## The Bears Coaches

**GEORGE HALAS** Founder and owner of the Bears and one of the organizers of the National Football League, George Halas is a native Chicagoan who prepped at Crane Tech high school from where he went to the University of Illinois. This is his 41st season in pro football and his 33rd as head coach of his Bears whom he led from 1920 through 1929; from 1933 until November 1942 when he entered the Navy; from 1946 through 1955; and from 1958 to the present.

Before all that, Halas starred in football, basketball and baseball at Illinois, graduating in 1918 and immediately going into the Navy. He was a member of Great Lakes' championship football team of 1918 that won the Rose Bowl game of Jan. 1, 1919. After leaving the Navy, he played outfield briefly for the New York Yankees before a leg injury shortened his baseball career. In 1920, he coached and played for the Decatur, Ill., Staleys football team that the following season moved to Chicago and became the Bears. Halas retired as an active player in 1929. In world war 2, he served as Welfare and Recreation Officer of the Pacific Fleet and was decorated with the Bronze Star by Admiral Nimitz.

**PADDY DRISCOLL** John L. "Paddy" Driscoll, an assistant since 1941, also was head coach in 1956 and 1957. He led the Bears to a Western division title in 1956. A graduate of Northwestern University and a native of Chicago, Paddy was a team mate of Halas at Great Lakes and, after playing briefly for the Chicago Cardinals, he joined the Bears as a player in 1925. He also played baseball with the Chicago Cubs one season. Driscoll was one of football's greatest practitioners of a lost art, drop-kicking, and holds NFL league records for most drop-kicked field goals in a game, four; and the longest drop-kicks, 50 yards twice.



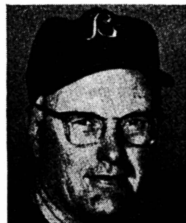
**DRISCOLL**

**CLARK SHAUGHNESSY** Clark Shaughnessy, technical advisor since 1951, specializes on defense. This is his 45th season as a coach in a career dating from his graduation from the University of Minnesota which he attended after his high school days in his home town of St. Cloud, Minn. His record includes head coaching positions at Stanford, Tulane, Maryland, Pittsburgh, University of Chicago and Loyola of the South as well as with the Los Angeles Rams. He also held an advisory coaching position with the Washington Redskins. He is a noted exponent of the T-formation.



**SHAUGHNESSY**

**LUKE JOHNSOS** Luke Johnsos is a real veteran of the Bears, first as a player and then, in 1937 as a member of the coaching staff. This is his 32nd season overall since he graduated from Northwestern University. With the Bears, he holds the record of association with six world championship teams, either as player or coach. He also had a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds before joining the Bears in 1929. When Halas entered the Navy in 1942, Johnsos and Hunk Anderson became co-coaches, leading the Bears to the championship in 1943. Away from football, Luke is a partner in Johnsos-Coppock Printers, Skokie, Ill.



**JOHNSOS**

**PHIL HANDLER** Phil Handler, line coach, was one of the National Football League's finest linemen himself. He is a native Texan who graduated from Texas Christian, then began a six-season pro career in 1930 with the Cardinals. He was assistant coach of the team under, in order, Ernie Nevers, Milan Creighton and Jimmy Conzelman. Handler's scouting was held largely responsible for the success of the 1947-'48 Cardinals. In 1943 and again in 1945, he was their head coach and in 1949, was co-coach with Ray Parker. He joined the Bears staff in 1952. In the off-season, he is a salesman for the Douglas Lumber Company.



**HANDLER**

**CHARLES "CHUCK" MATHER** "Chuck" Mather is in his third season with the Bears. He came from the University of Kansas where he achieved a spectacular rebuilding program—from a 0-10 record in 1954, his first season there, to second place in the Big Eight Conference in 1957. He won Conference Coach of the Year Honors in 1957. Before going to Kansas, he developed six straight Ohio state championship teams at Massillon Washington high school, with a 57-3 record. He holds an M. A. degree from Kent State and is a noted football innovator who developed use of IBM in evaluation of players and closed circuit TV on sidelines.



**MATHER**

**GEORGE ALLEN** George Allen joined the Bears staff in October 1958 after having been end coach of the Los Angeles Rams in 1957. Previously, he had a successful collegiate coaching career at Whittier, Cal., College and at Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa. At Whittier, Allen's teams had a 17-7 conference record for six seasons with a 9-0 season mark in 1952. He is a native of Detroit who played varsity football at Marquette and Alma, Mich., college under the Navy world war 2 program and then went to Michigan where he was on the varsity wrestling team coached by Cliff Keen.



**ALLEN**

**SID LUCKMAN** Sid Luckman is in his fifth season as coach of the quarterbacks. He is one of the Bears' and the National Football League all-time greats who retired as a player in 1951 after having led the team to championships in 1940, '41, '43 and '46. He won the Most Valuable Player award in 1943 and was all-NFL quarterback from 1941 through 1947, inclusive. His 12-season career with the Bears followed a brilliant collegiate record at Columbia University. He is a native of Brooklyn and presently is vice president of Cellucraft in Chicago.



**LUCKMAN**

**ED ROZY** Ed Rozy has been trainer of the Bears since 1948 and is regarded as one of the nation's foremost in his profession. He is a protege of the famed Matt Bullock and came to the Bears from Marquette University where, in addition to his duties as trainer, he coached boxing, wrestling and fencing.

## **JOHN ADAMS Fullback 6'3" 235 Los Angeles State 2nd Season**

Joined Bears: 1959, no. 4 selection. Born: Nov. 28, 1937, San Diego, Cal.

Illness in his family caused him to report late and miss much of 1959 training campaign. He stayed on roster all season, breaking in mainly on kickoff and punt return units. Adams' final varsity year at Los Angeles State, 1958, saw him average 6.4 yards rushing, with 718 on 114 carries; catch 11 passes for 62 yards; return nine kickoffs 326 yards, including one for 105.

## **DOUG ATKINS End 6'8" 255 Tennessee 6th Season (8th NFL)**

Joined Bears: 1955, trade from Cleveland. Born: May 8, 1930, Humboldt, Tenn.

One of the league's largest defensive ends, he's a towering terror at rushing the passer and a deadly protector against ground assaults directed at his flank. Chosen three straight times for West team in Pro Bowl, 1958, '59, '60, and voted game's outstanding lineman in 1959. He was the Browns' no. 1 choice of 1953, following selection as All-American tackle at Tennessee where he enrolled originally on a basketball scholarship. Regular at Cleveland two years before trade to Bears.

## **JOHN AVENI End 6'3" 210 Indiana 2nd Season**

Joined Bears: 1959, no. 27 selection. Born: March 17, 1935, Glassboro, N. J.

Used almost exclusively as a place kicker last year and, in addition to all kickoffs, he booted 28 extra points of 32 attempts. His field goal record (10 of 19 tries) was third best in league, percentage-wise, back of Bobby Layne (11 of 17) and Pat Summerall (20 of 29). In season finale against Detroit, he kicked three field goals. He also had two three-pointers in each of the first two games on 1959 schedule, against Green Bay (one for 46 yards) and against Baltimore (one for 42 yards).

## **ERICH BARNES Halfback 6'2½" 198 Purdue 3rd Season**

Joined Bears: 1958, no. 4 selection. Born: July 4, 1935, Elkhart, Ind.

An even more effective defensive back in his NFL sophomore campaign of '59 than he was as a rookie. Last year, intercepted five passes for 67 yards return to increase career total to nine for 157. He's aggressively efficient at breaking through to block place kick attempts too and in 1958, one of his two touchdowns came after he had smothered a Los Angeles Ram field goal try, recovered the loose ball and raced for the score.

## **BILL BISHOP Tackle 6'4" 248 Tex. State 9th Season**

Joined Bears: 1952, no. 11 selection. Born: May 8, 1931, Borger, Tex.

Bishop, defensive right tackle since his rookie campaign, is the fourth graduate of North Texas State to play with the Bears. Others are center Larry Strickland, 1954-'59; halfback Loyd Lowe, 1954; end Joe Abbey, 1948; end Abe Croft, 1944. He still recalls, with a grin, that in 1952, the season he broke in with the Bears, there were fifteen other tackles in camp. Bishop played in the 1955 Pro Bowl and at North Texas State, he was all-Conference two years and selected to the all-Texas defensive honor team in 1951.

## **CHARLES BIVINS Halfback 6'2" 212 Morris Brown (Ga.) 1st Season**

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 7 selection. Born: October 16, 1938, Atlanta, Ga.

Comes highly recommended as a pass receiver with tremendous speed, as evidenced by his time of :09.4 for the 100-yard dash in track. He's rangy and heavy and for three seasons, was the offensive star of the Atlanta, Ga., college.

## **ZEKE BRATKOWSKI Quarterback 6'2½" 203 Georgia 5th Season**

Joined Bears: 1954, no. 2 selection in '53. Born: Oct. 20, 1931, Danville, Ill.

Two years in U. S. Air Force (1955-'56) followed an excellent rookie campaign, 1954, when he completed 67 of 130 pass attempts for 1,087 yards and eight touchdowns, punted 39 times for a 41-yard average. He has not quite come back to that first year record but has performed well in frequent appearances, both as starter and replacement, in past three years. As collegian at Georgia, he led nation in passing yardage in 1952, with 1,824 yards, and topped punters in 1953 with 42.6 average.

## **ED BROWN Quarterback 6:2 208 San Francisco 7th Season**

Joined Bears: 1954, no. 7 selection in '52. Born: Oct. 26, 1928, San Luis Obispo, Cal.

Bears' leading passer and punter the past five seasons, with 1959 his best campaign in passes attempted, completed, yards and touchdowns—247-125-1881-13. In 1956, his totals were less than in '59, but he became only Bear player in a long line of great passers to lead NFL with 57.1 completion mark and average gain of 9.92 yards. He collaborated with Harlon Hill in two longest touchdown passes in Bear history—88 yards last season and 86 in 1955, both against Los Angeles Rams.

## **J. C. CAROLINE Halfback 6'1" 190 Illinois 5th Season**

Joined Bears: 1956, no. 7 selection. Born: January 17, 1933, Columbia, S. C.

A speedy defensive back in three of his four years with the Bears. Only in 1958 was he given a shot at offensive assignments and he gained 121 yards on 33 rushes, caught five passes for 78 yards, one touchdown. Otherwise, he has been a defensive stalwart in sharp contrast to his collegiate record at Illinois where, as a sophomore in 1953, his 1,670 yards rushing led the nation and broke both Red Grange's and the Big Ten single season records.

## **RICK CASARES Fullback 6'2½" 225 Florida 6th Season**

Joined Bears: 1955, no. 2 selection in '54. Born: July 4, 1931, Tampa, Fla.

The latest in a succession of great Bear fullbacks, who has led the team in rushing five straight seasons with his 3,848 yards not too far short of Bronko Nagurski's all-time Bears rushing record of 4,031 yards. Rick has gained 100 or more yards per game thirteen times, with a high of 190 in 1956. Also scored four touchdowns in a game twice, against Pittsburgh here last season and against San Francisco in 1956. Holds club record for touchdowns rushing with 34. Longest single gain, 81 yards in 1955. ALL-NFL offensive fullback, 1956, when he led league in rushing with 1,126 yards. Pro bowl, every year from 1956 through 1960.

## **ANGELO COIA Halfback 6'2" 211 Southern California 1st Season**

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 20 selection. Born: April 21, 1938, Philadelphia.

Star of the Copper Bowl post-season game at Phoenix, Ariz., in which he scored two touchdowns for the winning National All Stars. Did not play too much as senior at Southern California because of injuries, but in his junior year, he was a sensation—237 yards on 48 tries for a 4.9 average.

## **BILL DE COLIGNY Tackle 6'3" 248 Trinity (Conn.) 1st Season**

Joined Bears: 1960, free agent. Born: May 17, 1937, Hartford, Conn.

Capable defensive lineman and team mate of Roger Leclerc at the Hartford, Conn., college, he reputedly has aggressiveness to match his size.

## **ROGER DAVIS Guard 6'3½" 235 Syracuse 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 1 selection. Born: June 23, 1938, Cleveland, O.**

Unanimous all-American guard and voted "Lineman of the Year" in 1959 as one of the big stars of Syracuse's national championship squad. He has played all line positions except center, but his forte is offensive guard. Actually was an offensive end in high school so his speed and agility have served him well since his shift to the interior of the line. Hobby, in which he's associated with his dad, is breeding hounds and running them in field trials. At Syracuse, majored in physical education. A member of 1960 College All Stars, he did not play in the game because of an ankle injury received in practice.

## **WILLARD DEWVEALL End 6'4" 218 Southern Methodist 2nd Season**

**Joined Bears: 1959, no. 2 selection in '58. Born: April 29, 1936, Springtown, Tex.**

A real find at offensive end last season when he caught 20 passes for 420 yards and three touchdowns, including one 76-yarder that touched off the 31-7 rout of the Cardinals at Soldier Field. He was a high school fullback, shifted to end at Southern Methodist where he won three letters and was all-Southwest Conference.

## **JIM DOOLEY End 6'4" 198 Miami (Fla.) 7th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1952, no. 1 selection. Born: Feb. 8, 1930, Stoutsville, Mo.**

Led Bears' pass receivers last season for third time since he joined team. Also was top receiver in 1953 (53 for 841 yards) and in 1957 (37 for 530). He made a great comeback in 1959, after missing entire '58 schedule because of fractured ankle suffered before that season opened. Considered one of league's best down-and-out receivers. Voted outstanding player, and winner of Eisenhower Trophy, in 1959 Armed Forces victory over Giants when he caught ten passes for 137 yards, and two touchdowns.

## **MERRILL DOUGLAS Fullback 6'0" 204 Utah 3rd Season**

**Joined Bears: 1958, no. 6 selection. Born: March 15, 1936, Salt Lake City**

As understudy to Rick Casares, Douglas obviously is played only sparingly. But, an adaptable, shifty runner, he also has been used as a halfback. At Utah, he was All-Skyline Conference fullback his last two seasons and as a senior, scored eleven touchdowns for loop scoring title. In 1957 game against Army, he rammed over for two touchdowns.

## **STAN FANNING Tackle 6'6" 252 Idaho 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 11 selection. Born: Nov. 22, 1937, Peoria, Ill.**

Came to the team on a trade with Philadelphia Eagles who gave up their eleventh player selection. Back in 1936, his dad, Paul Fanning, then a Kansas State tackle, was selected by the Eagles but played in the NFL only briefly. Stan was offensive center and defensive tackle or end at Idaho and in high school at Pullman, Wash., he was an all-state selection. At Idaho, majored in agriculture.

## **JOHN FARRINGTON End 6'3" 217 Prairie View (Tex.) 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 16 selection. Born: Jan. 1, 1936, Houston.**

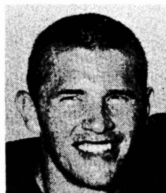
Recommended as an excellent pass receiver at Prairie View, Tex., College for whom he starred in the victory in the 1959 Orange Blossom game as well as during the undefeated 1958 schedule. Industrial education major.

### **JOE FORTUNATO Linebacker 6'1" 225 Mississippi State 6th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1955, no. 8 selection, '53. Born: March 28, 1930, Mingo Junction, O.**

Right linebacker on defense since he joined the Bears in 1955, following two years in the Army at Fort Benning, Ga. At Mississippi State, he had been an offensive fullback with a 6.09 average on 779 yards in his senior year, when he also was captain. Pro Bowl, 1959.

### **WILLIE GALIMORE Halfback 6'1" 187 Florida A. & M. 4th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1957, no. 5 selection in '56. Born: March 30, 1930, St. Augustine, Fla.**

His 1959 offensive performance was below his outstanding efforts of his first two years when he totaled 1,157 yards and scored thirteen touchdowns. Last year, he ran 58 times for 199 yards and one touchdown, caught ten passes for 125 yards and two touchdowns. He is one of three Bears (others, Hill and Casares) to score four touchdowns in a game, a feat that occurred against the Rams in 1957.

### **BILL GEORGE Linebacker 6'2½" 235 Wake Forest 9th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1952, no. 4 selection in '51. Born: Oct. 27, 1929, Waynesburg, Pa.**

Defensive captain of the Bears since 1956, he has been an all-NFL selection as linebacker or middle guard five straight years, beginning in 1955. Played in Pro Bowl six times, from 1955 through 1960. He also was called upon to place kick quite a bit in 1954 and his record shows four field goals in seven attempts and 14 extra points out of 15 tries. He was an All-American tackle at Wake Forest in 1951.

### **HARLON HILL End 6'3" 200 Florence, Ala., Teachers 7th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1954, no. 15 selection. Born: May 4, 1932, Florence, Ala.**

The Bears' greatest pass receiver of all time with most catches (218) and yards (4,467) as well as being within range of Ken Kavanaugh's team record of 50 touchdown passes. Hill has 40, including four in a game once, in that memorable win at San Francisco in 1954. He also has the longest completed pass for a Bears' touchdown, 88 yards last season. Voted Rookie-of-the-Year in 1954, he was all-NFL offensive end in 1954, '55 and '56 and played in the Pro Bowl in 1955, '56 and '57. Led the Bears in pass receiving three times. Severe ankle injury, suffered in eighth game of 1958, threatened to end his career but he came back spectacularly in 1959, as fast and shifty as ever.

### **STAN JONES Guard 6'1" 250 Maryland 7th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1954, no. 5 selection in '53. Born: Nov. 24, 1931, Lemoyne, Pa.**

Selected all-NFL offensive guard in 1959 for third time in career. Previously, he was honored in 1955-'56 and also played in Pro Bowl five straight times, from 1956 through 1960. A unanimous all-American and "Lineman of the Year" in 1953, he is one of football's strongest individuals and once was a weight-lifting champion.

## **TED KARRAS Guard 6'1" 242 Indiana 1st Season (3rd NFL)**

**Joined Bears: 1960, trade from Pittsburgh. Born: Gary, Ind., Jan. 31, 1934.**

Native of Gary and member of a famous football family that also includes Alex, a Detroit Lions' lineman, and Lou, who played at Purdue. After lettering at Indiana, Ted enlisted in the Marine Corps where, in 1957, he was an all-Service selection. In 1958, he was in the Bears' training camp but just before the season opened, he was sold to the Steelers. Performed on both offense and defense during two seasons with the Steelers who traded him back to the Bears for a player selection during the off-season.

## **KEN KIRK Center 6'2" 230 Mississippi 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 9 selection. Born: Feb. 26, 1938, Tupelo, Miss.**

Defensive captain of second nationally ranked Mississippi eleven that last season lost only to Louisiana State (7-3) in the regular schedule but reversed the result in the Sugar Bowl with a decisive 21-0 victory. Kirk also played with post season winning Ole Miss teams in his previous two seasons—in Sugar Bowl over Texas, 36-7, as a sophomore and in Gator Bowl over Florida, 7-3, as a junior. Actually started as an offensive fullback but in next to the last game of his soph season, he was switched to center. He was voted most valuable lineman award in 1960 Senior Bowl game. Majored in banking and finance and in off-season, has been employed as stock and bond salesman in Vicksburg, Miss. He was a member of this year's College All Stars.

## **BOB KONOVSKY Guard 6'2" 245 Wisconsin 1st Season (5th NFL)**

**Joined Bears: 1960, trade from Cardinals. Born: Aug. 19, 1934, Cicero, Ill.**

Son of the chief of police of suburban Cicero, Konovsky was an outstanding tackle at Wisconsin as well as winner of Big Ten wrestling championship three times and NCAA title twice. He was the Cardinals' seventh selection of 1956 and a regular offensive guard in 1958 and 1959.

## **ED KOVAC Halfback 6'0" 197 Cincinnati 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 6 selection. Born: April 22, 1938, McKeesport, Pa.**

Kovac ranked fifth nationally in scoring (90 points) and seventh in pass receiving (31 for 332 yards) last season. Of his 15 touchdowns, nine were by rushing, in which category he gained 515 yards on 134 attempts. He also threw three left handed passes, completing two, both for touchdowns and was a member of this year's College All Stars. Last year, he drove for first downs 32 times and eighteen of these were third or fourth down situations.

## **ROGER LECLERC Center 6'3" 235 Trinity (Conn.) 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 15 in '59. Born: Oct. 1, 1936, Springfield, Mass.**

Leclerc was selected as a "future" by the Bears a year ago, when he had one season of eligibility remaining at the Hartford, Conn., school. As a senior, he was named to the Little All America, the All-East and All-New England teams and voted the Maxwell Memorial Award. Last season, he probably was the highest scoring center in the nation for he led his team's scorers with 27 points, two touchdowns on runbacks of intercepted passes and 15 extra points place kicked on 20 tries. He intercepted five passes in all, returning them 188 yards, and did 95 percent of the punting and kickoffs. He was a member of this year's College All Stars. At Trinity, he majored in education and history.

### **HERMAN LEE Tackle 6'4" 247 Florida A. & M. 3rd Season (4th NFL)**

Joined Bears: 1958, no. 23 selection in '54. Born: July 1, 1933, Phenix, City, Ala.

Lee has developed into one of the best offensive tackles and finest blockers in the league. He first got a tryout with the Bears in 1956, after two years in the Army, but didn't make it. In 1957, he was traded to Pittsburgh. He played there one season, then returned to the Bears on a trade and has been regular offensive tackle since.

### **EARL LEGGETT Tackle 6'3" 250 Louisiana State 4th Season**

Joined Bears: 1957, no. 1 selection. Born: March 5, 1933, Jacksonville, Fla.

Leggett has more than justified his selection as the no. 1 choice of 1957. This was emphasized particularly last season when he functioned expertly at either defensive end or tackle. Speed, size and agility plus fine reactions and steady improvement have made him a valued member of the defensive unit. He was an All-American junior college selection at Hinds J. C., then transferred to Louisiana State for his last two years of eligibility, winning all-Southeastern Conference honors.

### **PETE MANNING End 6'3" 208 Wake Forest 1st Season**

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 8 selection. Born: Aug. 11, 1937, Hudson, Mass.

He's all-Atlantic Conference end who, in three seasons at Wake Forest, caught 48 passes for 693 yards and three touchdowns and returned five kickoffs 62 yards. He went to the southern school after a brilliant record as a high school fullback in Massachusetts. As a sophomore at Wake Forest, he was the no. 2 fullback, carrying the ball 64 times for 201 yards and never being thrown for a loss. Because of a shortage of ends, he was switched to that position in the spring of 1959 and that fall, was second high pass receiver in the conference with 25 for 307 yards.

### **JOHN MELLEKAS Center 6'3" 255 Arizona 4th Season**

Joined Bears: 1956, no. 4 selection. Born: June 14, 1933, Newport, R. I.

Mellekas took over the starting center job last season although most of his previous experience was at tackle. He had gone into the Army after his rookie campaign of '56, and in two years of service football at Fort Dix, N. J., won second team All-Army and All-Service honors. Returning in 1958, he was shifted to center because of injuries to Larry Strickland but he became the regular in '59. At Arizona, he was all-Border Conference tackle.

### **JOHNNY MORRIS Halfback 5'10" 180 U. C. S. Barbara 3rd Season**

Joined Bears: 1958, no. 12 selection. Born: Sept. 26, 1935, Long Beach, Cal.

He's an aggressive back with tremendous speed—in college he was co-holder of the world's 50-yard dash record of :05.2. As a rookie in 1958, he was a sensational find, fourth in the league in kickoff returns and third in rushing among the Bears. Last season, he was even better—he led the league in punt returns, 14 for 171 yards; was fourth in kickoff returns, 17 for 438; second to Casares in rushing by the Bears, 312 yards on 87 tries; and caught 13 passes for 197 yards. Against the Rams here, he returned a punt 78 yards for a touchdown, second in all-time Bears' records only to "Scooter" McLean's 89-yarder in 1942. His two-year kickoff return performance of 33 for 707 yards is second only in the all-time team category to Ron Drzewiecki's 38 for 906 yards.

### **LARRY MORRIS Linebacker 6'2" 230 Ga. Tech 2nd Season (5th NFL)**

**Joined Bears: 1959, trade with Washington. Born: Dec. 10, 1933, Decatur, Ga.**

The Bears gave up their no. 2 player selection to Washington for Larry Morris, just before the start of 1959 campaign. He was an instant asset as a linebacker and, among other exploits, recovered a fumble and ran it back 19 yards against Los Angeles. The Rams had made him their no. 1 choice in 1955 after he had been All-American center at Georgia Tech. Played regularly with the Rams until after 1958 campaign when they traded him to Washington for Gene Brito. The Redskins in turn traded him to the Bears.

### **RICHIE PETITBON Halfback 6'3" 205 Tulane 2nd Season**

**Joined Bears: 1959, no. 2 selection. Born: April 18, 1938, New Orleans.**

A brilliant offensive quarterback noted for his versatility at Tulane, Petitbon broke in as a rookie with a season-long outstanding defensive record. His pass interception and 33-yard return for a touchdown gave the Bears a lead against the world champion Colts at Baltimore that they never relinquished during the course of a 26-21 victory. His adjustment to defensive responsibilities exclusively was considered all the more remarkable because in his final varsity season at Tulane, he led his team in passing and scoring and was second in rushing. He scored both touchdowns in the 14-6 defeat of Navy and, though on a team with an indifferent record, he was selected as All-Southeastern quarterback.

### **JUSTIN ROWLAND End 6'2" 188 Texas Christian 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 12 selection in '59. Born: May 10, 1937, Hamlin, Tex.**

His brother, Brad, was a Bear halfback several seasons ago. Justin, chosen as a "future" on the 12th round of the NFL player selection a year ago, was a key performer on Texas Christian's 1959 co-champion of the Southwest Conference. He was originally an offensive end with speed and sure-handed pass receiving talents but in his final season, was shifted to defensive halfback. He played in four post-season bowl games—two with Arlington State (Texas) Junior College in the Junior Rose Bowl and two with Texas Christian in the Cotton Bowl and the Blue Bonnet Bowl. He is a physical education major.

### **CHARLIE SUMNER Halfback 6'1" 195 William & Mary 4th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1955, no. 22 selection in '54. Born: Oct. 19, 1930, Salem, Va.**

In three seasons, he has intercepted sixteen passes for 251 yards return, which compares favorably with the Bears' all-time co-leaders, 21 each by George McAfee in eight seasons (294 yards); and Don Kindt in nine seasons (348 yards). After starring as a rookie in 1955, he went into the U. S. Army the next two years, returning in 1958 to resume his fine play. Among his eleven kickoff returns for 307 yards in three years is an 81-yarder in 1955. In 1958, he recovered a fumble and ran it back 86 yards for a touchdown against the Cardinals. He was a quarterback at William & Mary.

### **LIONEL TAYLOR Halfback 6'2" 215 N. Mexico Highlands 2nd Season**

**Joined Bears: 1959, free agent. Born: Aug. 15, 1935, Las Vegas, N.M.**

In Bears' camps of 1958 and 1959, but didn't break into regular roster until after last year's schedule opened. Then, he got into eight games, essentially with the kicking units although he did run several plays from the flanker end.

As end at Notre Dame, won three letters and was picked on fifth round of 1959 player selection by Washington Redskins. He was not retained into the regular schedule last season. He played in the 1959 College All Star game after having starred in two post-season bowl games, the North-South and the Senior. Has BA in sociology.

## **GLENN SHAW Halfback 6'1" 217 Kentucky 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 11 selection. Born: July 11, 1938, Paducah, Ky.**

He's a rugged back who started 23 of 30 games in three seasons at Kentucky, with a 4.34 rushing average his last two years. As a junior, he scored the only touchdown in the 7-2 victory over Tennessee. Injuries hampered him as a sophomore, following a sensational freshman year when he averaged 11.7 yards a try. As a junior, he got in 287 minutes playing time and a senior last season, he was in for 351 minutes. Personnel management major.

## **FRED WILLIAMS Tackle 6'4" 248 Arkansas 9th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1952, no. 5 selection. Born: Feb. 8, 1930, Little Rock, Ark.**

One of game's finest defensive tackles, he has played in the Pro Bowl five times, 1953-'54, '58 '59, '60. He was voted outstanding player and Eisenhower trophy winner in the 1957 Armed Forces Benefit game. Off the field, he's an amiable, drawing wit with a highly developed sense of Ozarkian-type humor. At Arkansas, where he was all-Southwest Conference, also was an intercollegiate wrestling and boxing champion.

## **MAURY YOUMANS Tackle 6'6" 235 Syracuse 1st Season**

**Joined Bears: 1960, no. 9 selection in '59. Born: Oct. 18, 1936, Eagle Bay, N. Y.**

Another "future" from the player selection of last year, Youmans, though listed as a tackle, also has performed expertly at defensive and offensive end. He was a team mate of Bears' no. 1 selection Roger Davis on Syracuse's national championship team and also was with this year's College All Stars. He was a star basketball player, as well an outstanding football and baseball player, at North Syracuse high school. With the university, he played in the Cotton Bowl as a sophomore and again as a senior and in the Orange Bowl as a junior. Majored in sociology.

## **VIC ZUCCO Halfback 6'0" 187 Michigan State 4th Season**

**Joined Bears: 1957, no. 5 selection. Born: Sept. 4, 1935, Renton, Pa.**

Suffering a fractured collarbone in the second game last season, Zucco had to sit out the rest of the schedule. In previous years, he developed rapidly as a defensive back with speed and fine instincts as his main assets. He starred as a senior at Michigan State, after transferring there from Wayne University (Detroit) where he had gained more than 1,000 yards in two seasons.

In 1953, President Dwight D. Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player of the Armed Forces game, selected by sports writers attending. Player's name is inscribed on trophy and he receives a replica of the beautiful award. Here are players honored so far:

For the sixth straight year, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers sponsor the fifteenth annual Armed Forces Benefit game, whose latest renewal, Friday night, Sept. 16 at Soldier Field, will match the Bears against the Pittsburgh Steelers.

As members of the Chicago Newspaper Publishers Association, Chicago's American, the Daily News, the Sun-Times and the Tribune have contributed enthusiastic support to the success of a contest first held in 1946.

That inaugural came about at a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz, representing the Navy; General Ira Eaker, acting for the head of the Air Force, General Carl Spaatz; Ralph Cannon, then sports editor of the Chicago Herald-American; and George Helas.

The Herald-American sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947, followed by the Sun-Times from 1949 through 1954. In 1955, the Chicago Newspaper Publishers Association took over sponsorship and the worthy enterprise became even more successful than it had been previously.

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society. Those official relief agencies provide financial assistance to widows and orphans of servicemen . . . care and assistance to wounded servicemen and their families . . . hospital and medical aid to needy families and dependents of servicemen . . . prenatal and obstetrical care to needy servicemen's families . . . and cash grants to service personnel and dependents in emergencies.

Fourteen previous Armed Forces games have netted \$591,067.17.

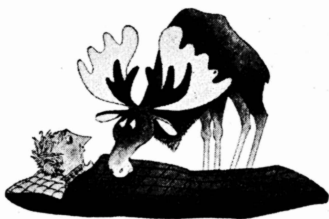

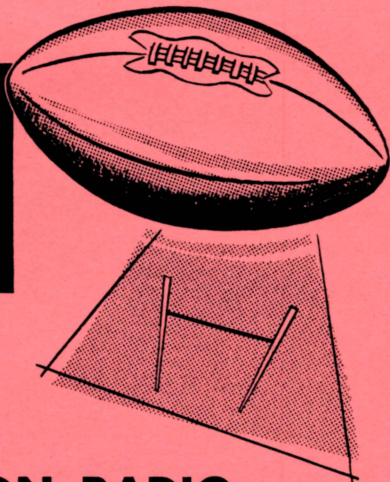
