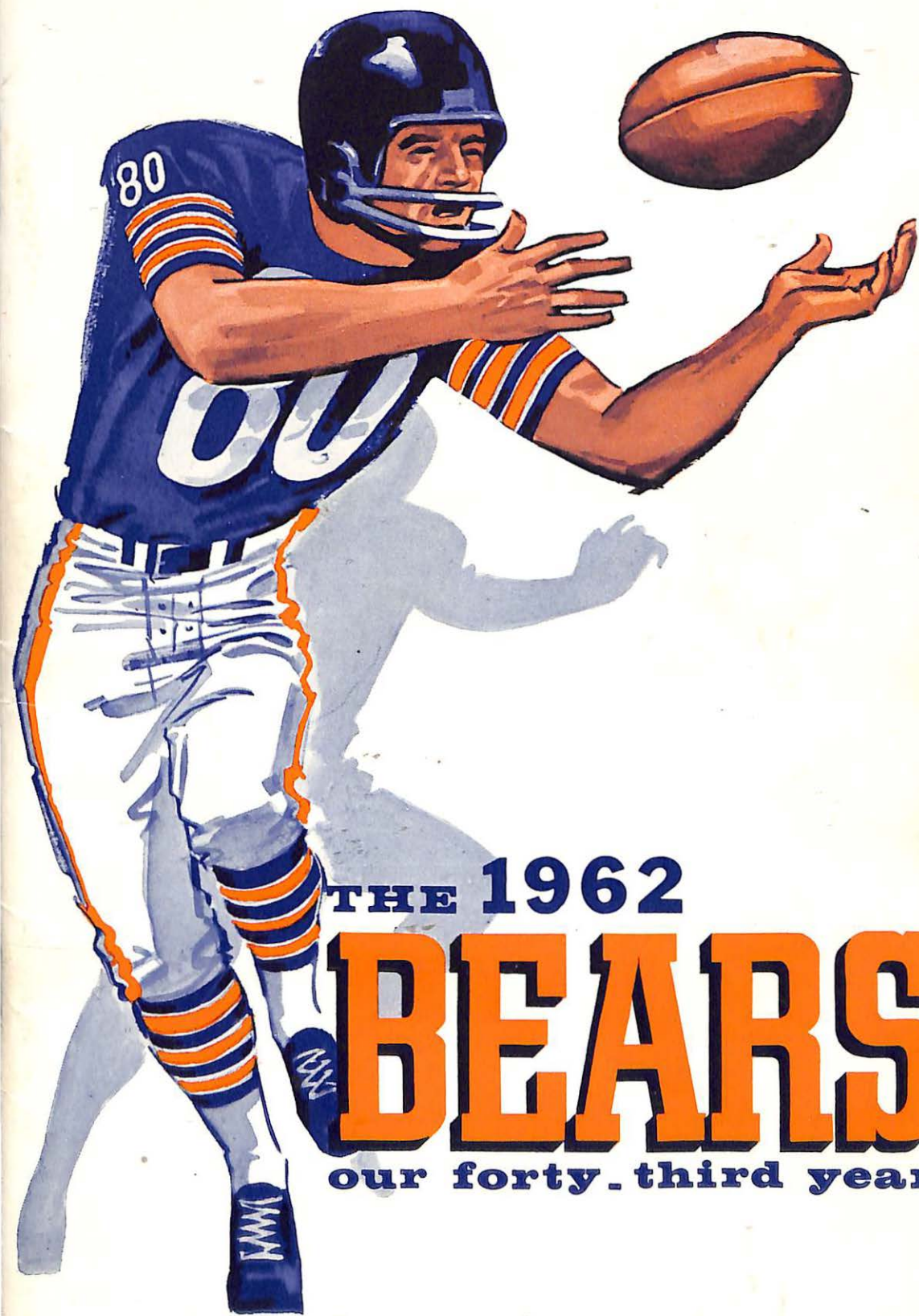

BEARS ROAD GAMES ON TV



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For the third straight season, all Bears' National Football League road games will be televised in Chicago over WBBM-TV (Channel 2). The CBS presentations are telecast by two all-time Bear greats, Red Grange, All American from Illinois and one of the greatest players in NFL history; and George Connor, All-N.F.L. tackle five times and an All-American at Notre Dame.

ALL Bears' games, home and road, will be broadcast by radio station W-G-N with Jack Brickhouse presenting the play-by-play and Irv Kupcinet the color commentary.

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The Bears Coaches

GEORGE HALAS is in his 43rd season of professional football and his 35th as head coach of the Bears who came into existence under his leadership in 1920. They were then known as the Decatur, Ill., Staleys but in 1921, the team was transferred to Chicago and became known as the Bears. The name was adopted because they took up playing residence in the home of the Chicago baseball Cubs, Wrigley Field.

Halas' coaching career with his team is divided into four time periods—1920 through 1929; 1933 until November 1942 when he entered the Navy in world war 2; 1946 through 1955; and 1958 to the present. His personal coaching record shows 280 victories, 114 defeats, 26 ties and only four of 34 seasons resulting in sub-.500 finishes. He had two undefeated, untied teams; six that lost only one in a season; four that lost two; seven that lost three.

Halas is a native Chicagoan who went to the University of Illinois from Crane Tech high school. He starred in football, basketball and baseball at Illinois and joined the Navy in world war 1 immediately after his graduation in 1918. He was with the Great Lakes championship eleven that won the Rose Bowl game of Jan. 1, 1919 and after leaving the Navy, played outfield briefly with the New York Yankees before a leg injury shortened his baseball career.

He was an active pro football player until 1929. In world war 2, he served as Welfare and Recreation Officer of the Pacific Fleet and was decorated with the Bronze Star by Admiral Nimitz.

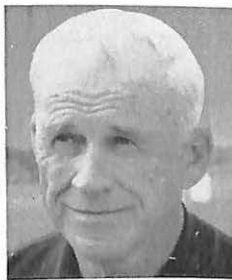
JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL has been an assistant since 1941 with two seasons, 1956 and 1957, as head coach. The Bears won a Western division title under his leadership in 1956. Like Halas a native of Chicago, Paddy was his team mate at Great Lakes, following a brilliant career at Northwestern University. He played briefly for the Cardinals, including a coaching stint in 1921-'22, but joined the Bears as a player in 1925. He also was an infielder with the Cubs for one season. Driscoll was one of football's all-time great drop kickers whose NFL records include most drop kicked field goals in a game, four; and the longest, 50 yards twice.

CLARK SHAUGHNESSY is in his twelfth season as technical advisor of the Bears, specializing on defense. This is his 47th season as a coach since he graduated from the University of Minnesota. His home town was St. Cloud, Minn., but he never played high school football there and was introduced to the sport at Minnesota. Shaughnessy has been an NFL head coach at Los Angeles and an advisor with Washington. His collegiate positions include Stanford, Tulane, Maryland, Pittsburgh, University of Chicago and Loyola of New Orleans. He is most famous as exponent of the T-formation.

LUKE JOHNSOS is in his 34th season with the Bears, as a player or a coach, since his graduation from Northwestern. During this period, he was associated in one or the other capacity with six world championship teams. Before joining the Bears as an end in 1929, he had a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds, and in 1937, he became an assistant coach. When Halas entered the Navy in 1942, Luke became co-coach with Hunk Anderson and their 1943 Bears won the championship. During the offseason, Johnsos is employed by the Bagcraft Corporation of America.

PHIL HANDLER has been Bears' line coach since 1952. Before that, he first was one of the National Football League's finest linemen for six seasons with the Cardinals. He was head coach of the Cardinals in 1943 and 1945; and co-coach with Buddy Parker in 1949, all after he had served as assistant under Ernie Nevers, Milan Creighton and Jimmy Conzelman. He also did an effective scouting job for the 1947-'48 Cardinals. Phil is a Texan who attended Texas Christian before going into pro football in 1930. Away from the sport, he is a salesman for the Douglas Lumber Company in Chicago.

CHARLES "CHUCK" MATHER, in his fifth full season with the Bears, came from the University of Kansas where he rebuilt an 0-10 team of 1954 into a second place finisher in the Big Eight in 1957, winning conference Coach of the Year Honors. He went to Kansas from Massillon, Ohio, Washington high school where he coached six straight state champions with an overall 57-3 record. Mather holds an M.A. degree from Kent State and as a football innovator, developed IBM evaluation of players and the use of closed circuit TV on the sidelines.

GEORGE ALLEN came to the Bears in October 1958, following a 1957 campaign as Los Angeles Rams' end coach. Before that, he had been a successful college head coach for nine years, in two of which his teams ranked in the top three nationally on pass defense. He made a notable record for rebuilding teams and athletic programs. Allen is a Detroit native who played varsity football at Marquette and Alma, Mich., college under the Navy world war 2 program. He later went to Michigan where he was on the varsity wrestling team coached by Cliff Keen.

SID LUCKMAN, a Bears and NFL all-time great, has been quarterback coach since 1956. His 12-year playing career with the Bears included championship teams in 1940, '41, '43 and '46. He was all-NFL quarterback, 1941-'47, inclusive, and won Most Valuable Player honors in 1943. Sid retired as an active player in 1951. He hails from Brooklyn and was a brilliant college performer at Columbia University. He has made his home in Chicago since his playing days and is vice president of Cellu-Craft division of Rapid-America.

ED ROZY has been Bears' trainer since 1948. Before that, he was trainer at Marquette University where he also coached boxing, wrestling and fencing. Rozy is a protege of the famed Matt Bullock and is widely recognized as one of the nation's leaders in his profession.

JOHN ADAMS Fullback 6'3" 235 Los Angeles State 4th Season

Joined Bears: 1959, no. 4 selection. Born: Nov. 28, 1937, San Diego, Calif.

Versatile Adams has performed as a utility offensive specialist at five different positions —fullback, left half, left end, closed end and right end. In final season at Los Angeles State, he averaged 6.4 rushing, caught 11 passes for 62 yards and returned nine kickoffs for 326 yards.

ART ANDERSON Tackle 6'3" 244 Idaho 2nd Season

Joined Bears: 1961, Free Agent. Born: Oct. 9, 1937, Wahpeton, N.D.

Anderson played three years as a 212 pound tackle at University of Idaho without catching eye of pro scouts prior to joining the Marines in 1958. He was stationed at San Diego Marine Corps Depot where his weight increased to 244 pounds and he earned All-Service tackle honors. On being discharged in 1961, he was signed as a free agent and played brilliantly in pre-season games. He was promoted to varsity offensive tackle position early in '61 campaign. A stout blocker, he is regarded as one of the finest new linemen in the National Football League.

DOUG ATKINS End 6'8" 255 Tennessee 8th Season (10th NFL)

Joined Bears: 1955, trade from Cleveland. Born: May 8, 1930, Humboldt, Tenn.

Atkins has been one of the NFL's most consistent defensive ends since he broke in with the Cleveland Browns in 1953 as their no. 1 draft choice. He had been an All-American tackle at Tennessee, where he enrolled originally on a basketball scholarship. Physically, he's one of the league's largest defensive ends and has been a towering terror to opponents since he came to the Bears on a trade in 1955. He was a member of the West team in the Pro Bowl five straight years (1958 through 1962) and in 1959, was voted the outstanding lineman in the contest. All-NFL defensive end in 1960-'61.

BOBBY BETHUNE Halfback 5'11" 180 Miss. State 1st Season

Joined Bears: 1961, no. 9 selection. Born: Dec. 10, 1938, Leeds, Ala.

A star defensive halfback for Mississippi State, Bethune topped Southeastern Conference in pass interceptions with six during 1960 season. Slowed by injuries in preseason drills, he was placed on waivers and did not play for Bears in 1961. He has run 100 yards in track in 10.2.

CHARLES BIVINS Halfback 6'2" 212 Morris Brown 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 7 selection. Born: Oct. 16, 1938, Atlanta, Ga.

After sparkling as a rookie kick-off return specialist in 1960, Bivins last year set an all-time Bear mark for kickoff returns with 25 for 668 yards. He also rushed 43 times for a 4.37 average. Rangy and solid at 212 pounds, Bivins has tremendous speed as evidenced by his time of :09.4

BILL BROWN Fullback 5'11" 218 Illinois 2nd Season

Joined Bears: 1961, no. 2 selection. Born: June 29, 1938, Mendota, Ill.

Brown, handicapped by late reporting date and leg injuries, saw limited service in rookie '61 but nonetheless impressed with his hard running and tackling on the kickoff and punt return teams. Captained Illinois in 1960. Starred as North beat South, 41-14, in Miami Shrine game, setting game records for total yardage and attempts with 27 rushes for 129 yards. Won Big Ten indoor shot put title in '60 and outdoor title in '61. Member of 1961 College All Stars.

RUDY BUKICH Quarterback 6'2" 205 So. Cal 3rd Season (8th NFL)

Joined Bears: 1962, trade with Pittsburgh. Born: Dec. 15, 1932, St. Louis, Mo.

Last season, Bukich stepped in for injured Bobby Layne with Pittsburgh Steelers and wound up campaign tenth among NFL quarterbacks. Bears, who had him in 1958-'59, reacquired him from Steelers on offseason trade. Bukich, no. 2 draft choice of Los Angeles Rams in 1953, went into the Army for two years, returning in 1956. He was traded to Washington Redskins in 1957 and the following season, the Bears got him on waivers. His 1961 record with Steelers:

RON BULL Halfback 6' 200 Baylor 1st Season

Joined Bears: 1962, no. 1 selection. Born: Feb. 2, 1940, Kingsville, Tex.

Bull starred at halfback, fullback and defensive halfback for Baylor. He was named the most valuable player in the '61 Gotham Bowl and also was paired with Ernie Davis of Syracuse on the All-American team picked by pro talent scouts. Noted for speed and durability, Bull started 36 of 37 games at Baylor over four years, including five freshman contests. He was Baylor's leading pass receiver and runner three straight seasons, and broke the Baylor pass reception record held by Del Shofner (now of the Giants) with 59 catches for 635 yards. He was the Southwest conference's leading scorer in 1960 and averaged 4.6 yards per carry over three varsity seasons. Among Bull's track accomplishments is a 9.7 mark for the hundred yard dash, breaking the Texas high school records set by Bobby Morrow, twice Olympic champion. He also ran the 220 yard hurdles in 23.5.

J. C. CAROLINE Halfback 6'1" 190 Illinois 7th Season

Joined Bears: 1956, no. 7 selection. Born: January 17, 1933, Columbia, S. C.

Caroline, an all-time great at Illinois where in 1953 his 1,670 yards rushing led the nation and broke Red Grange's and the Big Ten single season records, has been a defensive stalwart with the Bears. Of present Bears, he is the pass interception leader with 19 for 297 yards return in six seasons. In 1961, he intercepted three passes for a 48 yard return total. Caroline was with the West squad in the 1957 Pro Bowl.

RICK CASARES Fullback 6'2½" 225 Florida 8th Season

Joined Bears: 1955, no. 2 selection in 1954. Born: July 4, 1931, Tampa, Fla.

Casares, who has led the Bears in rushing in six of the last seven seasons, holds more club records than any other present member of the team. In 1960, he increased his career rushing total to 4,414 yards on 1,076 carries to pass Bronko Nagurski (4,031) in the all-time Bears' standings. In 1961, he increased his career rushing total to 5,002 yards. He has 47 touchdowns running; has scored four touchdowns in a game twice; gained most yards in one season (1,126 on 234 tries in 1956); most yards one game (190 on 17 in 1956); most touchdowns one season, 1956 (12 running, 2 pass receptions), gained 100 or more yards in a game twelve times, all club records. He was all-NFL fullback in 1956 and has played for the West team in the Pro Bowl four times. An All-American prep selection at Tampa high school, he went on to star for two seasons at the University of Florida before going into the Army in 1954. His 1961 record with the Bears:

ANGELO COIA End 6'2" 202 Southern Calif. 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 20 selection. Born: April 21, 1938, Philadelphia.

Coia, a real rookie find who was the Bears' 20th draft choice, broke in as starting left end in the third game of the 1960 schedule and remained a regular to the end of the season. His showing for the year was the more remarkable because at Southern California, he was a halfback and so had to adjust to an unfamiliar position with the Bears. He also was thirteen pounds under his normal playing weight due to food poisoning that hospitalized him while he was engaging in the Olympic sprint trials of 1960. Last year, a leg injury slowed him until the final two games, against Cleveland and Minnesota, when he caught five passes, three for touchdowns. He had a 64-yard touchdown pass against the Browns and his two against Minnesota included one for 62 yards. As a junior halfback at Southern California, Coia averaged 4.9 yards rushing. Injuries idled him as a senior but in the Copper Bowl post-season game he scored two touchdowns for the winning National All Stars. His 1961 record with the Bears:

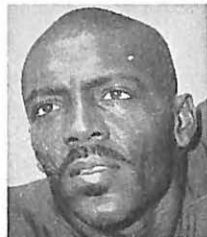

ROGER DAVIS Guard 6'3" 235 Syracuse 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 1 selection. Born: June 23, 1938, Cleveland, Ohio

Davis suffered an injury in the 1960 College All Stars camp that got him away to a slow start with the Bears. But as the season progressed the 1959 Syracuse All-American and Line-man of the Year developed rapidly to justify his no. 1 draft status. He is fast and agile despite his size and a natural in adaptability since he played every every offensive position except center during his collegiate and prep career. Took over first string guard assignment with Bears in 1961.

MIKE DITKA End 6'3" 230 Pittsburgh 2nd Season

Joined Bears: 1961, no. 1 selection. Born: Oct. 18, 1939, Carnegie, Pa.

Ditka was overwhelming choice for N.F.L. 1961 Rookie of The Year honors on record of catching 56 passes for 1,076 yards and 12 touchdowns. In Bears' all-time records, Ditka's 56 receptions rank second only to Jim Keane's 64 in 1947; his 1,076 yards are most accumulated by a Bear receiver since Harlan Hill totalled 1,128 in 1956; and his 12 touchdowns tied Hill for club record. In addition to leading Bear receivers, Ditka also bolstered running attack with fine blocking from closed end position. Selected to play on West team in Pro Bowl, a rare honor for a first year NFL performer. Ditka's versatility brought him All-American honors at Pitt in 1960 where he was a two-way-performer—defensively, a great at end and middle linebacker; offensively, an outstanding pass catcher and blocker as well as one of the nation's leading collegiate punters with a three-year average of 40 yards per boot. He starred in the East-West game at San Francisco and then repeated that triumph a few days later when he was voted the outstanding lineman in the East's 14-7 Hula Bowl victory over the West in Honolulu.

JIM DOOLEY End 6'4" 198 Miami (Fla.) University 9th Season

Joined Bears: 1952, no. 1 selection. Born: Feb. 8, 1931, Stoutsville, Mo.

Dooley, three times leader of the Bears in pass receptions, is regarded as one of the best down-and-out receivers in the NFL. After performing on defense in his rookie season of 1952, he was shifted to offensive end in 1953 and had his best single season record—53 pass receptions for 841 yards and four touchdowns. He also led his team in 1957 (35 for 517) and in 1959 (41 for 480). His '61 record with the Bears:

STAN FANNING Tackle 6'7" 270 Idaho 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 11 selection. Born: Nov. 22, 1937, Peoria, Ill.

Fanning finally stopped growing last year after adding one-half inch and 13 pounds during the '60 offseason. His size, strength and aggressiveness make him an effective blocker at tackle. He played defensive tackle and end at Idaho.

JOHN FARRINGTON End 6'3" 217 Prairie View, Tex. 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 16 selection. Born: Jan. 18, 1936, DeWalt, Tex.

After seeing limited service as a kickoff and punt return team specialist in 1960, Farrington took over the first team offensive left end spot in 1961 fall practice when a leg injury slowed Angelo Coia. He won the Eisenhower Trophy as outstanding player in 1961 Armed Forces Benefit Game when he caught touchdown passes of 90 and 75 yards in 24-21 victory over Pittsburgh. In season's fourth game against Lions at Detroit, Farrington grabbed a long pass from Bill Wade for a 98 yard touchdown and a new Bear record. JOE FORTUNATO Linebacker 6'1" 225 Mississippi State 8th Season

Joined Bears: 1955, no. 8 selection 1953. Born: March 28, 1931, Mingo Junction, O.

Fortunato returns for his eighth season as left linebacker in the Bears' stout, muscular trio that also includes Bill George and Larry Morris. Joe, whose home now is Natchez, Miss., is a vicious tackler and alert defensive man whose seven-year record shows twelve recovered fumbles and eight interceptions, including one for a 27-yard touchdown return. At Mississippi State, he was an offensive fullback with a 6.09 average and 779 yards rushing as a senior. Drafted by the Bears in 1953, he went into the Army at Fort Benning Ga., for two years. Pro Bowl, 1959.

WILLIE GALIMORE Halfback 6'1" 187 Fla. A. & M. 6th Season

Joined Bears: 1957, no. 5 selection in 1956. Born: March 30, 1935, St. Augustine, Fla.

Galimore experienced his greatest season as a Bear in 1961, rushing for 707 yards and gaining 502 more on pass receptions. He also captured team rushing leadership honors previously monopolized for six straight seasons by fullback Rick Casares. Key to Galimore's success was vast increase in pass catching effectiveness over 1960 when he grabbed only three for a total of 35 yards. Galimore now ranks third among Bears in all-time rushing statistics with a total of 2431 yards, trailing Casares (5002) and Nagurski (4031). Willie also shares Bears' one-game scoring record for four touchdowns with Casares and Harlon Hill. His 1961 record:

BILL GEORGE Linebacker 6'2½" 235 Wake Forest 11th Season

Joined Bears: 1952, no. 4 selection in 1951. Born: Oct. 27, 1930, Waynesburg, Pa.

George, all-NFL linebacker seven straight years beginning in 1955, has been defensive captain of the Bears since 1956. He is recognized as one of the shrewdest play diagnosticians in the league with the physical attributes to implement his defensive instincts. George was an All-American tackle, twice All-Southern Conference choice and National A.A.U. and conference wrestling champion at Wake Forest. He played with the West team in eight straight Pro Bowl games, 1955 through 1962. In '62 pro bowl battle, George's fierce tackle forced East's fullback Jim Brown to fumble with 70 seconds left, and George recovered to set up West's decisive TD in 31-30 triumph.

BOBBY JOE GREEN Halfback 5'11" 185 Florida 1st Season (3rd NFL)

Joined Bears: 1962, trade with Pittsburgh. Born: May 7, 1936, Gainesville, Fla.

Used exclusively as a punter by Pittsburgh Steelers, Green averaged 45.7 yards per boot for his two NFL campaigns. In 1960, his 44.2 average was second only to the 45.6 with which St. Louis' Jerry Norton won punting title. Green, however, got off the season's longest punt, a 75-yarder. Last year, he also was second with a 47-yard average to the 48.4 of Detroit's Lyn Lary. His 1961 record with Steelers:

STAN JONES Guard 6'1" 250 Maryland 9th Season

Joined Bears: 1954, no. 5 selection in 1953. Born: Nov. 24, 1931, Altoona, Pa.

Jones has represented the East in the last seven Pro Bowl games and has been named All-Pro offensive guard four times. He is the captain of the Bears' offensive platoon. At Maryland in 1953 Jones was a unanimous All-American Guard and was named Lineman of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association. He also was an intercollegiate weight lifting champion.

TED KARRAS Guard 6'1" 243 Indiana 3rd Season (5th NFL)

Joined Bears: 1960, trade with Pittsburgh. Born: Jan. 31, 1934, Gary, Ind.

Karras is a native of Gary and member of a famous football family. His brother, Alex is a Detroit Lions' defensive lineman, and another brother, Lou, played at Purdue and, after graduation, for three years with the Washington Redskins. Ted enlisted in the Marine Corps following graduation from Indiana and in 1957, he was an all-Service selection. In 1958, he went to the Bears' camp but was sold to the Steelers before the schedule begun. After two seasons with the Steelers, Karras was traded back to the Bears.

BOB KILCULLEN Tackle 6'3" 245 Texas Tech 5th Season

Joined Bears: 1957, no. 8 selection. Born: Aug. 1, 1936, St. Louis

Kilcullen returned to the Bears in 1960 season after two years in the Army following his NFL debut campaign of 1957. As a rookie, he was a defensive lineman but was shifted to offense in 1958. He returned to defense in 1960. Bob, an accomplished artist, attends the Chicago Art Institute.

KEN KIRK Linebacker 6'2" 230 Mississippi 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 9 selection. Born: Feb. 26, 1938, Tupelo, Miss.

Kirk is a valuable member of the Bears' linebacker group and also handles snapbacks as center of the punt and place-kick teams. Ken was defensive captain of the 1959 Mississippi eleven ranked second nationally. The team lost only to Louisiana State, 7-3, but reversed that decision with a 21-0 Sugar Bowl victory over the previous conquerors. Kirk also played with Ole Miss post-season winners in his two earlier campaigns—a 36-7 win over Texas in the Sugar Bowl when he was a sophomore and a 7-3 victory over Florida in the Gator Bowl as a junior. He started his collegiate career as a fullback but was moved to center in the last game of his sophomore season.

ROGER LECLERC Tackle 6'3" 245 Trinity (Conn.) 3rd Season

Joined Bears: 1960, no. 15 selection in 1959. Born: Oct. 1, 1936, Springfield, Mass.

Leclerc alternated between defensive tackle and middle linebacker in 1961 and also took charge of the kickoff, extra point and field goal assignment. He kicked five field goals against Detroit on Oct. 18, 1961, tying the National Football league record held jointly by Bob Waterfield and Ernie Nevers. Leclerc was a Little All-American center at Trinity (Conn.) college in 1959, and also earned All-East honors and the Maxwell Memorial Award.

HERMAN LEE Tackle 6'3" 247 Fla. A. & M. 4th Season (5th NFL)

Joined Bears: 1958, no. 23 selection in 1954. Born July 1, 1933, Phoenix City, Ala.

Lee has developed into one of the best offensive tackles and hardest blockers in the NFL. Fine speed for so large a man and great physical strength are among his many assets. He was originally drafted no. 23 in 1954, after starring at Florida A. & M. He went into the Army for a two-year tour of duty with the military police that included nine months in Korea. After leaving the Army, Lee got a tryout with the Bears in 1956 and another in 1957. After his second unsuccessful effort, he was traded to the Pittsburgh Steelers with whom he was a regular until he was traded back to the Bears in 1958.

EARL LEGGETT Tackle 6'3" 250 La. State 5th Season

Joined Bears: 1957, no. 1 selection. Born: Jacksonville, Fla., March 5, 1933.

An injury to his knee kept Leggett on the inactive list throughout 1961, following three fine NFL seasons with the Bears as defensive tackle and end. His steady improvement and adaptability were most noticeable in 1960 when, among other excellent defensive bits, his pass interception and eleven-yard return against the Green Bay Packers set up a field goal that gave the Bears a 17-14 victory.

BILLY MARTIN Halfback 5'11" 197 Minnesota 1st Season

Joined Bears: 1962, no. 4 selection in 1959. Born June 6, 1938, Chicago.

Martin earned all-service and All-Marine corps honors four straight seasons while starring for San Diego Marines, 1958 to '61. He also was named most valuable player in Leatherneck Bowl game of 1959. Martin attended the University of Minnesota and was named Gophers' outstanding freshman player before entering the marines. He was the Bears No. 4 pick in the 1959 draft. Timed at 9.6 seconds in the 100 yard dash, Martin was an outstanding blocker and pass catcher, pacing the Devildog eleven with 12 touchdown catches in 1959. He starred at Wendell Phillips High School in Chicago.

BENNIE McRAE Halfback 6'0" 180 Michigan 1st Season

Joined Bears: 1962, no. 2 selection. Born: Dec. 8, 1939, Newport News, Va.

McRae, who gained 1,037 yards on 231 carries for a 4.6 average in three seasons with the Wolverines, also was Big Ten indoor and outdoor 70 and 120 yard high hurdles champion. In 1961, he tied the indoor record of :08.4 for the 70-yard highs and skimmed over the 120 highs in :13.7 for a Big Ten outdoor mark that, however, was nullified by the wind. McRae also ran the 100 in :09.6. As a senior, he averaged 6.04 yards per carry with 453 on 75 rushes and caught ten passes for 210 yards. He scored six touchdowns, two on passes. He was named to the Scholastic All-America and, as another distinction, was the first Negro to play in the North-South Shrine game at Miami.

JOHNNY MORRIS Halfback 5'10" 180 UC at S. Barbara 5th Season

Joined Bears: 1958, no. 12 selection. Born: Sept. 26, 1935, Long Beach, Cal.

Morris' name pops up in four separate categories with the Bears—rushing, pass receiving, kickoff returns and punt returns. He holds the club career record for kickoff returns (54 for 1,267 yards), leads present Bears in punt returns and is third in rushing and fourth in pass receiving. Breakaway speed and aggressiveness are his main assets. At the University of California at Santa Barbara, Morris also starred in track and during his competitive days equalled the world's 50-yard dash record of :05.2. He has contributed many long runs in his four years with the

Bears, including a 78-yard punt return for a touchdown against Los Angeles in 1959 whose distance was second only to "Scooter" McLean's 89-yarder in Bears' club records. Led NFL in punt returns that year and in 1961, played in the Pro Bowl. His 1961 record with the Bears:

LARRY MORRIS Linebacker 6'2" 230 Ga. Tech. 4th Season (6th NFL)

Joined Bears: 1959, trade with Washington. Born: Dec. 10, 1933, Decatur, Ga.

The Bears traded their no. 2 draft choice to Washington for Morris, just before the start of the 1959 schedule. He was the Los Angeles Rams' no. 1 draft choice in 1955, after winning All-American center honors at Georgia Tech, and played regularly until after the close of the 1958 schedule when he was traded to Washington for Gene Brito. The deal that then brought him to the Bears proved out from Morris' first appearance in a Chicago suit. He has been an aggressive linebacker who, among other exploits in his first season with the Bears, recovered a fumble and ran it back 19 yards for a touchdown against his former Ram teammates.

DICK NORMAN Quarterback 6'3" 209 Stanford 2nd Season

Joined Bears: 1961, no. 5 selection in 1960. Born Sept. 14, 1938, Downey, Cal.

Norman was one of the nation's greatest collegiate passers at Stanford, even in 1960 when, despite the fact his team lost all ten of its games, he rated ninth nationally with 84 completions for 924 yards in 180 attempts. He was voted outstanding player as he completed 20 of 33 passes for 311 yards and three touchdowns for the North in the Senior Bowl game at Mobile, Ala. Before that, he pitched two touchdown passes to lead the Major College All Stars to victory over the Small College Stars in the Copper Bowl at Tucson. His greatest collegiate campaign was 1959 when he averaged .578 on 152 completions in 263 attempts for 1,963 yards. In Stanford's traditional game with California, he completed 34 of 39 passes for an astronomical .872 average and 401 yards gain, all intercollegiate single game marks.

ED O'BRADOVICH End 6'3" 255 Illinois 1st Season

Joined Bears: 1962, no. 7 selection. Born: May 21, 1940, Hillside, Ill.

O'Bradovich, an all-state high school fullback at Proviso, played two varsity seasons as an offensive and defensive end at Illinois, 1959 and 1960. He left the university before his senior year and in 1961 played with Calgary in the Canadian League. As a junior at Illinois, he led in pass receptions with 21 for 233 yards but he was more outstanding on defense.

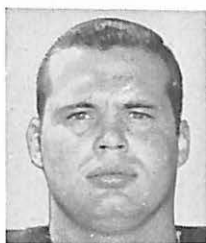

RICHIE PETITBON **Halfback** **6'3"** **205** **Tulane** **4th Season**

Joined Bears: 1959, no. 2 selection. Born: April 18, 1938, New Orleans.

Petitbon's campaigns have developed him into one of the better defensive backs. At Tulane, he was a brilliant offensive quarterback but, converted into a defensive halfback with the Bears, he made good immediately. In fact, early in the 1959 schedule, he intercepted a pass and ran it back 33 yards for a touchdown that gave the Bears a lead they never relinquished during the course of a 26-21 victory over the Baltimore Colts. His three year NFL career record shows 10 pass interceptions for 123 yards return; 15 punt returns for 103 yards; four kickoff returns for 68.

MIKE PYLE **Center** **6'3"** **245** **Yale** **2nd Season**

Joined Bears: 1961, no. 7 selection. Born: July 18, 1939, Keokuk, Ia.

Pyle accomplished the difficult task of taking over as first string offensive center as a rookie and played in all 14 games. His blocking improved throughout the season and he is regarded as one of the N.F.L.'s most promising young linemen. Pyle was captain in 1960 of Yale's first undefeated, untied football team in 37 years. An all-state Illinois high school center at New Trier, he broke in as a Yale regular as a sophomore and improved steadily for the rest of his collegiate career. Mike, whose older brother, Palmer, starred at Michigan State and now is with the Baltimore Colts, also lettered in track at Yale. He tied for first in the discus in the IC-4A meet in 1961 with a throw of 158 feet, 10 inches. Member of 1961 College All Stars.

ROOSEVELT TAYLOR **Halfback** **5'11"** **186** **Grambling** **2nd Season**

Joined Bears: 1961, free agent. Born: July 4, 1937, New Orleans.

Taylor was signed by Bears as free agent after starring on undefeated 1960 Grambling (La.) college eleven. In '60, he intercepted 12 passes to top nation's small college defensive backs. In addition to seeing considerable service on pass defense in rookie season, Taylor ranked No. 2 behind Bivins in kick-off returns with 14 for 379 yards and a 27 yard average.

BILL WADE **Quarterback** **6'2"** **205** **Vanderbilt** **2nd Season (9th NFL)**

Joined Bears: 1961, trade with Los Angeles. Born: Oct. 4, 1930, Nashville, Tenn.

Wade was obtained in a three-way trade in which the Bears sent Erich Barnes and Zeke Bratkowski to the Rams, who, in turn, dealt the former to New York for Lindon Crow. Bill was the Rams' bonus draft choice in 1952 but did not join them until 1954 after tour of Navy duty. He understudied and alternated with Norm Van Brocklin until 1958 when he took over as regular. In 1958, he came within 63 yards of breaking Sammy Baugh's record for total yards passing

Wetoska alternated at offensive guard and tackle last season. At Notre Dame, where he won three letters, he was an end and was drafted no. 5 by the Washington Redskins in 1959. Wetoska played in the 1959 College All Star game after having starred in two post-season bowl games, the North South and the Senior.

DAVE WHITSELL **Halfback** **6'1"** **190** **Indiana** **2nd Season** **(5th NFL)**

Joined Bears: 1961, trade with New York. Born: June 14, 1936, Shelby, Mich.

Whitsell came to the Bears from the Giants prior to the start of the 1961 season on a trade for John Aveni and led the club in pass interceptions with six for a return of 123 yards. He played three seasons with the Detroit Lions, whom he joined in 1958, and then was one of three selected by the new Minnesota Vikings. The latter team traded him to the Giants in the deal for Mel Triplett and Bob Schnelker. Whitsell played with various Lions' special units, but essentially was a defensive back. An all-around high school athletic star at Shelby, Mich. he played regularly at Indiana. As a prep, he ran a :09.8 hundred; put the shot 55 feet 6 inches and, in basketball, once scored 45 points in a game.

FRED WILLIAMS **Tackle** **6'4"** **248** **Arkansas** **11th Season**

Joined Bears: 1952, no. 5 selection. Born: Feb. 8, 1930, Little Rock, Ark.

Williams is one of the NFL's most versatile defensive linemen. For example, he plays either on the left or right side of the defensive line as well as at two of the three linebacker spots. His regular job is defensive left tackle and as such, he was selected to play in the Pro Bowl games of 1953, 1954, 1959 and 1960. In 1957, he was voted outstanding player of the Bears' 29-3 victory over Cleveland in the Armed Forces Benefit game and received the Eisenhower Trophy. Off the field, his drawling wit and Ozarkian expressions have made him one of the league's most entertaining speakers. He was All-Southwest Conference in football as well as an intercollegiate wrestling and boxing champion.

Most distinctive qualities are his size, speed and competitive desire. Youmans, a star two-way end and tackle on Syracuse's national championship team of 1959, had been drafted as a "future." At Syracuse, he played in three post-season games—the Cotton Bowl as a sophomore and again as a senior and the Orange Bowl as a junior.

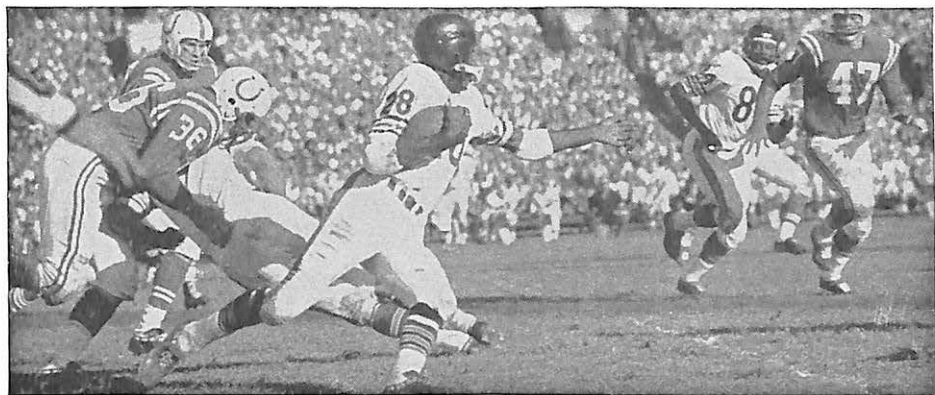

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to those servicemen and to widows and orphans of servicemen who need it.

Sixteen previous Armed Forces games have netted \$668,054.57. The inaugural came about at a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George Halas and Ralph Cannon, sports editor of the Chicago Herald-American, which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947.

The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers took over direction of the game.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in each game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters. The player's name is inscribed on the trophy and he receives a replica of the award. Last year's winner was John Farrington, Bears' end who caught touchdown passes of 90 and 75 yards.

Winners in other years were Rick Casares and Zeke Bratkowski, Bears, who tied in 1960; Jim Dooley, Bears, 1959; Willie Galimore, Bears, 1958; Fred Williams, Bears, 1957; Darrell Brewster, Cleveland, 1956; Ed Brown, Bears, 1955; Frank Gifford, New York, 1954; and Harry Jagade, Cleveland, 1953.

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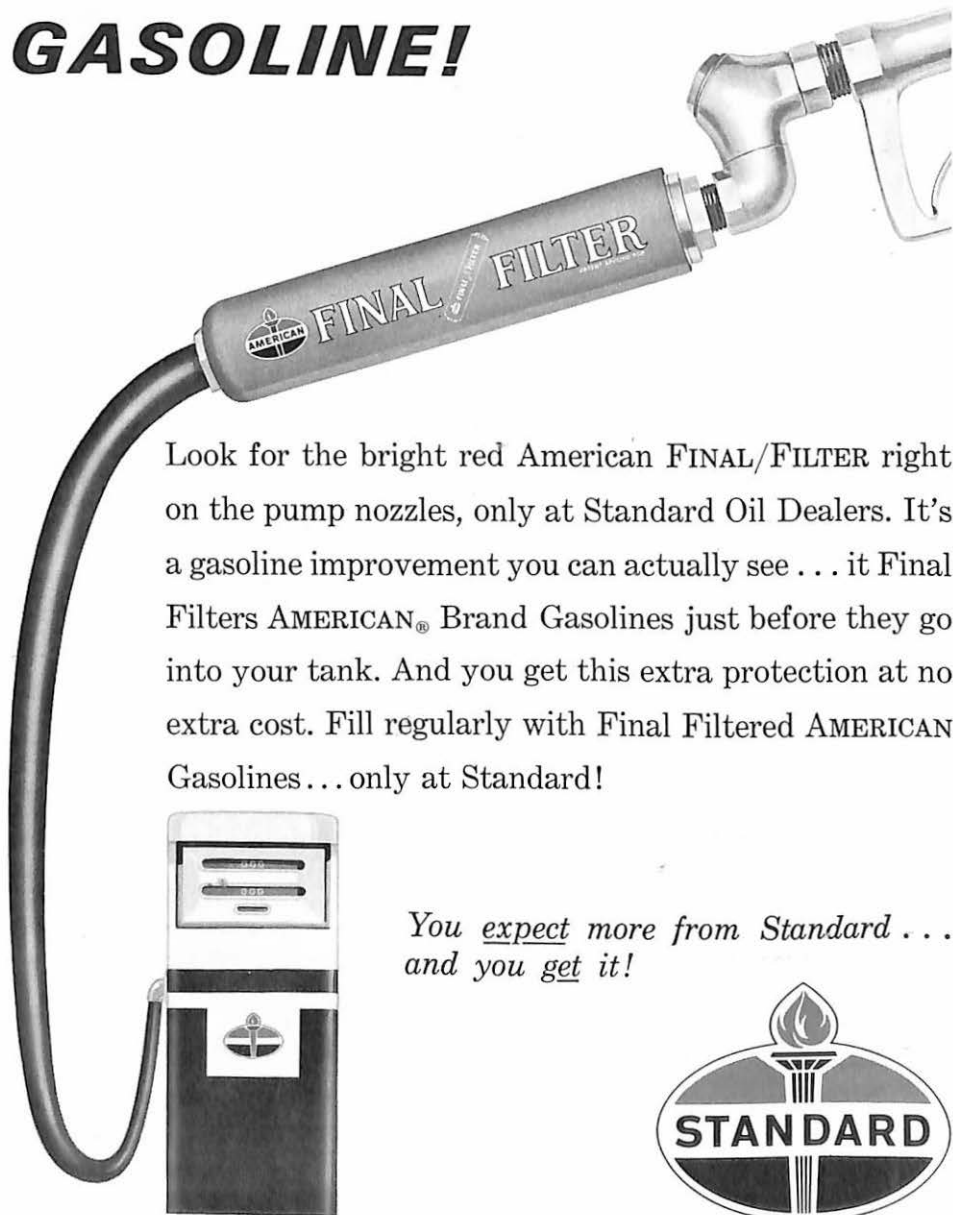
