The 1963 Championship Story

The Bears won the eighth championship in their 44-year history through a well coordinated team effort—an adroit ball control offense and a swift, opportunistic defense.

They were never out of first place from opening day, Sept. 15. They defeated the Green Bay Packers, 10-3, on that afternoon, won their next four but were upset, 20-14, by the Forty Niners at San Francisco in the sixth date of the schedule. On that same day, the Packers defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 30-7, to come up into a tie (5-1 each) for first place.

The Bears and the Packers then matched win for win over the next three weeks but the deadlock (8-1 each) was cracked in Wrigley Field on Nov. 17. The Bears repeated their opening victory over the Packers, but by a 26-7 score, to regain the undisputed lead they didn't relinquish to the end.

The defense led the NFL in ten of nineteen statistical categories and was second in eight others. Most significant of those defensive firsts were fewest opponents points (144); most interceptions, 36; fewest total yards, 3,176; fewest net yards rushing, 1,442; fewest pass completions, 164; fewest yards passing, 1,734; fewest ball control plays, rushes or passes, 801.

In the matter of ball control, the Bears had possession on runs or passes 911 times, second only to the New York Giants' 914.

On offense, the Bears were tackled only twenty times for 177 yards lost attempting to pass, another NFL leadership. They lost the ball on mistakes only 25 times—14 interceptions and 11 fumbles. In contrast, they capitalized on opponents' mistakes 54 times—36 interceptions and

18 fumble recoveries.

Of 52 scoring situations—touchdowns, field goals and a safety—28 were set up by the defense through interceptions or fumble recoveries. Four of those interceptions were run back for touchdowns.

And in the 14-10 championship victory over the Giants, two interceptions—a 61-yard return by Larry Morris and a 10-yarder by Ed O'Bradovich—set up both touchdowns. Finally, the ten points scored by the Bears maintained the Bears' seasonal average in that respect.

The Bears scored 301 points in fourteen NFL games and 89 of those came in two victories—52-14 over the Los Angeles Rams, 37-21 over the Detroit Lions. They scored one shutout . . . twice held opponents to a field goal . . . five times restricted their rivals to a single touchdown. Nine teams scored more points for the entire season—but the Bears managed to score MORE in each of their eleven victories. They also were fourth in the league in first downs with 257, back of the Giants, 278; Pittsburgh Steelers, 272; and the Packers, 258.

In the championship game, played on an eleven-degree day at Wrigley field Dec. 29, the Giants scored first when Y. A. Tittle passed 14 yards to Frank Gifford in the right end zone at 7:22 of the first period. That climaxed a seven-play drive that began from the Bears' 41 and Don Chandler added the conversion.

After two punt exchanges and a fumble recovery by the Giants, Larry Morris picked off Tittle's fake screen pass, raced 61 yards to the New York five. Ronnie Bull hit right tackle for three and then Bill Wade drove over at 14:44 for the score and Bob Jencks tied it with his conversion.

At 5:11 of the second, Chandler booted a 13-yard field goal on fourth down after the Giants had moved 56 yards in eleven plays.

In the fourth, O'Bradovich intercepted Tittle's screen pass at the

Giants' 24 and ran to the 14. Two plays netted a yard and on third down, Wade passed to Mike Ditka to the one. On the second play, Wade sneaked over for the score, Jencks converted to make it 14-10 and there the score remained to the end.

Bears Defeat College All Stars

The world champion Bears made their first competitive appearance of 1964 a successful one. They effected a three-touchdown second half to defeat the College All Stars, 28-17, in The Chicago Tribune's 31st Annual Classic before 65,000 at Soldier Field Friday evening, Aug. 7.

It was the Bears' fifth victory in seven All Star games since the inaugural of 1934 when the teams played a scoreless tie. The Bears then won, 5-0, in 1935; 37-13 in 1941; 21-0 in 1942; and 24-21 in 1944 before losing, 16-0, in 1947.

This year's renewal of the classic series saw the All Stars move into a 10-7 halftime lead. Dick Van Raaphorst (Ohio State) booted a 14-yard field goal and then, after Mike Ditka scored on a 13-yard pass from Bill Wade, the collegians went into the lead on 14-yard pass play, Chuck Taylor (Arizona State) to Ted Davis (Georgia Tech).

The Bears came back with two quick touchdowns in the third period—Wade sneaked over from the half foot line at 7:02 and then passed 20 to Gary Barnes at 8:39. At 8:43 of the fourth, Rudy Bukich completed a 30-yard scoring pass to Charlie Bivins. Bob Jencks added all extra points. The All Stars' final score, at 14:34 of the fourth, was a five yard pass from George Mira (Miami, Fla.) to Taylor.

The Bears gained 371 yards overall to 289 for the All Stars. Wade completed 15 out of 23 passes and Bukich 5 out of 8. Barnes (6-69) Johnny Morris (5-89) and Ditka (4-62) were the chief receivers. Ronnie Bull was the most effective running back for the champions with 35 yards on nine attempts. Bivins had 32 on 5.

The Bears Coaches

GEORGE HALAS, whose Bears won their eighth world championship in 1963, is in his 45th season of professional football and his 37th as their head coach. He founded them as the Staleys at Decatur, Ill., but they became the Bears after moving to Chicago in 1921.

Halas' personal record as a head coach shows 296 victories, 120 defeats and 28 ties. Six of the eight world championship teams were coached by him. He has been head coach four different times—1920-1929; 1933-November 1942 when he entered the Navy in World War II; 1946-1955; and 1958 to the present.

Halas, a native Chicagoan, prepped at Crane Tech, then went to the University of Illinois where he was a three-sport letterman. He was a member of the Great Lakes eleven that won the Jan. 1, 1919 Rose Bowl game and later, played outfield briefly for the New York Yankees. An end, he retired as an active player for the Bears in 1929. During World War I, he served as Welfare and Recreation Officer of the Pacific Fleet and was decorated with the Bronze Star.

LUKE JOHNSOS' service record with the Bears is exceeded only by George Halas. He has been with the organization, as player or coach, for 36 years, beginning in 1929 after his graduation from Northwestern. He became an assistant coach in 1937 and when Halas entered the Navy in midseason 1942, he became co-coach with Hunk Anderson. Johnsos has been a key figure in seven of the eight world championships—as a player in 1932-1933; and as coach in 1940, 1941, 1943, 1946 and 1963. At Northwestern and with the Bears, Luke was an end of distinction in the era of mandatory, 60-minute two-way players. He also was an outstanding baseball player who had a try-out with the Cincinnati Reds after his graduation. His off season position is with the Bagcraft Corporation of America.

JOHN L. "PADDY" DRISCOLL, director of research and planning, has been a member of the Bears' staff since 1941. He was head coach in 1956-1957, his initial team winning the NFL Western Conference title. Paddy, an Evanston native, was one of Northwestern University's all-time football greats and, entering the Navy in World War I, he was a team mate of Halas on the Great Lakes eleven. In 1920, he began a professional career with the Cardinals, coaching them in 1921-1922. In 1926, he joined the Bears and retired as an active player in 1931. After that came coaching positions at Marquette and Chicago St. Mel's high school before returning to the Bears. Driscoll, one of football's greatest drop-kickers, holds two NFL records. He also played baseball with the Cubs for one season.

PHIL HANDLER, in his 35th straight season as an NFL coach or player, has been with the Bears since 1952, following long service with the Cardinals. He effected remarkable improvement in the offensive line, best expressed in comparative passing statistics for three seasons—the 1963 Bears were charged with only 177 yards lost attempting to pass and 14 enemy interceptions as against 226 and 28 in 1962 and 339 and 24 in 1961. Handler was one of the fine pro linemen as a Cardinal player, beginning in 1930, and later was head coach (1943 and 1945) as well as assistant several years. He is rated one of the all-time great football players from Texas Christian. In the offseason, he is a salesman for the Douglas Lumber Company of Chicago.

CHARLES "CHUCK" MATHER has been with the Bears since the spring of 1958 following a remarkable job of rebuilding football at the University of Kansas. From an 0-10 record in 1954, he developed a team that in 1957 was second in the Big Eight Conference and, for the first time in history, defeated Missouri, Kansas State, Nebraska and Colorado in the same year. He was honored as Conference Coach of the Year. Before the Kansas tenure, Mather coached six consecutive state champions at Massillon, O., high school with an overall record of 57-3. He has written books and articles on football and, an imagina-

tive innovator, developed IBM evaluation of players and use of closed circuit TV on the sidelines. He holds an M.A. degree from Kent State.

GEORGE ALLEN joined the Bears staff in October 1958 after one year as Los Angeles Rams' end coach and nine years as a successful college head coach. The defense that was his responsibility in 1963 led the NFL in ten of 19 defensive categories and was second in eight others. The pass defense set a Bears' team record with 36 interceptions and overall, the unit permitted opponents an average of only ten points per game. Allen is a native of Detroit who played varsity football at Marquette, Alma, Mich. College and later attended the University of Michigan where he was a varsity wrestler. He is a member of Sigma Delta Psi, national honorary athletic and scholastic fraternity.

SID LUCKMAN'S name is a fabulous one in Bears' history, as well as that of the National Football League. Since 1939 he has been with the organization continuously as a player, a coach or in an advisory

capacity. Twelve of those years were spent as a player and included quarterbacking four world championship teams—1940, '41, '43 and '46. In 1943, he won the Most Valuable Player Award and from 1941 through 1947, inclusive, he was all-NFL quarterback. Sid retired as an active player in 1951. He is a Brooklyn native who went on to football and baseball brilliance at Columbia University. He was named to the Collegiate Football Hall of Fame. Luckman, a resident of Chicago since 1939, is vice president of Cellu-Craft Products Corporation.

JOE STYDAHAR, all-time Bears' great tackle, returned in a coaching role in 1963, working primarily with the defensive line. Outstanding improvement is evidenced in comparative figures—the 1962 Bears allowed 2,073 yards rushing, a 4.7 average, and gave up 17 touchdowns on the ground; the 1963 Bears cut those figures to 1,442, 3.5 and seven. Stydahar, first lineman ever to be drafted no. 1, was all-NFL tackle four times during his career with the Bears, 1936-1946 with two years out for Army service. He was an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams in 1947 and was head coach in 1950 and 1951, winning Western Conference titles both times with a world championship the second year. He coached the Cardinals in 1953-1954 and two years ago, did color commentary on Big Ten games for WBBM radio.

JIM DOOLEY is in his second year on the coaching staff following a playing career that began in 1952 when he was the Bears' no. 1 draft choice from Miami of Florida. His career record shows 211 pass receptions for 3,172 yards and 16 touchdowns. Dooley was used on defense as a rookie but in 1953, was shifted to right flanker on offense. He led the team in pass receptions that season and repeated in 1957 and 1958. In 1953, he caught 53 for 841 yards.

ED ROZY, trainer of the Bears since 1948, has a long, versatile career in athletics. He lettered as a guard in football at Marquette University, graduating in 1933. In his senior year, he was intramural athletic director and he continued in that position after graduation. For twelve years, he also coached freshman football, boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf and fencing and was athletic trainer. In World War II, Rozy was a lieutenant in the U. S. Navy, 1944-1947. He returned to Marquette for one year following his discharge from the Navy and then came to the Bears. Chicago is his year-around home.

DOUG ATKINS (81) DE 6'8" 255 Tennessee 12th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, T-Cleveland. Born: 5-8-'30, Humboldt, Tenn.

Atkins was a unanimous choice (AP, UPI, NEA) for all-NFL defensive end. He also was all-league in 1960-'61 and has been a member of the West team in the Pro Bowl seven straight times, 1958-'64, inclusive. In 1959, he was voted outstanding lineman in the Pro Bowl. Last year, he was a towering factor in the Bears' great defense. Atkins, whose forte is muscling his way in on the passer rather than picking off passes, got the first interception of his NFL career against the Los Angeles Rams there Oct. 13. Two weeks earlier, at Detroit, he broke through, tackled Earl Morrall in the end zone for a safety in the Bears' 37-21 victory. At Tennessee, where he enrolled originally on a basketball scholarship, Atkins was an All-American tackle and Cleveland's no. 1 draft choice in 1953. Two years later, he came to the Bears on a trade. Offseason home: Knoxville, Tenn.

GARY BARNES (86) E 6'4" 210 Clemson 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1964, T-Dallas. Born: 9-13-'39, Fairfax, Ala.

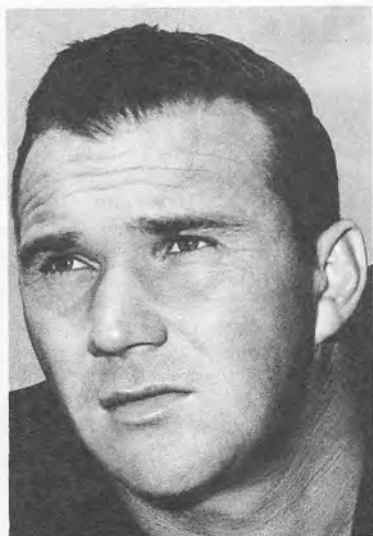
Barnes came to the Bears on an off-season trade that sent defensive end Maury Youmans to the Dallas Cowboys. After starring at Clemson, he was Green Bay's third draft choice for 1962 and was used in a reserve role. He was traded to Dallas for a draft choice just before the 1963 campaign began. With the Cowboys, Barnes caught 15 passes for 195 yards. His best single game effort was in the 27-20 victory over Philadelphia, 5 for 97. Offseason home: Fairfax, Ala.

STEVE BARNETT (73) G 6'1½" 255 Oregon 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-2. Born: 6-4-'41, Fremont, Cal.

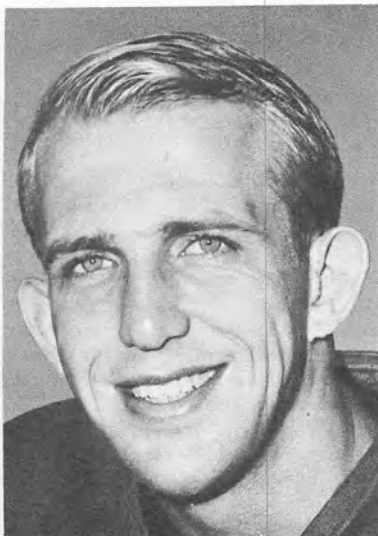
Barnett, an all-American at Oregon, broke in as starting right tackle with the Bears in 1963 but in later games, shared that role with Bob Wetoska. He came along well with his size, quickness and agility distinctive qualities. He also did a fine job on all of the kicking units. At Oregon, Barnett averaged more than 40 minutes per game and in 1962, he was co-captain. He starred in the Shrine East-West classic at San Francisco and the Hula Bowl at Honolulu. He was named to the Scholastic All-America. Offseason home: Chicago.

Joined Bears: 1960, D-7. Born: 10-16-'38, Atlanta, Ga.

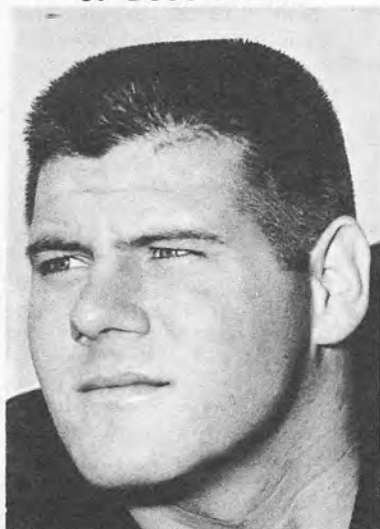

game against the Colts at Baltimore as he netted 36 yards on 11 attempts. Most of those came on the Bears' final sequence of offensive plays during which Bivins carried nine of 16 times, for 34 yards net, including two first down slashes. Once, he carried four straight times for a total of 27 yards. This drive from their 24 to the Baltimore eight with the Bears leading 14-7 was climaxed by a field goal that clinched the win. 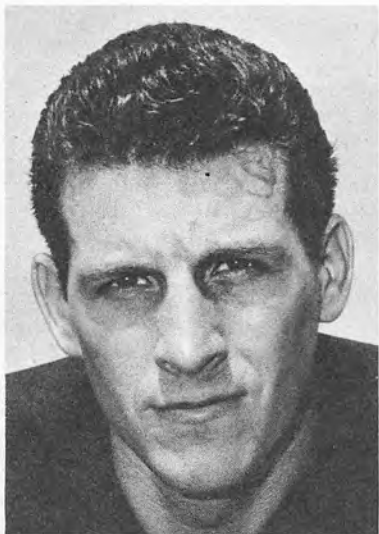

Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 12-15-'32, St. Louis, Mo.

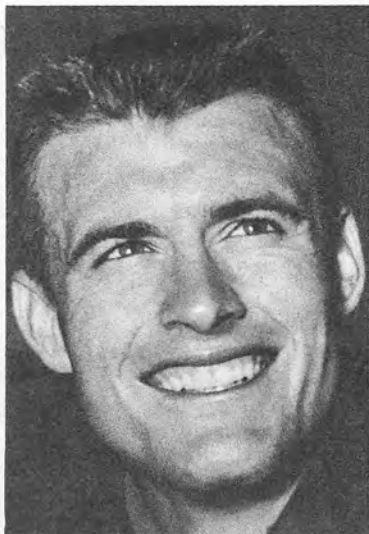
Bukich flipped the short pass to Ron Bull that developed into the 44-yard touchdown play that defeated Baltimore in Wrigley Field, 10-3. An experienced reserve quarterback, he completed six out of seven for 112 yards that day and eight out of nine for 99 yards and two touchdowns in the 52-14 win over the Rams at Los Angeles the following week. Thus, in two straight instances of spelling Bill Wade, Bukich had a phenomenal completion percentage of .876. Bukich has been with the Rams, who made him their no. 2 draft choice in 1953; Washington and Pittsburgh as well as a previous tenure with the Bears (1958-'59) in his nine year NFL career. RON BULL (29) HB 6' 200 Baylor 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-1. Born: 2-2-'40, Kingsville, Tex.

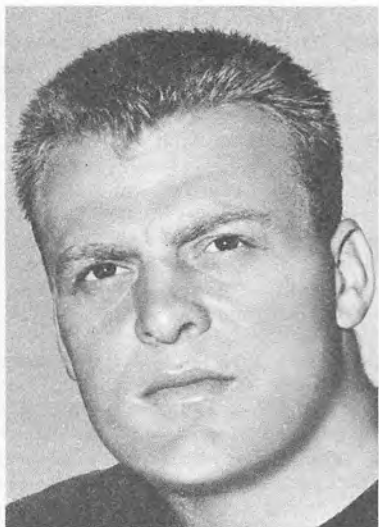
Bull's iron-man performance late in the Bears' championship victory over the Giants was a striking instance of the ball-control strategy that succeeded so well all year. On the last two sequences of plays, Bull carried ten of thirteen times, with the last five coming in succession. Burman was exclusively a tackle through his first two seasons at Northwestern but was shifted to end as a senior, mainly because his size gave him advantages as a blocker and pass receiver. He caught 12 passes for 209 yards. Offseason home: Munster, Ind.

JIM CADILE (72) G 6'3" 240 San Jose State 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-4. Born: 7-16-'40, San Jose, Cal.

Cadile, a defensive end and offensive tackle in college, has been developed into a versatile offensive guard with the Bears. In fact, he has played both sides on offense. He has good speed and, smart and aggressive, he is regarded as one of the most promising guards in the NFL. Cadile also functions on the kicking units. In 1962, he was one of the most sought-after collegiate linemen but his pro debut was delayed to the 10th game of the Bears schedule because of a broken ankle in a pre-season contest. Offseason home: San Jose.

J. C. CAROLINE (25) DB 6'1" 190 Illinois 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1956, D-7. Born: 1-17-'33, Columbia, S.C.

Caroline is one of the great "team players" of the National Football League whose name appears in seven of eight individual categories in Bears' career statistics. He has contributed in everything but punting. Last season, given permanent assignment on the kicking units, his sharp, savage tackling was one of the factors in the Bears' title drive. He intercepted one pass (against Philadelphia) to bring his career total to 22, tying the old club record held by Don Kindt but two under the new mark set by Richie Petitbon. An All-American at Illinois in 1953, his 1,670 yards rushing led the nation and broke Red Grange's and the Big Ten records. Offseason home: Chicago.

RICK CASARES (35) FB 6'2½" Florida 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, D-2 for 1954. Born: 7-4-'31, Tampa, Fla.

Casares, who divided fullbacking with Joe Marconi, was lost for the last four games of the schedule and, of course, the championship playoff as well. He suffered a dislocated ankle in the third quarter against the Packers here. Particularly effective that day, he had 44 yards on 11 tries up to the time of his injury. His 277 yards for the season raised his team-leading career total to 5,534 yards. He also has scored 57 touchdowns, 49 rushing, and twice had four touchdowns in a game. Injuries also reduced his playing time in 1962 when his 255 yards rushing were an all-time low for him. Casares holds club records in rushing yardage for one game (190) and one season (1,126) and has gained 100 yards or more in a game twelve times. He was all-NFL fullback in 1956 and has appeared in the Pro Bowl five times, 1956-'60 inclusive. Offseason home: Chicago.

ROGER DAVIS (60) G 6'3" 250 Syracuse 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-1. Born: 6-23-'38, Cleveland, O.

Davis, a top competitor, has developed into a fine pulling guard and a crisp open field blocker. He has progressed steadily since joining the Bears, used exclusively on offense although he was most distinguished on defense as an all-American at Syracuse. An injury during the 1960 College All Stars workouts retarded his rookie season progress although he came on rapidly in the latter stages. In 1961, he got into all 14 games but the following year, an early November knee injury required surgery and he missed the final five of the schedule. Last year, Davis missed only one start. MIKE DITKA (89) E 6'3" 230 Pittsburgh 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, D-1. Born: 10-18-'39, Carnegie, Pa.

For the third straight season, Ditka was named all-NFL tight end

in 1963, gaining unanimous recognition (AP, UPI, NEA) for the first time. He also played in the Pro Bowl for the third time. In the Bears' 52-14 win over the Rams at Los Angeles, he had four touchdown passes (13, 25, 2 and 14 yards) to tie a club record. In the championship game against the Giants, he caught a third down pass for 12 yards to the one from where, one play later, Bill Wade drove across at 12:48 of the third quarter for what proved to be the winning touchdown in the 14-10 victory. Ditka also was a strong factor in getting the Bears to the championship game. In the season final against Detroit, with the Bears owning a slim, 10-7 lead late in the third period, he made a sensational catch of a pass for a 22-yard touchdown. Earlier in the season, his crushing block cleared out the final enemy in the path of Ron Bull's touchdown run after a pass in the 10-3 victory over the Colts here. And against the Steelers at Pittsburgh, Ditka fought off half a dozen tacklers after getting a short pass and raced 63 yards to the 15 to set up Roger Leclerc's field goal that brought the Bears a 17-17 tie. Ditka, an all-American at Pitt, was '61 NFL Rookie of the Year. Offseason home: Lombard, Ill.

DICK EVEY (79) T 6'4" 225 Tennessee 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-1. Born: 2-13-'41, State College, Pa.

Evey, an all-SEC selection as a sophomore, maintained that status as one of the south's finest tackles right through his senior year. He has unusual speed and strength and at Tennessee, was a two-way performer equally proficient on offense and defense. Evey also lettered in track and set a school record in the shot-put. He was a member of the 1964 College All Stars. Offseason home: Springfield, O.

JOE FORTUNATO (31) LB 6'1" 225 Miss. State 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1955, D-8 for 1953. Born: 3-28-'31, Mingo Junction, O.

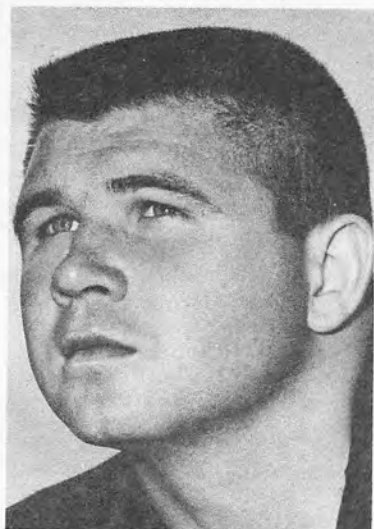
Fortunato, who called defensive signals last season, was the only linebacker to receive unanimous all-NFL recognition (AP, UPI, NEA). He also played in the Pro Bowl for the third time. During the season, he intercepted two passes and recovered three opponents' fumbles, the latter efforts raising his career total to sixteen, high for the team. The Bears' 1963 defense, by the way, was the NFL's best, leading in ten of nineteen categories. Fortunato, a consistent stalwart all season, was especially outstanding in three victories. His recovery of a Minnesota fumble, with the Bears leading by a slim 14-7 in the fourth quarter, set up a touchdown. Against the Rams at Los Angeles, with the score 0-0 in the first quarter, Fortunato recovered a fumble, the Bears went on to score and then turned it into a 52-14 rout. 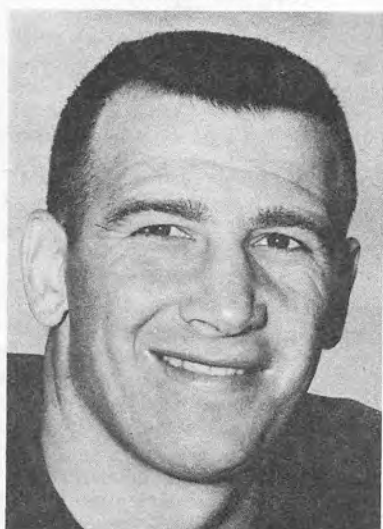

He is the longest service performer on the Bears roster as he goes into his thirteenth campaign. In twelve seasons with them, George has broken into three statistical categories—16 interceptions for 120 yards return; 15 opponents fumbles recovered; and 26 scoring points on 14 place kick conversions and four field goals. Offseason home: Morton Grove, Ill.

LARRY GLUECK (43) DB 6' 190 Villanova 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-3. Born: 10-5-'41, Norristown, Pa.

Glueck functioned mainly as a reserve defensive back and on kicking units during his rookie season. In the 52-14 defeat of the Los Angeles Rams, he intercepted a fourth period pass, returned it 14 yards and thereby set up the Bears' final touchdown. Glueck also was a top defensive star in the 1963 College All Stars' 20-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers. At Villanova, he was two-way performer. Offseason home: Lansdale, Pa.

BOBBY JOE GREEN (88) K 5'11" 185 Florida 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 5-7-'36, Vernon, Tex.

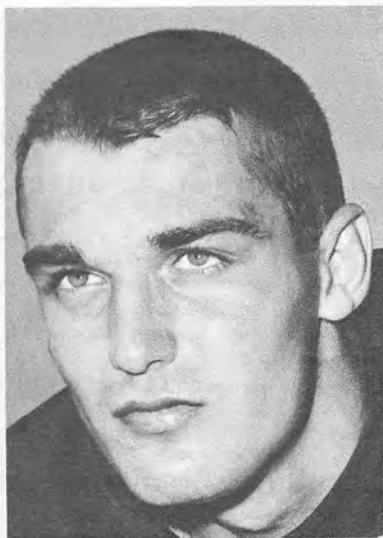
Green is one of the NFL's finest punters with a four-season average of 45.7 on 270 kicks. Three of the four years, including 1963, he finished second among the league's punters. Last year, he averaged 46.5 on 64 punts as against 48.9 on 35 for league leading Yale Lary. Offseason home: Gainesville, Fla.

BOB JENCKS (80) E 6'5" 227 Miami (O) 2nd Season

JOHN JOHNSON (76) DT 6'5" 260 Indiana 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1963, D-5. Born: 5-7-'41, Gary, Ind.

Johnson was used mainly on offense during preseason 1963 but injuries on the defensive unit caused his transfer shortly before the NFL schedule opened. His first league game was at Detroit and he continued as a reserve defensive tackle, with an occasional appearance on offense. When the Los Angeles Rams played here Nov. 10, Johnson made his first NFL start and, ranging all over the field to make tackles, his play was so outstanding, team mates voted him the game ball. Johnson was a guard his first two seasons at Indiana but, moved to tackle as a senior, he developed into one of the Big Ten's top two-way linemen of 1962. Offseason home: Hobart, Ind.

STAN JONES (78) DT 6'1" 250 Maryland 11th Season
Joined Bears: 1954, D-4 for 1953. Born: 11-24-'31, Altoona, Pa.

Jones, an all-NFL guard four times and member of the West Pro Bowl team seven times, all because of his offensive talents, became a full-time defensive performer in 1963, his 10th season with the Bears. In 1962, he had played both offense and defense some but last year, he was exclusively a defensive tackle. Jones' alert, aggressive play was a season-long factor. In the final against Detroit, with the Bears leading 10-7 in the third quarter, he recovered Earl Morrall's fumble at the Lions' 37 to set up the touchdown that was scored three plays later. As a collegian Jones was All-American guard and Lineman of the Year in 1953. Offseason home: Rockville, Md.

TED KARRAS (67) G 6'1" 243 Indiana 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, T-Pittsburgh. Born: 1-31-'34, Gary, Ind.

Karras is regarded as one of the best pass blockers in the NFL who is equally adept at pulling or straight ahead blocks. Graduating from Indiana, he enlisted in the Marine Corps and in 1957, was selected at guard on the All-Service eleven. He went to the Bears' camp in 1958 but was sold to Pittsburgh. After two seasons with the Steelers, he was traded back to the Bears. Offseason home: Gary.

GUS KASAPIS (69) DE 6'4" 252 Iowa 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-17. Born: 3-18-'42, Detroit.

For three seasons, Kasapis was the work-horse of the right side of Iowa's line, starring on both offense and defense. Reduction of defensive end manpower by two (Ed O'Bradovich and Maury Youmans) brought about the shift of Bob Kilcullen from his normal tackle spot. He started at defensive end in the 1963 opener and played there the rest of way, with occasional service at tackle. His recovery of Johnny Unitas' fumble on the Baltimore 25 with the Bears leading the Colts a slim 7-3 in the fourth quarter set up Roger Leclerc's important field goal. Kilcullen's rookie season, 1957, was spent on defense but in 1958 he was shifted to offense. After two years in the Army, he returned to the Bears in 1960 and has been with the defensive unit since. Offseason home: Chicago.

RICH KREITLING (41) E 6'2" 210 Illinois 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1964, T-Cleveland. Born: 3-13-'36, Chicago

The Bears obtained Kreitling from Cleveland for rookie defensive back Lowell Caylor and their second and third draft choices. Kreitling is a native Chicagoan who prepped at Fenger and played on its city championship eleven. He went to Illinois where he was All-American in 1958. He was Cleveland's no. 1 choice at the 1958 player selection meeting and his NFL career record shows 103 pass receptions for 1,590 yards and 14 touchdowns. Kreitling's best season was 1962 when he caught 44 for 659 yards and three touchdowns. Last year, he had 22 for 386 and six touchdowns. Offseason home: Chicago.

ROGER LECLERC (83) LB 6'3" 235 Trinity 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, D-15 for 1959. Born: 10-1-'36, Springfield, Mass.

Nine of Leclerc's thirteen field goals in 1963 were significant contributions to the Bears' title march. He place kicked four (29, 46, 19 and 35 yards) in the 26-7 win over Green Bay here. The previous week, he booted two (30 and 16 yards) for the only points in the 6-0 win over Los Angeles. In both games against Baltimore (10-3 here and 17-7 there), he kicked fourth quarter field goals and his 17-yarder at 10:29 of the fourth period brought the Bears into a 17-17 tie with Pittsburgh. Leclerc tied an NFL record against Detroit in 1961 with five field goals, a mark set by Ernie Nevers and later equalled by Bob Waterfield. Offseason home: Agawam, Mass.

HERMAN LEE (70) T 6'3" 247 Florida A. & M. 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1958, D-23 in 1954. Born: 8-29-'31, Phenix City, Ala.

Lee is one of the fastest big men in the NFL and observers agree that he could be one of the best offensive tackles. His straight ahead blocking is rated excellent and his smartness and alertness add to his effective play. Lee served with the Army military police for two years

Joined Bears: 1957, D-1. Born: 3-5-'34, Jacksonville, Fla.

Leggett was one of the NFL's outstanding defensive tackles in 1963, although recurrence of an old collegiate knee injury in the Minnesota Vikings game here sidelined him for the final two games of the schedule as well as the championship contest. In 1962, he had a great campaign after having missed the entire 1961 schedule because of offseason surgery. He was equally efficient in 1963 and, among other contributions, he recovered King Hill's first period fumble to set up an important field goal in the 16-7 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles. Lewis was a junior college All-American for two seasons at Compton in California. He has had NFL experience with several clubs, including the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Washington Redskins.

CHUCK LOGAN (41) E 6'4" 212 Northwestern 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-7. Born: 4-10-'43, Chicago.

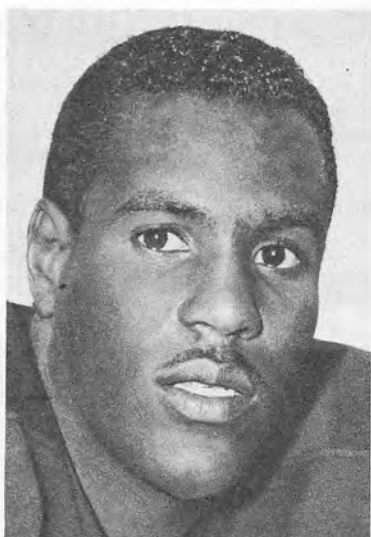
Logan's senior year at Northwestern gained him recognition as one of the finest two-way ends in the Big Ten. In three seasons as starting end, he caught 46 passes for 618 yards with top production as a senior—22 for 352. 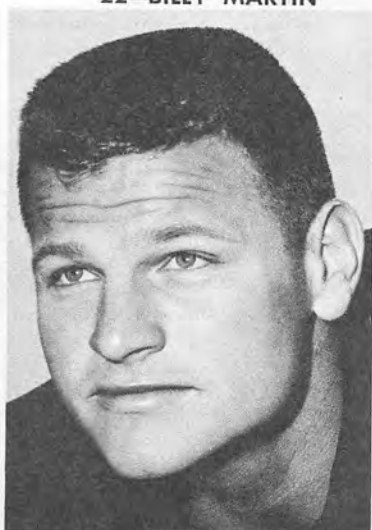

Martin comes to the Bears recommended not only as a great receiver—56 pass receptions for 777 yards and six touchdowns in three years—but as a fine blocker. He averaged 90 percent on blocking assignments. He grew up with Billy Lothridge, Georgia Tech's All-American quarterback and they played on the same teams from the fifth grade on through high school and college. He started every Georgia Tech game in 1962 and 1963. Offseason home: Gainesville, Ga.

BILLY MARTIN (22) HB 5'11" 197 Minnesota 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-4 for 1959. Born: 6-6-'38, Chicago.

Martin suffered a fractured fibula in the final preseason contest at New Orleans and missed all but the last four games of the regular schedule and the championship game of 1963. He has been primarily a kick return specialist in two NFL campaigns with his speed and elusiveness resulting in a 21.17 average on 29 kickoff runbacks and 6.53 on 19 punt returns. A Chicago native who prepped at Wendell Phillips, he attended the University of Minnesota for two years before serving in the Marine Corps for four years. Offseason home: Chicago.

BENNIE McRAE (26) DB 6' 180 Michigan 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-2. Born: 12-8-'39, Newport News, Va.

McRae, principally a reserve in his rookie season, broke into the Bears' magnificent defensive unit as a regular in 1963. Three of his six pass interceptions figured in key victories. He ran one back 35 yards for a touchdown in the rout of the Rams. Two others (against Detroit there and Green Bay here) put the Bears into scoring position and they capitalized on the opportunities. McRae's end zone interception with 4:12 remaining in the championship game was a timely stopper of a late Giants' threat. He has tremendous speed and, in fact, was Big Ten indoor and outdoor 70 and 120-yard hurdles champion. McRae's other distinction as a collegian came when he was the first Negro invited to play in the North-South Shrine game at Miami. Off-season home: Newport News, Va.

JOHNNY MORRIS (47) FL 5'10" 180 U.C.S.B. 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1958, D-12. Born: 9-26-'36, Long Beach, Cal.

Morris, one of the NFL'S fleetest flankers, has streaked for nearly 6,000 yards in four different categories in six seasons (2,733 on pass receptions; 1,034 rushing; 1,267 kickoff returns; 869 punt returns). He has led the team in punt returns for six straight seasons and his 100 total is only 12 under the all-time Bears' record of 112, set by George McAfee over an eight season period. Morris leads present Bears in pass receptions (185 to 173 for Mike Ditka) with 105 of those coming over the last two years. One of his best efforts of 1963 came in the Dec. 15 game against Detroit here in which he caught eight passes for 171 yards. One, a 51 yarder, came late in the third period with the Bears trailing, 7-3. For his career, he has scored 23 touchdowns, including such distance exploits as 80 and 73 yards on passes and a 78-yard punt return. Offseason home: Winnetka, Ill.

LARRY MORRIS (33) LB 6'2" 230 Georgia Tech 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1959, T-Washington. Born: 12-10-'33, Decatur, Ga.

The highlight of Morris' career came in the first period of the championship game against the New York Giants when he intercepted a Y.A. Tittle pass, streaked 61 yards down the sideline to the five before he was hauled down by Darrell Dess. On the second play, Bill Wade went across for the Bears' first touchdown that brought them into a 7-7 tie at the time. Oddly, it was Morris' first interception of a season that, in its formal phase of the regular schedule, saw the Bears set a new team interception record. However, his fierce defensive play throughout was a big factor in the drive that brought the Bears into the title game. Offseason home: Decatur, Ga.

ED O'BRADOVICH (87) DE 6'3" 255 Illinois 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-7. Born: 5-21-'40, Hillside, Ill.

O'Bradovich, handicapped by a virus infection that showed up during training camp and kept him inactive until the ninth game of the NFL schedule, finished strongly to demonstrate his fine showing as a rookie in 1962 was no accident. In the championship game, his third quarter interception and 10 yard return to the Giants' 14 led to the winning touchdown for the Bears. O'Bradovich also did a fine job of rushing Tittle all afternoon. In the regular schedule, his recovery of a San Francisco fumble in the first couple of minutes gave the Bears the ball at their 49 and set up Willie Galimore's 51-yard touchdown run. O'Bradovich was an all-state high school fullback at Proviso but at Illinois, he played offensive end two seasons before dropping out of school after his junior year. He played one season

RICHIE PETITBON (17) DB 6'3" 205 Tulane 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1959, D-2. Born: 4-18-'38, New Orleans.

Petitbon was named 1963 all-NFL safety and for the second straight time, played for the West in the Pro Bowl game. Last season by far was his best since joining the Bears. His eight interceptions raised his career total to 24 for 496 yards return, both of which erased Don Kindt's old team record of 22 for 348. Three of those interceptions were turned into touchdowns—a 66-yarder against the Lions at Detroit last year, plus a club record 101-yarder against Los Angeles in 1962 and a 33-yarder against Baltimore in 1959. In 1963's opener at Green Bay, he recovered Jim Taylor's fumble to set up a Bears' field goal and two weeks later at Detroit, he recovered Nick Pietrosante's fumble to set up a touchdown. Later in the same game, he ran back the interception for a 66-yard touchdown. Against the Forty Niners here in December, Petitbon intercepted a Lamar McHan pass putting the Bears in position to score their second touchdown of the game. And he applied a fitting personal climax to 1963 when, with two seconds remaining in the championship game, he picked off Y.A. Tittle's pass in the end zone to stifle the final Giant drive. At Tulane,

Petitbon was an outstanding quarterback although he also performed on defense. Offseason home: Metairie, La.

MIKE PYLE (50) C 6'3" 250 Yale 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, D-7. Born: 7-18-'39, Keokuk, Ia.

Pyle, widely hailed as the best young center in the NFL, hasn't missed a single offensive play during the course of starting 43 consecutive league games, including the world championship victory over the Giants. He is offensive co-captain with Mike Ditka. He was selected to play for the West in last January's Pro Bowl. Pyle came closest to seeing his durability record end in the final game of 1962 against Detroit here. A deep gash on his right hand, received when a Lion player stepped on him, didn't prevent him from staying in there for several plays that followed. Then, after the Bears relinquished the ball, his hand was bandaged with a protective pad and he went the rest of the way. He was an all-state Illinois high school center at New Trier. In 1960, he captained Yale's first undefeated, untied eleven in 37 years. Offseason home: Chicago.

MIKE RABOLD (64) G 6'2" 240 Indiana 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1963, F.A. Born: 3-12-'37, Chicago

Rabold was on the Bears' reserve list last year. After captaining Indiana and winning All-Big Ten honors in 1958, he was drafted no. 2 by the Detroit Lions and, as a rookie, was a starter in 1959. He was traded to the St. Louis Cardinals for Carl Brettschneider in 1960 and in 1961 and 1962, was a regular with the Minnesota Vikings. Off-season home: Chicago.

LARRY RAKESTRAW (12) QB 6'2" 195 Georgia 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-8. Born: 4-22-'42, Mableton, Ga.

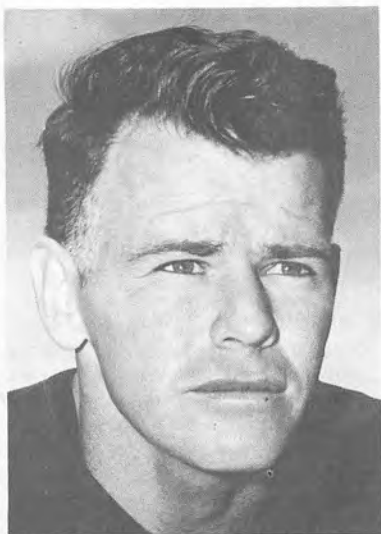
Rakestraw led Southeastern Conference passers last season (103 out of 209 for 1297 yards and seven touchdowns) to become the seventh Georgia player in history to win that honor. Other Bulldogs who have led the SEC included Fran Tarkenton, Zeke Bratkowski, Dick Young, Frank Sinkwich, Johnny Cook and Johnny Rauch. In three seasons, Rakestraw completed 249 passes for 3,142 yards and 19 touchdowns. He also had 523 yards rushing for a total offense of 3,665 yards on 814 attempts, passes or runs, the third straight time he led his team in that category. Offseason home: Mableton, Ga.

MIKE REILLY (62) LB 6'2½" 238 Iowa 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-4. Born: 3-27-'42, Dubuque, Ia.

Reilly was one of the nation's most aggressive collegiate linebackers last season and was selected at guard on the Look All-America



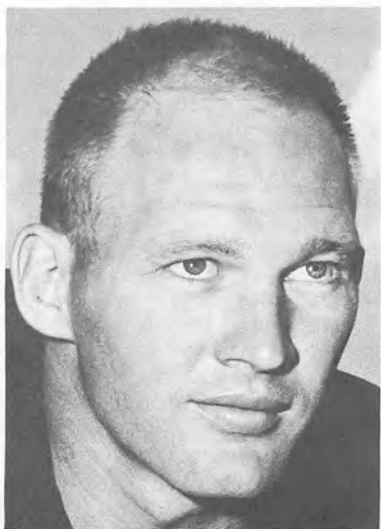

as well as on the Associated Press and United Press International All-Big Ten teams. He also starred in the East-West Shrine game at San Francisco. Reilly did all of Iowa's punting last season with an average of about 40 yards on 31 kicks, five of which traveled over 50 yards. He was named Midwest Lineman of the Week after the game against Minnesota and was runnerup after the Wisconsin contest. Reilly was with the 1964 College All Stars. Offseason home: Dubuque, Ia.

JOHN SISK (27) DB 6'3" 195 Miami, Fla. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-17 for 1963. Born: 7-15-'41, Milwaukee, Wis.

For the first time in the history of the Bears, a son is following his father as a player in the organization. John Sisk, Sr., now a prominent insurance executive in Milwaukee, was a halfback on Bear championship teams of 1932-'33 and continued as a regular through 1936. Johnny, jr., transferred to Miami of Florida after Marquette—also his dad's school—dropped football and track in 1960. On offense, he was a strong pass blocker and averaged 4.5 yards a carry running. On defense, he led his team last year with four pass interceptions and his average of seven tackles, three assists a game was the best for any defensive back. Offseason home: Milwaukee.

ROOSEVELT TAYLOR (24) DB 5'11" 186 Grambling 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, F.A. Born: 7-4-'37, New Orleans.

Taylor tied New York's Dick Lynch for the NFL interception leadership, nine apiece. He also was named 1963 all-NFL safety and played in the Pro Bowl game. His interceptions were a new Bears single season record. He also recovered three opponents' fumbles, tying Joe Fortunato in that respect. Taylor, a hard tackler, had his greatest single moment on the second half kickoff against the Giants in in the world championship game when he downed Hugh McElhenny after the latter had streaked 46 yards downfield. During the regular season, his alertness led to Bears' scores six different times—he returned an interception 30 yards for a touchdown against the Forty Niners here while two other interceptions, against the Packers at Green Bay and the Rams at Los Angeles, and three fumble recoveries, one against the Vikings there and two against them in Chicago, all set up Bears' scoring plays. He was signed in 1961 after leading the nation's small college backs with twelve interceptions. Offseason home: New Orleans.

BILL WADE (9) QB 6'2" 205 Vanderbilt 11th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, T-Los Angeles. Born: 10-4-'30, Nashville, Tenn.

Wade has made spectacular contributions to the Bears' offense in his three seasons with them—55 touchdown passes plus 13 he has

scored on runs. He ran for both touchdowns in the Bears' 14-10 world championship victory. In seven previous seasons with the Rams, he had 56 touchdown passes, 10 touchdowns running. Wade holds Bears' team single season records (set in 1962) for most attempts, completions and yards, 412-225-3,172 as well as the longest completed pass, a 98-yarder to John Farrington in 1961. In three seasons with the Bears, his 556 completions out of 1,018 give him an efficiency percentage of 54.6. Sid Luckman's 12-year career mark is 51.8. Three times in 1963, Wade pitched three touchdowns in a game, against Minnesota, Detroit and Los Angeles. He also ran for a touchdown in the 28-7 win over the Vikings. Wade now has eight three-touchdown games and two four-touchdown efforts as the Bears' quarterback. He was the Rams' bonus choice in 1952 but served in the Navy for two years before reporting in 1954. Offseason home: Nashville.

BOB WETOSKA (63) T 6'3" 240 Notre Dame 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1960, F.A. Born: 8-22-'37, Minneapolis

Wetoska is one of the league's most versatile linemen. He plays either guard or either tackle and has understudied Mike Pyle at center though he has yet to snap the ball in an NFL game. Some experts say he's the most improved player in the game, attributed in part to an increase in weight without any loss of speed. At Notre Dame, he was an end for three seasons and was drafted no. 5 by the Washington Redskins in 1959. When he wasn't retained, the Bears signed him. Offseason home: Minneapolis.

DAVE WHITSELL (23) DB 6'1" 190 Indiana 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1961, T-New York. Born: 6-14-'36, Shelby, Mich.

One of Whitsell's six interceptions in 1963 was a most timely steal—he ran it back 39 yards for a fourth quarter touchdown that cinched the 24-14 victory over Detroit here. In the championship game, his interception, without return, halted a New York Giant third quarter drive at the Bears' 26. During the regular schedule, his interception set up the second touchdown in the 28-7 victory over Minnesota, and, later, he picked off a Green Bay pass in the fourth quarter that put the Bears into position for a field goal. Offseason home: Indianapolis.

KELTON WINSTON (20) HB 6'2" 205 Wiley (Tex.) 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1964, D-9 in 1962. Born: 2-10-'40, Fort Worth, Tex.

Winston served in the U.S. Marine Corps for two years and was a star back on the San Diego Training Station eleven. Before that, he attended Wiley College, Marshall, Tex. He is described as extremely fast with defensive ability as well as his talents as a runner on offense. Offseason home: Fort Worth.

The nineteenth annual Armed Forces Benefit game, sponsored by Chicago's four metropolitan daily newspapers, matched the Bears against the St. Louis Cardinals at Soldier Field Friday night, Aug. 28. For the tenth straight time, it was sponsored by the Chicago Publishers Association (Chicago's American, Daily News, Sun-Times and Tribune).

Sharing in the proceeds are Army Emergency Relief, the Navy Relief Society and the Air Force Aid Society, all official agencies that provide financial assistance to those servicemen and to widows and orphans of servicemen who need it.

The series, since its inception in 1946, has raised \$759,610. The inaugural came about at a meeting in Washington attended by Dwight D. Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff; Admiral Chester K. Nimitz; General Ira Eaker, General Carl Spaatz, George Halas and Ralph Cannon, sports editor of the Chicago Herald-American, which sponsored the game in 1946 and 1947.

The Sun-Times assumed sponsorship from 1949 through 1954 and in 1955, the four Chicago metropolitan daily newspapers took over direction of the game.

In 1953, President Eisenhower authorized presentation of a trophy to the outstanding player in each game, selected by sports writers, radio and TV broadcasters. The player's name is inscribed on the trophy and he receives a replica of the award. Last year's winner was Charley Johnson, St. Louis Cardinals quarterback.

Winners in other years were: Jim Ninowski, Cleveland, 1962; John Farrington, Bears, 1961; Rick Casares and Zeke Bratkowski, Bears, who tied in 1960; Jim Dooley, Bears, 1959; Willie Galimore, Bears, 1958; Fred Williams, Bears, 1957; Darrell Brewster, Cleveland, 1956; Ed Brown, Bears, 1955; Frank Gifford, New York, 1964; and Harry Jagade, Cleveland, 1953.

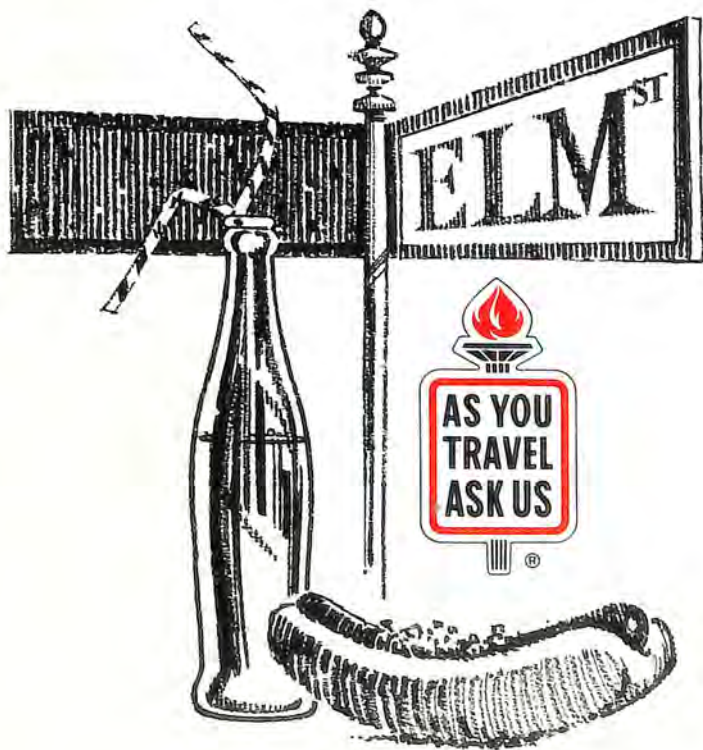
