'71 Goal . . . Continue on the Rise

All the Bears need do in 1971 is resume the momentum that was theirs at the end of '70. In short, stay on the upbeat and the past can be forgotten.

For the first time since they came to Chicago in 1921, the Bears will have a new home site for NFL games this year. They'll play at 54,000-capacity Soldier Field where an extensive program of modernizing improvements includes an Astroturf gridiron.

Distasteful, disastrous 1969 (an unprecedented one win only in fourteen starts) was partially removed in 1970 as a memory that gnaws at the Bears' intense pride in tradition. They finished 6-8, but there still was the feeling that it could have been or should have been better—over .500 at least, because several of the losses came after the Bears were in control through a full half and into a third quarter only to let down.

But 1970's finishing kick was significant. Three of the last six games were won decisively. The three that were lost were by a total of only FIVE points. And most important of all, that happened at a stage of the NFL schedule where the Bears were out of contention with only pride and morale as incentive.

The Bears didn't merely play out the string—they were "up" for six consecutive weekends and now the hope is the improvement will carry over into this season.

The late development probably is best explained by the offseason trades and a productive draft that brought about an unusually high revision of manpower. Consequently, time was needed for all of the new parts to fit in with the reliable holdovers.

At the cost of the first two draft choices for 1970 and two starting linemen (Rufus Mayes and Dick Evey), the Bears acquired nine quality players with solid big league credentials. Eight of them made it, six as starters and two as valuable "spot" performers.

Starting of necessity on the third round of the college draft, the Bears had excellent results anyway—seven rookies with more than enough talent to be trusted in situations that enabled them to get in considerable playing time.

This year, the Bears got a full count, plus, in the draft—eighteen choices of whom five came on the first three rounds. Three of those five were among the first thirty-six collegians picked—No. 1 Joe Moore and No. 2-a James Harrison, both running backs from Missouri; No. 2-b Charles Ford, Houston defensive back who was tenth on the second round.

Good distribution, offense and defense, is expected to add to the depth and take care of any future manpower emergencies.

Gale Sayers, who got into only two games in 1970 because of injury to his left knee requiring surgery about ten days after it happened and off-season operative procedures as well, fully expects to come back as elusively effective as ever.

One objective is to bring the ground game closer to parity with the air attack. Last year, offensive yardage broke down into 33.5 percent on rushing, 66.5 percent on passing and the league ratio is roughly 43 to 57.

The air attack was forceful as Dick Gordon led all pro receivers, NFC and AFC, with 71 catches for 1,026 yards and 13 touchdowns. He was all-NFL selection as a wide receiver, joining team-mate Dick Butkus, picked as middle linebacker for the fifth time in six seasons.

Butkus, by the way, also underwent offseason knee surgery for reconstruction of loose ligaments, a condition that had existed for fourteen years.

Besides Gordon, impressive receivers included a pair of first year men, third draft choice George Farmer who caught 31 for 496 yards and Jim Seymour, one of two Rams coming to the Bears in the Evey trade, who picked off only six passes but four were for touchdowns. Seymour made only seven game appearances because a pulled muscle delayed his start with the Bears.

Quarterbacks Jack Concannon and Bobby Douglass each had a four-touchdown afternoon, the former against Green Bay and the latter against Buffalo.

Another bright development in 1970 was the kickoff return unit. Cecil Turner led individual kickoff runners-back and scored four touchdowns (tying the NFL record) in the course of building a 26.3 yard average. As a team, the Bears missed the leadership by one-hundredth of a percentage point, 26.285 average yards to 26.295 for the Los Angeles Rams.

Defensively, the Bears tied for first in fewest average yards per rushing play allowed (3.2); fourth low in total yards rushing allowed (1,471); and fifth in first downs rushing (83). Those compare with the NFC averages of, respectively, 3.8; 1,679; and 88.

Among individual accomplishments besides those already mentioned, Doug Buffone's four pass interceptions were the most by any Bears' outside linebacker in one season, and Ron Smith set two new team records with 33 punt returns and 28 kickoff runbacks.

Documenting the upsurge over the last six-game stretch are these statistics:

DEFENSE—Opponents average rushing yardage per game cut to 255.3 yards for last six as against 316.9 for first eight; passing yardage to 146.1 from 214.9; percentage completed passes to 54.8 from 62.2; thirteen pass interceptions from four.

OFFENSE—Overall yardage average per game up to 275.8 from 201.3 for first eight; rushing, 83.7 from 73.8; passing, 192.1 from 127.5.

Apart from the one-point losses to Baltimore and Green Bay and the three-point defeat by Minnesota, there is evidence the Bears were in contention in four of the other five games they dropped. They led Detroit at the half in both meetings; set the pace for San Francisco at the half; and tied San Diego at the end of the first two periods. Only in the first Minnesota game were they completely outclassed from opening kickoff to final gun.

Jim Dooley . . . Head Coach



Jim Dooley enters his fourth season as head coach of the Bears for whom he has been a real career man. He has been associated with the team continuously since 1952 except for a year-and-a-half (1955-'56) on U.S. Air Force duty.

Dooley's enthusiasm has been at a high level since he was appointed head coach in 1968 when George S. Halas announced his retirement. Reverses and disappointments that might have discouraged others in

a similar position haven't bothered him and he goes into 1971 confident that the success theme developed in the closing stages of 1970 will be maintained.

Elsewhere in this book is an account of last season and a look into the future. But this biography of Dooley should contain the significant fact that he has not been content to amble along with the material available on the chance that somehow, everything would turn out all right.

To illustrate the changes made, only twenty-one players are still on the roster of the fifty who got into from one to as many as fourteen games with the Bears in 1968, his first season as head coach.

Dooley has come up steadily in the Bears organization from player (defensive back in 1952 and offensive end thereafter except for 1958 when a fractured ankle sidelined him); through a tenure as assistant coach (1962-'65 on offense and 1966-'67 on defense); and finally in 1968 his appointment as head coach.

He was an all-American end at Miami (Fla.) University and the Bears' no. 1 draft choice for 1952. His home in recent years has been Arlington Heights, Ill., and his family consists of his wife, Elaine; four sons, Jim, 18; Pat, 14; Tim, 12; and Bill, 9; and a daughter, Lisa, 16.

The Staff

BILL AUSTIN joined the staff this season after having been head coach of the Washington Redskins last year and an assistant to the late Vince Lombardi there in 1969. From 1966 through 1968, he was head coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers following service as Lombardi's aide at Green Bay, 1959-'64, and as an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams in 1965. A native of San Pedro, Cal., Austin played college football at Oregon, lettering as a tackle from 1946-'48 after which he was a regular guard with the New York Giants until 1957. His home is Deerfield, Ill.

ABE GIBRON has been a Bears' assistant since 1965, following five years with the Washington Redskins. His birthplace, Michigan City, Ind., is still his home and he played one year of college football at Valparaiso before transferring to Purdue and graduating in 1949. As a player he was an outstanding lineman with the Cleveland Browns for six seasons (1950-'55) following his debut with the Buffalo Bills of the All-America Conference. Gibron was with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Chicago Bears two seasons each before he turned to coaching at Washington.

PERRY MOSS, now two years with the Bears, has a wide coaching background since his all-America days at Illinois where he quarterbacked the 1946 Big Ten champions who also won the Rose Bowl. Following his graduation, he played one season with Green Bay but in 1949 went into coaching. Collegiate assignments included athletic directorship and head coach at Florida State University. He also was head coach-general manager of the Montreal Alouettes three years as well as head coach of Charleston and Orlando of the Continental League two seasons each. Moss was head coach at Marshall University, Huntington, W. Va., before joining the Bears a year ago. He lives in Park Ridge, Ill.

JIM RINGO joined the Bears as an assistant in 1969 after a fifteen year NFL playing record that included his selection as center for the Pro Bowl nine straight times. He was named to the all-Western division team from 1956-'63, inclusive. His first eleven seasons in the NFL were with the Green Bay Packers and he was on their title teams of 1961-'62 and the western champions of 1960. In 1964, he went to the Philadelphia Eagles for four seasons as a regular. At Syracuse University, from which he received a BA degree in 1953, he was an all-America center. He now lives in Barrington, Ill.

BOB SHAW is with the Bears for the third season and has an impressive record in football, as coach and player. Beginning at Ohio State where he was all-American in both football and basketball before graduating in 1944, he played seven NFL seasons (1945-'50) as an end with the Cleveland, later the Los Angeles Rams; and the Chicago Cardinals. With the latter, he set an NFL record of five TD passes in one game. As a college coach, he was at Loyola of Los Angeles and New Mexico Military and also was on the staffs of the Baltimore Colts, San Francisco Forty Niners and New Orleans Saints. His home now is Arlington Heights.

DON SHINNICK, like Moss, is in his second year with the Bears, following thirteen seasons as linebacker for the Baltimore Colts. He holds the NFL linebacker record for career interceptions, 37, and he was a member of Baltimore NFL championship teams in 1958-'59 and 1968 as well as with the 1964 western division winners. Shinnick has a bachelor of science degree from UCLA. Like Ringo, he also lives now in Barrington.

Director of Technical Research

LUKE JOHNSOS, in his third season as director of technical research, has been with the Bears continuously since 1929, as player or coach. He had graduated from Northwestern in June 1929 and joined the Bears that autumn, remaining active as a player through 1936. Then, Johnsos was appointed to the coaching staff with one tenure (1942-'45) as co-head coach. As a player or a coach, he has figured in seven of the team's eight championships. Johnsos' home is Evanston.

Director of Professional Talent

ED CODY, in his seventh consecutive season with the Bears, was named to a new position this year, that of director of professional talent. He had been a coaching assistant but his association with the Bears actually dated back to his pro playing days when he was an offensive back and linebacker with them. He started his pro playing career with the Green Bay Packers, following graduation with bachelor's and master's degrees from Purdue where he also was football captain and Big Ten scoring and ground gaining leader. His collegiate coaching experience included excellent records at University of California, Santa Barbara; and Washington State. His home is Mt. Prospect, Ill.

Director of Training Services

ED ROZY, a big league athletic career man, becomes director of training services in his 24th year with the Bears. Dean of NFL trainers, he came to the Bears directly from four years as a U.S. Navy lieutenant (1944-'47). Before that Rozy had been intramural director of athletics, head trainer in all major sports and coach of half a dozen minor sports teams at Marquette. He had graduated from there in 1933 and lettered in football as a guard. His home is Niles, Ill.

Head Trainer

BERNIE LAREAU, a protege of Rozy, moved up to head trainer this season. He had been associate trainer last year, coming here from Indianapolis where he had the dual assignment of business manager and trainer of the Indiana Pacers of the ABA. Lareau had attended St. Joseph's College, Rensselaer, Ind., the Bears' training site since 1944 and first became acquainted with Rozy in the summer of 1957. He was student trainer at the college that fall and winter but in 1958, became assistant with the Bears until his graduation from St. Joseph's in 1961. He became the college's first full-time trainer for six years before going to Indianapolis. He lives in Chicago.

Assistant to President . . . Player Personnel Director



WALSTON

BOBBY WALSTON was appointed assistant to the president of the Bears this summer but still is director of player personnel, a position he has held since 1968. Walston will be concerned primarily with all phases of playing personnel, from procurement of talent in the college draft or by trades with other NFL teams through the signing of all veterans. He is one of professional football's all-time great place kickers with a career record of eighty field goals and 365 conversions in twelve seasons (1951-'62) with the Philadelphia Eagles. He also caught 46 touchdown passes as an end. He came to the Bears after two years

as player personnel director for the Eagles and two as kicking and pass receiving coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was an all-American as a collegian at Georgia. Walston lives in Schaumburg, Ill.



Traveling Secretary Fifty Years

FRANK HALAS sets a record for pro sports traveling secretaries this year, which is his fiftieth in that capacity for the Bears. He began to

shepherd the Bears in 1922, a year after they came to Chicago from Decatur. His experiences range from railroad day-coach travel down to chartered jet planes. Frank, older brother (he's 88) of Bears owner George Halas, is a native of Chicago who attended Joseph Medill High School, West 14th and South Loomis which is now a grade school. He was a star in football, basketball and baseball around the turn of the century. After his graduation, Frank played semi-pro baseball with the famous Spaldings and also starred with the Commodore Barry Council K. of C. indoor baseball team that won the world champion-

ship eight years out of nine. He also played for the Chicago Titans semi-pro football team and one of his more painful recollections is the afternoon they met a South Bend eleven led by Pat O'Dea, a former Wisconsin great, who drop-kicked a fourth quarter 55-yard field goal to win the game.

HOWARD MUDD G 6'2" 252 Hillsdale (Mich.) 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, T-San Francisco Born: 2-10-'42, Midland, Mich.

Carryover of a knee injury that occurred in the final game of 1969 restricted Mudd's playing activity in 1970. An all-NFL guard selection in 1967 and 1968 and starter three times in the Pro Bowl, he came to the Bears late in 1969 on a trade that sent Roosevelt Taylor to the Forty Niners. He was San Francisco's No. 9 draft choice for 1964. Offseason home: Deerfield, Illinois.

JOHN NEIDERT LB 6'2" 230 Louisville 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, T-New York Jets Born: 6-18-'46, Akron, O.

Neidert, activated late in 1970, got into three games for the Bears who gave up an undisclosed draft choice to the Jets in a pre-season trade. In 1969, he got into all fourteen Jets' games, four as a starter. Neidert originally was Cincinnati's sixth draft choice for 1968 but the Bengals waived him to New York after nine games. Offseason home: Sarasota, Fla.

BOB NEWTON T 6'4" 250 Nebraska 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1971, D-3 Born: 8-16-'49, La Mirada, Cal.

Newton, one of the Bears' two third round draft choices, was strong man on Nebraska's 1970 national champion offensive line. He was

KENT NIX QB 6'2" 198 Texas Christian 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, FA Born: 3-12-'44, Corpus Christi, Tex.

Nix, signed originally as a free agent by the Green Bay Packers in 1966, spent all of that season on their reserve squad, before being traded to Pittsburgh the following year. He was with the Steelers three seasons, completing 217 passes and averaging 4.2 yards rushing. Offseason home: Fort Worth, Tex.

ED O'BRADOVICH DE 6'4" 255 Illinois 10th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, D-7 Born: 5-21-'40, Hillside, Ill.

O'Bradovich remains a terror to enemy quarterbacks and in the last four seasons, he has "reached"—either to tackle or assist on a sacking—seventy-one times. Last year, he sacked eight times, assisted on nine as well as being credited with 27 tackles and eight assists. He got into all fourteen games in 1970 to raise his durability record to 83 appearances in the last 84 for the Bears. That is significant to him because early in his career, injuries reduced his playing time and idled him for six games in 1963 and seven in 1964. Offseason home: Palatine, Ill.

RAY OGDEN TE 6'5" 225 Alabama 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, T-Atlanta Born: 9-2-'42, Jesup, Ga.

Ogden saw only limited service last season but the only pass he caught went for a touchdown, a six-yarder against the Green Bay

Packers on Dec. 13. The Bears, who got Ogden on a midsummer 1969 trade with Atlanta, are the fourth NFL team with which he has been associated. He was St. Louis' No. 3 draft choice for 1965, then went successively to New Orleans, Atlanta and the Bears. Offseason home: Jesup, Ga.

MAC PERCIVAL PK 6'4" 220 Texas Tech 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1967, T-Dallas Born: 2-26-'40, Garland, Tex.

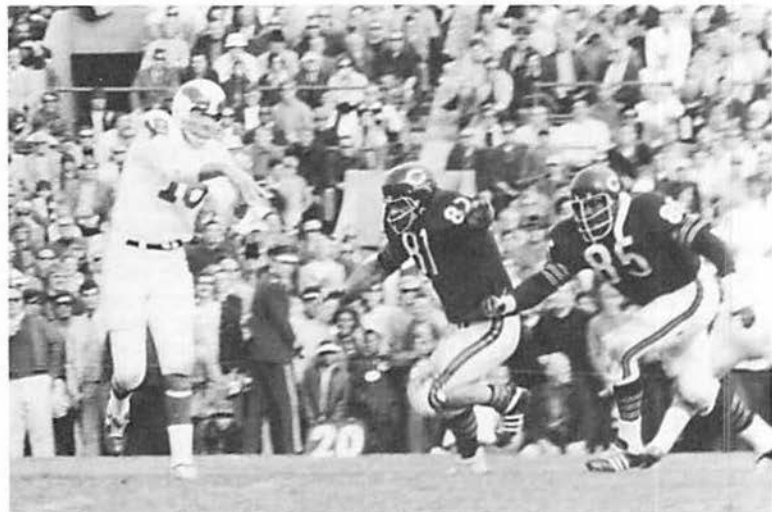

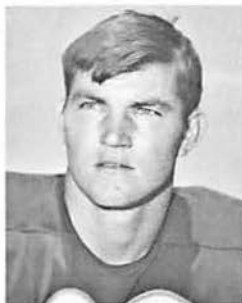
LARRY ROWDEN LB 6'2" 220 Houston 1st Season

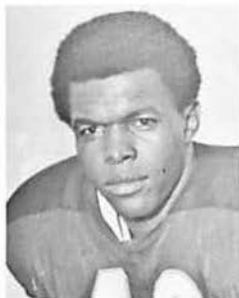

GALE SAYERS RB 6' 200 Kansas 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-1 Born: 5-30-'43, Wichita, Kansas

Sayers, plagued by a preseason injury to his left knee, got into only two of 1970's first four NFL games, starting against the Giants at New York and the Minnesota Vikings here. Surgery was required in mid-October and he underwent a second operation in the offseason. In 1968, injury to his right knee required surgery that caused him to miss the last five games. However, he came back in 1969 with 1,032 yards rushing, first time on record that any NFL running back had ever hit 1,000-plus the season immediately after knee surgery. He led the league's rushers that year, just as he had in 1966 with 1,033 yards. Sayers' accumulation of records and addition to his career totals were suspended because of the 1970 problems but he is expected to return this season able as ever. He now holds nine NFL and sixteen Bears' team records; unanimous all-league running back five times; most valuable player in the Pro Bowl three times; second to Rick Casares in Bears' career rushing yards; first in National Conference career kickoff and punt return averages (30.6 and 14.5); second active NFL player in career rushing yardage (4,918 to 5,192 for Bill Brown, Minnesota). He also has had twenty games of 100-or-more yards rushing. He was named to the all-time pro honor team and, in the area of civic activity, he is an unsalaried member of the Chicago Park District commission and was named one of the nation's ten outstanding young men of 1969 by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce. Offseason home: Chicago.

GREGG SCHUMACHER DE 6'2" 240 Illinois 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1971, F.A. Born: 6-30-'42, Chicago

Schumacher was on the Bears' reserve squad in 1965 after he had signed as a free agent. The following year, he was on the Los Angeles Rams' reserve list but was active as a member of their special teams in 1968 and became a starting defensive end in 1969. The Bears signed Schumacher as a free agent for a second time during this past off-season. A graduate of Taft high school, he played both tight end and guard at Illinois where he won three letters. Offseason home: Addison, Ill.

JIM SEYMOUR WR 6'4" 210 Notre Dame 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1970, T-Los Angeles Born: 11-24-'46, Detroit

A pulled muscle delayed Seymour's NFL debut in 1970, but when he got his chance with half of the schedule remaining, he had an unusual statistical mark—of six pass receptions, four went for touchdowns. He had come to the Bears on a trade with Los Angeles. Actually, his pro start was delayed a year and a half for after he had been selected No. 1 by the Rams for 1969, he went into Army service. He had been an All-American at Notre Dame. Offseason home: Northfield, Illinois.

DON SHY RB 6'1" 210 San Diego State 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, FA Born: 11-15-'45 Cleveland, Ohio

Shy got into only eight games for the Bears in 1970 but he had 227 yards rushing and caught ten passes for 147. He was Pittsburgh's second draft choice for 1967 and was with the Steelers two seasons before his trade to New Orleans for 1969. Offseason home: San Diego.

RON SMITH CB 6'1" 195 Wisconsin 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, T-Los Angeles Born: 5-3-'43, E. Chicago, Ind.

When Smith came to the Bears along with Jim Seymour in last pre-season's trade with the Rams, it was his second tour of duty here. He originally had signed with the Bears in 1965 as a free agent but subsequently went to Atlanta in the expansion draft and then to the Rams. Last year, Ron showed he had lost none of his speed or aggressiveness when he recovered three opponents fumbles, returned 33 kickoffs and 28 punts and was credited with 18 tackles and ten assists. JOE TAYLOR CB 6'1" 200 North Carolina A&T 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1967, FA Born: 12-27-'40, Miami, Fla.

Taylor had another good season with the Bears in 1970, although he missed three games. He was credited with 23 tackles, 22 assists to bring his total for the past three seasons to 99-42. In 1969, he was busiest of all the defense backs as he got into 99 percent of 783 possible defensive plays. Offseason home: Orlando, Florida.

EARL THOMAS TE 6'3" 224 Houston 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1971, D-6 Born: 10-4-'48, Greenville, Tex.

Thomas got into 244 minutes playing time as a senior at Houston after alternating at tight end his first two years. He caught 15 passes for 271 yards and also had six rushes for 67. In high school, he played quarterback, tailback and linebacker at various times. He is a brother of San Francisco running back Jimmy Thomas. Offseason home: Greenville.

CECIL TURNER WR 5'10" 176 California Poly 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-5 Born: 4-2-'44, Washington, D.C.

In 1970, Turner tied the NFL record (set by Travis Williams) when he returned four kickoffs for touchdowns, 95, 96, 94 and 88 yards. His 752 yards total returns for the season also beat Gale Sayers' Bears' mark of 718 in 1966. He still has the great speed that helped him to lead the 1968 Cal-Poly track team to the NCAA College Division championship. Turner had firsts in the 100-meter dash and the long jump; ran the first leg of the 400-meter relay; and had a second in the 200-meter. Offseason home: Washington.

Although Weiss lettered three years as a tight end, his physical specifications will get him a shot as an interior offensive lineman. In three seasons, he caught 60 passes for 794 yards for Vanderbilt. Scouting reports emphasized his speed and blocking ability with special enthusiasm conveyed on Weiss' showing in Vandy's win over Alabama and a loss to Tennessee. Offseason home: Madison, Connecticut.

TED WHEELER G 6'3" 245 West Texas State 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, W-St. Louis Born: 9-16-'45, Detroit

Wheeler was activated about midseason of 1970 and got into parts of six games. He had come to the Bears in September 1969 on waivers from the St. Louis Cardinals, with whom he was a reserve the previous two years. Pro Bowl All-Star Production

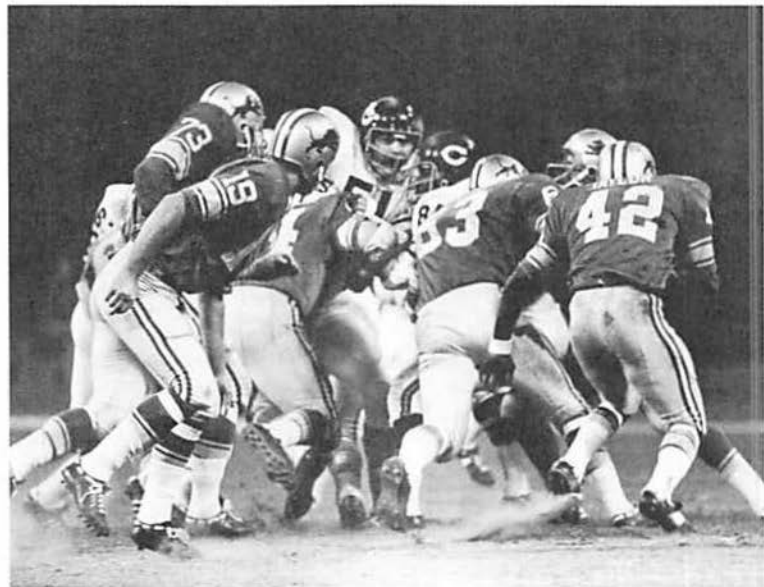

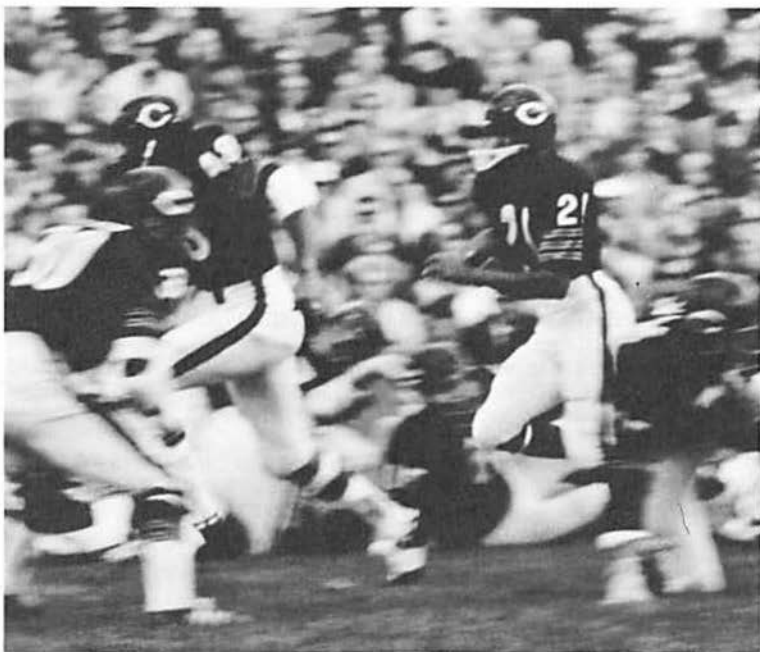
