ABE GIBRON IN THIRD SEASON AS HEAD COACH OF THE BEARS

This is Abe Gibron's third season as head coach of the Bears and his 12th year with the organization, beginning as a player (1958-'59), resuming as an assistant coach (1965-'71) and assuming his present position in 1972.

As a player, he was co-captain and offensive guard. As assistant, he coached the offensive line three seasons and the defensive line four. In 1965, that offensive line played a large role in an attack that resulted in an all-time Bears scoring record, 409 points.

He is a life-long resident of the Chicago area, born Sept. 22, 1925, at Michigan City, Ind., where he still maintains a year-around home with wife Susie; sons William Abraham and James

Kahlil; and daughter Matina Frances.

Gibron is a football career man who has been active in some capacity somewhere every year since his high school days.

He was a letterman and graduate of Purdue University whose first professional experience was with Buffalo of the old All-American Conference in 1949. Then, he spent seven seasons with the Cleveland Browns, the last three games of 1956 and all of 1957 with the Philadelphia Eagles before coming to the Bears.

As a player, he got into 128 games in all, 79 with Cleveland which, in his time there, played six NFL championship games and won three.

Gibron, all-pro offensive guard three times, appeared in five Pro Bowl games. After retirement as a player, he became an assistant with the Washington Redskins from 1960 through 1964.

The winning touch has eluded Gibron-coached teams in his two seasons as top man. Yet there were flashes of promise such as the 1972 Bears whose 2,360 yards rushing led the NFL National Conference and rated fourth in the league overall.

Last season was one of bitter disappointment mainly because the Bears lost their way after bright beginnings that suggested it might be a year of satisfaction. The pre-season record (3-1 and two ties) was the Bears best since 1968.

The first three regular NFL starts hinted that the pre-season was no accident—Dallas won with a last minute field goal and Minnesota needed

five field goals for a victory margin while much improved Denver was routed decisively.

But the fourth week—at New Orleans, where the Saints had been given no chance in pre-game reckoning—began a skid from which the Bears never recovered. Only successful afternoons after that unexpected loss were a win over the Packers at Green Bay and another over the Houston Oilers in Soldier Field, both of which were easy conquests.

Whatever the reason, the results made '73 one of the Bears' less memorable campaigns.

No question but that there will be changes of front, offense and defense, for 1974.

The veterans on the roster are neither worn out from too many seasons of NFL competition nor are they too old in years. But even the best of the experienced returning players will be pushed for jobs by incoming rookies—most significantly, those rookies acquired in what most experts agree was the Bears best college draft in several years.

EDMUND (ZEKE) BRATKOWSKI is now in his third season as an assistant coach with the Bears. He had begun his pro career here in 1954 and got in five playing seasons at quarterback, with two years of military service following his rookie campaign. Zeke had been a fifth round draft choice after a fine collegiate career at Georgia where, among other highlights, he was NCAA punting leader as a senior. After his fifth playing year with the Bears, he went to the Los Angeles Rams on a 1961 trade and remained with the Rams until early in 1963, when the Green Bay Packers purchased his contract. With the Packers, he was backup quarterback to Bart Starr, a member of three consecutive NFL championship teams and also on the winning rosters in the first two Super Bowls. He is a native of Danville, Ill. Zeke and his wife, Mary, are parents of two sons, Bobby and Steve, and a daughter, Cassie.

JIM CARR, respected around the league as a sharp defensive coach, returned to the Bears staff in 1972 following three seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles. He had also been a Bear assistant in 1969 after three years on the Minnesota Vikings staff. Jim, whose nickname is "Gummy", came from Kayford, W. Va., and played college football at Morris Harvey, Charleston, W. Va. He began his professional career in 1955 and got in a lot of action with the old Chicago Cardinals, Baltimore Colts, Philadelphia Eagles and Washington Redskins. Carr and his wife, Lila Lee, and two children, Kenneth and Gwendolyn, live in Roselle, Ill.

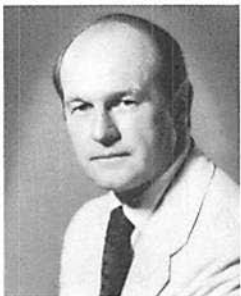
CHARLES (CHUCK) CHERUNDOLO made a name for himself as a genuine pro football career man who now is in his third season on the Bears' staff after having been with them previously from 1966 through 1968. In between the two tenures here, he was head coach of the Tri-City Apollos (Midland, Mich.) of the Continental League in 1969 and the following two years, was on assignments for the Quadra scouting combine that functions for Dallas, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego. After winning all-America selection as Penn State's center, Chuck was an NFL line star for the Cleveland Rams, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, with four years in the U.S. Navy, all between 1937 and 1948. Cherundolo and his wife, Margaret, live in Chicago with a daughter, Mary Pat. A son, John, graduated from Syracuse University in 1972.

WILLIAM (WHITEY) DOVELL pronounces his name "Doe-Vell" and this is his third year on the Bears staff. He had coached previously for five years with the Denver Broncos and before that, spent 15 seasons at the University of Maryland. He also lettered in varsity football at Maryland under Head coach Jim Tatum and, as an offensive guard, played twice in the Gator Bowl and once in the Sugar Bowl. After graduation, he coached the Maryland freshmen three years and then for the next 12 years was in charge of receivers, both offensive and defensive lines and linebackers at various times. He and his wife, Claire, have three daughters, Audrey, Patricia and Lisa, and the family lives in Cary, Ill.

RALPH GOLDSTON is one of two new members of the Bears' staff this year after a college and pro football career uninterrupted since the late 1940's. A native of Youngstown, O., he graduated in 1951 from the university there after transferring from Indiana University where he won two football letters as a halfback. He was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles

and after five seasons with them, he went to the Canadian League for nine years, with both Hamilton and Montreal. Retiring as a player, Goldston became an assistant coach, first at Montreal and, subsequently, at Harvard in 1971-'72 and at Colorado last season. He and his wife, Sarah, have one son, Ralph, Jr., member of the faculty at Youngstown University; and three daughters, Ursula, Beverly and Monica.

BOB LORD is the second new member of the staff this year. Since graduating from Colorado State in 1956, his coaching experience has been exclusively collegiate, including head coach positions at Chicago's North Park College (1960-'63) and Macalester College, St. Paul, Minn. (1965-'65). He also was an assistant at Wake Forest, Wesleyan (Middletown, Conn.), Appalachian State and, the last two years, at Massachusetts. He comes originally from Brunswick, Me. He and his wife, Julia, are parents of three daughters, Belinda Lea, Martha and Patricia and two sons, Bobby, Jr., and Billy.

JERRY STOLTZ is a native Chicagoan, who grew up on the South Side and was an outstanding prep athlete at Fenger high school in 1952-53-54. He went to the University of Toledo, and saw duty as a quarterback, a running back and a defensive back. He won All-Mid-America Conference honors as a defensive back. After graduation, Jerry went into coaching and at various times, was on the staffs at Toledo, Notre Dame, Miami of Ohio and Purdue. In 1969, he went to the New England Patriots and remained with them through 1972 when he accepted the chance to return to his home town area. He and his wife, Rosemary, and their children, Mike, Jeri Marie, Kelly and Patrick, now make their home in Hinsdale.

Begins 46th Year With Bears

LUKE JOHNSOS is beginning his 46th consecutive season with the Bears organization and since 1969, he has been director of technical research. But his start actually goes back almost to the beginnings of the Bears themselves because from 1929 through 1937, he was a regular end, three times winning All-National Football League honors. When he played, he was a 60-minute man, defense as well as offense. In his many years with the Bears, he figured as a player or an assistant coach in seven of their eight championships, missing out only on the 1921 first place finish. From 1942 through 1945,

when George Halas was in the United States Navy in World War II, Luke was co-head coach with Heartley (Hunk) Anderson. At Northwestern University he also won three baseball letters and was so highly regarded, he received a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds but decided on pro football instead. He was a player on the 1932-33 Bears championship teams and was in a coaching role during the 1940, 1941, 1943, 1946 and 1963 title seasons. Luke and his wife, Rosemary, make their home in Evanston. They have a son, Luke, Jr., of Deerfield; four daughters, Judy (Mrs. John Wolford of River Forest); Janet (Mrs. Dean Traflet of La Grange Park); Barbara (Mrs. Brian Kocher of Minneapolis); and Ann (Mrs. Gary Smith of Skokie). They also have 16 grandchildren.



Assistant to President . . . Player Personnel Director

BOBBY WALSTON is starting his seventh year with the Bears organization, the last three of which he has had dual responsibilities—assistant to the club president as well as director of player personnel. The latter involves the all important job of acquisition of talent and Walston's overall responsibilities cover the annual NFL college draft, signing of players (veterans as well as draft choices and free agents) and negotiation of deals with other teams in the league. He was an All-American at the University of Georgia before going to the Philadelphia Eagles where he compiled one of pro football's greatest all-

time place kicking records between 1951 and 1962. He wound up with 80 field goals and 365 conversions and those, along with 46 touchdowns, gave him a career scoring total of 881 points, ranking him 10th all-time. Following retirement as a player, Walston was Eagles' player personnel director two years and an assistant coach at Miami for two seasons. He and his wife, Neil; a daughter, Bobbie; and sons Mark and Michael live in Schaumburg, a suburb northwest of Chicago.

Director of Collegiate Talent

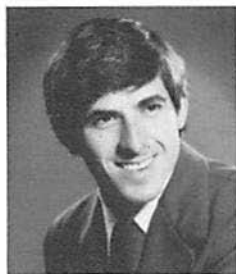


PARMER

JIM PARMER has brought excellent qualifying credentials to the position of director of collegiate talent for the Bears. He took over the job in February 1973 and has been a busy, much traveled man since. A key factor in his value is his friendship with scores of college coaches throughout the United States. Before joining the Bears organization, Parmer had been associated with the Blesto-VIII scouting combine since 1967 with regional responsibilities in 1971 and 1972. As an NFL player, he was starting back with the Philadelphia Eagles for nine seasons after having been drafted following a collegiate career at Oklahoma A. & M., 1944-'47. When he retired as a player, he coached three years at Texas Tech, went into insurance work for four years and then joined the Washington Redskins' personnel department. He and his wife, Mary Jean, have two daughters, Sandy and Jaime, and a son, Rich, and live in Wheeling, a suburb northwest of Chicago.

FRED CAITO, protege of the late Ed Rozy and graduate of St. Joseph's College at Rensselaer, became head trainer of the Bears last season. After assisting Rozy at the 1967 and 1968 training camps, he became full-time aide in 1969 upon graduation from St. Joseph's with a bachelor's degree. He also holds a master's degree in physical education from Northwestern. Caito became head trainer of the Bears in 1973 as successor to Bernie Lareau who had taken over for Rozy in 1970. He came originally from Tiffin, O., but now lives in Chicago.

OLIVER ALEXANDER RB 6-3 240 Grambling 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-15 Born: 1-4-51, Chicago Heights, Ill.

Alexander, Grambling's starting tight end for three seasons, will return this year to running back—specifically, what used to be called "fullback". His size and the recommendations on his blocking ability are the reasons. Alexander actually was a fullback at Bloom Township high school in Chicago Heights so the position won't be entirely unfamiliar. Home: Chicago Heights.

LIONEL ANTOINE T 6-6 255 S. Illinois 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1972, D-1a Born: 8-31-50, Biloxi, Miss.

Injuries at the outset of 1973 hampered Antoine, just as in his rookie campaign but they weren't as severe. In fact, though he actually played on defense in only two games of the five in which his name was on the active roster in 1972, he did far better in 1973. He was on the active roster all season and was starter at offensive tackle in the two final games. His development was noted as "satisfactory" and he is expected to fulfill the predictions of talent that originally made him a first round draft choice. Residence: Chicago Heights.

BOB ASHER T 6-6 260 Vanderbilt 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1972, T-Dallas Born: 6-13-48, Falls Church, Va.

Asher again graded out 90 percent plus to top Bears offensive linemen on the squad in that respect. His excellent efforts against some of the NFL's toughest defensive linemen again marked him as outstanding even in comparison with tackles chosen all-league. Again, he showed consistency and steady improvement. Asher was an all-American at Vanderbilt and the Dallas Cowboys' second round draft choice for 1970 when he got into a half dozen games. The following year, a knee injury

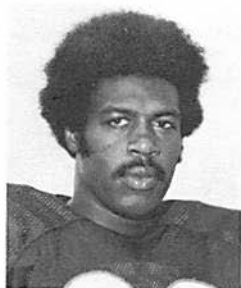
sidelined him but in 1972, he had an impressive training camp with the Cowboys before the trade that sent him to the Bears in mid-August. Residence: Chicago.

JOE BARNES RB 5-11 205 Texas Tech 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-13 Born: 12-8-51, Fort Worth, Tex.

Good size and speed are qualifications expected to fit Barnes into some category with the Bears, defense and special teams if not offense. At Texas Tech, he was basically a quarterback but he ran as well as passed. As a senior, his total offense was 1,546 yards (568 rushing, 978 passing) and was the leader as Tech swept to an 11-1 record including a 28-19 victory over Tennessee in the Gator Bowl. In that post-season contest, he threw two touchdown passes (79 and 7 yards) and ran six for another. In the Coaches All America game at Lubbock June 22, Barnes was a big factor in the West team's 36-6 win over the East with a 26-yard touchdown run among other efforts. Residence: Big Lake, Tex.

WAYMOND BRYANT LB 6-3 236 Tennessee St. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-1a Born: 7-28-52, Dallas, Tex.

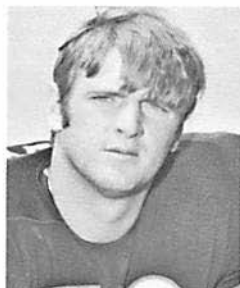
Bryant, overwhelmingly regarded as the nation's best collegiate linebacker in 1973, was the first man at that position chosen in the NFL selection meeting as well as the fourth on the first round. He comes off an undefeated (10-0) Tennessee State eleven and reputedly has all the weapons needed for his job, from aggressiveness and pursuit to speed, a consistent 4.75 for the forty. Though he lettered for all four years, defensive statistics were recorded only the past three seasons, 188 unassisted tackles, topped by 73 as a sophomore, as well as eight quarterback sacks, nine recovered opponents fumbles and seven interceptions. One of his interceptions was against Grambling in his freshman year and he returned it 76 yards for a touchdown. Home: Dallas.

DOUG BUFFONE LB 6-2 225 Louisville 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 4-27-44, Yatesboro, Pa.

Buffone, too long deprived of recognition as one of the NFL's legitimate blue-chip outside linebackers, has rolled up an impressive record, not the least important of which is his durability. Since joining the Bears in 1966 (when he was alternate for then defensive captain Joe Fortunato as well as a valued member of special units) he has played 112 consecutive games. In 1967, he became starting left linebacker and statistically, has contributed 535 tackles, 369 assists as well as 15 interceptions for 154 yards return. His four interceptions in 1970 were the most ever by any Bears outside linebacker. He scored a touchdown in 1967 after recovering a Detroit Lions fumble. Last season, Buffone's experience and his unselfish efforts as a genuine team man made him more distinctive. In the closing games of the schedule, he was the lone seasoned linebacker, working with two straight out rookies and a second year man. Residence: Deerfield, Ill.

ALAN CHADWICK QB 6-2 190 East Tenn. St. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-8a Born: 10-15-53, Decatur, Ga.

Chadwick had a great senior season for East Tennessee State (Johnson City, Tenn.). His 16.8 average completions per game were second nationally in the NCAA College division as he connected on 185 of 320 for 2,173 yards, nine touchdowns, and a lofty 58.7 completion percentage. He also ran for 124 yards and his 2,173 total offense was fourth nationally in his college division. Chadwick led the Ohio Valley Conference in passing in 1972 with 105 out of 220 for 1,176 yards, 11 touchdowns. In the season final, he completed five touchdown passes against University of Tennessee at Chattanooga. Home: Decatur, Ga.

WALLY CHAMBERS DE 6-6 250 Eastern Kentucky 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-1 Born: 5-15-51, Phenix, City, Ala.

Chambers, Bears' No. 1 draft choice for last season, had a brilliant

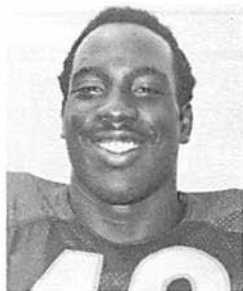
rookie campaign. He was selected on every All-NFL Rookie honor team of any consequence and also was named defensive rookie of the year by all top experts, headed by the prestigious Associated Press poll. In his first big league season, Chambers led the Bears in tackles (101, plus 31 assists), first time since 1965 that anyone besides Dick Butkus was team leader in that respect. He was second in quarterback sacks, nine for 70 yards loss along with five assists, recovered two opponents fumbles and caused five others. At Eastern Kentucky (Richmond, Ky.) Chambers led his team in tackles and assists three straight years, 65-57 in 1970; 85-64 in '71; and 73-44 in '72 and climaxed his collegiate career by playing in both the North-South and the Senior Bowl post-season games. Topping off his rookie pro season, Chambers was selected for the NFC All Stars who met the AFC Stars in the Pro Bowl at Kansas City. Residence: Chicago.

**GAIL CLARK LB 6-2 227 Michigan State 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1973, W-Pittsburgh Born: 4-14-51, Bellefontaine, O.**

Clark was a valuable waiver acquisition from Pittsburgh, whose Steelers had picked him off on the fourth round of the 1973 draft. The riddled linebacking situation here gave him his opportunity and he got into 11 games, starting against Kansas City, Minnesota and Los Angeles. He wound up with 43 tackles, 11 assists. At Michigan State, where he lettered three years, he was used at both the middle and outside, won All-Big Ten and honorable mention All-America and played in the East-West Shrine game. Residence: Chicago:

**CRAIG CLEMONS S 5-11 200 Iowa 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1972, D-1b Born: 6-1-49, Sidney, O.**

Clemmons came into his own as a starter in his second season with the Bears and his 91 tackles, 24 assists were second only to Wally Chambers. He also had two interceptions. In his rookie season, he was a backup man or special team performer for the most part but he did have one

memorable moment in the finale at Oakland. He blocked a punt and the loose ball was recovered for a touchdown. Residence: North Liberty, Iowa.

RICH COADY C 6-3 235 Memphis State 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-11 Born: 12-1-44, Chicago

Coady rapidly is becoming one of the league's top centers although that was a completely unfamiliar assignment for him when he was shifted from tight end in 1971. His steady improvement is especially noticeable on his deep punt snaps. He has been durable to the point where he hasn't missed an offensive play in two years. As a matter of fact, he actually has been in 14 games—starter or sub—every season since he broke in with the Bears as a tight end in 1970. Rich is a native Chicagoan and graduate of Taft high school who played his college football at Memphis State. After being picked by the Bears on the 11th round of the 1968 draft, he was in the Army for two years before reporting. Residence: Dallas, Tex.

CRAIG COTTON TE 6-2 225 Youngstown 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1973, T-Detroit Born: 7-7-47, Elizabeth, Pa.

Cotton escaped, by trade, from the shadows of Charlie Sanders at Detroit only to suffer a foot injury early in his first season with the Bears that reduced his effectiveness. He actually had only one really good game—two receptions for 83 yards that included a 63-yarder against Minnesota here. Otherwise, he was slowed down and that hadn't been figured when the Bears traded for him during the NFL draft meeting a year ago. Cotton had been a backer-up to Sanders in his four seasons at Detroit and his best day as a fill-in occurred against the Bears in 1972 when he caught four passes for 67 yards and a touchdown. Residence: Los Angeles.

CARROLL DALE WR 6-2 200 Virginia Tech 15th Season
Joined Bears: 1974, W-Minnesota Born: 4-24-38, Wise, Va.

The Bears are Dale's fourth NFL club in his 15 NFL seasons. He was

BOBBY DOUGLASS QB 6-4 225 Kansas 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, D-2 Born: 6-22-47, Manhattan, Kan.

Douglass' yardage total in 1973 was 525, a little over half of the 968 that gave him an NFL quarterback rush mark in '72. But he had the second personal four-touchdown game of his career when he rushed that many times for scores in the 31-13 win over the Packers at Green Bay. That also was his best all-around afternoon of the year because he ran 19 times for 100 yards in all and completed 10 of 15 passes for 118. In the season's second game against the Minnesota Vikings here, he ran 10 for 63, including one touchdown and completed nine passes out of 18 for 179. Back in 1970, he threw four touchdown passes against Buffalo, three coming after he had suffered a fractured left wrist. Douglass' record setting season of 1972 saw him average 6.9 per attempt. He had two games of 100 or more yards and was held to 30 yards or less in a game only twice. His career rushing total, 2,207 yards, ranks him seventh on the Bears' all-time list and his 6.65 average leads all the rest. Residence: Chicago.

ALLAN ELLIS CB 5-10 178 UCLA 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-5 Born: 8-19-51, Los Angeles

Ellis came along rapidly in his rookie season to the point where he is expected to be a strong factor in the defensive secondary this year. He appeared in all 14 games and came along so satisfactorily that he started

Joined Bears: 1970, D-3 Born: 4-19-48, Chattanooga, Tenn.

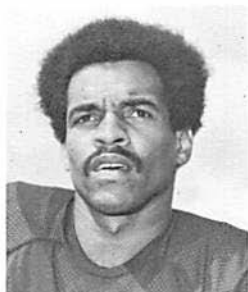
Farmer caught at least one pass in all but three games in 1973. His best single game effort was three for 47 in the game against the Detroit Lions here. A sure-handed speedster, Farmer has had more productive afternoons since coming to the Bears, including seven for 127 yards against Minnesota in 1971 and five for 141, including a 73-yard touchdown against the Cardinals in 1972. His high with the Bears was 1972 when he led with seven, along with 50 tackles that rated him fifth in that department. He was one of the stars of Houston's great defensive team of 1970. DAVE GALLAGHER DE 6-4 245 Michigan 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-1b Born: 1-2-52, Piqua, O.

The Bears' second choice on the first round also was the star of an unbeaten team, the Wolverines having won ten while tying Rose Bowl winner Ohio State. In Gallagher's three years as a regular, Michigan had a 31-1-1 regular season record, losing only to Ohio State, 14-11, in 1972. The Wolverines were edged out by Stanford, 13-12, in the Rose Bowl game following the 1971 season. Gallagher runs the forty in a flat 5 and

His best single game running jobs were 19 for 91 yards (plus three kickoff returns for 105) against New England, and 25 for 90 against the Minnesota Vikings here. He had a busy afternoon when the Detroit Lions visited Soldier Field, too—75 yards on 18 rushes; three kickoff returns for 130 and two pass catches for 21. Inexplicably, considering his past record for sure hands, Garrett had 13 fumbles—most he ever committed, as a pro or in college at New Mexico Highlands. By way of showing that the bobble was unique for him, his year-by-year totals with New England (1969-'72) were, respectively, 6-1-8-5. The Bears gave up a first round draft choice to the Patriots to effect one of their best trades in years. Garrett was rookie-of-the-year in 1969, beating out O. J. Simpson for the honor. **CONRAD GRAHAM CB 6-1 184 Tennessee 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-8 Born: 7-10-51, Winston-Salem, N.C.**

Injuries to the right knee—the first in training camp, the second in practice shortly after the start of the season—prevented Graham from getting a chance to show why he was leader of Tennessee's defensive

Grandberry, a Washington State offensive reliable for three seasons, climaxed his collegiate career by playing in the East-West game and the American Bowl at Tampa. He scored three touchdowns in the Tampa post-season contest. Grandberry wound up his eligibility at Washington State with 136 rushes for 643 yards, five touchdowns (a career total of 453 for 2,102, nine) and also caught 13 passes for 122 yards, one touchdown (career: 48-463-two). He also returned six kickoffs 125 yards. Home: Tacoma, Wash.

**BOBBY JOE GREEN P 5-11 175 Florida 15th Season
Joined Bears: 1962, T-Pittsburgh Born: 5-7-36, Vernon, Tex.**

This is Green's 12th season as the Bears' punter and he is the lone remaining member from the 1963 championship team. He came here by trade with Pittsburgh which had him for two years. In 14 NFL campaigns, Green has swung his sturdy right or punting leg 970 times—a league record—and has averaged 42.5 yards per kick. Only three times has one of his punts been blocked. Bobby's name can be found in Bears' career passing and rushing statistics, too, evidence of his successful fakery on occasional fourth down situations. Off the field, he is also a man of many talents in the business world. He is operator of a large cattle ranch and owner of a premium distributorship; in the world of music (amateur or hobby division), he strums a guitar and intones country and western songs. Joined Bears: 1969, D-12 Born: 5-21-47, McCook, Neb.**

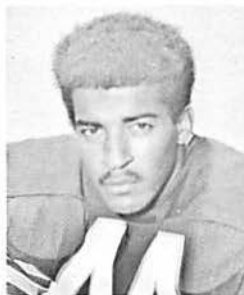

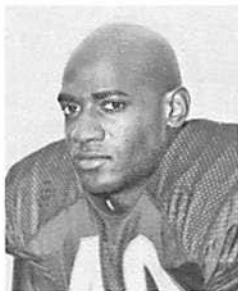

He had two quarterback sacks in 1973, throwing Charley Johnson for six yards at Denver and the Houston Oilers' Lynn Dickey for 16 here. Joined Bears: 1972, T-San Fran. Born: 7-22-49, Renton, Wash.

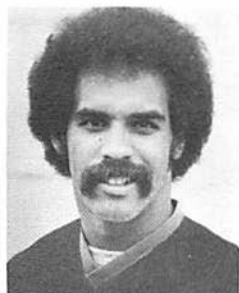

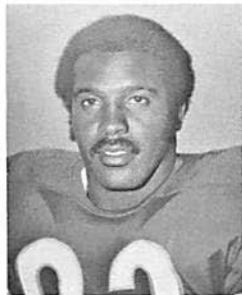

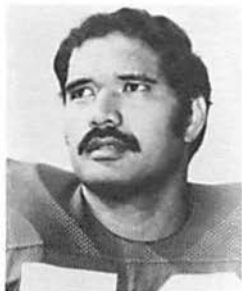

Joined Bears: 1971, D-3 Born: 8-16-49, LaMirada, Cal.

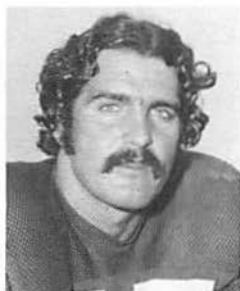

However, he hasn't missed a conversion try since Nov. 19, 1967 when the St. Louis Cardinals blocked an attempt. BOB PIFFERINI LB 6-2 226 UCLA 3rd Season

Reppond was a blue chip receiver at Arkansas where he set school

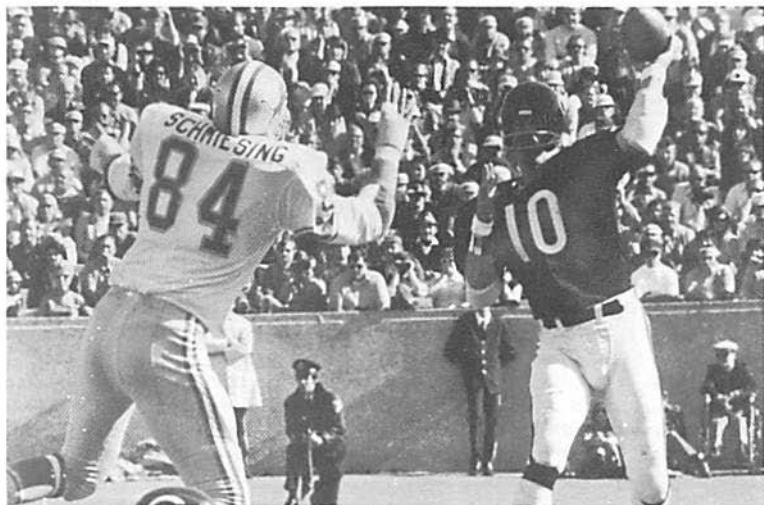

He was the Houston Oilers' 13th round draft choice for 1972 but didn't play and a year ago, he was in the Dallas Cowboys camp for a while. With 4.5 speed, Roberts was a spectacular kick return man at the University of Houston, setting

Rice has given the defensive line depth and experienced backup talent in his two seasons with the Bears. Over that period, virtually all in fill-in roles, Rice has made 44 tackles, 19 assists, in addition to getting four quarterback sacks and assisting on two others. DON RIVES LB 6-2 215 Texas Tech 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-15 Born: 8-30-51, Shamrock, Tex.

Rives, thrust into the middle linebacker spot for the last five games last season, responded gallantly. He wound up sixth in tackles (60 with 8 assists), contributed one quarterback sack and recovered one opponents' fumble. At Texas Tech, where he led in tackles and assists in each of his last two seasons, Rives was noted for the big play special. Among his memorable efforts were a pass interception returned 38 yards as well as blocked punt in the Sun Bowl in his sophomore year; causing and then recovering a Texas A. & M. fumble for a touchdown as a junior; and getting 13 unassisted tackles against Southern Methodist as a senior. He was a fullback in high school. Residence: Lubbock, Tex.

REGGIE SANDERSON RB 5-10 206 Stanford 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1973, FA Born: 11-4-50, Galveston, Tex.

Sanderson didn't break into the Bears action until the final two games last season, Green Bay here and the Lions at Detroit, but his showing was modest statistically. He was a member of two Rose Bowl championship Stanford teams. In three years at Stanford, a passing team, Sanderson was basically a blocker rather than a running back. Residence: Pasadena, Cal.

CLIFTON TAYLOR RB 5-11 190 Memphis State 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-3c Born: 5-10-52, Memphis, Tenn.

Taylor comes with recommendations as an exceptional blocker as well as a punishing runner who is at his best close to the enemy's goal line,

from two to five yards out. As an example, he blasted over University of Louisville's two 270-pound tackles for a touchdown apiece, each from three yards or less. He runs a 4.55 forty and also was a member of Memphis State's NCAA champion 440-yard relay team. As a senior, Taylor averaged 3.9 yards rushing with 471 yards on 120 carries. He also caught 14 passes for 69. While he lettered all three years, he didn't play a lot as a sophomore. Taylor's career total shows 784 yards rushing on 201 tries and 12 touchdowns as well as 31 pass receptions for 256 and one touchdown. His blocking ability was best demonstrated in the game against Tulsa when he was credited with 28 blocks, on 22 of which he grounded his man. Home: Memphis.

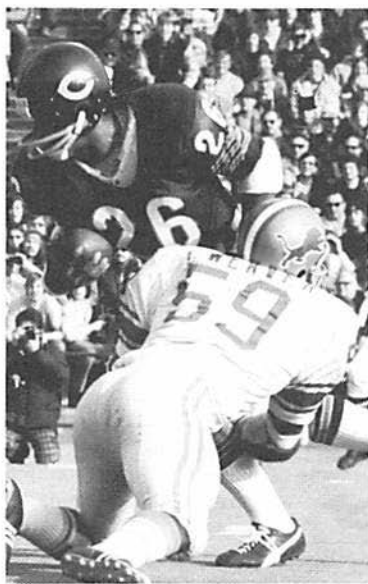
JOE TAYLOR CB 6-0 200 North Carolina A&T 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1967, FA Born: 12-28-40, Miami, Fla.

Taylor is one of the steadiest, most productive corner backs in the league and in seven years with the Bears, he has 238 tackles, 75 assists. His 14 career interceptions for 151 yards return have come in clusters for the most part—such as four in 1972 and three each in 1969 and 1971. It bothers him that last season is the first time since joining the Bears that he didn't pick off a single enemy pass. Residence: Chicago.

EARL THOMAS WR 6-2 200 Houston 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1971, D-6 Born: 10-4-48, Greenville, Tex.

Thomas had another full, 14-game season as a starter in 1972, but it was as a wide receiver. Tight end was his 1971 beat. He again led Bears' receivers with 24 for 343 yards and his two best games were Houston





(5 for 60 and a touchdown) and New Orleans (3 for 82). In 1972, Thomas caught 20 for 365 yards and also had an 82 yard kickoff return for a touchdown after taking a handoff. In his rookie season, he served basically as a play messenger. Residence: Greenville, Tex.

MEL TOM DE 6-4 249 San Jose State 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1973, T-Phila. Born: 8-4-41, Honolulu, Hawaii

Tom did a good job of harassing rival quarterbacks for the Bears after joining up in late October, 1973. He had five sacks and assisted on seven others. He had been a starter at defensive end for the Philadelphia Eagles who drafted him on the sixth round for 1967. He was all-NFL rookie selection his first year and in his second, teammates voted him most valuable player honors. Residence: Honolulu.

CECIL TURNER S 5-10 176 Cal. Poly-Obispo 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-5 Born: 4-2-22, Washington, D.C.

Turner gets a shot on defense this season, in addition to his kick return duties at which he has been a speedy artist since first joining the Bears. That same speed is expected to make him a valuable man at safety, too. He shares, with Travis Williams, the NFL record for most kickoffs returned in one season, four in 1970 for 95, 96, 94 and 88 yards, respectively. Residence: Houston, Tex.

WAYNE WHEELER WR 6-2 185 Alabama 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1974, D-3a Born: 3-28-50, Orlando, Fla.

All-America split end Wayne Wheeler also was all-Southeastern Conference choice this past season, his third straight as a letterman. The three 'Bama elevens of which he was a member won 32 of 33 regular season games although dropping post-season contests after each campaign. The Crimson Tide is basically a running team by a hefty three-to-one margin (4,027 yards rushing, 1,261 passing in 1973) and it has been Wheeler's tremendous downfield blocking that won him the starting job. For his career, he had 55 pass receptions for 1,246 yards and 11 touchdowns. As a senior, he averaged an exceptional 27.9 yards per catch on 19 receptions. His speed (4.6 forty) and sure hands made him Alabama's "long ball" threat and his pass catching was more significant than the career totals show. Home: Orlando, Fla.

ADRIAN YOUNG LB 6-1 232 Southern Cal. 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1973, FA Born: 1-31-46, Dublin, Ireland

Young previously was with the Detroit Lions and the Philadelphia Eagles, after having been the latters' third round selection for 1968. At Southern California, he was a three-year letterman and co-captain in 1967 as well as an All-American selection. Residence: Port Arthur, Tex.



George Bears' 14th Hall of Famer

Bill George was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame this year to bring the Bears' total representation to fourteen. George, a fourteen-season regular with the Bears, was one of the game's greatest middle linebackers, an all-NFL choice and participant in the Pro Bowl eight times as well as defensive captain of the 1963 championship team. 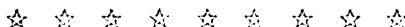

Ed Rozy, the dean of National Football League trainers, passed away Thursday, April 4, in his home at Niles, Ill. Surviving him are his widow, Josephine; and two daughters, Mary and Julie. Ed was in his 26th year with the Bears organization, as head trainer from 1947 through 1970 when ill health forced him into semi-retirement although he had new responsibilities as director of training services. He was an all-around career man in sports, as an athlete and an intramural coach.



Lettering in football as a guard at Marquette, he graduated from the Milwaukee university in 1933. As a senior, he was named director of intramural athletics and continued in that position after graduation. For 12 years, Rozy not only was trainer of

all Marquette athletic teams but coached freshman football, boxing, wrestling, tennis, golf and fencing. In World War II, he was a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy and after his return to civilian life in 1947, he became head trainer of the Bears. He was a native of Two Rivers, Wis., born there in 1910.
