**GEORGE
S. HALAS**
mr. "pro football"

George Halas coached in the NFL for 40 seasons, two and three decades longer than some of the game's most successful coaches. He led his team to 326 victories. Only one other coach even reached the 200-victory mark.

His Chicago Bears teams won seven NFL championships and his charter member Decatur Staleys team of 1920 claimed a tie for the unofficial title in the newly organized American Professional Football Association. His Bears won three other divisional crowns, finished 15 times in second place and 5 times in third. Only six of Halas's 40 teams finished below the .500 mark.

George Halas, the "Mr. Everything" of pro football, had a profound effect on George Halas, the coach, and it is difficult to separate the two. One's efforts led to the other's success and vice versa. Even when George was not the official on-the-field leader, there was seldom doubt about who was running the show.

The only person to be associated with organized pro football from its beginnings in 1920 to the present, Halas has filled the shoes of owner, general manager, player, promoter, ticket manager, rules maker, office manager. You name it, chances are George has done it sometime during his fabulous career.

Halas split his official 40-year coaching tenure into four 10-year packages. When he retired as a player after the 1929 season, Halas also "fired" himself as coach. But he was back on the sidelines again in 1933, a tenure ended by World War II and a U.S. Navy assignment. George was back for his "third term" in 1946, a championship year in Chicago, but he "retired" in 1955, handing the reins to his long-time associate, Paddy Driscoll. Two years later, he was back for a final 10-year hitch that ended in the spring of 1968 when George announced his retirement. This time George,

who was 73 years old, really meant it.

As a coach, Halas was first in many ways. He was the first coach to hold daily practice sessions, the first to utilize films of opponents' games for study and the first to make his team's home a major league baseball park. He was the first coach to schedule his team on a barnstorming tour and the first to have his team's games broadcast on radio. He was also the first to use a tarpaulin to protect the playing field in bad weather. In much of this precedent-setting, it is evident that the role of coach, general manager and owner were inseparable in George Halas.

Halas maintained tight control over his players. His word was law. Disobedience and insubordination were not tolerated. Even his innovation of daily practice sessions was motivated by the thought of increasing the team's proficiency.

"A big city is filled with varied attractions for a young athlete," Halas explained. "If a player has to report for morning practice, he won't do too much playing of a different sort at night."

It is said that one mark of a great coach is the outstanding talent he recruits. On that point, Halas could score no higher. Red Grange, Danny Fortmann, Sid Luckman, George McAfee, Bronko Nagurski, Joe Stydahar, George Trafton, Bulldog Turner and Bill Hewitt (as well as recent inductees Bill George and George Connor) were Bear rookies who later were admitted to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. In all, fifteen long-term members of the Bears have been so honored, more than from any other team.

With Ralph Jones, his coach from 1930 through 1932, and Clark Shaughnessy, Halas developed the T-formation, man-in-motion attack to perfection. It was this destructive force that gave the Bears their famous 73-0 NFL title victory over Washington in 1940. Soon almost everyone was copying the Halas system, and almost all of today's offensive football evolved from that game. Halas calls that style-setting victory his greatest thrill in his career of more than a half century in NFL football.

Jim Finks **Vice President** **General Manager**

"Rarely does any organization find precisely the right man at precisely the right time to lead it. The Chicago Bears were the exception in September of 1974 when we attracted Jim Finks to join us," intimated George Halas, founder of the team and Chairman of the Board.

Finks, 47, has earned that kind of respect from football executives since he broke into the National Football League (NFL) in 1949 as a rookie with the Pittsburgh Steelers from Tulsa University.

Since that time he has been an NFL regular at both defensive back and quarterback, a college coach, a Canadian Football League (CFL) scout and general manager, Club Vice President and General Manager, and League Executive—all with distinction.

Finks joined the Bears September 12, 1974, after serving as a consultant to the NFL Management Council through the turbulent summer of '74 and its player strike.

His 10-year association with the Minnesota Vikings (1964-73) brought the Vikings to the top of the professional game. Finks joined the Vikings as general manager and six seasons later saw the Purple Gang in its first Super Bowl.

That same season Finks was named a Vice President of the Minnesota Club—retaining his general manager's duties.

As Viking fortunes increased to include 47 victories in his last four seasons (1970-73), Finks resigned his post in Minnesota. He was the Club's Executive Vice President when he tendered his resignation following the Vikings Super Bowl.

Finks was a T-formation collegiate quarterback at Tulsa before he entered the NFL with the Steelers.

Pittsburgh still employed single wing offense, how-

ever, and the 5-10, 175-pound passer found himself defending passes. From 1949-51, Finks was a regular in the Steeler secondary.

In 1952, the Steelers converted to the T-formation and Finks was switched back to quarterback. In '53, he joined Otto Graham as the Eastern Conference quarterbacks in the Pro Bowl.

Although he retired after only four years as a quarterback and seven NFL seasons with the Steelers (at age 28), Finks established Club records for completions and attempts and three times threw four touchdown passes in a game.

Only Bobby Layne threw for more total yards or touchdowns than Finks in Pittsburgh.

Finks left the pro game to coach Notre Dame's 1956 backfield under Terry Brennan.

He scouted for Calgary in the Canadian League the following season and took over as general manager of the Stampeders in late 1957. He remained with the Stampeders until moving to Minnesota in '64.

In the Twin Cities area, he was a prominent civic figure: once Chairman of the United Negro College Fund and also Chairman of the Minneapolis United Fund Campaign.

In 1968, he was on the first NFL negotiating committee that met with the Players Association.

Finks and his wife, Maxine, have four sons — Jim, Jr., David, Danny and Tommy. He is a native of Salem in south central Illinois, about 70 miles east of St. Louis.

At Tulsa University he lettered in football, baseball and basketball and after graduation (in '49) played two summers in the Cincinnati Reds farm system while devoting the autumn and early winter to pro football.

GEORGE HALAS, JR.

PRESIDENT

Even though George (Mugs) Halas has been a Chicago Bears executive for more than 25 years, the next two may have the most resounding repercussions for the Club and its fans.

Since relinquishing the team's general manager's duties to Jim Finks in September, 1974, Halas' sole concern has been stadia—the league's new ones and possibilities for the Bears.

President of the Club since 1964, Mugs (nicknamed by his father George S. Halas) started his football career in 1950. Three years later, he took over its treasurer's responsibilities.

He had served the Bears as general manager for 14 years.

A Business Administration graduate of Loyola University in 1949, Halas is a life long resident of Chicago who attended Loyola Academy.

Halas is a member of the increasingly important National Football League Management Council's executive committee and serves on the board of directors of both the Park National Bank and Chicago Association of Retarded Children.

Born September 4, 1925, Halas has two children.



ED McCASKEY

VICE PRESIDENT

Community involvement programs are a natural for the Chicago Bears Vice President and Treasurer Ed McCaskey, who once was a professional night club singer.

An executive with the Bears since 1967, McCaskey has been the spearhead for the Club's civic projects.

Since coming to Chicago in '49, he has been merchandising manager for the National Retail Tea and Coffee Association, executive vice president of Merchandise Service, Inc., and an account executive for E.F. MacDonald Co.

Born April 27, 1919, in Philadelphia, McCaskey sang with dance bands before enrolling at the University of Pennsylvania in 1940.

He continued a singing career during his collegiate days and was elected a class president at Penn. After graduation in '43, McCaskey served with the 80th Infantry in France—enlisting as a private and leaving the Army with Captain's rank.

McCaskey and his wife Virginia have 11 children, eight grandchildren and reside in Des Plaines.



BILL McGRANE

ASSISTANT TO G.M.

After a two-year sabbatical as Assistant to the President (George Halas) of the National Football Conference, Bill McGrane returned to the Club level of the National Football League rejoining Jim Finks in January as his assistant with the Chicago Bears.

McGrane left his newspaper career behind him to become public relations director of the Minnesota Vikings under Finks in 1966.

Reunited with Finks again, McGrane's duties range from player contract negotiations to promotional activities and daily club operations.

Born September 7, 1933, in Des Moines, Iowa, McGrane is a 1958 graduate of the University of Iowa's school of journalism.

A son of noted football writer and sports editor Bert McGrane, Bill began his writing career with the Des Moines Register and Tribune in 1958.

The following year he joined the sports staff of the Minneapolis Tribune where he remained until joining the Vikings in 1966.

He and his wife, Dorothy, have four children (Peter 10, Patrick 8, Meg 6, and Katie 3.) The McGranes reside in Arlington Heights.



CARL MARASCO

PLAYER PERSONNEL DIR.

Most football fans dream about doing what Carl Marasco did.

So did Carl Marasco until three years ago, when he left a career in the insurance field to start a new one with the personnel department of the National Football League headquarters in New York.

The unlikely transition from super fan to NFL executive is tantamount to a model railroader building a working diesel engine.

Marasco joined the Bears in February as director of player personnel when Jim Finks surprised professional football watchers by appointing a non-player to head the Bears' activities in college and professional player evaluation.

A New York native, born May 10, 1936, Marasco graduated from Florida Southern College in 1960. While in the insurance business in Philadelphia, he and his brother Pete, now with the personnel department of the New York Jets, drew recognition as judges of college player talent.

Their long interest in player evaluation led to the Marasco brothers rating college prospects prior to the annual player draft. Their ratings—extremely accurate when measured against those of professional scouting systems—were published nationally.

Carl and his wife, Josie, have five children and reside in Palatine.



JIM PARMER

COLLEGE SCOUT

Jim Parmer makes book.

On college football players that is. For example, last year the Bears collegiate scout graded 444 potential NFL players prior to the January player draft comparing his ratings to those established by a national scouting combine (Blesto) to which the Club subscribes.

Born in Dallas April 15, 1927, Parmer is well qualified to rate talent with almost 30 years of football experience behind him.

He brought that experience and knowledge with him to Chicago in February, 1973, continuing a 10-year career in football personnel.

As an NFL player, he was a starter in the secondary and at fullback with the Philadelphia Eagles for nine seasons after having been drafted following a collegiate career at Oklahoma A & M 1944-'47.

When he retired as a player, following the 1956 season, he coached three years at Texas Tech, went into insurance work for four years and then joined the Washington Redskins personnel department.

He and his wife, Mary Jean, have two daughters, Sandy and Jaime, and a son, Rich, and live in Wheeling, a suburb northwest of Chicago.



BILL TOBIN

PRO SCOUT

"Man in Motion" could be an apt tag applied to the Chicago Bears Pro Scout Bill Tobin, who spends 80 percent of his time living out of suitcases on the road scouting for the team's personnel department.

A professional football scout since he was 30, Tobin begins his fifth year of NFL scouting this season—his first with the Bears.

Tobin came to the Bears from the Green Bay Packers in February. He was pro scouting director for the Pack since 1972. The 1963 Missouri graduate was a personnel scout for the Packers in 1971.

Tobin was a star running back for the Tigers under Dan Devine from 1959 to 1962.

He began his professional career with the Houston Oilers in 1963 and scored a touchdown the first time he carried the ball for the Oilers.

Born February 16, 1941, in Burlington Junction, Mo., Tobin ranks eighth on Missouri's all-time scoring list with 111 points. He was voted the outstanding player in the '62 Bluebonnet Bowl game against Georgia Tech capping his collegiate playing days.

He and his wife, Dusee, have three children, and reside in Arlington Heights.



GEORGE ARNESON

STADIUM OPERATIONS

Armed with a computer and the experience of dispensing National Football League tickets for 14 years, George Arneson took charge of the Chicago Bears ticket office in January as the Club's Director of Stadium Operations and Admissions.

A professional in the sports ticket business for 30 years, Arneson had been the Minnesota Vikings ticket manager since 1963.

Over 7,000,000 ducats have passed through Arneson's hands since 1945 when he accepted a position with the St. Paul entry in the U.S. Hockey League while he was an undergraduate at the University of Minnesota.

Arneson is also the Bears' liaison man with the Chicago Park District representatives at Soldier Field—current home of the team.

He and his wife Dorothy reside in Arlington Heights.



RUDY CUSTER

BUSINESS MANAGER

One of the more colorful personalities in the National Football League for 30 years, Chicago Bears' business manager Rudy Custer is the team's man-behind-the-scenes.

During that time, he helped pioneer two areas of prime concern to the NFL today: television contracts and charities.

As executive director of the Armed Forces football game in Chicago for 25 years, he saw over \$1 million raised for the Armed Forces Relief Agency.

Custer was also the catalyst in the Bears' television network—the largest in professional football—before the days of national network contracts.

Custer, who was born July 16, 1912, at Madison, Wisconsin, joined the Bears in January, 1946, as their business manager.

He and his wife Evelyn have three children and reside in Wilmette.



TED HARACZ

PUBLIC RELATIONS DIR.

The only professional football rookie among the 13 new Chicago Bear staffers, Ted Haracz (pron: harraz) begins his first National Football League season this fall.

Joining the Bears in January prior to the NFL draft with 12 years experience in the public relations field, Haracz is a 1964 journalism graduate of the College of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Sports Information Director at Purdue since 1970, Haracz was active in the College Sports Information Directors of America and headed CoSIDA's communications committee. He was also a member of the Big Ten radio-television committee.

Haracz was introduced to major college sports as assistant sports information director at Notre Dame from 1968-70.

A native Chicagoan (born May 31, 1942) who attended Weber High on the City's northwest side, Haracz's first full time PR assignment was at the University of Illinois-Chicago Circle in 1965.

He and his wife Judy have a son, Matt 3, and reside in Hoffman Estates.



JERRY VAINISI

CONTROLLER

When the Chicago Bears receive their salary checks, the slips carry two signatures, Jim Finks' and Jerry Vainisi's. Jerry Vainisi?

Yes, Jerry Vainisi, the Club's 33-year-old Controller, is the Chicago Bears keeper of the vault.

A native Chicagoan, Vainisi joined the Club in October, 1972, armed with degrees in law (Chicago Kent College of Law, 1969) and accounting (Georgetown, Washington, D.C., 1963). He won academic honors at both institutions.

Prior to joining the Bears, Vainisi worked for the Chicago accounting firm of Arthur Andersen & Company.

Vainisi's life-long interest in sports is reflected by his path following graduation from Georgetown. From 1964 to '65, he was news and sports director for a radio station in Monmouth, Illinois, where he did football and basketball play-by-play.

He and his wife Doris have four children and reside in Arlington Heights.



Jack Pardee Head Coach



Talent, dedication, enthusiasm and compassion were among the qualities Jim Finks wanted when the Chicago Bears went shopping for a new head coach.

Jack Pardee, 38, has them—the qualities beneficial to heading a winning football program.

The first non-Bear apprentice to guide the field fortunes of the Club in more than 40 years, Pardee succeeded Abe Giron December 31, 1974. He is only the eighth head coach in the Bears' 56-year pro football history.

An outstanding student of the sport, Pardee is the youngest head coach in the National Football League, yet his credentials are impressive as both player and coach.

A standout linebacker during a 15-year NFL career interrupted by a successful bout with cancer, Pardee first entered the League in 1957 as the Los Angeles Rams second round draft choice.

Even then, the Pardee accomplishments were many.

An honor student in business administration at Texas A&M and all-Southwest conference football star for Paul (Bear) Bryant, Pardee completed his collegiate career with outstanding performances in both the Blue-Gray and North-South post-season all-star games.

He continued the stellar play in his 196 pro games during 13 seasons at Los Angeles and two with the Washington Redskins. Pardee's 22 career interceptions, five touchdowns and (1963) all-Pro honors, don't indicate his true value to either club.

Known as a coach on the field, Pardee called defensive signals for both clubs late in his career.

When the Redskins completed one of the biggest trades in recent years involving Pardee, six other players and eight draft choices prior to the 1971 draft, Jack responded with an all-League performance for George Allen.

He retired following the 1972 season to return to coaching as the Redskins linebacking coach.

While recovering from the cancer surgery that interrupted his career in 1965, Pardee got his first taste of the coaching business as an assistant at Texas A&M.

Pardee accepted his first head coaching assignment in the 1974 World Football League with a franchise that was to be located in Washington, later moved to Norfolk, and became the Florida (Orlando) Blazers.

As coach and general manager of the Blazers, Pardee's leadership qualities garnered national attention.

In a general atmosphere of financial disaster, without paydays or paychecks, Pardee earned an amazing loyalty from his players which enabled the club to post a 14-6 record and enter the WFL championship game. Birmingham edged the Blazers 22-21.

The respect continues.

Born April 19, 1936 in Exira, Iowa, Pardee spent his formative years in Texas.

His family moved to Christoval, Texas when he was a youth. It was at Christoval High that Jack started playing football—six-man style.

He and his wife, Phyllis Lane Perryman (Houston), have five children: Steven, 16; Judee, 15; Ann Marie, 14; Susan, 12; and Ted, 6.

RAY CALLAHAN

A former collegiate head coach and Kentucky's 1962 prep coach of the year, Ray Callahan begins his second year on Jack Pardee's staff and third in professional football this fall.

Florida Blazers line coach and offensive coordinator last year, Callahan's first season in professional football was 1973 when he tutored the talented Baltimore Colts linebacking corps.

The former two-way player at Kentucky (1952-56) left a highly successful high school coaching career in 1963 to become linecoach at his Alma Mater. In 1967 he joined the University of Cincinnati as its line coach.

Two years later, he was appointed Cincinnati's head coach guiding Bearcat fortunes from 1969 to 1972.

Born April 28, 1933 at Lebanon, Ky., Callahan was graduated from Kentucky in 1956 and then served as a lieutenant in the Army Infantry.

He and his wife Lee have four children and reside in Hoffman Estates.

BRAD ECKLUND

DEFENSIVE LINE

The Dean of Chicago Bear coaching staff, Brad Ecklund begins his 15th year in professional football coaching this fall as Jack Pardee's defensive line coach.

Ironically, Ecklund left the Bears' personnel department in 1973 to join Pardee on the field at Florida.

His first professional coaching job was with Dallas from 1960-64, the first four seasons of the Cowboys existence.

Ecklund left the Cowboys to help organize CEPO (the Central-Eastern Personnel Organization). He remained with CEPO until returning to coaching with Atlanta (1966-67).

Stints as offensive line coach at New Orleans (1968-70) and Philadelphia (1971-72) followed.

Ecklund entered professional football with star center billings from his collegiate career at Oregon (1945-48). He served as a sergeant in the Marine Corps during World War II.

After six seasons as a center and middle linebacker with the New York Yanks, Dallas Texans and Baltimore Colts, Ecklund retired in 1954. He was named all-Pro with the Yanks in '49, '51 and '52 and was the Colts MVP in '54.

Four years of high school coaching and a 1959-stint on the staff at Oregon preceded his professional coaching career.

Born May 9, 1922 at Los Angeles, the 1949 Oregon graduate is married to the former Ruth McKenney. The Ecklunds have three children and reside in Schaumburg.

ROSS FICHTNER

SECONDARY

A nine-year veteran of defensive backfield play in the National Football League, Ross (Rocky) Fichtner (pron: FEET-ner) begins his second season coaching Jack Pardee's secondaries.

He returned to football last summer at Florida for the first time since completing his playing days with the New Orleans Saints in 1968.

Fichtner's best afternoons in football were spent with the Cleveland Browns from 1960 through '67. He played 102 games with the Browns during that eight-year span and intercepted 27 passes returning three of them for touchdowns.

Fichtner was Cleveland's most valuable defensive player in 1966. In a game against Dallas that year the strong safety had three interceptions. The Browns won the NFL championship in '64 and played for the '65 title.

Cleveland selected the former Purdue quarterback-defensive back on the third round of the '60 draft. His play with the Boilermakers from 1957-'59 earned him a spot on the College All-Star team that played the Baltimore Colts in 1960.

Fichtner was also MVP in the '59 Blue-Gray game.

Born October 26, 1938 at McKeesport, Pa., Fichtner and his wife Karen reside in Hoffman Estates.



JOHN HILTON

SPECIAL TEAMS

With Jack Pardee vowing emphasis on special teams play for the Chicago Bears, John Hilton's first year in coaching should be a very demanding one.

A 10-year veteran of professional football as a tight end, Hilton joined Pardee's staff in March, 1975, as the Chicago special teams coach.

Completing his playing career at Florida last fall under Pardee, Hilton spent five of his nine National Football seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers and had his best statistical season with the Three Rivers Gang in '66 when he caught 46 passes for 602 yards and four touchdowns.

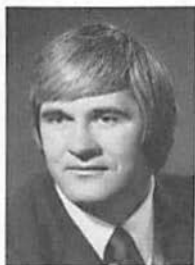
Hilton was drafted as a future by Detroit in 1964 and signed with the Steelers in '65 following a record setting collegiate career at the University of Richmond.

A native of Albany, N.Y., (born March 12, 1942), Hilton had tours with Green Bay (1970) and Minnesota (1971) before closing his NFL days with Detroit (1972-73). Thus, his Central Division swing is complete.

In his nine seasons he played in 107 games, caught 144 passes for 2,047 yards and 16 touchdowns.

Hilton, who led the Southern Conference in receiving three times, played in 18 regular season WFL games last year catching seven passes for 83 yards.

Hilton resides in Palatine.



FRED O'CONNOR

OFFENSIVE BACKS

The personification of Jack Pardee's teaching philosophy for his coaching staff could be his offensive backfield coach Fred O'Connor.

Entering his tenth year in coaching and second with Pardee, O'Connor spent eight of those years tutoring the collegiate game.

A former quarterback and running back at East Stroudsburg State College from 1958-62, O'Connor was graduated from the Pennsylvania school in 1962.

All ten of O'Connor's coaching years have been spent teaching offensive football. He began that career as offensive coordinator of C.W. Post College in New York in 1966. In 1970 he moved to Villanova in the same capacity.

Stints at Maryland (1971) and Southern Mississippi (1972) intervened before O'Connor returned to Villanova as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator in 1973.

He began his professional coaching career with Pardee at Florida last summer.

Born September 1, 1939 in Brooklyn, O'Connor and his wife Margaret have two children and reside in Arlington Heights.



JERRY STOLTZ

RECEIVERS

The only native Chicagoan on the Bears coaching staff, Jerry Stoltz enters his seventh National Football League season this fall as Jack Pardee's receiver coach.

A 1955 Fenger High graduate, Stoltz first joined the Bears following the 1972 season. He has been an NFL coach since 1969 when he left the college coaching ranks at Purdue to join the New England Patriots.

As a collegian at Toledo, Stoltz played quarterback, running back and defensive back in the Mid-America Conference. He was an all-league selection for his secondary play and was quarterback co-captain at Toledo during his senior season.

February 18, 1975: The Bears complete their personnel department staffing with the hiring of **Bill Tobin**, 34, as pro scout.

February 28, 1975: The Bears announce their first ticket price hike in six years. For the 1975 season, ticket prices will be raised \$1 to \$8 and \$6 a game in Soldier Field.

March 11, 1975: Pardee completes staff naming **John Hilton** special teams coach — the 13th addition to the Bears staff since September 12.

March 14-16, 1975: 28 players attend three-day "rookie" camp in Orlando.

March 18, 1975: The Bears announce they will have a new training camp this summer on the campus of Lake Forest College, approximately 25 miles north of the Club's Loop offices. St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Indiana, had served as the Bears' training grounds since 1944, 31 years.

March 25, 1975: **Noah Jackson** signs Chicago contract after two seasons as regular guard with Toronto in the CFL.

March 26, 1975: Linebacker **Mike Kaczmarek** becomes first WFL player to ink Chicago contract. Kaczmarek played with Colts in '73.

April 7, 1975: **Namish Wilson**, veteran cornerback of the Oakland Raiders, is obtained by Bears for an undisclosed draft choice.

April 11, 1975: The Bears hold a press conference regarding stand on new stadium plans for Arlington Heights.

BEAR HALL OF FAMERS

1963 — Harold (Red) Grange, HB (1925, 1929-34); Known as the Galloping Ghost, Grange came to the Bears after a spectacular college career at Illinois. He gave to professional football the glamour it so desperately needed in the early days.

1963 — George S. Halas, Sr., Player, Coach, Owner (1920-75); Co-organizer of the forerunner of the NFL. Founder of the Decatur Staleys which later became the Chicago Bears. Owner of the Bears since their birth. Head coach for 40 years; winningest pro coach of all time with 326 victories. Played end for 11 seasons with 1919 Hammond Pros, 1920 & 21 Chicago Staleys, and 1922-29 Chicago Bears.

1963 — Bronko Nagurski, FB-T (1930-37, 1943); All-Pro fullback three consecutive seasons. Came out of 6-year retirement in 1943 to lead the war-torn Bears to a world championship as a tackle and fullback. Known as the most punishing runner of all time. Played his college ball at Minnesota.

1964 — Ed Healey, T (1922-27); The first player ever purchased by George Halas, who describes Healey as "the most versatile tackle of all time." Named All-Pro five times with Bears. Became the first president of Chicago

Bears Alumni Association (1937). Starred as a collegian at Dartmouth.

1964 — Roy (Link) Lyman, T (1926-28, 1930-31, 1933-34); Lyman inspired the modern era of defensive line play when he developed a shifting, sliding style. Starred on three consecutive championship teams for the Canton (Cleveland in 1925) Bulldogs before coming to the Bears. Played college football at Nebraska.

1964 — George Trafton, C (1920-32); One of the greatest centers ever to play the game. Was the first center to snap the ball with one hand. Named All-Pro eight times. In 201 career games with the Bears, Trafton never made a bad center pass. Played college ball with George Gipp at Notre Dame.

1965 — John L. (Paddy) Driscoll, HB (1920, 1926-29); Sensational Triple-threat performer (halfback, punter, dropkicker). Driscoll came to the Bears after a sparkling career with the Chicago Cardinals. Once tied a record by dropkicking a 50-yard field goal. Head Coach of the Bears in 1956 and 1957. Played college ball at Northwestern.

1965 — Danny Fortmann, G (1936-43); All-Pro from 1938 through 1943. Danny played with-

out a helmet. Although barely 200 pounds, he was a punishing blocker. Made Phi Beta Kappa at Colgate. Received an M.D. degree from the University of Chicago Medical School in 1940.

1965 — Sid Luckman, QB (1939-50); Known as "Mr. Quarterback", Sid ranks as one of the greatest forward passers of all time. Five times selected as All-Pro quarterback, he was also chosen the NFL's most Valuable Player in 1943. Directed the Bears to four world championships. Played tailback at Columbia.

1966 — George McAfee, HB (1940-41, 1945-50); Double threat as a dangerous break-away type runner and also a punt returner. Was named All-Pro in 1941. The immortal Red Grange once termed McAfee "the most dangerous man with a football in the game." George was an All-American at Duke before joining the Bears.

1966 — Clyde (Bulldog) Turner, C-LB (1940-52); Was named All-Pro center eight times in his career. Also sparkled on defense as a linebacker; in 1942, Turner led the NFL in interceptions. Selected as the All-Time All-America center. Starred at Hardin Simmons where he was an All-American.

1967 — Joe Stydahar, T (1936-42, 1945-46);

All-Pro tackle four times. In 8½ years with the Bears, Joe played for five western division championship clubs and three world championship teams. Captained both the football and basketball teams at West Virginia in 1935. Head Coach of the Los Angeles Rams in 1950 and 1951.

1971 — Bill Hewitt, E (1932-36); During his career, Hewitt was known as the greatest end to have played the game. All-League selection in both 1933 and 1934. Tossing blond hair became his trademark as he refused to wear a helmet until late in his career. Starred at Michigan.

1974 — Bill George, LB (1952-66); All-Pro eight times in his career. The first of the NFL's great middle linebackers. "Created" the position of middle linebacker, switching from middle guard in 1954. Longest active career in Bear history, 14 seasons. A standout college player at Wake Forest.

1975 — George Connor, T-LB (1948-55); Connor was the first of the big, mobile linebackers. He was named All-Pro five times; three times he was named on offense and defense both. George played his college football at Holy Cross and Notre Dame.

BRIAN PICCOLO AWARD



Since the 1970 season, the Chicago Bears have presented their rookie of the year with the Brian Piccolo Award.

Bear veterans vote the award to the rookie who best exemplifies the courage, loyalty, teamwork, dedication and sense of humor of the late Brian Piccolo.

A running back who died of cancer June 16, 1970, Piccolo was in his fourth season with the club when forced from the lineup because of the malignancy. He was 26 years old when he died and left a wife and three daughters, and legions of friends.

Piccolo played the first nine games of the '69 season when a persistent cough led to a chest x-ray that revealed the cancer.

He signed with the Bears as a free agent following the '64 collegiate season. As a senior at Wake Forest, Piccolo led the nation in scoring (111) and rushing (1,044).

He missed his first season with the Bears because of a leg injury suffered in a college all-star game.

In 1966, he became the alternate for Gale Sayers, his roommate on road trips.

The 1974 winner, the fifth, was tight end Fred Pagac — ironically a free agent like Piccolo.
