**ARTHUR B. MODEL****Owner/President****Born: June 23, 1925****Brooklyn, N.Y.****Purchased Browns: March 21, 1961**

When the Washington Touchdown Club initiated the Lifetime Achievement Award for Outstanding Performance in the National Football League in 1988, the directors looked no farther than Art Modell as the first-ever recipient. His 29 years of service as owner of one of the NFL's most successful franchises has been highlighted by dedication, loyalty, accomplishment and a human touch that is so often missing in today's multi-million dollar professional sports industry.

Risking every dollar he owned and borrowing as much money as his bankers would allow, Modell, then a highly respected New York advertising and television executive working as a partner for the L.H. Hartman Company, purchased the Cleveland Browns for the then unprecedented price of \$4 million on March 21, 1961.

With his entry into the NFL at the age of 35, Modell had written his "American success story." When he was 15 years old, Modell dropped out of high school and began work as an electrician's helper in a Brooklyn shipyard. He was cleaning out the hulls of ships to help his financially strapped family after the death of his father.

Modell's vision that the NFL would soon explode at the box office and on television proved correct, while his prominence in the league grew rapidly. By 1967, he was president of the NFL, a position he held until 1970. "When I first came into the league, I was in awe of people like George Halas and Art Rooney. They were very kind and gracious to accept me into their fraternity so quickly," Modell says. Today, Modell is the dean of owners, having more years of NFL ownership than any other.

His close friend, Art Rooney, passed away prior to the start of the 1988 season. "The Chief" was a gentleman and a gentle man," recalls Modell. "He was a true sportsman, fierce competitor and one of my dearest friends since the first day he welcomed me to the NFL 29 years ago. Pat and I will miss him dearly."

Modell and the Browns have been successful in the 29 years of Art's leadership. During his tenure, the Cleveland record is 230-171-6 for a winning percentage of .572. Only the Raiders (.646), the Cowboys (.642), the Dolphins (.629) and the Bears (.609) have fared better than Modell's Browns. The 1988 Cleveland team was his 13th playoff squad. In five other years (1963, 1970, 1976, 1979 and 1983), the Browns had a chance to make the playoffs on the final day of the regular season, but did not qualify.

Modell's fourth Browns' team (1964) won the NFL Championship with a stunning 27-0 victory over the Baltimore Colts. The 1965, 1968 and 1969 teams each played in the league title contest, while Art's recent frustration saw his team lose heart-breaking, but memorable AFC Championship games in 1986 and '87. Last season's injury-riddled club lost a 24-23 Wild Card game to the Oilers on Christmas Eve. Under Modell, the Browns also earned postseason play in 1967, 1971, 1972 (when the Dolphins preserved their historic undefeated season with a thrilling come-from-behind 20-14 victory), 1980, 1982 and 1985.

Through the years Modell has received many local and national awards for contributions to his community, charities and civic affairs. His most recent was when the Washington Touchdown Club honored him with the first-ever Lifetime Achievement Award. Modell's salute from the Browns' Chapter of the NFL

Alumni on June 19, 1988, is one he cherishes. "I have great respect for the men who have played in this league, specifically those who have helped make this a consistent winning franchise. I'm a fan at heart and to have players like Jim Houston, Doug Dieken and Paul Warfield come back and say 'way to go.' It made me feel very proud," Modell says.

The Professional Football Writers bestowed the Jack Horrigan Award on Modell in 1988, as a tribute to his aiding and understanding their profession.

Here are other awards Modell has earned: the "National Volunteer Citation" from the Arthritis Foundation, "Champion of Brotherhood" distinction from the National Conference of Christians and Jews for "Modell's lifetime service in combating discrimination and prejudice," the "Citizen of the Year" award from the Cleveland Board of Realtors, the "United Way Commitment" honor for his and his team's involvement, the "Blanton Collier Award" from the Browns' Alumni, "1983 Executive of the Year" from the Cleveland Sales and Marketing Club, the "Pride of Cleveland" award from the Sports' Media Association of Cleveland and Ohio, and the "Super-Citizen" honor from the Variety Club.

Area hospitals, cultural organizations, Cleveland schools and youth activities have all received Modell's time and money to meet severe financial strains. Recently, Modell was elected Vice President of the Cleveland Clinic Foundation and is chairman of the current fund drive for the world-renowned hospital facility.

Hiram College made Modell a member of its prestigious Garfield Society; John Carroll University awarded him an honorary LL.D degree (1979); and Wilberforce University has honored him for "Outstanding Citizenship." Modell has also served as the Foreman for the Cuyahoga County Grand Jury.

Modell's community leadership inspired a 1974 request to run Cleveland Stadium, which was in terrible repair and losing money for the city. Fifteen years later, Modell continues to run the Stadium that is leased to his company through 1999 and gives Cleveland over \$1 million in revenues annually. Art also lent his money and influence to refurbish the financially troubled Cleveland Sheraton Hotel at Public Square, which became Stouffer's Inn On the Square under his direction. The *Cleveland Plain Dealer* said of his effort: "Not only did Modell take on the job of saving the hotel, he turned the venture into a team effort to save downtown and Public Square from a visual blight and the city from a loss of millions in convention business."

In NFL matters, his influence is league-wide and his devotion to the league Constitution and Commissioner's office is second to none. Along with Pete Rozelle, he has negotiated the NFL's precedent-setting television contracts. He serves as Chairman of both the league's Broadcast Committee and NFL Films. Currently, he is one of six owners serving on the committee to find a replacement for the retiring Rozelle. His daring transfer (1966) of the Browns to the American Conference, along with Pittsburgh and Baltimore, solved the AFL/NFL merger problem.

One of the many innovations he started with the Browns was the preseason doubleheader concept that proved extremely popular from 1962 to 1971. When a host team was sought for the first Monday Night Game in 1970, Modell volunteered the Browns and 85,703 fans came and watched the Browns beat the Jets, 31-21, quieting league moguls who were predicting box office disaster with a weeknight game. When other teams doubted a second Thanksgiving Day game in Dallas could succeed, Modell volunteered and the Detroit/Dallas doubleheader has become a holiday tradition.

Modell serves on the boards of directors of National City Corporation and National City Bank, the Ohio Bell Telephone Company and the world renowned Cleveland Clinic, where he is on the Executive Committee and is currently heading a major fund drive. He is a board member at Churchill Downs and is one of two Churchill directors on the Triple Crown Productions Company.

Modell, who completed high school through night classes, joined the Air Force in 1943 (he was 18) and then enrolled in a New York City television school following World War II. Always an innovator, Modell produced one of the first

regular daytime television shows in the nation before moving into the advertising business in 1954.

Pat Modell, Art's wife, has worked hard to improve the Cleveland community. She serves on the board at Ursuline College and is active with the Cleveland Musical Arts Association, the Cleveland Ballet, the Playhouse Square Foundation and Cerebral Palsy Association. A former actress, Pat appeared in over 400 motion pictures and television shows. The couple has two sons: John, 30, and David, 28. John is a music composer/producer living in Los Angeles with his wife Tracy, who is an artist. David, the Browns' Vice President of Marketing and Assistant to the President, lives in Kirtland with his wife Olwen, who is a lawyer with Cuyahoga County.

"According to the individuals who run the clubs, the NFL's most respected owner is Art Modell of the Cleveland Browns. Modell, they say, makes it a point to get along with the representatives of the league's many cliques and factions. He can be tough, but he plays fair. In a sense, they say Modell is the NFL." *Los Angeles Times*, Jan. 25, 1987.



## JIM BAILEY

**Executive Vice President,  
Administration and Legal**

In a business "covered" by the media as thoroughly as an NFL team is, it is almost surprising that Jim Bailey has maintained such a low profile in his dozen years with the Browns. Always working closely with Owner Art Modell since he (Jim) joined the franchise in 1978, Bailey has opted to work quietly behind the scenes, while having impact on every aspect of the team's operations. "There is not a Browns' function that does not include Jim's input. From hiring a head coach, to coordinating a road trip to London, to securing facilities for us to work, Jim is involved," Modell recently said of the Browns' Executive Vice President, Administration and Legal.

A former scholarship winner as a defensive back at Florida State, Bailey was promoted to his current position in early 1984. During his tenure with the Browns, Bailey has done everything from negotiate player, radio and TV contracts, to handle Browns' legal affairs, to coordinate Cleveland Stadium activities. In fact, most of Jim's initial work with the organization involved the development and maintenance of Cleveland Stadium Corporation.

Bailey earned a law degree from the University of Michigan after receiving his undergraduate degree at FSU. Prior to joining the Browns, Jim worked for the Cleveland-based law firm of Guren, Merritt, Sogg and Cohen, where he was quickly named a partner in 1976. Bailey's duties at the law offices included work with Art Modell in the formation of the Cleveland Stadium Corporation lease arrangement with the city. That association was instrumental in bringing Bailey to the Browns.

A native of Wilmington, Ohio, Bailey stood out in three sports (football, basketball and track) at Wilmington High School. Recently, Jim was named to the Board of Directors of the NFL Alumni/Browns' Chapter.

Jim and his wife Ann live in Shaker Heights. Daughter Sarah recently graduated from St. Louis' Washington University with a degree in marketing, while daughter Jenny is attending Northwestern University.



## ERNIE ACCORSI

**Executive Vice President,  
Football Operations**

What is Ernie Accorsi's impact on the Browns? Last December, *Pro Football Weekly* stated it simply: "Look at the Browns' record since Accorsi arrived." Certainly Ernie has helped make Cleveland an annual Super Bowl contender since his arrival in 1984, but the highly respected football executive down plays his role. "We're not a big company and we have an owner who works everyday at the football business and he allows a number of us to express our opinions. We've been able to reach a consensus on most major decisions and it's worked out pretty well for us."

Accorsi is celebrating his 20th year in the NFL this season. He began his league career in 1970 as the public relations' director of the then Baltimore Colts. Since that job, Accorsi has moved up the administrative ladder and has worked in virtually every phase of the football business, save coaching. In his current capacity with the Browns as Executive Vice President-Football Operations, Accorsi shoulders most of the responsibilities for player acquisitions and other player-related movements. He works closely with new Head Coach Bud Carson, directs all player contract negotiations and manages the Browns' personnel department.

Accorsi handled the delicate and important trade that gave the Browns the rights to then-sophomore Bernie Kosar in the spring of 1985. Kosar joined the Browns that summer and the team progressed to win three consecutive division championships and a fourth straight playoff spot last season. Earlier this year, the aggressive Accorsi put together bold trades that brought the Browns the draft choices to acquire Texas running back Eric Metcalf and Auburn wide receiver Lawyer Tillman. A trade for RB-Mike Oliphant and the scouting and signing of 14 new Browns through the NFL's "Plan B" free agent system kept Ernie's offseason anything but normal.

After serving five years with the Colts in the public relations capacity, Accorsi joined Commissioner Pete Rozelle's staff as Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference in 1975 and '76. He returned to the Colts in 1977 as assistant general manager and later became the club's general manager for two years (1982 and '83).

Just prior to coming to Cleveland, Accorsi's responsibilities in Baltimore included all of the Colts' functions. From negotiating local radio/TV contracts, to player movements, to the team's marketing and public relations efforts, Accorsi's imprint was seen. The Colts' climb from a winless 1982 (strike-shortened, 0-9) to seven victories in 1983, is attributed to Ernie's influence and direction.

Last fall (1988), Accorsi received the highest commendation from his alma mater, Wake Forest, when he was presented the "Distinguished Service Citation for Athletics." Following his graduation from Wake in 1963, Accorsi served in the Army between jobs as a sportswriter for the *Charlotte News* and later with the *Baltimore Evening Sun* (1964). He then worked as the Sports' Publicity Director of Philadelphia's St. Joseph's College before joining the *Philadelphia Inquirer* in 1966. Three years later (1969), he returned to collegiate athletics as Penn State University's Assistant Sports Information Director.

Ernie, who is an avid reader of world and sports' histories, has three children: Michael, 20, and Sherlyn, 19, who are students at Pittsburgh and Penn State, respectively, and Patrick, 15.

**DAVID MODELL**

**Vice President-Marketing,  
Assistant to the President**  
**Born: August 16, 1961**  
**Los Angeles, California**  
**15th Year with Browns**

David Modell, who first worked for the Browns at the age of 14, was recently (April, 1989) promoted to Vice President of Marketing/Assistant to the President. Previously, Modell, who is 28, had been the team's first ever Director of Marketing.

Modell's appointment was explained by Browns' Executive Vice President Jim Bailey. "The promotion reflects the added importance we've placed, as well as the other NFL teams, on local marketing. Player and operational costs are rising and we are aggressively seeking new sources of income through marketing to balance this inflation. Secondly, David's promotion is an indication of his growing role in our organization," Bailey said.

Modell started the club's marketing department in the Spring of 1985 after serving as a public relations' assistant for a year. Since that time, Modell has significantly increased the team's advertising revenues with such innovations as a 48-page training camp program and numerous game-day sponsorships. At the league level, Modell serves on the Executive Committee for marketing specialists.

Along with his marketing duties, Modell has continually increased his responsibilities with the Browns. For the past three years, he has negotiated player contracts under the direction of Ernie Accorsi. He has served as a coordinator for the Browns' promotional and advertising activities with radio station WWWE, which has the rights to the Browns' broadcasts. Most recently, David was a member of the interviewing group to select new Head Coach Bud Carson.

Modell is deeply involved in the Diabetes Association of Greater Cleveland, where he serves on the Board and Executive Council, while heading their development fund raising. Modell also works with the Lake County Boy Scouts' Association.

As a 14-year old student, David worked Browns' games as a member of the grounds' crew. In the next years, he spent time as a front office aid and training camp intern. After graduating from the The Gunnery School (Washington, Ct.) and attending Wittenberg University, Modell joined the Browns in a fulltime capacity in the team's ticket office (1981-82). He then worked two years as the front office manager for the Fernwood Inn, a resort in the Pocono Mountains (1982-84) before returning to Cleveland in October of 1984. Modell and his wife Olwen, who is a lawyer clerking in the Domestic Relations Division of the Cuyahoga County Courts, live in Kirtland.

## RICKY FEACHER

**Director of Player Relations,  
College Scout**

"One of the most important things I do is to prepare players to make the transition from professional football to a career outside of football," says Ricky Feacher of his responsibilities as director of player relations. Feacher has directed new energy into the Browns' career counseling program—a program that is one of the front-runners in the NFL. Besides these efforts, he is a full-time member of the personnel department, evaluating college talent and handling contract negotiations.

"Ricky functions as our national scout and sees the top prospects," says Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "He has a feel for seeing playing talent that is very rare. Although Ricky has additional responsibilities as Director of Player Relations, he has become a valued member of the player personnel staff as well."

Feacher was on the Browns' active roster for nine years (1976-84). He became a consistent starter in 1981 after playing his first five years behind Hall of Famer Paul Warfield, Dave Logan and Reggie Rucker. Nicknamed "The Hollywood Dude" by his teammates, he was such an effective leader in other aspects that his peers voted him special teams' captain in 1980 and '81. After his football career ended in the summer of 1985, Feacher was hired as assistant to then player relations director Warfield.

Originally drafted as a 10th-round pick in 1976 by New England, Feacher was released three weeks into his rookie season. The Browns signed him as a free agent one week later and Ricky totaled 113 receptions for 2,084 yards and an 18.4 yard per catch average for his career. Only the Browns' Ray Renfro (19.6) and Warfield (19.2) are ahead of him.

As a four-year varsity wide receiver at Mississippi Valley State after earning MVP honors in football, basketball and track at Hernando High School in Brooksville, Fla., Feacher caught 54 passes for 1,062 yards and eight touchdowns his last two college seasons. He has a degree in business administration.

Ricky and his wife, Regina, make their home in Westlake.

## CAREER COUNSELING PROGRAM

One of the most innovative player development programs in professional sports, the Cleveland Browns' Career Counseling Program was an idea originally developed by Paul Warfield in 1982 to ease the player's transition from football to a lifelong career. The function of the program is to introduce the active player to the business community prior to retirement from sports and get a head start on the future. This past year, Ricky Feacher, director of player relations, has added new commitment to the program with the appointment of Ben Leibowitz as director of career counseling and player development.

Under Feacher's direction, Leibowitz is responsible for the implementation of degree completion programs, comprehensive testing, selective job placement, other educational programs, and career development. Leibowitz, president of Sports Psychology and Counseling Associates, Inc., is a native of Paterson, N.J., and holds a B.A. in Psychology and a Master's in Counseling Psychology from Seton Hall. He has completed coursework toward his Ph.D. at Fordham University in New York City.

Now in his ninth year with the Browns and his 11th NFL season, Kevin Byrne is a Browns' Vice President and the team's Director of Public Relations. Byrne, who was born in Cleveland 40 years ago, joined the franchise in 1981 as the Director of Publicity and earned his promotion to vice president three years later (1984).

While he directs the Browns' public relations' department, Byrne also works closely with the team's operations, ticketing and marketing departments. He has negotiated a number of the Browns' preseason television and radio contracts and helps manage the day-to-day activities during training camp.

Byrne began his NFL career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1977 when he was named as the then youngest public relations director in the league. He stayed with the Big Red for two years before becoming Director of Public Affairs for Trans World Airline (1979-80). In 1980, *St. Louis Magazine* selected Byrne as one of 80 St. Louisans "to watch in the '80s."

From 1974-77, Byrne was Sports Information Director at Marquette University, where he worked with Al McGuire and the Warriors' 1977 NCAA basketball champions. His first job after graduating from college was as the "SID" at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. His publications at both schools won numerous national and regional awards from the College Sports Information Directors' Association.

Byrne earned distinction as a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the national Jesuit Honor Society, while gaining a degree in journalism from Marquette University (1971). He was a member of "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities" and was a four-year member of the Warrior wrestling team. (Byrne currently helps coach a grade school wrestling team in the Cleveland area). Kevin is a graduate of Lakewood (O.) St. Edwards High School, where he serves on the school's Board of Trustees and Executive Committee.

Kevin and his wife Sally live in Westlake with their four children: daughter Shannon, 13, and sons Sean, 12, Tim, 10, and Conor, 7.

## **BUD CARSON**

**Head Coach**

**Born: April 28, 1931**  
**Freeport, Pa.**

The Cleveland Browns will celebrate their 40th season in the NFL with their seventh full-time Head Coach, the 58-year-old Bud Carson. Owner Art Modell named Carson to the position on Jan. 27, 1989. After 33 years in the coaching profession, a period in which Bud gained a reputation as a "defensive genius" in many quarters, Carson's long awaited opportunity to be an NFL head coach was realized.

"This is the greatest thrill of my professional life," Carson said. "I've waited long, but it's worth it. To coach a team with the great history and tradition of the Browns, one that is so well respected for its commitment to winning - this is an opportunity I've worked hard to gain. The fact that I'm coming to a team that is playoff caliber makes it that much better."

Carson inherits a team that owns the AFC's best record over the past three seasons and has made four straight playoff appearances — also tops in the AFC. "There are very few people who become head football coaches in this league who are lucky enough to step into situations like this," said Bud. "I recognize that. I know what they want here. They didn't bring me in to have the team take a step backwards."

Carson most recently served as defensive coordinator for the New York Jets, and has served in a defensive coordinator's role for five NFL clubs (four in the AFC). "We are absolutely confident that Bud Carson is the right man to help us make the next step, which is to win the league championship, and, hopefully, more than one," Browns' owner Art Modell said. "I have never been involved in a more exhaustive talent search for a coach. We wanted to make sure we studied the whole field and, when we did, Carson became the clear-cut choice. He is an honorable and hard-working man, whose capabilities as a coach are readily evident in his defenses' accomplishments."

Carson knows what the organization, the Cleveland fans and the media expect of him. "We want to do exactly what we've done in the last four years — get in the playoffs," said Carson. "We have proven players who know what it takes to win. We've added some other talent and, importantly, I'm pleased with the coaching staff we put together." Five members have coached in a combined 12 Super Bowl games. In 16 seasons as an NFL assistant, Carson's teams made the playoffs 11 times and played in three Super Bowls, winning twice. Carson first gained notoriety as the architect behind the famed "Steel Curtain" of the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1970's. He served as defensive coordinator of the Steelers from 1972-77, a period when Pittsburgh gained the playoffs six straight seasons and won Super Bowls IX and X (1974-75). Three members of that unit - Joe Greene, Jack Ham and Mel Blount - have already been named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

"Sure we had good players," Carson said. "The double zone had never been played in the pros. We intercepted (a team-record) 37 passes with it in 1973. In football, if you're the first guy to use something, you've got an edge."

Carson was hired by Chuck Noll as secondary coach of the Steelers in 1972 and assumed the coordinator's position by midseason. "I got a call from Chuck Noll in 1972. He wanted me to coach his secondary. That was a start of a lifelong friendship from a guy who gave me a shot at the right time." The Steelers went 11-3 in Carson's first season and made the playoffs for the first time in 25 years.

**THE CARSON FILE**

— *ON PERSONALITY*: "I want us to have a team with backbone with players that get after people. I want to be able to blow people off the line of scrimmage. I don't want to have to throw on third and one. I want this team to have a tough personality - no cheap stuff. Just plain, tough man-on-man football and I think we'll get that personality."

— *ON DEFENSE*: "I think anybody who plays in our defense will love it because we turn people loose and hopefully allow them to do what they are most capable of doing. We're going to change the defensive system into a more attacking style."

— *ON CLEVELAND*: "We need to win more games in Cleveland Stadium. This should be the toughest place in the world to play. It's a lot tougher, in my opinion, than Cincinnati and a heck of a lot tougher than Houston. We ought to be the team that's 8-0 at home rather than Cincinnati."

After his run with Pittsburgh, Carson was hired by George Allen as the Los Angeles Rams secondary coach in 1978. Allen was fired after the Rams played only two preseason games, and Ray Malavasi was named head coach. Bud was named defensive coordinator, where he served until 1981. The Rams' defense topped the league in yards allowed in Carson's first season. The following year (1979), the Rams advanced to Super Bowl XIV, where they lost to the Steelers.

In a 24-0 Los Angeles victory on Nov. 4, 1979, Carson's Ram defense held the Seahawks to a negative-26 yards total offense, which is an NFL record. But perhaps an even greater feat occurred when Carson was in Pittsburgh, as the Steelers recorded five shutouts and allowed just two TDs in their final nine games of the 1976 season to qualify for the playoffs.

In 1982, Carson was the defensive coordinator of the Baltimore Colts (under Frank Kush). Although the young Colts suffered through an 0-8-1 campaign, Ernie Accorsi, then-general manager of Baltimore, was greatly impressed with Carson's coaching philosophy and his handling of the players. "Bud made an impression on me that I won't forget," said Accorsi, now the Browns' Executive Vice President of Football Operations. "His knowledge of the game vastly exceeded the talent we put on the field. His defensive schemes were always a few years ahead of time."

A year later, Carson joined the Chiefs as defensive coordinator and secondary coach and, in 1984, he served as a volunteer coach at the University of Kansas.

When Bud joined the Jets in 1985, he immediately rebuilt the defense into the league's eighth-ranked unit after the New Yorkers finished with the 21st best defense in 1984. In 1986, despite losing the entire starting defensive line due to injuries for the final six games, the Jets finished second in the AFC in defense (and did not allow a rushing touchdown until week 11). Making the playoffs as a Wild Card, the Jets stopped the Chiefs, 35-15, and then lost to the Browns at Cleveland Stadium, 23-20 in double overtime, in one of the most memorable games in NFL history. In 1987, the Jets slumped to 6-9, but rebounded in 1988 to an 8-7-1 mark, due in part to a young defense (three rookie starters) that held opponents to 17 points or less in seven of the 16 games, including a 23-3 victory over the Browns in week two at the Stadium. The Jets produced 45 quarterback sacks, second best in the AFC behind Buffalo's 46. New York was tied for fifth in the NFL with 40 takeaways (24 INTs and 16 FRs), behind Minnesota, Philadelphia, Houston and a tie with Green Bay and Seattle. FS-Erik McMillan, a third round pick, was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year by A.P. and *Football News* and earned a Pro Bowl trip.

Carson initiated his coaching career at Scottsdale (PA) High School (near Pittsburgh) in 1955, where he coached for two years (record: 16-2-1). "We had 18 players on our team. I had one rule — nobody get hurt. And nobody did. Nobody ever laid down on the field. We were the toughest team in football. We ran in place during timeouts. It's funny how you remember things like that more than Super Bowls."

Bud entered the collegiate ranks at his alma mater, the University of North Carolina, where he served from 1957 to 1964, and then went to South Carolina (1965). In 1966, he joined the staff at Georgia Tech and succeeded the legendary Bobby Dodd as head coach the following year.

In five seasons, Carson guided the Ramblin' Wreck to a 27-27 record, including a 9-3 mark in 1970 that ended with a 17-9 victory over Texas Tech in the Sun Bowl. Carson's first three Tech teams each finished with a 4-6 record, while the 1971 squad (his final season) gained a 6-6 mark, which included a 41-18 loss to Mississippi in the Peach Bowl.

"I made all the mistakes I could make," recalls Carson. "I was no more ready to be a head coach (at Georgia Tech) than to fly. But I know what's ahead of me now. And I'm going to have some fun doing it."

Born April 28, 1931 in Freeport, Pa., Leon H. "Bud" Carson attended Freeport (PA) H.S. and was an All-Southern Conference defensive back for coach Carl Snavely at North Carolina for four years. He spent 30 months in the Marines following graduation. Bud's wife, Linda, is an experienced television news journalist who has worked in Atlanta, Los Angeles, Baltimore, Kansas City, Hartford (Ct.) and Pittsburgh. The Carsons have four children: Dana, 29; Cliff, 28; Gary, 27; and Cathy, 13.

An 18-year veteran of coaching, Jed Hughes will tutor the Browns' deep and talented secondary, after being appointed by Bud Carson on February 7. Pro Bowl starters Frank Minnifield and Hanford Dixon anchor a unit that did not allow a touchdown pass until the eighth week of the season, and finished sixth in the NFL in passing yards allowed.

Hughes, who is 41, most recently served as linebacker coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers (1984-88), coaching Pro Bowlers Mike Merriweather and Robin Cole. Originally hired by Noll in 1984 as an outside linebacker coach, Hughes' duties were expanded in 1987 to include the inside linebackers. Hughes other pro experience was with the Minnesota Vikings as defensive backfield (1982-83) coach under then-head coach Bud Grant.

"Jed Hughes is a very capable teacher," said Bud Carson. "He has coached all (defensive) positions. The group of players we have is a talented one, and they will be under more pressure this season to play man-to-man because we will take some more gambles (rushing the passer) than in the past. Jed's background prepares him for the things we want to do. He comes highly recommended by both Chuck Noll and Bud Grant."

After one year as an assistant at Biglerville (Pa.) High in 1970, Hughes obtained his first college level coaching job at Stanford (1971-72) as an assistant line coach working with both the offensive and defensive lines. In 1973, Hughes went to Michigan as an offensive line coach. Shifting to defense in 1974, he coached the Wolverine linebackers for two seasons. Hughes went to UCLA in 1976 as linebacker coach and was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1977, a position he held until joining the Vikings in 1982.

Hughes attended Springfield (Mass.) College from 1966-67, where he lettered in three sports—football (linebacker, tight end), baseball and wrestling. In 1968, he transferred to Gettysburg College, and played for two seasons as the starting tight end and split end, as well as starting catcher on the baseball team.

In 1970, Hughes was graduated from Gettysburg College with a B.S. in biology and physical education. He received his master's in education from Stanford in 1972 and earned his Ph.D. in education at Michigan in 1975.

Ask Bud Carson what his major priorities are as new head coach of the Browns, and he'll tell you one of them is to improve the protection of the quarterback and upgrade the running game. Hal Hunter is the coach that Carson selected for that task in 1989. A veteran of 32 years, Hunter was on the Steelers' coaching staff for the past four seasons.

"Hal's experience and associations over the years qualifies him for one of the more important positions on our staff," said Bud Carson. "He has worked under some excellent coaches. Obviously, we need to protect our quarterback, and we have to run the ball effectively. It all starts up front, and that's why Hal's job is important."

Hunter was hired by the Steelers in 1985 to coach guards and centers. He was part of an offensive line coaching duo along with Ron Blackledge, who coached tackles and tight ends. In 1985 and '86, the Steelers were second in the NFL in fewest sacks allowed, and in 1987 they were 5th. On the ground, the Steelers ranked 7th, 5th and 6th in the NFL (1986-88, respectively) in rushing yards.

"I've been in the AFC for the past seven years, and in the AFC Central the last four," said Hunter. "During that time, I've gained a lot of respect for the Cleveland Browns' organization and Art Modell. I was with Bud, (receivers' coach) Richard Mann and Ernie (Accorsi) in Baltimore, and with (running backs' coach) George Sefcik at Kentucky. That familiarity and the fact that my son is just down the road at Akron and my mother (Freda Wargo) lives in Cleveland, makes it an honor to be joining the Browns."

Hunter, who is 54, is a veteran of 31 years of coaching at the professional and college level. He entered the professional ranks in 1981 as offensive coordinator under Frank Kush for the Hamilton Tiger Cats of the Canadian Football League. When Kush went to the Baltimore Colts in 1982, he took Hunter with him as offensive line coach. Hunter was named interim head coach for the Indianapolis Colts for the final game of the 1984 season.

In 1958, Hunter began his college career at Richmond as defensive line coach. He switched to the offensive line for a two-year stint at West Virginia (1962-63), another two years at Maryland (1964-65), followed by five years at Duke (1966-70). Hunter became offensive coordinator at Kentucky (1971-72) and accepted an offensive line assignment at Indiana (1973-76). In 1977, he was named head coach at California State University of Pa., and remained there until joining Kush in the CFL.

Hunter graduated from Pittsburgh in 1956 with a bachelor's degree in secondary education and received his master's in science in 1962 from West Virginia. He was a starting Panther at linebacker and guard from 1953-55. From 1952-54, he was Pitt's heavyweight wrestler and placed fourth in the 1956 AAU wrestling championships.

Hal and his wife Eileen have three children: Hal (offensive line coach at Akron), and two daughters, Heidi (a lawyer in Indianapolis) and Heather (an advertising director in San Diego).

## STAN JONES

The Browns hired longtime NFL coach Stan Jones on February 24 as their strength and conditioning coach. A former perennial Pro Bowl lineman, Jones most recently served as defensive line coach for the Denver Broncos. Originally hired by Lou Saban in 1967, Jones spent 18 years with Denver in that capacity. He also worked under Saban in Buffalo from 1972-75, before returning the Broncos in 1976.

Jones was among the first strength coaches in the NFL, serving a dual role as defensive line coach before the advent of full time strength coaches. Two of his products are Pete Martinelli of Oklahoma and Jimmy Williams of the Jets (who started at Nebraska).

"When Dan Reeves became head coach at Denver, he told me, 'Stan, you are going to have to choose between being strength coach and defensive line coach,'" Jones recalled. "I told him I would rather be the strength coach, which had been my first love for 40 years. He said, 'OK, but that means you are going to have to make a lot less money.' I had a younger family then and changed my mind."

"Strength and conditioning has always been my passion. I was going into that field in one form or another now anyway. I am just pleased to be able to do what I always wanted to do and do it with a great organization."

Bud Carson said, "This is a bonus for the Browns. We not only get one of the pioneers in strength and conditioning in this country. . . a guy who trained many of the strength coaches in college and pro football today, but we get a coach of great stature in this league for many years. This also gives me the freedom to use him on the field in various drills if I want to."

1989 will mark Jones' 36th consecutive year in pro football. He played 13 years in the league (1954-1966), 12 with the Chicago Bears and one with the Washington Redskins. He played in seven Pro Bowls and earned All-Pro honors four times as an offensive guard. He played both offensive guard and defensive tackle until 1963, when he played defensive tackle exclusively.

Jones was an All-American tackle at the University of Maryland in 1953 and was named the nation's Lineman of the Year. In 1977, he was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 25-year all-star team. He has been honored by the Maryland Alumni Association as Man of the Year, and is a member of Pennsylvania's Sports Hall of Fame.

Stan and his wife, Darlis, have a daughter, Sherrie, and two sons, Kevin and Tony.

Considered a special teams' mastermind, veteran coach Paul Lanham takes over as special teams' coordinator on Bud Carson's new staff. Most recently with the Redskins, Lanham was hired by Washington after the 10th game of the 1987 season, and the Redskins went on to win seven of their next eight games, including a victory over the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXII.

A 16-year NFL veteran, Lanham started his pro career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1972 as special teams and offensive backfield coach. He joined the Washington Redskins in 1973, serving under George Allen as special teams' coach from 1973-77. Lanham went to the Los Angeles Rams, where he coached a variety of positions — special teams, quarterbacks and running backs — for five seasons (1978-82). Bud Carson was on that same Rams' staff as defensive coordinator.

"Since the mid-'70s when he was with George Allen and the Redskins, Paul has been considered a kind of expert on special teams," said Bud Carson. "Everyone knows how the Redskins brought him in two years ago to fix their special teams, and they went on to win the Super Bowl. Once Paul told us he was interested in coordinating the special teams, we offered him the job."

In 1983, Lanham rejoined George Allen with the Chicago Blitz (the franchise relocated to Arizona the following season). Browns' defensive line coach John Teerlinck was on that staff in the same capacity. Lanham tutored the Detroit

Lions' receivers in 1985-86. He began his coaching career with Delaware in 1960, and coached at Dayton (1961), Colorado State (1962-69) as offensive coordinator, and Arkansas as special teams and tight ends' coach (1970-71).

"I grew up as a Cleveland Browns fan and have long admired Mr. Modell and the organization. I have worked with Bud and several members of his staff and have a great respect for all of them. It's a great opportunity and I'm excited about the possibilities of working in Cleveland for the Browns."

Lanham attended Glenville (W. Va.) State, where he lettered for three years as a linebacker. Paul received his masters degree in educational administration in 1960 from the University of Delaware. He and his wife, Helen, have four children: Tammy (30), Steve (27), Randy (25) and Gary (18).

"I've said it before and I'll say it again," states Bud Carson, "but we'll emphasize special teams. The quickest way to get fired in this league is to have bad special teams."

Richard Mann enters his fifth year with the Browns as receivers' coach. Mann, who has been with the Browns longer than any other coach on Carson's new staff, has played a major role in developing Cleveland's young receiving corps into a productive unit. Mann is no stranger to Bud Carson. They were on the same coaching staff (Baltimore) in 1982.

In 1988, all five Browns' receivers averaged over 12 yards-per-catch. As talented as they are youthful, the group continues to grow and mature along with QB-Bernie Kosar. Even the 1988 injury bug did not escape this group (WR-Webster Slaughter missed eight games), enabling Reggie Langhorne to develop into an every down threat. Veteran Brian Brennan (at 27) has caught more passes than any other receiver selected in the entire 1984 NFL draft. And Slaughter's role as one of the most dangerous pass catchers in the NFL is well known.

"Richard's hard work has certainly paid off in terms of production," said Bud Carson. "Our receivers can get open, they run the correct routes, and have improved every year. That marks the work of a quality coach. The wide receiver position has me most pleasantly surprised. Richard should be commended for the job he has done."

Mann describes his coaching mode as "demanding" and has been developing receivers for a dozen years on the college level and more recently in the NFL. Among the college players he helped advance are Miami standout WR-Mark Clayton at the University of Louisville. After that, Mann moved on to the pros with the Baltimore/Indianapolis Colts and maximized the Colts' receiving talent.

With the Colts, Mann worked under then-head coach Frank Kush, whom Mann played under, and later coached for, at Arizona State. At ASU, Mann was a three-year starter (first year at flanker) and caught 28 passes for 340 yards his final two seasons at tight end. After earning a B.S. degree in elementary education, Mann returned to his hometown high school as a teacher and coach from 1970-74.

He returned to ASU and spent six years developing future NFLers like John Jefferson, Bruce Hardy and Jerry Bell. He then moved on to Louisville for two years, before joining Baltimore in 1982. He spent three seasons on that staff before coming to Cleveland in 1985.

Mann and his wife, Karen, have three children: Deven (11), Richard (9) and Mario (7) and reside in Strongsville.

While new to the NFL, Joe Popp began coaching in 1954, first on the high school level, before moving on to the collegiate and professional levels. Popp's association with new Browns' head coach Bud Carson dates back to 1963 when both were on the University of North Carolina's coaching staff, and continued at Georgia Tech during Carson's tenure as head coach from 1967-71.

"Joe is a fine coach who I've known for many years," said Carson. "He'll assist me in organizing many of the details that go along with being a head coach."

"I'm happy to be a part of the Cleveland Browns," said Popp. "Bud is one super coach with a tremendous mind. I've known him for a long time, and he'll do some things on both sides of the ball that will generate some wins."

Popp, 58, started his career in 1954 as head coach at West Forsyth High School in Winston-Salem, N.C., where he served until 1957. From 1958-61, he moved on to Mooresville (N.C.) High School, where he served as head coach. In 1961, his Mooresville squad won the North Carolina AAA State Championship.

In 1962, Popp took over as freshman and scout team coach at the University of North Carolina, where he served for two seasons. Bud Carson was on the Tar Heels' coaching staff from 1957-64.

From 1964-67, Joe served as defensive coordinator at Wake Forest University. Brian Piccolo graduated from Wake Forest in Popp's first year, and John Mackovich was the Blue Demons' quarterback.

Popp rejoined Carson as a defensive coach at Georgia Tech in 1968, where he stayed until 1972. He served on Abe Gbron's Chicago Fire staff in World Football League in 1974 and '75. He had been self-employed since 1976.

Popp attended Franklin (N.C.) H.S. He earned a football scholarship to Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C., where he lettered for four years in football and three in basketball.

Joe and his wife, Peggy, have three children: Joey, 31, a television reporter in Charlotte, N.C.; Karen, 29, a lawyer in New York City for Sullivan and Cromwell; and Jimmy, 24, who played defensive back for Michigan State and is currently the backfield coach at The Citadel.

The Browns' new defensive coordinator and linebackers' coach on Bud Carson's staff is Dan Radakovich, 53, who has coached for over 30 years on both sides of the ball. Most recently, Radakovich was with the New York Jets, tutoring the offensive line from 1986-88 and the linebackers in 1985 — his first season with the Jets.

"Rad is a coach I very much wanted to have join our staff," said Bud Carson. "We've worked together at a couple of places and I can tell you he is an outstanding football coach. He will open the eyes of the players with his insights, understanding of the game, and his teaching. Even people who don't follow football closely know what he did with the linebackers at Penn State."

Radakovich began his coaching career at his alma mater, Penn State in 1957, where he tutored linebackers for 13 years (through 1969). He was credited with the development of All-Americans Jack Ham, Dave Robinson and Dennis Onkotz, as the Nittany Lions gained the reputation as "Linebacker U." In 1970, he was named defensive coordinator at the University of Cincinnati under Ray Callahan. In 1971, he was defensive line coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers, and his impact was immediate.

"I thought he was a master of technique," said Hall of Famer Joe Greene. "He helped me and L.C. Greenwood develop techniques we used our whole careers."

"Rad" then held the same position for Colorado University from 1972-73, before returning to the Steelers in 1974 as offensive line coach. In Radakovich's four years with the Steelers, Pittsburgh won two Super Bowls (1974 and '75). Pro Bowlers' Mike Webster and Jon Kolb were members of the strong Pittsburgh line. In 1978, Dan was named defensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers.

Radakovich's career almost paralleled Bud Carson's, as he went to the L.A. Rams as offensive line coach in 1979, where he coached until 1981. In 1979, the Rams went to the Super Bowl (with Carson as defensive coordinator), behind the likes of Dennis Harrah, Kent Hill, Jackie Slater and Doug Smith, all Pro Bowlers. Dan was a football advisor for North Carolina State in 1982, offensive line coach for Denver in 1983, and offensive line coach for the Minnesota Vikings in 1984. He joined the Jets in 1985.

"This is exciting for me because of the chance to work with Bud again, and because I've always looked at the Browns as an organization that worked hard to win," said Radakovich. "I saw that when I was a kid growing up as a Steeler fan when the Browns would always win; and of course, I've seen that from across the field in my time in the NFL."

Radakovich (pronounced rad-a-KO-vich) played linebacker and center for the Nittany Lions from 1954-56. He grew up in Kennywood, PA. Dan and his wife Nancy have a son, Dan (30) and daughters Lisa (25), Leslie (22) and Lori (20).

A familiar face on Bud Carson's newly appointed coaching staff, Cleveland native George Sefcik returns to his hometown as the Browns' running backs' coach. Sefcik, who served in the same capacity for the Browns on Forrest Gregg's staff from 1975-77, has coached in the NFL for the past 16 years, most recently as offensive coordinator for the Kansas City Chiefs in 1988.

Prior to his appointment with the Chiefs, Sefcik served on the Green Bay Packers' staff for four seasons (1984-87), tutoring the offensive backfield the first two seasons, and the quarterbacks the final two. In 1985, the Packers' running game averaged 4.7 yards per carry, second in the NFL. Sefcik coached the Cincinnati Bengals' running backs from 1978-83. During his tenure, the Bengals made their first Super Bowl appearance following the 1981 season. Before accepting his first position with the Browns in 1975, Sefcik served as offensive backfield coach for the Baltimore Colts from 1973-74.

"It's great to be back in Cleveland," said Sefcik. "I went to Benedictine High School, was raised in Cleveland and I enjoy the community. I feel honored and privileged to be back with a great organization like the Browns, and I'm looking forward to it. I've had to prepare against Bud Carson's defenses before and they have always challenged me. I'm excited to be part of his staff."

A two-way halfback for Notre Dame from 1959-61, Sefcik embarked immediately after college on his coaching career, taking over as head coach at Niles (Ill.) H.S. He returned to his alma mater as a freshman coach under Hugh DeVore in 1963, and when Ara Parseghian became head coach of the Irish, Sefcik tutored the wide receivers for five years (1964-68). The Fighting Irish won National Championships in 1964 and 1966. In 1969, he moved to the University of Kentucky, where he was the Wildcats' offensive coordinator under Johnny Ray for four years (1969-72).

Sefcik helped Benedictine High School bring the state high school title to Cleveland as a 5'-8", 158 lbs. halfback in 1958. An avid golfer and sportsman, George and his wife, Lori, have three children.

Former receiving great Lionel Taylor joins the Browns this season to coach tight ends and serve as a special assistant to the offense. Taylor's association with Bud Carson dates back to 1972, when Bud first joined Chuck Noll's Pittsburgh Steelers' coaching staff. Taylor coached the Steelers' wide receivers from 1970-76, and was the senior member on Noll's staff that won back-to-back Super Bowls in 1974-75. Both Carson and Taylor later served on the Los Angeles Rams' coaching staff; Carson as defensive coordinator from 1978-81, while Taylor tutored the Rams' wide receivers from 1977-79, and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1980 and '81.

"Lionel Taylor is a guy with a great background in coaching and we're very fortunate to have him," said Bud Carson. "He has been to three Super Bowls and coached a lot of playoff games. I'm sure our players will be impressed by him. His overall experience, both as a player and a coach, will allow him to make a big contribution to this offense."

"I think it's a great opportunity for me to work for the Browns," said Taylor. "I thought some time ago that Bud Carson would be a great choice as a head coach in the NFL. We've worked together for two different clubs in the past, so I know what he can do. To be a part of his staff is exciting."

Most recently, Taylor served as head coach and athletic director at Texas Southern University in Houston, Texas from 1984-88. Although Texas Southern managed a 13-41-1 record under Taylor, the Tigers' offense averaged over 28 points-per-game in 1986-87, and in 1986, two receivers, Darrell Colbert (currently with K.C. Chiefs) and Donald Narcisse (currently with CFL's Saskatchewan), had 1,000-yard seasons. Prior to going to TSU, Taylor served as receivers' coach at Oregon State from 1982-83.

Taylor distinguished himself as one of the game's receiving greats in his 10-year professional playing career (nine in the old AFL). He totaled 567 receptions playing for the Chicago Bears (1959), Denver Broncos (1960-66) and Houston Oilers (1967-68), which was the second-most ever in the history of pro football at the time of his retirement, and the most in AFL history. He is currently 12th among all-time receivers (tops in AFL history). Taylor caught 100 passes in 1961 for Denver, following a 96-catch year the previous season. Those totals are the second and third most grabs in AFL annals. He led the AFL in receptions in five of his nine years in the league. Taylor is the Denver Broncos' all-time leading receiver, and is a member of the "Ring of Fame" in Mile High Stadium.

On December 13, 1987, Ozzie Newsome caught three passes against Cincinnati to move past Taylor into ninth-place on the NFL's all-time reception list (Ozzie currently stands in sixth place among all-time pass receivers).

Lionel grew up in Lorado, W. Va., then attended New Mexico Highlands, where he was an All-Frontier Conference flanker. He and his wife, Lorencita, have two daughters, Loretta and LaVern.

## JOHN TEERLINCK

John Teerlinck, 37, joins the Browns as defensive line coach after a career that has spanned the USFL and college levels. Teerlinck is the youngest member of the Browns' defensive coaching staff.

"I've mentioned the respect I have for George Allen and how much I learned from him in a short time," said Bud Carson. "Well, George gave John Teerlinck the highest recommendation. George said John knew how to teach defensive linemen how to get to the quarterback and that's what we're looking for."

Teerlinck's last coaching job on the professional level was with the Chicago/Arizona Blitz as defensive line coach. He joined the Blitz in 1983, when the franchise was in Chicago. The Blitz transferred to Arizona in 1984 and was renamed the Wranglers. In both seasons, the Blitz led the USFL in defense and quarterback sacks. Of 12 possible All-Pro spots among defensive linemen in the league's two-year existence, the Blitz produced nine.

"It's the chance I've been waiting for," said Teerlinck. "I've been selective as to where I want to coach because I wanted to go to a place where they will get after the passer. That's what we'll do best, is get after the quarterback. After meeting Bud, I knew Cleveland was the organization for me."

Teerlinck entered the coaching ranks as defensive coordinator for Iowa Lakes Junior College in 1977. He took over as defensive line coach at Eastern Illinois University, where he served from 1978-79. In 1978, the Panthers captured the NCAA Division II national championship. Current Raiders' coach Mike Shanahan was the Panthers' offensive coordinator in 1978.

Teerlinck moved to Illinois under coach Mike White, serving as defensive line coach for three seasons (1980-82). During his tenure, John developed seven All-Big 10 linemen. He took over the Blitz' defensive line duties the following season.

An All-Catholic League standout for Fenwick (Oak Park, Ill.) H.S., John later earned first team Little All-America honors at Western Illinois, serving as co-captain. He earned defensive MVP honors in his senior year. John earned his degree in physical education. In 1979, he earned his master's degree in education from Eastern Illinois.

Teerlinck was drafted in the fifth round of the 1974 draft by the San Diego Chargers, and earned a starting defensive tackle position on Tommy Prothro's squad as a rookie. John played for four seasons before a knee injury ended his career.

John owns a highly successful business brokerage firm in Phoenix, which he opened in 1986 and operated from that time until taking the position with the Browns. An avid sportsman, John has among his trophies a world class bull elk.

John and his wife Sue have five children, Ann (14), Bill (11), Mark (9), Molly (5) and Mary (4).

Marc Trestman's steady rise in the coaching ranks escalates in 1989, as he takes over as the Browns' offensive coordinator after serving as quarterbacks' coach in 1988, his first season with Cleveland. Trestman will continue to tutor the Browns' signal callers this season as well. Trestman, 33, is recognized as one of the bright and promising young coaches in the NFL and has coached under some of the game's brightest coaches, such as Howard Schnellenberger, Jimmy Johnson, Bud Grant, Jerry Burns and Ray Perkins.

"When I took this job at the end of January," said Bud Carson, "I was familiar with Marc's philosophies, his intelligence and integrity. Although I didn't hire Marc, I'm pleased he's on our sideline. He develops new ideas and concepts — actually refines them — every day. I haven't been in this business for 30 years without knowing something about offense, and I like what I see with Marc."

Ozzie Newsome, one of the game's greatest players, decided to return for the 1989 season in part because "of my total respect for Marc as a brilliant offensive tactician."

Trestman entered the NFL coaching ranks at the young age of 29 when he joined the Vikings as running backs' coach in 1985. After spending two seasons in Minnesota, Trestman worked in 1987 as the quarterback coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. From 1981 through 1984, Marc worked at the University of Miami.

"I've been fortunate to learn from some quality coaches and, hopefully, they've helped me become a better coach," said Trestman. "I think you take the concepts you've learned from others and try to come up with a combination that allows you to create new ideas."

Trestman began his coaching career while attending law school at the University of Miami. In both 1981 and 1982, he served as a volunteer assistant, spending much of his time the second season with two redshirt freshman quarterbacks named Vinny Testaverde and Bernie Kosar. In 1983, Trestman was the quarterback coach; Kosar was the starter and Miami won the national championship. Trestman remained the quarterback teacher in 1984, Kosar's last collegiate season.

Trestman played quarterback four years (redshirted one season) at Minnesota (1974-77), serving two seasons as a backup to Tony Dungy. Marc played his senior year (1978) at Moorhead (Minn.) State University and was then signed by the Vikings as a free agent defensive back and later released during training camp in 1979. Marc re-signed with the Vikings in 1980 and was released in training camp.

Trestman attended St. Louis Park (Minn.) High School. As a senior quarterback, he was named All State and Prep All America, plus he played basketball and baseball. He graduated from Minnesota with a B.A. in Political Science in 1979, and earned a law degree from Miami and passed the Florida bar in 1983.

Marc is single and resides in Bay Village.

With a tireless work ethic and a compassion for all, Bill Tessendorf personifies the type of person it takes to be successful in his ever-expanding field. Perhaps never tested as he was last season, when the Browns lost four quarterbacks to injuries, along with a locker room full of ailments (Kevin Mack, Webster Slaughter, et. al.), Bill and his staff still managed to nurse the team onto the field, as the Browns made the playoffs for the fourth time in as many seasons.

"Bill Tessendorf is a dedicated worker who is a very, very valuable member of our organization," says owner Art Modell of the man who is entering his 17th year in the Browns' organization, including sixth as head trainer.

The Ohio Athletic Trainers Association felt that way as well, bestowing upon Bill the Clinical/Professional Trainer of the Year Award last May.

Tessendorf first joined the Browns as an assistant trainer in 1973 while working towards his master's degree in exercise physiology at Kent State. Bill did his undergraduate work at Northern Illinois University, graduating with a B.A. in 1971. He worked as a graduate assistant under Kent State coach Don James in 1971, then took a job as an elementary school teacher in the Dekalb (Ill.) Public School District in 1972.

He returned to Kent State a year later and began assisting Browns' trainer emeritus, Leo Murphy, while working towards his master's, which he received in 1976. "Bill's a fine young man and the team is lucky to have someone with his talents," Murphy said.

"I feel very fortunate to have had the opportunity to work with Leo Murphy, Dr. (Vic) Ippolito, Dr. (John) Bergfeld and the other doctors on our staff. They have enhanced my professional career," Tessendorf added. Bill has served for the past year and a half as treasurer of the Professional Football Athletic Trainers Society.

Bill and his wife, Nan Jean, reside in Medina and are the parents of Amy Ann, who will turn six in February.

**LEO MURPHY**  
 Trainer Emeritus


Of all the kind, generous people who have blessed the Cleveland Browns' organization, perhaps one stands out the most. Leo Murphy will spend his 40th year with the Browns in the capacity of trainer emeritus, having earned well-deserved "semi-retirement." Leo was honored last February by the Cleveland Touch-down Club with the Pro Recognition Award for serving 39 years in the best interest of the organization and the community.

Starting in 1950, when the Browns joined the NFL, Leo's quick wit has made the pressures of the locker and training room a pleasant experience for the team.

In 1947, Murphy graduated from Notre Dame, then went on to work with the AAFC's Chicago Rockets and baseball's New York Yankees. Murphy has long been regarded as one of the top trainers in the world, evidenced by induction into the National Athletic Trainers' Association Hall of Fame in 1982.

Leo and his wife, Betty, have two children, Nancy and Martin, and three grandchildren. The Murphys live in Medina.


**CHARLEY CUSICK**

**Equipment Manager**

**Born: October 7, 1950**

**San Bernadino, Calif.**

**20th Year Browns**

Charley Cusick is a living example of what hard work and determination can do for an athlete who has resolved to make it to the pros, even after a severe injury has cut short his chance of playing the game.

Cusick, who has the talent and physique of a professional athlete, had his career cut short by a severe knee injury. However, the Lakewood High School product still found his way to professional football 20 years ago as an assistant to long-time Browns' equipment manager Morrie Kono.

In 1974, Cusick was named equipment manager, replacing Kono, a pioneer in the football equipment business.

As equipment manager, Cusick coordinates the purchasing and maintaining of equipment for the Browns, as well as the operations involved in transporting these from Baldwin Wallace to training camp at Lakeland Community College, Cleveland Stadium, road sites and on to the offseason training headquarters at Big Creek Racquet Club.

The transporting of equipment between NFL cities is a task in itself, but Charley and his staff will coordinate the transport of the club's gear to London, England in 1989 after a trip to Canada in 1988. They also equipped the AFC Pro Bowl squad following the 1986 and 1987 seasons.

Cusick lives in Bay Village with his wife, Patty.

**DOM ANILE****College Scout****Born: December 19, 1937****Brooklyn, N.Y.****7th Year Browns****C.W. Post**

With an impressive 24-year college coaching career behind him, Dom Anile joined the Browns' scouting staff seven years ago. Anile, while an offensive coordinator at Columbia, was first introduced to the club when he worked three consecutive Browns' training camps assisting the offensive line coach.

A Brooklyn, N.Y. native, Anile is a 1959 graduate of C.W. Post. He was a three-year letter winner in both football and baseball at Post where he captained the football team two years and was MVP as a senior. Immediately after attending graduate school at Brooklyn College, Anile began his coaching career and served in a number of capacities, including offensive coordinator at Post from 1959 to 1967.

"Dom is the senior member of our staff," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "He has been largely responsible for the East Coast area, but in our system of cross checks, he has seen most of the top players the past two seasons. Dom brings to our department the value of a great coaching career at Post college and many years of scouting experience."

In 1968, he was named head coach at Post and became one of the most successful college division coaches during the next 12 years. His teams compiled an 84-33-1 (.716) record and twice won the Lambert Bowl as the East's top team — 1973 (10-1) and 1976 (8-2).

Selected as Eastern College Coach of the Year in 1973, Anile was also picked as New York's Metropolitan Coach of the Year four times. Dom joined the Columbia staff in 1980 and was the team's offensive coordinator prior to accepting the Browns' position.

Dom currently resides in Strongsville.

**WAIVERS**

The waiver system is a procedure by which player contracts or NFL rights to players are made available by a club to other clubs in the league. During the procedure the 27 other clubs either file claims to obtain the players or waive the opportunity to do so — thus the term "waiver." Claiming clubs are assigned players on a priority based on the inverse of won-and-lost standing. The claiming period normally is 10 days during the offseason and 24 hours from early July through December. In some circumstances another 24 hours is added on to allow the original club to recind its action (known as a recall of a waiver request) and/or the claiming club to do the same (known as withdrawal of a claim). If a player passes through waivers unclaimed and is not recalled by the original club, he becomes a free agent. All waivers from July through December are no-recall and no withdrawal. Under the Collective Bargaining Agreement, from February 1 through October 15, any veteran who has acquired four years of pension credit may, if about to be assigned to another club through the waiver system, reject such assignment and become a free agent.

**TOM DIMITROFF****College Scout****Born: June 6, 1935  
Barberton, O.****3rd Year Browns  
Miami University (Ohio)**

When opportunity knocked, Tom Dimitroff didn't hesitate to take advantage of it. The opportunity was an invitation in 1987 to join the Browns' organization and return to his home state. After 32 years of football experience in the U.S. and Canada, the hard-working Dimitroff was ready to come home. He enters his third full year with the club, having already scouted for the 1987 and '88 drafts.

"After a coaching career which spanned college and the Canadian Football League, Tom came to us three years ago with a unique background to scouting," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "Tom handles the mid-section of the country, where so many great players have come from, especially lately. He is a sound evaluator of playing talent and has great insight and experience. His firm, no-nonsense approach to the job makes him very important to the personnel department."

Tom, a 1953 graduate of Barberton H.S. and Miami University (Ohio), was a quarterback for the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League (1957-58), and the American Football League's Boston Patriots (1960). After football, Dimitroff managed an Akron restaurant for four years, then started his coaching career as an assistant for Wadsworth H.S. (1965-68) and Barberton H.S. (1968-69). He began coaching on a collegiate level as an assistant at Miami (Ohio) from 1969-72, and then at Kansas State University in 1973. He moved into the professional ranks in 1974 as the offensive coordinator for the Ottawa Rough Riders (through 1977).

In 1978, Dimitroff was named head coach of the Hamilton Tiger Cats, and then returned to the collegiate level as head coach of the University of Guelph (1979-83), where his five-year record was 21-13-1. Rejoining the Rough Riders in 1984, he served as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator, later moving over to the scouting department as director of player personnel (1985-86).

A challenge on the racquetball court, Tom and his wife Helen have three children, Randy (27), Sharon (26) and Thomas (23). The Dimitroff family currently resides in Strongsville.

**GARY HORTON****College Scout****Born: May 6, 1947  
Santa Monica, Calif.****3rd Year Browns  
L.A. Baptist College**

Beginning his third year with the club as an area scout, Gary Horton has accumulated 16 years of substantial expertise in evaluating college and pro football talent. His organizational skills well documented, Horton joined the Browns in 1987 after four years of scouting potential players for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

"Gary is responsible for coordinating and scheduling the department, as well covering a large section of the country and then cross-checking the top prospects," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "His capacity for work is amazing. He is thorough, talented, and in my opinion, has a bright future in the National Football League."

Horton attended Chaffey Junior College and Cal State Northridge, where he played football and earned two letters. He received his bachelor of science degree from L.A. Baptist College in 1969. After college, Horton taught school and coached at Scottsdale (Ariz.) H.S. from 1970-71, and at Marcos DeNica (Tempe, Ariz.) H.S. in 1972. He joined Arizona State's coaching staff and served as Frank Kush's chief recruiter from 1973-79.

Serving as Director of Player Personnel under Mike White at Illinois (1979-82), Horton concentrated on player evaluation and recruitment. While with the Fighting Illini, he was credited with recruiting a number of standout junior college players, including current NFL quarterbacks Tony Eason, Jack Trudeau and Dave Wilson. Horton joined the Bucs as a college personnel scout (1983-86) and covered the eastern region of the United States.

Mike Lombardi was given the title of Pro Personnel Director last May after six years as an NFL scout established him as one of the league's youngest and brightest. Mike's evaluation techniques and knowledge of the game are impressive, despite his youth (30). He spent three years scouting for the San Francisco 49ers' personnel staff before joining the Browns in 1987.

"Mike Lombardi has obviously experienced a rapid rise in his NFL career," said Executive Vice President of Football Operations Ernie Accorsi. "He handles the pro personnel department for the Browns, along with scouting many of the top college prospects. He has terrific instincts for this business, along with an encyclopedic recall of players and events."

Lombardi also assists Accorsi in contract negotiations. A native of Ocean City, N.J., Mike lettered in both football and baseball at Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, Pa.). He attended Hofstra University (1978-81), where he played nose tackle for the Flying Dutchman. He started his football career as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas (1982-83).

Just prior to the 1984 NFL Draft, Lombardi joined the 49ers' staff (1984-87), and coordinated all scouting reports in addition to evaluating college talent in the northeast region before switching to the southwest and western regions in 1985.

I'm not coming back for money, I'm coming back for a run at the Super Bowl. They both seemed happy when I told them that I'll return."

**ART MODELL ON OZZIE:** "I'm pleased Ozzie's returning for another season, which is good news for the Browns and I'm delighted. We left the decision up to Ozzie, because I knew he would decide to play only if he firmly believed he could come back and perform at a high level. He'll help us with his play, but he also provides great leadership off the field."

On December 13, 1987, Ozzie Newsome caught three passes vs. the Cincinnati Bengals to move past Lionel Taylor into ninth place on the NFL's all-time reception list. So what's the connection? Taylor is the Browns' new tight ends' coach, and a 20-year coaching veteran. He totaled 567 receptions playing for the Chicago Bears (1959), Denver Broncos (1960-66) and Houston Oilers (1967-68), which was the second-most ever in the history of pro football at the time of his retirement, and the most in AFL history. He is currently 12th among all-time receivers (tops in AFL history). He led the AFL in receptions in five of his nine years in the league, is the Broncos' all-time leading receiver, and is a member of the "Ring of Fame" in Mile High Stadium.

(1) **SUNDAY, SEPT. 4 — BROWNS 6, Chiefs 3 (55,654) at Arrowhead Stadium.** The Browns overcame injuries to six key players (five starters and five Pro Bowlers) yet won their first opener since 1982 in Kansas City, 6-3, behind two Matt Bahr field goals (19 and 38 yards). Bahr, who had his first three point attempt blocked by S-Lloyd Burruss, booted a 19-yarder with no time remaining in the first half to give the Browns a 3-3 tie at the half. Bahr's game-winner came with 25 seconds remaining in the contest. Both scoring drives (12 plays for 81 yards; 13 plays for 72 yards) were led by QB-Gary Danielson (18 of 29 for 170 yards, no TDs, one INT). QB-Bernie Kosar was forced out of the game when Burruss came clean on a safety blitz after Kosar's release of the ball early in the second quarter. Kosar was placed on injured reserve prior to week two with strained ligaments in his right elbow and missed the next six games. FB-Kevin Mack (neck), CB-Frank Minnifield (groin), NT-Bob Golic (abdomen), WR-Webster Slaughter (hamstring) and PR/WR-Gerald McNeil (thigh) were all sidelined during the contest (although Golic returned to play).

Cleveland's defense held Kansas City to 149 total yards (89 net yards passing) and nine first downs. Kansas City was unable to generate a first down in eight of 12 offensive drives and they started seven drives from their own 20 or less. LB-David Grayson led Cleveland's defensive charge with seven tackles, including two second-half QB sacks for 17 yards lost. The second-year linebacker's last sack was a jarring tackle of Chiefs' QB-Bill Kenney that knocked Kansas City out of potential game-tying field goal range with 6:44 remaining in the game. FB-Tim Manoa (playing for the injured Kevin Mack) gained 70 yards on 14 carries — all in the second half — and caught four passes for 25 yards (also career-highs). The win snapped a five-year opening day losing streak for Cleveland and handed the Chiefs their first opening-day loss in as many seasons.

(2) **SUNDAY, SEPT. 11 — Jets 23, BROWNS 3 (74,434) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns fell to 1-1 by dropping a 23-3 game to the visiting New York Jets in front of 74,434 fans. Behind three Pat Leahy field goals, New York held a 9-3 lead going into the fourth quarter. Bud Carson's defense totally dominated the final period. The Jets scored two TDs on runs of one and three yards by FB-Roger Vick. The Browns only score came on a 47-yard field goal by Matt Bahr in the first quarter. Cleveland gained only 218 total net yards, including 27 rushing yards. The Jets controlled the ball for 37 minutes and 47 seconds (compared to 22:13 for Cleveland), and converted 50% of their third down situations (8-16). Perhaps the most telling statistic was that the Jets' average starting field position for their 13 drives was their own 40-yard line, and the Browns' average starting field position was their own 24. Both New York touchdown drives started in Cleveland territory.

QB-Gary Danielson (13 of 23, 154 yards, three sacks) broke his left ankle in the third quarter and was replaced by Mike Pagel. Pagel completed seven of 14 passes for 73 yards, and threw one interception. WR-Reggie Langhorne caught a game-high six passes for 75 yards. FB-Kevin Mack had eight carries for 26 of the Browns' 27 rushing yards.

(3) **MONDAY, SEPT. 19 — BROWNS 23, Colts 17 (75,148) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns defeated the visiting Indianapolis Colts, 23-17, before 75,148 Cleveland Stadium fans and a national television audience to improve their record to 2-1. QB-Mike Pagel, the third starting quarterback in as many weeks and making his first start since 12/22/85, led the Browns to victory over his former club. Pagel completed 23 of 38 passes for 255 yards, two TDs and one INT, and threw to seven different receivers. WR-Webster Slaughter had a game-high six for 86 yards, including a 17-yard TD reception. TE-Ozzie Newsome caught a 14-yard TD among three receptions for 20 yards, and WR-Brian Brennan grabbed five for 50 yards. FB-Kevin Mack paced the Browns' ground attack with 76 yards on 23 carries. Colts' RB-Eric Dickerson gained 117 yards on 22 carries to lead all rushers, but gained only 13 yards on eight carries in the second half, as Cleveland's defense held Indianapolis to only one offensive touchdown.

The Colts scored first on Dean Biasucci's 30-yard field goal on the first drive of the game. The Browns countered with a 77-yard, 13-play drive that culminated in Ozzie Newsome's 14-yard TD reception, his first TD since 11/23/86. Matt Bahr kicked the first of three field goals (21, 29 and 40 yards), with 3:14 elapsed into the second quarter, giving the Browns a 10-3 lead. Dickerson then sprinted 41 yards for a TD to knot the score at 10-10 with 9:43 remaining in the first half, but the Browns scored on their next possession as Pagel hit Slaughter (who battled Colts' CB-Eugene Daniel for the ball, ruled complete by simultaneous possession) to put the Browns ahead, 17-10. S-Felix Wright intercepted backup QB-

Chris Chandler's pass with 45 seconds remaining in the half, stalling Indianapolis on Cleveland's 24-yard line, to ensure the Browns' 17-10 halftime lead.

Bahr kicked his second three-pointer from 29 yards for the third period's only score, to give Cleveland a 20-10 edge, and a 40-yard field goal to put the Browns up 23-10 with 14:46 remaining in the game. The Colts drove to the Browns 26-yard line before CB-Hanford Dixon picked off a Jack Trudeau (10 of 19 for 80 yards) pass. On the Browns' next possession, Lee Johnson punted to PR-Clarence Verdin, who raced 73 yards for a TD, to complete the scoring. The Colts were able to generate only one first down in the final 1:43, as Cleveland took over on downs with 20 seconds remaining for the win.

(4) SUNDAY, SEPT. 25 — Bengals 24, BROWNS 17 (54,943) at Riverfront Stadium. The Browns dropped to 2-2 as they traveled to Cincinnati and lost a 24-17 contest — their first setback in Riverfront Stadium since 1985. The Bengals improved their record to 4-0, two games in front of the Browns in the AFC Central. Cincinnati scored all 24 of their points in the first half on two Ickey Woods one-yard touchdown runs, a Lewis Billups 26-yard return of a Kevin Mack first-quarter fumble and a Jim Breech 24-yard field goal. Cleveland QB-Mike Pagel, who completed a career-high 24 of 48 passes for 254 yards, threw an 11-yard TD pass to WR-Brian Brennan in the second quarter following Matt Bahr's 27-yard first-period field goal, and FB-Kevin Mack slammed three yards for the Browns' final touchdown in the fourth quarter. The Browns were forced to start their five second-half drives at their own two, 11, 28, 20 and five-yard lines.

Cleveland's defense limited Boomer Esiason, the NFL's leading passer going into the game, to eight completions on 23 attempts for 183 yards. But Cincinnati's rushing game rolled up 213 yards behind RB-James Brooks (17-83), RB-Stanley Wilson (11-68) and Ickey Woods (13-62, two TDs). Conversely, Cleveland's running attack managed just 68 yards on 21 carries, led by Mack's 39 yards on 14 tries. RB-Earnest Byner was the game's leading receiver with eight for 64 yards, and TE-Ozzie Newsome caught five passes for 72 yards. For Cincinnati, WR-Eddie Brown grabbed four passes for 127 yards. Rookie DE-Michael Dean Perry recorded the game's only sack in the third quarter.

(5) SUNDAY, OCT. 2 — BROWNS 23, Steelers 9 (56, 410) at Three Rivers Stadium. The Browns improved their record to 3-2 with an important 23-9 inter-division victory to move into a tie with Houston for second place in the AFC Central. Cleveland extended their Three Rivers' streak to three wins, reversing a 16-game drought in what was once described as Cleveland's own "House of Horrors".

Cleveland's defense forced five Steeler turnovers in the second half, allowed just 183 yards, and did not allow a touchdown for the second time in 1988. FS-Felix Wright picked off two passes (one to halt Pittsburgh's first second-half drive and the second with 50 seconds left in the game, which he returned 53 yards). LB-Eddie Johnson, subbing for injured Mike Junkin (knee ligaments), recovered a RB-Merril Hoge fumble on the Browns' 19-yard line that set-up the go-ahead score in the third quarter and intercepted a Bubby Brister pass on Pittsburgh's next possession, leading to the second of Matt Bahr's three field goals (22, 21, 40 yards). Rookie SS-Brian Washington bolted 75 yards for a touchdown when he picked off QB-Steve Bono's fourth-quarter pass to give Cleveland a 20-9 lead and control of the game. The theft was the fifth-longest in Browns' history, Cleveland's longest in 20 years and the longest by a Browns' rookie in regular season play.

Second-year FB-Tim Manoa, who played high school football at North Allegheny H.S. in Pittsburgh, impressed family members with 82 rushing yards on 18 carries, including a 34-yard run, and a one-yard TD burst in the second period. RB-Earnest Byner churned out 78 yards on 20 carries. Manoa's TD overcame two Gary Anderson first-quarter field goals (49 and 35 yards), but Anderson booted his third three-pointer with 43 seconds left in the first half to give the Steelers a 9-7 halftime lead. Cleveland's defense shut out Pittsburgh in the second half, and QB-Mike Pagel (15 of 26 for 131 yards, 0 TDs, one INT) led a ball-controlled attack, as the Browns held the ball for 20:31 vs. Pittsburgh's 9:29 in the final half.

**(6) SUNDAY, OCT. 10 — Seahawks 16, BROWNS 10 (78,605) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns committed four turnovers, three of which led to Seattle's 16 points, as Cleveland dropped a 16-10 contest to the visiting Seahawks. The setback dropped the Browns to 3-3, three games behind division-leading Cincinnati. A sellout Cleveland Stadium crowd of 78,605 witnessed the loss of QB-Mike Pagel, who suffered a second-period shoulder separation while tackling S-Paul Moyer on a blocked field goal. Pagel marked the third (of four) starting quarterback to go down with a serious injury in 1988.

Cleveland opened the scoring, driving 69 yards in eight plays, as FB-Kevin Mack slammed over right tackle from one-yard out. Mack (15 carries, 66 yards) paced the Cleveland ground attack that rolled-up 160 yards on 30 rushes (5.3 avg.). On Seattle's next possession, the Browns forced a punt, but PR-Gerald McNeil fumbled, giving Seattle the ball on Cleveland's 24-yard line. RB-Curt Warner (24 carries, 96 yards), swept left on a one-yard score to knot the game at seven.

K-Matt Bahr attempted a 21-yard field goal on the Browns' first second-quarter possession and it was blocked by DE-Jeff Bryant and recovered by Moyer, who rambled 62 yards to set up a Norm Johnson 31-yard field goal to give Seattle a 10-7 lead. Pagel was injured making the tackle, but remained in the game for the Browns' next possession, which ended when he threw an interception. QB-Don Strock took over and completed 12 of 21 passes for 151 yards, no TDs and one INT. In Strock's second drive, he fumbled a snap on Seattle's 45-yard line to set-up Johnson's second field goal, this one from 38 yards, as the Seahawks took a 13-7 lead with 11 seconds remaining in the first half.

The Browns drove to Seattle's 25-yard line from their own three late in the third quarter, but Strock was intercepted by LCB-Melvin Jenkins when he tried to hit Reggie Langhorne in the endzone for the go-ahead score. The Seahawks drove to the Browns' four-yard line before Johnson kicked his third and final field goal of the day, a 22-yarder to put Seattle ahead 16-7 with 8:46 remaining in the game. The Browns drove to Seattle's six and Matt Bahr booted a 23-yard field goal to pull Cleveland to within six, 16-10, but Seattle took over possession with 2:32 remaining in the game, and the Browns were unable to stop the clock, thus ending the game.

Cleveland outgained Seattle, 334 yards to 227, had 21 first downs to Seattle's 14, out-passed Seattle 174 to 101, and controlled time of possession, 32:06 to 27:54, but four turnovers and the blocked field goal proved too much to overcome.

**(7) SUNDAY, OCT. 16 — BROWNS 19, Eagles 3 (78,787) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns' defense dominated a potent Philadelphia Eagles' offensive unit and Don Strock directed the Cleveland offense to a 19-3 win in his first start as a Brown and his first in five years. Strock used a left wristband with 55 plays written on it, as Cleveland won the hard-hitting contest with their fourth starting quarterback in seven games. The Browns sacked Eagles' QB-Randall Cunningham nine times and their defensive effort (119 net yards allowed) was the seventh-stingiest in club history. Philadelphia penetrated Cleveland's 40-yard line only twice (both in the first half).

CB-Frank Minnifield recorded two interceptions (and had a third nullified due to a pass interference call), and seven different defensive players accounted for the nine QB sacks (the most by a Cleveland team during the regular season since they set a team record with 11 on 11/11/84 vs. Atlanta). First-year DE-Charles Buchanan, activated off of PUP prior to the game, led the charge with 2-1/2 sacks. Conversely, the Browns' offense rolled up 361 yards, including 182 on the ground. QB-Don Strock (11 of 18 for 189 yards) threw for two touchdowns in his first NFL start since 1983. FB-Kevin Mack rushed for 100 yards on 16 carries, including a career-long 65-yard jaunt on the second play from scrimmage. RB-Earnest Byner added 74 yards on 17 carries. WR-Brian Brennan gained a game-high 79 yards on three receptions.

The game was deadlocked 3-3 at halftime after Cleveland squandered two first-half scoring opportunities, advancing the ball inside the Eagles' 15-yard line twice (one drive was halted on a Strock interception, another on a wide 39-yard field goal attempt). WR-Webster Slaughter, who caught four passes for 50 yards, scored on a 15-yard TD pass from Strock in the third quarter, before exiting the game in the fourth period with a fractured forearm. WR-Reggie Langhorne scored the other Cleveland TD on an 18-yard fourth-quarter pass from Strock, and Matt Bahr kicked field goals of 24 and 37 yards.

**(8) SUNDAY, OCT. 23 — BROWNS 29, Cardinals 21 (61,261) at Sun Devil Stadium.** QB-Bernie Kosar made a triumphant return to the starting lineup by leading the Browns to a 29-21 victory over the Cardinals in sun-drenched Sun Devil Stadium's 110 degree heat. Kosar (25 of 43, three TDs, three INTs) threw for 314 yards, his fifth career regular-season 300-yard game, after missing the previous six starts due to an elbow injury suffered in the season's opening game. WR-Reggie Langhorne scored two TDs (a career high) on receptions of 29 and 25 yards, and starting LT-Rickey Bolden caught his first career TD pass (three yards) on a tackle-eligible play for the Browns' first score. Kosar completed passes to 10 different receivers — six (a game high) to RB-Earnest Byner. K-Matt Bahr was perfect on two FGAs (46 and 23 yards). The Browns jumped to a 14-0 first-half lead before turnovers enabled Phoenix to tie the game, 14-14, at the half.

Cleveland's defense allowed only 161 net yards passing, recorded six QB sacks, forced four Phoenix turnovers and recorded a safety. LB-Mike Johnson recorded two interceptions (career high), and SS-Brian Washington swiped a fourth-quarter Cliff Stoudt pass. DE-Carl Hairston recorded two sacks, forcing a fumble on the Cardinals' first possession of the second half on one, which was recovered by LB-Eddie Johnson. First-year DE-Charles Buchanan, in only his second game as a pro, recorded two sacks including a fourth-quarter safety, and LBs-Clay Matthews and Eddie Johnson each recorded solo takedowns.

**(9) SUNDAY, OCT. 30 — BROWNS 23, Bengals 16 (79,147) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns held the Cincinnati Bengals' offense to three field goals and moved to within one game of the Bengals with a 23-16 victory before 79,147 Cleveland Stadium fans. The margin of victory proved to be a blocked Scott Fulhage punt by LCB-Frank Minnifield that was recovered by Herman Fontenot for a third-quarter touchdown. Cleveland's defense held the Bengals to 281 total net yards, and stalled four Cincinnati drives inside the Cleveland 14-yard line. Three of those drives resulted in Jim Breech field goals (19, 32, and 22 yards). Cleveland stopped the Bengals on a fourth-and-one from the Browns' 12 in the second quarter, and the Browns sacked QB-Boomer Esiason four times (DE-Sam Clancy, DL-Michael Dean Perry and two by LB-Clay Matthews) and limited the AFC's top passer to a 12 of 25 for 173 yard performance, with no TDs or INTs.

QB-Bernie Kosar completed 18 of 28 passes for 210 yards, did not throw a touchdown and had two interceptions, including one that was returned 16 yards by SS-David Fulcher for a TD. On the ensuing kickoff, Herman Fontenot raced 84 yards to set up a FB-Tim Manoa two-yard TD plunge. Manoa, who started his first pro game for the injured Kevin Mack (neck), bulled for 89 yards on 23 carries. Matt Bahr was perfect on FGAs of 34, 39 and 29

yards. WR-Clarence Weathers, starting for the injured Webster Slaughter (broken forearm), had a career day as he caught seven passes for 140 yards.

(10) **MONDAY, NOV. 7 — Oilers 24, BROWNS 17 (51,467) at the Astrodome.** The Browns lost a 24-17 game before a national television audience and 51,467 fans at the Astrodome to drop to 6-4, two games behind 8-2 Cincinnati and one game behind the 7-3 Oilers. After stopping Houston's first drive (K-Tony Zendejas missed a 52-yard field goal attempt), Matt Bahr booted a 40-yard three pointer to put Cleveland on top, 3-0. Houston drove 51 yards on eight plays following the Browns' next possession, and went ahead 7-3 when FB-Alonzo Highsmith scored on a one-yard TD run with 11:50 remaining in the first half. The Browns had a chance to take the lead when QB-Bernie Kosar led the Browns on a nine-play drive down to the Oilers' one-yard line with seconds remaining, but time expired in the half as his last pass into the endzone intended for Langhorne was incomplete.

The Browns' first second-half possession ended when LB-Johnny Meads blocked a Max Runager punt (the Oilers' fifth, and NFL record-tying, blocked punt on the season) giving Houston the ball on the Browns' 27-yard line. QB-Warren Moon (11 of 17 for 182 yards, no INTs), hit WR-Ernest Givins on a seven-yard TD pass to give the Oilers a 14-3 lead. The Oilers scored another third-quarter touchdown (the first two of the season in that period vs. the Browns) when RB-Mike Rozier scored on a three-yard rush to make the score 21-3.

WR-Reggie Langhorne accounted for 53 of Cleveland's 67-yard scoring drive on their ensuing possession, including a 33-yard reception and a 20-yard touchdown on a reverse play with 2:26 remaining to play in the third period. The score was Langhorne's first rushing TD of his career and cut Houston's lead to 21-10. Kosar (16 of 33 for 219 yards and no INTs) hit TE-Ozzie Newsome on a four-yard pass with 7:26 remaining to pull Cleveland within four, 21-17. That reception was the 600th of Ozzie's career. Following an exchange of punts, the Oilers moved 48 yards in seven plays, as Zendejas booted a 47-yard field goal to put Houston up 24-17, completing the scoring. The Browns regained possession on the ensuing kickoff with 1:44 remaining in the game, but a high snap from center in the shotgun was recovered by Oilers' DE-Ray Childress.

(11) **SUNDAY, NOV. 13 — Broncos 30, BROWNS 7 (75,806) at Mile High Stadium.** Denver scored on their first six possessions and were aided by four Cleveland turnovers — all in the first half. The loss marked the 10th straight for the Browns against Denver, who scored all 30 points in the first half. Cleveland's lone score was an Earnest Byner two-yard run in the third period after the Browns went to a no-huddle offense.

The tone was set on the game's first play from scrimmage, as FB-Tim Manoa's fumble was recovered by Denver S-Dennis Smith, leading to a Rich Karlis 18-yard field goal. Karlis was three of five on the day. Denver QB-John Elway (21 of 30 for 207 yards and two TDs) directed an eight-play, 53-yard drive to put Denver ahead 10-0. A Karlis 22-yard field goal put Denver ahead 13-0, and then Cleveland's next three possessions resulted in a Bernie Kosar interception and two lost fumbles (WRs-Clarence Weathers and Reggie Langhorne — both after receptions). All three turnovers led to scores (two TDs and Karlis' third three-pointer).

Cleveland was unable to take advantage of setbacks to their three AFC Central foes, as their record slipped to 6-5. QB-Bernie Kosar (19 of 30 for 175 yards, no TDs and one INT) was sacked six times and completed passes to eight different receivers. RB-Earnest Byner led all rushers with 60 yards on 11 carries. WR-Brian Brennan caught six passes for 59 yards. Denver's average starting field position was their own 47-yard line, while Cleveland started no drive past their own 30.

(12) **SUNDAY, NOV. 20 — BROWNS 27, Steelers 7 (77,131) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns forced four Pittsburgh turnovers, blocked a punt for a touchdown, and allowed just one score as they defeated the Steelers, 27-7, in front of 77,131 fans at rain-drenched Cleveland Stadium. The win marked Cleveland's sixth straight over Pittsburgh and improved their record to 7-5. The Browns jumped to a 17-0 lead early in the second quarter when CB-Stephen Braggs blocked a Harry Newsome punt, which CB-Frank Minnifield returned 11 yards for a touchdown, the second time this season that Cleveland has scored on a blocked punt. Newsome had six punts blocked in 1988, an NFL record.

LB-Eddie Johnson intercepted Steeler QB-Bubby Brister (16 of 35 for 220 yards, six sacks, no TDs, two INTs) on the game's second play, which led to a Matt Bahr 32-yard field goal. The Browns forced a Pittsburgh punt early in the second quarter, but C-Mike Webster (playing in his 30th game vs. the Browns) snapped the ball over Newsome's head, giving Cleveland the ball on the Pittsburgh three-yard line. QB-Bernie Kosar (12 of 24 for 204 yards, two sacks, two TDs, no INTs) hit TE-Derek Tennell for a touchdown on the next play to put Cleveland ahead, 10-0. Pittsburgh's next possession resulted in the blocked punt for Minnifield's touchdown, and then a miscue on a Cleveland punt (Max Runager fumbled the snap on the Browns' five-yard line) set up a Rodney Carter one-yard touchdown plunge to make the score 17-7 at the half.

Kosar hit WR-Reggie Langhorne on the second play of the final half on a 10-yard "out" pattern, and Langhorne bounced off three tacklers and jaunted 77 yards for a touchdown. It marked the longest pass play for the Browns in 16 years. Matt Bahr kicked a fourth-quarter 34-yard field goal to complete the scoring.

Six different Browns recorded QB sacks (Mark Harper, Eddie Johnson, David Grayson, Clay Matthews, Bob Golic (one-half) and Michael Dean Perry (one and one-half)), and Minnifield added an interception and held Pittsburgh WR-Louis Lipps to two catches for 40 yards.

(13) **SUNDAY, NOV. 27 — BROWNS 17, Redskins 13 (51,604) at RFK Stadium.** RB-Earnest Byner raced 27 yards for the game-winning touchdown with 1:49 remaining, lifting the Browns to a 17-13 victory over the defending world champion Washington Redskins in a steady rain at RFK Stadium (51,604). The victory marked Cleveland's second straight and improved their record to 8-5, as they rallied from a 10-3 third-period deficit by outscoring the Redskins 14-3 in the fourth quarter.

Byner's touchdown scamper (on a third-and-five and Washington leading, 13-10) came three plays after QB-Bernie Kosar connected with WR-Brian Brennan on a 21-yard pass under extremely heavy pressure from Washington's talented front line. Kosar completed 23 of 36 passes for 219 yard, no TDs, one INT, and was sacked six times. The 25-year old directed the Browns on scoring drives of 50, 76 and 80 yards. FB-Kevin Mack rushed for his ninth career 100-yard game (22 for 116) and scored the Browns' first TD, a one-yard plunge in the fourth quarter. Mack rushed for 46 yards in the fourth quarter. PK-Matt Bahr booted a 37-yard field goal in the second period, atoning for a miss (wide right) from the same distance on Cleveland's opening drive.

The Browns' rushing attack rolled-up 158 yards on 31 carries (5.1 avg.) against the Redskins' second-ranked run defense and controlled time of possession, 38:02 to 21:58. The Browns' defense limited the Redskins to 11 first downs, 227 total net yards, recorded two interceptions (CB-Frank Minnifield and CB-Mark Harper) and shut out the Redskins in the first half. Cleveland suffered a blocked punt following Washington's first touchdown (in the third period), which gave the Redskins the ball at Cleveland's nine-yard line with a 7-3 lead. Washington was held to just a 21-yard field goal by Chip Lohmiller after two running plays and pass into the endzone that was deflected by FS-Felix Wright. Lohmiller hit a 40-yard three-pointer to put Washington ahead 13-10 before the Browns' winning drive.

**(14) SUNDAY, DEC. 4 — BROWNS 24, Cowboys 21 (77,683) at Cleveland Stadium.** For the second straight week, the Browns scored 14 fourth-quarter points and came from behind to defeat an NFC East opponent, as Cleveland improved their record to 9-5 with a 24-21 win over the Dallas Cowboys at Cleveland Stadium. QB-Bernie Kosar (19 of 27, including nine of his first nine, for 308 yards, three TDs, no INTs) led a Browns' offensive attack that relied almost exclusively on the passing game. The Browns' running attack struggled to only 27 yards on 20 carries, with a team-record zero first downs rushing. But Kosar completed passes to eight different receivers and threw TD passes to WR-Clarence Weathers (36 yards), WR-Reggie Langhorne (73 yards) and RB-Herman Fontenot (14 yards). Dallas RB-Herschel Walker gained 134 rushing yards, and QB-Steve Pelluer completed 20 of 32 passes for 247 yards, two TDs and no INTs. But the Cowboys were called for 17 penalties for 142 yards, including two that wiped out successful field goals.

After a FB-Kevin Mack fumble on the game's first play, a 38-yard field goal by K-Roger Ruzek was negated by an illegal hands to the face penalty. LB-Clay Matthews blocked the ensuing 48-yard attempt to deny the Cowboys from a scoring opportunity. Kosar connected with Langhorne on the 73-yard scoring play with 35 seconds remaining in the first period for the game's first score. Dallas scored on their next possession when FB-Darryl Clack caught a seven-yard pass from Pelluer. K-Matt Bahr booted a 25-yard field goal on the Browns' next possession, and then Dallas drove 80 yards in 10 plays, capped by a TE-Steve Folsom five-yard TD reception to give Dallas a 14-10 halftime lead. After a scoreless third quarter, the Browns scored with just nine seconds elapsed in the final quarter when Fontenot scored on a 14-yard reception and run, and then Clarence Weathers made a one-handed 36-yard TD grab following a Dallas fumble. Walker scored on a four-yard TD sweep to pull Dallas to within three, 24-21. Dallas then had the game-tying field goal taken off the board due to penalty, when a 40-yarder with 1:43 remaining was negated to a tripping penalty, and Ruzek's ensuing 50-yard attempt was short.

**(15) MONDAY, DEC. 12 — Dolphins 38, BROWNS 31 (61,884) at Joe Robbie Stadium.** The Browns dropped a 38-31 shootout to the Miami Dolphins in Joe Robbie Stadium before 61,884 fans and a national television audience. Miami QB-Dan Marino became the first quarterback to throw for over 400 yards against Cleveland since Tommy Kramer of the Minnesota Vikings threw for 456 yards at Minnesota on 12/14/80. Marino riddled the Browns' secondary for four TDs among his 30 completions (on 50 attempts) for 404 yards, with three INTs.

Browns' QB-Bernie Kosar (21 of 30 for 202 yards, one TD, no INTs) left the game (to be his last in the '88 season) in the fourth quarter with strained ligaments in his left knee. QB-Don Strock performed brilliantly in relief, connecting on seven of 11 passes for 70 yards, including two TD strikes (three and two yards) to WR-Reggie Langhorne, the last one to knot the score at 31-31 with 59 seconds in the game. But Marino directed a four-play, 65-yard scoring drive in just 25 seconds to drop the Browns to 9-6.

**(16) SUNDAY, DEC. 18 — BROWNS 28, Oilers 23 (74,610) at Cleveland Stadium.** The Browns captured a playoff berth in dramatic fashion by rallying from a 16-point deficit and defeating the Houston Oilers, 28-23. QB-Don Strock reversed the Browns' fortunes by completing 16 of 23 passes for 215 yards, two TDs and no INTs in the second half, after throwing three interceptions and no touchdowns in the first half. The 38-year old veteran ended this snowy day by completing 25 of 42 passes for 326 yards (his second career 300-yard game), two TDs and three INTs. WR-Webster Slaughter caught the game-winning pass from Strock with 7:23 remaining, a 22-yarder to culminate an 11-play, 89-yard drive. Slaughter caught six passes for 136 yards, his fourth career 100-yard game.

The Browns' first three possessions resulted in interceptions and staked the Oilers to a 10-0 lead behind a Tony Zendejas 39-yard field goal and a Domingo Bryant 36-yard interception return for a TD. DE-Micahel Dean Perry scored his first NFL TD when he returned a fumble 10 yards after a jolting sack of QB-Warren Moon (20 of 35 for 287 yards, one TD, no INTs) by LB-David Grayson knocked the ball loose in the second quarter. Two more Zendejas field goals (42 and 35 yards) gave the Oilers a 16-7 halftime lead. Moon threw a seven-yard TD pass to rookie WR-Haywood Jeffries with 5:57 elapsed into the second half to put Houston up, 23-7.

RB-Earnest Byner scored on a two-yard Strock third-quarter pass to top an eight-play, 63-yard drive and then plowed into the endzone from two-yards out with 13:17 remaining to make the score 23-21, Houston. Following a Houston punt, WR-Reggie Langhorne (six catches, 68 yards), caught three passes for 47 yards in the Browns' winning drive, which ended in Slaughter's scoring catch. Houston was forced to punt on their next possession, and the Browns used 4:18 off the clock to preserve the victory.

## WILD CARD PLAYOFF GAME

**SATURDAY, DEC. 24 — Oilers 24, BROWNS 23 (74,977) at Cleveland Stadium.** For the second straight week, the Browns and Oilers met in Cleveland Stadium in a close, dramatic game, but this time the Oilers prevailed, 24-23. QB-Don Strock became the fourth Cleveland quarterback to leave a game with an injury. The 38-year old veteran started in place of Bernie Kosar, who was injured in week 15 vs. Miami, but he injured his hand early in the second quarter trying to recover his own fumble. For the second straight week, the Browns rallied from a deficit, as Houston built a 14-3 second-quarter lead only to see the Browns scratch back to a 16-14 edge behind QB-Mike Pagel. Pagel, who was activated off of injured reserve on 12/23 after suffering a shoulder separation in week six vs. Seattle, completed 17 of 25 passes for 179 yards and two TDs.

The Browns scored first when Matt Bahr booted a 33-yard field goal after FS-Felix Wright intercepted a QB-Warren Moon pass in the Oilers' first possession. Moon was 16 of 26 for 213 yards, one TD, three INTs. The Oilers marched 91 yards in 17 plays to take a 7-3 lead, as Moon hit RB-Allen Pinkett on a 14-yard TD pass. Strock fumbled the first snap on the Browns' ensuing possession (injuring his hand) and on the Oilers' next play, Pinkett swept left for a 16-yard TD run to put Houston on top, 14-3.

Pagel led a 71-yard drive in 13 plays, but the Browns were able to manage only a field goal, as Bahr connected from 26 yards to make the score 14-6, Houston. Bahr kicked his third three-pointer (tying a club playoff record), this from 28 yards, to pull the Browns to within five, 14-9, at the half. Cleveland took a 16-14 lead in the third period, as Pagel threw a 14-yard TD pass to Webster Slaughter with 2:36 remaining in the third quarter. Lorenzo White scored on a one-yard plunge with 12:25 left in the game to put Houston ahead, 21-16, after a 76-yard drive, and Tony Zendejas kicked a 49-yard field goal to increase Houston's lead to 24-16. The Browns scored on Slaughter's second TD from Pagel, a two-yarder, to pull the Browns within one point (24-23), but only 31 seconds remained and a series of unsuccessful onside kicks gave the Oilers the ball, where one play ran out the clock.

- 1946:** Browns were started by owner Arthur (Mickey) McBride as member of the All American Football Conference. Paul Brown was named coach and general manager and the first player he signed was then tailback Otto Graham. The Browns won the Western title with a 42-17 victory over the Buffalo Bisons and then defeated the New York Yankees in the championship game (14-9).
- 1947-49:** Browns continued their domination of the AAFC, winning three more championships.
- 1950:** Following the merger of the AAFC and the NFL, the Browns tied with the New York Giants with 10-2 records for a share of Eastern title. Browns won playoff, 8-3, and then stopped Los Angeles, 30-28, for the championship.
- 1951-53:** Browns won three consecutive Eastern titles, but lost each time in the league's title match. In 1953, McBride sold the club to an organization headed by David Jones.
- 1954-55:** Led by quarterback Otto Graham, the Browns won back-to-back NFL championships.
- 1956:** At 5-7, the Browns suffered first losing season.
- 1957:** Jim Brown was drafted; was named rookie of the year and helped Cleveland to Eastern Division title.
- 1961:** Former television and advertising executive Art Modell bought the Browns.
- 1963:** Blanton Collier, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach.
- 1964:** Browns win division title with 52-20 victory over Giants and captured NFL championship with 27-0 win over Colts.
- 1965:** In what was to be his last season, Jim Brown won NFL MVP honors and led Cleveland to league title game where they were defeated by Green Bay.
- 1966:** An eighth round pick from 1964, Leroy Kelly became the club's dominant threat, rushing for 1,141 yards, but the Browns finished second in their division to Dallas.
- 1968:** With newly acquired quarterback Bill Nelsen (from Pittsburgh), Browns won division; beat Dallas in playoffs and lost to Baltimore in the championship.
- 1969:** Browns won third consecutive division crown, but lost to Minnesota in title game.
- 1970:** Browns became members of AFC Central and finished second.
- 1971:** Nick Skorich, a Browns' assistant, was named head coach. Team won first AFC Central crown.
- 1972:** Browns once again gained postseason, losing to eventual champion Miami in playoffs.
- 1975-77:** Forrest Gregg, Browns' offensive line coach, becomes head coach; Greg Pruitt has three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons; Dick Modzelewski coaches final game of 1977.
- 1978:** Sam Rutigliano becomes the first non-Browns' assistant to gain head coaching position. Team won first three on way to 8-8 finish.
- 1979:** Losses in final two games prevented team from entering playoffs, finishing 9-7; Mike Pruitt keeps the tradition of outstanding Browns' running backs and has the first of three straight 1,000-yard seasons.
- 1980:** Browns win AFC Central title with 11-5 record; lost to eventual Super Bowl champion Oakland in playoff; Brian Sipe is consensus MVP of league.
- 1982:** In strike-shortened season, Browns finish eighth in AFC (4-5) and gain playoffs second time in three years. Lost to Raiders in Super Bowl Tournament.
- 1983:** Browns tied for wildcard playoff spot with 9-7 record, but did not advance, losing to Denver and Seattle through NFL tie-breaking procedure.
- 1984:** Browns replaced head coach Sam Rutigliano with defensive coordinator Marty Schottenheimer after a 1-7 midseason record and finished season at 5-11. TE Ozzie Newsome caught 89 passes for second straight year.
- 1985:** Browns captured their third central division championship, but lost to Dolphins, 24-21, in Miami. Rookie Kevin Mack (1,104) and Earnest Byner (1,002) each gained 1,000 yards rushing. It marked the third time in 66-year history of NFL that teammates both rushed for over 1,000 yards in the same season.

- 1986: Browns won more games than ever before during regular season, as they roll-up a 12-4 record en route to their second consecutive AFC Central crown. In a double-overtime playoff thriller before a packed Cleveland Stadium crowd, Bernie Kosar throws for an NFL-record 487 yards as the Browns beat the New York Jets, 23-20, to advance to the AFC championship game. The Browns lose to Denver, also in overtime, 23-20.
- 1987: Browns capture their third straight AFC Central, as they finished the season 10-5. The third week of the NFL season was cancelled due to the 24-day players' strike, while three "replacement" games were played (the Browns went 2-1). The Browns defeated the Colts, 38-21, at Cleveland Stadium in the AFC playoffs, then drop their second straight AFC Championship to Denver despite a spectacular come-from-behind bid that saw them score 30 second-half points, only to fall, 38-33 in Mile High Stadium. Bernie Kosar wins the AFC passing title with a 95.4 QB rating, and an NFL-high eight Browns make the Pro Bowl.
- 1988: Cleveland finishes 10-6 and earns a Wild Card berth by defeating Houston, 28-33, in the season finale by overcoming a 16-point third-quarter deficit. Houston defeats the Browns, 24-23, in the Wild Card game played on Christmas Eve. Four Cleveland quarterbacks suffered injuries during the course of the season. Marty Schottenheimer resigns on Dec. 27.
- 1989: Owner Art Modell announces Bud Carson as the Browns' seventh fulltime head coach on January 27.

The Cleveland Touchdown Club was founded in 1938 by Joe Fogg and twelve other Cleveland businessmen, whose love for football prompted them to organize a group dedicated to the sport. By the time the Rams departed for Los Angeles in 1946 and the Browns established themselves in Cleveland, that same year, club membership had multiplied twelve times.

Over the years, the TD Club evolved from a college and pro football booster club, to one that also included recognition for outstanding achievements of players and coaches on the high school level. **1989 RULES CHANGES**

Instant Replay will return in 1989 for the fourth consecutive year.

Replay was first adopted in 1986. It is used if there is indisputable visual evidence on videotape of an obvious error by a field official on plays limited to possession and goal line and out-of-bounds decisions.

In other action, a joint proposal by the Long-Range Planning and Finance committees regarding player personnel was adopted. The committees' recommendation for the first time sets offseason roster limits and the creation of a developmental squad. It also addressed roster cutdown dates and injured reserve. The teams agreed:

- Until May 31: No more than 90 players under contract.
- June 1: No more than 80 players under contract.
- Roster cutdown to 60 players after third preseason game (August 29).
- Roster cutdown to 47 players Monday (September 4) prior to regular-season opener.
  - Regular-season game roster of 45 players plus 2 inactive.
  - Developmental squad of 6 players maximum per club established after final cut to 47 and comprised of only rookies/first-year players who have passed through waivers.
    - Players placed on injured reserve during the preseason may not return to same club that year; also may not practice.
    - Players placed on injured reserve after the final cut may return after six games by free reactivation (each club has five) or procedural-recall waivers.
      - Two practice options: Option 1: After four weeks on injured reserve, player can practice for two weeks, then club must waive or activate; Option 2: After six weeks on injured reserve, a player can be activated, waived, or begin unlimited practice. If practicing, player must count against developmental squad total of six.

Also, the clubs approved the following:

- Further clarified the roughing-the-passer rule by prohibiting a defender who has an unrestricted path to the quarterback from flagrantly hitting him in the area of the knees when approaching *from any direction*.
- Specified that fouls which occur in the last five minutes of the fourth quarter as well as the last two minutes of the first half will result in the clock starting on the snap.
  - Called for strong disciplinary measures in cases of feigned injuries.
  - Any entering substitute who participates in a play must enter while the ball is dead and must move onto the field as far as the inside of the field numerals; in addition, the player or players replaced must have cleared the field on their own side (between end lines) prior to the snap or free kick.
  - Established a new set of procedures, including loss of team timeouts or a five-yard penalty on the defense, to handle the problem of crowd noise which prevents the offense from hearing its signals.
  - Further liberalized blocking rule to permit a blocker to initially contact an opponent on or *outside* the opponent's frame of the body so long as the blocker works to bring his hands back on or inside the frame after initial contact.
  - Changed the simultaneous catch rule so that the offensive or defensive player who first controls and continues to maintain control of a pass will be awarded the ball even though his opponent later establishes joint control of the ball.
    - Prohibited the offense, while in the process of substitution or simulated substitution, from rushing quickly to the line and snapping the ball with the obvious attempt to cause a defensive foul. In such an instance, the umpire shall hold the snap, giving the defense a reasonable time to complete its substitution or if a defensive foul results, the flag will be picked up and the down replayed.

**CLEVELAND STADIUM**

Cleveland Stadium, a famous and proud landmark for this city, is the nation's largest facility housing both a Major League baseball team and an NFL franchise. The Stadium, with a current capacity of 80,098, was completed in July of 1931 at a cost of \$3.5 million.

An estimated six-million dollar improvement plan, begun in December of 1988, gives Cleveland Stadium a new look in 1989. Upgrades include: a new scoreboard (including sideboards that continuously update out-of-town scores), a new sound system, 47 color TV monitors located within the concourse, renovation of concession stands and upgraded restroom facilities.

The Stadium, which sits on a landfill, has proved to be multi-purpose. Along with baseball and football, the range of activities at the Stadium has included everything from a heavyweight championship bout (Schmeling vs. Stribling) to religious convocations. The Metropolitan Opera and the Beatles have performed on the field, as have circuses, rodeos, big bands, tractor pulls, and a horde of professional and amateur athletes.

Over the years, the Stadium became a financial strain for the city of Cleveland. Art Modell responded to the need in 1974, when he formed Cleveland Stadium Corporation and signed a 25-year lease with the city. When the agreement between the city and Modell was first reached in 1974, the Browns' owner promised a \$10 million improvement plan, which was concluded in 1984.

Those improvements included the addition of 108 luxurious loges, a computerized scoreboard, more comfortable seats, new concession facilities, a new lighting system (both inside and around the perimeter of the Stadium), out-field fence pads, and the installation of a new playing field, which was lowered two feet to provide a better view from the stands (1976).

Current Cleveland Mayor George Voinovich gives Modell and the Stadium staff the credit for saving the Stadium. "If the city had held onto the Stadium, it probably would be closed today," Voinovich said. (*Cleveland Press*, 3/28/80).

## A PLAYOFF FRANCHISE

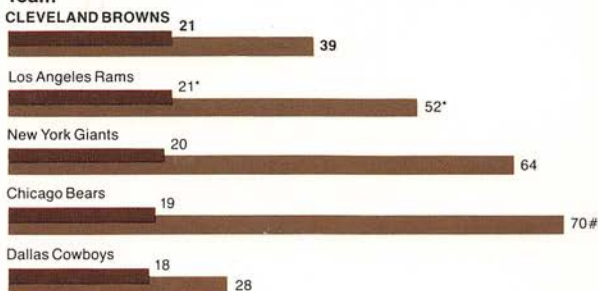
The 1988 Browns were the twenty-first playoff team in the franchise's 39-year NFL history. Only the Rams have enjoyed as many playoff seasons.

The Browns are the only AFC team to advance to postseason play for the past four years (including three division titles: 1985: 8-8; 1986, 12-4; and 1987, 10-5; and a Wild Card berth in 1988, 10-6). Only Chicago and San Francisco can match that streak in the NFC.

The Browns have made the Super Bowl tournament six times in the 1980s (also qualified in 1980 as the division winner and in 1982 during the strike-shortened campaign). The Browns' current string of four straight trips to the postseason is the second-best playoff streak in the franchise's history.
