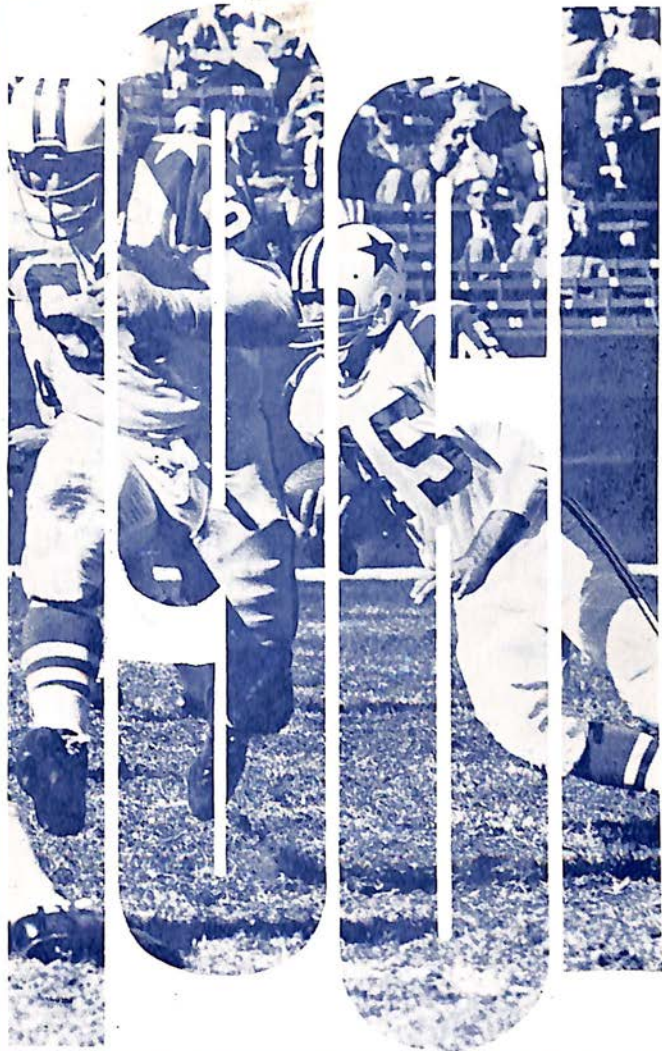

THE COACHES

TOM LANDRY — Head Coach

A native of Texas and a National Football League player and coach of long standing, Tom Landry was a natural choice to coach Dallas' entry in the strongest league in the history of football.

Among Landry's major accomplishments in the Cowboys' first season was a 31-31 tie with his old team, the New York Giants. The Cowboys also held the world champion Philadelphia Eagles to a 27-25 victory, their narrowest winning margin of the entire season.

Born 37 years ago in Mission, Texas, Landry entered the University of Texas in the fall of 1942. His first tenure there was short-lived, however, as he left after one semester to enter the Army Air Corps. He flew 30 combat missions as a B-17 pilot with the Eighth Air Force.

After his discharge in November of 1945, Landry returned to the University of Texas and played football three years. He was a mainstay on the Longhorn team that whipped Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl, 27-7, and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl, 41-28.

Landry met his wife, Alicia, at Texas and they were married in January 1949, four months before he received a bachelor of business administration degree. They have three children—Tom, Jr., age 11; Kitty, 8; and Lisa, 3.

In 1949 Landry joined the old New York Yankees of the All-America Conference as offensive and defensive halfback. When the two leagues merged, he began a 10-year association with the New York Giants. He was an active player from 1950 through '53 and a player-coach in 1954 and '55. In 1956 he became full-time defensive coach and the Giants won the world championship. In the years Landry was their defensive coach, the Giants fashioned a 33-14-1 record in league play.

The Landrys have been Dallas residents since 1957.

BORIS (BABE) DIMANCHEFF — Backfield Coach

Babe Dimancheff is well into his second decade of National Football League duty. He played for seven years and has coached for four.

A native of Indianapolis, Indiana, and a graduate of Purdue, Babe, now 39, began his professional playing career in 1945 as a half-back with the Boston Yanks. He was with the Chicago Cardinals from 1947 through 1950 and was a regular on their championship team of 1947 and '48. He closed out his playing career with the Chicago Bears in 1952.

In 1951 Dimancheff became backfield coach at Butler University, which he had attended before military service in World War II interrupted his college work. He went on to Purdue University in 1953. He coached football at Hamtramck, Michigan, in 1954-56, before joining the Pittsburgh Steelers coaching staff in 1957.

At Purdue, Babe was captain of the 1944 team and was chosen All-America, All-Big Ten, All-Midwest, Most Valuable Player at Purdue and Most Valuable Player in the Big Nine Conference.

He graduated from Purdue in 1945 with a bachelor of science degree and is married to the former Hilda Hine, also a native of Indianapolis.

TOM DAHMS — Defensive Line Coach

Tom Dahms, 34, an All-America tackle at San Diego State College is a veteran of seven years as a player in the NFL.

His early playing and coaching was primarily on the West Coast. He was born in San Diego, attended high school and college there and was line coach at the San Diego Naval Training Center.

When Tom broke into pro football in 1951, it was just up the Pacific Coast a few miles with the Los Angeles Rams. He also played with the Chicago Cardinals and the San Francisco 49ers.

Dahms returned to San Diego after his pro playing days to become athletic director of San Diego Junior High. After one year on that job he took over as line coach at the University of Virginia for one season before joining the Cowboys last year.

BRAD ECKLUND — Offensive Line Coach

A native of Los Angeles, Brad Ecklund came to the Cowboys last year from a line-coaching post at the University of Oregon.

Ecklund, 39, lived in Portland and Milwaukee, Oregon, and attended the University of Oregon one year before entering the Marine Corps in 1941 and serving until 1945.

He played at Oregon from 1946 through 1948, during which time he played in the Cotton Bowl. After finishing college, Brad joined the New York Yankees of the All-America Conference and remained with them the two years they were in the NFL. He was all-pro center in 1950 and 1951 and got his first taste of pro football in Dallas when the club moved to Texas for the 1952 season.

After his playing career ended, Ecklund began coaching in Ore-

gon high schools. His Gresham teams were in the state finals two of his three years there and were league champions all three years. Then he went to Roseberg High School for one year where his team was runner-up to the league champs. For the two years before joining the Cowboys in 1960, he coached at the University of Oregon.

CLINT HOUY — Trainer

A native of Fredericksburg, Texas, Clint Houy has an extensive background as an athletic trainer despite being only 27 years old.

"Pee Wee" Houy started as a student assistant at the University of Texas, where he received his bachelor of science degree in 1955.

His first job was at the Air Force Academy when it opened for the first time in 1955. He fulfilled his military obligation while serving as athletic trainer there and was with the Air Force team that played a scoreless tie with TCU in the 1959 Cotton Bowl game.

With the Ottawa Rough Riders in the Canadian professional league in 1959, Houy returned to his native state to become the Cowboys trainer in 1960.

JACK ESKRIDGE — Equipment Manager

A basketball player who holds one Kansas University scoring record that even Wilt Chamberlain never bettered, Jack Eskridge has been in most every phase of athletics since graduating from high school in Independence, Mo.

The 39-year-old Kansas City, Kan., native played pro basketball for two seasons (1949-50) with the Chicago Stags and Indianapolis Jets of the NBA after playing at Kansas in 1946-47-48. He also coached five years in Iowa and Kansas high schools and five years at Kansas University.

Chamberlain, the Jayhawks' great scorer while Eskridge was an assistant there, never bettered Eskridge's record of 30 points in one half.

"But he came awfully close the night he had 57 in one game," Eskridge recalled. "He had 29 one half and 28 the other."

GIL BRANDT — Player Scouting Director

A native of Milwaukee, Gil Brandt is another 27-year-old who has managed to crowd a maximum of experience into a few years.

This is his seventh season of professional football talent hunting, his fourth year at it on a full-time basis.

After his graduation from the University of Wisconsin in 1954, Gil scouted on a part-time basis for the Los Angeles Rams from 1955 through '57.

In 1958 he became a full-time scout for the San Francisco 49ers and remained with them until joining the Cowboys staff in the winter of 1960.

A Look at the 1961 Season

The Eastern Conference should produce one of the most exciting and evenly-matched races in the 42-year history of the National Football League.

After analyzing last season with other members of the Cowboys coaching staff, I feel that the Cowboys came very close to winning several games last season. A bit more experience in one spot, a bit deeper in personnel in another and we could have turned half a dozen defeats into victories.

Time was our big enemy last season. We've had time to jell now and we've received some outstanding help in off-season trades and through participating in the player draft last winter for the first time.

Of course, the other Eastern Conference teams haven't been standing pat over the winter. The Philadelphia Eagles are the world champions and they're still the team to beat; Cleveland has the best running attack in the league and its No. 1 passer in Milt Plum; St. Louis is a big favorite with a lot of folks because of its devastating running game; the Washington Redskins expect great things from a number of rookies this season and expect continued improvement from Quarterback Ralph Guglielmi; the New York Giants have been top contenders for four years and there's no reason to expect them to slow down now; and Pittsburgh, which beat both Cleveland and Philadelphia last season, will be tough as long as Bobby Layne and Tom Tracy are around.

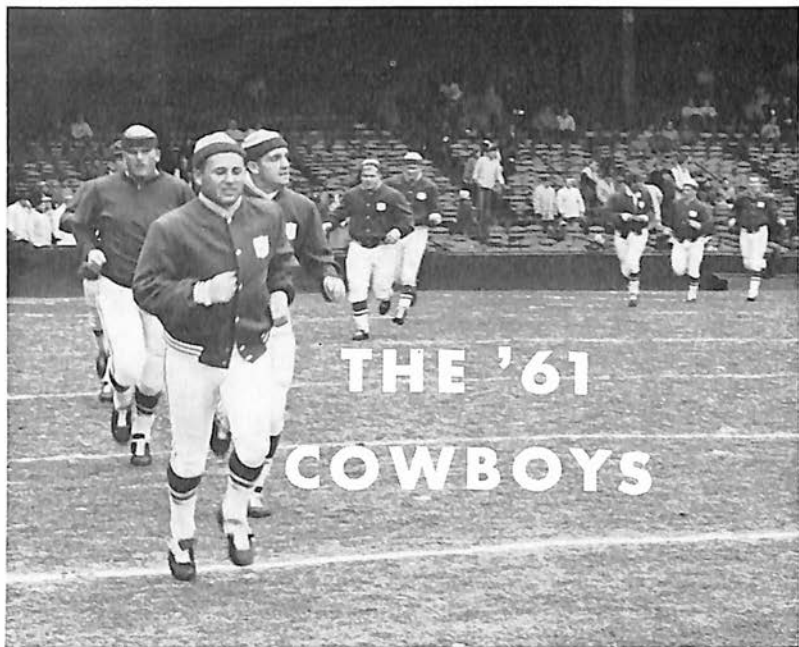
And now for the Cowboys.

We can't help but be improved in many ways. Our running will be improved with the availability of such players as Don Perkins and Amos Marsh. Our passing was good in 1960 and should be even better now that Eddie LeBaron has had time to familiarize himself with his receivers and our system and now that Don Meredith has progressed to the point where he may be able to practically split time with Eddie.

Our defense showed a lot of promise in late season last year and it should be much better this year with that added experience, plus the fact that such outstanding prospects as Dick Moegle and Bob Lilly will be in our defensive unit. Linebacking appears to be especially promising with Jerry Tubbs back from his finest season in 1960, and with Chuck Howley joining us from the Bears.

Like most others, I expect the Eagles, the Browns and the Cardinals to be as tough as any team in either conference. But I think you can expect any of the other Eastern Conference teams to be equally as tough on any given day — and that includes the Cowboys.

A member of the Cowboys' promising young defensive secondary in 1960 . . . came to Cowboys from the New York Giants, where he impressed coaches with his liking for defensive football . . . intercepted two passes last season, was credited with breaking up 11 more, had 19 unassisted tackles and was in on 27 more . . . now makes his home in Dallas . . .

Dick Bielski **Offensive End & Kickoffs** **Maryland**
Height: 6-1 **Weight: 228** **Age: 27** **Eighth Year**

Formerly with Philadelphia, he holds Eagles club record of two 50-yard field goals . . . as a Cowboy, he figured in an all-time National Football League record last season by receiving a 2-inch touchdown pass from Eddie LeBaron, shortest TD pass in NFL history . . . caught four passes for 38 yards while being used primarily as the "short man" in Cowboys' pass patterns . . . makes his off-season home in Maple Shades, N. J. . . .

Don Bishop **Defensive Halfback** **City College of LA**
Height: 6-1 **Weight: 208** **Age: 25** **Third Year**

One of Cowboys' busiest secondary defenders last year, he claimed 32 unassisted tackles, 39 assists, broke up 13 passes and returned three interceptions 13 yards . . . the Los Angeles native played with Chicago Bears in 1959 . . .

Nate Borden **Defensive End** **Indiana**
Height: 6-1 **Weight: 234** **Age: 28** **Seventh Year**

Durable 6-year veteran of the NFL, popular Nate had 14 unassisted tackles and 34 assists last season . . . played first five years of pro football with Green Bay before joining Cowboys in 1960 . . . as a tackle and end at Indiana, he played in 36 straight games . . . a native of Jersey City, N.J., where he was all-state fullback and tackle, he makes his off-season home in Cincinnati, Ohio . . .

Tom Braatz **Linebacker** **Marquette**
Height: 6-2 **Weight: 213** **Age: 27** **Sixth Year**

This well-traveled NFL veteran had 11 unassisted tackles in 1960, 38 assists and intercepted one pass . . . came to the Cowboys from the Washington Redskins, has also been with the Los Angeles Rams and Green Bay Packers . . . switched from end to linebacker as a rookie at Green Bay . . . lives in Milwaukee during off-season . . .

Byron Bradfute **Offensive Tackle** **Mississippi Southern**
Height: 6-3 **Weight: 243** **Age: 24** **Second Year**

A native of Beeville, Texas, big Brad parlayed his tremendous physical strength into a job as starting right tackle . . . he played his college ball at Mississippi Southern after transferring from Abilene Christian College . . . entered the Air Force last spring for six months' active training . . .

Frank Clarke **Wingback** **Colorado**
Height: 6-1 **Weight: 210** **Age: 27** **Fifth Year**

Had amazing record as long receiver for Cowboys last year, catching only nine passes but scoring on three of them and averaging 32.2 yards gained per catch . . . caught touchdown passes of 75, 76 and 32 yards . . . drafted sixth in 1956, playing three seasons at Cleveland before joining Cowboys

. . . competed in football, basketball and track in college . . . makes his off-season home in Cleveland . . . In pre-season action this year began catching short passes extremely well . . .

Mike Connelly **Offensive Center** **Utah State**

Height: 6-3 **Weight: 238** **Age: 25** **Second Year**

Switched positions after playing guard for Cowboys in rookie season of 1960 . . . came to Cowboys from Los Angeles Rams after pre-season schedule was completed . . . lives in Pasadena, Calif., during the off-season . . . Landry forecasts Connelly will become a standout center in the NFL . . .

Andy Cvercko **Offensive Guard** **Northwestern**

Height: 6-0 **Weight: 235** **Age: 23** **Third Year**

Came to Cowboys less than two weeks before NFL opener in trade with Green Bay Packers . . . fifth draft choice in 1958, he was injured before opener in rookie season and didn't play until 1959 . . . three-year starter at Northwestern, "Jiggs" maintained B average in electrical engineering . . . lives in Campbell, Ohio . . .

Arnold (Sonny) Davis **Linebacker** **Baylor**

Height: 6-2 **Weight: 219** **Age: 22** **First Year**

A strong blocker and outstanding pass receiver, he was a two-year All-Southwest Conference performer for Coach John Bridgers at Baylor . . . a graduate of Ray High School in Corpus Christi, he now lives in Jourdanon, Texas and will be 23 years old on Sept. 25 . . . capped off college career with outstanding performances in 1960 Gator Bowl and 1961 Senior Bowl . . . Cowboys' fourth draft choice . . . moved to linebacker in training camp this year.

Jim Doran **Offensive End** **Iowa State**

Height: 6-2 **Weight: 210** **Age: 33** **Eleventh Year**

One of the most remarkable players in the NFL, this veteran led Cowboys receivers last year with 31 receptions for 554 yards and three TD's . . . great hands enable him to make some of the best catches in the NFL . . . was Dallas' representative in the Pro Bowl game last winter . . . has caught 149 passes in last five seasons . . . deceptive speed plus know-how makes him one of the most consistent receivers in the league . . . didn't play football until his sophomore year at Iowa State, but established NCAA record by gaining 203 yards on eight catches against Oklahoma as a junior in 1949 . . . earning early honors in NFL as a tenacious defensive end, he was voted most valuable player by teammates in Lions' championship year of 1952 . . . lives in Paton, Iowa . . .

Merrill Douglas **Fullback** **Utah**

Height: 6-0 **Weight: 204** **Age: 25** **Fourth Year**

One of last players obtained by Cowboys before start of 1961 season, Douglas understudied Rick Casares three years with Chicago Bears . . .

adaptable, shifty runner, he has also played halfback for Bears . . . Bears' sixth draft choice in 1958 . . . lives in Salt Lake City . . .

Mike Dowdle **Linebacker** **Texas**

Height: 6-3 **Weight: 230** **Age: 23** **Second Year**

Former University of Texas standout from San Angelo . . . used primarily on the kickoff-return team last year, running back two for 22 yards . . . moved to linebacker post in camp this year . . . in first pre-season start this year, he turned in fine job as middle linebacker in win over Colts . . . in that game he showed good pass rushing ability, plus excellent pursuit . . .

L. G. Dupre **Offensive Halfback** **Baylor**

Height: 5-11 **Weight: 185** **Age: 28** **Seventh Year**

Came to the Cowboys from the Baltimore Colts . . . the hard-running back from Texas City High School carried 104 times for 362 yards to lead all Cowboy players in rushing . . . he also caught 21 passes for 216 yards and 2 touchdowns . . . joined the Colts on the third round of the 1954 draft . . . he had attracted attention at Baylor by rushing 593 yards for a school record in 1953 . . . originally from New Orleans, a steady performer who rarely fails to pick up that vital first down yardage, even if it means hurtling a pile of enemy linemen . . . now makes Dallas his home . . .

Mike Falls **Offensive Guard** **Minnesota**

Height: 6-1 **Weight: 248** **Age: 27** **Second Year**

The former resident of Bemidji, Minnesota, came to the Cowboys week of the 1960 opening game on waivers from Green Bay Packers . . . was expected to fill in as reserve guard but by mid-season had won starting job at right guard . . . decided to make Dallas his home, worked in Cowboys promotional programs this spring and cemented his claim to being a new citizen of Texas by marrying a Tyler girl last May . . .

Tom Franckhauser **Defensive Halfback** **Purdue**

Height: 6-0 **Weight: 193** **Age: 24** **Third Year**

Considered one of the finest young prospects in the NFL, this ex-Purdue co-captain is a happy combination of speed, receiving ability, competitive spirit and versatility . . . intercepted three passes in 1960, was credited with 23 unassisted tackles, 22 assists and with breaking up 13 passes . . . returned 25 kickoffs an average of 19.8 yards and three punts a total of 28 yards . . . entered the 1960 season as the most experienced member of Cowboys defensive secondary which was made up entirely of rookies and second-year men . . . as a rookie with the Rams in 1959, he intercepted three of the seven passes intercepted by the club . . . was an end at Purdue and voted the squad's most valuable player . . .

Ken Frost **Defensive Tackle** **Tennessee**

Height: 6-4 **Weight: 245** **Age: 22** **First Year**

NCAA's five-year rule made him ineligible for 1961 season at Tennessee . . . held out of competition as a sophomore, he ran into classroom diffi-

Jimmy Harris **Defensive Halfback** **Oklahoma**
Height: 6-1 **Weight: 175** **Age: 26** **Fifth Year**

Remarkable record as quarterback in high school and college . . . quarter-backed Terrell, Texas, High School to state championship in 1953 . . . never played on a losing team at Oklahoma, quarterbacking Sooners to two national championships . . . broke into pro ball as defensive back with the Eagles and went to Rams in trade involving Norman Van Brocklin . . . returned to Oklahoma as coach in 1959 season before Cowboys traded with Rams for him . . . signed with rival Dallas team in AFL in 1960 and sat out part of season in court dispute over contract . . . court ruled in favor of Cowboys this year and Harris adds experience to young secondary . . .

Don Healy **Defensive Tackle** **Maryland**
Height: 6-3 **Weight: 258** **Age: 25** **Fourth Year**

Top line star for College All-Stars against Detroit Lions in 1958 game . . . a member of East team in Shrine game and Senior Bowl, was rated fastest Maryland tackle to enter pro football in recent years . . . originally Cleveland's No. 3 choice, he was traded to the Chicago Bears in 1958 . . . improved steadily through his rookie season, particularly in in-line blocking, pulling, trapping and open field work . . . the Rome, N. Y., native came to the Cowboys from the Chicago Bears and was considered one of brightest defensive linemen with Cowboys last season . . .

Bill Herchman **Defensive Tackle** **Texas Tech**
Height: 6-1 **Weight: 249** **Age: 28** **Sixth Year**

A native of Lubbock, he now makes his home in Dallas after being obtained by Cowboys last year from 49ers . . . before going to San Francisco, he did all his football playing in his home town—at Lubbock High and Texas Tech . . . made 13 tackles, assisted in 38 more and recovered one opponent's fumble for Cowboys in 1960 . . .

John Houser **Center** **Redlands**
Height: 6-4 **Weight: 245** **Age: 26** **Fourth Year**

Played end and fullback at Redlands University and guard and center during the 1958 and '59 seasons with the Los Angeles Rams . . . ~~came to the Cowboys in player pool last year~~ and has played in every league game his teams have played for last two seasons . . . moved from center to guard in camp this year . . . now lives in Van Nuys, Calif. . . . America honorable mention . . . had outstanding performances in North-South Shrine game in 1955 and Senior Bowl game in 1956 . . . will be 27 in November . . . moved to fullback this year . . . native of Nashville, ~~he now makes his year-around home in Dallas~~ . . .

Chuck Howley **Linebacker** **West Virginia**
Height: 6-3 **Weight: 225** **Age: 25** **Third Year**

Acquired this spring in trade with Chicago Bears after being sidelined by injuries last season . . . this former Southern Conference athlete of the year is expected to join Jerry Tubbs and Jack Patera to give the Cowboys one of

the NFL's outstanding linebacking contingents . . . played in Shrine Bowl, Senior Bowl and College All-Star games after completing collegiate career . . . a native of Wheeling, W. Va., he still lives there . . .

Billy Howton

Ninth Year

Second leading pass receiver in NFL history, he signed a three-year contract with Cowboys last winter . . . previously with the Green Bay Packers and Cleveland Browns, he was an All-America end at Rice in 1952 . . . has caught 365 passes for 6,454 yards and 48 touchdowns in NFL, including 23 catches for 363 yards and four TD's last fall after joining Cowboys late in pre-season . . . ranks second among all-time NFL receivers for reception yardage . . .

COWBOYS FAN CLUBS

Dallas fans of the Cowboys have organized two clubs, one for youngsters through high-school age and one for adults. The kids' Cowboys Club has free membership and entitles youngsters to newsletters, free admission to certain practice sessions and other activities. The adult Cowboys Club memberships are \$2 per family. Its features include a Stadium Club where members can relax with snacks and refreshments before and after games, in-season luncheons, admission to certain practice sessions and trips to out-of-town games.

TICKET INFORMATION

Season tickets to the Cowboys' seven home National Football League games sell for \$32.20. All season tickets are reserved and when someone purchases a season ticket, he has the right to claim the same seat in future seasons. He also retains an option on that seat for the Salesmanship Club's pre-season game and championship playoffs. Single-game reserved seat tickets sell for \$4.60, general admission tickets for \$2.75 and student tickets for \$1.00.

The Cowboys' Free Football for Kids Program allows up to five children 14 years of age or younger to accompany each adult who buys a \$2.75 general admission ticket.

HALFTIME SHOWS

This is the schedule for halftime activities at the Cowboys' 1961 home games:

Steelers Game—Sept. 17

Music Day with the Cowboys will feature four outstanding high school bands from the Dallas-Fort Worth area—Brewer of Fort Worth, Irving, Mexia and Plano. Each band will give a four-minute demonstration of precision drilling and at the finish the bands will serenade in mass formation.

Vikings Game—Sept. 24

The Cowboys offer a salute to the Rose Capital of the World—Tyler, Texas. Taking part in the activities will be the Tyler Junior College band, the Apache Belles drill team from Tyler Junior College, the 1961 Rose Queen's Court and the Tyler Clown Club. The latter is a group of Tyler men whose routines are similar to those of circus clowns.

Giants Game—Oct. 15

Circus Day with the Cowboys will include acts by professional circus performers with the Gil Gray International Circus and by amateurs from Dallas. This will include floats, elephants, horses and ponies. Also on hand will be the 30-member Oglewanagi Indian Dancers, the state champion Indian dance group from Mexia, Texas

Eagles Game—Oct. 22

Appearing for the second straight year with the Cowboys will be the Galveston Ball High School band and Tornettes, a 100-member drill team. This group will also appear at the 1962 Sugar Bowl game in New Orleans for the second time.

Cardinals Game—Nov. 5

A Salute to the Armed Forces is the theme of this show. High school and college bands and military drill teams will perform precision drills and feature military music.

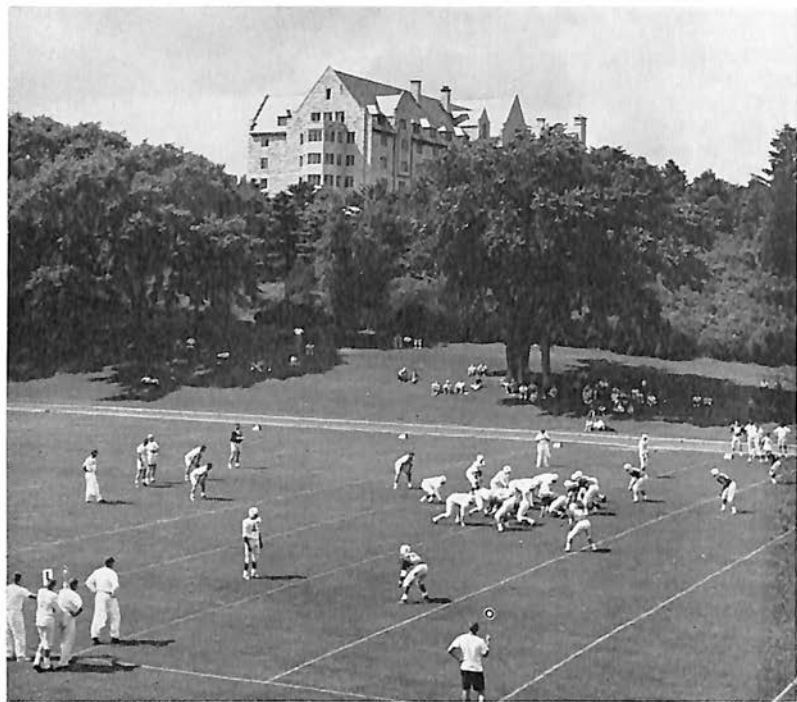
Redskins Game—Nov. 19

The area finals of the Pass, Punt and Kick contest will be staged on the Cotton Bowl turf. The Dallas winners' distances will be measured against other area winners to determine national champions. The Arlington State College and Arlington High School bands will also perform.

Browns Game—Dec. 3

The Kermit and Odessa High School bands, two of the nation's outstanding aggregations, will present a Salute to High School Bands Across the Country. COWBOYS PRE-SEASON

The Dallas Cowboys ushered in their second season in the National Football League by training at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn., and also ushered the Minnesota Vikings into existence by playing them in the Vikings' first game in history.

Results of the Cowboys' pre-season games in 1961:

COWBOYS 38, VIKINGS 13

At Sioux Falls, S.D.—Don Meredith and Eddie LeBaron riddled Vikings defense for 241 yards and three touchdowns passing. L.G. Dupre gained 48 yards on eight carries. Frank Clarke caught four passes for 54 yards and two touchdowns.

PACKERS 30, COWBOYS 7

At Dallas — Jim Taylor rushed for 112 yards, Bart Starr completed 14 of 24 passes for 188 yards and one touchdown as the Western Conference champions won easily in the Cowboys first Cotton Bowl appearance of the year. The Cowboys touchdown came on an 80-yard pass from Eddie LeBaron to Frank Clarke. Clarke caught six for 140 yards.

GIANTS 28, COWBOYS 10

At Albuquerque, New Mexico — Eddie LeBaron quarterbacked the Cowboys the entire game as Don Meredith sat out with a sore arm. LeBaron hit 13 of 27 for 171 yards, but Giants held Cowboys to 134 yards rushing. Rookie Bob Gaiters rushed seven times for 32 yards and caught three passes for 41 to pace Giants attack.

COWBOYS 35, COLTS 24

At Norman, Okla. — Don Meredith and Amos Marsh starred in big stunner of pre-season schedule. Meredith hit 15 of 26 for 224 yards and four touchdowns. Marsh gained 41 yards on six carries, caught four passes for 93 yards. Cowboys intercepted four Johnny Unitas passes, two by Tom Franckhauser.

49ERS 24, COWBOYS 10

At Sacramento, Calif. — The Cowboys looked down the barrel of the 49ers' shotgun offense without the services of three defensive starters. The 49ers took the advantage in the second period after intercepting a pass when the Cowboys drove inside their 10-yard line. The Cowboys suited out only four defensive backs as Tom Franckhauser and Jimmy Harris were injured. Linebacker Jerry Tubbs also missed the game.

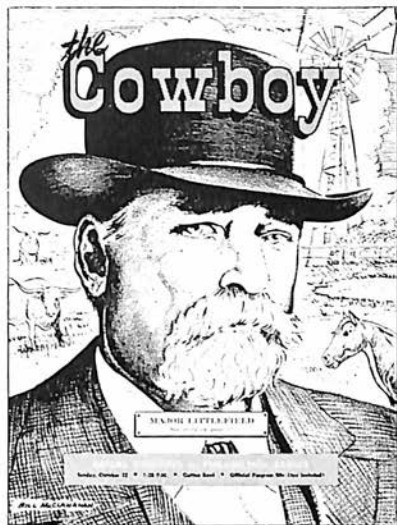

THE COWBOY



The Dallas Cowboys' 1961 game programs feature the cattlemen and cowboys who contributed to the colorful history of the Southwest area which the Cowboys represent in the National Football League.

The cover of each program through the '61 season will be a portrait of a famous Texas cattleman or cowboy—such men as Charles Goodnight, the Pitchfork Kid, Scandalous John Selman, Texas Ranger Capt. Tom Hickman. Inside the program, a page will be devoted to a biography of the individual with some earthy anecdotes about his life and adventures.

Two leaders in their respective fields, Texas Historian Frank X. Tolbert and Sports Cartoonist Bill McClanahan, combine their talents to bring this touch of Texas history to Cowboys fans.

Tolbert is the author of several books of fact and fiction on the days of the old West. His down-to-earth column, "Tolbert's Texas," is a favorite of readers of the Dallas Morning News. He is also the author of the story "Melody Jones," which was made into a very successful motion picture several years ago.

McClanahan's sports cartoons appear regularly in the Dallas News and his work has adorned athletic publications across the country for many years.

The Cowboys are making these eight program-cover drawings (the seven league games and the pre-season Salesmanship Club game) available at the end of the season for \$1.00 a set. The printing will be removed to make them suitable for framing, since they carry historical significance for the people of Texas.
