There are three men with the Dallas Cowboys today who were with them when Clint W. Murchison Jr. was awarded an expansion franchise in 1960 — President and General Manager Texas E. Schramm, Head Coach Tom Landry and Vice President Gil Brandt.

Schramm controls the day-to-day operations of the club. He was named President in 1966, retaining the title of General Manager.

Brandt, who directs the Cowboys' scouting operation, was named Vice President for Personnel Development in 1971. He assumed additional duties, including the signing of all veteran players, when Al Ward left the Cowboys in early 1975 to become General Manager of the New York Jets.

Schramm, a graduate of the University of Texas, joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director in 1947. In a 10-year career with the Rams he rose to General Manager.

Tex left the Rams in 1957 to join CBS as Assistant Director of Sports and was there when brought to Dallas by Murchison.

Aside from the development of the Cowboys, Schramm's foremost achievements have included his work with scouting systems, both with the Rams and Cowboys, and the merger of the NFL and AFL. Schramm and Kansas City Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt played the major roles in the merger.

Brandt pioneered many of the scouting techniques used by most clubs today. He may have been the first to look seriously at basketball players and trackmen as prospective NFL stars.

A native of Milwaukee and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Gil was a part-time scout with the Rams (and a baby photographer in Milwaukee) when he showed the flair for discovering talent that led him to Dallas.

THE COACH



"You've got to pay an awful price to win," says Tom Landry. "You've got to pay the price to get ready to win."

"If you're not willing, you lose."

The 1974 season was not a happy time for Landry, his coaching staff and his team. After a record eight consecutive years in the playoffs and six straight seasons of 10 or more victories, the Cowboys fell to 8-6 and failed to qualify for post-season play.

"Maybe the feeling of being successful too long will tend to make people average pretty quickly," said the only head coach in Cowboys history. "Maybe you have to see how it feels to be down before you can come back again."

"The only value of a season like ours comes if the team becomes more hungry than it was the year before. We didn't have a losing season, but we were out of the playoffs and out of the money."

"If that means enough to the players, they'll come back."

Landry, despite all of his team's successes, knows full well how it feels to be down and hungry. The first edition of the Cowboys, in

1960, finished 0-11-1. The team didn't finish above .500 until 1966 when the string of playoff appearances began.

Beginning with that 1966 campaign, and heading into the '75 season, the Landry-Dallas record was 91-33-2. His 15-year career record of 116-86-6 placed Tom ninth among the NFL's all-time winningest coaches and third among the active coaches.

One of his players, defensive end Larry Cole, has been observing Landry since 1968 and has this to say:

"People see Tom in a press conference or on the sidelines and think he's unemotional. Really, he's an emotional guy who is able to control it.

"Get him in a situation like the week ahead of a really big game and you see his competitive spirit come out. It's interesting to see the fighter in him that emerges. He's smiling more, mainly, having fun in a competitive way."

For Landry, the fun is in the competition.

"The world doesn't stop when you lose," he says. "You must think about the good things that have happened to you. You must look ahead. The only way a person can really become strong is to have setbacks.

"But if you think winning is not too important, then you are not willing to pay the price to win. This game is played with the heart."

* * * * *

Tom was born in Mission, Tex., on Sept. 11, 1924. He was an All-Regional fullback at Mission High before enrolling at the University of Texas.

After one semester at Texas, Landry went into the Air Corps and flew 30 B-17 missions over Germany with the Eighth Air Force.

Following his discharge as a 1st Lieutenant in November of 1945, Tom returned to Texas where he earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a junior and co-captained the Longhorns as a senior. Those Texas teams defeated Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl.

Landry joined the old New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949, moving to the Giants in 1950. He was a mainstay in the Giants' defensive backfield through 1955, the last two years as player-coach. He was All-Pro in 1954.

Retiring as a player following the 1955 season, Tom was the Giants' defensive coach through 1959. Giants Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called him "the best defensive coach in the business."

Tom and his wife Alicia, whom he met at Texas, have three children — Tom Jr., 25; Kitty, 22, and Lisa, 17.

Tom devotes much of his spare time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and is serving as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the National FCA. He also has served as chairman of the State American Cancer Society, and as area chairman for the All-American Roundup of the Boy Scouts of America.

The coach has received honorary degrees from California Lutheran College (Doctor of Humane Letters), John Brown University (Doctor of Humanities) and Southwest Baptist College (Doctor of Laws).

ERMAL ALLEN, Special Assistant

Allen is the "inside man" on the Dallas coaching staff, heading the Cowboys' Research and Development Department in its study and evaluation of all players and teams in the NFL.

Ermal quarterbacked the University of Kentucky from 1939 through 1941 and played on the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II. After the war he spent one year in the old All-America Conference as a Cleveland Browns defensive back in 1947.

Allen returned to his alma mater in 1948 and remained there as an assistant coach for 14 years under Paul Bryant ('48-'53) and Blanton Collier ('54-'61). He joined the Cowboys in 1962 and, along with Offensive Coordinator Jim Myers, is a senior member of Tom Landry's staff.

Ermal, born on Christmas Day, 1920, is the best golfer in the Cowboys organization. He is a two-time Kentucky Amateur champion, defeating Bobby Nichols in 1955 and Frank Beard in 1958.

Ermal and his wife Allie have a son, two daughters and five grandchildren.

MIKE DITKA, Special Teams • Tight Ends

Ditka joined the Cowboys staff in 1973 after 12 years in the NFL, the last four of them with Dallas.

Everybody's All-America at the University of Pittsburgh, Mike became the prototype of the modern tight end after the Chicago Bears drafted him No. 1 in 1961. His career totals show 427 receptions for 5,913 yards and 43 touchdowns.

The Aliquippa, Pa., native (10/18/39) always was noted for his aggressiveness on the field, and he admits that attitude carries over into his coaching.

Mike has three sons and a daughter.

ED HUGHES, Quarterbacks • Wide Receivers

When Tom Landry named Hughes offensive backfield coach in 1973, it marked a reunion for the two. Landry coached Hughes from 1956 through 1958 when Ed played cornerback for the New York Giants.

HUGHES, Cont.

Hughes is the most experienced pro coach on Landry's staff. He was with the Dallas Texans (1960-62), the Denver Broncos (1963), the Washington Redskins (1964-67) and the San Francisco 49ers (1968-70) before becoming head coach of the Houston Oilers for the 1971 season. He was with the St. Louis Cardinals in '72.

Ed played offensive and defensive halfback at Tulsa and was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1954. He spent two seasons with the Rams before moving to the Giants in '56.

A native of Buffalo, N. Y. (10/23/27), Ed and his wife Nancy have four daughters and a son.

JIM MYERS, Offensive Coordinator • Offensive Line

Jim is in his 14th season with the Cowboys, joining Tom Landry's staff in 1962 after head coaching stints at Iowa State and Texas A&M.

Concentrating on the offensive line, Myers' tutelage has paid off in All-Pro recognition for tackles Rayfield Wright and Ralph Neely and guards John Niland and Blaine Nye.

Myers is a native of Madison, W. Va. (11/12/21), who was a standout lineman at Tennessee in 1941-42 and at Duke in the Marine V-12 program in 1943.

Jim was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA before becoming a head coach. He and his wife Carolyn have three daughters and four grandchildren.

DAN REEVES, Offensive Backs

After a year in private business in Dallas, Dan returned in 1974 to the organization where he was a talented and popular mainstay for eight years.

Reeves was a Cowboy running back for seven seasons (1965-71) and, despite a series of knee injuries, rose to the fifth spot among all-time Dallas rushing leaders. He was a player-coach in '70 and '71 and coached the offensive backfield in 1972.

Dan is a native of Rome, Ga., (1/19/44) who quarterbacked South Carolina for three years. He signed with the Cowboys as a free agent in 1965.

Dan and his wife Pam have two daughters and a son.

ALVIN ROY, Conditioning

Alvin joined the staff in 1973 after earlier stints with the San Diego Chargers and Kansas City Chiefs. The Cowboys feel it is no coincidence that while following Roy's conditioning program they outscored opponents 122-59 in the fourth quarter in 1973 and 96-29 in the fourth quarter in 1974.

Alvin trained or managed several weightlifting teams in international competition, including the American team which won the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki.

A native of Baton Rouge, La., (4/20/20), Roy owns a health studio there and has had 2 TV shows on an NBC outlet for 15 years. He has two daughters, Astrid and Jo Ann.

GENE STALLINGS, Defensive Backfield

Gene returned to full-time duty as defensive backfield coach in '74 after doubling as coach of the special teams for the last half of the '73 season. His work with the special teams was credited with giving the Cowboys the boost they needed to reach the playoffs.

Stallings, in his fourth year with the club, is a Paris, Tex., native (3/2/35) who spent seven years as head coach at Texas A&M.

He was an All-Southwest Conference end at A&M under Paul Bryant and was a tri-captain on Bryant's undefeated 1956 team. After one season as student assistant at A&M, Gene moved with Bryant to Alabama and was assistant head coach there when the chance came to return to his alma mater in 1965.

Gene and his wife Ruth Ann have four daughters and a son.

ERNIE STAUTNER, Defensive Coordinator • Defensive Line

Since Ernie joined the Dallas staff in 1966, the Cowboys have led their league or conference in rushing defense six out of nine years. The "Doomsday Defense" began to assert itself almost from the day Stautner arrived on the scene.

A star defensive tackle with the Pittsburgh Steelers for 15 years, despite being "only" 6-0 and 235 pounds, Ernie was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame immediately upon becoming eligible in 1970. He played in nine Pro Bowl games.

Ernie is a native of Calm, Bavaria (4/2/25), who grew up in Albany, N. Y. After serving in the Marine Corps from 1943 through 1946 he was a football star at Boston College.

Ernie has a son and two daughters.

JERRY TUBBS, Linebackers

Jerry is the only "original" Cowboy player still with the organization. He came to the club in 1960 as a middle linebacker and played in Dallas for eight years before joining the coaching staff in 1968.

Born in Breckenridge, Tex., on Jan. 23, 1935, Jerry was an All-

America center-linebacker for the 1954-56 Oklahoma teams that never lost a game. He received the Walter Camp Award as the nation's outstanding player in '56.

Jerry was the No. 1 draft choice of the Chicago Cardinals in 1957 and also played for the San Francisco 49ers before settling in Dallas in '60.

Jerry and his wife Marlene have a son and a daughter.

DON COCHREN, Trainer

Don is in his 11th season with the Cowboys, joining the club in 1965 after experience in college, military and Canadian football training.

A graduate of Purdue, Don earned his physical therapy certificate at Pennsylvania. The 43-year-old Cochren spent two years as trainer at Case Institute in Cleveland, four years with the Toronto Argonauts and two years as a physical therapy officer in the Air Force.

Don and his wife Imogene have two daughters and two sons.

KEN LOCKER, Assistant Trainer

Locker is in his third season as assistant trainer after serving from 1969 through 1972 in the North Texas State University athletic department.

Ken, 23, was an assistant trainer at North Texas and also put in some time as interim head trainer when the Eagles' Skip Cox left to become Baylor's trainer. During the past off-season he was trainer for World Championship Tennis.

BUCK BUCHANAN, Equipment Manager

Buchanan joined the Cowboys in 1973 after 20 years in the Air Force, with most of that time spent supervising and maintaining military athletic programs.

For four years, SMSgt. Buchanan was Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Athletics and Programs at the U. S. Air Force Academy Prep School in Colorado Springs. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his performance during a 1968-69 tour of duty in Thailand.

Buck, 42, and his wife Geraldine have a son and daughter.

Jim Arneson • 64

CENTER-GUARD • ARIZONA • 3rd YEAR
HT: 6-3 • WT: 252 • BORN: 1/7/51 • (D-12 FOR '73)

PRO: Arneson may have saved the day for the Cowboys in 1974's "miracle" 24-23 victory over the Redskins. Playing guard, he was stunned on the play just before Clint Longley's game-winning pass to Drew Pearson. Jim was on his hands and knees several yards behind the line of scrimmage as the Cowboys, with no timeouts left, started to line up. Somehow, Arneson made it to his position, Walt Garrison told him who to block, and Longley completed the pass. Jim played in all 14 games, seeing action on the special teams and at guard and center.

COLLEGE: Jim was an All-Conference selection at Arizona, where his older brother Mark, now with the St. Louis Cardinals, was an All-America linebacker.

PERSONAL: Jim, his wife Terry and son Ryan Anthony (5/6/75) live in Dallas where in the past off-season he worked for the Olin-American Construction Co. Jim also is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

PRO: Austin played nine games with the Green Bay Packers in 1973 after being drafted in the eighth round. In 1974, he was with Portland in the World Football League and Cowboys scouts regarded him as "the best defensive back in the WFL." Tom Landry said Austin would battle Benny Barnes and Mark Washington for the starting left cornerback spot this season.

COLLEGE: In addition to his football activities, Hise was a star track man at Prairie View A&M where he anchored the mile relay team to an NCAA record.

PERSONAL: A native of Houston, Hise and his wife Pamela still make that city their off-season home.

PRO: Barnes had moved into the starting left cornerback position late last season when he broke an ankle vs. Cleveland in game No. 13. Benny recovered completely from that setback, and was ready to battle for his spot again this year. "Barnes is the best technique man we have at the left corner," says Tom Landry. A safety in college, Benny says, "I feel comfortable at safety. But the cornerback position is the greatest challenge. It takes confidence that you can handle it before you can even start to play there. I think I've got the confidence now." The versatile Barnes captained the Cowboys special teams in '74, and caught a 37-yard pass from Duane Carrell on a fake punt against the Redskins.

PERSONAL: A native of Lufkin, Tex., Benny and his wife Joyce live in Milpitas, Calif.

PRO: Carrell was signed as a free agent after the seventh game of the '74 season, and promptly put the Cowboys' punting game in shape. In his first game, a 17-14 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals, Duane averaged 41 yards on eight punts with three of them going out of bounds or being downed inside the 10-yard line. He was named the game's Most Valuable Player. "I thought he was fantastic," said Tom Landry. Carrell was the punter for the Jacksonville Sharks in the World Football League, and when that team folded the Cowboys latched onto him. A solid athlete, Carrell surprised the Washington Redskins with a 37-yard pass to Benny Barnes on a fake punt.

COLLEGE: A 1971 graduate of Florida State, Duane was a punter-placekicker for the Seminoles.

PERSONAL: Duane is a native of Washington, D. C., who persisted in his pursuit of a pro football career despite unsuccessful trials with the Redskins and Cardinals. He and his bride Gloria live in Dallas where Duane spent the off-season as Sports Director for the Richardson YMCA.

Despite only 16 carries in '74, Dennison scored four touchdowns. He accelerated his off-season program last spring and found himself in solid contention for a starting job.

PRO: No one gave Edwards much of a chance to make the Cowboys squad in 1962 when he arrived in camp as a free agent receiver from Auburn. Sure enough, he didn't. But he came back in 1963, was switched to linebacker and stuck. Two years later he was a starter and no one has been able to move Dave out of there since. "Edwards has been a fixture at strongside linebacker for a long time," said Tom Landry when discussing his lineup for 1975. "It's going to take a pretty good effort by someone to beat him out." The challengers come and go, and when the dust clears there's Edwards doing his job. He is a competitor. "Unless you want to lead a miserable life," says Dave, "you better win. If you don't, every time you go in a coffee shop, every time you go in a store, every time you go outside, people ask you, 'What happened?' The only thing that's satisfactory is to win. PRO: Fritsch missed the entire 1974 season after a knee injury suffered at New Orleans in a pre-season game required surgery. He worked hard at rehabilitating the knee (the non-kicking left knee) and by the spring of '75 rated himself 100 per cent fit. "I know I'll be back," he said. 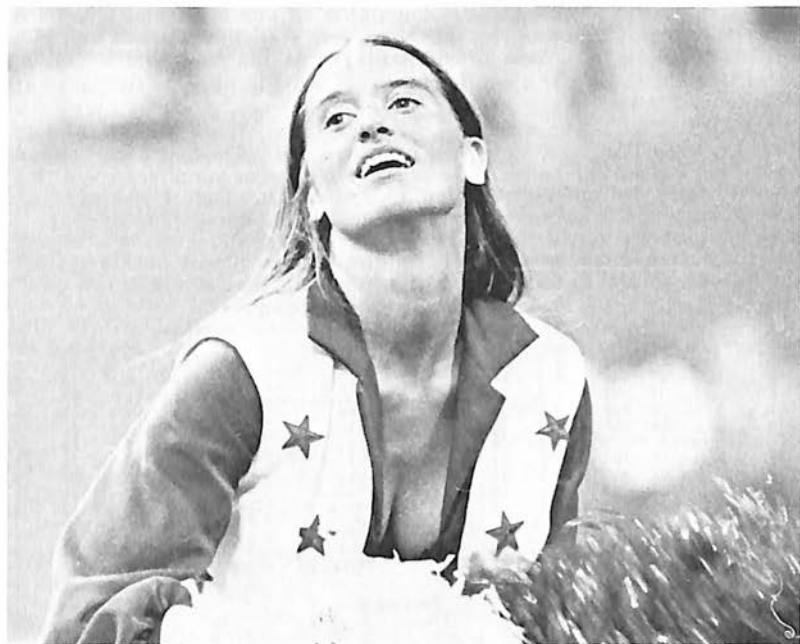

On June 21, back in Dallas, Walt underwent surgery for torn ligaments in his left knee. The prognosis: six weeks in a cast and a minimum of three months before he could return to action on the football field. Three days later, Garrison left the hospital on his own and a week later he was at the Cowboys practice field, whittling and trading stories, his cast propped up on a chair. The injury caused Tom Landry to revise his thinking about training camp and the pre-season. Although Robert Newhouse was expected to seriously challenge Garrison for the starting fullback job, Walt had figured heavily in the plans no matter what happened. "We feel Walt can still play solid football for us," Landry had said. "Whether he plays regularly again this year, or whether we use him in in-and-out situations, he will contribute to our team and will be a good leader." Garrison is the Cowboys' No. 3 all-time rusher and No. 4 all-time receiver, a smart, tough player at his best in the clutch.

COLLEGE: Walt was a two-time All-Big Eight fullback at Oklahoma State.

PERSONAL: A native of Lewisville, Tex., Walt lives in Dallas with his wife Pam and sons Philip Martin (6/5/69) and Carl Benton (1/2/74). In addition to his rodeoing, Walt is an accomplished whittler of intricately designed objects, animals, etc. "One time I was heading for an airplane," he says, "with 17 whittling knives in my bag. I was worried about the scanner picking 'em up and getting stopped, but they were going through OK and my western belt buckle set off the buzzer. It like to took us forever to get all that straightened out."

PRO: When it comes time to pick an All-Time All-Cowboys team, the selectors will have a difficult time not choosing Green at two positions. He was a four-time All-Pro at left cornerback, switched to strong safety in 1970 and two seasons later played in the Pro Bowl at his new position. Heading into the '75 season he had played in 182 consecutive games, never missing one since signing as a free agent basketball player in 1962. Cornell's experience is invaluable to young Cowboys trying to learn Tom Landry's intricate defense. "One thing it took me a while to learn," Green says, "is that in our defense you don't chase the ball. Just stay in your area, and if everybody does their job, the ball will come back to you. Saved me a lot of steps in 13 years." Landry has so much confidence in Cornell's ability and savvy that he was considering Green as the possible answer at weakside linebacker for 1975 before it was learned D. D. Lewis was returning. Positive thinking is Cornell's trademark. "I've never been beaten," he once told a reporter. "Never?" said the astonished sportswriter. "Well, maybe once or twice," said Green. "But I talk myself out of it before I get off the field."

COLLEGE: Cornell averaged more than 20 points a game in his three varsity basketball seasons at Utah State. He was a three-time All-Skyline Conference choice and an All-America as a sophomore.

PERSONAL: Cornell, his wife Betty and sons Randy (9/11/62) and Ronney (3/7/67) live in Dallas where he has spent five off-seasons working in the Cowboys' scouting department. Cornell was born in Oklahoma City and grew up in Richmond, Calif., where he was an all-star football fullback and basketball player in high school. One of his four brothers, Pumpsie, was a major league baseball player.

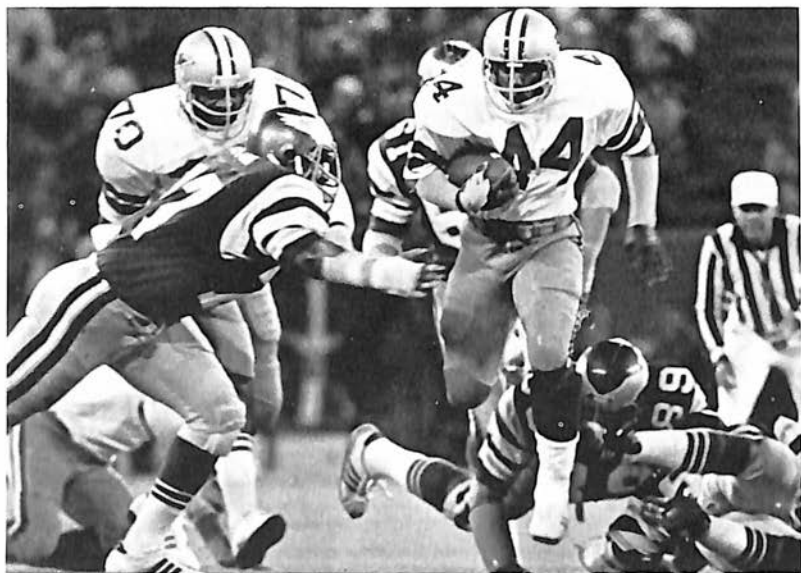

"I think Cliff will continue to improve, and as he does there will be no better free safety in the league." Harris is known as a violent hitter. He once described those on-field collisions as "exuberating." Teammate Golden Richards last season presented Cliff with a yellow crash helmet featuring a siren and a flashing red light on top. "I just want to know when Cliff is coming my way in practice," said Richards. Says Harris, "Many of those backs will outweigh me 20-30 pounds. What I try to do is find a spot — about their numbers — and hit that spot with all the force I have. If I just grab somebody around the shoulder pads and throw them down they won't even know I'm around." Cliff has been the starting free safety since the first game of his rookie season.

COLLEGE: Ignored in the 1970 draft, Harris was signed as a free agent by the Cowboys after they watched two films of him playing defensive back and returning punts. Ouachita (WASH-e-taw) Baptist College is in Arkadelphia, Ark.

PERSONAL: Cliff, who earned his BA in Math and Physics at Ouachita, spent the off-season working toward a Masters in Environmental Biology at Southern Methodist. He eventually hopes to work with government and industry in seeing that "progress doesn't upset the balance of nature." Cliff and his wife Linda live in Dallas. He's a native of Fayetteville, Ark.

"I've always been very reluctant to even partially compare anybody to Bob Lilly," says Defensive Coordinator Ernie Stautner, himself a Hall of Famer. "But Too Tall has the potential to be as good as Bob. It's all there within him." Teammate Ralph Neely, after a training camp scrimmage: "Too Tall is something else. One time I tried to block him and he just threw me like I was a tulip." Jones distinguished himself as a conscientious, hard worker who is all business when he pulls on his helmet. "This is serious to me," he says. "I smile and laugh a little, but not around the football field."

COLLEGE: An All-American at Tennessee State, Jones got his nickname from a teammate at the Nashville school. "It got so people we played against wouldn't try to throw to the side of the field he was on," said Tennessee State Coach John Merritt. Ed also played two years of college basketball.

PERSONAL: Ed was strictly a basketball player until his senior year at Merry High School in Jackson, Tenn. He turned to football "when the officials wouldn't let me play my game. I always had four fouls in the first half." A bachelor, Too Tall lived in Jackson during the off-season.

PRO: Jordan showed no signs of letting up as he prepared for his 13th NFL campaign, the coaches praising the veteran for his leadership in the Cowboys' off-season conditioning program. "All men may be created equal," said the league's smallest middle linebacker, "but some are just more equal than others. Extra work can give me an edge out there." Vikings guard Ed White describes Lee Roy this way: "What Jordan lacks in size, he makes up in determination and quickness and strength. He is strong, one of the most difficult middle linebackers for me to block." Jordan intercepted two passes in '74 to run his career total to 26 and move past Chuck Howley into the No. 3 spot on the Cowboys' all-time list of interception leaders. Heading into the '75 season Lee Roy ranked second, behind the Redskins' Dave Robinson, in interceptions among active linebackers. The years have not dimmed Jordan's enthusiasm for the physical aspects of the game. "I'm not a mean player," he said. "I like to think I'm aggressive. If I take a fair shot at a man it reflects my dedication. I try to hit him as hard as I can because he would do the same to me. That's what this game is about — hitting." And, "To me a football game is like a day off. I grew up picking cotton on my daddy's farm, and nobody asked for your autograph or put your name in the paper for that."

COLLEGE: Lee Roy, everybody's All-America at Alabama, was named the nation's outstanding lineman in 1962. He made 31 tackles against Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl following that season.

PERSONAL: A native of Excel, Ala., Lee Roy and his wife Biddy live in Dallas with sons David (12/8/65), Patrick Lee (5/23/68) and Christopher (5/5/73). Lee Roy is associated with the Dallas real estate firm of Williams, Gray, Evans, Sherer & Co.

Linebackers Coach Jerry Tubbs adds, "I'm not just saying he is a steady linebacker. I'm saying he can be a very good one."

COLLEGE: D. D. made All-Southeastern Conference twice at Mississippi State, and as a senior was All-America and conference Defensive Player of the Year. He weighed 210 in college, and one scout described him as "pound for pound maybe the best player in the country."

A national television audience watched Clint complete 11 of 20 passes for 203 yards and two touchdowns, including a last-minute 50-yarder to Drew Pearson that beat the Redskins, 24-23. It was his first NFL game. "Clint has incredible ability," says Tom Landry. "He's too young to read defenses correctly, but he has a special football sense. He's going to be a good one." Safety Cliff Harris describes Longley's unorthodox style: "He looks one way and throws sidearm in another direction. In practice, guys pull muscles trying to go where he's throwing the ball." Said Longley, when asked if the Washington game had changed his life-style: "I get a few more phone calls, and I get a few more letters. And I get to shower with the veterans. But that's about all."

COLLEGE: Clint led the nation's small colleges in total offense as a senior at Abilene Christian, completing 195 of 360 passes for 3,167 yards and 28 touchdowns and rushing for another 251 yards. The Cincinnati Bengals picked him in the supplemental draft in the spring of '74 when it was learned he planned to pass up a possible final year of eligibility at ACC. The Cowboys acquired Longley several weeks later for a fifth-round draft choice in '75.

PERSONAL: A bachelor, Clint lives in Dallas but still manages to pursue his favorite hobby — rattlesnake hunting. His nickname, "Mad Bomber", was acquired in his rookie training camp because of incidents like one of his errant passes hitting Tom Landry's coaching tower.

Even though troubled by a series of injuries since 1971, Lilly extended his club record to 196 consecutive regular season games. "Injuries have limited him in the past few seasons," said Defensive Coordinator Ernie Stautner. "But when I regraded films last winter I still saw him do some amazing things. He graded exceptionally high again." Fran Tarkenton, after Lilly spent much of the afternoon in the Vikings' backfield last season, said: "Mr. Lilly sure was good today. I like to see the old-timers play good, and he sure did today." Lilly, who set standards of excellence at defensive tackle that may never be surpassed, took a long look at the situation during the off-season. "The past couple of seasons have left a bad taste in my mouth," he said. "I didn't compete the way I could have or should have. I have to decide if my body's going to hold out and if I'm going to be able to compete the way I should again." When he was able to go at full speed, Bob continued to be an awesome sight. A bear of a man with exceptional quickness and strength, the seven-time All-Pro always has been assigned two or even three blockers. "There won't be another Bob Lilly in my time," says Landry. "You're observing a man who will become a legend."

COLLEGE: Bob was an All-American and two-time All-Southwest Conference choice at Texas Christian. He was the first player ever drafted by the Cowboys.

PERSONAL: Bob, his wife Ann and the newest addition to the family, Mark Edward Lilly (6/2/75) live in Dallas where he has varied business interests. Bob's other children are Bob Jr. (7/19/62), Katharine (4/22/64) and Christienne (7/21/65). Bob is a native of Throckmorton, Tex.

"When I get on the field I want everybody to know I'm there. I think some fans are identifying me as a guy who'll go in and club somebody. If that's what they want to see that's what they'll get." Landry, who has called Martin "intimidating," says Harvey and Ed Jones have the potential to give the Cowboys the best pair of defensive ends in football.

PERSONAL: Ralph is a native of Little Rock, Ark., who grew up in Farmington, N.M., and now lives in Dallas with his wife Dianne and children Dale (12/31/66) and Dedra Ann (6/23/69). Despite the shuttling, Robert averaged 4.5 yards a carry through his first three pro years. "It's rough, waiting your turn," he says. "But that's the way it is here. I'm making progress, and my time will come." Garrison is one of Newhouse's biggest boosters. "When House makes a mistake it's not because he isn't trying as hard as he can," says Walt. "He always goes full speed ahead." Newhouse's biggest day in '74 came against the Philadelphia Eagles when he rushed for 97 yards despite breaking a rib in the game's second series. His 54-yard run against the Eagles in 1973 rates as the Cowboys' longest since Duane Thomas' 56-yarder against New England in 1971.

COLLEGE: Newhouse rushed for 2,961 yards in his career at Houston, averaging 6.4 yards a carry and scoring 19 touchdowns despite a near-fatal auto accident just prior to his junior season.

"I break my helmets and get a lot of cuts in the forehead and on the nose," he says, "but the butt block is the most effective block for me." Whatever the technique he uses, Niland has been successful in the rough-and-tumble world at the line of scrimmage. "My job is to hit the guy across the line on every play and drive him back as far as I can," John says. "It's that simple." After being the Cowboys' No. 1 draft choice in '66, it took Niland just one season to move into the starting lineup and he's been there ever since. "Nobody can actually reach that 100 per cent performance," he says, "but you have to shoot for it."

COLLEGE: A fullback as a sophomore at Iowa, John moved to guard as a junior and was an All-America choice as a senior.

PERSONAL: John and his wife Iree live in Dallas, where one of his major projects is the John Niland Celebrity Golf Tournament. This year the proceeds benefited the Texas Baptist Children's Home. John is a native of Quincy, Mass., and grew up in Amityville, N. Y.

He owns a Masters Degree in Business Administration from Stanford and a Masters in Physics from the University of Washington. Asked why, with his scholarly credentials, he continues to play football, Blaine said: "I am naturally competitive, which in a way is unfortunate. It builds tensions. But, the thing that makes you want to beat somebody is innate. That's why I'm able to play football for money — because I don't like getting beat."





Drew Pearson • 88

WIDE RECEIVER • TULSA • 3rd YEAR

PRO: One of the real highlights of the Cowboys' 1974 season was the performance of Pearson, whose 62 catches for 1,087 yards represented the best year for a Dallas receiver since Bob Hayes grabbed 64 for 1,232 yards in 1966. "He has that feel," says Tom Landry of the slender flanker. "A few receivers have a feel for daylight working against zone defenses, and Drew has it." Pearson, signed as a free agent in 1973, emerged from obscurity when injuries to regulars forced him into a starting role late in the season. He was No. 1 all the way in '74, established himself as the guy the quarterbacks looked for in the clutch and was the Cowboys' only All-Pro. "Drew is very deceptive," says Roger Staubach. "He comes off his breaks exceptionally fast and runs excellent routes. He's always where he's supposed to be." Pearson, of course, has been asked a hundred times about his transformation from an unknown free agent into one of the NFL's premier receivers. "I don't know if I like to think about where I was," he says now. "I'd rather think of where I am and where I want to go. I know I can improve a lot, and I'll never stop working hard. It makes me terribly mad when I miss a pass, even in practice." The greatest 1974 example of Drew's value to the Cowboys came with 35 seconds to play against Washington when his grab of rookie Clint Longley's 50-yard touchdown pass beat the Redskins.

COLLEGE: Tulsa was a run-oriented team when Drew was there, and although he was a regular his pass-catching skills weren't showcased for the pro scouts and the Cowboys were able to land him as a free agent. Drew played quarterback as a freshman and sophomore before becoming a wide receiver, and retained enough of his old skills to throw a 46-yard touchdown pass to Golden Richards against the Giants last season.

PERSONAL: Drew, his wife Marsha and daughter Tori Nochole (7/23/74) live in Dallas where he worked in the off-season for Cullum & Boren Sporting Goods. Marsha's father is Harlem Globetrotters star Marques Haynes.

PRO: Training camp was to be a crucial period in 1975 for Peterson, a big, fast athlete who showed promise on the special teams as a rookie. Calvin showed he was a hitter on the special teams, initiating some collisions and displaying first-rate speed and pursuit. "He's the reckless type, a big play maker," said the coaches.

COLLEGE: Calvin played the "loose" defensive end position at UCLA, but the Cowboys were confident he could convert to linebacker and he was the first player at that position they drafted in '74.

PRO: Pugh again performed well in '74, bolstering his reputation as one of the most solid defensive tackles in the game. As he prepared to enter his 11th season with the Cowboys, Jethro said, "A lot of people think that when you've been in the league 10 years you're pretty much over the hill. I'd like to think I haven't reached my peak yet." With Bob Lilly's retirement, and the changes that would bring about, a possibility heading into training camp, Pugh at left tackle was the only definite starter in the defensive line. "Jethro Pugh is an exceptionally good football player," says Tom Landry. Conditioning Coach Alvin Roy said Jethro was "in the best condition of his life" heading into the '75 season. All of that indicated Pugh might be on the verge of the public recognition that has never come his way in great quantities. "Without a name like Jethro Pugh, I might really be anonymous," he says. "But it's more disappointing not going to the Super Bowl than not making the Pro Bowl. The Super Bowl is our goal."

COLLEGE: Jethro enrolled at Elizabeth City State without a scholarship, but ended up as a two-time All-Conference tackle and was named his team's Most Valuable Lineman as a senior. He was only 20 years old when the Cowboys drafted him on the 11th round in 1965, and the club had to wait until his 21st birthday before signing him.

PRO: Despite an injured foot that hampered his play in 1974 (and contributed to keeping him out of the Pro Bowl for the first time in 11 years) Renfro prepared for his 12th season in the NFL with the enthusiasm of a rookie. The five-time All-Pro was one of the leaders in the Cowboys' toughest-ever off-season conditioning program. In fact, he caused Conditioning Coach Alvin Roy to remark, "All the players were talking about him. He set a tremendous example." Tom Landry, noting Mel's relatively disappointing '74 season, says, "They've left him alone in the past, but now I imagine teams will throw at him a little more. They want to see if he's slowed down any. They'll find he can still play the position." Defensive Backfield Coach Gene Stallings was even more emphatic. "I hope they do throw at Mel. That would be the best thing that could happen for us." Renfro played safety until 1970, and a year later was All-Pro at right corner. "I don't think I had the attitude or the guts to play cornerback my first few years," says Mel. "I had the ability, but I don't know if I could have stood the pressure right away. At the corner, you have to have nerves of steel." Renfro is the Cowboys' all-time interception and kickoff return leader, and was named Most Valuable Player in the 1971 Pro Bowl game.

COLLEGE: Mel was an All-America halfback and a world-class trackman at Oregon.

PERSONAL: A native Texan from Houston, Mel grew up in Portland. His children are Mel Jr. (1/25/64), Tony (3/29/65) and Cindy (3/14/68). Mel lives in Dallas where he owns and manages real estate.

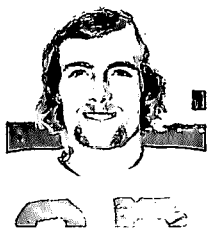

PRO: The 1974 season was a disappointing one for the Cowboys, so it follows that Staubach was disappointed in his own performance. "I thought 1974 would prove I'd be solid week in and week out," he says. "But I was sporadic. My best days are ahead, I believe that." Roger had 10 interceptions through the club's first five games, but suffered only five more the rest of the way. The fans elected him their "Favorite Cowboy" in a season-long contest. "I think Roger now has been through most of his problems as a quarterback," said Tom Landry. "You learn from being in adverse situations, and he will show the kind of maturity that will enable him to come back and be a solid quarterback again." In fairness to Staubach, he never really got untracked in '74. He had ankle surgery in June, a broken rib and a cracked rib in August and spent a couple of days in the hospital during the season with an infected passing elbow. Roger still had his big days, and set club records for most pass attempts and most completions in a single season. He ended the year just two-tenths of a point (80.6 to 80.4) behind Fran Tarkenton among active career passing leaders in the NFC. He is the Cowboys' all-time passing leader and ranks seventh in rushing, averaging 6.8 yards a carry. "Roger is our quarterback," says Landry.

COLLEGE: Staubach won the Heisman Trophy and the Maxwell Award as a junior at Navy, lettered in basketball and baseball, and captained the 1965 College All-Star team.

PERSONAL: Roger, a native of Cincinnati, lives in Dallas with his wife Marianne, daughters Jennifer (6/21/66), Michelle (5/23/68), Stephanie Marie (6/25/69) and son Jeffrey Roger (12/28/74). In business, he is associated with the Henry S. Miller Co. (real estate) in Dallas and with Aurora Toy Co. But he had the same effort and desire he's always had. I still think he's the best offensive tackle in the NFL." That opinion is shared by others. Former teammate Tody Smith, now a defensive end with the Houston Oilers: "Rayfield is the premier offensive tackle in the league. I don't think there are any close to him." Carl Barisich of the Cleveland Browns: "Big, not to mention fast. He's the type of guy, if I had my choice, I would stay home and concede." After drafting Wright seventh in 1967, the Cowboys knew they had a quality athlete on their hands but it took them a while to figure out his best position. He was tried at tight end and defensive end before moving to right tackle to stay in 1970. "Big Cat" made All-Pro for the first time the very next season.

COLLEGE: Rayfield lettered in football, basketball and track (a 50 flat 440) at Fort Valley State in Fort Valley, Ga., earning All-Conference honors in football and basketball. He played several positions in football, including defensive back.

Charlie would compete at strong safety in 1975 with Cornell Green, the 13-year veteran who's never missed a game. Waters-watchers knew he wouldn't back down from the challenge. In his first five years with the club Charlie played all four positions in the defensive backfield, underwent seven operations on various portions of his anatomy and still kept battling back. In fact, his 20 interceptions rank him seventh on the all-time list of Cowboys leaders in that department and in the top 20 among active NFC players. "He's very tough mentally," says Landry. "He can get beat and still come back and make the play." Says Waters, "I won't give up. With Dallas, patience is not only a virtue, but a necessity. Time is the only factor." Charlie ran a close second to Roger Staubach last year in the fans' balloting in the season-long "Favorite Cowboy" contest.

RANDY WHITE • Linebacker • Maryland

Everybody's All-America as a defensive end at Maryland, White won the Outland Trophy and the Vince Lombardi Award among other honors. And, the Cowboys think he may make an outstanding middle linebacker in the NFL. "He has that kind of ability," said Cowboys Coach Tom Landry. "If he doesn't fit at middle linebacker, there's no question he can play any of the four positions on the defensive line. Fundamentally, he's very sound. You very seldom see White on the ground. He seldom gets knocked off his feet, and if he does he's up again and after the ball right now. This guy can move." "Randy White may have been the strongest man in college football last year," said Cowboys Scout Red Hickey. "He will bench press 450 pounds or better. He is some kind of a physical man. He has all the traits you look for — quickness, balance, toughness, ability, desire, smartness." White was the second player chosen in the draft, following Atlanta's selection of California quarterback Steve Bartkowski. The Cowboys acquired the pick from the New York Giants in the October, '74, Craig Morton trade.

THOMAS HENDERSON • Linebacker • Langston
Ht: 6-2 • Wt: 220 • Born: 3/1/53 • D-1B for '75

Henderson's selection — he was the 18th player picked in the first round — came as somewhat of a surprise because of his small college background. "You're always tempted to take the better-known people," said Coach Landry, "but you have to go with what you think is best. We felt Henderson was the best athlete on the board when our turn came, and we'll always take a gamble if we think a man can be a great player." Red Hickey said, "This guy is one of the tremendous athletes in the country. He's quick, he's agile, he's fast, he blocks punts, he picks 'em up and runs 'em in for touchdowns, he chases people down from behind, he's all over the field. He's smart and dedicated. He fills the bill." Henderson was a two-time Little All-America selection at the small university in Oklahoma, and started 45 straight games in his four-year career. In track, he ran a 9.5 hundred and triple-jumped 49 feet.

BURTON LAWLESS • **Guard** • **Florida**
Ht: 6-4 • **Wt: 250** • **Born: 11/1/53** • **D-2 for '75**

NEA All-America Lawless was drafted higher than any Dallas offensive lineman since Bob Asher (now a starter with the Chicago Bears) in 1970. "He came to Florida as a tight end," said Red Hickey of Lawless. "He's a fine athlete. In fact, Lawless was the best pulling guard I saw all year. The Cowboys probably pull their guards more than anybody else, and Lawless will get out there and lead your plays. This man fits the Cowboy offense." "He'll be bigger than any guard we have," said Tom Landry. "He's young and he has great potential. We think this is a good pick."

BOB BREUNIG • **Linebacker** • **Arizona State**
Ht: 6-2 • **Wt: 227** • **Born: 7/4/53** • **D-3 for '75**

Breunig was an All-America in '74 and a three-time All-Western Athletic Conference selection. "He has size and speed and he's a hitter," said Tom Landry. "He's a definite prospect at middle linebacker." Breunig led Arizona State in defensive stats in all three of his varsity years. He showed a knack for the big play, recovering 10 fumbles, intercepting six passes and scoring two touchdowns. "It gives me satisfaction to beat the ballcarrier to the hole and see what happens," says Breunig. Bob spent vacation time in college playing the guitar and singing in a Phoenix nightspot.

PAT DONOVAN • **Defensive End** • **Stanford**
Ht: 6-4 • **Wt: 250** • **Born: 7/1/53** • **D-4A for '75**

The Cowboys saw this two-time All-America as a prospect in both the offensive and defensive lines, pointing to the athletic ability he displayed as early as high school. He was a Montana All-Stater in football and basketball and the state champion in the shot put and discus. "Donovan has great potential," said Coach Landry. "He should get bigger and stronger without sacrificing any of his speed." If Donovan, who carried a near-4.0 grade average in mechanical engineering, should make the switch to offense he would be following in the footsteps of another former Stanford defensive lineman — the Cowboys' Pro Bowl guard, Blaine Nye.

RANDY HUGHES • **Defensive Back** • **Oklahoma**
Ht: 6-4 • **Wt: 200** • **Born: 4/3/53** • **D-4B for '75**

"Hughes is a quality athlete," said Tom Landry. "He's accustomed to playing for a winner (Oklahoma was undefeated in Randy's junior and senior seasons) and he could make a contribution to our team in a hurry." An All-America in '74 and a two-time All-Big Eight choice, Hughes played safety throughout his high school and college careers. He overcame knee surgery following his junior year to intercept five passes in 1974, including three in the fourth quarter against Nebraska. Hughes' career total of 14 interceptions was only one short of the school record held by Darrell Royal. A top student, Randy was named a National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete in '74.

KYLE DAVIS • **Center** • **Oklahoma**
Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 240 • Born: 10/1/52 • D-5 for '75

Davis played behind All-America center Tom Brahoney (now with St. Louis) for two years, became a starter for the first time in '73, and made the Sporting News All-America team in '74. A powerful blocker in Oklahoma's record-setting Wishbone attack, Davis also is a strong and accurate snapper for punts and placements.

ROLLIE WOOLSEY • **Defensive Back** • **Boise State**
Ht: 6-1 • Wt: 182 • Born: 8/11/53 • D-6 for '75

An All-Big Sky Conference selection as a senior, Woolsey led his team with six interceptions in '74, led in punt returns and scored a touchdown in each department. Woolsey played eight-man football in high school at Grandview, Idaho, and entered Boise State to concentrate on track. He ran the 100 in 9.6 and the 60 in 6.2 and picked up enough football experience for Cowboys scouts to see him as a definite prospect as a pro cornerback.

MITCH HOOPES • **Punter** • **Arizona**
Ht: 6-1 • Wt: 210 • Born: 7/8/53 • D-8 for '75

In just two seasons as a punter at Arizona, Hoopes averaged 43.9 yards a kick in '73 and 41.8 in '74 with a long of 59. "He gets the ball off in a hurry and he kicks it very high," said the scouting report.

ED JONES • **Defensive Back** • **Rutgers**
Ht: 6-0 • Wt: 185 • Born: 6/29/52 • D-9 for '75

Because of 1974's top draft pick — Ed "Too Tall" Jones — it was inevitable jokes would be made about this Ed Jones' name. But his size was considered just right for a defensive back and his speed and quickness appeared to be pro caliber. Jones intercepted seven passes in '74 to run his career total to 14, a Rutgers record. He was an All-East selection.

DENNIS BOOKER • **Running Back** • **Millersville State**
Ht: 6-2 • Wt: 235 • Born: 4/17/50 • D-10 for '75

Booker, the first running back drafted by Dallas, averaged 6.2 yards a carry in rushing for 1,083 yards as a junior and senior at Millersville State in Millersville, Pennsylvania. Millersville is a member of the Pennsylvania State Colleges Athletic Conference, the same league that sent free agent running back Doug Dennison of Kutztown State to the Cowboys roster in '74.

GREG KRPALEK • **Center** • **Oregon State**
Ht: 6-4 • Wt: 250 • Born: 8/15/53 • D-11 for '75

A three-year starter at Oregon State and co-captain as a senior, Krpalek twice was named to the All-Pacific Coast first team. A good all-around athlete, Greg played football, basketball and baseball and was a weight man on the track team in high school at Albany, Oregon. It's pronounced Cur-PAH-lick.

CHUCK BLAND • **Defensive Back** • **Cincinnati**
Ht: 5-11 • Wt: 175 • Born: 8/5/53 • D-12 for '75

Bland spent two years as a starting safety for the Bearcats after attending Ferrum, Va., Junior College. He intercepted a total of five passes and also returned punts, including a 67-yarder for a touchdown. Chuck's big game came as a junior when he intercepted three passes in a 52-3 victory over North Texas State.

HERBERT SCOTT • **Guard** • **Virginia Union**

Historical Highlights

1960

NFL FRANCHISE—Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during their first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

COWBOYS STOCKED—A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS—Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME—The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME—In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club pre-season game, the Cowboys led the World Champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 71-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

FIRST VICTORY—In a pre-season game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith). (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME—In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED—Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS—Rookies launch training at new campsite—St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN—Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS — Team begins training at new campsite — Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter TD's in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY — The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

HOWTON SETS RECORD — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

FIRST SELLOUT — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

MERGER — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

THE CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys won their first championship,

capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

WIN CAPITOL — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE — The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

1971

TEXAS STADIUM — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and

16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl.

FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

1972

FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1½ minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFC title when the Redskins won, 26-3.

1973

100 VICTORIES — The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry, the only head coach the Cowboys have had, ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated Western Division champion Los Angeles in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

1974

FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE — For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL college draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9, 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

PLAYOFFS MISSED — The Cowboys' record-breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

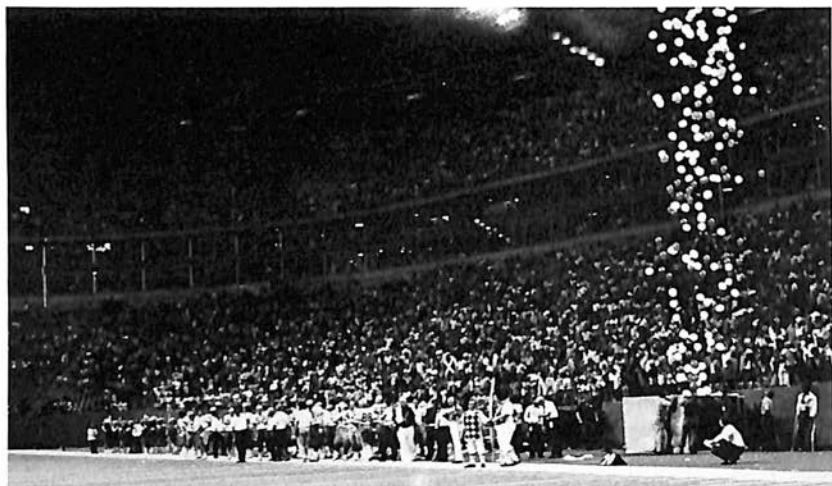
