ANTHONY ARENA

CENTER

MICHIGAN STATE

Tony is a native of Detroit, having played football and participated in track at Northwestern High School before joining the forces of Charles Bachman at State. For three years he was a mainstay in the powerful Spartan line. Weighing just over the 200 pound mark and standing six feet tall, he is a welcome addition to the center spot where Al Wojciechowicz is the only returning veteran. Although he excelled in football, his favorite sport is table tennis. When asked about his biggest thrill in football, he stated, "Linemen never have time for thrills."

MICHAEL BALITSARIS

END

TENNESSEE UNIVERSITY

Most football stars take great pride in pointing out that they have participated in a Rose Bowl or other Bowl game, but the new Lions' end has the distinction of having played in two. He was a member of the Vol eleven that battled in the Rose Bowl in 1939, and then made the Sugar Bowl in 1940.

A great pass catcher, Mike has averaged 30 points per season during his college career. He's six feet one and weighs 210 pounds. His greatest thrill was when he caught two passes within five minutes to score 12 points against the powerful Alabama team in 1940. He is married and lives in Pittsburgh.

EMIL T. BANJAVIC

HALF-BACK

UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA

"Banjo" comes to the Lions as one of the outstanding candidates for a backfield post. He was named on the All-Border Conference eleven while playing at Arizona. A triple-threat back, he calls signals, punts, passes and place-kicks. Last year he scored 40 points.

Emil is 24 years old and married. Blonde, green-eyed and six feet tall, he weighs 190 pounds. His hobbies are dogs and politics.

CHARLES EDWIN BEHAN

END

NORTH ILLINOIS STATE TEACHERS

One of the new ends this year is lanky, six-foot-four, 195 pound Big Ed Behan. Although he comes from a small school, he is highly recommended as a pro prospect. A sure ball handler and extremely fast, he may be a "sleeper".

WILLIAM CALLIHAN

BLOCKING BACK

NEBRASKA UNIVERSITY

Bill Callihan, one of the three Lion blocking backs, played his collegiate football at University of Nebraska.

Bill is one of the club's best line-blockers. This year he will be calling the signals in addition to blocking for the ball-carriers.

Bill is starting his third year as a blocking back.

LLOYD CARDWELL

HALF-BACK (CO-CAPTAIN)

NEBRASKA UNIVERSITY

One of the best liked ball-players on the Lion squad is big, blonde, handsome Lloyd Cardwell. Born in Republic, Kansas, on April 19th, 1913, "Cardy" will be playing his sixth year with the Lions. This will be his 14th year at his favorite position, right-half; (or wing-back), having played that position through his four years of high school as well as in college. Towering six-foot-three, and weighing close to 200 pounds, Cardy has the ideal build for wing-back.

Cardy missed more than half of last season, when he went out with a broken leg in the Cleveland game at Briggs Stadium. Since that leg healed, Cardy is romping the gridiron with his old abandon.

In 1938 Cardy's brilliant play won for him the right-half back spot on the All-League team, and he proved that his press notices were not to be sneered at. He was the League's ninth leading scorer, which is unusual for a right-half-back. He is called by many coaches in the game today, the greatest right half-back in the League, a large order for any man to fulfill, but one which Cardy is fitting right into.

THOMAS A. COLELLA

HALF-BACK

CANISIUS COLLEGE

Tom comes to the Lions with a top flight reputation as an all-around back from little Canisius College. He was rated as a one man ball club by the Northern New York State writers, who claim that he can make any pro club in the League.

Colella weighs 190 pounds and is an even six feet tall. He was named to the Little All-America three years in succession, 1939-40-41.

A true triple-threat back, Colella kicks well over the 45 yard mark, calls signals, passes and runs well above average. He scored 65 points last season.

ROBERT DETHMANHALF-BACKOREGON STATE

The hero of the Rose Bowl game last New Year's day when he pitched the passes that sunk the favored Duke Blue Devils, Dethman is being counted on to fill the shoes of the great Whizzer White at tailback. He is a passer of no little ability and has an uncanny knack of running off the tackles on the reverse smashes.

Dethman is five feet ten and weighs 190 pounds. He played in both the Chicago Tribune and Philadelphia Enquirer's All-Star games.

MURRAY CHARLES EVANSBLOCKING BACKHARDIN-SIMMONS

Although he was born in Nashville, Tenn., Evans transferred his home to Texas and earned a place on the colorful Hardin-Simmons eleven. He was shifted around from fullback to center to quarterback before earning recognition in that spot. He was named to the Little All-America and All-Border Conference teams at blocking back.

Evans, known as "Boom-Town" to his buddies, is a husky 200 pound, six foot one back. He is married and lives in Abilene, Texas, during the off-season, where he works in a bottling plant.

In addition to being a good blocker, Evans excels at pass receiving. Last year he scored 56 points on touchdowns, field-goals, and points after touchdowns.

WILLIAM G. FISK

END

UNIV. SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

Bill Fisk is 26 years of age, six feet tall, and weighs 205. He attended the University of Southern California. He was football and basketball captain at U.S.C., and was awarded the "Most Valuable Man" Trophy in both sports. Elected starting left end in the 1940 All-Star game in Chicago, he moved into the number one end combination with the Lions two years ago. He is the only veteran flanker returning this year.

SLOKO GILL

CENTER

YOUNGSTOWN COLLEGE

Another first year center seeking to fill the shoes of Bobby Nelson and Duncan Obec, last year's pivot men, who shared the center duties with Wojciechowicz, and who are now in the Armed Services. Sloko hits the scale at 195 and is five feet ten inches tall.

Despite his short stature he is an excellent pass defense man. A sure tackler and blocker, Gill was named to the All-Ohio team last year.

HENRY JOSEPH GOODMAN

TACKLE

WEST VIRGINIA UNIVERSITY

Two hundred and thirty pounds placed well on a six-foot-three frame, that's Goodman, who is one of the highly rated prospects for one of the tackle posts this season.

He is one of the few players on the Lions' squad who played the same position through high school and college. He started as a tackle at Bradford High in Pennsylvania, and continued at that spot at West Virginia.

FRANK JOHN GRIGONIS

FULLBACK

CHATTANOOGA UNIVERSITY

Since the advent of that certain musical number, it was inevitable that Frank would be nicknamed, "Choo-Choo". Five feet ten and weighing 190 pounds, he is a bone-crushing line-plunger. Last year, for the Chattanooga eleven, Frank received mention on the Little All-America and was captain of his team. He scored 73 points in 1941.

Although he played fullback in college, he is fast enough to play one of the half-back positions. An excellent broken-field runner, as well as a plunger, he may be switched to half-back.

ALBERT RUDOLPH GUTKNECHT

GUARD

NIAGARA UNIVERSITY

"Dutch" Gutknecht, the scourge of the Alleghany Valley, rated as one of the toughest customers to beat for a guard position. A mere six feet tall and weighing 210 pounds, Dutch plays both guard and tackle. He was born and still resides at Arnold, Pa.

He likes to play ball because it's a "he-man's" game. His pet hobby is boating.

JOHN ROBERT HALL

HALF-BACK

TEXAS CHRISTIAN

Hall is making his first appearance with the Lions, although he has been in the League for four years. He comes to the Detroit club in the player trade with the Chicago Cardinals last Spring.

He plays right half-back and is rated as excellent pass receiver.

He will be well remembered as the lad who ran back the kick-off 97 yards for a touchdown against the Lions in 1940.

John is married and lives in Dallas, Texas. He is six feet tall and weighs 205 pounds.

GRANVILLE PEARL HARRISON

END

MISSISSIPPI STATE

"Rock" is another first year end expected to strengthen the Lions' line this year. He is one of the four six-foot-three men on the squad and weighs 215.

Harrison was a team-mate of Bill Jefferson and Johnny Tripson, two former Lions, when his team won the Orange Bowl game in 1940 and also when they tied for the championship of the Southeastern Conference the same year.

Rock is 25 years of age and acts as a life-guard and swimming instructor in the off-season.

HARRY HOPP

HALF-BACK

NEBRASKA UNIVERSITY

Hard-shell, Hurrying, Hippety-Hopp, who served his apprenticeship under Major Biff Jones at Nebraska, came to the Lions with the reputation of being one of the hardest running, let-the-wreckage-fall-where-it-may backs to come out of the Midlands in years.

Barrel-bodied Hopp and his 200 pounds of dynamic energy starts barging into the opposition at the opening whistle and never lets up. He was one of the chief factors in the Huskers' taking the Big Six Conference championship in 1940.

Harry has moved back to his old tail-back post, after serving last year as fullback.

In addition to being a great running back, Hopp is above the average in the kicking department. His boots have averaged 50 yards, while kicking for Nebraska, and he completed 49.6% of passes attempted.

Harry's married and has one child, Tommy Ray. He is starting his second year with the Lions.

WILLIAM JAMES KENNEDY

GUARD

MICHIGAN STATE

Bill Kennedy is the sixth player to sign with the Lions, who played at Michigan State. He, like Arena, is also making his first try with the club, and learned his football at Northwestern High School at Detroit.

He is 195 pounds in weight and stands six feet tall.

Bill is a versatile player, having been used as fullback, guard, end, and half-back at State. Last year he played guard most of the time. However, he would like nothing better than a chance to play half-back for the Lions.

LARRY KNORR

END

DAYTON UNIVERSITY

Knorr is a lanky 190 pound end who came to camp late this fall but soon impressed the coaches with his will to win. A tough, slashing type end he excels at defense and is better than average as a pass catcher. He comes from the same school that gave the Lions tackle Tony Furst, now a lieutenant in the U.S. Army.

AGOSTINO SALVATORE LIO

GUARD

GEORGETOWN UNIVERSITY

All-American, Augie, 230 pounds of fightin' guard, gave the Lions one of the outstanding rookies of the year. Lio the Lion is a natural competitor ... rugged and instilled with a winning spirit. He was named on the All-League second team of 1941.

A great defensive and offensive guard, he increases his value by doing place-kicking in a highly accurate manner. In college Lio kicked 17 points after touchdown and a field goal. Last year he booted 12 of 13 points after touchdown.

Self-confidence oozes from the husky Italian. Comparing the pro game with college ball, Lio stated "It's a good game, I guess. Probably a little tougher than amateur ball." Lio lives with his mother in Passaic, N. J. He's 23 years old and an even six feet tall.

NED MATHEWS

WING-BACK

UNIV. OF CALIFORNIA AT L.A.

For seven years little Ned was a blocking back, knocking down the brothers while the other backs went on to score and get the glory. But last year, when the coaches decided Ned was too small for the blocking back spot in the National League, he had a chance to run from the wing. His work there and particularly his work against forward passes, made him a very valuable man.

This year he is about 15 pounds heavier than in 1941, and should be one of the stars of the Club. Last year he led the League in interceptions, duplicating the feat he performed in his last year at college.

Ned is five feet nine and weighs 185. He is married and has one child, Sandra Lee.

THEODORE CHARLES PAVELEC

TACKLE

UNIVERSITY OF DETROIT

"Terrible Ted" Pavelec is the only product of Detroit collegiate football playing for the Lions. He was a regular under Gus Dorais for three years, playing tackle throughout his college career. This year Ted has been moved to guard.

Ted weighs 215 and is an even six feet tall. Described by his coaches as one of the most rugged football players ever to come out of U. of D., Ted is instilled with the ambition to become a good pro player, to realize a life-long aim.

Pavelec also is a place-kicker of no little ability.

JOHN B. POLANSKI

FULLBACK

WAKE FOREST

John Polanski, 210 pound, six-foot-two fullback is the second Wake Forest alumnus to come to the Lions in the last three years. It is expected that he will make as good a showing in the Lions' line-up as did his fellow-collegian Clem Crabtree.

Polanski is a hard-driving, fast-running back and led the country in yards gained rushing last year.

John was captain of his college team in 1941 and was named to the All-State team in 1939-40 and All-Southern Conference in 1939.

His all time high in scoring was 96 points in one season.

DOMINIC SANZOTTA

HALF-BACK

WESTERN RESERVE

Better known as "Mickey" to thousands of Ohio Conference football fans, Sanzotta comes to the Lions rated as one of the greatest running backs ever to come out of the Cleveland school. Speed and power while running from the wing-back spot earned him places on the All-State and All-Big-Four Conference elevens last year. He was captain of his team while at Reserve.

Mickey was born in Geneva, Ohio, 21 years ago. He is five feet nine and weighs 190 pounds, has black hair, brown eyes and is single. His hobby is aviation and he is enlisted in the Naval Air Corps. and awaiting his call to active service.

ALEX SCHIBANOFF

TACKLE

FRANKLIN AND MARSHALL

Big Alex is making his second start with the Lions after being moved around quite a bit last year. He started the season with the Lions but was sent to the Jersey City Giants where he starred for the greater part of the season. Brought back to Detroit for the last three games, Alex saw little service, but this fall in training camp he seems to have earned a place in the starting lineup.

Alex is six feet one and weighs 215. He was named to the little All-America and the All-State teams while in college. A place kicker of no little ability he holds his biggest thrill to be a 42 yard placekick for a field goal last season that won a game for the Giants.

LEONARD PERRY SCOTT

END

MUHLENBERG COLLEGE

Although he is making his first try with the Lions, Scott has one season of pro ball under his belt. He played last season in the Eastern Pennsylvania League. He is the second Muhlenberg player to join the club this year, Tony Zuzzio, guard being the other.

Scott is 25, six foot three and weighs 210. He intends to make a career of the U. S. Army Air Corps as soon as he gets his orders.

MICHAEL FRANCIS SPANN

END

DAVIS ELEINS

Mike Spann, otherwise known as the "Deacon", is making his first appearance with the Lions. He has always played right end, a position that earned him a place on the all-West Virginia team in 1939. He is six feet one inch tall and weighs 200 pounds.

HARRY SELTZER

FULLBACK

MORRIS HARVEY

One of the hardest driving fullbacks to come to the Lions since the days of Bill Shepard, "Bromo" has shown up well in the early drills.

One hundred and ninety-five pounds draped over his five foot eight frame makes him the ideal build for a crushing fullback. He has tremendous driving power and is away at the first step of his charge. Always a backfield man, he played tail-back, fullback and wing-back in college.

GEORGE SIROCHMAN, JR.

GUARD

DUQUESNE UNIVERSITY

Another blonde, 210 pounder making his first bid for a place on the Lions' squad is George Sirochman, Jr., three letter winner from Duquesne.

The tough, slashing type of guard, George comes to the Lions highly recommended.

He was born in LaBelle, Pa., 24 years ago.

In addition to football, George competed in baseball in college, but lists swimming as his favorite sport.

He was a member of the famous "unbeaten, untied and uninvited" Duquesne team of 1940.

GEORGE CARL SPETH

TACKLE

MURRAY STATE

George's versatility on the gridiron made him one of Murray State's most valuable players. He is equally at home at fullback, center and tackle. His prowess at tackle put him on the All-State team of 1940-41.

A six-foot-two, husky 220 pounder, Speth has shown up well in the early drills. George is 23 years old and single.

His hobbies are sports and reading for relaxation.

JOE ELBERT STRINGFELLOW

END

MISSISSIPPI SOUTHERN

This lanky, six-foot-one, 180 pound newcomer to the Lions' squad stands a good chance of being the most versatile, all-around athlete ever to join the Detroit club.

"Stringbeans" is at home on the gridiron, the basketball court, the boxing ring, and the baseball diamond. In the off-season he is the backbone of a Charleston, S. C. pro baseball team.

Joe was captain of his college team in 1941 and was given honorable mention on the Little All-America. Besides his ability and natural fitness for playing end, he averages 45 yards on punts from tail-back.

He is a good-looking, 23 year old blonde. His pet hobbies are hunting and fishing.

PAUL MICHAEL SZAKASH

BLOCKING BACK

UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA

"Socko" Szakash, a veteran of three seasons with the Lions, made a comeback after being out for a season, due to a broken leg suffered playing baseball. He played both end and blocking back.

Szakash, who was the durable blocking back while with the club in 1938 and 1939, is back at his old post. He weighs 215 and is an even six feet tall.

While playing for Montana U, Socko was named to the All-Coast team and was given honorable mention on the All-America.

ALVIN MONROE THACKER

BLOCKING BACK

MORRIS HARVEY

"Tubby" Thacker is the second member of the Morris Harvey eleven to come to the Lions this year. He joins his team-mate Harry Seltzer, fullback. Tubby was named to the All-Eastern team last year and made most of the Conference teams in West Virginia. He's five feet ten and weighs 195.

THOMAS TRESSA

GUARD

DAVIS ELKINS

Although Tom played end most of the time in college and helped his team take the State Conference championship of 1939 from that position, he has switched to guard for pro ball.

He stands six foot one and weighs 205 pounds. Tressa, who is 24 years old and single, wants to make coaching football his life profession.

EMIL UREMOVICH

TACKLE

INDIANA UNIVERSITY

Emil Uremovich, starting his second year with the Lions, came to the Detroit club from the Philadelphia Eagles on a trade last year. Since joining the Lions he has proved that he was a wise choice.

He has about the loudest voice in the League and specializes in hog-calling as a pastime.

Emil weighed in this year at 235 pounds, a gain of 10 pounds over last season, and stands six foot one.

Coach Bo McMillan, of Indiana University, rated Emil as one of the best tackles he ever coached.

JOHN WIETHE

GUARD

XAVIER UNIVERSITY

"Socko" Wiethe won a starting assignment in his first season as a pro in 1939, and was one of the most sensational players in the League. His fast, aggressive playing gave him several All-League selections. He was All-League guard in 1940.

John is 25 years old, five feet eleven and weighs 200 pounds.

ALEXANDER FRANCIS WOJCIECHOWICZ

CENTER (CO-CAPTAIN)

FORDHAM

Fully recovered from an operation to correct a shoulder injury, "Wojie" is expected to be the key to the Lions' defense this year. He will be starting his fifth year when the Club opens its season against the Cardinals.

Wojie was the standout in the line at Fordham, when the forwards there were known as "The Seven Blocks of Granite". His work in that line of stars is described as the best job of pivot work that has ever been produced by a Fordhamite... and they have seen some good ones, including Tony Ciano and Del Isola.

Although he is a citizen of Detroit now, Wojie was born and raised in a little town in New Jersey... South River.

His consistently good play with the Lions since joining the Club in 1937, has made him one of the top centers in the League.

Wojie is married and has two children.

ANTHONY J. ZUZZIO

GUARD

MUHLENBERG COLLEGE

Five feet eleven inches tall and tipping the scales at 215 pounds, Tony has the ideal build for a guard.

"Zu" is a first year man with the Lions, although he has played two years of pro ball with minor league teams. He was captain of his college team, was named to the Eastern Conference team in 1938 and 1939, and was given honorable mention on the Little All-America.

Tony is 26 years old and single. During the off-season he is a policeman in Belleville, N. J.
