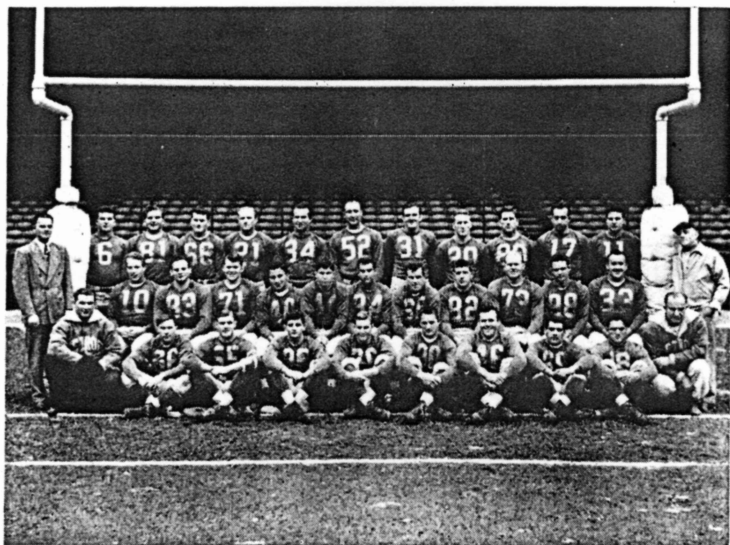

Column Notes on Detroit's Coaches and Players

GUS DORAIS is the first man to serve five years as head coach of the Detroit Lions, having started with the club in 1943 after 18 years as athletic director and coach at the University of Detroit. In beginning his fifth season this fall, Gus surpasses Potsy Clark's mark of four years as Lion mentor . . . Dorais has dubbed his version of the T, to which he turns this fall for the first time since playing the old T at Notre Dame 34 years ago, the D-T, meaning a Detroit T that will feature an unusual line alignment . . . Gus thinks this fall he has on hand the greatest pair of passers he has ever coached in the veteran Roy Zimmerman, obtained in a trade from the Philadelphia Eagles, and rookie Clyde LeForce from Tulsa.

Dorais' first four Lion elevens have won 17 games, lost 22 and tied two. In 27 years as a college head coach, Gus won 151 starts, lost 69 and tied 12. He was at Dubuke four years, Gonzaga five and the University of Detroit 18. Dorais' career includes only one year of service as an assistant coach. That was in 1919 when he was backfield coach at Notre Dame, working with his former Irish teammate and roommate of four undergraduate years, Knute Rockne.

When Dorais entered Notre Dame in 1910, he weighed 145 and stood five feet seven. Thirty-seven years later the figures still apply. . . . Despite his size, Gus was Notre Dame's first string quarterback through 1913—the year his passing put the Irish on the football map with the historic 36 to 13 triumph over Army at West Point. Incidentally, Dorais never has seen a Notre Dame-Army game since that series inaugural in which he played. . . . Dorais captained Notre Dame's 1912 eleven, with Rockne taking over to lead the 1913 combination. Gus also was a standout for the Irish in baseball and track. It was the baseball style of throwing which he introduced to football that made Dorais the gridiron's first great forward passer.

When he was head coach and athletic director at Gonzaga University Gus helped found the now famous Athletic Round Table of Spokane and one season had as a student manager a lad named Harry Crosby, now known to the world as Bing. . . . Gus was 56 on July 2 of this year and earlier in the year observed his 30th wedding anniversary. One of his sons, Tom, also is a member of the Lions staff, serving as head scout. Gus recently resigned from the Detroit city council after eight years of service to the city.

Like Dorais, Detroit's line coach is also a former Notre Dame football star. He is **JOSEPH A. BACH**, one of the famed Seven Mules that knocked aside the opposition in the path of the Four Horsemen in 1924, his second season with the Irish varsity. . . . When Bach enrolled at Notre Dame in 1922 after a season at Carleton the one year residence rule kept him out of competition, but not out of the grid picture completely. He took over for Rockne as trainer and still helped out on that end the two years he held down the left tackle berth.

Bach became line coach at Syracuse in 1925, staying until 1929 when he joined his former teammate, Elmer Layden, in the same capacity at Duquesne. . . . When Elmer left early in 1933 to return to Notre Dame as head coach and athletic director, Bach was elevated to the post of head coach of the Dukes. . . . He retained that coaching position for two seasons, then taking over as head coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers of the N.F.L. in 1935. In '35 he also doubled as line coach for Carnegie Tech, dropping that the next year to devote full time to the Steelers who had one of their finest seasons, remaining in contention for the eastern division title until the last week of the campaign. Bach thus spent eight years in Pittsburgh, including two as Duquesne's head coach and two more as Steeler boss.

Head coaching assignments at Niagara and later at Fort Knox were next for Joe before he came to the Lions in 1943 when Gus Dorais became head coach.

ROBERT E. WINSLOW, a Lion alumnus of the 1940 season, joins the Dorais staff this fall as backfield coach after four years as Jeff Cravath's assistant at Southern California. Three times in those four years the Trojans won Pacific Coast titles and accompanying Rose Bowl bids. . . . Winslow was an All-Coast end in 1938 and 1939 when the Trojans finished their seasons with 7 to 3 and 14 to 0 Rose Bowl victories over Duke and Tennessee respectively.

After the 1940 season, Bob coached at Arroyo Grande high school in Los Angeles, then at Inglewood high school in 1942, joining Cravath the next autumn. . . . In 1944 and 1945 Winslow not only coached, but also played pro football in the Pacific Coast circuit, with the Hollywood Rangers in '44 and the Los Angeles Bulldogs in '45. He held down the starting quarterback spot with each, directing them from the T to league titles.

STAN BATINSKI is the oldest member of the Lions in point of service, this being the sixth year with the club for the rugged guard who was a Temple star from 1938 through 1940. . . . "Bull" came with Detroit in 1941, missed the next season for a stretch of army life, then returned in 1943 to win a starting position he has yet to relinquish. . . . **J. R. CALLAHAN** was the hot shot of the great Texas eleven of 1943 and last year when he made his pro debut was hailed as the halfback who would make Detroit forget about Frankie Sinkwich. However, a training camp foot injury that never healed completely cost him a big share of his effectiveness. Nonetheless, he still was the team's second leading ball carrier. . . . The Texan was a lieutenant in the marines and was out of football from 1943 until 1946. . . . **AUGUST CAMARATA**, 185-pound halfback from Iowa Teachers, won the Silver Star and Purple Heart during his Pacific service as a marine lieutenant and returned to college last year following his discharge for a fourth season of varsity football. . . . The Cedar Falls runner won Little All-American honors in 1946.

BOB CIFERS, back for his second season with the Lions, had the best punting average in the National league last fall, a shade better than 45 yards a boot. In that he kept right on where he left off in 1942 at Tennessee when he led the nation's collegiate kickers. . . . The big 200-pound back played service football in 1944 and 1945 with Army Air Force teams. In 1946 he also led the Lions in the scoring column with 24 points. . . . Rugged **STEVE CIPOT**, 247-pound rookie tackle, long ago caught the eye of Line Coach Joe Bach of the Lions who saw him in action at St. Bonaventure before the war. Cipot returned last year for additional college football and makes his pro debut at the age of 28. . . . Like most of the Lions, Tackle **JIM CODY**, 242-pounder from East Texas State, experienced a gap in his collegiate grid career because of service duty. Cody was a marine with eight months in the Pacific theatre. . . . He was a Lone Star conference standout last fall,

possesses speed as well as bulk. . . . End **TED COOK** from Alabama ranked 10th in the nation in 1946 as a pass receiver and is expected to add strength to Detroit's aerial attack that will feature Roy Zimmerman and Clyde LeForce on the throwing end. . . . With the Crimson Tide last fall he snared 24 of Harry Gilmer's tosses for 377 yards. . . . Cook also was on 'Bama's 1942 team that beat Boston College in the Orange Bowl, 37 to 21, and then went into the Army Air Force for three years. . . . One of the best indications that Cook is a prize rookie is the fact that he started at end for the collegians against Green Bay in the 1945 Chicago Tribune All-Star game. . . . In the service he played with the Third Air Force eleven in 1944 and 1945.

TED CREMER from Auburn was Detroit's fourth leading pass receiver in 1946, his first year with the Lions, with a record of 15 passes received for a total net gain of 179 yards. . . . He played at Auburn in 1939 and '40, then was away from the game until 1943 when he played on the Jackson, Miss., Army Air Base team as he did again in 1944. . . . **BOB DERLETH**, 230-pound tackle, is one of seven former Michigan stars battling for positions with the Lions this season. He won Wolverine football awards in 1942, 1943, 1945 and 1946 and also captained Michigan's 1943 hockey team. . . . In 1944 Derleth was with the Iowa Seahawks, returning to Michigan after receiving his naval discharge to earn degrees in chemical and metallurgical engineering. . . . **CHUCK DE SHANE**, listed as a lion quarterback the last two years, is being shifted to guard this fall as Coach Gus Dorais installs the T formation. . . . The 218-pound Grand Rapids railroad conductor, who was an All-Southeastern conference quarterback at Alabama, has the speed and blocking ability to fit into that spot, in the opinion of Dorais, and is being moved because he has no experience in T ball handling. . . . DeShane has been a defensive powerhouse with the Lions and in 1945 returned a pass interception 45 yards for a touchdown that helped beat the Bears. . . . The following week his 81-yard scoring run on a punt return beat Boston, 10 to 9. . . . **JAY DILLARD** is an end prospect with one year's play at the University of Detroit behind him.

JACK DUGGER, Ohio State's great All-American end of 1944, jumps to the Lions this year from the Buffalo Bills (nee Bisons) of the All-America conference. The Lions obtained N.F.L. rights to the towering Buckeye in a trade with the Pittsburgh Steelers. . . . Dugger won three varsity football awards at Ohio, three others in basketball and another three in track. He captained the 1943 Buckeye grid eleven. . . . He has played in two of the Chicago Tribune's All-Star games, starting at end for the collegians in 1944. . . . He calls Michigan's 1943 team the most powerful he ever faced. . . . Last winter Dugger played pro basketball with Syracuse of the National Basketball League. . . . **LEON FICHMAN** is another of the Alabama delegates to the Lions and last year, his first with the club, had his share of starting tackle assignments. With an abundance of tackle prospects at hand, Fichman this fall is being tried at a guard spot to gain added strength there. . . . He played on the Alabama elevens of 1941 and 1942, then spent almost three years in the army, participating in the battle for the Rhine. . . . **JOHN GREENE**, known as the Cinderella Kid of the Lions because of his climb to stardom after three years as a reserve lineman at Michigan, has led the Lions in pass receiving two years in a row. . . . During his football experience at a Pittsburgh high school, then Kiski, Michigan and with the Lions he has played almost every possible position, finally settling at end two years back. He grabbed 26 passes in 1945, 20 more last fall and is rated one of the fastest men on the team. . . . At Michigan he won three football letters and two in wrestling, captaining the Wolverine grapplers in 1944 before he entered the army. . . . In 1945 Greene was the fifth leading pass receiver in the N.F.L. and last fall he was eighth. His 88-yard scoring run on a pass was the longest in the league in 1946. . . .

CHRIS HANSEN, six-foot-four-inch end from Bradley, gives the Lions a second brilliant pro basketball player battling for the same football assignment. The other is End Jack Dugger. Hansen was on the great Wright Field cage team in 1945 and with the Dayton Metropolitans last year. He also played service football at Wright Field after winning letters at Bradley in 1939, 1940 and 1941. . . . He was rated one of the best small college ends in the nation at Bradley. . . . Born in Denmark, he attended high school at Dundee, Ill. . . . Rookie **BILL HILLMAN**, 200-pound halfback from Tennessee, was a Vol teammate of Lion Bob Cifers in 1942. . . . Together they played a big part in Tennessee's 13 to 7 victory over Tulsa in the Sugar Bowl Jan. 1, 1943. . . . Hillman, after three and a half years in the infantry, returned to Tennessee last fall and won his second major football award there.

BOB IVORY is a home grown guard from Detroit's Catholic Central high school and the University of Detroit where he captained the 1946 eleven. . . . He spent 32 months in the Army Air Forces and played three seasons of service football, two with the powerful Third Air Force team. His first season at the U. of D. was 1942 when his coach was Gus Dorais. . . . It was Ivory who pounced on a fumble for the touchdown last fall that accounted for the only defeat suffered by Tulsa. . . . **TOMMY JAMES**, 188 pounds of speed from Ohio State, was to have captained the Buckeyes this fall but decided to turn instead to the pro gridiron. . . . He played for Ohio in 1942 and 1946, three years in the army filling the gap between those seasons. For the two years he averaged 7.7 yards against Western Conference opposition every time he handled the ball. One of his greatest performances was against Illinois in 1942 when he turned in an 80-yard touchdown run. . . . **CHARLES KALBFLEISH**, rookie 230-pound tackle from Western Michigan, first entered Michigan Normal and in all has had three years of college football experience. . . . He was a standout at Western where he also participated in track and basketball. . . . **JOHN KOVACH** from Niagara at 275 pounds rates as one of the biggest of the tackle prospects on the squad. He played at Niagara in 1940 and 1941 and received his service discharge this year. . . . **JIM LALIKOS**, another rookie tackle, first entered Northeastern college, was transferred to Villanova in the marine training program and finished his college work at Brown. He played football at all three schools, leading Brown's 1946 eleven as captain and winning All-Ivy league honors at tackle. . . . Guard **DICK LEAHY** is another Lion rookie from Western Michigan college at Kalamazoo where he played in 1943, 1944 and 1946. . . . He got his initial football experience at Fenwick high school in Chicago.

CLYDE LE FORCE, the passing wizard from Tulsa, led the Hurrican in scoring each of his varsity years there, 1942, 1943 and 1946. As a sophomore he tallied 59 points, matched that again in 1943 and last fall boosted it to 67 for a three year total of 185 points. By one means or another he scored in every game except one in which he played during those years. . . . As a runner, his three-year average was exactly four yards per try. He completed 49 per cent of the passes attempted, averaging 14 yards per completion. On total offense, Tulsa for three years averaged a gain of 5.9 yards every time LeForce either ran or passed; Tulsa's record for those seasons shows 25 victories, one defeat and one tie. . . . In one game in 1942, LeForce kicked 10 points after touchdown; on five other occasions during his career he booted six or more conversions in a single game. . . . In 1943, in 14 minutes against Oklahoma A. & M., LeForce ran 16 and 74 yards for two touchdowns,

passed 19 and 25 yards for two more and added extra points after all four. The same year, against Southern Methodist, he personally out-gained the entire opposition, 161 yards to 147, in pacing Tulsa to a 20 to 7 victory. . . . At one point last year he had a string of 18 conversions in a row. . . . His three longest runs in 1946 were 93 yards on a punt return against Detroit, 98 yards on a kickoff against Oklahoma A. & M. and 88 yards on a punt return against Baylor. . . . LeForce played only 146 minutes of a possible 600 in 1942, 204 of a possible 420 in 1943 and 430 of a possible 600 in 1946. . . . Last New Year's Day at San Francisco LeForce threw two touchdown passes and kicked one extra point in leading the West to a 13 to 9 victory in the annual East-West Shrine game. For the entire game the West gained 203 yards—all of it by passing and all of it by LeForce. . . . LeForce was in the navy during the 1944 and 1945 seasons. He did not play service football.

HOWARD MC AFEE, 260-pound tackle, returned to Tulane last fall after 30 months in the navy to win his third football letter, previously playing there in 1942 and 1943. . . . A broken jaw kept him out of some early season games but by the end of the '46 season he was back in top form. . . . **SAM MC CLURKIN**, rookie end from Auburn, entered college in 1945 after three years in the air corps and won letters at Auburn in both '45 and '46. . . . He was rated one of the best receivers in the Southeastern conference and also participated in track as a sprinter. . . . **JOEL MC COY** is one of the backs from last year's

Lion team taking another shot at the gridiron this fall. Coach Gus Dorais hopes McCoy's brilliant speed will make him a potent factor off the T. . . . He played at Alabama in 1941 and then served 43 months in the air corps, playing for Keesler Field in 1942 and 1943, Randolph Field in 1944 and the First Air Force in 1945. . . .

ELMER MADAR, wiry 180-pound end from Michigan, was picked by the Associated Press in 1946 for a first team All-American berth and was one of two men who were virtually unanimous choices as All-Big Nine ends last fall. The other was Cecil Souders of Ohio State who also is wearing a Lion uniform this season. . . . Madar, who is from Northeastern high school in Detroit—which also produced Lions Frank Szymanski and Walter Vezmar, played at Michigan in 1941 and 1942 before entering the

Army Air Forces. Last year was his first back in football since 1942 and he distinguished himself by his brilliant, aggressive defensive play. . . . This will be the second full season in the league for **HALFBACK ELMER (TIPPY) MADARIK** who hit his 1946 high point in a game against the Bears when he completed seven of 14 passes before suffering an injury that put him out of the last two games of the year. . . . Madarik was discharged from the Army Air Forces late in 1945 in time to join the Lions for one game and got his real professional start in 1946. . . . He played under Gus Dorais at the University of Detroit in 1941 and 1942 and at Randolph Field in 1944.

JOE MARGUCCI was a halfback with the Los Angeles Bulldogs in the Pacific Coast league in 1943 and 1946, spending the interim in the Army Air Forces, but this fall is being converted to quarterback in Detroit's T formation. . . . He played for Santa Ana Junior college in 1940 and 1941, the Santa Ana army base in 1942, and the Personnel Distribution Command team in 1945. . . . Since his discharge from the service he has enrolled at Southern California. . . . **JACK MATHESON**, veteran Lion end from Western Michigan, has caught more forward passes than any Lion in history. The total for his first four years stands at 72 but his yardage total of 936 is still 96 yards short of Lloyd Cardwell's Lion lifetime record of 1032 yards, set between 1937 and 1941. . . . A couple of good days this fall can give that record to the 230-pound Matheson as well as boost his mark for number of passes caught. . . . Last year Matheson hauled in 17 passes for 178 yards and had his best year in 1944 when 23 tosses were good for 361 yards. . . .

KELLEY MOTE of Duke rated as one of the South's most prominent ends last fall and was an All-Dixie choice with Ted Cook of Alabama, now also with the Lions. Mote won Southern Conference all-star honors each of the last two seasons. . . . Earlier he had played three years at South Carolina, so now has five seasons of college football to his credit. He also served two years in the marines. . . . He was Duke's football captain last year. . . . **REED NILSEN**, 230-pound

center from Brigham Young university, was one of the top linemen in Rocky Mountain football last year, his fourth at B.Y.U. . . . Nilsen not only won four varsity letters in football, but also four each in track and wrestling . . . He was captain of his 1943 wrestling team and of the 1946 grid team . . . He played for the West in the annual East-West game last Jan. 1 and has a record of 33 months in the navy. Against Colorado university last season he kicked a field goal that gave B.Y.U. a 10 to 7 victory, its first over Colorado in 12 years.

BILL O'BRIEN, Detroit boy who is battling for a halfback post with the Lions, played semi-pro football last fall with the Detroit All-Stars. Tom Dorais, son of the Detroit coach, and now head scout for the Lions, played for the same club . . . O'Brien served three years as a paratrooper, 27 months of that time overseas . . . Among other awards, he holds the Purple Heart and five bronze battle stars . . .

VICTOR PEDERSEN went back last fall to captain the Gustavus Adolphus eleven after serving five years in the infantry . . . He holds the Purple Heart for service in Europe and had previously played at Gustavus Adolphus in 1939 and 1940 . . . The 230-pound tackle was a Little All-American in 1946 . . . **GERARD PELLEGRINI**, one of Detroit's five center candidates, was a standout at Syracuse under Clarence Munn last fall. He also played there in 1942 before entering the army . . . In his first college game in '42 against Boston university, he intercepted a pass and ran 30 yards to set up a touchdown . . . He also played 59 minutes against Colgate in 1942 without being conscious of doing so as the result of a blow on the head . . . **HALFBACK**

BOB PIEFKE comes to the Lions from the Newport News Builders of the Dixie pro league where he was an all-league choice last season . . . He played college football both at Colgate (1942) and at William & Mary (1944-'45), winning All-Southern conference honors at the latter institution. While in the service he played

in 1943 for Lowrey Field . . . **MERVIN PREGUL-**

MAN was an All-American tackle at Michigan in 1943, although his normal position is at center . . . He'll be back at the pivot spot with the Lions after playing guard last fall for the Green Bay Packers from whom he was obtained by Detroit in a trade this summer . . . Pregulman was a Michigan regular in 1941, 1942 and 1943, then served three years in the navy and earned four battle stars . . . At Michigan he played center in 1941, guard in '42 and tackle in '43.

FLOYD RHEA from Rhea's Mill, Ark., is making his third N.F.L. stop, having played previously with Brooklyn in 1944 and Boston in 1945 . . . The big guard from Oregon was with the Honolulu team of the Pacific Coast loop last fall . . . He played four years at Oregon, captaining the 1942 team and winning a place on the All-Pacific

Coast conference team as well . . . **EDWIN ROUSH** is a three-sport star from Otterbein who may give the Lions additional strength at quarterback . . . He is experienced in the T and is a good passer, though small . . . He captained Otterbein's football team last year after 35 months in the navy . . . **TONY RUBINO** is a dependable guard from Wake Forest who broke in with the Lions in 1943, then served 29 months in the navy before returning to make the squad again in 1946 . . . In college he was an All-Southern conference choice . . . **DAVE RYAN** was the passing arm of the Lions last fall. He not only attempted more aerials than any man in Lion history for a season, but also completed more—breaking by 15 the mark set by Frank Sinkwich for completions in 1944 . . . Ryan was the ninth leading passer in the league for the full 1946 season, hitting 73 of 154 for 965 yards and a .474 average . . . It was the second year with Detroit for the former Hardin-Simmons back . . . He also led the Lions in 1946 in the number of opponents' passes intercepted and also in both kickoff and punt returns . . . **IVAN SCHOTTEL**, one of the best natural athletes on last year's Lion eleven, will be moved this fall from quarterback to end . . . In college, at Northwest Missouri State Teachers, he starred in football, basketball, baseball and track . . . He performed brilliantly for St. Mary's Pre-Flight in 1942 and later for two other service teams during his 41 months in the Army Air Forces . . . For St. Mary's in '42 he kicked a last minute field goal that beat Oregon, 10 to 9 . . . With the Lions last year he caught passes worth a total of 146 yards.

CECIL SOUDERS was named as an All-Big Nine end twice, in 1944 and 1946, during his career at Ohio State. In 1944 the other All-conference end was his teammate, Jack Dugger; last year it was Michigan's Elmer Madar. All three now are playing their first year for the Detroit Lions . . . In 1945, while in the Navy, Souders was on the Bainbridge training station eleven and returned to Ohio last fall for his fourth season there . . . He has played in two East-West games . . . **ED STACCO**, 250-pound tackle from Colgate, was an All-Eastern choice his first year of college competition (1943) and then captained

Colgate in '44 . . . Ed played on the El Toro marine eleven in 1945 and last year was back at Colgate . . . He played in last season's annual East-West game and is a graduate geologist . . . **JOSEPH STANKEVICH** is a 275-pound giant from St. Bonaventure who may fill a big gap in the Detroit line . . . After winning college grid awards in 1939, 1940 and 1941 he entered the service, picking up additional football experience there . . . He excels as a defensive player . . . **DICK STOVALL**, highly rated center prospect from Abilene Christian in Texas, is another rookie who returned to college for another season of competition last year after receiving a service discharge. Stovall served in the coast guard . . . He had played at Abilene in 1940, 1941 and 1942, winning All-Texas conference honors his last two seasons and again in 1946 . . . **FRANK SZYMANSKI**, veteran Lion center of the last two campaigns, is in the best condition of his football career. Last season a shoulder injury hampered his play; in 1945 a knee injury put him out for half the season; and in his final year at Notre Dame in 1944 he played only after having survived a 5000-foot fall in an air crash earlier in the year while serving as a naval student pilot . . . If the plague is over, it obviously will strengthen the Lions for at Notre Dame Szymanski, a Detroit product, was rated one of the greatest of Irish centers . . . He also stands as the most brilliant mathematics student in the school's history and is a specialist in atomic physics . . . His greatest single play in college was the interception of a Navy pass on the Notre Dame 35 which he returned to Navy's 10 yard line.

The Lions had to go back into the National league draft mart last January to get the services of **RUSS THOMAS**, former Ohio State tackle, who already had made his mark with the club as the best rookie lineman they had in 1946 . . . Thomas played for the Bucks in 1943, '44 and '45, making the All-Big Nine team his last year, and then turned down another year of eligibility to turn pro. . . . Ohio State gave its blessing and the Lions drafted him, but still had to repeat the process this year . . . Thomas played at 230 pounds last fall, is 10 pounds

heavier now. At O.S.U. he also won varsity letters in track and wrestling . . . **WALT VEZMAR** was a case for the Lions just like that of Russ Thomas, for inasmuch as Walt dropped out of Michigan State after one season and then plunked with the Lions his name went back on the draft board this year. So well did Detroit coaches think of his first year performance in 1946 that they tabbed him early in the draft routine . . . Vezmar, still only 22, won the Purple Heart during his two years in the infantry and took part in the battles both at Anzio and Casino . . . The big guard is one of a Lion trio from Detroit's Northeastern high school . . .

BOB WESTFALL, the chunky Bullet from Ann Arbor, is in his fourth year with the Lions, battling to get back into the groove he knew in 1945 when he led the club in ground gaining and his 54 points were tops for the year. Last season a fractured elbow in training camp plus severe asthma throughout the fall kept Westfall on the sidelines a large share of the time . . . He'll have competition for the fullback post this year from Bob Cifers, Bob Wiese and Camp Wilson—three of the best in the business . . . Westfall, in 1941, was captain of the Michigan eleven and a unanimous All-America choice . . . In 1945 he was picked by the Associated Press as all-N.F.L. fullback and has proved in the pro ranks that he is a splendid pass receiver as well as a power back. His mark of 45 passes received during his

years with Detroit is topped in the lifetime annals only by Jack Matheson, Lloyd Cardwell and John Greene . . . **PAUL WHITE** is one of three former Michigan captains playing with the Lions. Bob Westfall and Bob Wiese held the same Wolverine honor. White led Michigan in 1943 when the Wolverines tied Purdue for the Big Nine championship, the only time Michigan has been on top since 1933 . . . White won four Michigan letters at right halfback, playing in 1941, 1942, 1943 and then again in 1946 after three years in the marines . . . A reverse play on which he scored against Army last fall tops everything else as a source of satisfaction to him through his football career . . . White has the unusual distinction of twice winning the Western Conference medal for proficiency in both scholarship and athletics . . . During his four years at Michigan, White gained 607

yards, averaging 5.5 per try, and scored 84 points on 14 touchdowns.

BOB WIESE, Michigan fullback for four years and captain in 1944, brings a record to the Detroit Lions of having gained 1497 yards for the Wolverines plus scoring a total of 141 points. He got 23 touchdowns and three extra points and averaged 3.9 yards every time he lugged the ball . . . In 1943 when the navy sent Bill Daley to Ann Arbor, Wiese moved to quarterback for six games until Bill was transferred . . . Last fall injuries kept Wiese from possible honor team selections and more important, to the Wolverines at least, out of the Illinois game when the Illini took a close one to move a step closer to the Rose Bowl . . . In addition to his four letters in football, Bob won three in baseball and two in basketball. He served 38 months in the navy and currently is working on his master's degree in mechanical engineering

. . . **CAMP WILSON**, the fullback from Tulsa who led the Lions in ground gaining last season in his first year of pro football, was a teammate of Clyde LeForce in 1943 when the Hurrican went undefeated until dropping a 20 to 18 Sugar Bowl decision to Georgia Tech . . . Wilson was at Hardin-Simmons in 1942, then played three years at Tulsa, putting in a New Year's bowl appearance each of the four seasons . . . Since joining the Lions Wilson has made Detroit his permanent home and in the off-season is employed in a downtown men's store . . . His plunging netted Detroit 207 yards in 1946, averaging 3.2 yards per try. He also was the team's second leading scorer with 18 points.

LEROY ZIMMERMAN, for whom the Lions traded two men to Philadelphia this year, completed 190 of his 440 forward passes in four years with the Eagles for 3219 yards, 30 of them for touchdowns. His average at Philadelphia was .436 . . . Zimmerman, one of the most experienced quarterbacks in N.F.L., understudied Sammy Baugh at Washington in 1940, 1941 and 1942 before being sold to the Eagles. He had played at San Jose State in 1937, 1938 and 1939 attracting sufficient attention to be named to an All-Coast team and to the Little All-

American his senior year . . . Standing six feet three and weighing 205, Zimmerman was the passing arm that carried the Eagles to second place in the eastern division the last three years . . . His experience and ability as a passer and T quarterback takes the pressure off rookie Clyde LeForce upon whom Coach Gus Dorais had figured he would have to depend almost entirely until putting over the deal with Philadelphia . . . Zimmerman's best year with the Eagles was in 1945 when he completed 67 of 132 passes for 991 yards and nine touchdowns. However, he hit his peak in effectiveness last fall with 41 completions in 79 attempts, a .519 mark . . . During his first three years with the Eagles Zimmerman did all the club's punting, also kicked 87 conversions in 95 attempts and proved his defensive ability by leading the entire league in the number of interceptions in 1945 . . . He also is a long range field goal kicker and two years ago in Detroit kicked one from 47 yards out, only seven yards short of the 13-year-old N.F.L. record set by Glenn Presnell of the Lions in 1934. In 1944 Zimmerman had a 49-yard field goal against Boston.

The Detroit Lions training camp roster lists four men who won the Purple Heart: Guard Walter Vezmar from Michigan State, who was with the team last year; Halfbacks August Camarata from Iowa Teachers and Bill O'Brien of Detroit and Tackle Victor Pedersen from Gustavus Adolphus . . . Of the Lions who reported at the Alma, Mich., training site, 44 have service records. Thirteen were in the navy, 12 in the Army Air Forces, 11 in the army, seven in the marines and one in the coast guard . . . The roster also lists 19 men who were college football captains . . . The Detroit club has more Michigan men battling for jobs than there used to be in the entire National League. There are seven with the Lions, Fullbacks Bob Westfall and Bob Wiese, Halfback Paul White, Ends John Greene and Elmer Madar, Tackle Bob Derleth and Center Mervin Pregulman . . . Detroit also has four former Ohio State stars in Ends Jack Dugger and Cecil Souders, Tackle Russ Thomas and Halfback Tommy James, but no other Western Conference school is represented . . . Four of the Lions are from the University of Alabama . . . Detroit has five men who played in last season's annual East-West Shrine game at San Francisco. Ends Elmer Madar of Michigan, Cecil Souders from Ohio State and Tackle Ed Stacco of Colgate were on the eastern all-star eleven. Center Reed Nilsen from Brigham Young and Quarterback Clyde LeForce of Tulsa played for the West which won, 13 to 9, on two touchdown passes by LeForce and his general all-around effectiveness. It was the second

East-West appearance for Souders . . . Nine of the Lions have been on teams that received New Year's bowl bids, topped by Fullback Camp Wilson who appeared in four of them . . . Detroit's new trainer, Ray Roberts, was Michigan's trainer from 1930 until this fall and previously had served in the same capacity at West Point . . . The Lions also have a new equipment manager in Jim Brockman, another importation from Ann Arbor . . . The Lions will travel exclusively by rail throughout the 1947 National league season . . . General Manager Lewis M. Cromwell is the only member of the Detroit Lions organization who has been connected with the club since it first was brought to Detroit when G. A. (Dick) Richards bought the Portsmouth Spartan franchise in 1934. Cromwell had charge of ticket operations right from the start and was named general manager three years ago by Owner Fred L. Mandel, Jr., who has held the franchise since 1940 . . . Coach Gus Dorais took 36 rookies to the Lions training camp for their first fling at professional football. That's well over half his full squad.

BILL DUDLEY SIGNS WITH LIONS!

BILL DUDLEY, the National league's most valuable player in 1946, was obtained by the Lions from Pittsburgh just as this book was going to press. Bob Cifers and Paul White were the Lions who had 1947 contracts who were traded to the Steelers . . . Dudley was an All-American halfback at Virginia in 1941 at the age of 19, set an all-time modern collegiate scoring record with 134 points and was second that year in ground gaining for the nation . . . He was Pittsburgh's No. 1 draft choice and in 1942, his first year there, led the league in ground gaining . . . Dudley did the same again in 1946, his second full season in the league and climaxed that campaign when he was chosen for the most valuable player award . . . During the interim between the '42 and '46 seasons, Bill was in the Army Air Forces. He was discharged late in 1945 and played the last three games of that season with Pittsburgh . . . Now 25, he reported to the Lions at 182 pounds. His one previous experience as a T formation halfback was in his great senior year at Virginia.

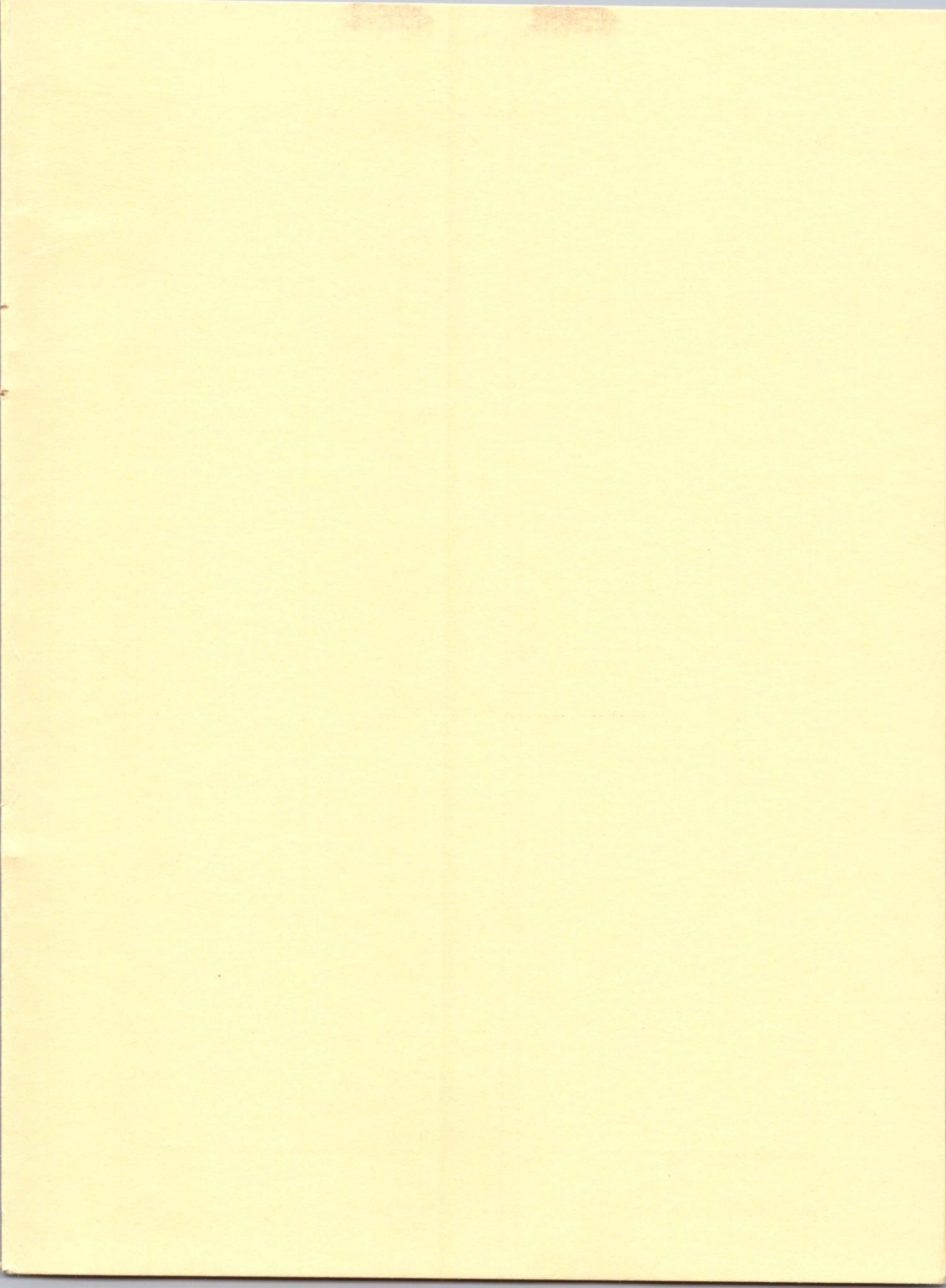
