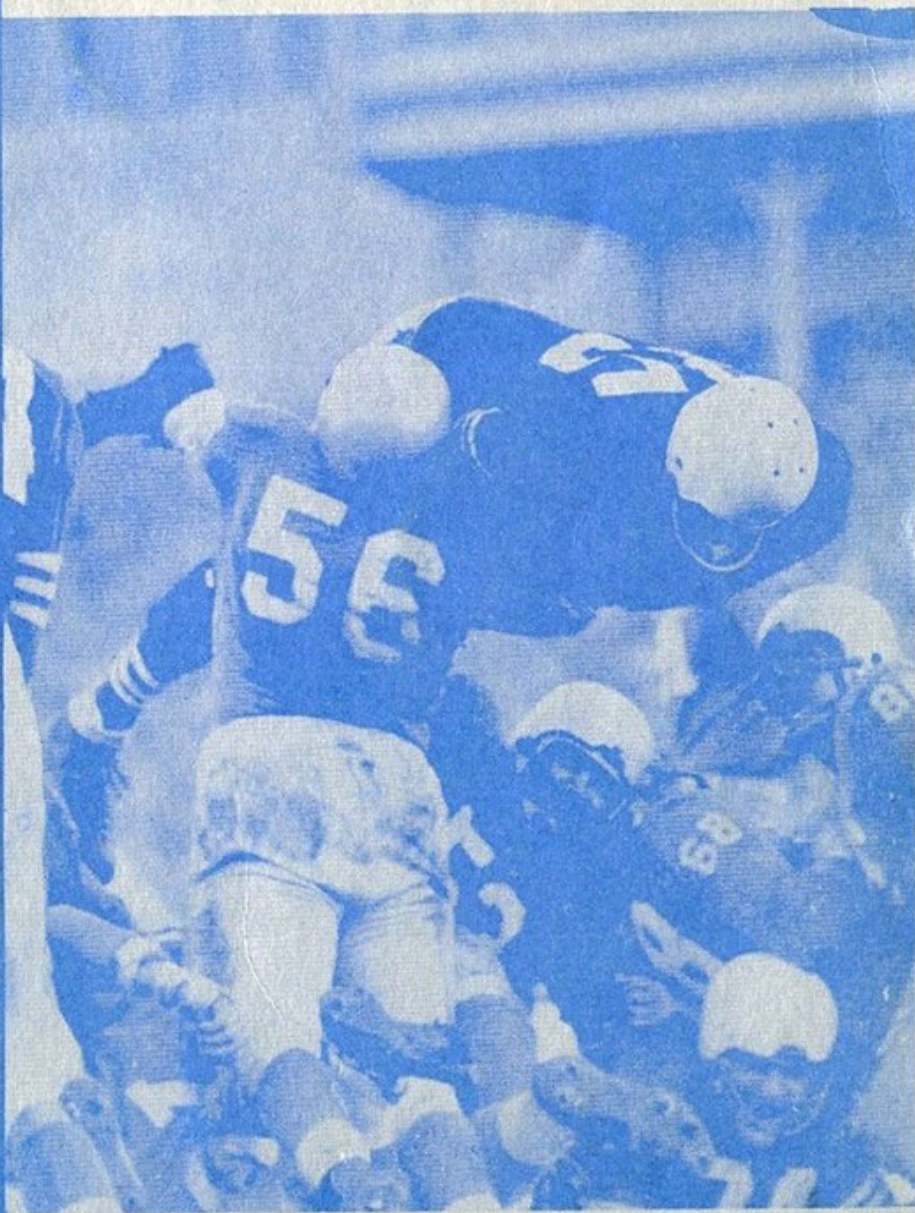

THE DETROIT FOOTBALL COMPANY

On January 15, 1948, a group of Detroit and Michigan sportsmen and football enthusiasts established the Detroit Football Company and purchased the franchise in the National Football League.

G. A. Richards transferred the Portsmouth, Ohio, Spartans to Detroit on June 30, 1934 and the Lions have represented the Motor City ever since. Richards handled the club, during which time the team won one World's Championship in 1935, until February 10, 1940 when he sold his franchise to Mr. Fred L. Mandel of Chicago. Mandel retained control of the team until the 1948 date when he sold out to the present corporation that enrolls more than 130 stockholders.

Of the seven men who were instrumental in the purchase of the franchise in 1948, six still are active on the company board of directors.

TICKET INFORMATION

Season Tickets—For the second straight year, a new all-time National Football League season ticket record was set by the Detroit Lions during the 1956 season. A total of 36,586 season books were distributed, to eclipse the record of 36,434 established by the Lions in 1955. The 1957 sale again promises a new record.

Since 1950, the sale of season tickets has jumped from 8,685 to the present 37,000-plus total. In 1951 the Lions distributed 10,094 season tickets, 1952 saw 17,554 tickets sold, in 1953 the figure jumped to 21,606, and in 1954 the total was 28,553.

Single Game Sales—Grandstand reserved seat tickets can be purchased at the Lions ticket office, 1401 Michigan Avenue. Lower deck reserved seats are \$3.50, tax included. Ticket offices remain open from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. during the season when the Lions are on the road and 9:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. the week preceding a home game. Saturday office hours are 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. during the season. Seven thousand \$2.00 general admission tickets go on sale at Briggs Stadium two hours before kickoff of each game, UNLESS there is a sell-out of all the reserved seats in advance of a game. Then an announcement would be made in the newspapers, on radio and television, advising the public of an advance sale of the bleachers, at our office, 1401 Michigan Avenue.

Mail Orders—Tickets to all Lion home games can be obtained by mail by sending a check or money order to cover the amount of the tickets and including a self-addressed stamped envelope to: Detroit Football Company, 1401 Michigan Avenue, Detroit 16, Michigan. It is advisable when ordering by mail to list an alternate date.

Press Tickets—Only certified press, radio and TV representatives will be admitted to the press box, which is operated according to recommendations of the Football Writers Association of America. Address requests for working press tickets to Bud Erickson, 1401 Michigan Ave., Detroit 16, Mich.

EDWIN J. ANDERSON

President

One of the big reasons for the rise of the Detroit Football Company in recent years has been the dynamic leadership of one of the Motor City's top executives, Edwin J. Anderson, president of the Goebel Brewing Company.

Anderson is in his eighth year as president of the Lion organization and during this period the Lions have established several all-time National Football League records for season ticket sales and home attendance records, and the company has developed into one of the soundest franchises in the National Football League.

Anderson moved into the presidency of the Lions in December, 1949, after being in the original group of sports-minded Michigan leaders who purchased the franchise from Fred Mandel in 1948. After finishing 4-8 in 1949, the team showed a 6-6 record in 1950 and then was in contention until the final four minutes of the '51 season before losing to San Francisco 21-17 to allow Los Angeles to take the division title. The Lions went on to win three straight division titles and two World Championships, 1952 and 1953, before a rash

of injuries dropped the club to the bottom in '55 with a 3-9 slate. Last year's 9-3 record again put the Lions in second place in the division, a half-game behind the Chicago Bears.

As the Lions have prospered on the field, so have they prospered at the box office. In 1950, 8,685 season tickets were distributed but that figure has grown to tremendous proportions since. In 1955, 36,434 season books were sold and despite the last place finish, a new record league total of 36,586 tickets was set last year. Another record is assured for '57.

Anderson is one of Detroit's top sports boosters (his company, the Goebel Brewing Company, sponsors radio and television broadcasts of both the Lions and the Detroit Tigers) as evidenced by the fact that he was elected president of the Global World Series of baseball which was held in Detroit in 1957. He also is a member of the Board of Directors of the Boys Committee of Detroit and is involved with important committee work with the United Foundation and the Detroit Urban League.

Anderson graduated from Beloit (Wis.) College in the mid-twenties, after being a standout performer on a football team that played some of the top teams of the day.

Engaged in the advertising business after he graduated as a Rhodes Scholar from Beloit, he was named vice-president of sales for Goebel in 1938 and three years later, at the age of 38, he was named president of the brewery. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of the American Motorists Insurance Co. of Chicago.

His family includes his wife, Sunny, and two daughters, Marynell, and Susan Jane Stenglein and one grandson, Harold J. Stenglein, III.

W. NICHOLAS KERBAWY, General Manager

It's a full time job . . . and then some . . . running a professional football team and Nick Kerbawy is the man on the job for the Detroit Lions.

Player contracts, pre-season schedules, and a "thousand and one" other details involving the million dollar operation of a franchise in the National Football League are handled through his office.



Kerbawy joined the Lions in 1948 as public relations director from Michigan State where he had built a reputation for himself as one of the top publicity directors in the college ranks. Since that time he has handled duties as assistant to General Manager Bo McMillin (Aug., 1950), and Business Manager (December, 1950) before he took over as General Manager in Feb., 1952.

Before his move into the sport field at MSU, Kerbawy had his background in school teaching for eleven years in Michigan public schools. Part-time newspaper work kept him in close touch with numerous city and state press representatives.

A noted graduate of Hillsdale College, Kerbawy was presented a special citation by the college in 1954 for his outstanding record in the field of public relations. He recently served as 1954 chairman of the Michigan Week Sports Committee for the Michigan Hall of Fame.

Born August 8, 1912, Kerbawy, at 45, has one of the most influential positions in the country in the professional sports field. Kerbawy resides in suburban Bloomfield Hills, Mich., with his wife, Antha, and son Kyle.



MAURICE SCHUBOT—(Box Office Treasurer)—has been connected with Lions box office, both on a part-time and full-time basis since the franchise was moved to Detroit in 1934 . . . assumed full-time duties as box office treasurer in 1950 . . . has supervised Lions tremendous season ticket increase from 8,000 in 1950 to the NFL record shattering total of 36,586 in 1956 . . . a life-long resident of Detroit . . . family includes wife, Fanne, and two children, Errol and Joan . . . assisted in box office by (Mrs.) Blanche Peters.

ROY (FRIDAY) MACKLEM—(Equipment Manager)—long-time veteran of the Lions staff . . . has handled equipment since 1936, with exception of period between 1944 and 1947 . . . one of the "behind the scenes" men who keep a football team operating efficiently . . . native of Detroit . . . attended Eastern High School . . . resides in Madison Heights, Mich. . . family includes wife, Leone, and two daughters, Alice, 16, and Diana, 13.

MILLARD KELLEY—(Trainer)—serving third year as trainer of the Lions . . . came to Detroit after serving as assistant trainer at Michigan State . . . graduate of Purdue University in '52 . . . took graduate work at Stanford Physical Therapy School, graduating in '53 . . . served on Stanford training staff before moving to MSU . . . native of Pittsburgh, Pa. . . family includes wife, Mary, and three sons, Robert, 9, Bart, 5, and Paul, 2.

1957 Detroit Lions Coaching Staff

GEORGE WILSON — Head Coach

George Wilson reported to the Chicago Bears in 1937, after completing his college career at Northwestern, and began a National Football League career that culminated with his appointment as head coach of the Lions just before the 1957 campaign got underway.



WILSON

Wilson is in his ninth season in the Detroit Lions organization. He joined the Lions as an assistant coach in 1949 and was the oldest in point of service on Coach Buddy Parker's staff. He succeeded Parker when the latter resigned suddenly two days before the first pre-season game.

During his playing days with the Bears, Wilson was recognized as one of the top end performers in the league. He played a key role in the Bears sensational 73-0 victory over the Washington Redskins in 1940. After concluding his playing career in 1946, Wilson served two years as a Bear aide before joining the Lions staff under "Bo" McMillin in 1949.

During his tenure with the Lions, Wilson has served as backfield coach and end coach, in the latter capacity developing such stellar Lion performers as Cloyce Box and Dave Middleton.

Wilson has been named on several occasions as a candidate for various professional head coaching posts, but has turned his back on other offers because of business connections in the Motor City area. His new job marks his first shot at a head coaching position.

"Following in the footsteps of Buddy Parker figures to be a big job," says Wilson, "as I personally considered him, along with George Halas and Paul Brown, as one of the all-time great pro coaches. I only hope that I can do half as good a job as Buddy . . . that would mean somewhere along the line I would win one championship, at least."

A former Chicagoan, who prepped at St. John's Military Academy, Wilson now resides in Dearborn, Mich., and his family includes his wife, Claire, and five children, Susan, 17, George, 14, Lynn, 10, Kathleen, 6, and Laurie, 3½. He was born Feb. 3, 1914.

Admittedly, Wilson has some big coaching shoes to fill in following Parker, but the former Bear star is a "rookie" again in the NFL and has tackled the job with typical rookie enthusiasm.



FORTE

ALDO FORTE—Another former Chicago Bear star who has turned to the coaching field . . . joined Lions in 1949 as scout . . . has been on coaching staff since 1950 . . . joined Bears in 1939 after completing college at Montana State University . . . retired from active roster in 1946 . . . spent four years in U. S. Navy . . . got first coaching experience as aide to Clark Shaughnessy at Maryland in 1942 while in service . . . jewelry business occupied time during '47 season but returned to game as Bear scout in '48 . . . native of Chicago, Ill. . . . born Jan. 20, 1918 . . . vice-president of National Foundry Sand Corp. during off-season . . . family includes wife, Lillian or "Sammy," and two sons, Gary, 12, and Gregory, 5 . . . resides in suburban Farmington Township . . . works with line, offensive and defensive, during week but handles press box phones during games.



RAMSEY

GARRARD (BUSTER) RAMSEY—Full-time assistant from William and Mary . . . played pro football with Chicago Cardinals . . . specializes on defensive unit, working especially with defensive backs . . . earned All-League honors during playing career . . . served as player-coach of Cardinals until 1951 . . . joined Lions' staff in 1952 . . . Navy veteran . . . one of top defensive strategists in the NFL . . . his outstanding record with defensive unit was one of key reasons for Lions' solid '56 performance . . . Detroit ranked second with 28 interceptions in '56 . . . allowed only 188 points . . . native of Maryville, Tenn. . . . now resides in Dearborn, Mich. . . . born March 16, 1920 . . . family includes wife, Betsy, and three children, Gary, 11, Beth, 8, and William, 4.



NUSSBAUMER

BOB NUSSBAUMER — full-time player scout . . . also works with offensive ends . . . joined Lions in 1954 . . . former University of Michigan grid, track, and baseball star . . . played with Green Bay in '46 . . . Washington in '47 and '48 . . . was with Cardinals in '49 and '50 . . . completed career with Packers in '51 . . . joined Cardinal front office in '52 . . . topped Eastern Division in receiving in 1947 with 47 catches for 625 yards . . . led league in interceptions in 1949 with 12 . . . played pro baseball in Phillies chain . . . resides in Dearborn, Mich. . . . native of Oak Park, Ill . . . family includes wife, Marie, and son John, 6.



COCHRAN

JOHN (RED) COCHRAN—joined Lions in February 1956 after serving as assistant coach at Wake Forest since 1951 . . . handles offensive backfield . . . played pro football with Cardinals from 1947 through 1950 . . . played college football at Wake Forest (1940, '41, '46) . . . native of Fairfield, Ala. . . . full-time assistant . . . 35 years old . . . married, wife, Pat, and infant daughter, Tracy.

'57 Lions Prospects

A new head coach and several top-rated veterans acquired via the trade route are the exciting new developments in the 1957 Detroit Lions picture.

George Wilson, a veteran assistant on Coach Buddy Parker's staff, moved into the head coaching spot when Parker resigned unexpectedly just before the pre-season campaign got underway.

On the player development front, four outstanding veteran NFL performers have bolstered the Lions in their bid for a Western Conference championship, Quarterback Tobin Rote, a Green Bay star since 1950, and defensive halfback Val Joe Walker joined the Lions in a trade that sent halfback Don McIlhenny, tackle Oliver Spencer, guard Jim Salisbury, and rookie tackle Norm Masters to the Packers. John Henry Johnson came from the San Francisco 49ers during the off-season in exchange for fullback Bill Bowman and defensive halfback Bill Stits.

Then midway through the pre-season campaign, All-Pro linebacker Roger Zatkoff was obtained from the Cleveland Browns in exchange for halfback Lew Carpenter and a future draft choice. Veteran center Frank Gatski was also obtained from Cleveland.

These established league performers, along with some promising rookie candidates, join a solid nucleus from the team that made the greatest comeback in league history last year, finishing 9-3 for second place in the Western Division after winding up last in 1955 with three victories and nine defeats.

The addition of Tobin Rote at quarterback gives the Lions probably the finest one-two punch in the game. Bobby Layne has been the sparkplug of the club through several outstanding seasons but has at times been troubled by a shoulder condition that limits his passing effectiveness. Such was the case in '55 as the Lions tumbled to the bottom of the division standing. Layne regained his form last year and the Lions led the league most of the season, only to be edged out of the title in the season finale by the Chicago Bears. A Thanksgiving Day loss to Green Bay, 24-20, sparked by Rote's great passing, probably was the one thing more than any other that spoiled the Lions chances. Now, Rote and Layne join forces against the rest of the league and the combination figures to be plenty tough. Rote threw more passes, 308, completed more, 146, for more yardage, 2203, and more touchdowns, 18, than any other NFL passer last season.

John Henry Johnson should provide the Lions with the best fullbacking the team has had in several years. Johnson's speed, blocking, and pass receiving know-how make him one of the most dangerous backs in the game.

Strength for an otherwise stalwart defensive club comes from a former Green Bay Packer, Roger Zatkoff. Zatkoff is regarded as one of the finest linebackers in the game and he and Joe Schmidt should provide Detroit with the most rugged linebacking duo in the game.

Here is a rundown, position by position, on the Lions offensive and defensive prospects looking ahead to the season.

'57 Lions Prospects Continued

OFFENSE: Charlie Ane, All-Pro choice center last year, is set for his fifth NFL season. The former USC star could develop into one of the best in league history. With Frank Gatski on hand, Ane may also play tackle.

Harley Sewell and Stan Campbell are solid veterans at the guard posts. Lion coaches feel that the former is one of the truly outstanding offensive performers in the game while Campbell, in his fourth season, is a steady performer with a fine improvement record behind him. Gene Cronin, a rugged sophomore, and rookies John Gordy and Chuck Muelhaupt are also working at the guard posts.

All-Pro Lou Creekmur "holds down the fort" at left tackle. Creekmur, prior to the start of the '57 season, had a string of 130 consecutive games going since joining the Lions in 1950. Rookie Ken Russell of Bowling Green and John Gordy have seen service on the right side, with veteran Darris McCord another possibility if the need arises.

Dave Middleton, Dorne Dibble, and Jim Doran are three talented receivers and two newcomers have come forward for frontline duty. Jerry Reichow, a former quarterback from Iowa, has made the switch to end and has been sensational in training games. Rookie end Steve Junker has filled in the ranks in outstanding fashion and he is regarded as a great pro receiving prospect.

Layne and Rote are due to share the quarterbacking spot in the Lions plans. Wilson has made plans to alternate the pair for starting assignments, allowing the quarterback who is "hot" on a particular day to carry the load.

Gene Gedman, the club's leading ground gainer last year, Hopalong Cassady, Ohio State's great All-American and the second leading ground gainer among the Lions last year, John Henry Johnson, a battle-tested veteran, Tom Tracy and Leon Hart form the nucleus for the Lions ball carrying corps. Rookie Marvin Brown of East Texas State has been the most impressive backfield newcomer in camp.

DEFENSE

All-Pro linebacker and team captain Joe Schmidt is the Lions' key operator on defense. He should get plenty of help from another All-Pro performer who joined the Lions by trade, Roger Zatkoff. Sonny Gandee and Bob Long, veterans who turned in stellar performances in '56, return to give the Lions as fine a group of defensive backer-ups as the league can boast. Jim Martin is another fine all-around performer who also handles kickoff and field goal assignments and plays offensive center.

Up front, the Lions feature a powerful four-man line sparked by veterans Ray Krouse, Bob Miller, Gil Mains, and Darris McCord. Jerry Perry and Gene Cronin are available to fill any vacancies that might develop through injuries.

"Buster" Ramsey's entire defensive backfield unit that ranked second in interceptions in the league last year returns intact. Jack Christiansen, Yale Lary, Jim David, Carl Karilivacz . . . "Chris' Crew" . . . probably is the top all-around unit in the league. Terry Barr has been impressive both as a defender and as a pass receiving possibility.

SUMMARY: The Lions again figure to be in contention in the division race with a team that rates as probably stronger than a year ago. The defense seems improved and the offensive club has better balance with the addition of Tobin Rote and John Henry Johnson. But being improved may not be enough, as most other clubs readily admit to stronger units than a year ago. All of which means another great scramble in the NFL with the fans due to reap the harvest in increased interest.

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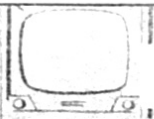

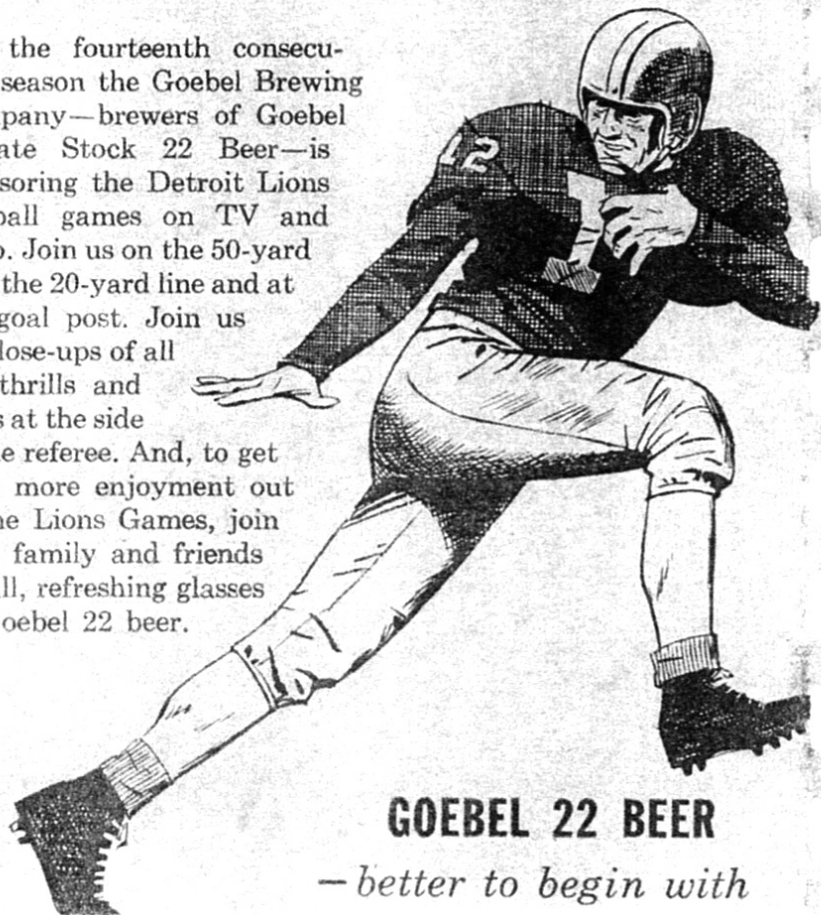
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
