DEDICATION

The 1987 Detroit Lions Media Guide is dedicated to the memory of Edwin J. Anderson, the former Lions' president and general manager, who passed away this

past February.

Mr. Anderson served as the Lions' president from 1949 to 1961 and general manager and vice president from 1961 to 1965 and manager and vice president

from 1961 to 1966 and during that time the Lions enjoyed great prosperity both on and off the field. During his presidency in the early and mid-1950s, the Lions were the dominant team in all of pro football with five divisional titles and three

were the dominant team in all of pro football with five divisional titles and three NFL championships (1952, '53, and 1957.)

Mr. Anderson also was instrumental in helping current Lions' owner, Mr. William Clay Ford, obtain full ownership of the franchise, which has resulted in the Lions' being one of the most stable and respected organizations in the entire NFL.

In more recent times, it was Mr. Anderson who spearheaded the drive to construct the present home of the Lions — the Pontiac Silverdome.

MEDIA SERVICES DIRECTORY

SILVERDOME PRESS BOX

The working area for writers, broadcasters and overhead photographers is located on the Club Level between the south and west corners of the stadium. The facility can accommodate over 150 media representatives in the upper press area and contains 15 booths in the lower area for radio, television, photographers, public address and scoreboard operations.

CREDENTIALS

All applications must be made through **Bill Keenist**, the Lions' Director of Public Relations. Credentials are available to working members of the media only. Advance notification of requests is appreciated. Season credentials will be issued to appropriate outlets. **Since no Press Will Call window is available due to the need for a parking pass to gain press lot access, most credentials and parking passes are mailed.** Please allow AT LEAST three days for mail delivery. Credentials can be left at a local hotel for pickup on game day. That hotel is the Northfield Hilton, which is located eight miles south of the Silverdome off I-75 at the Crooks Road exit. The Northfield Hilton front desk is used as a credential pickup point when requests are made too late to guarantee mail delivery.

PARKING

A parking pass is required to enter the press parking area, located on the southwest side of the Silverdome. Enter Gate 1 from Opdyke Road and proceed to the press parking area adjacent to the Press Box. Press parking is not automatically issued to every credentialed member of the media covering the game because of an insufficient number of parking passes and spaces.

SERVICES

Statistical information is distributed before, during and after the game. Spotters and statisticians are available to radio and TV crews upon advance request. Food and beverages for the working media are available in the Press Lounge. Your game credential entitles you to the buffet meal that is served prior to the game. The Lions' Public Relations staff is here to help. If you need assistance, don't hesitate to ask any of the PR persons shown below.





WILLIAM CLAY FORD

Owner and President

Detroit Lions' Owner William Clay Ford's involvement with the club goes back to his boyhood when his father, Edsel Ford, took him to the University of Detroit Stadium to see the first Lions' team play in their maiden season in the Motor City in 1934. Bill Ford to his friends and business associates, he became a club director in 1956 and was asked by then-Lions' President Edwin J. (Andy) Anderson to become Lions' President in 1961.

In November of 1963 Mr. Ford purchased the team outright for \$4.5 million.

He officially took over the club Jan. 10, 1964, with Mr. Anderson as General Manager and J. Russell (Russ) Thomas as Director of Player Personnel. Mr. Thomas succeeded Mr. Anderson as Vice-President and General Manager prior to the 1967 season.

The 23 seasons the Lions have played under Bill Ford's ownership have had their high moments. The 1969 through '75 teams all finished in second place in the NFC Central Division, with a high-water win-loss mark of 10-4 in '70. The '80 and '81 teams also finished in second place, and the 1983 club captured the NFC Central championship. A win in playoff competition has eluded Ford's Lions, however, and just ten seasons have been .500 or better. "We want a year-in, year-out contending team, one that has the capability of going to the Super Bowl every season," says Mr. Ford. "It has been a long wait for all of us to see the Lions return as one of profootball's best teams, and there must continue to be the common goal throughout the organization that a winning football team is all that matters."

Of course Mr. Ford's other passion in life is the automobile industry, he being a grandson of inventor and auto pioneer Henry Ford, founder of the Ford Motor Company. Today he serves the company as Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors. He was in charge of Ford's overall product design from 1956 to 1980, and was named to the Office of Chief Executive in 1978. As a member of that office, he is one of four executives who share responsibility for general management of the auto

company that has produced 35 million vehicles on the world's roads.

A member of the Board of Directors since 1948 and chairman of the Board's Executive Committee, Mr. Ford also serves as a member of Ford's Organization Review and Nominating Committee, the Finance Committee, and Policy and Strategy

Committee and he is chairman of the Design Committee.

Automobile design long has been a source of great pride to Mr. Ford. On his way to his present vice chairmanship of the company, he gained special satisfaction as the executive in charge of the design, development and subsequent introduction of the Continental Mark II, the successor to the classic Lincoln Continental that had been developed and introduced by his father Edsel in 1939.

The youngest of Edsel's four children (after brothers Henry Ford II, the late Benson Ford and sister Josephine Clay Ford), William Clay Ford was born (3/14/25) some two decades after grandfather Henry founded Ford Motor Company in 1903. During his formative years Bill attended Detroit University School in Grosse Pointe, Mich.,

and Hotchkiss School in Lakeville, Conn. He graduated from Yale with a Bachelor of Science degree in economics following a tour of duty with the U.S. Navy. He then joined Ford's sales and advertising staff and later served on the industrial relations staff where he was a member of the committee that negotiated the historic 1949 contract with the UAW-CIO.

Always known as the most competitive of the Fords, particularly in athletics, Mr. Ford completed 25 weeks in the Naval Air Corps competing in some of the most difficult physical requirements that any U.S. military branch requires, including rigorous tests in swimming, running, boxing, wrestling and on the obstacle course. Testing was done in terms of strength, speed and endurance and Mr. Ford finished first in his class.

He enrolled at Yale following his military discharge and eventually captained both the tennis and soccer teams at the Ivy League School. He was a nationally ranked tennis player until two Achilles tendon surgeries regulated him to the sidelines. Mr. Ford's athletic participation today includes some tennis, although he prefers golf, a game in which he became nearly a scratch performer.

A major change in Lions' history occurred under Mr. Ford's guidance when he moved the team in 1975 from the downtown-located Tiger Stadium to metropolitan

Pontiac and the sparkling, 80,000-plus seat Pontiac Silverdome. In '80, the Lions' Silverdome paid attendance of 634,204 fans was the highest single-season (eight games) paid attendance figure in NFL history, a record that still stands. He then led the spirited effort that brought Super Bowl XVI to the Silverdome in January of 1982. It was an event that united many factions throughout the state of Michigan.

Mr. Ford also is the Chairman of the Board of the Edison Institute, which operates Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn; is a trustee of the Eisenhower Medical Center; and serves as a director or a trustee for the Boys' Club of America, the National Tennis Hall of Fame, the Automotive Hall of Fame, the United Foundation of Detroit, the National Corporate Cabinet of the American Heart Association and he serves as

a director of Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit, Manufacturers National Corporation and with the Economic Club of Detroit.

Included among his more recent appointments have been his naming as a trustee for the Michigan Heart Association and to the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation. He received an honorary doctor of science degree from the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, Calif., in 1981.

He is married to the former Martha Firestone of Akron, Ohio, and they are the parents of three daughters — Martha, Sheila and Elizabeth — and a son, Bill Jr., who in addition to serving the Lions as club treasurer, is a graduate of MIT's prestigious Sloan School of Business, and who currently is in England working for Ford of Europe.



RUSS THOMAS Executive Vice President and General Manager

When you look at the qualifications of all the general managers in the National Football League, few campare to the those of the Lions' Russ Thomas. For starters, not many have been in the business as long as Thomas — he is now in his 41st year of service with the Lions — and even fewer, if any, have experience in as many areas of the club's operation as does Thomas. He has been a player, an assistant coach, a scout, the director of player personnel and he even

served as a broadcaster for the Lions when he teamed with the legendary Van Patrick on the Lions' telecasts during the early 1960s. With that resume it's easy to see why there's no one better prepared or more experienced than Russ to lead the Lions.

Russ Thomas first came to the Detroit Lions 41 years ago as a heralded player out of Ohio State University. His long affiliation with the Lions began with the 1946 NFL draft as the Buckeyes' two-way tackle was tabbed early in the selections that year by Detroit. He became an instant pro success by being named All-Pro his rookie season before advancing to the stature of team captain in 1949. His short playing career, however, ended that season when a knee injury forced Russ into retirement.

The injury eventually led to new challenges for Russ off the field. He left the Lions for two years, 1950-51, to work for Coach Joe Bach at St. Bonaventure University. Once football season ended each year, Thomas returned to Detroit to work in private business. It was during one of those off-seasons that Russ was contacted by Lions' Coach Buddy Parker to rejoin the club as an assistant coach. Russ did so in 1952 and he has remained with the Lions ever since.

While hired in '52 primarily as an assistant coach, Russ also joined the Lions as the club's primary college scout and also as the person in the organization responsible for scouting each week's pro opponent. Thus, long before the advent of film exchanges and computers, it was Thomas' scouting reports that helped bring Detroit NFL titles in 1952, '53 and '57.

For his efforts, Russ was promoted up the front office ladder, taking over as director of player personnel following William Clay Ford's outright purchase of the club in early 1964. In addition to utilizing Russ' talents at recognizing college talent and heading up the team's college draft each year, Russ also became the club's chief contract negotiator, a task he continues to handle today.

Thomas' rise to the top of Lions' management hit high gear in 1967 when he was named Vice President and General Manager, handling the day-to-day operations of the organization. He was appointed Executive Vice President and General Manager in 1972. Among his many off-the-field contributions was

playing a key role in the approval and construction of the Pontiac Silverdome. Russ led the effort to bring Super Bowl XVI (1982) to the Lions' home, the first and only time the NFL's championship game has been ventured to a northern clime.

"I've always found Russ to be courteous, resourceful and honest in all of his dealings, not only with his peers, but with everyone he comes in contact with," says George Young, the general manager of the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants. "He's also been very willing to assist those who have sought his highly-regarded opinions and outstanding experience. He truly is a respected leader in our profession."

A native of Griffithsville, W. Va., Russ was such an outstanding schoolboy football prospect as a lineman that he was wooed to Charleston, W. Va., to play high school football. While in high school he also excelled as the state champion in the discus and the shot put, setting state records in both events (he was voted into the West Virginia State Hall of Fame in 1983).

He was recruited to Ohio State by legendary Paul Brown, and he played one season for Coach Brown before Paul moved on to the old All-American Football Conference and started the Cleveland Browns. Russ was All-Big Ten and All-America in football at OSU and was a key member of the Buckeyes' 1944 national championship team. As a collegian, he lettered three years in football, twice in track and once in wrestling.

Today, Russ and his wife Dorothy live in Walled Lake, a suburb located northwest of Detroit. They are the parents of two grown sons, John and Jim, and they have one granddaughter.



DARRYL ROGERS


Head Coach and Director of Football Operations

Darryl Rogers proved to be anything but an ordinary rookie NFL head coach after he took over the Detroit Lions on Feb. 6, 1985. But, ordinary never has been an accurate description of Rogers, as he continues the rebuilding process of the Lions.

Rogers revitalized and enthused a veteran Lions' club and guided it to a deceiving 7-9 record in his freshman NFL season. Despite an onslaught of injuries (13 starters missed a total of 91 games that season), Rogers and his coaching

staff patchworked Detroit through a campaign that included back-to-back home victories over the Super Bowl XIX participants (49ers and Dolphins) and wins over two

other 1985 playoff-bound teams (Jets and Cowboys).



The 1987 season will represent the 23rd consecutive year Rogers has been a team's grid boss. In 20 years as a college head coach, his teams compiled a combined 129-84-7 win-loss record starting in 1965 when he became the first-ever head

coach at Hayward State College in Hayward, Calif.

And if ordinary is not an accurate description of Rogers, durable is since he has had to battle throughout his college coaching career with some difficult situations where the atmosphere has not necessarily been conducive to winning. Yet, wherever he's been, he's won.

Following just one year at Hayward, he was named head coach at his alma mater, Fresno State, in 1966, then moved to San Jose State in 1973. The head coaching

trail later took him to Michigan State in 1976 and Arizona State in '80.

Rogers' coaching talents hit the national spotlight most prominently during his final two college coaching stops. Following a 4-6-1 first year at Michigan State, the Spartans jumped to 7-3-1 in 1977 despite a sanction-saddled situation, and Rogers was named the Big Ten Coach-of-the-Year.

Even better things came in '78 when MSU finished 8-3 and earned a Big Ten co-title with Michigan. The Spartans also defeated the Wolverines in Ann Arbor, 24-15, to become the first team other than Michigan or Ohio State to win a Big Ten crown

in 11 years.

Along the way, Rogers' teams began rewriting offensive record books. The '78 Spartans averaged 523 yards per game and 41 points per contest, startling the previously ground-oriented conference. Both figures were MSU and Big Ten marks at the time. Rogers' offensive style was a harbinger of things to come in the Big Ten as many conference teams since then have switched to more wide-open, pass-oriented offenses.

The 1978 season brought the Spartans a No. 12 national ranking and Rogers was named national Coach-of-the-Year by The Sporting News.

He jumped from the frying pan into the fire in '80 when he agreed to assume the reins of the controversy-marred Arizona State program that soon became probation sentenced.

Undaunted by the factionalism that surrounded the dismissal of popular, longtime head coach Frank Kush, Rogers immediately took the Sun Devils to consecutive 7-4, 9-2 and 10-2 records with decidedly different teams. His 1981 club produced 35.8 points and 498.7 yards per game and the team's total vardage output of 5,486 yards led the nation while also setting a new Pac-10 Conference standard.

Darryl's '82 Sun Devil team then turned to defense to win ten games with the nation's stinglest unit - allowing just 228.9 yards per game. It was the first time a Pac-10 team had led the nation in defense.

Rogers, who was 52 on May 28, is a native Californian from Los Angeles who grew up in Long Beach, where he attended Jordan High School and City College before enrolling at Fresno State. An all-league receiver in high school and junior college, Darryl played at Fresno State while participating in a work-scholarship program, holding down a warehouse job. His college roommate was current Nevada-Las Vegas basketball Coach Jerry Tarkanian. He was the No. 2 ranked small college pass receiver in the nation as a junior with 33 receptions. Following college he served two years in the U.S. Marine Corps before having a brief free agent stint with the Los Angeles Rams during training camp in 1959.

Rogers, an avid golfer, holds bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education from Fresno State. He and his wife Marsha have three daughters-Jamie, Keely and Stacy.



THE COACHING STAFF

Bob Baker • OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

The one-time head coach of the Canadian Football League's Calgary Stampeders (1974-76), Bob Baker came to the Lions with Darryl Rogers prior to the 1985 season as offensive coordinator and tutor of the team's quarterbacks. He served the two years previous to coming to Detroit with the Los Angeles Rams (1983-84) as quarterback coach, going to the Rams from Rogers' coaching staff at Arizona State. Both Rams' teams made the playoffs during Baker's stint in L.A. The '84 team won 10 games, including nine under untested quarterback Jeff Kemp, who matured greatly under Baker. The Sun Devils had led the entire NCAA under Rogers



and Baker in total offensive yardage in 1981 with 5,486 yards. A 1951 graduate of Ball State (Ind.), Baker coached at four different Indiana high schools — Muncie, Royerton, Ft. Wayne Southside and Anderson Madison Heights — before becoming a college assistant coach. His coaching tours at the college level included stints as an assistant at Indiana (1966-73), Michigan State (1977-79, his first tour with Rogers), and at Arizona State (1980-82). He coached in the '68 Rose Bowl with the Indiana Hoosiers of Head Coach John Pont. Baker was born in Lima, Ohio, and was reared in Bluffton, Ind. He and wife Alyce have four daughters — Lisa, Rebecca, Sue and Debbie — and live in Rochester Hills, Mich.

Wayne Fontes DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Following a nine-year tenure with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers that saw him rise through the Bucs' coaching staff to become the No. 1 assistant on John McKay's staff, Wayne Fontes left the Bucs to become Darryl Rogers' defensive coordinator in Detroit in the spring of 1985. In just two seasons under Fontes and his defensive staff, the Lions have made marked improvements. Last season the Lions were sixth in the NFL in touchdowns allowed by its defense and fourth in the League in pass defense, yielding just 175 yards per game. The only defensive units in the NFL to yield fewer TDs than the Lions belonged to teams with winning records:



Chicago, N.Y. Giants, San Francisco, L.A. Rams and Minnesota. The Lions' '86 defense also made improvements in the following categories: first downs allowed (298, down from 359 in '85); average yards allowed per game; average yards allowed rushing and passing per game and fewer points allowed per game. A former AFL defensive back with the New York Jets, Fontes went from secondary coach to defensive coordinator and assistant head coach of the Bucaneers during his years at Tampa. He was first named the team's defensive coordinator in 1982. Under Fontes that year, the Bucs led the NFC in defense. Wayne is a Canton, Ohio, native who was a football and baseball star at Michigan State. He was an All-Big 10 defensive back and was selected to play in the continued


North-South and Senior Bowl All-Star games in 1962 before being drafted by the Jets, where he started in the defensive backfield in 1963-64 but had his playing career cut short by a broken leg. Entering 1987, Fontes still held the Jets' record for longest interception return, an 83-yarder against the Houston Oilers (12/15/63). His first coaching job was directing the freshman team at Michigan State in 1965 while he was working on his master's degree in administration. He coached at Visitation High School in Bay City, Mich., in 1966-67, winning the Michigan Class B state championship in '67 with a team that went 10-0, before serving as defensive backfield coach at three universities — Dayton (1968), lowa (1969-71) and Southern Cal (1972-75). It was at the latter stop Fontes began a 13-year association with McKay, moving on to the expansion Bucs with McKay in 1976. Wayne, whose brother Len is the defensive backfield coach of the World Champion Giants, lives with his wife Evelyn in Rochester, Mich. They have three children — Mike, Scott and Kim.



Carl Battershell SPECIAL TEAMS

The Lions' special teams coach, Carl Battershell, entering his third year of pro football in 1987, attended Bowling Green State University, just 82 miles from Detroit, in northwestern Ohio. At Bowling Green, he was an All-Mid-American Conference offensive tackle. The 38-year old Battershell (11/5/48) coached ofensive linemen and special teams during a collegiate coaching career that included stops at Bowling Green (1973-76), Syracuse (1977-79), West Virginia (1980-82) and Arizona State (with Darryl Rogers, 1983-84). Carl and his wife Susan live in nearby Rochester. They

have four children — sons Scott, Christopher and Jason, and a daughter, Lisette.



Lew Carpenter • RECEIVERS

The Lions' new receivers' coach, Lew Carpenter, 55, will be enjoying a homecoming of sorts since as a player he was drafted by the Lions out of Arkansas (eighth round, '53). He led Detroit in rushing in '54 and '55, gaining 476 yards in '54 and 543 in '55. He was traded to the Cleveland Browns and later to the Green Bay Packers, where he finished his career on two World Championship teams under Vince Lombardi ('61 and '62). He played five positions as a pro — both wide receivers, tight end and both running backs. Carpenter launched his coaching career with the Vikings in '65 and also has worked for the Falcons, Redskins,

Cardinals, Oilers and Packers. With Green Bay as receivers coach from 1975-85, he developed three Pro Bowl receivers all in the same year ('83) — James Lofton, John Jefferson and Paul Coffman — a feat that has never been duplicated in the NFL. In 1980 five Packers caught 40 or more passes and in '83 four players caught 50 or more passes. This season will be Carpenter's 22nd in coaching in the NFL. He is a native of West Memphis, Ark., and he and his wife Ann have four daughters — Cheryl, Cathy, Lisa and Rebecca.

Bill Muir OFFENSIVE LINE

Pittsburgh native Bill Muir became the offensive line coach of the Lions in 1985 following a pro football career that dates back 18 years to the Continental Football League and includes nine years of coaching as an assistant at five different colleges. The 44-year-old Muir (10/26/42) spent three seasons (1982-84) with the New England Patriots as the offensive line coach prior to joining the Lions. Over Muir's first two seasons in New England, the Patriots' offense had the best team rushing total (3,592 yards) in the NFL. In each of his three seasons at New England he had at least one offensive lineman make the Pro Bowl. Prior to that.



he was with the Tampa Bay Bucs for four years (1978-81), first as a scout, and during the last three years as Director of Pro Personnel. Before entering the NFL, Muir was an assistant coach at Susquehanna (1965), Delaware Valley (1966-67), Rhode Island (1970-71), Idaho State (1972-73) and at Southern Methodist (1976-77). He also coached in the Continental Football League with the Orlando Panthers (1968-69) as offensive coordinator and in the World Football League with the Houston-Shreveport franchise (1974-75), again as offensive coordinator. Bill played three years at tackle at Susquehanna, a small Pennsylvania college, making all-conference his final two seasons. He and his wife Barbara and their two children, Keelan and Brady, live in Rochester, Mich.

Mike Murphy • LINEBACKERS

Following a seven-year stint coaching defenses in the Canadian Football League and the United States Football League, Mike Murphy was the final assistant hired in 1985 on Head Coach Darryl Rogers' all-new assistant coaching staff. Murphy had spent the previous two years as the defensive line coach of the Chicago Blitz. Prior to that, he was for five seasons the defensive coordinator of the Saskatchewan Roughriders. He began his coaching career, which has spanned 20 years, at the high school level in the '60s in Boulder, Colo., then in Denver, and later in Woonsocket, S.D. Mike attended college in South Dakota, at Huron College, where



he played guard and linebacker for four years. He moved into college coaching as an assistant in 1974 at Idaho State, where he advanced to defensive coordinator by 1976. He moved to Western Illinois as linebacker coach in '77. A Manhattan, N.Y., native, Murphy graduated from Greenwich (Conn.) High. He holds a master's degree in educational administration from the University of Vermont. He and his wife Robin, and their children, Sam and Sarah, live in Rochester. Mike will turn 43 this fall (9/25/44).



Rex Norris • DEFENSIVE LINE

In the Oklahoma University salad decade of the '70s, while the Sooners were the only school in the nation other than Alabama to pile up 100 victories, and while OU was winning the Big Eight championship nine times, their great defensive linemen (Lucious, Dewey and Lee Roy Selmon, Reggie Kinlaw, Keith Gary, Phil Tabor, John Goodman, Ricky Bryan) all were being coached by Rex Norris, now the defensive line coach of the Lions. Norris spent 11 years on the Oklahoma staff under Barry Switzer, from 1973-83. He was named defensive coordinator in 1978 and assistant head coach in '81. He left OU after the '83 season to ioin Darryl Rogers

as defensive line coach at Arizona State and continued on with Darryl last spring to Detroit. Norris' other college jobs have been at Navarro Junior College in Texas (1970-71) and Texas A&M ('72). Rex was a JC All-America as a linebacker at Angelo State (Tex.) before transferring for his final two years to East Texas State, where he served as team captain in 1962. Following graduation, Norris spent six years coaching at R.L. Turner High in Carrollton, Tex. Now 47, (12/10/39), he was born in Tipton, Ind. Rex has a son, Rex Jr., and a daughter, Whitney Rae, both of whom are college students.



Vic Rapp • RUNNING BACKS

Vic Rapp, 51, enters his 21st season of pro coaching in his new assignment with the Lions. He spent the last two years as a running backs coach on the staff of Leeman Bennett with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He also has worked in the NFL for the Rams and Oilers. Rapp was for six seasons (1977-82) the head coach of the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League, compiling a win-loss record of 55-42-4. He twice led the BC Lions into the Western Conference championship game and his team qualified for the playoffs in three of his six seasons there. A graduate of Missouri, Rapp entered college coaching at Arizona ('65-'66)

in '65 after nine years as a high school coach. Rapp returned to his alma mater in '67. He remained at Missouri as an assistant until joining Edmonton of the CFL in '72 as offensive coordinator. Rapp, originally from Marionville, MO., and his wife, Carol, have three daughters — Rhonda, Paula and Marla.



Willie Shaw DEFENSIVE BACKS

Secondary Coach Willie Shaw, 43 (1/11/44), also came to the Lions from Darryl Rogers' Arizona State staff, where he coached the defensive backfield. In just his second season as an NFL coach, Shaw helped produce an NFL All-Rookie selection in free safety Devon Mitchell. An honorable mention All-America defensive back at New Mexico, Shaw attended college following a service hitch in the U.S. Air Force. Willie's coaching career has taken him throughout the west. He has been an assistant at San Diego City College (1970-72), Stanford ('73-'76), Cal State-Long Beach ('77-'78), Oregon ('79) and for five years at ASU ('80-'84). Shaw originally is

from San Diego, where he was a high school head coach at San Diego High. He and his wife Gay have two sons, David and Eric, and a daughter, Tawnya, and live in Rochester.

Don Doll • TIGHT ENDS/STAFF ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

Long-time Lions' favorite Don Doll returns this season for his 16th year of service with the Detroit Lions. A native of Southern California, Don was a two-way halfback for the Detroit Lions from 1949-52 and he still holds the club mark for the most interceptions in a game with four against the Chicago Cardinals in 1949. Don also shares (with Jack Christiansen) the Lions' record for most interceptions in a season with 12 in 1950. Don, 61, played his college ball at Southern California (1944, 1946-48) and was the most valuable Pacific Coast player his senior year. He began a four-year playing stint with the Lions in 1949, seeing most of his action on defense and earning three trips to the Pro



Bowl. He also played professionally for Washington (1953) and Los Angeles (1954). After his playing days, Don coached collegiately at Washington ('55), Contra Costa Junior College ('56), Southern California ('57-58) and Notre Dame ('59-62). His first professional coaching job was with the Lions (1963-64), and he then coached with the Los Angeles Rams ('65), Washington (1966-70), Green Bay (1971-73), Baltimore ('74), and Miami (1975-76). Don has been with the Lions on a continuous basis since 1978. In addition to his duties as tight ends coach, Don is the coaching staff's liaison with the club in administration and office matters and he also handles the majority of training camp administrative duties. A member of the Sacramento, Calif., Sports Hall of Fame, Don and his wife Diana have five children: Steven, Wendy, Kevan, Heidi and Michael.

Kent Falb HEAD TRAINER

Entering his 22nd year with the Lions, Kent Falb is one of the most respected trainers in the National Football League and throughout the field of athletic medicine. He was named the 1984 "Professional Athletic Trainer of the Year," as selected by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA). And this past June he had the most prestigious honor of being the keynote speaker for the NATA convention in Columbus, Ohio. It marked the first time in NATA history that a professional trainer was selected to deliver the keynote speech, which was presented to an audience of nearly 5,000. Along with his assistant, Joe Recknagel, Falb oversees all



rehabilitation programs, off-season conditioning work, and of course, the treatment of players' injuries. A native of Elgin, Iowa, Kent graduated from the University of Iowa in 1964 and received a Physical Therapy certificate from Iowa one year later. He began his athletic training career in 1959 as an assistant trainer at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. He was a student trainer at Iowa throughout college and worked part-time for the Minnesota Vikings in 1963 and

continued

'64. In 1965 Kent was named head trainer at Boston College and moved to the Lions as assistant trainer under Millard Kelly in 1966. He assumed his present position as head trainer with the Lions in 1967. Counting exhibition and playoff games, Kent enters the 1987 season having worked 397 games for the Lions. Of that total, 289 are regular-season games. By comparison, the most games played by a Lions' player is 200 by Wayne Walker. Kent, 47, lives in nearby Lake Orion with his wife Maxine and daughters Carmen and Nanette.



Dan Jaroshewich • EQUIPMENT MANAGER

One of the veteran equipment managers in the NFL, equipment manager Dan Jaroshewich, enters his 15th season of service with the Lions. A native of Windsor, Ont., Dan joined the Lions in 1973 as an assistant to long-time Lions' equipment man Roy "Friday" Macklem, who spent 44 years with the

Lions. Dan, 33, supervises the purchasing, repairing, replacing and cleaning of various equipment, uniforms and clothing used by the players and coaching

staff. Dan is capably aided by his assistant Mark Glenn. Mark, 26, worked for the Lions on a part-time basis from 1976-82. He became a full-time employee in 1983 and assists Jaroshewich in all areas of the equipment operation. Prior to joining the Lions, Jaroshewich worked at the high school and semi-pro levels in Windsor, where he also was a standout youth hockey player. He has a degree in personal and in-

dustrial relations from the University of Detroit and is close to completion of work on a master's degree in sports administration from Wayne State. Dan and his wife Kathy have two daughters, Jennifer (3), and Jessica (2) and they live in Troy. Mark Glenn and his wife Maria live in Waterford and have two boys, Marc (4), and Matthew (1).



Joe Recknagel ASSISTANT TRAINER

Every head trainer in professional sports will tell you the success of his operation depends greatly on the assistant trainer. So when Lions' head trainer Kent Falb was named the 1984 Professional Trainer of the Year, a big assist was credited to Joe Recknagel, Falb's assistant the past eight years. Recknagel, a Toledo, Ohio, native, began his athletic training career as a student trainer for four years at Rogers High School in Toledo. After graduating from Rogers, Joe attended Ohio University where he was a student assistant trainer for four years (1974-78). While at Ohio U., he assisted Falb at the Lions' training camp during the summers of

1977, '78, '79. After graduating from Ohio U. in 1978, Joe accepted the position of graduate assistant trainer at Marshall University in Huntington, W.Va. In 1979, he was promoted to assistant athletic trainer at Marshall. While at Marshall,

Recknagel worked with the football, wrestling and basketball teams. In June of 1980, he joined the Lions. Joe also donates a great deal of his time and expertise to the Oakland County Special Olympics and to both the Winter and Summer State (of Michigan) Special Olympic Games, which are held each February and May. A member of the National Athletic Trainers Association of America, Joe is single and resides in Lake Orion, Mich.

Don Clemons • STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

Another member of Darryl Rogers' Arizona State staff who came to Detroit. Don Clemons is the Lions' strength and conditioning coordinator. Clemons, 33, is a native of Northhampton, Pa. He was a standout defensive end at Muehlenberg (Pa.) College, where he earned all-district honors and was team captain his senior year ('76). His first coaching experience was at Kutztown State (Pa.) where he tutored outside linebackers for two seasons (1977-78). He then spent one year as linebackers' coach at New Mexico before joining Rogers at Arizona State. Clemons was the strength and conditioning coach for the Sun Devils and also assisted the defensive line coach. Holder of an English degree from



Muehlenburg, Don and his wife Shawn, who is the assistant women's basketball coach at nearby Oakland University, live in Rochester, Mich.

Joe Bushofsky . DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

One of the National Football League's most respected talent scouts, Joe Bushofsky enters his third season as the Lions' Director of Player Personnel. He was rewarded for his 11 years of dedicated service to the Lions in June of 1985 when he was promoted to his present position. Now in his 14th season with Detroit, Joe joined the Lions in 1975 after working two years for BLESTO - a National Football League scouting combine service. He originally scouted the Eastern United States' colleges for the Lions, then expanded his area to parts of the Midwest. Joe was responsible for the scouting of approximately one-half of the colleges



and universities in the country during his early years with the club. Now 48, Bushofsky was born and raised on Pittsburgh's Northside, where he was a threesport star in football, basketball and baseball at North Catholic Central High School. He played guard and center for North Catholic's 1956 football team which won the Pittsburgh Catholic championship. He enrolled at North Carolina State, where at 5-10, 185-pounds, he was one of the smallest starting guards in Atlantic Coast Conference history. He was all-conference as a senior ('62) and was named to the state of North Carolina's college all-star football team in '61 and '62. After obtaining a bachelor's degree in recreation from N.C. State, Joe returned to the Pittsburgh area, where he was a successful high school coach for 12 years. As head coach at his alma mater, North Catholic, he compiled three consecutive undefeated seasons (1968-70). In 1970, Joe began working for the Pittsburgh Steelers on a part-time basis doing film evaluation and then joined BLESTO in 1973. Joe and his wife Rose have four children - Ted, Tracy, Tricia, and Terry - and they reside in Troy, Mich.

TEAM PHYSICIANS



DR. KEITH BURCH

Two top physicians from Henry Ford Hospital serve the Detroit Lions as team doctors, Dr. Keith Burch as club internist and Dr. David Collon as orthopedic surgeon. Dr. Burch has been a full-time member of the Lions' staff since 1980, while Dr. Collon came aboard in 1985. They are contemporaries — Dr. Burch is 46 (12/10/41) and Dr. Collon is 47 (2/17/40) — both served their internships at Henry Ford and both returned to Ford Hospital in 1972, although both serve the hospital staff in different roles today than the ones they performed in '72.

Today, Dr. Burch is the Medical Director at the Henry Ford West Bloomfield Hospital, a post he was appointed to in July of 1985. He went to the West Bloomfield Center in 1979 as the division head for

internal medicine. His internship at Henry Ford in Detroit came in 1967-68 following his graduation from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. Dr. Burch's undergraduate studies were taken at the Ohio-located University of Akron. He is a graduate of Akron St. Vincent High School, now Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary's.

Dr. Burch served his residencies at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit from 1968-69 and at the Ohio State University Hospital from 1971-72. He also served at the U.S. Army Hospital in Ft. Gordon, Ga., in 1969-70 and in Vietnam for one year ('70-71). His certifications include a diplomate member of the American Board of Internal Medicine and a subspeciality boards membership for infectious diseases. He also is a clinical associate professor of medicine at the University of Michigan and holds memberships in the American Federation for Clinical Research, the Michigan Heart Association, the Wayne County Medical Society, the American Medical Association, the Infectious Diseases Society of America, the American Academy of Medical Directors and the National Football League Physicians' Society.

Dr. Burch and his wife Kathryn (Kitty) live in Birmingham and have two daughters, Kathy and Michelle. An avid golfer, he played that sport while an undergrad at the University of Akron. He began working with the Lions initially as a consultant in 1976.



DR. DAVID COLLON

Dr. Collon today is director of the orthopaedic surgery staff for the Center for Athletic Medicine at the Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. He also serves as vice-chairman for the orthopaedic department. He came back to Ford Hospital from five and one-half years in private practice in Mt. Clemens and Bloomfield Hills (both Detroit suburbs). He had been with the orthopaedic surgery staff at Henry Ford for three years in the mid-'70s, and prior to that, served for six months with Wrightington Hospital in Wigan, England, where he specialized in the hospital's hip center. He also worked further in Europe at Lorenz Bohler Krankenhaus, a hospital in Vienna, Austria. Dr. Collon, who completed his general surgery resident requirements at Beaumont Hospital in Detroit in 1969 and his orthopaedic sur-

gery residency at Ford Hospital from '72 to mid-'75, was the team physician for the Michigan Panthers of the USFL in 1983-84, and serves the Detroit Tigers baseball

team as an orthopedic consultant, an assignment he first undertook in '84.

He served with the U.S. Navy as a Lieutenant Commander and as General Medical Officer at Camp Pendleton, Calif., from 1970-72. Dr. Collon is a graduate of University of Michigan (1963) and the Wayne State University School of Medicine (1968). A Detroit native, he graduated from Cranbrook High School in 1959. His certifications include the American Board of Orthopaedic Surgery, and he holds a certificate of fellowship with the American College of Surgeons. He also is a member of the American Medical Association, the Michigan Medical Society, the Detroit Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery, the Wayne County Medical Society, the Detroit Surgical Society, the Macomb County Medical Society, and the American College of Sports Medicine.

Dr. Collon and his wife Jane live in Bloomfield Hills with their children — a daughter Katie and a son David. He is an avid jogger and tennis player.




John Trump

Ron Hughes continues to assist Joe Bushofsky with various college scouting duties, but his primary responsibility is in the area of pro scouting. Other full-time scouting staff members include John Trump, Dirk Dierking and Jim Owens, along with special assignments scout Jerry Neri. Hughes, a 1965 graduate of California State College of Pennsylvania, followed the same path to the Lions that Bushofsky took. He returned to his native Pittsburgh, became the head coach at North Catholic High School (for 12 seasons), then went to work for BLESTO for four years. A year ago, Hughes began his acceleration in the Lions' pro scouting program while also handling Detroit area college scouting along with various schools throughout Michigan, Ohio and Illinois. Also like Bushofsky, Ron and his wife Adrianne live in the Detroit metropolitan area (Lathrup Village), near Southfield. Trump spent seven years with the Chargers continued

continued

as that club's scouting department administrative assistant before coming to the Lions in '85. Prior to his job with San Diego, he had a 25-year association with the Rams that began in 1953 after three years as a high school football and baseball coach in the Los Angeles City School system. Trump serves the Lions as area scout in California and at Western U.S. colleges. Dierking, whose first name is Clarence, came to the Lions in June of 1978 to scout the Central and Southwest colleges, including all colleges in Texas. A native Texan from Brenham, his background includes several years as an area scout for BLESTO. Owens enters his third season with the Lions. Prior to his time with Detroit he scouted colleges in the Southeast. Like Dierking, a native Texan (Garland, Tex.) Owens also worked for BLESTO before coming to Detroit. Prior to six years with that scouting combine service, Owens was a high school and college coach at various stops throughout Texas for 21 years. This fall he will cover the Eastern U.S. colleges. John and Jean Trump live in Van Nuys, Calif. They have two sons, one of whom. Frank, is a scout for the Rams. Dierking and his wife Debbie, also are the parents of two sons and live in Plano, Tex., a suburb of Dallas, while Owens and his wife Charlotte live in Athens, Tex., with their three children. The dean of the Lions' scouting department. Neri handles special assignments from his home base in Los Angeles, where he and his wife Theresa live. Neri, a Villanova grad who has coached in college and pro football (Redskins), has been with the Lions since July of 1969.







Jim Arnold • 6

PUNTER • VANDERBILT • 5th YEAR HT: 6-3 • WT: 211 • BORN: 1-31-61 • (FA IN '86)

1986: Three outstanding performances highlighted the seven-game performance turned in by Jim Arnold after he was signed as a free agent by the Lions during Week 10. Arnold's acquisition came after the Lions waived their punter of three

seasons, Mike Black. In his debut with the Lions, Arnold averaged 46.3 yards per punt on six punts (vs. the Vikings). In later games he averaged 48.8 yards per punt for eight punts against the Bears (Week 15) and 46.8 yards for four punts versus the Falcons (Week 16). That final two-game performance not only boosted Arnold in his bid to retain the Lions' punting job in 1987, but those efforts pushed his season average to 42.6, the second-best among his four years in the National Football League. Arnold's net average for 36 punts was 35.2 yards, and he placed seven punts inside the 20-yard line. He also served as the team's backup holder to Eric Hipple and backup place-kicker to Eddie Murray. "Jim is a versatile guy who just doesn't bring punting ability to the team but also some competitive fire to our special teams," says Lions' special teams Coach Carl Battershell. "He expects himself to perform and he expects the same from his teammates, and I think his attitude will help improve our punt coverage unit this year." The Lions surrendered seven touchdowns via returns in '86 and three came against the punting unit.

CAREER: Arnold led the NFL in punting in 1984 while playing for the Kansas City Chiefs, who drafted him in the fifth round in '33 ... Also led the league in number of punts that year (98), tied with Stark, and the 44.9 yard mark is fourthbest in Chiefs' history, all behind the 1 through 3 performances turned in by fabled Jerrel Wilson ... As a rookie in '83, Arnold was somewhat inconsistent and averaged just 39.9, although he placed 21 punts inside the 20-yard line ... His '85 average with the Chiefs was 41.2 — 20th in the NFL ... Arnold's career-best performances have been a 51-yard average on eight punts in an '84 game against the Raiders, 48.8 on eight punts in last year's second Lions'-Bears' game and 48.4 on seven punts against Denver in an '83 game.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Arnold was the first punter drafted by the NFL in '83 after he led the nation in punting his senior season at Vanderbilt with a 45.8 yard average and an outstanding net average of 42.1 ... He was a consensus All-America first teamer that fall ... In one game versus North Carolina as a senior, Arnold set the Vanderbilt single game punting mark with an average of 53.1 yards per punt ... Jim's degree is in sociology ... He attended Dalton (Ga.) High School, where he participated in five sports ... A bachelor, his full name is James Edward Arnold.

1986: If the Detroit Lions had a Handy Andy among their 45 players a year ago, it was Steve Baack (sounds like BOCK). The veteran from Oregon served the Lions as a backup nose tackle, short-vardage tight end or



fullback, performed on nearly all the club's special teams and also served as an emergency guard for the offense. In the latter capacity, Baack did not see game action, but it was the third season in a row that Baack has practiced at guard to prepare for an emergency situation. He has yet to play guard in a game during his career, although pre-training camp plans called for Baack to work exclusively at guard this summer. Baack was a defensive end in college. He saw enough action in '86 to accumulate 13 tackles, including ten solo stops, and he excelled once again as a short-yardage defensive specialist. He is so good, in fact, at that role that Coach Darryl Rogers calls Steve, "one of the best short-yardage players I've ever seen." Baack's best individual effort came in the Cowboys' game in Week 2 when he racked up three solo tackles, two in short-yardage situations.

CAREER: The 75th player chosen in the '84 NFL draft, Baack has been primarily a special teams player for the Lions although in a Thanksgiving Day victory over the New York Jets in '85, he recovered a fumble that led to the Lions' first score and later sacked QB Ken O'Brien ... His other pro sack came against Green Bay in Week 15 of '85 when he sacked Jim Zorn ... Steve was Detroit's third third-round draft pick in '84, a choice the Lions received from the Rams in the David Hill trade. The other two picks in that round were NT Eric Williams and RB Ernest Anderson.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Baack was defensive captain for the '83 Oregon Ducks when he led the team in sacks with six and was second in tackles-for-aloss with eight ... He was voted second-team All-Pac 10 as a senior defensive end and later played in the Blue-Gray Game ... Steve holds a degree in psychology from Oregon where he met his wife Jeanette, who was a three-year letter winner in gymnastics ... Born in Ames, Iowa, Steve was a three-sport letterman at Grand Union High School in John Day, Ore ... He was a track all-stater in the discus ... Steve and Jeanette reside throughout the year in Rochester, Mich. ... His full name is Steven William Baack ... Steve says making two sacks in an '82 game against Notre Dame was his best individual performance as a collegian, and his biggest thrill came when the Ducks tied Southern Cal, 7-7, in 1980.

1986: At first Scott Barrows did not succeed, so he tried again, and the second time the Lions were the beneficiaries. Barrows initially signed with Detroit as a free agent in '85 but was released in the next-to-last cut during training camp. He

returned home to Ohio, worked as a metal tradesman in a pipe fabrication plant prior to his return to college, and wondered if his shot at the NFL had been spent. It hadn't. Lions' offensive line Coach Bill Muir, on a scouting trip to West Virginia University, re-acquainted himself with Barrows and another training camp tryout offer was extended. "When I came back I had a better awareness of the offense and knew what to expect," recalled Scott. "That first training camp opened my eyes." Barrows came off the bench to relieve an injured Chris Dieterich at left guard early in the season opener at Minnesota, and he started the next two games (Week 2 versus Dallas and Week 3 against Tampa Bay) at right guard. Weeks later, center Steve Mott was an early-game casualty at Philadelphia (Week 11) and Barrows — who had practiced but had never played in a game at center — took over. He followed that excellent relief performance with back-to-back starts at center against the Bucs (Week 12) and the Packers (Week 13). Scott also was Detroit's back-up long snapper and practiced occasionally at tackle. He played left quard for most of Week 14 (Pittsburgh) in place of Harvey Salem, who was ejected from the game for fighting. "Scott really helped us out when he assumed responsibilities at both guard and center," praised Muir. "He particularly helped us when he came off the bench cold and proved he could blend right into the flow and tempo of games." Games: Played 16, Started 4.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Barrows was a three-year starter and earned All-East honors in '83 and '84 ... Was a senior ('84) when West Virginia beat Penn State, 17-14, the Mountaineers' first win over the Nittany Lions in 28 years ... Played on four (Peach, Gator, Hall of Fame and Bluebonnet) WVU bowl teams ... Was an MVP and All-Stater in football (tight end and defensive end), basketball (forward) and track (discus) for Marietta (Ohio) High School ... 1986: After experiencing more ups and downs than the stock market his first two seasons with the Lions, Carl Bland proved he was indeed a worthy investment when the Lions signed him as a free agent in 1984. The other half (along with

Jeff Chadwick) of the Lions' starting free agent wide receivers combination, Bland opened every game and finished third on the club with 44 receptions for 511 yards and two touchdowns. "If you consider that both our starting wide receivers last year were free agents, you have to be pleased with the production," Lions' Head Coach Darryl Rogers said. "The most positive aspect of Carl Bland has been his determination

over the past three seasons. He has hung in there and proven he is a NFL-quality wide receiver. He has excellent concentration and does a good job catching the football in traffic and over the middle." Carl's first regular-season touchdown as a professional came on a three-yard reception from Eric Hipple during a Week 4 contest at Cleveland. His other TD reception was a 10-yarder from Joe Ferguson on Thanksgiving Day against the Packers. Carl recorded a single-game, career-high eight receptions for 72 yards against Tampa Bay (Week 3) and he had a career-high 34-yard reception from Joe Ferguson at Tampa Bay (Week 12). He had 41 receptions entering the final three games of the season, but suffered a shoulder separation in the Week 14 contest at Pittsburgh and only registered three receptions (all against Chicago Week 15) the remainder of the season. His eight receptions against the Bucs (Week 3) was the highest single-game reception total by a Lions' wide receiver last season.

CAREER: Rode the proverbial roller coaster his first two seasons with the Lions ... In '85 he was waived twice and re-signed twice ... Did play in the final seven games ... Big chance came when injuries to Jeff Chadwick and Mark Nichols gave Bland an opportunity to start the final two games ... 1986: The injury black cloud that shadowed the Lions' defensive secondary throughout the season finally claimed John Bostic on Thanksgiving Day against the Packers (Week 13). Bostic injured a shoulder which sidelined



him for the remainder of the year as he became one of four Detroit cornerbacks continued

Bostic continued

to sustain a season-ending injury. At year's end, seven corners were either on the Lions' active roster or on injured reserve. And seven could be an unlucky number since most NFL rosters list only four corners. "I know the competition is going to be stiffer than ever before," said Bostic during the off-season. "That means I have to work that much harder to be prepared." Secondary Coach Willie Shaw asserted, "It's going to be tough for everyone. There are a lot of people who will be battling for only a few spots." However, Bostic has proven to be a survivor. He opened the season on special teams with only limited nickel defense assignments. An early-season injury to starter Bobby Watkins opened two doors: Duane Galloway became the starter at left corner and Bostic's time in nickel coverage dramatically increased. Twice John came off the bench and had four-tackle performances (Week 6 at Green Bay and Week 10 versus Minnesota), but his shining moment came when he made the most of his first NFL pass interception. Bostic intercepted a last-second "Hail Marry" pass by Philadelphia's Randall Cunningham to preserve a 13-11 Lions' victory in Week 11.

CAREER: Bostic signed as a free agent during Week 4 of '85 and played in the final 13 games of the season ... Originally was a sixth-round draft choice by the Chiefs in '85 (149th player selected) but was released during training camp ... Earned a game ball for his special teams' play in the '85 Thanksgiving Day win over the Jets.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Clocked at 4.5 in the 40-yard dash on artificial turf by scouts ... Was a four-year starter and three-year captain at tiny (1,700 students) Bethune-Cookman in Daytona Beach, Fla. ... His college coach ('83-'84) was former Miami Dolphins' great Larry Little ... 1986: There was no "sophomore jinx" for Lomas Brown last season as the Lions' offensive tackle picked up right where he left off from the year before. The only Lions' offensive lineman to start every game the past two seasons, Brown's

sophomore campaign supported the conviction that he may soon be one of the very best in the NFL at his position. "The expectations that we had when we drafted Lomas have been fulfilled and then some," Lions' offensive line Coach Bill Muir said. "As good as he was as a rookie he still improved last year. He played with much more confidence and if he continues to work hard, he can be the very best." As left tackle, Lomas usually faces the oppositions' "very best". So far, he's more than held his own. "Defenses almost always have their top pass rusher at the right end spot and Lomas has been competitive against every one of them." This may be the year Lomas joins that elusive club of offensive linemen that have their annual meeting each year at the Pro Bowl. He has his work cut out for him, though, as he'll likely face some of the finest defensive linemen in the NFL, including Dexter Manley, Howie Long,

Ruland Jones, Richard Dent and Art Still. "To be successful in the NFL you have to win the key match-ups and one of the most important is your left offensive tackle against their right defensive end," Muir said. "It's really a plus to have someone like Lomas because it automatically gives us confidence at that position."

CAREER: Has started 32 consecutive games since joining the Lions. Considered one of the top rookie performers in the NFL in '85 ... A consensus NFL all-rookie selection ... A starter at left tackle from the day he arrived ... 1986: Success stories continue to occur in America, thanks to ambitious young people like Paul Butcher. Unheralded in scouting reports after playing small college football and

dubbed by some as undersized for his position, Butcher overcame the odds when he inked a Lions' free agent pact four days into training camp. He fell prey to the roster numbers game a few weeks later and was waived (Aug. 18), but Butcher left a lasting impression. "If you've got the ball and he finds you, you're going to feel it," praised Darryl Rogers, who remembered Butcher when Lions' special teams' coverage suffered early in the season. After Cleveland's Gerald McNeil returned a punt 84 yards to beat Detroit in Week 4, an SOS went out for Butcher's return and the Detroit product was re-signed during Week 5 preparation. At the time, Butcher was working part-time as a nightclub bouncer, having decided to keep himself ready with daily workouts in case pro football called again. At that point in his life, Paul was not quite ready to put his degree in mechanical engineering to work in the business world. "The Lions brought me in for the sole purpose of making things happen out there," said Butcher. "So, I run downfield like a wild man." Butcher played on every special team except the field goal and PAT units and almost always was among the first players down the field on coverages. His full-throttle play drew extra attention from opponents, and Butcher became prime material for isolated TV camera replay coverage. The notice earned him a spot on CBS-TV's John Madden's 'All-Madden'

squad. The latter accolade was prompted by a sterling performance on national television when he had three tackles and forced two fumbles on Thanksgiving Day (Week 13) against the Packers. Another end-of-the-season plaudit came when Paul was voted the Lions' MVP on special teams by his teammates. But the Dearborn, Mich., native has more in mind for '87. "Linebacker is my true position and that's where I really love to play," says Butcher, who was used exclusively on special teams in '86. "Special teams is how a lot of players get started in the league and it has gotten my foot in the door. I feel confident I can do the job at linebacker, too." Linebackers' Coach Mike Murphy says the door is wide open for Butcher: "Paul has excellent ability to find the football and is a good lateral player. He has proved in drills that he can consistently take the ball carrier head-on, but now he has to do it in game conditions. I think he can, and that means he could press some people for playing time at inside linebacker this season."

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Butcher was working as a doorsman at Galligan's, a downtown Detroit lounge, when the Lions' call came Oct. 1 ... His degree in mechanical engineering is from Detroit's Wayne State University ... One of three Lions' players (with Grand Valley State's Jeff Chadwick and Rob Rubick) who played in Michigan's Great Lakes Conference (GLIAC), an NAIA/NCAA Division II league ... Paul was a three-time All-GLIAC pick, a two-time Wayne State captain, and was his squad's MVP as a senior (1985) ... He holds most of Wayne's tackling records, including most career tackles (464), season tackles (147), game tackles (20), career tackles for a loss (22) and he had a string of 29 straight games with ten or more tackles ... He was a walk-on, 178-pound defensive back in his freshman, red-shirt year ('81). but was moved to linebacker the next season ... Nicknamed "Dr. Psycho" at Wayne State ... Butcher, whose father is a dentist in nearby Allen Park, was first-team All-City and All-League in football and basketball at Dearborn (Mich.) St. Alphonsus High School ... He took a graduate class in engineering in the off-season while living in Dearborn ... His full name is Paul Martin Butcher.

1986: In what should have been an off-season of content, Jeff Chadwick wrestled with frustration and uncertainty. The former free agent from little Grand Valley State was gliding through his finest NFL season when a partial

tear in his Achilles tendon abruptly slammed the door in Week 15 and left him in a cast for nine weeks, long after '86 had concluded. "There's a question as to how well Jeff is going to recover," warned Darryl Rogers as Chadwick was beginning rehabilitation. "I believe he's going to be fine and that he'll be back in the lineup." Then, Rogers cast a challenge: "Without a doubt, he should have been a 1,000-yard receiver for us last year. Jeff has shown us he has the qualities to become a very fine receiver in the NFL." Despite the Achilles injury which nagged him most of the season, those qualities were never more evident than when Chadwick set personal bests in season receiving yards (995), receptions (53) and touchdowns (5), while falling just five yards shy of becoming the first Lion to join the 1,000-yard receiving club since Freddie Scott (1.022) in '81. He did become the first Detroiter to have four 100-yard receiving games in a year since Pat Studstill had six such outings in '66 and his 18.8 yards-per-catch average was tops in the NFC among receivers with 48 or more receptions. After a slow start when he, as well as other Lions' receivers, were criticized for dropped balls. Chadwick caught fire in the season's second half. From Weeks 9 through 14, Jeff caught 30 passes for 576 yards and scored four touchdowns. His rising star corresponded with the influx of two veterans into the Lions' starting lineup. tight end Jimmie Giles and quarterback Joe Ferguson. Giles first started in Week 9 (Bengals) and helped draw some of the coverage that previously had been concentrated on Chadwick. As a result, Chadwick became the primary target of Ferguson during the veteran's four starts (Weeks 11 through 14). Chadwick had a TD catch in each of those games and had his finest NFL day with five receptions for 139 yards against the Eagles (Week 11). He also caught a 73-yard bomb from Ferguson in Week 12 at Tampa Bay and had a 72-yard TD catch in Week 11, the two longest receptions in Chadwick's career. He had a 64-yard reception versus the Eagles nullified by a penalty.

CAREER: Chadwick also had an injury-plagued '85 season when a broken collarbone limited his play to seven games ... Has had five career 100-yard receiving games, including: 1986 games of 139 yards at Philadelphia, 121 against the Packers (Week 13), 106 versus the Bucs (Week 3) and 100 against the Bengals (Week 9); and he had a 112-yard day at Green Bay in '85 ... The Lions found a gem in their own back yard when Chadwick was signed as a free agent in '83 ... Most scouts shied away after he had been clocked at 4.75 in the 40-yard dash as a college junior ... "Rob Rubick (Lions' tight end and Chadwick's roommate in college) told us he could run faster than 4.75," recalled Lions' Director of Player Personnel Joe Bushofsky. "So, one of our former assistant coaches (Larry Seiple) clocked him again during his senior year. This time his 40-yard dash was under 4.5." ... He was voted to two All-Rookie teams in '83 ... Jeff was the only non-drafted rookie to make the Lions' roster in '83 ... His lone NFL rushing attempt was a 12-yard TD rush on a reverse handoff from Billy Sims at San Diego (9/30/84).

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Chadwick is a native of the Detroit Metro area from Dearborn Heights and is a Dearborn Divine Child High School graduate ... Starred in both football and track (a 6'10" high jumper) in high school and college ... Is one of three Lions from the Great Lakes Conference (with Rubick and linebacker Paul Butcher), an NAIA/NCAA Division II league in Michigan ... OUTSIDE LINEBACKER • TENNESSEE • 5th YEAR HT: 6-5 • WT: 245 • BORN: 4-7-60 • (D-3 IN '83)

1986: Perhaps the best appraisal of Mike Cofer's performance last season came from Bears' Coach Mike Ditka when he assessed the Lions' defense prior to the Week 15 contest between Chicago and Detroit. "Of all the

linebackers we've seen this year," Ditka stated, "I honestly don't think we've seen any better than Cofer. He's a real effort guy who is always all over the field." In his first full season at right outside linebacker, Cofer played and progressed the way his Lions' coaches were hoping he would, but not necessarily the way they expected. "He improved tremendously after switching (from defensive end which he played in 1983 and '84) positions," Lions' defensive coordinator Wayne Fontes said. "We felt he would improve, but I think his progress even surprised us a bit. Michael can become a dominant linebacker in this League. If his pass coverage improves as much this season as his play against the run did last season, he will be a complete linebacker and a very dominant player on this football team." Cofer played in every game and started 15. The only game he didn't start was Week 2 against Dallas, when he was coming off an ankle injury the week before at Minnesota. Cofer, who was second on the team (to defensive end Keith Ferguson) with 7.5 sacks, did start two games at the left outside continued

linebacker position (Weeks 11 & 12) after Jimmy Williams was hurt, but he is at his best on the right side. Always around the football, he led the team with three forced fumbles and was second on the club with three fumble recoveries. He was fourth on the club with 73 total tackles, including 58 solo tackles. His best performance came in Tampa against the Bucs (Week 12) when he registered 2.5 sacks and also recorded ten tackles, including eight solo tackles.

CAREER: Began as a defensive end with the Lions and had a sack in his first professional start — in a Monday Night contest against the New York Giants in 1983 ... Started at both the right and left defensive end positions his first two years in the NFL, despite being undersized for the position at 245 pounds ... His 107 total and 75 solo tackles led all Lions' defensive linemen in '84 ... Was switched to outside linebacker prior to the '85 season when the current coaching staff took over ... Played well at ROLB in '85 until a mishap in an Oct. 23 practice resulted in a fractured hip which sidelined Cofer for the remainder of the season ... One of the most physically gifted Lions, Cofer has been clocked under 4.5 in the 40-yard dash.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: A four-year letterman at Tennessee and defensive captain as a senior ('82) when he was a first-team All-SEC and Honorable Mention All-America ... Earned degree in elementary education at UT ... Graduate of Rule High School in Knoxville, where he was All-America in football and All-State in basketball ... Once an aspiring actor, Mike appeared in two stage plays while in college ... Also hosted mock "Saturday Night Live" programs in college ... GUARD-TACKLE • PENN STATE • 9th YEAR HT: 6-5 • WT: 285 • BORN: 12-3-57 • (D-1 IN '79)

1985: Unless you have played or have been a part of the game, you probably cannot fully appreciate the talents and mettle of Keith Dorney. Since he graduated from Penn State eight years ago, Dorney has firmly entrenched himself as

one of the best offensive linemen in the National Football League. But while his onthe-field abilities have garnered him league-wide respect and admiration, it is Dorney's uncanny and almost supernatural ability to overcome serious injury that has left many in awe. For the third time in his career, Dorney suffered an injury that was serious

enough to end the season for most players. But like his three previous skirmishes with fate. Dorney spit into the wind and returned after the minimal four-week hiatus known as injured reserve. This time it was a knee injury — "severe degenerative arthritis" — that tried to bring Dorney down to a mortal level. But after initial reports suggested the injury might end his career, Dorney, as always, proved everyone wrong. Well, almost everyone. "I will never count Keith Dorney out of anything," Lions' offensive line Coach Bill Muir said. "Not only did he return to the lineup, but he continued to play at a level of excellence worthy of a Pro Bowl player." Dorney was placed on injured reserve after Detroit's season-opening, 13-10 win at Minnesota. He returned for the Week 6 contest at Green Bay which the Lions won, 21-14. Detroit rushed for 236 yards that day, thanks largely in part to the play of Dorney, who was so dominating that his performance inspired Packers' Coach and former All-Pro offensive lineman Forrest Gregg to say, "That might have been the finest game I've ever seen an offensive lineman play." When you also consider that 1986 was the first full season at guard for the former tackle, it makes Dorney's play in '86 even more impressive. "He's the epitome of a leader," Muir has said. "Not only because he is one of the older players, but because of the standard he sets. His toughness and ability to play through pain and injury really sets an example for the younger players." Dorney's exemplary performance did not go unnoticed. He was honored as the Lions' Miller Lite/NFL Lineman of the Year for 1986 and he also was selected (in a vote by his teammates) the Lions' Offensive Most Valuable Player (he shared the award with James Jones). He also received the prestigious Ed Block Memorial Courage Award. The award, which recognizes men of courage in the NFL, is presented annually to representatives of each of the 28 NFL clubs by the East Side Athletic Club of Baltimore.

CAREER: Was the first offensive lineman selected in the 1979 draft when the Lions made him their No. 1 pick ... Named to the Pro Football Writers All-Rookie team in '79 ... Missed seven games his second season with a serious knee injury, which required surgery, but incredibly, still returned to play in the final three games ... In 1981 he had a stellar season and was named All-NFC first team offensive tackle by UPI ... Was awarded in 1982 with the Lions' offensive captaincy and responded with a performance that earned him a Pro Bowl selection ... The following year, Dorney's bid for a second trip to the Pro Bowl was lost when he injured his back in the weight room and was forced to miss Weeks 5, 6 and 7 ... Once again he made a quick recovery and started the final eight games of the '83 season and the playoff loss to San Francisco that year ... Was considered to be well on his way to a second trip to the Pro Bowl in '85, but a decision to help the team and switch from tackle to a guard position (which had been decimated by injuries) probably cost him a spot in the Pro Bowl ... Played the last eight weeks of the '85 season with a broken big toe ... Despite his move to guard, Keith was named first team All-NFC tackle by United Press International ... Has had seven orthopedic operations since he entered the NFL ... The Lions' offensive captain the past five seasons, Keith has started 105 of the 106 games he's played since joining the Lions ... The only game he didn't start was the Week 13 contest his second season when he was coming back from knee surgery.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Considered the nation's best collegiate offensive lineman his senior year ('78) ... Was even considered by *The Washington Post* as possibly the first pick in the entire draft after an exceptional senior season (actually was taken by the Lions as the first round's tenth pick that year) ... Helped Penn State to a No. 1 ranking as a senior until the Nittany Lions lost to Alabama in the Sugar Bowl ... an All-America as a junior, Keith was named to the first team on ten different All-America squads his senior year ... administration ... Began his college career as a blocking tight end and started the 1975 Sugar Bowl as a freshman at that position ... Started 12 games his sophomore year at center before switching to tackle ... Captained the football and basketball teams and earned All-America honors in both sports at Emmaus High School in Emmaus, Pa. ... Could have attended Slippery Rock (Pa.) State College on a basketball scholarship ... Keith's hometown is Macungie, Pa. ... Does real estate work in San Juan Capistrano, Calif., where he resides in the off-season with his wife Katherine ... His full name is Keith Robert Dorney.

1986: The Lions signed Donnie Elder to a free agent contract on Dec. 3 as insurance for their injury-depleted defensive backfield. Elder made the most of the opportunity. He played well on special teams and was impressive in nickel

defensive aligments. "Donnie was a nice surprise for us," Lions' defensive backfield Coach Willie Shaw said. "He has excellent speed (4.45 in the 40-yard dash) and is a good cover man. What he might lack in size, he makes up for in intensity. We expect Donnie to contribute on special teams and continue to see action in certain nickel situations." Elder played in three games for Detroit and totaled four tackles. He began the year with the New York Jets, but was released during training camp. Elder was then signed as a free agent by the Pittsburgh Steelers on Aug. 26, and played in nine games, seeing most of his action on special teams. He recorded 14 tackles for the Steelers and also returned 21 kickoffs for 425 yards (20.2 average). The Steelers released him Nov. 28 after starting cornerback Chris Sheffield was returned to the active roster. Elder's first game for the Lions, ironically, was the Week 14 contest against the Steelers.

CAREER: Originally a third round draft pick (67th player selected overall) by the New York Jets in 1985 ... Played 10 games for the Jets as a rookie, mostly on special teams and in nickel and dime situations ... Suffered a hip injury on Nov. 16 and was placed on IR for the remainder of the '85 season ... Prior to his injury, he recorded seven tackles on special teams and 20 tackles as a cornerback ... Bench presses 375 pounds.

1986: Leon Evans was primed for his first full NFL season before he sustained a knee injury during preseason, which curtailed his play. Even with the malady, he refused to remain on the sidelines, playing and practicing throughout the year



in pain. "Leon impressed the coaching staff with how he fought through his injury and how he always practiced hard," praised Darryl Rogers. "He had a disappointing season because of the injury but the knee was scoped in the off-season and it looks like everything was taken care of. We're expecting Leon to have a much better season in '87. He's become a plus for us spelling others on the line and he really does a good job in our goal line defense." Evans played in all 16 games, mostly on special teams and in spot defensive situations. The most game action he saw with the defense came in Week 16 against Atlanta when he played much of the second half and had two solo tackles.

CAREER: Evans had a free agent tryout with the Redskins in '83 but was released just prior to the opening of the season ... Signed with the Eagles for '84, but served two stints on injured reserve that forced him to miss all of that season ... Was waived by the Eagles in October of '85 and was signed and released by the Lions before he was re-signed for good on Oct. 24, 1985 ... Evans saw limited action in Detroit's final eight games of '85.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Nagging injuries also clouded his college career but he did see enough game action to earn three varsity letters at Miami ... Was a schoolboy All-America in both football and basketball (National High School Coaches Association) in '79 at Montgomery Blair High School in Silver Springs, Md. ... Led Blair High to the state basketball championship his sophomore and senior seasons, and he was named the Maryland State Tournament's MVP in '79 ... Leon and his wife Karen live in West Chester Pa., during the off-season.

QUARTERBACK • ARKANSAS • 15th YEAR HT: 6-1 • WT: 195 • BORN: 4-23-50 • (TRADE IN '85)

1986: Don't bother to strike up the band just yet. Because it appears it's going to be awhile before the Joe Ferguson swan song gets played. In his 14th National Football League season and at the age of 36, Ferguson continued to deny Father

Time and proved he still has a lot left in that slingshot attached to his right shoulder. "He sure doesn't show his age on the football field," Lions' Coach Darryl Rogers said. "He has kept himself in excellent shape over the years and that dedication has enabled him to not only stay in the NFL, but it has helped him continue to perform at a high level. He has been nothing but a positive influence in the two years he's been with our club. Joe has proven he can still play this game and at times last season he played the game guite well." Ferguson and incumbent Eric Hipple waged an intense preseason battle for the No. I quarterback spot again last summer, with Hipple emerging the victor. Except for a brief mop-up role in the second half against the Cowboys (Week 2). Ferguson waited patiently for his chance to start, and it came in the Week 11 contest at Philadelphia. With Hipple sidelined with an elbow injury, it didn't take Joe long to show the wait was worth it, despite not knowing that he would start until 15 minutes before kickoff. On the Lions' 10th play from scrimmage, he fired a 72-yard TD pass to Jeff Chadwick (Detroit's longest pass completion in more than two seasons) to give the Lions an early lead. While he finished the game with just 10 completions in 33 attempts for 176 yards, he had a 64-yard completion to Chadwick called back due to a penalty and had two perfectly thrown TD passes dropped in the end zone. More importantly, Ferguson led the Lions to a 13-11 victory. the team's first win after four consecutive losses. The following week Ferguson was nearly flawless, completing 14 of 21 passes for 230 yards and two touchdowns in the Lions' 38-17 romp at Tampa Bay. Then, four days later came the "Heartbreak of '86". In one of the most memorable Thanksgiving Day games ever, Joe had another great afternoon, completing 19 of 37 passes for 256 yards and three touchdowns, and he had two potential touchdown passes dropped in the end zone. But when it was over, he would have the cruel distinction of being the only Lions' quarterback in team history to put 40 points on the scoreboard and lose a game as the Packers scored 10 points in the final two minutes to register a 44-40 win. The following week in Pittsburgh. Ferguson — suffering from the flu and a knee injury (sustained against the Packers) - had his most unproductive game of the season (23 of 39, 207 yards, 1 TD, 3 Ints.) in a 27-17 loss to the Steelers. Still, with Ferguson as the starter the Lions were 2-2 and averaged 29.5 points a game. By comparison, the Lions were 3-9 and averaged just 13.4 points in the games Joe did not start. While four starts do not make a season, Ferguson proved he still has a few miles left. "With perhaps the exception of the Pittsburgh game when he really wasn't up to par physically, Joe did a good job for us," Rogers said. "He moved the team well and got us into the end zone with a degree of regularity. That is one thing no one can deny. He still has a heck of an arm." Ferguson used that arm to pass some NFL legends on the alltime passing charts last season. Joe surpassed Norm Snead and Sonny Jurgenson and moved into 9th place on the all-time passes attempted list with 4,375 attempts. His 73 completions last year moved him ahead of Ken Stabler and Snead and into the 10th spot for all-time completions with 2,292. He vaulted over Terry Bradshaw,

Y.A. Title and Len Dawson into 11th place in all-time yards passing with 28,895 yards. And he moved past Sammy Baugh and into 18th place with 190 touchdown passes for his career.

CAREER: Widely recognized as one of the top quarterbacks in the modern era of the NFL ... Ranks among the "Top Twenty" quarterbacks of all-time in the following categories: TOTAL PASSES ATTEMPTED: 4,375 (10th on the alltime list); TOTAL PASSES COMPLETED: 2,292 (11th on the all-time list); TOTAL YARDS PASSING: 28,895 (11th on the all-time list); TOTAL TOUCHDOWN PASSES: 190 (18th on the all-time list) ... Oldest Lions' player at 37 (4-23-50) and the oldest player on a Lions' roster since defensive end Larry Hand, who played his last season with the Lions (1977) at the age of 37 ... With the retirement of Atlanta's Jeff Van Note, Ferguson now is the oldest active player in the National Football Conference ... Among quarterbacks in the NFL, only Ken Anderson (16 years) and Jim Plunkett (16 years) have played longer than Joe ... If Ferguson had compiled all his passing statistics as a Lions' quarterback, he would be Detroit's all-time leader in every passing category: attempts, completions, passing yards, touchdown passes and passes intercepted ... The starting quarterback at Buffalo from the first game of his rookie year, Joe holds all the Bills' career passing records, as well as the franchise's record for most games played (168) and most seasons (12) ... Established an NFL record for fewest passes intercepted among qualifying quarterbacks with one (1) interception in 1976 (151 attempts) ... Perhaps Joe's best game as a pro came against Miami in 1983 when he set a Bills' single-game club record with 419 yards passing on a 38 of 55 performance with a record-tying five touchdown passes in a 38-35 Buffalo win in the Orange Bowl ... Another testimony to his strong right arm: Joe completed 50 percent or more of his passes in cold, windy Buffalo in nine of his last 11 seasons there ... Joined the Lions in a 1985 draft-day trade with Buffalo (for the Lions' seventh-round draft choice in 1986) ... Lost an intense preseason QB battle with Hipple for the starting QB spot in '85 ... Played a vital role in '85 as "relief pitcher" to Hipple and as a "sidelines coach" to Hipple and the offensive staff.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Still holds the majority of the passing and total offense records at Arkansas ... Was MVP of the Southwest Conference as a junior (1971) ... Led Arkansas to the Liberty Bowl as a junior ... Named to the Hula Bowl, North-South and East-West Shrine teams following senior year ... Also played in the now-defunct College All-Star Game (vs. previous year's Super Bowl Champion) ... Has a B.S. Degree in physical education ... He was selected in 1986 to the prestigious National High School Sports Hall of Fame ... Is a product of Woodlawn H.S. in Shreveport, La., where he still makes his home with wife Sandi and their two children, Kristen and Joe Carlton III ... Woodlawn H.S. also is the alma mater of Terry Bradshaw ... Joe owns a single engine Cessna, which he pilots during the off-season for business and recreation trips ... He is an avid hunter, golfer and fisherman ... Participated in two fishing tournaments in the off-season, including a \$300,000 bass tournament ... His full name is Joe Carlton Ferguson Jr.

DEFENSIVE END • OHIO STATE • 7th YEAR HT: 6-5 • WT: 260 • BORN: 4-3-59 • (WAIVERS IN '85)

1986: Wherever he's played in the NFL, Keith Ferguson has quietly gone about his job. And that job has been leading his team in sacks. He accomplished that again a year ago with nine and one-half sacks, taking



opposing quarterbacks down for a total of 73 yards in losses. His determined play did not go unrecognized when teammates voted him the club's Most Valuable Defensive Performer at year's end. It capped a fine comeback for Ferguson. who found himself on the waiver wire during Week 12 of '85, cut loose by the San Diego Chargers, the team he led in sacks from 1982-84. His play for the Lions in '86 was best illustrated in Week 11 at Philadelphia when his four sacks, a career high, for 331/2 yards in losses led a furious Detroit charge that carried the Lions to a 13-11 last-minute victory over the Eagles. The Lions tied a club record with 11 sacks that day. Ferguson also had a career-high seven solo tackles in the game. For the season, Ferguson had 50 solo tackles, including 42 solo stops. He also grabbed his first career interception, a weird play in Week 5 versus the Oilers that began with a tip of a Warren Moon pass by Jimmy Williams, with the ball landing in Ferguson's hands. He returned the interception seven vards for what would have been a touchdown, but fumbled the ball out of the end zone, giving the Oilers possession again on their 20-yard line. Keith also forced two fumbles during the season, one with a hit on Eric Dickerson of the Rams in Week 7 at Anaheim that set up the Lions' only touchdown in a 14-10 loss, and he recovered a fumble against the Bears on Monday Night Football during Week 15. Ferguson started 15 of the 16 games at left end, missing a start at Green Bay in Week 6 with a knee injury although he did play in the 21-14 win over the Packers.

CAREER: Starting the final four games of '85 for the Lions following his acquisition from the waiver wire (11/21/85), Ferguson had 2½ sacks for Detroit along with 11 tackles, including 9 unassisted ... He also contributed a pair of forced fumbles ... In 67 games with the Chargers between '81 and Week 11 of '85, he racked up 21½ sacks for 165 yards in losses ... Keith came to the Chargers as a linebacker who weighed 231 pounds and bulked up to his present 260, becoming a full-time starter at defensive end in his second pro season of '82 ... He had a string of 67 consecutive NFL games snapped in Week 11 in Denver in '85 and was waived by the Chargers following that contest ... A knee injury after seven games that year eventually cost him his starting position ... His career-best tackling effort was 55 total tackles in '83 ... The 131st player taken in the '81 draft (a fifth-round pick by the Chargers that year), he has started at both defensive ends during his career and even started one game his rookie year at defensive tackle when both Chargers' starters, Gary Johnson and Louie Kelcher, were injured. Keith had three sacks versus the Colts that day.

CORNERBACK • ARIZONA STATE • 2ND YEAR HT: 5-8 • WT: 181 • BORN: 11-7-61 • (FA IN '85)

1986: Don't tell gritty Lions' defensive back Duane Galloway about lightning striking twice. He doesn't want to hear it. That's because for the second year in a row Galloway will be making a comeback from arm surgery. The surgery

became necessary after lightning struck Galloway twice — in the form of Atlanta's 230-pound running back Gerald Riggs, Galloway's college teammate at Arizona State. It was old buddy Riggs who twice fractured Galloway's right arm while Duane was tackling Riggs in games between the Lions and Falcons the last two seasons. In the opening contest of '85, Galloway stopped Riggs a number of times on sweeps after Duane replaced injured Bruce McNorton at right cornerback. Galloway was credited with eight solo tackles in that game, most coming against Riggs, but the final one broke Duane's arm — although Galloway still remained in the game for a series late in the fourth quarter after the injury. Then, in last year's finale at the Silverdome, Galloway hit Riggs on a sweep - this time while playing left cornerback - and reinjured the arm, knocking Galloway out of the game and again necessitating surgery. Injuring himself twice on virtually the same play against the same foe was unfortunate for another reason. That's because the injuries overshadowed the Duane Galloway story in Detroit, one of the best stories of 1986. The Lions' smallest player not only overcame injury, but he established himself as a full-fledged pro defensive back with a season that included I2 starting assignments at left cornerback in place of injured Bobby Watkins, four interceptions for 58 yards in returns, ten passes defensed, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 66 tackles, including 57 solo tackles, some of which were among the best in the league in '86. Talk about a guy coming up and

hitting hard on sweeps, Galloway led the Lions in big hits a year ago. And his lack of size bothers him not even a little bit: "I grew up playing against the older and bigger guys (south-central Los Angeles, Crenshaw High School), and at that time Pat Thomas and Rod Perry were playing cornerback for the Rams," explains Galloway. "They were small in physical stature but they excelled. That showed me size is not everything. Football's a fun sport. At age 8 and 9, I was playing with the older guys. I always felt I could play if given the chance." Says Darryl Rogers, "He's a little guy who just plays. He's one of those guys who doesn't fit the scouts' criteria, but he's a player." Adds Defensive Coordinator Wayne Fontes, "The game doesn't awe him."

CAREER: The player his teammates call "Gallo" has traveled far and wide enroute to finding a home in Detroit. Drafted in the 19th round by the Los Angeles Express of the USFL in January of '83, he was cut out of training camp there and signed with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the CFL in March of '83... He was released by Saskatchewan that June, re-signed in July and played in six games, before being released again (9/11/83)...He was signed by the Indianapolis Colts (5/15/84) and spent four weeks on their injured reserve that fall before being waived from reserve (9/18/84)...The Lions signed Gallo May 9, 1985, and he did not receive credit for a year of playing action in the NFL that season since he appeared in just two games because of the first arm fracture...He played in all 16 Lions' games last year.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Duane Keith Galloway went from LA's Crenshaw High to Santa Monica Junior College, where he was a JUCO All-America cornerback in '80...He enrolled at Arizona State in '81 and was a two-year starter in the secondary ... He was coached at ASU by his current pro coach, Lions' defensive backfield mentor Willie Shaw ... Duane made All-Pac Ten second team as a senior in '82 ... A bachelor, he is engaged to Pamela Walker of Los Angeles...Gallo makes his off-season home in Culver City, Calif.

1986: After nine seasons with the Lions, defensive captain William Gay has witnessed his share of peaks and valleys. He counts '86 as a valley. "Last year was a major disappointment for the entire team." reflected the defense's elder

He counts '86 as a valley. "Last year was a major disappointment for the entire team," reflected the defense's elder statesman. "We lost so many games in the fourth quarter that it deflated us. But through that experience I think a lot of us found what it's going to take to win. If we have anything left at the end of the game, then we haven't given our all. That's what we've got to do." Statistically, Gay did not have one of his better years, but his leadership played a critical role in any success Detroit did have. He was third on the club in quarterback sacks (6.5), fourth in minutes played (459.6) and helped lead the charge

in the Lions' finest defensive hour — the 13-11 win over the Eagles (Week 11). Gay had two and one-half of Detroit's team record-tying 11 sacks in the victory at Philadelphia. In a losing effort against the Bears (Week 8), Gay had seven solo tackles, including a sack of Jim McMahon and a tackle of running back Dennis Gentry for an eight-yard loss. Perhaps an even stronger testimony for Gay has been his durability. The California native has played and started in 54 straight regular-season games plus two post-season outings, and has missed only four games over the past six seasons, though a neck injury late in the '86 season caused concern for the future. His total of 135 games played ranks him 14th (with Charlie Weaver) on the Lions' all-time longevity list, and a 16-game '87 season would hike Gay to ninth on the chart just three games behind Hall of Famer Joe Schmidt.

CAREER: Gay was a 225-pound tight end as a rookie after the Broncos had made him their second-round draft choice in '78 ... The Lions gave Denver a sixth-round draft pick and defensive back Charlie West to complete the trade (8/14/78) that brought Gay to Detroit ... After a rookie season as David Hill's back-up at tight end and as one of the club's leading special teams players, defensive line Coach Floyd Peters (now with the Vikings) engineered Gay's move to defensive end ... A vigorous weight trainer, William added 35 pounds to make the shift to defense in '79 ... He had no receptions as a tight end in '78 ... Became a full-time starter in 1982 and made the '83 NFC Pro Bowl squad ... Played end in a ''43'' defensive alignment until Detroit shifted to the ''34'' in '85 ... Notched a team-record 5.5 sacks in the ''83 opener at Tampa Bay, and has 14 career fumble recoveries and 57.5 career sacks ... Led NFL defenders with six fumble recoveries in '85, just two shy of Joe Schmidt's club record of eight in '55 ... Toppped the Lions with 546 minutes played in '85.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: The son of a military man and one of eight children, Gay was born in San Francisco and attended San Diego's Herbert Hoover High School ... Was an outside linebacker at San Diego City College before he transferred to Southern California where he played tight end for both John McKay and John Robinson ... Led USC in minutes played his final two seasons ... Caught 26 passes in the Trojans' run-oriented offense ... Is a member of the Board of Directors for Detroit's Ronald McDonald House and often donates his time as a speaker for youth groups ... He and his wife Gwen have a son Ruben and daughter Lauren ... They live year-around in Rochester, Mich., where Gwen is an art consultant ... His full name is William H. Gay.

Jimmie Giles • 81

TIGHT END • ALCORN STATE • 11th YEAR HT: 6-3 • WT: 240 • BORN: 11-8-54 • (FA IN '86)

CAREER: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers' release of Jimmie Giles at mid-season (I0/20/86) became a happy occasion for the Detroit Lions, who were only too pleased to ink him to a free agent contract four days later. At the time, Phila-



delphia Head Coach Buddy Ryan was quick to say: "The Lions picked a plum. I wish we had him. I think he's the best tight end in football." There was no argument from Darryl Rogers on Giles' worth: "There's absolutley no question that when he stepped onto our football field he added quality to the tight end position and to our franchise. He upgraded our team. Jimmie's an excellent pass receiver, has a great attitude and exemplary work habits." Then, Rogers predicted: "He's going to be even better this year, when he's gone through an entire training camp and can fully familiarize himself with our offense. That unfamiliarity kept Giles out of the Lions' lineup for only his first game in Detroit, which was Week 8 in Chicago two days after his arrival. He did, however, play as a substitute in that game. He started the final eight games of the season and instantly opened up Detroit's air game. "Jimmie forces them (opposing teams) out of double coverage on the wide receivers," praised quarterback Eric Hipple. "His presence forces our opponents out of certain coverages, which opens things up for us." Giles, who made the Pro Bowl four out of the six seasons prior to signing with the Lions, had 12 catches for 89 yards and two touchdowns in his first three Detroit starts (Weeks 9-11) — more production out of the tight end position than the Lions had had in the entire first half of the year. The Mississippi native got his first Lions' start against the Bengals (Week 9) and responded with five catches for 37 yards, including a five-yard TD reception from Hipple - the 300th catch in Giles' pro career. But, the '86 season highlights did not stop there. He had a 10-yard, one-handed TD catch against the Vikings (Week 10) and a 20-yard scoring reception versus the Packers (Week 13). His play was instrumental in the 13-11 win at Philadelphia (Week 11) when Giles had four receptions for 30 yards. Three of those catches at Philly went for first downs during a key, fourth-quarter drive that resulted in a field goal and a 10-8 lead. Season highs as a Lion were the five receptions against the Bengals and 42 receiving yards on Thanksgiving against the Packers. Prior to his release by the Bucs, Giles had started each of their season's seven games and was Tampa Bay's second leading receiver with 18 receptions for 178 yards and a touchdown. "I'm just in my 11th year of playing football. I played just one and a half vears in college," said Giles as his thoughts turned toward the future. "My body really hasn't taken the beating that seven and eight-year veterans have taken. I think I still have two or three good years left."

CAREER: A four-time Pro Bowl selection following the 1980 through the '82 seasons and after the '85 season ... Was waived by the Bucs on the same day fellow veterans Kevin House and Ron Springs also were Tampa Bay cuts ... When released, Giles ranked as the Bucs' second all-time leader in receiving yardage (4,300), third in career receptions (279), and he was the Bucs' leader in TD catches (34) ... Had a standout '85 season when he set a personal high in TD catches (8) and had his highest totals in catches (43) and receiving yardage (673) since his '81 season ... Had three 100-yard receiving games in '85 ... Capped his '85 season by catching the game-winning TD in the Pro Bowl ... In '81, he set personal highs in receptions (45) and receiving yards (786) ... Has had seven 100-yard receiving games, including continued

a career high of 134 yards (on six catches) versus St. Louis (11/10/85) and five times he has had a career-high seven receptions in a game ... His longest reception was an 81-yarder for a TD against the Bears (11/1/81) ... Had a brilliant game at Miami (10/20/85) when he had seven receptions for 116 yards and a career-best four TDs ... Knee problems led to disappointing '83 and '84 seasons ... Highlight of '83 season came on an 80-yard reception at Dallas (10/9/83) for the longest non-scoring reception in Bucs' history ... Ended his Tampa Bay career ranked second in games started (112) behind Lee Roy Selmon (117) and tied with Selmon for third in total games played (121) ... His average of 17.8 yards per catch in '82 led all NFL tight ends and was third among all NFC receivers ... Led all NFC tight ends in receiving vardage with 602 in '80 ... Had five kickoff returns for 60 yards (long of 17) in '78 ... Career honors include UPI first team All-NFC in '82, honorable mention All-Pro by Sports Illustrated in '79 and second team All-NFC in '79 by UPI ... Joined Tampa Bay after rookie season with Oilers ('77) and alternated with Jim Obradovich in '78 (10 starts) ... Third-round draft pick by the Oilers in '77 ... Traded to the Bucs in '78 along with four draft picks in return for Tampa Bay's first-round draft pick that year, which Houston used to select Earl Campbell.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Played professional baseball in the summer of '76 after being chosen in the 12th round of the free agent draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers ... Played for Bellingham (Wash.) in the Class A Northwest League, primarily as a third baseman ... Played football for only two seasons at Alcorn State but was on the baseball team until his senior year ... Concentrated on baseball until a chance to play Grambling in the Louisiana Superdome motivated him to try football in '75 ... Ironically, his last game for Tampa Bay also was in the Superdome, when the Bucs played the Saints in Week 7 of '86 ... All-Southwestern Athletic Conference in both football and baseball, and he captained both teams at Alcorn State ... Plaved windback on the run-oriented Alcorn teams ... Caught 19 career passes as Alcorn State went 14-5-1 ... Had a 3.0 academic average while graduating with a degree in business administration ... An all-around athlete at Greenville (Miss.) High School where former Lions' and Eagles' running back Wilbert Montgomery was a teammate on the undefeated '72 state championship team ... Owner of People's Optical in Tampa, a one-stop eye care center ... Has been an active member of the Lions Club in Tampa and has donated a pair of glasses to needy children each week of the season, a practice he intends to continue in Metropolitan Detroit ... Jimmie and his wife Vivian have two sons, Jimmie and Johnathan, and a daughter Candace, and they reside in Tampa ... His full name is Jimmie Giles Jr.

1986: For the second consecutive season the Lions lost Kevin Glover for most of the year with a knee injury. Both times, the former No. 2 draft choice's injury was severe enough to knock him out of action for a number



of weeks, although neither of his knee injuries have required surgery. Last fall Glover had just worked his way into the starting lineup, opening his first game as a pro at left guard during Week 4 at Cleveland (9/28/86) when he was forced to leave the contest in the third quarter. By the time Glover returned to the active roster from a stint on injured reserve, it was Week 16 against Atlanta and he dressed for that game but did not play. In four games, he played just 74 minutes. The Lions expect that this training camp and preseason will determine whether Glover's future with the team is at guard or center.

CAREER: Glover played the fewest amount of minutes (43) of any Lion who appeared in ten or more games during his rookie season of '85...His season-ending knee injury that year came in practice during Week 11...Glover has not been a long snapper during his career, but he has been considered the Lions' No. 2 center for the past two seasons. Games Played, 14; Started, 1.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Named *The Sporting News* All-America center following his senior season at Maryland, Glover anchored the Maryland offensive line his junior and senior seasons, two years in which the Terps set 51 school offensive records ... Received a game ball for his play against Clemson nose guard William (The Refrigerator) Perry his senior season when Maryland amassed 406 yards rushing and 571 total offensive yards in a 41-23 rout of Clemson that year ... Played offensive tackle in the Aloha Bowl as a sophomore, center in the Florida Citrus Bowl as a junior and center in the Sun Bowl as a senior ... Also started at center for the winning squads in both the Hula and Senior Bowls following his senior season. He roomed with Lions' No. 1 '85 draft choice Lomas Brown at the Senior Bowl in Mobile that year ... Born in Washington D.C. ... Attended Largo High School in Largo, Md., where he was All-State in football his senior year and where he also earned letters in basketball, wrestling and track and field ... He majored in recreation at Maryland ... A bachelor, he returned to Largo, Md., for the off-season ... His full name is Kevin Bernard Glover.

William Graham • 33

SAFETY • TEXAS • 6th YEAR HT: 5-11 • WT: 191 • BORN: 9-27-59 • (D-5 IN '82)

1986: After a season of discontent, a brighter future could be in store for William Graham. But an impressive training camp must be in the cards if he is to recapture a starting spot. The roadblocks are there. Graham, who started at free safety in '85 after three years at strong safety, will be in the

competition this summer to regain the strong safety spot but he must unseat veteran Demetrious Johnson, who led the club in tackles. "We had William earmarked to start at strong safety last year, but he reported late (Aug. 30) and never seemed to get things going for himself," said Darryl Rogers. "He'll get a much better start this year and that should lead to a better season for him." Graham spent '86 in an unfamiliar back-up role at strong safety, and played in some nickel packages and on special teams. He did contribute 30 tackles, including three solos and an assist in the narrow loss at Los Angeles (Week 7). For the first time in his pro career, Graham also returned kickoffs. Though he had only three returns, he led the Lions with his 24.0 average per runback.

CAREER: Though '86 was the downside, there has been plenty of upside for Graham since he was a fifth-round draft pick in '82, a year that also brought Lions' secondary starters Bruce McNorton and Bobby Watkins ... Graham led the Lions in total tackles (113), solo tackles (75) and assists (38) at free safety in '85 ... Sparked a 41-21 rout of the Vikings in '85 (11/17/85) with two pass interceptions, including one he returned 22 yards for a career best ... Had ten tackles and intercepted a Danny White pass in the end zone to halt a drive in the upset '85 win over the Cowboys (9/15/85) ... Has played in 39 straight games but his string of 23 consecutive starts was snapped last year ... His lone career sack came against Tampa Bay's Steve DeBerg (9/29/85) ... Tied linebacker Garry Cobb (now with the Eagles) with a teamhigh three fumble recoveries (including two against the Bears 10/30/83) in '83 ... Despite missing two games with an elbow injury, he still ranked second in solo tackles (96) in '84 ... Missed the first two regular-season games of his rookie year ('82) after he sustained a broken ankle in training camp ... Started both of the Lions' playoff games in the '80s ... Combined for six tackles in the '82 post-season against the Redskins and for eight stops against the 49ers in the '83 playoffs ... Had a career-best two pass interceptions in a game (which he tied in '85 against the Vikings) versus the Bears (12/16/84).

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: William is nicknamed "Glove" since he often wears white golfing gloves as well as several wristbands while playing ... He was a three-year letterman at Texas where he was an All-Southwest Conference pick as a junior and senior ... His eight interceptions as a senior ('81), which led the SWC and set a Longhorns' record ... Graham has a degree in sociology from Texas ... He was an All-America high school football standout at Silsbee (Tex.) High ... William spends the off-season in Austin, Tex., where he is a Volvo salesman ... His full name is William Roger Graham.

Curtis Green 62

7th YEAR ALABAMA STATE DEFENSIVE END BORN: 6-3-57 (D-2 IN '81) WT: 265 HT: 6-3

1986: Quiet consistency has been the trademark of Curtis Green since he joined the Lions six years ago. And last year was no different. Projected as a starter in training camp, Green was relegated to a back-up role due to



a series of nagging injuries throughout the preseason and into the championship campaign. "We had big plans for Curtis going into last year," Lions' defensive line Coach Rex Norris said. "We saw him as a possible starter at either nose tackle or one of the end positions, but he had to battle some minor injuries that really slowed his progress. But when he was called upon he performed very well for us. He has an exceptional attitude and is one the most aggressive players we have on the defensive side of the football." Green played in 16 games last season and was used extensively when the Lions' were in the nickel defensive alignment and played four down linemen. Despite the fewest starts (one) of his career, Curtis finished fourth on the team with 31/2 sacks (24 yards). He also was tied for second on the club with two forced fumbles. His lone start (for injured defensive end Keith Ferguson) was the Week 6 contest at Green Bay and he shared a sack in that game with William Gay. The following week against the L.A. Rams he recorded an eight-yard sack of Steve Bartkowski and shared another ten-yard sack with Ferguson. He also forced an Eric Dickerson fumble that stopped a Rams' drive at the Lions' 13-yard line. His four-yard sack of the Bears' Doug Flutie (Week 15) was the first sack of a Chicago quarterback in five games, which was one short of the NFL team record for most consecutive games without allowing a sack.

CAREER: Early in his career, Green often was overshadowed by more heralded defensive linemates — Doug English, Bubba Baker and William Gay - all of whom have been selected to the Pro Bowl ... Started five games and played in 14 as a rookie ('81) and was named to the Pro Football Writers' All-Rookie Team that year ... He started the '82 opener, but was bothered by an ankle injury most of the season and didn't start another game until the playoff contest against the Redskins ... COLLEGE & PERSONAL: A three-year starter at Alabama State, Curtis recorded 252 tackles and 20 sacks during his college career ... Most Valuable Player of the Sheridan Black All-Star Game in 1980 ... Also played in the Blue-Grey Classic where he was used at both defensive end and linebacker ... Was Alabama continued

State's Most Valuable Player his senior year ... Was a standout in football and basketball at Shanks High School in Quincy, Fla., where he played against current teammate Keith Ferguson in a high school all-star football contest ... A physical education major in college, Curtis and his wife Patricia have a son, Carlos Donald (10/14/85), and they live in Montgomery, Ala., during the offseason ... His full name is Curtis Green.

1986: The Lions acquired a quality football player two days after the final NFL cut to 45 players (on 9/3/86) last fall when they signed safety James Griffin as a free agent. Griffin had failed to make the Cincinnati Bengals' final roster a

year ago after leading the Bengals in interceptions with seven in 1985. He had become the Bengals' starting free safety in Week 6 of '85 following three seasons in a backup role. Griffin gave the Lions immediate help, opening the first game of the season in Detroit's extra defensive backs alignment and eventually working in as the team's regular nickel back. He had two interceptions, two sacks, 13 solo tackles and two assists, along with one forced fumble and six passes defensed. One of his interceptions came in the Lions' Week 5 win over Houston when he returned a Warren Moon pass 21 yards to stop a late Oilers' rally, and his other came in Week 9 against his former Bengals' teammates. Also an excellent special teams' coverage performer, Griffin entered '87 training camp as Devon Mitchell's back-up at free safety but also was considered a candidate to start for the Lions at strong safety.

CAREER: Despite limited action in four seasons, Griffin has 11 career interceptions ... His 256 yards via interception returns during his career is the most interception return yardage by any Lions' player on the current Detroit roster ... In each of his first three Bengals' seasons, James returned interceptions for touchdowns ... His longest was 57 yards versus Buffalo in '84 ... He returned one 49 yards for a score against Pittsburgh in '83, and another 33 yards for a TD versus the Giants in '85 ... In that latter game, he was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week in a 35-30 Bengals' win over the Giants, a game in which Griffin intercepted two passes and recovered an onside kick ... His best total tackle season came in '85 for Cincinnati with 55, including 40 solo tackles.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: One of two Griffins playing defensive back in the NFL, James' brother Don started every game a year ago at right cornerback for the San Francisco 49ers and was a consensus All-Rookie selection...They are from Camilla, Ga., although James makes his off-season home now in Pelham, Ga... James originally was a seventh round pick by the Bengals in '83 (the 193rd player selected), while brother Don was taken in the sixth round by San Francisco (the 162nd player taken) ... Both played at Middle Tennessee State in Murfreesboro, Tenn. ... James was named All-Ohio Valley first team as a junior and senior ... His full name is James Victor Griffin ... He is a bachelor.

1986: In his seventh full season with the Detroit Lions, James Harrell finally became a full-fledged starting linebacker. He opened 15 games at inside linebacker, finished second



on the team in total tackles with 109 and third in solo tackles with 85. He also recovered two fumbles, defensed seven passes and shared a sack while playing primarily at strong inside linebacker, although he did start one game (11/16/86 at Philadelphia) at weak inside linebacker. Lions' Defensive Coordinator Wayne Fontes calls Harrell "an overachiever, a guy who has as much heart as anyone on our squad." Fontes also says Harrell's abilities include athletic intelligence: "James is a guy who makes plays by always knowing the defense we're in and by working hard in his weekly preparations. He gets the most out of his athletic ability and as long as he takes care of himself he'll help us because he runs well and he gets himself around the ball." In Week 2 against Dallas, Harrell had ten solo tackles (after notching 11 solos against the Cowboys in an '85 game). He had a game-high nine solo tackles, two assists and a fumble recovery against the Vikings in Week 10 and added nine solo tackles the following week in a win at Philadelphia. He finished the season strong: 13 solo tackles, a career high, in Week 14 at Pittsburgh; then eight tackles and two passes batted down against the Bears in Week 15; and eight tackles in the Week 16 finale against the Falcons. "James just plays his fanny off," says linebackers' Coach Mike Murphy. "He's a heck of a guy to have around."

CAREER: A career-long backup — both in college and the NFL — Harrell received his first real starting opportunities in the United States Football League, where he played the '84 and '85 seasons with the Tampa Bay Bandits and was an All-League selection ... He rejoined the Lions in '85 but went on injured reserve for the final eight weeks of the season with a back injury ... He started two games in '85 and accumulated 24 solo tackles in the seven games in which he appeared ... Harrell originally came

to the Lions via waivers from Denver during his rookie season of '79 ... He was on injured reserve for seven weeks that season with a shoulder injury, then had to return to IR in '80 for ten weeks with a knee injury ... Prior to last fall, his best statistical season came his rookie year of '79 when he had 62 tackles and 33 assists (he started eight games that fall) ... Prior to '85, Harrell had played outside linebacker throughout his career but switched to the inside upon returning to Detroit from the USFL ... In 1985, James played in a total of 31 pro games.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Personal tragedy struck the Harrell family in James' hometown of Tampa last November in the week the Lions were preparing to play the Buccaneers in that south Florida city ... Younger brother Demetrius ('Meechie') was shot to death by an assailant that week, yet James played in the Sunday game against the Bucs, finishing the game with five solo tackles and two assists ... "He would have wanted me to play," was Harrell's explanation following the game ... Funeral arrangements and family matters in the ensuing days kept James from practicing and knocked him out of the starting lineup for the Thursday Thanksgiving Day game against the Packers four days later ... That was his only non-start of '86 ... James attended Chamberlain High School in Tampa, a cross-town school from his home area of College Hill ... He and his wife Shirley returned to their off-season Tampa home where James is planning to put his degree in public relations from the University of Florida to work in a food service business or a beverage distributorship ... His full name is James Clearance Harrell Jr. ... He was a walk-on at Florida who coupled a minority scholarship with a student loan in order to attend the Gainesville-based university.

1986: Rod Hill was re-signed by the Lions for the final two games when backup cornerback John Bostic went on injured reserve. Hill had played one game for the Lions earlier in the year, Week 7 versus the Rams, before

being waived to make room on the roster for tight end Jimmie Giles. His playing time was limited in his three games, and he finished the season with just one tackle and no other statistical data. "Rod is a quick and fluid athlete with coverage

ability who has a chance to stick with us," says Darryl Rogers. "Detroit is his hometown so this is an opportunity to continue his pro career if things work out for him."

CAREER: The first player in Kentucky State history to be drafted by the NFL in the first round, Hill was taken by the Dallas Cowboys in the '82 draft (25th player selected) ... He became a passing-situation right cornerback for them late in the '82 season and during the playoffs, replacing Ron Fellows on passing downs ... He also returned a kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown in a 37-26 playoff win over the Packers and blocked an extra point in that game ... He played in all nine Dallas' games in '82, then played in 14 '83 games with the Cowboys before being dealt to the Buffalo Bills along with a fifth round draft pick for two Bills' draft choices on Aug. 23, 1984 ... He played in just two games with the '84 Bills, missing most of the season with a fractured ankle ... He then played in just ten '85 games because of a broken hand ... Rod was waived by the Bills after six games a year ago and claimed by the Lions (10/16/86) ... He has started seven games during his career, all of those starts coming with the Bills.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Full name is Rodrick Hill and he is a Detroit native who attended Martin Luther King High School ... Went from there to lowa, before transferring to Kentucky State, where he was an NAIA honorable mention All-America in '79, an NAIA second team All-America and Associated Press honorable mention Little All-America in '80, and a *Sporting News* honorable mention All-America in '81 ... As a sophomore, he led the NAIA in punt return average (21.7) ... One of seven children (four sisters and two brothers), he studied economics and computer science in college ... Rod has been ultra-active in charity work throughout his pro career — having been involved with Special Olympics in Dallas and Buffalo and as a keynote speaker for the governor of New York's anti-drunk driving campaign while with the Bills ... Was one of the more active Lions in charity appearances in the '86 off-season ... Hill also does Richard Pryor impressions.

QUARTERBACK • UTAH STATE • 8th YEAR HT: 6-2 • WT: 198 • BORN: 9-16-57 • (D-4 in '80)

1986: Eric Hipple is a survivor. He has weathered years of challenges for the Lions' starting quarterback job, through the early 1980's when he split duty with Gary Danielson to more recent training camp competitions with

veteran Joe Ferguson. Now, 1986 first-round draft pick Chuck Long, who started the final two games of the '86 season, likely will be "Hip's" prime contender for the starting job. But, Hipple — The Survivor — intends to be ready. "It's always a battle for the No. 1 job," says Hipple. "Nothing is ever given to you and you can never let down. But, I'll go to training camp feeling I'm the starting quarterback." After a neck-and-neck race with Ferguson for the '86 starting job, Hipple opened the first ten games of the season before a persistent elbow injury sent him to the sidelines. The injury reduced his role to holder on placements for the final six games of the season and abruptly shut the door on what could have been Hipple's finest season. Despite a broken nose suffered against the Buccaneers (Week 3), Hipple was molding impressive credentials before the elbow injury ended his year. He concluded the season as the NFC's third-rated passer, behind Minnesota's Tommy Kramer and San Francisco's Joe Montana, and his .630 pass completion percentage topped the entire league. Noted for his scrambling ability and gutsy play, Hipple proved adaptable to any situation that the Lions' topsy-turvy season offered. When he needed to pass, he set records. He established the Lions' single-game mark with 31 pass completions against the Bucs (Week 3) and then upped the figure to 33 at Cleveland (Week 4) one Sunday later. Hipple erased the pass attempts record with 48 versus the Browns and then hiked the mark to 50 in Week 7 at the L.A. Rams. His 318 and 316-yard performances against the Bucs and the Rams (Weeks 3 and 7) respectively, were the second and third times in his seven-year career that he had passed for over 300 yards. And, his quarterback rating found a bullish market when he had a string of 89 straight passes without an interception from the second half of Week 3 to a Mossy Cade first half theft in Green Bay (Week 6). In the Packer game, he was a brilliant 15 of 19 passing for a career-best .790 completion percentage. However, the Lions played their best when Hipple passed only to offset the running of James Jones and Garry James. With the Lions' rushing game in high gear, Hipple completed seven passes in only 14 attempts in a Week 5 win over the Oilers, the lowest individual game total by a Lions' quarterback since Greg Landry had back-to-back five completion games in 1977.

CAREER: The Lions' are 28-29 (20-8 in the Silverdome) with Hipple as their starting QB, while they are 9-23-1 during that same span ('81-86) with other starting quarterbacks ... He ranks fourth in career passing for Detroit with 10,458 yards, 1,427 yards behind third place Gary Danielson (11,885), and is one of only four Lions' quarterbacks to pass for over 10,000 yards in the franchise's 53-year history ... Eric's first start was a dandy, when he passed for a personal-high 336 yards, threw four TD passes, and rushed for two scores in front of 71,273 Silverdome fans in a Monday night (10/19/81) 48-17 romp over the Bears ... Hipple's first career TD pass (in that win over Chicago) was a two-yarder to Rick Kane, but his fourth (and final) scoring toss of that evening was a 94-yarder to Leonard Thompson, which still ranks as the third longest in Lions' history ... He

led the Lions to six wins in their final ten games in '81, led all NFL quarterbacks with seven rushing TDs and was voted Detroit's offensive MVP ... His roller coaster career saw him displaced as the Lions' starter after just four games in '82 only to regain the job in '83 and lead Detroit to the NFC Central Division crown (the Lions' first title since the 1957 NFL Championship) ... Eric missed the post-'83 season playoff game with the 49ers due to a knee injury, but he did hit 22 of 38 passes for 298 yards and one TD in an '82 playoff loss to the Redskins ... Injuries and a fall from favor limited Hip to just one start in '84 ... He was the Lions' fourth-round draft pick in '80 and spent his rookie season as the Lions' holder for place-kicker Eddie Murray, a job he still fulfills today.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: The Downey, Calif., native was a four-year starter at Utah State where he led the Aggies to Pacific Coast Athletic Association cochampionships in '78 and '79 ... He ranked 6th in the NCAA and first in the PCAA with 1,924 yards passing as a senior ('79) and had career totals of 6,073 yards, 459 completions in 850 attempts and 34 TD passes ... Eric, his wife Jann, daughter Erica and son Jeffrey reside during the off-season in Dana Point, Calif. — just five minutes away from teammate and scuba-diving chum Keith Dorney and boating buddy and Dallas Cowboys' punter Mike Saxon ... Always active in community projects, Eric and wide receiver Jeff Chadwick are co-chairmen for the Lions' chapter of the "65 Roses Club," a fund-raising arm of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation ... Eric donated \$117 for each of his TD passes in '86 to the CFF ... He is the owner of an Olga's Restaurant (a Michigan-headquartered chain) which opened in Southern California prior to the '87 season ... His full name is Eric Ellsworth Hipple.

RUNNING BACK-KICK RETURNER • TENNESSEE STATE • 3rd YEAR HT: 6-1 • WT: 193 • BORN: 2-14-61 • (FA IN '86)

1986: Originally signed as a kick returner and as insurance at running back, Herman Hunter was one of last season's most pleasant surprises. The Lions signed Hunter on Sept. 2 after he was released by Philadelphia

(Aug. 19). He played in the opener at Minnesota (Sept. 7) but was released by the Lions Sept. 10 when Detroit signed an offensive lineman (Steve Kenney) after guard Keith Dorney was injured in the opener. But Hunter was back with the Lions to stay three days later (Sept. 13) when the club put Dorney on the injured reserve list. He responded by setting Lions' single-season records for most kickoff returns (48) and most kickoff return yards (1,007). He also proved to be a valuable possession receiver out of the backfield, registering 25 receptions for 218 yards and one TD. His reception total tied him for fifth on the club with veteran wide receiver Leonard Thompson. "We had a gaping hole at the kickoff return position and Herman did a great job filling it for us," Lions' special teams Coach Carl Battershell said. "He was a valuable contributor for us last season, doing a consistently good job as our kickoff returner. He might lack great speed, but he has a knack for finding the open lane. He's a tough guy and a very positive person and that has a positive effect on the rest of the special teams." As a receiver out of the backfield, Hunter's best game receiving was the Week 7 contest against the L.A. Rams when he recorded nine receptions for 87 yards, with six of those receptions resulting in first downs. He had a careerhigh 54-yard kickoff return against the Bucs in Week 3 and registered six receptions and a 48-yard KO return at Pittsburgh (Week 14). His only TD came on an 18-yard TD pass from Eric Hipple in the Lions' win over the Oilers (Week 5).

CAREER: Had an excellent rookie season for Philadelphia in 1985 when he started five games and played in all 16 ... He broke 22-year-old club records for most kickoff returns in a season (48) and most kickoff return yardage (1,047) in a season ... Had a 74-yard TD run at Dallas, which was the longest of the year for Philadelphia and the fourth longest in team history ... Best game as a rookie was against St. Louis (10/13/85) when he caught six passes for 120 yards, including his first pro TD (32-yard reception) ... In game at St. Louis (11/17/85), he threw a 38-yard TD pass to Mike Quick on an option pass ... Earned his rookie roster postion after an excellent preseason in which he returned two kickoffs for TDs (97 yards vs. Jets and 99 yards vs. Rams).

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Set Division I-AA career record for all-purpose yardage (5,717) during his four seasons at Tennessee State ... Averaged 10.7 yards every time he touched the ball in college ... Set NCAA single game all-purpose yardage record of 464 yards vs. Mississippi Valley as a junior ... Also set NCAA single game kickoff return yardage mark (262) in same game ... As a three-year starter at running back he rushed 247 times for 1,052 yards and caught 78 passes for 1,120 yards ... Caught 50 passes for 712 yards and six TDs as a senior ... Established Tigers' career yardage records for punt returns (112 for 1,096 - 9.8 avg.) and kickoff returns (103 for 2,405 - 23.3 avg.) ... Majored in criminal justice ... Outstanding athlete at Hardaway High School in his

hometown and birthplace of Columbus, Ga. ... Enjoys fishing, reading, painting and music ... New York Mets fan ... His full name is Herman James Hunter

1986: Other than Rookie-of-the-Year Rueben Mayes of the Saints and his 1,353 yards rushing, no rookie runner in the NFL had a better season than the Lions' No. 2 pick of last year, Garry James. In a year when six top college running



backs were drafted in the first round, three others went early in the second round and Mayes went to New Orleans in the third round, James' 688 yards rushing following a slow start gave promise to an outstanding career in the pros. His yards rushing were the most by a Lions' rookie since Billy Sims had 1,303 in '80. Included in James' totals was a 140-yard performance in Week 6 at Green Bay, 71 yards in Week 13 against Green Bay (plus a 40-yard TD run that was called back due to a penalty) and 84 yards at Pittsburgh in Week 14, including a 60-yard TD run. That latter effort topped a 41-yard touchdown run he had in the first Green Bay game, and the play became the Lions' longest TD run since Sims went 48 yards for a score against Denver in '81. James added 34 receptions for 219 yards (his yards per-catch average was 6.4; his rushing average per carry was 4.3). Much more running could be in store for James in '87, according to Darryl Rogers: "Garry could become our featured back with a lot more carries this year. He overcame a deep stomach muscle pull that slowed him early last year and came on the second-half of the season. We're looking for better things." Rushing totals a year ago for the other running backs drafted high in the NFL draft included: Keith Byers, No. 1 by Philadelphia (577 yards); John L. Williams, No. 1 by Seattle (538); Neal Anderson, No. 1 by Chicago (146, although he played in the backfield sparingly); Ronnie Harmon, No. 1 by Buffalo (145, and also a backup in their offense); Reggle Dupard, No. 1 by New England (39 in just 15 carries); Kenneth Davis, No. 2 by Green Bay (519); and Dalton Hilliard, No. 2 by New Orleans and James' college teammate at LSU who lost the starting job competition on the Saints to Mayes and finished with 425 yards rushing. And of course the No. 1 pick of '86, running back Bo Jackson, opted for professional baseball. At season's end, James was named to the UPI and Pro Football Weekly All-Rookie teams at running back.

James continued

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: James enjoyed a sparkling career at LSU with 3,211 total yards, playing mostly as a wingback (Hilliard was the Tigers' tailback) ... He logged 27 career kickoff returns for 569 yards (21.1 avg.) ... James had 166 yards rushing in a game versus Tulane in '82, a career best, and he rushed for 100 or more yards four times ... He twice caught eight passes in a game - against North Carolina (for 72 yards) and versus Florida (for 64 yards) in '85 ... He also threw a 23-yard TD pass in '82 off an option play ... Garry is from Harvey West Jefferson High School in Gretna, La. ... He returned to Baton Rouge and LSU during the off-season where he continued work on his undergraduate degree in public relations ... 1986: One of the most consistent performers in the Lions' defensive backfield the past two seasons, Demetrious Johnson continued his steady play in '86 when he started all 16 games at strong safety and led the Lions' with 112 total tackles.

"Demetrious gives us veteran leadership at the strong safety position and that's crucial," Lions' defensive backfield Coach Willie Shaw said. "He played well early in the season and I think you can attribute that to the fact he came to camp in excellent shape. If he can come into the '87 camp with a positive mental attitude and in the best shape he can be in, D.J. can be a positive force on this football team." One of the brightest moments for Johnson and the Lions came in Week 11 at Philadelphia. The Eagles had the ball and the lead with less than two minutes to play when D.J. sacked Philadelphia quarterback Randall Cunningham and stripped him of the football. Lions' teammate Michael Cofer recovered the Tumble which led to Eddie Murray's last second, game-winning field goal. Four times during the '86 season, D.J. recorded ten or more tackles in a game, and he also had two interceptions and forced two fumbles.

CAREER: Johnson was a part-time starter during his first two NFL seasons, before becoming a full-time starter in 1985 ... D.J. was second on the Lions with 97 tackles in 1985, when he also recorded three sacks, three interceptions and recovered four fumbles ... He had a career game that year against Tampa Bay when he recorded

six tackles, one assist, one sack for 15 yards, one interception, three passes defensed, including one in the end zone that prevented a TD, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries ... Part owner of Visual Consultants, Inc., which offers the professional representation of athletes and currently represents professional football, basketball and soccer players ... Opened a new convenience store in January called "Dr. J's Market" ... He and his wife Patricia had their first child, Ashley Patrice, on Dec. 17, 1986.

the Lions' final 45-man roster following pre-season action, but was waived after five games when guard Keith Dorney became eligible to return to the active roster from injured reserve. Johnson later was re-signed (11/11/86) to take the place of Jimmy Williams, who suffered a knee injury in the Week 10 Minnesota game and was lost for the remainder of the season. Johnson filled in briefly at both outside linebacker positions from that point on, although during his two seasons working with the team he has mostly practiced at strongside linebacker. Reports Lions' linebacker Coach Mike Murphy, "James Johnson has a lot of ability and potential. He needs to channel that into productivity this training season."

1986: A quick glance at his statistics would reveal to even the most astute NFL follower that James Jones had the typically-superb season Lions' fans have come to expect from the former University of Florida star. For the

second consecutive year he led the Lions in rushing (903 yards) and for the third time in his four professional seasons he was the club's top receiver (with 54 receptions). In fact, J.J. was one of only three players in the entire NFL to pace his club in both rushing and receiving, the other two being Herschel Walker of Dallas and San Diego's Gary Anderson. For his efforts, Jones was named the Lions' co-offensive Most Valuable Player (he shared the honor with Keith Dorney) and he also was an honorable mention NFL All-Pro selection by the Associated Press. Dallas defensive back Michael Downs says, "Of all the guys in the League, he's the toughest to tackle. I voted for him for the Pro Bowl." But despite the glowing credentials and an increased amount of respect and plaudits from opponents, J.J. probably will consider 1986 his most disappointing pro season to date. "Whenever you begin the season with high expectations and with the goal of making the playoffs, anything less is a huge disappointment," Jones said. "Despite your own individual achievements, it's what the team does that really counts and from that standpoint last year was very frustrating. It's nice to lead the team in rushing and receiving, but that doesn't mean much when you don't win and make the playoffs." Compounding Jones' frustration was his fast start last year, followed by an atypical slow finish. He began the season with a careerhigh 174 yards rushing on a club record-tying 36 carries in the Lions' 13-7 win at Minnesota. For that performance he was named the NFC's Offensive Player of the Week. He scored at least one touchdown in each of the first five games and was the NFC's TD leader at that point in the season. During Week 4 in Cleveland, J.J. tied a Lions' record (with Cloyce Box) when he snared 12 pass receptions. But after scoring seven TD's in the first five games of the season,

he registered just two in the final 11 contests. "There's no question J.J. is one of the most talented fullbacks in the NFL," Darryl Rogers said. "But while he had a very good season statistically, we feel, and I think J.J. would agree, that we can expect even better things from him in the future. He had a super first half, but tailed off a bit as the season wore on. If we can get the same productivity all year long, that would be super. Of course, we have to understand that J.J. can't do it all by himself." One of the key factors in Jones' performance will be the play of second-year running back Garry James, who, after a slow start in '86, finished strong enough to be an All-Rookie selection. "I think Garry proved that he is a much better running back than a lot of people thought," J.J. continued. "And that can only help me. They won't key on me as much with Garry in the backfield."

CAREER: A starter for the Lions since the first game of his rookie season and an exceptional receiver, J.J. holds the Lions' all-time single-season pass reception mark with 77 catches during the 1984 season ... Has been the Lions' Offensive MVP (by vote of his teammates) the past three seasons (sharing the honor in '86 with guard Keith Dorney) ... Has led the Lions in TDs the past three seasons ... Entering the '86 season, he had a string of at least one pass reception in every game (44) he's played in the NFL ... The string ended, ironically. in his record-setting performance in the '86 opener at Minnesota when he rushed for 174 yards (6th-highest in Lions' history) on 36 carries (a Lions' record he shares with Billy Sims) ... He did register a reception in every other contest in '86 except for the Philadelphia game, giving him at least one pass reception in 58 of the 60 NFL games he's played ... His 222 receptions after four seasons is the highest total for four consecutive seasons in Lions' history ... If he maintains the pace, he will be the Lions' all-time leading receiver (based on number of receptions) early in his seventh NFL season ... James is the Lions' player rep in '87 ... Joined forces with the University of Detroit in a continuing education program that encourages professional athletes to complete their college degrees ... Active in the Michigan Summer Special Olympics ... Was selected the 1985 "Lion of the Year" by the Michigan March of Dimes.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Considered the prototype fullback in the '83 college draft ... Was the 13th player selected overall ... The fourth all-time leading rusher in Florida Gators' history with 2,026 yards on 468 carries (4.3 avg.) ... He also caught 68 passes during his college career ... An All-America performer at Ely High in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., Jones played quarterback, linebacker and tight end in high school and was the most sought-after prep player in the state of Florida his senior year ... He began his college career at tight end ... One of ten children, James and his wife Sheila are the parents of a daughter, Jasmine, and they live year-'round in nearby Rochester, Mich. ... His full name is James Roosevelt Jones.

1986: After a career season in '85, Angelo King suffered through a year of injury and reduced playing time. He spent four weeks in November on injured reserve with an ankle injury, an injury that also caused him to miss the Lions'

game in Chicago (Week 8). He then started the final four games of the season at an unfamiliar position — strong outside linebacker — when injuries claimed starter Jimmy Williams for the year. King's tackling stats fell from a career-high 90 tackles in '85 to 23 in '86 as he played in just 11 games, starting five. His other start other than the final four games of the season came in Week 2 against his old Dallas Cowboys' teammates, a game in which he had six solo tackles and an assist. He racked up the same satistics, plus a seven-yard sack, in Week 16 versus the Falcons. His other sack came off a blitz in the opener at Minnesota, a four-yard tackle-for-loss of Tommy Kramer.

CAREER: King's fine '85 season included a team-leading 77 solo tackles ... He began that year as the Lions' nickel linebacker, but became a full-time starter in Week 8 when right outside linebacker Michael Cofer was lost with a hip fracture ... King originally came into the NFL with the Cowboys as a free agent in '81 ... Acquired 8-27-84 by the Lions for a future draft choice ... 1986: The addition of four-time Pro Bowl tight end Jimmie Giles at mid-season could be a blessing in disguise for David Lewis. The Lions' top draft pick in '84 started the first seven games of the season but a combination of an ankle injury and



the free agent signing of Giles in Week 8 cut drastically into Lewis' playing time. In fact, he did not catch a pass after Week 6 at Green Bay and did not start after Week 7. However, Darryl Rogers figured Giles' signing could become a boost for his young tight end. "A part of what Jimmie Giles has done for us is to help our other tight ends know what tight ends can do and what we expect of them now," said the Rogers. "I think they (Lewis and Rob Rubick) will upgrade their efforts and abilities because they've seen what we need." Rogers continued by saying, "David has good talent. He's one of those talented athletes who just has to produce a little bit more, but then, that's what we as coaches are here for." Though the season was filled with frustration for Lewis, it was not without its successes. He had three catches for 34 yards in the Week 3 loss against Tampa Bay and turned in a key performance at Green Bay in Week 6. David contributed three catches against the Packers, one on a two-yard TD toss from Eric Hipple which proved to be the winning score in the game. Lewis, with 10 catches in the season's first six games, could have been on the way to his finest season in his young pro career had not a nagging (now healed) injury and Giles' introduction into the lineup, intervened.

CAREER: Lewis had his finest season in '85 when he started all 15 games he played and contributed 28 receptions for 354 yards and three TDs ... Had a pair of touchdowns in Detroit's 41-21 Silverdome victory over the Vikings in '85 (11/3/85) ... Also turned in a two-TD outing in the '84 Thanksgiving Day (1/22/84), 31-28 win over Green Bay ... His four catches against Atlanta (9/9/84) is a single-game best ... His longest career reception is 58 yards versus Denver (10/7/84) ... Lewis' most receiving yards in a game were 71 yards against the Bucs (9/29/85).

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Even though he grew up in Portland, Ore., Lewis has been a life-long Lions' fan and he lists being drafted No. 1 by the Lions' in the spring of '84, 'one of the greatest thrills of my life' ... David was the 20th player drafted in the '84 draft ... Lewis' senior year at Cal. was hampered by a hamstring pull that limited his playing time after he had been tabbed a preseason All-America by The Sporting News and Street and Smith Magazine ... After starting his college career as a linebacker, he switched to tight end and led the Pac-10 in receiving in '80 and '82, setting a record for receptions by a tight end in '82 with 54 ... He majored in political science ... He also took part in the famous kickoff return, multi-lateral play at the end of the Cal-Stanford game his junior year (1982) ... A prep All-America from Grant High School in Portland, David still lives in that Oregon city during the off-season ... Lions' wide receiver Leonard Thompson is David's cousin ... His full name is David Wayne Lewis.

1986: When the Lions made Chuck Long their first firstround quarterback selection in 18 years of the NFL draft a year ago this spring, it was a signal that Long is expected to

be the Lions' quarterback of the future. Not since Greg Landry was drafted by the Lions in the first round of the '68 draft had the Lions selected a signal caller with their first pick. This year's training camp and preseason action will go a long way in determining whether Long's future as the Lions' quarterback is now or sometime further down the road. Protracted contract negotiations kept Long out of the Lions' entire '86 training camp and deterred his progress. Finally, after 11 weeks of no game activity, Long came off the bench in the final minutes of a Week 12 win at Tampa Bay and threw a 34-yard touchdown pass to veteran Leonard Thompson. It was his only pass attempt in the game. Two more weeks of no action followed before Lions' Coach Darryl Rogers elected to start Long in the Lions' final two contests. His first start, on Monday night against the World Champion Bears, helped the Lions' to their lone sellout crowd of the year, and the game was close to the end as Long went 12 of 24 passing for 167 yards with one touchdown pass (to Thompson) and one interception. The Bears pulled off a win late in the fourth quarter, 16-13, but Long's official debut was auspicious. Then came Week 16 and his second start against Atlanta and the results were disappointing. Long hit just 8 of 15 passes for 46 yards (with one interception) and was replaced at quarterback by Joe Ferguson in the second half. Said Long following the game, "I found out against the Falcons just how much I have to learn in the off-season. They disquised their coverages very well and I was confused. I still have a lot of work to do." Rogers agrees, "Missing training camp and preseason really set Chuck back. Many of the things he saw in his two starts he would have recognized more quickly because they are things you work against every day in camp. But that's not the point anymore. The off-season will be spent re-conditioning his arm, working with receivers and absorbing the information from hundreds of reels of game and practice tapes. If Chuck is going to be our quarterback of the future, and that's what we drafted him to be, then he's going to have to work tirelessly this off-season to be ready for '87." Long's final numbers of '86 showed 21 of 40 passes completed (52.5%) for 247 yards and two TDs with a pair of interceptions.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: A consensus All-America as a senior following honorable mention All-America namings as a sophomore and junior, Long was the Heisman Trophy runnerup to Bo Jackson in 1985 while playing for the lowa Hawkeyes. He was selected by the Maxwell Football Club of Philadelphia as the college player of the year that season after leading the Hawkeyes to the Rose Bowl and setting all of the lowa career passing records ... He also set several Big Ten passing standards, including most TD passes in a game (6), season (27) and career (74). He threw for at least 200 yards in 27 college games during his career and his lowa records include: 1,203 pass attempts, 782 completions, 74 touchdowns, 10,461 yards and single-season completion percentage, 67.1 (set in '84). He ranked third at the end of '85 in NCAA career passing efficiency and sixth in passing yards, and his 22 consecutive completions in an '84 game at Indiana also set an NCAA mark. He twice

was a consensus first team All-Big Ten pick ... In leading lowa to the Big Ten title and Rose Bowl in '85. Long completed 260 of 388 passes (67%) for 3,297 yards and 27 touchdowns, all school records. He also completed the longest pass in lowa history. 89 yards, to Robert Smith against Northwestern. He was third nationally in passing efficiency (153.0) and eighth in total offense (262.5) ... In the Rose Bowl loss to UCLA that concluded his career. Long hit on 29 of 37 passes for 319 yards and a TD In the Freedom Bowl following his junior season, Long was 29 of 39 passing versus Texas for 461 yards and a record six touchdowns ... And as a sophomore in the Peach Bowl, he set game records with 11 consecutive completions, three TD passes, 304 yards passing and 306 total yards. lowa was 33-12-1 in games Long started during his career with the Hawkeves ... Chuck was a seven-letter winner in football, basketball and baseball at North High School in Wheaton, Ill., a Chicago suburb, where he was the All-Illinois quarterback as a senior ... He was married to the former Lisa Wells, his long-time sweetheart who also is from Wheaton, in June and they live year-'round in suburban Bloomfield Hills ... Born in Norman, Okla., his full name is Charles Franklin Long Jr.

1986: When you think of punt returners in the National Football League, Pete Mandley probably won't be the first name that comes to mind. Or even the second for that matter. But over the past two seasons, Mandley has guietly



been as consistent and as productive as any punt returner in the game. In fact, he's the only player in the National Football Conference who has returned a punt for a touchdown in both the 1985 and '86 seasons. "Pete really has been a plus for us," Lions' special teams Coach Carl Battershell said. "In fairness to Pete, you should only look at his performance the last two years and overall he has performed well. Last season he did an excellent job defending our 10-yard line (on punt returns) and that's crucial. He has good hands, good speed and the ability to make the first guy miss and those are the ingredients you look for in a punt returner. We expect him to have an even better season in 1987." Mandley played a key role in the season opener at Minnesota when he withstood two big hits by the Vikings' special teams' ace Joey Browner, who was penalized on both occasions for interfering with Mandley as he attempted to field the punts. He also was used late in the season on kickoff returns and had a key kickoff return (37-yards) late in the Lions' win over Philadelphia, which helped set the continued

Mandley continued

stage for Eddie Murray's last-second, game-winning, field goal. Against the Steelers (Week 14) he had a 35-yard punt return and a career-high 51-yard pass reception. Mandley was third in the NFC with a 9.8 punt return average on 43 returns (420 yards), including an 81-yard jaunt for a touchdown against Atlanta in the season finale. Those 43 returns represent the second-highest number of returns (Robbie Martin had 52 returns in 1981) in a single season in Lions' history. And the 420 yards is the third-highest single-season total ever by a Lions' player. In spot duty at wide receiver, he recorded seven receptions for 106 yards (15.1 avg.).

CAREER: A preseason toe injury and a lack of playing time got his pro career off to a less than auspicious start in 1984 when he was the Lions' second-round draft choice ... He was injured in the first preseason game and didn't see action again until the second game of the regular season, which put him in a catch-up mode for the rest of the campaign ... Registered just three pass receptions as a rookie ... Did lead the Lions in number of kickoff returns in '84 with 22 for a 17.7 average ... A new coaching staff meant new life for Pete in 1985 when he recorded 18 receptions for 316 yards (17.6 avg.) and became the Lions' No. 1 punt returner ... He responded with a 10.6 average on 38 returns, which was the third-best return average in the NFC and the seventh-best in the NFL ... His father nicknamed him "PeeWee" as a child but it evolved into "Pete" as he grew older ... His full name is William H. Mandley.

1986: One of the pleasant surprises of the '86 campaign, Vernon Maxwell proved he still has the talent and the ability to be the player he was in 1983 when he earned NFL Defensive Rookie-of-the-Year (as selected by Associated Press)



honors as a member of the Baltimore Colts. Perhaps even more gratifying about Maxwell's season a year ago was the fact that he performed so well at a relatively new position — inside linebacker. "Vernon really surprised us at how well he could play inside linebacker," said Lions' Head Coach Darryl Rogers, who coached Maxwell in college. "He really made some big plays early in the year and only through natural ability can you do that at such an unfamiliar position." Maxwell started the first 15 games of the '86 season until an injury kept him out of the season finale against Atlanta. Despite missing that last game, Maxwell still led the Lions with four fumble recoveries and he also finished third on the club with 107 tackles, just five behind team leader Demetrious Johnson. He led all linebackers with 87 solo tackles and he also regsitered two sacks. Twice during the '86 season (Week 3 vs. Bucs. and Week 8 at Bears), Maxwell had 10 solo tackles in a game. Ironically, Maxwell solidified his '86 roster spot with steady, if not superb, preseason play at the outside linebacker spot vacated by Jimmy Williams, who was an '86 training camp holdout, "There's no question that outside linebacker has been Vernon's natural position, but he has so much ability that he adapted to the inside spot very well. We have two very good outside linebackers (Jimmy Williams and Michael Cofer), but Vernon is such a fine athlete, we were able to find a spot for him. You can never have too many quality football players on the field at any one time and Vernon is a quality football player." Maxwell enters the '87 season as a starter at the "Wanda" or right inside linebacker spot and should also see plenty of action on special teams.

CAREER: Was a second-round draft choice (29th overall) by the Colts in '83 ... Led Baltimore in quarterback sacks (11) and earned a trophy case full of honors: AP and Pro Football Writers "Rookie of the Year" NFLPA AFC defensive "Rookie of the Year," CPFN All-Pro (second team), and the UPI, Football Digest, and Pro Football Writers All-Rookie teams ... Was third on the Colts in total tackles (92) and the leader in solo tackles in '83 ... Was second on the Colts in sacks (8½) and tenth in total tackles (53) in '84 ... But fell out of favor with the Colts and was traded to San Diego during the '85 training camp for a fifth-round pick ... Was released by the Chargers prior to the opening game of the '85 season ... Signed by his former college coach Darryl Rogers on Oct. 25, the same day starting linebacker Michael Cofer went on the injured reserve list with a hip injury ... Played in nine games and started two for the Lions in '85.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Had an outstanding college career at Arizona State ... Recorded 337 total tackles, including 178 solos ... Was a three-time All-PAC 10 pick ... One of four finalists for the Lombardi Award for the outstanding college lineman ... Was ASU's defensive "MVP" as a senior ('82) ... Born in Birmingham, AL., Vernon attended Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles ... His full name is Vernon Leroy Maxwell.

1986: At the conclusion of his fifth Detroit Lions' season last December, Bruce McNorton found himself at the top of several team categories. They are not show-stopping categories, but they are the kind that reflect the

steady, if unspectacular, career McNorton has put together after coming to Detroit the year of the strike-shortened season of 1982. The Lions' starting right cornerback since the second-half of the '83 season, McNorton finished last year as the Lion who has started the most consecutive games (56) among current players, and as the player who has appeared in the most consecutive games among Lions' starters (68, to kicker Eddie Murray's 71). Bruce also led the Lions in minutes played in '86 with 497 minutes, in passes defensed with 17 (up from eight in '85), and he was second on the club in interceptions with four (tied with Duane Galloway, one behind club leader Devon Mitchell). "Chili," as he is known to his teammates, was seventh on the Lions in total tackles with 65, seventh in solo tackles with 52, and he was credited with forcing one fumble and recovering two others. He started all 16 games last fall, and starred in a Week 5 win over Houston with six solo tackles, a fourth-down tackle to stop one drive and an interception that halted the Oilers' final drive.

CAREER: Although he has not returned a kick during his pro career, McNorton primarily was drafted by the Lions to be a kickoff and punt returner ... His skills as a pass defender earned him a spot on the roster in '82 training camp, but he missed most of that season on injured reserve with a hand injury that he suffered in training camp ... He became a starter in Week 9 of the '83 season and has remained the Lions' right cornerback ever since ... Keyed a 31-21 win over the defending AFC champion Dolphins in Week 8 of '85 with 11 tackles and a critical break-up of a fourth-down Dan Marino pass late in the contest ... The Lions' fifth-leading tackler in '85, he was called the team's 'most improved defensive back' by secondary Coach Willie Shaw that year ... In his first seven starts as a pro in '83, McNorton picked off an opponent's pass, and he ended up leading the Lions in thefts that year with seven (and defensed passes with 11) despite starting just eight games ... He had two pickoffs and a team-leading eight defensed passes in '84.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Nickname is Chili, a name he received from teammates in '82 training camp after the defensive backs drafted a policy of donating \$1 toward a chili party at the end of camp for every ball missed or dropped and McNorton was the far and away leader in drops and \$1 donations ... First player ever drafted from Georgetown College where he set school records for career interceptions with 24 and single-season and kickoff return average, a whopping 29.6 his senior year ... He captained both the football and track teams as a senior and was named the school's most outstanding practicum student ... Also an All-Conference pick as a junior and senior and Little All-America in '81 ... Selected to play in the Senior Bowl that year ... McNorton's degree is in social work ... An All-State football player at Spruce Creek High School in Port Orange, Fla., McNorton makes his off-season home in Daytona Beach, Fla., and is the father of two daughters — Mykeshia (11/3/84) and Brittiney (3/16/86) ... His full name is Bruce Edward McNorton.



1986: Alvin Moore played in a backup role for the Lions for the first seven games, then was waived (10/25/86) to make room on the roster for rookie Oscar Smith. Moore returned two weeks later (11/7/86) when Smith went on

injured reserve with a neck injury. In the final six games, Alvin did not carry the ball or catch a pass as rookie running back Garry James asserted himself in the Lions' lineup and Moore's role was reduced to just spot duty. Prior to James' emergence, Moore still was the Lions' utility running back. Against Tampa Bay in Week 3 he came off the bench to replace James and had six rushes for 31 yards and also had a career-high seven pass receptions for 40 yards. He also played extensively in a win over the Oilers (Week 5) two weeks later, carrying the ball 13 times for 42 yards. Darryl Rogers, who also coached Alvin at Arizona State, calls Moore, "a tough kid who gets you the tough yards." Says Moore, "I just go out there and do my job. I'm a team player so I do whatever is best. Coach Rogers has always had confidence in me, he knows he can depend on me. I don't mind my role. If someone else plays, I don't get mad. I just keep myself ready for whenever I'm needed."

CAREER: In 16 games, including five late-season starts for the Lions in '85, Moore rushed for a career-high 221 yards and caught 19 passes ... He also scored five TDs ... His best '85 outing came in a Week 11 win over the Vikings as he rushed for a career-best 60 yards on 20 carries, two for TDs, and added five

pass receptions for 36 yards ... Alvin was the 169th player chosen in the '83 draft (7th round) by the Colts, and he spent his two seasons there as a back-up to Curtis Dickey ... As a pro, he has played for both of his college coaches at Arizona State — Frank Kush while with the Colts and now Darryl Rogers in Detroit ... He started two games in '84 for the Colts, versus Philadelphia and Buffalo.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Rushed for 1,462 career yards on 334 carries at ASU (a 4.4 yard average) with eight TDs ... Alvin also is a first cousin of famed Oklahoma and NFL greats Dewey and Lee Roy Selmon ... He and his wife, Debra, son Alvin and daughter Malissa, live in Tempe, Ariz., during the off-season.

CENTER • ALABAMA • 5th YEAR HT: 6-3 • WT: 270 • BORN: 3-24-61 • (D-5B IN '83)

1986: An enviable work ethic on the Lions may be defined in two words: Steve Mott. The determined Lions' center overcame potentially career-ending injuries during his first two NFL seasons to start 30 of the Lions' past 32 games, but his

most recent year was not without frustration. "My frustrations were really two-fold," remarked Mott. "First there was the (foot) injury and then the team just didn't have the kind of season we were capable of having." Mott's string of 27 straight starts came to an abrupt half after a severely sprained arch in his foot forced him to the continued

sidelines in the first quarter at Philadelphia (Week 11). "Nothing is more frustrating than not being able to contribute," said the New Orleans native. "You work all week long, learn the game plan and hope that the injury heals enough to enable you to play, and then on game day you can't do anything but watch." Steve did get back on track in time to start the season's final three games. Mott has been described by offensive line Coach Bill Muir as "an extremely tenacious competitor and a very smart player."

CAREER: Despite playing most of the season with a broken ring finger on his snapping hand, Mott started all 16 games and rarely missed a down in '85 ... Took command of the starting job in Week 5 of '83 (against the Rams) when he replaced four-year starter Amos Fowler ... The Lions won eight of the last 12 games with Steve at center enroute to the '83 NFC Central Division title ... Was one of only three rookies (with James Jones and Mike Cofer) to start the '83 playoff game against the 49ers, but he sustained a knee injury in the first half that required surgery and an entire off-season of rehabilitation ... Mott made the recovery and started the first six games of '84 before being sidelined for the remainder of that season with a fracture dislocation of his ankle (versus the Broncos). Games: Played 49, Started 48.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Steve was recruited by the legendary Paul (Bear) Bryant after being a schoolboy All-America at New Orleans' Archbishop Shaw High School ... Captained Bryant's last Crimson Tide squad ('82), was a three-year letterman and played on Alabama's '79 national championship team ... Was an All-SEC first-team choice and honorable mention All-America in '82, and starred in the 28-17 'Bama victory over Auburn (11/28/81) when Bryant became college football's all-time winningest coach ... Steve and his wife Julie (a former Alabama cheerleader) are extremely active in community and charity projects, both in the Detroit area and in their off-season hometown of Birmingham, Ala. ... For the past two years, they have spearheaded a fund raiser among Lions' players and a clothing drive for needy Detroit area families in "A Lions' Merry Christmas" program, which was the subject of the Lions' NFL United Way network television spot in '86 ... Last year's program concluded with a Christmas party for more than 60 children from 20 needy families ... The Motts serve on a committee that helped raise \$36,000 for the March of Dimes in Birmingham through a celebrity cooking contest in '86, which they won with a family recipe for New Orleans pralines ... Steve was the Lions' nominee for the NFL Man of the Year in '86, and Julie was a finalist among all NFL players' wives in the '87 NFLPA-Childhelp Awards dinner which recognized community involvement ... That event was a fund raiser in the fight against child abuse ... Steve also was the Lions' 1985 recipient of the Ed Block Memorial Courage Award, which recognizes men of courage in the NFL and is presented by the East Side Athletic Club of Baltimore to one player on each of the 28 NFL teams ... Steve's full name is Walter Stephen Mott III.

PLACE-KICKER • TULANE • 8th YEAR HT: 5-10 • WT: 175 • BORN: 8-29-56 • (D-7 IN '80)

1986: On Nov. 2, place-kicker Errol Mann's longstanding Lions' career scoring record came tumbling down. Ten years and 16 days after Mann had scored his 636th and last Lions' point (on Oct. 17, 1976), Eddie

Murray split the uprights midway into the fourth quarter of Week 9 in the Silverdome against Cincinnati and a new Detroit point king was crowned. The PAT gave Murray his 637th career point on the way to ending the '86 season with a record 684 points and leading the Lions in season scoring for the seventh straight year. "If you're with a team long enough, you've got a shot at becoming the leading scorer. But, if you're hitting 20 out of 50 field goals, what does that prove," asked Murray prior to the '86 season. "At this point in my career. the consistency record means more." Murray, whose nickname is "Money", enters 1987 as the third all-time NFL percentage field goal kicker. His .745 percentage trails only Pittsburgh's Gary Anderson (115 of 149, .772) and Kansas City's Nick Lowery (155 of 203, .764) among career NFL kickers with 100 or more successful boots, New Orleans' Morten Andersen has an .802 percentage (97 of 121) and likely will assume the leadership early in '87. "Consistency is No. 1," said Murray on his philosophy for a successful kicker. "Then, there's handling the pressure. On kickoffs, it's not just a matter of booting it into the end zone. There's hang time and location. And there is the factor of lasting as long as you can at peak performance." Though a sub-par first half lowered his overall percentage a year ago. Eddie did close the season by hitting eight straight field goals, including a four-for-four outing in the Thanksgiving Day loss (Week 13) to the Packers. He also had his first career punt, a 37-yarder in Week 16 against Atlanta from field goal formation and contributed his fifth career game-winning kick when he booted a 41-yard field goal with 12 seconds left in a 13-11 win over Philadelphia in Week 11. Summarized Darryl Rogers, "The only thing that I can see that could be considered sub-par about Eddie's season was the poor opportunities we gave him. We need to get him better field position, and in scoring position more often, and he'll kick 'em in there as well as anybody. He's an All-Pro kicker in my book.'

CAREER: "Eddie Murray not only is an exceptional kicker, but he may be one of the finest athletes on our team," says Rogers ... The Canadian native leads the Lions in consecutive games played (71), dating to the strike-shortened 1982 season ... Is Detroit's all-time leader in points scored (684), PATs (228) and field goals (152) ... Holds the Detroit record with 12 straight field goals (achieved through the final six games of '85), and had an NFL-high string (among active kickers) of 157 straight PATs snapped in Week 2 of '85 ... Has made at least one field goal in 74 of the 78 regular season games in which he has attempted at least one FG ... Twice Eddie has tied Glenn Presnell's Detroit record 54-yard field goal, at Cincinnati (12/11/83) and in the '83 playoffs against San Francisco (12/31/83) ... Has hit on 78.7 percent of his field goal attempts (100 of 127) in the last five seasons, including 85.2 percent (52 of 61) in the Silverdome ... Murray had a banner rookie season ('80) when he led the NFL in scoring (116 points) and became the first and only rookie to be named the Pro Bowl's MVP after his four field goals iced a 21-7 NFC win ... His first pro kickoff (against the Rams on 9/7/80) was returned 98 yards for a TD by Drew Hill ... In his second pro game (9/14/80). Murray booted five FGs (second most in Lions'history) in a 29-7 win over the Packers ... In '81, Murray tied Dallas' Rafael Septien for the NFL scoring title (121 points) and set a Lions' mark with 46 PATs ... Has scored 12 points in playoff games, including 11 points against the 49ers on New Year's Eve, '83, although his 43-yard FG attempt sailed wide right with 0:05 left in that 24-23 loss to the Niners.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Eddie holds virtually every kicking record in Tulane history, where he was a four-year letterman, four-time All-South Independent choice and an honorable mention All-America ('78 and '79) ... Earned the equivalent of 26 varsity letters in high school (for rugby, soccer, field hockey, track and field, volleyball and badminton), and turned down pro contracts from the Vancouver White Caps of the North American Soccer League and the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League before enrolling at Tulane ...

Eddie holds a degree in education from the New Orleans-located university ... Will be inducted in the Tulane Sports Hall of Fame during Week 3 of the '87 season ... Was born in Halifax, Nova Scotia, went to high school in Victoria, British Columbia, and spent much of his childhood (from age 5 to 15) in England ... Has been heavily involved with charity and community activities, and has donated \$100 for each of his field goals the past two seasons to the Multiple Sclerosis Society ... For the last two years, Murray has been the Lions' nomination (by vote of his teammates) for the NFL Players Association's prestigeous Byron "Whizzer" White Humanitarian Award ... The Variety Club of Detroit honored Eddie early in '87 with its Heart Award for his charity participations ... Murray was the Lions' NFL/Lite Man of the Year for '84 and '85, and was the March of Dimes (Southeast Michigan chapter) Athlete-Citizen of the Year in '85 ... Is an outstanding racquetball player and consistently shoots in the 70s on the golf course ... Spends his off-seasons as a loan representative at Bloomfield (Mich.) Mortgage Corporation ... His car's license plate reads "Kick It" ... Eddie lives vear-around in Southfield, Mich., and he has a son Robbie ... His full name is Edward Peter Murray.

1986: After his most productive season as a pro in '85, it appeared Mark Nichols finally was approaching the performance level expected of him when the Lions made him their No. 1 pick in the 1981 draft. But his recovery from



knee surgery (Dec. '85) put those thoughts on hold for at least a year as Mark was forced to miss the entire '86 campaign while his knee healed. "There's no question that Mark had his best season in 1985," Darryl Rogers said. "He has had more than a year to recover from his surgery and we feel he has made a tremendous recovery. He is a big receiver (physically) and his addition will be a huge plus for our football team. We honestly expect him to have an even better year this year than he had in 1985."

CAREER: Was the Lions' first selection in the 1981 draft and the 16th player selected overall ... A fractured shoulder blade and inconsistent play limited him to just 10 catches his rookie year ... During the strike-shortened '82 season, Mark had only eight catches ... In that '82 season, Nichols again found himself on injured reserve with a foot fracture ... His first pro TD reception came in the Lions' dramatic 27-24 win over the Cowboys (11/15/81) on a six-yard pass from Eric Hipple ... Mark's career high for receptions in a game is five and he has done that three times - versus Tampa Bay (9/4/83), Minnesota (9/25/83) and Minnesota (10/21/84) ... The most receiving yards he has registered in a game came in the latter Minnesota contest (117 yards) ... Nichols teamed up on a 77-yard pass play for a TD from Gary Danielson (9/16/84 vs. Tampa Bay) ... He led Detroit in yards-per-catch with a 21.9 average in '84, ranking second only to Green Bay's James Lofton (22.0) among NFL receivers with 30 or more receptions ... Mark had big Thanksgiving Day games in '84 & '85 ... In '84 versus Green Bay he had four catches for 108 yards in a 31-28 Lions' win and in '85 he helped key the 31-20 Turkey Day victory over the Jets with a 38-yard TD reception from Hipple just prior to the half that gave the Lions a 17-3 lead ... His knee problems (which eventually led to surgery) started when he suffered strained ligaments at Minnesota (11/3/85). His injury forced him to miss the final two games of the '85 season and resulted in surgery at the conclusion of the '85 season.

college & Personal: Finished his college career at San Jose State as the school's third all-time leading receiver with 1,217 yards on 48 catches, including 16 touchdowns ... Played for Jack Elway at San Jose State, now the Stanford head coach and father of Broncos' quarterback John Elway ... He also set Spartan records for single-season receiving yardage (773) and TD catches (11) in 1979 after transferring from Bakersfield Junior College ... 1986: A Labor Day (9/1) trade with Seattle may have been overlooked in its significance early in the season, but by year's end Shelton Robinson's presence was reaping dividends for the Lions. Detroit dealt a fifth-round

('87) draft pick to the Seanawks to acquire Robinson for depth at inside linebacker. However, injuries to Jimmy Williams and Vernon Maxwell forced a shuffling of linebackers, which earned Robinson four late-season starts and increased playing time. "Shelton was an excellent addition to our team," praised Darryl Rogers. "We were very pleased with his progress through the season and he should help us a great deal in '87." Robinson started against the Eagles (Week 11), Bucs (Week 12), Packers (Week 13) and in the season-finale versus the Falcons. His 11 total tackles (nine solos, two assists) were a game-high at Tampa Bay and he had a team-high 10 total stops (six solos, four assists), including a shared sack with Vernon Maxwell versus the Packers on Thanksgiving. "Each time Shelton was called upon, he performed very well," said linebackers' Coach Mike Murphy. "He's one of our more physical inside linebackers and he has the ability to earn a starting position this ('87) year."

CAREER: Robinson originally was signed as a free agent by Seattle in '82 ... Has missed playing in only one game in his five-year career but that miss proved a big one ... Shelton had started 31 of 32 games in the '83 and '84 seasons, but after starting the first three games of '85, a bruised hip sidelined him and eventually cost him his position ... He was replaced by Fredd Young and from that point on in his time with the Seahawks he remained a reserve ... Was a back-up middle linebacker and special teams player in his rookie season ('82) but earned a start in the season-finale with Denver (1/2/83) and recorded a personal high of 15 tackles ... 1986: Challenges are nothing new to Rob Rubick. From the day he became the Lions' second 12th-round draft pick in '82 through his first training camp and five NFL seasons, Rubick has been forced to hurdle one obstacle after another.



After missing seven games in '85 due to an assortment of knee, back and calf injuries, Rubick met one of his more severe tests in last season's training camp. Incumbent starter David Lewis, converted fullback Dave D'Addio and former Buffalo star Mark Brammer — who had played for Darryl Rogers at Michigan State — joined Rubick in the battle for the two tight end roster spots. At camp's end, Rubick had earned his way once more. "That was a tough training camp," recalled Rubick. "I was injured for part of camp (pulled groin) and then there was all that competition. At one point during camp, I was prepared to turn in my playbook and say goodbye to my teammates. But, I've been prepared to say goodbye for five years." No goodbyes were necessary, not even when former Pro Bowler Jimmie Giles signed as a free agent at mid-season. Rubick had earned his keep. "Rob is keenly aware of the

areas he can make contributions to our team," says tight ends' Coach Don Doll. "He helps at tight end as a blocker and as a receiver and he plays well on special teams. Rob is dedicated to getting the job done." No better proof of Rubick's worth was evident than in Chicago (Week 8). With Lewis lame with an ankle injury and Giles new to the offense, Rubick got the starter's nod. He responded with a career-high four pass receptions for 56 yards in an otherwise poor Lions' offensive outing. Throughout the season, the Newberry, Mich., native was a boost as a blocker at tight end in short-yardage situations, and he added four solo tackles on special teams.

CAREER: Lions' final selection (second pick in 12th round) of the '82 draft ... Spent rookie season as Lions' third-string tight end ... Hard work paid off in '84 as Rubick started the last seven games of the regular season ... He scored a touchdown the first time he touched the ball as a pro in the '82 season finale against Green Bay on a one-yard end-around run which clinched a 27-24 victory and gave Detroit its first playoff berth since 1970 ... First pro TD pass reception came on a six-yard toss from Gary Danielson against Atlanta (9/18/83) ... Opened the '85 season on the injury list after having had off-season back and knee surgeries ... Was the 326th player (out of 334) taken in the '82 draft ... Lions had extra pick in last round of '82 draft as compensation from San Diego for the Chargers' signing of former Detroit defensive tackle John Woodcock.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Rubick hails from Newberry, a small town in Michigan's Upper Peninsula ... Thanks to efforts in the weight room, Rob has gone from a 185-pound college freshman to a 234-pound 6th-year pro ... Set Grand Valley (an NCAA Division II school in Allendale, Mich.) records for career receptions (83) and yards receiving (I,491), and for season catches (33) and yards (558) — which all were broken a year later by current Lions' wide receiver Jeff Chadwick ... One of three GVSC grads in the NFL (with Chadwick and Seattle's Ron Essink) ... "I think the three of us might have gotten lost in the shuffle at a big college," says Rubick. "Going to a smaller school gave us time to develop. We might not have had that chance somewhere else." ... Has a degree in physical education with a minor in elementary education from Grand Valley, and intends to coach and teach once his playing days are over ... Joined teammate Rich Strenger as the Michigan Special Olympics Pro Athlete of the Year for '87 ... Organized the Lions' off-season charity basketball team and is a highly sought-after banquet speaker ... Lives year-'round in Oxford, Mich. ... His full name is Robin James Rubick.

1986: The Lions made a crucial trade for the present and the future during Week 4 when they acquired offensive lineman Harvey Salem from the Houston Oilers. An outstanding young regular for the Oilers. Salem became available



after he expressed unhappiness playing in Houston and following a 44-day training camp and preseason holdout. The acquisition on 9-23 was made when the Lions relinquished their second-round draft pick in this year's ('87) draft. "We gave up a second-round pick for a solid football player who we need now due to injuries and who should be an outstanding starter for us for a number of years," explained Darryl Rogers following the deal. And although he had played just one-half of one game at guard during his Oilers' career, Salem immediately moved into the Lions' lineup at right guard. The next week, Week 5 versus his old teammates from Houston, Salem switched to left guard and remained there for the rest of the season. He helped us, no question," said Rogers. "A full training camp at that position will make him an even better player, but Harvey's a pro, whether you play him at guard or tackle." Prior to Salem solidifying the left guard position last season, eight different Lions had started games at left guard for Detroit since the first game of '84, a 35-game span: Chris Dieterich, Larry Lee, Homer Elias, David Jones, Ray Snell, Don Greco, Scott Barrows and Kevin Glover.

CAREER: A second-round draft pick by the Oilers in 1983 (30th player selected overall), Salem was named to the NFL All-Rookie team by PFWA and *Pro Football Weekly* that year after starting all 16 games at right tackle ... In '84 Harvey switched to left tackle where he started 15 games and played in all 16 contests, and he played 13 games at left tackle in '85 for the Oilers, missing two games at the beginning of the year with a knee sprain that required arthroscopic surgery ... Following his 44-day '86 preseason holdout, Salem played one-half of one game against the Chiefs at guard before joining the Lions. Games: Played 59, Started 57.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Named to several All-America teams as a junior and senior and tabbed first team All-America by The Sporting News his senior season, Harvey M. Salem is considered a scholar as well as a football player ... After achieving a 3.7 grade point average at El Cerrito High School, located in the San Francisco East Bay area near Berkeley and Oakland, Harvey enrolled at Cal-Berkeley and again excelled academically, finishing college with a 3.5 GPA in psychology ... He was named Academic All-America at tackle as a junior and senior ... He did not play in his first two college games as a freshman, but then started the final 42 games of his fouryear career, grading out with the top score of any Golden Bears' offensive linemen in 34 of his 42 starts ... He was named first team All-Pac Ten as a junior and senior, made the Pac-Ten All-Academic team three years, and was named to the Strength All-America team for his weight-lifting training as a senior ... He played in the East-West Shrine game in Palo Alto and in the Japan Bowl following his senior season ... Harvey also was a member of the Cal track team and posted a personal-best of 60 feet in the shot put ... He was born in Berkeley and still resides there during the off-season.

1986: Eric Sanders came to the Lions (11/18/86) via waivers from the Atlanta Falcons and handled long-snapping duties for Detroit's final three games. He also filled in at tackle during his first game with the Lions

(Week 14) at Pittsburgh. It was part of a strange season for Sanders, who spent most of six seasons with the Falcons in Atlanta and expected to play some more with that club when he didn't make it through injured waivers last November and ended up in Detroit. Nothing could have pleased Lions' Coach Darryl Rogers more: "Eric is a versatile offensive lineman who can play at all the positions and he also can long snap. But, more importantly, he's another big body and you can't have enough of those in the National Football League." In the first eight Falcons' games, Sanders made three starts at right tackle before going on injured reserve with a back injury. Upon coming to the Lions, he took long-snapper Tom Turnure's place on the roster and gave Detroit more versatility since Turnure's strong suit was strictly as a long snapper while Sanders has considerable game experience in the league at tackle and guard.

CAREER: Sanders was a fifth round pick by the Falcons in '81 and started for six weeks that year in place of injured Warren Bryant at right tackle ... In '84 he started two games at left tackle in place of Mike Kenn, then filled in during '85 for seven games — one at left guard, one at right tackle and five at left tackle — all because of injuries to Falcons' starters ... Despite his long-snapping ability, Sanders has not played at center during his pro career ... He missed six weeks of the '84 season on injured reserve with a knee injury.

Games: Played 78, Started 18.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: A pre-med student at Nevada-Reno, Eric did not play football until his junior year in college because of a heavy academic load ... His college major was nutrition ... He and his wife, Irene, today live in Alpharetta, Ga., an Atlanta suburb ... In high school (Reno's Wooster High) Eric was an imposing member of his school's snow skiing team ... Today he lists golf as his favorite pastime ... Full name is Eric Downer Sanders.

1986: What a difference a year makes. For Rich Strenger, '86 couldn't have been more encouraging. After suffering a career-threatening knee injury in the '84 season opener which kept him sidelined until mid-'85, Strenger turned into an iron-

man last fall. The affable Wisconsin native started all 16 games, running his string to 22 consecutive starts. In fact, he played every offensive down and was second only to tackle Lomas Brown (456.5 minutes to Brown's 456.9, a 24-second difference)

in minutes played among offensive players. While Strenger became a fixture at right tackle, injuries at guard continued to mount. Rich played alongside three starting right guards — Keith Dorney, Scott Barrows and Harvey Salem. Dorney returned to full health for Week 6 (Green Bay) and he and Strenger played every offensive down side-by-side over the next ten weeks. Strenger often was at his best when he played against some of the NFL's finest defensive ends. His best outing came when he limited Philadelphia's Reggie White (the eventual Pro Bowl MVP) to one tackle in the Lions' 13-11 victory in Week 11.

CAREER: Sustained a knee injury that required surgery on the seventh play of the '84 season opener against San Francisco while playing left tackle ... Extensive rehabilitation followed the injury but he worked back into the starting lineup for Week 11 against Minnesota in '85, and he hasn't been moved from right tackle since ... Played in 16 games as a rookie ('83) and started four while then-tackle Keith Dorney was injured ... Joins Eric Sanders as Lions' tallest players (6-7) ... Was the 40th player chosen in the '83 NFL draft ... Is considered a fourth-year pro because he was active for only one game in '84, thus not qualifying for a year's service that season. Games: Played 46, Started 27.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Chosen, along with teammate Rob Rubick, as Pro Athlete of the Year prior to the '87 training camp for his work with Michigan Special Olympics ... Named the Lions' 1985 Sportsman of the Year by the Pontiac (Mich.) Elks Club for his exceptional comeback following his '84 injury ... Arrived on the Michigan campus as a gangling 218-pound freshman in '79 ... He and his wife Karen reside in Lake Orion, Mich. ... His full name is Richard Gene Strenger.

1986: The Lions' "Golden Oldie" wide receiver Leonard Thompson finds himself at the crossroads of a distinguished career. On one hand is the telling tale of a veteran who has been relegated to being a situated to the control of the

lost his starting spot and has been relegated to being a situation receiver. On the other hand is the vision of a man who, over his 12 years of play, consistently seems to be like a fine wine — getting better with age. It took "LT" until his sixth NFL season to become a fixture in the Lions' starting lineup. And, despite aging knees and other injuries that were nagging (but rarely kept him off the field) he spent six seasons as a starting and at times spectacular receiver for the Lions. Last season, however, a sub-par training camp led to Thompson's move out of the starting lineup in favor of the youthful and steady Carl Bland. Leonard spent the season as the club's third wide receiver and had only one start, in Week 16 against the Falcons.

when Jeff Chadwick went on injured reserve. "You've got to give their (the Lions' continued

coaching staff) philosophy a chance," Thompson said during the '86 season. "I've been asked to play a role. They're intelligent people. If something isn't working they'll make a change. I've got to give them a chance." When he was given the opportunity, Thompson showed glimpses of his past deeds. In fact, he equaled Chadwick for the club lead in TD catches (5), and he tied the Eagles' Kenny Jackson in topping the NFC in TDs per catch ratio (a TD per five receptions) among players with more than 15 receptions. LT had five scores among his 25 season catches while Jackson (six TDs in 30 receptions) had the same ratio. There were also some magic moments thanks to Thompson and rookie quarterback Chuck Long in the Week 12 contest at Tampa Bay, LT had two TD catches on the day but the second put both Thompson and Long in the Lions' record book. Thompson caught a dramatic, fourth-quarter, 34-yard TD pass from Long on the rookie's first-ever pass attempt in the NFL. It was also Leonard's 35th career TD catch which tied him with Terry Barr (1957-65) for the most scoring receptions in Lions' history. Thompson also closed off his 12th season ranked third in games played (175) and yards received (4,682), fourth in pass catches (277) and tied with Barr for second in total TDs (38) in his Lions' career.

CAREER: Thompson, who has played in 49 straight games, has missed only four games in his career despite three knee surgeries, several arthroscopies and a broken jaw ... Has had nine 100-yard receiving games (eight in the regular season) including a 133-yard outing against the Dolphins (10/27/85), 115 yards and three TDs versus the Jets on Thanksgiving (11/28/85) and 101 in the season-finale with the Bears (12/22/85) in 1985 ... Teamed with Pete Mandley (5 catches for 127 yards) against the Bears (12/22/85) to mark the first time that the Lions have had two 100-yard receivers in the same game since LT (3 for 118) paired with Freddie Scott (3 for 110) against the Bears in '81 (10/19/81) ... Had a career-high 179 receiving yards (8 catches and an 80-yard TD) against Cleveland (9/11/83), which ranks as the fourth highest single-game total in Detroit history ... Two of his three three-TD catch games have come against the Vikings (9/23/78 and 12/9/78) ... Began his pro career as one of the Lions' and the NFL's premier special teams players, used for kickoff and punt returns and in all teams coverage ... He continued to see regular special teams duty through the '83 campaign and saw some action on 'teams' in '86 ... Has nine career (opponent) fumble recoveries, including four in '78 ... Blocked, recovered and scored on a punt against the Colts with :09 left in a dramatic 13-10 Lions' victory in '77 (12/11/77) ... The Tucson, Ariz., native earned a start at running back, his college position, against the Packers in '77 (12/4/77), and led Detroit with 76 rushing yards (18 carries) and scored the Lions' lone TD in a 10-9 loss ... Caught the third longest TD pass in Detroit history, and the longest ever in the Silverdome, with a 94-yard TD reception from Eric Hipple in Hipple's first career start, against the Bears in '81 (10/19/81) ... Has sparkled in post-season play with standout performances against the Redskins (7 catches for 150 yards) following the '82 season and in the '83 playoffs against the 49ers (6 for 74).

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Leonard was a world class sprinter and a running back at Oklahoma State ('73-'74) after transferring from Arizona Western College ... Caught just four passes in his two-year OSU career in the Cowboys' ground-oriented wishbone offense ... His first trip to Detroit came following the '75 NFL draft when he competed at Cobo Arena in the 60-yard dash in the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships ... Long been devoted to community and charitable activities ... Was the Lions' NFL-sponsored 'Man of the Year' in '83, has spearheaded a drive by his teammates that raised money to assist needy families in Pontiac, Mich., the past two years, and has been co-chairman of a celebrity golf tournament in Phoenix that has raised funds for the Make-a-Wish Foundation ... Owner and chairman of the board of KSUN radio in Phoenix ... At a family reunion prior to '85 training camp, Leonard found he had a cousin for a teammate — tight end David Lewis ... Thompson, who attended Pueblo

High School in Tucson, Ariz., resides in the off-season in Scottsdale, Ariz, with his wife Debra, son Christopher and infant daughter Evin ... His full name is Leonard Irwin Thompson.

1986: Frustration had to be the byword for Bobby Watkins in his fifth season with the Lions. Entering the year, Watkins had team-highs in consecutive starts and games played. But the streak ended abruptly at 55

straight starts and 60 consecutive games played when Watkins sustained a foot injury against Tampa Bay in Week 3. Watkins missed the following week's contest at Cleveland, marking the first time in his Lions' career that he did not play in a game and the first time since Dec. 12, 1982 that he did not start for the Lions. He came back the following week and started against Houston, but only lasted a few plays because of the foot injury. Watkins, who was replaced in the lineup by Duane Galloway, was placed on injured reserve Oct. 16. Prior to his injury, Watkins had registered ten total tackles. In the Week 2 game against Dallas, he had six solo tackles and one assist. "Bobby should enter the season continued

as our starting left corner," Lions' defensive backfield Coach Willie Shaw said. "He never really responded to treatment after that foot injury and we missed him, although Galloway did a fine job as Bobby's replacement."

CAREER: Prior to last season, Watkins had led the Lions in interceptions in three of his four professional seasons ... Averaged five interceptions a year prior to '86, with a high of six in '85 ... Seven of his 20 career interceptions have come against the Packers ... In '84 Bobby had six thefts, but zero return yards ... Had three interceptions against Lynn Dickey and the Packers on Jan. 1, 1983 ... Longest interception return is 31 yards (against the Bears on 10/30/83) ... Had a 24-yard interception return in the '83 playoff game at San Francisco ... Was the 42nd player chosen in the '82 draft and the Lions' second-round pick (after Jimmy Williams in the first round).

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Bobby was a four-year starter at Southwest Texas State, which won the NCAA Division II Championship in '81 (his senior year) ... He started the final 38 games of his college career and had 13 pass interceptions over his last three seasons ... He captained the STSU Bobcats his senior year, was All-Conference his final three years and was All-District (NAIA) in both football and track his junior and senior seasons ... Watkins was an NAIA second-team All-America as a senior ('81) ... He was a standout wide receiver and safety at Bishop Dunne High School in Dallas ... One of nine children, Watkins majored in business at STSU ... He and his wife Joselyn reside during the off-season in San Antonio, Tex. ... His full name is Bobby Lawrence Watkins.

1986: In his first full season at nose tackle, Eric Williams rolled up some pretty fair numbers: 62 tackles (tops among Lions' defensive linemen), 52 solo tackles (also tops among D-linemen), three sacks, one intercep-

tion, six batted down passes, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one blocked field goal. Twice he was nominated for the NFC Defensive Player of the Week: the first time following the Lions-Rams game (Week 7) when he had a game-high ten tackles (eight solo, two assists) as he led the charge against Eric Dickerson in a game the Lions lost, 14-10; the second nomination came for a dominating effort at Philadelphia in Week 11 (eight tackles, two assists, one sack, two batted down passes and a field goal block). The Lions won that game, 13-11. Considering '86 was his first season on the nose, it was a good

job. Still, Williams may return to defensive end — where he started in '85 — if a capable nose tackle is found to take his place in the middle. "Playing in there is a nightmare, but I got used to it," said Williams late last season. "My preference would be to play outside, but I'll go where they put me." Defensive line Coach Rex Norris, who dubbed Williams "Bam Bam", says he prefers to play Eric at end, but nose tackle is okay too: "He's probably better suited outside because of his style of play and he's put together like a 34 defensive end. But he did a pretty good job on the nose last year, too, and Eric is the kind of player who only can get better with work." Williams played last year with an assortment of injuries (hip, shoulder, finger — the latter was repaired by off-season surgery). "But I made it through without a debilitating injury and that was one of my goals," explains Williams. "Now, for the first time in my career, I won't be asked to come in with the rookies during the first weeks of training camp to rehabilitate an injury."

CAREER: Williams' third season with the Lions last year required him to be in camp early because he was coming back from a neck fracture suffered in the '85 Thanksgiving Day game against the Jets ... His rookie year of '84 was considered pretty much a washout since Eric found himself in Coach Monte Clark's dog house early and was unable to work himself out: "It was great to be able to get a second chance in pro football and that's what happened to me when Coach Rogers took over the club. I had a clean slate, the coaches didn't know me and I didn't know them." ... Williams moved into the starting lineup that second season at left end and racked up 60 tackles and 6½ sacks in 12 games before suffering the season-ending neck injury against the Jets ... His final two starts of that year were at nose tackle. He was moved there to replace Doug English, whose career ended in an '85 Week 10 game by, ironically, a neck fracture.

COLLEGE & PERSONAL: Eric was one of two defensive linemen at Washington State who received All-America recognition in '83, the other being Keith Millard, now of the Vikings ... He also was a first team All-Pac Ten and All-West Coast selection that year and played in the Senior Bowl game ... Eric is the son of former Lions' second-round draft choice Roy Williams, who was cut as a rookie by Detroit and then played with the 49ers from 1958-64 ... Dad Roy was a University of Pacific graduate and the Williams' family still makes their home in that college town of Stockton, Calif. ... Eric runs a football camp for kids every summer in Stockton and calls upon some of his own teammates and other NFL players to help out ... His degree from Washington State is in agricultural economics ... Eric's two brothers were college basketball players Scott at Idaho State and Dan at George Washington University ... He played his final high school football game (Stockton's St. Mary's High) at fullback and was the leading rusher in the game with over 200 yards ... In another high school game, he blocked two punts, recovered a fumble and made 21 unassisted tackles ... A bachelor who lives in Birmingham, Mich., during the season, his full name is Eric Michael Williams.

1986: It was not the best of times last season for the Detroit Lions and coincidentally, perhaps, the same can be said for Jimmy Williams. The year before ('85) Williams was the spark plug of the Lions' defense. He led the team

in sacks and even received some Pro Bowl consideration late in the '85 season. But Williams, who was in the option year of his contract, held out for the majority of the '86 training camp. He finally signed a one-year pact on Aug. 15 after missing nearly 40 practices. Williams started the first 10 games of the season, but suffered a knee injury against the Vikings (Week 10) that not only stopped his streak of 58 consecutive starts (third highest on the team at the time), but also ended his season. "There's no question that 1986 was a disappointing season," Williams said. "It started out bad (due to his holdout) and I think I let those problems carry over and affect my play on the field. And of course it ended badly with my injury." Despite what Williams classified as a "sub-par" '86 season, he still was the club's fourth-leading tackler and was tied for second on the team with two interceptions at the time of his injury. Williams was at his best in the big games as he totaled nine tackles against both the Cowboys and the Bears and had an interception against Dallas and a sack against Chicago. He was the only Lions' linebacker to record an interception last season and his two thefts were the most by a Detroit linebacker since the 1983 season. But perhaps the most encouraging bit of information regarding Jimmy Williams occurred this past February when he signed a new multi-year contract with the Lions. "I feel great about the new contract and I have a lot of renewed enthusiasm entering the season," Williams said. "I'm really excited about our chances this year. In a lot of our losses last season we were just one play away from winning the game. We can turn that around this season." Another person who shares Williams' optimism is defensive coordinator Wayne Fontes. 'We are looking for Jimmy to provide a tremendous amount of leadership this season," Fontes said. "He's very capable of having the type of year for us that Carl Banks had for the Giants last season. He already is exceptional against the run and if he continues to improve on his defense against the pass. Jimmy can be as good as any linebacker in football."

CAREER: Was the Lions' No. 1 draft choice (15th overall) in '82 ... Played behind Stan White as a rookie, before spending the final four games of that season on injured reserve with an ankle injury that required surgery ... Used mostly in passing situations early in his career because of excellent speed (4.5 in the 40-yard dash) ... Started every game in '83 and '84 at the right outside linebacker position ... Was fifth on team in tackles with 143 in '83, and placed second in that category in '84 when he recorded 140 tackles ... Returned to his more natural left outside linebacker position (the one he played in college) when new coaching staff arrived in '85 ... Responded with best year of career which included a team-leading 7.5 sacks ... Was voted the Lions' Most Valuable Defensive Player by his teammates in '85 when he led the team with 7.5 sacks and was generally considered to be one of the top linebackers in the NFC ... His tackle total in '85 was lower than the two previous seasons due to opposing teams directing their offenses away from Williams.


COLLEGE & PERSONAL: The epitome of a rags-to-riches story, Jimmy did not receive a single scholarship offer from a major university after his high school playing days at Washington, D.C.'s Woodrow Wilson High School ... So he, along with his brother Toby, ventured west to Nebraska where both made the squad as walk-ons ... Toby now starts for the New England Patriots at nose tackle ... Jimmy entered Nebraska as a 180-pounder, with a 4.8 time in the 40-yard dash ... Hard work in the weight room helped him increase his weight to 215 pounds and improve his speed to a one-time clocking of 4.3 in the 40 ... A unanimous All-Big Eight selection as a senior ... Was the conference's defensive player of the Year in '81 and was named to nine All-America teams as a senior ... Jimmy and Toby are two of eight children in the family of James and Flora Williams of Washington, D.C. ... Jimmy is very active with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and does a lot of speaking to church youth groups ... Is learning to play the saxophone ... Jimmy was married last September and he lives with his wife Chris year-'round in Rochester, Mich. ... His full name is James Henry Williams.

Had 32 career rushes for 252 yards, 31 receptions for 342 yards, and played in five post-season bowl games (three Sugars, one Cotton and a Citrus) ... Was a fullback, defensive back and place-kicker at North Mecklenberg High School in Charlotte, N.C., where he was All-Conference, All-County and All-City and also lettered in basketball and track ... His brother Newton was a running back with the 49ers and the Colts in the early '80s ... Lives in the off-season in Charlotte ... His full name is Edmund Scott Williams.

OTHER LIONS WITH PRO EXPERIENCE

Twenty-eight young veterans, or players with previous pro training camp experience, entered 1987 training camp with the Lions in July. The group included:

RUNNING BACKS: Karl Bernard (5-11, 205, Southwestern Louisiana) had an injury-plaqued college career that began at Louisiana State where, ironically, he was battling current Lions' running back Garry James for a spot in the backfield until injuries struck. Bernard later transferred to Southwestern Louisiana where he set a school record during his senior season (1986) for most pass receptions (29 catches for 412 yards) for a running back in the Ragin' Caiuns' run-and-shoot offense. He also rushed 20 times for 89 yards as a senior ... Dave D'Addio (6-1, 229. Maryland) was the Lions' fourth-round draft pick in 1984 who fell on hard times in '85 and '86. He had seven rushes for 46 vards (long of 14) and one pass reception for 12 yards as a rookie fullback and back-up to James Jones. However, he suffered a severe arch injury during '85 training camp which required him to be placed on injured reserve the entire season. He was among the Lions' final cuts in '86 camp after working exclusively that summer at tight end. He played fullback and linebacker in college, and co-captained Maryland as a senior ('83) ... Stan Edwards (6-1, 214, Michigan) is a Detroit native (Kettering High School) who returned home when he was released by the Houston Oilers in February, 1987 after he had been Houston's third-round draft pick in 1982. Edwards played 53 games in his Oilers' career and had 117 rushes for 464 yards and two TDs. He also had career totals of 45 pass receptions for 354 vards and one score. His best season was in 1984 when Edwards rushed for 267 yards and one TD and had 20 receptions for 151 yards. A member of some of the University of Michigan's finest teams. Stan concluded his college career as the Wolverines' ninth leading rusher in the school's history with 2,040 yards on 426 carries and 13 TDs ... Weldon Ledbetter (6-1, 223, Oklahoma) spent his freshman college season (1979) in the same backfield with former Lions' great Billy Sims, before he finished his four-year Sooners' career with 1,182 yards rushing on 274 carries (5.1 yards per carry average) and four touchdowns. He also was a four-time Big Eight All-Academic selection. Ledbetter was a seventhround draft pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in '83 but was waived during training camp that year. He did spend the '83 season on the Indianapolis Colts' reserve list and had an '84 camp tryout with the Houston Oilers ... Oscar Smith (5-9, 203, Nicholls State) was Detroit's promising fifth-round draft pick in '86, but he broke a bone in his big toe during training camp and was on injured reserve for the season's first seven weeks. His two-game return (Weeks 8 and 9) was highlighted by five kickoff returns for 81 yards (16.2 average, long of 30) until a neck injury suffered on a kickoff return forced him back to injured reserve for the final seven weeks of the season. At Nicholls State, Smith set school records in career rushing (2,482 yards) and scoring (210 points), and in single-season rushing (947 vards) in '85. He also averaged 28.2 vards per kickoff return in his career.

QUARTERBACKS: Lee Saltz (6-1, 195, Temple) was the only free agent quarterback inked by the Lions after a standout college career at Temple. The New Jersey native was a four-year letterman (1983-86) and three-year starter for the Owls. He concluded his career as Temple's all-time leader in passing yards (5,171), total offense (5,407) and career passing attempts (655). Saltz's final two seasons were his finest when he passed for 1,875 yards and 13 TDs as a junior and followed with 1,729 passing yards and 12 TDs with a 57.6 percent completion average as a senior.

RECEIVERS: Steve Bird (5-11, 185, Eastern Kentucky) came to Detroit this spring after two seasons in the CFL with Edmonton (1985) and Montreal (1986). Originally, Bird was a fifth-round draft pick by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1983, and played most of two seasons for the Cards where he was used primarily as a return specialist. In 22 NFL games with the Cardinals and one game with the Chargers before moving to the CFL. Steve had a 6.8 yards per return average on 20 punt returns and a 20.0 average on 20 kickoff returns. He played on two NCAA Division I-AA championship teams (1979 and 1982) at Eastern Kentucky and was voted Ohio Valley Conference Offensive Player-Of-The-Year in '82 ... Eddie Coleman (6-0, 180, Bluffton) was a four-year letterman at Bluffton (Ohio) where he was the team's Most Valuable Player as a senior, along with '85 namings as All-Conference, All-NAIA District, honorable mention All-America (NAIA) and Bluffton College's Male Athlete of the Year. He set school records in career touchdown receptions (13), receiving yards (1,520) and yards per catch (21.1), and also the single-season mark for receiving yards (724) and average yards per catch (26.8) as a senior. Coleman added a career average of 8.1 yards per punt return and 18.9 yards per kickoff return ... Darrell Grymes (6-2, 186, Central State) had a training camp tryout with the New England Patriots in '86 after playing his college career under former Denver Broncos' and New York Jets' fullback Billy Joe at Central State University of Ohio. Injuries and a groundoriented college attack limited his pass receptions to only seven his final two years, but four of the catches went for touchdowns ... Todd Hines (5-11, 180, Hanover) sustained an ankle injury during Detroit's passing mini-camp in March that clouded his '87 status. Hines, who had a tryout with the CFL Hamilton Tiger Cats in '86, had outstanding junior and senior seasons at Hanover (Ind.) — 67 catches for 783 yards and seven TDs in '84 and 64 receptions for 830 yards and six TDs in '85. He was a three-time All-Hoosier-Buckeye Conference selection, twice was named NAIA All-District and was a 1985 NAIA honorable mention All-America ... Bret Pearson (6-4, 240, Wisconsin) is a tight end who was the Badgers' second-leading receiver as a junior ('83) and senior ('84) behind current New York Jets' star Al Toon. Pearson had 34 catches for 373 yards and two TDs in '83 and added 36 receptions for 360 yards (no TDs) in '84. He was the San Diego Chargers' second pick in the 12th round of the '85 draft before being released during that season's training camp ... Eric Truvillion (6-4, 205, Florida A&M) played three seasons with the USFL Tampa Bay Bandits and was named to The Sporting News All-USFL team in 1983 when he had 66 receptions for 1,080 yards and a league-leading 15 receiving TDs. The following year ('84) he had 70 catches for 1,044 yards and nine TDs, and threw a 13-yard touchdown pass. In '85, he spent most of the year on the developmental squad with an injury but still managed 31 receptions for 428 yards and six scores. Originally signed as a free agent by the New York Jets in '82, Truvillion began his college career at quarterback before switching to wide receiver for his senior ('81) season. Prior to the '87 training camp, he had not been active with an NFL club.

OFFENSIVE LINEMEN: Tony Brown (6-5, 295, Pittsburgh) is the type of widebodied tackle that offensive line Coach Bill Muir looks for, and comes to Detroit after a free agent tryout with the New England Patriots during training camp in 1986. The Stamford, Conn. native lettered three seasons (1983-85) at Pitt and was an honorable mention All-America his senior year ... **Ron Kosor** (6-2, 270,

North Carolina State) lettered four years on the offensive line for the Wolfpack and teamed with the Lions' 1986 third-round draft pick Joe Milinichik. He played guard and tackle until he switched to center in I983, his sophomore season. Kosor did have a free agent tryout during training camp last year with the New England Patriots but was released prior to the season-opener ... Joe Milinichik (6-5, 300, North Carolina State) had the misfortune to dislocate his elbow in a preseason fall in the locker room that left him on injured reserve for the entire '86 season. The big lineman, who can play tackle or guard as well as long snap, was Detroit's third-round draft choice in '86 after he was a two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference pick and was an AP and UPI honorable mention All-America in '85 ... Jack Oliver (6-4, 285, Memphis State) was a sixth-round draft pick of the New York Giants in 1985 but was released during training camp that year, and he sat out of football in 1986. A three-year starter at both tackle and guard at Memphis State, Oliver is projected to play guard with the Lions. The Pensacola, Fla. native was Memphis State's offensive captain for his senior (1984) season as well as being voted the team's MVP offensive lineman that year ... Don Snyder (6-5, 290, Tennessee Tech) comes back for a second free agent try with the Lions after he was released during '85 training camp in which he tried out for the team as a defensive end. Snyder, who will try out this year at offensive tackle, was a tight end and guard at Garden City Community College (Kan.) before transferring to Tennessee Tech for his final two seasons ('83 and '84). After starting his first four games at tight end for Tech, with five receptions for 47 yards, he finished his college career as a defensive tackle. Snyder set Tech's single-game marks in sacks (five) and fumble recoveries (three) in an outstanding performance against Middle Tennessee State in '84.

DEFENSIVE LINEMEN: Joe Drake (6-3, 285, Arizona) had 1985 and 1986 visits to the Lions' training camp, but as a Philadelphia Eagles' nose tackle when the Lions and Eagles combined workouts for a week both years. Drake was Philly's second pick in the ninth round of the '85 draft and played in all 16 Eagles' games with nine tackles that year. He was waived during '86 training camp. Drake was a second-team All-Pac-10 choice as a senior ('84) at Arizona when he had 92 tackles and eight quarterback sacks. Drake had three sacks and 102 tackles as a junior ... Tony Garbarczyk (6-3, 275, Wake Forest) can blame injuries for cutting short his '86 training camp tryout with the Buffalo Bills after that club had chosen him in the 11th round of the draft. He was a two-year letterman and starter at Wake Forest after he had two outstanding seasons at Nassau Community College (N.Y.) where he was a junior college All-America. The Queens Village, N.Y., native played outside linebacker in college but will get a shot at nose tackle in Detroit ... Allen Hughes (6-3, 254, Western Michigan) is a homegrown product from Detroit who has played in both the USFL and CFL. He was a 12th-round draft pick by the Pittsburgh Steelers in '82 but failed to make that club. Hughes went on to play one game ('82) with the CFL Ottawa Rough Riders and three seasons with the USFL Michigan Panthers ('83 and '84) and Portland Breakers ('85). The defensive end originally signed as a free agent with the Lions in '86 but sustained a severe ankle fracture in the final preseason game at Cincinnati and was placed on injured reserve for the entire regular season. A Detroit probation officer when he signed with the Lions, Hughes was a two-time defensive Player of the Year at Western Michigan. He has worked at nose tackle as well as defensive end with the Lions ... Frank Mattiace (6-1, 270, Holy Cross) earned his pro experience in two USFL seasons ('84 and 85) with the New Jersey Generals. He played in 17 games during each season and had three quarterback sacks each year. The nose tackle first was signed continued as a free agent in '83 by the Green Bay Packers but was released during training camp. At Holy Cross, he was named to the All-ECAC and All-New England teams and was an honorable mention All-America as a senior ('83).

LINEBACKERS: George Jamison (6-1, 226, Cincinnati) originally was tabbed by Detroit in the supplemental draft of USFL players in '84 but the Lions did not sign the outside linebacker until '86 training camp was underway. He then sustained an Achilles injury in camp and was placed on injured reserve for all of '86. Jamison played on two USFL championship teams with the Philadelphia ('84) and Baltimore ('85) Stars after he was that team's second-round draft pick in '84. An All-Rookie USFL choice in '84, he was an All-America and All-Metro Conference selection at the University of Cincinnati following his senior season ('83) ... Bob Sebring (6-2, 238, Illinois) attended Illinois after a two-year career at Saddleback Junior College (Calif.). He began his college career as a quarterback before shifting to outside linebacker, and he'll be given a shot at inside linebacker with the Lions. Sebring had 100 career tackles (57 solos and 43 assists) in his two-year Illini career. He got his first taste of the NFL after being chosen in the ninth round of the '86 draft by the Houston Oilers. He was released during that training camp.

DEFENSIVE BACKS: Ricky Smith (6-0, 188, Alabama State) has 37 games of NFL experience after he was a sixth-round draft pick by the New England Patriots in 1982. He spent two seasons ('82 and '83) with the Patriots before he was traded to the Washington Redskins in '84. In all, Smith has 24 career tackles (18 solo, 6 assists), 67 kickoff returns with a 22.5 yards per return average, and 54 punt returns for a 9.9 yards per return average. He returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown for the Patriots against the Jets as a rookie, and he had an interception (37-yard return) in '84 for the Redskins against the Lions. Smith also had training camp tryouts with the Indianapolis Colts (185) and the Miami Dolphins ('86). In college, he had seven career pass interceptions, was the NAIA's national indoor long jump champion in '79 and '80, and was a centerfielder on his school's baseball team ... Steve Smith (6-0, 200, Michigan) will attempt to settle in at safety with the Lions after a pro career that has seen him play quarterback, running back and wide receiver. His most recent pro experience came in '86 training camp with the San Diego Chargers. Previously, Smith played in the CFL in Montreal ('84) and Ottawa ('85). He is best known as having been a three-year starting quarterback at the University of Michigan where he set records in passing yards (4,860) and total offense yards (6,554), and ended his career with 324 completions in 648 pass attempts, 42 of those completions going for touchdowns.

SPECIALISTS: Kevin Buenafe (6-0, 180, UCLA) has had a pair of training camp tryouts with NFL clubs after a record-setting college career at UCLA. He was in camp with the Dallas Cowboys in 1985 and then had a training camp shot with the Los Angeles Raiders in '86. Buenafe was a four-year (1981-84) letterman at UCLA where he had a career punting average of 42.1 yards per punt and set the school's all-time records in punting attempts (232) and yards (9,766). His finest collegiate season was as a senior when Kevin averaged 43.2 yards on 65 punts and was an All-Pac-10 selection ... Russell Erxleben (6-5, 230, Texas) is making a comeback attempt after being out of pro football since 1983. He originally came into the NFL as the New Orleans Saints' No. 1 draft pick in 1979. He played five seasons ('79-'83) with the Saints, accumulating 279 career punts for a 40.6 yards per punt average. His best season was in 1982 when he recorded a 43.0 average. Erxleben also has seen limited duty as a place-kicker, and

has been 7 of 7 on PATs and 4 of 8 in field goal attempts. He was released by New Orleans prior to the '84 season and had an '85 training camp tryout with the Los Angeles Rams. In college, Erxleben had an All-America career that included a 44.2-yard career punting average and he tied the NCAA field goal distance record with a 67-yarder against Rice in '77 ... **David Jacobs** (5-7, 150, Syracuse) was a 12th-round draft pick by the Denver Broncos in 1979 but received his first regular season experience that year with the New York Jets after his training camp release by the Broncos. He scored 25 points (10-11 PATs, 5-9 FGs) with New York in '79 before he was released prior to the '80 season. He had 21 points (9-10 PATs, 4-12 FGs) in the '81 season for the Browns, followed by training camp tryouts in '82 with both Philadelphia and New England, in '84 with the Raiders and in '86 with the Dolphins. He did play in the '83 USFL season with New Jersey and was 6 of 13 in field goal attempts, 13 of 16 in PAT attempts, and had a 34.3 yard punting average. Jacobs was a four-time All-ECAC selection at Syracuse, and was the ECAC's Rookie of the Year in '75.

For the 1986 season, the Defensive MVP was Keith Ferguson, who led the club in quarterback sacks. For the third consecutive season, fullback James Jones was voted the Lions' MVP on offense but this time he shared the honor with the Lions' offensive captain, guard Keith Dorney. Paul Butcher, who signed as a free agent during Week 5 after initially being cut during training camp, was tabbed the Special Teams' MVP.

Last year the Lions got their quarterback for the future when they drafted Chuck Long on the opening round. This

year, the Lions went to the other side of the football with their initial pick and selected defensive end Reggie Rogers from the University of Washington. The 6-foot-6, 272-pound lineman was the seventh pick overall in the draft, and was the first defensive lineman chosen.

Rogers' selection marked the first time since 1973 (when the Lions selected DE Ernest Price) that Detroit used its first round pick to select a defensive lineman.

"Reggie is a player who we feel is necessary for us to improve our defense," said Lions' Head Coach Darryl Rogers. "There were some excellent defensive players on the (draft) board when our time came to pick, so it was necessary for us to make a decision. We felt he was the best person that we could bring in at this point to be a player for us."

After Rogers' (Reggie) performance at the Lions' May mini-camp, it was obvious the Lions' had made an excellent choice. "Reggie is an excellent athlete and he proved that at the mini-camp," the Lions' head coach said. "He's big and strong, and he's potentially a great football player. He had to be considered the best pure pass rusher in the draft, especially from the defensive end position."

The Lions' top pick, who also lettered three years for the basketball team at Washington, dedicated his senior football season to his late brother, Don Rogers, a former Pro Bowl safety with the Cleveland Browns.

REGGIE ROGERS' COLLEGE HIGHLIGHTS

1986: First team All-PAC 10 Conference and All-America selection by virtually every wire service and tabloid in the country ... Winner of the Morris Trophy, given to the conference's top defensive lineman and was a finalist for both the Outland and Lombardi Trophies ... Finished the year with 95 tackles (41 solos), 13 for 81 yards in losses and 7 sacks ... Had 2 pass deflections, caused 5 fumbles and recovered 2 others ... Registered 13 tackles, 2 sacks and caused a fumble as the defense forced 4 turnovers in a 28-12 win over California ... He ranked third in the conference in tackles for losses, second in caused fumbles and eighth in sacks ... Had 9 tackles and a sack in a 28-6 loss to Alabama in the Sun Bowl ...

1985: Associated Press All-America honorable mention and first team All-Pac 10 selection in his first full year at defensive tackle ... Finished third on the team and led the defensive linemen in tackles with 112 (56 solos, 11th in the conference) ... Led the team in sacks with 8 (5th in PAC-10) ... Had a season high 16 tackles with 2 sacks vs. California ... Caused 2 fumbles, recovering 1 and had 3 pass deflections.

1984: Started 10 of 12 contests at outside linebacker, playing the other 2 contests at defensive tackle ... Voted the team's most improved player ... Finished with 74 tackles, had 10 tackles for 61 yards in losses, caused 3 fumbles, deflected 3 passes, and blocked a field goal attempt ... Had a season high 9 tackles in

the Stanford contest ... Moved to right defensive tackle permanently during spring drills before the '85 season to take advantage of his size and pass rushing ability ... Continuing with their pre-draft intention to emphasize defense, the Lions selected nose tackle Jerry Ball of Southern Methodist on the third round.

The Lions' second pick overall in the draft, Ball compliments the Lions' No. 1 selection of defensive end Reggie Rogers.

"We have said all along we need defensive linemen and people on the defensive side of the football and we

think we have a good one in Jerry Ball," Lions' Coach Darryl Rogers said. "Jerry is a very active football player. With his size (6-0, 296) he has proven he can take care of his area on the football field. We are very happy with the selection of Jerry."

Considered one of the premier nose guards in the country prior to his senior season, Ball moved to right defensive tackle in 1986 when SMU switched from a 3-4 to a 4-3 defensive alignment.

He earned consensus first team All-SWC honors and also was an All-America selection his senior year, when he finished second on the team with 95 tackles (59 solo). Ball was a finalist for the Outland & Lombardi Trophies as a junior and senior and was particularly impressive to the pro scouts at the Senior Bowl where he played nose tackle. After a stellar performance against Texas A & M during his junior year, Aggies' Head Coach Jackie Sherrill remarked that, "Jerry Ball could be the best nose guard ever to play college football. He is surely the best I've ever seen."

A heavy-duty hitter from the University of Michigan, defensive back Garland Rivers was the name Coach Darryl Rogers called when the Lions' turn came in the fourth round. Rivers, a 6-1, 181-pound first-team All-Big Ten cornerback, likely will use his size and abilities at another position for Detroit. "He'll probably be shifted to strong safety," predicted Rogers. "He's strong and fast, and has the intangibles you want to have. He can read and react.

Garland is a good football player." A physical player whose aggressiveness easily fits the mold of a strong safety, Rivers figures he will have little difficulty shifting from cornerback. "I think strong safety is my natural position," said Rivers on draft day. "I like to come up and force the run but I feel I'm quick enough to

get back to cover the pass, as well. I played strong safety in high school before I was switched to corner at Michigan, so I think I can make the adjustment without too much difficulty."

The selection of linebacker Danny Lockett on the sixthround by the Lions gave Detroit a player with exceptional athletic ability who can play both inside and outside linebacker as well as special teams. Lockett, who played his final two years of college ball at the University of Arizona, saw action at both linebacker and defensive end in college. He excelled as a pass rusher with a total of 21 sacks in two seasons at Arizona and 12 sacks in one

season at the College of the Sequoias Junior College. "We got a good football player and an excellent athlete in Danny Lockett," Lions' Coach Darryl Rogers said. "He played both up and down in college, but while he really isn't big enough to play down (defensive end) for us, we feel he is a good enough athlete to help us at either linebacker spot. I liken him a little to Brian Noble (Green Bay linebacker who Rogers coached at Arizona State). "Danny plays very hard and is an excellent special teams player," Rogers continued. "We expect him to make some major contributions to our special teams."

The San Diego native, whose family comes from Samoa, played his first two college seasons at Arizona State under Lions' Coach Darryl Rogers, and was recruited to the Sun Devils by Detroit secondary Coach Willie Shaw. "Very few people tried to handle Danny

one-on-one because of his size and quickness," recalled Shaw. "He's an all-around athlete who has the potential to be an excellent football player. The motivation of playing in the NFL could be just what he needs to show everyone what he is capable of doing." Saleaumua was twice chosen as second-team All-PAC 10 selection (1984 and 1985) and was a four-time Sun Devil letterman. His play was limited to nine games with five starts in '86, but he had 190 career tackles. He closed out his ASU career competing on the Sun Devils' track team in the shot put and discus in 1987.

Gibson mostly played outside linebacker for the lowa State Cyclones and it led him to becoming a four-year letterman, three-year starter and the team's Defensive Most Valuable



Player his junior and senior years. "He'll move inside for us, but he shouldn't have any trouble making the shift," offered Dierking who scouted Gibson. "Dennis often was moved inside in lowa State's alignment and took on the big guys. He's big enough to be able to handle it." The Ankeny, lowa, native was used mostly on special teams for the Cyclones as a freshman (1983) after he was red-shirted in '82. He took command of a starting slot his final three years.

"He's very strong in the upper body (Calhoun can bench press 400 pounds) and is very elusive in the open field, which makes him such

a dangerous return man. We'll try him at both the running back and return positions."

A speedburner is Detroit-bound in the form of wide receiver/return specialist Ray Brown. The South Carolina Gamecock was the Lions' tenth-round choice, and Director of Player Personnel Joe Bushofsky was quick to sing Brown's praises. "He's a super strong kid who has been clocked under 4.3 on a grass field," said Bushofsky. "He needs some work on running routes, but Brown has lots of ability and he has that thing you just can't teach —



speed." Brown spent his first three years at South Carolina as a running back before he was shifted to wingback as a senior. "I thought he'd have a tough time making the adjustment from running back to wing but he was super," said South Carolina Coach Joe Morrison. "Ray did the little things well, he was a leader and was pleasure to coach." Brown caught 28 passes for 289 yards and two touchdowns as a senior and added a 21.1 kickoff return average on 27 runbacks. He also rushed 18 times for 62 yards and one score. In his career he averaged 23.4 yards on 61 kickoff returns.



A player who helped build an NCAA National Championship team became the Lions' 11th-round draft choice as Detroit tabbed 6-7, 253-pound tight end Brian Siverling (SIGH-ver-ling). Siverling helped Penn State to a national title last season with 21 catches for 279 yards as the team's second leading receiver. "Siverling has good hands which could make him a valuable receiver for us, especially at his size," said Lions' regional scout Jim

Owens. "He's extremely smart and you'd never have to worry about him always giving 100 percent effort. Brian has the potential to develop into a good end-line blocker and has also shown us he is a tough receiver who isn't afraid to catch in a crowd." The fifth-year senior, who red-shirted in '82, had a banner senior season when he earned All-East honors. Siverling's championship season was capped when he had a six-yard reception late in the fourth quarter that set up D.J. Dozier's game-winning six-yard run in the 14-10 victory over Miami in the Fiesta Bowl. Hours later, the Nittany Lions were acclaimed as the national champions.

Lee, a four-year letterman as a wide receiver and return specialist for Georgia Tech, was a preseason All-America selection by The Sporting News after a superb junior season. His statistical production fell off somewhat his senior year, but that can be attributed to the fact that Georgia Tech's offense didn't utilize its' passing game as



often as it had the year before. Georgia Tech also used two new quarterbacks during much of Lee's senior season, which led to breakdowns in the passing game. "Gary is a good, solid receiver who also has excellent kickoff return ability," Lions' Area Scout Jim Owens said. "He is a possession-type receiver who goes over the middle real well. We'll probably try him as a receiver, a coverman on special teams and as a kickoff return man." During his junior season Lee had a string of 23 consecutive third-down receptions that resulted either in a touchdown or a first down.

GARY LEE'S COLLEGE HIGHLIGHTS

1986: Led Georgia Tech in receiving and kickoff returns ... Returned one kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown against North Carolina State ... INSTANT REPLAY APPROVED FOR 1987

For the second year in a row, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system basically stays the same as in 1986 with the exception that larger monitors will be used by Replay Officials. In 1986, there were 374 plays closely reviewed (defined as a contact to the field, but not necessarily stoppage of play). There were 38 reversals for an average of one reversal in each six games. There were three other rulings (clarification of rules) by Replay Officials.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. In 1987, the vote was 21-7.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a "no frills" approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basis system that later was adopted for 1986 and 1987. A total of 28 plays were examined closely in 1985 (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed,

and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted via a headset

contacted via a neadset

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period after the play is over.

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will not include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeing; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct: and use of the helmet as a weapon.





SIGNIFICANT DATES IN DETROIT LIONS' HISTORY

- June 30, 1934 G. A. Richards purchases Portsmouth, Ohio, franchise and moves team to Detroit.
- Sept. 23, 1934 Lions play first NFL game, beat New York Giants 9-0 at U of D Stadium before 12,000.
- Nov. 25, 1934 Lions suffer first defeat, 3-0, to Green Bay, after winning ten straight including seven consecutive shutouts.
- Nov. 29, 1934 Lions play first of traditional Thanksgiving Day home games, losing to the Bears, 19-16, before 26,000.
- Dec. 9, 1935 Lions defeat New York Giants, 26-7, for first Championship.
- Sept. 9, 1938 Lions play first game in new home, Briggs Stadium.
- Feb. 10, 1943 Gus Dorais named head coach of Lions, after a long and successsful career at the University of Detroit.
- Jan. 15, 1948 Syndicate headed by Edwin J. Anderson purchases Detroit franchise for \$165,000 and names "Bo" McMillan general manager and head coach.
- Dec. 2, 1949 Anderson elected president of Lions.
- Dec. 20, 1950 "Buddy" Parker succeeds McMillin as head coach.
- Dec. 21, 1952 Lions defeat Los Angeles, 31-21, for NFL's National Conference title.
- Dec. 28, 1952 Lions win first Championship since 1935 on a 17-7 victory over the Browns in Cleveland before 50,934.
- Dec. 27, 1953 Detroit wins second straight Championship on 17-16 decision over Cleveland in Detroit before 54,577.
- Aug. 12, 1957 Parker resigns suddenly as head coach and assistant coach George Wilson succeeds him the next day.
- Dec. 28, 1957 Detroit claims fourth Championship on 59-14 victory over Cleveland before 55,263 in Detroit.
- Jan. 23, 1961 William Clay Ford elected president of Lions.
- Jan. 10, 1964 Ford takes over as Lions' sole owner after purchasing franchise for \$4.5 million.
- Jan. 7, 1965 Harry Gilmer appointed head coach, replacing George Wilson.
- Mar. 10, 1966 After 13 seasons, Joe Schmidt retires to become Lions' linebacker coach.
- Jan. 11, 1967 Schmidt named Lions' head coach, succeeding Gilmer.
- Dec. 26, 1970 Lions edged by Dallas, 5-0, in first playoff game since 1957.
- Oct. 24, 1971 Chuck Hughes, wide receiver, dies on field during game after suffering a heart attack.
- Jan. 12, 1973 Schmidt resigns as head coach.
- Jan. 26, 1973 Don McCafferty named Lions' head coach.
- July 28, 1974 McCafferty dies of heart attack.
- Aug. 3, 1974 Rick Forzano named head coach.
- Aug. 23, 1975 Lions play first game in new home, Pontiac Silverdome.
- Oct. 4, 1976 Forzano resigns as head coach.
- Oct. 5, 1976 Tommy Hudspeth named interim head coach.
- Feb. 9, 1977 Hudspeth signs three-year contract as head coach.
- Jan. 11, 1978 Monte Clark named head coach and director of football operations.
- Apr. 29, 1980 Lions choose Oklahoma's Billy Sims first in the draft.
- Jan. 8, 1983 Detroit qualifies for first playoff appearance in 12 seasons, but loses, 31-7, at Washington. The Redskins went on to win Super Bowl XVII.
- Dec. 31, 1983 A last-second field goal attempt fails as Detroit drops a 24-23 playoff game at San Francisco.
- Dec. 19, 1984 Monte Clark and his coaching staff are released.
- Feb. 6, 1985 Darryl Rogers is named head coach after a successful 20-year college coaching career.




NEW RULES FOR 1987 SEASON

Action taken by NFL executives at the League's 1987 annual meeting in Maui, Hawaii, included the adoption of the following resolutions and rule changes:

- —Continued in effect for one year the instant replay system that was used during the 1986 season.
- —Team timeouts in the final two minutes of each half will be reduced from 60 to 40 seconds.
- —Made an exception to close line play that previously permitted clipping between the tackles and three yards on either side of the line of scrimmage. Now, an offensive lineman may not clip a defender who is lined up more than one position away when the defender is responding to the flow of the ball away from the blocker. Example: Tackles cannot clip the nose tackle on a sweep play away.
- —No player on either team is permitted to block below the waist during a kicking play or after any change of possession.
- —With the exception of the first onside kick attempt, if a kickoff goes out of bounds, the receiving team will take possession of the ball 30 yards from the spot of the kickoff or at the out-of-bounds spot. The first onside kick will result in a five-yard penalty and re-kick must be made.
- —Incorporated the present Chop Block Policy in the Official Rule Book: During a forward pass or any play in which an offensive player indicates an apparent attempt to block, no offensive player may deliberately block (chop) a defensive player in the area of the thigh or lower while the defensive player is physically engaged by the blocking attempt of another offensive player.
- -Blocking with extended arms is legal anywhere on the field.
- —A passer who wants to stop the clock will be permitted to throw the ball away — out of bounds or to the ground — so long as he begins his throwing motion immediately after receiving the snap and throws the ball in the direction of the sideline.
- —A club may use three of its five free activations on players who went onto Reserve/Injured in the preseason, provided such reactivations do not occur until after the trading deadline of that same season.
- -Prohibits trades during a supplemental draft.
- —A chuck by a defensive player on an opponent beyond the five-yard zone is no longer a foul if the offensive team is in an obvious punting formation.
- —Beginning with the 1988 season, the scheduling pattern of non-divisional games within a conference by teams that finish one through four the previous season in their respective divisions will be per the following chart:

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE DETROIT LIONS

"The Third Time is a Charm" is the slogan as the Detroit Lions move into their 54th season in 1987, the third year under Coach Darryl Rogers and his staff. A frustrating 1986 season of 11 losses — seven defeats by seven points or less, five of those by four or less points — reaped an off-season of much disappointment but bred determination for better results in the future. A youthful Detroit squad will confront its difficult '87 schedule with the desire to return glory to a franchise that has had a long and successful association with the Detroit area and the National Football League.

Detroit welcomed the Lions in 1934, but it was not the area's first look at professional football.

In 1920, the Detroit Heralds were a charter member of the American Professional Football Association, which was the original name of the present NFL. But the club folded after two years. Then, the Detroit Panthers appeared in 1925. They also folded after two seasons. In 1928, the Detroit Wolverines were formed, but they failed after just one year.

In 1930, the then ten-year-old National Football League added a franchise from Portsmouth, Ohio, called the Spartans. After four seasons, the team was purchased for less than \$8,000 by Detroit radio executive George A. Richards and moved to the Motor City.

Playing in the University of Detroit Stadium before average crowds of 16,000 people, the new Detroit Lions won the NFL Championship in their second year, 1935. Under the leadership of Coach "Potsy" Clark and stars like Hall of Famer "Dutch" Clark, Ernie Caddel, George Christensen, "Ace" Gutowsky, Glenn Presnell and "Ox" Emerson, the early Lions established pro football in Detroit. For more than 50 years they have been an integral part of the Michigan sports scene.

In 1940, Chicagoan Fred Mandel bought the club. Lions' stars of that era were Hall of Famers Bill Dudley and Alex Wojciechowicz, John Greene, "Whizzer" White, Frank Sinkwich and "Camp" Wilson. The team was sold eight years later, to a group of local businessmen under the leadership of Edwin J. Anderson. The Detroit syndicate controlled the club until 1964 when William Clay Ford became sole owner for a price of \$4.5 million.

The Lions dominated the NFL in the 1950s with four division titles and three League championships. Under Head Coach Buddy Parker, the team won back-to-back world crowns in 1952 and 1953, defeating Cleveland in both title games. Stars of those glittering teams were Hall of Famers Bobby Layne and Jack Christiansen, along with Doak Walker, Les Bingaman, Cloyce Box, Leon Hart and Bob Hoernschemeyer. The Detroit-Cleveland battles of the era were classic confrontations between two giants of the blossoming NFL.

Since their last title in 1957 under the coaching of George Wilson, the Lions have been looking in vain for the top spot. Such recent performers as Joe Schmidt, Yale Lary and "Night Train" Lane have been elected to the Hall of Fame. Outstanding players like Wayne Walker, Mike Lucci, Nick Pietrosante, Roger Brown, Terry Barr, Lem Barney, Charlie Sanders and Dexter Bussey have taken their places in the annals of pro football in Detroit.


In 1967, Schmidt began the first of six seasons as head coach of the Lions. His 1970 team made the post-season playoffs, but lost in the first round to Dallas by the baseball—like score of 5-0.

Just prior to the 1975 season, the Lions moved into a new, domed stadium in Pontiac, Michigan, a town of 85,000 people located 30 miles north of Detroit. The Silverdome is the world's largest air-supported domed structure and seats over 80,000 spectators under a fiber glass roof.

Monte Clark took control of all football operations as head coach in 1978. Under Clark's direction, the Lions narrowly missed playoff berths in both 1980 and 1981, before finally qualifying in 1982—the first time the Lions made the playoffs since 1970. Detroit captured the NFC Central Division crown in 1983 but stumbled in the first round of the playoffs with a 24-23 loss to San Francisco. Clark was released after the Lions fell to 4-11-1 in 1984.

Rogers was named the Lions' 16th head coach in the franchise's history on Feb. 6, 1985. With two year's experience and three solid NFL drafts for Rogers and his staff in Detroit and the hope that 1986's near misses turn into '87 wins, the Lions seek to return to NFL prominence and an elusive Super Bowl berth.





THE PONTIAC SILVERDOME

The Pontiac Silverdome has been "Home Sweet Home" for the Detroit Lions since the last brick was put in place in 1975. During those 12 years the building has earned a reputation as one of the finest sports facilities in the world. Not even a freak, late-winter snowstorm on Mar. 4, 1985, which caused extensive structural damage to the roof, could keep the Silverdome from maintaining its enviable stature in the sports world. A new canvas and steel-girder reinforced roof was added between March and June of 1985.

Since a 27-24 pre-season game victory over the Kansas City Chiefs on Aug. 23, 1975, the Lions have played 116 games in the Silverdome after moving from their former home at Tiger Stadium (nee Briggs Stadium) in downtown Detroit. The Lions have posted a 65-49-2 overall record in Pontiac, including a 51-38-1 mark in regular-season games (a .616 winning percentage).

Though the Silverdome is the Lions' home, the Cincinnati Bengals and the San Francisco 49ers made NFL history in the building on Jan. 24, 1982. The 49ers defeated the Bengals, 26-21, before a crowd of 81,270 in Super Bowl XVI — the only Super Bowl ever played in a northern U.S. city.

The Silverdome, which also is the home of the NBA Detroit Pistons, was built at a cost of \$55.7 million. It was occupied in just 23 months, on time and within budget, from its ground breaking on Sept. 19, 1973. During the roof's reconstruction a year ago, the Teflon-coated fiber glass panels (100 in all) that span the roof were completely replaced, and several structural modifications and safety improvements also were accomplished. The roof was re-inflated by workmen on May 30, 1985.
