

MEDIA SERVICES DIRECTORY

SILVERDOME PRESS BOX

The working area for writers, broadcasters and overhead photographers is located on the Club Level between the south and west corners of the stadium. The facility can accommodate over 150 media representatives in the upper press area and contains 15 booths in the lower area for radio, television, photographers, public address and scoreboard operations.

CREDENTIALS

All applications must be made through **Bill Keenist**, the Lions' Director of Public Relations. Credentials are available to working members of the media only. Advance notification of requests is appreciated. Season credentials will be issued to appropriate outlets. *Since no Press Will Call window is available due to the need for a parking pass to gain press lot access, most credentials and parking passes are mailed.* Please allow AT LEAST three days for mail delivery. Credentials can be left at a local hotel for pickup on game day. That hotel is the Northfield Hilton, which is located eight miles south of the Silverdome off I-75 at the Crooks Road exit. The Northfield Hilton front desk is used as a credential pickup point when requests are made too late to guarantee mail delivery.

PARKING

A parking pass is required to enter the press parking area, located on the southwest side of the Silverdome. Enter Gate 1 from Opdyke Road and proceed to the press parking area adjacent to the Press Box. Press parking is not automatically issued to every credentialed member of the media covering the game because of an insufficient number of parking passes and spaces.

SERVICES

Statistical information is distributed before, during and after the game. Spotters and statisticians are available to radio and TV crews upon advance request. Food and beverages for the working media are available in the Press Lounge. Your game credential entitles you to the buffet meal that is served prior to the game. *The Lions' Public Relations staff is here to help. If you need assistance, don't hesitate to ask any of the PR persons shown below.*



WILLIAM CLAY FORD Owner and President

Detroit Lions' owner William Clay Ford's involvement with the Lions can be traced to his childhood, when his father, Edsel Ford, took him to the University of Detroit Stadium to see the first Lions' team play in their maiden season in the Motor City in 1934. Bill Ford to his friends and business associates, he became a club director in 1956 and was asked by then-Lions' President Edwin J. (Andy) Anderson to become Lions' President in 1961.

In November of 1963 Mr. Ford purchased the team outright for \$4.5 million. He officially took over the club Jan. 10, 1964, with Mr. Anderson as General Manager and J. Russell (Russ) Thomas as Director of Player Personnel. Mr. Thomas succeeded Mr. Anderson as Vice-President and General Manager prior to the 1967 season.

The 1989 season will mark Mr. Ford's 26th as sole owner of the Lions. During his ownership, Mr. Ford has provided the team with stability, integrity and honest leadership—characteristics that seem atypical in today's modern era of sports, where ownership changes and franchise movements have become annual occurrences.

The 25 seasons the Lions have played under Bill Ford's ownership have had their high moments. The 1969 through '75 teams all finished in second place in the NFC Central Division, with a high-water win-loss mark of 10-4 in '70. The '80 and '81 teams also finished in second place, and the 1983 club captured the NFC Central Division championship. A win in playoff competition has eluded Ford's Lions, however, and just ten seasons have been .500 or better.

But as the Lions enter the 1989 season under new Head Coach Wayne Fontes, Mr. Ford sees a positive future for his football team.

"I am very optimistic," says Mr. Ford. "I think Wayne has done a great job with the players and he has assembled an exceptional coaching staff. You don't win without quality coaches and I feel we have potentially the best staff in the NFL."

"It has been a long wait for all of us to see the Lions return as one of pro football's best teams, but I feel we are on the right path. There must continue to be the common goal throughout the organization that a winning football team is all that matters."

Of course, Mr. Ford's other passion in life is the automobile industry, he being a grandson of inventor and auto pioneer Henry Ford, founder of the Ford Motor Company.

Although he retired from his post as Ford Motor Company Vice-Chairman this past March, Mr. Ford remains a member of the Board of Directors and chairman of the Finance and Executive Committees. He has been a board member since 1948 and chairman of the company's Design Committee since its' inception in 1957.

During his career with the company, Mr. Ford gained special satisfaction as the executive in charge of the design, development and subsequent introduction of the Continental Mark II, the successor to the classic Lincoln Continental that had been developed and introduced by his father Edsel in 1939.

The youngest of Edsel's four children, William Clay Ford was born March 14, 1925. He graduated from Yale with a Bachelor of Science degree in economics following a tour of duty with the U.S. Naval Air Corps. He then joined Ford's sales and advertising



staff and later served on the industrial relations staff where he was a member of the committee that negotiated the historic 1949 contract with the UAW-CIO.

He enrolled at Yale following his military discharge and eventually captained both the tennis and soccer teams at the Ivy League School. He was a nationally-ranked tennis player until two Achilles tendon surgeries regulated him to the sidelines. Mr. Ford's athletic participation today includes some tennis, although he prefers golf, a game in which he became nearly a scratch performer.

A major change in Lions' history occurred under Mr. Ford's guidance when he moved the team in 1975 from the downtown-located Tiger Stadium to metropolitan Pontiac and the sparkling, 80,000-plus seat Pontiac Silverdome.

Mr. Ford also is the Chairman of the Board of the Edison Institute, which operates Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn; is a trustee of the Eisenhower Medical Center; and serves as a director or a trustee for the Boys' Club of America, the National Tennis Hall of Fame, the Automotive Hall of Fame, the United Way For Southeastern Michigan, and the Economic Club of Detroit.

Included among his more recent appointments have been his naming as a trustee for the Michigan Heart Association and to the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation. He received an honorary doctor of science degree from the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, Calif., in 1981.

He is married to the former Martha Firestone of Akron, Ohio, and they are the parents of three daughters—Martha, Sheila and Elizabeth—and a son, Bill Jr., who serves the Lions as club treasurer.

WILLIAM CLAY FORD JR. Treasurer

A young executive of the Ford Motor Company doubles as the treasurer of the Detroit Lions — William Clay Ford Jr. The 32-year-old Ford has recently returned to Detroit, after spending three years in Europe, to become the manager of Ford Heavy Truck Engineering and Manufacturing. Previously, he was elected to the Ford Motor Company's Board of Directors (Jan. 14, 1988).

Mr. Ford, son of Lions' Owner and President William Clay Ford, joined the company in 1979 as a product planning analyst in Advanced Vehicles Development. He later moved to automotive assembly operations and worked on the launch of the Escort and Lynx. Additionally, he was a zone manager for district sales in the New York-New Jersey area before he was appointed a member of Ford's bargaining team for negotiations with the UAW in 1982.

After a stint as a Ford Division advertising specialist, the Princeton University graduate entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where he earned a master's degree in management. Subsequent moves at Ford came in 1984 when he served as an international finance specialist and, in 1985, when he became a Car Product Development planning manager.

His tenure in Europe began in 1986 when Mr. Ford was appointed director of Commercial Vehicle Marketing for Ford of Europe and, in 1987, he moved his family to Zurich to become Chairman and managing director of Ford Switzerland. He assumed his new responsibilities with Heavy Truck Operations in July, 1989.

Mr. Ford and his wife Lisa have two daughters.



RUSS THOMAS

Executive Vice President and General Manager

One of the most respected and dedicated executives in the National Football League, the Lions' Russ Thomas enters his 43rd year of service with the Detroit Lions. Easily one of the most qualified general managers in the National Football League, Thomas literally has "done it all" for the Lions.

Russ has been a player, an assistant coach, a scout, the director of player personnel and he even served as a broadcaster for the Lions when he teamed with the legendary Van Patrick on the Lions' telecasts during the early 1960s. With that resume, it's easy to see why there's no one better prepared or more experienced than Russ to lead the Lions.



Russ Thomas first came to the Detroit Lions 43 years ago as a heralded player out of Ohio State University. His long affiliation with the Lions began with the 1946 NFL draft as the Buckeyes' two-way tackle was tabbed early in the selections that year by Detroit. He became an instant pro success by being named All-Pro his rookie season before advancing to the stature of team captain in 1949. His playing career, however, ended that season when a knee injury forced Russ into a premature retirement.

The injury eventually led to new challenges for Russ off the field. He left the Lions for two years, 1950-51, to work for Coach Joe Bach at St. Bonaventure University. Once football season ended each year, Thomas returned to Detroit to work in private business. It was during one of those off-seasons that Russ was contacted by Lions' Coach Buddy Parker to rejoin the club as an assistant coach. Russ did so in 1952 and he has remained with the Lions ever since.

While hired in '52 primarily as an assistant coach, Russ also joined the Lions as the club's primary college scout and also as the person in the organization responsible for scouting each week's pro opponent. Thus, long before the advent of film exchanges and computers, it was Thomas' scouting reports that helped bring Detroit NFL titles in 1952, '53 and '57.

For his efforts, Russ was promoted up the front office ladder, taking over as director of player personnel following William Clay Ford's outright purchase of the club in early 1964. In addition to utilizing Russ' talents at recognizing college talent and heading up the team's college draft each year, Russ also became the club's chief contract negotiator, a task he turned over in 1988 to the Lions' new vice-president for finance, Chuck Schmidt.

Thomas' rise to the top of Lions' management hit high gear in 1967 when he was named Vice President and General Manager, handling the day-to-day operations of

the organization. He was appointed Executive Vice President and General Manager in 1972. Among his many off-the-field contributions was playing a key role in the approval and construction of the Pontiac Silverdome. Russ led the effort to bring Super Bowl XVI (1982) to the Lions' home, the first and only time the NFL's championship game as been ventured to a northern climate.

"I've always found Russ to be courteous, resourceful and honest in all of his dealings, not only with his peers, but with everyone he comes in contact with," says George Young, the general manager of the Super Bowl XXI Champion New York Giants. "He's also been very willing to assist those who have sought his highly-regarded opinions and outstanding experience. He truly is a respected leader in our profession."

A native of Griffithsville, W. Va., Russ was such an outstanding schoolboy football prospect as a lineman that he was wooed (recruited, if you wish) to Charleston, W. Va., to play high school football. While in high school he also excelled as the state champion in the discus and the shot put, setting state records in both events. Considered the most sought-after schoolboy athlete in West Virginia, Thomas was honored for his athletic and professional accomplishments in 1983 when he was voted into the West Virginia State Hall of Fame.

He was recruited to Ohio State by legendary Paul Brown, and he played one season for Coach Brown before Paul moved on to the old All-American Football Conference and started the Cleveland Browns. Russ was All-Big Ten and All-America in football at OSU and was a key member of the Buckeyes' 1944 national championship team. As a collegian, he lettered three years in football, twice in track and once in wrestling.

Today, Russ and his wife Dorothy live in Birmingham, a suburb located north of Detroit. They are the parents of two grown sons, John and Jim, and they have one granddaughter.





WAYNE FONTES

Head Coach

It hasn't taken Wayne Fontes very long to put his mark on the 1989 Detroit Lions. Since being named the 17th head coach in team history last December 22, Fontes has created an aura of excitement and anticipation that hasn't been felt around these parts since the early 1980's when the Lions' Silver Rush defense was one of the NFL's best and Billy Sims was the league's premier running back.

There are a number of reasons for this excitement. In short order Fontes has:

—Hired a coaching staff that rivals the best in the NFL.

—Blown the lid of the heretofore conservative Lions' offense and replaced it with the revolutionary "SILVER STRETCH", an offense born of the "RUN SHOOT" which utilizes three and four wide receiver sets almost exclusively and promises to be the most wide open, if not the most exciting offense in pro football.

—Used his No.1 draft choice to select the 1988 Heisman Trophy winner, running back Barry Sanders, who last year authored the greatest single-season performance by a running back in the history of college football.

But while the coaching staff, a new offense and a Heisman Trophy-winning running back get most of the headlines, perhaps Fontes' single greatest contribution to date comes in the form of an intangible — attitude.

"It's all attitude," Fontes insists. "It might sound simple, but it's true. You must have the proper attitude before you can even think about winning. Everyone must have the absolute belief that we will win. Not just play well, or come close. But win!

"We are not going to settle for anything less than an absolute commitment from everyone — and that includes players, coaches, the front office staff, even the secretaries. Everything we do will be done with the belief that it will help the Detroit Lions become a winner. I won't settle for anything less.

"I have waited a long time for this chance," Fontes said. "This really is a dream come true for me. I've worked long and hard to get this opportunity and I want to make the best of it. I'm confident with the support of everyone in this organization we can get this thing turned around. We can get our fans back and make them proud of the Lions again. We can be winners and I am confident we will be winners."

Fontes was born Feb. 17, 1939 in New Bedford, Mass., and lived there until he was 15 when his moved to Canton, Ohio, where his father worked in a Canton steel mill. An exceptional schoolboy athlete at Canton's McKinley High School, he matriculated to Michigan State where he was a two-sport (football and baseball) star and earned All-Big 10 honors as defensive back.

He was selected to play in the North-South and Senior Bowl All-Star games in 1962 before being drafted by the New York Jets, where he started in the defensive backfield in 1963 and 64, but had his playing career cut short by a broken leg. Entering the 1989 season, Fontes still held the Jets' record for the longest interception return, an 83-yarder against Houston (12-15-63).

His first coaching job was directing the freshman team at Michigan State in 1965 while he was working on his master's degree in administration (which he later earned).



He coached at Visitation High School in Bay City, Mich., in 1966-67, winning the Michigan Class B state championship in '67 with a team that went 10-0. He then moved on to the college level and was defensive backfield coach at Dayton (1968), Iowa (1969-71) and Southern California (1972-75). It was at the latter stop Fontes began a 13-year association with John McKay, who brought Fontes with him when McKay was named the head coach of the expansion Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1976.

He spent nine years with the Bucs and advanced from secondary coach to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach under McKay. In his first year as the Bucs defensive coordinator (1982) Tampa Bay led the NFC in defense.

Fontes left the Bucs in 1985 to become the Lions defensive coordinator. Under Fontes the Lions switched to a new 3-4 defensive alignment and the defense has shown continued improvement throughout. Despite the Lions' 4-12 overall record last season, the defense played extremely well at times. Of the 28 defenses in the NFL, 18 yielded more points than the Lions' defense, including playoff teams Cincinnati, Houston, Seattle and Philadelphia.

Off the field Fontes has been extremely active in charitable causes during his first off-season as head coach. This past spring he was the Chairman of the Michigan Chapter of the American Cancer Society's Great America Lockup which raised nearly \$200,000 for the Cancer Society. Fontes also serves as Chairman of a program to raise \$1 million for the expansion of Camp Fowler, a Mayville, Mi., camp for disabled children.

In March, Fontes took his coaching staff to Detroit's Capuchin Soup Kitchen and served nearly 300 pizzas to the homeless and hungry of Detroit as part of a program sponsored by Buddy's Pizza (a metro Detroit pizza chain) which donated pizzas for every sack registered by the Lions' defense last year.

Fontes participated in numerous charity golf outings and was Chairman of the Detroit Lions Quarterback Club annual golf tournament which benefits the Boys and Girls Clubs of Pontiac.

Fontes, and his wife Evelyn (the two met at a high school sock hop in Canton) have three children—Mike, Scott and Kim, and reside in nearby Rochester Hills.

CHUCK SCHMIDT

Vice-President/Finance

One of the National Football League's rising young executives, Chuck Schmidt enters his second season as the club's Vice-President for Finance.

Schmidt oversees all contract signings and is charged with the crucial, yet often thankless task of signing the Lions' draft choices. Detroit was the only NFL team to sign all of its draft choices prior to training camp the past two seasons (1987 and '88).

Schmidt, 42, has been with the Lions since 1976 when he joined the club as a CPA. He soon thereafter was promoted to the team's controller.



A Detroit native, Schmidt was a standout athlete at Detroit's Lutheran East High School. He received numerous athletic scholarship offers before accepting a scholarship from the University of Michigan where he earned his undergraduate degree in business. While at Michigan, Schmidt was a three-year letterman at shortstop for the Wolverine baseball team.

He then earned a graduate degree in finance from Detroit's Wayne State University, before joining the accounting firm of Ernst and Whinney, where for five years he worked as a tax specialist.

For the last 11 years Schmidt has assisted Lions' General Manager and Executive Vice-President Russ Thomas in contract negotiations and with the day-to-day operations of the club. In 1987, with Schmidt spearheading the contract signing of the Lions' draft picks, the Lions were the only team in the NFL to have all its draft picks signed prior to the opening of training camp.

Schmidt also has been the Lions' liaison with the NFL regarding financial, pension and other league concerns, and along with Thomas, represents the Lions at League meetings. Schmidt, and his wife Sharon, have three children and reside in Rochester Hills, Mich.

JERRY VAINISI

Vice-President/Player Personnel

The newest member of the Lions' management team, Jerry Vainisi serves as the club's Vice-President for Player Personnel. He oversees all areas of player personnel, including the draft, trades, and other player acquisition matters.

The former general manager of the Chicago Bears, Vainisi joined the Lions in March of 1987 as the team's legal counsel. He was promoted after the 1987 season to his present position and was instrumental in Lions' widely-acclaimed 1988 and 1989 drafts.

Vainisi is a veteran NFL executive. He joined the Chicago Bears in 1972 as controller and In-House Counsel. In subsequent years, he also served as the Bears' treasurer, corporate assistant secretary and as a member of the Bears' Board of Directors.

In 1983 George Halas Sr. named Vainisi the Bears Vice-President and General Manager and three seasons later, Chicago ruled the football world when it won Super Bowl XX.

During his four years as Bears' G.M., the club compiled a regular-season record of 47-17, while capturing three consecutive NFC Central Division Championships. Chicago's playoff record during this period was 4-2. Vainisi left the Bears' organization after the 1986 season.

The Chicago native is a graduate of Georgetown University and Chicago's Kent College of Law. After completing his education, Vainisi worked briefly as a radio sports announcer in Monmouth, Ill., before joining the accounting firm of Arthur Anderson Company in 1966. Vainisi, who will turn 48 this October, and his wife Doris have five children and reside in Bloomfield Hills, Mich.

"WOODY" WIDENHOFER

Defensive Coordinator/Outside Linebackers
1st Year with Lions
12th Year in the NFL

One of Wayne Fontes' first priorities as head coach was to find the right man to replace him as defensive coordinator, a man who would continue to instill an aggressive style and have the patience and experience to mold a young, promising squad. Former Pittsburgh Steelers' defensive coordinator Robert "Woody" Widenhofer (Widden-hofer) was the man.

Widenhofer, 46 (Jan. 20, 1943), was most recently the head coach at the University of Missouri, where he served the last four seasons (1985-88). He compiled an 18-43-1 record over his tenure with the Tigers, and concluded the 1988 campaign with a 3-7-1 mark.

In his 24th year of coaching, the former Missouri graduate (1965) and Riverview, Mich., native began his coaching career on the high school level in the Detroit area as an assistant at Holy Redeemer High ('65) and the head coach at Nativity High (1966-68). After spending four years as an assistant on the collegiate levels in the early '70s (Michigan State, Eastern Michigan and Minnesota), Widenhofer began his professional career with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1973.

At Pittsburgh, he coached three All-Pro linebackers (Jack Ham, Andy Russell and Jack Lambert) during an 11-year stay, during which time the Steelers won four Super Bowl championships and were noted for their "Steel Curtain" defense. Widenhofer came to the Steelers' as linebackers coach in 1973. Defensive backs were added to his responsibility in 1978 before he was named defensive coordinator in 1979. He was the Steelers' assistant head coach for his final two seasons (1982-83) with the club. In 1984, he became the head coach of the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws, and after a 6-12-0 finish in his first season with the team, Widenhofer was appointed to the head coaching position at his alma mater.



BILLIE MATTHEWS

Defensive Backs
1st Year with Lions
11th Year in the NFL

Wayne Fontes completed his 1989 coaching staff when he hired NFL veteran Billie Matthews to coach the defensive backfield, a responsibility Fontes had handled himself as part of his increased duties last season.

Matthews, 59 (March 15, 1930), who previously served as running backs coach (1987-88) on the staff of present Lions' special teams coach Frank Gansz at Kansas City,

is in his 11th season of coaching in the NFL. Prior to joining the Chiefs, he spent two years as offensive coordinator and running backs coach for the Indianapolis Colts (1985-86).

Matthews first entered the NFL in '79 as running backs coach of the San Francisco 49ers, where he spent four seasons, including the team's first Super Bowl title in 1981. Matthews then joined the staff of the Philadelphia Eagles where he served two years (1983-84) as running backs coach.

He began his college coaching career at the University of Kansas in 1970 before moving on to an eight-year stint at UCLA (1971-78), where he coached the running backs and secondary. Matthews coached five 1,000-yard rushers while with the Bruins. A standout player himself, he quarterbacked Southern University (Baton Rouge, La.) to a 37-4 record during his playing career (1948-51).

A native of Houston, Tex., Matthews and his wife Gene have four children (Jackie, Kenneth, Kennette and Karen), and reside in Rochester Hills, Mich.



DICK MODZELEWSKI

Defensive Line

2nd Year with Lions

22nd Year in the NFL

One of the NFL's most highly respected defensive coaches, Dick Modzelewski was one of three coaches (with Don Clemons and Mike Murphy) asked to return with Coach Wayne Fontes for the 1989 season.

Modzelewski, 58, is in his 22nd season as an NFL assistant after spending four seasons as defensive coordinator of the Green Bay Packers (1984-87).

He began his pro coaching career with the Cleveland Browns (1968) before moving to the New York Giants (1978) and then to the Cincinnati Bengals (1979-83). While in Cincinnati, his defensive line helped lead the Bengals to Super Bowl XVI in the Pontiac Silverdome against the San Francisco 49ers in 1982, and the Bengals achieved a No. 1 ranking in the NFL defensively in 1983.

Modzelewski moved to Green Bay with Forrest Gregg in '84 as defensive coordinator, where he took over the NFL's worst — 28th ranked — defense. He led the Packers to a 16th-place ranking in '84, followed by 12th-place finishes in '85 and '86, and a 14th-place defensive finish last season.

The West Natrona, Pa., native had established an impressive background as a player before he became an NFL assistant. As a player, Modzelewski starred at the University of Maryland where he was named the Outland Trophy winner as the nation's premier college lineman in his senior season (1952). Originally a second-round NFL draft choice with Washington, his pro playing career spanned 14 seasons. He played for the Redskins (1953-54), Pittsburgh (1955), Giants ('56-63) and Cleveland (1964-66). He played on the 1956 Giants' and '64 Browns NFL championship teams and was named to the Pro Bowl in 1964.

Modzelewski and his wife Dorothy, have four children (Mark, Laurie, Terrie and Amie) and live in Rochester Hills.



HERB PATERRA

**Inside Linebackers
1st Year with Lions
9th Year in the NFL**

Though this season marks Herb Paterra's first with the Lions, the nine-year NFL coaching veteran is well familiar with Michigan and Head Coach Wayne Fontes. After spending the past two seasons ('87-'88) with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Paterra will coach the Lions' inside linebackers.

The association between Fontes and Paterra began at Michigan State, where both were collegiate teammates under former Spartan head coach Duffy Daugherty. Fontes played defensive back and Paterra was a two-way performer at MSU (offensive guard and linebacker).

Paterra began his professional career with the Buffalo Bills in 1963 (18th-round choice), and after two seasons in Buffalo (including one as AFL champions in '64), he joined the CFL Hamilton Tiger-Cats where he spent four years. Hamilton won two Grey Cup championships during his time there.

This year is Paterra's 21st season of coaching after he joined the Michigan State staff as an assistant in 1969 (linebackers and defensive line). He also coached linebackers at Wyoming (1972-74). His first professional stint came in '75 when he served as linebackers coach with the Charlotte Hornets of the World Football League.

Following two seasons (1976-77) as head coach at North Mecklinburgh High in Charlotte, N.C., Paterra returned to Hamilton (CFL) as defensive coordinator. His first stint in the NFL came as the defensive coordinator and special teams coach of the Los Angeles Rams (1980-82).

After a return to the CFL as the defensive coordinator at Edmonton ('83), Paterra was named linebackers coach at Green Bay where he spent the '84-'85 seasons. He became a member of Hank Bullough's staff at Buffalo in 1986, as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach before joining the Bucs to coach the inside linebackers in '87.

The 48-year-old (Nov. 8, 1940) Paterra was born in Glassport, Pa. He and his wife Lou Ann have two sons (Jeff, a quarterback at MSU, and Craig, a quarterback at Missouri), and reside in Rochester Hills, Mich.



FRANK GANSZ

**Special Teams
1st Year with Lions
12th Year in the NFL**

A veteran of the NFL wars, Frank Gansz brings outstanding credentials to Detroit. After two seasons as head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs (1987-88) where his teams went 8-21-1, Gansz was quickly tabbed by Wayne Fontes following the 1988 season to direct the Lions' special teams.

The 12th-year NFL coaching veteran is in his 26th year as a coach. He began his

coaching career at the Air Force Academy (1964-66), and had stints at Colgate (1968), the Naval Academy (1969-72), Oklahoma State (1973, '75), Army (1974) and UCLA (1976-77).

An outstanding special teams instructor, Gansz entered the NFL in '78 as special teams coach at San Francisco, and then added the title of tight ends coach to his credit during stops at Cincinnati ('79-80), Kansas City ('81-82) and Philadelphia ('83-85). Upon his return to Kansas City in 1986, Gansz was named assistant head coach and special teams coach. That season, the Chiefs' special teams blocked a NFL record 10 kicks and scored five touchdowns while sparking Kansas City to its first playoff berth in 15 years.

The 50-year-old (Nov. 22, 1938) Gansz was born in Altoona, Pa., and grew up in Pittsburgh. He is a 1960 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy where he played guard, center and linebacker in three seasons and was a member of the 1958 Cotton Bowl team. Gansz went through the Air Force's pilot training program and earned his wings in 1961, flying single-engine aircraft.

Gansz and his wife Barbara have two children (Frank and Jennifer), and live in Auburn Hills, Mich.

DARREL "MOUSE" DAVIS

Quarterbacks and Receivers

2nd Year with Lions

2nd Year in the NFL

A 29-year coaching veteran, Darrel "Mouse" Davis is in his first full season with the Lions and the National Football League after coming to Detroit as an offensive assistant for the final three weeks of the 1988 campaign. Davis serves as an architect of the "Silver Stretch" offense — a wide-open, run-and-shoot philosophy that long has been Davis' forte.

Davis began his coaching career in 1974 as the offensive coordinator at Portland State University where he became head coach one year later ('75). During his six years, his Vikings compiled a 42-24 record and rewrote the NCAA Division I-AA record book, setting 20 offensive records. In addition, 14 of his PSU players went on to play pro football including quarterbacks Neil Lomax (Cardinals) and June Jones (Falcons) who joins his mentor as a Lions' assistant coach.

Davis claimed his first pro coaching job in 1982 as offensive coordinator of the CFL Toronto Argonauts. With the free-wheeling "Run-N-Shoot" offense in full gear, the former doormat Argonauts went all the way to the Grey Cup championship game before they were beaten by Edmonton. Davis went on to become the offensive coordinator of the USFL Houston Gamblers (1984) where Jim Kelly triggered an offense that set 38 league records enroute to posting a 13-5 regular-season mark. Davis then became head coach of the Denver Gold (USFL) in 1985 and led the team to an 11-7 record. He became director of football operations for the Arena Football League ('87) before being named in Detroit last November.

A graduate of Western Oregon State University, Davis lettered in three sports (football, basketball and baseball) and earned All-America honors as a quarterback and running back. Born on Sept. 6, 1932, he and his wife Beverly have four children (Brad, Debbie, Brent and D'Ann) and live in Lake Orion, Mich.



JUNE JONES

Quarterbacks and Receivers

1st Year with Lions

3rd Year in the NFL

June Jones has been re-united with his former college coach, Mouse Davis, in giving the Lions double-duty coaching of the quarterbacks and receivers in the newly installed "Silver Stretch" offense. The 36-year-old Jones (Feb. 19, 1953) is in his first year in Detroit after he helped direct two highly successful seasons as quarterbacks coach of the Houston Oilers (1987-88).

Jones came to Houston in 1987, and success followed. The Oilers posted their first winning season (9-6) and (wild card) playoff berth in seven years. The 1988 Oilers upped their record to 10-6 and again earned a wild card bid. He is widely credited with the development of the Oilers' "Red Offense," an offensive formation which involves the use of four wide receivers. As a result of that system, Houston ended the '88 season ranked second in the NFL (behind Cincinnati) in scoring, averaging 26.5 points per game, and the ever-improving Warren Moon earned his first AFC-Pro Bowl berth.

A former two-sport (football and baseball) star at the University of Hawaii ('73-'74), Jones transferred to Portland State (1975-'76) where he was a two-time All-America under then-head coach Mouse Davis. After his four-year NFL playing career with Atlanta (1977-'79, '81) and a one-season stint with the CFL's Toronto Argonauts ended, Jones began his coaching career in '83 as the QB's coach at the University of Hawaii ('83).

One year later, he was named receivers coach with the Houston Gamblers ('84) of the USFL, where he continued his association with Davis, who was serving as offensive coordinator. When Davis gained the top spot with the Denver Gold (1985), he selected Jones as his offensive coordinator. After one season with the Gold, Jones followed Davis to Jacksonville in the same capacity, but the league suspended operations prior to the start of the '86 season.

A native of Portland, Oregon, Jones and his wife Diane have three daughters (Jennifer, Kelli and Nicole), and reside in Lake Orion, Mich.



DAVY LEVY

Running Backs

1st Year with Lions

10th Year in the NFL

Thirty-two years worth of coaching experience, including 10 in the NFL, are wrapped around the Lions' new running backs coach, Davy Levy. He joins the Detroit "Silver Stretch" offensive brain trust backed by a rich coaching background.

Having coached virtually every position at one time or another during his career, the 56-year-old (Oct. 25, 1932) Levy comes to Motown after nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers (1980-89). He served in many different capacities with the Chargers, most recently as coach of the tight ends and H-backs. He also was San Diego's offensive coordinator (1983-85, '87) and coached the offensive line (1980-82, '86). Levy coached

on two divisional championship teams ('80-'81), and the "Air Coryell" offense flourished when the Chargers led the NFL ('81-'83) by allowing only one sack for every 27 pass attempts.

A two-year performer at guard for UCLA, Levy began his coaching career with the Bruins' freshman team in '54, and as an assistant at Long Beach City College (1955). Following five seasons in the California high school ranks (1955-59), he coached for 16 years at the University of Southern California. During the 1972-75 seasons, Levy and Wayne Fontes were assistants under former Trojan field general John McKay. During Levy's Trojan tenure, USC appeared in eight Rose Bowls. Before entering the NFL ranks (at San Diego) he concluded his USC stint as an assistant athletic director (1976-79).

Born in Carrollton, Missouri, Levy grew up in Long Beach, Calif. He and his wife Barrie have four children (Laurie, Gayle, John and Robert), and reside in Southfield, Mich.



CHARLIE SANDERS

Tight Ends

1st Year with Lions

1st Year in the NFL

Recalling a former Lions' standout from the late '60s and early '70s, Detroit welcomed a good friend home when Wayne Fontes named Charlie Sanders the team's tight ends coach on Jan. 30, 1989. Sanders, who played 10 years with the Lions, makes his first transition into the coaching ranks.

Considered the finest tight end in Lions' history, Sanders is the club's all-time leading receiver with 336 receptions, second in yards gained with 4,817 (14.3-yard average), and fourth in touchdown catches with 31. The team's leading receiver during four of his 10 years, Sanders enjoyed his best year in '69, when he gained 656 yards on 42 receptions (he also caught 42 passes in 1974).

A durable performer who was forced to retire because of knee problems (July 21, 1978), Sanders missed only 12 games over his 10 seasons ('68-77) with the Lions. The seven-time Pro Bowler and two-time All-Pro member had his best single-game effort of his career during his rookie season when he grabbed 10 passes for 133 yards against Washington (Dec. 15, 1968). He was the only rookie selected that season to appear in the Pro Bowl game and, in addition, Sanders finished second to then-teammate Earl McCullouch for NFL Rookie-of-the-Year honors.

A two-sport (football and basketball) star at the University of Minnesota, Sanders concluded his senior season as the Gophers' leading receiver after hauling in 21 receptions for 276 yards and two TDs, in helping his team win a share of the 1967 Big Ten title.

Over the past six years, Sanders has remained close to the organization by serving as an analyst on the Lions/WJR radio broadcast team. The Greensboro, N.C., native prepped at Dudley High School. Born on Aug. 25, 1946, Sanders and his wife Georgianna have seven children (Mia, Charese, Mary Jo, Georgianna, Charlie Jr., Nathalie and Tallisa).



JERRY WAMPFLER

**Offensive Line
1st Year with Lions
17th Year in the NFL**

Wayne Fontes again went for a NFL-experienced coach when he rounded out his offensive staff early in 1989, by naming Jerry Wampfler to coach the offensive line. In his 17th NFL coaching season, Wampfler recently completed a one-year ('88) stint with the San Diego Chargers in a similar capacity.

A veteran of 36 years of coaching at the high school, college and pro levels, Wampfler had served on the staffs of five NFL clubs prior to his appointment in Detroit, beginning in Philadelphia ('73) where he coached the defensive line.

Three seasons after joining the Eagles, he was named defensive line coach at Buffalo (1976) and switched to the offensive line with the New York Giants in 1978. After rejoining the Eagles a year later, Wampfler was the running game coordinator and offensive line coach for five years (1979-83). Before his stint in San Diego, he spent four seasons ('84-'87) as offensive line coach of the Green Bay Packers.

The Miami of Ohio graduate began his coaching career on the high school level in 1954 at his alma mater, New Philadelphia (Ohio) High. During his collegiate coaching days, Wampfler coached under Bo Schembechler at his alma mater (Miami of Ohio) during 1963-65, and also coached at Notre Dame (1966-69). He was the head coach at Colorado State in 1970.

Born Aug. 6, 1932, in New Philadelphia, Ohio, Wampfler and his wife Carol have three children (Nan, Jody and Tad), and live in Lake Orion, Mich.

5th Year in the NFL**

In his fifth year with the Lions, Don Clemons tackles a new role as an administrative assistant. Clemons came to Detroit in 1985, and served the past four years as the Lions' Strength and Conditioning Coordinator.

Murphy helped mold inside linebackers Dennis Gibson and Chris Spielman into two of the finest young defensive stars in the League.

Murphy came to Detroit under Darryl Rogers in 1985 after a seven-year stint coaching defenses in the CFL and the USFL. Murphy had spent the previous two seasons (1983-84) as the defensive line coach of the USFL Chicago Blitz. Prior to that, he was for five seasons the defensive coordinator of the CFL Saskatchewan Roughriders.

He began his coaching career, which has spanned 21 years, at the high school level in the '60s in Boulder, Colo., then in Denver, and later in Woonsocket, S.D.

Entering his 24th year with the Lions, Kent Falb is one of the most respected trainers in the National Football League and throughout the field of athletic medicine. He was named the 1984 Professional Athletic Trainer of the Year," as selected by the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) and he currently serves as the president of MATS (Michigan Athletic Trainers Society), which constitutes all certified athletic trainers in Michigan.

In June of '87, he had the most prestigious honor of being the keynote speaker for the NATA convention in Columbus, Ohio. It marked the first time in NATA history that a professional trainer was selected to deliver the keynote speech.

Along with his assistant Joe Recknagel and strength and conditioning coach Skip Allen, Falb oversees all rehabilitation programs, off-season conditioning work, and of course, the treatment of players' injuries.

JOE BUSHOFSKY

Director of Player Personnel
16th Year with Lions

One of the NFL's most respected talent scouts, Joe Bushofsky enters his fourth season as the Lions' Director of Player Personnel. He was rewarded for his 11 years of dedicated service to the Lions in June of '85 when he was promoted to his present position.

Now in his 16th season with Detroit, Bushofsky joined the Lions in 1975 after working two years for BLESTO — a National Football League scouting combine service. He originally scouted the eastern United States' colleges for the Lions, then expanded his area to parts of the Midwest.

He was responsible for the scouting of approximately one-half of the colleges and universities in the country during his early years with the club.

The 50-year-old Bushofsky was born and raised on Pittsburgh's Northside, where he was a three-sport star in football, basketball and baseball at North Catholic Central High School. He played guard and center for North Catholic's 1956 football team which won the Pittsburgh Catholic championship.

He enrolled at North Carolina State, where at 5-10, 185-pounds, he was one of

the smallest starting guards in Atlantic Coast Conference history. He was All-ACC as a senior ('62) and was named to the state of North Carolina's college all-star football team in '61 and '62.

After obtaining his degree from N.C. State, Bushofsky returned to the Pittsburgh area, where he was a successful high school coach for 12 years. As head coach at his alma mater, North Catholic, he compiled three consecutive undefeated seasons (1968-70). In '70, he began working for the Pittsburgh Steelers on a part-time basis doing film evaluation and then joined BLESTO in 1973.

Bushofsky and his wife Rose have four children: Ted, Tracy, Tricia and Terry, and they reside in Troy, Mich.

Ron Hughes continues to assist Joe Bushofsky with various college scouting duties, but his primary responsibility is in the area of pro scouting. Other full-time scouting staff members include **John Trump**, **Dirk Dierking**, **Jim Owens** and **Scott McEwen**, along with part-time scout **Allen Hughes** and special assignments scout **Jerry Neri**.

Ron Hughes, a 1965 graduate of California State College of Pennsylvania, followed the same path to the Lions that Bushofsky took. He returned to his native Pittsburgh, became the head coach at North Catholic High School (for 12 seasons), then went to work for BLESTO for four years. A year ago, Hughes began his acceleration in the Lions' pro scouting program while also handling Detroit area college scouting along with various schools throughout Michigan, Ohio and Illinois. Also like Bushofsky, Ron and his wife Adrienne have three children and live in the Detroit metropolitan area (Lathrup Village), near Southfield.

Trump spent seven years with the Chargers as that club's scouting department administrative assistant before coming to the Lions in '85. Prior to his job with San Diego, he had a 25-year association with the Rams that began in 1953 after three years as a high school football and baseball coach in the Los Angeles City School

system. Trump serves the Lions as area scout in California and at western U.S. colleges. John and Jean Trump live in Van Nuys, Calif. They have two sons, one of whom, Frank is a scout for the Rams.

Dierking, whose first name is Clarence, came to the Lions in June of '78 to scout the central and southwest colleges, including all colleges in Texas. A native Texan from Brenham, his background includes several years as an area scout for BLESTO. Dierking has two sons and lives in Plano, Tex., a suburb of Dallas.

Owens enters his fourth season with the Lions. Prior to his time with Detroit, he scouted colleges in the southeast. Like Dierking, a native Texan (Garland, Tex.) Owens also worked for BLESTO before coming to Detroit. Prior to six years with that scouting combine service, Owens was a high school and college coach at various stops throughout Texas for 21 years. This fall he will cover the eastern U.S. colleges. Owens and his wife Charlotte live in Athens, Tex., with their three children.

McEwen begins his third season with the Lions, and the East McKeesport, Pa., native will handle scouting along the southeast portion of the U.S. A 1980 graduate of West Liberty State (W. Va.), McEwen spent two seasons with BLESTO before joining the Lions. After a four-year career at West Liberty State, he became a defensive line coach at his alma mater (1980-81), and later coached four years at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. He and his wife Colleen have two children.

Neri handles special assignments from his home base in Los Angeles, where he and his wife Theresa live. Neri, a Villanova grad who has coached in college and pro football (Redskins), has been with the Lions since July of 1969.

Allen Hughes is the most recent ('88) addition to the Lions' scouting staff, and he will scout colleges in the Michigan area. The Detroit native (Benedictine H.S.) played three seasons in the USFL — two for the Michigan Panthers ('83 and '84) and a third with the Portland Breakers ('85) — and he was also a 12th-round draft pick by the Steelers in '82. Hughes signed with the Lions in '86 as a free agent, but a broken ankle suffered in the final ('86) preseason game ended his career. He was a four-year starter (at defensive end) and two-time Western Michigan defensive Player of the Year. Hughes and his wife Maureen have two boys.

TEAM PHYSICIANS



Dr. Keith Burch

Two top physicians from Henry Ford Hospital serve the Detroit Lions as team doctors, **Dr. Keith Burch** as club internist and **Dr. David Collon** as orthopedic surgeon. Dr. Burch has been a full-time member of the Lions' staff since 1980, while Dr. Collon came aboard in 1985. They are contemporaries — Dr. Burch is 47 (12-10-41) and Dr. Collon is 49 (2-17-40) — both served their internships at Henry Ford and both returned to Ford Hospital in 1972, although both serve the hospital staff in different roles today than the ones they performed in '72.

Today, Dr. Burch is the Medical Director at the Henry Ford West Bloomfield Hospital, a post he was appointed to in July of 1985. He went to the West Bloomfield Center in 1979 as the division head for internal medicine. His internship at Henry Ford in Detroit came in 1967-68 following his graduation from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine. Dr. Burch's undergraduate studies were taken at the Ohio-located University of Akron. He is a graduate of Akron St. Vincent High School, now Akron St. Vincent-St. Mary's.

Dr. Burch served his residencies at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit from 1968-69 and at the Ohio State University Hospital from 1971-72. He also served at the U.S. Army Hospital in Ft. Gordon, Ga., in 1969-70 and in Vietnam for one year ('70-71). His certifications include a diplomate member of the American Board of Internal Medicine and a subspecialty boards membership for infectious diseases. He also is a clinical associate professor of medicine at the University of Michigan and holds memberships in the American Federation for Clinical Research, the Michigan Heart Association, the Wayne County Medical Society, the American Medical Association, the Infectious Diseases Society of America, the American Academy of Medical Directors and the National Football League Physicians' Society.

Dr. Burch and his wife Kathryn (Kitty) live in Birmingham and have two daughters, Kathy and Michelle. An avid golfer, he played that sport while an undergrad at the University of Akron. He began working with the Lions initially as a consultant in 1976.



Dr. David Collon

Dr. Collon today is director of the orthopaedic surgery staff for the Center for Athletic Medicine at the Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. He also serves as vice-chairman for the orthopaedic department. He came back to Ford Hospital from five and one-half years in private practice in Mt. Clemens and Bloomfield Hills (both Detroit suburbs). He had been with the orthopaedic surgery staff at Henry Ford for three years in the mid-70s, and prior to that, served for six months with Wrightington Hospital in Wigan, England, where he specialized in the hospital's hip center. He also worked further in Europe at Lorenz Bohler Krankenhaus, a hospital in Vienna, Austria.

Dr. Collon, who completed his general surgery resident requirements at Beaumont Hospital in Detroit in 1969 and

his orthopaedic surgery residency at Ford Hospital from '72 to mid-'75, was the team physician for the Michigan Panthers of the USFL in 1983-84, and serves the Detroit Tigers baseball team as an orthopedic consultant, an assignment he first undertook in '84. He served the Detroit Red Wings in the same capacity during their 1988-89 season.

He served with the U.S. Navy as a Lieutenant Commander and as General Medical Officer at Camp Pendleton, Calif., from 1970-72. Dr. Collon is a graduate of the University of Michigan (1963) and the Wayne State University School of Medicine (1968).

A Detroit native, he graduated from Cranbrook High School in 1959. 

Last season was anything but pleasant for Chuck Long, who went into the year with high expectations and goals, but instead suffered through injuries and rustiness...After spending the entire off-season working out at the Silverdome, Long's progress came to a grinding halt during the third week of training camp, when a sore elbow caused him to miss the entire preseason schedule...He returned to action in the season-opener against Atlanta, as the Lions cruised to a 31-19 win...Long was 13-of-19 in that game for 107 yards and two TDs...The injury bug returned the following week in Los Angeles, when Long (12-of-29, 143 yards and one TD) suffered a slight concussion against the Rams and was replaced by Eric Hipple...He responded with his best outing of the year in Week 3 action against New Orleans, throwing for 274 yards on 20-of-33 and two scores...Three weeks later, Long suffered strained knee ligaments in the second quarter vs. Chicago and the injury caused him to miss five weeks of action...He was activated off the injured reserve list on Nov. 18, but only appeared in one of the remaining five games (vs. Minnesota, 11-24)...For the season, Long threw for 856 yards on 75-of-141 attempts and six TDs.

CAREER: Games - Played 22, Started 21.

Long has completed close to 55 percent of his passes (54.9%) on 328-of-597 attempts for 3,701 yards and 19 TDs...He also has 28 interceptions. **1987:** Concluded the season among the team's top five in several season statistical categories: 416 attempts (second-highest), 232 completions (third-best), 2,598 passing yards (fifth-most) and 20 pass interceptions (tied for fourth)...He also threw 11 TDs...Long had one of the finest passing games in Lions' history against Green Bay (10-25) — 33 completions (which tied Hipple's 1986 record) on 47 attempts (fourth-highest) for a 70.2% average and 362 yards (third-best single-game total), in addition to three TDs...In the second half, Long's scoring strikes led Detroit from a 31-7 deficit to a 33-31 lead late in the game,

but the Packers pulled out the victory with a field goal with one minute remaining. **1986:** Entered the NFL record books with his first regular season pass...It happened at Tampa Bay (11-23) when Long threw a 37-yard TD pass to Leonard Thompson...Saw very limited action as a rookie (three games) after reporting late due to contract negotiations...He became the first QB selected in the first round by the Lions since Greg Landry in '68.

COLLEGE and PERSONAL: One of Iowa's finest players, Long led the Hawkeyes to three bowl appearances as a starter...In addition to being a consensus All-America ('85) as a senior and a two-time All-Big Ten pick, Long was the Heisman Trophy runnerup to Bo Jackson in 1985...He also received the 1985 Maxwell Trophy, which goes to the College Football Player of the Year as selected by the Maxwell Football Club of Philadelphia, and the '85 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, sponsored by the Fort Worth (Tex.) Club...Long concluded his career as the Hawkeyes' and Big Ten Conference's all-time passing leader (782-of-1,203 for 10,461 yards and 74 TDs)...He threw for at least 200 yards in 27 college games, and his 22 consecutive completions in an '84 game at Indiana set an NCAA mark...Long was a seven-letter winner in football, basketball and baseball at North High School in his hometown of Wheaton, Ill....He and his wife Lisa have one daughter, Lindsay Ruth...His full name is Charles Franklin Long, Jr.

NOTABLES: With his first punt return of '89, Pete Mandley will become the all-time leader in that category for Detroit (ended last season with 143, the same as Lem Barney)...He also established a new team mark in career punt return yardage with 1,360 yards...Mandley needs 20 receptions to reach the 150th of his career.

1988: Games - Played 15, Started 14.

In addition to his record-breaking year in punt return yardage, he also led the Lions in receiving for the second straight season with 44 catches for 617 yards (13.8 avg.) and four touchdowns...Mandley's best outing came at San Francisco (10-2), when he recorded a team season-high 116 yards against San Francisco (10-2) on seven receptions and one TD...One week later, he caught a 56-yard pass from Rusty Hilger against Chicago — his longest ever...A lot of contributing factors caused him to cool off after 26 catches over the first six games (quarterback injuries and an ankle injury to himself), but Mandley ended the year in top form, pulling down 11 passes in the remaining three contests (169 yards)...His 7.8 punt return average (37 for 287 yards) was the 10th-highest mark among NFC players...Mandley also gained 44 yards on six rushing attempts (7.3 avg.) in '88, and scored one TD — a 21-yard reverse against Green Bay (12-4).

Mandley has averaged 13.8 yards per catch over the last five years (130 for 1,797 yards) and 9½ yards in punt returns (37 for 1,360). **1987:** Named a Pro Bowl alternate following his career-high 58 catches (720 yards, 12.4 avg.), which also was the fifth-highest among NFC leaders, Mandley was selected by team-mates as the team's offensive MVP...Had a career-high eight receptions against Dallas (11-8). **1986:** In limited duty at wide receiver, Mandley recorded seven catches for 106 yards, but his 43 punt returns for 420 yards were the Lions' second and third-best single-season totals. **1985:** He accounted for 871 all-purpose yards and scored his first pro TD on a 63-yard punt return against the 49ers (10-20)...Mandley had 18 catches for 316 yards (17.6 avg.) that year. **1984:** A second-round pick from Northern Arizona, Mandley's rookie season suffered a setback after a preseason toe injury...Despite making only three receptions, he did lead the squad in kickoff returns (22 returns, 17.7 avg.).

COLLEGE and PERSONAL: An All-America pick as a junior (Associated Press and *The Sporting News*), Mandley concluded his career as the NCAA Division 1-AA's career all-purpose yardage leader (5,922 yds.)...He set five Big Sky Conference records and 13 school marks...He also ran track as a senior at NAU...Mandley prepped at Westwood High School (also the school of Dallas' Danny White) in Mesa, Ariz., where he was All-State in track and football...He and his wife Teresa have two children, Dejhown and Treasure...“Pete” is not his given name, it resulted from his father nicknaming him “PeeWee” as a child and it evolved into “Pete”...His full name is William H. The Lions' second fifth-round pick of the '83 draft, Mott's entrance into the starting lineup (Week 5) coincided with the team's drive to the 1983 Central Division title....After a 1-4 start, Detroit won eight of the last 12 games with Mott at center....He was one of three rookies (along with James Jones and Michael Cofer) to start the '83 play-off game against San Francisco....He missed the final 10 games of the 1984 season after a fracture/dislocated ankle forced him to the sidelines....In 1985, despite a broken ring finger on his snapping hand, Mott started all 16 games....Enjoyed a steady year in 1987, highlighted by strong line play in back-to-back contests against Dallas and Washington, when the offensive line allowed only one sack....Games Played/Started in Yearly Totals: **1987 (11/11), 1986 (14/14), 1985 (16/16), 1984 (6/6), 1983 (13/12).**

COLLEGE and PERSONAL: A captain of Paul "Bear" Bryant's last Alabama squad (1982), Mott lettered three seasons for the Crimson Tide and he was a member of the school's 1979 national championship team....In his final season, he was a first-team All-SEC player and honorable mention All-America....He and his wife Julie, a former 'Bama cheerleader, are very active in community and charity projects in both Detroit and their off-season home of Birmingham, Ala....For the fourth straight year, they were instrumental in providing clothes for the needy on Thanksgiving Day with their annual "Lions' Merry Christmas" program....In '86, their program was the subject of Detroit's NFL/United Way segment....He was also the 1985 recipient of the Ed Block Memorial Courage Award, which recognizes men of courage in the NFL and is presented by the East Side Athletic Club of Baltimore to one player on each of the 28 teams....His full name is Walter Stephen Mott, III.



Instant Replay Approved for 1989

For the fourth consecutive season, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system stays the same as in 1988. The Replay Official will be assigned a regular officiating crew and will attend crew meetings the day before each game.

The following table outlines the number of reversals and plays closely reviewed by Instant Replay in each of the previous three seasons.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. In 1987, the vote was 21-7. In 1988, replay was cleared by a 23-5 margin. In 1989, the vote was 24-4.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks — an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the games, and a "no-frills" approach using existing TV coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of the nine nationally-televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system which later was adopted for 1986, 1987, and 1988. A total of 28 plays (17 confirmed call, 4 inconclusive, 1 reversed, and 6 no replay shown) were closely examined in the 1985 experiment.

Q — What is the objective of this system?

A — The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has indisputable visual evidence available to him that warrants the change.

Q — Who will be involved?

A — The Replay Official (a former NFL or collegiate official) will be positioned in a sideline Replay Booth, which will house two TV monitors and two high-speed VCRs plus radio communications to the on-field officials. The Replay Official makes the decision although a Communicator (normally a member of the League Office staff) and a Technician also will be there to lend logistical help.

Q — Why is the system referred to as "limited" Instant Replay?

A — This system will concentrate on plays of possession or touching (e.g. fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g. receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line). It also will be

used to determine whether there are more than 11 men on the field.

Q — Why aren't most fouls included in this system?

A — It is recognized that in most circumstances the on-field officials have the best vantage points involving fouls. It is for this reason that Instant Replay will not review a list of the following 26 fouls:

1. Clipping
2. Encroachment or offsides
3. Grasp of facemask
4. False start
5. Defensive pass interference
6. Offensive pass interference
7. Offensive holding and illegal use of hands
8. Illegal batting or punching ball
9. Illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick
10. Illegal crackback
11. Illegal motion
12. Illegal use of forearm or elbow
13. Illegal use of hands by defense
14. Illegally kicking ball
15. Illegally snapping ball
16. Intentional grounding
17. Member of punting team downfield early
18. Illegal formation
19. Palpably unfair act
20. Piling on
21. Roughing the passer
22. Running into/roughing kicker
23. Striking, kicking, or kneeing
24. Unnecessary roughness
25. Unsportsmanlike conduct
26. Use of helmet as a weapon

Q — Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

A — No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to which plays to show or not to show.

Q — What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?

A — The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other one continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.





WIDE RECEIVERS and TIGHT ENDS: **James Dixon** (5-8, 181, WR, Houston) teamed with Lions' tenth-round pick Jason Phillips to shatter career receiving records at Houston. The tandem became the first in NCAA history to catch over 100 passes during the same season. Dixon had 102 receptions for 1,103 yards and 11 TDs last year ('88), enroute to earning second-team All-America honors. He played his high school ball at Vernon (Tex.) High...**Kelley Johnson** (5-8, 168, WR, Colorado) spent one season with the USFL's Denver Gold ('85) before joining the CFL's Ottawa Rough Riders the following season. He also participated in the NFL with the '87 Indianapolis strike team, hauling in one reception for 15 yards in three games of action. Johnson, who attended Carlsbad (N.M.) High, transferred to Colorado from Los Angeles Valley College...**Richard Johnson** (5-6, 185, WR, Colorado) was a member of the USFL's Denver Gold (1983) and Houston Gamblers (1984-85) before he was signed as a free agent replacement player by Washington in '87. He was a running back with the Gamblers before making the shift to wide receiver, where he caught 115 passes for 1,455 yards and 15 TDs in 1984, and 103 passes for 1,384 yards and 14 TDs in '85. He played in one game with the Redskins in 1987, catching one pass for five yards. Johnson transferred to Colorado from Los Angeles Harbor JC, and played his high school ball at San Pedro (Calif.) High...**Keith McDonald** (5-7, 159, WR, San Jose State) has had tryouts with two NFL clubs (Dallas training camp, '85; and Los Angeles Rams training camp, '86) before becoming a member of Houston's strike team in 1987. He rejoined the Oilers for training camp in 1988, but was released....**Stacey Mobley** (5-7, 165, WR, Jackson State) was a free agent signee of the Los Angeles Rams in 1987, and he played on their '87 strike team before he was released. SPECIALISTS: **Ali Haji-Sheikh** (6-0, 172, K, Michigan) has spent six seasons in the NFL, his most recent with the Washington Redskins (who released him prior to the start of the '88 regular season). Haji-Sheikh has scored 323 career points on 76-of-121 (.628) FGs and 95-of-103 PATs (.922). A ninth-round pick by the New York Giants in 1983, he spent three seasons with the Giants (1983-85), and one with Atlanta (1986) before joining the Redskins...**Rick Sutkiewick** (6-2, 229, K, Michigan) is a local product (Detroit's Country Day High) who shared kickoffs with former Wolverine kicker Mike Gillette over his career. DEFENSIVE LINEMEN: **Mark Murphy** (6-5, 263, DT, Boston College) totalled 55 tackles and recovered one fumble as a senior for the Eagles. He was an All-State defensive end and offensive tackle and team MVP at Bishop Egan High School.

LINEBACKERS: **Mike McCray** (6-1, 237, LB, Ohio State) was an All-America honorable mention pick as a senior ('88) by the Football News after recording 40 tackles and one interception last season. He was a three-sport star in high school (football, basketball and track) at Roth High (first two years) and Dun-bar High (final two seasons) in Dayton, Ohio.

DEFENSIVE BACKS: **Bruce Alexander** (5-9, 170, CB, Stephen F. Austin) led the Southland Conference with six interceptions last year at Stephen F. Austin, enroute to earning 1988 Walter Camp Division I-AA All-America honors...**Willie Bryant** (6-0, 197, DB, Louisiana State) was signed as a free agent in 1988 by the Lions, but was released prior to the start of the regular season. Bryant, who prepped at Choctawatchee High in Ft. Walton Beach, Fla., registered 87 tackles and three interceptions over his four years at LSU...**John Lewis** (5-9, 180, DB, Sul Ross State University) gained 1,529 yards on 356 carries as a running back over his career at Sul Ross State. He also grabbed 30 receptions for 284 yards and four TDs, and returned 25 kickoffs for 826 yards and two TDs. Lewis hails from Cold Springs, Tex....**John Miller** (6-1, 192, S, Michigan State) accumulated 179 career tackles for the Spartans and 14 interceptions, and earned All-Big Ten first-team honors his senior season (1988). He was a nominee for the Jim Thorpe Award, given to the nation's premier defensive back. BARRY SANDERS

After his first two seasons were spent as a backup to former Cowboy RB Thurman Thomas (now with Buffalo), Barry Sanders electrified the nation as a junior last season enroute to claiming college football's most prestigious honor — the Heisman Trophy.

A tough and elusive runner (4.40 time in the 40-yard dash, and has been clocked at 4.27) with the knack of always finding the open holes, Sanders, a consensus first-team All-America in '88, was also named Player-of-the-Year by several publications after setting 13 NCAA season records (among the records set by Sanders last year include: touchdowns (39), points scored (234), rushing TDs (37), two-plus TD games (11), three-TD games (7), 300-plus rushing games (4), all-purpose yards (3,249), all-purpose average (295.4), rushing yards (2,628), and rushing average (238.9)). In addition to five consecutive games of 200-plus rushing yards (which ties former USC star Marcus Allen's NCAA record) last year, he caught 19 passes for 106 yards, and returned ten punts for 94 yards and added 421 yards on 21 kickoff returns.

In just three seasons, Sanders broke the school's career record for TDs with 56 and concluded his career as the Cowboys' third all-time leading rusher with 3,797 yards (including bowl games), as well as returning two kickoffs for TDs (both for 100 yards). His finest game came in his final regular season contest of '88 in Tokyo, Japan (Coca-Cola Classic), when he rushed for 332 yards on 44 carries and four touchdowns.

His record-setting performances continued in Oklahoma State's Holiday Bowl appearance against Wyoming, in a 222-yard, five-TD effort, as the Cowboys rolled to a 62-14 victory.

In becoming the seventh Heisman Trophy recipient to join the Lions, Sanders joins former award winners RB Frank Sinkwich (Georgia, '41), RB Doak Walker (SMU, '48), DE Leon Hart (Notre Dame, '49), RB Howard Cassady (Ohio State, '55), RB Steve Owens (Oklahoma, '69), and RB Billy Sims (Oklahoma, '78) in wearing the Honolulu Blue and Silver.

A physical education major, Sanders (born 7-16-68) prepped at North High School in Wichita, Kan., lettered two seasons in football and basketball, and served as co-captain in both sports. His older brother Byron, who starred at Northwestern University, was selected by Chicago in the ninth round of the '89 draft.

Comments from Lions' Head Coach WAYNE FONTES: "I look for him to make a tremendous impact. I recall many years ago when Detroit drafted Billy Sims and the impact he had on this team and the city. I hope Barry Sanders will make the same kind of impact on the Lions and the state of Michigan. You'll find out he's a class and quiet young man. He'll play in this league 10 years, hopefully. He is very quick, has great power and great elusiveness."

The Lions emphasized the need for speed with their first two picks of the '89 draft, and following the selection of Barry Sanders as their top pick, the club made wide receiver John Ford from Virginia the second round choice.

Ford, who has the ability to turn a routine pass into a long gainer with his 4.41 speed in the 40-yard dash, ended his career with the Cavaliers as the team's all-time leader in receptions (128), receiving yards (2,399) and touchdown catches (20).

Last year, he earned honorable mention All-America honors from the Associated Press and The Sporting News after leading Virginia in receptions with 29 catches for 444 yards (15.3 avg.) and two TDs. He also carried the ball seven times for 48 yards, and returned five kickoffs for 123 yards (24.6 avg.).

A first-team All-ACC selection as a junior, Ford hauled in 48 passes for 855 yards (17.8 avg.) and six TDs, as well as rushing six times for 58 yards. His best season came as a freshman ('84), when he averaged 28.7 yards and scored seven TDs on 19 receptions.

Ford (born 7-31-66), who majored in sociology, played his high school ball at Glade Central High in Belle Glade, Fla., where he earned all-county, all-conference and all-state honors. He also lettered three years in track, establishing a school record in the 880-yard run (1:57).

Comments from Lions' Head Coach WAYNE FONTES: "We needed a speed receiver and we're very fortunate to get John Ford. This team lacks speed and we've got two people (Sanders and Ford) who can stretch it. He (Ford) reminds me of Willie Gault, and we originally had him projected as a first-rounder." continued

A big, versatile lineman with great agility, offensive lineman Mike Utley is made for the Lions' new "stretch" offense, according to Lions' scout John Trump. Utley, who has seen action at both guard and tackle, is projected as a guard by the Lions.

"We're looking at a new type offense and linemen don't have to be as mobile," said Trump. "We're looking for big bodies with long arms who are able to control an area, which Utley can do."

A consensus first-team All-America and All-Pac 10 selection in '88, Utley started the last 42 games for the Cougars, and he was the recipient of the Golden Helmet Award, given to Washington State's most valuable player. The Cougars averaged 494.5 yards in total offense last season, ranking 11th in the nation with an average of 257.8 passing yards.

Utley (born 12-20-65) was a first-team All-League defensive tackle and second-team offensive tackle his senior year at Kennedy High School in Seattle, Wash., and he served as team captain in both football and basketball. The general studies major runs a 5.42 in the 40-yard dash.

Comments from Lions' Head Coach WAYNE FONTES: "The two things we were looking for from the draft was speed and big people, and Utley is big. He'll block out the sun offensively. We didn't think he would still be there. He was high on our board and we couldn't afford to pass him up."

A big-time player who continues the tradition of fine secondary players from Baylor University, Ray Crockett follows former Bears' Thomas Everett (Pittsburgh) and Ron Francis (Dallas) to the pro ranks. His selection marks the fourth consecutive year Detroit has selected a defensive back in the fourth round.

Crockett started ten games at left cornerback last season (1988), recording a career-high 71 tackles and three tackles for losses (-11 yards), with a season-high nine stops against Houston. He also grabbed one interception, a 16-yarder in the season-finale versus Texas.

Over his career, he accumulated 169 tackles (120 solos), two interceptions and seven tackles for losses. In addition, Crockett also returned five punts as a junior ('87) for 30 yards.

A first-team All-SWC in '87, he made 62 tackles on the year and broke up 13 passes.

Crockett (born 1-5-67) was a first-team All-District choice at Duncanville (Tex.) High who was named to the Dallas Morning News' All-Academic team (an A student in high school). He was also a three-year letterman in track at Duncanville (he runs a 4.55 in the 40-yard dash).

A consensus first-team All-Big Eight member, Pete finished fourth on the squad in tackles with a career-high 55 (33 solos), and recorded seven sacks and seven tackles for losses. He enjoyed his finest individual effort at Nebraska last year against Missouri, after registering 10 tackles, two sacks and causing one interception.

An aggressive player with a quick first step to the quarterback, Pete had 126 total tackles and 10 sacks during his career with the Cornhuskers.

He was a standout defensive lineman at Wichita South (Kan.) High, and in addition, Pete (born 1-18-66) won the Kansas Class 6A shot put title (57-0) as a senior. Pete, who runs the forty in 5.1, majored in business at Nebraska.

A tremendous leader of USC's pro-set offense, quarterback Rodney Peete could well be the Lions' steal of the 1989 draft. The Heisman Trophy runner-up to first-round pick Barry Sanders, Peete is a strong, mobile passer and elusive scrambler.

The first-team All-America and All-Pac 10 selection threw for 2,654 yards on 208-of-338 passing (61.5%) and 18 touchdowns, enroute to leading the Trojans to a 10-

2 finish in '88. Peete also was named Pac-10 Offensive Player-of-the-Year, and earned Player of the Week honors on three occasions. His best outing last year came in a 50-0 romp over Arizona State, when he completed 23-of-33 passes for 361 yards and three TDs.

"He probably moves better (runs the forty in 4.63) than anyone in the draft at that position," said Lions' Head Coach Wayne Fontes. "Rodney's a class young man who comes from a class family. He has all the tools to be a quarterback. Sometimes when a young man comes from that background, he just becomes a winner."

His college coach, USC's Larry Smith, echoed Fontes' comments. "Rodney has everything you look for in a quarterback. He has a great arm, great mobility, a great mind and great leadership. He's got to be one of the best quarterbacks in the country. He's the first player I've ever coached who has the ability to meet all of the high goals he sets for himself. A big part of our success goes to the type of player he is."

Peete, a communications major who graduated in May, concluded his career as the Trojans' all-time leader in pass attempts (1,081) and completions (630), and passing yardage (8,225).

He also was an All-Pac-10 third baseman for the USC baseball squad in '88 after hitting .338 with 12 home runs and 46 RBIs. Despite sitting out the 1989 season, Peete was a preseason All-American pick by several publications. In three years of baseball, he batted .297 with 18 HRs and 84 RBIs.

Peete spent one season at Shawnee Mission (Kan.) High, where he earned All-America honors at quarterback, following three years at Sahuaro High in Tucson, Ariz., where he was named the Arizona High School Athlete of the Year as a junior. A three-sport athlete in high school, Peete was also chosen by the Toronto Blue Jays organization after graduation (31st round).

Peete (born 3-16-66), whose family is very active in sports, is the son of Green Bay assistant coach Willie Peete. His brother Skip signed with the New York Jets as a free agent wide receiver in '87, and his second cousin is pro golfer Calvin Peete.

The nation's top receiver over the past two seasons, Jason Phillips combined with teammate James Dixon to become the only pair of receivers in NCAA history to catch over 100 passes for the same team in a season. His familiarity with the "Run-N-Shoot" offense, which the Lions' plan to use as the "Silver Stretch," caught the eyes of Detroit scouts, and they chose Phillips in the 10th round of the draft.

With 108 receptions for 1,444 yards and 15 TDs last year (1988), Phillips broke school records that he set a year earlier as a junior (99 catches for 875 yards). As a result, he earned consensus first-team All-America and All-SWC honors, after becoming the first receiver — and fourth in NCAA history — in 23 years to lead the nation in receiving two straight years. His best game of '88 came in the season opener against Louisiana Tech when he grabbed 16 passes for 224 yards and two TDs.

Phillips (born 10-11-66) ended his career as the leading receiver for the Cougars and the Southwest Conference in five categories: career receptions (207), single season receptions (108), single game receptions (16), single season reception yards (1,444) and single season TD receptions (15). He also returned 15 career punts for 156 yards (10.4 avg.).

He began his collegiate career as a quarterback at Taft (Calif.) Junior College before being converted into a receiver his sophomore season. Phillips was an All-District 20-5A quarterback and All-Greater Houston selection at Sterling High in Houston, where he also lettered in track (he runs a 4.55 in the 40-yard dash). He majored in business at the University of Houston.



LIONS' MVP

Since the 1952 season, Detroit Lions' players have voted for the Lions' Most Valuable Player. From that initial MVP vote until 1966, only one Lions' player was honored per season. Since 1967, Offensive and Defensive MVPs have been honored, and since 1981 the Lions also have voted for a Special Teams' MVP. For the 1988 season, the Offensive MVP was quarterback **Rusty Hilger**, who directed the club to three victories last year. On defense, linebacker **Michael Cofer** was named following his best season ever as a pro, which resulted in his starting berth and first-ever appearance in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl. The special teams' top performer was linebacker **George Jamison**, who finished fourth on the team in tackles with 77, and second in special teams tackles with 11.







A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE DETROIT LIONS

A new level of excitement awaits Lions fans in '89, as first-year head coach Wayne Fontes takes over the reins and attempts to "Restore the Roar" in the Pontiac Silverdome.

Despite a 4-12 finish last year, Detroit received outstanding performances from All-Pros Michael Cofer and Jim Arnold, who along with defensive stalwarts Chris Spielman, Bennie Blades and Dennis Gibson give Lions faithful hope for success in the future.

With the new "Silver Stretch" offense employed by the club this year, coupled with the selection of the finest running back Motown has seen since Billy Sims, 1988 Heisman Trophy winner Barry Sanders, and Heisman runner-up quarterback Rodney Peete, the Lions are confident of making strides in the NFC's Central Division.



Detroit welcomed the Lions in 1934, but it was not the area's first look at professional football.

In 1920, the Detroit Heralds were a charter member of the American Professional Football Association, which was the original name of the present NFL. But the club folded after two years. Then, the Detroit Panthers appeared in 1925. They also folded after two seasons. In 1928, the Detroit Wolverines were formed, but they failed after just one year.

In 1930, the then ten-year-old National Football League added a franchise from Portsmouth, Ohio, called the Spartans. After four seasons, the team was purchased for less than \$8,000 by Detroit radio executive George A. Richards and moved to the Motor City.

Playing in the University of Detroit Stadium before average crowds of 16,000 people, the new Detroit Lions won the NFL Championship in their second year, 1935. Under the leadership of Coach "Potsy" Clark and stars like Hall of Famer "Dutch" Clark, Ernie Caddel, George Christensen, "Ace" Gutowsky, Glenn Presnell and "Ox" Emerson, the early Lions established pro football in Detroit. For more than 50 years, they have been an integral part of the Michigan sports scene.

In 1940, Chicagoan Fred Mandel bought the club. Lions' stars of that era were Hall of Famers Bill Dudley and Alex Wojciechowicz, John Green, "Whizzer" White, Frank Sinkwich and "Camp" Wilson. The team was sold eight years later, to a group of local businessmen under the leadership of Edwin J. Anderson. The Detroit syndicate controlled the club until 1964 when William Clay Ford became sole owner for a price of \$4.5 million.

The Lions dominated the NFL in the 1950s with four division titles and three League championships. Under Head Coach Buddy Parker, the team won back-to-back world crowns in 1952 and 1953, defeating Cleveland in both title games. Stars of those glittering teams were Hall of Famers Bobby Layne and Jack Christiansen, along with Doak Walker, Les Bingaman, Cloyce Box, Leon Hart and Bob Hoernschemeyer. The Detroit-Cleveland battles of the era were classic confrontations between to giants of the blossoming NFL.

Since their last title in 1957 under the coaching of George Wilson, the Lions have been looking in vain for the top spot. Such recent performers as Joe Schmidt, Yale Lary and "Night Train" Lane have been elected to the Hall of Fame. Outstanding players like Wayne Walker, Mike Lucci, Nick Pietrosante, Roger Brown, Terry Barr, Lem Barney, Charlie Sanders, Dexter Bussey, Billy Sims and Doug English have taken their places in the annals of pro football in Detroit.

In 1967, Schmidt began the first of six seasons as head coach of the Lions. His 1970 team made the post-season playoffs, but lost in the first round to Dallas by the baseball-like score of 5-0.

Just prior to the '75 season, the Lions moved into a new, domed stadium in Pontiac, Michigan, a town of 85,000 people located 30 miles north of Detroit. The Silverdome is the world's largest air-supported domed structure and seats over 80,000 spectators under a fiberglass roof.

Monte Clark took control of all football operations as head coach in 1978. Under Clark's direction, the Lions narrowly missed playoff berths in both 1980 and 1981, before finally qualifying in 1982 — the first time the Lions made the playoffs since 1970. Detroit captured the NFC Central Division crown in 1983, but stumbled in the first round of the playoffs with a 24-23 loss to San Francisco. Clark was released after the Lions fell to 4-11-1 in 1984.

In his fourth season at the helm, Darryl Rogers was replaced on an interim basis by Wayne Fontes, after posting an 18-40 record over that period. Fontes was named the 17th head football coach of the Detroit Lions on December 22, 1988.



LIONS' THANKSGIVING DAY SERIES

This year marks a milestone in the long and proud history of Thanksgiving Day football featuring the Detroit Lions. On Nov. 23, 1989, the Detroit Lions will host the Cleveland Browns in the 50th Lions' Thanksgiving Day game.


The game was the brainchild of G.A. Richards, the first owner of the Detroit Lions. Richards had purchased the team in 1934 and moved the Lions from Portsmouth, Ohio, to the Motor City. At that time, Thanksgiving Day football was a tradition in the Midwest on the high school and college levels, but unheard of on the professional level. In fact, professional football played on any day back then was a risky proposition. The Lions were the new kids in town and had taken a backseat to the baseball Tigers. Despite the fact the Lions had lost just one game prior to that Thanksgiving Day in '34, the largest crowd of the season had been just 15,000.

The opponent for the first Thanksgiving Day game—on Nov. 29, 1934—was the undefeated, defending World Champion Chicago Bears of George Halas and, the reigning star of that era, fullback Bronco Nagurski. The game would determine the champion of the Western Division. Richards had convinced the NBC Radio Network to carry the game coast-to-coast (94 stations), and additionally, an estimated 26,000 fans jammed into the University of Detroit Stadium while thousands more disappointed fans were turned away.

The Bears won the inaugural game, 19-16, but a classic was born. Since 1934, 49 Thanksgiving Day games have been played in the series with the Lions one game under .500—23-24-2.

- Dec. 21, 1952 — Lions defeat Los Angeles, 31-21, for NFL's National Conference title.
- Dec. 28, 1952 — Lions win first Championship since 1935 on a 17-7 victory over the Browns in Cleveland before 50,934.
- Dec. 27, 1953 — Detroit wins second straight Championship on 17-16 decision over Cleveland in Detroit before 54,577.
- Aug. 12, 1957 — Parker resigns suddenly as head coach and assistant coach George Wilson succeeds him the next day.
- Dec. 28, 1957 — Detroit claims fourth Championship on 59-14 victory over Cleveland before 55,263 in Detroit.
- Jan. 23, 1961 — William Clay Ford elected president of Lions.
- Jan. 10, 1964 — Ford takes over as Lions' sole owner after purchasing franchise for \$4.5 million.
- Jan. 7, 1965 — Harry Gilmer appointed head coach, replacing George Wilson.
- Mar. 10, 1966 — After 13 seasons, Joe Schmidt retires to become Lions' linebacker coach.
- Jan. 11, 1967 — Schmidt named Lions' head coach, replacing George Wilson.
- Dec. 26, 1970 — Lions edged by Dallas, 5-0, in first playoff game since 1957.
- Oct. 24, 1971 — Chuck Hughes, wide receiver, dies on field during game after suffering a heart attack.
- Jan. 12, 1973 — Schmidt resigns as head coach.
- Jan. 26, 1973 — Don McCafferty named Lions' head coach.
- July 28, 1974 — McCafferty dies of heart attack.
- Aug. 3, 1974 — Rick Forzano named head coach.
- Aug. 23, 1975 — Lions play first game in new home, Pontiac Silverdome.
- Oct. 4, 1976 — Forzano resigns as head coach.
- Oct. 5, 1976 — Tommy Hudspeth named interim head coach.
- Feb. 9, 1977 — Hudspeth signs three-year contract as head coach.
- Jan. 11, 1978 — Monte Clark named head coach and director of football operations.
- Apr. 29, 1980 — Lions choose Oklahoma's Billy Sims first in the draft.

- Jan. 8, 1983 — Detroit qualifies for first playoff appearance in 12 seasons, but loses, 31-7, at Washington. The Redskins went on to win Super Bowl XVII.
- Dec. 31, 1983 — A last-second field goal attempt fails as Detroit drops a 24-23 playoff game at San Francisco.
- Dec. 19, 1984 — Monte Clark and his coaching staff are released.
- Feb. 6, 1985 — Darryl Rogers is named head coach after a successful 20-year college coaching career.
- Nov. 14, 1988 — Darryl Rogers is released as head coach and Wayne Fontes named interim coach.
- Dec. 22, 1988 — Wayne Fontes is named Lions' 17th head coach.


THE PONTIAC SILVERDOME

The Pontiac Silverdome has been "Home Sweet Home" for the Detroit Lions since the last brick was put in place in 1975. During those 13 years the building has earned a reputation as one of the finest sports facilities in the world. Not even a freak, late-winter snowstorm on Mar. 4, 1985, which caused extensive structural damage to the roof, could keep the Silverdome from maintaining its enviable stature in the sports world. A new canvas and steel-girder reinforced roof was added between March and June of 1985.

Since a 27-24 pre-season game victory over the Kansas City Chiefs on Aug. 23, 1975, the Lions have played 135 games in the Silverdome after moving from their former home at Tiger Stadium (nee Briggs Stadium) in downtown Detroit. The Lions have posted a 69-64-2 overall record in Pontiac, including a 54-50-1 mark in regular-season games (a .540 winning percentage).

Though the Silverdome is the Lions' home, the Cincinnati Bengals and the San Francisco 49ers made NFL history in the building on Jan. 24, 1982, the 49ers defeated the Bengals, 26-21, before a crowd of 81,270 in Super Bowl XVI—the only Super Bowl ever played in a northern U.S. city.

The Silverdome was built at a cost of \$55.7 million. It was occupied in just 23 months, on time and within budget, from its ground breaking on Sept. 19, 1973. During the roof's reconstruction in 1985, the Teflon-coated fiber glass panels (100 in all) that span the roof were completely replaced, and several structural modifications and safety improvements also were accomplished. The roof was re-inflated by workmen on May 30, 1985.

1989 NFL Rules Changes

Instant Replay will return for the 1989 NFL season.

At the NFL annual meeting in March at Palm Desert, California, club owners, for the fourth consecutive year, voted to utilize a limited Instant Replay system as an officiating aid. The vote was 24-4.

Replay was first adopted in 1986. It is used if there is indisputable visual evidence on videotape of an obvious error by a field official on plays limited to possession and goal line and out-of-bounds decisions.

The Replay system in 1989 remains the same as the 1988 version when the Instant Replay official was assigned to work with the same seven-man, on-the-field crew throughout the regular season.

In other action, a joint proposal by the Long-Range Planning and Finance committees regarding player personnel also was adopted. The committees recommendation for the first time sets offseason roster limits and the creation of a developmental squad. It also addressed roster cutdown dates and injured reserve. The teams agreed:

— Until May 31: No more than 90 players under contract.

— June 1: No more than 80 players under contract.

— Roster cutdown to 60 players after third preseason game (August 29).

— Roster cutdown to 47 players Monday (September 4) prior to regular-season opener.

— Regular-season game roster of 45 players plus two inactive.

— Developmental squad of six players maximum per club established after final cut to 47 and comprised of only rookies/first-year players who have passed through waivers.

— Players placed on injured reserve during the preseason may not return to same club that year; also may not practice.

— Players placed on injured reserve after the final cut may return after six games by free reactivation (each club has five) or procedural-recall waivers.

— Two practice options: Option 1: After four weeks on injured reserve, player can practice for two weeks, then club must

waive or activate; Option 2: After six weeks on injured reserve, player can be activated, waived, or begin unlimited practice. If practicing, player must count against developmental squad total of six.

Also, the clubs approved the following:

— Further clarified the roughing-the-passer rule by prohibiting a defender who has an unrestricted path to the quarterback from flagrantly hitting him in the area of the knees when approaching *from any direction*.

— Specified that fouls which occur in the last five minutes of the fourth quarter as well as the last two minutes of the first half will result in the clock starting on the snap.

— Called for strong disciplinary measures against feigned injuries.

— Any entering substitute who participates in a play must enter while the ball is dead and must move onto the field as far as the inside field numerals; in addition, the player or players replaced must have cleared the field on their own side (between end lines) prior to the snap or free kick.

— Established a new set of procedures, including loss of team timeouts or a five-yard penalty on the defense, to handle the problem of crowd noise which prevents the offense from hearing its signals.

— Further liberalized blocking rule to permit a blocker to initially contact on or outside the opponent's frame of the body so long as the blocker works to bring his hands back on or inside the frame after initial contact.

— Changed the simultaneous catch rule so that the offensive or defensive player who first controls and continues to maintain control of a pass will be awarded the ball even though his opponent later establishes joint control of the ball.

— Prohibited the offense, while in the process of substitution or simulated substitution, from rushing quickly to the line and snapping the ball with the obvious attempt to cause a defensive foul. In such an instance, the referee shall hold the snap, giving the defense a reasonable time to complete its substitution or if a defensive foul results, the flag will be picked up and the down replayed.
