



LEN FONTES

March 8, 1938 - May 8, 1992

Len Fontes had recently completed his second season in charge of the Lions' defensive backfield. In just two years, Fontes turned the Detroit secondary into one of the most solid and productive units in the NFL. He developed those coaching skills with both the Cleveland Browns (1980-82) and the New York Giants (1983-88). Fontes sported a Super Bowl ring from the 1986 season when the Giants recorded a 14-2 regular season mark and defeated Denver in Super Bowl XXI.

Dedication


The Detroit Lions and fans throughout the game of football lost two very special people in recent months.

On May 8, Len Fontes, Detroit's Defensive Backs Coach and brother of Lions' Head Coach Wayne Fontes, died of a heart attack at the age of 54. Little more than a month later, guard Eric Andolsek was killed when a truck drove off the road and hit him as he was doing yard work at his Thibodaux, Louisiana, home.

"It's hard to make sense of it—you can't, you really can't," said Wayne Fontes. "Lenny meant the world to me. We were as close as two brothers can be. He was as good a coach, as good a friend, and as good a person as there ever was.

"Eric was taken at the age of 25. That's a terrible tragedy. The young man was on the verge of doing great things in this league, he was that good. My heart goes out to his family—I know what an awful, awful loss this is for them."

Their contributions, dedication and friendship will be missed by all who knew them. It is to their memories that the 1992 Detroit Lions Media Guide is sincerely dedicated.

ERIC ANDOLSEK

August 22, 1966 - June 23, 1992

Eric Andolsek was a three-year starter and an All-American lineman at Louisiana State University, capturing All-SEC honors in both 1986 and '87. Selected by the Lions in the fifth round of the 1988 draft, Eric started every game over the past three seasons for Detroit. In fact, in the NFC Championship Game at Washington, Andolsek made his 50th consecutive start at left guard for the Lions. In 1991, he was named to the USA Today's All-Pro team, his first such honor as a Lion.



William Clay Ford

OWNER AND PRESIDENT



The Detroit Lions' biggest fan and most loyal supporter has an office at 1200 Featherstone Road. His office walls are covered with photographs — some black and white, some color, most yellowed — commemorating Detroit's past championships, memorable games and brightest stars.

Although he has enjoyed these pictures for many years, William Clay Ford is making room for new photos.

In his first 27 years as sole owner of the ball club, the Lions had enjoyed several fine moments. The 1969 through '75 teams all finished in second place in the NFC Central Division, with a high-water win-loss mark of 10-4 in '70. The '80 and '81 teams also finished in second place, and the 1983 club captured the NFC Central Division championship.

But it was Mr. Ford's 28th team, the 1991 edition, that truly Restored the Roar, rekindling memories of past powerhouses. The Lions marched to a 12-4 record, the NFC Central Division title, a 38-6 win over Dallas in Detroit's first home playoff game in 34 years, and the club's first-ever appearance in the NFC Championship Game.

And as the Lions prepare for the 1992 season under Head Coach Wayne Fontes, Mr. Ford sees a positive future for his football team.

"Two years ago, we all saw signs of great potential from many of those young players, and last year they put it all together," said Mr. Ford. "I'm confident that this team is now in a position to take the next step. It has been a long wait for all of us to see the Lions return as one of pro football's best teams, but I feel we are ready to do just that on an annual basis."

"I'm happy with the success we enjoyed last season — the staff and players should get all the credit in the world," Mr. Ford said. "Now we find ourselves in the situation of having to live up to high expectations. I suppose if you consider that a problem, it's a good problem to have."

For nearly three decades, he has guided the Detroit Lions organization with a sense of stability, integrity and honest leadership. If you know Mr. Ford, you understand that the owner and president of the Lions is, in the truest sense of the word, a gentleman.

Known as Bill Ford to his friends and business associates, his relationship with the Lions began during his childhood when his father, Edsel Ford, took him to the University of Detroit Stadium to see the first Lions' team play in their maiden season in the Motor City in 1934.

He became a club director in 1956 and was asked by then-Lions' President Edwin J. (Andy) Anderson to become the Lions' president in 1961.

In November of 1963, Mr. Ford purchased the team outright for \$4.5 million and officially took over the club January 10, 1964.

Of course, Mr. Ford's other passion in life is the automobile industry, he being a grandson of inventor and auto pioneer Henry Ford, founder of the Ford Motor Company.

Although he retired from his post as Ford Motor Company Vice-Chairman in March of 1989, Mr. Ford remains a member of the Board of Directors and chairman of the Finance and Executive Committees. He has been a board member since 1948 and was chairman of the company's Design Committee since its' inception in 1957 until retirement in 1989.

During his career with the company, Mr. Ford gained special satisfaction and acclaim as the executive in charge of the design, development and subsequent introduction of the Continental Mark II, the successor to the classic Lincoln Continental that had been developed and introduced by his father Edsel in 1939.

The youngest of Edsel's four children, William Clay Ford was born March 14, 1925. Following a tour of duty with the U.S. Naval Air Corp, he enrolled at Yale, where he captained both the tennis and soccer teams at the Ivy League school. In fact, he was a nationally ranked tennis player until two Achilles tendon surgeries relegated him to the sidelines. (Mr. Ford's athletic participation today includes some tennis, although he prefers golf, a game in which he became nearly a scratch performer.) He graduated from Yale with a Bachelor of Science degree in economics and then joined Ford's sales and advertising staff. He later served on the industrial relations staff where he was a member of the committee that negotiated the historic 1949 contract with the UAW-CIO.

He helped orchestrate a major change in Lions' history when he moved the team in 1975 from the downtown-located Tiger Stadium to metropolitan Pontiac and the sparkling, 80,000-plus seat Pontiac Silverdome, which remains the world's largest (based on seating capacity) indoor athletic facility.

Mr. Ford also is Chairman Emeritus of the Board of Trustees of the Edison Institute, which operates Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn. He is a trustee of the Eisenhower Medical Center, and serves as a director or a trustee for the Boys' Club of America, the National Tennis Hall of Fame, the United Way of Southeastern Michigan, and the Economic Club of Detroit. His more recent appointments include being named as a trustee for the Michigan Heart Association and to the Ronald Reagan Presidential Foundation. He received an honorary doctor of science degree from the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California, in 1981.

He is married to the former Martha Firestone of Akron, Ohio, and they are the parents of three daughters — Martha, Sheila and Elizabeth — and a son, Bill, Jr., who serves the Lions as club treasurer.

William Clay Ford, Jr.

TREASURER



One of the fastest-rising, young executives of the Ford Motor Company doubles as the treasurer of the Detroit Lions — William Clay Ford Jr. In March of 1991, the 35-year old Ford was named executive Director of Business Strategy for the Ford Automotive Group. Prior to assuming his current responsibilities, he was the manager of Ford Heavy Truck Engineering and Manufacturing after a three-year assignment in Europe. Previously, he was elected to the Ford Motor Company's Board of Directors (Jan. 14, 1988).

Mr. Ford, son of Lions' Owner and President William Clay Ford, joined the company in 1979 as a product planning analyst in Advanced Vehicles Development. He later moved to automotive assembly operations and worked on the launch of the Escort and Lynx. Additionally, he was a zone manager for district sales in the New York-New Jersey area before he was appointed as a member of Ford's bargaining team for negotiations with the UAW in 1982.

After a stint as a Ford Division advertising specialist, the Princeton University graduate entered the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where he earned a master's degree in management. Subsequent moves at Ford came in 1984 when he served as an international finance specialist and, in 1985, when he became a Car Product Development planning manager.

His tenure in Europe began in 1986 when Mr. Ford was appointed director of Commercial Vehicle Marketing for Ford of Europe and, in 1987, he moved his family to Zurich to become chairman and managing director of Ford Switzerland.

Chuck Schmidt

EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT
AND CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER



In less than three years as Detroit's Executive Vice-President and Chief Operating Officer, Chuck Schmidt's impact on the organization has been substantial and far-reaching. While the coaches and players understandably command much of the spotlight surrounding the club's recent renaissance, Schmidt has been Detroit's 'man behind the scenes'; His leadership, integrity and vision have helped establish the Lions as a "Team of the '90s".

Schmidt, 45, was handed the baton on December 27, 1989, when he succeeded Russ Thomas as the organization's top officer. In his first year at the helm, he hired a new Director of Player Personnel in Ron Hughes; oversaw construction of a new weight room that rivals any in the NFL; and was instrumental in the Lions' switch in training camp sites from Oakland University to the team's year-round residence at the Pontiac Silverdome. More recently, Schmidt has reorganized the front office staff to reflect the club's increased emphasis in the areas of marketing, promotions, and community and media relations; spearheaded the construction of a new player's lounge; was responsible for the construction of a new ticket office at the north end of the Silverdome and the renovation of the old ticket office into the new public relations department; and helped initiate "Lions Live '92", a three-day football festival to benefit charity.

This long list of improvements, says Schmidt, merely points to the Detroit Lions' bottom line — winning.

"Everything we do — from the improved weight room and players' lounge to the resources we've allocated for the coaching staff, player personnel and scouting — is done in the name of winning," said Schmidt. "We have worked especially hard, both on the field and behind the scenes, to do everything possible to help ensure success for this team and the organization.

"We enjoyed a good amount of success last season, and we should be proud of what was accomplished. But even more importantly, I think we must build from that success so that the Detroit Lions are a force in this league year after year."

Now in his 17th year with the Lions, Schmidt has performed a variety of duties during his tenure, providing the Detroit native with a keen and unique insight into the overall operation of the organization. He has been with the Lions since 1976 when he joined the club as a CPA. He soon thereafter was promoted to the team's controller. In 1987, Schmidt was named to the position of Vice-President for Finance and assumed the crucial, yet often thankless task of negotiating and signing all player contracts. Schmidt attended Detroit's Lutheran East High School before accepting a baseball scholarship from the University of Michigan where he earned his under-graduate degree in business. After earning a graduate degree in finance from Detroit's Wayne State University, he joined the accounting firm of Ernst and Whinney, where for five years he worked as a tax specialist before joining the Lions organization.

Under Schmidt's direction in 1990, the club established Detroit Lions Charities, a non-profit organization which assists various charitable and worthwhile causes in Michigan. Schmidt serves on the board of directors for the new program and is Secretary-Treasurer. He also serves on the Board of Directors for Detroit Tigers' Manager Sparky Anderson's CATCH charity and also is on the board of the Pontiac Development Foundation, which is an organization established to enhance economic progress in the Pontiac area. In 1992, Schmidt was named to the Board of Trustees at Henry Ford Hospital of West Bloomfield.

Born on January 22, 1947, Schmidt and his wife Sharon reside in Oakland County with their three children, Scott, Krista and Matthew.

10th Year with Lions



Managing the sale and distribution of tickets is an enormous task, and the Lions are fortunate to have someone as experienced as Mark Graham as assistant ticket manager. Mark re-joined the Lions in 1990 following a brief stint in the ticket office of the Fox Theatre in Detroit. He started with the Lions on a part time basis in 1980 and remained in that capacity until 1986 when he was hired to a full time position by the Lions. Graham, 33, brings to the Lions a plethora of knowledge in many areas of ticket management. He has worked in the ticket offices of the Detroit Tigers, Detroit Red Wings and Joe Louis Arena in Detroit. Graham has worked at the Super Bowl and was involved in the allocation and distribution of all the Super Bowl tickets.

Mark and his wife Michelle have a daughter, Suzan, and are expecting their second child. They reside in Sterling Heights.

Bill Keenist

DIRECTOR OF MARKETING, BROADCASTING AND COMMUNICATIONS 8th Year with Lions



When the Lions formed their first marketing department, Bill Keenist, with more than a decade of experience in athletic publicity and promotions, was a natural selection as one of the directors. Keenist continues to oversee the Lions' public relations department. He also, along with Chuck Schmidt, coordinates the team's local broadcasting concerns.

Keenist has been with the Lions since 1985 when he was hired as assistant public relations director. In 1987 he was named director of public relations, a position he held until 1991.

Prior to joining the Lions, Keenist worked for the Washington Redskins from 1981-83 as a public relations assistant and Director of Promotions. He was a member of the Redskins when the team won Super Bowl XVII in 1983 over Miami.

Keenist left the Redskins to become P.R. Director of the Pittsburgh Maulers of the United States Football League. After the Maulers, Keenist was the Sports P.R. Director for the Pittsburgh Civic Arena, where he worked primarily with the Pittsburgh Penguins hockey team.

For Super Bowls XXIV, XXV and XXVI he had the honor of being selected the public relations co-captain, which involves the coordination of all media-related activities.

A native of Elizabeth, Pa., Keenist holds a master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University, he also received his bachelor's degree from Ohio University. He lives in Oxford with his wife Cindy and their two sons Billy and Christopher.

Tom Lesnau

CONTROLLER 14th Year with Lions



Tom Lesnau was named controller of the Lions in January of 1991 after serving as the team's accountant for 13 years. Lesnau came to the Lions from the accounting firm of Ernst and Whinney where he had worked for five years. He was hired as the club's accountant in 1978 and took over the additional duties of travel coordinator in 1980. In his current position, Lesnau is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day financial operations of the organization as well as coordinating all of the team's travel arrangements. Lesnau also coordinated the construction of the new players' lounge as well as the construction of the new ticket and marketing offices and the conversion of the old ticket office into the public relations office in 1991.

The Detroit Lions expanded its community efforts in June, 1990, with the establishment of Detroit Lions Charities (DLC), a non-profit organization founded by the Lions to assist charitable and worthwhile causes in Michigan. The Lions, with corporate assistance, have raised over \$163,000 for charity since 1990 season. Grants totaling over \$93,000 were awarded to 50 Michigan charities in March, 1992.

"Now, the club has made an even greater commitment with the establishment of Detroit Lions Charities. Funding for Detroit Lions Charities comes from several sources including proceeds from the Detroit Lions Invitational, a golf outing held in July at Great Oaks Country Club in nearby Rochester. Principal financial support comes from the "Northwest Airlines Flies for Detroit Lions Charities" program. Northwest Airlines donates \$100 for every point the Lions score to DLC.

DLC assists a wide variety of activities and programs that benefit education, civic affairs and health and human services in Michigan. Requests for funding will be accepted from October 1 through December 31, 1992. Grant applications will be reviewed early in the new year with recipients being announced in March, 1993, and awarded shortly thereafter.

Detroit Lions Head Coach

Wayne Fontes

When Wayne Fontes officially was named the 17th head coach in Detroit Lions' history on December 22, 1988, he promised that his team would put excitement back into the Pontiac Silverdome and that his Lions would "Restore the Roar."

Fontes was true to his word as the Lions compiled a 12-4 record in just his third season. The 12 victories were the most regular season wins in franchise history. Fontes directed the Lions to their first playoff berth since 1983 and the first home playoff game for Detroit since 1957.

Under Fontes' guidance, the Lions overcame adversity and tragedy in 1991 to reach the playoffs. After an embarrassing 45-0 loss at Washington on opening day, Detroit bounced back with five straight victories. The Lions then lost three of four contests, including a heart-breaking 20-10 contest at Chicago, before reeling off six consecutive wins to close out the year.

Despite a slew of injuries that sidelined five starters for the season, Fontes kept his young team on the path to the most successful season in club history. The wounded list included Michael Cofer, the team's top pass rusher; Rodney Peete, quarterback; Mike Utley, right guard; Jerry Ball, Pro Bowl nose tackle; and Eric Sanders, right tackle and long snapper. The most devastating of the injuries was, of course, suffered by Utley, whose spinal injury against the Rams left him paralyzed from the chest down.

Still, Fontes guided the Lions to a Central Division title and the NFC Championship Game, replacing proven starters with promising athletes, refining the defense and redefining the offense. It is little wonder that Fontes earned universal praise as the NFL's Coach-of-the-Year, capping the season with a 21-15 victory as the NFC's head

coach in the 1992 Pro Bowl.

Fontes did not turn the Lions into winners overnight. The framework for success was built in Fontes' first two full seasons as head coach. In his first full season, the Lions ended the season as the NFL's hottest team with five straight victories; scored their most points since the 1983 NFC Central Division Championship season; sent four players to the Pro Bowl for the first time since 1972; featured NFL "Rookie of the Year" and NFC rushing champion Barry Sanders; and boasted the NFL's finest special teams with standouts Eddie Murray, Jim Arnold and Mel Gray.

Behind Fontes, the Lions made even greater improvement in 1990; the team tallied 373 points, the second-best output in club history; Sanders earned All-Pro honors

while becoming the second player in Lions history to capture the NFL rushing title; Detroit sent five players to the Pro Bowl, the most representatives for the club in 18 seasons; fan enthusiasm and support reached an eight-year high as Silverdome attendance skyrocketed 32 percent from the previous season and 75 percent over 1988.

He was named the Lions' head coach in December of 1988 after serving five weeks as interim head coach at the close of the 1988 season. He coached Detroit to a 2-3 record during that span.

Fontes was born Feb. 17, 1939, in New Bedford, Mass., and lived there until he was 15 when he moved to Canton, Ohio, where his father worked in a steel mill. An exceptional schoolboy athlete at Canton's McKinley High School, he matriculated to Michigan State where he was a two-sport (football and baseball) star and earned All-Big Ten honors as a defensive back.

He was selected to play in the North-South and Senior Bowl All-Star games in 1962 before being drafted by the New York Jets where he started in the defensive backfield. His brief pro career (1962) was cut short by a broken leg. However, his 83-yard interception return against Houston (12-15-62) stood as a Jets' record until it was broken in 1989 by Erik McMillan's 93-yarder.

His first coaching job was directing the freshman team at Michigan State in 1965, while he was working on his master's degree in administration (which he later earned). He coached at Visitation High School in Bay City, Mich., in 1966-67, winning the Michigan Class B state championship in 1967 with a team that went 10-0. He then moved on to the college level and was defensive backfield coach at Dayton (1968), Iowa (1969-71) and Southern California (1972-75). It was at the latter stop Fontes began

a 13-year association with John McKay, who brought Fontes with him when McKay was named the head coach of the expansion Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1976.

Fontes spent nine years with the Bucs and advanced from secondary coach to defensive coordinator to assistant head coach under McKay. In his first year as the Bucs' defensive coordinator (1982) Tampa Bay led the NFC in defense.

He left the Bucs in 1985 to become the Lions' defensive coordinator. Under Fontes the Lions switched to a new 3-4 defensive alignment and the defense showed continued improvement.

Off the field, Fontes has been extremely active in charitable causes. Gifted with a quick smile and keen sense of humor, Fontes is often seen at community and charity events lending a helping hand. This past spring, Fontes was the guest of honor at a "Wayne Roast" dinner which benefitted the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit. In the last year alone, Fontes has taken an active role in many charitable causes, including the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, C.A.T.C.H., Special Olympics, D.A.R.E., the Whaley Children Center, the National Paralysis Foundation, the Palmer Drug Abuse Program and the Mike Utley Foundation.

Active on the banquet circuit, he was the 1989 Chairman of the Michigan Chapter of the American Cancer Society's Great American Lockup which raised nearly \$200,000. He also serves as Chairman of a program to raise \$1 million for the expansion of Camp Fowler, a Mayville, Mich., camp for disabled children. Fontes also has participated in numerous charity golf outings and has been a chairman the past two years of the Detroit Lions Charities' annual golf tournament which benefits numerous causes throughout southeast Michigan.

Fontes and his wife Evelyn (who met at a high school sock hop in Canton) have three children (Mike, Scott and Kim) and reside in nearby Rochester Hills.

In his eighth year with the Lions, Don Clemons continues to be valuable to the Lions' coaching staff, now in charge of the outside linebackers. Clemons came to Detroit in 1985, and served four years as the Lions' strength and conditioning coordinator before handling a variety of duties as a defensive assistant beginning in 1989.

Clemons, 38, is a native of Northampton, Pa. He was a standout defensive end at Muhlenberg (Pa.) College, where he earned All-District honors and was team captain his senior year ('76). His first coaching experience was at Kutztown State (Pa.) where he tutored outside linebackers for two seasons (1977-78). He then spent one year as linebackers coach at New Mexico State (1979) before joining former Lions' Head Coach Darryl Rogers at Arizona State. Clemons was the strength and conditioning coach for the Sun Devils and also assisted the defensive line coach from 1980-84.

John Fontes

John Fontes (pronounced fon-TEZ) becomes the newest member of the Lions' staff as he takes over as defensive backs coach, a position held by his late brother Len for the past two seasons. John, the younger brother of Head Coach Wayne Fontes, comes to the Lions with twelve years of coaching experience.

Fontes spent the spring of 1992 as a defensive assistant with the World League Champion Sacramento Surge. In 1991 he served as the defensive coordinator for the Tampa Bay Storm in the Arena League, and the Storm won the Arena League championship with a 13-2 record.

Prior to his stint with the Storm, John was an assistant at Louisiana State University. He tutored the defensive backs in 1987-88 and he coached the outside linebackers in 1989.

In 1986 Fontes was the linebacker coach at the University of Miami, a season in which the Hurricane defense finished fifth in the nation in total defense and seventh in scoring defense. He coached at Northwestern in 1985, and he coached the linebackers at Oregon State from 1976-80 and also worked with the secondary. Fontes left coaching from 1980-84 and worked for Levi Strauss and Company.

He played for the University of Iowa, however his career was cut short by a knee injury. After his injury he became a graduate assistant for the Hawkeyes and received a degree in Physical Education. Fontes and his wife, Theresa, have two children, John and Ashley.

Frank Gansz

SPECIAL TEAMS

**4th Year with Lions
15th Year in the NFL**



A veteran of the NFL wars, Frank Gansz brought outstanding credentials to Detroit built through 14 years of NFL coaching experience. After two seasons as head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs (1987-88), Gansz was quickly tabbed by Wayne Fontes following the 1988 season to direct the Lions' special teams.

It didn't take long for Gansz to add to his coaching credits. In a vote by the league's coaches, he was named the NFL's 1989 Special Teams "Coach of the Year". The Lions' special teams have flourished under Gansz's direction as evidenced by return specialist Mel Gray's two consecutive Pro Bowl appearances. In 1991 Gray became the first return specialist in NFL history to lead the league in punt return and kickoff return average in the same season.

Gansz is in his 28th year as a coach. He began his coaching career at the Air Force Academy (1964-66), and had stints at Colgate (1968), the Naval Academy (1969-72), Oklahoma State (1973-75), Army (1974) and UCLA (1976-77).

An outstanding special teams instructor, Gansz entered the NFL in '78 as special teams coach at San Francisco, then added the title of tight ends coach to his credit during stops at Cincinnati ('79-80), Kansas City ('81-82) and Philadelphia ('83-85). Upon his return to Kansas City in 1986, Gansz was named assistant head coach and special teams coach. That season, the Chiefs' special teams blocked an NFL record 10 kicks and scored five touchdowns while sparking Kansas City to its first playoff berth in 15 years.

This past off-season Gansz conducted clinics for several World League teams during their respective training camps. The 53-year-old (Nov. 22, 1938) Gansz was born in Altoona, Pa. and grew up in Pittsburgh. He is a 1960 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy where he played guard, center and linebacker in three seasons and was a member of the 1958 Cotton Bowl team. Gansz went through the Air Force's pilot training program and earned his wings in 1961, flying single-engine aircraft.

Gansz and his wife Barbara have two children (Frank, who is an assistant coach with New York/New Jersey Knight of the World League, and Jennifer) and two grandsons, and live in Auburn Hills, Mich.

Dan Henning

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

*1st Year with Lions
18th Year in the NFL*



Looking to add a more stable running game to accompany the Lions' four wide receiver offense, Head Coach Wayne Fontes hired Dan Henning as his new offensive coordinator. Henning, an 18-year NFL coaching veteran, completes one of the most experienced staffs in the league.

The 50-year-old Henning (June 21, 1942) brings with him impressive credentials and a reputation as one of the top offensive minds in the game. He spent the past three years ('89-'91) as head coach of the San Diego Chargers. Prior to joining the Chargers, Henning spent 1987-88 directing the passing game and quarterbacks of the Washington Redskins and was on the staff when the Redskins defeated the Denver Broncos 42-10 in Super Bowl XXII. He was no stranger to Washington having been the assistant head coach when the Redskins captured Super Bowl XVII, a 27-17 win over the Miami Dolphins. In between his stints with the Redskins, Henning spent four seasons ('83-'86) as head coach of the Atlanta Falcons.

Following a standout career as a quarterback at William & Mary, where he finished 14th in the nation in passing yardage in his senior season ('63), Henning joined the San Diego Chargers in the 1964 preseason. Following two years in the Continental League, Henning spent 1966 with the Chargers. He remained with the Chargers into the 1967 preseason before finishing his career with Norfolk in the Continental League.

Henning entered the coaching ranks in 1968 on the collegiate level at Florida State University where he tutored the quarterbacks and receivers, a position he held through 1970. He moved on to Virginia Tech where he was offensive coordinator in 1971 and 1973, before returning to Florida State in 1974. In 1972 Henning began his professional coaching career as quarterbacks and receivers coach of the Houston Oilers. He returned to the NFL to stay in 1976 when he joined the New York Jets as quarterbacks and receivers coach, remaining with the Jets through 1978. Henning tutored the quarterbacks and receivers with the Miami Dolphins from 1979-80 before moving on to the Redskins in 1981.

Long ago NFL teams learned that much of the on-the-field success is due to dedicated and well-spent hours in the weight room. In charge of this vital responsibility for the Lions is Strength and Conditioning Coach and Defensive Assistant Bert Hill, who also assists in coaching the defensive line.

Backed by nine years of college strength coaching experience, Hill organizes and implements the strength and conditioning program for the Lions, and has overseen the recent \$130,000 renovation of the club's weight room. The 34-year-old (Jan. 25, 1958) Montgomery, Ala. native attended junior college at Marion (Ala.) Military Institute ('76-'77) where he captained the football team and also played baseball. After one year ('78) at Wichita State University where he was a Shockers' linebacker, he earned his degree in physical education from Auburn University (Montgomery campus).

Lamar Leachman enters his third season as the Lions' defensive line coach. He brought plenty of experience and success to Detroit when he joined the Lions in 1989 after ten years with the New York Giants. Leachman spent a decade (1980-89) coaching the Giants' defensive linemen and helped build one of the NFL's finest defenses. The highlight of his tenure with the Giants came in 1986 when New York defeated Denver 39-20 to capture Super Bowl XXI.

Before entering the NFL, he was defensive coordinator for two years (1978-79) with the Montreal Alouettes and three seasons (1975-77) for the Toronto Argonauts of the CFL. He also held a similar post for one year (1974) with the WFL New York Stars.

Born August 7, 1934, in Cartersville, Ga., Leachman was a center-linebacker under Bowden Wyatt at the University of Tennessee where he gained honorable mention All-America honors. He began his coaching career in Savannah, Ga., with Chatham County Public School as head coach. He remained there until 1966, when he was named assistant coach at Richmond University (1966-67). He also coached at Georgia Tech (1968-71), Memphis State (defensive coordinator, 1972), and South Carolina (defensive coordinator, 1973).

Lamar and his wife Paula have three daughters (Lisa, Lori and Lamara), three granddaughters and one grandson.

Dave Levy

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

4th Year with Lions
13th Year in the NFL



Thirty-four years of coaching experience, including 12 in the NFL, are wrapped around Dave Levy who was promoted to assistant head coach after serving one year as offensive coordinator.

Having coached virtually every position at one time or another during his career, the 59-year-old (Oct. 25, 1932) Levy came to Motown after nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers, most recently as coach of the tight ends and H-backs. He also was San Diego's offensive coordinator (1983-85, '87) and coached the offensive line (1980-87). Levy coached on two divisional championship teams ('80-'81) and the "Air Coryell" offense flourished when the Chargers led the NFL ('81-'83) by allowing only one sack for every 27 passing attempts.

A two-year performer at guard for UCLA, Levy began his coaching career with the Bruins' freshman team in '54, and as an assistant at Long Beach City College (1955). Following four seasons in the California high school ranks (1956-59), he coached for 16 years at the University of Southern California. During the 1972-75 seasons, Levy and Wayne Fontes were assistants under former Trojan field general John McKay. During Levy's tenure at USC, the Trojans appeared in eight Rose Bowls. Before entering the NFL ranks (at San Diego) he concluded his USC stint as an assistant athletic director (1976-79).

Born in Carrollton, Missouri, Levy grew up in Long Beach, Calif. He and his wife Barrie have four children (Laurie, Ariel, John and Robert), and reside in Southfield.

Billie Matthews

RUNNING BACKS

4th Year with Lions
14th Year in the NFL



Matthews enters his third season as the Lions' running backs coach - a position he has coached virtually his entire career. He tutored the Lion's defensive backs in 1989, his first year with Detroit.

Matthews, who previously served as running backs coach (1987-88) on the staff of present Lions' special teams coach Frank Gansz at Kansas City, is in his 14th season of coaching in the NFL. Prior to joining the Chiefs, he spent two years as offensive coordinator and running backs coach for the Indianapolis Colts (1985-86).

Matthews entered the NFL in '79 as running backs coach of the San Francisco 49ers, where he spent four seasons, including the team's first Super Bowl title in 1981. Matthews then joined the staff of the Philadelphia Eagles where he served two years (1983-84) as running backs coach.

He began his college coaching career at the University of Kansas in 1970 before moving on to an eight-year stint at UCLA (1971-78), where he coached the running backs and the secondary. Matthews coached five 1,000-yard rushers (Kermit Johnson, James McAlister, Wendell Tyler, Theotis Brown and Freeman McNeil) while with the Bruins. A standout player himself, he quarterbacked Southern University (Baton Rouge, La.) to a 37-4 record during his playing career (1948-51).

A native of Houston, Tex., Matthews and his wife Gene have four children (Jackie, Kenneth, Kennette and Karen), and reside in Rochester Hills, Mich.

Herb Paterra

INSIDE LINEBACKERS

*4th Year with the Lions
12th Year in the NFL*



Herb Paterra, in his fourth season in Detroit, was well familiar with Michigan and Head Coach Wayne Fontes long before joining the Lions to coach the inside linebackers.

The association between Fontes and Paterra began at Michigan State, where both were teammates under former Spartan head coach Duffy Daugherty. Fontes played defensive back and Paterra was a two-way performer at MSU (offensive guard and linebacker).

Paterra began his professional career with the Buffalo Bills in 1963 (13th-round choice), and after two seasons in Buffalo (including one as AFL champions in '64), he joined the CFL Hamilton Tiger-Cats where he spent four years. Hamilton won two Grey Cup championships during his time there.

This year is Paterra's 23rd season in coaching. He began his coaching career at Michigan State as an assistant in 1969 (linebackers and defensive line). He also coached linebackers at Wyoming (1972-74). His first professional stint came in '75 when he served as linebackers coach with the Charlotte Hornets of the World Football League. Following two seasons (1976-77) as head coach at North Mecklinburgh High in Charlotte, N.C., Paterra returned to Hamilton (CFL) as defensive coordinator. His first stint in the NFL came as the defensive coordinator and special teams coach of the Los Angeles Rams (1980-82).

After a return to the CFL as the defensive coordinator at Edmonton ('83), Paterra was named linebackers coach at Green Bay where he spent the '84-85 seasons. He became a member of Hank Bullough's staff at Buffalo in 1986, as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach before joining the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to coach the inside linebackers ('87-88).

The 51-year-old (Nov. 8, 1940) Paterra was born in Glassport, Pa. He and his wife Lou Ann have two sons - Jeff and Craig who were college quarterbacks at Michigan State and Missouri, respectively - and reside in Rochester Hills, Mich.

Charlie Sanders

RECEIVERS

4th Year with the Lions 4th Year in the NFL



Detroit welcomed a good friend home when Wayne Fontes named Charlie Sanders the team's tight end coach on Jan. 30, 1989. Sanders, who played 10 years with the Lions (1968-77), was given complete charge of the receivers in 1991.

Sanders is the club's all-time leading receiver with 336 receptions, second in yards gained with 4,817 (14.3-yard average), and fourth in touchdown catches with 31. The team's leading receiver during four of his 10 years, Sanders enjoyed his best year in '69, when he gained 656 yards on 42 receptions (he also caught 42 passes in 1974).

The seven-time Pro Bowler and two-time All-Pro had his best single-game effort during his rookie season when he grabbed 10 passes for 133 yards against Washington (Dec. 15, 1968). He was the only rookie selected that season to appear in the Pro Bowl and, in addition, Sanders finished second to then-teammate Earl McCullough for NFL Rookie of the Year honors.

Sanders' standout Lions' career was recognized in May, 1990, when he was inducted into the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame.

A two-sport (football and basketball) star at the University of Minnesota, Sanders concluded his senior season as the Gophers' leading receiver after hauling in 21 receptions for 276 yards and two TD's helping his team win a share of the 1967 Big Ten title.

Sanders remained close to the Lions' organization by serving as an analyst on the Lions' WJR radio broadcast team in the six years prior to joining the Detroit coaching staff. The Richland, N.C., native prepped at (Greensboro) Dudley High School. Born on Aug. 25, 1946, Sanders and his wife Georgiana have nine children (Mia, Charese, Mary Jo, Georgianna, Charlie Jr., Nathalie, Tallisa, Wayne and Jordan).

Jerry Wampfler

OFFENSIVE LINE

4th Year with Lions 20th Year in the NFL



Wayne Fontes again went for an NFL-experienced coach when he rounded out his offensive staff early in 1989, by naming Jerry Wampfler to coach the offensive line. In his 20th NFL coaching season, Wampfler completed a one-year ('88) stint with the San Diego Chargers in a similar capacity before joining the Lions.

A veteran of 39 years of coaching at the high school, college and pro levels, Wampfler served on the staffs of five NFL clubs prior to his appointment in Detroit. He began his pro coaching career in Philadelphia ('73) where he coached the defensive line.

Three seasons after joining the Eagles, he was named defensive line coach at Buffalo (1976) and switched to the offensive line with the New York Giants in 1978. After rejoining the Eagles a year later, Wampfler was the running game coordinator and offensive line coach for five years (1979-83). During his tenure in Philadelphia the Eagles made the playoffs three times and competed in Super Bowl XV. Before his stint in San Diego, he spent four seasons ('84-'87) as offensive line coach of the Green Bay Packers.

The Miami of Ohio graduate began his coaching career on the high school level in 1954 at his alma mater, New Philadelphia (Ohio) High. During his collegiate coaching days, Wampfler coached under Bo Schembechler at his alma mater (Miami of Ohio) during 1963-65. He then moved on to Notre Dame where he spent four years (1966-69) under Ara Parseghian, the Irish won the National Championship in 1966. He was the head coach at Colorado State in 1970.

Born Aug. 6, 1932, in New Philadelphia, Ohio, Wampfler and his wife Carol have three children (Nan, Jody and Tad), and live in Lake Orion, Mich.

Woody Widenhofer

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

*4th Year with Lions
15th Year in the NFL*



One of Wayne Fontes' first priorities when he was named head coach was to find the right man to replace him as defensive coordinator, a man who would continue to instill an aggressive style and have the patience and experience to mold a young, promising squad. Former Pittsburgh Steelers' defensive coordinator Robert "Woody" Widenhofer (Woodenhofer) was the man.

In his 27th year of coaching, the 49-year-old (Jan. 20, 1943) Missouri graduate (1965) and Riverview, Mich. native began his coaching career on the high school level in the Detroit area as an assistant at Holy Redeemer ('65) and the head coach at Nativity High (1966-68). After spending four years as an assistant on the collegiate level in the early 70's (Michigan State, Eastern Michigan and Minnesota), Widenhofer began his professional career with the Steelers in 1973.

At Pittsburgh, he coached three All-Pro linebackers (Jack Ham, Andy Russell and Jack Lambert) during an 11-year stay, during which time the Steelers won four Super Bowl championships and were noted for their "Steel Curtain" defense. Widenhofer joined the Steelers as linebackers coach in 1973. Defensive backs were added to his responsibility in 1978 before he was named defensive coordinator in 1979. He was the Steelers' assistant head coach for his final two seasons (1982-83) with the club.

In 1984, he became the head coach of the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws. After one season in the USFL he was named the head coach at his alma mater - Missouri - where he spent four years (1985-88) before coming to Detroit.

Entering his 27th season with the Lions, Kent Falb is one of the most respected trainers in the National Football League and throughout the field of athletic medicine. He was named the 1984 "Professional Athletic Trainer of the Year", as selected by the National Athletic Trainers Association and he served as president of MATS (Michigan Athletic Trainers Society), in 1989-90. In June, 1991 Falb received the high honor of induction into the MATS Hall of Fame joining three other inductees in the Hall's second class.

Also in 1991 Falb was elected to the board of directors of NATA, representing the Great Lakes Athletic Trainers Association (GLATA), one of ten districts that comprises NATA. He served as Director-elect in 1991 then began a three year term as an active board member. In June 1987, Falb had the most prestigious honor of being the keynote speaker for the NATA convention in Columbus, Ohio.

Along with his assistants, Joe Recknagel and Robert Thomas, and Strength and Conditioning Coach Bert Hill, Falb oversees the prevention, evaluation, treatment and rehabilitation of player injuries.

A native of Elgin, Iowa, Falb graduated from the University of Iowa in 1964, and received a Physical Therapy certificate from Iowa one year later. He began his athletic training career in 1959 as an assistant trainer at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.



He also had a free agent tryout with the San Diego Chargers in the '87 camp. A former grid standout at Southern Illinois, Spielman is the BLESTO representative for the Lions and will handle the scouting along the southeast portion of the U.S. Rick and his wife Michelle reside in Royal Oak, Mich.

Allen Hughes joined the Lions' scouting staff in 1988 and scouts colleges in the Michigan area. The Detroit native (Benedictine H.S.) played three seasons in the USFL - two for the Michigan Panthers ('83 and '84) - and he also was a 12th-round draft pick by the Steelers in '82. Hughes signed with the Lions in '86 as a free agent, but a broken ankle suffered in the final ('86) pre-season game ended his career. He was a two-time Western Michigan University "Defensive Player of the Year". Hughes and his wife Maureen have two sons.

John Trump retired in 1990 but still serves the Lions on a part-time basis scouting colleges on the west coast. He started with the Lions in 1985 as area scout in California and at western U.S. colleges. Prior to joining the Lions Trump spent seven years with San Diego as scouting administrative assistant. Trump started working in professional football in 1953 when he began a 25-year association with the Los Angeles Rams. John and his wife Jean live in Van Nuys, California. They have two sons, one of whom, Frank, is a scout for the Rams.



He enters the 1992 season needing 785 yards to break Billy Sims' all-time Detroit rushing record . . . In just three full seasons, Sanders has broken or tied 11 Detroit offensive records . . . Sanders is the first Lion to record three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons . . . He is just the seventh back in NFL history to run for 1,000 yards in each of his first three seasons (the others are Eric Dickerson, Earl Campbell, Ottis Anderson, William Andrews, Tony Dorsett and John Brockington) . . . Barry now owns the Lions' career record for rushing TDs with 43 . . . He begins the '92 season tied with Billy Sims for the most total career TDs with 47 . . . 

After five seasons as a valuable reserve for the Lions, Sanders proved to be a capable starting NFL tackle in 1991, and is a front runner to return to that position in '92 . . . Although he is the team's long-snapper, he has never played center . . . An outstanding pass protector . . . A finesse blocker who responds well to quick and physical defensive ends . . . Drafted on the fifth round by the Falcons, he was the 136th player selected in the 1981 draft . . . Claimed on waivers by Detroit on Nov. 28, 1986. **1991:** Started 14 games at tackle and again handled all long-snapping chores before season was cut short by a knee injury . . . Assumed the starting right tackle position in place of Harvey Salem, and responded with some of the best line play of his career . . . 





Lions' MVP Selections Through the Years

Since the 1952 season, Detroit Lions' players have voted for the Lions' Most Valuable Player. From that initial MVP vote until 1966, only one Lions' player was honored per season. Since 1967, Offensive and Defensive MVPs have been honored, and since 1981, the Lions have voted for a Special Teams' MVP. For the 1991 season, the MVP was running back **Barry Sanders**, who re-wrote the Lions rushing record book with 1,548 rushing yards, and led the NFC with 16 rushing TDs. On the defense, outside linebacker **George Jamison** captured the award by turning in an outstanding all-around performance ranking among team leaders in tackles, sacks, interceptions and fumble recoveries. The special teams' winner was return specialist **Mel Gray**, who became the first player in the NFL history to lead the league in both kickoff and punt return average in the same season and was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive year.

Pro Football Hall of Fame

The 1992 season marks the 29th year for the Pro Football Hall of Fame, located in Canton, Ohio. Eleven of the Detroit Lions' former greats are enshrined in the Hall having been chosen as among the finest to ever play the game.

The Lions' family took great pride on Aug. 1, 1992, when the latest of its stars was inducted into the Hall — Lem Barney. He joined Al Davis, John Mackey and John Riggins in the Hall's most recent class.

A second-round draft pick from small Jackson State in 1967, Barney served notice on the NFL from the opening game of his rookie season. Immediately thrust into a starting cornerback slot against the defending Super Bowl champion Green Bay Packers, Barney picked off the first Bart Starr pass thrown in his direction and returned it 24 yards for a touchdown.

The Lem Barney era had begun.

The always smiling, ever friendly Barney would go on to intercept a league-leading 10 passes that season, returned three for touchdowns, and was named the NFL's Defensive "Rookie of the Year."

From 1967-77, Barney played in 140 Lions' games, intercepted 56 passes and returned seven for touchdowns. He also had a career kickoff return average of 25.5 with one TD, and added a 9.2 average on 143 punt returns with two more scores. He was chosen to seven Pro Bowls. Though his accomplishments on the field are many, it has been what Lem has given back off the field that reveal the true measure of the man. Always eager to help his community and countless charities whenever and wherever he can, Lem Barney epitomizes what it truly means to be a member of the Hall of Fame.



The History Book

A Brief History of the Lions

The Lions "Restored the Roar" in 1991, winning a franchise record 12 regular season games. Detroit hosted its first playoff game in the Silverdome and defeated Dallas 38-6, Detroit's first playoff victory since 1957. The win gave the Lions a berth in the NFC title game, where Detroit fell to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Washington Redskins.

The team's success was highlighted by several individual accomplishments. All-Pro running back Barry Sanders set new team records with 1,548 rushing yards and 16 rushing touchdowns and made his third straight Pro Bowl appearance. Return specialist Mel Gray became the first player in NFL history to lead the league in both kickoff and punt return average in the same season. The Lions sent a total of six players to the Pro Bowl. In addition to Gray and Sanders, other Pro Bowl Lions were Jerry Ball, Bennie Blades, Lomas Brown and Chris Spielman. The triumphs and improvements accomplished in 1991 all point to a young Detroit Lions' team headed in a winning direction as the club enters its 59th season in the Motor City.

Detroit welcomed the Lions in 1934, but it was not the area's first look at professional football.

In 1920, the Detroit Heralds were a charter member of the American Professional Football Association, which was the original name of the present NFL, but the club folded after two years. Then, the Detroit Panthers appeared in 1925. They also folded after two seasons. In 1928, the Detroit Wolverines were formed, but they failed after just one year.

In 1930, the then 10-year-old National Football League added a franchise from Portsmouth, Ohio, called the Spartans. After four seasons, the team was purchased for less than \$8,000 by Detroit radio executive George A. Richards and moved to the Motor City.

Playing in the University of Detroit Stadium before average crowds of 16,000 people, the new Detroit Lions won the NFL Championship in their second year, 1935. Under the leadership of Coach "Potsy" Clark and stars like Hall of Famer "Dutch" Clark, Ernie Caddel, George Christensen, "Ace" Gutowsky, Glenn Presnell and "Ox" Emerson, the early Lions established pro football in Detroit.

In 1940, Chicagoan Fred Mandel bought the club. Lions' stars of that era were Hall of Famers Bill Dudley and Alex Wojciechowicz, John Green, "Whizzer" White, Frank Sinkwich and "Camp" Wilson. The team was sold eight years later to a group of local businessmen under the leadership of Edwin J. Anderson. The Detroit syndicate controlled the club until 1964 when William Clay Ford became sole owner for a price of \$4.5 million.

The Lions dominated the NFL in the 1950s with four division titles and three League championships. Under Head Coach Buddy Parker, the team won back-to-back world crowns in 1952 and 1953, defeating Cleveland in both title games. Stars of those glittering teams were Hall of Famers Bobby Layne, Jack Christiansen and Doak Walker, and Les Bingaman, Cloyce Box, Leon Hart and Bob Hoernschemeyer. The Detroit-Cleveland battles of the era were classic confrontations between two giants of the blossoming NFL.

Since their last title in 1957 under the coaching of George Wilson, the Lions have been looking in vain for the top spot. Such recent performers as Joe Schmidt, Yale Lary, Dick "Night Train" Lane, John Henry Johnson and Lem Barney have been elected to the Hall of Fame. Outstanding players like Wayne Walker, Mike Lucci, Nick Pietrosante, Roger Brown, Terry Barr, Mel Farr, Charlie Sanders, Dexter Bussey, Billy Sims and Doug English have taken their places in the annals of pro football in Detroit.

In 1967, Schmidt began the first of six seasons as head coach of the Lions. His 1970 team made the post-season playoffs, but lost in the first round to Dallas by the baseball-like score of 5-0.

Just prior to the '75 season, the Lions moved into a new, domed stadium in Pontiac, Michigan, a town of 85,000 people located 30 miles north of Detroit. The Silverdome is the world's largest air-supported domed structure and seats over 80,000 spectators under a fiberglass roof.

Under Monte Clark's direction, the Lions narrowly missed playoff berths in both 1980 and 1981, before finally qualifying in 1982 — the first time the Lions made the playoffs since 1970. Detroit captured the NFC Central Division crown in 1983, but stumbled in the playoffs with a 24-23 loss to San Francisco.

Darryl Rogers took over the Lions' command in 1985 but was replaced on an interim basis by Defensive Coordinator Wayne Fontes in November, 1988. Fontes officially was named the 17th head coach of the Detroit Lions on December 22, 1988.

Thanksgiving Day Series

Dating to 1934, the Detroit Lions have been a proud part of the American celebration of Thanksgiving. In all, 52 Thanksgiving games have been played. The Lions have won the last three, defeating the Cleveland Browns 13-10 in the Golden Anniversary game in 1989, the Denver Broncos 40-27 in 1990 and the Chicago Bears 16-6 last year. The game was the brainchild of G.A. Richards, the first owner of the Detroit Lions. Richards had purchased the team in 1934 and moved the Lions from Portsmouth, Ohio to the Motor City. At that time, Thanksgiving Day football was a tradition in the Midwest on the high school and college levels, but unheard of on the professional level. In fact, professional football played on any day back then was a risky proposition. The Lions were the new kids in town and had taken a backseat to the baseball Tigers. Despite the fact the Lions had lost just one game prior to the Thanksgiving Day in '34, the largest crowd that season had been just 15,000.

The opponent for the first Thanksgiving Day game - on Nov. 29, 1934 - was the undefeated, defending World Champion Chicago Bears of George Halas and the reigning star of that era, fullback Bronco Nagurski. The game would determine the champion of the Western Division. Richards had convinced the NBC Radio Network to carry the game coast-to-coast (94 stations), and additionally, an estimated 26,000 fans jammed into the University of Detroit Stadium while thousands of disappointed fans were turned away.

The Bears won the inaugural game, 19-16, but a classic was born. Since 1934, 51 Thanksgiving Day games have been played with Detroit leading the series at 26-24-2.

The Pontiac Silverdome

The Pontiac Silverdome has been "Home Sweet Home" for the Detroit Lions since the last brick was put in place in 1975. During the past 17 years, the building has earned a reputation as one of the finest sports facilities in the world. Not even a freak, late-winter snowstorm on March 4, 1985, which caused extensive structural damage to the roof, could keep the Silverdome from maintaining its enviable stature in the sports world. A new canvas and steel-girder reinforced roof was added between March and June of 1985.

The Silverdome has the second largest seating capacity (at 80,494) among NFL stadiums - second only to the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum (92,488). The air-supported and cable-restrained facility is the largest of its kind in the world and is the first successful example of a fiberglass fabric roof system.

Since a 27-24 pre-season game victory over the Kansas City Chiefs on Aug. 23, 1975, the Lions have played 165 games in the Silverdome after moving from their former home at Tiger Stadium in downtown Detroit. The Dallas Cowboys defeated the Lions, 36-10, in the first regular-season game in the building, Oct. 6, 1975. The Lions have posted a 85-71-2 overall record in Pontiac, including a 71-59-1 mark in regular season games (a .542 winning percentage). On January 5, 1992, the Lions defeated the Dallas Cowboys 38-6 in the first playoff game held at the Silverdome. The victory also capped an undefeated home season for the Lions as they finished a perfect 9-0 in games played in the Silverdome.

Though the Silverdome is the Lions' home, the Cincinnati Bengals and the San Francisco 49ers made NFL history in the building. On Jan. 24, 1982, the 49ers defeated the Bengals, 26-21, before a crowd of 81,270 in Super Bowl XVI - the first Super Bowl ever played in a northern U.S. city. The Silverdome was built at a cost of \$55.7 million. It was occupied in just 23 months, on time and within budget, from its ground breaking on Sept. 19, 1973. During the roof's reconstruction in 1985, the Teflon-coated fiberglass panels (100 in all) that span the roof were completely replaced, and several structural modifications and safety improvements also were accomplished. SILVERDOME PRESS BOX

The working area for writers, broadcasters and overhead photographers is located on the Club Level between the south and west corners of the stadium. The facility can accommodate more than 150 media representatives in the upper press area and contains 15 booths in the lower area for radio, television, photographers, public address and scoreboard operations.

CREDENTIALS

All applications must be made in writing through Mike Murray, Media Relations Coordinator. Credentials are available to working members of the media only. Advance notification of requests is appreciated. Season credentials will be issued to appropriate outlets. Since no Press Will Call window is available due to the need for a parking pass to gain press lot access, most credentials and parking passes are mailed. Please allow AT LEAST three days for mail delivery. Credentials can be left at a local hotel for pickup on game day. That hotel is the Hilton Suites (313-334-2222), which is located on Featherstone Road, approximately one-quarter mile east of the Silverdome. The front desk is used as a credential pickup when requests are made too late to guarantee mail delivery.

PARKING

A parking pass is required to enter the press parking area, located on the southwest side of the Silverdome. Enter Gate 1 from Opdyke Road and proceed to the press parking area adjacent to the press Box. Press parking is not automatically issued to every credentialed member of the media covering the game because of an insufficient number of parking passes and spaces.

SERVICES

Statistical information is distributed before, during and after the game. Spotters and statisticians are available to radio and TV crews upon advance request. Food and beverages for the working media are available in the Press Lounge. Your game credential entitles you to the buffet meal that is served prior to the game.

Head Coach Wayne Fontes will hold his regular Monday luncheon/press conference at noon in the Silverdome. The Lions' locker room is open for player interviews between the hours of 12:00 (Noon) - 12:55 p.m. on non-game days. The Lions' Public Relations staff is here to help.
