## HEAD COACH — E. L. (CURLY) LAMBEAU

The only National Football league coach with 25 successive seasons as head mentor of the same team, plus an additional two years when the team played independent football, Coach "Curly" Lambeau is a former member of the Packers and a member of the charter organization, which through 27 seasons has given Green Bay fame as "The Little Town That Leads Them."

Possessed by a driving determination to keep the Packers at the top of the professional football heap, Lambeau has been the key figure in the Green Bay eleven's successful drives to six national championships (1929, 1930, 1931, 1936, 1938, and 1944) and a Western division title (1938). A thorough student of the game, Lambeau's ideas on defense and offense are often several years ahead of those of other coaches. Because of this, the Packers have managed to stay in a league composed of cities ten and more times its size.

A native of Green Bay, the Packer coach gained fame as a high school player at Green Bay East. He later attended Notre Dame, where he played under Knute Rockne. Lambeau has often described his experience under the immortal Notre Dame coach as "the most valuable of my life. He taught me things that will continue to help me as long as I coach football."

Returning to Green Bay, Lambeau organized an independent team in 1919, backed at first by the now defunct Acme Packing Company. In return for the company's aid to the team, Lambeau agreed to have the word "Packers" emblazoned on their uniforms, hence the nickname "Packers" has been applied to the team to this day. After playing two years of independent ball (1919 and 1920) the team received a franchise in the National Football League, then called the American Professional Football Association.

"Curly" played with and coached the Packers through the 1928 season, scoring 109 points. He was a forward pass specialist, which accounts for the great use of this offensive weapon by Packer teams of today. Besides being head coach, he is general manager and vice-president of the Green Bay Packers, Inc.

## BACKFIELD COACH — DON HUTSON

Little introduction is needed to Assistant Coach Don Hutson, No. 14 of the Green Bay Packers, who has thrown terror into opponents' pass defenders for eleven seasons in the National Football League. Long ago recognized as the greatest pass snatcher and scorer in pro football history, Hutson has "retired" for the last three or four years. Because of wartime shortages of material, however, he has always come back for "another season" and, in playing, has added to almost a score of all-time league records he holds.

In 1944, Hutson was named by Coach "Curly" Lambeau as assistant coach. Thus, he has operated two seasons in a dual capacity of coach and

player, both successfully. He joined the Packers in 1935 after a brilliant career at Alabama, where he was named to most of the nation's All-American teams. In his first game as a Packer, he snared a long pass from Arnie Herber to score a touchdown that whipped the Chicago Bears. He has been adding to his laurels ever since.

Slender for the pro sport, Hutson won the league's individual scoring record five consecutive seasons (1940-1944). He is the only player ever to receive the league's most valuable player award two years in succession. He was a unanimous choice for all-league end six straight years and in 1942 won fifth place in the Associated Press poll to determine the outstanding male athlete of the year. In 1945, he scored 10 touchdowns, 2 field goals and 31 points after touchdown for 97 points to boost his all-time scoring total to 825 points. He scored 105 touchdowns, 55 more than the second highest mark in league history. Against Detroit in 1945, he scored 4 touchdowns, 4 extra points and a field goal for 31 points, second best one-game total in the league's history.

In the off season, Hutson operates one of Wisconsin's finest bowling establishments. Last spring he was also granted a franchise as northern Wisconsin and Upper-Michigan distributor for a nationally known automobile.

## LINE COACH — WALTER KIESLING

The 1946 season marks the 21st consecutive year that Line Coach Walter Kiesling has been in the National Football League, a record matched by few others in the major professional football circuit. Walt, who signed a two-year contract to coach the Packers' line after his first year in Green Bay as a coach in 1945, entered the pro league's ranks in 1926 after his graduation from St. Thomas college in St. Paul.

Walt, a genial and capable mentor, played in the 1926 and 1927 seasons with the Duluth Eskimos under Ernie Nevers. In 1928, he joined the Pottsville eleven and then played five years with the Chicago Cardinals (1929-1933). He was named all-league guard on the official team in 1932. Kiesling played with the Chicago Bears in 1934 and in 1935 and 1936 he toiled with the Packers.

In 1937, Kiesling went to Pittsburgh in a coaching capacity. He was assistant coach two years under Johnny Blood, head coach four seasons and co-head coach when the Steelers merged with Philadelphia and then with the Chicago Cardinals. He was signed by the Packers after the 1944 season.

Walt ranks as one of the best linemen ever to play the guard spot in the post-graduate game. He is an expert on defensive tactics. Last year he molded a solid forward wall although faced with several handicaps, including the loss of the entire right side of the Green Bay line of 1944, a championship year. During 1945, the line opened the way for 21 Packer touchdowns running, second best mark in the circuit and only one less than the 22 which won Philadelphia the top spot in that department last season.
