EARL L. (CURLY) LAMBEAU — Head Coach

Dean of National Football league coaches, Curly Lambeau, a former star of the team and a member of the charter organization, is in his 29th consecutive year as head coach of the Green Bay Packers.

A native of Green Bay, Lambeau was born on April 9, 1898, and first came into football prominence as a halfback on the East High school team. He later attended Notre Dame, where he was fullback on Knute Rockne's first team in 1918, playing with George Gipp.

Returning to Green Bay after one year at Notre Dame, he organized an independent team in 1919, backed at first by the now defunct Acme Packing Company. In return for the company's aid, Lambeau agreed to have "Packers" emblazoned on the team's uniforms. The name remained after the packing company quit.

Following two years of independent ball (1919 and 1920), the team was granted a franchise in the National Football League, then called the American Professional Football Association.

Lambeau played with and coached the Packers through the 1928 season, scoring 109 points. He has a forward pass specialists and in later years was to become known as the foremost authority on forward pass offense and defense in football.

As head coach, vice-president and general manager, he has been the key figure in Green Bay's successful drives to six world championships (1929, 1930, 1931, 1936, 1939 and 1944). His Packers are the only team to win three consecutive world championships. They also won a western division title in 1938.

Under Lambeau, the Packers have won 225 games, while losing only 87 and tying 22, not counting exhibitions, in a span of 28 consecutive seasons, giving them an average of .721. They have scored 5,901 points to 2,822 for the opposition. One of the most colorful coaches in football, Lambeau's teams contributed a major share to the success of professional football. In 1945 the Packers played to more than half a million, setting a record for professional attendance.

DON HUTSON — End Coach

Don Hutson is in his second season as a full-time coach, after having served in 1944 and 1945 as a player-coach. Hutson came to Green Bay in 1935 after a brilliant career at the University of Alabama. His first play in major league football was an 87-yard pass for a touchdown in which he combined with Arnie Herber to defeat the Chicago Bears, 7 to 0.

Spindly, but fast, and with the surest pair of hands in the game, Hutson went on from there to nineteen records, more than any other man in the history of the game. Universally recognized as the greatest stylist in the annals of the sport, he was named All-League end six times, won the league's most valuable player award twice and in 1942 he was the first football player in a nation-wide Associated Press poll to name the outstanding male athlete of the year. He finished fifth in the poll.

He caught touchdown passes from four inches to 87 yards in length and performed other feats which built up into the most unusual success story in professional football. Against Detroit in 1945 he scored four touchdowns in one quarter, which with four extra points and a field goal gave him 31 points, the second best single game total in league history.

Among his records are 489 passes caught for 101 touchdowns and 8,010 yards. He leads all players in scoring with 825 points in his eleven years of play and his total touchdowns scored is 105, also an all-time record. He scored one or more points in 41 consecutive league games, kicked 174 extra points and for five consecutive seasons was the league's leading scorer and leading receiver.

In the off-season, he operates one of Wisconsin's outstanding bowling alleys and cocktail lounges and an automobile distributorship. He was born in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, on January 31, 1913, but now makes his home in Green Bay.

WALTER KIESLING — Line Coach

Walter Kiesling has been in the National League only five years less than head coach Curly Lambeau. Starting out with the Duluth Eskimos in 1926, after his graduation from St. Thomas college in St. Paul, Kiesling now is in his 22d consecutive season in the major league.

Following two seasons with the Eskimos under Ernie Nevers, Kiesling joined Pottsville in 1928 and then played five years with the

Chicago Cardinals (1929 to 1933). He was named all-league guard in 1932. From the Cardinals, he went to the Chicago Bears in 1934 and 1935 and the following season, he joined the Packers.

He remained with the Packers only one season. In 1937 he went to Pittsburgh to become assistant coach to Johnny Blood. When Blood left Pittsburgh in 1939, Kiesling took over the Steelers for four seasons as head coach. His 1942 team, led by Bill Dudley, very nearly won the eastern division championship. In 1943 he served as co-coach of the Phil-Pitt combine and the following season, when the Cardinals and Pittsburgh merged, he again was co-coach. He was signed by the Packers immediately after the 1944 season.

Kiesling makes his home in St. Paul, a place for which he grew so homesick in his freshman year that he refused to stay at Notre Dame, where he had gone at the suggestion of Joe Brandy, a former Notre Dame quarterback star.

BO MOLEND — Backfield Coach

Bo Modenda, fullback star on Green Bay's first three world championship teams and coach of the powerful San Diego Naval Base service eleven during the war, was added to Curly Lambeau's staff as backfield assistant this year.

Varsity fullback on Michigan's Big Ten championship teams in 1925 and 1926, Molenda broke into professional football in 1927 as a member of Red Grange's New York Yankees. When the Yankee bubble burst in mid-season of 1928, Molenda joined the Packers.

He remained with Green Bay through the 1931 season, when he was sold to the New York Giants, for whom he played until he was named assistant to coach Steve Owen in 1936. In the off-season he was a baseball umpire in the American Association and the International league.

Leaving the Giants in 1941 to become end coach at Lafayette, he enlisted in the navy as a chief petty officer early in 1942 and was discharged a full lieutenant after 45 months service, during which he participated in the Hollandia and Leyte invasions in the Pacific.

He was born in Oglesby, Illinois, on February 20, 1905; and at present makes his home in Manhattan Beach, Calif.
