

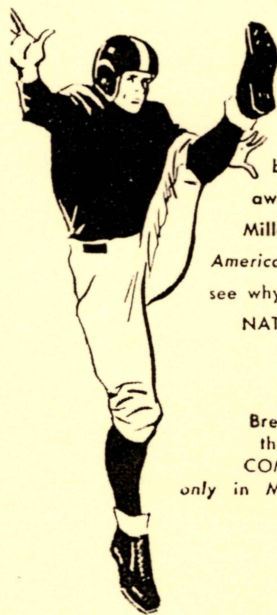

THE NEW GREEN BAY PACKERS

THE YEAR 1950 marks an entirely new chapter in the long and colorful history of the Green Bay Packers.

This year, their thirty-second in professional football, the Packers go into the National Football League campaign with an entirely new coaching staff, a big majority of new ball players on the roster, some 1,500 new stockholders in the community corporation and a new spirit of rebirth among all members of the Packer family.

Once again the Packers struggled up off the canvas early this year. It wasn't the first time Packer fortunes had been down. After all the Packers are one of the two clubs still operating under the same set-up which originally made up the National Football League. This record merely proves that the Packers have successfully weathered storms where other clubs have hit the rocks.

Just as they have in the past, the great number of loyal Packer fans not only in Green Bay but throughout Wisconsin and Upper-Michigan again rallied to the Packer cause. That is the secret of their strength. That is the answer to the question: How can Green Bay stay in the league.

On Feb. 1, 1950, Earl L. (Curly) Lambeau announced he was leaving the Packer head coaching position after 31 years in the same job. The Packers had just experienced two of their worst seasons on the gridiron as far as won and lost percentages go. They had gone through four years of pro football war. Their fortunes were down; but they still had their thousands of loyal fans.

Last Thanksgiving Day these fans contributed \$50,000 to help meet the 1949 deficit. And this spring they have come through with another \$125,000 to purchase non-profit sharing stock in the Packer corporation. The 1950 season ticket sale went over at a near-record clip.

And out on the football field, Coach Gene Ronzani, another native son of Packerland, from Iron Mountain, Mich., is starting again to build Packer football fortunes with a whole galaxy of new stars. He has the able assistance of three former associates with the Chicago Bears, John (Tarz) Taylor, Dick Plasman and Ray Nolting, plus the sage advice of one of the game's all-time great strategists, Clark Shaughnessy.

Applications for purchases of stock came in from Packer fans in every one of the 48 states. In their recent troubles the Packers really found out how many friends they have.

And every time the team steps out on the field this fall, whether at home in Green Bay or Milwaukee or in the major cities all across the nation, there will be thousands in the stands rooting for the "Little City That Leads 'Em."

Coach Ronzani doesn't promise them any miracles. "I'm no miracle man," he keeps telling them over and over. He knows he has a tough rebuilding problem confronting him. But he has promised to put a team on the field with the old Packer spirit. And there are those among Packer fans that think he might surprise a few of the skeptics around the league.

GENE RONZANI — Head Coach

Gene Ronzani, starting his first year as a head coach for one of the National Football League's oldest teams, is a native of Packerland. He was born in Iron Mountain, Mich., 100 scant miles north of Green Bay, and went from stardom in high school there to Marquette University. A nine-letter man at the Milwaukee school, Ronzani, immediately after his graduation, went with the Chicago Bears.

Chosen to become head coach of the Packers Feb. 6, 1950, Ronzani previously had 16 years of playing and coaching with the Chicago team. He joined the Bears in 1933. As a halfback, he was a member of three championship teams, teaming with Bronko Nagurski, Beattie Feathers and Carl Brumbaugh to form one of professional football's greatest backfields.

Ronzani switched from halfback to quarterback in 1937. In this position he had adequate opportunity to learn the intricacies of the T-formation from almost the very start of this explosive offensive weapon. In 1939, Ronzani was appointed head coach of the Newark Bears, a Chicago farm club. The team won its league title in 1940. In 1943, Ronzani returned to the Bears as an active player and helped direct the offense while Sid Luckman was on coast guard duty.

Ronzani was named head coach of the Akron, Ohio, Bear farm team in 1946. A year later, in 1947, he started his coaching career with the parent organization as backfield assistant and quarterback coach. The Bears' boss, George Halas, described Ronzani as one of the "best young coaching prospects" in the business.

Ronzani is of Italian descent. He is 41 years old and single. He was born in Iron Mountain on March 28, 1909.

CLARK SHAUGHNESSY — Assistant Coach

Clark Shaughnessy, one of the oldest coaches in the country in years of active service, entered his 35th year as a football tutor when he joined the Packers as an assistant coach.

Shaughnessy was born March 6, 1896, in St. Cloud, Minn. He played fullback for the University of Minnesota in 1911, 1912, and 1913. He opened his long coaching career at Tulane University in 1915 and remained at the New Orleans school through the 1926 season. In 1925, Tulane was recognized as national champion.

In 1927, Shaughnessy moved over to Loyola of the South in New Orleans. Six years later, he was named head coach at the University of Chicago, when that school was still a member of the Big Ten. While in Chicago, Shaughnessy started to work with George Halas of the Bears, starting in 1936 and ending in 1940, when he went to Stanford. His success there was phenomenal. In his first year, the Stanford team was undefeated and untied and won the Rose Bowl game over Nebraska.

Shaughnessy moved to Maryland in 1942 and after one year became head coach at Pittsburgh, where he remained through the 1945 season. In 1944, he became an advisory coach with the Washington

Redskins, a job which he held until joining the Los Angeles Rams in a similar capacity in 1948. After two games, he was named Ram head coach. In 1949, the Rams won the National Football League Western division championship.

JOHN L. (Tarzan) TAYLOR — Line Coach

John L. (Tarzan) Taylor, a veteran of 33 years in football, is in his first season as line coach of the Packers.

Taylor has been in football all his life. Born in Superior, Wis., he played guard and tackle at Central High School in Duluth, Minn., and then went to Ohio State University, where he graduated in 1920.

After his college days, Taylor moved into professional football, starting in 1921. He played a season under George Halas with the Decatur Staleys. He followed Halas to Chicago when the Staleys became the Bears. In 1923, he closed his pro career with the Canton Bulldogs.

Taylor went into college line coaching in 1924 at Michigan State, where he remained three years. He then spent one year at Ohio University and two years at Ohio State. He went to Marquette in 1929 and remained through the 1942 season. At Marquette, he began a long friendship with Packer Head Coach, Gene Ronzani. After leaving Marquette he worked for a Milwaukee corporation and wrote a syndicated column on sports.

He returned to coaching in 1947 with the Baltimore team of the All-American conference.

RAY NOLTING — Backfield Coach

Ray Nolting, who played with Head Coach Gene Ronzani on the Chicago Bears, is in his first season as backfield coach with the Packers.

A native of Cincinnati, he graduated from the university there in 1936. During the following nine years with the Bears he participated in the winning of five National Football League divisional crowns and three world championships.

He went back to Cincinnati as head coach at his alma mater, where he served for four years. He left college football to go back into the pro game in 1949 as backfield coach with the New York Bulldogs.

DICK PLASMAN — End Coach

Dick Plasman, a former teammate of Head Coach Gene Ronzani, is making his debut as a Packer coaching aid this season.

Plasman attended Vanderbilt University, where he graduated in 1937. He played with the Chicago Bears from 1937 through 1941. He entered the United States Navy following the 1941 season. When he returned from service he joined the Chicago Cardinals, where he was a player-coach in 1946 and 1947.

During the last two seasons (1948-1949) he devoted full time to coaching with the Cards. His home is in Coral Gables, Fla.

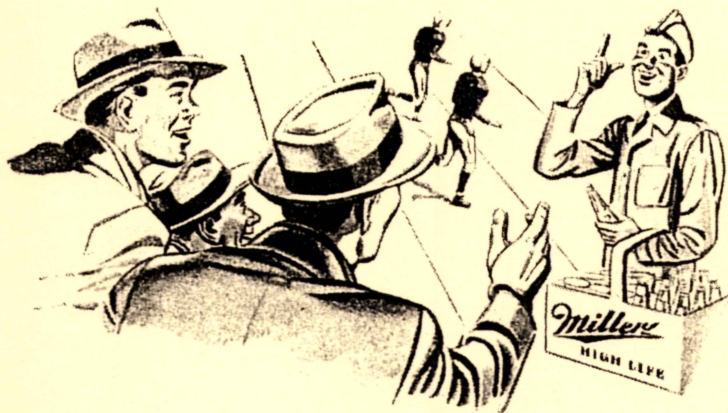
