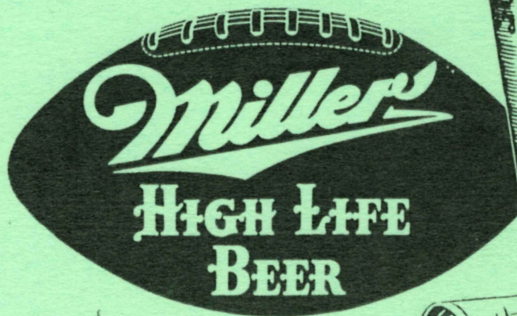

REVIEWING PACKER HISTORY

FOUNDING — The Packers started out in 1919 as a “scrub” team of former Green Bay High School stars organized by Earl L. (Curly) Lambeau, who had played at Notre Dame. A war time plant, The Indian Packing Company, agreed to give Curly \$500 for uniforms if they called their team the Packers. The Packing company folded up after World War I but the Packers are now in their 34th season of professional football.

EARLY DAYS — That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other city teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fence or bleachers, and interested fans “passed the hat.” But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight, and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited. This was the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained some other backers, bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out, but the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundreth of an inch short of that required in the policy. Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A. B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be “greats.” And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in 1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein, and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 to 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD — Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict. And the insurance company went busted. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold up when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital, reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. And from his first game on, he became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. On his first play in professional ball against the Chicago Bears, he took a pass from Arnie Herber and went 94 yards for the only score of the game. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI TAKES OVER — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline, which with the disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. And in the midst of it Lambeau went to the Chicago Cardinals as head coach. Then began the reorganization and rebuilding which Green Bay fans think is going to carry the Packers back to the top of the heap under their new coach, Gene Ronzani. Over \$100,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state, new blood came into the Packer corporation and Ronzani started rebuilding the team itself. The Packers the past two seasons played the spirited type of ball the fans wanted, and they were also successful at the gate. Now those fans are looking forward to 1952 to see the rebuilding program take shape and place the Packers back in the position of constant contenders in the National Football League.

GENE RONZANI — Head Coach

Gene Ronzani, starting his third year as head coach for one of the National Football League's oldest teams, is a native of Packerland. He was born in Iron Mountain, Mich., 100 scant miles north of Green Bay, and went from stardom in high school there to Marquette University. A nine-letter man at the Milwaukee school, Ronzani, immediately after his graduation, went with the Chicago Bears.

Chosen to become head coach of the Packers Feb. 6, 1950, Ronzani previously had 16 years of playing and coaching with the Chicago team. He joined the Bears in 1933. As a halfback, he was a member of three championship teams, teaming with Bronko Nagurski, Beattie Feathers and Carl Brumbaugh to form one of professional football's greatest backfields.

Ronzani switched from halfback to quarterback in 1937. In this position he had adequate opportunity to learn the intricacies of the T-formation from almost the very start of this explosive offensive weapon. In 1939, Ronzani was appointed head coach of the Newark Bears, a Chicago farm club. The team won its league title in 1940. In 1943, Ronzani returned to the Bears as an active player and helped direct the offense while Sid Luckman was on coast guard duty.

Ronzani was named head coach of the Akron, Ohio, Bear farm team in 1946. A year later, in 1947, he started his coaching career with the parent organization as backfield assistant and quarterback coach. The Bears' boss, George Halas, described Ronzani as one of the "best coaching prospects" in the business.

Ronzani is of Italian descent. He is 43 years old and single. He was born in Iron Mountain on March 28, 1909.

RICHARD PLASMAN — Assistant Coach

Also starting his third season as assistant coach of the Green Bay Packers. Dick is a veteran of pro ball having joined the Chicago Bears in 1937 after receiving All-American honors at Vanderbilt University.

He played with the Bears from 1937 thru 1941 when he was called into service. At the time was considered one of pro football's great ends. Following his discharge from the Navy he joined the Cardinals as player-coach in 1946. Dick coached the Cardinals during their great regime and joined the Packer staff in 1950.

Dick was born in Arizona but now has established residence in Coral Gables, Florida. He is married and the father of two daughters.

JOHN L. "Tarzan" TAYLOR — Asst. Coach

The veteran of 35 years in football, returns to his third year as line coach for the Packers.

Taylor entered college coaching in 1924 at Michigan State, where he remained for 3 years. He coached at Ohio University and then returned to his Alma Mater, Ohio State, for two years of coaching. Joined the Marquette University coaching staff in 1929 where he remained thru the 1942 season. Took up coaching again in 1947. At Marquette he began a long friendship with Packers Head Coach Gene Ronzani. John L. is single and resides in Green Bay the year around.

Tarz Taylor was born at Superior, Wisconsin, playing guard and tackle on Central High School in Duluth, Minn., and then attended Ohio State University, where he graduated in 1920.

Tarz played with the Decatur Staleys in 1921 under George Halas and came to Chicago with Halas when the Bears were organized. He played the 1923 season with the powerful Canton Bulldogs, one of the great pro teams of the early era.

RAY "Scooter" McLEAN — Asst. Coach

Ray McLean, a former team-mate of Head Coach Gene Ronzani on the Chicago Bears, is in his second year as backfield coach of the Packers.

McLean played his College Football at St. Anselms, Manchester, New Hampshire, where he was a football standout, also competing in track, hockey and baseball.

The "Scooter," one of footballs fastest halfbacks, played 8 seasons with the Chicago Bears. Being a member of 4 championship teams. A dargerous runner and a great pass receiver during his entire pro career.

He was Head Coach at Lewis College, Lockport, Illinois, for the past three years. Born in Lowell, Mass., December 6, 1915, of Scotch-Irish ancestry. Married, Residence: Green Bay, Wis.

CHUCK DRULIS — Assistant Coach

Drulis joined the Packers in 1950 and the following year was added to Coach Ronzani's staff as line coach. He gained All-Eastern honors during the early forties as a member of the powerful Temple University eleven before joining the Chicago Bears. Chosen All-Pro guard in 1947 and 1948.

Starting his second season as an assistant to Coach Ronzani, Chuck is considered one of the best young coaches in the business. Has an excellent knowledge of the "T" formation and possesses keen ability to diagnose opposition weaknesses.

During the off season he resides in Chicago with his wife and two children. In used car business with Ray Bray, a former team-mate.

JACK VAINISI — SCOUT

Vainisi joined the Packer staff in 1950 as a game and talent scout. Jack played his college football at Notre Dame, graduating from that institution in 1950. An illness, received while in service, cut short a promising professional football career.

With the prominence of Talent Scouting now displayed in professional football, Jack's position has taken on added responsibilities. He is employed on a year-around basis. He has made football a study and enjoys a wide acquaintance throughout the country with former players and coaches. Married, Residence: Green Bay, Wis.

FREDERICK C. MILLER — Honorary Coach

President of the Miller Brewing Co. in Milwaukee. A member of the Green Bay Packers' directorate. Miller, was captain of the 1928 Notre Dame grid machine and was chosen All-American tackle that season. He has continued to be an All-American in his support of athletics in the State and Nation. He finds time from his busy schedule to meet with Packer personnel lending his business and football experience in an advisory capacity.

Mr. Miller is chairman of the Packers' Milwaukee directors, composed of C. Kohlhepp, President of Wisconsin Public Service; Joe Krueger, Milwaukee City Treasurer; Frank Birch, Advertising; Herbert Mount, Attorney; Don Hutson, Automotive, Racine, Wisconsin.

ANTHONY (Tony) CANADEO**Halfback — Gonzaga University — Spokane, Washington****Height 5' 11", Weight 190. Born in Chicago, Illinois, May 5, 1920**
