BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually, the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curley Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

First they talked Curly's employers at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the teams' jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

EARLY DAYS — That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fence or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight, and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited. This was the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy. Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A. B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in 1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red

Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 to 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD — Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict, and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. On his first play in professional ball against the Chicago Bears, he took a pass from Arnie Herber and went 94 yards for the only score of the game. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER — The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and business man, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the re-building plans and Lisle W. Blackbourn, a native Wisconsinite, and Coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP — Likeable Ray "Scooter" McLean moves up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his first season as head coach.

FROM SANDLOT TO STADIUM — Procedures at Packers games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no police, no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system —

the latter hadn't been invented yet. There weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their career in 1919 they played on approximately the same site as now abandoned City Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called, was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics for the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectators' halftime suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built—just a small bleacher with a capacity of a couple hundred—on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.



When Hagemeister Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides between the 30-yard lines. A wooden railing surrounded the rest of the gridiron, along which the Knothole Gang stood or sat on the ground.

Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

One of the first tasks of the stadium builders was the creation of a good playing field, a job admirably done. Whatever antiquated City Stadium may have lacked, one of the best turfs in the country wasn't one of them.

After World War II City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home.

September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of nearly 35,000 was dedicated. They served notice on the football world that they intend to support and keep their "Packers" in Green Bay for as far as men can see into the future.

The Packer's have solidified their future in the National Football League by hiring a dedicated football man in alert and imaginative Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager. Lombardi was signed to a five year contract after a wide spread search for the right man to place in complete charge.

In his first year Lombardi led Green Bay from it's worst record in 40 years to it's best finish since 1944 when the Packers won the last of six world's championships. He was very nearly a unanimous choice as coach of the year in his first season as Packer Head Coach.

In just two short years Lombardi led the Packers to an 8-4 record and the Western Division Title.

VINCE LOMBARDI

Head Coach and General Manager



VINCE LOMBARDI — Head Coach

Vince Lombardi was born in Brooklyn on June 11, 1913 and played full-back at St. Francis Prep. He later was a regular guard in Fordham's line known as the "seven blocks of granite" winning three straight football letters. He was graduated from Fordham in 1937 and continued school working toward his law degree.

He worked his way through law school at Fordham by coaching at St. Cecelia High School in Englewood, New Jersey.

Great success there with the T-Formation gave him national recognition — not to mention a string of 36 wins that spelled the end of his law plans.

In 1947 he installed the T-Formation for the freshmen at Fordham under Ed Danowski and the following year coached the varsity offense.

Lombardi then began a five year career at Army in 1949, working in Army's T-attack. Army had an unbeaten season in Lombardi's first year.

He took the big jump to the pros in 1954 as the offense coach of the New York Giants.

The story of Lombardi and the Packers is now well known, how he picked up the pieces of a team which had only won one game, tied one and lost 10 in 1958 and steered it to seven victories against five defeats.

The turnaround was remarkable — from Green Bay's worst record in 40 seasons to its best finish since 1944, when the Packers won the last of their six league championships.

For bringing the little town of Green Bay back into a contender in the pro league, Lombardi was very nearly a unanimous choice as "Coach of the Year". He and his players won many awards after the 1959 season. . . Green Bay's football famine ended this past season when Lombardi led the Packers to the Western Division Title.

PHIL BENGTSON — Coach of Defense



Phil Bengtson has built some of the toughest lines in the NFL during his eight seasons with the 49'ers.

A native of St. Paul, Phil was an All-American tackle at the University of Minnesota in 1933-34 when the Golden Gophers were the scourge of the collegiate football world. After climaxing his playing career in the Shrine East-West game, he joined the staff of Don Faurot at the University of Missouri.

Phil came west in 1940 with Clark Shaughnessy and had an important role in the development of the famed "Cinderella" team that captured the Pacific Coast Conference title and trounced Nebraska in the Rose Bowl.

He spent four years in the Navy during World War II, returning to Stanford in 1946 as chief aid to Marchy Schwartz.

Phil became a member of the 49'er staff under Buck Shaw in 1951.

Bengtson, in his first season, brought the Packers from the worst team defensively in 1958 to the highly respected third position. Last season Green Bay's defense tied the New York Giants for the lowest yards gained per try rushing with a 3.2 — Best in the NFL.

BILL AUSTIN — Offensive Line Coach



Bill Austin, the youngest member of a young staff, graduated from Oregon State College in 1949 after playing tackle four years for the Beavers. He was a starter in the East-West Shrine Game of 1949 and also played in the Hula Bowl. In 1949 Bill played regular tackle with the New York Giants even though he was only twenty years of age.

At the very height of his career, he was called into service and stationed in Japan where he was Head Coach of the Far East champs at Camp Drake, Tokyo.

Austin rejoined the Giants in 1953. At the end of the 1954 season he was selected to play in the Pro-Bowl Game and in 1955 was named on the All-Pro eleven. Bill was selected for the Hula Bowl Game for the second time after a very fine year with the World Champion Giants in 1956.

Austin was line coach at Wichita University in 1958.

Green Bay's line under Austin became one of the most respected in the NFL toward the latter part of the '59 season. The 1960 Packer line was considered one of the finest in professional football.

NORB HECKER — Defensive Backfield Coach



Norb Hecker in his playing days was one of the National Football League's finest defensive half-backs when playing with the Los Angeles Rams and the Washington Redskins.

A native of Olmstead Falls, Ohio, Norb was a former Baldwin-Wallace College Little All-American in 1950. He was captain of the Baldwin-Wallace football team and also participated in baseball, basketball and track.

At the end of his brilliant college career, Norb was selected in the sixth round by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played regular defensive halfback for the Rams for three years.

Norb was traded to the Redskins in 1954 but decided to play with Toronto of the Canadian League. He signed with the Redskins in 1955 where he had three great years as a defensive safety, an offensive end and a kickoff return specialist until a serious knee injury cut short his career.

In 1958 Hecker returned to Canada to become a player-coach for the Hamilton Tiger Cats with Jim Trimble.

Hecker played in 86 consecutive games and intercepted 28 passes in his six seasons in the NFL.

The defensive backfield, under Hecker's guidance, allowed less than 150 yards completed per game. This was good for the number two spot in the standings in 1959. Last years defensive unit came up with many timely interceptions to break up enemy drives.

JOHN "Red" COCHRAN — Backfield Coach



Red is in his fifth year of coaching in the National Football League having been the backfield coach of the Detroit Lions for three seasons before joining Vince Lombardi at Green Bay. As the backfield coach he is responsible for the offensive unit and works the press box phones with Hecker.

Cochran played professional ball with the Chicago Cardinals from 1947 through 1950 then accepted the backfield coaching spot at his alma mater, Wake Forest, from 1951 through 1955.

Cochran was a star athlete for Wake Forest in 1940, 1941 and 1946 and at the time of graduation could have chosen pro football or baseball.

Red's fiery enthusiasm rubs off on his players. The 1960 team was top in the NFL in most first downs with 237.

Height 6'1", Weight 200, Born in Philadelphia on June 8, 1939

First year in Pro ball...Packers first draft choice for 1961 season...Three year starter at Michigan State and a 1960 Tri-Captain...An All Big Ten selection...Played in the East-West Shrine game, and the Hula Bowl, the All American Bowl and the All Star game...Runs the 100 in 9.8...Gained 290 yards on 68 carries in 1960 and 419 yards on 93 carries in 1959... Residence: Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

TOM BETTIS Linebacker — Purdue University

Height 6'2", Weight 235, Born in Chicago, Illinois on March 17, 1933

Seventh year in pro ball...Packers first draft choice in '53...Ironman guard at Purdue... Named Boilermakers' most valuable two straight years...Purdue captain in 1952-53... Named to Look and INS All-American...Played in East-West and North-South Bowls... Nicknamed Buddha...Owns own home in Green Bay...Wife Val former collegiate swimming champ...Two children, Lisa 4; Karen 3.

LEW CARPENTER Halfback — University of Arkansas

Height 6'2", Weight 210, Born in West Memphis, Arkansas on January 12, 1933

Sixth year in pro ball...Lions 8th choice in '53...Used little that year but gained 99 yards in 1954 All Star game, then led Lions in rushing in '54 and '55...Scored TD first time he touched a ball in pro football, intercepting a pass and running 73 yards to score...Spent '56 in service and then was traded to Browns for Roger Zatkoff...Came to Packers in '59 with Bill Quinlan in trade for Billy Howton...Known as Louie...Rates as No. 1 offensive handyman, also returns punts and kickoffs...Working in hardware business in Green Bay where he owns home...Lew and Ann Carpenter have two children, Cheryl 4; Kathy 2.

DAN CURRIE Linebacker — Michigan State

Height 6'3", Weight 235, Born in Detroit, Michigan on June 27, 1935

Fourth year in pro ball...Pack's first draft choice in 1958...All-American center and linebacker; one of States' all-time greats...Played any position from tackle to defensive end or linebacker...Was offensive guard at MSU for two years, then switched to center as senior... Won All-Detroit and All-Michigan honors as center at St. Anthony High in Detroit...Also played baseball and basketball...Lives in Detroit in off-season...Nicknamed Dapper Dan... Tom and Mary Currie have three children, Janie 4; Tom 2; Matthew 6 months.

ANDY CVERCKO**Guard — Northwestern****Height 6'0", Weight 235, Born in Campbell, Ohio on November 6, 1937**

Third season in pro ball...Pack's fifth draft choice in '58...stayed on injured reserve rookie season...Backed up Jerry Kramer and Fuzzy Thurston in 1959-60... Played 470 minutes Northwestern's nine-game schedule in 57', averaging 52.2 per game...Turned in greatest game of career in NU's 21-0 upset win over Ohio State... Three-year starter in College... Maintained "B" average in electrical engineering... Nicknamed Jiggs... Lives in Campbell, Ohio

WILLIE DAVIS**End — Grambling****Height 6'3", Weight 240, Born in Lisbon, Louisiana on July 24, 1934**

Fourth season in pro ball...Drafted 17th by Browns in 1956, then went into service, winning All-Army and All-Service honors in '57... Came to Packers in trade for A. D. Williams in '60... Starred at Booker T. Washington High in Texarkana, Arkansas... Captained Grambling two straight years and made Collier's NAIA All-American... Willie and Ann Davis have one child, Duane 2... Home is in Cleveland.

BOYD DOWLER**End — Colorado****Height 6'5", Weight 220, Born in Cheyenne, Wyoming on October 18, 1937**

Third season in pro ball...Packers third draft choice in '59...All-Big Eight quarterback but still led team in passing (35 completions in 77 attempts for 320 yards), in receiving (20 for 254 yards) and in interceptions (5)... Great potential as punter, averaged 43.3... Competed in track, clocked in 9.9 in 100; 14.2 in high hurdles... Virtually unanimous choice as NFL rookie of year, leading Packers with 32 catches for 549 yards, 4 touchdowns... Son of Walt Dowler, former prep coach and outstanding gridder at Wyoming... Boyd and Pat Dowler married last winter... Residence: Cheyenne, Wyoming.

GEORGE "Bill" FORESTER**Linebacker — Southern Methodist University****Height 6'3", Weight 235, Born in Dallas, Texas on August 9, 1932**

Ninth season in pro ball...Captains Packers defensive team...Packers third draft choice in '53... Played guard and tackle in first few years and even tried fullbacking in early years... Specialized in linebacking last six years... Named all-pro three times... Twice played in Pro Bowl game... Brother Herschel played with Browns...
