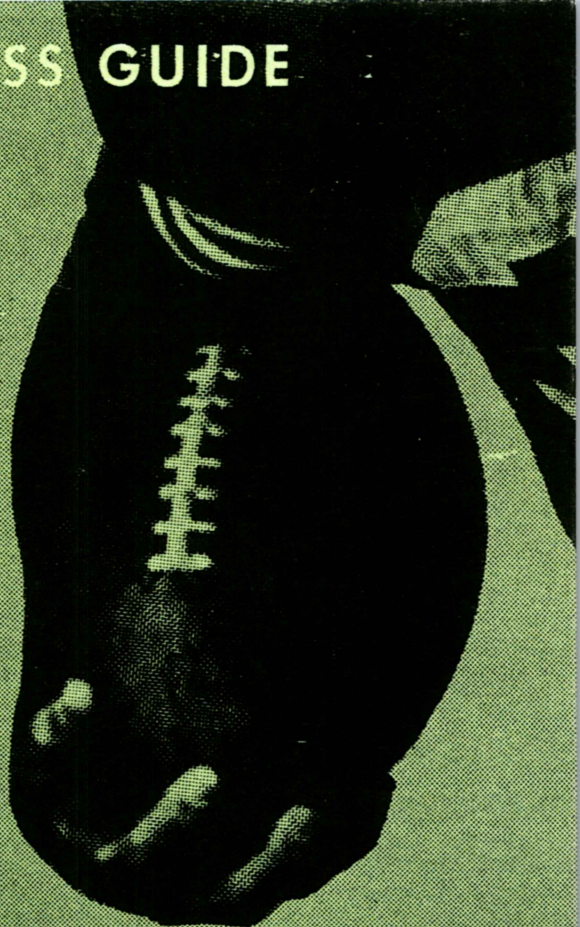

VINCE LOMBARDI

Head Coach and General Manager



VINCE LOMBARDI — Head Coach

The story of football in Green Bay, Wis., has long been one of the NFL's best known legends. Some of the greatest chapters in that city's gridiron history, however, are still being written by a transplanted Easterner.

He is Brooklyn-born Vincent T. Lombardi, a physics teacher who teaches football and a lawyer who doesn't practice law but lays it down in hardnosed fashion for his gridgers.

He is also a coach with a most interesting football philosophy.

Where other mentors search for a foe's weaknesses, Lombardi looks for the enemy's strength.

"We attempt to break down our opponents at their strongest points," the coach of the NFL champion Green Bay Packers, pointed out during the past season. "There is no more effective way to damage a team's morale, destroy its poise, than to attack and gain through or over his strongest position.

"Beat him at his strength and his weaknesses become weaker than ever."

That's a tough formula to follow, but Vince Lombardi, a one-time, 172 pound guard who was a member of Fordham's famed "Seven Blocks of Granite" in the 1930's, has made it work in an almost miracle-like manner.

In effect, he has changed the name of Green Bay to "Titledown, U.S.A." while engineering one of the NFL's most remarkable feats — that of making a championship club out of a cellar-dweller.

Green Bay won just one of 12 NFL games in 1958. That was the Packers' worst season in 40 years. Then the Lombardi regime began with the former Fordham star serving in the dual role of head coach and general manager.

The Packers bounced back with a 7-5 mark in 1959, earning Lombardi numerous "coach of the year" honors. But the best was still to come.

They captured the Western Division title the following year. Then the Packers climaxed their drive to the top by claiming the NFL championship this past season with a 37-0 thrashing of the powerful New York Giants, Eastern Division titlists whom Lombardi at one time helped coach.

Even before the 1961 season got underway, the Packers' executive board in an unusual display of satisfaction and confidence rewarded Lombardi with a brand new contract even though his old one still had 3 seasons to run.

Today, the man who was born in Brooklyn on June 11, 1913, reigns as Green Bay's number one citizen.

A man of tremendous drive, Lombardi continued school after winning three football letters at Fordham, working toward his law degree. To help meet expenses, he coached at St. Cecelia High in Englewood, N. J.

There he ran up a string of 36 straight victories while winning acclaim for his work, the T-formation. It soon became obvious that he wouldn't do much practicing before the bar.

In 1947, he installed the T-formation for the freshmen at Fordham under Ed Danowski and the following year coached the varsity offense.

Lombardi in 1949 began a five-year career at Army, working in Army's T-attack. The Cadets had an unbeaten season in his first year.

He moved into the professional ranks as offense coach of the New York Giants in 1954 and promptly demonstrated dramatically the value of a balanced running and passing attack in pro football.

In 1959, he began a new career as head football coach at Green Bay and that spelled the beginning of this new era for the Packers.

JOHN "Red" COCHRAN — Backfield Coach



Red is in his fifth year of coaching in the National Football League having been the backfield coach of the Detroit Lions for three seasons before joining Vince Lombardi at Green Bay. As the backfield coach he is responsible for the offensive unit and works the press box phones with Hecker.

Cochran played professional ball with the Chicago Cardinals from 1947 through 1950 then accepted the backfield coaching spot at his alma mater, Wake Forest, from 1951 through 1955.

Cochran was a star athlete for Wake Forest in 1940, 1941 and 1946 and at the time of graduation could have chosen pro football or baseball.

Red's fiery enthusiasm rubs off on his players. The 1960 team was top in the NFL in most first downs with 237.

The Cochran coached world champion backfield led the league in rushing and scoring during the 1961 season. All three — Starr, Hornung and Taylor were named to various all-pro units.

PHIL BENGTON — Coach of Defense



Phil Bengtson has built some of the toughest lines in the NFL during his eight seasons with the 49'ers.

A native of St. Paul, Phil was an All-American tackle at the University of Minnesota in 1933-34 when the Golden Gophers were the scourge of the collegiate football world. After climaxing his playing career in the Shrine East-West game, he joined the staff of Don Faurot at the University of Missouri.

Phil came west in 1940 with Clark Shaughnessy and had an important role in the development of the famed "Cinderella" team that captured the Pacific Coast Conference title and trounced Nebraska in the Rose Bowl.

He spent four years in the Navy during World War II, returning to Stanford in 1946 as chief aid to Marchy Schwartz.

Phil became a member of the 49'er staff under Buck Shaw in 1951.

Bengtson brought the Packers from the worst team defensively in 1958 to its present highly regarded position.

BILL AUSTIN — Offensive Line Coach



Bill Austin, the youngest member of a young staff, graduated from Oregon State College in 1949 after playing tackle four years for the Beavers. He was a starter in the East-West Shrine Game of 1949 and also played in the Hula Bowl. In 1949 Bill played regular tackle with the New York Giants even though he was only twenty years of age.

At the very height of his career, he was called into service and stationed in Japan where he was Head Coach of the Far East champs at Camp Drake, Tokyo.

Austin rejoined the Giants in 1953. At the end of the 1954 season he was selected to play in the Pro-Bowl Game and in 1955 was named on the All-Pro eleven. Bill was selected for the Hula Bowl Game for the second time after a very fine year with the World Champion Giants in 1956.

Austin was line coach at Wichita University in 1958.

Green Bay lines under Austins' guidance have been called the finest ever produced in the NFL.

NORB HECKER — Defensive Backfield Coach



Norb Hecker in his playing days was one of the National Football League's finest defensive halfbacks when playing with the Los Angeles Rams and the Washington Redskins.

A native of Olmstead Falls, Ohio, Norb was a former Baldwin-Wallace College Little All-American in 1950. He was captain of the Baldwin-Wallace football team and also participated in baseball, basketball and track.

Norb was traded to the Redskins in 1954 but decided to play with Toronto of the Canadian League.

In 1958 Hecker returned to Canada to become a player-coach for the Hamilton Tiger Cats with Jim Trimble.

Hecker played in 86 consecutive games and intercepted 28 passes in his six seasons in the NFL.

The defensive backfield, under Hecker's guidance, allowed less than 150 yards completed per game. This was good for the number two spot in the standings in 1959. Last years defensive unit came up with many timely interceptions to break up enemy drives.

TOM FEARS — Offensive End Coach

Tom was the end coach on Vince Lombardi's first Packer team in 1959 and helped develop Boyd Dowler to "Rookie of the Year".

Fear is a coach accomplished at the techniques he teaches because he was a receiver par excellence for the Los Angeles Rams for nine years and ranks below only Don Hutson in the number career receptions. Both the Ram and NFL charts feature his name prominently.

Fears holds the NFL record for most passes caught in a season (84) and most passes caught in one game (18), oddly enough, against the Packers in 1950.

Tom returned to the Rams for the 1960 and 1961 seasons.

RICHARD VORIS — End Coach

San Jose College, Class of 1948, has a varied background in football. Dick was an outstanding high school center and linebacker at Santa Cruz High, Hartnell Junior College and San Jose. Coming between Hartnell and San Jose were four years of wartime service in the Marine Corps, including combat time in the Pacific.

His coaching career started on the high school level. He returned to Hartnell as head coach for two seasons of 1952-53, his teams going undefeated in twenty-one games. He was line coach of the Los Angeles Rams in 1954, then came East in '55 to join Earl Blaik's staff at West Point as line coach and chief assistant. He was a third year member of the Army Staff when he resigned to be head coach at Virginia. With a year to go on the Virginia Contract he resigned to join the Packers.

Halfback — Michigan State

Height 6'1", Weight 200, Born in Philadelphia on June 8, 1939

Second year in Pro ball... Packers first draft choice for 1961 season... Three year starter at Michigan State and a 1960 Tri-Captain... An All Big Ten selection... Played in the East-West Shrine game, and the Hula Bowl, the All American Bowl and the All Star game... Runs the 100 in 9.8... Gained 290 yards on 68 carries in 1960 and 419 yards on 93 carries in 1959... Made outstanding plays on defense in 1961... Expected to develop to outstanding defensive back. Returned 18 kickoffs for a 26.6 average... Residence: Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

GARY BARNES

End — Clemson

Height 6'4", Weight 210, Born in Fairfax, Alabama on September 13, 1939

First year in pro ball... Packers third draft choice... Switched from end to halfback in senior year... Clemson's top receiver with 14 catches for 256 yards as junior... Residence: Fairfax, Ala.

ED BLAINE

Tackle — University of Missouri

Height 6'1", Weight 240, Born in Farmington, Missouri on January 30, 1940

First year in pro ball... Packers second draft choice... Named to Look Magazine All-American squad and made several All-American second teams including the Associated Press... Played in East-West, Senior Bowl, All-American Bowl and All-Star games... He is a pre-med major with a hobby in mountain climbing... Quick and maneuverable for a lineman... Residence: Farmington, Missouri.

LEW CARPENTER

Halfback — University of Arkansas

Height 6'2", Weight 210, Born in West Memphis, Arkansas on January 12, 1933

Seventh year in pro ball... Lions 8th choice in '53... Used little that year but gained 99 yards in 1954 All Star game, then led Lions in rushing in '54 and '55... Scored TD first time he touched a ball in pro football, intercepting a pass and running 73 yards to score... Spent '56 in service and then was traded to Browns for Roger Zatkoff... Came to Packers in '59 with Bill Quinlan in trade for Billy Howton... Known as Louie... Rates as No. 1 offensive handyman, also returns punts and kickoffs... Sells paper products in Green Bay area... Residence: Green Bay.

DAN CURRIE**Linebacker — Michigan State****Height 6'3", Weight 235, Born in Detroit, Michigan on June 27, 1935**

Fifth year in pro ball... Pack's first draft choice in 1958... All-American center and linebacker; one of States' all-time greats... Played any position from tackle to defensive end or linebacker... Was offensive guard at MSU for two years, then switched to center as senior... Won All-Detroit and All-Michigan honors as center at St. Anthony High in Detroit... Also played baseball and basketball... Lives in Detroit in off-season... Nicknamed Dapper Dan... All Pro and Pro Bowl in 1961.

BEN DAVIDSON**Tackle — University of Washington****Height 6'8", Weight 275, Born in Los Angeles, California on June 14, 1940**

Second year in pro ball... Drafted 22 by New York Giants for 1961 season... Traded to Packers before season opened... Played both tackle and end at Washington... Never played high school ball... Began his career at East L.A. Junior College... Played in 1960 and 1961 Rose Bowl games and the College All-Star game... Also wrestled, winning third on Pacific Coast Wrestling and third in Canadian National Championships... Honorable mention All-Big 5 team... Residence: Seattle, Washington.

WILLIE DAVIS**End — Grambling****Height 6'3", Weight 240, Born in Lisbon, Louisiana on July 24, 1934**

Fifth season in pro ball... Drafted 17th by Browns in 1956, then went into service, winning All-Army and All-Service honors in '57... Came to Packers in trade for A. D. Williams in '60... Starred at Booker T. Washington High in Texarkana, Arkansas... Captained Grambling two straight years and made Collier's NAIA All-American... Quick and agile for a big man... Good pass rusher... Home is in Cleveland.

BOYD DOWLER**End — Colorado****Height 6'5", Weight 220, Born in Cheyenne, Wyoming on October 18, 1937**

Fourth season in pro ball... Packers third draft choice in '59... All-Big Eight quarterback but still led team in passing (35 completions in 77 attempts for 320 yards), in receiving (20 for 254 yards) and in interceptions (5)... Great potential as punter, averaged 43.3... Competed in track, clocked in 9.9 in 100; 14.2 in high hurdles... Virtually unanimous choice as NFL rookie of year, leading Packers with 32 catches for 549 yards, 4 touchdowns, missed several games in 1961 to service... Son of Walt Dowler, former prep coach and outstanding grinder at Wyoming... Boyd and Pat Dowler married last winter... Residence: Cheyenne, Wyoming.

Second year in pro ball. . .Drafted sixth in 1960 by Rams. . .Four year end and halfback at State. . .Co-captained in 1959 and won honorable mention on All-Coast and All-American selections. . .East-West Shrine and Senior Bowl. . .Outstanding performance in both games. . .Major in Engineering. . .High school star in four sports. . .Traded to Vikings. . .Free agent to Packers.

GEORGE "Bill" FORESTER**Linebacker — Southern Methodist University****Height 6'3", Weight 235, Born in Dallas, Texas on August 9, 1932**

Tenth season in pro ball. . .Captains Packers defensive team. . .Packers third draft choice in '53. . .Played guard and tackle in first few years and even tried fullbacking in early years. . .Specialized in linebacking last six years. . .Named all-pro four times. . .Three times played in Pro Bowl game. . .Brother Herschel played with Browns. . .His father, Herschel, Sr., played football at Mercer, later coached at Dallas for 18 years. . .Football stadium named after Senior Forester in Dallas. . .Sells sporting goods in off-season in Texas. . .Nicknamed Bubba.

LEE FOLKINS**End — Washington University****Height 6'5", Weight 218, Born in Wallace, Idaho on July 4, 1939**

Second year in pro ball. . .Packers sixth draft choice for '61 season. . .Caught seven passes for 152 yards and two touchdowns in 1960. . .Married and a mechanical engineering student at Washington. . .Made brilliant diving catch in 1960 Rose Bowl Game. . .Played in All-American Bowl. . .Residence: Seattle, Washington.

RON GASSERT**Tackle — University of Virginia****Height 6'3", Weight 250, Born in Mt. Holly, New Jersey on July 22, 1940**

First year in pro ball. . .Packers fourth draft choice. . .Outstanding lineman during each of his 4 seasons at Virginia. . ."As good a tackle as any in Atlantic Coast Conference this year," said Bill Elias, coach of Cavaliers. . .Lineman of the Year in Virginia last year by vote of opponents. . .Co-captain of Virginia's squad. . .All-Star game. . .Residence: Mt. Holly, New Jersey.

FORREST GREGG**Tackle — Southern Methodist University****Height 6'4", Weight 230, Born in Birthright, Texas on October 18, 1933**

Sixth year in pro ball. . . Packers second draft choice in 1956. . . Named all-pro in 1959-60-61, three times in pro bowl game. . . One of best blockers in league for rushing or passing. . . Made All-Southwest Conference team in 1954-55; captained SMU in '55. . . Missed '57 Packer season due to service. . . Salesman in Sulphur Springs, Texas, in off season.

HENRY GREMMINGER**Halfback — Baylor University****Height 6'2", Weight 200, Born in Windthorst, Texas on September 1, 1933**

Seventh year in pro ball. . . Drafted No. 7 by Packers in '56. . . Played regular defense cornerback last five years. . . Tough tackler. . . Came into pro football as an offensive end, switched to defense. . . Led Baylor in pass catching his last two years, 18 catches in '54, 15 in '55. . . Salesman in off-season. . . Hank and Shirley Gremminger have one child, Tina 4. . . Resides in Dallas, Texas.

EARL GROS**Fullback — Louisiana State****Height 6'3", Weight 230, Born in Houma, Louisiana on August 29, 1940**

First year in pro ball. . . Packers first draft choice for 1962 season. . . Shared most valuable honors with Wendell Harris at L.S.U. . . Had excellent senior year offensively and defensively. . . Led team in rushing with 406 yards in 90 carries for a 4.5 average. . . Powerful blocker. . . Gets ball on tough assignments and didn't lose a yard during senior year. . . Was co-most valuable in Senior Bowl. . . Played in All-Star game. . . Residence: Houma, Louisiana.

JOEL "Dave" HANNER**Tackle — Arkansas University****Height 6'2", Weight 250, Born in Parkin, Arkansas on May 20, 1930**

Eleventh year in pro ball. . . Daddy of homegrown Packers. . . Drafted No. 5 by Green Bay in 1952. . . One of top tackles in pro football. . . Named all-pro five times. . . Played in two pro bowl games. . . One of greatest games was against Colts in 1954 when he made 10 tackles, recovered a fumble that set up the Packers' winning touchdown, and helped keep the Colts from scoring a touchdown. . . Twice named to All-Southwest Conference team. . . Nicknamed Hawg. . . Soil Conservationist in off-season. . . Dave (His real name is Joel) and Jane Hanner live in West Memphis, Arkansas.

PAUL HORNING**Halfback — University of Notre Dame****Height 6'2½", Weight 220, Born in Louisville, Kentucky on December 23, 1935**
