ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers lead the NFL in most Championships won with eleven. Green Bay won three by League standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight times (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967) since the play-off system was established in 1933.

in addition, the Packers hold two AFL-NFL Professional Football Titles by virtue of their 35-10 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in 1967 and their 33-14 victory over the Oakland Raiders in 1968.

The Chicago Bears are next with eight NFL Championships, having won twice prior to the play-off system (1921 and 1932) and six times since (1937, 1940, 1941, 1943, 1946 and 1963).

The Giants, Lions and Browns have won 4 titles, the Eagles and Colts 3, the Redskins twice, and Cleveland Rams, Chicago Cards, and Los Angeles Rams once apiece.

The Giants have appeared in 13 playoffs and have lost 10. The Bears and Redskins have lost 4 times and the Browns 5 times.

Green Bay's only two losses were in 1938 (Giants 23, Packers 17) in New York; and in 1960 in Philadelphia (17-13 margin to the Eagles).

DAN DEVINE HEAD COACH AND GENERAL MANAGER

Winning has been a way of life with Daniel

John Devine - at all levels.

An intense, thoroughgoing fundamentalist, he launched an imposing success pattern in his very first coaching assignment, at little East Jordan, Michigan, High School, where his 1948 team went undefeated.

He continued it during 16 years as a collegiate head coach, a span in which he fashioned the nation's third highest winning percentage, and quickly cemented his stature

upon entering the pro ranks in 1971.

In only his second season as head coach and general manager, he led the Packers to a 10-4 record and the National Football Conference's Central Division championship in 1972, Green Bay's first division title since 1967.

That accomplishment brought him NFC "Coach of the Year" recognition from the Pro Football Writers' Association of America and United Press International, as well as a salute from Pro Football News as its "Man of the year"

Despite a disappointing 5-7-2 season in 1973, which saw the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolve in the face of key injuries to Willie Buchanon, Jim Del Gaizo and Bill Hayhoe, he still owns the third best winning record among all head coaches in Packer history (19-19-4). Devine, who remains a strict disciplinarian in an age of growing permissiveness, is

straightforward and direct in approach, and his teams are a reflection of the man.

One of nine children in a family of six boys and three girls, he was born December 23, 1924 in Augusta, Wisconsin, near Chippewa Falls in west Central Wisconsin. He later moved to Proctor, Minnesota, a suburb of Duluth, where he captained the football team prior to graduation in 1942.

Entering the University of Minnesota-Duluth, he continued to gain athletic and scholastic distinction. Chosen to captain both the football and basketball teams, he also was elected president of the senior class and president of the student body. In addition, he also

received the Alumni Award as UM-D's outstanding senior athlete.

A 21/2 year tour of duty in the Army Air Corps interrupted Devine's college education.

which he completed in 1948, graduating with a B. A. degree in social studies. Following two unbeaten seasons at East Jordan High School, where he coached both football and basketball, he was named freshman coach at Michigan State University under Clarence (Biggie) Munn and later served as backfield coach under Duffy Daugherty at MSU.

In 1955, new opportunity beckoned and Devine became a collegiate head coach for the first time at Arizona State. He proceeded to compile a glittering 27-3-1 record during a three-year stay at Tempe, climaxed when his 1957 team was the first unbeaten and

nationally ranked team in ASU history.

That prominence piqued the interest of the University of Missouri, which offered the then 34-year-old Devine it's head coaching job. Frank Broylles had left Missouri after one year, convinced the Tigers could not be competitive under such rigorous scholastic requirements, but Devine accepted the challenge and one year later had the Tigers in the Orange

In his 13 years at Missouri, Devine became a legend, an eminence he enjoys to this day in the "show me" state. Until his Tigers won the 1961 Orange Bowl, the University of Missouri had never won a bowl game, but under him they captured one Orange Bowl (1961), one Bluebonnet (1963), one Sugar (1966) and one GatorBowl (1969) trophy.

The Packer coach, who has become a devout tennis buff in recent years, married the former Joanne Brookhart in 1947 and they have seven children: Jennifer (Mrs. S. A. Husain), Mary Jo (Mrs. Andrew Carver), Diana (23), Danny (19), Sarah (17), Melissa (15), and Jill (13).

PACKER ASSISTANT COACHES



JOHN (RED) COCHRAN Assistant Coach -Offensive Backfield

The all-time dean of Packer assistant coaches, Cochran is now in his 12th season as a mamber of the Green Bay staff. The only others to approach his Packer longevity are Defensive Coordinator Dave Hanner, in his 10th year as a Green Bay coaching aide, and Phil Bengtson, who served as an assistant for nine seasons before being elevated to head coach in 1968.

Cochran, born in Fairfield, Ala., Aug. 2, 1922, broke into professional football as a running back with the then Chicago Cardinals in 1946 following two-sport stardom at Wake Forest. After four years as a two-way back with the Big Red, he returned to his alma mater as backfield coach in

1951, serving until 1955.

The square-cut redhead, who still owns one of the highest single season punt return averages in pro football history, re-entered the NFL in 1956, becoming offensive backfield coach of the Detroit Lions. Subsequently summoned to Green Bay in 1959 by Vince Lombardi, Red presided over the "dream" backfield of Bart Starr, Paul Hornung and Jim Taylor, a trio which was primarily responsible for returning the running game to pre-eminence during the 1960s.

Cochran took a one-year sabbatical from football in 1967, then joined the St. Louis Cardinal staff for two years before moving on to San Diego in 1970. The following year, incoming Head Coach Dan Devine brought Red back to Green Bay for a second tour of duty by naming him offensive backfield coach. Cochran is married and the father of a son and two

daughters.



DAVE HANNER Defensive Coordinator

Dave Hanner, now in his 23rd consecutive year with the team, has become a symbol of Packer tradition and solidarity. Only the late E. L. (Curly) Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach, has served Green Bay's storied National Football League franchise longer as player and coach than the canny defensive coordinator.

A fifth round draft choice in 1952, the former University of Arkansas star found a home at defensive left tackle, where he held forth for 13 seasons and five times won allpro honors. Also a two-time Pro Bowl selection, Hanner played a major role as the Packers won the Western Division title in 1960, their first championship in 16 years, then helped them win successive world titles in 1961 and '62.

Dave, a native of Parkin, Ark., joined the coaching staff in 1965 and quickly built a league-wide reputation for his defensive acumen, formally acknowledged when Coach Dan Devine named him defensive coordinator in 1972. In his first year in this role, the Packer defense finished No. 1 in the National Football Conference. Dave, a year-around resident of Green Bay since 1964, and his wife, Jane, have four sons and two daughters.

A dedicated fundamentalist, Rollie Dotsch is in his fourth season as overseer of the Packers' offensive line, a unit which has developed excellence in blocking for both the run and the pass.

Born in Escanaba, Mich., Feb. 14, 1933, he was a rare 16-letter winner as a high school athlete in Lansing, Mich., before matriculating at Michigan State. While at MSU, he played guard under Dan Devine, then an assistant on the Spartan staff, for all four of his collegiate seasons.

Following his graduation in 1954, Rollie entered the coaching ranks, serving as head football coach at Escanaba High School in 1956 and '57, then became an assistant coach at Northern Michigan in 1958. Three years later, he moved to the University of Colorado as an assistant, then joined Devine for the second time, serving as offensive line coach at the University of Missouri from 1962 through 1965.

In 1966, Rollie was named head coach and athletic director at Northern Michigan University, where his teams compiled an imposing, five-year record of 33-15-1.

Dotsch again rejoined Devine in February of 1971 when the new Packer coach appointed him his offensive line coach. Rollie is married to the former Carol Thomas of Alpena, Mich., and they have two children, Mike and Missy.

A veteran defensive coach, Burt Gustafson has tutored Packer linebackers since 1971, when he left the University of Wyoming to answer Dan Devine's call.

Born in Marquette, Mich., Nov. 30, 1925, Gustafson matured into a 12-letter winner at Northern Michigan University in his home town, earning four monograms each in football, basketball and track.

He later coached at Battle Creek High School, from 1953 through 1955, before becoming end coach at his alma mater in 1956. In 1962, he joined Coach Lloyd Eaton, present Packer personnel director, at the University of Wyoming, where he worked with the defensive secondary for eight years.

During this span, he visited the Packers' early training camp annually and became familiar with Green Bay's personnel and pass defense in the process. In February of 1971, Devine appointed him linebacker coach, succeeding Dick Evans.

Burt and Alice Gustafson have five children, two sons and three daughters.

John Polonchek, a native of Granastov, Czechoslovakia, is in his third season as a Packer aide following a five-year tour of duty on the staff of the perennially powerful Oakland Raiders.

Polonchek, a Michigan State alumnus, arrived upon the pro football scene in 1963 as a scout for the New York Jets and Raiders. After four years in that capacity, he joined the Raider staff in 1967 as offensive backfield coach.

A four-year varsity performer at Michigan State as a collegian (1946-49), Polonchek began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under then junior varsity coach Dan Devine at MSU.

Later, following a hitch in the Air Force, where he coached at Bolling Air Force Base, John returned to Michigan State as an assistant coach from 1956 through 1958. In 1959, he moved on to become an aide on the University of Colorado staff (1959-61), where he served with present Packer offensive line coach Rollie Dotsch.

John and his wife, Jo-Ann, have three children.

Henry Norman (Hank) Kuhlmann, who turned to coaching after an extensive fling at professional baseball, is the first special teams coach in Packer history.

Kuhlmann joined the Green Bay staff in 1972 at the invitation of his old college coach, Dan Devine, to fill a need created by the ever increasing emphasis on the importance of "suicide" squads to winning football games. His duties include supervision of the Packer kicking game, a department which will become even more critical to success in light of the new National Football League rules adopted for the 1974 season.

The 36-year-old Kuhlmann, a halfback under Devine at the University of Missouri in 1958, launched a four-year baseball career in the St. Louis Cardinals' farm system fol-lowing graduation in 1959. Deciding his future lay elsewhere, he returned to Missouri as an assistant coach in 1963, a post he held until joining the Packers. For six of those nine seasons, he served as defensive backfield coach.

Hank and his wife, Donna, have one son.

Perry Moss, a success at every coaching level over a long career, takes on a new challenge in 1974 - the responsibility for polishing the Packers' young quarterbacks to championship gloss.

Moss, who comes to Green Bay following four years as an assistant coach with the neighboring Chicago Bears, is beginning his third Packer term. The former University of Illinois star spent his only National Football League season with the Packers in 1948 as an understudy to Indian Jack Jacobs, then presiding at quarterback, and later returned to serve as a special assignment scout in 1963.

In the interim, he has had wide and productive experience, serving as an assistant coach at Illinois (1949), the Universities of Washington (1950-51), LSU (1952-53), Miami of Florida (1954-56) and Wisconsin (1957-58), as well as head coach Florida State (1959) and Marshall University

(1968-69).

Moss, a native of Tulsa, Okla., also spent three years as head coach and general manager of the Montreal Alouettes (1960-62) and two years each as head coach and general manager of the Charleston Rockets and Orlando Panthers of the Continental League, winning successive league titles in 1965-66-67.

Perry, born Aug. 4, 1926, is married and the father of two children.

Billy Kinard, who once wore Green Bay's green and gold as a player, returns this year as the Packers' defensive secondary coach. The former Ole Miss player and coach was named to the position by Coach Dan Devine Feb. 1, 1974.

Kinard, a native of Jackson, Miss., brings rich and varied experience to his new assignment. A second round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1956, he played four seasons of professional football-one with the Browns, two with the Packers (1957-58) after being acquired in a trade, and one with the Buffalo Bills (1960) - all as a defensive back.

Billy, who began his coaching career at a Daytona Beach, Fla., High School in 1959, signed on as an assistant Auburn in 1961 after calling it quits as a player. He later served as an aide at the Universities of Florida (1964-66), Georgia (1967-69) and Arkansas (1970) before becoming head coach at Ole Miss in 1971. Kinard, who served in that capacity into the 1973 season, is the first alumnus ever to serve as head football coach at Ole Miss, whose grid history dates back to 1893.

While head coach of the Rebels, Billy guided them to a 10-2-0 record in 1971, the school's best season since 1963. Billy, born Dec. 16, 1933, is married and the father of two children.

Johnny Roland, one of the St. Louis football Cardinals' all-time greats, has taken on a multi-dimensional role in joining the Packers for 1974.

Listed as an assistant coach in charge of special assignments, he moved into an all-purpose position with varied responsibilities. One of his primary duties is scouting college talent, an assignment in which he and other Packer coaches will cover the area formerly scouted by Elijah Pitts, who resigned to become offensive backfield coach of the Los Angeles Rams.

Roland's duties also include establishing and coordinating a computer program with the coaching staff, handling special on-field coaching duties and heading up the team's

new research and development program.

A future choice of the Cardinals in the fourth round of the 1965 draft, he won NFL and team rookie of the year honors in 1966, then went on to set three club records before being dealt to the New York Giants in 1973, his final pro season. The Corpus Christi, Tex., native, an All-American at the University of Missouri as a defensive back, remained the Cardinals' all-time leading rusher coming into the 1974 season. A highly eligible bachelor, the 31-year-old Roland now makes his home in Green Bay.

Lloyd Eaton brings 27 years of coaching experience to the task of evaluating annual collegiate crop of football players and coordinating Packer scouting program. He culminated his coaching career at University of Wyoming, where he compiled an impressive 57-33-2 record during nine years as head coach of the Cowboys. Named Packers' director of player personnel in May of 1972 by Dan Devine, he had previously served as a scout for the "QUADRA" combine, representing the Rams, Cowboys, 49ers and Chargers, in 1971.

STARR: A MAN APART

Bart Starr is a man apart in Packer history. The most successful quarterback in pro football annals, he led the Packers to five National Football League championships and two Super Bowl titles in seven years (1961-62 and 1965-66-67).

Starr also owns pro football's career passing efficiency record, having completed 57.42 per cent of his attempts over a 16-year span. A three-time NFL passing

champion, he hit on 1,808 of 3,149 passes.

In addition, No. 15 holds the league record for most consecutive passes attempted without an interception, 294, set over the 1964 and '65 seasons, and he shares with Gary Wood of the New York Giants the mark for having had the fewest passes intercepted in a season, 3, which he tied in 1966. Wood set the record in 1964.

Starr also is the most enduring of all Packers. A lowly 17th round draft choice in 1956, he wore the green and gold 16 seasons, longer than any other player in Green Bay history.



BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a

birthday as any.

Actually, the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

First they talked Curly's employers at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for

equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

EARLY DAYS—That first season the team won 10 games and lost only

one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan, Games were played in an open field with no fence or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight, and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited. This was the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy. Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A. B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in

1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 to 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD - Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict, and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ron-

zani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER — The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and business man, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the re-building plans and Lisle W. Blackbourn, a native Wisconsinite, and Coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP — Likeable Ray "Scooter" McLean moves up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his first season as head coach.

FROM SANDLOT TO STADIUM -

Procedures at Packers games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system — the latter hadn't been invented yet. There weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their career

in 1919 they played on approximately the same site as now abandoned City Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called, was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut street street-car and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donny-brook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics for the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's halftime suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built — just a small bleacher with a ca-

pacity of a couple hundred — on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

When Hagemeister Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides between the 30-yard lines. A wooden railing surrounded the rest of the gridiron, along which the Knothole Gang stood or sat on the ground.

Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

After World War II City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961 the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, and to the present 56,267 in 1970.

THE LOMBARDI ERA

In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giant assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager of a team that finished dead last in 1958 with a 1-10-1 mark.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and was unanimously voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division Title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams have become the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise has become one of the most successful in the National Football League.

In 1967, Green Bay played to 22 consecutive sellouts in 23 games and became the first team in the history of the League to win three straight world titles.

Over a nine year span as Head Coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 141 victories against 39 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .783 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 Division playoffs and World Championship Games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

Following the third consecutive Title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970 compiling a 20-21-1 record and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE PRESENT - The Packers launched a new era on Jan. 14, 1971, when fundamentalist Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, was named head coach and general manager. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season. in which he undertook a massive rebuilding project, Devine led the Packers to a Central Division title in 1972 with a 10-4 mark. He will be striving this season for a repeat of that championship performance, Green Bay's first since '67, following an unexpected recession in '73, when the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved into a 5-7-2 nightmare in the wake of key injuries to Willie Buchanon. 



1974 NFL RULE CHANGES

OVERTIME

Sudden death for all games but limited to 15 minutes for pre-season and regular season games.

KICKING

Goal posts have been moved back 10 yards from the goal line to the end line. Kickoffs will be made from the 35-yard line instead of the 40.

Missed field goals will be returned to the line of scrimmage or 20-yard line, whichever is further from the goal line.

Only the two outside men, one on each side of the kicking team, will be permitted to go downfield on the snap, when a team is kicking from scrimmage (punt or field goal). Other players must remain at the line of scrimmage until the ball is kicked.

PASSING

Roll blocking and cutting of wide receivers is now prohibited.

The extent of downfield contact a defender is permitted to have with an eligible receiver will be restricted to area three yards beyond the line of scrimmage.

PENALTIES

The penalty for offensive holding, illegal use of hands and tripping has been reduced from 15 yards to 10 yards when the infraction occurs in the area of the line of scrimmage and three yards beyond.

BLOCKING

Wide receivers blocking back toward the ball three yards from the line of scrimmage cannot block below the waist.
