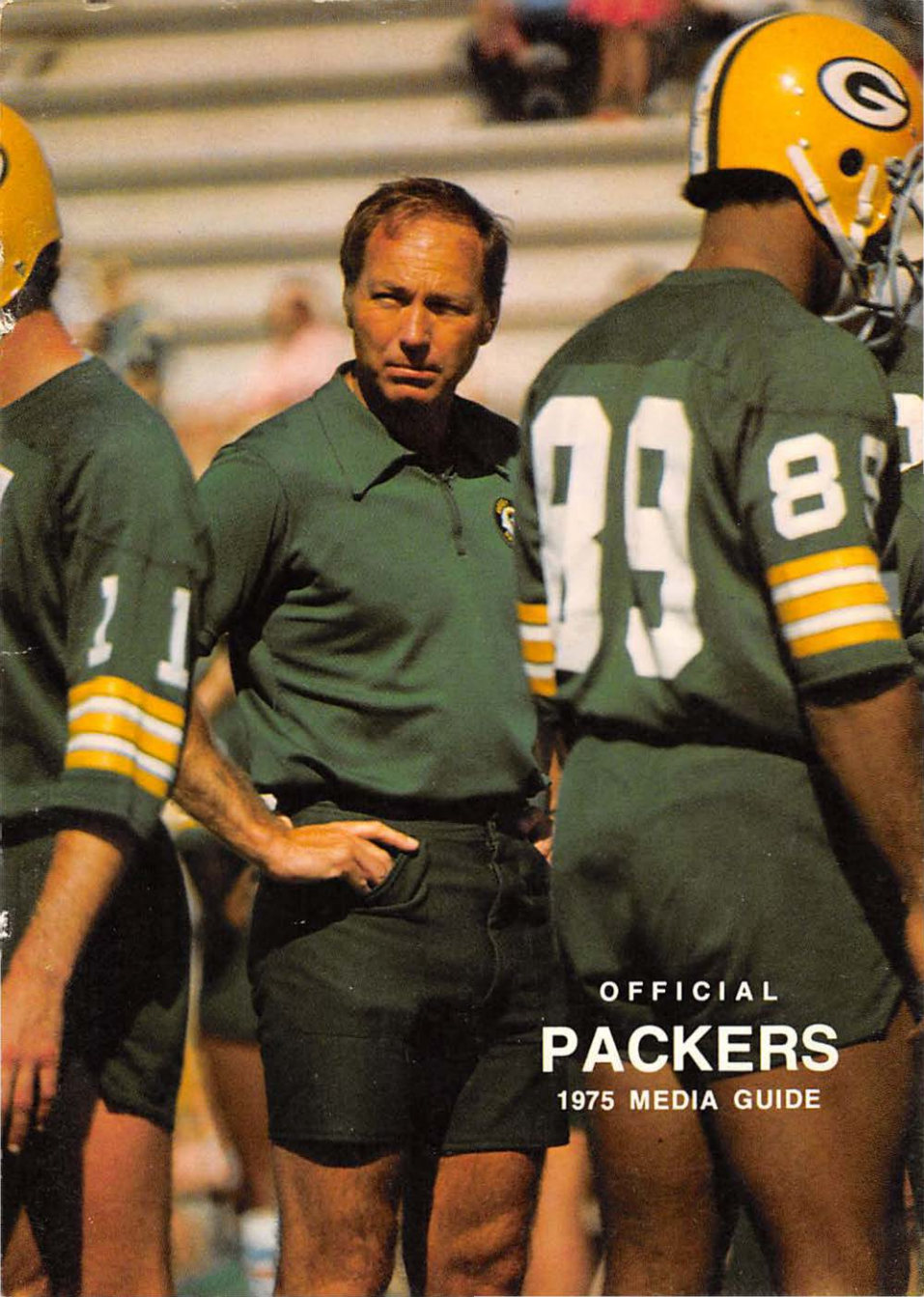

ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers lead the NFL in most championships won with eleven. Green Bay won three by League standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight times (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967) since the play-off system was established in 1933.

In addition, the Packers hold two AFL-NFL professional football titles by virtue of their 35-10 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in 1967 and their 33-14 victory over the Oakland Raiders in 1968.

The Chicago Bears are next with eight NFL Championships, having won twice prior to the play-off system (1921 and 1932) and six times since (1937, 1940, 1941, 1943, 1946 and 1963).

The Giants, Lions and Browns have won 4 titles, the Eagles and Colts 3, the Redskins twice, and Cleveland Rams, Chicago Cards, and Los Angeles Rams once apiece.

The Giants have appeared in 13 playoffs and have lost 10. The Bears and Redskins have lost 4 times and the Browns 5 times.

Green Bay's only two losses were in 1938 (Giants 23, Packers 17) in New York; and in 1960 in Philadelphia (17-13 margin to the Eagles).

The Green Bay Packer football team is a community owned, non-profit corporation (Green Bay Packers, Inc.), founded in 1922. There are 4,656½ shares of stock owned by 1,728 shareholders — none of whom receives any dividend on the initial investment. The corporation is governed by 45 directors and a 7-man executive committee, elected by the board. (For the Green Bay Packer story, turn to P.69.)

Day-to-day decisions affecting conduct of Packer business are made by the general manager, who is in complete charge of all football operations. Other matters such as financial/budgeting policy and construction projects fall under jurisdiction of the 7-man Executive Committee, all of whom are veterans of Packer service.

One of them, President Dominic Olejniczak, has headed the corporation since 1958, longer than any previous president. Olejniczak was elected to his 18th consecutive one-year term April 29, 1975, thus eclipsing the longevity record he shared with L.H. Joannes, who served as president for 17 years (1930-47).

Richard L. Bourguignon, Fred N. Trowbridge, Sr., John B. Torinus, Jerry Atkinson, former Packer great Tony Canadeo and Clarence Renard are the other members of the committee.

Bourguignon has served as vice president since 1958. Torinus, the dean of the committee in point of service, having been elected on August 8, 1949, has been corporation secretary since 1955. Trowbridge, on the committee since July 10, 1950, is treasurer and also serves as corporation legal counsel. The complete board of directors:

BART STARR

*Head Coach and
General Manager*

Seldom, if ever, has a new head coach come into the National Football League with more universal predictions of instant success, or with more vocal and widespread fan support, than Bryan (Bart) Starr.

The eighth head coach in Green Bay's storied pro football history, he clearly was the people's choice to succeed Dan Devine and undertake resuscitation of the Packers, burdened by a sub-par 11-15-2 record over the last two seasons.

The assignment, officially tendered to him by the Packer Executive Committee Dec. 24, 1974, was his by informal acclamation. The sweeping mandate was entirely understandable, even though he had only one year of coaching experience. The Starr track record, as a leader and achiever, is both imposing and extensive. Success has been a habit with him for a decade and a half—on and off the field.

"Mr. Quarterback," the most successful signal caller in pro football's 55-year annals, had endeared himself to the Packer faithful with his achievements as field leader of the Packers in the 7-year period between 1961 and 1967, during which the purposeful Alabamian guided Green Bay to five world championships, a feat without equal in pro football history.

With Starr at the offensive controls, the Packers made 6 playoff appearances in 8 years, beginning with a 1960 showdown against the Eagles in Philadelphia. That, it developed, was the only playoff the Packers were to lose with No. 15 at quarterback. They rebounded from that disappointment to decimate the New York Giants in the '61 title game, 37-0, and repeated in '62, again felling the Giants (16-7).

After a modest interval, two productive but non-championship years in 1963 and '64, Starr led the Packers to three consecutive titles in 1965-66-67, the first time such a parlay had been achieved since the advent of the NFL playoff system in 1933.

The Packers' all-time field general climaxed that historic "triple play" by escorting Green Bay to successive victories in the first two Super Bowls, in both of which he was voted the game's Most Valuable Player.

During those highly prosperous '60's, Starr three times led the NFL in passing (1962, 1964 and 1966) and was named to the Pro Bowl on four occasions (1961, '62, '63 and '66).

The Packers' new leader also established four NFL passing records during his 16-year playing career, longest in the team's history. He set, and still holds, league marks for lifetime passing efficiency, 57.42 per cent; most consecutive passes attempted without an interception, 294; lowest percentage of passes intercepted for a season, 1.20, set in 1966; and shares the record for fewest passes intercepted in a season, 3, with Gary Wood of the New York Giants.

Born Bryan Bartlett Starr, in Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 9, 1934, the son of a career Air Force master sergeant, Starr won All-American honors in high school, but things did not come easily for him thereafter. He had to fight his way through adversity and initial professional obscurity to gain pre-eminence among pro football quarterbacks.

Bart was a lowly, 17th round draft choice of the Packers in 1956 because pro scouts were wary of his physical future, a reluctance prompted by a back injury Starr had received as a junior at Alabama, which threatened his football career.

The uphill struggle continued after he joined the Green and Gold. For the next four seasons, Starr shared the quarterbacking duties with Tobin Rote, Lamar McHan, Babe Parilli, and Joe Francis before gaining regular status in the ninth game of the 1959 season. He led the Packers to consecutive victories in those last four games, under first year Coach Vince Lombardi, and Green Bay's first winning season in 12 years.

Although a consistent, high level performer game in and game out during the regular season, it was Starr's brilliance in post-season play which set him apart from all others. In six NFL title games, he completed 84 of 145 passes for 1,090 yards and 11 touchdowns—with incredibly, only one interception—for a glittering 57.9 percent. In two Super Bowls, he was even more deadly, completing 29 of 47 attempts (61.7 per cent) for 452 yards, 3 TD's and again, with only 1 interception.

Along the way, Starr won an imposing collection of honors, chief among them the Jim Thorpe Award (1966), the Byron White Award (1967), and the NFL Gladiator Award (1969). He also was named Pro Football Player of the Decade by The Columbus Touchdown Club in 1970.

Following his retirement as a player in July of 1972, following two shoulder operations, Bart became Packer quarterback coach. He resigned in January of 1973 to pursue private business interests. In the interim, he had become a highly successful automobile dealer and a much sought after motivational speaker and TV "salesman" as well as a popular analyst on CBS-TV's NFL football telecasts and an actor in motivational films prior to taking on his current challenge.



Despite his heavy schedule, Starr gives generously of his time and talents to charitable and civic endeavors such as "Rawhide," a leadership training camp for boys who need a second chance. He and his wife, the former Cherry Morton of Birmingham, Ala., also annually serve as co-chairmen of Wisconsin's American Cancer Society fund drive and the Vince Lombardi Classic, proceeds of which go to the Vince Lombardi Cancer Clinic at Georgetown University. Starr also records numerous public service messages each year for both radio and television use in behalf of civic and charitable projects.

The Starrs have two sons, Bart Jr., 17, a De Pere High School student and crack golfer, and Bret, 11.

PACKER ASSISTANT COACHES



DAVE HANNER

Now in his 24th consecutive year with the team as player and coach a record surpassed by only one man in the Packers' 57-year history, Dave Hanner takes on new and added responsibilities this season as assistant head coach. The 44-year-old Arkansan., whose unit finished a lofty sixth in the 26-team National Football League last season also continues as defensive coordinator.

Only the late E. L. (Curly) Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach, has served Green Bay's venerable franchise longer as player and coach than Bart Starr's top aide, a 13-year standout in the Green Bay front four prior to joining the coaching staff.

Hanner, a fifth round draft choice in 1952, five times won all-pro honors at defensive tackle, where he teamed with Henry Jordan to provide the Packers with the NFL's premier tackle tandem during the early years of the Lombardi Era. Also a two-time Pro Bowl selection, he played a major role as the Packers won the Western Division Title in 1960, their first championship in 16 years, then helped them win successive world titles in 1961 and 62.

A native of Parkin, Ark., Dave joined the coaching staff in 1965 and quickly built a league wide reputation for his defensive acumen, formally acknowledged when Coach Dan Devine named him defensive coordinator in 1972. In his first year in this role, the Packer defense finished No. 1 in the National Football Conference and, in 1974, it permitted only 206 points, the best performance by a Green Bay defensive unit since the Super Bowl year of 1967.

Dave and his wife, Jane, have six children — Joe, 20, a junior at Northern Michigan where he is on the football varsity; Eddie, 19, a sophomore at University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and a member of the football varsity; Sammie Jane, 18, also a UW-Whitewater student; Mike, 15, a Green Bay Southwest student and JV football player, Hollye Ann, 12, and Jimmy, 7.



ZEKE BRATKOWSKI

Edmund Raymond (Zeke) Bratkowski, one of the premier rescue quarterbacks in pro football annals, is in his second term on the Packer coaching staff. Named quarterback coach by Coach Bart Starr Jan. 4, 1975, he previously served as an assistant to then Coach Phil Bengtson in 1969 and 1970 before returning to active Packer duty at quarterback in '71.

His appointment to the new staff not only reunited Bratkowski with the Packers but with his longtime former colleague, Starr, whom he backstopped with distinction when injuries sidelined Mr. Quarterback during the highly successful '60's. They combined during that period to preside at the acquisition of three consecutive world champions in 1965-66-67, a span in which the Packers dominated pro football by winning 31 games, losing only 9 and tying 2.

Although he was a starting quarterback with the Chicago Bears and Los Angeles before coming to the Packers in a 1963 trade, the Brat had his most memorable day as a Packer in leading Green Bay to a sudden death victory over Baltimore in the 1965 Western Conference playoff.

During 1969's training camp, he was placed on waivers by the Packers and claimed by the Minnesota Vikings. Deciding to remain in Green Bay, Bratkowski declined a contract offer from the Vikings to remain with Green Bay as offensive backfield coach in 1969 and '70.

After returning to active duty in '71 at Dan Devine's invitation, Zeke joined the Chicago Bears' coaching staff in '72 assisting Abe Gibrone through the '74 season.

A veteran of 14 playing seasons in the NFL, Bratkowski was the Bears' No. 2 draft choice in 1953. Following his rookie season with the Midway Monsters, Bratkowski spent 1955 and '56 in the Air Force. He returned to the Bears in 1957 and in 1961, was traded to the Rams, from whom the Packers acquired him in '63 in exchange for center Ken Iman.

Bratkowski is married and he and M. E. (for Mary Elizabeth) have three children — Robert, a junior at Washington State University, where he is a split end on the varsity football team; Steve, a junior at West De Pere's Abbot Penning High School, where he is a varsity performer in football, basketball and golf; and Kassie, in the eighth grade at De Pere's Dickinson School.



LEW CARPENTER

A jack-of-all-positions as one of the most versatile performers in professional football history, Lew Carpenter returns as a coach to the team he helped win two world championships as a player.

The possessor of an acute, probing football mind, he is basically responsible for the conduct of the passing game — a problem area a year ago — which has been re-designed under his direction for the 1975 season.

The former University of Arkansas athlete is admirably equipped for the assignment, having toiled at both wide receiver positions, tight end, half-back and fullback — all intimately involved in the air arm — while wearing the Packers' green and gold from 1959 through 1963.

He is also a veteran of 11 years' coaching experience, having served on the staffs of the Minnesota Vikings, Atlanta Falcons, Washington Redskins, St. Louis Cardinals and Houston Oilers before being named to the Bart Starr staff Jan. 25, 1975.

Born in West Memphis, Ark., Jan. 12, 1932, Carpenter was an eighth round draft choice of the Detroit Lions in 1953. He subsequently led the Lions in rushing in 1954 and '55 and, after spending 1956 in service, was traded to the Cleveland Browns for linebacker Roger Zatkoff in 1957.

Following two seasons in Cleveland, he came to the Packers with defensive end Bill Quinlan in a 1959 trade which sent wide receiver Billy Howton to the Browns. He later became Green Bay's No. 1 offensive utility man during the Packers' drive to a division championship in 1960 and consecutive world titles in 1961 and '62 under the late Vince Lombardi. Carpenter, who underscored his versatility by also returning punts and kickoffs during that span, retired following the 1963 season.

Lew, 43, and his wife, Ann, have four daughters — Cheryl, 18; Cathy, 16; Lisa, 13; and Rebecca, 10.



JIM COLBERT

A former All-American wide receiver, Jim Colbert now spends his time plotting ways to prevent pass completions. The 35-year-old Coloradan, who won NAIA All-American recognition at Adams State in 1960, is the Packers' new secondary coach.

Defensive coordinator of the World Football League's Portland Storm a year ago, Colbert is in his 13th year of coaching. He began his career at his alma mater, Colorado Springs High School, where he coached both football and baseball from 1963 through 1968. He then graduated to the college ranks, coaching the secondary at Fresno State from 1969 through 1972, before moving to San Jose State for the 1973 season, also as a defensive backfield coach.

As a prep, Colbert won all-state honors in both football and baseball at Colorado Springs High School. He also was all-conference in football three times and in baseball twice at Adams State.

Jim, a lover of symphonic music, and his wife, Cornelia, have four children — Karen Lynn, 11; Dean, 10; Donald Ray, 7; and Kimberly Ann, 6.

The new overseer of Packer kamikazes, a 44-year-old native of Brunswick, Me., is a veteran of coaching at every level — high school, college and pro.

A Colorado State graduate, Bob Lord launched his coaching career as a basketball and baseball coach at Hotchkiss, Colo., High School, debuting on an auspicious note when he led the basketball team to the semi-finals of the state basketball tournament.

Following a one-year sabbatical to attend graduate school at Springfield, Mass., College, he entered college coaching at Wesleyan, Conn., College. After two years there, he began a four-year stint as head football coach at North Park College in Chicago.

Lord later served as head coach at Macalester College in St. Paul for two years before moving to Wake Forest as defensive line coach in 1970. He then coached at the University of Massachusetts in 1972 and 73 before moving into the pro ranks in 1974 as special teams and linebacker coach of the Chicago Bears.

A versatile athlete in high school, Lord won a total of 12 letters in four sports — four in football, three each in basketball and track and two in baseball — at his prep alma mater, Brunswick High School.

He spent 3½ of the next 4½ years in service, including a 2½-year hitch in the Korean conflict, before receiving his discharge and enrolling at Colorado State. He became a four-year letterman in football and twice won all-Rocky Mountain Conference honors.

Bob, an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes as well as an ardent golfer and skier, and his wife, Julia, have five children — Lindsay, 20, a student at North Carolina State; Martha, 16; Bobby, 17, a high school student who is a varsity performer in football, baseball and wrestling at Amherst, Mass.; Patty, 15, and Billy, 14, who is in football, gymnastics and baseball at Amherst.

Leon McLaughlin, a veteran of the NFL trenches, represents the fulfillment of what Bart Starr termed "a number one priority" in structuring his new staff — the position of offensive line coach.

In appointing McLaughlin to realign and revitalize a forward wall which had been decimated by injury in 1974, Coach Starr added a man of imposing experience up front — as both player and coach — where games are largely won and lost. A former UCLA star, he later was the Los Angeles Rams' starting center for five seasons before moving into coaching and service on three NFL staves before coming to the Packers.

An assistant with the Detroit Lions the last two years, McLaughlin began his coaching career at Washington State in 1956, then transferred to Santa Monica, California High School as head coach in 1957. He later coached at Stanford for seven years, from 1959 through 1965, before entering the pro ranks with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1966. After three seasons with the Steelers, he joined the San Fernando State staff in 1969, returning to the NFL in '71 as an assistant with his pro alma mater, Los Angeles. He moved to Detroit where he joined the late Don McCafferty, in 1973.

As a player, McLaughlin helped the Rams win the 1951 NFL championship with a 24-17 playoff victory over the Cleveland Browns. The Rams again reached the title playoff in his final pro season, 1955, losing to the Browns, 38-14. He also was a one-time Pro Bowl selection.

Leon and his wife, Jacqueline, have four children — Steve, 23, a Stanford alumnus; Bruce, 21; Marilyn, 19, a Stanford student; and Scott, 17, a student at Green Bay Preble High School, who is a 6-foot-7-inch basketball center and track man.

Youngest member of the Packer coaching staff at 33, John Meyer already has won substantial respect in the National Football League for his teaching skills.

A native of Chicago, the Packers' new linebacker coach began his coaching career with the New England Patriots in 1969 when, at 27, he became the youngest assistant coach in the NFL. He earlier had served as a scout and training camp coaching aide with the Houston Oilers in 1967 and 1968.

After four seasons with the Patriots, Meyer joined the staff of the late Don McCafferty when he became head coach of the Lions in 1973, then stayed on to assist Rick Forzano following McCafferty's death in the summer of 1974.

A graduate of Chicago's Brother Rice High School, where he won all-city honors at defensive end, Meyer later played three years of varsity football at Notre Dame. During the latter period, he played under three different head coaches for the Irish — Joe Kuharich, Hughie Devore and Ara Parseghian.

Subsequently selected by the Cardinals in the eighth round of the 1965 draft, Meyer played for St. Louis that year and for the Oilers in 1966 before going into scouting and coaching.

John and his wife, Loretta, have three daughters, Tracey, 8; Courtney, 5; and Blake, 2.

Paul Roach, considered one of the most knowledgeable offensive "minds" in all of professional football, is the first officially designated offense coordinator in the Packers' 57-year history.

Named to that position by Coach Bart Starr Feb. 7, 1975, Roach comes to Green Bay from a highly productive stay at Oakland, where he helped direct the Raiders to a glittering 31-9-2 record over the last three years and three consecutive AFC Western Division championships. It included a 12-2 mark in 1974, best regular season record in the NFL.

His new assignment is a homecoming of sorts for Roach, a native of Spring Green, Wis., who accentuated his ties with "America's Dairyland" by serving as offensive backfield coach at the University of Wisconsin in 1970 and '71.

Earlier, he spent eight years as a backfield coach at the University of Wyoming, helping the Cowboys win three straight Western Athletic Conference championships under Lloyd Eaton, now the Packers' director of College scouting. He also coached at North Dakota University for five years (1957-61).

A three-sport star at Black Hills State College in South Dakota, Roach obtained a master's degree from North Dakota U. in 1962. He attended high school in Rapid City, S. D., where he lettered in football, basketball and track.

Paul, whose responsibilities will include tutoring the offensive backs, is married and the father of three children, daughters Judy, 21, (a student at Chabot College in Hayward, Calif.) and Cathy, 16, (a junior in high school) and a son, Michael 7, in first grade.



DICK CORRICK

Dick Corrick, a member of the Packer organization since 1971, this season finds himself in a new position — with a new perspective. Previously a scout of college talent, working the West Coast area, he is now director of pro player personnel.

Corrick, named to the position March 6, 1975 by Head Coach and General Manager Bart Starr, will be scouting the "finished product" in his new role, keeping a close watch on the rosters of the National Football League's 25 other clubs with an eye to trade possibilities and to upgrading the overall Packer roster via the waiver route.

A 40-year-old graduate of La Jolla, Calif., High School and Oregon State, where he performed under Tommy Prothro as a 161-pound center and linebacker, Corrick was in the coaching ranks for 16 years before becoming a scout. He began his coaching career at Notre Del Rio High School in Sacramento in 1955. After one year there, he moved on to assistant coaching assignments at Riverside, California, City College, Iowa State, Arizona State and the University of California — Berkeley prior to joining the Packer scouting staff.

In the latter capacity, he has seen several of the players he recommended become Packers, notable among them Steve Odom, Tom Toner and Perry Smith.

Dick and his wife, Jani, have two children — Traci, 17, a Green Bay Southwest student, and Rowdy, 15, a student at Lake Tahoe, Calif., High School where he is a varsity performer in football, basketball and baseball.



LOYD EATON

Coordinator of the Packers' far-flung scouting program, Lloyd Eaton brings 27 years of successful coaching experience to his complex task. The shrewd and forthright South Dakotan culminated his coaching career at the University of Wyoming, where he compiled an imposing 57-33-2 record during nine years as head coach of the Cowboys.

Named the Packers' director of player personnel in May of 1972, Eaton previously served as a scout for the "QUADRA" combine, representing the Rams, Cowboys, 49ers and Chargers.

Born March 23, 1918 in Belle Fouché, South Dakota, he attended Black Hills State College and later secured his master's degree at the University of Michigan and a director's degree in physical education at the University of Indiana.

Overall, Eaton fashioned a 103-44-5 record as a coach. He began his collegiate coaching career at Alma, Mich., College, also serving as athletic director. Lloyd moved on to become head coach at Northern Michigan, where he was named small college "Coach of the Year" in 1956. In 1957, he became Bob Devaney's top defensive assistant at Wyoming, then succeeded Devaney as coach in 1962.

Lloyd and his wife, Ann, have two children, Glen, an Air Force pilot, and Christie.



BILLY KINARD

Billy Kinard, the Packers' defensive secondary coach a year ago, is back this year in a new role — as director of research and development. It also is a new position, instituted by incoming Head Coach and General Manager Bart Starr, designed to improve the overall Packer product.

Kinard's primary responsibility, for which he is well suited by virtue of a wide and varied coaching background, is to measure the team's success in a number of areas — to assess its growth and improvement.

Billy, who once wore Green Bay's green and gold as a player, brings 15 years of coaching experience — as both an assistant and a head coach — to his new assignment. He also played four seasons of professional football — one with the Cleveland Browns, by whom he was drafted in 1956, two with the Packers (1957-58) after being acquired in a trade, and one with the Buffalo Bills (1960) — all as a defensive back.

A native of Jackson, Miss., Kinard began his coaching career at a Daytona Beach, Fla., High School in 1959. Then, after a one-year "sabbatical" with Buffalo in the American Football League the following year, he signed on as assistant at Auburn in 1961 upon calling it quits as a player.

He later served as an aide at the Universities of Florida (1964-66), Georgia (1967-69) and Arkansas (1970) before becoming head coach at his alma mater, Ole Miss, in 1971. The first alumnus ever to serve as head football coach at Ole Miss, whose grid history reaches back to 1893, Kinard held that post into the 1973 season. While head coach of the Rebels, he guided them to a 10-2-0 record in 1971, the school's best season since 1963.

Billy, born Dec. 16, 1933, and his wife, Kay, have two children — Billy Jr., 18, attending Auburn University; and Kathy, 16, a Green Bay Preble High School student.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME RECORDS ON PAGE ONE

PACKERS SET, TIE 7 MARKS

The Packers set or tied seven team and individual records during the 1974 season, producing two all-time National League marks in the process.

Elongated Ted Hendricks established an NFL record by blocking seven kicks—three field goals, three punts and one extra point. As a team, the Packers emerged with 12 "blocks", another team and NFL record.

Placekicker Chester Marcol set a club standard for career field goals with 79, breaking the old mark of Paul Hornung. He also tied the field goal distance record with

a 52-yard kick against Baltimore Sept. 22 and twice matched the team high for field goals in a game, four, which he shares with Paul Hornung and Jerry Kramer. He turned the trick against Detroit Sept. 29 and against Minnesota Nov. 17.

In that same Viking contest, fullback John Brockington tied the team record for most ball carrying attempts in a single game with 32 rushes, good for 137 yards.

Steve Odom set the other club record with a 95-yard punt return, for a touchdown, against the Bears Nov. 10.

BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually, the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

First they talked Curly's employers at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

EARLY DAYS—That first season the team won 10 games and lost only

one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fence or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight, and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited. This was the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy. Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A. B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in

1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 to 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD — Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict, and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ron-

zani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER — The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and business man, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the re-building plans and Lisle W. Blackbourn, a native Wisconsinite, and Coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP — Likeable Ray "Scooter" McLean moves up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his first season as head coach.

FROM SANDLOT TO STADIUM — Procedures at Packers games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system — the latter hadn't been invented yet. There weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in. When the Packers began their career

in 1919 they played on approximately the same site as now abandoned City Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called, was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut street street-car and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field.

By moving as the play progressed you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics for the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's halftime suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built — just a small bleacher with a ca-

capacity of a couple hundred — on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

When Hagemeister Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides between the 30-yard lines.

Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

After World War II City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an

inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961 the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, and to the present 56,267 in 1970.

THE LOMBARDI ERA

In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giant assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager of a team that finished dead last in 1958 with a 1-10-1 mark.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and was unanimously voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division Title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams have become the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise has become one of the most successful in the Over a nine year span as Head Coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 141 victories against 39 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .783 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 Division playoffs and World Championship Games, the Packers

emerged victorious nine times.

Following the third consecutive Title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970 compiling a 20-21-1 record and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE DEVINE DAYS

Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a 5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record after losing their last three games, and Devine submitted his resignation.

THE PRESENT

Bart Starr, the most successful field general in pro football history as Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the National Football League wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on Dec. 24, 1974. Starr, who led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere . . . We will earn everything else."

1975 NFL RULE CHANGES

PENALTIES

A team using entering substitutes, legally returning players, substitutes on sidelines or withdrawn players to confuse opponents (such as a 14-man defensive huddle prior to start of a play) will be penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct.

When there are penalties on each team on the same play and one results in disqualification, the penalties will be offsetting but the disqualification will stand.

Penalties for an ineligible player downfield on a forward pass, and for offensive pass interference, have been reduced from 15 to 10 yards.

In the case of defensive holding or illegal use of hands, the penalty will be assessed from the previous line of scrimmage rather than from the spot where the ball is blown dead if that spot is behind the line of scrimmage.

PASSING

Any fourth down pass incomplete in or through the end zone when the line of scrimmage is inside the 20 will result in the opponent taking possession at the previous line of scrimmage, rather than on the 20.

DOUBLE SHIFT

A team may use a double shift on or inside the opponent's 20-yard line after it has been shown at least three times previously in the game.
