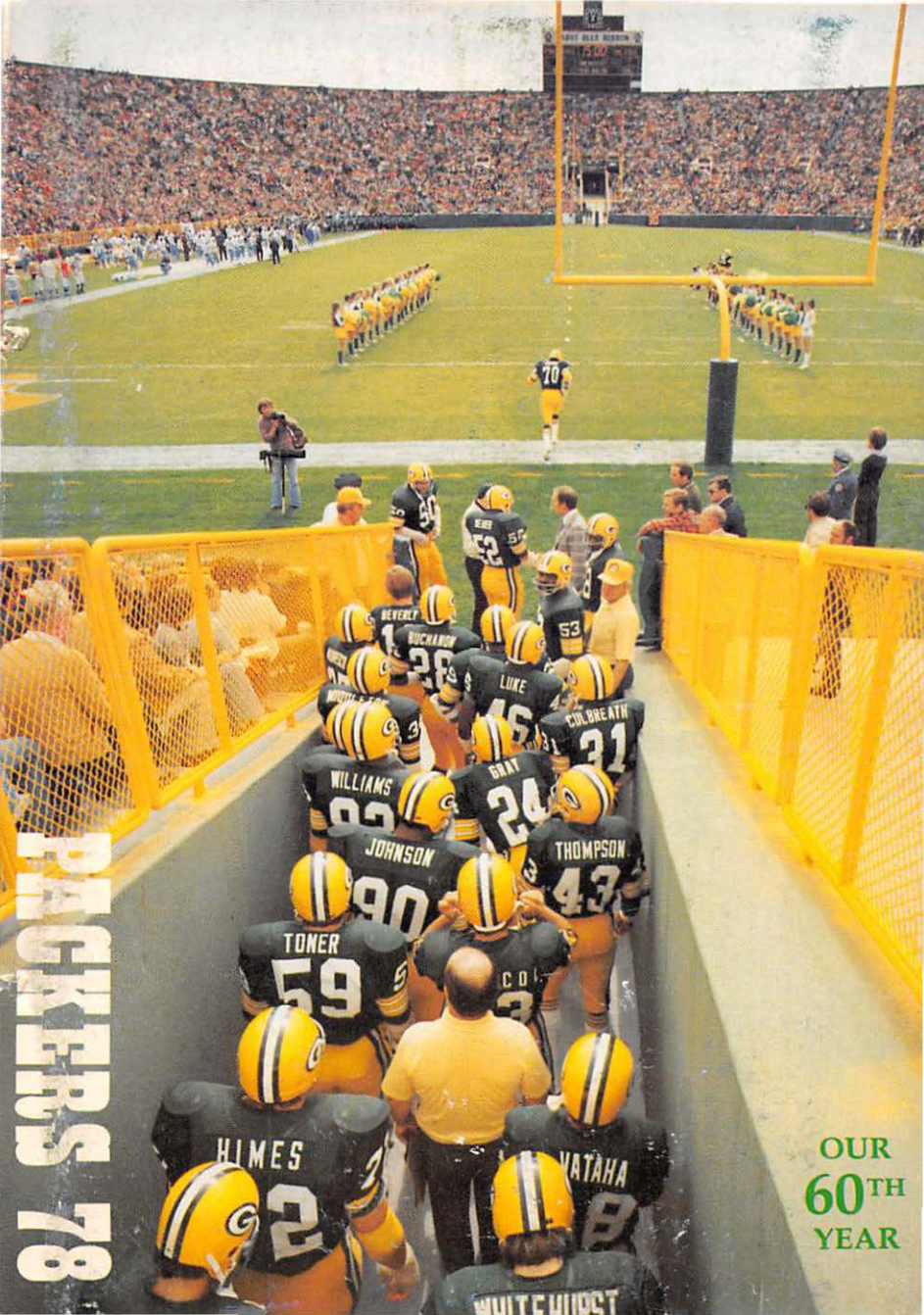
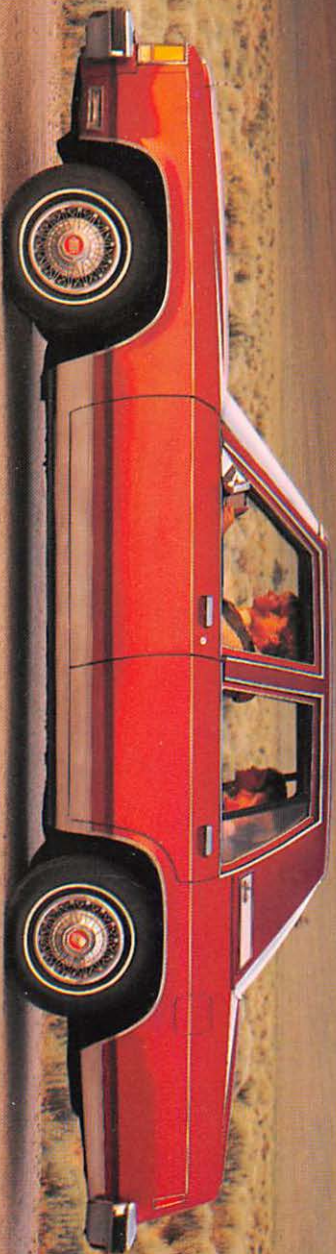

ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers lead the NFL in most championships won with eleven. Green Bay won three by league standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight times (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967) since the play-off system was established in 1933.

In addition, the Packers hold two AFL-NFL football titles by virtue of their 35-10 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs in 1967 and their 33-14 win over Oakland in 1968.

The Chicago Bears are next with eight NFL championships, having won twice prior to the play-off system (1921 and 1932) and six times since (1937, 1940, 1941, 1943, 1946 and 1963). The Giants, Lions and Browns have won 4 titles, the Eagles and Colts 3.

The Green Bay Packers, unique in structure as well as championship tradition, are the only publicly-owned team in professional football. Green Bay Packers, Inc., is a non-profit corporation, founded in 1922. There are 4,656½ shares of non-profit stock owned by 1,728 shareholders. The corporation is governed by a 7-man Executive Committee, elected from a 45-man board of directors. (For the "Green Bay Packer Story," turn to page 83).

Day-to-day corporate decisions are made by the general manager, who is in total charge of football operations. Other matters, such as financing/budgeting and construction projects, fall under the jurisdiction of the Executive Committee.

One member of that 7-man body, Dominic Olejniczak, has headed the corporation for 21 years, longer than any previous president.

BART STARR Head Coach and General Manager

Harvest time, at long last, may be at hand for Bart Starr.

The legendary ex-field general, avoiding "the future is now" temptation, has been committed to rebuilding Packer fortunes via the draft ever since he became head coach and general manager in late December of 1974 — a commitment made despite the knowledge Green Bay's first and second round draft choices in each of his first two years would not be available to him because they had been dealt away in a pre-Starr trade.

After biting that unpalatable bullet in 1975 and '76, as his Packers struggled to 4-10 and 5-9 records, he became the beneficiary of a complete draft for the first time in '77. Unfortunately, injuries to quarterback Lynn Dickey, starting linebacker Gary Weaver and key members of the offensive line combined to offset the addition of such premium rookies as Mike Butler and

Ezra Johnson, and the Packers slipped back to a 4-10 mark.

In 1978, however, Starr has had a full draft for a second year and hopefully now is in a position to begin capitalizing — from a won-lost standpoint — on the quality athletes assembled during this span. Newcomers like James Lofton, John Anderson and Mike Hunt are expected to provide immediate and substantial help. If so, Starr well could restore the Packers to artistic respectability this season, though he and they face one of the more challenging schedules in the team's 60-year history.

The eighth head coach in the annals of professional sports' most storied franchise, Starr officially was tendered his imposing assignment by the Packer Executive Committee on Dec. 24, 1974. It was his by informal acclamation, a development unique in Packer annals. The sweeping mandate was entirely understandable, even though he had had only one year of coaching experience, success having been a habit with him on and off the field.

"Mr. Quarterback," most productive signal caller in pro football history, had endeared himself to the faithful with his achievements as field leader of the Packers in the 7-year period between 1961 and 1967, during which he guided Green Bay to five world championships, a feat without equal in pro football history.

With Starr at the offensive controls, the Packers made 6 playoff appearances in 8 years, beginning with a 1960 showdown against the Eagles. That was the only playoff the Packers were to lose with No. 15 at quarterback. They rebounded from that disappointment to decimate the Giants in the '61 title game, 37-0, and repeated in '62, again felling the Giants (16-7).

After two winning but non-championship years in 1963 and '64, Starr led the Packers to three consecutive titles in 1965-66-67, the first time such a parlay had been achieved since the advent of the NFL playoff system in 1933.

The Packers' all-time field general climaxed that historic "triple play" by escorting Green Bay to successive victories in the first two Super Bowls, in both of which he was voted the game's Most Valuable Player.

During those highly prosperous '60's, Starr three times led the NFL in passing (1962, 1964 and 1966) and was named to the Pro Bowl on four occasions (1961, '62, '63 and '66). He also established four NFL passing records during his 16-year playing career, longest in the team's history. He set, and still holds, league marks for lifetime passing efficiency, 57.42 per cent; most consecutive passes attempted without an interception, 294; lowest percentage of passes intercepted for a season, 1.20, set in 1966; and shares the record for fewest passes intercepted in a season, 3, with Gary Wood of the New York Giants.

Born Bryan Bartlett Starr, in Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 9, 1934, the son of a career Air Force master sergeant, Starr won All-American honors in high school, but things did not come easily for him thereafter. He had to fight his way through adversity and initial professional obscurity to gain pre-eminence among pro football quarterbacks.

Bart was a lowly, 17th round draft choice of the Packers in 1956 because pro scouts were wary of his physical future, a reluctance prompted by a back injury Starr had received as a junior at Alabama. The uphill struggle continued after he joined the Green and Gold. For the next four seasons, Starr shared quarterbacking duties with Tobin Rote, Lamar McHan, Babe Parilli, and Joe Francis before gaining regular status in the ninth game of the 1959 season. He led the Packers to consecutive victories in those last four games, under first year Coach Vince Lombardi, and Green Bay's first winning season in 12 years.

Although a consistent, high level performer game in and game out during the regular season, it was Starr's brilliance in post-season play which set him apart from all others. In six NFL title games, he completed 84 of 145 passes for 1,090 yards and 11 touchdowns — with incredibly, only one interception — for a glittering 57.9 percent. In two Super Bowls, he was even more deadly, completing 29 of 47 attempts (61.7 per cent) for 452 yards, 3 TDs and again, with only 1 interception.

Following his retirement as a player in July of 1972, after two shoulder operations, Bart became Packer quarterback coach. He resigned in January of 1973 to pursue private business interests. In the interim, he had become a highly successful automobile dealer and a much sought after motivational speaker and TV "salesman" as well as a popular analyst on CBS-TV's NFL football telecasts and an actor in motivational films prior to taking on his current challenge.

Despite his heavy schedule, Starr gives generously of his time and talents to charitable and civic endeavors such as "Rawhide," a leadership training camp for boys who need a second chance. He and his wife, the former Cherry Morton of Birmingham, Alabama have two sons, Bart Jr., an accomplished golfer who is attending the University of Alabama, and Bret, 14.

DAVE HANNER

Assistant Head Coach and Defensive Coordinator



Joel David Hanner is a man apart in the annals of Packer service. Now in his 27th season in Green and Gold, he has served Green Bay's storied National Football League franchise longer as player and coach than any other man except the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, the team's founder and first coach.

The imposing Arkansan, in his 14th year on the staff, also holds the club record for tenure by an assistant coach.

Plucked from the University of Arkansas campus on the fifth round of the 1952 draft, Hanner quickly established himself at defensive left tackle, winning all-pro honors five times over a 13-year career,

plus two Pro Bowl nominations. Enroute, he played a major role as the Packers won the NFL's Western Division title in 1960, then helped them win successive world championships in 1961 and '62.

Born at Parkin, Ark., on May 20, 1930, Hanner called it a career during the pre-season of 1965 to join Vince Lombardi's coaching staff. Over the next three seasons, the defensive line he tutored made a prominent contribution to the acquisition of three straight NFL titles (1965-66-67) and two Super Bowl crowns.

Dave thus rapidly built a league-wide reputation for his defensive acumen, officially acknowledged when Coach Dan Devine named him defensive coordinator in 1972. In his first year in this role, the Packer defense finished No. 1 in the National Football Conference. Two years later, Hanner's defense gave up only 206 points over 14 games, which remains the best record by a Packer defensive unit since the Super Bowl year of 1967.

Dave and his wife, Jane, have six children — Joel David II (Joe), 23; Eddie, 22, a student at UW-Whitewater; Sammye Jane, 21, a student at the University of Minnesota; Mike, 18, a freshman at Northern Michigan; Hollye Ann, 15; and Jimmy, 10.

ZEKE BRATKOWSKI Quarterback Coach

Edmund Raymond "Zeke" Bratkowski, one of the pre-eminent rescue quarterbacks in pro football history as a player, is in the fourth year of his second "hitch" on the Packer coaching staff.

Originally a Chicago Bear and later a Los Angeles Ram, prior to joining Green Bay, Bratkowski was named quarterback coach of the Packers by Bart Starr on Jan. 4, 1975. That appointment not only reunited Zeke with the Packers but with his longtime ex-teammate, Starr. Bratkowski previously had served as a Packer coaching aide under Phil Bengston in 1969-70, and as a Packer player for 6½ seasons (1963-68 and 1971). As a player, he had backed up Starr with distinction when injuries sidelined No. 15 during the highly successful '60s.

An NFL performer for 14 seasons, Bratkowski had been a starter with the Bears and Rams but had his most memorable day as a player in a rescue role. That was on December 26, 1965, when he escorted the Pack to a sudden death victory over Baltimore in the Western Conference playoff after Starr had suffered a disabling injury early in the game.

Born in Danville, IL, Oct. 20, 1931, Bratkowski was the Bears' No. 2 choice in the 1953 draft. Following his rookie season, he spent two years in the Air Force, rejoining the Bears in 1957. He was traded to the Rams in 1961, and by LA to the Packers during the '63 season.

Zeke and M.E. (for Mary Elizabeth) have three children — Robert, an assistant football coach at the University of Missouri-Columbia; Steve, varsity quarterback at Arizona State University; and Kassie, a junior at Green Bay's St. Joseph's Academy.



LEW CARPENTER Passing Game Coach

A jack-of-all-positions as a player, Lew Carpenter has gained league-wide recognition for this coaching skills as a specialist. Over the past decade, he has honed and polished the talents of such renowned receivers as John Gilliam, Mel Gray, Ahmad Rashad, Charley Taylor and Paul Flatley.

Named to the Packer coaching staff in January of 1975 by Head Coach Bart Starr, Carpenter came to Green Bay with the assignment of redesigning the Packer passing game. So well did he succeed that quarterback John Hadl set a Packer all-time single season record for completions (191) that year. Uniquely equipped for this role, Lew has played both wide receiver positions, tight end, halfback and fullback during his playing days, which included five

seasons in Packer green and gold.

Prior to joining the Packers as a coach, Carpenter had served on the staffs of the Minnesota Vikings, Atlanta Falcons, Washington Redskins, St. Louis Cardinals and Houston Oilers.

An eighth round draft choice of Detroit in 1953, he spent the '54 and '55 seasons with the Lions before entering the service for a year. Dealt to Cleveland in 1957, he later came to the Packers in a 1959 trade. He became Green Bay's No. 1 utility man on offense, helping the Packers win successive world titles in 1961 and 1962.

Born in West Memphis, Ark., January 12, 1932, Lew and his wife Ann, have four daughters, Cheryl, 21; Cathy, 19; Lisa, 16; and Rebecca, 13.



BILL CURRY Offensive Line Coach

A man of rare skills in the art of communication, Bill Curry has taken to coaching with the same verve and diligence he exhibited as a player. And his articulate, committed approach spawned visible improvement in the Packer's offensive line in 1977, particularly in the waning weeks of the season, despite formidable injury problems along the way.

Curry, who joined the Green Bay staff a year ago following an initial year of coaching at Georgia Tech, already is regarded as a future head coaching prospect.

The 35-year-old Atlantan is in his third tour of duty with the Packers. Originally selected by Green Bay as a future choice in the 20th round of the 1964 National Football League draft, he later helped the Packers

win consecutive world championships in 1965 and 1966 and was their starting center in Super Bowl I against Kansas City. He was selected by New Orleans in the expansion draft of 1967 and was traded to Baltimore prior to the '67 season. He went on to become a mainstay of the Colts' 1969 and 1971 Super Bowl teams.

One of a handful to play in three Super Bowl games, Curry was dealt to Houston in January of 1973. He played only four games that season, suffering a serious knee injury. Claimed by the Rams prior to the 1974 season, he was re-acquired by the Packers from Los Angeles in 1975 but retired during the pre-season because of an injury problem.

Born in College Park, GA, October 21, 1942, Curry is a past president of the NFL Players' Association and a former part-time sportscaster noted for his eloquence as a public speaker.

William Alexander and Carolyn Curry have two children, Kristin, 11, and William Alexander, Jr., 7.

DICK LeBEAU

Defensive Backfield Coach

Under the direction of this legendary former Detroit Lion, the Packers' defensive secondary has been molded into the soundest and most combative unit on the squad and one with such unity of purpose it has come to call itself S.W.A.T.

That youthful "outfield" is a reflection of the coach. Dick LeBeau was a punishing hitter who set an all-time NFL durability record for cornerbacks during a 14-year career, playing in 171 consecutive games. Dick also emerged as the fourth ranking interceptor in the game's history with 62 career thefts.

Appointed to the Packer staff on Jan. 23, 1976, LeBeau previously had served as special teams coach of the Philadelphia Eagles for three years after retiring as a

player following the 1975 season.

Born in London, Ohio, Sept. 9, 1937, Charles Richard LeBeau was an all-state performer in high school and later had an outstanding career at Ohio State, where he starred on the Buckeyes' national championship team in 1957.

A fifth round draft choice of Cleveland in 1959, he became one of the biggest bargains in the Lions' history after he was released by the Browns and signed by Detroit in his rookie year.

An accomplished golfer — he was the NFL Players' Association's 1967 golf champion — Dick also is an indefatigable reader with a predilection for history and biography. Just turned 40, he is married to the former Nancy Shadrick of Detroit.



BOB LORD

Offensive Backfield Coach

Bob Lord, an eloquent and effervescent coaching veteran, is in his second year as tutor of the Packers' offensive backs. He was transferred to his current assignment by Head Coach Bart Starr in January of 1977 after two seasons as coach of the special teams, a role in which he developed some of the NFL's finest suicide squads.

Lord, a native of Brunswick, ME., has coached at every level — high school, college and pro. He began his career as a basketball and baseball coach at Hotchkiss, Colo. High School. Bob later coached at Wesleyan, Conn., College, North Park College, Macalester College, Wake Forest and the University of Massachusetts before entering the pro ranks in 1974 as special teams

and linebacker coach for the Chicago Bears. He was named to the Packer staff in 1975.

An all-around athlete as a prep, Lord won a total of 12 letters in four sports at Brunswick High School. He spent the next 4½ years in service, including a 2½-year hitch in the Korean conflict. Following his discharge, he enrolled at Colorado State, where he won four letters in football.

Lord, born Feb. 3, 1930, is an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, as well as an ardent golfer, skier and handball player. He and his wife, Julia, have five children — Lindsay, 22; Martha, 21; Bobby, 20, a junior at UW-Oshkosh, where he is a quarterback on the football team; Patty, 18; and Billy, 17.



ERNIE McMILLAN **Offensive Line Assistant**

Huge Ernie McMillan, who enjoyed a distinguished, 15-year playing career in the National Football League as an offensive tackle, will assist Bill Curry in coaching the Packer offensive line in 1978.

In making the appointment February 7, Coach Bart Starr explained, "A championship caliber offensive line is crucial for team success. With this in mind, we hired Bill Curry a year ago to begin molding this all important group. . . Appropriately, a year later, we have further emphasized our commitment. . . Ernie McMillan earned the respect of everyone who has ever known him and we were so impressed with his work in training camp here last year, we sought to have him join us full time."

A former University of Illinois athlete, McMillan spent 14 seasons with the St. Louis Cardinals, who had made him a 13th round choice in the 1961 draft. He twice was an all-pro selection (1970 and '71) and was chosen to play in four Pro Bowls. He also played in more games than any other player in Cardinal history, 178. Ernie, a native of Chicago Heights, Ill., closed out his playing career with the Packers in 1975.

Prior to his Packer appointment, McMillan had served as publisher of "Proud," a black consciousness periodical. He also has been active in St. Louis community affairs.



JOHN MEYER **Linebacker Coach**

At the relatively tender age of 36, John Meyer already is in his tenth season as an assistant coach in the National Football League.

Meyer, who ranks behind only veterans Dave Hanner and Lew Carpenter in NFL coaching experience on the Packer staff, was the youngest assistant coach in pro football when he made his debut with the New England Patriots in 1969 at the age of 27.

The former Notre Dame athlete, now in his fourth year with the Packers, spent his first four seasons with the Patriots. He later joined the staff of the late Don McCafferty, when the latter became head coach of the Detroit Lions in 1973, then stayed on to assist Rick Forzano following McCafferty's death in the summer of 1974.

Born in Chicago Feb. 20, 1942, Meyer is a graduate of Chicago's Brother Rice High School, where he won all-city honors at defensive end before enrolling at Notre Dame. An eighth round selection of St. Louis in the 1965 draft, Meyer played for the Cardinals that year and for the Oilers in '66 before going into scouting and coaching in 1967.

John and his wife, Loretta, have three daughters: Tracey Ann, 11; Courtney Lynn, 8; and Blake Marie, 4.

DICK CORRICK

Director of Player Personnel



Previously a talent scout and more recently director of pro player personnel, Dick Corrick has moved into a new and key assignment in 1978 as director of player personnel. In this highly responsible role, the former Oregon State athlete coordinates all Packer efforts in the area of player personnel.

In addition to directing the club's college scouting program, Corrick also keeps a close watch on the rosters of the NFL's 27 other clubs with an eye to trade possibilities or opportunities to upgrade the overall Packer roster via the waiver route.

Immediately prior to taking on his new assignment, Dick had been associated with the coaching staff in the area of team development in 1977, when he coordinated

the coaching staff on the field and monitored the Packers' offensive and defensive approaches.

Born April 22, 1934, Corrick is a 44-year-old graduate of LaJolla, CA., High School. A 161-pound center and linebacker at Oregon State under Tommy Prothro, he later was in high school and college coaching for 16 years prior to joining the Packer scouting staff in 1971.

A chef of exceptional talents, Dick delights in whipping up an exotic or elaborate meal in his leisure moments. He is the father of two children — Traci, 20, and Rowdy, 18, an all-around high school athlete.

1978 NFL RULE CHANGES

Interpretation of pass blocking rule clarified to permit extended arms and open hands.

Defenders now permitted to maintain contact on receivers in a five-yard zone beyond the line of scrimmage, but restricted their contact on receivers beyond that point.

15-yard penalty reduced to 10 yards for all fouls except those involving unnecessary roughness, unsportsmanlike conduct, personal fouls, disqualification or palpably unfair acts.

Whenever the ball is carried across the line of scrimmage, no legal forward pass can be thrown.

Unsportsmanlike conduct rule clarified to include flagrant forms of taunting or baiting by players towards opponents as violations at any time during the game.

Double touch of a forward pass legalized (batting pass in flight towards the opponent's goal line made illegal).

During last two minutes of a half, responsibility placed on defensive team to line up properly when referee signals ready for play after offensive team is set.

A 15-yard penalty will now be assessed during a down involving a double foul without change in possession when one foul carries a penalty of 15 yards and the other only 5.

Penalty for intentional grounding in the field of play reduced from a loss of down and 15, to loss of down and 10 (awarding of a safety when passer illegally grounds the ball in the end zone also approved).

Clarified official's right not to stop the clock, or if stopped, to run 10 seconds off the clock during the last two minutes of a half when a team deliberately attempts to conserve time.

Hurdling eliminated as a foul.

- Sept. 18** Charging to a 24 - 0 halftime lead, the Packers open their 1977 National Football League season with a 24-20 victory over the New Orleans Saints in the New Orleans Superdome. Scoring plays include a 2-yard run by Barty Smith, a 75-yard punt return by Willard Harrell, and a 15-yard pass from Lynn Dickey to Ken Payne.
- Sept. 25** Packers mount early 7-0 lead on 40-yard scoring pass from Lynn Dickey to Steve Odom in home opener at Lambeau Field, but ultimately fall to Houston. 16-10, when a deflected pass is converted into an interception and a 95-yard scoring run by Oiler Willie Alexander.
- Oct. 2** Lynn Dickey and Steve Odom forge the longest pass completion of NFL's '77 season (95 yards) on the third play of the game, and erect a quick 7-0 Packer lead. Vikings eventually prevail, however, 19-7.
- Oct. 9** Packers again score first, this time posting a 7-0 edge over Tampa Bay Buccaneers, taking early 6-0 lead on a pair of Chester Marcol field goals and sealing the decision in the third quarter with a 5-yard scoring run by Eric Torkelson in wake of a punt block by Jim Gueno.
- Nov. 6** Steve Odom and Terdell Middleton collaborate on a 96-yard scoring kickoff return in the fourth quarter at Kansas City, but it's not enough to avert a 20-10 loss to Chiefs.
- Nov. 21** Rookie David Whitehurst makes impressive pro starting debut in nationally televised game at Washington, completing 12 of 24 passes for 140 yards, but Redskins escape with 10-9 victory. Chester Marcol kicks three field goals (44, 40 and 42 yards) in losing cause.
- Dec. 4** Posting early 10-0 lead on 2-yard run by Willard Harrell and 37-yard Chester Marcol field goal, Packers crack four-game losing streak with 10-9 victory over Lions in Lambeau Field.
- Dec. 18** Packers roll up 322 yards and close out with 16-14 decision over 49ers at Milwaukee behind stellar 17-for-22 passing performance by David Whitehurst and a 29-yard scoring runback with an interception by Willie Buchanon.

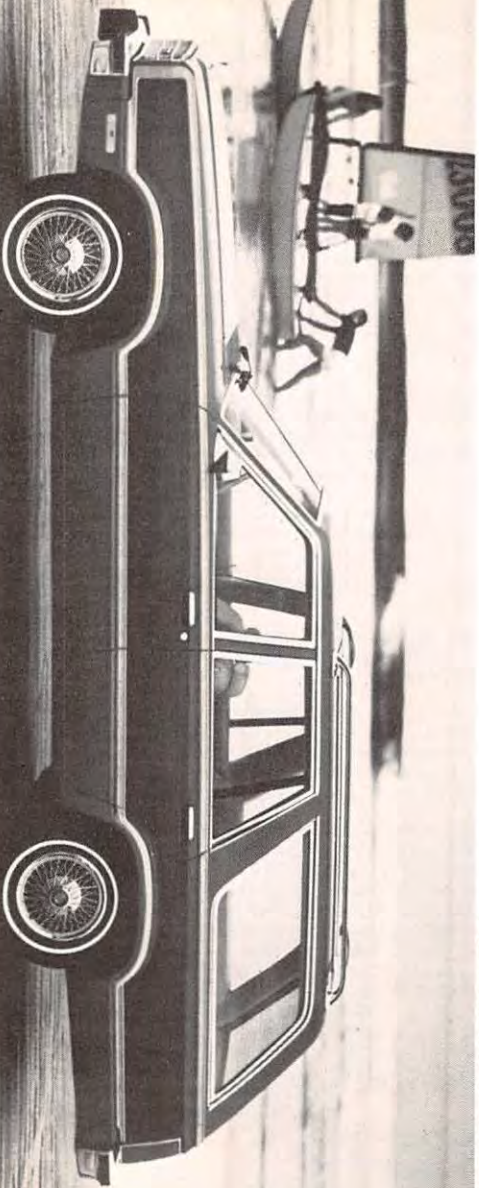

SUPER BOWL STORY

Super Bowl I

January 15, 1967

Memorial Coliseum, Los Angeles, Calif.

Paid Attendance: 61,946

Green Bay 35, Kansas City 10

The Packers launched the Super Bowl series by whipping Kansas City's American Football League champions 35-10 behind the passing of Bart Starr, the receiving of Max McGee and a key interception by all-pro safety Willie Wood.

Vince Lombardi's repeating NFL champions broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 40-yard return of an interception to the Chief's 5-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. The pass, authored by the Chiefs' Len Dawson, had been intended for Kansas City tight end Fred Arbanas.

McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler (injured on the Packers first offensive series) after having caught only three passes all season, snared seven from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores counting one on a 5-yard run in the third quarter and the other on a one-yard bolt in the final period.

The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter; the only touchdown on a seven-yard pass from Dawson to Curtis McClinton.

Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 touchdowns and was chosen the game's most valuable player. His scoring strikes came on a 37-yard collaboration with McGee in the first quarter and a 13-yard pitch to the aging end in the decisive third period.

The Packers collected \$15,000 per man and the Chiefs \$7,500 apiece — the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports.

Super Bowl II

January 14, 1968

Orange Bowl, Miami, Florida

Paid Attendance: 75,546

Green Bay 33, Oakland 14

Having acquired a third consecutive NFL championship just two weeks earlier, the Packers embellished that record-tying parlay by winning the Super Bowl title for the second straight year. This time, they dispatched the AFL champion Raiders, 33-14, in a game that drew the first \$3 million gate in football history.

Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown and directed a Packer attack that was in control all the way after building up a 16-7 halftime lead.

Don Chandler kicked four field goals (39, 20, 43 and 31 yards), and all-pro cornerback Herb Adderley highlighted the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard interception return of a Daryle Lamonica pass.

After leading by only 3-0 at the quarter, the Packers padded their margin to 16-7 at halftime by way of three Chandler field goals and a 62-yard scoring pass from Starr to split end Boyd Dowler. They then left the Raiders behind with a 10-point third period, Donny Anderson scoring on a 2-yard run and Chandler with his final field goal.

The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packers coach, ending nine years at Green Bay in which he won six Western Conference championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowls, a record unprecedented in pro football history.

THE PACKERS NFC (NFL) PLAYOFF HISTORY . . GAME BY GAME

1936 — GREEN BAY 21, BOSTON REDSKINS 6, (Polo Grounds, New York) — Although New York was not represented in the title playoff, the game was played in the Polo Grounds because the Redskins franchise was being shifted to Washington, D.C., by George Marshall. A turn-out of 29,545 saw Don Hutson take a 45-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes, and the Packers were never headed.

1938 — NEW YORK 23, GREEN BAY 17, (Polo Grounds, New York) — The Packers overcame an early 9-0 New York lead, spanned by two blocked punts, but could not hold off the Giants in the second half. The Packers began to close-in early in the second period, Arnie Herber capitalizing on a Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen interception by lofting a 50-yard touchdown strike to Carl Mulleneaux, cutting the Giants margin to 9-7.

The Giants shortly converted a mid-field fumble by Packer fullback Eddie Jankowski into a 18-7 lead before Green Bay again trimmed the deficit to two points before the half was over. Clarke Hinkle crashing over from the 6-inch line following a 66-yard Cecil Isbell pass to Wayland Becker. The Packers then forged in front in opening minutes of the second half for the first and only time in the game; an Engebretsen field goal presenting them with a 17-16 edge. The Giants, however, stormed back with a 61-yard scoring drive, capped by a 35-yard pass from Ed Danowski to Hank Soar. Soar fought his way over the goal line from the 2, with Hinkle clinging to one leg, for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A crowd of 48,120, a play-off record, sat in on proceedings.

1939 — GREEN BAY 27, NEW YORK 0, (State Fair Park, Milwaukee) — The Packers made playoff history by scoring first shutout ever registered in NFL championship game. Despite bitter, 35 m.p.h. wind, both Arnie Herber and Cecil Isbell passed for touchdowns in leading Green Bay to its fifth world championship before 32,279 fans.

Green Bay mounted a 7-0 halftime lead, by dint of a Herber scoring strike to Milt Gantenbein, and pulled away in the third quarter on a 29-yard field goal by Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen and a long TD pass from Isbell to Joe Laws. The Packers added 10 more points in the fourth quarter on a 42-yard field goal by Ernie Smith and a short scoring run by fullback Eddie Jankowski.

1944 — GREEN BAY 14, NEW YORK 7, (Polo Grounds, New York) — With peerless pass catcher Don Hutson employed primarily as a decoy for the Giant defense, fullback Ted Fritsch emerged the offensive hero of Packers' sixth world title victory.

Fritsch scored both Green Bay touchdowns, one on a 2-yard run in the second quarter and the other on a 26-yard pass-and-run collaboration with Irv Comp in the third. Ward Cuff scored the Giants touchdown with a one-yard plunge on the first play of the final period. Joe Laws, the Packers' veteran, 34-year-old all-purpose halfback, had a brilliant day, setting a playoff record with three interceptions and claiming ground gaining honors with 74 yards in 13 carries. Attendance: 46,016.

1960 — PHILADELPHIA 17, GREEN BAY 13 (Franklin Field) — Packers erected a 6-0 lead in the second period and were out in front by 13-10 in fourth quarter before yielding to late surge by Eagles, who scored the deciding points on a 5-yard burst by Ted Dean.

Green Bay moved ahead in first quarter on a 20-yard Paul Hornung field goal. Hornung added 23-yard FG in second quarters but Eagles tied it 6-6 on a 35-yard scoring pass from Norm Van Brocklin to Tommy McDonald and edged ahead via Bobby Walston's first conversion. Walston followed with a 15-yard FG for a 10-6 halftime lead.

The Packers stopped Philadelphia at their own four late in the third period, then recaptured lead on a 7-yard TD pass from Bart Starr to Max McGee. A 58-yard kickoff return by Dean, however, ignited Eagles and victory eluded Packers, making their first title game appearance in 16 years. Attendance: 67,325.

1961 — GREEN BAY 37, NEW YORK 0, (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Paul Hornung, on leave from the Army, scored an individual record 19 points to key Packer decimation of Giants in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

A record Packer home crowd of 39,029 watched the Green and Gold erupt for 24 points in the second quarter. In all, the Packers scored seven times against the NFL's top defensive team of 1961, amassing four touchdowns and three field goals. The defense, meanwhile, was proving a devastating complement to the attack, intercepting four Giant passes and recovering one fumble.

Two interceptions, by Ray Nitschke and defensive back Hank Gremminger, set up touchdowns No. 2 and 3 while the fumble recovery by Forrest Gregg led to Hornung's second field goal and a Jess Whittenton interception to Hornung's final FG.

1962 — GREEN BAY 16, NEW YORK 7, (Yankee Stadium, New York) — Out front all the way in a raw, cyclonic setting, Packers weather siege by vengeful Giants in primitive, hand-to-hand struggle. Ray Nitschke proves principal frustration to New Yorkers, seeking redemption for shutout humiliation in '61 title game. His deflection triggers interception to blunt early Giant drive to Green Bay 10. On way to being named game's most valuable player, he also registers two interceptions, one of which led to the Packers' only touchdown of the afternoon. The other set up a 29-yard field goal by Jerry Kramer, whose trio of three-pointers provided eventual margin.

Giants' only TD comes on block of Max McGee punt in Green Bay end zone midway through the third quarter.

A battered Jim Taylor sets playoff record with 31 rushing attempts, good for 85 yards.

1965 — GREEN BAY 23, CLEVELAND 12, (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Field softened by four-inch snow made Packer backs only run harder as Lambeau Field crowd of 50,777 celebrated third championship in five years. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung amassed 201 yards rushing in rally that overcame Browns' early 9-7 lead.

Packers charged to 7-0 first quarter advantage on 47-yard Bart Starr pass to Carroll Dale and Don Chandler's conversion, but Cleveland moved in front on a 17-yard TD strike from Frank Ryan to Gary Collins and 24-yard Lou Groza field goal.

Green Bay rebounded, however, with 15 and 23 yard FGs by Chandler, the latter following a Willie Wood interception, to claim 13-7 lead subsequently trimmed to a single point by a second Groza FG shortly before the intermission.

Starr settled the issue in third quarter, escorting the Packers on a 90-yard, 11-play scoring drive climaxed by Hornung's 13-yard sweep of Browns' right perimeter.

1966 — GREEN BAY 34, DALLAS 27, (Cotton Bowl, Dallas) — Bart Starr has one of his finest hours, passing for four touchdowns as Packers win second straight title and fourth in six years. Tom Brown thwarts last-minute Cowboy bid, and the majority of 74,152 Cotton Bowl fans, with end zone interception of Don Meredith's fourth down pass from Green Bay 2.

Packers mounted quick 14-0 lead on a 17-yard Starr pass to Elijah Pitts and 18-yard scoring run with a fumble recovery by rookie Jim Grabowski, but led only 21-17 at halftime following explosive Cowboy comeback. After a 32-yard Villanueva field goal had cut Packer lead to a tenuous 21-20, Starr hit Dowler and McGee with 16-yard scoring passes to provide a cushion against the Cowboy's late surge.

1967 — GREEN BAY 21, DALLAS 17, (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — With thermometer shuddering at 13 below zero and 50,861 in stands, Bart Starr scores winning touchdown from one-yard-line with 13 seconds remaining, sealing record third straight championship for Packers and their fifth in seven years.

Starr's touchdown, on third down with no timeouts remaining, climaxed a 68-yard drive in 12 plays.

As was case in 1966, Packers grabbed early 14-0 advantage. But this time Cowboys came from behind to take the lead, forcing story book finish by Green Bay to win contest later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

Starr's touchdown passes of 8 and 46 yards to Boyd Dowler built the first quarter bulge, trimmed in second quarter by George Andrie's 7-yard scoring return of a Starr fumble and 21-yard Danny Villanueva field goal. Don Meredith's 50-yard scoring strike to Lance Rentzel in the fourth quarter triggered the dramatic denouement.

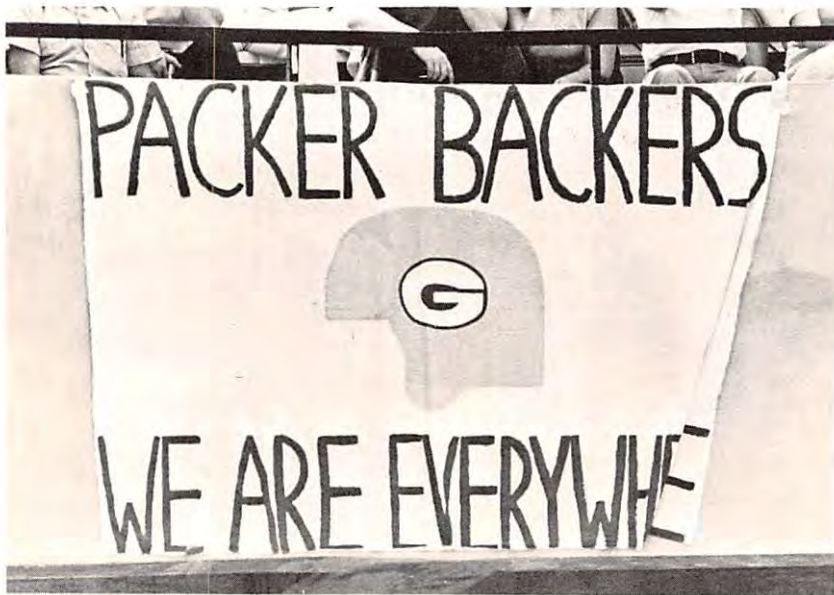

PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1963 — E. L. (Curly) Lambeau, Founder, player, coach, vice-president (1919-49): Founded Packers in 1919 and served as team's only coach through 1949 season. Also played halfback from '19 through '27, a period during which he pioneered forward pass in professional football. Led Packers to six world championships and remains one of only three coaches to record more than 200 coaching victories in the NFL. (others are George Halas, Paul Brown) Also coached Chicago Cardinals (1950-51) and Washington Redskins (1952-53).



1963 — Johnny (Blood) McNally, HB (1928-36). Also played for Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Steelers. An elusive runner and gifted pass receiver, he played major role in Packer's drive to first three championships in 1920, 30 and 31. Also helped Packers win a fourth world title in '36. Still ranks 13th in Packer lifetime scoring, four decades after departing Green Bay scene, with 224 points. Collegiate star at St. Thomas.



1963 — Don Hutson, E (1935-45). Highest scoring receiver in pro football history with 99 touchdowns, all-time NFL record. Credited with inventing pass patterns, he led league in receiving 8 years and in scoring 5 seasons, both also lifetime marks. Caught passes in 95 consecutive games, third longest streak in NFL history. Currently ranks 10th lifetime among pro receivers with 488 catches and 13th in NFL career scoring with 823 points. Starred at U. of Alabama.



1963 — Robert (Cal) Hubbard, T-E (1929-35). Also played for New York Giants, Pittsburgh Steelers. A legendary athlete, he was one of pro football's first genuine giants — a massive 6 ft. 3 inch, 265 pounder who was a devastating blocker on offense and relentless pursuer on defense as a premier, two-way performer. Was an all-pro choice in each of first three years (1931, 32, 33) such selections were made. Played college football at Centenary, Geneva.



1964 — Clarke Hinkle, FB (1932-41). A four-time all-pro selection (1936, 37, 38, 41) ... One of the most versatile players in NFL annals, he was tough, bruising runner, fine blocker, good receiver and excellent placekicker as well as a shrewd, hard-hitting linebacker. Fourth-ranking rusher in Packer history with 3,860 yards in 1,171 carries. Played college football at Bucknell.



1964 — Mike Michalske, G (1929-37). Also played for New York Yankees (1927-28) before joining Packers. Rated one of game's greatest guards during pro football's "two-way" era. Two-time all-pro selection (1931 and 1935). A true 60-minute player, he was known as "Iron Mike" because of his great stamina and durability. Best asset was exceptional quickness, which made him equally effective on both offense and defense. Played college football at Penn State.



1966 — Arnie Herber, HB (1930-41). Also played for New York Giants (1944-45). Pro football's first great long passer. Won three National Football League passing titles and was all-pro selection in 1932. Teamed with Don Hutson to form NFL's first feared passing combination in mid-'30s. Shares third place in lifetime passing efficiency in Packer annals with 50.06 percentage for 9 seasons and ranks fourth in career touchdown passes with 51. Tough, durable athlete and accomplished punter as well as great passer. A Green Bay native, he played college football at Regis (Denver, Colo.)



1966 — Walt Kiesling, T (1935-36). Also played for Duluth Eskimos (1926-27), Pottsville (1928), Chicago Cardinals (1929-33) and Chicago Bears (1934). All-pro selection in 1932. Two-way performer, he starred on both offense and defense. Although a giant of his time, he possessed impressive quickness for one of his dimensions. Later served as Packer assistant coach (1945-48). Also coached for Pittsburgh Steelers, Philadelphia-Pittsburgh combine and Chicago Cardinals. Played college football at St. Thomas.



1967 — Emlen Tunnell, HB (1959-61). Also played for New York Giants (1948-58). Leading interceptor in pro football history. Intercepted 79 passes over 14-year career and returned them 1,282 yards, another National Football League record. Also holds NFL career record for punt returns with 258 and most yards punts returned, 2,209. Played college football at University of Iowa.



1971 — Vince Lombardi, Coach and General Manager (1959-67). Also assistant coach for New York Giants (1954-58) and head coach of Washington Redskins (1969). Directed Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 1965-66-67), a feat without precedent or parallel in pro football history. His 1966 and 1967 teams also made history by winning first two Super Bowls. Packers won nine of 10 playoff games under his leadership and overall, compiled a 98-30-4 record, a glittering .766 winning percentage. Lombardi, a guard, played his college football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite".



1974 — Tony Canadeo, HB (1941-43, 1946-52). Became only the third 1,000 yard rusher in pro football history when he gained 1,052 yards in 1952. Still ranks as No. 3 ground gainer in Packer annals with 4,197 yards in 1,025 attempts, a 4.1 average. A durable, all-purpose halfback, he was an accomplished blocker, capable passer and good receiver in addition to being a highly effective kick returner. Also played defensive back during early years of his career. Played college football at Gonzaga, where he acquired sobriquet of "Grey Ghost."



1976 — Jim Taylor, FB (1958-66). Also played for New Orleans Saints (1967). Only running back in pro football history to rush for 1,000 yards in five consecutive seasons (1960-64). Also second ranking career rusher in NFL annals with 8,597 yards in 10 seasons. Ranks fourth, all-time, in number of 100-yard rushing games with 26 and second in career rushing attempts with 1,941. Also holds NFL record for most rushing touchdowns in a season, 19 in 1962, and owns second highest lifetime total of rushing TDs, 83. Played college football at LSU.



1977 — Forrest Gregg, T (1956, 1958-70) Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1971). A second round draft selection, Gregg won all-pro honors eight times, including selection at both guard and tackle in 1965, and five times was named to the Pro Bowl. Termed by his late coach, Vince Lombardi, "the finest football player I ever coached." Holds Packer durability record, having played in 187 consecutive games for Green Bay. Played college football at SMU.



1977 — Bart Starr, QB (1956-71). A 17th round draftee in 1956, Starr became the most productive quarterback in pro football annals, directing the Packers to six Western Division championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowl triumphs. Embellished these achievements by winning Most Valuable Player honors in both Super Bowls I and II, Starr led the NFL in passing three times (1962, 1964 and 1966) and retired as the leading percentage passer in league history. He also was named to the Pro Bowl four times. Later served as Packer quarterback coach in 1972 and was named head coach and general manager of the Packers Dec. 24, 1974. Played college football at the University of Alabama.



1978 — Ray Nitschke, LB (1958-72). One of the most devastating hitters in the game's history, he was named to NFL's All-50 Year Team at linebacker after winning all-pro honors three times. Had 15-year playing career, second longest in Packer history, highlighted by his selection as Most Valuable Player in 1962 NFL Championship Game against the Giants at New York. Helped Packers win five world titles (1961-62 and 65-66-67) and first two Super Bowls. Talented ballhawk, he forged career total of 25 interceptions and recovered 20 fumbles, only one short of Packers' all-time record. A third round draft choice in 1958, he played his college football at the University of Illinois.

JUST FOR THE RECORD

Coming into the 1978 season, the Packers had played 971 games in 59 years of professional football competition. Of these, they had won 570, lost 358 and tied 43 since being founded as a town team by the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau in 1919. This figures out to an all-time, overall winning percentage of .603.

The bulging total includes 720 league, playoff and Super Bowl games and 251 pre-season, mid-season and post-season non-league games. The league-playoff breakdown shows the Packers with 401 victories against 286 defeats and 33 ties, a .583 success ratio. In pre-season and post-season non-league play, they possess an imposing .701 percentage, based on 169 wins, 72 losses and 10 ties.

BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Green Bay Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "Why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

FIRST THEY TALKED Curly's employer at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fences or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-

football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited.

THIS WAS the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy.

Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A.B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

FROM THOSE MODEST and somewhat tenuous beginnings, the Packers have gone on to earn national stature and virtual world-wide recognition by winning more championships (eleven) over the intervening half-century than any other team in professional football.

The fact that these achievements have come while representing a city of only 90,000 inhabitants, in competition with the country's population giants, has endeared them to the nation's football fans, many of whom are intrigued by the David vs. Goliath concept and the Packer's unique status as a community-owned corporation.

INEVITABLY, PROCEDURES at Packer games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes no band and no public address system — the latter hadn't been invented yet, there weren't even any seats at

first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their existence in 1919, they played on approximately the same site as the now abandoned City (East) Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut Street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed, you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics of the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's half time suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built — just a small bleacher with a capacity of a couple hundred — on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

WHEN HAGEMEISTER Park was dug

up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides, between the 30-yard lines. Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

AFTER WORLD WAR II, City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961, the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, and to the present 56,267 in 1970.

The Packer's colorful saga, spanning 57 years, can be roughly divided into

eight chapters. They take us from the "Iron Man" period of the first decade under founder Curly Lambeau to the present day, which finds the Packer's legendary quarterback, Bart Starr, presiding as the eighth head coach in the team's history.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in 1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 or 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD — Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold, when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial

crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER — The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and business man, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the re-building plans and Lisle W. Blackburn, coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four-year Blackburn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

MCLEAN MOVES UP — Likeable Ray "Scooter" McLean moved up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his lone season as head coach.

THE LOMBARDI ERA — In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giant assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and was unanimously voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966, and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams became the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise one of the most successful. Over a nine year span as head coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 141 vic-

tories against 39 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .783 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 Division playoffs and World Championship Games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

BENGTSON PERIOD — Following the third consecutive title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970, compiling a 20-21-1 record, and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE DEVINE DAYS — Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a

5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record after losing their last three games, and Devine resigned.

THE PRESENT — Bart Starr, the most successful field general in pro football history as Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the NFL wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on Dec. 24, 1974. Starr, who led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere... We will earn everything else."

Although he had to settle for a 4-10 record in the baptismal season of a massive rebuilding project, Starr gave Packer fans new hope by assembling a sound organization and restoring a positive attitude, underscored by three victories in the last five games of the 1975 season. He continued the resurgent trend in 1976, leading the Packers to a 5-9 record, highlighted by a three-game, mid-season winning streak. Major and key injuries slowed the comeback in 1977 but a strong finish produced a 4-10 mark, enhancing hopes for '78 and beyond.

LAMBEAU FIELD — THEN AND NOW

Lambeau Field, the home of the Green Bay Packers, was constructed in 1957 with an initial capacity of 32,150. The cost of the original project, \$960,000 was shared equally by the Green Bay Packers, Inc. and the city of Green Bay. It was financed by means of a bond issue, which received voter approval in a referendum conducted April 3, 1956.

Since that time, there have been four additions to the stadium, all underwritten by the Packer Corporation. The capacity was increased to 38,669 in 1961, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 and to its present capacity, 56,267 in 1970.

The stadium was dedicated as City Stadium on September 29, 1957. It was later renamed Lambeau Field in 1965, following the death of the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, founder and first coach of the Packers.
