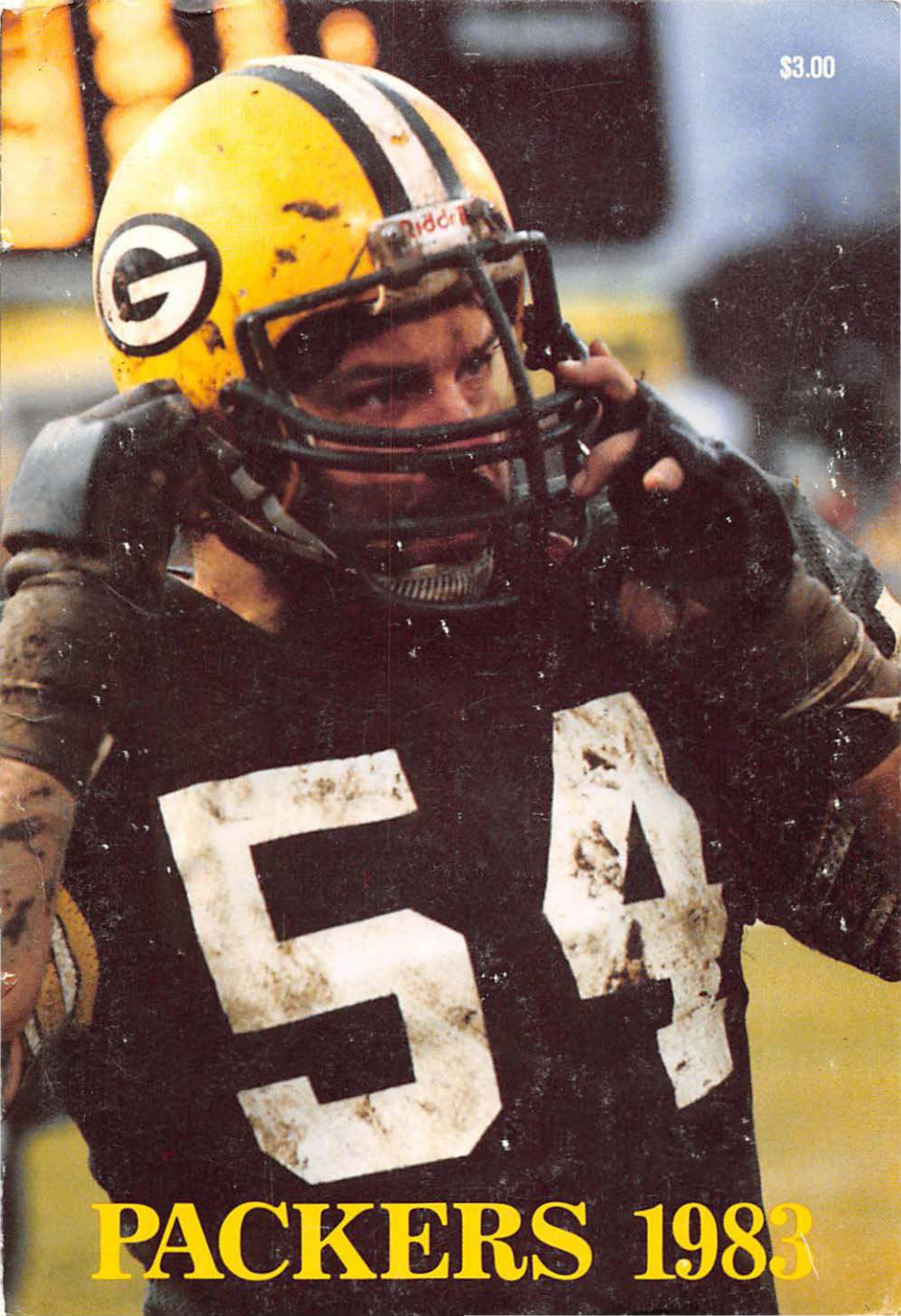

ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers lead the National Football League in most championships won with eleven. They won three by league standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight times since the playoff system was established in 1933 (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967). Green Bay also is the only team to win three straight titles, having done it twice (1929-30-31 and 1965-66-67).

In addition, the Packers won the first two Super Bowls (over Kansas City in 1967, 35-10, and over Oakland in 1968, 33-14).

The Chicago Bears rank second with eight NFL titles, followed by the Giants, Lions and Browns with 4 each.

The Green Bay Packer Football Team is a community owned non-profit corporation. 4,626 shares of stock are owned by 1,769 shareholders—none of whom receives any dividend on the initial investment. JUDGE ROBERT J. PARINS President

Judge Robert J. Parins, who was elected president of the Green Bay Packers, Inc., May 3, 1982, had an eventful first year as the organization's chief executive.

During the course of it, he presided over the planning and construction of two major additions to the Packers' facilities—a \$700,000 indoor practice structure and a \$2,000,000 remodeling and expansion of the administration building and training quarters. He also was called upon to guide the corporation through a 57-day player strike and, at season's end, to direct and coordinate preparations for the Packers' first playoff game since 1967.

The first full-time president in the Packer organization's 64-year history, Judge Parins formally assumed his duties on June 1, 1982, following his resignation as a Brown County circuit court judge (Branch 2 of the 8th Judicial District). He previously had been named principal executive officer at a board of directors' meeting October 11, 1981.

Only the eighth man to hold the Packer presidency, he had been a member of the Packers' official family since May 23, 1966, when elected to the board of directors at the organization's annual stockholders' meeting.

Judge Parins later was elected to the Packer Executive Committee at a board of directors' meeting August 1, 1979, a day on which he also was elected vice president of the corporation.

Born in Green Bay, August 23, 1918, he graduated from Green Bay East High School in 1936. He subsequently obtained a bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1940 and a law degree, also from the University of Wisconsin, in 1942.

Upon graduation from law school, he worked for Employers Mutual Insurance Co. in Minneapolis from 1942 through 1944 before returning to Green Bay, in 1944, to open the practice of law in partnership with the late Meyer Cohen. In 1949, he was elected district attorney of Brown County and served one, two-year term. Elected a circuit judge in the fall of 1967, he was formally invested Jan. 2, 1968. On the bench, he earned a state-wide reputation for the fair, efficient and expeditious disposition of the cases brought before him.

Judge Parins and his wife, Elizabeth, have five children and 11 grandchildren.

An active sportsman in private life, he owns a stable just outside Green Bay and regularly works with his horses there. He also is an ardent fisherman and shoots a respectable game of golf.

DOMINIC OLEJNICZAK Chairman of the Board



Dominic Olejniczak, who served the organization as president longer than any other man in the team's history, now serves as chairman of the board of Green Bay Packers, Inc. He was elected to the position by the board of directors Oct. 11, 1981.

Mr. Olejniczak ended a 24-year tenure as corporation president May 3, 1982, when Judge Robert J. Parins was elected to succeed him. A former mayor of the City of Green Bay (1945-55), he used that experience in municipal government to help guide the Packers to unprecedented corporate prosperity.

A devout Packer fan since the 1920s, when he was a pupil at St. Mary of the Angels Grade School, he first began to develop close ties with the Packers in an official capacity during the mid-1930s.

Elected to the Green Bay City Council, he became involved with the team through the City of Green Bay and the Board of Education, which had jurisdiction over old City Stadium, where the Packers then played their games. He continued to work closely with the Packers while mayor and, in that position, was a prime mover in the drive to build the current stadium, Lambeau Field.

Elected to the board of directors July 10, 1950, Mr. Olejniczak subsequently moved up through the chairs, being named to the Executive Committee January 21, 1952, elected a vice president March 1, 1954, executive vice president Dec. 23, 1957, president April 28, 1958, and then chairman of the board in 1981.

The Green Bay Packers are a unique entity—in both structure and accomplishment. Organizationally, they represent the only publicly-owned club in the 28-team National Football League. Competitively, they have won more championships, 11 in all, than any other team in the NFL's 64-year annals.

Green Bay Packers, Inc., is a non-profit corporation, founded in 1922 at the behest of A. B. Turnbull, the organization's first president. There are over 4,600 shares of stock owned by more than 1,750 shareholders. The corporation is governed by a seven-man Executive Committee, selected from a 45-man board of directors. Judge Robert J. Parins, eighth president of the corporation, was elected the organization's chief executive May 3, 1982. He succeeded Dominic Olejniczak, who had served in that capacity for 24 years.

BOB HARLAN **Assistant to the President**

Robert E. "Bob" Harlan, corporate assistant to the president, has been a member of the Packer management team since 1971. His major responsibility is the negotiation of all player contracts, an assignment which has become a virtual year-around job in the field of professional football, whose contractual complexities have increased dramatically over the past decade.

The 46-year-old Iowan, a native of Des Moines, also handles all coaching contracts, except that of the head coach. In addition, he supervises all Packer ticket operations, as well as the public relations department, and is responsible for the hiring of all front office and secretarial personnel.

A graduate of Marquette University, where he earned a B.S. degree in journalism in 1958, Harlan had a short tour of duty in the U.S. Army before spending a year as a reporter for United Press-International in Milwaukee. He subsequently became sports information director at Marquette in 1959, serving six years in that capacity. He joined the St. Louis baseball Cardinals in 1965, serving as director of community affairs and speakers bureau for two years and director of public relations for 3½ years. He left that position to join the Packers as assistant general manager on June 1, 1971.

Bob and his wife, Madeline, have three sons, Kevin, 23, a sportscaster at radio station KCMO in Kansas City who is also a member of the broadcast team for University of Kansas football and basketball; Byran 21, a University of Iowa student majoring in Journalism and Mass Communications; and Michael, 14, at home.



TOM MILLER **Assistant to the President**

Thomas M. "Tom" Miller is the dean of the Packers' front office, having joined the organization in 1956. As assistant to the president for business, a position he has held since 1981, he wears a number of "hats." He arranges team travel and is responsible for scheduling of pre-season games, as well as all purchasing.

In addition to these duties, Miller is responsible for repair and maintenance of Lambeau Field in cooperation with the Green Bay Stadium Commission, and for the planning and construction of all additions to the Packer facilities. He has been heavily involved in the latter area in the past two years, during which the Packers have erected a \$700,000 indoor practice facility and completed a \$2,000,000 addition to the administration building.

Possessor of an extensive football background, the Pennsylvania native played five years of professional football—the last of them for the Packers in 1946. An end, he launched his National Football League career with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1942, following graduation from Hampden-Sydney. After three seasons with Philadelphia, he moved to the Washington Redskins in 1945 before joining the Packers.

Miller subsequently coached for nearly a decade, coaching football and basketball at Wilkes College (1946-50) and football, basketball and baseball at Drexel College (1950-55). He rejoined the Packers as publicity director in 1956, serving in that capacity until 1965, when the late Vince Lombardi named him assistant to the general manager. He was appointed business general manager by Bart Starr in 1975 before being named assistant to the president.

Tom and his wife, the former Beverly Rusch of Green Bay, have three children: Tom, Jr., Nancy and Sue.



BART STARR Head Coach

Perseverant Bryan Bartlett Starr, now in his ninth season as head coach of the Green Bay Packers, began to realize the fruits of his coaching labors in 1982.

The 49-year-old perfectionist, who quarterbacked Green Bay to championship heights with spectacular regularity during the '60s, maneuvered the Packers into the National Football League playoffs last season for the first time in a decade, leading them to a 5-3-1 record.

In the happy process, the Packers reached the second round of the playoffs, thereby spawning hopes among their fans of even bigger things in 1983 and beyond. They punctuated their post-season performance by amassing 41 points, an all-time Packer playoff record, in routing the St. Louis Cardinals 41-16 in the opening round of the playoffs, then battled the perennially powerful Cowboys to a standstill in Texas Stadium before bowing (37-26) in the second round.

The Packers actually had initiated their surge at the midpoint of the 1981 season, which found them own-

ing a disappointing 2-6 record at the turn. At that juncture, Coach Starr rallied his athletes for the most dramatic comeback in Green Bay's history, directing them to a 6-2 second half mark and within one game of the playoffs.

The strong finish, which ended three years of injury-fraught adversity for the Green and Gold, not only ignited the faithful's hopes but gave the steel-willed Packer coach something of substance to build on. The overall, 8-8 record then represented the Packers' best won-lost performance since 1978, when they posted an 8-7-1 mark and tied Minnesota for first place.

Inevitably, the recent turnabout has triggered talk of a possible Super Bowl appearance for the Packers in January of 1984, when pro football's "world series" will be staged at Tampa Stadium. What, Coach Starr was asked, are the chances of such a happening?

The man who presided at quarterback in the Packers' first two Super Bowl ventures—both resounding victories, blended characteristic optimism with understandable realism in his reply. (Even though there now have been 17 Super Bowls, no fewer than 12 of the NFL's 28 teams have yet to make it to the league's championship game).

"The people are here to do the job," he said without equivocation, "although we need to strengthen the team in several areas, and we need to improve our depth and backup strength."

The former field general, out-ranked in Packer head coaching tenure only by team founder E. L. "Curly" Lambeau and Vince Lombardi, would be the first to concede reaching the current point in the rebuilding process has not been an easy one. Committed from the outset to reconstructing Packer fortunes via the draft, he adopted this course upon taking over in 1975, despite the knowledge Green Bay's first and second round draft choices in his first two years would not be available to him, having been dealt away in a pre-Starr trade. After he had bitten that unpalatable bullet in 1975 and '76—as his team struggled to 4-10 and 5-9 records—injuries conspired to thwart him a first time in 1977, the Packers slipping back to a 4-10 mark. That began to change in '78 with the addition of talented newcomers like James Lofton and John Anderson, triggering visions of a productive future.

The Packers responded with an 8-7-1 season, their first winning record in six years and only their second since 1967. It gave promise of better things to come—until the football fates again took an untimely hand. Major injuries sidelined starters Barty Smith, Michael Hunt, Carl Barzilauskas and Anderson, contributing heavily to a 5-11 record. Then, in their grim wake, came the injury epidemic of 1980, which saw 27 players on injured reserve at one time or another, forcing the Packers to settle for a disappointing 5-10-1 mark.

The eighth head coach in the annals of professional sports' most storied franchise, Starr officially was tendered his imposing assignment by the Packer Executive Committee on Dec. 24, 1974. It was his by informal acclamation, a development unique in Packer annals. The sweeping mandate was entirely understandable, even though he had had only one year of coaching experience, success having been a habit with him on and off the field.

"Mr. Quarterback," most productive signal caller in pro football history, had endeared himself to the faithful with his achievements as field leader of the Packers in the 7-year period between 1961 and 1967, during which he guided Green Bay to five world championships, a feat without equal in pro football history.

With Starr at the offensive controls, the Packers made 6 playoff appearances in 8 years, beginning with a 1960 showdown against the Eagles. That was the only playoff the Packers were to lose with No. 15 at quarterback. They rebounded from that disappointment to decimate the Giants in the '61 title game, 37-0, and repeated in '62, again felling the Giants (16-7).

After two winning but non-championship years in 1963 and '64, Starr led the Packers to three consecutive titles in 1965-66-67, the first time such a parlay had been achieved since the advent of the NFL playoff system in 1933.

He climaxed that historic "triple play" by escorting Green Bay to successive victories in the first two Super Bowls, in both of which he was voted the game's Most Valuable Player.

During those highly prosperous '60s, Starr three times led the NFL in passing (1962, 1964 and 1966) and was named to the Pro Bowl on four occasions (1961, '62, '63 and '66). During a 16-year playing career, longest in Packer history, he set, and still holds, league marks for most consecutive passes attempted without an interception, 294, and lowest percentage of passes intercepted for a season, 1.20, set in 1966; and shares the record for fewest passes intercepted in a season, 3.

Born in Montgomery, AL, Jan. 9, 1934, the son of a career Air Force master sergeant, Starr won All-American honors in high school, but things did not come easily for him thereafter. He had to fight his way through adversity to gain pre-eminence among pro football quarterbacks.

Bart was a lowly, 17th round draft choice of the Packers in 1956 because pro scouts were wary of his physical future, a reluctance prompted by a back injury he had received as a junior at Alabama. The uphill struggle continued after he joined Green Bay. For the next four seasons, Starr shared quarterbacking duties with Tobin Rote, Lamar McHan, Babe Parilli, and Joe Francis before gaining regular status in the ninth game of the 1959 season. He led the Packers to consecutive wins in those 4 games, under first year Coach Vince Lombardi, and Green Bay's first winning season in 12 last years.

Although a consistent, high level performer during the regular season, it was Starr's brilliance in post-season play which set him apart from all others. In six NFL title games, he completed 84 of 145 passes for 1,090 yards and 11 touchdowns — with, incredibly, only one interception — for a glittering 57.9 percent. In two Super Bowls, he was even more deadly, completing 29 of 47 attempts (61.7 percent) for 452 yards, 3 TDs and again, with only 1 interception.

Following his retirement as a player in July of 1972, after two shoulder operations, Bart became Packer quarterback coach. He resigned in January of 1973 to pursue private business interests. In the interim, he had become a highly successful automobile dealer and a much sought after motivational speaker and TV "salesman" as well as a popular analyst on CBS-TV's NFL football telecasts.

Despite his heavy schedule, Starr gives generously of his time and talents to charitable and civic endeavors such as "Rawhide," a leadership training camp for boys who need a second chance. He and his wife, the former Cherry Morton of Birmingham, AL, have two sons, Bart Jr., 24, an attorney, and Bret, 19, a University of Wisconsin-Madison student.

BOB SCHNELKER **Offensive Coordinator**

A bold and imaginative tactician, Bob Schnelker orchestrated one of the most explosive offenses in the National Football League during the 1982 season, his first as the Packers' offensive coordinator. The Green Bay attack, often succeeding with the element of surprise, amassed 226 points in 9 games during the strike-interrupted season, a total matched in the National Football Conference only by the potent Dallas Cowboys.

The 54-year-old Schnelker, recognized as one of the NFL's foremost offensive "minds," is in his second tour of duty in Green Bay. He previously had served as the Packers' passing game and receivers coach under the late Vince Lombardi from 1966 through 1971, helping Green Bay win two consecutive league titles.

Schnelker returned to the Packers last season after four years as offensive coordinator at Detroit, where he directed the NFC's No. 1 offense in 1981 while with the Lions. Although the passing game is supposed to be his forte, Schnelker displayed admirable ability to adjust to the personnel at hand when his Lion offense, paced by Billy Sims, led the entire NFL in rushing.

Bob, born Oct. 17, 1928, began his 20-year coaching career with the Los Angeles Rams in 1963. Joining the Packers in 1966, he served under Lombardi as Green Bay won NFL titles and the first two Super Bowls in '66 and '67, later under Phil Bengtson (1967-70) and Dan Devine (1971). He moved to the San Diego Chargers in 1972, to Miami in 1974, where he coached under Don Shula, and to Kansas City in 1975 before joining the Detroit staff.

A 17th round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953, he subsequently played for the New York Giants from 1954 through 1960, helping them win the NFL championship in 1956, before closing out his nine-year playing career in 1961 with Pittsburgh and Minnesota, where he caught the first of Fran Tarkenton's record 342 touchdown passes. A standout tight end, he was a two-time Pro Bowl selection.

Schnelker and his wife, B. J., have three children, Mindy, Jeff and Tina.



JOHN MEYER **Defensive Coordinator**

Under John Meyer, a flamboyant and resourceful coach, the Packer defense continued to develop into one of the NFL's more miserly units in 1982. It advanced from 11th to fifth place in scoring defense by holding opponents to 169 points, and from 19th place to sixth against the run. Meyer's tightfisted platoon ranked eighth overall in the league, a vast improvement over 1980 when it finished 25th in his first year as defensive coordinator. In 1981, the Packer defense collected 30 interceptions, the most Green Bay has had in a season since 1962, when the Packers had what many experts consider to be the greatest team in the club's history.

Understandably, the Packer defensive unit mirrors the 41-year-old Meyer, an innovative tactician who has quickly gained recognition for his ability to make adjustments "on the run" in a fast-changing game

becoming increasingly sophisticated with each passing year.

Meyer, in his 16th year as a coach in the NFL, implemented a major change in the Packers' defensive philosophy in 1980 when he discarded the venerable 4-3 alignment in favor of the '3-4' a format the Green and Gold will be employing for a fourth year in 1983.

Meyer, honored as professional football's "Assistant Coach of the Year" in 1978, is in his ninth year on the Packer staff. Youngest assistant coach in the NFL when he made his debut with New England in 1968 at the age of 27, he spent his first four seasons with the Patriots. He subsequently joined the staff of the late Don McCafferty when the latter became head coach of the Detroit Lions in 1973, then came to the Packers in January of 1975, becoming one of the first assistants to be hired by Bart Starr when he became Green Bay's head coach.

Born Feb. 20, 1942, Meyer is a graduate of Chicago's Brother Rice High School, where he won all-city honors at defensive end before enrolling at Notre Dame. Later an eighth round selection of St. Louis in the 1965 draft, he played for the Cardinals that year and the Oilers in '66 before moving into the scouting department for Houston in 1967.

John and his wife, the former Loretta Kruchten, have three daughters, Tracey Ann, 16; Courtney Lynn, 12; and Blake Marie, 9.



JOHN BRUNNER Offensive Backfield Coach

John Brunner, a member of the Detroit Lions' coaching staff from 1980 through 1982, joined the Packers as offensive backfield coach last February, succeeding Pete Kettela.

The 46-year-old Perkasio, PA, native coached in the college ranks for 13 years before signing on under Monte Clark at Detroit. He began his coaching career at Villanova in 1967, moved to Temple in 1970, and to Princeton and the Ivy League in 1974 before returning to Temple in 1976.

At Temple, Brunner helped the Owls to achieve their best record ever (10-2) in 1979 as the Owls established new school total offense, rushing and passing marks.

In coming to the Packers, the genial Pennsylvanian rejoins the man under whom he began his pro coaching career, Offensive Coordinator Bob Schnelker, who was the offensive coordinator at Detroit when Brunner joined the Lions' staff in 1980.

Born Sept. 6, 1937 in Perkasio, PA, Brunner is a graduate of East Stroudsburg State. He is married (Barbara) and the father of seven children. The eldest of his offspring, Scott, is the starting quarterback for the New York Giants.



LEW CARPENTER Receivers Coach

In 1982, Lew Carpenter added lustre to an already imposing reputation for the development of premium receivers. His latest disciple, Phillip Epps, blossomed into the Packers' "Rookie of the Year" under Carpenter's skilled tutelage, emerging with a team-leading average of 22.6 yards per reception. An added testimonial to Carpenter's coaching acumen surfaced when the Packers' John Jefferson, James Lofton and Paul Coffman were named to the 1983 Pro Bowl, marking the first time in National Football Conference history that all three of a team's starting receivers were chosen to play in the post-season classic. In 1981, three Packers—Lofton (71), Coffman (55), and fullback Gerry Ellis (65) caught more than 50 passes in a season, the first such parlay in Packer annals. A year earlier, five Packers (Lofton, Coffman, Ellis, Eddie Lee Ivery and Aundra Thompson) had 40 or more receptions, another

Packer first. In the process, the Packers set new club records for gross (3,651) and net (3,291) yards passing in a season.

These impressive statistics have come as no surprise to those familiar with Carpenter's coaching expertise. During an 18-year pro coaching career, the affable Arkansan has presided over the development of such talented receivers as Ahmad Rashad, Charley Taylor, Mel Gray, John Gilliam and Paul Flatley.

Earlier, as a player, Carpenter was one of the most versatile performers in National Football League history, playing five different positions overall. Uniquely equipped for his current role, Lew played both wide receiver positions, tight end, halfback and fullback during an 11-year playing career. An eighth round draft choice of Detroit in 1953, he was traded to Cleveland and later came to the Packers from the Browns in a 1959 trade. He became Green Bay's utility man on offense, helping them win successive NFL titles in 1961-62.

Carpenter launched his coaching career with the Vikings in 1965, later moving to the Falcons, Redskins, Cardinals and Oilers. He was named to the Packer coaching staff in January of 1975 by Coach Bart Starr with the assignment of redesigning the passing game. So well did he succeed that quarterback John Hadl set a team single season record for completions (191) that year.

Born in West Memphis, AR, Jan. 12, 1932. Lew is married (Ann) and the father of four daughters, Cheryl, 26; Cathy, 24; Lisa, 21; and Rebecca, 18.



ROSS FICHTNER Defensive Backfield Coach

Ross Fichtner's scholarly, laid back coaching style continued to pay dividends for the Packer secondary last season, his third on the Green Bay staff. The Packer "outfield," intent upon preventing the big play, permitted only seven passes over 30 yards in 11 games (including playoff contests against the St. Louis Cardinals and Dallas Cowboys). A year earlier, the secondary had forged 20 interceptions, almost doubling its 1980 total in the first year under Fichtner's direction.

A veteran of two championship playoffs and nine NFL seasons as a player, the mustachioed Purdue alumnus had been actively employed by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in 1978 and '79 before joining the Packer staff and returning to pro football. A former Cleveland Brown, he previously had spent four seasons as secondary coach under Jack Pardee in the World Football League and with the Chicago Bears, beginning in 1974.

A two-way performer at Purdue, where he played quarterback and defensive back, Fichtner was a member of the College All-Stars who played the Baltimore Colts in the 1960 midsummer classic. He was selected by the Browns in the third round of the '60 draft and went on to forge a successful career with the Browns. He played 102 games for Cleveland and intercepted 27 passes during the 8-year-span, returning three for touchdowns. Voted the Browns' most valuable player in 1966, the strong safety previously had been a starter as the Browns won the NFL championship in '64 and as Cleveland played for the '65 title in Green Bay, a game won by the Packers (23-12). Fichtner closed out his playing days with New Orleans in 1968. He returned to football in 1974 as an aide to Pardee with the WFL's Florida Blazers.

Ross was born Oct. 26, 1938, at McKeesport, Pa., and is the father of four children (Randy, 19, a sophomore on Purdue's football team; Tamara, 18; Tonya, 16; and Rusty, 14). He and his wife, Karen, make their home in Allouez, a Green Bay suburb. A popular after-dinner speaker, Ross also is active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, serving as the FCA's chairman for Wisconsin.



MONTE KIFFIN Linebacker Coach

Monte Kiffin, a veteran of 17 years' coaching experience in the college ranks, was named Packer linebacker coach by Head Coach Bart Starr on February 21, 1983. He succeeded John Marshall, who resigned to become defensive coordinator for the Atlanta Falcons.

Kiffin, a native of Lexington, NE, had been head football coach at North Carolina State University the last three years. He resigned December 1, 1982, after compiling a 16-17 record, including winning 6-5 marks in both 1980 and last season.

The 42-year-old Kiffin began his coaching career in 1966 at his alma mater, University of Nebraska, where he spent 11 years as an assistant to Bob Devaney and Tom Osborne and helped coach the Cornhuskers to consecutive national championships in 1970 and '71 as defensive line coach. Later, when he served as defensive coordinator, Nebraska

annually finished among the nation's leaders in scoring defense.

Prior to taking on the North Carolina State assignment, Kiffin had served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator under Lou Holtz at the University of Arkansas, where the Razorbacks led the nation in scoring defense in 1977, Kiffin's first year on the Arkansas staff. They also finished sixth in the nation in scoring defense in 1979, his final year at Arkansas.

Monte, Nebraska "High School Athlete of the Year" in 1958 at Lexington, NE, High School, played both offensive and defensive tackle at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln for three years (1961-63). He later was a defensive lineman for Winnipeg of the Canadian Football League in 1965, helping the Blue Bombers to the Grey Cup playoff, before entering coaching.

Born Feb. 29, 1940, Kiffin is married (Robin) and the father of three children (Heidi, 14; Lane, 7; and Christopher Lee, 1).



ERNIE McMILLAN Offensive Line Coach

Monolithic Ernie McMillan, perennially ranked among the National Football League's premier offensive tackles during a 15-year playing career, is in his sixth season on the Packer coaching staff.

During his days as a player, the towering University of Illinois alumnus won league-wide acclaim as a topflight technician and thus has brought impressive expertise to his assignment. The soft-spoken Chicago native also is an outstanding communicator, having developed an excellent relationship with his athletes via an articulate, low key and highly personal approach to coaching. Under his shrewd and patient tutelage, Greg Koch has developed into one of the NFL's most respected tackles, earning all-pro recognition in 1982.

A 13th round draft choice of St. Louis in 1961, McMillan spent 14 seasons with the Cardinals, winning all-pro honors in 1970 and '71. Chosen to play in four Pro Bowls, Ernie played in more games than any other player in Cardinal history (178). He closed out his playing career with the Packers in 1975.

Before being named to the Packer coaching staff by Head Coach Bart Starr in 1978, McMillan had served as publisher of "Proud," a St. Louis black consciousness periodical. A native of Chicago Heights, IL, Ernest Charles McMillan was born Feb. 21, 1938. He is married to the former Gail Thomas of St. Louis, a teacher in the Green Bay school system, and they have a two-year-old daughter, Amber Gail.



BILL MEYERS Offensive Line Coach

A 36-year-old Wisconsin native who originally aspired to a career in law, Bill Meyers has begun his second season as a member of the Packer staff after 11 years in the college coaching ranks.

Meyers, born in Chippewa Falls, WI, launched his coaching career in 1972, following graduation from Stanford when he joined the University of California-Berkeley staff as a graduate assistant working with the defensive line. Two years later, he moved to Santa Clara as linebacker and defensive coach for three years. Meyers rejoined the California staff as offensive line coach in 1977, spending two more seasons with the Bears before moving to Notre Dame in 1979. At South Bend, he coached the offensive line during his first two years there under Dan Devine, then tutored the defensive tackles under new coach Gerry Faust in 1981 before joining the Packer staff.

Meyers played his high school football in Long Beach, CA, where his parents had moved from Chippewa Falls, and earned All-America junior college honors at Long Beach City College. Later, at Stanford, he was a two-year starter and all-Pacific Coast lineman in 1970-71, helping the Cardinals post Rose Bowl victories following both of those seasons.

Bill, a Marine Corps veteran (1964-67), and his wife, Cathie, have a son, Charlie, 10, and a daughter, Michelle, 6.



DICK REHBEIN Special Teams Coach

A thorough, painstaking student of the game, Dick Rehbein is now in his third season as coach of the Packers' special teams. In 1982, his kamikazes blocked five opponent kicks, the most by a Packer team since 1976.

Rehbein, now in his fifth year on the Packer staff, served as a special assistant in 1979 and 1980 before being named special teams coach by Head Coach Bart Starr in 1981. In addition to special teams duties, the 27-year-old Ripon College graduate will continue to supervise the team's strength and conditioning program.

A center during his playing days at Ripon, Rehbein was appointed to the Packer coaching staff January 1, 1979. The Green Bay native had a Packer tryout in 1977, following graduation from college and later returned in 1978 to assist with centering duties during training camp. He subsequently worked as an in-office assistant in the

Packers' computer program on a part-time basis during the 1978 season before being named to a full-time position on the coaching staff.

A graduate of De Pere, WI, High School, Rehbein won four varsity football letters at Ripon and was a two-time Associated Press and Kodak Coaches' Little All-America selection. Born Nov. 22, 1955, he is married to the former Pam Kowalczyk and they make their home in De Pere.



RICHARD "DOC" URICH Defensive Line Coach

"Doc" Urich, whose impressive coaching dossier shows more than 30 years' experience, has developed a tightfisted defensive line during two seasons on the Green Bay staff. Under his shrewd and challenging direction, Terry Jones matured into a highly productive player and Ezra Johnson in 1982 returned to the passrushing form he displayed in 1978. In the process, Urich also has kept his troops fresh by alternating lines, a policy which has accelerated individual development and improved morale.

A native of Wapakoneta, OH, Urich joined the Packers Jan. 29, 1981, after serving as defensive coordinator of the Washington Redskins in 1978-79-80.

Doc's imposing resume includes 11 years as an assistant to Ara Parseghian in the college ranks. He began his NFL coaching career in 1971 with the Buffalo Bills and moved to Denver in 1972, when John Ralston became the Broncos' head coach.

When Robert "Red" Miller succeeded Ralston in 1977, Urich was appointed director of pro scouting for the Broncos. He left Denver in 1978 to join Jack Pardee's staff at Washington.

As a collegian, Urich played end at Miami (OH) University—where his teammates included Parseghian, Bo Schembechler and Paul Dietzel—from 1948-50 under Sid Gillman and Woody Hayes. He launched his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater in 1951, later moving to Northwestern in 1955 under Parseghian. Urich followed Parseghian to Notre Dame in 1964, then became head coach at the University of Buffalo in 1966. He subsequently was named head coach at Northern Illinois University in 1969, then left in 1971 to enter pro coaching.

The 54-year-old Urich was born Sept. 10, 1928. He and his wife, Pat, have two children, Cynthia, 30, and Danny, 27.



DICK CORRICK Director of Player Personnel

One of professional football's most discerning evaluators of personnel, Dick Corrick has the overall responsibility for providing the Packers with new talent, the life blood of any National Football League team. He supervises and coordinates all Packer scouting activities and personnel operations as Director of Player Personnel.

In this highly important assignment, the ex-Oregon State athlete directs the club's extensive college scouting program, synthesizing input from Packer talent scouts, the United National Scouting combine and Packer coaches in making critical personnel decisions during the annual draft, the wellspring of every NFL team's talent supply. Named to his present position by Head Coach Bart Starr in 1978, Corrick responded by supervising drafts which have produced such quality performers as James Lofton, John Anderson, Greg Koch, Mike Douglas, Eddie Lee Ivery, George Cumby, Mark Lee and Del Rodgers.

Immediately prior to assuming his current role, Dick had been associated with the coaching staff in the area of team development in 1977. He joined the Packer organization in 1971 as a college talent scout and later served as director of pro player personnel from May 6, 1975 until early 1977.

Born April 22, 1934, Corrick is a 49-year-old graduate of La Jolla, CA, High School. A 161-pound center-linebacker under Tommy Prothro at Oregon State, he later coached in the high school and college ranks for 16 years before joining the Packer scouting staff.

Dick is the father of two children, Traci, 25, and Rowdy, 23. He likewise is a chef of imposing talents who is fond of putting together a gourmet meal for himself and his wife, Bonnie, when at leisure.



BURT GUSTAFSON Director, Pro Player Personnel

Burt Gustafson's primary responsibility as Director of Pro Player Personnel is monitoring the competition. He maintains close surveillance of the National Football League's 27 other clubs with an eye to trade possibilities or opportunities to upgrade the Packers' overall roster by way of the waiver or free agent route.

A thorough and tireless scout respected for his dedication and football knowledge, Gustafson has served in his current capacity since April 2, 1979. He joined the organization in 1971 as linebacker coach, serving in that role through the 1974 season. Following a two-year stint as a college talent scout, he was named special teams coach in February of 1977, continuing in that role through the pre-season of 1978 before transferring to the pro scouting department.

Born in Marquette, MI, Nov. 30, 1925, Burt went on to become a 12-letter winner at Northern Michigan University in his home town. He later coached at Battle Creek, MI, High School at Northern Michigan, and at the University of Wyoming (1962-70) before joining the Packers. A firm believer in the benefits of physical fitness, he is a dedicated jogger and distance runner, frequently competing in marathon events.

Burt and his wife, Alice, have five children—two sons and three daughters.

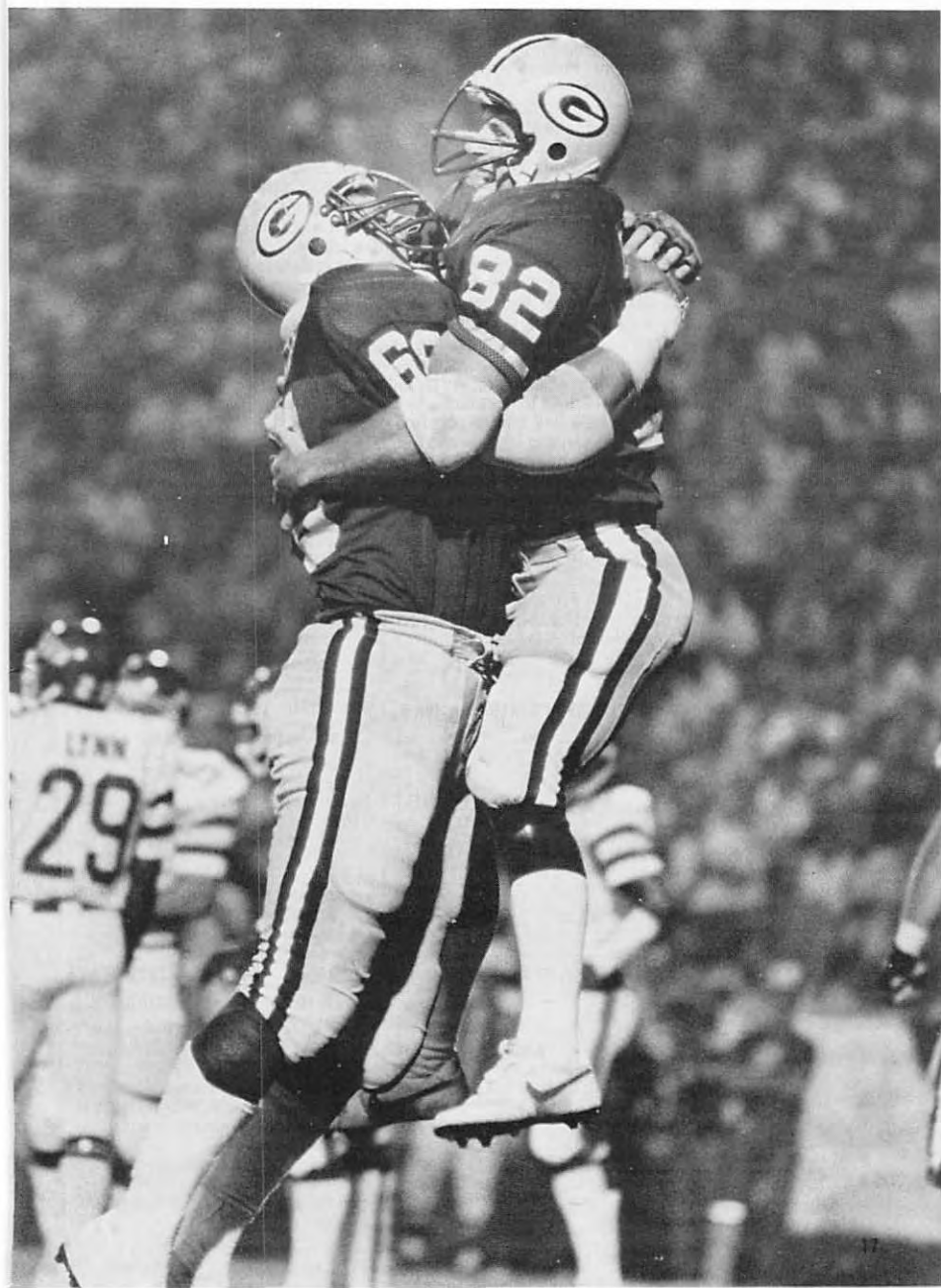

A man who has rebounded from major injury to become one of the most productive performers in the team's long history, the laconic Kansan moved up to second place in career completions with 894, passing Tobin Rote (826)... Only his head coach, Bart Starr, the club's all-time leader (1,808), is now ahead of him... Dickey also climbed into third place on the Packers' lifetime list in touchdown passes with 61, passing Cecil Isbell (59) and Arnie Herber (51) en route and closed in on second place tenant Rote (11,535) in career passing yardage, padding his total to 11,510 despite a strike-shortened, nine-game season... Also increased his second ranking career passing percentage to a glossy 55.8... In addition, the 33-year-old veteran continued his assault on Packer single game records... Throwing for 332 yards in the Jan. 16 playoff game at Dallas, he broke the Packer playoff game standard of 304, set by Starr against the Cowboys in the 1966 NFL title game (Jan. 1, 1967)... A week earlier, he tied another Starr and Packer mark, also set in that '66 playoff against Dallas, by firing four touchdown passes against the St. Louis Cardinals in Green Bay's opening Super Bowl Tournament game... Went 17-for-23 and 260 yards overall vs. Cards... Had his best day of the regular season against the Vikings at Milwaukee Nov. 21 when he completed 15 of 22 attempts for 244 yards and one touchdown... Had best yardage day (248) at Atlanta Dec. 26, with a 10-for-17 performance... Set all-time Green Bay single game percentage record (90.47) vs. New Orleans in 1981 (Dec. 13), completing 19 of 21 passes... Also tied Packer record for touchdowns in a game the same day, throwing 5 TD strikes... Already held seven other Packer marks, all set in 1980—for most passes attempted in a season (478), most passes completed (278), and most yards gained (3,529), and single game records for most attempts (51), completions (35), yards gained (418) and consecutive completions (15), all of the latter four coming against the Buccaneers at Tampa Oct. 12, 1980... In the process, Dickey presided over an offense which set all-time Packer season records for yards gained passing (3,651) and total yards gained (5,097)... Returned to action in Game Ten vs. Giants and reinjured back... Forced to sit out two more weeks, he returned vs. Minnesota Nov. 29 and played prominent role as Packers forged consecutive victories over the Vikings, Lions and Saints, passing for 977 yards and 10 touchdowns over this span... Closed out season with 17 TD passes, a personal season high... Played full season for first time in 1980, rebounding from broken left leg which sidelined him for one season (1978) and substantial portions of two others (1977 and 1979)... Injured vs. Rams at Milwaukee Nov. 13, 1977 and did not make another regular season appearance until Game Nine of '79 (Oct. 28 vs. Miami)... Took over at beginning of second half of Game 13 vs. Philadelphia (Nov. 25) and, for all practical purposes, has been the Packers' starting quarterback ever since... PRO: Continued last season to make his celebrated, 1981 acquisition from San Diego one of the most profitable trades in Packer history... Mere statistics (he caught 27 passes during strike-shortened 1982 season) do not begin to illustrate his true worth to the team... As was the case in the second half of the '81 season after he had been acquired from the Chargers, Jefferson's infectious and uninhibited "cheerleading" made a major if immeasurable contribution to the Packers' success, his positive approach rubbing off on his

teammates... On the field, his presence in company with gifted fellow receiver James Lofton put heavy pressure on opposing defenses... And, over the season, his ability to make the tough, "first down" catch consistently kept Packer drives alive... Though he went without a touchdown reception during the regular season for the first time in his five-year pro career, "J.J." made up for that oversight during the playoffs, snaring two TD passes in Game One vs. St. Louis (Jan. 16, 1983)... One of them, a 60-yarder staked the Packers to a permanent 7-3 lead in the first quarter... He closed out the contest with 148 yards (on 6 catches), an all-time Packer playoff record for yardage... It was the 21st 100-yard receiving day of Jefferson's pro career, his fourth as a Packer (he had one during regular season, 5-for-101 yards vs. Baltimore Dec. 19)... Was named to Pro Bowl for fourth time following season and emerged as game's MVP after making spectacular, diving fourth down catch to keep last-minute drive alive, then snaring TD pass in end zone to produce come-from-behind victory... Acquired from San Diego Sept. 17, 1981, in one of the most electrifying trades in recent pro football history... Though he thus missed the first three weeks of Green Bay's season, he made such an impact on Packer fans he was voted team's "Most Popular Player" in a late-season poll conducted by a Green Bay radio station... The trade sent veteran Packer flanker Aundra Thompson, the Packers' No. 2 draft choices in 1982 and 1984 and their No. 1 selection in '83 to the Chargers, along with the right to exchange places in the first round of 1982's draft... Jefferson had a highly productive day in his Packer debut, snaring 7 passes for 121 yards vs. Vikings at Milwaukee Sept. 27... Had another 100-yard day (6 catches for 113 yards) vs. Lions Dec. 6... Has been one of game's most successful receivers since being drafted in first round by Chargers in 1978... His first regular season catch was a leaping, end zone reception from Dan Fouts which produced a 29-yard TD vs. Seattle Sept. 2, 1978... Went on to lead NFL in TD catches that

rookie season—and again in 1980—both times with 13 ... In '80, he also became first player in NFL history to gain at least 1,000 yards receiving in each of his first three seasons, making a career high 82 catches in the process ... During this 45-game span, he caught 36 TD passes and was shut out only once—when he went without a catch against Buffalo Sept. 16, 1979, only because Chargers did not aim a pass at him when he was assigned double coverage, which helped contribute to a 245-yard team rushing performance ... Also has gone catchless only once as a Packer—in 21-17 Green Bay victory over Bears Nov. 15, 1981.

PRO: One of the pre-eminent placekickers in the game's history and almost certain to be enshrined in Pro Football Hall of Fame upon becoming eligible, the sinewy Norwegian has one of the National Football League's major records within reach going into a 17th season. He needs only 19 field goals—a total he has surpassed in 11 different seasons—to become the most prolific field goal kicker in pro football history. Stenerud has 317 FGs to his credit, or just 18 fewer than the current record holder George Blanda (335). Now the third

ranking scorer in NFL annals (1,408 points), the Norway-born specialist also could easily move into second place in 1983 because he trails present runnerup Jim Turner (1,439) by only 31 points. With 1,408 points, he is the NFL's leading active scorer. Packer only since the last four weeks of the 1980 season, he has been a model of consistency and dependability during a 31-game tenure as Green Bay's resident placekicker. During this span, he has attempted 51 field goals and made 42—a somewhat incredible 82.4 percentage. These totals include 38 successes in 47 attempts during regular season play and a perfect, 4-for-4 record during last January's Super Bowl Tournament, when he was 2-for-2 (46 and 34 yards) in a 41-16 victory over St. Louis and again 2-for-2 (30 and 33 yards) in a 37-26 loss to

Dallas ... Overall, he was 13-for-18 in 1982 ... A year earlier, in his first full Packer season, he set what was then an NFL efficiency record by connecting on 22 of 24 attempts, an imposing 91.67 mark subsequently broken by Washington's Mark Moseley in 1982 ... Stenerud's performance had eclipsed a 28-year-old NFL record established by Lou Groza in 1953 ... Along the way, he set a Packer distance mark by kicking a 53-yard field goal vs. the Buccaneers at Tampa Bay (Nov. 22, 1981) ... The 40-year-old veteran is one of only four players in pro football history to score 100 or more points in as many as six seasons ... Only two kickers, Blanda (638) and Turner (488) have attempted more field goals than Stenerud (483) and he could quickly surpass Turner this season ... One of the most accurate and consistent kickers in pro football history, he hiked his career percentage to 65.63 in 1982, based on 317 FGs in 483 attempts ... The breakdown includes a 94.82 percentage (55 of 58) from 1-19 yards, 79.09 percent from 20-29 (87 of 110), 75.20 from 30-39 (94 of 125), 49.62 from 40-49 (67 of 135) and 49.61 from 50 or more yards out (64 of 129) ... Joined Packers as free agent Nov. 26, 1980 following 13 seasons with Kansas City Chiefs ... Holds Super Bowl record for longest FG (48 yards) in Chiefs' 23-7 triumph over Vikings in SB IV ... Also owns Pro Bowl record (48-yarder in '71 contest) ... Kicked five field goals in a game 11 times ... Led NFL in FGs three times (21 in 1967, 30 in 1970 and 22 in 1975) ... Highest FG total came in '69 when he made 27 of 35 (a 77.1 percentage) ... Named to Pro Bowl three times ... Selected by Kansas City in third round of 1966 American Football League red shirt draft.

Founded as a town team by the late E. L. "Curly" Lambeau in 1919, the Packers are one of only three teams in the history of professional football to have played more than 1,000 games (the Bears and Cardinals are the others). They own a .595 all-time winning percentage going into the 1983 season, the 65th in their existence and 63rd in the National Football League, based on 609 victories compared to 407 defeats and 47 ties.

The total includes 796 league, playoff and Super Bowl games and 267 pre-season, mid-season and post-season non-league games. The league-playoff breakdown reveals 434 victories, 326 defeats and 36 ties, a .568 percentage, and the non-league record 175 wins, 81 losses and 11 ties, a .676 percentage.

THE PACKERS' SUPER BOWL STORY

Super Bowl I

January 15, 1967

Memorial Coliseum, Los Angeles, Calif.

Paid Attendance: 61,946

Green Bay 35, Kansas City 10

The Packers launched the Super Bowl series by whipping Kansas City's American Football League champions 35-10 behind the passing of Bart Starr, the receiving of Max McGee and a key interception by all-pro safety Willie Wood.

Vince Lombardi's repeating NFL champions broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 40-yard return of an interception to the Chief's 5-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. The pass, authored by the Chiefs' Len Dawson, had been intended for Kansas City tight end Fred Arbanas.

McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler (injured on the Packers first offensive series) after having caught only three passes all season, snared seven from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores counting one on a 5-yard run in the third quarter and the other on a one-yard bolt in the final period.

The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter; the only touchdown on a seven-yard pass from Dawson to Curtis McClinton.

Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 touchdowns and was chosen the game's most valuable player. His scoring strikes came on a 37-yard collaboration with McGee in the first quarter and a 13-yard pitch to the aging end in the decisive third period.

The Packers collected \$15,000 per man and the Chiefs \$7,500 apiece — the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports.

Super Bowl II

January 14, 1968

Orange Bowl, Miami, Florida

Paid Attendance: 75,546

Green Bay 33, Oakland 14

Having acquired a third consecutive NFL championship just two weeks earlier, the Packers embellished that record-tying parlay by winning the Super Bowl title for the second straight year. This time, they dispatched the AFL champion Raiders, 33-14, in a game that drew the first \$3 million gate in football history.

Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown and directed a Packer attack that was in control all the way after building up a 16-7 halftime lead.

Don Chandler kicked four field goals (39, 20, 43 and 31 yards), and all-pro cornerback Herb Adderley highlighted the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard interception return of a Daryle Lamonica pass.

After leading by only 3-0 at the quarter, the Packers padded their margin to 16-7 at halftime by way of three Chandler field goals and a 62-yard scoring pass from Starr to split end Boyd Dowler. They then left the Raiders behind with a 10-point third period, Donny Anderson scoring on a 2-yard run and Chandler with his final field goal.

The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packers coach, ending nine years at Green Bay in which he won six Western Conference championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowls, a record unprecedented in pro football history.

THE PACKERS NFC (NFL) PLAYOFF HISTORY... GAME BY GAME

1936 — GREEN BAY 21, BOSTON REDSKINS 6. (Polo Grounds, New York) — Although New York was not represented in the title playoff, the game was played in the Polo Grounds because the Redskins franchise was being shifted to Washington, D.C., by George Marshall. A turnout of 29,545 saw Don Hutson take a 45-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes, and the Packers were never headed.

1938 — NEW YORK 23, GREEN BAY 17. (Polo Grounds, New York) — The Packers overcame an early 9-0 New York lead, spawned by two blocked punts, but could not hold off the Giants in the second half. The Packers began to close in early in the second period, Arnie Herber capitalizing on a Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen interception by lofting a 50-yard touchdown strike to Carl Mulleneaux, cutting the Giants margin to 9-7.

The Giants shortly converted a mid-field fumble by Packer fullback Eddie Jankowski into a 16-7 lead before Green Bay again trimmed the deficit to two points before the half was over; Clarke Hinkle crashing over from the 6-inch line following a 66-yard Cecil Isbell pass to Wayland Becker. The Packers then forged in front in opening minutes of the second half for the first and only time in the game; an Engebretsen field goal presenting them with a 17-16 edge. The Giants, however, stormed back with a 61-yard scoring drive, capped by a 35-yard pass from Ed Danowski to Hank Soar. Soar fought his way over the goal line from the 2, with Hinkle clinging to one leg, for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A crowd of 48,120, a play off record, sat in on proceedings.

1939 — GREEN BAY 27, NEW YORK 0. (State Fair Park, Milwaukee) — The Packers made playoff history by scoring first shutout ever registered in NFL championship game. Despite bitter 35 m.p.h. wind, both Arnie Herber and Cecil Isbell passed for touchdowns in leading Green Bay to its fifth world championship before 32,279 fans.

Green Bay mounted a 7-0 halftime lead, by dint of a Herber scoring strike to Milt Gantenbein, and pulled away in the third quarter on a 29-yard field goal by Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen and a long TD pass from Isbell to Joe Laws. The Packers added 10 more points in the fourth quarter on a 42-yard field goal by Ernie Smith and a short scoring run by fullback Eddie Jankowski.

1944 — GREEN BAY 14, NEW YORK 7. (Polo Grounds, New York) — With peerless pass catcher Don Hutson employed primarily as a decoy for the Giant defense, fullback Ted Fritsch emerged the offensive hero of Packers' sixth world title victory.

Fritsch scored both Green Bay touchdowns, one on a 2-yard run in the second quarter and the other on a 26-yard pass-and-run collaboration with Irv Comp in the third. Ward Cuff scored the Giants' touchdown with a one-yard plunge on the first play of the final period. Joe Laws, the Packers' veteran, 34-year-old all-purpose halfback, had a brilliant day, setting a playoff record with three interceptions and claiming ground gaining honors with 74 yards in 13 carries. Attendance: 46,016.

1960 — PHILADELPHIA 17, GREEN BAY 13 (Franklin Field) — Packers erected a 6-0 lead in the second period and were out in front by 13-10 in fourth quarter before yielding to late surge by Eagles, who scored the deciding points on a 5-yard burst by Ted Dean.

Green Bay moved ahead in first quarter on a 20-yard Paul Hornung field goal. Hornung added 23-yard FG in second quarter but Eagles tied it 6-6 on a 35-yard scoring pass from Norm Van Brocklin to Tommy McDonald and edged ahead via Bobby Walston's first conversion. Walston followed with a 15-yard FG for a 10-6 halftime lead.

The Packers stopped Philadelphia at their own four late in the third period, then recaptured lead on a 7-yard TD pass from Bart Starr to Max McGee. A 58-yard kickoff return by Dean, however, ignited Eagles and victory eluded Packers, making their first title game appearance in 16 years. Attendance: 67,325.

1961 — GREEN BAY 37, NEW YORK 0. (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Paul Hornung, on leave from the Army, scored an individual record 19 points to key Packer decimation of Giants in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

A record Packer home crowd of 39,029 watched the Green and Gold erupt for 24 points in the second quarter. In all, the Packers scored seven times against the NFL's top defensive team of 1961, amassing four touchdowns and three field goals. The defense, meanwhile, was proving a devastating complement to the attack, intercepting four Giant passes and recovering one fumble.

Two interceptions, by Ray Nitschke and defensive back Hank Gremminger, set up

touchdowns No. 2 and 3 while the fumble recovery by Forrest Gregg led to Hornung's second field goal and a Jess Whittenton interception to Hornung's final FG.

1962 — GREEN BAY 16, NEW YORK 7. (Yankee Stadium, New York) — Out front all the way in a raw, cyclonic setting, Packers weather siege by vengeful Giants in primitive, hand-to-hand struggle. Ray Nitschke proves principal frustration to New Yorkers, seeking redemption for shutout humiliation in '61 title game. His deflection triggers interception to blunt early Giant drive to Green Bay 10. On way to being named game's most valuable player, he also registers two interceptions, one of which led to the Packers' only touchdown of the afternoon. The other set up a 29-yard field goal by Jerry Kramer, whose trio of three-pointers provided eventual margin.

Giants' only TD comes on block of Max McGee punt in Green Bay end zone midway through the third quarter.

A battered Jim Taylor sets playoff record with 31 rushing attempts, good for 85 yards.

1965 — GREEN BAY 23, CLEVELAND 12. (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Field softened by four-inch snow made Packer backs only run harder as Lambeau Field crowd of 50,777 celebrated third championship in five years. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung amassed 201 yards rushing in rally that overcame Browns' early 9-7 lead.

Packers charged to 7-0 first quarter advantage on 47-yard Bart Starr pass to Carroll Dale and Don Chandler's conversion, but Cleveland moved in front on a 17-yard TD strike from Frank Ryan to Gary Collins and 24-yard Lou Groza field goal.

Green Bay rebounded, however, with 15 and 23 yard FGs by Chandler, the latter following a Willie Wood interception, to claim 13-7 lead subsequently trimmed to a single point by a second Groza FG shortly before the intermission.

Starr settled the issue in third quarter,

1983 SUPER BOWL TOURNAMENT

1983—GREEN BAY 41, ST. LOUIS 16 (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Making their first post-season appearance in Lambeau Field since celebrated "Ice Bowl" game of 1967 against Dallas, Packers halt Cardinal drive at one-yard-line in first quarter then proceed to forge an all-time club scoring record in their opening Super Bowl Tournament contest following 1982 season.

Out front 21-3 at halftime, they pad lead to 41-9 in fourth quarter before permitting Cards a consolation touchdown. Quarterback Lynn Dickey ties Packer playoff record before 54,282 fans by passing for 4 touchdowns (17 of 23 for 260 yards and 0 intercepts overall) and flanker John Jefferson sets club postseason mark with 148 receiving yards on 6 catches, including a 60-yard TD reception, another Packer playoff record. Placekicker Jan Stenerud also establishes a club playoff mark with a 46-yard field goal.

1983—DALLAS 37, GREEN BAY 26 (Texas Stadium, Irving, TX) — Packers amass 466 yards, a team playoff record, but are unable to overcome slow start, which finds them trailing 20-7 at halftime. They roll up 363 yards and out-score Cowboys 19-17 in second half, pulling within four points (30-26) on a 23-yard scoring runback of an interception by Mark Lee in fourth quarter, but Cowboys retaliate with 74-yard scoring drive to end Green Bay hopes with 63,972 fans looking on.

Quarterback Lynn Dickey throws for 332 yards (19-for-36) and all-time Packer playoff record in losing cause, split end James Lofton emerging with 109 yards on 5 receptions. Lofton also spices Packers' second half comeback with 71-yard reverse for a TD, tying all-time NFL playoff record for a run from scrimmage.

escorting the Packers on a 90-yard, 11-play scoring drive climaxed by Hornung's 13-yard sweep of Browns' right perimeter.

1966 — GREEN BAY 34, DALLAS 27. (Cotton Bowl, Dallas) — Bart Starr has one of his finest hours, passing for four touchdowns as Packers win second straight title and fourth in six years. Tom Brown thwarts last-minute Cowboy bid, and the majority of 74,152 Cotton Bowl fans, with end zone interception of Don Meredith's fourth down pass from Green Bay 2.

Packers mounted quick 14-0 lead on a 17-yard Starr pass to Elijah Pitts and 18-yard scoring run with a fumble recovery by rookie Jim Grabowski, but led only 21-17 at halftime following explosive Cowboy comeback. After a 32-yard Villanueva field goal had cut Packer lead to a tenuous 21-20, Starr hit Dowler and McGee with 16-yard scoring passes to provide a cushion against the Cowboys' late surge.

1967 — GREEN BAY 21, DALLAS 17. (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — With thermometer shuddering at 16 below zero and 50,861 in stands, Bart Starr scores winning touchdown from one-yard-line with 13 seconds remaining, sealing record third straight championship for Packers and their fifth in seven years.

Starr's touchdown, on third down with no timeouts remaining, climaxed a 68-yard drive in 12 plays.

As was case in 1966, Packers grabbed early 14-0 advantage. But this time Cowboys came from behind to take the lead, forcing story book finish by Green Bay to win contest later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

Starr's touchdown passes of 8 and 46 yards to Boyd Dowler built the first quarter bulge, trimmed in second quarter by George Andrie's 7-yard scoring return of a Starr fumble and 21-yard Danny Villanueva field goal. Don Meredith's 50-yard scoring strike to Lance Rentzel in the fourth quarter triggered the dramatic denouement.

THE LAMBEAU FIELD STORY

Lambeau Field, the home of the Green Bay Packers, was constructed in 1957 with an initial capacity of 32,150. The cost of the original project, \$960,000 was shared equally by the Green Bay Packers, Inc. and the city of Green Bay. It was financed by means of a bond issue, which received voter approval in a referendum conducted April 3, 1956.

Since that time, there have been four additions to the stadium, all underwritten by the Packer Corporation. The capacity was increased to 38,669 in 1961, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 and to its present capacity, 56,189 in 1970.

The stadium was dedicated as City Stadium on September 29, 1957. It was later renamed Lambeau Field in 1965, following the death of the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, founder and first coach of the Packers.

Lambeau Field now is wholly owned by the city of Green Bay, retirement of the original \$960,000 indebtedness having been celebrated at a mortgage-burning ceremony in May of 1978.

PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1963 — E. L. (Curly) Lambeau, Founder, player, coach, vice-president (1919-49). Founded Packers in 1919 and served as team's only coach through 1949 season. Also played halfback from '19 through '27, a period during which he pioneered forward pass in professional football. Led Packers to six world championships and remains one of only five coaches to record more than 200 coaching victories in the NFL. (others are George Halas, Paul Brown, Don Shula and Tom Landry) Also coached Chicago Cardinals (1950-51) and Washington Redskins (1952-53).



1963 — Johnny (Blood) McNally, HB (1928-36). Also played for Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Steelers. An elusive runner and gifted pass receiver, he played major role in Packers' drive to first three championships in 1920, 30 and 31. Also helped Packers win a fourth world title in '36. Still ranks 13th in Packer lifetime scoring, four decades after departing Green Bay scene, with 224 points. Collegiate star at St. Thomas.



1963 — Don Hutson, E (1935-45). Highest scoring receiver in pro football history with 99 touchdowns, all-time NFL record. Credited with inventing pass patterns, he led league in receiving 8 years and in scoring 5 seasons, both also league marks. Caught passes in 95 consecutive games, fifth longest streak in NFL history. Currently ranks 14th lifetime among pro receivers with 488 catches and 18th in NFL career scoring with 823 points. Starred at U. of Alabama.



1963 — Robert (Cal) Hubbard, T-E (1929-35). Also played for New York Giants, Pittsburgh Steelers. A legendary athlete, he was one of pro football's first genuine giants — a massive 6 ft. 3 inch, 265 pounder who was a devastating blocker on offense and relentless pursuer on defense as a premier, two-way performer. Was all-pro choice in each of first three years (1931, 32, 33) such selections were made. Played college football at Centenary, Geneva.



1964 — Clarke Hinkle, FB (1932-41). A four-time all-pro selection (1936, 37, 38, 41)... One of most versatile players in NFL annals, he was tough, bruising runner, fine blocker, good receiver and excellent placekicker as well as a shrewd, hard-hitting linebacker. Fourth-ranking rusher in Packer history with 3,860 yards in 1,171 carries. Played college football at Bucknell.



1964 — Mike Michalske, G (1929-37). Also played for New York Yankees (1927-28) before joining Packers. Rated one of game's greatest guards during pro football's "two-way" era. Two-time all-pro selection (1931 and 1935). A true 60-minute player, he was known as "Iron Mike" because of his great stamina and durability. Best asset was exceptional quickness, which made him equally effective on both offense and defense. Played college football at Penn State.



1966 — Arnie Herber, HB (1930-41). Also played for New York Giants (1944-45). Pro football's first great long passer. Won three National Football League passing titles and was all-pro selection in 1932. Teamed with Don Hutson to form NFL's first feared passing combination in mid-'30s. Shares fourth place in lifetime passing efficiency in Packer annals with 50.06 percentage for 9 seasons and ranks fifth in career touchdown passes with 51. Tough, durable athlete and accomplished punter as well as great passer. A Green Bay native, he played college football at Regis (Denver, Colo.)



1966 — Walt Kiesling, T (1935-36). Also played for Duluth Eskimos (1926-27), Pottsville (1928), Chicago Cardinals (1929-33) and Chicago Bears (1934). All-pro selection in 1932. Two-way performer, he starred on both offense and defense. Although a giant of his time, he possessed impressive quickness for one of his dimensions. Later served as Packer assistant coach (1945-48). Also coached for Pittsburgh Steelers, Philadelphia-Pittsburgh combine and Chicago Cardinals. Played college football at St. Thomas.



1967 — Emlen Tunnell, HB (1959-61). Also played for New York Giants (1948-58). Second leading interceptor in pro football history. Intercepted 79 passes over 14-year career and returned them 1,282 yards, another National Football League record. Also holds NFL career record for punt returns with 258 and most yards punts returned, 2,209. Played college football at University of Iowa.



1971 — Vince Lombardi, Coach and General Manager (1959-67). Also assistant coach for New York Giants (1954-58) and head coach of Washington Redskins (1969). Directed Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 1965-66-67), a feat without precedent or parallel in pro football history. His 1966 and 1967 teams also made history by winning first two Super Bowls. Packers won nine of 10 playoff games under his leadership and overall, compiled a 98-30-4 record, a glittering .766 winning percentage. Lombardi, a guard, played his college football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



1974 — Tony Canadeo, HB (1941-43, 1946-52). Became only the third 1,000 yard rusher in pro football history when he gained 1,052 yards in 1952. Still ranks as No. 3 ground gainer in Packer annals with 4,197 yards in 1,025 attempts, a 4.1 average. A durable, all-purpose halfback, he was an accomplished blocker, capable passer and good receiver in addition to being a highly effective kick returner. Also played defensive back during early years of his career. Played college football at Gonzaga, where he acquired sobriquet of "Grey Ghost."



1976 — Jim Taylor, FB (1958-66). Also played for New Orleans Saints (1967). One of only three running backs in pro football history to rush for 1,000 yards in five consecutive seasons (1960-64). Also sixth ranking career rusher in NFL annals with 8,597 yards in 10 seasons. Ranks eighth, all-time, in number of 100-yard rushing games with 26 and fifth in career rushing attempts with 1,941. Also shares NFL record for most rushing touchdowns in a season, 19 in 1962, and owns third highest lifetime total of rushing TDs, 83. Played college football at LSU.



1977 — Forrest Gregg, T (1956, 1958-70). Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1971). A second round draft selection, Gregg won all-pro honors eight times, including selection at both guard and tackle in 1965, and five times was named to the Pro Bowl. Termed by his late coach, Vince Lombardi, "the finest football player I ever coached." Holds Packer durability record, having played in 187 consecutive games for Green Bay. Played college football at SMU.



1977 — Bart Starr, QB (1956-71). A 17th round draftee in 1956, Starr became the most productive quarterback in pro football annals, directing the Packers to six Western Division championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowl triumphs. Embellished these achievements by winning Most Valuable Player honors in both Super Bowls I and II. Starr led the NFL in passing three times (1962, 1964 and 1966) and retired as the leading percentage passer in league history. He also was named to the Pro Bowl four times. Later served as Packer quarterback coach in 1972 and was named head coach and general manager of the Packers Dec. 24, 1974. Played college football at the University of Alabama.



1978 — Ray Nitschke, LB (1958-72). One of the most devastating hitters in the game's history, he was named to NFL's All-50 Year Team at linebacker after winning all-pro honors three times. Had 15-year playing career, second longest in Packer history, highlighted by his selection as Most Valuable Player in 1962 NFL Championship Game against the Giants at New York. Helped Packers win five world titles (1961-62 and 65-66-67) and first two Super Bowls. Talented ballhawk, he forged career total of 25 interceptions and recovered 20 fumbles, only one short of Packers' all-time record. A third round draft choice in 1958, he played his college football at the University of Illinois.



1980 — Herb Adderley, DB (1961-69). Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1970-72). Packers' No. 1 draft choice (Michigan State) in 1961. Five-time all-pro at cornerback. Played in five Pro Bowls, four of six Super Bowls (two with Green Bay, two with Dallas). Had 48 career intercepts, ran 7 back for TDs (second highest total in NFL history).



1981 — Willie Davis, DE (1960-69). Also played for Cleveland (1958-59). A 17th round draft choice, he came to Packers from Browns in 1960 trade. Became one of premier pass rushers in pro football history, winning all-pro honors six times and selection to Pro Bowl five times. Holds all-time Packer record for career fumble recoveries (21) and second longest consecutive game streak (162) in Green Bay annals. Helped Packers win five NFL titles during 1960s. Played college football at Grambling.



1981 — Jim Ringo, C (1953-63). Also played for Philadelphia (1964-67). Seventh round draft choice out of Syracuse in 1953. Went on to win all-pro honors six times, five as a Packer, and play in 10 Pro Bowls, seven as a Packer. Highly durable performer, once held NFL record for most consecutive games played (183). Helped Packers win back-to-back NFL titles in 1961-62. Traded to Philadelphia in 1964. Presently offensive line coach for Los Angeles Rams.

BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND . . . THE PACKER STORY

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Green Bay Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "Why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

FIRST THEY TALKED Curly's employer at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fences or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited.

THIS WAS the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy.

Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A.B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of

Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

FROM THOSE MODEST and somewhat tenuous beginnings, the Packers have gone on to earn national stature and virtual world-wide recognition by winning more championships (eleven) over the intervening half-century than any other team in professional football.

The fact that these achievements have come while representing a city of only 90,000 inhabitants, in competition with the country's population giants, has endeared them to the nation's football fans, many of whom are intrigued by the David vs. Goliath concept and the Packers' unique status as a community-owned corporation.

INEVITABLY PROCEDURES at Packer games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system—the latter hadn't been invented yet, there weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their existence in 1919, they played on approximately the same site as the now abandoned City (East) Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut Street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed, you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics of the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's half time suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built—just a

small bleacher with a capacity of a couple hundred—on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

WHEN HAGEMASTER Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemaster Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides, between the 30-yard lines. Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

AFTER WORLD WAR II, City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961, the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, and to the present 56,191 in 1970.

The Packers' colorful saga, spanning 62 years, can be roughly divided into eight chapters. They take us from the "Iron Man" period of the first decade under founder Curly Lambeau to the present day, which finds the Packer's legendary quarterback, Bart Starr, presiding as the eighth head coach in the team's history.

THE IRON MAN ERA—With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in

1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in 1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 or 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD—Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold, when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME—After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER—The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and businessman, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the rebuilding plans and Lisle W. Blackbourn, coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four-year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP—Likable Ray "Scooter" McLean moved up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958.

McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his lone season as head coach.

THE LOMBARDI ERA—In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giant assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and was unanimously voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966, and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams became the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise one of the most successful. Over a nine year span as head coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 141 victories against 39 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .783 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 Division playoffs and World Championship Games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

BENGTSON PERIOD—Following the third consecutive title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970, compiling a 20-21-1 record, and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE DEVINE DAYS—Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a 5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record, and Devine resigned.

THE PRESENT—Bart Starr, the most successful field general in pro football history as

Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the NFL wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on Dec. 24, 1974. Starr, who led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere... We will earn everything else."

Although he had to settle for a 4-10 record in the baptismal season of a massive rebuilding project, Starr gave Packer fans new hope by assembling a sound organization and restoring a positive attitude, underscored by three victories in the last five games of the 1975 season. He continued the resurgent trend in 1976, leading the Packers to a 5-9 record, highlighted by a three-game, mid-season winning streak. Major and key injuries slowed the comeback in 1977 but a strong finish produced a 4-10 mark. Hopes soared in 1978 when the Packers posted their first winning record since 1972, an 8-7-1 record, only to be temporarily dampened in '79 by a record rash of injuries which spawned a 5-11 mark. Another injury epidemic, one which saw 27 players on injured reserve during the course of the season, struck in 1980, forcing the Packers to settle for a 5-10-1 record.

Rebounding strongly in 1981, they rallied from a disappointing 2-6 start to mount the most dramatic comeback in Green Bay history, closing with a 6-2 rush (an 8-8 mark) and coming within one victory of the playoffs.

The Packers continued the upsurge in 1982, when they qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1972 by posting a 5-3-1 record during a strike-interrupted season. They then embellished that performance by routing St. Louis 41-16 in the first game of the NFL's Super Bowl Tournament before bowing to Dallas (37-26) despite a record-setting, 466-yard offensive effort.

1967 — Packers defeat Kansas City of NFL 35-10 at Los Angeles in first Super Bowl, Jan. 15.

— Packers edge Cowboys, 21-17 for third consecutive NFL title on last minute, one-yard sneak by Bart Starr in 16-below temperature at Lambeau Field.

1968 — Packers beat Oakland 33-14 in Super Bowl II at Miami, Jan. 14; game has first \$3 million gate in history.

— Lombardi steps down as Packer head coach, stays as general manager; Phil Bengtson named coach.

1969 — Lombardi resigns to become part-owner, executive-vice president, head coach of Washington Redskins; Bengtson named Packer GM.

1970 — Lombardi dies at 57, Sept. 3.

— Bengtson resigns, Dec. 21.

1971 — Dan Devine, University of Missouri coach, named Packer head coach, general manager.

1972 — Packers win first Central Division title since '67 (10-4-0) but lose to Redskins in divisional playoff at Washington, 16-3.

1974 — Devine resigns Dec. 16, following 5-7-2 mark in '73 and 6-8-0 in '74.

— Bart Starr, who quarterbacked Packers to five NFL titles in 7 years during '60s, named head coach, general manager, Dec. 24.

1982 — Judge Robert J. Parins elected Packer president (May 3), becoming first full-time chief executive in team's history.

— Packers gain playoffs for first time since 1972 and defeat St. Louis in first round (41-16) before losing to Dallas (37-26).

The Green Bay Packers have completed two major and comprehensive additions to their facilities in the past year, improvements representing an investment of approximately \$3,000,000 which provide the organization with the most complete physical plant in professional football.

Pictured above is the 29,400—square foot addition to the administration building and training quarters, a \$2,000,000 project begun in October of 1982 and completed in July of this year, it has more than doubled the available space, increasing the building's overall area from 23,700 to 53,100 square feet. The improvements include new and more spacious dressing room facilities, a larger players' lounge, more and larger meeting rooms, handball courts, a jacuzzi and a laundry. There also is a new ticket office and a new and expanded public relations department, including for the first time a media lounge and private interview room.

The Packer complex was first expanded in 1982 by the construction of a \$700,000 indoor practice facility—pictured on the next page.





An all-metal structure, the Packers' new practice facility (above) covers an 80-yard artificial turf strip and sprawls over a 55,000-square foot area.

Erected on the team's South Oneida Street practice field, across the street from the Packer administration building, it is a clear span, free-standing structure. The building is 240 feet long, 230 feet wide and 65 feet high at the apex, sufficient to permit practice of punting and placekicking. Lighting is provided by sky lights and 1,500-watt, metal halide indirect lighting (76 fixtures).

The only one of its kind in professional football (the Minnesota Vikings have an indoor practice facility but it is an air-supported structure), the building is equipped with electric heating and can be heated to a temperature of 65 degrees.

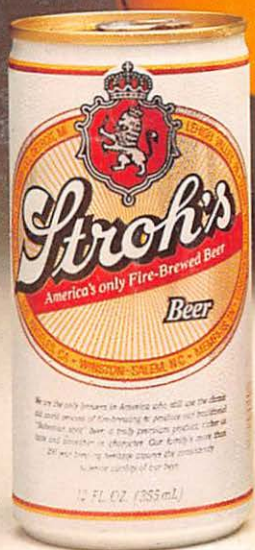
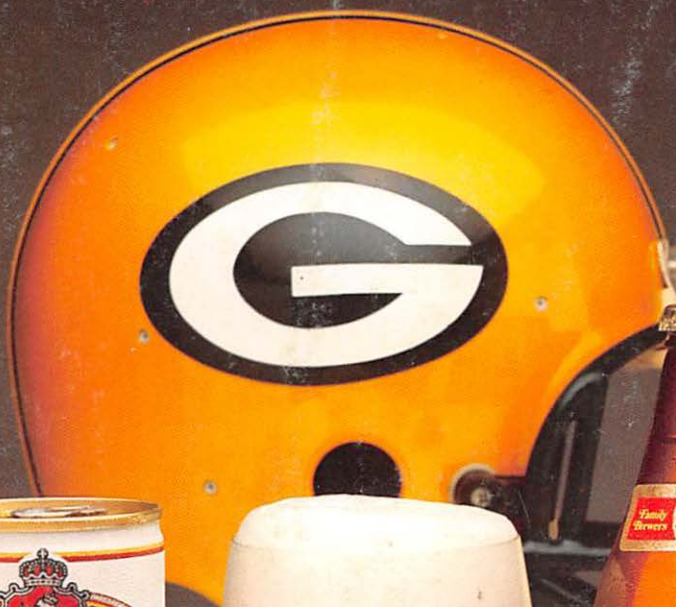
