ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers have won more championships — eleven — than any other team in National Football League history. They won their first three by league standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight since the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933 (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967). Green Bay also is the only NFL team to win three straight titles, having done it twice (1929-30-31 and 1965-66-67).

In addition, the Packers won the first two Super Bowls (over Kansas City in 1967, 35-10, and over Oakland in 1968, 33-14).

Chicago's Bears rank second with nine NFL titles, followed by the Giants, Lions and Browns with four each.

The Green Bay Packer Football Team is a community owned non-profit corporation. 4,625½ shares of stock are owned by 1,796 shareholders—none of whom receives any dividend on the initial investment. The Corporation is governed by 45 directors and a 7-man executive committee.



JUDGE ROBERT J. PARINS President

Two constants, growth and change, have continued to mark the presidency of Judge Robert J. Parins, now in his fifth year as chief executive of the Green Bay Packers, Inc.

During this span, he has presided over the planning and construction of three major additions to the Packers' physical facilities and seen the corporation's assets mount from \$19.5 million when he took office to more than \$30,000,000 in 1986.

The building program was launched in 1982 with construction of a 55,000-square foot indoor practice facility, followed in 1983 by remodeling and expansion of the administration building and training quarters, which more than doubled the size of the existing structure. In 1984, as part of a renegotiated lease with the City of Green Bay, stadium rest room facilities also were doubled

and all concession stands were remodeled. In 1985, seventy-two private boxes were constructed along the east and west sides of Lambeau Field.

This year, the upgrading process will continue with the installation of a new and more sophisticated scoreboard in 'Lambeau.'

During his tenure, Judge Parins also has been called upon to guide the corporation through a 57-day strike, which occurred in 1982, and at that season's end to coordinate preparations for the Packers' first home playoff game since 1967.

The veteran jurist, the first full-time president in the Packers' 67-year history, formally assumed his current responsibilities on June 1, 1982, following his resignation as a Brown County circuit court judge (Branch 2 of the 8th Judicial District). He previously had been named principal executive officer at a board of directors' meeting October 11, 1981.

Only the eighth man to hold the Packer presidency since the corporation was founded in 1922, he has been a member of the team's official family since May 23, 1966, when elected to the board of directors at the annual stockholders' meeting.

Judge Parins later was elected vice president of the corporation at a board of directors' meeting Aug. 1, 1979, automatically becoming a member of the Packer Executive Committee in the process.

Born in Green Bay Aug. 23, 1918, he graduated from Green Bay East High School in 1936. He later obtained a bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1940 and a law degree, also from the University of Wisconsin, in 1942.

Upon graduation from law school, he worked for Employers Mutual Insurance Co. in Minneapolis from 1942 through 1944 before returning to Green Bay, in 1944, to open the practice of law in partnership with the late Meyer Cohen. In 1949, he was elected district attorney of Brown County and served one, two-year term. Elected a circuit judge in the spring of 1967, he was formally vested Jan. 2, 1968. On the bench, he earned a state-wide reputation for the fair, efficient and expeditious disposition of the cases brought before him. Although he officially retired from the bench in 1982, he continues to serve as a reserve judge on occasion.

Judge Parins and his wife, Elizabeth, have five children and 11 grandchildren.

An active sportsman in private life, he owns a stable just outside Green Bay and regularly works with his horses there. He also is an ardent fisherman and shoots a respectable game of golf.



DOMINIC OLEJNICZAK Chairman of the Board

Dominic Olejniczak, who served the organization as president longer than any other man in the team's history, now is chairman of the board of Green Bay Packers, Inc. He was elected to the position by the board of directors Oct. 11, 1981.

Mr. Olejniczak ended a 24-year tenure as corporation president May 3, 1982, when Judge Robert J. Parins was elected to succeed him. A former mayor of the City of Green Bay (1945-55), he used that experience in municipal government to help guide the Packers to unprecedented corporate prosperity.

A devout Packer fan since the 1920s, when he was a pupil at St. Mary of the Angels Grade School, he first began to develop close ties with the Packers in

an official capacity during the mid-1930s. Elected to the Green Bay City Council, he became involved with the team through the City of Green Bay and the Board of Education, which had jurisdiction over old City Stadium, where the Packers then played their games. He continued to work closely with the Packers while mayor and, in that position, was a prime mover in the drive to build the current stadium, Lambeau Field.

Elected to the board of directors July 10, 1950, Mr. Olejniczak subsequently moved up through the chairs, being named to the Executive Committee January 21, 1952, elected a vice president March 1, 1954, executive vice president Dec. 23, 1957, president April 28, 1958, and then chairman of the board in 1981.

"Mr. Ole" and his wife, Regina, have two sons — Thomas, a Green Bay attorney who was elected to the Packer board of directors June 2, 1986, joining his father in the 45-member directorate; and Mark, a Green Bay realtor.

BOB HARLAN **Assistant to the President**

A member of the Packer management team since 1971, Robert E. "Bob" Harlan has a wide range of responsibilities as corporate assistant to the president. They include management of Lambeau Field's new private boxes, constructed in 1985.

The 49-year-old Iowan, a native of Des Moines, also oversees the Packers' ticket operations, public relations department, game entertainment and front office personnel. In addition, he works with Tom Miller, assistant to the president for business, in purchasing.

Prior to 1985, he also negotiated all player contracts for 14 years. He continues involvement in this area as a member of a management committee which regularly evaluates player contracts and costs.

A graduate of Marquette University, where he earned a B.S. degree in journalism in 1958, Harlan had a brief tour of duty in the U.S. Army before spending a year as a general reporter for United Press-

International in Milwaukee. He subsequently became sports information director at Marquette in 1959, serving six years in that capacity. He joined the St. Louis baseball Cardinals in 1965, serving as director of community relations and the speakers' bureau for two years and as director of public relations for 3½ years. He left that position to join the Packers as assistant general manager on June 1, 1971.

Bob, a devout fan of Marquette basketball as well as the Milwaukee Bucks and Brewers, is a member of the board of directors of the First Wisconsin Bank of Green Bay. He and his wife, Madeline, have three sons, Kevin, 26, sports director of radio station KCMO in Kansas City and play-by-play "voice" of the Kansas City Chiefs, and University of Missouri basketball; Bryan, 24, who is assistant coordinator of media relations for the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears; and Michael, 17, a senior at Green Bay Premontre High School.



TOM MILLER **Assistant to the President**

Thomas M. "Tom" Miller, who joined the organization in 1956, is dean of the Packers' front office. Currently in his 31st year of service to the club, he wears a variety of "hats" as assistant to the president for business, a position he has held since 1981. He arranges all team travel and is responsible for negotiating radio and pre-season television contracts as well as for the scheduling of pre-season games. He also is in charge of purchasing for the corporation. In addition to these duties, Miller is responsible for repair and maintenance of Lambeau Field in cooperation with the Green Bay Stadium Commission, and for the planning and construction of all additions to Packer facilities. He has been deeply involved in the latter area in the past five years, during which the Packers erected a \$700,000 indoor practice facility and completed a \$2,000,000 addition to the administration building, a \$1,300,000 concession stands project and the

private box construction, the latter completed in late summer of 1985.

The Pennsylvania native, possessor of an extensive football background, played five years of professional football the last of them for the Packers in 1946. An end, he began his National Football League career with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1942, and moved to the Redskins in 1945 before joining the Packers.

Following his retirement from football, Miller coached in the college ranks for nearly a decade, coaching football and basketball at Wilkes College (1946-50) and football, basketball and baseball at Drexel College (1950-55). He rejoined the Packers as publicity director, serving in that capacity until 1965, when the late Vince Lombardi named him assistant to the general manager. He was appointed business general manager by Bart Starr in 1975 before being named assistant to the president.

Tom and his wife, the former Beverly Rusch of Green Bay, have three children: Tom, Jr., Nancy and Sue.

The Green Bay Packers stand alone in professional football, both in structure and accomplishment. As an organization, they represent the only publicly-owned team in the 28-club National Football League. On the field, they have won more championships — 11 — than any other team in the NFL's 65-year history.

Green Bay Packers, Inc., a non-profit corporation, was founded in 1922 under the leadership of A. B. Turnbull, who became the organization's first president. There are 4,625½ shares of stock owned by approximately 1,790 shareholders. The corporation is governed by a seven-man Executive Committee, selected from a 45-man board of directors. Judge Robert J. Parins, eighth president of the corporation, was elected the organization's chief executive May 3, 1982.

FORREST GREGG Head Coach

For Forrest Gregg, a classic competitor as a player and an intense, demanding leader as a coach, a deep and continuing commitment to excellence and success have been a way of life.

A member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, he already was a legendary figure in both Packer annals and the archives of the National Football League when he became the ninth head coach in Green Bay's history December 24, 1983, agreeing to a five-year contract.

—**For example**, he to date is the only man in the history of the game who has made it to the Super Bowl as both a starting player (with the Green Bay Packers) and a head coach (with Cincinnati) since the classic was originated in 1967.

—**As a player**, he helped the Packers win five NFL titles during a seven-year span in the 1960s, an achievement without parallel or precedent in professional football history. It included three consecutive championships

(in 1965-66-67), the only time this feat has been accomplished since the NFL's playoff system was inaugurated in 1933, and victories in Super Bowls I and II.

—**In the process**, he became one of the most honored performers of all time, winning all-pro honors eight times and being named to nine Pro Bowls during a distinguished, 14-year Packer career which prompted the late Vince Lombardi to call him "the finest player I have ever coached."

—**He also was** the most durable athlete in the team's history, playing in 187 consecutive games, a total which still ranks as an all-time Packer record.

—**In 1977, his pre-eminence** at his position was further documented when he was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the first time he was eligible following the mandatory five-year retirement period. He also was voted into the Packer Hall of Fame the same year.

—**As a head coach**, he developed the most successful team in the NFL over the 1981 and '82 seasons, a period during which his Cincinnati Bengals forged a glittering 19-6 won-lost record and qualified for Super Bowl XVI.

Both Gregg and Packer loyalists, who universally acclaimed his selection, are confident the success story will continue.

The big Texan promised as much in taking over the head coach's office at 1265 Lombardi Avenue.

"I'm not a prophet, so I can't tell you what is going to happen ... but I can tell you that I didn't take this job to field a losing football team," he said. "I took this job to field a winning football team. That will happen."

Although hampered in pursuit of the playoffs his first two seasons, in part by injuries in the offensive line and uncertainty at the quarterback position, he is confident the objective is within reach.

"This football team has been 8-and-8 for some time," he noted in assessing the "state of the team" at the organization's annual stockholders' meeting, adding, "We have made some changes within our coaching staff ... We also will make some changes in our player ranks."

"I think a team sometimes has a tendency to get into a rut, to become satisfied with mediocrity ... That is not what we're here for, and not what I said when I came here — that we intended to make this team a winner. We certainly intend to do that ... Sometimes you have to get things back in line."

Enthusiastic about the challenge at hand, the Packer coach declared, "I can't remember a time when I've looked forward to a season more than I'm looking forward to this one. I think we have some good football players, I think we have an excellent coaching staff, and the support of Judge Parins and the Packer Executive Committee."

"We made a promise when we came here that we would win, and we certainly intend to do that ... I think good things are in store for the Green Bay Packers in 1986."

The 52-year-old Gregg left Green Bay as a player following the 1970 season, ending a distinguished career which had begun in 1956 when Head Coach Lisle Blackbourn made the Southern Methodist University captain Green Bay's selection in the second round of the NFL draft.

Subsequently persuaded by Tom Landry to play a 15th year, he joined the Dallas Cowboys in 1971 for a final season, capped by Super Bowl V, before going into coaching as an assistant on the San Diego Chargers' staff in 1972.

Leaving San Diego after the 1973 season, he moved to Cleveland, where he became offensive line coach in 1974. Just one year later, he was named head coach of the Browns by Art Modell. After a 3-11 rebuilding season in that role in 1975, Gregg turned the Cleveland franchise around in dramatic fashion the following year, maneuvering the Browns to a 9-5 record and earning "Coach of the Year" honors in the process.

His 1977 Browns won five of their first seven games to forge into contention for AFC Central Division honors. Injuries then struck, however, and they lost six of their last seven games. Gregg resigned with one game remaining in the season.

Out of football in 1978, he signed on as head coach of the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts in 1979, compiling a 5-11 record with a young and inexperienced team.

That stint set the stage for a return to the NFL in 1980 as head coach of a Cincinnati team which had struggled to back-to-back 4-12 seasons in 1978 and '79.

In just two years, the purposeful Gregg had the Bengals in the Super Bowl. After improving the record to 6-10 in 1980, he directed them to an impressive 12-4 regular season record the following year, two playoff victories and a berth in Super Bowl XVI against the 49ers.

This achievement brought him a host of honors. He was chosen coach-of-the-year by the Associated Press, United Press International and the Professional Football Writers Association of America.

Refusing to permit the distractions of an eight-week player strike to disrupt his team, Gregg followed that Super Bowl achievement by leading the Bengals to a 7-2 record in 1982 and a second consecutive playoff appearance.

In 1983, he may have done the finest coaching job of his career. After two starters were suspended for the first four games by Commissioner Pete Rozelle for using drugs and two others announced their signing with the United States Football League for future delivery, his team got off to a rocky, 0-6 start, but he rallied the Bengals to win seven of their last ten games — a remarkable comeback by any measurement.

A man who brings the same intensity to coaching that he did to the playing field, Forrest sums up his basic approach with typical economy of verbiage.

"First of all, I believe in discipline," he says. "I believe in a well-conditioned football team, and I believe in a football team's being drilled to a point where they make very few mental mistakes."

Also an exponent of the direct approach from a coaching standpoint, he says: "I go straight down the road with the players and that's the only way I know how to go ... and that's the only way I'm comfortable."

He may have been best described by one of his former Bengal players, punter-wide receiver Pat McInally. "He has a strong personality and he has the ability to lead just with his presence," McInally said. "He doesn't have to just say words. He embodies everything that he believes in and tells his players ... He's not phony. He's genuine, and that's very important — and he finds a way to relate to all his players."

Born Alvis Forrest Gregg in Birthright, TX, Oct. 18, 1933, Gregg had established himself as a multi-talented, injury-free athlete by the time he joined the Packers as a player. He participated in football, basketball, baseball and track at Sulphur Springs, TX, High School, and then twice won all-Southwest Conference honors as a two-way tackle at SMU, captaining the Mustangs in his senior year.

A broken arm, incurred when he was a high school sophomore, was the only major injury he suffered during his athletic career. Later, in the NFL, a bruised knee almost kept him out of a game against Detroit in 1965, but he went in to block on an extra point attempt to keep his consecutive game streak alive.

In 1960, the year that the Packers won their first Western Division title under Lombardi, Gregg was voted all-pro, the first in a string of eight straight years of all-league recognition. In 1965, an injury to Jerry Kramer necessitated his moving to guard but it had no effect on Gregg's "all" status. He was named all-pro at both guard (Associated Press) and tackle (United Press International) that season.

Only two players in the Packers' 65-year NFL history have worn Green Bay's green and gold longer than

the "Man from Birthright" — his immediate coaching predecessor, Bart Starr, who played for 16 seasons, and Ray Nitschke, a Packer for 15 seasons.

Although he has known great success as both an athlete and a coach, Gregg won perhaps his greatest battle off the field — winning a bout with cancer during the late '70s. In May of 1982, he went to the White House to accept the American Cancer Society's "National Courage Award" from President Reagan.

A new honor, and one of special significance to him because of his heritage, came to the Packer coach earlier this year when he was enshrined in the Texas Sports Hall of Fame in June, along with such luminaries from other sports as pro basketball's Elvin Hayes and boxing's George Foreman.

Forrest and his wife, Barbara, have two children — a son, Forrest, Jr., now working under his father as administrative assistant to the Packers' defensive coaching staff, and a daughter, Karen, who is employed in the personnel department of a hotel management corporation in Dallas.

DICK MODZELEWSKI Defensive Coordinator

The Packer defense continued to make strides in 1985 under Richard "Mo" Modzelewski, the Packers' colorful and energetic defensive coordinator.

In 1984, his first season in his current role, Modzelewski took over a platoon which had finished 28th in the National Football League statistically a year earlier. By the end of the season, his revamped defense had soared all the way to 16th place under the tough-minded tutelage of the former Cleveland Brown and New York Giant lineman.

In 1985, the upward trend continued, Green Bay's defense advancing to 12th place.

The 55-year-old Modzelewski, a 19-year coaching veteran, has an impressive football pedigree — as both a player and coach. As a player, the former University of Maryland athlete won the Outland Trophy as the nation's premier college lineman in his senior year (1952), then subsequently played on six conference championship and two NFL title teams — the 1956 New York Giants and 1964

Cleveland Browns — as a professional. He also was chosen to play in the 1964 Pro Bowl.

As a coach, the personable West Natrona, PA, native helped Cincinnati reach Super Bowl XVI in 1981, gain the playoffs again in 1982's strike-shortened season and achieve No. 1 ranking in the NFL defensively in 1983 while serving as the Bengals' defensive line coach. Earlier, while defensive coordinator at Cleveland, he guided the Browns' defense to the highest finish it has had in the past decade.



COACHES

Modzelewski, who accompanied Forrest Gregg from Cincinnati to Green Bay when No. 75 became Packer head coach, was named Green Bay's defensive coordinator by Gregg, May 23, 1984 following Hank Bullough's resignation. He previously had been appointed defensive line coach December 30, 1983.

Dick, born in West Natrona Feb. 16, 1931, has his coaching career with Cleveland in 1968 under Blanton Collier. He continued with the Browns under Nick Skorich who succeeded Collier, and was re-hired by Gregg when he became Cleveland's head coach in 1975. Gregg later appointed Modzelewski defensive coordinator in 1976, a position he also held in 1977. "Mo" later was appointed interim head coach of the Browns for the final game of the '77 season after Gregg resigned. He served as defensive coordinator for the Giants in 1978, then joined the Bengals in 1979 as defensive line coach. Gregg asked him to remain on the Cincinnati staff when Forrest became head coach of the Bengals in 1980.

Drafted in the second round by Washington in 1953, when Packer founder E. L. "Curly" Lambeau was the Redskins' head coach, Modzelewski later played for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955 before being traded to the Giants, with whom he became a principal in the Giant "Fearsome Foursome," which also included Andy Robustelli, Jim Katcavage and Rosey Grier.

After starring for the Giants from 1956 through 1963, Dick was traded to Cleveland in 1964 and played three more seasons for the Browns before retiring in 1966.

Dick and his wife, Dorothy, have four children — Mark, Laurie, Terrie and Amie — and two granddaughters.



TOM COUGHLIN Passing Game/Receivers

Thomas R. "Tom" Coughlin, the Packers' new passing game and receivers coach, has been hailed as one of the brightest young "minds" in professional football by the legendary oracle of offense, Sid Gillman.

Gillman and Coughlin (pronounced COFF-lin) were fellow members of Coach Marion Campbell's Philadelphia coaching staff in 1985 when the Eagles' Mike Quick caught a career-high 73 passes under Coughlin's tutelage and led the National Football Conference in receiving yardage (1,247).

Coughlin, 40, was named to the Packer coaching staff Feb. 7, 1986 by Head Coach Forrest Gregg, who said in making the appointment, "Our key ... was we wanted someone who had some familiarity with our style of offense." Coughlin had been a training camp observer at Cincinnati when Gregg was head coach of the Bengals (1980-83).

The Waterloo, N.Y., native was on the Boston College staff for three years prior to joining the Eagles in 1984, playing a key role in the development of quarterback Doug Flutie and coordinating the offense. Flutie went on to win the Heisman Trophy in '84 and finish with more passing yards than any quarterback in collegiate history. While Coughlin was at BC, the football team compiled a 22-10-1 record and in 1983, his final season there, won the Lambert Trophy as the top team in the East for the first time since 1942.

Earlier, Coughlin spent seven years on the coaching staff at his alma mater, Syracuse University, serving as offensive coordinator under Frank Maloney from 1974 through 1980. He began his coaching career at Rochester, N.Y. Tech, where he was head coach from 1969 through 1973 and the only winning coach in the school's history.

Born March 31, 1946, Coughlin won all-state and all-America honors as an offensive halfback at Waterloo, N.Y., Central High School and went on to letter for three years as a wingback at Syracuse under the famed coach, Ben Schwartzwalder, while playing in the same backfield as Floyd Little and Larry Csonka. In each of his last two years, he won the school's "Orange Key" award as the outstanding student-athlete on the varsity football team. He later served as graduate assistant on the Syracuse coaching staff in 1968 while completing work on a master's degree in education.

Coughlin and his wife, Judy, have four children, Keli, 16; Tim, 14; Brian, 9; and Katie, 4.



JOHN HILTON Offensive Backfield/Special Teams

Towering John Hilton, a one-time Packer starter and a veteran of six years as an assistant coach with the Chicago Bears and Washington Redskins, has returned to Green Bay in a dual role as offensive backfield and special teams coach. He was named to the position by Head Coach Forrest Gregg Feb. 17, 1986.

Hilton, the Packers' starting tight end in 1970, launched his coaching career under Jack Pardee with the Bears in 1975. He later moved to Washington with Pardee when the latter became head coach of the Redskins in 1978, coaching the special teams, receivers and the outside running game for both clubs.

After leaving Washington, Hilton spent five years in the sales field in Pennsylvania.

The former University of Richmond athlete, born in Albany, N.Y., March 12, 1942, originally was drafted by the Detroit Lions, who selected him as a "future" in the sixth round of the 1964 NFL draft,

following his junior year at Richmond. The Lions later dealt him to Pittsburgh in a draft choice trade prior to the 1965 season — after obtaining all-pro tight end Ron Kramer from the Packers.

The Packers acquired Hilton from Pittsburgh in a 1970 trade which sent defensive back John Rowser to the Steelers. That season, he caught 25 passes for 350 yards, a 14.0-yard average, and 4 touchdowns. He subsequently was released in the final cutdown for the 1971 season and later spent half of that year with the Minnesota Vikings and the other half with the Redskins. Traded by Washington to Detroit in 1972, he closed out his NFL career with the Lions in 1973 before moving to the Florida Blazers of the World Football League for a final season under Pardee as a player.

Overall, Hilton caught 144 passes for 2,047 yards, a 14.2-yard average, and 16 touchdowns during nine NFL seasons. He had his best year in 1966, when he caught 46 passes for 603 yards for the Steelers, with whom he spent five seasons before being traded to Green Bay.

Hilton, a teammate of Gregg during that '70 season, did not play football until his junior year at Hermitage High School in Richmond, going on to help his team win the state championship as a senior. At Richmond, he earned four varsity letters in football and was named to the All-Southern Conference team each of his last three years.

John is married and he and his wife, Penny, have two children, a son, John, 18, who graduated from high school this year, and a daughter, Erin, who is in the fourth grade.



DICK JAURON Defensive Backfield Coach

Dick Jauron, who once patrolled the 'outfield' at free safety for Forrest Gregg at Cincinnati, this year has rejoined him as defensive backfield coach of the Packers.

The Packer coach named the 35-year-old Jauron to the position Jan. 7, 1986, succeeding Ken Riley, who resigned to become head coach at his alma mater, Florida A&M.

Jauron (pronounced JUH-RON) began his pro coaching in 1985, signing on as interim secondary coach of the Buffalo Bills after Bills' defensive backfield coach Dick Moseley suffered a heart attack. Jauron, who had left the business field to join Hank Bullough's Buffalo staff, continued to work with the Bills' defense after Moseley rejoined the staff in mid-season.

The former Detroit Lion star played for Gregg in 1980, the latter's first year as head coach at Cincinnati, before suffering a career-ending knee injury in the tenth game. He subsequently assisted the



Bengal coaching staff during Cincinnati's 1981, Super Bowl season while spending the year on injured reserve. Gregg later offered Jaaron a coaching job the following season but Dick decided to go into business.

A graduate of Yale, where he ranks as one of the school's all-time greats, Jaaron entered professional football in 1973 as a fourth round selection of the Detroit Lions and was named to the Pro Bowl following the 1974 season, his second in the NFL. Released by the Lions Aug. 23, 1978, he signed with Cincinnati six days later and was a Bengal starter until he suffered the knee injury in 1980.

Jaaron, a native of Swampscott, MA, made a total of 26 interceptions over his eight pro seasons, including a career-high six for Cincinnati in 1979, and returned two of them for touchdowns. He also recovered 14 fumbles. Employed as a kick returner in the early years of his NFL career, he also posted a 10.2-yard average for 44 punt returns, including an impressive 16.8-yard average for 17 runbacks in 1974.

After retiring as a player, he owned a health fitness center in Cincinnati with teammate Jimmy Corbett. He sold his interest in the business in 1983 and moved to Florida, where he was employed by Nautilus until he joined the Buffalo coaching staff in July of 1985.

Born Dick Manual Jaaron on Oct. 7, 1950, he was a nine-letter winner at Swampscott High School (three each in football, basketball and baseball) before going on to entrench himself among Yale's all-time elite. An offensive back as a collegian, he still holds Yale's career rushing record (2,947 yards in 515 attempts, a 5.7-yard average), owns the second longest run from scrimmage in the school's history (an 87-yard maneuver against Columbia in 1972) and ranks second in Yale annals in both total offense (2,952 yards) and scoring (170 points). A three-letter winner, he was named to the Kodak and Walter Camp All-America teams following his senior season and chosen to play in the East-West Shrine game.

Football runs in the Jaaron family. Dick's father, Robert, was a successful college football coach, once directing St. Joseph's College of Rensselaer, IN, to the national small college championship during the late 1940s.

Dick and his wife, Gail, are the parents of a one-year-old daughter, Kacy.



VIRGIL KNIGHT **Strength/Conditioning Coach**

When Forrest Gregg became the Packers' head coach in 1984, he quickly listed improving the physical strength of the players as a high priority. He then hired the first strength conditioning coach in Packer history, Virgil Knight, to achieve this objective.

Substantial strides have been made in the two-year interim under Knight's direction. Gregg noted "a big improvement" in this area in the first year, 1984, and there was continued progress last season.

The 38-year-old Knight, a 14-year coaching veteran of the college ranks, was named to the Green Bay staff Feb. 9, 1984. Previously a position coach, Knight had had five years' experience as a strength coach — beginning in 1979 when he moved from Arkansas Tech to the University of Florida. He left Florida in 1981 to become a member of Coach Pat Dye's staff at Auburn, spending three years at the Alabama institution before joining the Packers.

In addition to his duties in the strength and conditioning area,

Knight assists Jerry Wampfler with the offensive line.

Born January 30, 1948 in Clarksville, AR, Virgil began his coaching career at Sylvan Hills High School in Little Rock, AR, in 1971. After one year there and three years at Marist, GA, High School, he moved into the college ranks at Arkansas Tech, where he coached the defensive line and linebackers for four years and also was head track coach.

As an athlete himself, Knight won all-state honors in football and was an all-district selection in basketball in high school at Clarksville. He later attended Northeast Oklahoma University, where he was named to the All-Oklahoma Collegiate Athletic Conference football team in both his junior and senior years and also competed in track.

Virgil and his wife, Becky, have two sons, Trent, 12, and Josh, 5.



DALE LINDSEY Linebackers

Moustachioed Dale Lindsey, the Packers' new linebacker coach, is a veteran of coaching service in four professional football leagues.

The 43-year-old Kentuckian, in his tenth season as a pro coach, began his career as linebacker coach of the Cleveland Browns in 1974, when current Packer Head Coach Forrest Gregg was in charge of the Browns' offensive line. The following year, he joined the staff of the World Football League's Portland Storm.

Lindsey later moved into the Canadian Football League, joining Gregg's Toronto Argonaut staff in 1979 and remaining there through the 1982 season.

In 1983, he transferred to the United States Football League, where he served as linebacker coach of the Boston Breakers. He moved to the New Jersey Generals in 1984, working as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach under Walt Michaels.

Between his stints with Portland and Toronto Lindsey was head football coach at Warren Central High School in Bowling Green, KY, from 1976 through 1978.

A Western Kentucky University star as a collegian, Lindsey was drafted by both the Cleveland Browns (NFL) and New York Jets (AFL) in 1965 after twice being named to the All-Ohio Valley Conference team and to the first team Little All-America first team as a senior. He elected to play for the Browns and remained with Cleveland for nine years before launching his coaching career.

Lindsey and his wife Eva, have three children — Blan, Jennifer and Jim — and one grandchild.



GEORGE SEFCIK Quarterback Coach

George Sefcik, a key member of every staff Forrest Gregg has assembled while coaching three NFL teams, takes on a new role in 1986 as quarterback coach. He had served as offensive backfield coach the past two seasons.

Sefcik, a Notre Dame alumnus, initially joined Gregg when the Packer head coach was forming his first coaching staff at Cleveland in 1975. He was offensive backfield coach of the Browns from 1975 through 1977, later joining the Cincinnati staff in 1978 upon Gregg's recommendation. He served under Bill Johnson with the Bengals for two seasons and was retained by Gregg when Forrest took over as head coach at Cincinnati in 1980.

When Gregg became head coach of the Packers following the 1983 season, Sefcik was the first assistant Number 75 named.

The 46-year-old Ohioan, a Cleveland native, is credited with returning the 1,000-yard rusher to the Bengal offense during his stay in Cincinnati. In 1981, Bengal fullback Pete Johnson rushed for 1,077 yards, thus becoming Cincinnati's first 1,000-yard rusher since Paul Robinson in 1968. Two years earlier, in 1979, Bengal running backs gained more yardage collectively and scored more touchdowns than any such group in Cincinnati history.

Born in Cleveland December 27, 1939, George was a two-way halfback on the Notre Dame teams of 1959-60-61. Following graduation, he became a head coach at Niles, IL, High School, then returned to Notre Dame as freshman coach under Ara Parseghian. He served as an aide to Parseghian until 1964, when he moved to the University of Kentucky as offensive coordinator. Four years later, Sefcik launched his pro coaching career under Howard Schnellenberger with the Baltimore Colts in 1973. He then joined Gregg's staff at Cleveland in 1975 when Forrest became head coach of the Browns.

Sefcik is a graduate of Cleveland's Benedictine High School. He and his wife, Loretta (Lori), have three children.



COACHES



JERRY WAMPFLER Offensive Line Coach

Jerry Wampfler, an outstanding teacher and technician, played a key role in the resurgence of the Packer running game in 1985. Overcoming injury problems and related reshuffling of personnel up front, he regrouped the offensive line so effectively that Green Bay emerged with the second best rushing average in the National Football League last season (4.7 yards).

The line also made dramatic improvement in protecting the quarterback over the last half of the season, permitting only 18 sacks in the final eight games after giving up 32 in the first eight.

Wampfler, previously a member of the Eagles' coaching staff, gained a reputation in Philadelphia for developing outstanding offensive linemen. His most prominent Eagle pupils included Pro Bowl tackles Jerry Sisemore and Stan Walters.

Named to the Packer staff by Head Coach Forrest Gregg Jan. 8, 1984, he had been running game coordinator as well as offensive line coach for Philadelphia from 1979 through 1983, serving under Dick Vermeil from 1979 through 1982 and under Marion Campbell in 1983.

The New Philadelphia, OH, native had launched his pro coaching career with the Eagles in 1973 as an assistant to Mike McCormack. He moved to the Buffalo Bills in 1976 and to the New York Giants in 1978 before rejoining the Eagles' staff in 1979.

Born Aug. 6, 1932, Wampfler was a standout offensive tackle at Miami of Ohio from 1951 through 1954. An off-season back injury forced him to miss an NFL tryout as a Los Angeles Rams draft choice and he turned to coaching in the high school ranks — first at his native New Philadelphia, then at Lancaster and Massillon, OH, before returning to his alma mater, Miami of Ohio, as an assistant to Bo Schembechler when the latter became head coach there.

In 1965, Jerry moved to Notre Dame as offensive line coach on the staff of Ara Parseghian, then to Colorado State as head coach in 1970. Three years later, he entered the pro coaching ranks with the Eagles.

Wampfler and his wife, Carol, have three children — Nan, 29; Jody, 27; and Tad, 25.

PLAYER PERSONNEL



DICK CORRICK Director of Player Personnel

Considered to be one of pro football's keenest judges of talent, Dick Corrick is responsible for coordinating all Packer scouting of college players.

In this highly important role, the former Oregon State athlete directs the club's extensive scouting program, sifting input from Packer talent scouts and the National Football Scouting combine to assist Head Coach Forrest Gregg and his coaching staff in making critical decisions during the annual draft.

On the road from September through December, Corrick also augments the scouts' reports by annually making a fall tour of the nation's major colleges and universities to personally evaluate all of the top-rated players.

Appointed to his present position in 1978, Corrick responded by supervising drafts which have produced such quality performers as James Lofton, John Anderson, Eddie Lee Ivey, Mark Lee and Tim Lewis.



PLAYER PERSONNEL

His input also was a key factor in the 1985 draft, highlighted by the "move-up" trade with Buffalo to acquire offensive tackle Ken Ruettggers of USC in the first round and the decision to select wide receiver-kick returner Walter Stanley of Mesa College in the fourth round.

Prior to assuming his current role, Dick had been associated with the coaching staff in the area of team development in 1977. He joined the Packer organization in 1971 as a college talent scout and later served as director of pro player personnel from May 6, 1975 until early 1977.

Born April 22, 1934, Corrick is a 52-year-old graduate of LaJolla, CA, High School. A combative, 161-pound center-linebacker under Tommy Prothro at Oregon State, he later coached in the high school and college ranks for 16 years before joining the Packer scouting staff.

Dick is the father of two children, Traci, 27, and Rowdy, 25. A talented chef, he enjoys creating a gourmet meal for himself and his wife, Bonnie, during leisure at home.



CHUCK HUTCHISON Director of Player Procurement

Possessor of a diversified background in professional football as a player, coach and administrator, Charles A. "Chuck" Hutchison is responsible for negotiating all player contracts as the Packers' director of player procurement. His duties also include evaluating of free agents who have been with other pro clubs or who are not selected in the college draft, and conducting trade talks in conjunction with Head Coach Forrest Gregg.

The 37-year-old Hutchison, named to his position by Packer President Robert J. Parins January 22, 1985, had been serving as vice president-administration for the United States Football League's Oakland Invaders before joining the Packers. He previously had been interim head coach of the Invaders for the last 13 games of the USFL's 1984 season, leading Oakland to within one game of the playoffs.

Born in Canton, OH, November 17, 1948, Hutchison attended neighboring Carrollton High School where he was a star all-around athlete, winning 11 letters (four in both football and baseball and three in basketball). He later played college football at Ohio State under Woody Hayes, earning All-America and All-Big Ten honors as senior. A year earlier, he helped the Buckeyes win the 1968 Big Ten championship and Rose Bowl.

Drafted in the second round by the Cardinals, he played in St. Louis for three seasons (1970-72) and was an NFL all-rookie selection in '70. Just prior to the '73 season, Hutchison was claimed on waivers by Cleveland and played for the Browns for four seasons, the last two under Gregg, then Cleveland's head coach. He retired prior to the 1977 season after undergoing three knee operations.

Invited by Gregg to join his new staff at Toronto as offensive line coach in 1979, Hutchison remained on the Argonaut staff for the 1980 and '81 seasons after Gregg moved to Cincinnati as head coach of the Bengals in 1980. He subsequently joined the Invaders in the fall of '82, first serving as offensive line coach and later also becoming personnel director. Following the '84 season, he was named the Invaders' vice-president-administration.

Chuck is married (Eileen) and the father of two sons, Tyler, 12, and Brady, 9.

John Hilton, the Packers' current offensive backfield and special teams coach, caught the 152nd and last touchdown pass of Bart Starr's career. It came on a 65-yard collaboration against the Steelers at Pittsburgh Dec. 6, 1970.



BURT GUSTAFSON Adm. Ass't./Football Operations

Named to his current position by Head Coach Forrest Gregg in January of 1985, he is responsible for organizing the Packers' spring mini-camps, the annual summer training camp, handling all transportation, housing and workout arrangements for free agents brought to Green Bay and assisting position coaches in all free agent tryouts.

Gustafson, who previously had served as director of pro player personnel, also scouts National Football League teams the week before they play the Packers.

A painstaking and tireless scout, respected for his dedication and football knowledge, Gustafson joined the Packer organization in 1971 as linebacker coach, serving in that capacity through the 1974 season. Following a two-year tour as a Packer talent scout, he was named special teams coach by then Head Coach Bart Starr in February of 1977, continuing in that role through the pre-season of 1978. He later was named director of pro player personnel April 2,

1979.

Born in Marquette, MI, Nov. 30, 1925, Burt went on to become a 12-letter winner at Northern Michigan University in his hometown. He later coached at Battle Creek, MI, High School, at his alma mater, Northern Michigan, and at the University of Wyoming (1962-70) before joining the Packers. A firm believer in the benefits of physical fitness, he is an inveterate jogger and distance runner, frequently competing in marathon events.

Burt and his wife, Alice, have five children — two sons and three daughters.

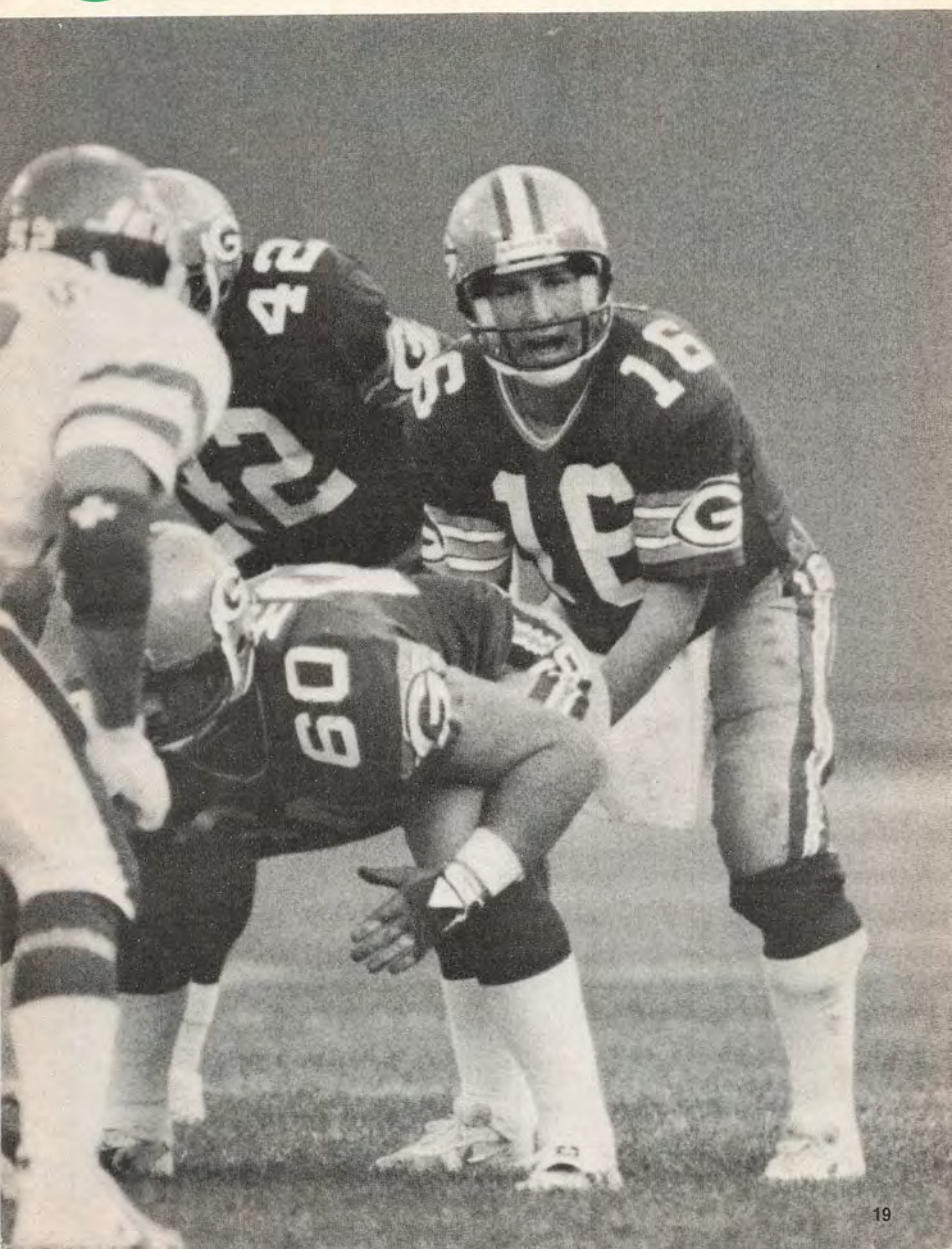

 tackles (77) and assists (52) while pacing Packer linebackers in
 quarterback sacks with 5... Anderson also posted 2 interceptions,

These contributions lifted him into eighth place on the Packers' lifetime rushing list (2,908 yards in 663 carries, a 4.4 average) and 15th place on the team's career receiving table (131 catches for 1,227 yards, a 9.4-yard average) ... Had best rushing effort of season in a 27-17 victory over the Vikings at

Minneapolis Nov. 10, gaining 111 yards in 15 carries, a plush 7.4-yard average ... Also rushed for 109 yards in the 21-0 "Snow Bowl" win over Tampa Bay in Green Bay Dec. 1, a day on which he and fellow running back Gerry Ellis both rushed for 100 yards (Ellis had 101 in 9 attempts), marking the first such achievement by a Packer duo since 1980 when the same pair turned the trick vs. Minnesota ... He never missed a practice and played hard. Anytime anybody can have the kind of year he had after what he's been through, I take my hat off to him ... I still consider Ezra

one of the premier pass rushers in the NFL. To me, he's a leader-type. Other people look up to him. I've never seen him quit in a game and I've never seen him quit in practice. That's just the way he is" ... Paced the



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defense in quarterback sacks (9½) and the defensive line in unassisted tackles (47) in 1985 ... Also led platoon in forced fumbles with three and recovered two ... 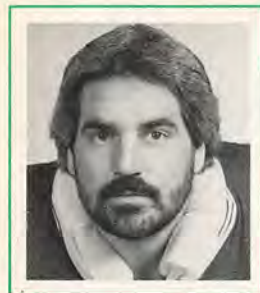

his rookie, '83 season, he registered 5 interceptions in those last seven games to share team honors with linebacker John Anderson ... His heroic broke a club record which had stood since 1950, when Rebel Steiner engineered a 94-yard interception return against the Chicago Bears ... Also knocked down 13 passes over the season and made 52 unassisted tackles ... Led Packer secondary in intercepts last season with four, running his career total to 16, and broke up six other passes ... Also made big play contribution to 20-17 victory over Vikings at Milwaukee Oct. 13, snatching a Darrin Nelson fumble out of the air and bolting 6 yards into the end zone for the Packers' second TD ... Registered 47 solo tackles overall, including 2 QB sacks, and 16 assists ... Made immediate impact in his starting debut as a rookie (Nov. 6, 1983), making two interceptions and playing a major role in 35-21 Green Bay victory over Cleveland Browns at Milwaukee ... It turned out to be Green Bay's longest interception runback of the season ... His second theft later ended a major Cleveland threat ... Again had 2 interceptions in '83 season finale at Chicago ... Also utilized as a kickoff returner, he averaged 17.7 yards for 20 runbacks.

PRO: Easily one of the most gifted athletes in all of professional sport, the former world class long jumper continues to collect honors, amass records and reach new milestones with machine-like regularity each passing year ... In 1985, he became only the fifth receiver in National Football League history to gain 1,000 yards in five or more seasons, accumulating 1,153 yards to join Lance Alworth, Steve Largent, Don Maynard and Art Powell in this elite category ... Lofton also became the only wideout in the league to have been elected to the Pro Bowl each of the last six years ... From a team standpoint, the multi-talented Stanford

alumnus continued his invasion of the Packer record book, eclipsing the club's career receiving yardage mark (7,791 by Don Hutson, 1935-45) by swelling his lifetime total to 8,816 ... Also, in the season-long process, he moved past Boyd Dowler into second place on the Packers' all-time receiving list with 466 receptions ... His 69 catches thus lifted him within easy reach of another Packer career record (488, also held by Hutson) ... He needs only 23 catches in 1986 to break the record, which has stood since 1945 ... Registered three 100-yard receiving performances during the '85 season, including a best day of 10 catches for 151 yards vs. Detroit Oct. 6, the day on which he surpassed Hutson's career yardage record ... Embellished these achievements by counting 4 touchdowns to climb into 11th place on the club's all-time scoring list with 276 points ... Durable as well as multi-talented, the 30-year-old Los Angeles native has never missed a game ... In 1985, he extended his starting streak to 121 games, longest such skein on the Green Bay roster ... Led the NFL in average yards per reception in both 1983 (22.4) and 1984 (22.0) ... Had six 100-yard receiving days, a personal, one-year mark, in 1984 ... They included a league-high, 206-yard effort vs. the Broncos in Denver's snow-swept Mile High Stadium (Oct. 15) ... Both his 11 receptions and 206 yards that memorable evening were career bests for the Packers' fluid split end ... Later broke his own Packer single season record for receiving yards for the second year in succession, this time with 1,361 yards ... First eclipsed the club record in 1981 with 1,294, then broke that mark in 1983 with 1,300 ... Underscored his versatility — he has averaged 7.8 yards per rushing attempt as a Packer — in 1982's strike-shortened season, scoring on two brilliantly executed reverses — on both of which he went the distance untouched ... Keyed a second half Packer comeback with the first, an 83-yard run vs. the New York Giants at East Rutherford, N.J., Sept. 20 as the Packers rebounded to pull out a 27-19 victory ... It was the third longest run from scrimmage in Packer history ... He later turned the trick again, engineering a 71-yard excursion vs. the Cowboys in the Super Bowl Tournament which followed the '82 season, an effort which tied an all-time NFL playoff record ... Once a high school quarterback, Lofton also demonstrated that season he hasn't forgotten how to throw a football, lofting a 43-yard pass to John Jefferson at Baltimore (Dec. 19, 1982) ... Lofton has caught at least one pass in every game of his 121-game NFL career except four — one in 1979, vs. Detroit in Milwaukee, Oct. 14; one in 1983, vs. Bengals on Oct. 30; and two in 1984, vs. the Raiders at Los Angeles,



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Sept. 9; and vs. Buccaneers in Green Bay, Dec. 2 ... Highlighted rookie, 1978 season with three TD receptions vs. Saints (Sept. 10), becoming the first Packer to catch three for TDs in one game since Max McGee performed the feat vs. Rams in 1963 ... No Green Bay receiver has duplicated the effort in the interim ... In Packer annals, only the legendary Hutson has caught more passes in a season (74) than Lofton, who twice made 71 receptions — in both 1980 and '81 ... 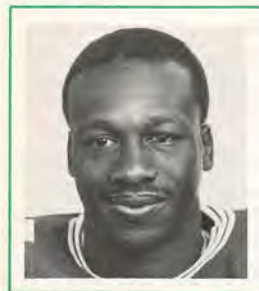

Earlier had impressed coaching staff by coming off bench in 1985 season finale and leading Packers to 20-17 victory over Buccaneers at Tampa Dec. 22, sealing the decision by directing a 73-yard, 13-play drive for a come-from-behind touchdown with 7:03 remaining in the game ... Completed 8 of 11 passes for

101 yards — with no interceptions — during his stint ... Had started one game earlier — vs. Cardinals at St. Louis Sept. 29 — before offensive coaches decided to give him a rest because of problems with a left knee on which he had undergone surgery in December of 1984 ... 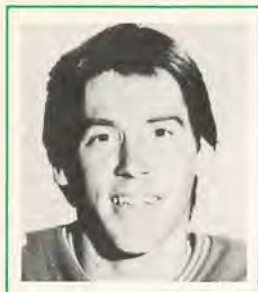

QUARTERBACK • CAL POLY-POMONA • 11TH YEAR
HT: 6-2 • WT: 200 • BORN: 5/10/53 • (ACQ: FA, '85)

PRO: Veteran field general joined Packers in third week of 1985 regular season (Sept. 24) and subsequently started five games, emerging with a 1-2 mark as the quarterback of record ... Victory came at Pontiac, MI, Silverdome Dec. 15 when he directed a late, 72-yard drive to trigger a 37-yard Al Del Greco field goal which produced a 26-23 triumph on the final play of the game ... A week earlier, he had turned in his best statistical performance of the season vs. the playoff-bound Miami Dolphins, completing 20 of 35 passes for 247 yards and 2 touchdowns in a losing cause (34-24) ... Made his first Packer start vs. Chicago Bears

in Lambeau Field Nov. 3 and had Green Bay out front in the fourth quarter, 10-7, before Walter Payton engineered a 27-yard touchdown run which pulled out a 16-10 victory for the eventual Super Bowl champions ... Also served as holder for placekicker Al Del Greco, his efforts in this capacity drawing praise from Head Coach Forrest Gregg ... Signed on with Packers as free agent after being released by Seattle in final cutdown for the regular season, ending a nine-year association ... The former Cal Poly-Pomona athlete owns most Seahawk career passing records, including most attempts (2,922), completions (1,593), yards gained (20,122), touchdowns (107) and interceptions (133) ... Also holds Seattle season records for most attempts (550) and completions (285), both set in 1979 ... Has had nine career games of the 300 or more yards passing and 27 with 250 or more ... Three of the former came in 1979, including a team record 384 yards vs. New Orleans ... A year earlier, he led the American Football Conference in attempts (443), completions (248) and yards (3,283) ... The left-handed Zorn subsequently passed for 3,346 yards in 1980 and was headed for his fourth consecutive 3,000-yard season in 1981 when he was sidelined for the final three games of the year with a broken ankle ... Named NFC Offensive Rookie of the year in 1976 when he led the NFL in attempts with 439 and set a rookie passing record with 2,571 yards ... He later became only the third player to throw for over 10,000 yards in his first four seasons, joining Joe Namath (12,753) and Norm Snead (10,212) with 11,202 yards ... Originally signed by Dallas Cowboys as free agent in 1976 but was released two days before the season opened.

Founded as a town team in 1919, the year after World War I ended, the Packers begin the 1986 season with a .588 overall winning percentage after playing 1,123-games. The Chicago Bears and St. Louis Cardinals are the only other teams in professional football to have played more than 1,000 games.

In 67 seasons, the Packers have won 637 games, lost 439 and tied 47. The 1,123-game total includes 834 league, playoff and Super Bowl games and 279 pre-season, mid-season and post-season non-league games.

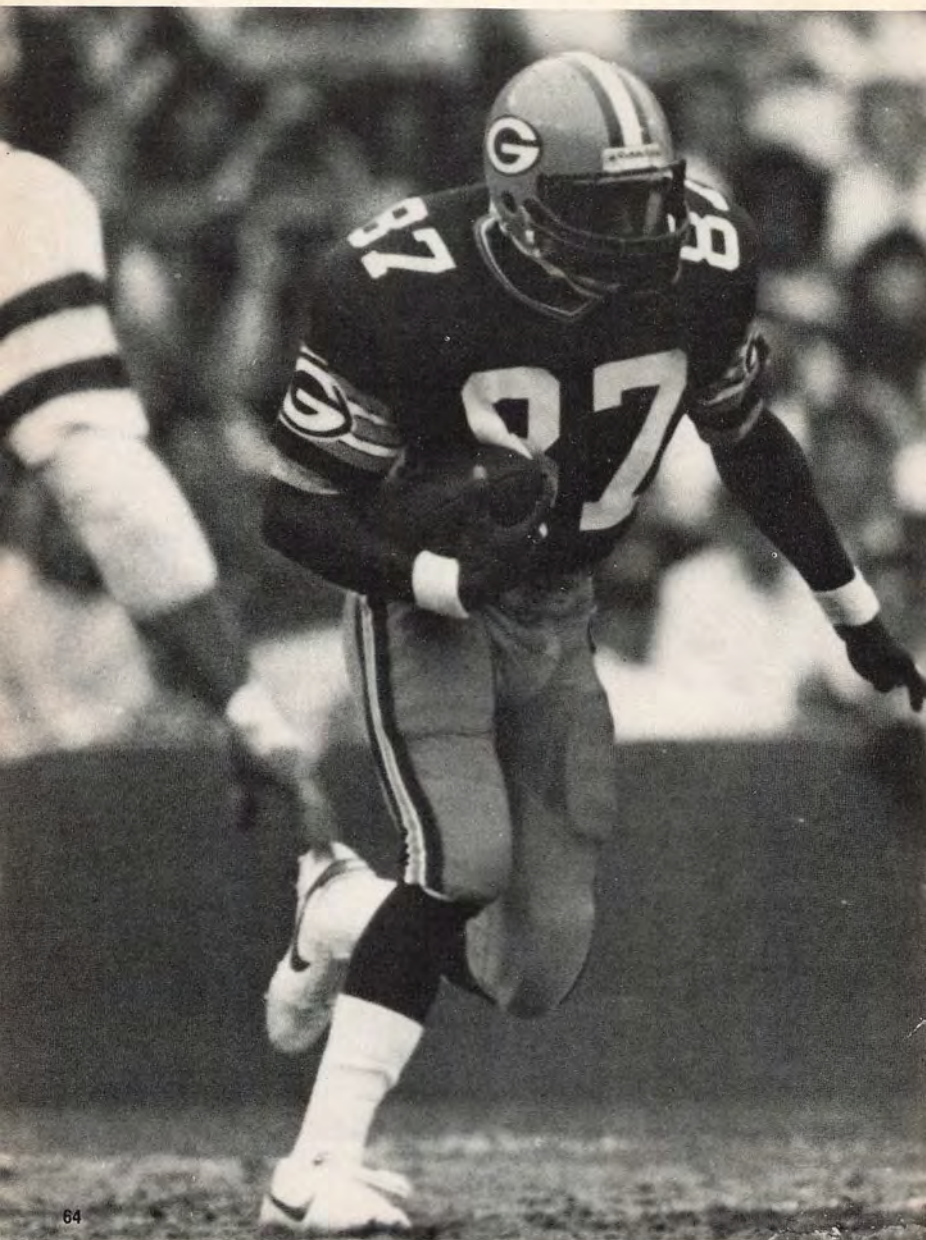

KENNETH DAVIS • 36 • RB • Texas Christian
Ht: 5-10 • Wt.: 212 • Born: April 16, 1962 • D-2

Rated among premier running backs in 1986 draft ... TCU's first consensus All-American since Bob Lilly — now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame — was so honored in 1959 ... Head Coach Forrest Gregg calls Davis "an excellent football player — a very, very productive running back. Kenneth is a strong kid, with breakaway speed. And that's the one thing that we felt we needed in our backfield was that ability — a breakaway runner ... He fits that mold ... We didn't know whether he could catch the football but he proved in our mini-camp that he does have good hands" ... Davis set TCU single season and career records for rushing, breaking Jim Swink's 29-year-old mark with 1,611 yards in 1984 and closing out his career with 2,944 yards in 493 attempts, an impressive, 6.1 yard average and 21 touchdowns ... Registered three 200-yard rushing performances in 1984, including a career high 239 yards against Kansas State ... Also authored seven runs from scrimmage of over 50 yards and seven others over 30 yards ... His career production includes 47 pass receptions for 491 yards and 2 TDs ... Named Southwest Conference Offensive Player of the Week four times in '84 while becoming first SWC back ever to rush for over 200 yards three times in one season ... Also fifth place finisher in '84 Heisman Trophy balloting after leading nation in average yards per carry (7.64) and finishing third in the nation in touchdowns with 17 ... Dismissed from team for remainder of 1985 season on September 20, 1985 by Head Coach Jim Wacker when it was discovered he and five other Horned Frog players had violated NCAA regulations by receiving illegal payments ... Saw only action of '85 season in opener against Tulane, rushing for 152 yards in 24 carries ... Also caught 5 passes for 81 yards, giving him 233 yards total offense for the day ... Redshirted as a freshman after storybook prep career ... Has consistently been timed in 4.4 seconds — or under — for 40 yards ... Forty-first player chosen in 1986 draft.

John Hilton, Packer offensive backfield coach, says of him: "Kenneth is a tremendous athlete. I think the thing I like about him is that he has had some bad experiences and he wants to overcome that, so he's working twice as hard as someone that may have just come out of college playing his senior year. He really wants to prove that he's going to be a great back. He can make quick moves, he changes directions well. And he's got good body size — he plays normally at 217 pounds. He's also hard to handle in the open and has great acceleration. I think he's really going to help us. This guy's a number one choice as far as I see it. There are backs that I think he was better than that went in the first round ... We've got a player that can be a dominant player."

HIGH SCHOOL: Led his Temple, TX., High School team to an unbeaten season and a Texas state championship ... Widely recruited as a prep All-America before settling upon TCU.

PERSONAL: Given name Kenneth Earl Davis ... One of 12 children ... Speech communications major ... Considered one of Lone Star State's top racquetball players ... Lists professional pool champions Willie Mosconi and Minnesota Fats as personal sports heroes because he secretly aspires to be a professional pool player.

One of the most proficient and productive passers in college football history, he set eight NCAA records and tied another during his BYU career ... Finished third in NCAA career passing efficiency with a 149.4 rating, ranking behind only Jim McMahon (156.9) and Steve Young (149.8), both also former BYU quarterbacks, and ahead of John Elway (139.3) ... Head Coach Forrest Gregg says of him: "The thing I like about him, number one, was his overall production, throwing the football. I think he has great vision of the field. I think he has a

great feeling of where people are. He doesn't have what they call a rocket arm, but he has a strong arm ... From what I saw of him in our first mini-camp, I don't think there's anything wrong with his arm (Bosco was hampered by a shoulder problem in 1985) ... He has a strong enough arm to play in the National Football League. There are a lot of quarterbacks playing in the NFL who probably don't throw the ball as well as he does. He has a good touch with the ball, he's been tough and competitive, he's shown good leadership and he's played on a national championship football team. He's been under a lot of pressure situations, I like that. And he's been able to handle it ... He's not a scrambler, per se, but he does have the ability to avoid the rush and he's a pretty good runner. He also comes out of an excellent passing system. I don't think you'll have to wait near as long for a guy like this to develop, as you would on some quarterbacks that you might draft in the third round."

Bosco's new NCAA records include: Most consecutive 200-yard passing games, 12; most 200-yard passing games in a season, also 12; most passes completed, three consecutive games, 105; most plays total offense, two years, 1,121; most completions, two years, 621; most passing attempts, two years, 969; most pass completions, one season, 338; most passing attempts, one season, 511; most yards passing, two years, 8,148. Also tied record for most seasons of 3,000-yards total offense or more with two (3,875 yards in 1984 and 4,273 in 1985) ... Compiled a 24-2 record as a starting quarterback for BYU, including '84 Holiday Bowl victory over Michigan ... Injured a knee and ankle early in the Holiday Bowl contest but returned to the game to finish with 30 pass completions in 43 attempts for 343 yards and two touchdowns, including the winning TD pass with 1:23 left in the game ... Performance earned him selection as game's offensive MVP ... Runner up in 1984 to Doug Flutie for Davey O'Brien Award, given to outstanding collegiate quarterback, and finished third in Heisman Trophy balloting ... Led the nation in total offense (average of 327.7 yards per yards per game) while escorting BYU to the national championship ... Posted personal career bests for attempts (61, vs. New Mexico). Completions (42, vs. New Mexico), passing percentage (.809 on 17-for-21 vs. Wyoming, passing yards (585, vs. New Mexico in 1985) ... Again finished third in Heisman Trophy balloting ... second team All-America selection by United Press International.

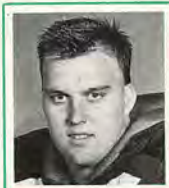

"Pass blocking is one of his strong suits," Head Coach Forrest Gregg says of Knight, "because, at San Diego State, they didn't get much chance to run the ball. He's a good blocker and he probably can play either side (left or right tackle) ... What we liked about him is his temperament. He was a defensive lineman at Boise State before he transferred to San Diego State."

Offensive Line Coach Jerry Wampfler: "He has a good background in pass protection but needs a lot of work on the running game — they were

basically a passing team, so naturally that part of it wouldn't be as far along. Also, he really has only two years of experience on offense, so you wouldn't expect this guy to be polished, and you wouldn't expect him to be as far along as a lineman who has played the same area for the last five or six years. However, he does show good savvy at the right tackle position and a surprising amount of ring-wise ability for the short time that he's been at the position. I think that had a lot to do with us drafting him where we did. He has the good, big frame that we like. He weighed 282 the day I worked him out and he ran well — a 4.97, five-flat, which is good for that size person."

- Sept. 15** Packers mount early 10-3 lead on 40-yard Al Del Greco field goal and one-yard scoring run by Jessie Clark, later fall behind 20-17 before rebounding on one-yard TD run by Eddie Lee Ivery with only 3:07 remaining in game to win home opener, 23-20. Ivery's score caps 75-yard, 9-play drive. Ali Haji-Sheikh's 47-yard field goal attempt falls short in Giants' bid for tie with 1:06 to play.
- Oct. 6** Rushing for 285 yards, third highest single game total in team history, Packers roll up 512 yards overall in routing Detroit Lions at Lambeau Field, 43-10. Jessie Clark leads ground offensive with 74 yards in 15 attempts as Packer backs average 6.1 yards for 47 rushes. James Lofton catches 10 passes for 151 yards and breaks Don Hutson's career yardage record (7,991) in process.
- Oct. 13** Al Del Greco's 22-yard field goal with only seven seconds to play gives Packers second straight victory, 20-17 win over Vikings in Milwaukee County Stadium. Quarterback Lynn Dickey engineers 66-yard drive to set up winning kick. Del Greco earlier had kicked 45-yard field goal to give Packers temporary 17-14 lead, which lasted until Jan Stenerud tied score on 18-yard FG with 5:18 remaining.
- Nov. 3** Packers carry 10-7 lead over unbeaten Chicago Bears into fourth quarter but lose 16-10 after Bears' Steve McMichael fells quarterback Jim Zorn in end zone for safety and Bears take advantage of ensuing short Packer punt, moving 49 yards in 3 plays to winning TD, a 27-yard run by Walter Payton.
- Nov. 10** In arrears 17-6 in fourth quarter, Packers erupt for three touchdowns in space of 3 minutes, 37 seconds to torpedo Vikings in Minneapolis Metrodome, 27-17. The first comes on a one-yard Gerry Ellis run, capping a 76-yard drive, the second on a one-yard pass from Lynn Dickey to Eddie Lee Ivery and the third on a 50-yard scoring run with an interception by Mark Murphy.
- Nov. 17** Packers bolt to 17-0 halftime lead on way to a 38-14 victory over the Saints in Milwaukee. Dickey stages 300-yard passing performance, hitting on 22 of 35 passes for 302 yards and 2 TDs, as Packers gain 433 yards overall.
- Dec. 1** Rising to the occasion in a swirling snowstorm which deposits 14 inches of "precip" on the Green Bay area and restricts attendance to 19,856, the Packers amass 512 yards and hold the Buccaneers to a mere 65 in scoring their first shutout in eight years, 21-0. Lynn Dickey, a peerless marksman despite the conditions, completes 22 of 36 passes for 299 yards and Eddie Lee Ivery and Gerry Ellis both rush for 100 yards, marking first such achievement by a Packer duo since 1980. Ivery gains 109 yards in 13 carries, Ellis 101 in 9.
- Dec. 15** Al Del Greco kicks record-tying 4 field goals — the last as game ends — to lift Packers over Lions in Pontiac Silverdome 26-23. An 80-yard scoring run with an interception by Mike Douglass turns things around for Packers in fourth quarter after Green Bay falls behind 17-16.
- Dec. 22** Quarterback Randy Wright comes off bench in third quarter with score tied 10-all to lead Packers over Buccaneers in Tampa, 20-17. He completes 8 of 11 passes for 101 yards — without an interception — and marches Packers 73 yards in 13 plays in fourth quarter for winning touchdown — a 6-yard run by Jessie Clark.

CAN PACKERS, BEARS TOP THIS?

The Packers will be making their third Green Bay appearance on "Monday Night Football" the night of September 22 — against the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears — and it promises to be a memorable evening. But it may take some doing to surpass their last showing on the nationally televised, prime time series. On that occasion, October 17, 1983, the Packers combined with their guests, the Washington Redskins, to titillate a Lambeau Field house of 52,555 fans by forging the highest scoring game in the history of "Monday Night Football".

The Packers eventually prevailed over the then defending Super Bowl champions, 48-47, in a scoring orgy which produced 11 touchdowns, 11 conversions and 6 field goals. Jan Stenerud's 20-yard field goal with only 54 seconds remaining decided the issue. The Redskins' Mark Moseley added a final, dramatic touch by missing a 39-yard field goal attempt on the game's last play.

The 95-point aggregate surpassed the previous "Monday Night Football" record for total points by 11. The latter was established Dec. 20, 1982, when the San Diego Chargers outscored the Cincinnati Bengals, 50-34.

The Lambeau Field contest also was the highest scoring game in which the Packers ever have been involved. The 95 points exceeded by eight the previous high of 87, set when Green Bay lost to the Lions at Detroit, 52-35, in 1951.

The Packers' first MNF appearance in "Lambeau" — on Oct. 1, 1979 — also was a game to remember. In that one, Green Bay forced 10 New England turnovers to score a 27-14 upset of the heavily favored Patriots, then considered a prime favorite to reach the Super Bowl.

PACKER SUPER BOWL STORY

Super Bowl I

January 15, 1967

Memorial Coliseum, Los Angeles, Calif.

Paid Attendance: 61,946

Green Bay 35, Kansas City 10

The Packers launched the Super Bowl series by whipping Kansas City's American Football League champions 35-10 behind the passing of Bart Starr, the receiving of Max McGee and a key interception by all-pro safety Willie Wood.

Vince Lombardi's repeating NFL champions broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 40-yard return of an interception to the Chief's 5-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. The pass, authored by the Chiefs' Len Dawson, had been intended for Kansas City tight end Fred Arbanas.

McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler (injured on the Packers, first offensive series) after having caught only three passes all season, snared seven from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores counting one on a 5-yard run in the third quarter and the other on a one-yard bolt in the final period.

The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter; the only touchdown on a seven-yard pass from Dawson to Curtis McClinton.

Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 touchdowns and was chosen the game's most valuable player. His scoring strikes came on a 37-yard collaboration with McGee in the first quarter and a 13-yard pitch to the aging end in the decisive third period.

The Packers collected \$15,000 per man and the Chiefs \$7,500 apiece — the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports.

Super Bowl II

January 14, 1968

Orange Bowl, Miami, Florida

Paid Attendance: 75,564

Green Bay 33, Oakland 14

Having acquired a third consecutive NFL championship just two weeks earlier, the Packers embellished that record-tying parlay by winning the Super Bowl title for the second straight year. This time, they dispatched the AFL champion Raiders, 33-14, in a game that drew the first \$3 million gate in football history.

Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown and directed a Packer attack that was in control all the way after building up a 16-7 halftime lead.

Don Chandler kicked four field goals (39, 20, 43 and 31 yards), and all-pro cornerback Herb Adderley highlighted the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard interception return of a Daryle Lamonica pass.

After leading by only 3-0 at the quarter, the Packers padded their margin to 16-7 at halftime by way of three Chandler field goals and a 62-yard scoring pass from Starr to split end Boyd Dowler. They then left the Raiders behind with a 10-point third period, Donny Anderson scoring on a 2-yard run and Chandler with his final field goal.

The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packers coach, ending nine years at Green Bay in which he won six Western Conference championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowls, a record unprecedented in pro football history.

PACKER NFC PLAYOFF HISTORY

GAME BY GAME

1936 — GREEN BAY 21, BOSTON REDSKINS 6, (Polo Grounds, New York) — Although New York was not represented in the title playoff, the game was played in the Polo Grounds because the Redskins' franchise was being shifted to Washington, D.C., by George Marshall. A turnout of 29,545 saw Don Hutson take a 45-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes, and the Packers were never headed.

1938 — NEW YORK 23, GREEN BAY 17, (Polo Grounds, New York) — The Packers overcame an early 9-0 New York lead, spawned by two blocked punts, but could not hold off the Giants in the second half. The Packers began to close in early in the second period, Arnie Herber capitalizing on a Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen interception by lofting a 50-yard touchdown strike to Carl Mulleneaux, cutting the Giants margin to 9-7.

The Giants shortly converted a mid-field fumble by Packer fullback Eddie Jankowski into a 16-7 lead before Green Bay again trimmed the deficit to two points before the half was over; Clarke Hinkle crashing over from the 6-inch line following a 66-yard Cecil Isbell pass to Wayland Becker. The Packers then forged in front in opening minutes of the second half for the first and only time in the game; an Engebretsen field goal presenting them with a 17-16 edge. The Giants, however, stormed back with a 61-yard scoring drive, capped by a 35-yard pass from Ed Danowski to Hank Soar. Soar fought his way over the goal line from the 2, with Hinkle clinging to one leg, for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A crowd of 48,120, a play off record, sat in on proceedings.

1939 — GREEN BAY 27, NEW YORK 0, (State Fair Park, Milwaukee) — The Packers made playoff history by scoring first shutout ever registered in NFL championship game. Despite bitter 35 m.p.h. wind, both Arnie Herber and Cecil Isbell passed for touchdowns in leading Green Bay to its fifth world championship before 32,279 fans.

Green Bay mounted a 7-0 halftime lead, by dint of a Herber scoring strike to Milt Gantenbein, and pulled away in the third quarter on a 29-yard field goal by Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen and a long TD pass from Isbell to Joe Laws. The Packers added 10 more points in the fourth quarter on a 42-yard field goal by Ernie Smith and a short scoring run by fullback Eddie Jankowski.

1944 — GREEN BAY 14, NEW YORK 7, (Polo Grounds, New York) — With peerless pass catcher Don Hutson employed primarily as a decoy for the Giant defense, fullback Ted Fritsch emerged the offensive hero of Packers' sixth world title victory.

Fritsch scored both Green Bay touchdowns, one on a 2-yard run in the second quarter and the other on a 26-yard pass-and-run collaboration with Irv Comp in the third. Ward Cuff scored the Giants' touchdown with a one-yard plunge on the first play of the final period. Joe Laws, the Packers' veteran, 34-year-old all-purpose halfback, had a brilliant day, setting a playoff record with three interceptions and claiming ground gaining honors with 74 yards in 13 carries. Attendance: 46,016.

1960 — PHILADELPHIA 17, GREEN BAY 13 (Franklin Field) — Packers erected a 6-0 lead in the second period and were out in front by 13-10 in fourth quarter before yielding to late surge by Eagles, who scored the deciding points on a 5-yard burst by Ted Dean.

Green Bay moved ahead in first quarter on a 20-yard Paul Hornung field goal. Hornung added 23-yard FG in second quarter but Eagles tied it 6-6 on a 35-yard scoring pass from Norm Van Brocklin to Tommy McDonald and edged ahead via Bobby Walston's first conversion. Walston followed with a 15-yard FG for a 10-6 halftime lead.

The Packers stopped Philadelphia at their own four late in the third period, then recaptured lead on a 7-yard TD pass from Bart Starr to Max McGee. A 58-yard kickoff return by Dean, however, ignited Eagles and victory eluded Packers, making their first title game appearance in 16 years. Attendance: 67,325.

1961 — GREEN BAY 37, NEW YORK 0, (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Paul Hornung, on leave from the Army, scored a record tying 19 points to key Packer decimation of Giants in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

A record Packer home crowd of 39,029 watched the Green and Gold erupt for 24 points in the second quarter. In all, the Packers scored seven times against the NFL's top defensive team of 1961, amassing four touchdowns and three field goals. The defense, meanwhile, was proving a devastating complement to the attack, intercepting four Giant passes and recovering one fumble.

Two interceptions, by Ray Nitschke and defensive back Hank Gremminger, set up touchdowns No. 2 and 3 while the fumble recovery by Forrest Gregg led to Hornung's second field goal and a Jess Whittenton interception to Hornung's final FG.

1962 — GREEN BAY 16, NEW YORK 7, (Yankee Stadium, New York) — Out front all the way in a raw, cyclonic setting, Packers weather siege by vengeful Giants in primitive, hand-to-hand struggle.



PACKER NFC PLAYOFF HISTORY

Ray Nitschke proves principal frustration to New Yorkers, seeking redemption for shutout humiliation in '61 title game. His deflection triggers interception to blunt early Giant drive to Green Bay 10. On way to being named game's most valuable player, he also registers two interceptions, one of which led to the Packers' only touchdown of the afternoon. The other set up a 29-yard field goal by Jerry Kramer, whose trio of three-pointers provided eventual margin.

Giants' only TD comes on block of Max McGee punt in Green Bay end zone midway through the third quarter.

A battered Jim Taylor sets playoff record with 31 rushing attempts, good for 85 yards.

1965 — GREEN BAY 23, CLEVELAND 12, (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Field softened by four-inch snow made Packer backs only run harder as Lambeau Field crowd of 50,777 celebrated third championship in five years. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung amassed 201 yards rushing in rally that overcame Browns' early 9-7 lead.

Packers charged to 7-0 first quarter advantage on 47-yard Bart Starr pass to Carroll Dale and Don Chandler's conversion, but Cleveland moved in front on a 17-yard TD strike from Frank Ryan to Gary Collins and 24-yard Lou Groza field goal.

Green Bay rebounded, however, with 15 and 23 yard FGs by Chandler, the latter following a Willie Wood interception, to claim 13-7 lead subsequently trimmed to a single point by a second Groza FG shortly before the intermission.

Starr settled the issue in third quarter, escorting the Packers on a 90-yard, 11-play scoring drive climaxed by Hornung's 13-yard sweep of Browns' right perimeter.

1966 — GREEN BAY 34, DALLAS 27, (Cotton Bowl, Dallas) — Bart Starr has one of his finest hours, passing for four touchdowns as Packers win second straight title and fourth in six years. Tom Brown thwarts last-minute Cowboy bid, and the majority of 74,152 Cotton Bowl fans, with end zone interception of Don Meredith's fourth down pass from Green Bay 2.

Packers mounted quick 14-0 lead on a 17-yard Starr pass to Elijah Pitts and 18-yard scoring run with a fumble recovery by rookie Jim Grabowski, but led only 21-17 at halftime following explosive Cowboy comeback. After a 32-yard Villanueva field goal had cut Packer lead to a tenuous 21-20, Starr hit Dowler and McGee with 16-yard scoring passes to provide a cushion against the Cowboys' late surge.

1967 — GREEN BAY 21, DALLAS 17, (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — With thermometer shuddering at 16 below zero and 50,861 in stands, Bart Starr scores winning touchdown from one-yard-line with 13 seconds remaining, sealing record third straight championship for Packers and their fifth in seven years.

Starr's touchdown, on third down with no timeouts remaining, climaxed a 68-yard drive in 12 plays.

As was case in 1966, Packers grabbed early 14-0 advantage. But this time Cowboys came from behind to take the lead, forcing story book finish by Green Bay to win contest later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

Starr's touchdown passes of 8 and 46 yards to Boyd Dowler built the first quarter bulge, trimmed in second quarter by George Andrie's 7-yard scoring return of a Starr fumble and 21-yard Danny Villanueva field goal. Dan Reeves' 50-yard scoring strike to Lance Rentzel in the fourth quarter triggered the dramatic denouement.

1983 SUPER BOWL TOURNAMENT

1983—GREEN BAY 41, ST. LOUIS 16 (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Making their first post-season appearance in Lambeau Field since celebrated "Ice Bowl" game of 1967 against Dallas, Packers halt Cardinal drive at one-yard-line in first quarter then proceed to forge an all-time club scoring record in their opening Super Bowl Tournament contest following 1982 season.

Out front 21-3 at halftime, they pad lead to 41-9 in fourth quarter before permitting Cards a consolation touchdown. Quarterback Lynn Dickey ties Packer playoff record before 54,282 fans by passing for 4 touchdowns (17 of 23 for 260 yards and 0 interceptions overall) and flanker John Jefferson sets club postseason mark with 148 receiving yards on 6 catches, including a 60-yard TD reception, another Packer playoff record. Placekicker Jan Stenerud also establishes a club playoff mark with a 46-yard field goal.

1983—DALLAS 37, GREEN BAY 26 (Texas Stadium, Irving, TX) — Packers amass 466 yards, a team playoff record, but are unable to overcome slow start, which finds them trailing 20-7 at halftime. They roll up 363 yards and out-score Cowboys 19-17 in second half, pulling within four points (30-26) on a 23-yard scoring runback of an interception by Mark Lee in fourth quarter, but Cowboys retaliate with 74-yard scoring drive to end Green Bay hopes with 63,972 fans looking on.

Quarterback Lynn Dickey throws for 332 yards (19-for-36) and all-time Packer playoff record in losing cause, split end James Lofton emerging with 109 yards on 5 receptions. Lofton also spices Packers' second half comeback with 71-yard reverse for a TD, tying all-time NFL playoff record for a run from scrimmage.

The Lambeau Field Story

Green Bay's Lambeau Field, home of the Packers has a higher profile following the construction in 1985 of 72 private boxes, 44 of them from goal line to goal line on the east side and 28 on the west side, extending from either end of the press box to the goal line. The fifth addition since the facility was built, it adds 952 seats and increases the capacity to 57,063.

The cost of the original project, when the stadium was constructed in 1957 with a capacity of 32,150, was \$960,000. It was shared equally by the Green Bay Packers, Inc., and the City of Green Bay. Financed by means of a bond issue, it received voter approval in a referendum conducted April 3, 1956. All subsequent additions have been underwritten by the Packer Corporation. They previously increased stadium capacity to 38,669 in 1961, 42,327 in 1963, 50,861 in 1965 and to 56,155 in 1970.

The stadium was dedicated as City Stadium on September 29, 1957. It later was renamed Lambeau Field in 1965, following the death of the late E. L. "Curly" Lambeau, founder and first coach of the Packers.

Lambeau Field now is wholly owned by the City of Green Bay, retirement of the original \$960,000 indebtedness having been celebrated at a mortgage-burning ceremony in May of 1978.



PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1963 — E. L. (Curly) Lambeau, Founder, player, coach, vice-president (1919-49). Founded Packers in 1919 and served as team's only coach through 1949 season. Also played halfback from '19 through '27, a period during which he pioneered forward pass in professional football. Led Packers to six world championships and is one of only five coaches to record more than 200 coaching victories in the NFL, (others are George Halas, Paul Brown, Don Shula and Tom Landry). Also coached Chicago Cardinals (1950-'51) and Washington Redskins (1952-'53).



1963 — Johnny (Blood) McNally, HB (1928-'36). Also played for Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Steelers. An elusive runner and gifted pass receiver, he played major role in Packers' drive to first three championships in 1929, '30 and '31. Also helped Packers win a fourth world title in '36. Still ranks 15th in Packer lifetime scoring, four decades after departing Green Bay scene, with 224 points. Collegiate star at St. Thomas.



1963 — Don Hutson, E (1935-'45). Highest scoring receiver in pro football history with 99 touchdowns, all-time NFL record. Credited with inventing pass patterns, he led league in receiving 8 years and in scoring 5 seasons, both also lifetime marks. Caught passes in 95 consecutive games, seventh longest streak in NFL history. Currently ranks 17th lifetime among pro receivers with 488 catches and 19th in NFL career scoring with 823 points. Starred at U. of Alabama.



1963 — Robert (Cal) Hubbard, T-E (1929-'35). Also played for New York Giants, Pittsburgh Steelers. A legendary athlete, he was one of pro football's first genuine giants — a massive 6 ft. 3 inch, 265 pounder who was a devastating blocker on offense and relentless pursuer on defense as a premier, two-way performer. Was an all-pro choice in each of first three years (1931, '32, '33) such selections were made. Played college football at Centenary, Geneva.



1964 — Clarke Hinkle, FB (1932-'41). A four-time all-pro selection (1936, '37, '38, '41) ... One of the most versatile players in NFL annals, he was tough, bruising runner, fine blocker, good receiver and excellent placekicker as well as a shrewd, hard-hitting linebacker. Fourth-ranking rusher in Packer history with 3,860 yards in 1,171 carries. Played college football at Bucknell.



1964 — Mike Michalske, G (1929-'37). Also played for New York Yankees (1927-'28) before joining Packers. Rated one of game's greatest guards during pro football's "two-way" era. Two-time all-pro selection (1931 and 1935). A true 60-minute player, he was known as "Iron Mike" because of his great stamina and durability. Best asset was exceptional quickness, which made him equally effective on both offense and defense. Played college football at Penn State.



PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1966 — Arnie Herber, HB (1930-'41). Also played for New York Giants (1944-'45). Pro football's first great long passer. Won three National Football League passing titles and was all-pro selection in 1932. Teamed with Don Hutson to form NFL's first feared passing combination in mid-'30s. Shares fourth place in lifetime passing efficiency in Packer annals with 50.06 percentage for 9 seasons and ranks fifth in career touchdown passes with 51. Tough, durable athlete and accomplished punter as well as great passer. A Green Bay native, he played college football at Regis (Denver, Colo.).



1971 — Vince Lombardi, Coach and General Manager (1959-'67). Also assistant coach for New York Giants (1954-'58) and head coach of Washington Redskins (1969). Directed Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-'62 and 1965-'66-'67), a feat without precedent or parallel in pro football history. His 1966 and 1967 teams also made history by winning first two Super Bowls. Packers won nine of 10 playoff games under his leadership and overall, compiled a 98-30-4 record, a glittering .766 winning percentage. Lombardi, a guard, played his college football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



1974 — Tony Canadeo, HB (1941-'43, 1946-'52). Became only the third 1,000 yard rusher in pro football history when he gained 1,052 yards in 1952. Still ranks as No. 3 ground gainer in Packer annals with 4,197 yards in 1,025 attempts, a 4.1 average. A durable, all-purpose halfback, he was an accomplished blocker, capable passer and good receiver in addition to being a highly effective kick returner. Also played defensive back during early years of his career. Played college football at Gonzaga, where he acquired nickname of "Grey Ghost."



1976 — Jim Taylor, FB (1958-'66). Also played for New Orleans Saints (1967). One of three running backs in pro football history to rush for 1,000 yards in five consecutive seasons (1960-'64). Also seventh ranking career rusher in NFL annals with 8,597 yards in 10 seasons. Ranks ninth all-time, in number of 100-yard rushing games with 26 and eighth in career rushing attempts with 1,941. Also shares NFL record for most rushing touchdowns in a season, 19 in 1962, and owns fifth highest lifetime total of rushing TDs, 83. Played college football at LSU.



1977 — Forrest Gregg, T (1956, 1958-'70). Also played with Dallas Cowboys (1971). Drafted No. 2 in 1956. Gregg was named All-Pro eight times (including All-Pro at both Guard and Tackle in 1965) and 9 times to the Pro Bowl. Called by Lombardi the "finest player he'd ever coached." Gregg holds the Packer record for durability with 187 consecutive games. Head Coach of the Green Bay Packers. Also served as head coach of Cleveland Browns (1975-77) and Cincinnati Bengals (1980-83). Played college football at SMU.



1977 — Bart Starr, QB (1956-'71). Drafted in 17th round in 1956. Starr became the winningest quarterback in football, directing the Packers to 6 Western Division Titles, 5 World Titles, 2 Super Bowl victories, and was named MVP in Super Bowls I and II. Starr led the League in passing in 1962, 1964 and 1966 and was named to the Pro Bowl 4 times. In 1972 he coached Packer quarterbacks, Head Coach of Green Bay Packers 1975-83. He played college football at Alabama.



PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1978 — Ray Nitschke, MLB (1958-'72). Drafted in third round in 1957 after playing fullback at Illinois. Most Valuable Player in 1962 NFL Title game vs NY Giants. Named to the NFL All-50 year team. All-Pro in 1964, 1965 and 1966; Pro Bowl 1965.



1980 — Herb Adderley, DB (1961-'69). Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1970-'72). Packers' No. 1 draft choice (Michigan State) in 1961. Five-time all-pro at cornerback. Played in five Pro Bowls, four of first six Super Bowls (two with Green Bay, two with Dallas). Had 48 career interceptions, ran 7 back for TDs (second highest total in NFL history).



1981 — Jim Ringo, C (1953-'63). Also played for Philadelphia (1964-'67). Seventh round draft choice out of Syracuse in 1953. Went on to win all-pro honors six times, five as a Packer, and played in 10 Pro Bowls, seven as a Packer. Highly durable performer, once held NFL record for most consecutive games played (183). Helped Packers win back-to-back NFL titles in 1961-'62. Traded to Philadelphia in 1964. Currently offensive line coach for New York Jets.



1981 — Willie Davis, DE (1960-'69). Also played for Cleveland (1958-'59). A 17th round draft choice, he came to Packers from Browns in 1960 trade. Became one of premier pass rushers in pro football history, winning all-pro honors six times and selection to Pro Bowl five times. Holds all-time Packer record for career fumble recoveries (21) and second longest consecutive game streak (162) in Green Bay annals. Helped Packers win five NFL titles during 1960s. Played college football at Grambling.



1986 — Paul Hornung, HB (1957-'62, 1964-'66). One of the most versatile players in pro football history, he won NFL scoring title three consecutive years (1959-60-61), setting all-time league record of 176 points in 1960. Also shares league single game playoff scoring record, 19 points. All-pro selection three times and named to Pro Bowl twice. Averaged 4.1 yards per rush, caught 130 passes and kicked 66 field goals during 9-year career. Second ranking scorer in Packer history with 760 points. Bonus choice (first player selected overall) in 1957 NFL draft. Played college football at Notre Dame, winning Heisman Trophy in 1956.

PACKERS SHARE NFL'S RECORD FOR OVERTIME GAMES

The Packers, who long have exhibited a flair for the dramatic, share the National Football League record for most overtime games (with Cleveland and Denver). Though they denied themselves such excitement in 1985, they have played 12 overtime contests to date, including a league season record five in 1983. The first of them was a sudden death struggle with the Baltimore Colts in Green Bay's Lambeau Field for the Western Conference championship in 1965. The Packers won that one, 13-10, on a Don Chandler field goal and went on to defeat the Cleveland Browns in that year's NFL championship game, 23-12. It was the first of a record three consecutive NFL titles for the Packers, underscoring the importance of Chandler's decisive FG in the Western Conference playoff. Overall, the Packers have won four, lost five and tied three in overtime play. The game-by-game list:

BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young characters, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Green Bay Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "Why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

FIRST THEY TALKED Curly's employer at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fences or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro-football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited.

THIS WAS the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy.

Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Eskimos, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A.B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

FROM THOSE MODEST and somewhat tenuous beginnings, the Packers have gone on to earn national stature and virtual world-wide recognition by winning more championships (eleven) over the intervening half-century than any other team in professional football.

The fact that these achievements have come while representing a city of only 90,000 inhabitants, in competition with the country's population giants, has endeared them to the nation's football fans, many of whom are intrigued by the David vs. Goliath concept and the Packers' unique status as a publicly-owned corporation.

INEVITABLY, PROCEDURES at Packer games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system—the latter hadn't been invented yet, there weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their existence in 1919, they played on approximately the same site as the now abandoned City (East) Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut Street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about ten yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed, you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics of the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's half time suggestion.

In 1920 a section of stands was built—just a small bleacher with a capacity of a couple hundred—on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit



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there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

WHEN HAGEMEISTER Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of nearly 6,000. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides, between the 30-yard lines. Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

AFTER WORLD WAR II, City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957 was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961, the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,861 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, 56,155 in 1970, and to 56,926 following the addition of private boxes in 1985.

The Packers' colorful saga, spanning 65 years, can be roughly divided into eight chapters. They take us from the "Iron Man" period of the first decade under founder Curly Lambeau to the present day, which finds the Packer's legendary lineman, Forrest Gregg, presiding as the ninth head coach in the team's history.

THE IRON MAN ERA—With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. They repeated in 1930 and 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Eap, Mike Michalske, Johnny Blood, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle,

Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 or 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD—Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership, were just about to fold, when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era they always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME—After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER—The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne C. Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and businessman, as general manager. Reaching into college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the rebuilding plans and Lisle W. Blackbourn, coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four-year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP—Likable Ray "Scooter" McLean moved up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, worst in Packer history in his lone season as head coach.

THE LOMBARDI ERA—In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giant assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and was unanimously voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the



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Western Division title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966, and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams became the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise one of the most successful. Over a nine year span as head coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 141 victories against 39 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .783 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 Division playoffs and World Championship Games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

BENGSTON PERIOD—Following the third consecutive title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970, compiling a 20-21-1 record, and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE DEVINE DAYS—Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a 5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record, and Devine resigned.

BART STARR—the most successful field general in pro football history as Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the NFL wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on Dec. 24, 1974. Starr, who led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere... We will earn everything else."

Although he had to settle for a 4-10 record in the baptismal season of a massive rebuilding project, Starr gave Packer fans new hope by assembling a sound organization and restoring a positive attitude, underscored by three victories in the last five

games of the 1975 season. He continued the resurgent trend in 1976, leading the Packers to a 5-9 record, highlighted by a three-game, mid-season winning streak. Major and key injuries slowed the comeback in 1977 but a strong finish produced a 4-10 mark. Hopes soared in 1978 when the Packers posted their first winning record since 1972, an 8-7-1 record, only to be temporarily dampened in '79 by a record rash of injuries which spawned a 5-11 mark. Another injury epidemic, one which saw 27 players on injured reserve during the course of the season, struck in 1980, forcing the Packers to settle for a 5-10-1 record.

Rebounding strongly in 1981, they rallied from a disappointing 2-6 start to mount one of the most dramatic comebacks in Green Bay history, closing with a 6-2 rush (an 8-8 mark) and coming within one victory of the playoffs.

The Packers continued the upsurge in 1982, when they qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1972 by posting a 5-3-1 record during a strike-interrupted season. They then embellished that performance by routing St. Louis 41-16 in the first game of the NFL's Super Bowl Tournament before bowing to Dallas (37-26) despite a record-setting, 466-yard offensive effort. Starr was relieved of his head coaching duties on Dec. 19, 1983, after the Packers finished the '83 season with an 8-8 record and missed the NFL playoffs on the final week of the year.

THE PRESENT—On December 24, 1984, Starr was replaced by Forrest Gregg, a former teammate and one of the premier offensive tackles in the history of the game as a player, who had maneuvered Cincinnati into Super Bowl XVI following the 1981 season. Gregg, whose Bengals' 19-6 record over the 1981-82 seasons was the best in pro football, received a five-year contract.

In taking over, he declared, "I took this job to field a winning team... That will happen."

Gregg's prediction began to bear of fruit in the second half of the 1984 season when the Packers rebounded from an injury-ridden 1-7 start to win seven of their last eight games.

Because of injury and other complications, however, the 1985 season followed the '84 script, the Packers getting off to a slow 3-6 start before mounting a strong finish to again close at 8-8 by winning 5 of their last 7 games.

1921 — J.E. Clair of Acme Packing Company granted National Football League franchise for Green Bay Packers, August 27.

— Packer-Bear series launched at Chicago. Packers losing 20-0 decision to Decatur Staleys, who changed name to Bears in 1922.

1934 — Fan falls from stands at East (old City) Stadium, sues Packers and wins \$5,000 verdict. Insurance company goes out of business and Packers go into receivership, about to fold, but Green Bay businessmen come to rescue, raise \$15,000 in new capital and reorganize club.

1935 — Don Hutson of Alabama, to become most feared pass receiver in pro football history, signed by Packers.

1936 — Packers make Russ Lellow, University of San Francisco guard, their No. 1 choice, in first NFL Draft.

— Packers win fourth NFL championship, first under playoff system. Post 11-1-1 record, defeating Boston Redskins for title in New York's Polo Grounds, 21-6.

1938 — Packers win Western Division championship, lose to Giants in NFL title game at New York, 23-17.

1939 — Packers repeat for Western Division title, rout Giants in title game at Milwaukee, 27-0.

1941 — Packers tie Bears for Western Division title, fail to beat Bears in Chicago playoff, 33-14.

1944 — With Ted Fritsch scoring both touchdowns, Packers beat Giants 14-7 at New York's Polo Grounds for sixth NFL title.

1945 — Don Hutson catches 4 TD passes, kicks 5 PAT in second quarter against Detroit at Milwaukee, sets all-time one-quarter scoring record of 29 points as Packers win 57-21, Oct. 7.

1949 — Packers play intra-squad game at East (old City) Stadium on Thanksgiving Day, raise \$50,000 to stay afloat financially.

— Packers, 3-9-0 in 1948, dip to all-time low under Curly Lambeau, 2-10-0.

1950 — Lambeau resigns to become vice president, head coach of Chicago Cardinals.

— Gene Ronzani, ex-Chicago Bear star, named Packer head coach, V.P.

— Stock drive nets \$118,000, puts Packers on sound financial basis.

1953 — Ronzani dismissed with two games remaining; Hugh Devore, Ray "Scooter" McLean named co-coaches.

1954 — Lisle Blackburn, Marquette University coach, is named Packer coach.

1957 — Lambeau Field, completed just in time for season opener, dedicated (Sept. 29) with 21-17 victory over Bears.

— Packers post 3-9-0 mark following 4-8-0 in '56, Blackburn resigns.

1958 — Asst. Coach Ray "Scooter" McLean promoted to head coach.

— Dominic Olejniczak elected president of Green Bay Packers, Inc., April 28.

— McLean resigns following 1-10-1 record, poorest in Packer history.

1959 — Vince Lombardi, offensive coach of Giants, named Packer head coach, GM, Feb. 4.

— Packers post 7-5-0 record, first winning season in 12 years.

1960 — Packers win Western Division title, first since '44, lose to Eagles in NFL title game, 17-13.

— Paul Hornung, scores 176 points new NFL record.

1961 — Packers rout Giants, 37-0 for 7th NFL championship in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

1962 — Packers beat Giants in New York, 16-7, for second straight crown.

1965 — E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, Packers' founder and first coach dies at 67 (June 1).

— Packers defeat Baltimore 13-10 at Green Bay in sudden death Western Division Conference playoff (first overtime game in team's history) on Don Chandler's 25-yard field goal at 13:39 of second overtime.

— Packers beat Cleveland Browns, 23-12, for 9th NFL title.

1966 — Game-ending end zone interception by Tom Brown enables Packers to down Cowboys, 34-27, in Dallas for second straight NFL title.

— Packers edge Cowboys, 21-17 for third consecutive NFL title on last minute, one-yard sneak by Bart Starr in 16-below temperature at Lambeau Field.

1968 — Packers beat Oakland 33-14 in Super Bowl II at Miami, Jan. 14; game has first \$3 million gate in history.

— Lombardi steps down as Packer head coach, stays as general manager; Phil Bengtson named coach.

1969 — Lombardi resigns to become part-owner, executive-vice president, head coach of Washington Redskins; Bengtson named Packer GM.

1970 — Lombardi dies at 57, Sept. 3.

— Bengtson resigns, Dec. 21.

1971 — Dan Devine, University of Missouri coach, named Packer head coach, general manager.

1972 — Packers win first Central Division title since '67 (10-4-0) but lose to Redskins in divisional playoff at Washington, 16-3.

1974 — Devine resigns Dec. 16, following 5-7-2 mark in '73 and 6-8-0 in '74.

LIMITED INSTANT REPLAY SYSTEM TO BE USED IN 1986

At the NFL Annual Meeting in March 1986, the clubs adopted (by a 23-4-1 vote) a one-year system of limited Instant Replay of officiating calls for 1986.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a “no frills” approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised preseason games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986. A total of 28 plays were examined closely (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of a play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is

needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted (via a paging device worn at the beltline), and he then will use a walkie-talkie for further communication with the Replay Official.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period (probably 15-20 seconds) after the play is over. (If there is a time out, the Replay Official would not be restricted to the 15-20-second period.)

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will *not* include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeling; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.
