## ROBERT E. HARLAN

President and Chief Executive Officer

Now in his fourth year as the operating head of the Green Bay Packers, Inc., Robert E. "Bob" Harlan has gained league-wide respect for the extensive and innovative agenda he has implemented while putting his personal stamp upon the office of president and chief executive officer.

The veteran Packer official, a member of the team's front office since 1971, made two major and historic decisions late in the 1991 season, relieving Executive Vice President Tom Braatz of his responsibilities on Nov. 20 and, one week later, naming former Raider personnel chief Ron Wolf as executive vice president and general manager, with total authority over all football operations.

These were the latest in a series of significant moves Harlan has effected since succeeding Judge Robert J. Parins as president of the corporation at the annual stockholders' meeting June 5, 1989.

Once elected, the Packers' new chief executive officer lost little time initiating his first major project. Ten weeks later, in late August of 1989, he announced plans to construct 1,920 club seats — a historic "first" in the home of the Packers — and 36 new private boxes in Green Bay's Lambeau Field, an \$8,263,000 expansion which increased the stadium capacity to nearly 60,000 (59,543). It was completed in time for the start of 1990 NFL preseason play.

A firm believer in the importance of ongoing, person-to-person dialogue with the team's fans, the 55-year-old Iowa native also scheduled and staged the first "Breakfast with the Packers" functions in club history, gatherings for fans selected at random by computer, at which he invited questions and feedback from them about the Packer organization. The third was held in Green Bay in May of this year, following a second such session at Milwaukee in 1991.

Committed to making the fans' day at the stadium as enjoyable as possible, Harlan in 1990 also directed the formation of a comprehensive program designed to encourage responsible drinking by fans in Lambeau Field. Results in the first two years of its existence indicate it has been a success, with arrests for misconduct down appreciably from previous years.

In what was unanimously approved and widely hailed — within and outside the organization — as a master stroke, Harlan also nominated Milwaukee Brewers President Allan H. "Bud" Selig to the Packer board of directors at the 1990 annual meeting, a move designed to promote a closer relationship between the two Wisconsin sports franchises.

A year earlier, while still executive vice president of administration, Harlan was the catalyst in the implementation and development of a long-term marketing program, launched with the hiring of a director of marketing and the opening of an official outlet store in the Packers' administration building, a project which has become a solid success in the intervening three years and gives promise of greater dividends in the future.

In the overall process, Harlan has adhered to the agenda he had set for himself on the occasion of his election as president, when he announced, "I want to move this franchise ahead in every area...We've got to be successful from top to bottom to succeed. And we are going to succeed."

At that point, he addressed what he termed the two key "bottom lines...Obviously, one is winning football games, and the other is keeping the organization financially solvent and strong so it can always remain in Green Bay and compete with the other 27 clubs in this league."

Becoming president of the Green Bay Packers, he also revealed on that historic day, had exceeded his fondest dreams.

"In 1960, when I had just graduated from Marquette University and was working as sports information director at Marquette, just getting started in public relations, I attended a Packer game at Milwaukee County Stadium," he told members of the media following his election. "I made a comment to my wife then that I hope I can grow in the public relations field and become competent enough that someday I can become the public relations director for the Green Bay Packers. When the opportunity came along 11 years later to join this fine organization, I jumped at it...To be associated with the NFL and the Packers, I have been highly honored...That honor has reached a new and incredible level."

Since taking over as chief executive officer, Harlan has become actively involved in National Football League matters and currently serves on the influential NFL Properties Executive Committee.



## THE ADMINISTRATION

The ninth president in the team's 74-year existence, Harlan is the first CEO to come up through the ranks. All previous presidents of the NFL's only publicly-owned franchise had come from the business and professional areas of the community as members of the board of directors.

Harlan, who has been involved in every area of the club's operations over the course of his 21-year Green Bay career, joined the Packer organization as assistant general manager on June 1, 1971, after serving as director of public relations for the St. Louis baseball Cardinals. He later was named corporate general manager in 1975, corporate assistant to the president in 1981 and executive vice president of administration on Feb. 16, 1988.

In the latter role, he had been responsible for team travel, negotiating radio and preseason television contracts, front office personnel, ticket office operations, purchasing, the leasing of Lambeau Field's private boxes, insurance, game day entertainment and scheduling of preseason games.

Prior to 1985, he also had negotiated all player contracts for 14 years.

Harlan, who earned a B.S. degree in journalism from Marquette in 1958, had a brief tour of duty in the U.S. Army before spending a year as a general reporter for United Press International in Milwaukee. He subsequently became sports information director at Marquette in 1959, serving six years in that capacity, after which he joined the St. Louis baseball Cardinals in 1965, serving as director of community relations and the speakers' bureau for two years and as director of public relations for 3 1/2 years before coming to the Packers.

Harlan, born Robert Ernest Harlan in Des Moines, Iowa, on Sept. 9, 1936, is active in the Green Bay community as a member of the boards of directors of St. Mary's Hospital, St. Norbert College and the Firstst Bank of Green Bay. He also is a member of the executive board of the Packer 65 Roses Sports Club, which was created to generate awareness of cystic fibrosis and to raise money for research to find a cure for the dreaded disease.

Bob and his wife, Madeline, have three sons — Kevin, 32, who is the play-by-play "voice" of both the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs and the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves; Bryan, 30, who is director of public relations for the Chicago Bears; and Michael, 23, a member of the sports marketing staff at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

An avid golfer, Harlan also is an "involved" fan, closely monitoring the athletic fortunes of the Milwaukee Brewers and Milwaukee Bucks as well as those of the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay and his alma mater, Marquette.



### MICHAEL R. REINFELDT Chief Financial Officer

The first chief financial officer in the 71-year history of the Packer Corporation, Michael R. Reinfeldt has an extensive background in finance as an athletics administrator at both the college and professional levels.

The former All-Pro defensive back was named to the position by Bob Harlan, the Packers' president and chief executive officer, on Nov. 8, 1990.

Reinfeldt's responsibilities in his history-making role include supervising the Packers' financial operations and accounting staff, and negotiating all player contracts.

A native of Baraboo, Wis., Reinfeldt came to the Packers from the University of Southern California, where he had served as the school's associate athletic director. He previously had been chief financial officer of the Los Angeles Raiders from 1985 through 1987.

Reinfeldt, who earned an MBA degree in management and finance from Houston Baptist University, obtained a bachelor of science degree from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, where he starred as a four-year starter on the varsity football team and holds the school record for most interceptions in a career (24). It is a mark that may never be broken because his alma mater dropped football after his senior year. Reinfeldt holds another distinction in UW-M's annals — he is the only alumnus in the institution's history ever to play in the National Football League.

Following graduation, Reinfeldt went on to a distinguished, nine-year playing career in the professional ranks, begun when he signed with the then-Oakland Raiders as a free agent in 1975. After spending that season with the Raiders, he played eight years (1976-83) with the Houston Oilers, starting 102



consecutive games, calling defensive signals for the secondary and leading the team in interceptions in 1977, 1979 and 1981. In the process, he played in two AFC title games for Houston (against Pittsburgh in 1978 and 1979) and also acquired his MBA degree while attending Houston Baptist in the off-season.

Reinfeldt enjoyed his best season in 1979, when he led the NFL in interceptions with 12, earned consensus All-Pro honors, started in the Pro Bowl and was named Player of the Year in the American Football Conference.

Subsequently, as chief financial officer of the Raiders, he was responsible for overseeing the organization's financial and accounting operations and negotiating the majority of player contracts. He also dealt with local television and radio contracts, and was responsible for staff personnel.

Reinfeldt left professional football in 1988 to join the athletic department at the University of Southern California, where he served as the school's assistant athletic director for one year, then was promoted to associate athletic director, a position he held until he joined the Packer organization on Jan. 7, 1991.

At USC, he was responsible for the formulation and control of the athletic department's \$17 million budget, and handled negotiations on major contracts with radio and television networks, sponsors and outside suppliers.

Born May 6, 1953, in Baraboo, Wis., Reinfeldt was a high school sports star there, earning six letters in football and basketball. Still highly athletic, he regularly is involved in a variety of sports, including tennis, golf and bicycling, activities he shares with his wife, Susan, as well as basketball and racquetball. Also an omnivorous reader, he is committed to reading "as many different books as I can...I try to read three or four books a week — some fiction, some historical fiction and some factual...some biography...a little bit of everything."



## **RON WOLF** Executive Vice President and General Manager

Ron Wolf, respected throughout the National Football League for his knowledge and expertise, is in his 30th year in professional football.

Long regarded as one of the game's premier personnel experts, he was named Executive Vice President and General Manager Nov. 27, 1991, by President Robert E. Harlan, with "full authority to run the Packers' football operation."

In hiring Wolf, Harlan said, "When we started the search to fill this position, we put together a list of eight names. Ron's name was at the

top of the list."

Wolf, who previously had spent 24 years in the front office of the Raiders, took over a position new to the Packers' organizational structure in terms of authority and responsibility for conduct of the football operation, said authority including hiring and supervising the head coach and the scouting staff, conducting the draft and making all football decisions for the organization.

With the sweeping mandate, Wolf moved swiftly. He made his first major decision in a span of 24 days after his appointment, dismissing Lindy Infante as head coach Dec. 22, 1991, his second in hiring Mike Holmgren as Infante's successor Jan. 11, 1992.

A month later, he began to move on the personnel front, trading a first-round draft choice to Atlanta for quarterback Brett Favre and a sixth-round pick to Phoenix for veteran offensive tackle Tootie Robbins in a bid to upgrade the offense.

The 53-year-old Wolf, who agreed to a five-year contract in joining the Packer organization, credits his long experience in the Raiders' front office with preparing him for his current responsibilities.

"I had an opportunity to learn from — now that Paul Brown's no longer with us — to me, the greatest figure in the game today, Al Davis," he said. "He knows every aspect of the game of professional football — not just the X's and O's — from the business standpoint and the talent standpoint. He is totally involved, and he taught me. I was very, very fortunate to work with him."

The Pennsylvania native began his professional football career in 1963 when he joined the Raiders as a talent scout. Subsequently, when Raiders head coach and general manager Davis was named American Football League commissioner in 1966, Wolf accompanied him to the league office as the AFL's coordinator of talent. He returned to the Raiders prior to the opening of the 1966 season and



played a major role in the club's personnel operation until the spring of 1975.

At that time, the then 37-year-Wolf was named to oversee the formation of the newly-franchised Tampa Bay Buccaneers as Vice President of Operations. He remained in that capacity until 1978 when he re-joined the Raiders, for whom he headed up player personnel operations until he joined the Jets' organization in June of 1990.

Born in New Freedom, Pa., Dec. 30, 1938, Wolf is a 1963 graduate of the University of Oklahoma, where he earned a degree in history. He earlier had served with Army Intelligence in Europe for three years (1956-59).

Wolf said he decided he wanted to make professional football his life's work "when I was in the service in '58 or '59, and I was stationed in Berlin, Germany. I think that appealed to me as something I would really like to do if I could do it. I never thought I'd be able to get my foot in the door."

His first job in the field was with Pro Football Illustrated, a publication based in Chicago, in 1961. He subsequently returned to the University of Oklahoma in 1962, he said, "and then Al Davis called me in 1963, after I'd taken my last final examination at Oklahoma...The very day, he called me."

When not immersed in football matters today, Wolf can be found reading. "I like to read novels — and when I really get serious, I like to delve into the Civil War or World War II," he says of himself. "That's when I get into a serious mode, which runs for about two weeks...Then I get off it."

Wolf, who has a highly developed interest in the lives of legendary military leaders, such as George S. Patton, George Custer and Douglas MacArthur, et al, said, "What fascinates me — and I can't pin the answer down — is where do all these people come from...the great people that emerge in time of crisis?...Where have they been? Why do they suddenly appear on the scene at the precise moment of history?"

Ron's family includes his wife, Edie, and five children — daughters Saralyn, Celli, Joan, and two sons, Jonathan and Eliot. Mrs. Wolf is a psychologist and has established a practice in Green Bay.



## LEE REMMEL Executive Director of Public Relations

Lee Rimmel has been a member of the Packer front office for 18 years, serving as director of public relations in 1974 and from 1980 through 1988, and as director of publicity from 1975 through 1979.

He was named executive director of public relations in March of 1989 by Robert Harlan, then executive vice president of administration, with responsibility for overseeing the public relations, marketing and community relations areas. Prior to joining the Packer organization on March 24, 1974, Rimmel was a sportswriter and columnist for

the Green Bay Press-Gazette for 29½ years.

In the course of his two "careers," he has been involved in staffing all 26 Super Bowls played to date, the first eight representing the Press-Gazette and the last 18 as a member of the National Football League's auxiliary media relations staff.

Rimmel also is currently a member of the NFL public relations directors' Professional Football Writers of America liaison committee, following long service as a member of the statistics committee.

While at the Press-Gazette, he was the only sports writer in Wisconsin to have been directly involved in coverage of the Packers throughout all of the team's coaching regimes to that point, beginning with Packer founder E.L. "Curly" Lambeau and continuing until the naming of Bart Starr in 1975.

In 1967, he was voted "Wisconsin Sports Writer of the Year." He also is a past president of the former Wisconsin Pro Football Writers' Association.

Rimmel, a native of Shawano, Wis., where he was born June 30, 1924, began his career as the sports editor of a weekly newspaper while a Shawano High School freshman. He is a member of the executive committee of the Brown County Civic Music Association, along with his wife, Noreen, as well as of the executive board of the Packer 65 Roses Sports Club (cystic fibrosis). He also is a member of the St. Norbert College Fine Arts Committee, the Green Bay School/Business/Industry Partnership Council and the board of directors of the Green Bay Packer Hall of Fame.

Now in their 74th season, the Green Bay Packers are a team and an organization apart in professional football, unique in both structure and accomplishment. From an organizational standpoint, they represent the only publicly-owned franchise in the 28-club National Football League. On the field, they have won more championships — eleven — than any other team in the NFL's 72-year history.

Green Bay Packers, Inc., was founded as a non-profit corporation in 1922 under the leadership of A.B. Turnbull, then publisher of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, who became the organization's first president. There are 4,627 shares of stock owned by 1,866 shareholders. The corporation is governed by a seven-member Executive Committee, selected from a 45-person board of directors. (For "The Green Bay Packer Story," turn to page 197).

Robert E. Harlan, ninth president of the corporation, was elected the organization's chief executive officer June 5, 1989, succeeding Judge Robert J. Parins.

## MIKE HOLMGREN

Head Coach

Michael G. "Mike" Holmgren, in his first year as head coach of the Green Bay Packers, brings to his role a league-wide reputation as one of professional football's premier offensive coaches and a long-time identification with success.

The tall, imposing Californian — at 6-foot-5 he is the tallest head coach in Packer annals — became the eleventh in the team's 74-year history when he was signed to a five-year contract on Jan. 11, 1992, by Ron Wolf, the Packers' new executive vice president and general manager.

A 21-year coaching veteran, the 44-year-old Holmgren was sought after by no fewer than six National Football League clubs following the 1991 season in recognition of his accomplishments as offensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers.

Earlier quarterbacks coach under Bill Walsh for three seasons, he became the 49ers' offensive coordinator in 1989 and proceeded to put his personal stamp upon the club's attack. Under him, the 49er offense ranked no lower than third in the league in his three years as coordinator.

As a member of the 49ers' coaching staff since 1986, Holmgren was identified with one of the most successful organizations in NFL history, San Francisco having swept to five consecutive NFC Western Division championships (1986-90) and to a pair of back-to-back Super Bowl victories (in 1988 and '89) during his six-year tenure with the team.

Over this span, the 49ers compiled the NFL's best overall record, posting 71 wins, compared to only 23 losses, with one tie, a .753 percentage.

Individually, Holmgren did perhaps the finest coaching job of his career in 1991. Despite losing quarterbacks Joe Montana and Steve Young to injuries, the 49er offense finished third in the NFL under his leadership.

With third-string quarterback Steve Bono taking over for the injured Young, who had replaced an injured Montana at the start of the season, the 49ers won five of their last six games.

The ability to win with three different quarterbacks, a major achievement, helped to make Holmgren the NFL's most sought-after assistant as head coaching opportunities began to develop following the '91 season.

Under his direction, the 49er offense had been the top-rated unit in the NFL in 1989, his first in 1987, his second year with San Francisco. Holmgren's guidance was credited with helping Montana capture his first league passing championship. He also has been cited for the manner in which he prepared Steve Young to step in for Montana when injuries forced the latter to the sideline, and the adjustments he implemented to help Bono succeed in his interim role.

A native of San Francisco, Holmgren had returned home in 1986 to take on his first coaching assignment in the professional ranks. He came to the 49ers from Brigham Young, where he had been a member of LaVell Edwards' staff for four years (1982-85) and tutored Robbie Bosco, a Packer draft selection in 1986, and Steve Young in his role as quarterbacks coach, helping the Cougars maintain one of college football's most potent passing offenses.

During Holmgren's tenure, BYU won the school's first football national championship in 1984. Holmgren also has known personal success on the football field, having been named 1965's "Prep Athlete of the Year" at San Francisco's Lincoln High School. A quarterback, he went on to play four years of college football at the University of Southern California (1966-69) and was drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals in the eighth round of the 1970 NFL selection meeting. He subsequently was in training camp with both the Cardinals and the New York Jets that year, prior to returning to his high school alma mater, Lincoln High, to begin his coaching career in 1971.

A year later, Holmgren moved to San Francisco's Sacred Heart High for the 1972-74 seasons, struggling through 0-and-21 adversity at a school which had no practice facilities, before taking over at Oak Grove High (1975-80), a period during which he brought the school a Central Coast Sectional football championship.

Holmgren next served as quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator for San Francisco State in 1981, preceding his appointment at Brigham Young in 1982.



# HEAD COACH

Of Swedish-Norwegian descent, the Packers' new field leader was born Michael George Holmgren on June 15, 1948, in San Francisco. Following graduation from Lincoln High School, he earned his bachelor of science degree at USC in 1970.

Mike and his wife, Kathy, have four daughters — twins Calla and Jenny, 18, (born 9/27/73), sophomores at North Park College in Chicago (their mother's alma mater); Emily, 15, (born 1/21/77), an Ashwaubenon High School student; and Gretchen, 11, (born 7/14/81), a Park View Middle School (Ashwaubenon) student.

Although a new resident, Holmgren has Wisconsin ties, his maternal grandfather, Jens Bugge, having been born on a farm in the Badger state. Known as "Colonel" in the family because of his service as an officer in the United States Army, Bugge was the author of a book on military strategy, a copy of which reposes in the West Point library.

Away from football, Holmgren spends most of his leisure time with his family. Golf is his favorite pastime and he also is fond of reading, particularly historical books, having been a history teacher at the high school level.

Already substantially involved in the Green Bay community and his adopted state, the native San Franciscan has seen his first Mike Holmgren Celebrity Invitational Golf Tournament raise more than \$25,000 for the Packer 65 Roses Sports Club (cystic fibrosis) last May.

Holmgren also served as honorary chairman for the Wisconsin Arthritis Foundation's 1991 telethon, in addition to acting as a fundraising spokesperson for the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay's new Weidner Center for the Performing Arts.

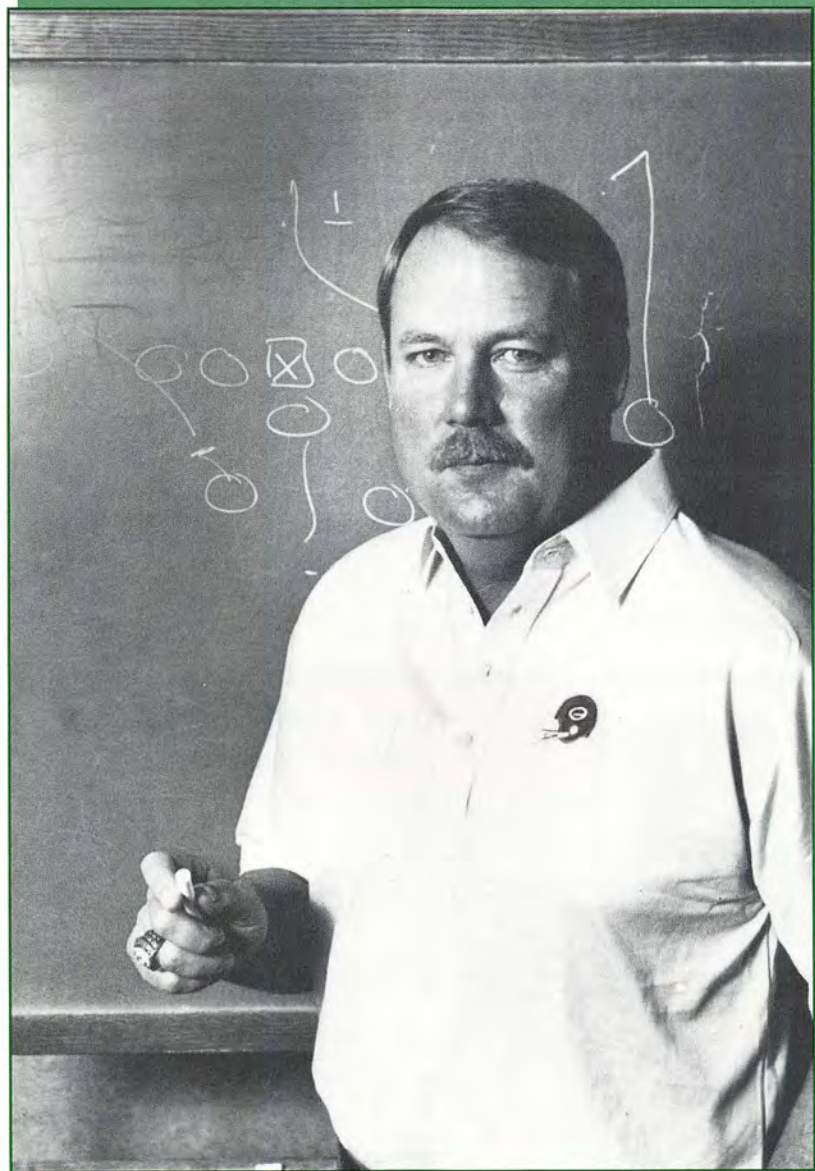

### SHERMAN LEWIS

#### Offensive Coordinator

Sherman Lewis brings an impressive pedigree to his key role as offensive coordinator, previously having helped the San Francisco 49ers develop one of the most productive attacks in National Football League history en route to three Super Bowl victories.

The 50-year-old Louisville, Ky., native, named to the Green Bay staff by new Head Coach Mike Holmgren on Jan. 18, 1992, had been a member of the 49ers staff since 1983 — the first six seasons as running backs coach, the last three as receivers coach under then-offen-

sive coordinator Holmgren.

His Packer responsibilities also include coaching the wide receivers.

With the 49ers, Lewis helped hone the skills of running backs Roger Craig, a four-time Pro Bowler, and Tom Rathman, and Pro Bowl receivers Jerry Rice and John Taylor, among others.

Lewis had been an assistant coach at his alma mater, Michigan State, for 14 seasons prior to joining the 49ers under Bill Walsh, serving as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator for his final three years at MSU. Originally hired by the late Hugh "Duffy" Dougherty, he subsequently served on the staffs of Denny Stolz, Darryl Rogers and Frank "Muddy" Waters.

Sherman earlier had been a two-way All-American halfback at Michigan State, where he was second runner-up for the 1963 Heisman Trophy (behind Roger Staubach of Navy and Billy Lothridge of Georgia Tech) and named Football News "Player of the Year."

Lewis also was a standout track and field performer for the Spartans. He later earned his master's degree in educational administration from MSU in 1974.

Sherman, born in Louisville on June 29, 1942, and his wife, Tori, have two sons, Kip (born 2/6/67), a former University of Arizona football player who has been a standout for the New York/New Jersey Knights of the World League in each of its two seasons, and Eric (born 1/2/76).

### RAY RHODES

#### Defensive Coordinator

Defensive Coordinator Ray Rhodes, in his 11th season as an NFL coach, has been described by Head Coach Mike Holmgren as "the best teacher I've ever been around, bar none."

Holmgren, a coaching colleague on the San Francisco 49ers' staff for the past six years, named Rhodes to his new Packer staff on Jan. 18, 1992 — exactly one week after taking over as Green Bay's head coach.

The 41-year-old Rhodes had played defensive back for the 49ers in 1980 before joining the San Francisco coaching staff under Bill Walsh the following year. He previously had spent six seasons with the New York Giants, for whom he had played both offense and defense, from 1974 through 1979.

During Rhodes' San Francisco coaching tenure, the 49ers became one of the great dynasties in recent pro football history, capturing four Super Bowl victories over the past decade.

Over that period, the purposeful Texan developed four Pro Bowl defenders, cornerbacks Ronnie Lott and Eric Wright and safeties Dwight Hicks and Carlton Williamson.

Drafted out of the University of Tulsa by the New York Giants in 1974's tenth round, Rhodes played wide receiver for his first three seasons before being transferred to defensive back in 1977. He led all National Football Conference receivers in average yards per catch (20.7) in 1975.

A running back at Texas Christian before ending his career at Tulsa as a wide receiver, running back and kick returner, Rhodes also earned college letters in track and field.

A native of Mexia, Texas, Ray was born on Oct. 20, 1950. He and his wife, Carmen, have four daughters — Detra (born 11/4/70), Candra (born 5/25/76), Tynesha (born 9/10/79) and Raven (born 5/23/85).

### GREG BLACHE Defensive Line

Recognized by both players and coaching peers as an outstanding teacher, Greg Blache found his life's work through a quirk of the football fates, which intervened to make a career decision for him at an early age.

The Packers' defensive line coach entered the coaching profession unexpectedly when a lower leg injury suffered in freshman football at Notre Dame abruptly ended his playing career.

The professional impetus came from the legendary Ara Parseghian, then head coach of the Fighting Irish, under whom Greg became a student assistant coach as a sophomore, tutoring Notre Dame's freshman defensive backfield for the next three seasons.

Blache subsequently remained on Parseghian's staff as a graduate assistant following graduation and later was named a full-time aide in 1973. He continued in that capacity under new head coach Dan Devine in 1975 before moving a year later to Tulane, where he first encountered former Packers head coach Lindy Infante, then on the Green Wave staff.

Greg returned to Notre Dame in 1981, serving as running back coach that season before taking over the defensive line and linebackers in 1982. Two years later, he joined Infante's Jacksonville Bulls staff. Following the United States Football League's demise, Blache coached at Southern University in 1986 and at Kansas in 1987. He had just moved to the University of North Carolina early in 1988 when Infante invited him to join the Packers' staff (Feb. 15).

Greg, an avid hunter and fisherman, was born March 9, 1949. A popular and sought-after member of the Packers' off-season speakers' bureau, he is the father of three children — Greg, Jr., 22, Christopher, 16, who is a high school senior, and Corinne, a high school sophomore.

### NOLAN CROMWELL Special Teams

Nolan Cromwell joins the Packers as special teams coordinator following one of the more distinguished playing careers in recent National Football League history. The 37-year-old Kansan, in his second year as a coach, was a four-time Pro Bowler as a Los Angeles Rams safety during an 11-year tenure as a mainstay in the Rams' secondary (1977-87).

Cromwell launched his coaching career in 1991 as defensive and special teams assistant on Coach John Robinson's Rams staff.

An All-America quarterback at the University of Kansas, Nolan was named to the Pro Bowl following the 1980, '81, '82 and '83 seasons. He ended his playing career as the Rams' all-time leader in interception return yardage with 643 yards on 35 interceptions, the latter total ranking second in Rams history to Eddie Meador's 46 thefts.

Cromwell also served a holder for extra points and field goals, scoring three rushing touchdowns on

fake field goal attempts.

In addition to being a four-time Pro Bowl honoree, Nolan was named NFC Defensive Player of the Year by the Kansas City Committee of 101 in 1980. He also was chosen NFL Defensive Back of the Year in 1984 by Football Digest.

As a collegian, Cromwell was accorded All-America honors as a junior quarterback in the Kansas wishbone offense.

Following retirement as a player in 1987 and prior to re-joining the Rams as a coach in 1991, Cromwell owned and operated three tire stores in the Los Angeles area.

Nolan, born in Smith Center, Kan., on Jan. 30, 1955, and his wife, Mary, have two children, Lance (born 6/15/86) and Jennifer (born 4/13/88).

### JON GRUDEN

Offensive Assistant / Quality Control

Jon Gruden, only 28 years of age coming into training camp, has risen rapidly in the coaching field. Being born into a football family — his father, Jim, is a regional scout for the San Francisco 49ers and formerly served as backfield coach under John McKay with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers — has to be credited with giving him a leg up in his chosen profession.

Starting with the 1988 season, when he was passing game coordinator at Southeast Missouri State, his arrival in Green Bay marks his

fifth stop in five years. Gruden coached the wide receivers at the University of Pacific in 1989, then served as an offensive assistant with the 49ers during the '90 season, a position in which he worked closely with the Packers' new head coach, Mike Holmgren, at the time San Francisco's offensive coordinator.

Jon, the youngest member of Holmgren's Green Bay staff, made another career move in 1991, joining Paul Hackett at the University of Pittsburgh to tutor the wide receivers.

Named to the Packer staff by Holmgren on Jan. 27, 1992, Gruden was a three-year letterman at the University of Dayton, graduating from that institution in 1985. He embarked on his coaching career by spending two seasons (1986-87) as a graduate assistant at the University of Tennessee.

Jon, born Aug. 17, 1963, is married to the former Cindy Brooks, a one-time cheerleader at the University of Tennessee.

### GIL HASKELL

Running Backs

Personable Gil Haskell, like Head Coach Mike Holmgren a native San Franciscan, is in his 10th year as a National Football League coach.

Haskell was named to the Packers' coaching staff on Jan. 27, 1992, following nine seasons under Coach John Robinson with the Los Angeles Rams. He coached the Rams' special teams for the first four of those seasons, the running backs for the next four and concluded his tenure last year by tutoring the tight ends and re-assuming the special teams responsibilities.

As running backs coach, Haskell had significant success, two Rams backs rushing for 1,000 yards in three of the four seasons he coached the position. Charles White gained 1,374 yards in 1987 and Greg

Bell rushed for 1,212 in 1988 and 1,137 in 1989.

Earlier, under Haskell's guidance, Rams special teams ranked among the NFL's finest, emerging with the league's No. 1 ranking in both 1984 and 1985, his second and third years in charge. Three of his players also were named to the Pro Bowl — kickoff return man Ron Brown and punt returner Henry Ellard in 1984 and punter Dale Hatcher in 1985.

During that four-year span, only one opponent scored a touchdown on a kickoff or punt return while the Rams, conversely, had impressive success, returning nine kicks for scores.

Haskell joined the Rams' staff in 1983 after serving as Robinson's special teams coach for five seasons at the University of Southern California, a period during which he also was the Trojans' receivers coach for two seasons.

Prior to signing on at USC, Haskell coached at San Francisco's St. Ignatius High School for nine years, the last five as head coach. In the latter role, he compiled an imposing 34-15 won-lost record. He also served as track coach for four years, winning three Catholic Athletic League titles.

Haskell launched his coaching career at Riordan High School, also in San Francisco, serving as line coach for three years while also coaching the track team and winning three Catholic Athletic League championships.

Born in San Francisco on Sept. 24, 1943, Gil has long-standing ties to the NFL. An uncle, the late Dr. William O'Grady, was a part owner of the San Francisco 49ers and, before going to USC in 1978, Haskell had worked with the 49ers for 22 years.

Gil is married to the former Nancy Van Acker, who had served as speakers' bureau and entertainment coordinator for the Rams before moving to Green Bay.

### DICK JAURON Defensive Backs

Dick Jauron, in his seventh season in green and gold, is the senior member of the Packers' coaching staff in point of service, originally having entered the Green Bay organization in 1986 under then-Head Coach Forrest Gregg.

Subsequently retained by Lindy Infante when Infante succeeded Gregg in 1988, he now has joined the staff of new Head Coach Mike Holmgren, who has described him as "a quality coach and individual who has earned league-wide respect for the consistent and productive

performance of the Packer secondary."

Over his previous six seasons, Jauron's secondaries have registered a total of 114 interceptions, 25 of them in 1989 when Green Bay finished fourth in the National Football Conference in this category.

The Packer "outfield" embellished its '89 efforts by allowing the collective opposition just four 100-yard receiving days — or an average of one every four games — two of those to pass-receiving nonpareil Jerry Rice of the 49ers and the Vikings' gifted Anthony Carter. In 1990, Jauron's secondary permitted only six 100-yard receiving days — just four of those over the last 15 games.

Earlier, in 1987, the soft-spoken Yale alumnus produced a defensive backfield which ranked among the league's elite in another major category — preventing the "bomb." It gave up only 14 touchdown passes, a season-long performance which ranked second only to that of the 49ers, who permitted a league-low 13.

Jauron began his coaching career in 1985 as a member of the Buffalo Bills' staff under Hank Bullough, then Buffalo's head coach.

The 41-year-old Peoria, Ill., native, who still ranks as one of Yale's all-time football greats, was a fourth-round draft selection of the Detroit Lions in 1973 and was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back following the '74 season. Released by the Lions on Aug. 23, 1978, he signed with Cincinnati six days later and was a Bengals starter until he suffered a knee injury in Game 10 of the 1980 season.

Jauron made 26 interceptions over his eight pro seasons, including a career-high six for Cincinnati in 1979, and returned two of them for touchdowns.

After retiring as a player, he owned a health fitness center in Cincinnati with former teammate Jimmy

Corbett. He later sold his interest in the business in 1983 and moved to Florida, where he was employed by Nautilus until he joined the Buffalo coaching staff in July of 1985.

Born Richard Manual Jauron in Peoria on Oct. 7, 1950, he later was a nine-letter winner at Swampscott (Mass.) High School. An offensive back as a collegian, he still owns Yale's career rushing record (2,947 yards in 515 attempts, a 5.7-yard average).

Dick and his wife, Gail, are the parents of two daughters, Kacy (born 4/2/85) and Amy (born 10/3/86).

## KENT JOHNSTON

### Strength and Conditioning

Kent Johnston, in his first year with the Packers after five seasons on the Tampa Bay staff, quickly has made a significant impact in his new role.

Implementing a comprehensive program, including weight control and nutrition as well as conditioning, he has contributed in areas beyond his customary domain, the weight room.

"He has helped us a great deal in our rehabbing of players who have had injuries," according to Head Trainer Domenic Gentile, "and he also

has helped us with advice and guidance on nutrition."

Since joining the Packers, Johnston has structured specific training programs for each player, as he did at Tampa Bay, where he implemented karate as a segment of the Bucs' conditioning regimen.

Johnston earlier earned high marks as a strength and conditioning coach at the University of Alabama under then-Head Coach Ray Perkins in 1985 and 1986, when the Crimson Tide's weight program was regarded as one of the nation's finest. The athletes he developed during that span include premier linebackers Cornelius Bennett (Buffalo Bills) and Derrick Thomas (Kansas City Chiefs) and such NBA performers as Buck Johnson (Houston Rockets), Derrick McKey (Seattle SuperSonics) and Michael Ansley (Orlando Magic).

The soft-spoken Texan launched his coaching career in 1978 at Teague (Texas) High School as an assistant coach before signing on at Northwestern (La.) State in 1979. He next moved to Northeast Louisiana as strength coach in 1980 before returning to the prep ranks at Willis (Texas) High School in 1982. In 1983, he joined Perkins' University of Alabama staff as a graduate assistant for two seasons (1983-84) before being named strength and conditioning coach in 1985. When Perkins became head coach at Tampa Bay in 1987, Johnston joined his Buccaneers staff.

A graduate of Stephen F. Austin University, he lettered in football as a defensive back en route to earning his bachelor's degree in physical education and history. He secured his master's degree in physical education from Alabama in 1984.

### **JIM LIND** Defensive Assistant / Quality Control

Jim Lind joins the Packers' coaching staff following nine years as a head coach in the college ranks — the last five at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire.

The 44-year-old Isle, Minn., native, named to the position of defensive assistant/quality control by Head Coach Mike Holmgren on March 25, 1992, thus is teamed with Holmgren for a second time. The pair previously coached together in 1982 when the Packer head coach was a member of LaVell Edwards' staff at Brigham Young University and

Lind a graduate assistant.

Head coach at Minnesota-Morris prior to taking over at UW-Eau Claire, Lind directed the M-M Cougars to two championships in the Northern Intercollegiate Conference, in which his institution was the only member that offered no athletic scholarships.

His 1986 team finished with a 7-1-2 record and was ranked No. 11 in that season's final NAIA Division II poll. It also ranked No. 3 in the NAIA in scoring offense. Three of Lind's four teams led the NIC in total offense.

In the process, Lind was named NIC "Coach of the Year" in 1984 and NAIA District 13 "Coach of the Year" in 1986.

Lind subsequently compiled an 18-12 record during his first three seasons at UW-Eau Claire (1987-88-89), including a 7-3 mark in 1989, before the Blugolds were decimated by injuries, falling to 2-8 in 1990 and to 2-7-1 in 1991.

The Packer aide began his college coaching career at St. Cloud (Minn.) State, where he was a graduate assistant in 1977 and offensive coordinator in 1978. He moved to St. John's University in Collegeville, Minn., in 1979, serving as offensive coordinator under John Gagliardi — the second winningest coach in college football behind Grambling's Eddie Robinson — before becoming a graduate assistant at BYU.

Earlier, Lind entered his profession in 1974 at Underwood (Minn.) High School, where he took over a team which had won one game the previous year and produced a Little Eight Conference championship in his first season.

Born Nov. 11, 1947, Lind played football and participated in track at Isle (Minn.) High School. He later played linebacker for one year at Bethel College and defensive back for two years at Bemidji State, from which he received his undergraduate degree. Lind subsequently earned his master's degree at St. Cloud State and defended his dissertation and completed his doctorate in Professional Leadership in Physical Education and Athletics at BYU in 1987.

The Packers' newest coaching aide is married, and he and his wife, Cindy, have two sons — Erik (born 1/6/87) and Bryan (born 1/31/90).

The genial Utah native, the first assistant to be hired by new Head Coach Mike Holmgren, was named to the Packers' staff on Jan. 14, 1992.

A member of the Phoenix Cardinals' staff the past two seasons,

Lovat previously served as a Green Bay's offensive line assistant (to Ernie McMillan) in 1980 under Bart Starr.

Tom, respected for his teaching skills, launched his coaching career at the University of Utah in 1967 while completing his master's degree, received in 1968.

He moved on to Idaho State and then to Saskatchewan of the Canadian Football League, taking on his first professional assignment as defensive coach for the Roughriders in 1971.

Lovat returned to Utah as an assistant in 1972 and later was named the school's head coach in 1974, a position he held through the 1976 season. He then moved to Stanford, where he was a member of the Bill Walsh staff from 1977 through 1979 before signing on with the Packers for the first time in 1980.

Lovat next joined the Cardinals for the first time in 1981, serving as offensive line coach through the 1984 season. He then became assistant head coach-offense for the Colts, holding the position from 1985 through 1988 under Ron Meyer, the Colts leading the American Football Conference in rushing in 1985 under his direction.

Tom subsequently spent the 1989 season as offensive line coach at the University of Wyoming before re-joining the Cardinals in 1990. That '90 season, his offensive line allowed only 43 quarterback sacks, the lowest total by the Cardinals in 11 seasons and one, oddly enough, that the Phoenix line matched last season. In the '90 process, Lovat's line paved the way for rookie running back Johnny Johnson to earn Pro Bowl honors.

Lovat is a 1961 graduate of the University of Utah, where he was a three-year football and baseball letterman for the Utes, earning All-Skyline Conference honors in baseball.

Tom, born in Bingham Canyon, Utah, on Dec. 28, 1938, and his wife, Lyn, have three children: a daughter Johna Rae, 29, and two sons, Matthew, 25, and Mark, 22.

## STEVE MARIUCCI

### Quarterbacks

"The Steve Mariucci Story" reads a little like a fairy tale. He grew up as a Packer fan in his native Iron Mountain, Mich., became a record-setting college quarterback and later established himself in the coaching profession in distant California before returning to his home area as quarterbacks coach of the Packers.

The 36-year-old Mariucci, named to the new Green Bay staff by Head Coach Mike Holmgren on Jan. 27, 1992, spent the last five seasons at the University of California, the last two as the school's offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

He had served as the Bears' wide receivers coach and special teams coordinator during his first three years, following other assistant coaching positions in the college ranks at USC, Louisville, Cal State-Fullerton, and at his alma mater, Northern Michigan.

Along the way, Mariucci also put in a season as wide receivers coach for the Orlando Renegades of the United States Football League and another as quality control coach on John Robinson's Los Angeles Rams' staff, both in 1985.

A star quarterback at Iron Mountain High School and Northern Michigan University, Mariucci started as a freshman at Northern after injuries felled the first four quarterbacks on the Wildcats' roster. As a sophomore in 1975, he led Northern to the Division II national championship.

Mariucci, named a Division II All-America quarterback in both 1976 and '77, was chosen the Wildcats' Most Valuable Player in three of his four seasons and closed out his collegiate career with 14 school passing records. He finished eighth in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy in 1976, the year Tony Dorsett received the honor. In 1988, Mariucci was named to the Northern Michigan Hall of Fame.

One of the highlights of Mariucci's boyhood came when he won a Green Bay Packers jacket for taking first place in a Punt, Pass and Kick contest when he was 10 years old.

"I was so proud of it," he recalls. "I was afraid to get it ruined. I barely wore it. I saved it."

#### Tight Ends / Assistant Offensive Line

Andy Reid, a three-time bowl performer at Brigham Young as a collegian, joins the Packer coaching staff after developing some of the premier offensive lines in the college ranks as a coach.

The 34-year-old Reid, offensive line coach at the University of Missouri since 1989, was named to the Packers' staff by Head Coach Mike Holmgren on Jan. 21, 1992, to assist Tom Lovat with the offensive line in addition to coaching the tight ends.

Quality pass-blocking offensive lines, in both the Division I and II ranks, had been Reid's hallmark since launching his coaching career at San Francisco State in 1983. The school led the nation in passing offense and total offense for three consecutive years, 1983-84-85, while he served as offensive coordinator, offensive line coach and strength coach.

Reid moved to Northern Arizona as offensive line coach in 1986, then to Texas-El Paso in 1987. When Bob Stull took over as head coach at Missouri in 1988, he joined Stull's Tiger staff.

Andy received his coaching start at his alma mater, Brigham Young, as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards in 1982.

An offensive tackle/guard on three Holiday Bowl teams as a collegian, Reid earned three varsity football letters at BYU, graduating with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He also received a master's degree in Professional Leadership in Physical Education and Athletics.

Born March 19, 1958, in Los Angeles, Andy and his wife, Tammy, have five children — Garrett (born 4/13/83), Britt (born 4/28/85), Crosby (born 3/17/88), Drew Ann (born 3/9/90) and Spencer James (born 6/16/92).

### BOB VALESENTE

#### Linebackers

Bob Valesente, who has come to the Packers following two seasons as linebackers coach for the Pittsburgh Steelers, is a true veteran of the coaching wars. Now in his 31st year in his chosen vocation, he has coached at every level — high school, college and professional.

Along the way, Valesente has held positions as head coach, assistant head coach and offensive or defensive coordinator for seven colleges and universities.

In joining the Packers, he is taking on his third NFL coaching assignment. In addition to his tour of duty with the Steelers, he previously had been secondary/special teams coach for the Baltimore Colts in 1982-83.

The 52-year-old Seneca Falls, N.Y., native began his coaching career at Ithaca (N.Y.) High School in 1962. He left the coaching profession temporarily after one year to play professional baseball for the Chicago Cubs organization in 1963 and '64.

Valesente then launched his college coaching career at Cornell University as freshman defensive coordinator in 1964. After 11 seasons at Cornell, the last six as varsity secondary coach, he moved to

the University of Cincinnati as secondary coach in 1975, then to Arizona (1977-79) and to Mississippi State in 1980 as defensive coordinator/linebackers coach.

Valesente (the name is pronounced VAL-uh-SEN-tee) then received his first NFL coaching opportunity at Baltimore in 1982, subsequently returning to the college ranks as assistant head coach/quarterbacks coach at the University of Kansas in 1984. He later was named head coach in 1986, then spent one year as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Maryland in 1988, before joining the University of Pittsburgh staff. During Bob's tenure at Kansas, the Jayhawks set 28 assorted passing records.

Valesente was named linebackers coach for the Steelers by Head Coach Chuck Noll on March 9, 1990, after serving as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator at Pitt in 1989. Under his tutelage, both David Little and Greg Lloyd blossomed into All-Pro performers, helping the Steelers to earn the league's No. 1 overall ranking on defense in 1990.

A graduate of Ithaca College, Valesente played halfback on the football-varsity and was a catcher/outfielder for the baseball team that reached the 1962 College World Series. Drafted by the Chicago Cubs, he played at the Class A level in 1963-64.

Valesente, a member of the Ithaca College Hall of Fame, graduated in 1962 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, subsequently earning his master's degree from the same institution in 1965.

Bob, born in Seneca Falls, N.Y., on July 19, 1940, and his wife, Joan, have three children — a son, Rob, 24, and two daughters, Ginger Valesente Weekly, 26, and Michelle, 12.

### THE LAMBEAU FIELD STORY

Green Bay's Lambeau Field, home of the Packers, was erected in 1957 with a capacity of 32,150. Six subsequent additions have been made to the facility in the 35-year interim, increasing the current capacity to 59,543. The most recent was completed in 1990, when 36 new private boxes and 1,920 club seats were constructed. The \$8,263,000 project, which has given the stadium a "horseshoe" appearance, increased the number of private boxes to 108 — 42 on the west side and 66 on the east side.

The theatre-style club seats, a "first" for Lambeau Field, were installed in the south end zone on either side of the scoreboard. They are enclosed and the area is heated and air conditioned. It also is equipped with elevators, concession stands and restrooms.

The previous additions, all of them, like the 1990 project, underwritten by the Green Bay Packers, Inc., increased the stadium capacity to 38,669 in 1961, 42,327 in 1963, 50,852 in 1965, 56,263 in 1970 and 56,926 in 1985, the year the first private boxes were constructed.

The cost of the original construction, when the stadium was built in 1957, was \$960,000, shared equally by the Packer Corporation and the City of Green Bay. Financed by means of a bond issue, it received voter approval in a referendum conducted April 3, 1956.

The stadium was dedicated as City Stadium on September 29, 1957. It later was renamed Lambeau Field in 1965, following the death of the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, founder and first coach of the Packers.

Lambeau Field now is wholly owned by the City of Green Bay, retirement of the original \$960,000 indebtedness having been celebrated at a mortgage-burning ceremony in May of 1978.

With the completion of the new additions two years ago, the Packers have spent more than \$20 million on improvements to Lambeau Field and the Packer administration building and training quarters over the past decade.

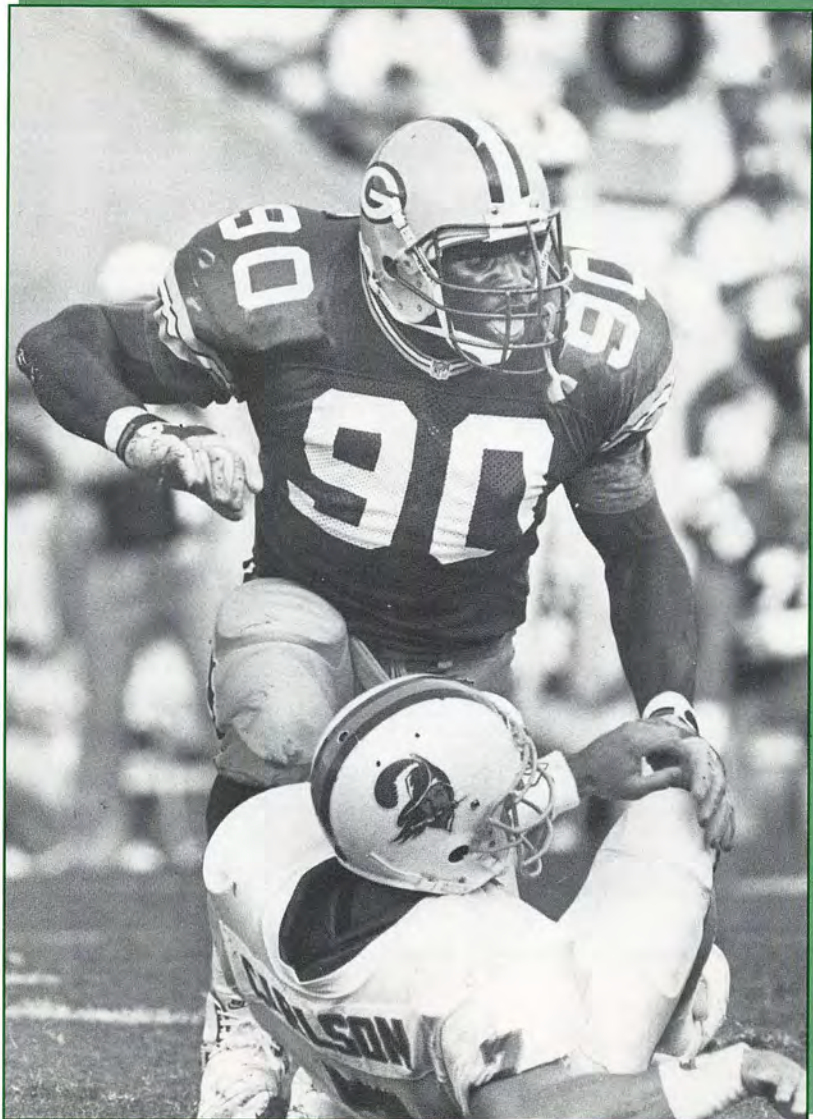

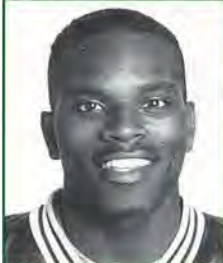

"If he gets himself into shape, he has every opportunity to be as productive as he was with the Rams," Haskell said. "He's young and he's not beat up. 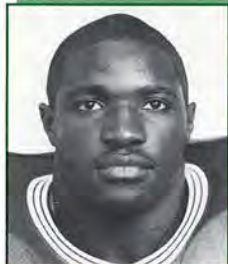

**PRO:** A consistent and indestructible performer for 10 National Football League seasons, this classically constructed North Carolinian has quietly taken his place among the team's all-time elite...Only four players in its 73-year history have been more durable than Robert Lee Brown, who has suited up for every game (regular season, union contest) the Packers have played since he joined them as a fourth-round selection out of Virginia Tech in 1982 — a span of 149 games...It includes a string of 92 consecutive starts dating back to the beginning of the 1986 season,

**PRO:** Confident, strong-armed former Falcon, acquired from Atlanta in an off-season trade, adds a significant dimension to the quarterback position...The 33rd player chosen in the 1991 draft, he became a Packer Feb. 10, 1992, in a transaction which sent a 1992 first-round draft choice (the 17th pick overall) to Atlanta...Head Coach Mike Holmgren is confident the investment will pay impressive future dividends. "I think Brett Favre can be great," he said of the newcomer. "He's young and he has everything that I look for to play the position.

What separates the great ones from the good ones is how hard they work. But he's got all the stuff."...Favre, equally confident, sees "a legitimate chance to start" — while admitting, "Going in, I'm third string and that's the way it should be. Those two guys (Don Majkowski and Mike Tomczak) have performed here and done well."...Packers General Manager Ron Wolf, who engineered the Favre trade, had been impressed with the young field general at the time of the 1991 draft, when he was player personnel director for the New York Jets...At that point, he and the Jets made strenuous efforts to trade up — with eight or nine teams — to select Favre, without success...Brett, rated the premier quarterback in the college ranks as he entered that '91 draft, is the possessor of exceptional arm strength, having thrown the football better than 80 yards on occasion...**1991:** Completed 14 of 32 passes for 160 yards and 2 touchdowns, with 1 interception, in the preseason...Active for three games during the regular season, he played in two, attempting five passes without a completion.

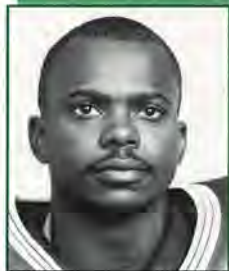

**PRO:** Imperturbable, sure-footed Texan has firmly established himself among the Packers' all-time placekicking elite in only three seasons...With a long career still ahead of him, Chris Jacke already owns the team's single-game field goal record (five), the second-highest career field accuracy percentage in club annals (76.83) — ranking behind only Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud (80.82) — and the Packers' record for most consecutive field goals (15), established over the 1989 and 1990 seasons...Only Chester Marcol and Paul

Hornung, in club history, have made more field goals in a career than Jacke, who has connected on 63 of 82 attempts and has never missed one from inside the 30-yard line, having compiled a perfect 28-for-28 record...He has been 9-for-9 from 20-29 yards in each of his three seasons...Jacke also has missed only one extra point attempt as a Packer, having made 101 of a possible 102 attempts (giving him a 99.02% success rate, best in club history), and shares the team's field goal distance record with Stenerud (53 yards), from which he twice has been successful...He also owns the Packer record for most field goals of 50-plus yards with four...In addition, Jacke six times has provided the Packers' winning margin with his clutch kicks, five of them coming in his rookie, 1989 season...Has been the Packers' leading scorer all of his three seasons and, in 1991, moved up to 11th place on Green Bay's all-time scoring list with 290 points...Jacke should — while the 1992 season is still young — become the 11th player in the team's 73-year history to scale the 300-point plateau and invade the team's all-time Top Ten...Immediately ahead are James Lofton (300) in 10th place, Verne Lewellen (301) in ninth and Max McGee (306), currently eighth...**1991:** Converted 18 of 24 field goals over the season (75 percent), including a perfect 9-for-9 inside the 30-yard line...Also made all 31 extra points he attempted...Led team in scoring with 85 points, tying Minnesota's Fuad Reveiz for 10th place among NFC kickers...Tied club record with 53-yard field goal at New York Jets Nov. 3...Also connected on 41- and 34-yard efforts in same contest, missing a 42-yarder wide right in overtime, and tackled Jets kick returner Terance Mathis in the second quarter after a 49-yard run-back...Hit 22-yard, game-winning FG in 15-13 victory over Tampa Bay Sept. 15...Put 23 of 63 kickoffs in end zone, 15 of which were touchbacks...**1990:** Made 23 of 30 field goal attempts, a 76.7 percent, and 28 of 29 PATs...Also made inroads in the Packer record book en route, establishing a new single-game record by kicking five field goals in a 29-16 victory over the Raiders at Los Angeles Nov. 11, with successes from 39, 51, 32, 23 and 20 yards, and extending his consecutive field goal string to 15, breaking the record set by Stenerud in 1981...Also tied the Packers' FG distance record with a 53-yard effort against the Los Angeles Rams in the season opener Sept. 9 (Stenerud first established the record against the Buccaneers at Tampa Nov. 22, 1981) and Chester Marcol's club record for most field goals of 50 or more yards in a season (two) and most field goals of 50 or more yards in a career (three) by following that 53-yard success with the 51-yarder against the Raiders...Led Packers in scoring for second year in a row with 97 points, and became only the 21st player in team history to score as many as 200 points in a career...Also put 19 of 69 kickoffs in the end zone, 12 of them touchbacks...**1989:** Jacke provided Packers' winning margin in five games, his most dramatic moment coming on Dec. 3 at Tampa when he hit a 47-yarder on the final play of the game to give Green Bay a 17-16, come-from-behind victory...His first decisive effort had come on Sept. 17 when his fifth and last conversion shaded the Saints, 35-34, and his second on Oct. 1, when he connected from 22 yards with 1:42 remaining to propel the Packers past the Falcons at Milwaukee, 23-21...His other winning kicks came vs. the Bears Nov. 5, his second conversion providing a 14-13 margin, and at Milwaukee Nov. 26 when his PAT edged the Vikings, 20-19...Emergued as the team's leading scorer with 108 points, thus becoming the first Packer to score 100 points in a season since Stenerud posted 115 in 1983...Tied a club single-game record along the way, making four field goals against the Bears at Chicago Dec. 17 (19, 44, 23 and 21 yards)...Hit his longest FG of the season, a 52-yarder, vs. Atlanta Oct. 1...Sent 20 of his 51 kickoffs into the end zone, 11 of them resulting in touchbacks...Drafted in the sixth round (142nd pick overall) by Packers.

## Don Majkowski

Quarterback • Virginia • 6th Year

Ht: 6-2½ • Wt: 203 • Born: 2/25/64 • Acq: D10-87

**PRO:** Just beginning to hit the prime of his career, Don Majkowski enters the 1992 season with something to prove...Plagued by lingering questions about his throwing arm since suffering a rotator cuff injury on Nov. 18, 1990, the sixth-year quarterback seemingly is on a mission. "I'm really tired of talking about it," he says of the arm. "I'm just going to go out and prove to everybody that I'm capable of doing the job."...Quite capable during his first five league seasons, Majkowski already has firmly entrenched himself among

Green Bay's all-time passing elite...The third-most accurate passer in team history — his 54.83 career completion percentage entering this season is bettered only by the 57.42% of Bart Starr and the 56.23% of Lynn Dickey — he also stands fourth in club record books in career passing yardage, his 10,599 yards leaving him less than 1,000 yards behind No. 3 Tobin Rote (11,535)...Sixth all-time in touchdown passes with 54, he is within striking distance this season of No. 5 Cecil Isbell (59) and No. 4 Arnie Herber (64)...Third in career completions with 851, exceeded by only Starr (1,808) and Dickey (1,592), Majkowski already is second in career 300-yard games with nine, a figure surpassed only by Dickey's 15...Not limited to the air in his skills, Majkowski has rushed for over 1,000 yards (1,004) in just five pro seasons and boasts an impressive 5.3 yards-per-carry average...A fan favorite due to his colorful style and past heroics, Majkowski enters training camp as the projected starter and with new Head Coach Mike Holmgren harboring little concern about past arm difficulties. "I don't think Don will ever be accused of having a rifle arm or whatever you want to call it," Holmgren says. "My main thing is accuracy. If he can get it there on time and be accurate, then we'll have a good quarterback. Unless something drastic happens, I would expect Don to start."...Also bothered by injuries last season — though they were of his hamstring and his left, non-throwing shoulder — Majkowski is highly cognizant of the precarious nature of his job, admitting that his 1990 shoulder injury "made me more aware of how fast your career can be over in this league. I was on top of the world in '89, and 1990 could have been the last year in my career. You've got to really learn while you're playing this game — you have to take advantage of this opportunity...work your tail off and really give it all you can."...Even in 1991, Majkowski was limited in his opportunity by injury troubles, leaving him with considerable motivation entering the '92 campaign...**1991:** Missed majority of second half of season with hamstring injury suffered at the New York Jets on Nov. 3...Played in nine games overall, starting eight of the first nine, and also seeing relief duty in the season finale at Minnesota (Dec. 21)...Did not play in four games and was

inactive for other three...Finished year second on team in passing (behind Mike Tomczak), completing 115 of 226 (50.9%) for 1,362 yards and 3 touchdowns with 8 interceptions — giving him a passer rating of 59.3...In addition, rushed 25 times for 108 yards (4.3 avg.) and 2 scores to rank as Packers' No. 4 ball carrier...Emerged from preseason as runaway choice to be Green Bay's starting quarterback — over challengers Tomczak, Blair Kiel and Anthony Dilweg — posting 104.0 passer rating...Completed 20 of 39 for season-high 258 yards and 1 TD in 15-13, come-from-behind win over Tampa Bay (Sept. 15)...After Majkowski's 8-yard touchdown pass to Vince Workman with 2:03 remaining had brought the Packers to within 13-12, he then led the Green and Gold on a 4-play, 40-yard drive to the Bucs' 4-yard line — the key play being a 35-yard completion to Perry Kemp — to set up Chris Jacker's game-winning, 22-yard field goal...Also rushed 4 times for 30 yards vs. Buccaneers...Only one week earlier, Majkowski had thrown for a Green Bay season-best 71.4% completion percentage at Detroit (20 of 28 — for 185 yards), also scoring one of his two rushing TDs on the year (from two yards out)...Left Rams contest at Anaheim, Calif. (Sept. 29), with a bruise of his left (non-throwing) shoulder, an injury incurred on his two-yard scoring run in the second quarter which gave Green Bay a 7-3 advantage in an eventual 23-21 setback...Completed 3 of 8 passes and ran 3 times for 8 yards before being sidelined...Inactive for following week's game vs. Dallas, then got additional rest due to Packers' bye week before returning to action against Chicago on Oct. 17...Had another fine showing vs. Buccaneers (Oct. 27), this time in Tampa, as he led Green Bay to its second victory of the season in a 27-0 whitewash of the host club...Hit on 19 of his 28 passes for 223 yards at Bucs, including 10-yard scoring strike to TE Ed West...The following week at New York, was enjoying strong game vs. Jets, having completed 10 of 19 for 123 yards, when he was forced out of contest by a third-quarter hamstring injury, sustained as he was scrambling to the left sideline...Earlier in Jets duel, had shown his considerable running prowess, weaving his way to a 46-yard rushing touchdown which was negated by a holding penalty...Spent the next six weeks on the sidelines before he was called to relief duty in second quarter at Minnesota when Mike Tomczak suffered a rib injury...Completed 5 of 10 attempts for 64 yards vs. Vikings as he drove Green Bay home to 27-7 season-ending victory...**1990:** Was just beginning to find the form which had put him into the Pro Bowl one year earlier when he suffered a devastating shoulder injury in second quarter of Game 10 at Phoenix (Nov. 18)...The injury, sustained to Majkowski's right (throwing) shoulder, was brought to light when he was tackled by the Cardinals' Freddie Joe Nunn along the right sideline, the much larger Nunn's weight coming to rest upon the QB's shoulder...Diagnosed as a half-inch by half-inch tear in the rotator cuff by San Diego doctor Gary Losse, Majkowski had the tear surgically repaired by Losse on Dec. 13...The surgeon was careful to say that Majkowski's rotator cuff problem did not arise solely out of the Nunn tackle, describing the injury as "an accumulation of a year to two years of trauma. Most likely the injury he had in Phoenix just caused generalized bruising or irritation about the shoulder. When he tried to come back from that it just added to everything else that was going on."...Prior to his injury-forced absence, Majkowski had started eight straight games after joining the team late following a lengthy preseason holdout...Threw for 1,925 yards and 10 touchdowns on 150 of 264 passing, with 12 picked off...Also was Packers' No. 3 rusher, carrying 29 times for 186 yards (6.4 avg.), even though he did not play in season's final six games...Had spent the first two games of the season backing up Dilweg after signing only during the week leading up to the opener vs. the L.A. Rams...Made his first appearance in Week 2 vs. Chicago (Sept. 16) with Packers in arrears 31-13 in fourth quarter...Moved Green Bay 84 yards in 11 plays before he was picked off by Bears' Lenuel Stinson in the end zone with but 3:38 showing on the clock...Named the starter for the next game, vs. Kansas City, he completed 19 of 31 for 171 yards in 17-3 loss to Chiefs...Flashed his electrifying '89 form the following week at Detroit (Sept. 30), helping Packers to pull out last-minute, 24-21 comeback win when he hit WR Jeff Query with 26-yard scoring strike with 55 seconds remaining...On the day vs. Lions, he completed 28 of 46 attempts for 289 yards and 3 TDs — while not being intercepted...Two weeks later at Tampa, he threw for season-best 355 yards — but was the victim of career-high five interceptions in 26-14 setback to Bucs...Rebounded vs. Minnesota (Oct. 28) following Green Bay's bye week, completing 11 of 22 for 203 yards and also rushing six yards for a score, in 24-10 triumph over Vikings at Milwaukee...Subsequently threw for 274 yards (22 of 33) vs. defending Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers, though Packers came up short in 24-20 loss...From an artistic standpoint, maybe had his top performance of the season the next week at the Los Angeles Raiders (Nov. 11)...Invaded Tinsel Town and completed 16 of 26 for 195 yards and 2 TDs to lead Green Bay over highly-favored Raiders by 29-16 margin in what turned out to be Majkowski's last full-length appearance of the year...**1989:** Enjoyed truly a "dream" season after

winning the starting job over Randy Wright and Dilweg in training camp...Led the National Football League in passing yards (4,318), attempts (599) and completions (353)...Threw for 27 touchdowns with 20 interceptions, emerging as the league's eighth-ranked passer with a 82.3 passer rating...Finished third in NFL in TD throws, behind only the 29 of the Rams' Jim Everett and the 28 of Cincinnati's Boomer Esiason...Voted to the NFC Pro Bowl squad as the backup to Joe Montana, Majkowski became the first Green Bay quarterback to be named to the all-star game since Bart Starr had been chosen in 1966 (Majkowski later withdrew from the contest for "personal reasons" and did not play)...Won a variety of post-season accolades, among them selection to second-team All-Pro squad of AP and recognition as second-team All-NFC by UPI...Finished second to Montana in voting for AP's NFL "Most Valuable Player," he also was one of six finalists for Miller Lite "NFL Player of the Year"...Set club seasonal records for passing attempts (599), completions (353), most 300-yard games (6) and most consecutive games throwing a touchdown pass (13)...Also established a Packers' single-game high with 59 pass attempts at Detroit (Nov. 12) and tied another when he completed 18 consecutive passes vs. New Orleans on Sept. 17 (equalling Dickey's 1983 feat)...Became only the second 4,000-yard passer in team history — Dickey, with 4,458 yards in 1983, is the other...Over the course of the season, became known as the "Majik Man" for spearheading a series of stirring comebacks which produced five come-from-behind victories, including an NFL-record four one-point wins...Starting all 16 games for the first time in his pro career, Majkowski complemented his passing exploits by finishing as the Packers' No. 2 rusher with 358 yards and 5 TDs on 75 attempts (4.8 avg.)...His 5 scores on the ground tied Brent Fullwood for club leadership...Was 20th in NFC rushing overall and second only to the Eagles' Randall Cunningham among league quarterbacks as a whole...Threw for a career-high 367 yards in a 23-20 overtime win over Detroit at Milwaukee (Oct. 29), completing 29 of 45 in the process, following that up with a 357-yard effort two weeks later at the Silverdome in Lions rematch (with a career-best 34 completions among a club-record 59 attempts), a 31-22 loss...Recorded the first of six 300-yard passing games in 1989 in Week 2 against New Orleans, rallying the Packers from a 24-7 halftime deficit to a 35-34 victory over the Saints (Sept. 17)...Completed 25 of 32 attempts for 354 yards and 3 TDs, also posting personal career-high single-game completion percentage of 78.1 in win over New Orleans...The next week at Anaheim, Calif., followed that up by throwing for 335 yards (25 of 43) in an explosive, 41-38 shootout loss to Rams...Also racked up 300 yards passing against Dallas on Oct. 8 (21-32-313) and at Tampa Bay on Dec. 3 (25-53-331), a game where he led the Packers to an electrifying, last-play victory, the Green and Gold emerging as victors when Chris Jacke's 47-yard field goal gave them a 17-16 advantage as time expired...Perhaps his most memorable play of 1989 was a 14-yard "instant replay" touchdown pass to Sterling Sharpe on a fourth-and-goal with 32 seconds remaining, giving the Packers a 14-13 win over Chicago (Nov. 5)...A willing and elusive runner, he had his most productive rushing day of the year in the Bears rematch, gaining 59 yards on but 6 carries — an average of just under 10 yards per attempt — and scored 2 touchdowns...His first score came on a 17-yard sweep of his own right end in the second quarter, the latter on a one-yard swing into the right corner of the end zone to seal a 40-28 conquest of the Midway Monsters...Played a major role in Packers' 21-17 upset of the reigning Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers on their own turf (Nov. 19) — a game which turned out to be the Niners' last loss of the year as they went on to win Super Bowl XXIV at New Orleans...Shrugging off rib and knee injuries which restricted him coming into the contest, Majkowski staked Green Bay to an early 6-0 lead by scoring on a 2-yard bootleg in the first quarter, he then scored what proved to be the winning touchdown on a well-executed, 8-yard quarterback draw early in the final period — his efforts earning him NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors...1988: Started nine games for Packers, including three of their four victories...He also played the entire second half of Green Bay's lone other success, vs. Vikings on Dec. 11, in relief of Wright, who had suffered a recurrence of a groin injury...Earlier had taken over as the starter in sixth game of year following Wright's initial injury, he led the Packers to a 45-3 demolition of the New England Patriots in Milwaukee, Green Bay's largest margin of victory in 20 years...Continued to find success in the next game, directing the Green and Gold to a 34-14 triumph over the Vikings in Minneapolis (Oct. 16)...Made eight straight starts in all before yielding to Wright in Game 14 (vs. Detroit, Dec. 4) in the aftermath of a shoulder injury he suffered vs. Chicago...Enjoyed his best statistical performance of the season during his starting run, hitting 30 of 43 (69.8%) for 327 yards — the second 300-yard day of his career — vs. Lions at Milwaukee on Nov. 20...After missing Detroit rematch, he returned in second half of Dec. 11 Minnesota contest and added a third-quarter touchdown (11-yarder to Patrick Scott) for a 10-3 lead as Packers scored 18-6 victory to complete a season sweep of the Vikings...Supplemented his

throwing skills by rushing for an impressive 4.8-yard average, carrying 47 times for 225 yards to emerge as club's No. 2 rusher...Scored the first rushing TD of his career, from two yards out, at Minnesota (Oct. 16)...**1987:** Played in seven games, starting five, as a rookie...Made first league start in Week 2 vs. Denver in Milwaukee (Sept. 20) — one week prior to four-week players' strike — and made the most of his opportunity, showing considerable composure in directing Green Bay to a 17-17 tie with the defending AFC champions...Became the first rookie quarterback in team history to throw for 300-plus yards when he passed for 323 vs. Detroit on Oct. 25...Completed 19 of 29 vs. Lions, leading the Packers to 31 first-half points, then rallied the Green and Gold to a game-winning field goal in the fourth quarter of a 34-33 squeaker after Detroit had gained a 33-31 advantage...Also started Nov. 1 vs. Tampa Bay, Nov. 22 vs. Kansas City and Dec. 27 at New Orleans...Closed out season with an inspirational performance vs. the playoff-bound Saints, firing a pair of early TD passes to Walter Stanley and leading the Packers in rushing with 54 yards on only 4 carries...Completed 14 of 29 throws for 219 yards and 3 TDs on the day, with but 1 interception...Drafted by Green Bay in the 10th round (255th overall) in 1987.

## Tony Mandarich

Offensive Guard • Michigan State • 4th Year

Ht: 6-5 • Wt: 303 • Born: 9/23/66 • Acq: D1-89

**PRO:** Beginning to live up to the expectations which preceded him as a 1989 rookie, Tony Mandarich unquestionably enjoyed the finest pro season of his career in 1991...Though he had just started to excel at right tackle, Mandarich faces a new challenge heading into 1992 as he moves to right guard following the off-season acquisition of long-time Cardinals RT Tootie Robbins...The switch, first instituted at the Packers' April and May mini-camps, will take advantage of Mandarich's superior athletic ability in the Mike Holmgren offense, which emphasizes extensive pulling and trapping by the guards in the running game...Already impressed with Mandarich's overall skills, first-year Offensive Line Coach Tom Lovat believes that the change to guard will be highly beneficial for Mandarich. "Tony's a very good athlete. He's really coming into his own," says Lovat. "I've been impressed with him as a man. He's smart and has a good work ethic. It's going to be easier for him moving to guard. It's less of a problem from the standpoint that when you're at guard you don't have to block big, quick guys out in space."...Mandarich, who played right guard as a redshirt freshman at Michigan State University, sees the advantage in making the switch. "We're going to do a lot of pulling and trapping. One of my biggest strengths is being able to run," he says....One of the most celebrated players to enter the National Football League in recent years, he possesses many of the physical skills necessary for success at the pro level, particularly speed and intelligence...Mellowed somewhat from the brash rookie who took Green Bay and the nation by storm in 1989, the 1992 version of Tony Mandarich is a family man with a wife and daughter, highly reflective and, at times, philosophical...Answering the critics who suggest he is a "bust," Mandarich says, "Do you call somebody a bust who got that much notoriety, didn't play at all his rookie year, his second year didn't play well, but in his third year played much better. And then in his fourth year plays better. And his fifth year maybe he's in the Pro Bowl. Is that guy a bust? I'm not saying that's going to happen. Hopefully it will. I wasn't a great offensive lineman at Michigan State my freshman year or my sophomore year or my junior year. My fourth and fifth year I started getting good. I started to get notoriety. It doesn't happen overnight, it very rarely does."...As for the notoriety he received, Mandarich doesn't regret one bit making the splash he did, though he realizes the expectations created at the time — by the media in particular — may have been a tad outlandish. "It's funny because a lot of people meet you and they're like, 'Well, you're not as big as I thought you were going to be,'" says the native Canadian. "And they make you out to be this Superman. These people have to realize that I'm just another human being. Media makes you and media breaks you. And they made me and they broke me within three years."...Taking stock of his personal situation following the 1990 season, Mandarich came to one firm conclusion. "I sat down and evaluated it, and the only way I said I was going to come back and fight it was to just keep my mouth shut and mind my own business and basically, to put it in short, 'Shut up and play good, and let my playing do my talking.'"...And, for the most part, Mandarich's pre-1991 self-evaluation proved to be true...**1991:** Started first 15 games of season at right tackle...Upgraded his pass blocking tremendously over his first two years in the league...Suffered slight ligament tear in his left ankle vs. Detroit (Dec. 15), necessitating that he spend the season finale at Minnesota on the two-man inactive list...Started and played at Tampa Bay (Oct. 27) despite missing entire practice week with severe case of flu; got team's game plan for Bucs contest on flight to Tampa...Made 1 miscellaneous tackle at Chicago (Dec. 8)...**1990:** Starter in all 16 games for the first time in his career, all at right tackle...Made a key block which helped to spring RB Darrell Thompson for a 12-yard touchdown run vs. Minnesota at Milwaukee (Oct. 28), giving the Green and Gold a 10-3 bulge in an eventual 24-10 victory...Gave Packers' running game big surge over right flank when called upon...The single running play employed most often by Green Bay in 1990 — one going off tackle on the strong side (usually over Mandarich's position) — averaged 4.2 yards...Showed great improvement, both in his techniques and in his knowledge of the offense...**1989:** Saw action in 14 games, solely as a reserve, in his rookie season...Missed first two contests under a roster exemption after signing late (Sept. 5), made his NFL debut at the Los Angeles Rams on Sept. 24...Had awed pro scouts in a pre-draft workout on the Michigan State campus in East Lansing, when he recorded a 10-foot, 3-inch

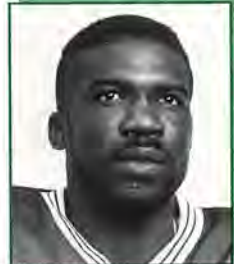

## Bryce Paup

Linebacker • Northern Iowa • 3rd Year

Ht: 6-5 • Wt: 247 • Born: 2/29/68 • Acq: D6-90

**PRO:** Previously obscure player who burst onto the national scene early last season by piling up sacks in volume...Became sudden media star, including national recognition on CBS-TV's "NFL Today"...Found most of his success when employed as Packers' "rover" linebacker — a duty previously performed by Tim Harris...In that role, Paup would bounce around the line of scrimmage just prior to the snap, sometimes rushing the QB from the outside, sometimes shooting in on the inside and other times lining up right over center, but always leaving

the opposition uncertain of his intentions...Big, smart player with a constant push to the football and a never-give-up mentality..."Bryce Paup is a high effort guy who gives you everything he's got and does a lot on effort alone," says new Packers head coach Mike Holmgren. "Teams will have to account for him in their pass-protection schemes this year."...Paup credits his mindset, in part, to his Iowa upbringing..."I guess my parents brought me up to work hard," he says, continuing, "plus I've always been kind of paranoid that if I don't go 100% they'll replace me."...Highly motivated toward constant improvement, he remains self critical, saying, "Sometimes I hate the way I play. I'm my own worst critic. I really get down on myself. But I want to be the best linebacker in the National Football League. I want to go to the Pro Bowl someday. But anything that's worth doing is worth doing right, and I want to be the best."...**1991:** Played in 12 games with one start (at RILB in place of Johnny Holland)...Made the most of that start, earning NFC Co-Defensive Player of the Week honors for his stellar performance vs. Tampa Bay on Sept. 15...Recorded 4 1/2 sacks (for -35 yards), his first NFL safety and 7 solo tackles...Had 2 additional QB pressures as well...His safety, a play where he eluded the upfield block of Bucs FB Robert Wilson before dropping quarterback Vinny Testaverde in the end zone, put Green Bay ahead 2-0 in second quarter and provided eventual winning margin in 15-13 victory...Shared conference award with Philadelphia's Clyde Simmons, who also had picked up 4 1/2 sacks that week...The first Packer to garner Player of the Week recognition since Harris had done it in Week 4 of the '89 season, it also was the first time in the eight-year history of the award that two players from different teams were named to share defensive laurels...Ironically enough, Paup's feats came on a day where he suffered from an upset stomach and, by self-proclamation, was not at 100%...His 4 1/2-sack output was the most sacks by a Green Bay player in one game since DE Ezra Johnson registered 5 on Sept. 3, 1978, at Detroit...By season's end, only the Giants' Pepper Johnson had equalled the 4 1/2-sack game put forth by Paup and Simmons, meaning that the three jointly hold the NFL high mark for most sacks in a game

during the 1991 campaign...Followed strong showing vs. Bucs with another valiant effort the next week at Miami...Terrorizing QB Dan Marino and the Dolphins' offensive line with his constant movement prior to the snap, had 2 more sacks, forced a fumble by Marino, recorded 6 tackles (5 solo) and also pressured the Miami signal-caller on two other occasions...Had begun '91 season by instantly making himself known to the nation as the player who had put Eagles QB Randall Cunningham out for the year...Hit Cunningham low to the ground on the first play of the second quarter, just as the QB was releasing a swing pass to WR Fred Barnett; Cunningham suffered torn knee ligaments which would sideline him for all of '91..."I just went to tackle him. I didn't try to hurt him," said Paup of the play. "All I saw was him standing there. I came up through the middle and the center had me turning, so I didn't know if he had the ball. If I let him go and he still had the ball, I'd look stupid for letting him go..."Also got attention for himself in a more conventional manner against Eagles, getting a season-high 5 quarterback pressures and by recording his first NFL sack (of Cunningham in first quarter)...On the year, he made 28 tackles (24 solo), 7 1/2 sacks (-46 yards) and forced 3 fumbles...His seasonal sack total was 16th in the NFC and second on the team to Tony Bennett's 13, in addition to being 1/2 sack more than 1990 club leader Harris...Led NFL in sacks after Weeks 3-6 before being overtaken by Redskins' Charles Mann...Was tied with Bennett for team lead in fumbles caused...Also added 2 solo special teams tackles...Had season curtailed when on Nov. 17 vs. Minnesota he suffered a tear in the gastroc muscle of his left leg...Injury was a dark ending to what had started out as one of the happiest days of Paup's life, when his wife, Denise, gave birth to the couple's first child at 8:05 a.m. that day after a night-long vigil at the hospital...Spent following two games, vs. Indianapolis and at Atlanta, on inactive list due to gastroc problem...Returned on Dec. 8 at Chicago, but aggravated injury and was forced to leave game...Went on injured reserve four days later, effectively ending his season...Had 14 of his 22 quarterback pressures in first six weeks of 1991...Forced a fumble to go along with 3 pressures at the Rams on Sept. 29...Saw extra playing time at Detroit in Week 2 when Brian Noble went out with minor knee injury...1990: Spent majority of rookie season on injured reserve with preseason hand injury suffered vs. Cleveland...Activated off IR on Nov. 17, but was inactive following day at Phoenix...Played in five of final six games, also sitting out on inactive list at Minnesota (Dec. 2)...Personal highlight of year came on Dec. 9 when he recovered an onside kick, leading to a Green Bay touchdown, in Packers' failed comeback try in 20-14 loss to Seattle...Saw most of his action on special teams, making 3 solo tackles...Also had 1 unassisted stop from linebacker spot...Sixth-round draft choice (159th overall) of Packers in 1990.

**COLLEGE:** Three-year starter and four-year letterman (1986-89) at Northern Iowa...Played a host of different positions for Division I-AA Panthers, seeing action at inside and outside linebacker as well as at defensive end and nose tackle...Recorded 298 career tackles (157 solo), in addition to 6 forced fumbles, 3 fumble recoveries, 2 interceptions, 12 passes defensed, 24 tackles for loss and 15 sacks...Made career-high 115 tackles (84 solo) as a senior, earning All-Gateway Conference honors and being named a third-team All-American by AP...Majored in business.

Offensive Tackle • East Carolina • 11th Year

**PRO:** Mammoth veteran offensive tackle, was acquired in an off-season trade with the Phoenix Cardinals in an effort to beef up Packers' line...Consistent, reliable performer at right tackle over his 10 seasons with the Cardinals...Started 121 total games for the Big Red, including 31 of 32 over the past two seasons...Obtained in a Jan. 30, 1992, trade with Phoenix, Green Bay giving up its sixth-round pick in the '92 draft (Cardinals subsequently selected OT Brian Brauning with the choice)...No stranger to new Packers Offensive Line Coach Tom Lovat, Robbins played for Lovat both from 1982-84, when the Cardinals franchise was still in St. Louis, as well as during the last two seasons...Based on his "up close" vantage point of late, Lovat believes that Robbins still has a couple years of good football left in him despite the fact that the career Cardinal is creeping into his mid-30s..."Tootie can still run," assesses Lovat. "He still has a burst. He had a very productive year (in 1991). He played in all but about 30 plays. The year before it was the same way. I just felt he was a young man with some production left in him. We thought he might be available. When he was, we moved quickly to get him. We're looking for big people who can run. It's hard to find (quality) tackles..."...A dedicated athlete, Robbins readied himself for the '92 campaign by working with a personal trainer this past off-season in an effort to shed weight and to increase his flexibility..."I love to work out and I know I need to be more flexible," says the imposing Robbins. "I think it'll help my longevity..."...When fully healthy, he is able to use his tremendous size (6-5, 315 pounds) to physically dominate opposing defensive linemen...Originally a fourth-round draft choice (90th overall) in 1982 by the then-St. Louis Cardinals, Robbins moved into the Cardinals' starting lineup during his strike-shortened rookie season and for the most part remained the incumbent at right tackle up until his acquisition by Green Bay...Was a fine complement to Cardinals' left tackle, Pro Bowler Luis Sharpe, since two had first joined the club together in '82...**1991:** Started first 15 games of year at right tackle, also seeing action as a reserve in Phoenix's season-finale vs. New Orleans (Dec. 22)...**1990:** For second time in his career, starter in all 16 of team's games...Battled through host of nagging injuries, missing just one practice and a portion of another during entire year...After lining up for every offensive play from scrimmage in first 10 contests, missed portion of New England game (Nov. 25) due to an ankle sprain...Important factor in Cardinals' success on the ground, as evidenced by rookie RB Johnny Johnson's selection to NFC Pro Bowl squad...**1989:** Missed seven games due to two different injuries...Did start at right tackle in other nine contests...Suffered a twisted knee in season opener vs. Detroit (Sept. 10), necessitating his placement on injured reserve five days later...After spending required six games on IR, returned to starting lineup Oct. 29 vs. Dallas...Felled by a ligament sprain in his right elbow vs. the L.A. **PRO:** Once seemingly invincible — he missed only one non-strike game during his first five NFL seasons — Ken Ruettgers has fallen victim to knee and hamstring injuries over the last two seasons which have greatly limited his time on the field...New Head Coach Mike Holmgren, while realizing Ruettgers' abilities, was concerned about the offensive tackle's health heading into the Packers' spring mini-camps. "Ken's a good football player," says Holmgren. "His concern with me was his physical status. But he participated in (mini-camp drills)."...Coming out

of the mini-camps, Offensive Line Coach Tom Lovat felt assured that Ruettgers was at 100%, saying, "He feels pretty good, and from the work he's done that's pretty obvious. If he stays healthy that will be a big plus. Those left tackles are hard to find."...A fixture at left tackle since the opening game of the 1986 campaign, his second year in the league, Ruettgers has attained a fairly high level of success in his career, mainly due to his preparedness...An exhaustive seeker of perfection, not only does he spend long hours in the weight room, but he also thoroughly studies his opponent during the workday and after hours...Included in his analysis is a personal "book" which he keeps on each defensive end he faces over a season...Comprehensive in nature, its contents include "just what their moves are, what their personality types are from what I can determine on film, and what they've done against me and against other teams," the author, Ruettgers, reveals. "I take things down," he says...Measured into Ruettgers' success, undoubtedly, is the strenuous off-season regimen which he maintains, a program consisting of, among other things, four days of weightlifting per week, racquetball, basketball, karate, jumping rope and hitting the speed bag...1991: Got into but four games as he was hobbled by nagging hamstring injury...Started at left tackle in Packers' first three games before suffering pulled hamstring in practice on Sept. 18...The injury — the first hamstring problem he had experienced in his career — was at first thought to be relatively minor; it lingered, however, forcing Ruettgers to miss the next six games (inactive), plus Green Bay's bye week, while on the mend...Returned to start vs. Buffalo on Nov. 10 in Milwaukee, but re-injured hamstring while pulling on running play...Placed on injured reserve on Nov. 13, where he spent the remainder of the year...Recovered fumble vs. Buccaneers (Sept. 15)...Had made miscellaneous tackle at Detroit one week prior...1990: Missed five starts at mid-season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on both of his knees

during the Packers' bye week, ending string of 37 consecutive games in which he had started dating back to Week 2 of '88 campaign...**1989:** Started all 16 games for second time in his career as Packers enjoyed 10-6 season...**1988:** Missed the season opener vs. the Rams (Sept. 4) due to shoulder injury sustained in Packers' initial preseason contest, Aug. 6 vs. the N.Y. Giants...His absence in inaugural snapped a streak of 44 straight non-strike games played, beginning with opening duel of his '85 rookie year...**1987:** Had perhaps the finest season of his career, giving up only 3 1/2 quarterback sacks over the course of the strike-shortened, 12-game schedule...Recognized for that accomplishment, among other things, when he was voted as Packers' "Offensive Player of the Year" by Wisconsin sports media — the first time a Green Bay offensive lineman has been so honored since center Ken Bowman was similarly recognized in 1971...Was the starter in all 12 "union" games...Ruettgerts' season-long performance was all the more impressive in light of the fact that he had been forced to overcome an attack of mononucleosis during the early weeks of training camp...**1986:** First gained league-wide notoriety in finale against the N.Y. ## Sterling Sharpe

Wide Receiver • South Carolina • 5th Year

**PRO:** Unquestionably one of the league's top pass catchers, charismatic Sterling Sharpe just may be the NFL's best receiver "after the catch"...Using his superior upper-body strength to advantage, he has become widely known for his fearlessness across the middle and his skill in taking a short pass for an additional 10-20 yards..."I think the greatest asset of mine is that I don't mind catching the ball and going back inside," Sharpe says. "I don't mind challenging linebackers and defensive linemen. And down near the goal line or wherever you've got to have that extra yard. I think my size and strength really comes in handy."...After only four seasons, already has firmly estab-

lished himself in the Packer record books, standing seventh all-time in both career receptions (281) and receiving yards (4,280)...Having made at least one reception in 55 consecutive games (dating back to the 10th game of his 1988 rookie season), Sharpe is on the brink of reaching another club milestone...Coming into the year, he trails only the 58 straight games in which James Lofton caught a pass (from the 8th game in 1979 through the 8th game in 1983) in this category...Capable of climbing all the way up to fourth on the Packers' all-time receiving list during the '92 campaign, with his 281 receptions Sharpe is immediately behind #6 Bill Howton (303), #5 Paul Coffman (322) and #4 Max McGee (345)...Based on the 70.3 catches he has averaged over his four Green Bay seasons, Sharpe would, in fact, make that lofty ascent in 1992...New Head Coach Mike Holmgren is anticipating the same high level of production from his talented wide receiver, saying, "I'm expecting great things from Sterling Sharpe this year. He has gone to the Pro Bowl — he has that type of ability. And I'm expecting him to emerge as a leader, as well, of that unit"...Sharpe has started all 64 games during his four league seasons, in the process leading the Packers in both receptions and receiving yards each year...Is only the second player in team history to catch 60-plus passes in three consecutive seasons (90 in 1989, 67 in '90 and 69 in '91), the other being Lofton, who had five such years including three straight from 1984-86...Along with Lofton, the pair also share the distinction of being the only players in club annals to catch 50-or-more passes over four consecutive seasons, Lofton having accomplished the feat from 1983-86 and seven years in all...Reaching a milestone which Lofton was unable to attain, Sharpe in 1989 led the NFL in receptions with 90, becoming the first Packer to set the league pace since legendary Don Hutson last did so in 1945...Tied for sixth (with Carroll Dale) for most career 100-yard games, the pair having 12 apiece: Sharpe needs four to tie McGee's 16 and five to reach Howton's 17...Is tied with Howton for most career 1,000-yard seasons, the two stand behind only Lofton's five such years...Enters season 29th on Green Bay's all-time scoring list with 144 career points, needing 66 points (11 touchdowns) to crack the club's Top 20...Highly respected among other players, he has served as team captain each of the last two seasons...**1991:** Had yet another impressive season, for the fourth straight year starting all 16 games and leading the team in receptions...Finished seventh in the NFC with 69 catches for 961 yards (13.9 avg.) and 4 touchdowns, his reception total matching the fifth best in club history (Lofton also had 69 in 1985) and exceeded only by his team-record 90 in 1989...Fell 39 receiving yards shy of his third straight 1,000-yard season, though his total was good enough to rank him 10th in the conference...Passed both Gerry Ellis (267) and Dale (275) to take over seventh on club's all-time receiving chart...Made a season-high 8 receptions for 133 yards — including a 58-yard TD catch from Mike Tomczak, his long reception of '91 — vs. Buffalo at Milwaukee (Nov. 10)...Sharpe's effort against the Bills also was his only 100-yard game of the year...Had his lone two-TD game of the season Dec. 1 at Atlanta in front of family and friends, catching 7 passes for 98 yards...Sharpe's scoring grabs of 4 and 20 yards from Tomczak gave him his first multiple touchdown contest since Nov. 4, 1990, vs. San Francisco...Also had 7 receptions (for 82 yards) the following week at Chicago (Dec. 8)...Caught a 13-yard TD throw from Blair Kiel to close the scoring in 20-17 setback to Dallas (Oct. 6)...Was limited to one catch on but two occasions — at Detroit Sept. 8 and vs. Indianapolis Nov. 24...With his 4 touchdowns, finished third on team in scoring...Also ranked 17th in NFC in total yards from scrimmage with 965 (4 rushing)...**1990:** Earned his second straight berth on the NFC Pro Bowl squad (this time as a reserve) with another terrific season...Caught 67 passes for 1,105 yards (a career-best 16.5-yard average) and 6 TDs...Upped his career catch total to 212, tying him with the L.A. 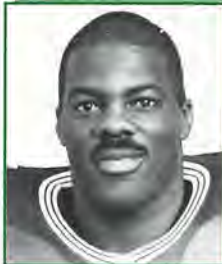

**PRO:** One of the best pure athletes on the team, Scott Stephen is ever capable of making the big play on defense...Well constructed for his position, he is particularly strong at the point of attack...Since taking over as the starter at strong-side outside linebacker in 1990 following the retirement of long-time standout John Anderson (1978-89), has more than adequately filled No. 59's big shoes, registering more total tackles in each of the last two years — 91 in 1991,

**PRO:** Savvy veteran performer who had a successful first season with the Packers in 1991...Took over Green Bay's quarterback fortunes in Game 9 at the N.Y. Jets when starter Don Majkowski suffered a hamstring injury, starting final seven contests, and emerged as the Packers' '91 passing leader at season's end...Acquired as a 'Plan B' free agent last year (March 30, 1991) from the Chicago Bears — for whom he played his first six league seasons (1985-90) — Tomczak enters training camp confident of

his abilities, saying, "I feel very competitive with Don. I'm not going to concede anything to Don, or to Brett (Favre)."...A one-time starter for the Bears, Tomczak went 23-11 as Chicago's starting QB...Possessor of extensive post-season experience, heading into the 1992 season he remains the only Bears quarterback to have won a playoff game (vs. Philadelphia in 1988 and vs. New Orleans in 1990) since Chicago's 1985 Super Bowl season...**1991:** Started last seven games of the season in place of an injured Majkowski and emerged as the Packers' seasonal passing leader...Completed 128 of 238 passes (53.8%) for 1,490 yards and 11 touchdowns with 9 interceptions...His 72.6 passer rating placed him 12th in the NFC...Earlier in year had played in five other games as a reserve, was inactive for three contests and did not see any action in one...Also rushed 17 times for 93 yards and 1 TD to rank sixth on club...Took over at quarterback in third quarter at N.Y. 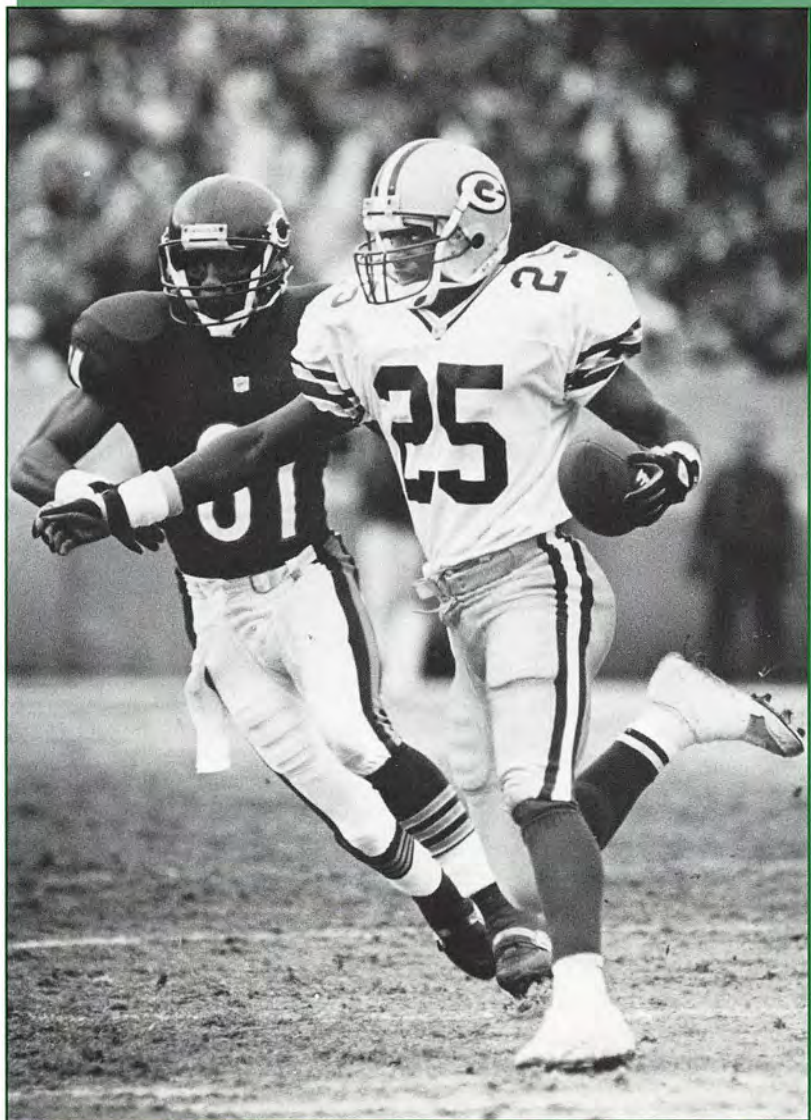
Founded as a town team in 1919, when Woodrow Wilson was in the White House, the Green Bay Packers carry a .564 overall winning percentage into the 1992 National Football League season after playing 1,241 games. Over the 73-year span, they have won 676 games, lost 518 and tied 47. Only two other teams in the annals of professional football, the Chicago Bears and the Phoenix (formerly Chicago and St. Louis) Cardinals, have played more than 1,000 games.

The 1,241-game total includes a record of 489 victories — compared to 413 defeats and 36 ties — in league and playoff competition, a .541 percentage, and a record of 187 victories, 105 losses and 11 ties in non-league play, a .635 percentage.

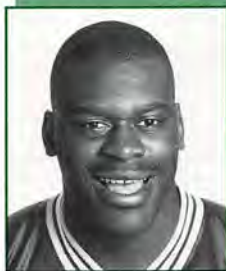

## SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

**Sept. 15** Trailing 13-5 with just under 4 minutes remaining, the Packers strike for 10 points on their last two possessions to post their first victory of the season, pulling out a 15-13 win over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Lambeau Field. Taking over at their own 24-yard-line with 3:59 left to play, the Packers launch successful rally by sweeping 76 yards in 7 plays, quarterback Don Majkowski hitting Vince Workman with an 8-yard scoring pass with 2:03 remaining. The Packer defense, with the aid of a 10-yard sack of Tampa quarterback Vinny Testaverde by rookie nose tackle Esera Tuaolo, then quickly forces a Buccaneer punt following the kickoff. Regaining the football at the Tampa Bay 44, the Packers immediately move into field goal range on Majkowski's 35-yard pass to Perry Kemp along the right sideline. Four plays later, Chris Jacke hits from 22 yards to provide decisive margin. Majkowski completes 20 of 38 passes overall for 258 yards, 6 of them to Sterling Sharpe for 95 yards, Allen Rice pacing a 97-yard rushing attack with 49 yards in 10 attempts.

Linebacker Bryce Paup plays havoc with Bucs' Testaverde in his "rover" role, being credited with 4.5 quarterback sacks and a safety, a performance which earns him National Football Conference "Co-Defensive Player of the Week" honors in company with Eagles' Clyde Simmons, also the author of a 4/5 sack effort.

**Sept. 22** Packers carry 13-6 lead over Dolphins into the fourth quarter when football fates take a perverse twist. Don Majkowski, attempting to pass from his own end zone, drops the football and Dolphins' Chuck Klingbeil recovers for a Miami touchdown. Pete Stoyanovich's conversion gives Dolphins 13-13 tie. Later in the period, Miami reaches Green Bay 14-yard-line, setting up what proves to be decisive, 31-yard field goal by Stoyanovich, giving Dolphins a 16-13 victory. Majkowski completes 19 of 36 passes for 238 yards, with one intercept, in losing effort.

**Sept. 29** Sabotaged by two Rams touchdowns during a 7-second span in the second quarter, the result of Packer fumbles, the Green and Gold see a bristling fourth quarter comeback fall just short in a 23-21 loss to the Rams at Anaheim Stadium. In arrears 23-7 in the final period, quarterback Blair Kiel engineers two long scoring drives, a 10-play, 76-yard march capped by a 2-yard touchdown pass to Perry Kemp and a 4-play, 60-yard push climaxed by a 5-yard TD throw to Vince Workman, the latter coming with 4:49 remaining. Chris Jacke's third conversion of the day lifts Packers to within two points but they are unable to regain the football, the Rams registering three first downs following the kickoff to run out the clock and preserve victory.

Kiel displays a hot hand in a relief role, completing 11 of 15 passes for 149 yards - without an interception - after being summoned from the bench to replace the injured Don Majkowski in the second quarter. Free safety Chuck Cecil is a defensive standout, finishing the afternoon with 11 unassisted tackles.

**Oct. 27** Packers forge their first shutout in six years, scoring in each quarter en route to a 27-0 victory over Buccaneers at Tampa Stadium. Linebacker Brian Noble scored what proved to be the winning touchdown in the sixth minute of the first quarter, picking up a fumble by Buccaneer quarterback Chris Chandler at the one-yard-line and barging into the end zone for the score. Defensive end Matt Brock set up the score, forcing the fumble in the process of registering an 8-yard sack. A pair of Chris Jacke field goals, of 34 and 45 yards, pad the lead to 13-0 before quarterback Don Majkowski hits tight end Ed West with a 10-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter and Vince Workman adds a third TD in final period on a 4-yard run, finishing a 58-yard drive.

It is the Packers' first shutout since December 1, 1985, when the Buccaneers also were the victims, 21-0, in what has come to be known as the "Snow Bowl."

**Nov. 3** A "Hail Mary" pass for a touchdown by the Jets, ending the first half, is combined with a missed field goal and a fumbled punt to scuttle the Packers in overtime, 19-16, at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. With the score tied at 16-all in the sudden death period, the Packers miss an opportunity to end it when Chris Jacke's 42-yard field goal attempt is wide right. The Green Bay defense shuts down the Jets on the next series, forcing a punt, but it is fumbled by Vai Sikahema at the Green Bay 23-yard-line, the Jets' Bobby Houston recovering. Three plays later, Pat Leahy kicks a 37-yard field goal to seal Jet victory.

Mike Tomczak, replacing the injured Don Majkowski at quarterback, completes 8 of 11 passes for 73 yards and the Packers' only touchdown of the game, a one-yard toss to tight end Ed West in the third quarter. Majkowski hits on 10 of 19 for 123 yards before suffering a hamstring injury in the third quarter. Linebacker Brian Noble paces the Packer defense with 8 unassisted tackles, Johnny Holland weighing in with 7.

**Nov. 10** Tomczak, making his first start as a Packer, passes for a career-high 317 yards but it is not enough to carry the day against the defending AFC champion Buffalo Bills, who ultimately prevail at Milwaukee County Stadium, 34-24. Overall, Tomczak completes 23 of 38 passes, 8 of them to Sterling Sharpe, who closes out with 133 yards and a touchdown. The Bills carry the day, however, via the efforts of quarterback Jim Kelly, author of two touchdown passes, wide receiver James Lofton (6 catches for 114 yards) and all-pro running back Thurman Thomas, who rushes for 106 yards in 24 attempts.



# SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

**Nov. 17** With Tomczak throwing a pair of touchdown passes (75 yards to Charles Wilson and one yard to Jackie Harris), the Packers move out to a 21-14 lead over Minnesota at halftime in Lambeau Field but Vikings take charge in the second half and post 21 unanswered points with a strong running attack to depart with a 35-21 victory, Herschel Walker closing out the afternoon with 95 yards in 20 carries.

**Nov. 24** The Packers, mounting a season-high, 163-yard running attack, weather a late Indianapolis surge to shade the Colts in their final Milwaukee appearance of the season, 14-10. Tomczak plays a prominent role in the successful effort, engineering a 48-yard run along the left sidelines in the third quarter to set up the eventual winning touchdown, one he personally scores with a 2-yard bootleg into the right corner of the end zone to cap a 71-yard drive and give the Packers a 14-3 lead. The Colts close in with a fourth quarter touchdown on a 6-yard scoring pass from quarterback Jeff George to Bill Brooks, then threaten again with a march in the closing minutes but Mark Murphy's 10-yard sack of George in a third-and-3 situation saves the day, George's fourth down pass falling incomplete to end the drive. Murphy, ringleader of the defense, finishes with 10 solo tackles and 3 assists. Darrell Thompson spearheads Packer ground game with 63 yards in 15 attempts.

**Dec. 1** The football gods continue to frown upon the Packers as they make their final appearance in Atlanta's Fulton County Stadium. Leading 31-28 on a 27-yard Chris Jacke field goal, they see their victory hopes begin to dissolve when punter Paul McJulien fumbles the center's snap and, after picking up the football and attempting to run for it, is stopped short of a first down at the Green Bay 41-yard-line with 51 seconds remaining. Two plays later, Atlanta quarterback Chris Miller hits Andre Rison with a 16-yard scoring pass to give Falcons a 35-31 victory. Squandered in the process are a 276-yard passing day by quarterback Mike Tomczak (22 of 35) and Darrell Thompson's best rushing day as a professional, 93 yards in 18 attempts.

**Dec. 15** Packers nurse tenuous 10-7 lead over Detroit into fourth quarter, then see Lions pull away to a 21-17 victory with two late touchdowns, the final and decisive one on a 78-yard punt return by Mel Gray, disappointing 43,881 hardy fans who braved cold which saw the wind chill dip to 18 degrees below zero. The maneuver gives Detroit a 21-10 advantage and eventually seals Packers' fate, even though they rebound with a 6-play, 41-yard scoring drive, finished off by a 12-yard pass from quarterback Mike Tomczak to Vince Workman. Darrell Thompson turns in another strong rushing performance, gaining 71 yards in 15 attempts, as Packers mount massive statistical margin, outgaining Lions 367 yards to 206 in the losing effort.

**Dec. 21** Packers build 10-0 first quarter lead on a 42-yard field goal by Chris Jacke and a 12-yard scoring pass from Tomczak to Workman, proceed to wrap up their 1991 season on a positive note with a 27-7 victory over the Vikings in Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome at Minneapolis. Jacke and Workman follow the same formula in the third quarter, the former adding a 39-yard field goal and Workman a one-yard TD run to make it 20-0. Keith Woodside's 10-yard scoring burst in the fourth quarter concludes the Packers' TD production for the afternoon - and his best rushing day of the season, 76 yards in 19 attempts.

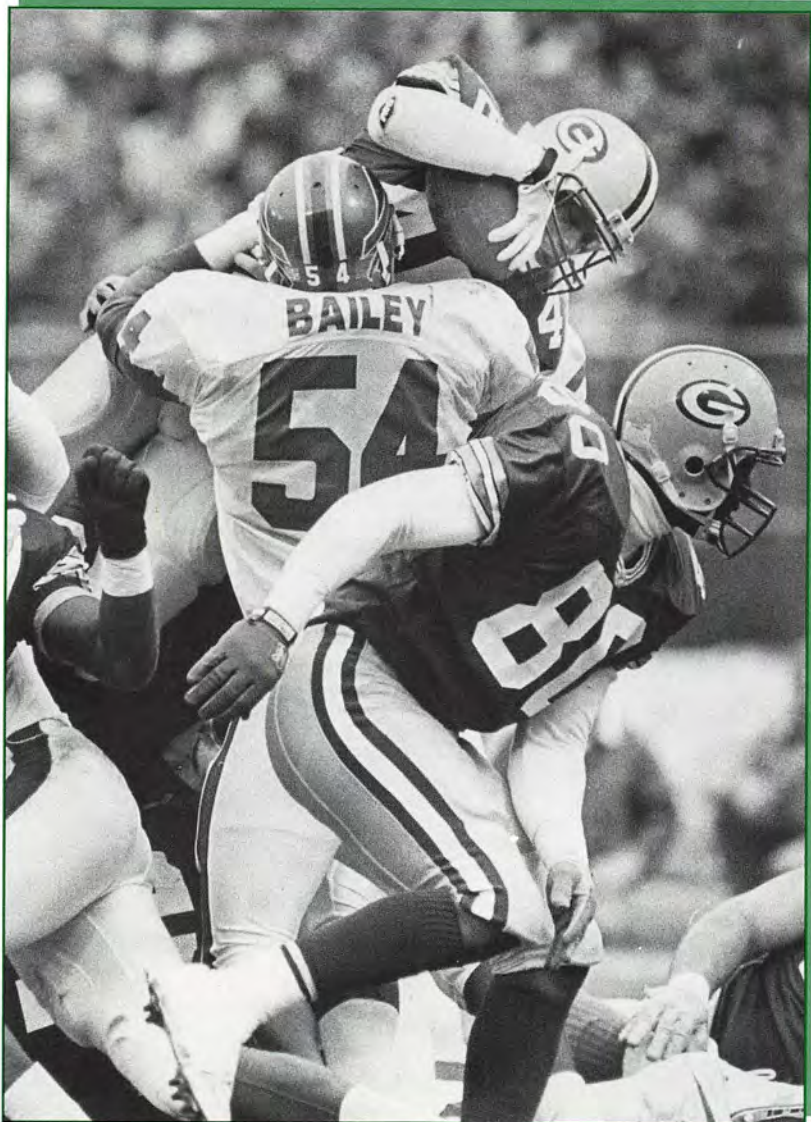

Charles Wilson finished among the National Football Conference's kickoff return leaders for the second straight year in 1991, tying with the 49ers' Dexter Carter for third place honors with a 22.7-yard average for 23 returns. He also finished third in the NFC as a rookie in 1990, with a 22.8-yard average for 35 runbacks. The Packers' 27-0 shutout of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, recorded Oct. 27 of last season, was their first since 1985, when they blanked the Buccaneers in the "Snow Bowl" Dec. 1, 1985, 21-0.

# PACKER SUPER BOWL STORY

## SUPER BOWL I

January 15, 1967

Memorial Coliseum; Los Angeles, Calif.

Paid Attendance: 61,946

### Green Bay 35, Kansas City 10

The Packers launched the Super Bowl series by whipping Kansas City's American Football League champions 35-10 behind the passing of Bart Starr, the receiving of Max McGee and a key interception by All-Pro safety Willie Wood.

Vince Lombardi's repeating NFL champions broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 50-yard return of an interception to the Chiefs' 5-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. The pass, authored by the Chiefs' Len Dawson, had been intended for Kansas City tight end Fred Arbanas.

McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler (injured on the Packers' first offensive series) after having caught only four passes all season, snared seven from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores, counting one on a 5-yard run in the third quarter and the other on a one-yard bolt in the final period.

The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter, the only touchdown on a seven-yard pass from Dawson to Curtis McClinton.

Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 touchdowns and was chosen the game's most valuable player. His scoring strikes came on a 37-yard collaboration with McGee in the first quarter and a 13-yard pitch to the aging end in the decisive third period.

The Packers collected \$15,000 per man and the Chiefs \$7,500 apiece — the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports at the time.

## SUPER BOWL II

January 14, 1968

Orange Bowl; Miami, Fla.

Paid Attendance: 75,564

### Green Bay 33, Oakland 14

Having acquired a third consecutive NFL championship just two weeks earlier, the Packers embellished that record-tying parlay by winning the Super Bowl title for the second straight year. This time, they dispatched the AFL champion Raiders 33-14 in a game that drew the first \$3-million gate in football history.

Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown and directed a Packers attack that was in control all the way after building up a 16-7 halftime lead.

Don Chandler kicked four field goals (39, 20, 43 and 31 yards), and All-Pro cornerback Herb Adderley highlighted the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard interception return of a Daryle Lamonica pass.

After leading by only 3-0 at the quarter, the Packers padded their margin to 16-7 at halftime by way of three Chandler field goals and a 62-yard scoring pass from Starr to split end Boyd Dowler. They then left the Raiders behind with a 10-point third period, Donny Anderson scoring on a 2-yard run and Chandler with his final field goal.

The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packers coach, ending nine years at Green Bay in which he won six Western Conference championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowls, a record unprecedented in pro football history.

## ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers have won more championships — eleven — than any other team in National Football League history. They won their first three by league standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight since the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933 (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967). Green Bay also is the only NFL team to win three straight titles, having done it twice (1929-30-31 and 1965-66-67).

In addition, the Packers won the first two Super Bowls (over Kansas City in 1967, 35-10, and over Oakland in 1968, 33-14).

Chicago's Bears rank second with nine NFL titles, followed by the Giants with six, the Redskins with five, and the Lions, Browns and 49ers with four each.

## GAME BY GAME

**1936 — GREEN BAY 21, BOSTON REDSKINS 6** (Polo Grounds, New York) — Although New York was not represented in the title playoff, the game was played in the Polo Grounds because the Redskins' franchise was being shifted to Washington, D.C., by George Marshall. A turnout of 29,545 saw Don Hutson take a 43-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes, and the Packers were never behind.

**1938 — NEW YORK 23, GREEN BAY 17** (Polo Grounds, New York) — The Packers overcame an early 9-0 New York lead, spawned by two blocked punts, but could not hold off the Giants in the second half. The Packers began to close in early in the second period, Arnie Herber capitalizing on a Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen interception by lofting a 50-yard touchdown strike to Carl Mulleneaux, cutting the Giants margin to 9-7.

The Giants shortly converted a mid-field fumble by Packer fullback Eddie Jankowski into a 16-7 lead before Green Bay again trimmed the deficit to two points before the half was over; Clarke

Hinkle crashing over from the 6-inch line following a 66-yard Cecil Isbell pass to Wayland Becker. The Packers then forged in front in opening minutes of the second half for the first and only time in the game; an Engebretsen field goal presenting them with a 17-16 edge. The Giants, however, stormed back with a 61-yard scoring drive, capped by a 23-yard pass from Ed Danowski to Hank Soar. Soar fought his way over the goal line from the 2, with Hinkle clinging to one leg, for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A crowd of 48,120, a playoff record, sat in on proceedings.

**1939 — GREEN BAY 27, NEW YORK 0** (State Fair Park, Milwaukee) — The Packers made playoff history by scoring first shutout ever registered in NFL championship game. Despite bitter 35 m.p.h. wind, both Arnie Herber and Cecil Isbell passed for touchdowns in leading Green Bay to its fifth world championship before 32,279 fans.

Green Bay mounted a 7-0 halftime lead, by dint of a Herber scoring strike to Milt Gantenbein, and

pulled away in the third quarter on a 29-yard field goal by Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen and a long TD pass from Isbell to Joe Laws. The Packers added 10 more points in the fourth quarter on a 42-yard field goal by Ernie Smith and a short scoring run by fullback Eddie Jankowski.

**1944 — GREEN BAY 14, NEW YORK 7** (Polo Grounds, New York) — With peerless pass catcher Don Hutson employed primarily as a decoy for the Giant defense, fullback Ted Fritsch emerged the offensive hero of Packers' sixth world title victory.

Fritsch scored both Green Bay touchdowns, one on a 2-yard run in the second quarter and the other on a 26-yard pass-and-run collaboration with Irv Comp in the third. Ward Cuff scored the Giants' touchdown with a one-yard plunge on the first play of the final period. Joe Laws, the Packers' veteran, 34-year-old all-purpose halfback, had a brilliant day, setting a playoff record with three interceptions and claiming ground gaining honors with 74 yards in 13 carries.

**1960 — PHILADELPHIA 17, GREEN BAY 13** (Franklin Field, Philadelphia) — Packers erected a 6-0 lead in the second period and were out in front by 13-10 in fourth quarter before yielding to late surge by Eagles, who scored the deciding points on a 5-yard burst by Ted Dean.

Green Bay moved ahead in first quarter on a 20-yard Paul Hornung field goal. Hornung added 23-yard FG in second quarter but Eagles tied it 6-6 on a 35-yard scoring pass from Norm Van Brocklin to Tommy McDonald and edged ahead via Bobby Walston's first conversion. Walston followed with a 15-yard FG for a 10-6 halftime lead.

The Packers stopped Philadelphia at its own four late in the third period, then recaptured lead on a 7-yard TD pass from Bart Starr to Max McGee. A 58-yard kickoff return by Dean, however, ignited Eagles and victory eluded Packers, making their first title game appearance in 16 years.

**1961 — GREEN BAY 37, NEW YORK 0** (City Stadium, Green Bay — renamed Lambeau Field in 1965) — Paul Hornung, on leave from the Army, scored a record-tying 19 points to key Packer decimation of Giants in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

A record Packer home crowd of 39,029 watched the Green and Gold erupt for 24 points in the second quarter. In all, the Packers scored seven times against the NFL's top defensive team of 1961, amassing four touchdowns and three field goals. The defense, meanwhile, was proving a devastating complement to the attack, intercepting four Giant passes and recovering one fumble.

Two interceptions, by Ray Nitschke and defensive back Hank Gremminger, set up touchdowns No. 2 and 3 while the fumble recovery by Forrest Gregg led to Hornung's second field goal and a Jesse Whitenton interception to Hornung's final FG.

**1962 — GREEN BAY 16, NEW YORK 7** (Yankee Stadium, New York) — Out front all the way in a raw, cyclonic setting, Packers weather siege by vengeful Giants in primitive, hand-to-hand struggle. Ray Nitschke proves principal frustration to New Yorkers, seeking redemption for shutout humiliation in '61 title game. His deflection triggers interception to blunt early Giant drive to Green Bay 10. On way to being named game's most valuable player, he also registers two interceptions, one of which led to the Packers' only touchdown of the afternoon. The other set up a 29-yard field goal by Jerry Kramer, whose trio of three-pointers provided eventual margin.

Giants' only TD comes on block of Max McGee punt in Green Bay end zone midway through the third quarter.

A battered Jim Taylor sets playoff record with 31 rushing attempts, good for 85 yards.

**1965 — GREEN BAY 23, CLEVELAND 12** (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Field softened by four-inch snow made Packer backs only run harder as Lambeau Field crowd of 50,777 celebrated third championship in five years. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung amassed 201 yards rushing in rally that overcame Browns' early 9-7 lead.

Packers charged to 7-0 first-quarter advantage on 47-yard Bart Starr pass to Carroll Dale and Don Chandler's conversion, but Cleveland moved in front on a 17-yard TD strike from Frank Ryan to Gary Collins and 24-yard Lou Groza field goal.

Green Bay rebounded, however, with 15- and 23-yard FGs by Chandler, the latter following a Willie Wood interception, to claim 13-9 lead subsequently trimmed to a single point by a second Groza FG shortly before the intermission.

Starr settled the issue in third quarter, escorting the Packers on a 90-yard, 11-play scoring drive climaxed by Hornung's 13-yard sweep of Browns' right perimeter.

**1966 — GREEN BAY 34, DALLAS 27** (Cotton Bowl, Dallas) — Bart Starr has one of his finest hours, passing for four touchdowns as Packers win second straight title and fourth in six years. Tom Brown thwarts last-minute Cowboy bid, and the majority of 74,152 Cotton Bowl fans, with end zone interception of Don Meredith's fourth down pass from Green Bay 2.

Packers mounted quick 14-0 lead on a 17-yard Starr pass to Elijah Pitts and 18-yard scoring run with a fumble recovery by rookie Jim Grabowski,

but led only 21-17 at halftime following explosive Cowboy comeback. After a 32-yard Villanueva field goal had cut Packer lead to a tenuous 21-20, Starr hit Dowler and McGee with 16- and 28-yard scoring passes, respectively, to provide a cushion against the Cowboys' late surge.

**1967 — GREEN BAY 21, DALLAS 17** (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — With thermometer shuddering at 16 below zero and 50,861 in stands, Bart Starr scores winning touchdown from one-yard-line with 13 seconds remaining, sealing record third straight championship for Packers and their fifth in seven years.

Starr's touchdown, on third down with no time-

outs remaining, climaxed a 68-yard drive in 12 plays.

As was case in 1966, Packers grabbed early 14-0 advantage. But this time Cowboys came from behind to take the lead, forcing storybook finish by Green Bay to win contest later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

Starr's touchdown passes of 8 and 43 yards to Boyd Dowler built the first-quarter bulge, trimmed in second quarter by George Andrie's 7-yard scoring return of a Starr fumble and a 21-yard Danny Villanueva field goal. Dan Reeves' 50-yard scoring strike to Lance Rentzel in the fourth quarter triggered the dramatic denouement.

## 1972 DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF

**WASHINGTON 16, GREEN BAY 3** (Robert F. Kennedy Stadium, Washington, D.C.) — Chester Marcol's 17-yard field goal early in the second quarter puts the Packers out front, but a Bill Kilmer-to-Roy Jefferson touchdown pass late in the same period gave the Redskins a lead they never yielded. Curt Knight kicked three field goals to provide the Redskins' other points before a crowd of 53,140 fans on Sunday afternoon, December 24. John Brockington, the Packers' 1,000-yard rusher, had to settle for nine yards on 13 carries as the Redskins used a five-man defensive line to shut down Green Bay's running game.

## 1982 SUPER BOWL TOURNAMENT

**1982 — GREEN BAY 41, ST. LOUIS 16** (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Making their first post-season appearance in Lambeau Field since celebrated "Ice Bowl" game of 1967 against Dallas, Packers halt Cardinal drive at one-yard-line in first quarter, then proceed to forge an all-time club scoring record in their opening Super Bowl Tournament contest following 1982 season.

Out front 21-9 at halftime, they pad lead to 41-9 in fourth quarter before permitting Cards a consolation touchdown. Quarterback Lynn Dickey ties Packer playoff record before 54,282 fans by passing for four touchdowns (17 of 23 for 260 yards and 0 intercepts overall) and flanker John Jefferson sets club post-season mark with 148 receiving yards on 6 catches, including a 60-yard TD reception, another Packer playoff record. Placekicker Jan Stenerud also establishes a club playoff mark with a 46-yard field goal.

**1982 — DALLAS 37, GREEN BAY 26** (Texas Stadium, Irving, TX) — Packers amass 466 yards, a team playoff record, but are unable to overcome slow start which finds them trailing 20-7 at halftime. They roll up 363 yards and out-score Cowboys 19-17 in second half, pulling within four points (30-26) on a 22-yard scoring runback of an interception by Mark Lee in the fourth quarter, but Cowboys retaliate with 74-yard scoring drive to end Green Bay hopes with 63,972 fans looking on.

Quarterback Lynn Dickey throws for 332 yards (19 of 36), an all-time Packer playoff record, in losing cause. Split end James Lofton emerges with 109 yards on 5 receptions. Lofton also spices Packers' second-half comeback with 71-yard reverse for a TD, tying all-time NFL playoff record for a run from scrimmage.



# PACKERS NO. 1 IN POST-SEASON

The Green Bay Packers continue to own the best winning percentage in post-season in National Football League history. They have won 13 of 18 playoff games since making their first post-season appearance in the 1936 league championship game (in which they defeated the Boston Redskins 21-6) for a .722 percentage. The Pittsburgh Steelers and San Francisco 49ers are next up with .640 percentages, based on identical 16-9 playoff records. The all-time standings:

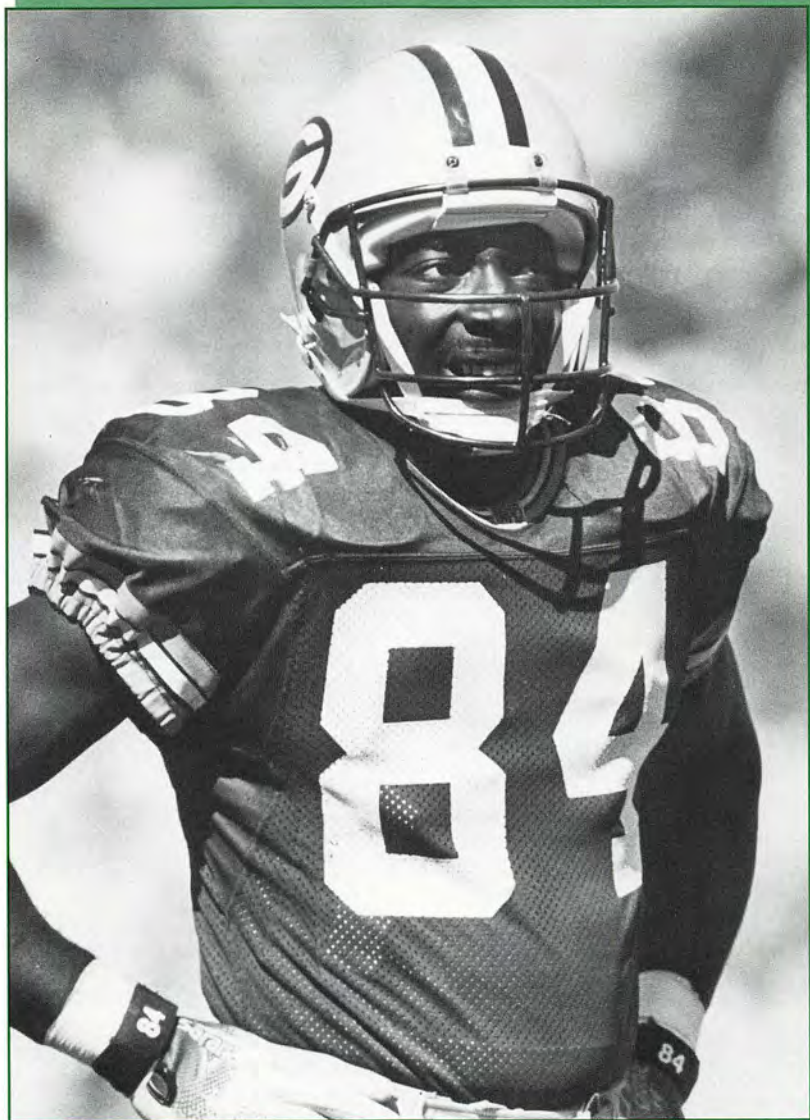

# PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



**1963 - E. L. (Curly) Lambeau**, Founder, player, coach, vice-president (1919-49). Founded Packers in 1919 and served as team's only coach through 1949 season. Also played halfback from '19 through '27, a period during which he pioneered forward pass in professional football. Led Packers to six world championships and is one of only six coaches to record more than 200 coaching victories in the NFL (others are George Halas, Paul Brown, Don Shula, Tom Landry and Chuck Noll). Also coached Chicago Cardinals (1950-51) and Washington Redskins (1952-53).



**1963 - Johnny (Blood) McNally**, HB (1928-36). Also played for Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Pirates. An elusive runner and gifted pass receiver, he played major role in Packers' drive to first three championships in 1929, '30 and '31. Also helped Packers win a fourth world title in '36. Still 18th place in Packer lifetime scoring, six decades after departing Green Bay scene, with 224 points. Collegiate star at St. John's.



**1963 - Don Hutson**, E (1935-45). Made second-most touchdown receptions (99) in pro football history, an all-time NFL record until broken by Steve Largent. Credited with inventing pass patterns, he led league in receiving 8 years and in scoring 5 seasons, both also lifetime marks. Caught passes in 94 of 95 games from 1937-45. Led NFL in receiving yards in 7 seasons, an all-time record. Also holds league record for most points scored in one quarter (29).



**1963 - Robert (Cal) Hubbard**, T (1929-35). Also played for New York Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates. A legendary athlete, he was one of pro football's first genuine giants - a massive 6-ft. 3-inch, 265-pounder who was a devastating blocker on offense and relentless pursuer on defense as a premier, two-way performer. Was an All-Pro choice in each of first three years (1931, '32, '33) such selections were made. Played college football at Centenary, Geneva.



**1964 - Clarke Hinkle**, FB (1932-41). A four-time All-Pro selection (1936, '37, '38, '41). One of the most versatile players in NFL annals, he was tough, bruising runner, fine blocker, good receiver and excellent placekicker as well as shrewd, hard-hitting linebacker. Fourth-ranking rusher in Packer history with 3,860 yards in 1,171 carries. Played college football at Bucknell.



**1964 - Mike Michalske**, G (1929-37). Also played for New York Yankees (1927-28) before joining Packers. Rated one of game's greatest guards during pro football's "two-way" era. Two-time All-Pro selection (1931 and 1935). A true 60-minute player, he was known as "Iron Mike" because of his great stamina and durability. Best asset was exceptional quickness, which made him equally effective on both offense and defense. Played college football at Penn State.



# PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



**1966 - Arnie Herber, QB (1930-41).** Also played for New York Giants (1944-45). Pro football's first great long passer. Won three National Football League passing titles and was All-Pro selection in 1932. Teamed with Don Hutson to form NFL's first feared passing combination in mid-'30s. Ranks fourth in Packer annals with 64 career touchdown passes over his 12 seasons. Tough, durable athlete and accomplished punter as well as great passer. A Green Bay native, he played college football at Regis (Denver, Colo.)



**1971 - Vince Lombardi, Coach and General Manager (1959-67).** General Manager only in 1968. Also assistant coach for New York Giants (1954-58) and head coach of Washington Redskins (1969). Directed Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 1965-66-67), a feat without precedent or parallel in pro football history. His 1966 and 1967 teams also made history by winning first two Super Bowls. Packers won nine of 10 playoff games under his leadership and overall compiled a 98-30-4 record, a glittering .766 winning percentage. Lombardi, a guard, played his college football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



**1974 - Tony Canadeo, HB (1941-44, 1946-52).** Became only the third 1,000-yard rusher in pro football history when he gained 1,052 yards in 1949. Still ranks as No. 3 ground gainer in Packer annals with 4,197 yards in 1,025 attempts, a 4.1 average. A durable, all-purpose halfback, he was an accomplished blocker, capable passer and good receiver in addition to being a highly effective kick returner. Also played defensive back during early years of his career. Played college football at Gonzaga, where he acquired nickname of "Grey Ghost."



**1976 - Jim Taylor, FB (1958-66).** Also played for New Orleans Saints (1967). One of six running backs in pro football history to rush for 1,000 yards in as many as five consecutive seasons (1960-64). Also 11th ranking career rusher in NFL annals with 8,597 yards in 10 seasons. Ranks 13th all-time (tied) in number of 100-yard rushing games with 26 and 12th in career rushing attempts with 1,941. Also owns sixth highest lifetime total of rushing TDs, 83. Played college football at LSU.



**1977 - Forrest Gregg, T (1956, 1958-70).** Also played with Dallas Cowboys (1971). Drafted No. 2 in 1956. Gregg was named All-Pro eight times (including All-Pro at both Guard and Tackle in 1965) and eight times to the Pro Bowl. Called by Lombardi the "finest player I've ever coached." Gregg holds the Packer record for durability with 187 consecutive games. Head Coach of the Green Bay Packers 1984-87. Also served as head coach of Cleveland Browns (1975-77) and Cincinnati Bengals (1980-83). Played college football at SMU, where he now is athletic director.



**1977 - Bart Starr, QB (1956-71).** Drafted in 17th round in 1956. Starr became the winningest quarterback in football, directing the Packers to 6 Western Division Titles, 5 World Titles, 2 Super Bowl victories, and was named MVP in Super Bowls I and II. Starr led the League in passing in 1962, 1964 and 1966 and was named to the Pro Bowl 4 times. In 1972 he coached Packer quarterbacks. Head Coach of Green Bay Packers 1975-83. He played college football at Alabama.



# PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



**1978 - Ray Nitschke**, MLB (1958-72). Drafted in third round in 1957 after playing fullback at Illinois. Most Valuable Player in 1962 NFL Title game vs. N.Y. Giants. Named to the NFL All-50 Year Team. All-Pro in 1964, 1965 and 1966; Pro Bowl 1965.



**1980 - Herb Adderley**, DB (1961-69). Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1970-72). Packers' No. 1 draft choice (Michigan State) in 1961. Five-time All Pro at cornerback. Played in five Pro Bowls, four of first six Super Bowls (two with Green Bay, two with Dallas). Had 48 career interceptions (39 with Packers), ran 7 back for TDs (second highest total in NFL history).



**1981 - Jim Ringo**, C (1953-63). Also played for Philadelphia (1964-67). Seventh round draft choice out of Syracuse in 1953. Went on to win All-Pro honors eight times, seven as a Packer, and played in 10 Pro Bowls, seven as a Packer. Highly durable performer, once held NFL record for most consecutive games played (183). Helped Packers win back-to-back NFL titles in 1961-62. Traded to Philadelphia in 1964.



**1981 - Willie Davis**, DE (1960-69). Also played for Cleveland (1958-59). A 17th round draft choice, he came to Packers from Browns in 1960 trade. Became one of premier pass rushers in pro football history, winning All-Pro honors five times and selection to Pro Bowl five times. Holds all-time Packer record for career fumble recoveries (21) and is tied for second-longest consecutive game streak (162) in Green Bay annals. Helped Packers win five NFL titles during 1960s. Played college football at Grambling.



**1986 - Paul Hornung**, HB (1957-62, 1964-66). One of the most versatile players in pro football history, he won NFL scoring title three consecutive years (1959-60-61), setting all-time league record of 176 points in 1960. Also shares league single game playoff scoring record, 19 points. All-Pro selection two times and named to Pro Bowl twice. Averaged 4.2 yards per rush, caught 130 passes and kicked 66 field goals during 9-year career. Second ranking scorer in Packer history with 760 points. Bonus choice (first player selected overall) in 1957 NFL draft. Played college football at Notre Dame, winning Heisman Trophy in 1956.



**1989 - Willie Wood**, FS (1960-71). Wrote several NFL teams asking for a tryout coming out of USC in 1960, before Packers agreed to take a look and signed him as a free agent. Went on to become recognized as a premier free safety, winning all-NFL honors six straight years beginning in 1963. A Pro Bowl selection eight times (1962, 1964-70), Wood also played in six NFL championship games, helping Packers win five titles. Starting free safety for Green Bay in Super Bowls I and II, he broke open a close contest in third quarter of SBI, intercepting a Len Dawson pass and returning 50 yards to the Kansas City five, triggering a 35-10 Packer victory. Had 48 career interceptions, returned for 699 yards. Won NFL title in 1962 with nine thefts and also captured a league punt return crown in 1961 with a 16.1 average. One of only 6 free agents to make Hall of Fame.

The late Dominic Olejniczak served the Packer Corporation as president longer than any other chief executive officer in its history. He held the office for 24 years, following his election in April of 1958, until becoming chairman of the board on May 3, 1982, the day on which Judge Robert J. Parins succeeded him as president.

## PACKERS STILL SHARE 'MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL' SCORING RECORD

The night of October 17, 1983, remains a memorable one in Packer history. On that occasion, the Packers delighted a Lambeau Field house of 55,255 fans by shading the Washington Redskins in an explosive "Monday Night Football" struggle, 48-47. As a result, they still own a share - the winning share - of the highest scoring game in the history of "MNF," ABC-TV's 22-year-old prime-time series.

The Packers eventually prevailed over the Redskins - reigning Super Bowl champions then - by way of a Jan Stenerud field goal. The scoring orgy produced 11 touchdowns, 11 conversions and 6 field goals in all. Stenerud's 20-yard success with only 54 seconds remaining decided the issue. The Redskins' Mark Moseley added a final, dramatic flourish by missing a 39-yard field goal attempt on the game's last play.

The 95-point production surpassed the previous "Monday Night Football" record for total points by 11. The latter had been established Dec. 20, 1982, when the San Diego Chargers outscored the Cincinnati Bengals, 50-34.

The contest also was the highest scoring game in which the Packers ever have been involved. The 95 points exceeded by eight the previous mark of 87, set when Green Bay lost to the Lions at Detroit in 1951, 52-35.

## PACKERS OWN OVERTIME MARK

The Green Bay Packers continue to own the National Football League record for most overtime games played in a season, a standard they set in 1983 when they were involved in five sudden death decisions, winning two and losing three.

In the interim, the Packers have gone to sudden death five additional times — on three occasions in 1987, once in 1989 and, the most recent, a 19-16 loss to the N.Y. Jets last Nov. 3 at the Meadowlands.

In its 17 overtime contests, Green Bay stands 5-7-4 in the regular season and 1-0 in the post-season for an overall mark of 6-7-4.

The lone post-season occurrence was a historic 13-10 victory over the Baltimore Colts in a Western Conference playoff game — the first overtime game in which the Packers ever were involved — in Green Bay's Lambeau Field Dec. 26, 1965, on a 25-yard Don Chandler field goal.

In addition to regular- and post-season play, the Packers have played four overtime games in preseason action. Capsules of the Packers' regular- and post-season overtime games follow:

The Packers set a team single-game home attendance record in 1991 when they drew 58,991 fans to Lambeau Field for their season opener against the Philadelphia Eagles (Sept. 1).



## BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young athletes, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Green Bay Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "Why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

FIRST THEY TALKED Curly's employer at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fences or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited.

THIS WAS the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy.

Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Kelleys, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A.B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay

Football Corporation was formed.

FROM THOSE MODEST and somewhat tenuous beginnings, the Packers have gone on to earn national stature and virtual world-wide recognition by winning more championships (11) over the intervening 70 years than any other team in professional football.

The fact that these achievements have come while representing a city of only 90,000 inhabitants, in competition with the country's population giants, has endeared them to the nation's football fans, many of whom are intrigued by the David vs. Goliath concept and the Packers' unique status as a publicly-owned corporation.

INEVITABLY, PROCEDURES at Packer games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system — the latter hadn't been invented yet. There weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their existence in 1919, they played on approximately the same site as the now abandoned City (East) Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemeister Park, as it was called, was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut Street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about 10 yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed, you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended, teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics of the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's halftime suggestion.



## THE PACKER STORY

In 1920 a section of stands was built — just a small bleacher with a capacity of a couple hundred — on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

WHEN HAGEMEISTER Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemester Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of 5,389. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides between the 30-yard lines. Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

AFTER WORLD WAR II, City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957, was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961, the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,852 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, 56,263 in 1970, and to 56,926 following the addition of private boxes in 1985. With the addition of 36 more private boxes and 1,920 club seats in the south end zone, capacity was upped to 59,543 in 1990.

The Packers' colorful saga, spanning 73 years, can be divided roughly into eight chapters. They take us from the "Iron Man" period of the first decade under founder Curly Lambeau to the present day, which finds Mike Holmgren presiding as the 11th head coach in the team's history.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars from all over the country, plus some unknowns

who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. It repeated in 1930 and in 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny (Blood) McNally, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 or 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD — Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership and were just about to fold when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era the Packers always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER — The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and businessman, as general manager. Reaching into the college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the rebuilding plans and Lisle Blackburn, coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four-year Blackburn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP — Likable Ray "Scooter" McLean moved up from an outstanding assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1



record, the worst in Packer history in his lone season as head coach.

**THE LOMBARDI ERA** — In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giants assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and unanimsously was voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams became the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise one of the most successful. Over a nine-year span as head coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 98 victories against 30 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .758 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 division playoffs and World Championship games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

**BENGTSON PERIOD** — Following the third consecutive title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970, compiling a 20-21-1 record, and in December of 1970 resigned.

**THE DEVINE DAYS** — Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a 5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record, and Devine resigned.

**BART STARR** — The most successful field general in pro football history as Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the NFL wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on December 24, 1974. Starr, who led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere...We will earn everything else."

Although he had to settle for a 4-10 record in the baptismal season of a massive rebuilding project, Starr gave Packer fans new hope by assembling a sound organization and restoring a positive attitude, underscored by three victories in the last five games of the 1975 season. He

continued the resurgent trend in 1976, leading the Packers to a 5-9 record, highlighted by a three-game, mid-season winning streak. Major and key injuries slowed the comeback in 1977 but a strong finish produced a 4-10 mark. Hopes soared in 1978 when the Packers posted their first winning slate since 1972, an 8-7-1 record, only to be temporarily dampened in '79 by a record rash of injuries which spawned a 5-11 mark. Another injury epidemic, one which saw 27 players on injured reserve during the course of the season, struck in 1980, forcing the Packers to settle for a 5-10-1 record.

Rebounding strongly in 1981, they rallied from a disappointing 2-6 start to mount one of the most dramatic comebacks in Green Bay history, closing with a 6-2 rush (an 8-8 mark) and coming within one victory of the playoffs.

The Packers continued the upsurge in 1982, when they qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1972 by posting a 5-3-1 record during a strike-interrupted season. They then embellished that performance by routing St. Louis 41-16 in the first game of the NFL's Super Bowl Tournament before bowing to Dallas (37-26) despite a record-setting, 466-yard offensive effort. Starr was relieved of his head coaching duties on December 19, 1983, after the Packers finished the '83 season with an 8-8 record and missed the NFL playoffs on the final week of the year.

**GREGG ERA** — On December 24, 1984, Starr was replaced by Forrest Gregg, a former teammate and one of the premier offensive tackles in the history of the game as a player, who had maneuvered Cincinnati into Super Bowl XVI following the 1981 season. Gregg, whose Bengals' 19-6 record over the 1981-82 seasons was the best in pro football, received a five-year contract.

In taking over, he declared, "I took this job to field a winning team. That will happen."

Gregg's prediction began to bear fruit in the second half of the 1984 season when the Packers rebounded from an injury-ridden 1-7 start to win seven of their last eight games.

Because of injury and other complications, however, the 1985 season followed the '84 script, the Packers getting off to a slow 3-6 start before mounting a strong finish to again close at 8-8 by winning five of their last seven games.

Gregg, convinced the time had come to rebuild a team which had gone 8-and-8 three years in succession and was "starting to get old" at that level, made sweeping personnel changes in 1986. The young and inexperienced Packers, their task complicated by injuries to such key performers as John Anderson, Tim Lewis, Rich Moran and Mark Cannon, got off to an 0-6 start, then began to mature in mid-season and went on to finish with a 4-and-12 record.



# THE PACKER STORY

Following the 1987 season, which saw the Packers finish third in the NFC Central with a 5-9-1 record, Gregg resigned (January 15, 1988) to become head coach at his alma mater, Southern Methodist University.

**INFANTE SIGNS ON** — Nineteen days later (February 3), Cleveland Browns offensive coordinator Lindy Infante became the 10th head coach in Packer history. Recognized throughout the NFL as a brilliant innovator, the 47-year-old University of Florida alumnus received a five-year contract.

With turnovers and kicking problems plaguing his offense, Infante's first Packer team had to settle for a 4-and-12 record, but left fans with hopes for 1989 and the future by winning the last two games to mount a strong finish.

Building upon that positive note, Infante orchestrated a dramatic upsurge in '89, escorting the Packers to a 10-6 record — their best in 17 years — and within one game of the National Football League playoffs, spicing that turnabout with a league-record four one-point victories.

In 1990, subsequent high hopes for the team's first post-season berth in a non-strike year since 1972 evaporated when the Packers — with a contending, 6-5 record after 11 games — saw a potential playoff opportunity expire in the face of a season-ending, five-game losing streak.

The Packers' field fortunes continued to decline in 1991, the record falling to 4-12, and Infante was relieved of his duties on December 22 by new Executive Vice President/General Manager Ron Wolf, who had been hired November 27 with full authority to run the organization's football operation.

**THE PRESENT** — Mike Holmgren, architect of one of the NFL's most potent attacks as offensive coordinator for the perennially successful, four-time Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers, was named by Wolf to succeed Infante as the 11th head coach in Packer history on January 11, 1992. # PACKER CHRONOLOGY

**1919** — Packers founded at meeting in editorial rooms of Press-Gazette, August 11.

**1921** — J.E. Clair of Acme Packing Company granted National Football League franchise for Green Bay Packers, August 27.

— Packer-Bear series launched at Chicago (November 27), Packers losing 20-0 decision to Chicago Staleys, who changed name to Bears in 1922.

**1922** — Packers disciplined for using college players under assumed names, Clair turns franchise back to league, January 28. E.L. "Curly" Lambeau promises to obey rules, uses \$50 of own money to buy back franchise for \$250.

— Bad weather, low attendance plague Packers, merchants raise \$2,500, public non-profit corporation set up under direction of A.B. Turnbull to operate team with Lambeau as manager, coach.

**1923** — Andrew B. Turnbull is elected first president of Green Bay Football Corporation.

**1925** — Packers beat Bears for first time, 14-10, in fourth regular-season meeting.

**1925** — East (old City) Stadium built, with initial capacity of 6,000.

**1927** — Packers surprise "Big Town" skeptics, shut out football Yankees, 13-0, in first New York appearance (October 23).

**1929** — Packers sign back Johnny "Blood" McNally, tackle Cal Hubbard, guard Mike Michalske and win first National Football League championship, posting unbeaten 12-0-1 record.

**1930** — Packers win second straight NFL title, this time with 10-3-1 record.

**1931** — Packers capture third consecutive NFL championship, extending unbeaten streak to 22 games, finish 12-2-0.

**1932** — Packers just miss winning fourth straight title on 10-3-1 mark, Bears winning crown with 7-1-6 record because ties not counted in standings.

**1934** — Fan falls from stands at East (old City) Stadium, sues Packers and wins \$5,000 verdict. Insurance company goes out of business and Packers go into receivership, about to fold, but Green Bay businessmen come to rescue, raise \$15,000 in new capital and reorganize club.

**1935** — Don Hutson of Alabama, to become most feared pass receiver in pro football history, signed by Packers.

**1936** — Packers make Russ Letlow, University of San Francisco guard, their No. 1 choice in first NFL Draft.

— Packers win fourth NFL championship, first under playoff system. Post 11-1-1 record, defeating Boston Redskins for title in New York's Polo Grounds, 21-6 (December 13).

**1938** — Packers win Western Division championship, lose to Giants in NFL title game at New York, 23-17 (December 11).

**1939** — Packers repeat for Western Division title,

roust Giants in title game at Milwaukee, 27-0 (December 10).

**1941** — Packers tie Bears for Western Division title, fall to Bears in Chicago playoff, 33-14 (December 14).

**1944** — With Ted Fritsch scoring both touchdowns, Packers beat Giants 14-7 at New York's Polo Grounds for sixth NFL title (December 17).

**1945** — Don Hutson catches 4 TD passes, kicks 5 PATs in second quarter against Detroit at Milwaukee, sets all-time one-quarter scoring record of 29 points as Packers win 57-21, October 7.

**1949** — Packers play intra-squad game at East (old City) Stadium on Thanksgiving Day, raise \$50,000 to stay afloat financially.

— Packers, 3-9-0 in 1948, dip to all-time low under Curly Lambeau, 2-10-0.

**1950** — Lambeau resigns to become vice president, head coach of Chicago Cardinals.

— Gene Ronzani, ex-Chicago Bear star, named Packer head coach, V.P.

— Stock drive nets \$118,000, puts Packers on sound financial basis.

**1953** — Ronzani resigns with two games remaining; Hugh Devore and Ray "Scooter" McLean named co-coaches.

**1954** — Lisle Blackburn, Marquette University coach, is named Packer coach.

**1957** — Lambeau Field, completed just in time for season opener, is dedicated (September 29) with 21-17 victory over Bears.

— Packers post 3-9-0 mark following 4-8-0 in '56, Blackburn resigns.

**1958** — Ass't. Coach Ray "Scooter" McLean promoted to head coach.

— Dominic Olejniczak elected seventh president of Green Bay Packers, Inc., April 28.

— McLean resigns following 1-10-1 record, poorest in Packer history.

**1959** — Vince Lombardi, offensive coach of N.Y. Giants, named Packer head coach and GM, February 4.

— Packers post 7-5-0 record, their first winning season in 12 years.

**1960** — Packers win Western Division title, first since '44, but lose to Eagles in NFL title game, 17-13 (December 26).

— Paul Hornung, scores 176 points, new NFL record.

**1961** — Packers rout N.Y. Giants, 37-0, for seventh NFL championship in first title game ever played in Green Bay, December 31.

**1962** — Packers beat Giants in New York, 16-7, for second straight league crown (December 30).

**1965** — E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, Packers' founder and first coach, dies at age 67 (June 1).

— Packers defeat Baltimore, 13-10, at Green

Bay in sudden death Western Conference playoff (the first overtime game in team's history) on Don Chandler's 25-yard field goal at 13:39 of second overtime (December 26).

— Packers beat Cleveland Browns, 23-12, for ninth NFL title, January 2.

**1966** — Game-ending end zone interception by Tom Brown enables Packers to down Cowboys, 34-27, in Dallas for second straight NFL title (January 1, 1967).

**1967** — Packers defeat Kansas City of AFL, 35-10, at Los Angeles in first Super Bowl, January 15.

— Packers edge Cowboys, 21-17, for third consecutive NFL title on last minute, one-yard sneak by Bart Starr in 16-below zero temperature at Lambeau Field (December 31).

**1968** — Packers beat Oakland, 33-14, in Super Bowl II at Miami, January 14; game has first \$3 million gate in history.

— Lombardi steps down as Packer head coach, stays as general manager; Phil Bengtson named coach.

**1969** — Lombardi resigns to become part-owner, executive-vice president and head coach of Washington Redskins; Bengtson named Packer GM.

**1970** — Lombardi dies at age 57, September 3.

— Bengtson resigns, December 21.

**1971** — Dan Devine, University of Missouri coach, named Packer head coach and general manager.

**1972** — Packers win first Central Division title since '67 (10-4-0), but lose to Redskins in divisional playoff at Washington, 16-3 (December 23).

**1974** — Devine resigns December 16, following 5-7-2 mark in '73 and 6-8-0 in '74.

— Bart Starr, who quarterbacked Packers to five NFL titles in seven years during '60s, named head coach and general manager, December 24.

**1982** — Judge Robert J. Parins elected Packer president (May 3), succeeding Dominic Olejniczak, becoming first full-time chief executive in team's history.

— Packers build 55,000-square foot indoor practice facility.

— Packers gain playoffs for first time since 1972 and defeat St. Louis in first round (41-16) before losing to Dallas (37-26).

**1983** — Bart Starr released as head coach (December 19).

— Former Packer great Forrest Gregg named head coach (December 24), agreeing to 5-year contract.

**1985** — Packers build 72 private boxes at Lambeau Field, increasing stadium seating capacity to 56,926.

**1986** — Packers report first \$2 million annual profit in their history (\$2,029,154).

**1987** — Fred N. Trowbridge, longtime Packer

treasurer and executive committee member, dies (March 14).

— Green Bay Packer Foundation, a vehicle to assure continued contributions to charity, established (May 6).

— Packers report first \$3,000,000 profit in their history (\$3,018,000).

**1988** — Forrest Gregg resigns to become head coach at his alma mater, Southern Methodist University (January 15).

— Lindy Infante, offensive coordinator of Cleveland Browns, named Packer head coach, agreeing to 5-year contract (February 3).

— Packers report \$2,839,270 profit, second highest in team history.

**1989** — Judge Robert J. Parins retires as President of Packer Corporation and is elected Chairman of the Board (June 5).

— Robert E. Harlan is elected president and chief executive officer of Packer Corporation, succeeding Judge Parins (June 5).

— Packers announce plans for construction of 1,920 club seats — a "first" for Lambeau Field — in south end zone and 36 additional private boxes at a projected cost of \$8,263,000 (August 22).

**1990** — Packers extend Head Coach Lindy Infante's contract two years — through the 1994 season (January 16).

**1991** — Michael R. Reinfeldt, former Pro Bowl safety and Oakland Raiders executive, becomes Packers' Chief Financial Officer (January 7).

— The names of the 18 Packer players and coaches elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame are placed in permanent display on the green walls between floors of Lambeau Field's private boxes, on both sides of the stadium, with team's 11 championship years (1929-30-31, 1936, 1939, 1944, 1961-62 and 1965-66-67) emblazoned above club seats in the south end zone.

— Tom Braatz, executive vice president of football operations, relieved of his duties (November 20).

— Ron Wolf, director of player personnel for New York Jets and a veteran of 29 years as a pro football scout and executive, is named executive vice president and general manager by president Robert E. Harlan, with full authority to run the Packers' football operation (November 27).

— Lindy Infante is relieved of his duties as head coach by executive vice president and general manager Ron Wolf (December 22).

**1992** — Mike Holmgren, offensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers, is named by Wolf as the 11th head coach in Packer history (January 11).

— Treasurer John R. Underwood reports Packer Corporation profit of \$2.17 million on 1991-92 operations, third-highest in team history (May 27).

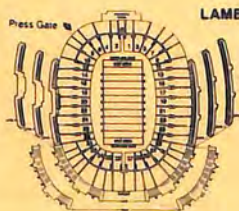

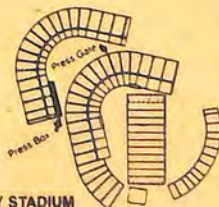

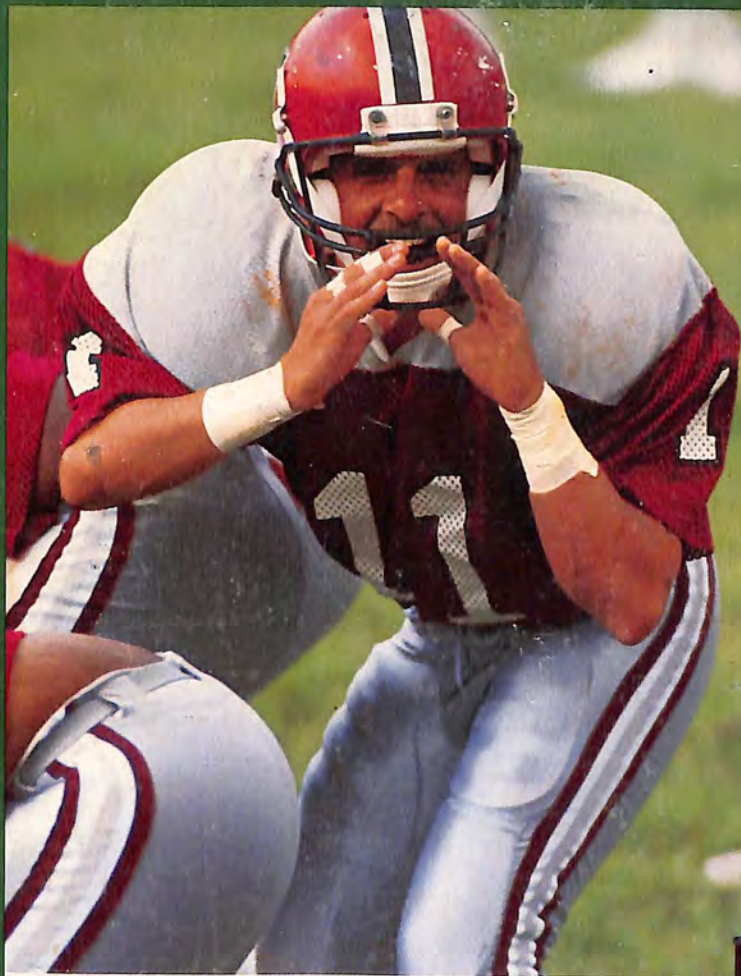
