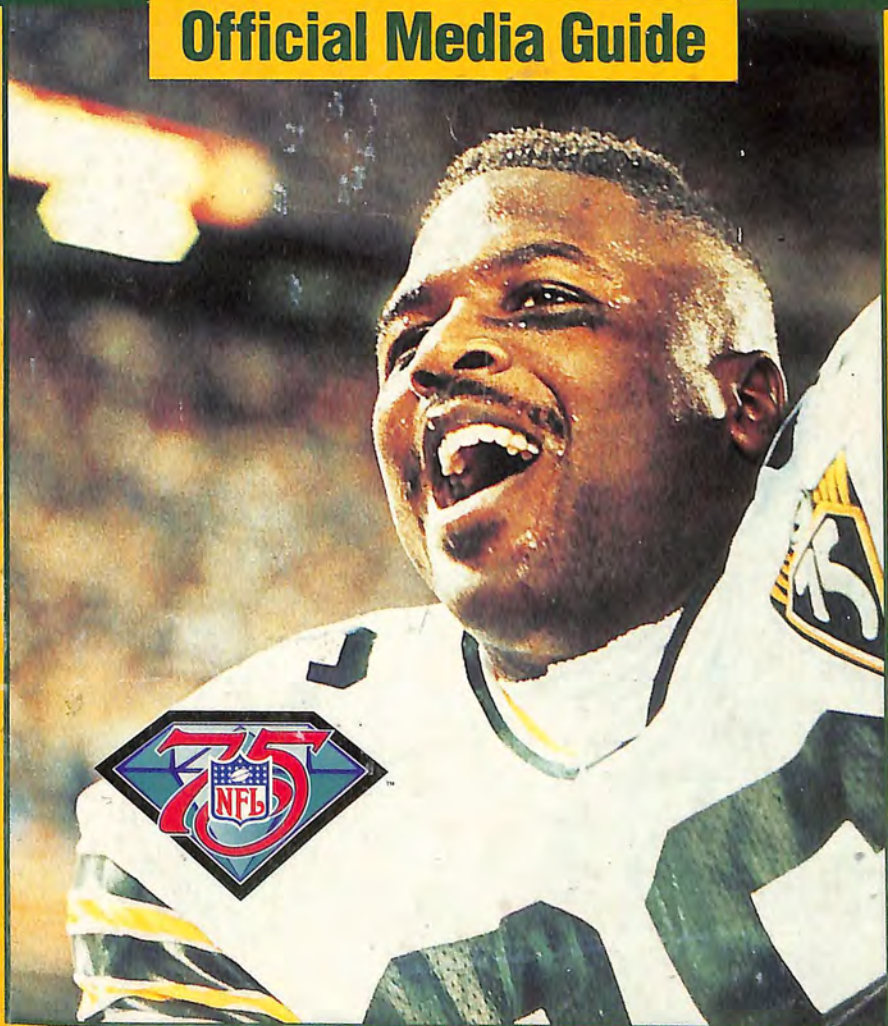

ROBERT E. HARLAN

President and Chief Executive Officer

Now in his sixth year as the operating head of the Green Bay Packers, Inc., Robert E. "Bob" Harlan is respected throughout the National Football League for the extensive and innovative agenda he has implemented since taking over the office of president and chief executive officer in 1989.

A member of the team's front office since 1971, the veteran Packer official made two major and historic decisions late in the

1991 season, moves that have had a profoundly positive effect upon the Green Bay franchise and its future. Convinced the organization was merely treading water competitively, he first relieved Executive Vice President Tom Braatz of his responsibilities November 20, 1991, and, one week later, named former Raider personnel chief Ron Wolf as executive vice president and general manager, with total authority over all football operations.

In the light of subsequent events, the latter decision already ranks among the most significant in the Packers' 75-year history. Wolf was chosen 'NFL Executive of the Year' following his first full season with the Packers, which saw him hire ex-49er offensive coordinator Mike Holmgren as head coach to replace Lindy Infante and also acquire Pro Bowl quarterback Brett Favre for a first-round draft choice in the most acclaimed trade of 1992. Holmgren responded by directing the Packers to a 9-7 record — a five-victory improvement over '91 — in his first season, one in which Favre established himself as the Packers' field general, and to a second consecutive 9-7 mark in 1993, thus bringing Green Bay its first back-to-back winning seasons since 1966-67 and the Lombardi Era.

The hiring of Wolf was the latest in a series of key moves Harlan has effected or triggered since succeeding Judge Robert J. Parins as president of the corporation at the annual stockholders meeting June 5, 1989.

Once elected, the Packers' new chief executive officer lost little time initiating his first major project. Ten weeks later, in late August of 1989, he announced plans to construct 1,920 club seats — a historic first in the home of the Packers — and 36 new private boxes in Green Bay's Lambeau Field, an \$8,263,000 expansion which increased the stadium capacity to nearly 60,000 (59,543). It was completed in time for the start of 1990 NFL preseason play.

A firm believer in the importance of ongoing, person-to-person dialogue with the team's fans, the 57-year-old Iowa native also scheduled and staged the first 'Breakfast with the Packers' functions in club history, gatherings for fans selected at random by computer, at which he invites questions and feedback from them about the Packer organization. The fifth such session was held in Green Bay in May of this year.

Committed to making the fans' day at the stadium as enjoyable as possible, Harlan in 1990 also directed the formation of a comprehensive program designed to encourage responsible drinking by fans in Lambeau Field, and in 1993 implemented a no-smoking ban in the stadium seating area at all home games. Results in the first four years of the responsible drinking program's existence indicate it has been a success, with arrests for misconduct down appreciably from previous years.

In what was unanimously approved and widely hailed — within and outside the organization — as a master stroke, Harlan also nominated Milwaukee Brewers President Allan H. "Bud" Selig to the Packer board of directors at the 1990 annual meeting, a move designed to promote a closer relationship between the two Wisconsin sports franchises.

A year earlier, while still executive vice president of administration, Harlan was the catalyst in the implementation and development of a long-term marketing program, launched with the hiring of a director of marketing and the opening of an official outlet store in the Packer administration building, a project which has become a solid success in the intervening five years and gives promise of greater dividends in the future following a major expansion of the team shop in 1993.

In 1992, he initiated plans for a comprehensive upgrade and expansion of the team's administration building and training quarters — a 20,500-square foot addition, encompassing a 74- by 80-foot gymnasium with a suspended running track as well as new public relations and marketing offices. The project, completed in time for the opening of 1993 training camp, also permitted enlarging of the team shop to

2,000 square feet — six times its original size.

Most recently, Harlan and the Packer Executive Committee authorized the construction of a new, \$4.2 million "state of the art" indoor practice facility, The Don Hutson Center, which was completed in time for use during the 1994 season.

In the overall process, Harlan has adhered to the agenda he had set for himself on the occasion of his election as president, when he announced, "I want to move this franchise ahead in every area...We've got to be successful from top to bottom to succeed. And we are going to succeed."

At that point, he addressed what he termed the two key "bottom lines...Obviously, one is winning football games, and the other is keeping the organization financially solvent and strong so it can always remain in Green Bay and compete with the other 27 clubs in this league."

Becoming president of the Green Bay Packers, he also revealed on that historic day, had exceeded his fondest dreams.

"In 1960, when I had just graduated from Marquette University and was working as sports information director at Marquette, just getting started in public relations, I attended a Packer game at Milwaukee County Stadium," he told members of the media following his election. "I made a comment to my wife then that I hope I can grow in the public relations field and become competent enough that someday I can become the public relations director for the Green Bay Packers. When the opportunity came along 11 years later to join this fine organization, I jumped at it...To be associated with the NFL and the Packers, I have been highly honored...That honor has reached a new and incredible level."

Since taking over as chief executive officer, Harlan has become actively involved in National Football League matters and currently serves on the influential NFL Properties Executive Committee.

The ninth president in the team's 75-year existence, Harlan is the first CEO to come up through the ranks. All previous presidents of the NFL's only publicly-owned franchise had come from the business and professional areas of the community as members of the board of directors.

Harlan, who has been involved in every area of the club's operations over the course of his 23-year Green Bay career, joined the Packer organization as assistant general manager on June 1, 1971, after serving as director of public relations for the St. Louis baseball Cardinals. He later was named corporate general manager in 1975, corporate assistant to the president in 1981 and executive vice president of administration on February 16, 1988.

In the latter role, he had been responsible for team travel, negotiating radio and preseason television contracts, front office personnel, ticket office operations, purchasing, the leasing of Lambeau Field's private boxes, insurance, game-day entertainment and the scheduling of preseason games.

Prior to 1985, he also had negotiated all player contracts for 14 years.

As he moves through his sixth year as president, Harlan becomes the fourth-longest tenured chief executive officer in Packer history. Only Dominic Olejniczak, who served 24 years (1958-82), Lee Joannes, 17 years (1930-47), and Judge Robert J. Parins, 7 years (1982-89), have headed the corporation longer.

Harlan, who earned a B.S. degree in journalism from Marquette in 1958, had a brief tour of duty in the U.S. Army before spending six months as a general reporter for United Press International in Milwaukee. He subsequently became sports information director at Marquette in 1959, working six years in that capacity, after which he joined the St. Louis baseball Cardinals in 1965, serving as director of community relations and the speakers' bureau for two years and as director of public relations for 3½ years, before coming to the Packers.

Born Robert Ernest Harlan in Des Moines, Iowa, on September 9, 1936, he is active in the Green Bay community as a member of the boards of directors of St. Mary's Hospital, St. Norbert College and Firstar Bank of Green Bay. He also is a member of the executive board of the Packer 65 Roses Sports Club, which was created to generate awareness of cystic fibrosis and to raise money for research to find a cure for the dreaded disease.

In 1993, he was honored by the Green Bay Rotary Club with its 'Free Enterprise Award' for his numerous contributions to the community, both individually and on behalf of the Packer Corporation.

Bob and his wife, Madeline, have three sons — Kevin, 34, who this year will be handling weekly NFL play-by-play assignments for Fox Broadcasting after nine years as the radio "voice" of the Kansas City Chiefs and who will continue doing play-by-play for the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves; Bryan, 32, who is director of public relations for the Chicago Bears; and Michael, 25, who is an account executive for sports marketing and sales with the Marcus Corporation.

An ardent golfer, Harlan also is an "involved" fan, closely monitoring the athletic fortunes of the Milwaukee Brewers and Milwaukee Bucks as well as those of the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay and his alma mater, Marquette.



MICHAEL R. REINFELDT

Vice President of Administration/Chief Financial Officer

Chief financial officer of the Packer Corporation since 1990, Michael R. Reinfeldt this year has taken on new and additional responsibilities as vice president of administration, a position which he was named to by Robert E. Harlan, president and chief executive officer, on January 1, 1994.

In this expanded role, he is responsible for overseeing all of the organization's extensive non-football operations.

As chief financial officer, the first in the 72-year history of the Corporation, Reinfeldt's responsibilities include overseeing the negotiation of all player contracts as well as supervising the Packers' financial operations and accounting staff and directing the preparation of corporate and departmental budgets.

He brings an important and additional dimension to his responsibilities in this area as a former All-Pro defensive back over a 9-year National Football League playing career, as well as an extensive background in finance as an athletics administrator at both the college and professional levels.

A native of Baraboo, Wis., Reinfeldt was named chief financial officer by Harlan on Nov. 8, 1990, coming to the Packers from the University of Southern California, where he had served as the school's associate athletic director. He previously had been chief financial officer of the Los Angeles Raiders from 1985 through 1987.

Reinfeldt, who earned an MBA degree in management and finance from Houston Baptist University, earlier obtained a bachelor of science degree from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, where he starred as a four-year starter on the varsity football team and holds the school record for most interceptions in a career (24). It is a mark that is not likely to be broken because his alma mater dropped football after his senior year.

He holds another distinction in UW-M's annals — he is the only alumnus in the institution's history ever to play in the National Football League.

Following graduation, he went on to a distinguished career in the professional ranks, launched when he signed with the then-Oakland Raiders as a free agent in 1975. After spending that season with the Raiders, he went on to play eight years (1976-83) with the Houston Oilers, starting 102 consecutive games, calling defensive signals for the secondary and leading the team in interceptions in 1977, 1979 and 1981. In the process, he played in two AFC championship games for Houston (against Pittsburgh in both 1978 and 1979) and also acquired his MBA degree while attending Houston Baptist in the off-season.

Reinfeldt enjoyed his best season in 1979, when he led the NFL in interceptions with 12, earned consensus All-Pro honors, started in the Pro Bowl and was named Player of the Year in the American Football Conference.

Subsequently, upon retiring as an active player, he returned to the Raiders as chief financial officer, overseeing the organization's financial and accounting operations and negotiating the majority of player contracts. He also dealt with local television and radio contracts, and was responsible for staff personnel.

Reinfeldt left professional football in 1988 to join the athletic department at the University of Southern California, where he served as the school's assistant athletic director for one year, then was promoted to associate athletic director, a position he held until he joined the Packer organization on January 7, 1991.

At USC, he was responsible for the formation and control of the athletic department's \$17 million budget, and handled negotiations on major contracts with radio and television networks, sponsors and outside suppliers.

Born May 6, 1953, in Baraboo, Wis., Reinfeldt was a high school sports star there, earning six letters in football and basketball. Still highly athletic, he regularly is involved in a variety of sports, including tennis, golf, bicycling, basketball and racquetball. Also an omnivorous reader, he is committed to reading "as many different books as I can...I try to read three or four books a week — some fiction, some historical fiction and some factual...some biography...a little bit of everything."

Reinfeldt and his wife, Susan, are the parents of a son, Jared Michael, born January 29, 1994.

Executive Vice President and General Manager

Ron Wolf, currently in his third year as executive vice president and general manager of the Packers, is the man primarily responsible for returning Green Bay to National Football League prominence, a task he has accomplished with impressive speed.

In the process, which has seen the Packers post back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in more than a quarter-century, he has made a more profound impact upon the Packer organization

in that short span than anyone since the advent of the legendary Vince Lombardi three decades ago.

"I was brought here to win," Wolf declared during a 1992 speaking appearance, succinctly delineating the challenge he had accepted in taking over as the team's executive vice president and general manager on November 27, 1991. Seldom has anyone responded to such a challenge with greater dispatch than the man who earlier had played a major role in developing the Oakland/Los Angeles Raiders into one of pro football's most successful franchises.

Although a Super Bowl remains to be won, the tireless Wolf already has delivered a contender — and a playoff team — in just two years time, with the aid of the head coach he selected to direct on-field operations, former 49ers offensive coordinator Mike Holmgren.

In appreciation for that considerable accomplishment, Wolf was rewarded with a three-year extension of his original five-year contract, one which will have him presiding over the Packers' competitive fortunes until the next century. The new contract will take him through the year 1999.

"We believe that stability and continuity are vitally important to having consistent success in the National Football league," Packer President Bob Harlan said in announcing the extension last April. "Ron Wolf has done a wonderful job for the Packer organization and we feel he is one of the really talented football executives in the NFL. Needless to say, we therefore are pleased that he has made a long-term commitment to overseeing our football operations."

Wolf, in turn, calls his "the ultimate job" in his profession, "particularly (for) a person at my level. Green Bay is it, as far as I'm concerned, for that very reason. There isn't an owner whose ego needs to be stroked. You're given everything you need to do the job. To me, that's so important. Nobody has denied us anything."

Wolf's signing of Holmgren, his first major hire after taking over the Packers' football operation, proved to be a master stroke. And, in the months that followed, Wolf supplemented that contribution by executing two significant trades, later with a series of shrewd acquisitions via the waiver wire and free agent market.

The key transactions saw him acquire Brett Favre, a highly-talented young quarterback with an impressive arm, from the Atlanta Falcons with a first-round draft choice, and huge offensive tackle Tootie Robbins from the Phoenix Cardinals for a sixth-round pick. He subsequently added center/guard Frank Winters, signed from the Kansas City Chiefs in Plan B, and a savvy, sure-handed fullback, Harry Sydney of the 49ers, to the mix, providing valuable maturity and stability.

These, and several other timely and profitable moves, helped the Packers to forge their second-best record since 1972, a 9-7 mark that saw them remain in the NFC Central race until the final game of the '92 season.

In the wake of that remarkable turnaround — the Packers had been 4-12 in 1991 after going 6-and-10 in 1990 — Wolf was saluted as 'NFL Executive of the Year' by *The Sporting News*, thus becoming the first Packer executive ever to be so honored.

Wolf, who came to the Packers from the New York Jets, typically deflected credit from himself, preferring to generalize in labeling *The Sporting News* award "a great honor for the Packer organization."

But Harlan, the man who hired him, offers a more specific analysis.

"I think I can tell you, Ron Wolf spends every minute of every waking hour thinking about what he can do to make this football team better," Harlan said. "He's dedicated and working at it so constantly. With that work ethic, you think, 'We're going to make it.'"

In 1993, Wolf further bolstered the team's talent level by venturing aggressively into the free agent mar-

ket, following the advent of unrestricted free agency, bringing in Reggie White, considered by many the greatest defensive end in pro football history, starting guard Harry Galbreath and one-time Pro Bowl wide receiver Mark Clayton, among others.

Again, the moves paid immediate dividends. The Packers repeated 1992's 9-7 record against a much more demanding schedule — it included six playoff teams — and not only qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1982 but advanced to the second round, defeating the Detroit Lions (28-24) in their first post-season assignment before falling to the Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys (27-17) in a divisional playoff.

The Packers' on-field upswing since Wolf's arrival, accompanied by increasingly high expectations by the team's excited loyalists, documents Harlan's decision to bring him in late in 1991 with total authority over the football operation.

"When we started the search to fill the position," Harlan said at the time of the announcement, "we put together a list of eight names. Ron's name was at the top of the list."

Wolf, who previously had spent 25 years in the front office of the Raiders, took over a position new to the Packers' organizational structure in terms of authority and responsibility, said authority including hiring and supervising the head coach and the scouting staff, conducting the draft and making all football decisions for the organization.

With the sweeping mandate, Wolf moved swiftly. He made his first major decision in a span of 24 days after his appointment, dismissing Lindy Infante as head coach on December 22, 1991, his second in hiring Mike Holmgren as Infante's successor just 20 days later — January 11, 1992.

The 55-year-old Wolf, who agreed to a five-year contract in leaving the New York Jets to join the Packer organization, credits his long experience in the Raiders' front office with preparing him for his current responsibilities.

"I had an opportunity to learn from — now that Paul Brown's no longer with us — to me, the greatest figure in the game today, Al Davis," he said. "He knows every aspect of the game of professional football — not just the X's and O's but from the business standpoint and the talent standpoint. He is totally involved, and he taught me. I was very, very fortunate to work for him."

The Pennsylvania native began his professional football career under Davis in 1963 when he joined the then-fledgling Raiders as a talent scout.

Subsequently, when Davis was named American Football League commissioner in 1966, Wolf accompanied him to the league office as the AFL's coordinator of talent. He returned to the Raiders prior to the opening of the 1966 season and played a major role in the club's personnel operation until the spring of 1975.

At that time, the then 37-year-old Wolf was named to oversee the formation of the newly-franchised Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the NFL as vice president of operations. He remained in that capacity until 1978 when he re-joined the Raiders, for whom he headed up player personnel operations until he went to the Jets organization in June of 1990.

Born in New Freedom, Pa., on December 30, 1938, Wolf attended the University of Oklahoma, where he majored in history. He earlier had served with Army Intelligence in Europe for three years.

Wolf has said he decided he wanted to make professional football his life's work "when I was in the service in '58 or '59, and I was stationed in Berlin, Germany. I think that appealed to me as something I would really like to do if I could do it. I never thought I'd be able to get my foot in the door."

His first job in the field was with Pro Football Illustrated, a publication based in Chicago, in 1961. He subsequently returned to the University of Oklahoma in 1962, he said, "and then Al Davis called me in 1963, after I'd taken my last final examination at Oklahoma...The very day, he called me."

When not immersed in football matters today, Wolf can be found reading. "I like to read novels — and when I really get serious — I like to delve into the Civil War or World War II," he says of himself. "That's when I get into a serious mode, which runs for about two weeks...Then I get off it."

Wolf, who has a corollary and highly developed interest in the lives of legendary military leaders, such as George S. Patton, George Custer and Douglas MacArthur, et al, said, "What fascinates me — and I can't pin the answer down — is where do all these people come from...the great people that emerge in time of crisis? Where have they been? Why do they suddenly appear on the scene at the precise moment of history?"

Ron's family includes his wife, Edie, and five children — daughters Saralyn, Celli and Joan, and two sons, Jonathan and Eliot. Mrs. Wolf is a psychologist who has established a practice in Green Bay.

LEE REMMEL

Executive Director of Public Relations

Lee Remmel has been a member of the Packer front office for 20 years, serving as director of public relations in 1974 and from 1980 through 1988, and as director of publicity from 1975 through 1979.

He was named executive director of public relations in March of 1989 by Robert Harlan, then executive vice president of administration, with responsibility for overseeing the public relations, marketing and community relations areas. Prior to joining the Packer

organization on March 24, 1974, Remmel was a sportswriter and columnist for the Green Bay Press-Gazette for 29½ years.

In the course of his two "careers," he has been involved in staffing all 28 Super Bowls played to date, the first eight representing the Press-Gazette and the last 20 as a member of the National Football League's auxiliary media relations staff.

Remmel also is currently a member of the NFL public relations directors' NFL Films committee, following long service as a member of the Professional Football Writers of America liaison and statistics committees.

While at the Press-Gazette, he was the only sportswriter in Wisconsin to have been directly involved in coverage of the Packers throughout all of the team's coaching regimes to that point, beginning with Packer founder E.L. "Curly" Lambeau and continuing until the naming of Bart Starr in 1975.

In 1967, he was voted 'Wisconsin Sports Writer of the Year.' He also is a past president of the former Wisconsin Pro Football Writers' Association.

Remmel, a native of Shawano, Wis., where he was born June 30, 1924, began his career as the sports editor of a weekly newspaper while a Shawano High School freshman. He is a member of the executive committee of the Brown County Civic Music Association, along with his wife, Noreen, as well as of the executive board of the 65 Roses Sports Club (cystic fibrosis). He also is a member of the St. Norbert College Fine Arts Committee, the Green Bay School/Business/Industry Partnership Council and the board of directors of the Green Bay Packer Hall of Fame.

Now in their 76th season of professional football, the Green Bay Packers are a team and an organization unique in both structure and accomplishment. They represent — from an organizational standpoint — the only publicly-owned franchise in the 30-club National Football League. On the field, they have won more championships — eleven — than any other team in the NFL's 74-year history.

Green Bay Packers, Inc., was founded as a non-profit corporation in 1922 under the leadership of A.B. Turnbull, then publisher of the *Green Bay Press-Gazette*, who became the organization's first president. There are 4,632 shares of stock owned by 1,877 stockholders. The corporation is governed by a seven-member Executive Committee, elected from a 45-person board of directors. (For "The Green Bay Packer Story," turn to page 256).

Robert E. Harlan, ninth president of the corporation, was elected the organization's chief executive officer June 5, 1989, succeeding Judge Robert J. Parins.

MIKE HOLMGREN

Head Coach

It has taken Michael George Holmgren only two seasons as head coach to make a substantial imprint upon the Packers' already proud history. The tall, imposing Californian has quickly become only the third field leader in the team's 75-year annals to own a winning record, thus joining team founder E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau and the legendary Vince Lombardi in an elite triumvirate.

In the process, he has done something none of his predecessors

has been able to do in a quarter-century:

- (1) Put together back-to-back winning seasons; and
- (2) Lead the Packers into the National Football League playoffs over a full-term season for the first time since 1972.

Taking over a club which had finished a dismal 4-and-12 in 1991, Holmgren has maneuvered his two Packer teams to successive 9-and-7 records, turning the trick the second time despite the rigors of a more demanding schedule which included the reigning Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys and five other 1992 playoff teams — Kansas City, San Diego, New Orleans, Philadelphia and Minnesota.

Honored as National Football Conference 'Coach of the Year' in 1992, the ex-USC quarterback had escorted the Packers to within one game of the playoffs, leading them to a six-game winning streak — their longest since 1965 — along the way.

Last season, he managed to take his team to the next level — the playoffs — despite the loss of four starters to injuries, three of them members of the offensive line (center James Campen, left guard Rich Moran and right tackle Tootie Robbins), plus left inside linebacker Brian Noble, a consistently productive performer and a team leader.

In plotting and executing his offensive strategy, Holmgren had to deal with the fact that his principal weapon, wide receiver Sterling Sharpe, was not able to practice the last eight weeks of the season — and throughout the playoffs — because of a nagging turf toe injury, and thus was not at his physical best in the drive for a playoff berth.

A reasoned and compassionate perfectionist, he also exercised admirable patience in continuing to develop his highly-talented young quarterback, Brett Favre, and coping with the turnovers the latter had fallen victim to while maturing as an NFL field general.

Holmgren's resourceful handling of these challenges loomed large in the final analysis as the Packers rebounded from a season-ending loss to Detroit to score a last-minute victory over the Lions in their wild card playoff encounter a week later, thus recording their first post-season victory in more than a decade.

In complete command of his football team throughout his two-year tenure, Holmgren has exuded a quiet confidence from the beginning, perhaps traceable to the league-wide reputation as one of professional football's premier offensive coaches he had brought with him from the San Francisco 49ers — together with a long-time identification with success.

Gil Haskell, one of his assistant coaches, cites another explanation. "My impression is that he has prepared himself to be a head coach," Haskell said of Holmgren. "Many people get head coaching jobs that never expected to get them. He didn't...He's been planning this for some time."

Holmgren's initial success in 1992 stemmed in large part from his ability to achieve what he listed as his number one priority. At the outset, he pinpointed the need "to establish a winning attitude," asserting, "We have to establish the fact that good things are going to happen in the second half of games, not bad things...And that's a mindset."

The Packers' 9-7 record in that baptismal season is eloquent proof that Holmgren's words were taken to heart. Over the course of the season, the Packers compiled an imposing 8-0 record in games in which they led at halftime, a shining example of the positive approach. And, poetically, they came from behind in the final minute of play to post their first regular-season victory of the "Holmgren Era," scoring with 13 seconds remaining to shade the Cincinnati Bengals, 24-23, in Week 3.

Holmgren, who at 6-feet-5 inevitably cuts an impressive figure (he is the tallest head coach in Packer history), became the eleventh head coach in team annals when he was signed to a five-year contract January 11, 1992, by Ron Wolf, the Packers' executive vice president and general manager.

The 46-year-old mentor had been sought after by no fewer than six National Football League clubs following the 1991 season in recognition of his accomplishments as offensive coordinator for the 49ers.

Earlier quarterbacks coach under the celebrated Bill Walsh for three seasons, he became San Francisco's offensive coordinator in 1989 and proceeded to put his personal stamp on the club's attack. Under him, the 49er offense ranked no lower than third in the league in his three years as coordinator.

As a member of the 49ers' coaching staff since 1986, Holmgren was identified with one of the most successful organizations in NFL history, San Francisco having swept to five consecutive NFC Western Division championships (1986-90) and to a pair of back-to-back Super Bowl victories (in 1988 and 1989) during his six-year tenure with the team.

Over this span, the 49ers compiled the NFL's best overall record, posting 71 wins compared to only 23 losses, with one tie, a .753 percentage.

Individually, Holmgren did the finest job of his San Francisco tenure in 1991. Despite losing quarterbacks Joe Montana and Steve Young to injuries, the 49er offense finished third in the NFL under his leadership. With third-string quarterback Steve Bono taking over for the injured Young, who had replaced an injured Montana at the start of the season, the 49ers won five of their last six games.

The ability to win with three different quarterbacks, a major achievement, helped to make Holmgren the NFL's most sought-after assistant as head coaching opportunities began to develop following the '91 season.

Under his direction, the 49er offense had been the top-rated unit in the league in 1989, his first season as the team's offensive coordinator. Earlier, in 1987, Holmgren's guidance was credited with helping Montana capture his first league passing championship. He also was cited for the manner in which he prepared Young to step in for Montana when injuries forced the latter to the sideline, and the adjustments he implemented to help Bono succeed in his interim role.

A native of San Francisco, Holmgren had returned home in 1986 to take on his first coaching assignment in the professional ranks. He came to the 49ers from Brigham Young University, where he had been a member of LaVell Edwards' staff for four years (1982-85). There, he tutored Young in his role as quarterbacks coach, helping the Cougars to maintain one of college football's most potent passing offenses. During Holmgren's tenure, BYU won the school's first national championship in 1984.

Holmgren also has known personal success on the football field, having been named 1965's 'Prep Athlete of the Year' at San Francisco's Lincoln High School. A quarterback, he went on to play four years of college football at the University of Southern California (1966-69) and was drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals in the eighth round of the 1970 NFL selection meeting. He subsequently was in training camp with both the Cardinals and the New York Jets that year, prior to returning to his high school alma mater, Lincoln High, to begin his coaching career in 1971.

A year later, Holmgren went to San Francisco's Sacred Heart High as a teacher and assistant coach, struggling through 4-and-24 adversity from 1972-74 at a school which had no practice facilities, before moving to Oak Grove High from 1975-80, a period during which the school won a Central Coast Sectional football championship.

The Packers' future head coach next entered the college ranks, serving as quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator for San Francisco State in 1981, preceding his hiring at Brigham Young in 1982.

Of Swedish-Norwegian descent, Holmgren was born on June 15, 1948, in San Francisco. Following graduation from Lincoln High School, he earned his bachelor of science degree at USC in 1970.

Mike and his wife, Kathy, have four daughters — twins Calla and Jenny, 20 (born 9/27/73), juniors at North Park College in Chicago (their mother's alma mater); Emily, 17 (born 1/21/77), an Ashwaubenon High School student; and Gretchen, 13 (born 7/14/81), a Park View Middle School (Ashwaubenon) student.

Although a relatively new resident, Holmgren has Wisconsin ties. His maternal grandfather, Jens Bugge, was born on a farm in the Badger state. Known as 'Colonel' in the family because of his service as an officer in the United States Army, Bugge was the author of a book on military strategy, a copy of which reposes in the West Point library.

Away from football, the Packer coach spends most of his leisure time with his family. Golf is his favorite pastime and he also is fond of reading, particularly historical books, having been a history teacher at the high school level.

Already substantially involved in the Green Bay community and his adopted state, he has seen his Mike Holmgren Celebrity Invitational Golf Tournament raise roughly \$25,000 annually for the Packer 65 Roses Sports Club (cystic fibrosis) each of the past three years. Holmgren also served as honorary chairman for the Wisconsin Arthritis Foundation's telethon in 1992 and 1993, in addition to acting as a fund-raising spokesperson for the University of Wisconsin's new Weidner Center for the Performing Arts.

SHERMAN LEWIS

Offensive Coordinator

When Mike Holmgren became head coach of the Packers in January of 1992, the identity of his offensive coordinator was a foregone conclusion. Without question, it was going to be Sherman Lewis.

"I wanted Sherm to be my offensive coordinator when I became head coach here in Green Bay because I knew he was an outstanding football coach," Holmgren later said. "We had worked together in

San Francisco...and he was a key member of the staff. He's one of the brightest and most innovative coaches I've ever been around."

Now in his third season in the coordinator role, Lewis brought an impressive coaching pedigree with him to Green Bay, having helped the 49ers develop one of the most productive attacks in the National Football League under Bill Walsh en route to three Super Bowl victories during the '80s.

His expertise paid immediate and practical dividends in 1992. The Packer offense Lewis coordinated proceeded to produce 4,786 yards, the most by a Green Bay offensive unit since 1989. Moving the chains consistently, the Green and Gold registered 291 first downs along the way, compared to 259 a year earlier.

Last season, the offense again made substantial strides — this time in a major "bottom line" category — scoring. The Packers rolled up 340 points — 66 more than the previous year — and the team's highest total since 1989.

Named to the Packer staff on January 18, 1992 — one week after Holmgren became head coach — Lewis was a member of the 49er staff for nine seasons, the first six seasons as running backs coach, tutoring such outstanding players as four-time Pro Bowl running back Roger Craig and fullback Tom Rathman. Lewis coached the wide receivers during his final three seasons with the 49ers and helped hone the skills of Jerry Rice and John Taylor, who have been selected to a combined 10 Pro Bowls.

Sherman's Packer responsibilities during his first season on the Packer staff also included coaching the receivers, among them record-breaking Sterling Sharpe, duties he turned over to Jon Gruden in preparation for the 1993 season.

The 52-year-old Kentucky native had been an assistant coach at his alma mater, Michigan State, for 14 seasons prior to joining the 49ers, serving as a assistant head coach and defensive coordinator for his final three years at MSU. Originally hired by the late Hugh "Duffy" Dougherty, he subsequently served on the staffs of Denny Stolz, Darryl Rogers and Frank "Muddy" Waters.

Lewis earlier had been a two-way All-America halfback at Michigan State, where he was second runnerup for the 1963 Heisman Trophy (behind Roger Staubach of Navy and Billy Lothridge of Georgia Tech) and named college football's "Player of the Year" by *Football News*.

Sherman also was a standout track and field performer for the Spartans. He later earned his master's degree in educational administration from MSU in 1974.

Lewis, born in Louisville, Ky., June 29, 1942, and his wife, Toni, have two sons, Kip (born 2/6/67), a former University of Arizona football player, and Eric (born 1/2/76), who closed out a distinguished prep football career at St. Francis High School in Mountain View, Calif., in 1993 and earlier this year was awarded a football scholarship to San Diego State University.

FRITZ SHURMUR

Defensive Coordinator

Innovator, author and technician, resourceful Fritz Shurmur has gained universal recognition for his creative defensive schemes, widely copied throughout the National Football League by his coaching colleagues.

The Packers' personable new defensive coordinator, now in his 20th NFL year, was named to succeed Ray Rhodes by Head Coach Mike Holmgren on January 31, 1994.

A classic example of Shurmur's flair for innovation came in 1989 when, as defensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams, he was confronted with the challenge of revamping an injury-depleted defensive unit. Utilizing linebackers as down linemen and compensating for the absence of two regular inside linebackers until the season's 10th game, he developed a 2-5 "eagle" defense which allowed only three running backs to gain 100 yards, finished fifth in the National Football Conference with 42 sacks and led the Rams to two post-season victories.

On the Phoenix staff for the past three years, Shurmur produced comparable results in becoming the Cardinals' defensive coordinator in 1990. Developing a unit featuring seven new starters, he turned out a defense which held opponents to 52 fewer points than the previous season and limited the opposition to two touchdowns or less nine times, scored three touchdowns on turnovers and shared the league low for touchdown passes allowed with 12.

Shurmur's "11 men to the football" zone concept also produced 37 fumbles, third highest single season total in franchise history, while the Cardinals' 21 fumble recoveries ranked second in the NFC and third in the league.

A year later, his schematic originality paid dividends for Phoenix with a "Big Nickel" alignment that featured four down linemen, two linebackers and five defensive backs. It fueled a defensive surge that limited foes to 67.5 yards rushing per game over the final six weeks of the season and enabled the Big Red to finish with the fifth-rated rush defense in the conference. The unit also held opponents to 101 first downs, best effort in club history over a 16-game schedule.

Last season, Shurmur's 4-2-5 Cardinal defense again proved highly effective, closing out the season seventh in the NFL in points allowed with 269 — an average of 16.9 per game — the team's lowest total since the 16-game schedule was implemented in 1978.

Shurmur had joined the Cardinals following nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams' successful defense, eight of them as its coordinator. He signed on as the Rams' defensive line coach for the strike-shortened 1982 season and became their defensive coordinator the following season, in which the Rams improved from 27th to 15th in total defense. In 1985 and '86, his efforts began to bear fruit as the Rams led the NFL with 56 quarterback sacks in '85 and finished fifth in total defense both seasons. Overall, the Rams reached post-season play six times during Shurmur's nine-year tenure.

The 62-year-old Wyandotte, Mich., native made his NFL coaching debut with the Detroit Lions in 1975 as defensive line coach. He later was named Detroit's defensive coordinator in 1977. Four seasons in New England, the first two as defensive line coach, the last two as defensive coordinator, followed. During this span, Shurmur's 1979 Patriot defense led the NFL with 57 sacks.

Fritz began his coaching career as a graduate student in 1954 at his alma mater, Albion (Mich.) College, where he served as assistant football coach and swimming coach through 1961 before moving to the University of Wyoming as an assistant football coach. He was the Cowboys' defensive line coach from 1962-70 prior to being named head coach in 1971. As Wyoming's defensive coach, Shurmur's teams led the nation in rushing defense twice and in total defense once. During his stay in Laramie, the Cowboys paced the Western Athletic Conference in defense in 1963 and '65-69.

Blessed with writing skills to complement his football knowledge, Shurmur has authored three books, *Coaching Team Defense*, which covers all phases of defensive football and has elicited acclaims from his peers and fans alike, *The Five Linebacker Eagle Defense*, and *Coaching Team Defense: Second Edition*.

Born July 15, 1932, Leonard "Fritz" Shurmur attended Roosevelt High School in his native Wyandotte. He later earned All-Michigan Athletic Association honors as a center at Albion College and was named confer-

ence most valuable player. Fritz, who graduated with a master's degree in education administration in 1956, also was named to the all-conference baseball team.

Shurmur and his wife, Peggy Jane, have three children: Sally Ann Michalov, 37, Scott, 35, and Susie, 31. Sally Ann, an award-winning sports reporter for the *Casper Star-Tribune*, was named the 1990 Wyoming sportswriter of the year.

Defensive Line

A perennial Pro Bowl performer as a player, Larry Brooks is in his 20th season in professional football — his ninth as a coach — and his first as a member of the Packer coaching staff.

The 44-year-old former Los Angeles Rams star, who had been serving as interim athletic director and assistant football coach at his alma mater, Virginia State University, was named defensive line coach by Head Coach Mike Holmgren February 15, 1994.

succeeding Greg Blache. His arrival in Green Bay reunited him with Packer Defensive Coordinator Fritz Shurmur, under whom he previously had served as assistant defensive line coach for the Rams for eight seasons.

A native of Prince George, Va., Brooks was a late round choice (14th) of the Rams in the 1972 draft. Becoming a starting defensive tackle midway through his rookie year, he went on to play an important role alongside Jack Youngblood, Cody Jones and Fred Dryer as the Rams won seven consecutive NFC Western Division championships during his 11-year playing career (1972-82).

Named to the Pro Bowl for five consecutive seasons (1976-80), he also was an All-Pro selection in 1977, 1978 and 1979. Along the way, Brooks was the starting left defensive tackle in the Rams' only Super Bowl appearance (against the Pittsburgh Steelers) in January of 1980. He also started three NFC championship games.

Following his retirement as a player, Brooks joined the Rams coaching staff as assistant defensive line coach in 1983, a position he held through the 1990 season. Out of football in 1991, he returned to Virginia State University as assistant athletic director and assistant football coach in 1992.

As a collegian, Brooks was named to the *Associated Press* Little All-America team. He also earned all-conference honors and was honored as Virginia Small College Lineman of the Year in 1971.

Born June 10, 1950, at Prince George, Va., Brooks is an ardent outdoorsman who enjoys hunting and fishing. Larry is married (Colleen) and the father of a son, Larry, Jr., 24, who lives in Orange County, Calif.

Special Teams

An All-America performer as a collegian and a frequent Pro Bowler during an 11-year National Football League playing career, Nolan Cromwell now is making an impact as a member of the NFL's coaching fraternity.

Under his direction, Packer special teams demonstrated major

improvement in 1993. Based on a statistical analysis of 17 special teams categories by the *Dallas Morning News*, the Packers tied for fourth in the league, a dramatic rise from 1992's 24th place ranking.

Cromwell's kamikazes ranked first in kickoff return average (24.7 yards), opponents' gross punting average (40.2 yards) and extra point percentage (100.0).

The Packers' specialty units also tied for first in fewest points allowed (0) and fewest kicks blocked (0).

In 1992, his first season on Green Bay's coaching staff, Cromwell substantially upgraded the Packers' kick coverage, the kickoff coverage unit emerging as the leader of the National Football Conference with an average yield of only 15.8 yards per return, a mark which ranked second in the NFL as a whole, and the punt coverage platoon finishing sixth in the NFC with an average yield of 8.8 yards per return. A year earlier, the same units ranked 10th and 13th, respectively, in the NFC.

Cromwell, a native of Smith Center, Kan., enjoyed one of the more distinguished playing careers in recent NFL history prior to joining the coaching ranks. A second-round draft choice of the Rams in 1977 out of the University of Kansas, he was a four-time Pro Bowl selection during his 11 seasons with Los Angeles, ending his playing career as the team's all-time leader in interception return yardage with 671 yards on 37 interceptions, the latter total ranking second in Rams history to Eddie Meador's 46.

The 39-year-old Cromwell also was a standout special teams player, serving as holder for extra points and field goals and scoring three rushing touchdowns on fake field goal attempts.

In addition to his Pro Bowl honors, Nolan was named NFC Defensive Player of the Year by the Kansas City Committee of 101 in 1980 and was chosen NFL Defensive Back of the Year in 1984 by *Football Digest*.

As a collegian, he was accorded All-America honors as a junior quarterback in the Kansas wishbone offense.

Cromwell launched his coaching career in 1991 as defensive and special teams assistant on Coach John Robinson's Rams staff. Following retirement as a player and prior to re-joining the Rams as a coach, he owned and operated three tire stores in the Los Angeles area.

Nolan, who was born on January 30, 1955, and his wife, Mary, have two children, Lance (born 6/15/86) and Jennifer (born 4/13/88).

Wide Receivers

The youngest member of the Packer coaching staff at 30, Jon Gruden is in his second year as the tutor of Green Bay's receivers.

Gruden, a Tampa native with a rich football background, was promoted to wide receivers coach by Head Coach Mike Holmgren in early 1993 after serving as offensive assistant/quality control in 1992, his first year on the Packer staff.

Gruden's early success in his chosen field may be attributable in part to being born into a football family. His father, Jim, is a regional scout for the San Francisco 49ers and formerly served as backfield coach under John McKay with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Starting with the 1988 season, when he was passing game coordinator at Southeast Missouri State, Jon's arrival on the Green Bay staff two years ago marked his fifth stop in a five-year span. He coached the wide receivers at the University of Pacific in 1989, then served as an offensive assistant with the 49ers during the '90 season, a position in which he worked closely with Holmgren, the 49ers' offensive coordinator at the time. Gruden made another career move in 1991, joining Head Coach Paul Hackett's staff at the University of Pittsburgh to tutor the wide receivers.

Named to the Packer staff by Holmgren on January 27, 1992, Jon was a three-year letterman at the University of Dayton, graduating from that institution in 1985. He prepared for his coaching career by spending two seasons (1986-87) as a graduate assistant at the University of Tennessee.

Born August 17, 1963, Jon is married to the former Cindy Brooks, a one-time cheerleader at the University of Tennessee, and they are parents of a son, Jon David II, born January 19, 1994.

GIL HASKELL

Running Backs

Consistently successful as both a running backs and special teams coach over an 11-year NFL career, ebullient Gil Haskell added luster to his coaching credentials in 1993. Under his tutelage, Packer running backs had their most productive year since 1989, gaining 1,619 rushing yards.

In the process, the San Francisco native helped halfback Darrell Thompson become a key factor in the running game, the 1990 first-round draft selection emerging with a career-high 654 yards after gaining starting status in the sixth game.

Haskell also honed the talents of second-year pro Edgar Bennett, who registered 9 rushing touchdowns — the most by a Packer running back since 1982 — and made 59 receptions, matching the second-highest single-season total in club history.

Named to the Packer coaching staff January 27, 1992, by Head Coach Mike Holmgren following nine years under Coach John Robinson with the Los Angeles Rams, Haskell had made his presence felt in his first Green Bay season. Vince Workman, his prize protege, appeared to be en route to the first 1,000-yard rushing season by a Packer running back since 1978 when he suffered a season-ending shoulder injury in Game 10 against Philadelphia. Under Haskell's tutelage, Bennett also became the first Green Bay rookie to register a 100-yard rushing game in 13 years.

Prior to joining the Packers, Haskell coached the Rams' special teams for the first four of those seasons (1983-86), the running backs for the next four and concluded his tenure in 1991 by tutoring the tight ends and re-assuming the special teams responsibilities.

As running backs coach, Haskell had significant success, two Rams backs rushing for 1,000 yards in three of the four seasons he coached the position. Charles White gained 1,374 yards in 1987 and Greg Bell rushed for 1,212 in 1988 and 1,137 in 1989.

Earlier, under Haskell's guidance, Rams special teams ranked among the NFL's finest, emerging with the league's No. 1 ranking in both 1984 and 1985, his second and third years in charge. Three of his players also were named to the Pro Bowl — kickoff returner Ron Brown and punt returner Henry Ellard in 1984 and punter Dale Hatcher in 1985. During that four-year span, only one opponent scored a touchdown on a kickoff or punt return while the Rams, conversely, had impressive success, returning nine kicks for scores.

Haskell joined the Rams' staff in 1983 after serving as Robinson's special teams coach for five seasons at USC, a period during which he also was the Trojans' receivers coach for two seasons.

Prior to signing on at USC, Haskell coached at San Francisco's St. Ignatius High School for nine years, the last five as head coach. In the latter role, he compiled an imposing 34-15 won-lost record. He also served as track coach for four years, winning three Catholic Athletic League titles.

Haskell launched his coaching career at Riordan High School, also in San Francisco, serving as line coach for three years while also coaching the track team and winning three Catholic Athletic League championships.

Born in San Francisco September 24, 1943, Gil has long standing ties to the NFL. An uncle, the late Dr. William O'Grady, was a part owner of the San Francisco 49ers and, before going to USC in 1978, Haskell had worked with the 49ers for 22 years.

Gil is married to the former Nancy Van Acker, who served as speakers' bureau and entertainment coordinator for the Rams before moving to Green Bay.

DICK JAURON

Defensive Backs

Dick Jauron, whose coaching/teaching skills and extensive knowledge of the game have brought him league-wide respect, is the senior member of Green Bay's coaching staff in point of Packer service.

Now in his ninth year on the staff, Jauron originally entered the Packer organization in 1986 under then-Head Coach Forrest Gregg.

Subsequently retained in 1988 by Lindy Infante when Infante succeeded Gregg, he in 1992 joined the staff of then-new Head Coach Mike Holmgren, who described him as "a quality coach and individual who has earned league-wide respect for the consistent and productive performance of the Packer secondary."

Over his eight seasons, Jauron's secondaries have registered a total of 147 interceptions, 25 of them in 1989 when Green Bay finished fourth in the National Football Conference in this category.

The Packer "outfield" embellished its '89 efforts by allowing the collective opposition just four 100-yard receiving days — or an average of one every four games — two of those to pass-receiving non-pareil Jerry Rice of the 49ers and the Vikings' gifted Anthony Carter. In 1990, Jauron's secondary permitted only six 100-yard receiving days — just four of those over the last 15 games.

Earlier, in 1987, the Yale alumnus produced a defensive backfield which ranked among the league's elite in another major category — preventing the "bomb." It gave up only 14 touchdown passes, a season-long performance which ranked second only to that of the 49ers, who permitted a league-low 13.

Jauron began his coaching career in 1985 as a member of the Buffalo Bills' staff under Hank Bullough, then Buffalo's head coach.

The 43-year-old Peoria, Ill., native, who still ranks as one of Yale's all-time football greats, was a fourth-round draft selection of the Detroit Lions in 1973 and was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back following the '74 season. Released by the Lions August 23, 1978, he signed with Cincinnati six days later and was a Bengal starter until he suffered a knee injury in Game 10 of the '80 season.

Jauron made 26 interceptions over his eight pro seasons, including a career-high six for Cincinnati in 1979, and returned two of them for touchdowns.

Born Richard Manual Jauron in Peoria on October 7, 1950, he later was a nine-letter winner at Swampscott (Mass.) High School. An offensive back as a collegian, he still owns Yale's career rushing record (2,947 yards in 515 attempts, a 5.7-yard average).

Dick and his wife, Gail, are the parents of two daughters, Kacy (born 4/2/85) and Amy (born 10/3/86).

KENT JOHNSTON

Strength and Conditioning

Genial Kent Johnston, who supervises the Packers' strength and conditioning programs on a year-round basis, has been credited with making a major contribution to the Green and Gold's success over the past two 9-and-7 seasons.

Implementing a comprehensive program upon his arrival in Green Bay, including weight control and nutrition as well as conditioning, he has contributed in areas beyond his customary domain, the

weight room. He has been credited with rendering valuable assistance in the rehabbing of injured players while also helping with advice and guidance on nutrition.



ASSISTANT COACHES

Since joining the Packers, Johnston has structured specific training programs for each player, as he previously had done at Tampa Bay, where he implemented karate as a segment of the Bucs' conditioning regimen. In the process, he also has initiated karate classes as an element of the Packers' conditioning program.

The soft-spoken Texan also has traveled around the country this off-season to monitor the conditioning progress of those players who do not live in the Green Bay area on a year-round basis, an itinerary which Head Coach Mike Holmgren expects to pay off in improved endurance and on-field performance during the 1994 season.

Johnston earlier earned high marks as a strength and conditioning coach at the University of Alabama under then-Head Coach Ray Perkins in 1985 and 1986, when the Crimson Tide's weight program was regarded as one of the nation's finest. The athletes he developed during that span include premier linebackers Cornelius Bennett (Buffalo Bills) and Derrick Thomas (Kansas City Chiefs) and such NBA performers as Buck Johnson (Houston Rockets), Derrick McKey (Seattle SuperSonics) and Michael Ansley (Orlando Magic).

Kent launched his coaching career in 1978 at Teague (Texas) High School as an assistant coach before signing on at Northwestern (La.) State in 1979. He next moved to Northeast Louisiana as strength coach in 1980 before returning to the prep ranks at Willis (Texas) High School in 1982. In 1983, he joined Perkins' University of Alabama staff as a graduate assistant for two seasons (1983-84) before being named strength and conditioning coach in 1985. When Perkins became head coach at Tampa Bay in 1987, Johnston joined his Buccaneer staff.

A graduate of Stephen F. Austin University, he played defensive back in football en route to earning his bachelor's degree in physical education and history. He secured his master's degree in physical education from Alabama in 1984.

Born in Mexia, Texas, February 21, 1956, Allen Kent Johnston graduated from Mexia High School, where he participated in football, tennis and track. Kent and his wife, Pam, have two sons, Kody (born 5/30/90) and Kole (born 5/7/92).

JIM LIND

Defensive Assistant/Quality Control

Jim Lind, who is in his third NFL season, spent nine years as a head coach in the college ranks before joining the Packer staff in 1992.

The 46-year-old Isle, Minn., native, named to the position of defensive assistant/quality control by Head Coach Mike Holmgren March 25, 1992, is teamed with Holmgren for a second time. They previously had coached together in 1982 when the Packer head coach was a member of LaVell Edwards' staff at Brigham Young University and Lind a graduate assistant.

Head coach at the University of Minnesota-Morris from 1983 through 1986, Jim directed the UMM Cougars to two championships in the Northern Intercollegiate Conference.

In the process, he was named NIC "Coach of the Year" in 1984 and NAIA District 13 "Coach of the Year" in 1986.

Lind served as head coach at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire from 1987 through 1991.

The Packer aide began his college coaching career at St. Cloud (Minn.) State, where he was a graduate assistant in 1977 and offensive coordinator in 1978. He moved to St. John's University (Minn.) in 1979, serving as defensive coordinator under John Gagliardi.

Earlier, Lind entered his profession in 1974 at Underwood (Minn.) High School, where he took over a team which had won one game the previous year and subsequently produced a Little Eight Conference championship in his first season.

Born November 11, 1947, Lind played football and participated in track at Isle (Minn.) High School. He later played linebacker for one year at Bethel College and defensive back for two years at Bemidji (Minn.)

State, from which he received his undergraduate degree. Lind subsequently earned his master's degree at St. Cloud State and defended his dissertation and completed his doctorate in Professional Leadership in Physical Education and Athletics at BYU in 1987.

TOM LOVAT

Offensive Line

Tom Lovat, now in his third year on the Green Bay staff and his 15th as a National Football League coach, has molded the Packer offensive line into one of the NFL's most effective such units over the past two seasons.

The first assistant to be hired by then-new Head Coach Mike Holmgren (January 14, 1992), Lovat did perhaps the finest coaching job of his professional career in 1993. Despite the injury loss of three of five starters during the course of the season (center James Campen, guard Rich Moran and tackle Tootie Robbins), he was able to maintain a consistent, productive and well-coordinated unit over the 16-game regular-season schedule and throughout the playoffs.

So effective was the Packer O-Line under his direction that repeating Super Bowl champion Dallas was the only National Football Conference team to yield fewer sacks (29) during the '93 season than Green Bay's front wall, which gave up 30 — an average of 1.9 per game. The Packer total also represented the fewest sacks a Green Bay offensive line has given up in a season since the NFL adopted the 16-game season in 1978.

Lovat enjoyed similar success in 1992, the first year of his second tour of duty with the Packers. Although hampered by injury problems which caused Moran to miss half the season and Campen to sit out three games, the Green and Gold's offense ranked among the league leaders in both third- and fourth-down efficiency, a development traceable in no small measure to the performance of Lovat's line.

The genial Utah native, a 33-year coaching veteran and a member of the Phoenix Cardinals' staff prior to re-joining the Packers, previously served as a Green Bay's offensive line assistant (to Ernie McMillan) in 1980 under Bart Starr.

Well respected for his teaching skills, Lovat launched his coaching career at the University of Utah in 1967 while completing his master's degree, received in 1968.

He moved on to Idaho State and then to Saskatchewan of the Canadian Football League, taking on his first professional assignment as defensive coach for the Roughriders in 1971.

Lovat returned to Utah as an assistant in 1972 and later was named the school's head coach in 1974, a position he held through the 1976 season. He then moved to Stanford, where he was a member of the Bill Walsh staff from 1977 through 1979, before signing on with the Packers for the first time in 1980.

Lovat next joined the Cardinals for the first time in 1981, serving as offensive line coach through the 1984 season. He then became assistant head coach-offense for the Colts, holding the position from 1985 through 1988 under Ron Meyer, the Colts leading the American Football Conference in rushing in 1985 under his direction.

Tom subsequently spent the 1989 season as offensive line coach at the University of Wyoming before re-joining the Cardinals in 1990. That '90 season, his offensive line allowed only 43 quarterback sacks, the lowest total by the Cardinals in 11 seasons and one, oddly enough, that the Phoenix forward wall matched in 1991. In the '90 process, Lovat's line paved the way for rookie running back Johnny Johnson to earn Pro Bowl honors.

Lovat is a 1961 graduate of the University of Utah, where he was a three-year football and baseball letterman for the Utes, earning All-Skyline Conference honors in baseball.

Tom, who was born in Bingham Canyon, Utah, December 28, 1938, and his wife, Lyn, have three children: a daughter, Johna Rae Griese, and two sons, Matthew and Mark.

STEVE MARIUCCI

Quarterbacks

There is a storybook quality about the odyssey which brought Steve Mariucci to Green Bay as a member of the Packer coaching staff. A Packer fan from early on in his native Iron Mountain, Mich., he subsequently became a record-setting college quarterback and later established himself in the coaching profession in far away California before returning to his home area as quarterbacks coach of the Packers.

In the latter capacity, Mariucci has played a key role in another intriguing "story," the rapid rise and development of young quarterback Brett Favre, who responded with two record-setting seasons after being thrust into the starting assignment by an injury to incumbent Don Majkowski early in the 1992 season.

Under Mariucci's patient tutelage, Favre became the youngest quarterback ever to play in the Pro Bowl following the '92 season, setting a Packer single-season record for passing percentage (64.12) in the process and leading the Green and Gold to all nine of their victories after replacing Majkowski in Game 3. Favre continued to improve in 1993, establishing an all-time Packer career passing percentage record (62.8) and becoming the first passer in team history to complete 300 or more passes in two seasons.

Mariucci, named to the Green Bay staff by then-new Head Coach Mike Holmgren on January 27, 1992, had spent the previous five seasons on the University of California-Berkeley's staff — the first three tutoring the wide receivers and special teams, the last two as offensive coordinator — following other assistant coaching positions in the college ranks at USC, Louisville, Cal State-Fullerton, and at his alma mater, Northern Michigan.

Along the way, he also put in a season as wide receivers/tight ends coach for the Orlando Renegades of the United States Football League and another as quality control coach on John Robinson's Los Angeles Rams staff, both in 1985.

A star quarterback at Iron Mountain High School and Northern Michigan University, Mariucci started as a freshman at Northern after injuries telled the first four quarterbacks on the Wildcats' roster. As a sophomore in 1975, he led Northern to the Division II national championship.

Named a Division II All-America quarterback in both 1976 and '77, Mariucci was chosen the Wildcats' Most Valuable Player in three of his four seasons and closed out his collegiate career with 14 school passing records. He finished eighth in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy in 1976, the year Tony Dorsett received the honor. In 1988, Mariucci was named to the Northern Michigan Hall of Fame.

One of the highlights of Mariucci's boyhood came when he won a Green Bay Packer jacket for taking first place in a Punt, Pass and Kick contest when he was 10 years old. "I was so proud of it," he recalls. "I was afraid to get it ruined. I barely wore it. I saved it."

Born November 4, 1955, Mariucci and his wife, Gayle, have three sons — Tyler (born 11/28/84), Adam (born 8/23/86) and Stephen (born 2/3/89).

ANDY REID

Tight Ends/Assistant Offensive Line

Andy Reid, who built a reputation for developing outstanding offensive lines while in the college ranks, has had comparable success in a more specific role as the Packers' tight end coach over the past two seasons.

Under his demanding, yet nurturing tutelage, Jackie Harris matured into one of the premier tight ends in the National Football League. During Reid's tenure, Harris caught 97 passes, including 55

in 1992 when he fell just one reception short of the Packers' all-time single-season record for a tight end and 42 during a personal 1993 season abbreviated to 12 games by injury. Veteran Ed West also had one of his most productive years last season as a some-time starter, making 25 catches to provide the Packers — in company with Harris — the imposing total of 67 receptions for the tight end position.

The 36-year-old Reid, who had been offensive line coach at the University of Missouri since 1989, was named to the Packer staff by Head Coach Mike Holmgren on January 21, 1992, to assist Tom Lovat with the offensive line in addition to coaching the tight ends.

Quality pass-blocking offensive lines, in both the Division I and II ranks, had been Reid's hallmark since launching his coaching career at San Francisco State in 1983. The school led the nation in passing offense and total offense for three consecutive years (1983-84-85) while he served as offensive coordinator, offensive line coach and strength coach.

Reid moved to Northern Arizona as offensive line coach in 1986, then to Texas-El Paso in 1987. When Bob Stull took over as head coach at Missouri in 1988, he joined Stull's Tiger staff. Andy received his coaching start at his alma mater, Brigham Young, as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards in 1982.

An offensive tackle/guard on three Holiday Bowl teams as a collegian, Reid earned three varsity football letters at BYU, graduating with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He also received a master's degree in Professional Leadership in Physical Education and Athletics.

Andy, born in Los Angeles March 19, 1958, and his wife, Tammy, have five children: Garrett (born 4/13/83), Britt (born 4/28/85), Crosby (born 3/17/88), Drew Ann (born 3/9/90) and Spencer (born 6/9/92).

General Assistant

Harry Sydney, a veteran of 10 playing seasons and two Super Bowl championships, is in the first year of a second career as a member of the Packer coaching staff.

Sydney, 35, was named to a new staff position — to "work with many areas of the football team" — by Head Coach Mike Holmgren on January 28, 1994.

"People always said Harry was like a coach while he still was playing," Holmgren said in making the appointment. "I think he'll make an excellent teacher."

Sydney, a fullback, played on Super Bowl championship teams in 1988 and 1989 during a five-year tenure with the San Francisco 49ers in which he served as the Niners' special teams captain.

In one subsequent season with the Packers, 1992, he caught 49 passes for 384 yards and rushed for 163 yards in 51 carries while helping the Green and Gold post a 9-and-7 record, their second-best mark in a 20-year span.



ASSISTANT COACHES

Sydney earlier played in the USFL for three years and in the Canadian Football League for one season prior to joining the 49ers in 1987. A wishbone quarterback at the University of Kansas as a collegian, he moved to running back prior to his junior season and earned All-Big Eight honors at the position.

Born Harry Flanroy Sydney III in Petersburg, Va., June 26, 1959, he was an all-state performer in both football and basketball at Seventy-First High School in Fayetteville, N.C.

Sydney, who owns a degree in criminal justice from the University of Kansas, is the possessor of a highly eclectic resume. In addition to having taught a high school psychology course on a "sabbatical" from pro football in 1986, he also reports having had a variety of odd jobs in earlier years — cook, factory worker, basketball referee and driver of a soft drink truck, among others.

Harry and his wife, Nancy, have four children: Harry IV (born 6/13/81), Zachary (born 11/29/85), Nathan (born 12/26/89) and Taylor (born 10/12/92).

BOB VALESENTE

Linebackers

Now in his 33rd year in his chosen profession, Bob Valesente has done it all, vocationally speaking, having coached at every level — high school, college and professional.

Along the way, the 54-year-old Seneca Falls, N.Y., native has had extensive teaching experience on both sides of the football — as a head coach, assistant head coach and offensive or defensive coordinator for seven colleges and universities.

Bob, who joined the Packer staff in 1992 after two seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers, is on his third NFL coaching assignment. In addition to his tour of duty with the Steelers, he previously had been secondary/special teams coach for the then-Baltimore Colts in 1982-83.

Valesente began his coaching career at Ithaca (N.Y.) High School in 1962. He left the coaching profession temporarily after one year to play professional baseball for the Chicago Cubs organization in 1963 and '64. Valesente subsequently launched his college coaching career at Cornell University as freshman defensive coordinator in 1964. After 10 seasons at Cornell, the last five as varsity secondary coach, he moved to the University of Cincinnati as secondary coach in 1975-76, then to Arizona (1977-79) and to Mississippi State (1980-81) as defensive coordinator/linebackers coach.

Valesente (the name is pronounced VAL-uh-SEN-tee) then received his first NFL coaching opportunity at Baltimore in 1982, subsequently returning to the college ranks as assistant head coach/quarterbacks coach at the University of Kansas in 1984. He later was named head coach in 1986, then spent one year as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Maryland in 1988 before joining the University of Pittsburgh staff. During Bob's tenure at Kansas, the Jayhawks set numerous passing records.

Bob was named linebackers coach for the Steelers by then-Head Coach Chuck Noll March 9, 1990, after serving as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator at Pitt in 1989. Under his tutelage, both David Little and Greg Lloyd blossomed into All-Pro performers, helping the Steelers earn the league's No. 1 overall ranking on defense in 1990.

A graduate of Ithaca College, Valesente played halfback on the football varsity and was a catcher/outfielder for the baseball team that reached the 1962 College World Series. Drafted by the Chicago Cubs, he played at the Class A level in 1963-64.

Valesente, a member of the Ithaca College Hall of Fame, graduated in 1962 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, subsequently earning his master's degree from the same institution in 1965.

Bob, born in Seneca Falls, N.Y., on July 19, 1940, and his wife, Joan, have three children — a son, Rob, 26, and two daughters, Ginger Valesente Weekly, 28, and Michelle, 14.

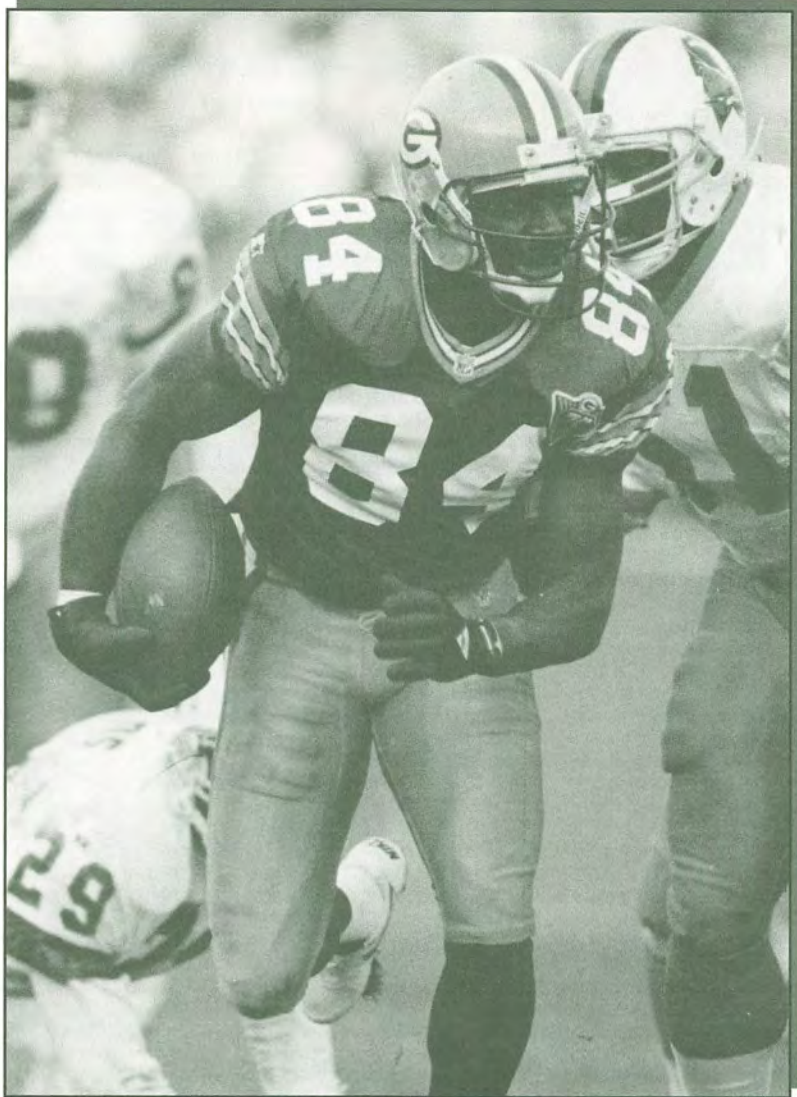

"He's an excellent open-field runner after the catch and he can go over the middle and catch. He blocks well downfield and he plays full speed every play — he gives you everything he has. first time in 1993...His rookie, 1992 campaign had been "abbreviated" by a contractual stalemate which found him missing training camp and the first two games of the regular season, delaying his professional development...Defensive Backfield Coach Dick Jauron, for one, is convinced Buckley is poised to become a dominant factor in the Green Bay secondary..."I think Terrell has made a lot of progress in two years," he said. "He's a very competitive guy — I think he really enjoys playing. The one thing that happened to him was the fact that, when he came in here as a rookie, he was put right out there on the field. And when you have that, you're going to have to live with mistakes, because that's the only way they're going to learn. He's been living with that, swimming upstream while playing against the best players in the world, and he's held his own. I think he's now ready to make a step because he's seen a lot. I expect him to have a good year. Not that he had a bad year last year — he made a lot of plays, he had a lot of good downs for us last year. But because of his background and his accomplishments in college, people expect a lot of him. And when they don't get what they expect, they tend to sound off. But there are a lot of positives to focus on. He has a lot of skills — he has great quickness and he can locate a thrown ball and make a play. You're always looking for people who can make a play, and he can do that. He's got the speed, he's got the closing ability. And though he's not a very big corner, he is extremely competitive. PRO: A professional's professional, flamboyant, far-ranging LeRoy Butler scaled All-Pro heights in 1993, capping a remarkable fourth season by making it to the Pro Bowl for the first time...And, though he set an unofficial club record for passes

defended in only his second year at strong safety and led the team in interceptions en route to a career year — both major accomplishments — his position coach is convinced Number 36 still is not at the top of the game...“I don't think there's anybody in the business any better than this guy at strong safety,” defensive backfield coach Dick Jauron says without a hint of equivocation. “And I don't think he's reached his potential yet. Number one, he likes to play. He likes the competition, he likes the contact. He likes game day — and he prepares well for game day. He's a thinker on the field. He's also big, strong, fast, and he has great hands. And he has tremendous anticipation. He has all the intangibles. It's not very difficult to coach a player like LeRoy Butler.”...Forging to the front as a team leader, he also became a potent moral force as well as a highly physical factor in the Packer defense...The irrepressible Butler, a cornerback in his first two seasons, also entertained Packer fans by executing impromptu dance “routines” after making big plays, some of which found their way into the team's highlights video...His fancy footwork provided a vivid illustration of how far LeRoy has come from a childhood which once found him wheelchair-bound...There was a time when dancing would have been impossible for Butler — because the bones in his feet were extremely weak, creating a misalignment which allowed him to walk only short distances and prevented him from running...For most of his childhood, his feet thus were in braces or casts, and there were periods when he was bound to a wheelchair...By the time he reached seventh grade, however, his feet had healed and he was on his way to Florida State and the NFL...**1993:** Tied for second in the NFC while leading the team with 6 interceptions — equalling the most INTs in one season by a Green Bay defender since 1989 — and starting all 16 games at strong safety...His 25 passes defended also were an unofficial team record, his total being the most in one season by a Packer since the club regularly began keeping the statistic in 1982...It also was 11 pass breakups higher than Butler's previous one-season career best of 14, achieved in 1992...Surpassed 100 tackles for the first time in his career, his 111 stops (including 89 solo) ranking third on the defense behind Johnny Holland and George Koonce...Named first-team All-Pro by *Associated Press*, *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA, *Sports Illustrated*, *Sporting News* and *Football Digest*...Also chosen to All-NFC squads of *UPI* and *Football News*, he was named to the Pro Bowl as an alternate, eventually replacing the Dallas Cowboys' Thomas Everett, who was sidelined by injury...Tabbed as Packers' Defensive Most Valuable Player...Had 4 tackles, 1 interception and 4 passes defended in season-opening win over L.A. PRO: A heralded addition via unrestricted free agency, Reggie Cobb was acquired in the off-season as the long-awaited key to a substantial Packer running game...The Green and Gold has not had a 1,000-yard rusher in 15 years and running backs coach Gil Haskell is convinced that Cobb, who surpassed the magic number as a Buccaneer in 1992, can be the first Packer to scale that plateau since Terrell Middleton did so in 1978...“Reggie’s really a good player — he’s a legitimate 1,000-yard back,” Haskell said of the Packer newcomer. “He’s a smooth runner. He sees things easily — it’s not hard for him to find the right hole. He should upgrade the position. He’s sharp — he’s with the game. And I think



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he wants to be good — he doesn't want to just put in his time, he wants to be the best. He has good hands. And he's deceptively fast — he's so smooth you don't really know how fast he's going. He's a legitimate good back..." Signed as an unrestricted free agent April 22, after turning down a more lucrative contract from Tampa Bay, he is the second-ranking rusher in Buccaneer history, having gained 3,061 yards in 878 attempts, a 3.5-yard average, and scored 21 touchdowns...He also has caught 84 passes (for 627 yards and 1 TD) in his four NFL seasons, including a career-high 39 as a 1990 rookie...An accomplished runner both inside and outside...**1993:** Despite missing four games with a sprained knee, managed to rush for 658 yards in 221 attempts, a 3.0-yard average, and 3 TDs...Also had 9 receptions for 61 yards and his first receiving touchdown in NFL...Finished season with 3,061 career rushing yards, surpassing Ricky Bell (3,057), to become second-ranking rusher in Tampa Bay history...Joined Bucs' all-time leading rusher James Wilder as the only Tampa Bay backs to record three consecutive 500-yard seasons...Also scored 4 touchdowns to move into ninth place on team's all-time scoring list with 132 points...Posted at least 50 rushing yards in eight of the 12 games he played in (10 starts)...Ground out 113 yards and 1 TD on 25 carries vs. Detroit (Oct. 3) for his third career 100-yard effort against Lions...Carried 18 times for 75 yards in first half of Atlanta contest (Oct. 31) before spraining the medial collateral ligament in his left knee...Forced onto the Bucs' inactive list for the next four weeks by knee ailment, had a string of 55 consecutive games played snapped in the process...Returned to lineup Dec. 5 vs. Washington, rushing for 59 yards on 15 attempts...Gained 295 yards over Bucs' final five games...Rushed for 2 scores at the Raiders (Dec. 19), the second multiple-touchdown game of his pro career...**1992:** Emerged as one of the NFL's elite running backs, gaining 1,171 yards on the ground to become only the third Bucs runner ever to surpass the 1,000-yard mark...Finished fourth in the NFC (seventh in the NFL), he also became the first Tampa Bay player to rush for over 1,000 yards since Wilder in 1985...Began the season as Buccaneers' starter at tailback and proceeded to become the first non-kicker to lead the team in scoring (54 points) since the club's inaugural year of 1976...His accomplishments included a team record-tying five straight games with a TD run...Also turned in four 100-yard rushing games, pushing his career total to six...Victimized Chicago for over 100 yards in both meetings with the Bears, including a season-high 114 yards on a career-high 28 carries (Nov. 15)...Also posted two other 100-yard rushing days, 107 at Detroit (Sept. 27) and 100 vs. the L.A. Quarterback

PRO: In just two tumultuous seasons, freewheeling Brett Favre has made a major imprint on the Packer record book, escorted the Green and Gold to back-to-back winning seasons for the first time in a quarter-century, led them into the playoffs for the first

time in more than a decade, gone to the Pro Bowl each year and simultaneously whetted the faithful's appetite for even bigger things in the years to come...Impressive contributions, to be sure, yet ones that have only heightened the expectations of Head Coach Mike Holmgren and quarterbacks coach Steve Mariucci... "Reaching the Pro Bowl twice is fine, well and good, but it is not the only measure of a quarterback. The next step is to take his team further," Mariucci said in assessing Favre's professional progress and potential. "The great quarterbacks put their teams in a position to get to the Super Bowl. Last January, for example, it was (Joe) Montana of Kansas City against (Jim) Kelly of Buffalo in the AFC championship game and (Troy) Aikman of Dallas against (Steve) Young of San Francisco in the NFC championship game. That's the next step for Brett — winning more games, winning the division. Aside from the personal statistics, that's the next step. They're team goals. How does that happen? By playing consistently well. Brett has shown flashes of greatness and he's shown flashes of being a rookie. Now he has to become consistent. He's shown that he's durable — he's started 31 straight games and only two NFL quarterbacks have longer streaks, so durability is a plus for him. He has a real strong arm and he's a physically tough kid. He's very courageous — he doesn't fear any situation or a hostile environment. They don't bother him. He's confident and very focused — he shows poise and leadership — and that rubs off. He's a winner — he plays hurt, he practices hurt. And he's coachable — he listens. He also has shown that he can win big games for us, he's been on, 'Monday Night Football,' he's been in playoff games. Now it's time for him to be a steady, consistent, reliable quarterback, week after week...win...And I have every reason to believe that he will take that next step this year."...Acquired from Atlanta for a first-round draft choice during a February, 1992 trade, he had authored only 5 passes for the Falcons in minimal action during his rookie, 1991 season (without a completion), giving little indication in limited opportunity of the record-breaking productivity to come...Owns a 17-12 regular-season record as a starter since taking over the position in the fourth game of the 1992 campaign...With 6,530 career passing yards, he is only the ninth player in Packer history to pass for over 5,000 yards and ranks seventh in club annals entering the '94 season...**1993:** Started all 16 games — one of only seven NFL quarterbacks to do so...Became the most accurate career passer in Packer history in the '93 process (62.44%), based on 620 completions in 993 attempts, supplanting the legendary Bart Starr (57.42%)...Finished the year eighth in the NFC with a 72.2 passer rating, completing 318 of 522 passes (60.9%) for 3,303 yards and 19 touchdowns, with 24 interceptions...Was first among all NFC passers (second in NFL) with 318 completions and his 19 TDs ranked third in the conference (fifth in the NFL)...His 3,303 passing yards were second in the NFC to Young (sixth in the NFL) and also bettered his previous best of 3,227 yards in 1992...With 3,000-plus passing yards, became only the second player in Packer history with two career 3,000-yard seasons to his credit — Lynn Dickey posted three such years over his nine seasons in Green Bay...His 318 completions also represented the second-best one-season total in team history (Don Majkowski had 353 in 1989) and his 522 attempts were second-highest in club annals (Majkowski had 599 in '89)...His 3,303 passing yards and his 19 touchdown passes also were the fourth- and fifth-highest totals, respectively, in Packer annals...Played in the Pro Bowl as a



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reserve when the Giants' Phil Simms could not due to shoulder difficulties...Completed 19 of 29 passes for 264 yards and 2 TDs, with 1 INT, to lead Packers to 36-6 win over L.A. Rams in season opener (Sept. 5)...Had a rough outing the following week vs. Philadelphia, hitting on 12 of 24 passes for 111 yards and 2 TDs with 2 INTs in 20-17 defeat...Completed 20 of 31 passes for 150 yards (2 INTs) in 15-13 loss at Minnesota (Sept. 26)...Scored game's only TD vs. Vikings as Packers took opening kickoff and marched 85 yards in 14 plays (8:55 elapsed), capped by his diving 2-yard plunge to give Packers the early lead...Hit 21 of 37 passes for 174 yards and had 1 carry for 9 yards in 36-14 loss at Dallas (Oct. 3)...Turned in strong performance vs. Denver (Oct. 10), completing 20 of 32 passes for 235 yards and 1 TD (a 66-yarder to TE Jackie Harris), with 3 INTs...Had highly productive outing at Tampa Bay (Oct. 24) when he completed 20 of 35 passes for 268 yards and a career-high 4 touchdowns (all of the latter to Sterling Sharpe), escorting Packers to 37-14 win...Led Packers to 17-3 victory over Chicago (Oct. 31), hitting on 15 of 24 passes for 136 yards and 1 TD (a 21-yarder to Sharpe), with 1 INT...Threw a 35-yard TD pass to Harris among his 20 completions in 34 attempts at Kansas City (Nov. 8)...Staged gritty performance in leading Packers to 19-17, come-from-behind victory over Saints in New Orleans (Nov. 14)...Came up with the biggest play of the season to that point when, on a second-and-20 play from the Packers' 27-yard line with 52 seconds left and the Packers down 17-16, he rolled out of the pocket to his left and hit Sharpe with a 54-yard strike that led to Chris Jacke's game-winning FG...Closed out day with 18 completions in 32 attempts for 150 yards and 1 TD...Led Packers to 26-17 win over Detroit (Nov. 21), throwing for 259 yards (24 of 33 — for a season-best 72.7%)...Led Packers to a come-from-behind, 13-10 win over Tampa Bay (Nov. 28) when he directed a 15-play, 75-yard scoring drive late in the fourth quarter, capping it with a 2-yard TD pass to Sharpe with 1:16 left to give the Packers the win...On the play previous to his scoring strike to Sharpe, he had suffered a deep thigh bruise on a 1-yard rollout to the right sideline, but, even though limping noticeably, threw the game-winner on the next play...Finished Bucs contest with 23 completions in 36 attempts for 159 yards and 1 TD, with no INTs...Set a Packer single-game record with 36 completions at Chicago (Dec. 5), breaking the previous record of 35 set by Dickey in 1980...His 54 attempts in that contest tied him for second place in Packer annals (with Randy Wright)...Also threw for career-high 402 yards vs. Bears — the third-most in team history (behind Dickey's 418 vs. Tampa Bay in 1980 and Don Horn's 410 vs. the Cardinals in 1969)...It also represented the first 300- and 400-yard passing games of Favre's career...Also threw for 2 TDs vs. Bears (an 18-yarder to Sharpe and a 22-yarder to Mark Clayton), but had 3 INTs...Led Packers to 20-13 win at San Diego (Dec. 12) when he completed 13 of 23 passes for 146 yards...Forged fine performance in losing cause vs. Minnesota (Dec. 19), throwing for 256 yards and 2 TDs, with 1 INT, on 20 completions in 33 attempts...Turned in solid outing vs. Raiders (Dec. 26) in -22 degree wind chill, passing for 190 yards and 1 TD (a 23-yarder to Sharpe in the third quarter) on 14 completions in 28 attempts, with no INTs...Completed 23 of 37 passes for 190 yards and 1 TD (a 39-yarder to Edgar Bennett) in season-ending loss to Detroit (Jan. 2), but also threw a career-high 4 interceptions...**The Playoffs:** Pulled off one of the most spectacular plays in Packer history in wild card playoff the following week (Jan. 8)...With the Packers trailing 24-21 in the final minute of play, he scrambled out of pocket to his left, found an "unguarded" Sharpe in the open and unleashed an across-the-body throw from extreme left to extreme right; Sharpe ran under the football in the end zone with 55 seconds left and the Packers shortly became 28-24 winners...Had thrown 2 earlier TD passes to Sharpe (a 12-yarder in the second quarter and a 28-yarder in the third period) while completing 15 of 26 passes for 204 yards overall...Also rushed 4 times for 18 yards...Threw 2 more TD passes in losing (27-17) effort in divisional playoff at Dallas the following week (Jan. 16) — a 2-yarder to Robert Brooks and a 29-yarder to Sharpe...Closed out day with 28 completions in 45 attempts for 331 yards (one yard short of Packers' single-game playoff record) and the 2 TDs, with 2 INTs...**1992:** Keyed Packers' 9-and-7 resurgence (following a 4-and-12 season in 1991) in a meteoric rise from designated backup to Pro Bowler in just three months' time...Was so impressive in escorting Green Bay to its second-best record in 20 years that Holmgren was prompted to observe, "If Brett can stay healthy, he will be the cornerstone of our football team for many years to come."...Began the season as the understudy to



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incumbent Majkowski, then was hastily summoned from the bench to replace an injured Majkowski in the first quarter of Game 3 vs. Cincinnati (Sept. 20) and proceeded to take a stranglehold on the QB position, staking an immediate claim by leading the Packers to an electrifying, come-from-behind, 24-23 victory over the Bengals, forged by way of a 35-yard scoring pass to wideout Kitrick Taylor with only 13 seconds remaining in the game...Performing in storybook fashion, he went on to compile an 8-5 record as a starter and establish two new Packer passing records in the process — single-season marks for passing percentage (64.12%) and most consecutive 200-yard passing games (11)...Named as third QB for NFC Pro Bowl squad after finishing fifth among conference passers with an 85.3 overall rating, based on 302 completions in 471 attempts for 3,227 yards and 18 touchdowns with only 13 interceptions...His 302 completions tied him with Aikman of Super Bowl champion Cowboys for first-place honors in NFC....Also ranked second in conference to Young with his 64.12 passing percentage, which broke Starr's Packer single-season record of 63.74, set in 1968...Had third-lowest interception percentage among all NFL quarterbacks (2.76)...Also became only fourth Packers QB to pass for over 3,000 yards in a season, his 3,227 yards then representing the fifth-highest single-season total in team history...His 18 TD passes then tied him with Tobin Rote (1956) for the fifth-most in one season in Packer history...Had a string of 111 passes without an interception broken at Oilers on Dec. 13...Did not play vs. Minnesota in regular-season opener on Sept. 6, but saw action in relief role the next week at Tampa Bay (Sept. 13), completing 8 of 14 passes for 73 yards in second-half play...Engineered 2 TD drives in last eight minutes of game to pull out 24-23 victory over Cincinnati (Sept. 20) after relieving injured Majkowski in opening quarter...Threw for season-high 289 yards against Bengals on 22 of 39 passing...Made first NFL start on Sept. 27 vs. Pittsburgh and responded by completing 14 of 19 passes for 210 yards and 2 TDs, including a 76-yarder to Sharpe, with no interceptions...Played well at Atlanta (Oct. 4) despite heavy pressure from Falcon defense...Completed 33 of 43 passes for 276 yards and 1 TD, his 33 completions then representing the third-most ever by a Packer QB in one game...His 76.7 completion percentage vs. former mates also was a career single-game best...Led Packers to 27-13 victory over Detroit (Nov. 1) at Pontiac (Mich.), Silverdome, completing 22 of 37 passes for 212 yards and 2 TDs...Completed 27 of a season-high 44 attempts for 279 yards at N.Y. Giants (Nov. 8) but had 3 interceptions, his first multiple-interception contest of the season...Also forced a fumble vs. Giants — recovered by teammate Sanjay Beach — in an impromptu role as a tackler, hitting New York's Pepper Johnson after Johnson had intercepted a pass...Staged an inspiring performance vs. Philadelphia (Nov. 15), leading Packers to a 27-24, come-from-behind victory despite suffering a first-degree separation of his left (non-throwing) shoulder early in the game...Completed 23 of 33 for 275 yards and 2 scores with 2 interceptions in upset of Eagles...Had a 5-yard TD run (his first NFL touchdown) at Bears a week later (Nov. 22) during a fine overall performance, which saw him complete 16 of 24 passes for 209 yards and 1 TD (a 49-yard strike to Sharpe) in 17-3 triumph...Had productive afternoon in return meeting with Tampa Bay (Nov. 29), completing 26 of 41 passes for 223 yards and 1 TD (a 9-yard throw to Harris in 4th quarter) in leading Packers to 19-14 win...Posted high percentage performance in rematch with Lions (Dec. 6), hitting on 15 of 19 passes for 214 yards and 3 TDs (the first 3-touchdown game of his career) in escorting Packers to 38-10 victory...Also effective at Houston (Nov. 13), completing 19 of 30 passes for 155 yards in 16-14 win over Oilers...Closed out regular-season home schedule with a 14 for 23 effort vs. L.A. Rams (Dec. 20), good for 188 yards and 2 TDs (both to Sharpe) in a 28-13 victory...**1991:** Was second-round draft selection by Falcons (33rd overall and third quarterback, after Dan McGwire and Todd Marinovich)...Completed 14 of 32 passes for 160 yards and 2 touchdowns, with 1 interception, in the preseason...Active for three games during the regular season, he played in two, attempting five passes without a completion.

COLLEGE: Led his Southern Mississippi team to 29 victories, including two bowl triumphs, during four varsity seasons (1987-90), and climaxed his collegiate career by earning a Most Valuable Player award in the East-West Shrine game featuring the nation's best seniors...Set school records for passing yards (8,193), passing attempts (1,234), completions (656), passing percentage (53.0) and touchdowns (55), with only 35 interceptions...His production included five 300-yard passing games and



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five 3-TD performances, while his 7,695 regular-season passing yards ranked him among the top 30 of all-time NCAA passers...His 1.57 interception ratio in 1988 was the lowest among the 50 top-ranked passers in the nation, and his 2.9 interception rate for his four-year career (based on only 34 in 1,169 attempts) also ranks as one of the best in NCAA history...Overcame injuries in a serious summer car accident prior to his senior season to lead his team to an 8-3 record and just eight points from an undefeated season...Suffered internal injuries in the accident on July 14, 1990, he subsequently had 30 inches of his intestines surgically removed 24 days later (Aug. 7)...Shocked his coaches and teammates by returning to the starting lineup a month later (Sept. 8) and escorting the Golden Eagles to an upset over Alabama...Also was MVP of All-American Bowl at conclusion of senior year...Became starter at Southern Miss in third game of his freshman season...Special education major.

PRO: A key, consistent and productive performer in the Packers' offensive line at right guard as a major unrestricted free agent addition in 1993, Harry Galbreath is expected to be an even bigger contributor — literally as well as figuratively — this season...Has put on 15 pounds, adding the weight at the request of Head Coach Mike Holmgren and offensive line coach Tom Lovat, as a safeguard against season-long process of attrition..."Harry was a mainstay last year — he didn't miss any games — and his productivity was good," Lovat said. "We expect him to be even better this year if he can keep his weight up. He got real small toward the end of the year and it affected his play. If he can keep his weight up, he will be one of our top linemen."...The added bulk had made a difference as early as mini-camp time...Kent Johnston, the Packers' strength and conditioning coach, reported, "Harry has improved his strength. He benched 400 pounds six times in a row, which is considerably better than he had done before, and is a lot to bench for a football player."...Galbreath's best assets, according to Lovat, "are that he is quick and instinctive. He's a very quick, explosive football player. He runs well and gets out on the sweeps and screens. And he's tough — mentally tough. He's a legitimate tough guy. He plays hurt — he has the right pain threshold to play in this league. He's a professional."...A bulwark of the Miami Dolphins' highly regarded offensive line for

PRO: Just hitting his prime, even now is one of the most prolific kickers in Packers' history in only his sixth pro season...Also beginning to make his mark on the league record books, enters the '94 season as the fourth-most accurate kicker (78.38%) in NFL history...Already holds seven Packer records, is tied for three others and is on the verge of breaking a handful more...Also shares one league record...Had unquestionably his finest year in 1993, establishing personal marks for points scored, field goal accuracy and long-distance kicking...His career success rate of 78.38% (116/148) leaves him fourth all-time behind only the Jets' Nick Lowery (80.05%), the Dolphins' Pete Stoyanovich (79.62%) and the Chiefs' David Treadwell (78.48%) (see listing of top six at end of bio)...Known for both his accuracy and distance kicking...Has personal success buoyed by supreme confidence which is virtually unshakable..."He's a talented, young kicker who's got a lot of growth and a long career ahead of him," assesses Nolan Cromwell, coach of Green Bay's special teams. "Chris, in 1993, probably had the best season in his career from the standpoint of his accuracy and his accuracy from a distance. From 50-plus (yards) he was six out of seven, and I think that was a big factor in our team's success."...Jacke's overall success comes as no surprise to Cromwell, who gets to view him up close year-round..."Chris really is a true professional at his skill," he



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says. "He starts working out two weeks after the season and then works right up until training camp. He is so dedicated to his profession. He also is very self-contained emotionally. He doesn't express many emotions. He is very poised in his approach. It doesn't matter what is happening around him, he will remain focused on his job."...Is only five three-pointers away from breaking perhaps the most prestigious kicking record in team annals, that for most career field goals...Enters 1994 season with 116 career FGs, four behind club leader Chester Marcol's 120...Also has scored in 41 straight games, tying him with Al Del Greco for the third-longest streak in team history — and only four shy of Jan Stenerud's club mark of 45...Among the Packer records he already holds are: *Longest Field Goal* — 54 yards on Jan. 2, 1994, at Detroit; *Most Field Goals (game)* — 5 on Nov. 11, 1990, at L.A. Raiders; *Most Consecutive Field Goals* — 17 in 1993; *Most Field Goals, 50 or More Yards (career)* — 12; *Most Field Goals, 50 or More Yards (season)* — 6 in 1993; *Most Consecutive Points After Touchdown* — 121 from 1990-93 (current); and *Highest Point After Touchdown Percentage (career)* — 99.40%...Tied for three other team marks: *Most Points, No Touchdowns (season)* — 128 in 1993 (tied with Marcol, 1972); *Most Consecutive Seasons Leading Team in Field Goals* — 5 from 1989-93 (tied with Fred Cone, 1953-57); and *Most Consecutive Games Scoring Field Goals* — 12 from 1991-92 (tied with Stenerud, 1980-81)...Also shares NFL record (first set by Dean Biasucci of Indianapolis) for most 50-plus yard field goals in one season, his 6 in 1993 matching Biasucci's 6 in 1988...Has not had a field goal or extra point attempt blocked over his first five league seasons (315 total kicks — 148 FGs, 167 PATs)...Has 12 career game-winning kicks — successes which provided the eventual winning points — to his credit (8 FGs, 4 PATs), including three last year and six as a rookie...Highly successful from inside of 30 yards throughout his career — 46/48 (95.8%)...Had been a perfect 30/30 from '30-in' until missing from 25 yards vs. Pittsburgh in Week 4 of the 1992 season...Stands fifth on the Packers' all-time scoring list, entering the '94 season with 514 career points...Should climb all the way to third this year, passing Marcol (521) and Jim Taylor (546), after moving by Cone (455) in 1993...Has led Green Bay in scoring for five straight seasons, surpassed in club annals only by Don Hutson's seven from 1939-45...Has six of the 10 longest field goals in team history...Continues to hold No. 2 spot in club history for career field goal percentage (78.38%), bettered only by Hall of Famer Stenerud's 80.82%...Has missed only one extra point in his five-year career (166/167), his team-record string of 121 consecutive PATs made remains active entering the '94 campaign...Only failed extra point of pro career was his fourth attempt in 1990 season-opening victory over L.A. Rams (Sept. 9)...Should he lead Green Bay in field goals this year, would tie three others for most total seasons doing so in team history (six)...His 148 career field goals attempted is second only to Marcol's 195 in club annals...Holds career touchback percentage of 15.3%, 51 of his 333 kickoffs having been kicked out of or downed in the end zone...Relatively injury-free, has yet to miss a game in the NFL (80 regular season, two in the playoffs)...Faces new challenge in 1994 with implementation of league rules which limit kickers to a one-inch kicking tee and moves kickoffs back to the 30-yard line..."I think kicking with a one-inch tee is going to have an effect on every kicker," analyzes Cromwell. "For what I ask Chris to do in terms of directional kicking, he might have a little advantage there because of his kicking style and the way that he kicks it. I still feel he can give me good hang time and, hopefully, being backed up further with the lower tee, it's going to be a little lower, but I think Chris will maybe improve his distance with that."...1993: Enjoyed his best season to date, from both an accuracy and a scoring standpoint...Made all 35 PAT tries and was 31/37 on field goal attempts (83.78%) — a personal-best success rate and also the third-highest in team history (behind the 91.67% of Stenerud in 1981 and the 84.21% of Max Zendejas in 1987)...His career-high 128 points was second in NFC scoring — third in the NFL, surpassed only by the Raiders' Jeff Jaeger (132) and the Lions' Jason Hanson (130)...Personal point total tied the team record for most points (no TDs) in a single season, previously held by Marcol, who in 1972 also scored 128 points...Was the second time in his six pro seasons that he had reached the 100-point plateau — he had scored 108 points as a 1989 rookie — making him only the fourth player in club history to have two-or-more 100-point seasons (Paul Hornung, Hutson and Stenerud are the others)...His 31 FGs was second in team record books for most in one season, bettered only by Marcol's 33 in 1972...Successful from most distances, set a team



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mark and tied an NFL single-season record with 6 field goals of 50-plus yards, equalling the number of 50-yarders booted by the Colts' Biasucci in 1988 (the Rams' Tony Zendejas also had 6 FGs from beyond 50 yards last year)...Scaled new heights in Packer annals when he connected on a 54-yard field goal in the regular-season finale at Detroit (Jan. 2), breaking the club record of 53 yards done four times previously (once by Stenerud, by himself on three occasions)...Duly recognized for his achievements, was bestowed with most national honors of his career...First-team All-Pro selection of *Associated Press*...Also named to All-Pro squad of *College & Pro Football Newsweekly*...Established a new team record by making 17 straight field goals — he had held the previous mark of 15 set over the 1989-90 seasons — before string was snapped vs. Detroit (Nov. 21)...Began season by kicking a 51-yard field goal in opening day victory over the Rams (Sept. 5)...Named NFC 'Special Teams Player of the Week' after converting all 3 FG tries and 3 PAT attempts in 30-27 "Nitro" win over Denver (Oct. 10)...Two weeks later at Tampa Bay, also hit 3 FGs, including a 50-yarder, in 37-14 pounding of Bucs...Surpassed previous club record for consecutive PATs made — 99 by Hornung — vs. Buccaneers...Again booted 3 field goals in Monday night tilt at Kansas City (Nov. 8), one of which covered 51 yards, in the process of which reaching the minimum 100 career field goals made for inclusion in the NFL's all-time accuracy listing...Connected on his most pressure-packed field goal attempt of the season — a 36-yarder with :03 remaining — to lift Packers to 19-17 triumph over New Orleans at the Louisiana Superdome (Nov. 14)...Was 11th game-winning kick of his NFL career...Hit 4 field goals overall vs. Saints, earning him *Pro Football Weekly's* 'Golden Toe Award'...Had 4 FGs for second straight game, against Detroit on Nov. 21, including a 52-yarder...Held string of 26 consecutive field goals made from inside the 40-yard line before missing from 36 yards at Chicago (Dec. 5)...Converted FG tries of 51 and 42 yards in 20-13 prime-time victory at San Diego (Dec. 12)...Had scored at least one field goal in 10 straight games (two off team record he himself shares with Stenerud) before streak was snapped vs. Raiders (Dec. 26) when he missed his only two attempts in sub-zero temperatures...Made both FG efforts, including his team-record 54-yarder, Jan. 2 vs. Lions at Pontiac (Mich.) Silverdome...Had a career-high 5 special teams tackles (4 unassisted) over the course of the year...Of his 82 kickoffs, 21 went into the end zone and 7 resulted in touchbacks (8.5%)...Was 1/2 in the post-season, both of his attempts coming in the Packers' divisional playoff loss at Dallas (Jan. 16)...Also made all 6 of his post-season extra point tries...**1992:** Successful on 22/29 field goal attempts (75.9%) and on all 30 extra point efforts...Ranked sixth among NFC kickers with 96 points, which also gave him team scoring lead for fourth consecutive year...Had a string of 12 straight games with at least one FG snapped at N.Y. Giants (Nov. 8), leaving him in a tie with Stenerud for club record...Made three field goals (39, 36, 20 yards) in 16-14 win at Houston (Dec. 13)...Hit FGs of 34, 33, 29 and 48 yards, missing a 52-yarder, despite swirling winds the entire day, in 19-14 victory over Tampa Bay (Nov. 29)...Made 2 field goals in final two minutes in 27-24 triumph over Philadelphia, including game-winning 41-yarder as time expired...His lone other decisive kick in '92 had come on Sept. 20 vs. the Bengals, when his PAT in the final minute gave Green Bay a 24-23 victory...Hit season-long 53-yarder Nov. 1 at Detroit, tying club distance record at the time...Had become only 11th player in team's 74-year history to reach 300-point level when he made a 33-yarder at Tampa Bay (Sept. 13)...Experienced some difficulties to begin the season, attributable at least in part to a change of placement holders following Don Majkowski's ankle injury early in the Cincinnati game...Directional kickoffs with good hang time were big factor in success of team's coverage unit — 2nd in NFL...Had a touchback percentage of 8.8% (6/68), highly reflective of the fact that the majority of his kickoffs were directional as opposed to geared for distance...**1991:** Made 18 of 24 field goal tries over the season (75.0%), including a perfect 9/9 inside the 30-yard line...Also made all 31 of his extra point attempts...Led team in scoring with 85 points, tying Minnesota's Fuad Revez for 10th place among NFC kickers...Hit 22-yard, game-winning FG with 22 seconds remaining in 15-13 victory over Tampa Bay (Sept. 15)...Tied club distance record with 53-yard field goal at N.Y. Jets on Nov. 3...Also connected on 41- and 34-yard efforts in same contest, missing a 42-yarder in overtime, and tackled Jets kick return man Terance Mathis in second quarter following a 49-yard runback...Placed 23 of 63 kickoffs into or out of end zone, 15 resulting in touchbacks for a career-high 23.8% of



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23.8...**1990:** Converted 23/30 field goal attempts (76.7%), the total including an unblemished 9/9 from inside the 30, and 28/29 of his PAT tries...Made inroads in Packers' record book en route, establishing a new single-game record by kicking five field goals in a 29-16 victory over the Raiders at Los Angeles (Nov. 11) — from 39, 51, 32, 23 and 20 yards...Also set a new club mark (since broken by himself) with 15 consecutive field goals, adding six more to the nine straight he had at the conclusion of the '89 campaign, a string snapped when he missed a 49-yarder at Detroit (Sept. 30)...First tied the former Green Bay field goal distance record with a 53-yard effort against the L.A. Rams in the season opener (Sept. 9), a milepost originally established by Stenerud at Tampa Bay on Nov. 22, 1981...Led Packers in scoring with 97 points, and became only the 21st player in team history to score as many as 200 points in a career...Put 19 of 69 kickoffs in the end zone, 12 of them touchbacks...**1989:** Provided Packers with winning margin in six games as a rookie...His most dramatic moment came on Dec. 3 at Tampa Bay, when he hit a 47-yarder on the final play of the game to give Green Bay a 17-16, come-from-behind victory...His first decisive effort had come on Sept. 17, when his fifth and final PAT shaded the Saints, 35-34...In subsequent weeks he: made a 22-yard field goal against Atlanta (Oct. 1) with 1:42 remaining to propel the Packers past the Falcons at Milwaukee, 23-21; nailed a 38-yarder in overtime vs. Detroit on Oct. 29 at Milwaukee, giving Green Bay a 23-20 conquest; provided the winning margin over the Bears (Nov. 5) with his second conversion of the day in 14-13 triumph; and hit his final PAT try vs. Minnesota at Milwaukee (Nov. 26), spelling the difference in 20-19 victory...Had a 78.6% success rate on field goal attempts (22/28), also converting all 42 of his PAT tries...Emerges as Packers' leading scorer with a career-high 108 points, becoming only the third Green Bay player to surpass 100-point mark and the first since Stenerud had totalled 115 points in 1983...Tied a club single-game record along the way, making 4 field goals at Chicago on Dec. 17 (19, 44, 23 and 21 yards)...Hit season-long 52-yard field goal in Atlanta contest...Solved what had been a trouble spot for Packers in 1988, when four different Green Bay kickers missed a total of 6 extra points and converted only 13/25 field goal tries...Sent 20 of his 51 kickoffs into the end zone, 11 of them resulting in touchbacks...Drafted in the sixth round (142nd overall and 1st kicker) by Green Bay in 1989.

COLLEGE: Three-time letterman (1984-85, 1988) at Texas-El Paso...Redshirted in 1987...Successful on 32/38 field goal attempts and on 67/70 PAT tries during his collegiate career...Graduated as Miners' all-time career leader in both FG (84.2%) and PAT (95.7%) percentage...Had outstanding 1988 senior season, earning first-team All-America recognition from Football Writers Association of America and second-team All-America honors from *Associated Press*...Also was an All-Western Athletic Conference first-team choice...Set UTEP single-season record for highest FG percentage — 86.6 (26/30)...Also made all 49 of his PAT attempts...Hit career-long 52-yarder vs. Air Force...Holds B.S. degree in business finance.

PRO: One of the National Football League's pass-rushing elite for the last decade, was signed by the Packers as an unrestricted free agent from Houston this past April 18...Tied for 11th in NFL history in career sacks (with the Falcons' Chris Doleman), enters the '94 season with 88%...Along with Reggie White, gives Green Bay the top pair of active defensive ends on the same team in the game today, the two having 225½ career sacks between them...Has had four seasons of 10-plus sacks (1986, 1990-91, 1993) and has recorded at least 6 sacks every year except his rookie season of 1984...Possesses 15 career multiple sack games — 12 with Houston (1988-93), three with the Raiders (1984-87)...Finally received some long-overdue recognition following 1993 season when he went to the first Pro Bowl of his career, named as the AFC's "Need" player by Head Coach Marty Schottenheimer...Highly durable, has not missed a game while under contract since the final regular-season contest of 1985...Has played in 154 career games, 96 starts among them...Pro experience also includes 10 playoff games with seven post-season starts...Has failed to play in only two non-strike games over his 10 years in the league — Dec. 23, 1985, at the Rams, as well as Sept. 6, 1992, vs. Pittsburgh when he was not in camp...Could have played in '85 Rams contest, despite a dislocated elbow suffered the previous week vs. Seattle, but was held out of final regular-season game after victory over Seahawks clinched AFC West title for Raiders... "I expect Sean to be a consistent player because he is a veteran," says Larry Brooks, the new coach of Green Bay's defensive line. "He's had a lot of battles in the league, so I think he'll be able to help and teach our younger players that will be behind him. He's got a lot of experience that's going to be valuable to our team."...Began pro career as a 1984 second-round draft choice of the Los Angeles Raiders (the team did not have a first-round selection that year), then was traded to Houston in April of 1988, where he played the past six seasons...Needs only 11½ sacks to become but the eighth player in NFL history to have 100-or-more career sacks...Expected to make his 100th career start in the fourth game of the '94 season, vs. Tampa Bay (Sept. 25)...Has demonstrated a proclivity at blocking kicks over his career, his resume showing 4 blocked field goals and 3 PATs which were batted down...Has had 6 of his 7 total blocks in the last four seasons...**1993:** Led team with 13 of the Oilers' NFL-high 52 sacks, ranking him fourth in the AFC and also tying him with White and the Saints' Renaldo Turnbull for fourth in the league as a whole...Went to the first Pro Bowl of his 10-year career, going as the AFC's "Need" player after finishing as the first alternate at defensive end in voting for the all-star contest...Started all 16 regular-season games (at RDE) for the third time in his career, the second occasion with Houston...Ended year eighth on the team in tackles with 54, including 42 solo stops, and also added a pair of fumble recoveries...Registered multiple sacks in three different games — Oct. 17 at New England, Nov. 14 at Cincinnati and Dec. 19 at Pittsburgh — to raise his career total to 15...Also blocked the fourth field goal effort of his pro career in Patriots contest...Had at least one sack in 10 of the team's 16 league games...Made 2 solo tackles and broke up a pass in Oilers' playoff loss to Kansas City, his seventh career post-season start...**1992:** Started at right defensive end in Houston's final 15 games plus playoff loss at Buffalo...Had announced his "retirement" during the off-season, but later changed his mind and reported to the Oilers in days following league opener (Sept. 9)...Immediately reclaimed his starting spot and finished year with 8½ sacks (third on team)...Had eight of his sacks over five-game stretch at mid-season...His 53 total tackles (34 solo) was second among the club's defensive linemen and eighth overall...Set up Houston

PRO: A one-of-a-kind individual who has demonstrated both durability and productivity for nearly a decade-and-a-half in the National Football League...Spent last 13 seasons with Packers' arch-rival, the Chicago Bears (1981-93), after beginning his pro career with New England in 1980...Joined Green Bay this past June 8 as a free agent, two months following his termination from the Bears' roster (April 6)...Immediately became Packers' projected starter at the 'flop' tackle spot, where he will play over the guard on either side of the formation, in club's new 4-3 alignment...Enters the 1994 season ranked 10th in NFL history in sacks with 92½ (see full listing at conclusion of bio), also standing second behind Richard Dent (124½) on the Bears' all-time list...Has averaged better than 8 sacks a year over the last 11 seasons...Along with Reggie White, gives Green Bay the top two sackers on the same team in the NFL today, the duo having 229½ sacks between them...Add fellow defensive lineman Sean Jones (and his 88½ career sacks) to that mix and the threesome has 318 sacks to its credit...Holds Chicago team records for games played (191) and consecutive "union" games played (both 191), having surpassed the previous record-holder, Walter Payton (190 and 186, respectively), during the 1993 season...Has played in an amazing 209 NFL games

"I take things down," he says...Measured into his success, undoubtedly, is the strenuous off-season regimen which he maintains, a program consisting of among other things, four days of weightlifting per week, racquetball, basketball, karate, jumping rope and hitting the speed bag...Highly valued by the Packers, was designated as a 'transition' player by the team on Feb. 25, 1993, giving Green Bay the opportunity to match any contract offer from another club which he might have received last year in the off-season...**1993:** Started all 16 games for the second year in a row and the fourth time in his nine pro seasons (others: 1986, '89 and '92)...Also was Packers' starter at left tackle for both playoff games — the first of his career...Had one of the finest seasons of his career, this despite the fact that he did not join the team until the week before the league opener (Aug. 31) due to a contractual stalemate...Held some of the league's top sack artists without a sack, including the Vikings' Chris Doleman (twice), the Cowboys' Charles Haley (twice), the Bears' Richard Dent (twice), the Saints' Renaldo Turnbull, the Bucs' Eric Curry, the Eagles' Clyde Simmons and the Rams' Fred Stokes...Made his 100th career start in the NFL Nov. 8 at Kansas City...**1992:** Started all 16 games and did not miss an offensive snap the entire year — a giant accomplishment for a player who had been ravaged by injury the previous two seasons...Held Simmons, the NFC sack leader at the time, without a sack in 27-24 victory over Philadelphia (Nov. 15)...Eagles contest also marked his 100th NFL contest...**1991:** Got into but four games as he was hobbled by nagging hamstring injury...Started at left tackle in Packers' first three games before suffering pulled hamstring in practice on Sept. 18...The injury — the first hamstring problem he had experienced in his career — initially was thought to be relatively minor; it lingered, however, forcing him to miss the next six games (inactive), plus Green Bay's bye week, while on the mend...Returned to start Nov. 10 vs. Buffalo in Milwaukee, but re-injured hamstring while pulling on running play...Placed on injured reserve on Nov. 13, where he spent the remainder of the year...**1990:** Missed five starts at mid-season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on both of his knees during the Packers' bye week, ending string of 37 consecutive games in which he had started dating back to Week 2 of '88 campaign...**1989:** Started all 16 games for second time in his career as Packers enjoyed 10-6 season...**1988:** Missed the season opener vs. the Rams (Sept. 4) due to shoulder injury sustained in Packers' initial preseason contest, Aug. 6 vs. the N.Y. Giants...His absence in inaugural snapped a streak of 44 straight non-strike games played, beginning with opening duel of his '85 rookie year...**1987:** Had one of the finest seasons of his career, giving up only 3½ sacks over the course of the strike-shortened, 12-game schedule...Recognized for that accomplishment, among other things, when he was voted as Packers' 'Offensive Player of the Year' by Wisconsin sports media — the first time a Green Bay offensive lineman has been so honored since center Ken Bowman was similarly recognized in 1971...Was the starter in all 12 'union' games...His season-long performance was all the more impressive in light of the fact that he had been forced to overcome an attack of mononucleosis



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during the early weeks of training camp...**1986:** First gained league-wide notoriety in finale against N.Y. Giants (Dec. 20), who would go on to win Super Bowl XXI, when he climaxed his personal year by shutting out NFL sack titlist Lawrence Taylor, in the process depriving the Pro Bowl linebacker of the league's single-season record for sacks...Started all 16 games for first time...**1985:** Played in all 16 games with two starts as a rookie...Pressed into starting lineup at left tackle for opening game at New England (Sept. 8) when incumbent Karl Swanke was moved to right tackle in place of Greg Koch, who himself had been switched to right guard in Ron Hallstrom's injury-forced absence...Also got starting call in closer at Tampa Bay as Swanke had suffered a knee injury the previous week vs. Detroit...Split time with Swanke in eight of the final nine games...Became a Packer by virtue of a draft day trade with the Buffalo Bills, Green Bay exchanging its first- (14th overall) and second-round (42nd overall) choices for the Bills' first-rounder (7th overall), which then was used to tab Ruettgers, the Packers also receiving a fourth-round pick in 1986.

PRO: Played through two significant injuries in 1993 to have his finest season yet in what is quickly becoming a Hall of Fame career...Though he historically has held a decided personal disdain for the spotlight, it is becoming more and more difficult to avoid in light of his remarkable achievements on the field...Has established a new NFL single-season record for receptions two seasons running...Combines unheard-of strength for a wide receiver with good quickness to realize success as one of the league's best runners after the catch...Highly intelligent and charismatic, amazingly has been able to continue to get open even when the opponent knows where the ball is going...Bothered in 1993 by Achilles and turf toe injuries which greatly restricted his practice time and worsened as the season progressed, he always answered the bell on Sunday — even when excruciating pain was the price to pay...Extent of injury to his left big toe was so great that corrective surgery was required following the season...Had surgical procedure to reconstruct the sesamoid complex (undersurface of the big toe joint) and for the removal of bone spurs performed by Dr. Robert B. Anderson, and assisted by Packer team physician Dr. Pat McKenzie, at the Carolinas Medical Center in Charlotte on March 23, 1994...“He had an outstanding year, especially considering the fact that he never practiced from about mid-season on,” states Sherman Lewis, the Packers’ offensive coordinator. “I think he would have had an even greater year if he could have practiced. There were some throws that he couldn’t get to (which he normally would have been able to), some catches that he didn’t run after the catch like he normally does, because of the toe.”...Very adept at taking a short pass for an additional 10-20 yards, an attribute aided by his unusually high degree of fearlessness in going across the middle...Nearly impossible to hold up at the line of scrimmage due to his superior strength...“What makes him unique is his quickness and strength,” says Lewis, who previously tutored both Jerry Rice and John Taylor while receivers coach for the 49ers. “He has that rare combination of great strength, yet he has great agility and quickness. He’s a great runner after the catch, I think that’s what separates him from the other guys. There’s a lot of guys that probably catch the ball as well as he does, but very few people can run with it like he does after he gets it. If you play him man-to-man, he’s very strong and physical. He can out-physical one-on-one coverage. If you play him zone, he’s smart and he knows how to find the open area, he knows how to sit down, how to get open. He’s just a gifted athlete.”...Unquestionably has had two of the finest seasons by a wide receiver in NFL history the last two years...Broke the league’s single-season record for receptions in 1993 with 112, surpassing his own mark of 108 set but one year earlier — and giving him an amazing 220 catches over the 1992-93 seasons...Is the only player in NFL history with two 100-reception seasons to his credit, let alone two such years consecutively...Became the first player to lead the league in receiving two straight years since the Chargers’ Kellen Winslow did so over the 1980-81 seasons...Also is the only active player — and but the eighth overall — to have led the NFL in receiving three times in his career (he also did so in 1989); only Packer legend Don Hutson (8) and Lionel Taylor (5) have paced the league on more occasions than he...In only six NFL seasons, already has 501 career receptions for 7,015 yards and 47 touchdowns...On the verge of becoming the Packers’ all-time leading receiver, he needs only 30 catches to pass James Lofton’s 530 career receptions with Green Bay...At his current rate of 5.2 receptions per contest (501 in 96 career games), should vault ahead of Lofton by the Packers’ sixth game of the ‘94 campaign, Oct. 9 vs. the L.A. Giants (for 160 yards), the fifth-highest, one-game total in Packers history...Posted second consecutive 100-yard day, catching 7 balls for 116 yards and 1 TD vs. Philadelphia (Nov. 15)...Snared 49-yard scoring pass from Favre for Green Bay's first touchdown in eventual 17-3 triumph at Chicago on Nov. 22...Had third 9-catch performance the following week in Buccaneers rematch...On the receiving end of 6 passes vs. Detroit (Dec. 6) on snowy afternoon in Milwaukee, including crazy 65-yard touchdown catch where he reached the ball over the goal-line, had pigskin jarred out by Lions' Melvin Jenkins, then scooped up loose ball and scored...Caught eventual game-winning touchdown pass (of 6 yards from Favre) with 3:33 remaining in 16-14 victory at Houston on Dec. 13...Exploded out of the box in home finale vs. L.A. PRO: An 11-year veteran who still is one of the National Football League's best blocking tight ends, steady Ed West continues his climb among the Packers' receiving elite after beginning his career in 1984 as an unknown free agent...Will be an important piece of the Packers' puzzle offensively with the departure of '93 starter Jackie Harris to Tampa Bay as a free agent...With 171 career catches, is now 14th on the Packers' all-time receiving list, having passed Ron Kramer (170) in the final game of the '93 season; only Rich McGeorge (175) and Paul Coffman (322) have more career receptions among Green Bay tight ends...Also has 1,944 career receiving yards and 23 TDs...Currently is the player with the longest service to the Packers (11 seasons) and is the team record-holder for tight end longevity as well, surpassing both McGeorge (1970-78) and Coffman (1978-85)...“What Ed West has lost in speed he's gained in knowledge,” says tight ends coach Andy Reid. “And at the ripe age of 33, he's still able to compete. He's very competitive.”...Also is the second-highest scoring tight end in Packer history with 138 points on his 23 touchdowns, trailing only the 234 points of Coffman...Dependable, he possesses an impressive career touchdowns-to-receptions ratio with 23 scores among his 171 catches, or a TD every 7.4 receptions...**1993:** Filled in admirably when injuries took Harris out of the lineup on two separate occasions...Played in all 16 games for fourth straight year (and the eighth time in his 10 seasons), starting seven contests — three times when Packers opened in double-tight end formation...Finished as the team's fifth-leading receiver with 25 catches for 253 yards, his highest seasonal total since he caught 27 in 1990...Saw action mostly in short-yardage situations until the Detroit game on Nov. 21, when he took over for Harris, who had torn knee cartilage the previous week at New Orleans...Had an exceptional performance vs. the Lions in starting role, caught a season-high 5 passes for 62 yards in the Packers' 26-17 win and also threw a key block on Edgar Bennett's game-clinching touchdown run in the fourth quarter...Started second consecutive game vs. Tampa Bay and caught 3 passes for 26 yards as the Packers downed the Bucs, 13-10...Resumed backup status with Harris' return at Chicago on Dec. 5, but was pressed back into starting lineup Dec. 26 vs. the L.A. REGGIE WHITE

Defensive End

Tennessee 10th year

PRO: There is no way to fully measure Reggie White's electrifying impact upon the Packers' defense and collective psyche in 1993, when the former Philadelphia Eagle superstar joined the Green and Gold as the most sought-after performer to become available with the advent of unrestricted free agency in the National Football League...But Head Coach Mike Holmgren was able to put it in practical perspective...White "made us a better football team — no question about it," Holmgren said, documenting this assertion by noting, "We went from 23 on defense (in the league as a whole) to 2 — with no noticeable dramatic personnel changes, except for one man."...New defensive line coach Larry Brooks also has become an instant fan of professional football's all-time sack leader... "Reggie's the real deal," he declares. "At his position, there are three or four at the very top and Reggie's in those top three or four. Physically, probably his best qualities are his



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strength and his speed. And he always plays on Sunday — he gets up to play on Sunday.”...Pinpointing what sets White apart from many of his peers, Brooks observed, “As I looked back on video over the games played last season, the bigger the game, the bigger he plays. In the Denver game, for example, he made a bunch of tackles and two big sacks of John Elway at the end to save the win (30-27). When he gets to playing, it just shows — he’s a force. Offensive teams have to account for him with two people. As greatness shows, it shows how great he is in the number of people they put on him. It’s hard to know how good he could be if was single-blocked on a regular basis. What I’ve also discovered about him in the short time I’ve been with him are the intangibles of what he is. He’s a good person. He’s had all the accolades, but he’s just a normal guy and the players just seem to enjoy his presence.”...The only player in NFL history to have as many sacks as games played (he has recorded 137 in 137 career games), the mountainous Tennessean also is the only player in league annals to register double-digit sack totals in nine consecutive seasons...Along the way, his perennial dominance at his position has earned him selection to the National Football Conference Pro Bowl squad each of the past eight seasons, the first seven years as a member of the Eagles...He last season became the first Packer defensive end chosen for the Pro Bowl since Ezra Johnson in 1978...Impressively productive since his selection by the Eagles as a first-round pick in the NFL’s supplemental draft of USFL players in 1984, White has amassed 892 tackles (637 solo), in addition to his 137 sacks...He also has registered 2 interceptions, 28 passes defended, forced 21 fumbles and recovered 14, two of the latter for touchdowns...In addition, he has supplemented these contributions by posting 2 safeties and blocking 3 kicks (2 FGs and 1 PAT)...The only player to be selected by *Pro Football Weekly* on its 1980s All-Decade team and also to be projected to its All-1990s team, he customarily has lined up at defensive end, but also has used his strength and speed (4.6 in the ‘40’) to play havoc on blocking schemes from various positions along the line during his career...Launched his career with the USFL’s Memphis Showboats (1984-85), posting 193 tackles (120 solo), 23½ sacks and forcing 7 fumbles in 34 starts...1993: Started all 16 games at left defensive end in his first Packer season and became an immediate team leader, both by example and contribution...Became NFL’s all-time sack leader in season’s first Bears contest (Oct. 31), surpassing Lawrence Taylor, and went on to close out year as NFC’s 1993 co-leader (with Renaldo Turnbull of New Orleans) with 13...Led Green Bay’s defensive line in total tackles with 98 (67 solo)...Also tied for team lead in forced fumbles (3) and fumble recoveries (2)...Elected to Pro Bowl for eighth consecutive year (as a starter in ‘93), he also was named a first-team All-Pro by *Sporting News* and was a second-team All-Pro choice of *Associated Press*, *Football Digest* and *College & Pro Football Newsweekly*...Also tabbed for *UPI* and *Football News* All-NFC teams...Turned in exceptional performance in “reunion” meeting with Philadelphia (Sept. 12), posting 8 tackles, 1 sack and forcing 2 fumbles...Later named Pro Football Writers of America Classic Games Player of the Week for an outstanding, clutch effort vs. Denver (Oct. 10), when he had 5 tackles and 3 sacks, including sacks on consecutive plays (third and fourth down) late in the fourth quarter to seal a 30-27 victory for the Packers after the Broncos had advanced to the Green Bay 43-yard line...Contributed another sterling performance vs. Bears (Oct. 31), forging season-high 10 tackles, 2 sacks and 1 forced fumble...Registered 7 tackles and 1 sack in a ‘Monday Night Football’ appearance at Kansas City (Nov. 8)...Had 2 more sacks among his 8 tackles in the Packers’ 19-17, come-from-behind win at New Orleans (Nov. 14) to earn NFC ‘Defensive Player of the Week’ honors...Recorded 6 tackles and 1 sack in Packers’ 26-17 victory over Detroit at Milwaukee (Nov. 21)...Made 5 tackles and batted down a Stan Humphries pass, despite constant double-teaming, in Packers’ 20-13 win at San Diego (Dec. 12)...Had 7 tackles vs. Minnesota (Dec. 19)...Forged another dominating performance vs. Raiders (Dec. 26), posting 8 tackles, 2½ sacks, 1 pass defended and 1 fumble recovery — the latter forced by LeRoy Butler off Raiders’ Randy Jordan, which White scooped up and ran 10 yards with before lateraling back to Butler, who ran 25 yards for a TD, giving Packers a 21-0 lead in an eventual 28-0 victory...Equalled ‘93 best with 10 total tackles, including a season-high 8 solo stops, in regular-season finale at Detroit (Jan. 2)...Started both post-season contests, played a significant defensive role in Packers’ 28-24 playoff victory over the Lions (Jan. 8), collecting 4 tackles and sacking Detroit quarterback Erik Kramer



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twice...Had 3 tackles in Green Bay's divisional playoff contest at Dallas the following week...**1992:** Led Eagles' defense in the first round of the NFC playoffs at New Orleans, making the two biggest plays of the game...The first came on a third-and-one for the Saints, which saw White stop RB Craig Heyward for no gain, forcing New Orleans to settle for a field goal...He then sacked QB Bobby Hebert to cause a safety, sealing a 36-20 win...A week later, in a 34-10 loss to eventual Super Bowl XXVII champion Dallas, White weighed in with 7 tackles and a sack...Earlier finished regular season with 14 sacks, adding the Redskins' Mark Rypien to his career "hit list" in Game 15...Had perhaps his best performance of season, at N.Y. Giants (Nov. 22), registering 3½ sacks, 7 QB hurries and 8 tackles...Posted season-high tackle total of 11 vs. Raiders (Nov. 8), his output including 1½ sacks...Returned a fumble (by Phoenix QB Chris Chandler) 37 yards for the game's final touchdown against Cardinals...Played in his 120th consecutive non-strike game for Eagles in regular-season finale vs. Giants...Chosen to NFC's Pro Bowl squad for seventh consecutive season, an Eagles record...Named All-Pro by *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA, *NEA*, *College & Pro Football Newsweekly* and *Football Digest*...Also earned All-NFC recognition from *UPI* and was a second-team All-Pro selection by *Associated Press*...**1991:** Was undisputed leader of the Eagles' defense, a unit that achieved a rare triple honor by ranking No. 1 in the NFL against the run, the pass and, overall, in terms of fewest yards allowed...A near-unanimous first-team All-Pro pick, he subsequently was selected a starter in the Pro Bowl for the sixth straight year...Also was named NFL Defensive Player of the Year by *Pro Football Weekly*...Closed out season as Eagles' leader in both QB sacks (15) and hurries (55)...Tied for second in the NFL in sacks with DE William Fuller (Oilers) and trailed only Saints' Pat Swilling (17)...When he joined teammates Jerome Brown and Clyde Simmons as NFC starters in the Pro Bowl, it marked the first time since 1981 — and only the sixth time ever — that three defensive linemen from the same team were selected to the Pro Bowl...Made the 100th consecutive regular-season start of his career at Phoenix on Nov. 24 and ran his total to 104 by season's end...Had one of his finer days as an Eagle at Green Bay in the season opener — 3 sacks, 2 forced fumbles (one of which he recovered) and batted a Don Majkowski pass which then was intercepted by linemate Mike Golic...Forged other multiple sack performances vs. the Giants (Nov. 4), Cincinnati (Nov. 17) and Washington (Dec. 22), registering an interception vs. Bengals as Golic returned the favor, tipping a Boomer Esiason pass into the air for White...In a CBS Sports poll, conducted during the season and asking NFL club general managers which player they would build their defense around, White was named most often...**1990:** Selected as an NFC Pro Bowl starter for the fifth consecutive season...Earned near unanimous All-NFL acclaim and was named defensive lineman of the year by the NFL Players' Association...Led Eagles' defense with 14 QB sacks, ranking second in the NFC to the 49ers' Charles Haley and fourth in NFL...Had season-high 3 sacks vs. Indianapolis (Sept. 30)...Made his first career interception on a deflected pass thrown by Washington QB Jeff Rutledge in a Monday Night Football matchup, returning it 33 yards...Sacked QB Jim Everett on Sept. 23 at the L.A. 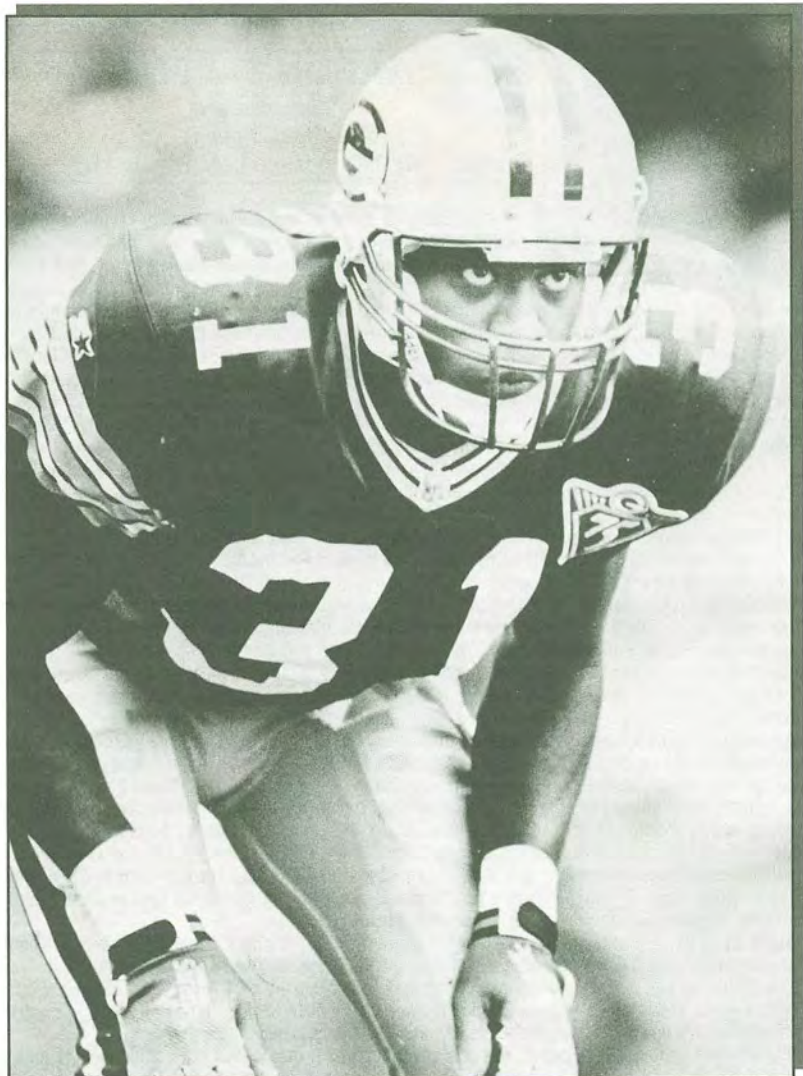

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

SEPT. 5: Performing at a high level in all three areas – offense, defense and special teams – the Packers score their first opening day victory since 1990, dispatching the Los Angeles Rams, 36-6, in Milwaukee County Stadium. While the offense scores in every quarter, the defense restricts the Rams to a pair of field goals, punctuating the defensive effort with an early safety. The specialty units' bristling kick coverage limits Rams to an average of 11.3 yards for 7 kickoff returns and a one-yard runback on their only punt return.

The Packers' superiority is documented by the time of possession figures. They control the football for 36 minutes and 9 seconds – executing touchdown drives of 67, 76, 64 and 59 yards – the Rams for only 23 minutes, 51 seconds.

In the process, quarterback Brett Favre becomes the Packers' all-time leader in career passing percentage, reaching the 500-attempt qualifying minimum with a 64.20 percentage. Seven of Favre's 19 completions (in 29 attempts) go to wide receiver Sterling Sharpe for 120 yards – the 20th 100-yard receiving day of his career.

OCT. 10: Packers charge to 30-7 halftime lead, then hang on in face of furious comeback by John Elway and the Denver Broncos to emerge with a 30-27 victory – the 500th in their 73-year National Football League history.

Highly opportune, back-to-back sacks of Elway by Reggie White with the Broncos approaching field goal position preserve the victory in the first Sunday night game ever played in Green Bay's Lambeau Field.

Tight end Jackie Harris plays major role in Packer attack, snaring 5 passes for 128 yards (highest single-game yardage total by a tight end in Packer history) and 1 touchdown, and placekicker Chris Jacke contributes three field goals to the cause.

OCT. 24: With Sterling Sharpe tying an all-time Packer record by way of a four-touchdown performance, Packers score early and often at Tampa Stadium to forge a 37-14 victory over the Buccaneers.

Sharpe, who registers three of his TD receptions in the first half as Packers sweep to a 24-0 intermission lead, matches a 48-year-old record set by the fabled Don Hutson in a 57-21 victory over the Detroit Lions at Milwaukee's State Fair Park October 7, 1945.

Sharpe also makes personal history when he lines up at quarterback in Mike Holmgren's 'Star Wars' formation and completes the first passing attempt of his six-year pro career to fellow wideout Robert Brooks – for a one-yard gain.

OCT. 31: After walking a tightrope for the better part of 3½ quarters in their 145th regular-season meeting with the Bears, the Packers take control of the game midway through the final period. Husbanding a modest 10-3 lead with 8:02 remaining, they embark on a 12-play, 91-yard drive which halfback Darrell Thompson climaxes with a 17-yard sweep of right end for the decisive score.

Strong safety LeRoy Butler also has a hand in the victory. With the Bears threatening at the Green Bay 12-yard line early in the fourth quarter, the blitzing Butler strikes the passing arm of quarterback Jim Harbaugh, forcing a fumble, then recovers the runaway football at the 37-yard line as it bounces toward midfield.

NOV. 14: Resilient Packers, rebounding from a devastating 'Monday Night' loss to Kansas City six days earlier, overcome imposing odds to pull out victory over Saints in Louisiana Superdome. Trailing 17-16, they take over football for last time at their own 25-yard line with no timeouts and only 1:37 remaining.

Facing a 4th-and-3 situation at the Packers' own 32, quarterback Brett Favre hits tight end Jackie Harris for a 5-yard gain and a first down. Three plays later, scrambling Favre lofts a 43-yard strike to Sharpe, who advances another 11 yards before being grounded at the New Orleans 19. After another three-play hiatus, the last a Favre throw into the ground to stop the clock with 6 seconds left, Chris Jacke delivers a 36-yard field goal to give the Packers a 19-17 win.

NOV. 21: Four Chris Jacke field goals plus one- and two-yard scoring runs by Edgar Bennett carry the Packers to a second straight victory – a 26-17 win over the Detroit Lions at Milwaukee – and into a near tie with the Lions for the NFC Central Division lead. Trailing 17-16 at the end of three quarters, the Packers overcome two early turnovers and scoring difficulties in the 'red zone' by staging a fourth-quarter breakthrough to upend the division leaders. A 32-yard Brett Favre pass to Mark Clayton is the catalyst in a field goal drive which sends the Packers ahead to stay. A subsequent interception by LeRoy Butler at the Lions' 36-yard line triggers the Packers' final touchdown and seals the decision.

NOV. 28: Packers find Buccaneers somewhat more intractable in rematch, are forced to mount a 15-play, 75-yard drive in the closing minutes to escape with a 13-10 victory. Favre, 23 of 36 for 159 yards without an interception, climaxes the 75-yard excursion with a 2-yard bullseye to Sharpe in the right corner of the end zone with only 1:16 remaining.



SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

DEC. 12: Packers exploit a fourth-down gamble by the Chargers in the third quarter to turn the tide in their direction. San Diego, down 13-6, elects to go for it on 4th-and-4 after reaching the Green Bay 34-yard line. Linebacker Tony Bennett breaks through to throw quarterback Stan Humphries for an 11-yard loss and the Packers embark on a drive of their own, moving for the decisive score in 12 plays, Darrell Thompson going the final 5 yards over left guard.

DEC. 26: Packers make history in frigid, minus-22 degree wind chill, blanking Los Angeles Raiders, 28-0, to clinch a playoff berth for the first time since 1982.

Out front by a relatively modest 14-0 margin after three quarters, by way of a one-yard touchdown run by Edgar Bennett and a 23-yard Brett Favre scoring pass to Sterling Sharpe, the Packers put away Raiders with a 14-point fourth period, LeRoy Butler racing 25 yards to score with a fumble following a lateral from Reggie White, and Darrell Thompson adding substantial insurance with a 60-yard TD excursion.

Sharpe also makes history, becoming the first player in NFL annals to catch 100 passes in two seasons – and in two consecutive seasons.

JAN. 2, 1994: Sterling Sharpe catches 6 passes, raising his seasonal total to 112, to eclipse his own NFL single-season record for receptions, set only one year earlier when he had 108.

PLAYOFFS

JAN. 8, 1994: Packers post one of the most electrifying victories in their rich post-season history, coming from behind to shade NFC Central Division champion Detroit, 28-24, in the Pontiac (Mich.) Silverdome on a dramatic, 40-yard, last-minute touchdown pass from Brett Favre to Sterling Sharpe.

Favre's decisive strike, a scrambling, across-the-body throw from extreme left to extreme right, finds Sharpe in end zone with only 55 seconds remaining.

Earlier, rookie free safety George Teague had made NFL and Packer playoff history by returning an interception 101 yards for a touchdown, propelling the Packers into a 21-17 lead at that point. Teague's heroic breaks an 11-year-old NFL post-season mark, set by Darrol Ray of the New York Jets, who had a 98-yard scoring runback of an intercept in a 1982 playoff contest with Cincinnati.

Sharpe's 3 TD receptions – he finishes day with 101 yards on 5 catches – tie an all-time NFL playoff record. The first of his 3 scoring receptions comes on a 12-yarder in the second quarter, taking Packers to a 7-3 lead, and the other on a 28-yard effort in the third quarter, when Green and Gold closes gap to 17-14.

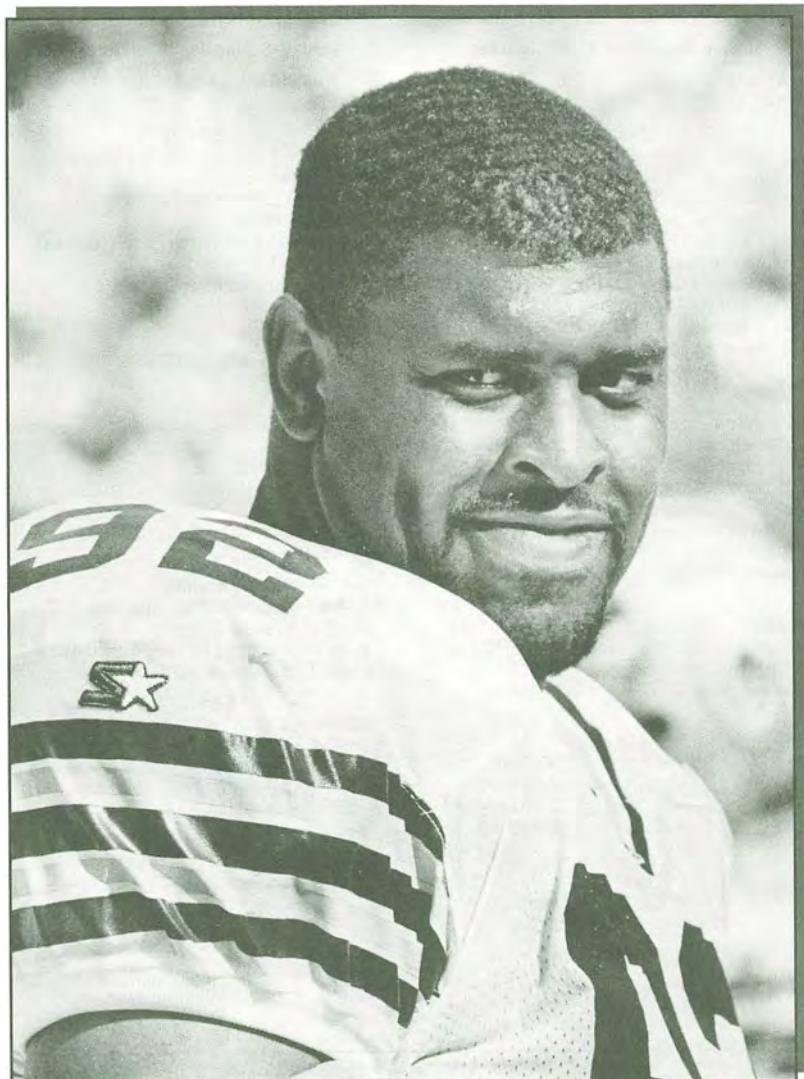
Packer defense weathers 169-yard rushing performance by Lions' Barry Sanders, sacking Detroit quarterback Erik Kramer 4 times for 13 yards in losses in the process.

JAN. 16, 1994: Packers get off to early 3-0 lead in the first quarter on 30-yard Chris Jacke field goal, after stopping fake punt run by Bill Bates, but fall behind during 17-point second-quarter surge by Cowboys, eventually bow, 27-17, in divisional playoff game at Texas Stadium. Brett Favre passes for a near-record 331 yards (falling only one yard short of Lynn Dickey's club standard) and Sterling Sharpe forges second consecutive 100-yard game in post-season, snaring 6 passes for 128 yards and a 29-yard, fourth-quarter touchdown. Robert Brooks provides Packers' other score on an acrobatic catch of a 23-yard Favre pass.

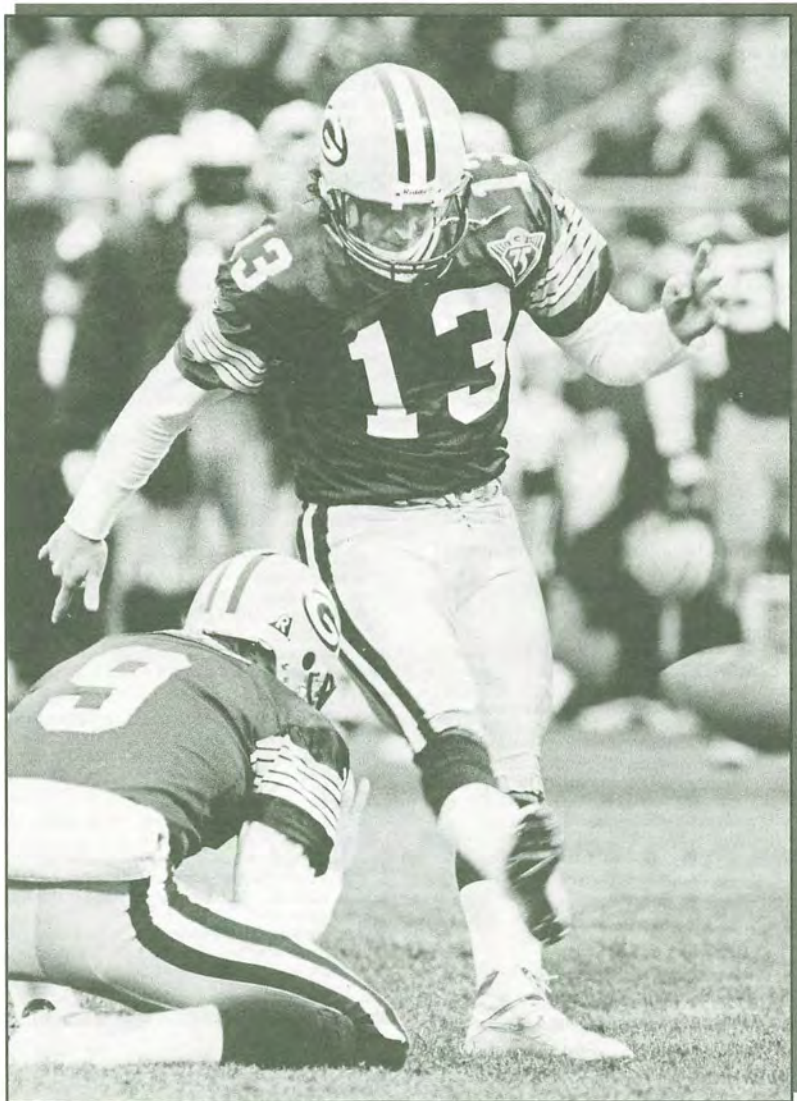

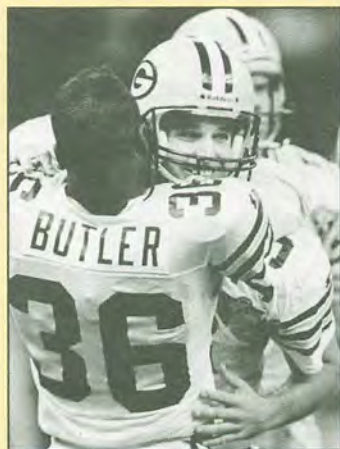

PACKER SUPER BOWL STORY

SUPER BOWL I

January 15, 1967

Memorial Coliseum; Los Angeles, Calif.

Paid Attendance: 61,946

Green Bay 35, Kansas City 10

The Packers launched the Super Bowl series by whipping Kansas City's American Football League champions 35-10 behind the passing of Bart Starr, the receiving of Max McGee and a key interception by All-Pro safety Willie Wood.

Vince Lombardi's repeating NFL champions broke open the game with three second-half touchdowns, the first of which was set up by Wood's 50-yard return of an interception to the Chiefs' 5-yard line with the Packers leading by only 14-10. The pass, authored by the Chiefs' Len Dawson, had been intended for Kansas City tight end Fred Arbanas.

McGee, filling in for ailing Boyd Dowler (injured on the Packers' first offensive series) after having caught only four passes all season, snared seven from Starr for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Elijah Pitts ran for two other scores, counting one on a 5-yard run in the third quarter and the other on a one-yard bolt in the final period.

The Chiefs' 10 points came in the second quarter, the only touchdown on a seven-yard pass from Dawson to Curtis McClinton.

Starr completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 touchdowns and was chosen the game's most valuable player. His scoring strikes came on a 37-yard collaboration with McGee in the first quarter and a 13-yard pitch to the aging end in the decisive third period.

The Packers collected \$15,000 per man and the Chiefs \$7,500 apiece — the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports at the time.

SUPER BOWL II

January 14, 1968

Orange Bowl; Miami, Fla.

Paid Attendance: 75,546

Green Bay 33, Oakland 14

Having acquired a third consecutive NFL championship just two weeks earlier, the Packers embellished that record-tying parlay by winning the Super Bowl title for the second straight year. This time, they dispatched the AFL champion Raiders 33-14 in a game that drew the first \$3-million gate in football history.

Bart Starr again was chosen the game's most valuable player as he completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and one touchdown and directed a Packers attack that was in control all the way after building up a 16-7 halftime lead.

Don Chandler kicked four field goals (39, 20, 43 and 31 yards), and All-Pro cornerback Herb Adderley highlighted the Green Bay scoring with a 60-yard interception return of a Daryle Lamonica pass.

After leading by only 3-0 at the quarter, the Packers padded their margin to 16-7 at halftime by way of three Chandler field goals and a 62-yard scoring pass from Starr to split end Boyd Dowler. They then left the Raiders behind with a 10-point third period, Donny Anderson scoring on a 2-yard run and Chandler with his final field goal.

The game marked the last for Vince Lombardi as Packers coach, ending nine years at Green Bay in which he won six Western Conference championships, five NFL titles and two Super Bowls, a record unprecedented in pro football history.

PACKER NFL PLAYOFF HISTORY

ELEVEN TIMES WORLD CHAMPIONS

The Green Bay Packers have won more championships — eleven — than any other team in National Football League history. They won their first three by league standing (1929, 1930 and 1931) and eight since the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933 (1936, 1939, 1944, 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967). Green Bay also is the only NFL team to win three straight titles, having done it twice (1929-30-31 and 1965-66-67).

In addition, the Packers won the first two Super Bowls (over Kansas City in 1966, 35-10, and over Oakland in 1967, 33-14).

Chicago's Bears rank second with nine NFL titles, followed by the Giants with six, the Redskins with five, and the Lions, Browns, 49ers and Cowboys with four each.

GAME BY GAME

1936 — GREEN BAY 21, BOSTON REDSKINS 6 (Polo Grounds, New York) — Although New York was not represented in the title playoff, the game was played in the Polo Grounds because the Redskins' franchise was being shifted to Washington, D.C., by George Marshall. A turnout of 29,545 saw Don Hutson take a 43-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes, and the Packers were never behind.

1938 — NEW YORK 23, GREEN BAY 17 (Polo Grounds, New York) — The Packers overcame an early 9-0 New York lead, spawned by two blocked punts, but could not hold off the Giants in the second half. The Packers began to close in early in the second period, Arnie Herber capitalizing on a Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen interception by lofting a 50-yard touchdown strike to Carl Mulleneaux, cutting the Giants margin to 9-7.

The Giants shortly converted a mid-field fumble by Packer fullback Eddie Jankowski into a 16-7 lead before Green Bay again trimmed the deficit to two points before the half was over; Clarke Hinkle

crashing over from the 6-inch line following a 66-yard Cecil Isbell pass to Wayland Becker. The Packers then forged in front in opening minutes of the second half for the first and only time in the game; an Engebretsen field goal presenting them with a 17-16 edge. The Giants, however, stormed back with a 61-yard scoring drive, capped by a 23-yard pass from Ed Danowski to Hank Soar. Soar fought his way over the goal line from the 2, with Hinkle clinging to one leg, for what proved to be the winning touchdown. A crowd of 48,120, a playoff record, sat in on proceedings.

1939 — GREEN BAY 27, NEW YORK 0 (State Fair Park, Milwaukee) — The Packers made playoff history by scoring first shutout ever registered in NFL championship game. Despite bitter 35 m.p.h. wind, both Arnie Herber and Cecil Isbell passed for touchdowns in leading Green Bay to its fifth world championship before 32,279 fans.

Green Bay mounted a 7-0 halftime lead, by dint of a Herber scoring strike to Milt Gartenbein, and pulled away in the third quarter on a 29-yard field

goal by Paul (Tiny) Engebretsen and a long TD pass from Isbell to Joe Laws. The Packers added 10 more points in the fourth quarter on a 42-yard field goal by Ernie Smith and a short scoring run by fullback Eddie Jankowski.

1944 — GREEN BAY 14, NEW YORK 7 (Polo Grounds, New York) — With peerless pass catcher Don Hutson employed primarily as a decoy for the Giant defense, fullback Ted Fritsch emerged the offensive hero of Packers' sixth world title victory.

Fritsch scored both Green Bay touchdowns, one on a 2-yard run in the second quarter and the other on a 26-yard pass-and-run collaboration with Irv Comp in the third. Ward Cuff scored the Giants' touchdown with a one-yard plunge on the first play of the final period. Joe Laws, the Packers' veteran, 34-year-old all-purpose halfback, had a brilliant day, setting a playoff record with three interceptions and claiming ground gaining honors with 74 yards in 13 carries.

1960 — PHILADELPHIA 17, GREEN BAY 13 (Franklin Field, Philadelphia) — Packers erected a 6-0 lead in the second period and were out in front by 13-10 in fourth quarter before yielding to late surge by Eagles, who scored the deciding points on a 5-yard burst by Ted Dean.

Green Bay moved ahead in first quarter on a 20-yard Paul Hornung field goal. Hornung added 23-yard FG in second quarter but Eagles tied it 6-6 on a 35-yard scoring pass from Norm Van Brocklin to Tommy McDonald and edged ahead via Bobby Walston's first conversion. Walston followed with a 15-yard FG for a 10-6 halftime lead.

The Packers stopped Philadelphia at its own four late in the third period, then recaptured lead on a 7-yard TD pass from Bart Starr to Max McGee. A 58-yard kickoff return by Dean, however, ignited Eagles and victory eluded Packers, making their first title game appearance in 16 years.

1961 — GREEN BAY 37, NEW YORK 0 (City Stadium, Green Bay — renamed Lambeau Field in 1965) — Paul Hornung, on leave from the Army, scored a record-tying 19 points to key Packer decimation of Giants in first title game ever played in Green Bay.

A record Packer home crowd of 39,029 watched the Green and Gold erupt for 24 points in the second quarter. In all, the Packers scored seven times against the NFL's top defensive team of 1961, amassing four touchdowns and three field goals. The defense, meanwhile, was proving a devastating complement to the attack, inter-

cepting four Giant passes and recovering one fumble.

Two interceptions, by Ray Nitschke and defensive back Hank Gremminger, set up touchdowns No. 2 and 3 while the fumble recovery by Forrest Gregg led to Hornung's second field goal and a Jesse Whittenton interception to Hornung's final FG.

1962 — GREEN BAY 16, NEW YORK 7 (Yankee Stadium, New York) — Out front all the way in a raw, cyclonic setting, Packers weather siege by vengeful Giants in primitive, hand-to-hand struggle. Ray Nitschke proves principal frustration to New Yorkers, seeking redemption for shutout humiliation in '61 title game. His deflection triggers interception to blunt early Giant drive to Green Bay 10. On way to being named game's most valuable player, he also registers two interceptions, one of which led to the Packers' only touchdown of the afternoon. The other set up a 29-yard field goal by Jerry Kramer, whose trio of three-pointers provided eventual margin.

Giants' only TD comes on block of Max McGee punt in Green Bay end zone midway through the third quarter.

A battered Jim Taylor sets playoff record with 31 rushing attempts, good for 85 yards.

1965 — GREEN BAY 23, CLEVELAND 12 (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Field softened by four-inch snow made Packer backs only run harder as Lambeau Field crowd of 50,777 celebrated third championship in five years. Jim Taylor and Paul Hornung amassed 201 yards rushing in rally that overcame Browns' early 9-7 lead.

Packers charged to 7-0 first-quarter advantage on 47-yard Bart Starr pass to Carroll Dale and Don Chandler's conversion, but Cleveland moved in front on a 17-yard TD strike from Frank Ryan to Gary Collins and 24-yard Lou Groza field goal.

Green Bay rebounded, however, with 15- and 23-yard FGs by Chandler, the latter following a Willie Wood interception, to claim 13-9 lead subsequently trimmed to a single point by a second Groza FG shortly before the intermission.

Starr settled the issue in third quarter, escorting the Packers on a 90-yard, 11-play scoring drive climaxed by Hornung's 13-yard sweep of Browns' right perimeter.

1966 — GREEN BAY 34, DALLAS 27 (Cotton Bowl, Dallas) — Bart Starr has one of his finest hours, passing for four touchdowns as Packers win second straight title and fourth in six years. Tom Brown thwarts last-minute Cowboy bid, and the majority of 74,152 Cotton Bowl fans, with end zone interception of Don Meredith's fourth down pass from Green Bay 2.

Packers mounted quick 14-0 lead on a 17-yard Starr pass to Elijah Pitts and 18-yard scoring run with a fumble recovery by rookie Jim Grabowski, but led only 21-17 at halftime following explosive Cowboy comeback. After a 32-yard Villanueva field goal had cut Packer lead to a tenuous 21-20, Starr hit Dowler and McGee with 16- and 28-yard scoring passes, respectively, to provide a cushion against the Cowboys' late surge.

1967 — GREEN BAY 21, DALLAS 17 (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — With thermometer shuddering at 16 below zero and 50,861 in stands, Bart Starr scores winning touchdown from one-yard-line with 13 seconds remaining, sealing record third straight championship for Packers and their fifth in seven years.

Starr's touchdown, on third down with no time-outs remaining, climaxed a 68-yard drive in 12 plays.

As was case in 1966, Packers grabbed early 14-0 advantage. But this time Cowboys came from behind to take the lead, forcing storybook finish by Green Bay to win contest later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

Starr's touchdown passes of 8 and 43 yards to Boyd Dowler built the first-quarter bulge, trimmed in second quarter by George Andrie's 7-yard scoring return of a Starr fumble and a 21-yard Danny Villanueva field goal. Dan Reeves' 50-yard scoring strike to Lance Rentzel in the fourth quarter triggered the dramatic denouement.

1972 DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF

WASHINGTON 16, GREEN BAY 3 (Robert F. Kennedy Stadium, Washington, D.C.) — Chester Marcol's 17-yard field goal early in the second quarter puts the Packers out front, but a Bill Kilmer-to-Roy Jefferson touchdown pass late in the same period gave the Redskins a lead they never yielded. Curt Knight kicked three field goals to provide the Redskins' other points before a crowd of 53,140 fans on Sunday afternoon, December 24. John Brockington, the Packers'

1,000-yard rusher, had to settle for nine yards on 13 carries as the Redskins used a five-man defensive line to shut down Green Bay's running game.

1982 SUPER BOWL TOURNAMENT

1982 — GREEN BAY 41, ST. LOUIS 16 (Lambeau Field, Green Bay) — Making their first post-season appearance in Lambeau Field since celebrated "Ice Bowl" game of 1967 against Dallas, Packers halt Cardinal drive at one-yard-line in first quarter, then proceed to forge an all-time club scoring record in their opening Super Bowl Tournament contest following 1982 season.

Out front 21-9 at halftime, they pad lead to 41-9 in fourth quarter before permitting Cards a consolation touchdown. Quarterback Lynn Dickey ties Packer playoff record before 54,282 fans by passing for four touchdowns (17 of 23 for 260 yards and 0 interceptions overall) and flanker John Jefferson sets club post-season mark with 148 receiving yards on 6 catches, including a 60-yard TD reception, another Packer playoff record. Placekicker Jan Stenerud also establishes a club playoff mark with a 46-yard field goal.

1982 — DALLAS 37, GREEN BAY 26 (Texas Stadium, Irving, TX) — Packers amass 466 yards, a team playoff record, but are unable to overcome slow start which finds them trailing 20-7 at halftime. They roll up 363 yards and out-score Cowboys 19-17 in second half, pulling within four points (30-26) on a 22-yard scoring runback of an interception by Mark Lee in the fourth quarter, but Cowboys retaliate with 74-yard scoring drive to end Green Bay hopes with 63,972 fans looking on.

Quarterback Lynn Dickey throws for 332 yards (19 of 36), an all-time Packer playoff record, in losing cause. Split end James Lofton emerges with 109 yards on 5 receptions. Lofton also spices Packers' second-half comeback with 71-yard reverse for a TD, tying all-time NFL playoff record for a run from scrimmage.





PACKERS NO. 1 IN POST-SEASON

On the heels of their first playoff appearance in over a decade, the Green Bay Packers continue to own the best winning percentage in post-season play in National Football League history. They have won 14 of 20 playoff games since their first-ever post-season contest – the 1936 NFL championship (a 21-6 victory over the Boston Redskins) – for an overall winning percentage of .722. NFC foes San Francisco (.621) and Dallas (.614) follow. The all-time standings:

PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1963 — Earl L. (Curly) Lambeau, Founder, player, coach, vice-president (1919-49). Founded Packers in 1919 and served as team's only coach through 1949 season. Also played halfback from '19 through '27, a period during which he pioneered forward pass in professional football. Led Packers to six world championships and is one of only five coaches to record more than 200 coaching victories in the NFL (others are George Halas, Don Shula, Tom Landry and Chuck Noll). Also coached Chicago Cardinals (1950-51) and Washington Redskins (1952-53).



1963 — Johnny (Blood) McNally, HB (1928-36). Also played for Milwaukee Badgers, Duluth Eskimos, Pottsville Maroons, Pittsburgh Pirates. An elusive runner and gifted pass receiver, he played major role in Packers' drive to first three championships in 1929, '30 and '31. Also helped Packers win a fourth world title in '36. Going into 1994 season, still held 19th place in Packer lifetime scoring, six decades after departing Green Bay scene, with 224 points. Collegiate star at St. John's.



1963 — Don Hutson, E (1935-45). Made third-most touchdown receptions (99) in pro football history, an all-time NFL record until broken by Steve Largent and subsequently surpassed by Jerry Rice. Credited with inventing pass patterns, he led league in receiving 8 years and in scoring 5 seasons, both also lifetime marks. Caught passes in 94 of 95 games from 1937-45. Led NFL in receiving yards in 7 seasons, an all-time record. Also holds league record for most points scored in one quarter (29). Named to four Pro Bowls.



1963 — Robert (Cal) Hubbard, T (1929-35). Also played for New York Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates. A legendary athlete, he was one of pro football's first genuine giants — a massive 6-ft. 3-inch, 265-pounder who was a devastating blocker on offense and relentless pursuer on defense as a premier, two-way performer. Was an All-Pro choice in each of first three years (1931, '32, '33) such selections were made. Played college football at Centenary, Geneva.



1964 — Clarke Hinkle, FB (1932-41). A four-time All-Pro selection (1936, '37, '38, '41). One of the most versatile players in NFL annals, he was tough, bruising runner, fine blocker, good receiver and excellent placekicker as well as shrewd, hard-hitting linebacker. Fourth-ranking rusher in Packer history with 3,860 yards in 1,171 carries. Played college football at Bucknell. Named to three Pro Bowls.



1964 — Mike Michalske, G (1929-37). Also played for New York Yankees (1927-28) before joining Packers. Rated one of game's greatest guards during pro football's "two-way" era. Two-time All-Pro selection (1931 and 1935). A true 60-minute player, he was known as "Iron Mike" because of his great stamina and durability. Best asset was exceptional quickness, which made him equally effective on both offense and defense. Played college football at Penn State.



PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1966 — Arnie Herber, QB (1930-41). Also played for New York Giants (1944-45). Pro football's first great long passer. Won three National Football League passing titles and was All-Pro selection in 1932. Teamed with Don Hutson to form NFL's first feared passing combination in mid-'30s. Ranks fourth in Packer annals with 64 career touchdown passes over his 12 seasons. Tough, durable athlete and accomplished punter as well as great passer. A Green Bay native, he played college football at Regis (Denver, Colo.)



1971 — Vince Lombardi, Coach and General Manager (1959-67). General Manager only in 1968. Also assistant coach for New York Giants (1954-58) and head coach of Washington Redskins (1969). Directed Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 1965-66-67), a feat without precedent or parallel in pro football history. His 1966 and 1967 teams also made history by winning first two Super Bowls. Packers won nine of 10 playoff games under his leadership and overall compiled a 98-30-4 record, a glittering .758 winning percentage. Lombardi, a guard, played his college football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."



1974 — Tony Canadeo, HB (1941-44, 1946-52). Became only the third 1,000-yard rusher in pro football history when he gained 1,052 yards in 1949. Still ranks as No. 3 ground gainer in Packer annals with 4,197 yards in 1,025 attempts, a 4.1 average. A durable, all-purpose halfback, he was an accomplished blocker, capable passer and good receiver in addition to being a highly effective kick returner. Also played defensive back during early years of his career. Played college football at Gonzaga, where he acquired nickname of "Grey Ghost."



1976 — Jim Taylor, FB (1958-66). Also played for New Orleans Saints (1967). Rushed for over 1,000 yards five straight seasons (1960-64). Heading into '94 campaign, still is NFL's 12th ranking career rusher with 8,597 yards over his 10 seasons. Also owns league's sixth highest lifetime total of rushing touchdowns — 83. Is Packers' all-time leading ground-gainer with 8,207 yards to his credit during his nine seasons in Green Bay. Had 26 career 100-yard rushing games. Played his college football at LSU. Named to five Pro Bowls.



1977 — Forrest Gregg, T (1956, 1958-70). Also played with Dallas Cowboys (1971). Drafted No. 2 in 1956. Gregg was named All-Pro eight times (including All-Pro at both Guard and Tackle in 1965) and nine times to the Pro Bowl. Called by Lombardi the "finest player I've ever coached." Gregg holds the Packer record for durability with 187 consecutive games. Head Coach of the Green Bay Packers 1984-87. Also served as head coach of Cleveland Browns (1975-77) and Cincinnati Bengals (1980-83). Played college football at SMU.



1977 — Bart Starr, QB (1956-71). Drafted in 17th round in 1956. Starr became the winningest quarterback in football, directing the Packers to 6 Western Division Titles, 5 World Titles, 2 Super Bowl victories, and was named MVP in Super Bowls I and II. Starr led the League in passing in 1962, 1964 and 1966 and was named to the Pro Bowl four times. In 1972 he coached Packer quarterbacks. Head Coach of Green Bay Packers 1975-83. He played college football at Alabama.



PACKER PRO HALL OF FAMERS



1978 — Ray Nitschke, MLB (1958-72). Drafted in third round in 1957 after playing fullback at Illinois. Most Valuable Player in 1962 NFL Title game vs. N.Y. Giants. Named to the NFL All-50-Year Team. All-Pro in 1964, 1965 and 1966; Pro Bowl 1964.



1980 — Herb Adderley, DB (1961-69). Also played for Dallas Cowboys (1970-72). Packers' No. 1 draft choice (Michigan State) in 1961. Five-time All Pro at cornerback. Played in five Pro Bowls, four of first six Super Bowls (two with Green Bay, two with Dallas). Had 48 career intercepts (39 with Packers), ran 7 back for TDs (second highest total in NFL history).



1981 — Jim Ringo, C (1953-63). Also played for Philadelphia (1964-67). Seventh round draft choice out of Syracuse in 1953. Went on to win All-Pro honors eight times, seven as a Packer, and played in 10 Pro Bowls, seven as a Packer. Highly durable performer, once held NFL record for most consecutive games played (183). Helped Packers win back-to-back NFL titles in 1961-62. Traded to Philadelphia in 1964.



1981 — Willie Davis, DE (1960-69). Also played for Cleveland (1958-59). A 17th round draft choice, he came to Packers from Browns in 1960 trade. Became one of premier pass rushers in pro football history, winning All-Pro honors five times and selection to Pro Bowl five times. Holds all-time Packer record for career fumble recoveries (21) and is tied for second-longest consecutive game streak (162) in Green Bay annals. Helped Packers win five NFL titles during 1960s. Played college football at Grambling.



1986 — Paul Hornung, HB (1957-62, 1964-66). One of the most versatile players in pro football history, he won NFL scoring title three consecutive years (1959-60-61), setting all-time league record of 176 points in 1960. Also shares league single game playoff scoring record, 19 points. All-Pro selection two times and named to Pro Bowl twice. Averaged 4.2 yards per rush, caught 130 passes and kicked 66 field goals during 9-year career. Second ranking scorer in Packer history with 760 points. Bonus choice (first player selected overall) in 1957 NFL draft. Played college football at Notre Dame, winning Heisman Trophy in 1956.



1989 — Willie Wood, FS (1960-71). Wrote several NFL teams asking for a tryout coming out of USC in 1960 before Packers agreed to take a look and signed him as a free agent. Went on to become recognized as a premier free safety, winning all-NFL honors six straight years beginning in 1963. A Pro Bowl selection eight times (1962, 1964-70), Wood also played in six NFL championship games, helping Packers win five titles. Starting free safety for Green Bay in Super Bowls I and II, he broke open a close contest in third quarter of SBI, intercepting a Len Dawson pass and returning 50 yards to the Kansas City five, triggering a 35-10 Packer victory. Had 48 career interceptions, returned for 699 yards. Won NFL title in 1962 with nine thefts and also captured a league punt return crown in 1961 with a 16.1 average. One of only six free agents to make Hall of Fame.

The Packers are 182-119-13 (.600) in Green Bay and 103-60-3 (.630) in Milwaukee for an overall home mark of 285-179-16 (.610). The Packers first began to play league games in Milwaukee on an annual basis in 1933.

PACKERS OWN OVERTIME MARK

The Green Bay Packers continue to own the National Football League record for most overtime games played in a season, a standard they set in 1983 when they were involved in five sudden death decisions, winning two and losing three. In the interim, the Packers have gone to sudden death six additional times — on three occasions in 1987, once in 1989 and 1991 and, the most recent, a 23-20 loss to Minnesota to open the '92 season.

In its 18 overtime contests, Green Bay stands 5-8-4 in the regular season and 1-0 in the post-season for an overall mark of 6-8-4.

The lone post-season occurrence was a historic 13-10 victory over the Baltimore Colts in a Western Conference playoff game — the first overtime game in which the Packers ever were involved — in Green Bay's Lambeau Field Dec. 26, 1965, on a 25-yard Don Chandler field goal.

In addition to regular- and post-season play, the Packers have played five overtime games in preseason action. Capsules of the Packers' regular- and post-season overtime games follow:

MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL RESULTS

The Packers make their 20th appearance ever on Monday Night Football in 1994 as ABC-TV's prime-time series celebrates its 25th season on the air. In doing so, the Packers will be facing their most common MNF foe, the Chicago Bears, the teams having met three previous times on a Monday night.

Entering the '94 campaign, Green Bay stands 7-11-1 on Monday Night Football. The Packers, meanwhile, hold a 3-2 record in their five other prime-time appearances on either ESPN or TNT.

Though Green Bay has been an infrequent MNF participant over the past decade, the Packers continue to hold the distinction of being a part of the highest scoring game in series history — a 48-47 track meet with the Washington Redskins on Oct. 17, 1983, in front of 55,255 spectators at Lambeau Field. Facing the then-reigning Super Bowl champions, the Packers prevailed in a contest which featured 11 touchdowns, 11 extra points and 6 field goals in the final tally.

Jan Stenerud's 20-yard FG with but 54 seconds remaining decided the issue, though a final, dramatic flourish was added when the 'Skins' Mark Moseley missed a 39-yard field goal try as time expired.

The 95-point production surpassed the previous Monday Night Football scoring mark by a whopping 11 points — set Dec. 20, 1982, when San Diego outscored Cincinnati 50-34. The contest also represented the highest scoring game in Packers' history, surpassing Green Bay's 52-35 loss at Detroit in 1951.

THE PACKER STORY

BIRTH OF A TEAM AND A LEGEND

On the evening of August 11, 1919, a score or more of husky young athletes, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old Green Bay Press-Gazette building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.

There had been some preliminary talk and planning and that night's decision wasn't announced until two days later, but the big step had been taken. So August 11 is as good a birthday as any.

Actually the initial spark had been struck a few weeks before during a casual street corner conversation between Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun. It was apparently one of those "Why not get up a football team?" remarks, but once they got interested they wasted no time.

FIRST THEY TALKED Curly's employer at the Indian Packing Company into putting up some money for equipment.

Because the team's jerseys had been provided by the packing company, which also permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the corporation had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.

That first season the team won 10 games and lost only one against other teams from Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Games were played in an open field with no fences or bleachers, and interested fans "passed the hat." But the team was so successful by 1921 that Lambeau was backed by two officials of the packing plant in obtaining a franchise in the new national pro football league that had been formed in 1920. Cash customers didn't quite pay the freight and at the end of the season it had to be forfeited.

THIS WAS the first in a long series of troubles that the now famous team overcame, for in 1922 Lambeau gained other backers and bought the franchise back for \$250. Troubles continued during that season. One game was rained out and the insurance company wouldn't pay off because the official amount of rain was one one-hundredth of an inch short of that required in the policy.

Another storm late in the season when the Packers were scheduled to play the Duluth Kelleys, however, proved the founding of the modern community corporation. A.B. Turnbull, general manager of the Green Bay Press-Gazette, told the Packers to play anyway. He then went out and helped organize the businessmen of Green

Bay in the support of the team, and the Green Bay Football Corporation was formed.

FROM THOSE MODEST and somewhat tenuous beginnings, the Packers have gone on to earn national stature and virtual world-wide recognition by winning more championships (11) over the intervening 70-plus years than any other team in professional football.

The fact that these achievements have come while representing a city of only 96,000 inhabitants, in competition with the country's population giants, has endeared them to the nation's football fans, many of whom are intrigued by the David vs. Goliath concept and the Packers' unique status as a publicly-owned corporation.

INEVITABLY, PROCEDURES at Packer games have come a long way since the sandlot years of 1919-20 when the Pack was subsisting on the contents of George Calhoun's hat. Then there were no ushers, no majorettes, no band and no public address system — the latter hadn't been invented yet. There weren't even any seats at first, and it didn't cost anything to get in.

When the Packers began their existence in 1919, they played on approximately the same site as the now abandoned City (East) Stadium, but with a mighty difference. Hagemester Park, as it was called, was just a big vacant lot with a football gridiron marked on it.

There were no gates because there wasn't any fence. Spectators just dropped off the Walnut Street streetcar and walked over to the sideline, or drove their own cars and parked about 10 yards behind the ropes stretched around the playing field.

If they felt like it they either sat in their automobiles or on top of them, but most preferred to get out and follow the play up and down the field. By moving as the play progressed, you always had a "50-yard line" location and were handy to any donnybrook that might require a little help. In fact, when things got exciting the crowd sometimes spilled right onto the field, surrounded the scrimmage in a big circle and virtually took part in every play. Teams didn't huddle in those days, or the fans would have been in that too.

When the half ended, teams grabbed blankets and adjourned to opposite end zones where they relaxed and talked over the tactics of the next half. Nothing private about those huddles. The crowd formed a ring around the players, a practice encouraged since it made a handy wind break. Fans weren't bashful about joining the discussions either, sometimes with surprising results. At least one early game was pulled out of the fire by a spectator's halftime suggestion.



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In 1920 a section of stands was built — just a small bleacher with a capacity of a couple hundred — on one side of the field, and a fee charged to sit there. The next year a portable canvas fence was erected around the whole field and a regular admission charge inaugurated.

WHEN HAGEMEISTER Park was dug up in 1923 to make way for East High School, the Packers shifted to the new baseball grounds out on the end of Main Street. This was called Bellevue Park because it was just east of the old Hagemeister Brewery, which was renamed the Bellevue Products Co. during Prohibition. Things were Big Time out there, with crowds of 4,000 to 5,000 storming the fences to boo the hated Chicago Bears.

The Packers used Bellevue in 1923-24, but it was obviously inadequate and too far out, lacking about every facility needed for football. Agitation to build a new stadium somewhere near the original site culminated in the erection of old City Stadium just back of the new high school.

The new plant was barely completed in time for the 1925 opening, but was an immediate success, the Bear game that year drawing a record crowd of 5,389. It was a typical small town park of its day, with wooden fences and stands on both sides between the 30-yard lines. Seating capacity was gradually increased until it seated 15,000 by 1934, with the end zones still uncovered. With the filling in of the area around the end lines the ultimate capacity of 25,000 was reached.

AFTER WORLD WAR II, City Stadium gradually faded from its once proud position as one of the favored fields in the National Football League to an inadequate and obsolete installation. As pro crowds increased it was impossible to expand the stadium any further. With limited capacity, the Packers found it increasingly difficult to schedule top opponents at home. September 29, 1957, was a proud day for Green Bay and its Packers. A million dollar modern stadium with a seating capacity of 32,150 was dedicated. In 1961, the Stadium was expanded to 38,669, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,852 in 1965 when the name was changed to Lambeau Field, 56,263 in 1970, and to 56,926 following the addition of private boxes in 1985. With the addition of 36 more private boxes and 1,920 club seats in the south end zone, capacity was upped to 59,543 in 1990.

The Packers' colorful saga, spanning 75 years, can be divided roughly into eight chapters. They take us from the "Iron Man" period of the first decade under founder Curly Lambeau to the present day, which finds Mike Holmgren presiding as the 11th head coach in the team's history.

THE IRON MAN ERA — With good financial backing, Lambeau began to pick up college stars

from all over the country, plus some unknowns who were going to turn out to be "greats." And in 1929 Green Bay won the national professional football championship. It repeated in 1930 and in 1931 with a team featuring such all-time pro greats as Red Dunn, Verne Lewellen, Cal Hubbard, Bo Molenda, Jug Earp, Mike Michalske, Johnny (Blood) McNally, Bill Kern, Arnie Herber, Clarke Hinkle, Lavvie Dilweg, Tom Nash, Milt Gantenbein and Hank Bruder. Many games 12 or 13 players would go for almost the full 60 minutes. These teams were hailed all over the country as some of the greatest ever.

THE HUTSON PERIOD — Trouble flared again soon afterward. A fan fell from the stands, sued and won a \$5,000 verdict and the insurance company went out of business. The Packers went into receivership and were just about to fold when Green Bay businessmen came to the rescue again, raised \$15,000 in new capital and reorganized the club. About this time a rather slight, lanky end by the name of Don Hutson came to the club. From his first game on, Hutson became the terror of the league and the secret of Green Bay's next three championships. With Herber and Cecil Isbell pitching and Hutson catching anything they threw at him despite any kind of a stop-Hutson defense, Green Bay won championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944, and all during the Hutson era the Packers always finished in the first division.

RONZANI REGIME — After Hutson's retirement, Packer fortunes again went into a decline. The disastrous pro football war brought on another financial crisis after the 1949 season. In the midst of it Lambeau resigned to take a position as head coach of the Chicago Cardinals. Then began another major reorganization and rebuilding effort with Gene Ronzani of the Bears hired as head coach. Over \$125,000 was raised in a giant stock sale all over the state. Ronzani's teams improved each of the first three seasons until 1952. The Packers were in the thick of the title chase until the last weeks of the season. In 1953 the team played erratic ball and Ronzani resigned with two games remaining on the schedule.

BLACKBOURN TAKES OVER — The Packers overhauled their front office and coaching staff in 1954, hiring Verne Lewellen, all-time Packer great, attorney and businessman, as general manager. Reaching into the college ranks for a head coach was the next step in the rebuilding plans and Lisle Blackbourn, coach of Marquette University, was signed to a contract. During the four-year Blackbourn regime the Packers won 17 while losing 31.

McLEAN MOVES UP — Likable Ray "Scooter" McLean moved up from being an outstanding



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assistant coach to guide the destiny of the Packers for 1958. McLean resigned in December after a 1-10-1 record, the worst in Packer history in his lone season as head coach.

THE LOMBARDI ERA — In 1959, the Packers announced the signing of New York Giants assistant Vince Lombardi as head coach and general manager.

In his first season, Lombardi lifted the Packers to a 7-5 record and unanimously was voted Coach of the Year. Then in 1960, the Packers captured the Western Division title and went on to win World Championships in 1961, 1962, 1965, 1966 and 1967. Never finishing lower than second since 1960, his teams became the standard of football excellence and the Packer franchise one of the most successful. Over a nine-year span as head coach, Lombardi's teams racked up 98 victories against 30 losses and 4 ties for a remarkable .758 winning percentage. Even more noteworthy, however, is the record of Lombardi coached teams in post-season play. In 10 division playoffs and World Championship games, the Packers emerged victorious nine times.

BENGTSON PERIOD — Following the third consecutive title in 1967, Lombardi turned over the head coaching duties to Phil Bengtson and one year later announced that he was leaving Green Bay to coach and manage the Washington Redskins. Bengtson coached the Packers from 1968-1970, compiling a 20-21-1 record, and in December of 1970 resigned.

THE DEVINE DAYS — Dan Devine, one of the three most successful coaches in the nation's collegiate ranks, succeeded Bengtson as head coach and general manager in January of 1971. After settling for a 4-8-2 record during his first season, Devine and the Packers appeared on the road to new heights when 1972 produced a 10-4 record and the team's first Central Division title since 1967. But the Packers' Super Bowl hopes dissolved in the second half of '73 and they slipped to a 5-7-2 mark. They continued their recession in '74, emerging with a 6-8 record, and Devine resigned.

THE STARR TREK — The most successful field general in pro football history as Green Bay's quarterback of the '60s, Bart Starr accepted the challenge to lead the Packers out of the NFL wilderness, agreeing to a three-year contract as head coach and general manager on December 24, 1974. Starr, who led the Packers to five world championships from 1961 through 1967, asked for "the prayers and patience of Packer fans everywhere...We will earn everything else."

Although he had to settle for a 4-10 record in the baptismal season of a massive rebuilding

project, Starr gave Packer fans new hope by assembling a sound organization and restoring a positive attitude, underscored by three victories in the last five games of the 1975 season. He continued the resurgent trend in 1976, leading the Packers to a 5-9 record, highlighted by a three-game, mid-season winning streak. Major and key injuries slowed the comeback in 1977 but a strong finish produced a 4-10 mark. Hopes soared in 1978 when the Packers posted their first winning slate since 1972, an 8-7-1 record, only to be temporarily dampened in '79 by a record rash of injuries which spawned a 5-11 mark. Another injury epidemic, one which saw 27 players on injured reserve during the course of the season, struck in 1980, forcing the Packers to settle for a 5-10-1 record.

Rebounding strongly in 1981, they rallied from a disappointing 2-6 start to mount one of the most dramatic comebacks in Green Bay history, closing with a 6-2 rush (an 8-8 mark) and coming within one victory of the playoffs.

The Packers continued the upsurge in 1982, when they qualified for the playoffs for the first time since 1972 by posting a 5-3-1 record during a strike-interrupted season. They then embellished that performance by routing St. Louis 41-16 in the first game of the NFL's Super Bowl Tournament before bowing to Dallas (37-26) despite a record-setting, 466-yard offensive effort. Starr was relieved of his head coaching duties on December 19, 1983, after the Packers finished the '83 season with an 8-8 record and missed the NFL playoffs on the final week of the year.

GREGG ERA — On December 24, 1984, Starr was replaced by Forrest Gregg, a former teammate and one of the premier offensive tacklers in the history of the game as a player, who had maneuvered Cincinnati into Super Bowl XVI following the 1981 season. Gregg, whose Bengals' 19-6 record over the 1981-82 seasons was the best in pro football, received a five-year contract.

In taking over, he declared, "I took this job to field a winning team. That will happen."

Gregg's prediction began to bear fruit in the second half of the 1984 season when the Packers rebounded from an injury-ridden 1-7 start to win seven of their last eight games.

Because of injury and other complications, however, the 1985 season followed the '84 script, the Packers getting off to a slow 3-6 start before mounting a strong finish to again close at 8-8 by winning five of their last seven games.

Gregg, convinced the time had come to rebuild a team which had gone 8-and-8 three years in succession and was "starting to get old" at that



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level, made sweeping personnel changes in 1986. The young and inexperienced Packers, their task complicated by injuries to such key performers as John Anderson, Tim Lewis, Rich Moran and Mark Cannon, got off to an 0-6 start, then began to mature in mid-season and went on to finish with a 4-and-12 record.

Following the 1987 season, which saw the Packers finish third in the NFC Central with a 5-9-1 record, Gregg resigned (January 15, 1988) to become head coach at his alma mater, Southern Methodist University.

INFANTE SIGNS ON — Nineteen days later (February 3), Cleveland Browns offensive coordinator Lindy Infante became the 10th head coach in Packer history. Recognized throughout the NFL as a brilliant innovator, the 47-year-old University of Florida alumnus received a five-year contract.

With turnovers and kicking problems plaguing his offense, Infante's first Packer team had to settle for a 4-and-12 record, but left fans with hopes for 1989 and the future by winning the last two games to mount a strong finish.

Building upon that positive note, Infante orchestrated a dramatic upsurge in '89, escorting the Packers to a 10-6 record — their best in 17 years — and within one game of the National Football League playoffs, spicing that turnaround with a league-record four one-point victories.

In 1990, subsequent high hopes for the team's first post-season berth in a non-strike year since 1972 evaporated when the Packers — with a contending, 6-5 record after 11 games — saw a potential playoff opportunity expire in the face of a season-ending, five-game losing streak.

The Packers' field fortunes continued to decline in 1991, the record falling to 4-12, and Infante was

relieved of his duties on December 22 by new Executive Vice President/General Manager Ron Wolf, who had been hired November 27 with full authority to run the organization's football operation.

THE PRESENT — Mike Holmgren, architect of one of the NFL's most potent attacks as offensive coordinator for the perennially successful, four-time Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers, was named by Wolf to succeed Infante as the 11th head coach in Packer history on January 11, 1992. Holmgren, sought after by five other NFL clubs, received a five-year contract.

Getting his team on track after an 0-and-2 start, the former USC field general directed the Packers to a 9-and-7 record and within striking range of the playoffs. He thus became only the third head coach in Packer history to post a winning record in his first season, a record punctuated by a six-game winning streak, longest by a Packer team since 1965.

In 1993, his second season at the controls, Holmgren took his team to the next level — the playoffs — despite the loss of four starters to injuries and a nagging turf toe problem which hampered the Packers' principal offensive weapon, wide receiver Sterling Sharpe, over the last half of the season.

Surmounting these handicaps, the Green and Gold forged a second consecutive 9-and-7 record — against a considerably more demanding schedule — to qualify for post-season play for the first time since 1982, then posted a last-minute, come-from-behind victory over the Detroit Lions (28-24) in their first playoff assignment before falling to the repeating Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys (27-17) in their second, a divisional playoff.

1939 — Packers repeat for Western Division title, rout Giants in title game at Milwaukee, 27-0 (December 10).

1941 — Packers tie Bears for Western Division title, fall to Bears in Chicago playoff, 33-14 (December 14).

1944 — With Ted Fritsch scoring both touchdowns, Packers beat Giants 14-7 at New York's Polo Grounds for sixth NFL title (December 17).

1945 — Don Hutson catches 4 TD passes, kicks 5 PATs in second quarter against Detroit at Milwaukee, sets all-time one-quarter scoring record of 29 points as Packers win 57-21, October 7.

1949 — Packers play intra-squad game at East (old City) Stadium on Thanksgiving Day, raise \$50,000 to stay afloat financially.

— Packers, 3-9-0 in 1948, dip to all-time low under Curly Lambeau, 2-10-0.

1950 — Lambeau resigns to become vice president, head coach of Chicago Cardinals.

— Gene Ronzani, ex-Chicago Bear star, named Packer head coach, V.P.

— Stock drive nets \$118,000, puts Packers on sound financial basis.

— Packers change team colors to green and gold, eliminating navy blue.

1953 — Packers play their first game in new Milwaukee County Stadium (September 27).

— Ronzani resigns with two games remaining; Hugh Devore and Ray "Scooter" McLean named co-coaches.

1954 — Lisle Blackbourn, Marquette University coach, is named Packer coach.

1957 — Lambeau Field, completed just in time for season opener, is dedicated (September 29) with 21-17 victory over Bears.

— Packers post 3-9-0 mark following 4-8-0 in '56, Blackbourn resigns.

— Dominic Olejniczak elected seventh president of Green Bay Packers, Inc., April 28.

1959 — Vince Lombardi, offensive coach of N.Y. Giants, named Packer head coach and GM, February 4.

— Packers post 7-5-0 record, their first winning season in 12 years.

— Bengtson resigns, December 21.

1971 — Dan Devine, University of Missouri coach, named Packer head coach and general manager.

1972 — Packers win first Central Division title since '67 (10-4-0), but lose to Redskins in divisional playoff at Washington, 16-3 (December 23).

1974 — Devine resigns December 16, following 5-7-2 mark in '73 and 6-8-0 in '74.

— Lindy Infante, offensive coordinator of Cleveland Browns, named Packer head coach, agreeing to 5-year contract (February 3).

— Packers report \$2,839,270 profit, then second highest in team history.

1989 — Judge Robert J. Parins retires as President of Packer Corporation and is elected Honorary Chairman of the Board (June 5).

— Robert E. Harlan is elected president and chief executive officer of Packer Corporation, succeeding Judge Parins (June 5).

— Packers announce plans for construction of 1,920 club seats — a "first" for Lambeau Field — in south end zone and 36 additional private boxes at a projected cost of \$8,263,000 (August 22).

1990 — Packers extend Head Coach Lindy Infante's contract two years — through the 1994 season (January 16).

1991 — Michael R. Reinfeldt, former Pro Bowl safety and Los Angeles Raiders executive, becomes Packers' Chief Financial Officer (January 7).

— The names of the 18 Packer players and coaches elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame are placed in permanent display on the green walls between floors of Lambeau Field's private boxes, on both sides of the stadium, with team's 11 championship years (1929-30-31, 1936, 1939, 1944, 1961-62 and 1965-66-67) emblazoned above club seats in the south end zone.

— Tom Braatz, executive vice president of football operations, relieved of his duties (November 20).

— Ron Wolf, director of player personnel for New York Jets and a veteran of 29 years as a pro football scout and executive, is named executive vice president and general manager by president Robert E. Harlan, with full authority to run the Packers' football operation (November 27).

— Lindy Infante is relieved of his duties as head coach by executive vice president and general manager Ron Wolf (December 22).



PACKER CHRONOLOGY

1992 — Mike Holmgren, offensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers, is named by Wolf as the 11th head coach in Packer history (January 11).

— Treasurer John R. Underwood reports Packer Corporation profit of \$2.17 million on 1991-92 operations, then third-highest in team history (May 27).

— Holmgren becomes only third head coach in Packer history to have winning record in his first season (9-7).

1993 — Packers sign Reggie White, most sought-after unrestricted free agent, as free agency comes to NFL (April 8).

— Treasurer John R. Underwood reports record Packer corporation profit of \$4.96 million before booking of \$4.1 million for club's share of NFL's litigation settlement with players (May 26).

— New 20,500 square-foot addition to Packers' training quarters, housing a 84-by-70 foot gymnasium and new public relations and marketing offices, is completed in July.

— Packers shut out Los Angeles Raiders, 28-0, in -22 degree wind chill, gain playoffs for first time since 1982 (December 26).

1994 — Packers defeat Detroit Lions in wild card playoff, 28-24, for first post-season victory since January, 1983 (January 8).

— Packers extend contract of Ron Wolf as executive vice president/general manager for three additional years, through 1999 (March 31).

— President Robert E. Harlan announces plans to construct 90 additional private boxes and a 57-seat auxiliary press box, at a cost of \$8 million, in Lambeau Field's north end zone area in 1995 (April 21).

— Treasurer John R. Underwood reports Packer Corporation profit of \$1.95 million on 1993-94 operations (May 25).

— The Don Hutson Center, Packers' new, \$4.2 million indoor practice facility, is dedicated (July 18).



Edgar Bennett's 59 receptions in 1993 matched the second-highest single-season total in Packer history for a running back. Keith Woodside earlier had 59 catches in 1989, six short of the club record for a back, 65, set by Gerry Ellis in 1981.

1994 PLAYING RULES

At its annual meeting the NFL took significant measures to strengthen offensive football for 1994. After in-depth study by special meetings of head coaches and the Competition Committee, member clubs adopted several new playing rules. In addition, longstanding policies affecting offensive production were re-emphasized and refined.

- **Chunking Rules.** The policy which governs chunking and other contact by defensive players with offensive receivers will be strictly enforced. Evidence showed that receivers were being unfairly restricted both within the five-yard chunking zone and farther downfield.
- **Roughing-the-Passer Rules.** Like the chunking rules, roughing the passer has been re-defined and will be strictly enforced. Officials will emphasize fouls when defensive players unnecessarily punish a passer (e.g., stuffing him into the ground or driving him down after he has thrown the ball). Formerly the defender was given one step after the passer completed his throwing motion (often with the arm far forward or at his waist). That will be changed to after the pass is released.
- **Coach-to-Quarterback Radio.** Coaching staffs will send in offensive plays to the quarterback by a radio equipped with a scrambling device. These benefits will result for the offensive team: 1) uniformly easy-to-understand signals, 2) signals secure from eavesdropping or other observation, 3) ease of communication when the ball is at an extreme end of the field, 4) better time management between plays, 5) better understanding by quarterback in noisy environments.
- **Deeper Alignment for Offensive Lineman.** Offensive linemen now may line up deeper off the ball, provided their helmets pass through an imaginary plane at the center's beltline (formerly the numeral on his jersey). This will promote better protection against pass rushers and allow linemen to easily see the snap of the ball (particularly helpful when crowd noise is high).
- **Restrictions on Defensive Players.** If a defensive player enters the neutral zone and causes the offense to move, a foul will be called on the defense (formerly an offensive foul and only a warning to defense).
- **Kickoff from 30.** The kickoff spot will be moved back to the 30-yard line, and a tee no higher than one inch may be used. Although this should produce more kickoff returns, often a highly exciting play, the main benefit will be better field position for the offense.
- **Two-Point Conversion.** After a touchdown the ball will be placed on the two-yard line and offensive teams will have the choice of kicking for one point, or running or passing for two. The possibility of an "eight-point touchdown" will help teams behind to catch up.
- **Spot of Missed Field Goals.** Missed field goals attempted from beyond the 20-yard line will be brought back to the spot of the kick (formerly the line of scrimmage). It is expected that this approximately seven-yard difference will affect coaching strategy and keep the emphasis on first downs and touchdowns.





THE LAMBEAU FIELD STORY



Green Bay's Lambeau Field, historic home of the Packers, has undergone a number of major alterations since it was constructed in 1957, the most recent of these the installation of a \$1.7 million color replay board prior to the 1993 season.

Over the stadium's 37-year history, there have been six additions to the facility's seating, increasing the present capacity to 59,543. The latest was completed in 1990, when 36 private boxes and 1,920 club seats were constructed. The \$8,263,000 project, which has given Lambeau a horseshoe appearance, increased the number of private boxes to 108 — 42 on the west side and 66 on the east side.

The theatre-style club seats, a first for the now legendary stadium, were installed in the south end zone on either side of the scoreboard. They are enclosed and the area is heated and air conditioned. It also is equipped with elevators, concession stands and restrooms.

The previous additions, all of them, like the 1990 project, underwritten by the Green Bay Packers, Inc., increased the stadium capacity from its original 32,150 to 38,669 in 1961, to 42,327 in 1963, to 50,852 in 1965, to 56,263 in 1970 and to 56,916 in 1985, the year the first private boxes were constructed.

A seventh expansion, construction of which will begin following the 1994 season, will add 90 private boxes to the north end zone area and increase the stadium's capacity to 60,789. The \$8 million project also will include a 57-seat auxiliary press box.

The cost of the original construction, when the stadium was built in 1957, was \$960,000, shared equally by the Packer Corporation and the City of Green Bay. Financed by means of a bond issue, it received 2-to-1 voter approval in a municipal referendum conducted April 3, 1956.

The structure was dedicated as City Stadium on September 29, 1957, during ceremonies attended by then-Vice President Richard M. Nixon and National Football League Commissioner Bert Bell. It later was renamed Lambeau Field in 1965, following the death of the late E.L. "Curly" Lambeau, founder and first coach of the Packers.

Lambeau Field now is wholly owned by the City of Green Bay, retirement of the original \$960,000 indebtedness having been celebrated at a mortgage burning ceremony in May of 1978. Under terms of an agreement reached in 1984, the Packers leased the stadium from the City for a 20-year period extending through the year 2004 with an option to renew through the year 2024.

With the completion last July of a 20,500-square foot addition to the team's building and training quarters, and of a new, \$4.2 million indoor practice facility — the 112,400-square foot Don Hutson Center, the Packer organization has spent over \$28 million on improvements to Lambeau Field and the administration building and training facilities over the past 13 years.

The names of the 18 Packer players and coaches elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame appear in permanent display on the green walls between floors of the stadium's private boxes, on both sides of the stadium, with the team's 11 championship years (1929-30-31, 1936, 1939, 1944, 1961-62 and 1965-66-67) emblazoned above the club seats in the south end zone.



THE NEW DON HUTSON CENTER



The Green Bay Packers' ongoing commitment to excellence in all areas, on and off the field, has been exemplified again with the construction of the Don Hutson Center, a state-of-the-art indoor practice and training facility completed in mid-July.

Named in honor of the legendary end, who has been called the greatest player in pro football history, it was dedicated at July 18 ceremonies presided over by the charter Hall of Famer, who now lives in retirement at Rancho Mirage, Calif. Located across the street from Lambeau Field, the \$4.2-million structure sprawls over 112,400 square feet and encompasses two artificial turf fields — one of 70 yards, the other of 60 — both with a 10-yard end zone, which permit the offense and defense to practice separately at the same time.

Capable of accommodating two '747' jet airliners, side by side, The Don Hutson Center is 452 feet long, 170 feet wide and 90 feet high at its apex. In addition to the practice fields, it includes a coaches' meeting room, training room and conditioning room, and can be heated to a maximum temperature of 65 degrees.

The 81-year-old Hutson was the most dominant performer of his era (1935-45), an eminence underscored by the fact that the "Alabama Antelope" still holds 11 NFL records a half century after his retirement from the game. An All-American at the University of Alabama before signing with the Packers as a free agent in 1935 (the year before the college draft was implemented), he has been credited with inventing pass patterns — a development which revolutionized the passing game — while helping Green Bay win three National Football League championships in 1936, 1939 and 1944.

With completion of the Hutson Center, the Packers have spent more than \$28 million on improvements to the training facilities, administration building and Lambeau Field since 1982.

PLAYER AVAILABILITY: During the regular season, the locker room is open for player interviews five days a week. On Monday, the locker room is open from 12 Noon to 1 p.m. and for one hour upon completion of the players' workout. From Wednesday through Friday, the locker room is open from 12:30-1:15 p.m. and for one hour following practice. At the conclusion of all games, the locker room will be opened after the NFL's standard "cooling off" period. The locker room will be closed on the players' "off" day (generally Tuesday).

The locker room is closed during training camp.

Any requests to interview players other than at the aforementioned times should be directed to a member of the Packers' public relations department.

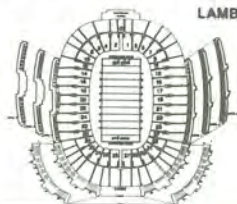

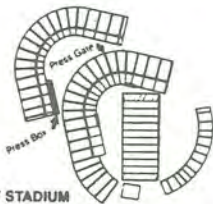

COACH-TO-QUARTERBACK RADIO

Q: What is the helmet radio?

It is a system designed to enhance communication between the coach on the sideline (either the head coach, the offensive coordinator or another designated coach) and the quarterback. Coaches will be able to transmit plays to the quarterback under specific guidelines with the goal of replacing and improving upon the current procedure of hand-signaling plays into the game.

Q: Why did NFL clubs approve it?

The overall aim was to promote offensive production. The system will benefit the offense in several ways: 1) play-calling will be simplified; 2) the signal will be secure from eavesdropping or other observation; 3) it will make communication easier when the offense is at an extreme end of the field; 4) it will help improve time management between plays and give quarterbacks more time at the line of scrimmage; and 5) there will be better understanding by the quarterback of the coach's instructions in a noisy environment.

Q: How does it work?

The coach on the sideline calls the offensive play into a microphone on the headset. His voice will be heard through the small speakers mounted inside the quarterback's helmet. The message travels from the coach to the cut-off unit in the press box and is then relayed instantaneously to the quarterback's helmet.

Q: How will other teams be prevented from picking up the signals?

All communication on this system will be encrypted ("scrambled") for security. The receiving device in the quarterback's helmet will instantaneously de-code the scrambled message. The encryption scheme will have more than 268 million possible codes, and each team will have its own code, indecipherable by any other team or person attempting to listen in.

Q: Can the quarterback transmit messages?

No. It is a one-way communication system that can only transmit messages from the coach to the player.

Q: Can the coach transmit messages during a play?

No. When the play clock reaches 15 seconds (descending from either its 40- or 25-second interval) or when the ball is snapped, whichever comes first, the coach-to-quarterback transmission will be electronically terminated by a cut-off device manned by a league employee positioned with the clock operators in the press box.

Q: Will any player besides the quarterback be wearing the device?

No. Each team will be supplied with four quarterback-helmet devices, one transmitter for the coach and one cut-off device. No other players in the offensive lineup will have the communication system.

Q: What happens if there is a malfunction?

The helmet radio will not be subject to the same policy which requires one team to shut down its coaches' phones if the opposition loses all phone communication to the field. Clubs will be responsible for any malfunctions. In such cases, teams may use hand-signals or other previous methods for calling plays.

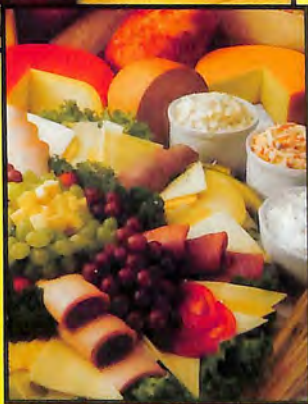
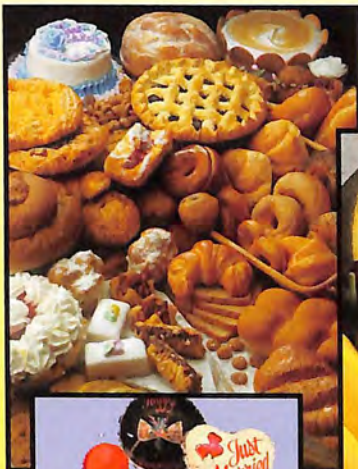
Q: How big is the quarterback-helmet communication device?

The helmet components include two flat electronic modules about the shape of a credit card and about a quarter-inch thick and a pack of coin-shaped batteries, all of which fit deep under the padding. These devices will be connected to small speakers located near each earhole of the helmet.

Q: How much does the system cost?

The complete package of equipment will cost each team \$20,000, totaling \$560,000 for all 28 teams. This cost includes the four quarterback-helmet devices, one coach's transmitter and one cut-off device per team. The system is manufactured by Control Dynamics of Ivyland, Pennsylvania.

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
