TED COLLINS—SPORTSMAN

Six years of perseverance in the face of gridiron reverses, both artistic and financial, appear about to reward Ted Collins in 1950.

Up until this season, he had never fielded a winning team in five years in Boston and one in New York. His teams had never won a non-championship game. And the turnstiles had never returned a profit. On the contrary, his losses have surpassed the million-dollar mark.

Asked publicly last winter how long he could continue to take such deficits, his unhesitating reply was, "forever." This statement may have had much to do with ending the four-year professional football war.

In any case, it accurately reflects the enthusiasm for football of a man whose associates find it difficult to discuss pressing business with him—because he'd rather reminisce about the plays, the players, and the coaches who have made professional football the great game it is.

With the end of the professional war, Ted purchased Dan Topping's New York Yankees of the All-America Conference, combined them with his own Bulldogs of the National Football League, and changed the name back to Yanks—the banner under which his Boston clubs played for five seasons.

He secured the services of Norman (Red) Strader, one of the most highly regarded coaches in football; signed probably the greatest array of talent in the history of the game, and turned optimistically to the 1950 season.

A phenomenal success in the music and radio fields—with further laurels just around the corner in television—Ted's sports career began with his activity as a professional basketball player. He later owned the great Original Celtics, for six years.

Ted shifted to football in 1941 when he acquired the Long Island Indians of the American League. He entered the National Football League in 1944 when he bought the Boston franchise.

The thousands who have watched, with interest and admiration, his dogged battle for success in major league football, are pulling for the scrappy, persistent native New Yorker to fly a championship flag from Yankee stadium, the Home of Champions, in the near future. This could be the year.



THE COACHES

NORMAN (RED) STRADER—Head Coach

Known as a defensive coach second to few off his record of the past two seasons with the Yankees, "Red" Strader will have the opportunity this year to prove that he is also a master of the offensive game.

He took over the Yankees in 1948 after the club had won 1 and lost 3 in a row, with several key players injured—notably Spec Sanders—and broke even the rest of the way, although using the unfamiliar single-wing formation. Last year, switching to "T", he was unable to unearth a quarterback with top-flight qualifications, but his club won 8 out of 12 starts. Now, with George Ratterman and Johnny Rauch to engineer his "T", he is hopeful of putting more numbers on the scoreboard than ever before.

A native of Newton, N. J., where he was born Dec. 21, 1904, Strader and his family settled in Ceres, Calif., when he was six months old. He made Walter Camp's third all-American as a full-back for St. Mary's in 1924—behind Ernie Nevers and Elmer Layden—and also starred as a catcher.

He played in organized baseball with Saginaw, Mich., Hollywood, and Wheeling, W. Va., doubling in football with the Chicago Bulls and Chicago Cardinals in 1926 and 1927.

Three-sport coach at Regis college of Denver from 1928 through 1931, Red returned to his alma mater in 1932 as freshman football coach. He became "Slip" Madigan's assistant the following year, and in 1940 he became head mentor for two seasons, giving Fordham it's only defeat of the 1940 campaign, 9-6.

A lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve, he served from 1942 through 1945, coaching at Whitby Island, Camp Perry, and Sampson. His Camp Perry team lost only to Bainbridge and defeated North Carolina Pre-Flight, including Otto Graham and Sanders.

Joining the Yankees as backfield coach in 1946, he also served as a baseball scout for the Bronx Bombers. He was elevated to the head coaching post after the disastrous start of 1948, and did so well that when Ted Collins purchased the Yankees last December, he insisted that Red come along.

JACK WHITE—Assistant Coach

A product of New Britain, Conn., high school and Manhattan college, Jack White is far more than an assistant coach. He directs the Yanks' player-scouting system, and appears able to solve any football problem, on the gridiron, in the office, on the road, or in the scouting department, all with consummate skill and apparently endless energy.

An all-State star at New Britain high in 1930 and 1931, Jack made the all-New England prep team at Suffield, Conn., then played three years for Chick Meehan during Manhattan's best era, lining up at guard, center, and tackle. He also had a brilliant collegiate boxing career as a heavyweight and light-heavyweight.

A fling at professional ball, cut short by injuries, was followed by two years coaching New Britain high into a game billed for the national title at Baton Rouge, La., against Manual of Louisville. He was in the Navy from 1941 through 1945, going into inactive status as a lieutenant after coaching the great Pearl Harbor all-Stars. He went with the Yankees in 1945 and moved over to the Yanks last January with Red Strader. Jack is married and has a daughter, 4, and a son born last January.

SHELBY C. CALHOUN—Assistant Coach

A former Louisiana State U. great, with a long and varied coaching career behind him, Shelby Calhoun is making his bow as a professional mentor, although he has done player and game scouting for the majors.

He coached at his alma mater after getting his degree in physical education in 1934, spending a year as assistant frosh coach and another as assistant line coach. He moved on to Mississippi State for two years as line coach, to Wyoming for another two in the same capacity, thence to Southern California for four years.

When the Trojans decided upon an all-alumni staff, he moved crosstown to UCLA, where he was end coach for four years through the 1948 season. Married to the former Helene King, his L.S.U. sweetheart, he is the father of two sons, 6 and 3½. He is a native of Monroe, La.
