LAMAR HUNT

Lamar Hunt that the American Football League's founder and its first enshrinee accepted the distinguished honor with quiet humility:

"I'm the last person to claim personal justification. My selection is symbolic of all the general managers, coaches and players who worked for the growth of the American Football League."

Thus, Lamar Hunt begins his 15th season as the owner and president of the Kansas City Chiefs Football Club, as the President of the American Football Conference of the NFL and with dreams and ambitions to make professional football an even better product in the years to come.

Lamar Hunt is a man who thrives on challenges. He has seen and lived with the trials of the beginning of the American Football League. He has moved a franchise from Dallas to Kansas City. He has watched and helped the AFL grow into first a rival league and then a merger with the NFL. He has been an organizer and an architect of the Super Bowl. And because of his dedication, Lamar Hunt now is recognized as one of the sports world's most active pioneers.

At the age of 26, the quiet Texan, already a success in the business world, formed the American Football League in 1959, became its first president in 1960 and obtained his own franchise, the Dallas Texans.

Because he thought it would be "good for the league," Hunt moved his franchise to Kansas City for the 1963 season and as president of the Chiefs and the AFL he continued his pursuit to make the league the best in professional football.

Hunt is involved in several other sports and entertainment ventures in addition to owning the Kansas City Chiefs. He is president and founder of World Championship Tennis (WCT) which headquarters in Dallas and has boosted the popularity of the game tremendously. He also is Chairman of the Board of Directors of Mid-American Enterprises, which developed Kansas City's Worlds of Fun family entertainment park, which is in its second year of operation. And he owns the Dallas Tornado soccer team in the NASL.

This spring, Hunt was named National Chairman of the Victor Awards, a special benefit of the City of Hope. In June of 1968 he was elected to membership on the Board of Trustees of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in July of 1972. He is a member of the board of directors of three of Kansas City's most active companies, Great Midwest Corporation, Interstate Securities and Traders National Bank. He also serves on the board of directors of NFL Charities.

A graduate of Southern Methodist University, Hunt and his wife, Norma, and children, Lamar Jr., Sharon and Clark, make their home in Dallas.

CHIEFS HEAD COACH AND VICE PRESIDENT



HANK STRAM

It is no small coincidence that a winning tradition has followed Hank Stram in his 14 seasons as the only Head Coach of the Kansas City Chiefs. The dynamic and innovative Stram has directed the Chiefs ever since Lamar Hunt founded the American Football League and named Stram, then an assistant coach at the University of Miami, to direct the Dallas Texans in 1960.

And since that very first year of the American Football League, a winning tradition has

followed Hank Stram. Since 1965 Stram's Chiefs have compiled nine consecutive winning seasons, a feat matched by only one other NFL team in pro football's last decade.

Stram will begin his 15th season and his third year of a 10-year contract under owner Lamar Hunt as the Kansas City Chiefs Head Coach and Vice President. The popular mentor's 14-year record as the Head Coach of the Chiefs is an outstanding one, showing 119 victories against only 67 losses and 10 ties plus an additional five triumphs in eight Championship/Playoff battles. His Dallas Texans won their first American Football League crown in 1962 in the first sudden death contest against the Houston Oilers. Since that time, the Chiefs, under Stram, have played in two Super Bowls, losing to Green Bay in Super Bowl I and defeating Minnesota in Super Bowl IV. He was the only coach in the old AFL to take his team to two Super Bowls.

Stram has been honored as either the AFL/AFC or pro football's Coach of the Year on four occasions—1962, 1966, 1968 and 1970.

The Chiefs now are the fourth winningest team in professional football history and the third winningest team in the American Football Conference with 119 regular season victories. Only Baltimore and Cleveland, inherited from the NFL at the time of the pro football merger are ahead of the Chiefs in the AFC.

This Chiefs mentor currently ranks seventh in all-time pro coaching victories and is second behind Paul Brown of Cincinnati among active NFL coaches in all-time victories.

ATHLETIC HISTORY

A native of Gary, Indiana where he was an All-State halfback at Low Wallace High, Stram entered Purdue University on a football scholarship in 1941.

After his first varsity season, Stram was invited to play in the College All-Star Game. However, he had enlisted in the Army reserve in the spring of 1943, and was called to active duty two months before the game was to be played. He remained in the service for three years, returning to Purdue in 1946. In 1948, he was graduated with a B.S. in Physical Education.

Stram won seven monograms at Purdue, four in baseball and three in football. In his senior year he received the coveted Big Ten Medal which is awarded to the conference athlete who best combines athletics with academics.

COACHING BACKGROUND

Immediately upon graduation, Stram joined Purdue's coaching staff and served the next eight years as backfield coach under head coach Stu Holcomb. In 1956, Stram coached at Southern Methodist University, and then spent the following two seasons at Notre Dame, under Terry Brennan. A one-year stint as an assistant at the University of Miami (Fla.) preceded Hunt's naming him to head his new A.F.L. Dallas Texans.

During his 12 years in the college ranks, Stram gained the reputation as one of the country's most imaginative teachers of offensive football. He is credited with the development of four All-American quarterbacks . . . Dale Samuels and Len Dawson of Purdue, George Izo of Notre Dame and Fran Curci of Miami.

Stram has enlarged upon his reputation as a top offensive tactician and innovator since he joined the pro ranks. His use of the moving quarterback pocket is one of the most talked about developments in pro football. In 1967, he added the Tight-End I to the Chiefs offensive arsenal. This formation has the tight-end shift out of the backfield to either side of the line, thus creating indecision on the opposing team's defensive backfield.

Stram made his mark as a defensive strategist in 1962 when he successfully employed his now famous "stack" defense. In the "stack" Kansas City can present the appearance of being in anything from a three-man to a seven-man front. The various alignments that the "stack" makes possible create a different look to the opposing quarterback, change blocking assignments and open the door for a variety of defensive stunts. Several professional clubs have added versions of the "stack" to their defensive repertoire as a result of Stram's success.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

In 1962, when the Chiefs were the Dallas Texans, they won their first A.F.L. Championship with a thrilling 20-17 six quarter victory over the Houston Oilers in the second longest football game ever played. The game was not decided until Tommy Brooker kicked a 25 yard field goal 77 minutes and 54 seconds after the game had begun.

1966 was the second year a Stram-led team captured the AFL flag. The Chiefs defeated the Buffalo Bills 31-7 to earn a berth opposite the Green Bay Packers in the First World Championship Game of Pro Football—Super Bowl I.

The AFL's ten year history came to a close in 1969. Stram guided the Chiefs to an 11-3 season and the fourth qualifier spot in the League's Inter-divisional Playoffs. The Chiefs outscored the New York Jets 13-6 and went on to defeat the Oakland Raiders 17-7 for their third League crown.

The highlight of Stram's illustrious career came on January 11th, 1970, when the Chiefs defeated the Minnesota Vikings 23-7 for the World Championship of Professional Football.

He has been involved in the two longest games in pro football history—the AFL title battle in 1962 and the famous 1971 Christmas day, six-quarter divisional playoff against Miami.

ALL STAR GAMES

Following his first AFL Championship in 1962 Stram coached the Western Division All Stars to a 21-14 victory.

In 1967, Stram was given the honor of coaching the South All Stars in the Senior Bowl game in Mobile, Alabama. His team was victorious, winning 34-21 over the North.

Following the 1968 season, Stram coached the Western Division to a 38-25 victory over the Eastern Division in the AFL All Star game. Stram's team trailed 19-3 in the first half but scored 25 points after intermission to win the game.

AWARDS

Following Stram's first AFL Championship in 1962, he was named "Pro Football Coach of the Year." Stram received a host of national awards following the 1966 season. He was named the AFL's Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, the Washington Touchdown Club, the Dapper Dan Club of Pittsburgh and the Helms Athletic Association. The Rockne Club honored him as Pro Football's Coach of the Year.

After the Chiefs posted a 12-2 record in '68, Stram was again voted the AFL's Coach of the Year by Associated Press, United Press International, Pro Football Weekly, the Pittsburgh Dapper Dan Club and the Washington Touchdown Club.

Following the Chiefs Super Bowl victory, Stram repeated as AFL Coach of the Year at the Washington Touchdown Club and the Dapper Dan Club of Pittsburgh. He was also voted Coach of the Year by 101 Sportswriters and Broadcasters throughout the country, who comprised the selection committee for Kansas City's first annual Salute to Professional Football. The New York Chapter of the Pro Football Writer's Association named Stram their Super Man of the Year. He traveled to New York to receive the B'Nai B'Rith Man of the Year Award and was selected Hoosier Celebrity of the Year at the 13th Annual Celebrities Golf Tournament in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

PERSONAL

Stram is in great demand as a speaker and travels countless miles during the off-season spreading the gospel of professional football. His hobbies include golf and paddle ball, both of which he plays exceptionally well.

Stram and his wife, Phyllis, live in Shawnee Mission, Kansas, with their six children: Hank Jr. 19, Dale 18, Stu 16, Julie 14, Gary 12, and Mary Nell 11.

BILL WALSH, Offensive Line Coach



When Hank Stram was named the head coach of the Dallas Texans in 1960, the first assistant he hired was Bill Walsh.

Walsh is 46 years old and a native of Phillipsburg, N. J. He was a center on the great Notre Dame teams in the late 40's and later starred for six seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers where he was selected All-Pro several seasons.

In 1955 Walsh retired from the pro game and returned to his alma mater as an assistant to Terry Brennan. He remained at Notre Dame through the '58 season. In 1959 he became the line coach at Kansas State and in '60 returned to the pro ranks to join Stram's Dallas Texans staff and the team that later became the Kansas City Chiefs. TOM PRATT, Defensive Line Coach



Tom Pratt has been the Chiefs defensive line coach for 11 seasons. He is 39 years old and a native of Beloit, Wisc.

Pratt played his college football at the University of Miami from 1953 through '56. After graduation in 1957 he became an assistant coach at his alma mater under Andy Gustafson. It was while Pratt was at Miami that he came in contact with Chiefs coach Hank Stram, who was backfield coach at the Florida school in 1959.

After the 1960 season, Pratt left Miami to become the line coach at Southern Mississippi. When Stram sought a defensive assistant after the 1962 season he tabbed Pratt for the job.

TOM BETTIS, Defensive Backfield Coach



Tom Bettis joined the Chiefs in March of 1966. He is 40 years old and a native of Chicago.

Bettis played guard for Purdue from 1951 through 1954. He was a three-time All Big Ten selection and a consensus All America choice in both his junior and senior years. He also captained Purdue in 1953 and '54 and was co-captain of the College All Star team. He was selected to the Chicago Catholic League Hall of Fame in 1973.

Bettis was the first draft choice of the Green Bay Packers in 1955. He was a starter with the Packers for seven seasons from 1955 through 1961. In 1962 he was traded to the Pittsburgh Steelers and played one season for them, before moving to the Chicago Bears for their '63 championship campaign. After the '63 season, Bettis retired to enter private business and was sales manager for an advertising firm in Green Bay, Wisc., when he accepted Hank Stram's offer to coach the Chiefs defensive backfield in 1966.

WALT COREY, Linebacker Coach



Walt Corey, a former Chiefs player, joined Hank Stram's coaching staff in 1971. He is 36 years old and was an outstanding linebacker for the Chiefs from the inception of the AFL in Dallas in 1960 through the 1966 season. A three-year starter as a defensive end for the University of Miami prior to his playing career with the Chiefs, Corey has served as an assistant coach in the collegiate ranks at Utah State and Miami. He also has been an assistant on the coaching staffs for the College All Star Game in Chicago, the North-South Shrine Game

and the Tampa American Bowl Game.

Corey and his wife, Jane, reside in Kansas City. The couple has two daughters and a son.

EDDIE WILSON, Offensive End Coach



Eddie Wilson is the newest member of the Chiefs coaching staff, joining in May of this year. The 34-year old coach will handle the tight ends and wide receivers. Wilson played for the Chiefs as a quarterback from 1962-64. He came into pro football after a brilliant three-year varsity career at the University of Arizona and was the No. 3 draft pick by Stram and his Dallas Texans in 1962. Wilson played in three post-season all-star games after his collegiate career and received All-America mention. Since leaving pro football after the 1965 season, he has

been an assistant coach at Arizona and, for the past two seasons, coached the quarterbacks and receivers at Duke University.

A native of Redding, California, Wilson and his wife, Laura, have four children.

TOMMY O'BOYLE, Assistant Coach



Tommy O'Boyle serves the Chiefs in a dual capacity. He is the head talent scout and also an assistant coach.

O'Boyle was a two-time All-America guard at Tulane. After graduation in 1940 he was the number one draft choice of the Chicago Bears but a stint in the service interrupted this opportunity and he later chose to pursue a career in coaching. His first assignment was at his alma mater, Tulane, as line coach. Subsequently he served as head coach and athletic director at Southwest Missouri State and line coach at Kansas State, Duke, and Miami (Fla.) before returning to Tulane as an assistant to Andy Pilney in 1960. In '62 he became Tulane's head coach and held that position until he resigned at the end of the '65 season. He joined the Chiefs staff in '66.

Tommy and his wife Rose Mary have five children, two boys and three girls, and reside in Kansas City, Mo.

WAYNE RUDY, Head Trainer



The Chiefs veteran trainer, Wayne Rudy has been serving athletic teams for the past 28 years. He has been the Chiefs trainer since the team's inception in Dallas. Recognized as one of the foremost in this field, Wayne is certainly the unsung hero of the Chiefs camp.

A graduate of Bowling Green University, Rudy was trainer for the SMU Mustangs for 13 years before signing on with Lamar Hunt's team in 1960. He was one of the founders of the Southwest Athletic Trainers Association and has twice been a national director of the National Athletic Trainers Association. He has received numerous awards in his field and this year was named to the Helms Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame.

BOBBY YARBOROUGH, Equipment Manager and Assistant Trainer

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER



JACK STEADMAN

As the Kansas City Chiefs begin their third season of pro football in Arrowhead its personality reflects those of Jack Steadman the Chiefs Executive Vice President and General Manager.

For it was Steadman who conceived the idea of Kansas City building the two-stadium complex that houses a 78,000-plus seat football stadium (Arrowhead) and a 42,000 seat baseball stadium. Steadman was primarily responsible for the design and

development of Arrowhead, which has been nationally acclaimed as the world's finest football stadium.

In the first two years of operation in Arrowhead, Steadman has continued to revise and add to the development of Arrowhead and game day operations that include a 20,000-car parking area in addition to all of the operations within the stadium. Following the 1972 season the Chiefs, under Steadman, financed an additional parking area to handle some 2,000 additional cars to ease the parking situation for the nearly 80,000 fans who attend Chiefs games. He was instrumental in developing a unique parking program for season ticket holders. After the 1972 season, the first in Arrowhead, Steadman established a plan to provide Chiefs season ticket holders with an opportunity to personally relocate their seats. This program just completed its third year and has provided thousands of season ticket holders an opportunity to improve their seating locations in Arrowhead. In addition, Steadman, working with the Jackson County legislature, came up with a revolutionary idea of a drawing to select priorities for Jackson County residents to purchase a minimum of 5,500 tickets that are made available for each Chiefs pre-season and regular season home game.

Steadman has been the head of the Chiefs administrative staff since November of 1960, when owner Lamar Hunt named him General Manager of the Dallas Texans. Steadman was promoted to Executive Vice President of the Chiefs in 1966.

Continuing with his relentless approach to "doing a better job in pro football and in Kansas City," Steadman has turned his talents to another new endeavor in the Kansas City area—Worlds of Fun. Worlds of Fun is a multi-million dollar, theme recreation park north of Kansas City and in its second year of operation. Steadman serves as president of Mid-America Enterprises, developers of Worlds of Fun.

Despite a demanding work schedule, Steadman remains active in numerous civic affairs. Last July he was appointed to the Kansas Athletic Commission by Kansas Governor Robert Docking. He serves as a director of the Jackson County unit of the American Cancer Society, is on the advisory board of the Salvation Army, a member of the Civic Council of Greater Kansas City and on the executive committee of the Starlight Theatre. In addition, he is a director of the American Royal Association and the Raytown Bank and is vice-president of the First Fidelity Investment Trust.

Steadman was born in Aurora, Illinois and grew up in Warrenville, Illinois. He attended Baylor University and received his degree in business administration from Southern Methodist University. Jack and his wife, Martha, live in suburban Johnson County with their three children, Tom, Barbara and Don.

CHIEFS CHAMPIONSHIP REVIEW

1962 AFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME KANSAS CITY vs. HOUSTON

Football's Second Longest Day
December 23, 1962

Football historians will be reliving "the day the Dallas Texans won the American Football League championship" as long as there are football historians. Seldom, if ever, has there been a contest with such drama and excitement as the one played that day in Houston, December 23, 1962.

The Texans, champions of the American Football League's West, got away fast and at halftime held a 17-0 lead over Houston's defending champions. Abner Haynes, the No. 1 touchdown-maker in football in 1962, got both TDs, one on a pass from Len Dawson, the other on a short burst. Tommy Brooker added a field goal.

Houston stormed back in the second half and completely controlled the football. When the regulation 60 minutes were up the score was tied. This time, 17-17.

The two teams then went into sudden-death overtime. The first team to score would be the American Football League champions. The Chiefs won the toss and Hank Stram chose to kick off, figuring his thoroughly fired-up defense could hold the Oilers and his offense would have field position when it got the ball. Inadvertently, Captain Abner Haynes also gave up the wind, a minor factor but nevertheless a factor.

The two great football teams battled back and forth in the extra period with neither offering too serious a threat. Then, as the "fifth" quarter was about to come to a close, the Texans got a break. Bill Hull, a defensive end, intercepted a George Blanda pass and gave the Western Division champs an opportunity at midfield. A Len Dawson pass to Jack Spikes for 10 yards; a 19-yard run by Spikes, the game's outstanding player, and the Texans were in field goal position. Tommy Brooker's kick was good as the clock read 2:54 gone in the sixth period. Seventy-seven minutes and 54 seconds after the game had begun, the Dallas Texans became the American Football League champions in 1962.

1966 AFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME KANSAS CITY vs. BUFFALO

January 1, 1967

A frigid New Year's day in Buffalo found the Chiefs slight favorites to capture their second A.F.L. Championship in five years. Buffalo had won the League title the past two years and was determined to repeat.

The Chiefs capitalized on the Bills' fumble of the opening kickoff as Jerrel Wilson recovered on the Buffalo 31. Three plays later Len Dawson hit Fred Arbanas for a touchdown and the Chiefs led 7 to 0. Buffalo came back to tie the score on a Jack Kemp to Elbert Dubenion pass that covered 69 yards.

The Chiefs regained the lead when Dawson passed to Otis Taylor and the fleet flanker bulled his way to a touchdown. With two minutes to go in the first half Buffalo had a second down on the Chiefs 10. Johnny Robinson then intercepted a Kemp pass on the goal line and returned it 72 yards to the Bills 18, setting up a field goal by Mike Mercer that gave the Chiefs a 17 to 7 lead at halftime.

Early in the final period Dawson passed to Burford for a first down on the Buffalo four. Mike Garrett applied the knockout blow when, after three smashes at the goal, he bolted over from one yard out to give the Chiefs a commanding 24 to 7 lead. Garrett added the game's final touchdown shortly thereafter on a spectacular exhibition of broken field running, reversing his field to score from the Bills 18.

The final score was Kansas City 31, Buffalo 7 and the Chiefs were Super Bowl bound.

FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP GAME KANSAS CITY vs. GREEN BAY January 15, 1967

History was made at the Los Angeles Coliseum on January 15, the Kansas City Chiefs versus the Green Bay Packers for the Championship of the World. The Packers, rated by many experts the greatest team in the history of pro football, were heavy favorites. The Chiefs showed that they came to play on the opening series of downs when first Buck Buchanan, then Bobby Bell, and Jerry Mays dropped Bart Starr for consecutive losses.

Green Bay scored first, midway in the opening quarter, when Max McGee made an unbelievable one-handed catch of a Starr pass. The Chiefs, behind the brilliant play calling and passing of Len Dawson, tied the score early in the second period with Dawson passing to Curtis McClinton for the touchdown.

Green Bay went ahead 14 to 7 on a Jim Taylor touchdown but the Chiefs with Dawson connecting to Fred Arbanas, Otis Taylor and Chris Burford moved into Green Bay territory. With time running out, Mike Mercer kicked a 31 yard field goal and the score at halftime was Kansas City 10, Green Bay 14.

The Chiefs had momentum on their side when the second half started and promptly moved to a first down. With third and five on their own 49, Dawson threw a flat pass to Arbanas. Packer safety, Willie Wood, intercepted and returned to the Chiefs five. Elijah Pitts drove over left tackle on the next play for the touchdown to give the Packers a 21 to 10 lead.

The tide of battle turned after Pitts' touchdown. Now the Packers had momentum. With Starr hitting his receivers on key third down situations, the Packers marched to two more touchdowns to make the final score: Kansas City 10, Green Bay 35.

1969 AFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME KANSAS CITY vs. OAKLAND January 4, 1970

January 4, 1970—a date that will go down in professional football history. For on that day the American Football League staged its final Championship Game. Ironically, the Kansas City Chiefs were facing their Western Division rivals, the Oakland Raiders. A Kansas City victory over the New York Jets in the AFL's one-year divisional playoff system had given the Chiefs a shot at an unprecedented third league title. The Raiders had narrowly defeated the Chiefs in two regular season games and were rated four-point favorites for this historic showdown.

Oakland scored the game's first touchdown late in the opening quarter on a three-yard sweep by running back Charley Smith.

The Chiefs mounted a drive in the closing minutes of the first half when Len Dawson hit Otis Taylor on a 14-yard pass to the Kansas City 40. Four plays later Dawson connected with Frank Pitts for 41 yards to the Raiders one-yard line. Running back Wendell Hayes plunged over for the touchdown and the first half came to a close with the teams deadlocked 7-7.

The Raiders had two chances to break the tie in the third quarter. Both times a George Blanda field goal went astray. Midway through the third period, the Chiefs had the ball on their own two. Taylor got Kansas City out of the hole with a fantastic over the shoulder grab of a Dawson pass for 35 yards. Robert Holmes added 23 yards to the scoring drive by taking a flare pass to the Raiders 34. Five plays later Holmes swept left end from the five for the go ahead touchdown. Jan Stenerud's conversion gave the Chiefs a 14-7 lead.

Then Coach Hank Stram called on the defense.

Led by end Aaron Brown, the Chiefs harassed Lamonica all afternoon. Two times in the fourth quarter the Chiefs dropped the Oakland signal caller as he was attempting to pass.

Three times in the final quarter a weird turnover gave Oakland the ball in Kansas City territory. Each time a Chiefs interception stopped the scoring threat.

The final turnover occurred when cornerback Emmitt Thomas grabbed his second interception of the day and raced 62 yards to the Oakland 18. There, Stenerud's 22-yard field goal gave the Chiefs a 17-7 victory, their third AFL Championship and a trip to New Orleans for their second Super Bowl encounter.

FOURTH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP GAME KANSAS CITY vs. MINNESOTA

January 11, 1970

The Kansas City Chiefs had fought their way into another historic game January 11, 1970 when they faced the National Football League Champion Minnesota Vikings in the last Super Bowl between the two leagues. The Vikings had outfought and outclassed their NFL rivals in posting a 12-2 record.

Under Hank Stram's leadership the Chiefs had closed out their decade in the American Football League as its winningest team. They were the only team to win three AFL titles and the only team to represent the league in two Super Bowls. After an 11-3 season, the Chiefs defeated the World Champion New York Jets and the Western Division Champion Oakland Raiders to get to New Orleans.

The Chiefs grabbed an early lead, midway through the first quarter when Jan Stenerud booted a Super Bowl record 48-yard field goal. Stenerud kicked two more three-pointers in the second quarter to give the Chiefs a 9-0 lead.

Kansas City got the first break in the game when Minnesota's Charlie West fumbled a kickoff and Remi Prudhomme recovered on the Viking 19. After an eight-yard loss, Len Dawson sent Wendell Hayes up the middle for 13 yards on a draw play. A ten-yard pass to Otis Taylor gave the Chiefs a first down at the four. Three plays later Mike Garrett went off-tackle through a devastating hole in the Minnesota line to score the game's first touchdown. The defense shut the Vikings out the rest of the quarter and Kansas City had a 16-0 half-time lead.

Minnesota mounted a third quarter scoring march to cut the Chiefs lead to 16-7.

However, any hopes of a Vikings comeback were thrust into oblivion when Dawson hit Otis Taylor on a short hitch, and the Chiefs wide receiver broke two tackles en route to a 46-yard touchdown. The Chiefs went into the final quarter with a 16-point lead. Again, as was the case so often in 1969, the defense took over.

The Vikings had the ball three times in the fourth quarter, and three times the Chiefs regained possession with an interception. Middle linebacker Willie Lanier picked off a Joe Kapp pass at the Kansas City 34. Later, Johnny Robinson, playing with three broken ribs, grabbed another errant throw. In the closing minutes of the game, cornerback Emmitt Thomas, the AFL's interception leader, stole another Minnesota aerial. The Chiefs ran out the clock to capture the AFL's second Super Bowl victory with a 23-7 win over the Vikings.

The American Football League's ten-year history was over. 1970 ushered in a new decade in the era of professional football, a decade that began with the Kansas City Chiefs as World Champions.

The Chiefs Club was formed by a group of civic-minded citizens with one goal in mind:

"Making Kansas City the strongest franchise in professional football and the best professional sports city in the U.S."

The Chiefs Club, as a booster organization, got its start when Lamar Hunt moved his AFL team from Dallas to Kansas City in 1963. The Club, under the direction of President Ray Evans, is now approaching a membership of nearly 3,000.

The energetic Evans, a former All-America football star at the University of Kansas and a member of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame,

has been president of the Chiefs Club since its inception. He led the ticket drive that was responsible for initiating the Chiefs move to Kansas City. It was largely through the efforts of this group that the Chiefs season ticket sale increased from 9,500 in 1965 to an NFL-best of 67,962 for the 1973 season.

The Chiefs Club activities during the year center around various civic functions involving the Kansas City Chiefs football team, including the 1973 Kickoff Luncheon.

Some 550 members of the Chiefs Club have become Red Coaters, having sold 100 or more season tickets, and you can find them on game day dressed in their official red blazers that signify their achievement.

Assisting President Ray Evans in the operation of the Chiefs Club are executive Vice Presidents Jack Wheeler and G. Findlay Reed. Vice Presidents are: Max Norman, charter trips; Dave Smith, luncheons; Dick Dexter, publicity; Bruce Rice, special events; Dick Docking, public affairs; Sam Gould, membership; Jim Lanning, ticket sales; John McDermott, inter-club relations. Truman Sloan serves as Treasurer and Chuck Richardson as secretary. As past president of the Red Coat Committee, Don Krouse also sits on the Chiefs Club Board as does current Red Coat President Jim Pendleton.

The Chiefs cheerleaders are directed by Mrs. Vicki Comiskey and Mrs. Margaret Smith.

Mack Lee Hill Award



GARY BUTLER

GARY BUTLER, the Chiefs rookie who shared starting duties at tight end with Morris Stroud a year ago, was voted the winner of the team's 1973 Mack Lee Hill Award.

Playing in all 14 of the Chiefs regular season games as a rookie and a part-time starter, Butler caught eight passes on the season for 124 yards, an impressive 15.5 per-catch average and two touchdowns. His first touchdown catch in pro football came in the Chiefs opener against Los Angeles on a six yard toss from Pete Beathard that capped a 62 yard K.C. march. His second TD reception was a five yard toss from Mike

Livingston in the Chiefs 38-14 victory over Houston.

Butler was one of two Chiefs second round draft picks and the Chiefs first choice in the 1973 draft. The 6-3, 235 pounder played his college football at Rice University where he was an All-Southwestern Conference performer at tight end.

He turned in a top performance for the Chiefs in his rookie year last season and was impressive as both a blocker and a receiver. Butler also played on a number of the Chiefs special teams and figures to provide a big contribution to the Chiefs offensive thrust in 1974.

Each year since 1966, the Chiefs players select a recipient for the Mack Lee Hill Award. This award is a tribute to the late Mack Lee Hill, an outstanding runningback who played for the Chiefs in 1964 and 1965 and was described as a man who played as much with his heart as he did with his driving legs in those early days of the American Football League.

In memory and tribute to Mack Lee Hill the award is given annually to the Chiefs rookie who, as the inscription on the trophy reads—*"best exemplifies the spirit of the late Mack Lee Hill . . . the man with the giant heart and the quiet way."* In selecting the awardee, the Chiefs players look for a rookie who has displayed the attitude and the spirit of the late Mack Lee Hill.
