MAX WINTER

President



Naming the Vikings office/practice facility "Winter Park" was as deserved as it was appropriate.

It was Max Winter's dogged persistence that resulted in a National Football League franchise for Minnesota; and it was the stability of ownership under Max Winter that helped create the strong foundation that made the Vikings' organization one of the most successful in the National Football League.

Winter brought the first big league team to the Twin Cities, building the Minneapolis Lakers into one of the most solid and successful franchises in sports history, winning five NBA championships in seven years (from 1947-1954).

It was when he still was president and general manager of the Lakers, in 1955, that Winter saw an NFL game in Chicago. He followed up almost immediately, writing to the NFL for a franchise in Minnesota. And he kept at it, with the same persistence that made him successful as a businessman of varied interest. He continued to write letters to the NFL owners and the commissioner and he attended league meetings regularly.

Finally, it came to pass. In 1960, a franchise was awarded to Winter for the 1961 season. At that time, he added four other Minnesotans as co-owners -H.P. Skoglund, Bill Boyer, Bernard Ridder, Jr. and Ole Haugsrud. And thus, a new vista opened for Max Winter, but still in the area of sports that he had enjoyed for so many years.

Winter was born in the Austrian village of Mahrishostrau and was a gymnast and ice skater as a youth. His family emigrated to the United States in 1913 and settled in Minneapolis where Max attended North High School, graduating in 1922 after playing football and captaining the basketball team. His basketball talents won him a scholarship at Hamline University in St. Paul.

From college he went on to a number of business endeavors including his promotion work for the Harlem Globetrotters and the Auto Show and then graduated to the Lakers.

One of the players he signed for the team was a University of Minnesota all-around athlete named Bud Grant. That was in 1949 and it was Grant's first job in pro sports. Winter's Lakers won championships the two years Grant was with the team (before moving to the NFL). And the Winter-Grant Viking alliance didn't do badly either — the team won 11 division titles and four conference championships during Grant's tenure — and the organization is recognized as one of the NFL's best-run franchises.

Winter and his wife, Helen, have three daughters, Mrs. Sue Diamond, Mrs. Nancy Ditlove and Mrs. Diane Cohen, and nine grandchildren.

MIKE LYNN

Executive Vice President/
General Manager



When Mike Lynn joined the Minnesota Vikings in 1974, his intention was to be a general manager who was involved with all aspects of the operation of a National Football League team.

His achievements certainly would indicate that he has taken that plan to full implementation—and beyond. Today, in addition to his overall responsibility of the Vikings, Lynn is also active in decision making on a league-wide basis.

He is a member of the newly created NFL planning committee, serves on the executive committee of National Football League Properties, represents the owners on the Bert Bell retirement board, and is a trustee of the funding arm of NFL Charities.

He was the club's "ramrod" in the effort to build a new stadium — the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome — in Minneapolis. And he supervised the financing and planning of the Vikings' Winter Park office/training facility.

At Winter Park, Lynn's office is right at the hub of the operation, easily accessible to all departments and during the past 10 years, while governing those departments, Lynn has seen the Vikings win six Central Division titles, go to the playoffs seven times and play in two Super Bowls.

In April of 1984 Lynn signed a five-year extension of his current contract (through Jan. 1, 1991) elevating him to executive vice president and general manager. He is also a member of the five-man board of directors.

Lynn's involvement with the National Football League started in 1965 when he formed a group that sought an NFL franchise for Memphis, Tenn. He formed a group to make the purchase, the newly constructed stadium was ready and he was to serve as either president or managing general partner.

But Memphis chose instead to cast its lot with the World Football League and Lynn was hired as assistant to Vikings president Max Winter from among 50 applicants.

Lynn was born in Scranton, Pa., on May 18, 1936. At age 17, while attending Morris Hills Regional High School in New Jersey, Lynn became the youngest manager of a theater in the history of the Walter Reade chain of theaters. He spent three years with the Army Security Agency — one year in Korea — and ran a chain of movie theaters in Delaware and Maryland after he was discharged. In 1963, at the age of 27, Lynn became a general manager of a department store in East St. Louis — becoming, according to a national trade publication, the youngest man of that title working for a store that did over \$10 million of business annually. In 1964 he became a group executive of Dixiemart-Corondolet in Memphis, a chain of stores that did \$50 million in business annually.

In 1965, Lynn became interested in an NFL franchise and formed Mid-South Sports, Inc., which sponsored eight NFL pre-season games. He founded the Chamber of Commerce Sports Committee and was chairman of the Mayor's NFL Committee. At the same time, he served as chief executive officer of the Memphis ABA team.

Lynn attended Pace University in New York City. He and his wife, Jorja, live on Lake Minnetonka, in a Minneapolis suburb, and have four children — Louisa, 21, Robert, 20, Michael IV 16, and Lucia, 8.

BUD GRANT

Head Coach



Only one man has won more professional football games as a head coach than Bud Grant — the legendary George Halas with 326 victories.

Grant, in his 28th season as a head coach, has won a total of 283 regular and post-season games — 122 as coach of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League from 1957-1966 and 161 as coach of the Vikings from 1967-83.

Entering his 18th year as head coach of the Vikings, his teams have compiled a regular-season record of 151-87-5, made the playoffs 12 times, and won 15 championships: 11 Central Division (1968-71, 1973-78, and 1980), one NFL (1969) and three NFC (1973, 1974 and 1976). The Vikings, under Grant, have played in four Super Bowls.

Bud Grant's coaching career began in 1957 when, at age 29, he jumped directly from the player ranks to the head coaching job with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL. He had been the Blue Bombers' top pass receiver and also a starting cornerback. During four CFL seasons, he caught 216 passes and led the league in receptions three times. He also set a pro football record of five interceptions in one game.

In 10 years of coaching at Winnipeg, Grant's team had a regular-season record of 102-56-2 and a playoff record of 20-10-1 — winning six Western Conference titles and four Grey Cup Championships. He was the first coach to win 100 regular-season games in his first 10 years.

On January 27, 1984, Grant retired after 35 years in professional sports as a player and coach to spend time with his family and to pursue his love of outdoor activities. Grant, however, was coaxed out of retirement, and it was announced December 18, 1984, that he would begin his second tenure as Minnesota's head coach.

Born May 20, 1927, in Superior, Wis., Grant graduated from Superior Central High School. Grant played football and basketball at Central and also pitched in American Legion baseball. He went on to win nine varsity letters at the University of Minnesota from 1946-1949. Included were four letters in football (an All-Big-Ten end twice, playing both ways), three in basketball and two in baseball.

He went to Minnesota after a year in the Navy at Great Lakes Naval Training Center, where he played football under Paul Brown and basketball under Weeb Ewbank. His athletic skills earned him the honor of Minnesota's Athlete of the Half Century, as voted by a panel of sportswriters and sportscasters in 1950.

In 1949, current Vikings president Max Winter (then president of the Minneapolis Lakers) signed Grant to play basketball in the NBA. After two seasons in which the Lakers won World Championships, Grant signed with the Philadelphia Eagles, which had drafted him No. 1 in 1950. A defensive end as a rookie, he then moved to offense and was the second-ranking receiver in the NFL in 1952 with 57 catches. Grant signed with Winnipeg in 1953 after experiencing contractual difficulties with the Eagles.

Grant is an avid hunter, fisherman and naturalist. He spends much of his free time with his family at their lake home in Northern Wisconsin. Bud and his wife, Pat, have six children — Kathy (8-6-51), Laurie (7-26-53), Pete (3-4-55), Mike (4-15-57), Bruce (12-31-60) and Danny (2-16-67). The family home is in Bloomington.

ASSISTANT COACHES



JERRY BURNS, Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator

Burns has been with the Vikings since 1968. He joined the Vikings after working two years as the defensive backfield coach with Green Bay (1966-67). Served at the University of Iowa for 12 years; seven as an assistant (1954-60) and five as head coach (1961-65) prior to working with the Packers. Also coached The University of Hawaii 1951, Whittier (Ca.) 1952, St. Mary's of Redford High in Detroit in 1953. Burns was

born January 24, 1927, in Detroit, Michigan. He and his wife, Marlyn, have five children — Michael (3/13/56), Erin (8/27/57), Kelly (3/31/59), Kathy (8/13/60) and Kerry (11/25/70) — and live in Eden Prairie, Minn.



JOHN MICHELS, Offensive Line

Michels will again be coaching the offensive line after coaching the offensive backfield for one season. He joined the Vikings in 1967 and coached the line for 17 seasons until 1984. Michels played collegiately at the University of Tennessee from 1949-53 earning All-America honors in 1952. He also played for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1953 and again in 1956 following a tour of duty with the Army. He coached one year

(1958) at Texas A&M before coaching Winnipeg (CFL) from 1959-66. Michels was born February 15, 1931, in Philadelphia. He and his wife, Ann, have four children — John Jr. (1/6/55), Steve (4/8/56), Lila (8/31/58) and Sara (7/29/61) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



DICK REHBEIN, Receivers

Rehbein joined the Vikings just prior to the start of the 1984 season after coaching with the L.A. Express (USFL) for one season. Also coached with the Green Bay Packers (1979-83). Played center at Ripon College (Wis.) from 1973-77. Has a degree in criminal justice from Ripon. Rehbein was born November 22, 1955, in Green Bay, Wis. He and his wife Pam, have one child — Betsy (2/24/85) — and live in

Edina, Minn.



MARC TRESTMAN, Running Backs

Joined the Vikings in 1985 after working as an offensive assistant at the University of Miami (1981-84). Played quarterback at the University of Minnesota (1976-78). He has a degree in political science from Minnesota and attended law school while in Miami; he passed the Florida Bar Exam in 1984. Trestman was born January 15, 1956, in Minneapolis and attended St. Louis Park Senior High School. He is single and lives in

Minneapolis, Minn.



BOB HOLLWAY, Defensive Coordinator

Renamed as defensive coordinator in 1985 after working in the research and development department in 1984. Hollway is in his twelfth season as an assistant with the Vikings. Hollway rejoined the Vikings to head the defense in 1978. His previous stint was as defensive coordinator from 1967-1970. In 1969 the defense established 12 NFL records for excellence. He left the Vikings in 1971 to become head coach of the St. Louis Cardinals. Was the defensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions in 1973-74, San Francisco 49ers in 1975, and the Seattle Seahawks in 1976-77. Hollway played football at the University of Michigan on three Big 10 championship teams (1947-49). After receiving his Master's degree from Michigan, he coached at the University of Maine and Eastern Michigan University where he also was the head basketball coach. Hollway then coached at Michigan for 14 years before joining the Vikings. Hollway was born on January 29, 1926, in Ann Arbor, Michigan and he and his wife, Colleen, have six children — Michael (9/23/52), Anne (12/6/53), Kathleen (9/6/55), Robert (12/5/56), Bruce (10/22/58) and William (7/4/61) — and live in Edina, Minn.



TOM BATTA, Defensive Assistant/Kicking Teams

Batta joined the Vikings as defensive line coach in 1984 and will now serve as a defensive assistant. He was defensive coordinator at North Carolina State in 1983 and at Kansas from 1979-1982. Was defensive line coach at Colorado from 1974-78. Coached in the Hall of Fame Bowl (1981), Blue Bonnet Bowl (1975) and Orange Bowl (1976). He began his college coaching career at Akron University after coaching Warren Harding High School, Warren, Ohio, to the state championship. Born October 6, 1942 in Youngstown, Ohio, he attended Conneaut (Ohio) high school. Played three years of football at Kent State University and graduated with a degree in health and physical education in 1965. In 1970 he earned his Master's of Education from the University of Akron. Tom and his wife, Liz, have two sons — Jeff (5/13/67) and Tommy (4/9/69) — and live in Eden Prairie, Minn.



PETE CARROLL, Defensive Backs

Joined the Viking staff in 1985. He was the defensive backfield coach for the Buffalo Bills in 1984. Carroll was the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at the University of Pacific in 1983. Was an assistant coach at North Carolina State (1980-82), Ohio State (1979), Iowa State (1978) and Arkansas (1977). He played two years (1971-72) at UOP and earned All-Pacific Coast Conference honors twice, after transferring from the College of Marin. Received his Master's degree from Pacific in 1978. Carroll was born on September 15, 1951 in San Francisco, California. Pete and his wife, Glenna, have two children — Brennan (3/20/79) and Jaime (4/12/82) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



FLOYD REESE, Linebackers

Renamed as coach of the linebackers after serving as defensive coordinator in 1984. He joined the Vikings in 1979 and coached the linebackers and special teams for five seasons. Reese played college football at UCLA as a defensive lineman (1966-1969), and played one year of pro football, with the Montreal Alouettes (CFL) in 1970. Started coaching career at Liberty Union High School in Brentwood, California (1970), and moved on to UCLA (1971-73) and Georgia Tech (1974). Also coached the Detroit Lions (1974-77) and worked with the San Francisco 49ers in 1978. Reese was born August 8, 1948, in Springfield, Missouri. He and his wife, Sally, have two sons — Jeremy (9/19/76) and Sean (5/16/80) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



PAUL WIGGIN, Defensive Line

Joined the Viking coaching staff in 1985 after serving as the head coach at Stanford University (1980-83). He did not coach in 1984, but spent the year working with the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee. Prior to the Stanford job, he was the defensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (1978-80). Also served as head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs (1975-78). Following his retirement as a player, Wiggin coached the defensive line at San Francisco (1968-73) and was then named defensive coordinator in 1974. He coached in the 1970 and 1971 Pro-Bowl games. He was a three-year starter at offensive and defensive tackle at Stanford receiving first-team All-America honors in 1955 and 1956 and played in three post-season all-star games. Played 11 seasons with the Cleveland Browns, and was selected to play in two Pro-Bowls: 1965 and 1967. Won the Browns' Player of the Year award in 1966, and the Cleveland Pro Athlete of the Year award in 1967. Wiggin was born on November 18, 1934 in Modesto, California. He earned his Master's degree in physical education from Stanford in 1959. He and his wife, Carolynn, have 3 daughters — Kymberly (3/22/61), Kristyn (6/6/63), and Kellie (7/4/67) — and live in Eden Prairie, Minn.

PLAYER PERSONNEL/SCOUTING



JERRY REICHOW, Director of Football Operations

Jerry Reichow was director of player personnel for the Vikings for nine years until being named director of football operations in 1975. Reichow was an All-Big Ten quarterback at Iowa and started his pro football career at Detroit. He played on the Philadelphia Eagles' 1960 championship team, quarterbacked by Norm Van Brocklin. When Van Brocklin became Vikings coach in 1961, he engineered a trade that brought Reichow to the Vikings. Reichow played wide receiver and tight end for the Vikings from 1961 until his retirement as a player in 1964. Reichow is a native of Decorah, Iowa. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children — Alan, Lori and Jimmie.



FRANK GILLIAM, Director of Player Personnel

Frank Gilliam joined the Vikings in 1970 as scouting director and was named director of player personnel in 1975. Gilliam played college football at Iowa, where he was a teammate of Jerry Reichow's and an All-Big Ten end in 1956. He played pro football with Winnipeg and Vancouver of the Canadian Football League and was an assistant coach at Iowa from 1966-1970. Gilliam's brother, Joe, is assistant head coach at Tennessee State. He is a native of Steubenville, Ohio. Frank and his wife, Velma, have three children — Frank Jr., Gayle and Michelle.



RALPH KOHL, Head Scout

Ralph Kohl joined the Vikings in 1978 as head scout after working for the Blesto scouting combine for the past 14 years. Kohl first worked as an area scout for Blesto (the combine of which the Vikings are members). He then moved up to regional scout and finally national scout, with the job of grading the top college players in the country. Kohl played on two national championship teams at Michigan in the late 1940s and signed with the Baltimore Colts before suffering a knee injury that ended his career. He coached in high school and college before becoming head coach at Eastern Illinois and then moving on to Blesto. Ralph and his wife, Dorothy, have one daughter — Jackie.



DON DEISCH, Assistant Head Scout

Don Deisch joined the Vikings in 1980. As with Head Scout Ralph Kohl, Deisch had been with the Blesto scouting organization prior to joining Minnesota. He played quarterback and defensive back at Southern Oregon. He coached and taught at Hillsboro (Ore.) High School. He also coached at Stanford and at Portland State before joining Blesto in 1976. His primary responsibility for the Vikings is the West Coast.



JOHN CARSON, Regional Scout

John Carson joined the Vikings in 1983 after having worked in private business for seven years. Carson was born in Atlanta and was an All-American end at Georgia. He was drafted by the Browns and played for the Redskins and Oilers. After winning the 1960 AFL championship with the Oilers, Carson left to scout for the Eagles and United. Carson and his wife, Betsy, live in Farmington, Ga., and have two children — John Jr., and Dianne.

PRO: Was the leading rookie rusher in the NFC and second ranking rookie in the NFL, finishing 12th overall in the NFL while leading the Vikings in rushing in 1984. Best game was vs. Detroit (9/23/84) when he ran for 120 yards on 19 attempts. Against Philadelphia (9/9/84) threw a 20-yard TD to Tommy Kramer and rushed for 105 yards on 20 carries. Rushed for 79 yards on 17 attempts vs. Atlanta (9/16/84) and 78 yards on 18 carries vs. Tampa Bay (10/7/84). Completed three of seven passes, two for TDs. Ranked second on the team in kickoff return yardage and finished seventh in the NFC. Ranked seventh on the club in receiving. Played in all 16 games and started the final 14. Named to the Pro Football Writers, Pro Football Weekly, and Football Digest All-Rookie team for 1984. Was the fourth running back and the 67th player selected in the 1984 NFL draft.

COLLEGE: As a junior and senior led Baylor in rushing and TDs, setting a school record for career scoring. As a senior, ranked second in the Southwest Conference and 13th in the NCAA in rushing was also named All-SWC (AP and UPI), and second-team All-American (Football News). Played in both the Japan Bowl and the East-West Shrine Game. As a four-year letterman and three-year starter, played in 43 of 44 games. Career totals include: 2,424 yards rushing on 554 attempts, with 36 touchdowns; also caught 42 passes for 543 yards and one touchdown. Rushed for 100 yards seven times during his career. Finished second on the Bears' all-time rushing list behind Walter Abercrombie, now with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Suffered a wrist injury in a prep high school all-star game, forcing him to move from quarterback to running back as a freshman and was named SWC Freshman-of-the Year. Moved to wingback as a sophomore. As a junior returned to running back and earned second-team All-SWC (UPI) honors. Majored in recreation.

PERSONAL: Born Alfred Anthony Anderson in Waco, Tex., where he attended Richfield High School. As a senior quarterback he passed for 17 TDs and rushed for 14; also lettered in basketball (three) and track (four). Was a celebrity waiter to help raise money for leukemia, and played on a off-season charity basketball team. Attended school, working on his degree during the winter. Also was married during the off-season, wife's name is Monica Yolanda and they live in Waco, Tex.

His club record 54-yard field goal vs. Atlanta (9/16/84) was the longest in the NFC in 1984 and second longest overall. In game No. 4 vs. Detroit (9/23/84) was five for five with a long of 37 yards. The following week vs. Seattle (9/30/84) he accounted for all 12 of the team's points, connecting on four of four with a long of 44 yards. His 53-yard field goal, with two seconds remaining, enabled the Vikings to beat Tampa Bay 27-24 in game No. 10 (11/4/84). His career total now stands at 358 — 23 more than the previous leader, George Blanda. Set an NFL single season FG efficiency record in 1982 connecting on 22 of 24 attempts for a 91.6 percentage (which was broken in 1983 by Washington's Mark Mosely 20-21). Holds the Super Bowl record with a 48-yard field goal against the Vikings in SB IV, and also owns the Pro Bowl record with a 48-yarder in 1971. His longest field goal in a regular season contest is 55 yards. Has kicked five field goals in four games during his career. Led the NFL in FG's three times: '67, '70, and '75. Was selected by Kansas City in the third round of the American Football League red shirt draft in 1966. Has played in two AFL All-Star games: 1968 and 1969, and four Pro Bowls: 1971, 1972, 1976 and 1984. Played 13 seasons with the Chiefs before being released and signed as a free agent with the Packers late in 1980. Was traded to the Vikings just prior to training camp last season for a seventh round pick in the 1985 draft.

COLLEGE: Attended Montana State on a skiing scholarship and was discovered as a kicker by football coach Jim Sweeney. Had been ranked among Norway's leading ski jumpers. Majored in business administration.
