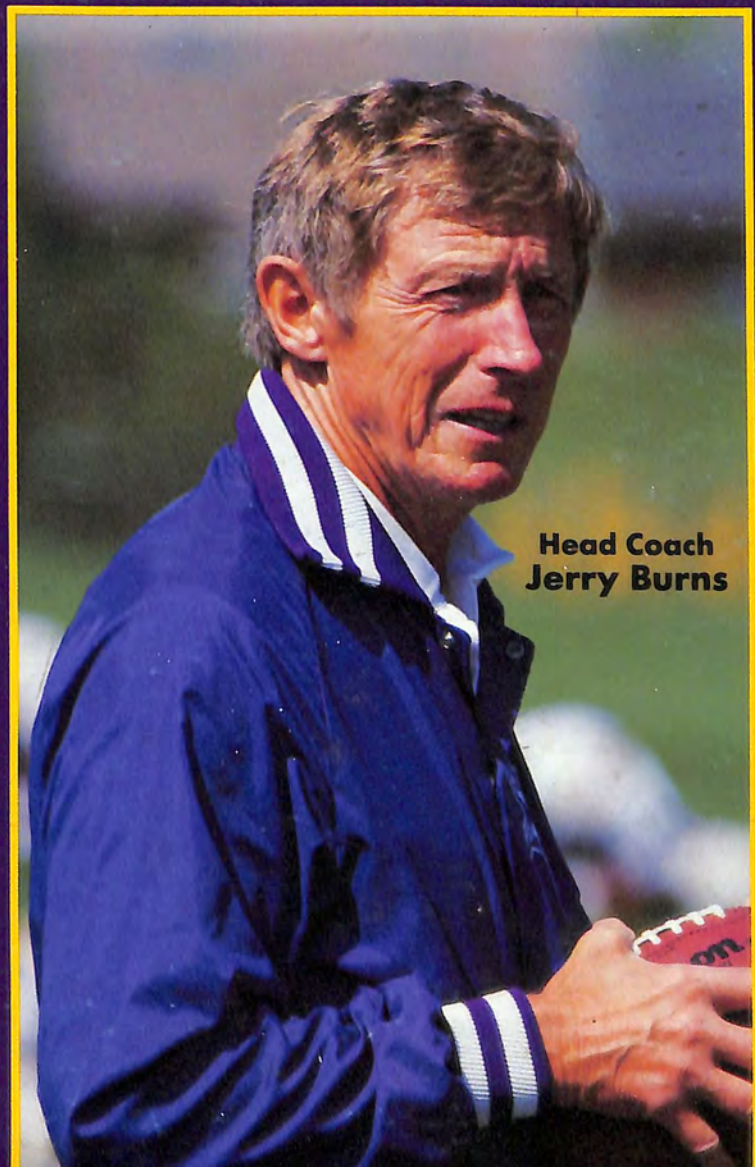

PLAYER PERSONNEL/SCOUTING



JERRY REICHOW, Director of Football Operations

Jerry Reichow was director of player personnel for the Vikings for nine years until being named director of football operations in 1975. Reichow was an All-Big Ten quarterback at Iowa and started his pro football career at Detroit. He played on the Philadelphia Eagles' 1960 championship team, quarterbacked by Norm Van Brocklin. When Van Brocklin became Vikings coach in 1961, he engineered a trade that brought Reichow to the Vikings. Reichow played wide receiver and tight end for the Vikings from 1961 until his retirement as a player in 1964. Reichow is a native of Decorah, Iowa. He and his wife, Carolyn, have three children — Alan, Lori and Jimmie.



FRANK GILLIAM, Director of Player Personnel

Frank Gilliam joined the Vikings in 1970 as scouting director and was named director of player personnel in 1975. Gilliam played college football at Iowa, where he was a teammate of Jerry Reichow's and an All-Big Ten end in 1956. He played pro football with Winnipeg and Vancouver of the Canadian Football League and was an assistant coach at Iowa from 1966-1970. Gilliam's brother, Joe, is assistant head coach at Tennessee State. He is a native of Steubenville, Ohio. Frank and his wife, Velma, have three children — Frank Jr., Gayle and Michelle.



RALPH KOHL, Head Scout

Ralph Kohl joined the Vikings in 1978 as head scout after working for the Blesto scouting combine for 14 years. Kohl first worked as an area scout for Blesto (the combine of which the Vikings are members). He then moved up to regional scout and finally national scout, with the job of grading the top college players in the country. Kohl played on two national championship teams at Michigan in the late 1940s and signed with the Baltimore Colts before suffering a knee injury that ended his career. He coached in high school and college before becoming head coach at Eastern Illinois and then moving on to Blesto. Ralph and his wife, Dorothy, have one daughter — Jackie.



DON DEISCH, Assistant Head Scout

Don Deisch joined the Vikings in 1980. As with Head Scout Ralph Kohl, Deisch had been with the Blesto scouting organization prior to joining Minnesota. He played quarterback and defensive back at Southern Oregon. He coached and taught at Hillsboro (Ore.) High School. He also coached at Stanford and at Portland State before joining Blesto in 1976. His primary responsibility for the Vikings is the West Coast.



JOHN CARSON, Regional Scout

John Carson joined the Vikings in 1983 after having worked in private business for seven years. Carson was born in Atlanta and was an All-American end at Georgia. He was drafted by the Browns and played for the Redskins and Oilers. After winning the 1960 AFL championship with the Oilers, Carson left to scout for the Eagles and United. Carson and his wife, Betsy, live in Farmington, Ga., and have two children — John Jr., and Dianne.

JERRY BURNS

Head Coach



On January 6, 1986, Jerry Burns was named head coach of the Minnesota Vikings, thus becoming the fourth head coach in the Club's history. With that announcement, Bud Grant passed the team's leadership to a man who had been lending direction since 1968.

It seemed fitting that Burns, who had been serving as the Vikings' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator, would receive the appointment. Since his arrival in Minnesota he had been designing the offensive scheme and, for the most part, calling the plays. He had often been called an innovator and been credited with such things as originating the one-back offense and popularizing the short-passing game.

Thus, the head coaching responsibility was placed into the hands of a man familiar with the organization who possesses a wealth of experience.

Burns has coached in a total of six Super Bowls. He guided the Viking offense during all four of their appearances, and he was the defensive backfield coach on two winning Green Bay teams.

Burns began his coaching career at the University of Hawaii in 1951, where he served as the backfield coach for the football team and the head baseball coach. In 1952 he coached the backfield at Whittier College in California before returning to his native Detroit in 1953 as the head football coach at St. Mary's of Redford High School. Burns was named freshman coach at the University of Iowa in 1954 and varsity assistant in 1955. In 1957 he succeeded Bump Elliott as backfield coach at Iowa when Elliott went to Michigan as head coach. In 1961 Burns was named head coach at Iowa when Forest Evashevski retired to become athletic director. During Burns' 12 years at Iowa, (1954-65) the Hawkeyes won two Big Ten titles, playing in two Rose Bowl games. After leaving Iowa he coached at Green Bay (1966-67) before joining the Vikings as offensive coordinator in 1968. In 1985, Minnesota promoted him to assistant head coach.

He was born Jerome Monahan Burns on January 24, 1927, in Detroit where he was one of eight children. He attended Detroit Catholic Central High School and went on to play quarterback at Michigan, playing on the 1950 Rose Bowl team. Burns graduated from Michigan in 1951, with a bachelor of science degree, majoring in physical education. Bob Hollway, Viking Special Assistant/Football Operations, was Burns' teammate on the 1949 Michigan team. Burns also coached Jerry Reichow, Minnesota's director of football operations, and Frank Gilliam, Minnesota's director of player personnel, while both were at Iowa.

Jerry and his wife, Marlyn, have five children — Michael (3/13/56), Erin (8/27/57), Kelly (3/31/59), Kathy (8/13/60) and Kerry (11/25/70) — and live in Eden Prairie, Minnesota.

ASSISTANT COACHES



FLOYD PETERS, Defensive Coordinator

Peters joined the Viking staff in 1986 as defensive coordinator after serving as assistant head coach at both St. Louis, where he was in charge of the defense from 1982-85, and Detroit, where he coached the defensive line for four years (1978-81). He also spent two years coaching the defensive line with both San Francisco (1976-77) and the New York Giants (1974-75). He played defensive tackle and guard at San Francisco State (1954-57) and was drafted by Baltimore in the eighth round of the 1958 draft. He played one season for the Colts and then went on to play for Cleveland (1959-62), Detroit (1963) and Philadelphia (1964-69) before joining Vince Lombardi and the Washington Redskins for the 1970 season as a player/coach. Peters was selected to three Pro Bowls while playing with Philadelphia (1964, 66 and 67) and was named most valuable lineman of the 1966 game. He was also the Eagles captain. Peters scouted for the Miami Dolphins (1971-73) before beginning his coaching career. As a coach, he has achieved a reputation for building a stellar pass rush. In 1976, at San Francisco, his line led the NFL in quarterback sacks with 61. During Peters' first season with Detroit, the Lions set a team record for sacks with 55. Detroit's line went on to average 47 sacks per season during his coaching tenure there. Peters was born May 21, 1936, in Council Bluffs, Iowa. He and his wife, Nancy, have four sons — Craig (8/7/57), Kelly (12/28/60), Dean (6/22/63) and Allen (10/8/64) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



BOB SCHNELKER, Offensive Coordinator

Schnelker joined the Viking coaching staff in 1986 as offensive coordinator. He began his coaching career with Los Angeles (1963-65) as the Rams' receivers coach. He joined Green Bay in 1966 where he was the passing game and receivers coach until 1971. He was offensive coordinator at San Diego for two years (1972-73) before coaching Miami's receivers in 1974. In 1975, Schnelker served as Kansas City's receivers coach before being promoted to offensive coordinator, a position he held with the Chiefs for two years. He then joined Detroit (1978-81) as offensive coordinator before returning to direct the Packer offensive attack (1982-85). Schnelker was a basketball player and tight end for Bowling Green University from 1946-49. He was a 23rd-round draft choice of the Browns in 1950 and spent two years in the service before joining Cleveland in 1953. He was traded to New York in 1954, where he helped the Giants to the 1956 NFL title and played in another two NFL championships (1958-59). In 1961, the Giants traded him to the expansion Vikings, along with Mel Triplett and Bob Schmidt, in return for Zeke Smith, Dave Whitsell and two draft choices. With the Vikings, he caught six passes for 70 yards and one TD (a 14-yard reception to score the Vikings' first ever touchdown, which was also the first of Fran Tarkenton's NFL record, 342 TD passes). Midway through the 1961 season, he was released and finished the year with Pittsburgh. Schnelker coached, along with Jerry Burns, on the staff of two Green Bay championship teams (1966-67). He also directed the NFC's No. 1 offense in 1981 at Detroit and the NFC's No. 1 offense in 1983 at Green Bay. Schnelker was born October 17, 1928, in Galion, Ohio. He and his wife, B.J., have four children — Mindy (5/5/54), Jeff (10/14/55), Brad (12/27/60) and Tina (6/9/67).



TOM BATTA, Tight Ends/ Special Teams

Batta joined the Vikings in 1984. He coached the defensive line in 1984 and in 1985 served as a defensive assistant/kicking teams coach. In 1986 he became tight ends/special teams coach. He was defensive coordinator at North Carolina State in 1983 and at Kansas from 1979-82. Was defensive line coach at Colorado from 1974-78. Coached in the Hall of Fame Bowl (1981), Blue Bonnet Bowl (1975) and Orange Bowl (1976).

He began his college coaching career at Akron University after coaching Warren Harding High School, Warren, Ohio, to the state championship. Born October 6, 1942 in Youngstown, Ohio, he attended Conneaut (Ohio) high school. Played three years of football at Kent State University and graduated with a degree in health and physical education in 1965. In 1970 he earned his Master's of Education from the University of Akron. He and his wife, Liz, have two sons — Jeff (5/13/67) and Tommy (4/9/69) — and live in Eden Prairie, Minn.



PETE CARROLL, Defensive Backs

Carroll joined the Viking staff in 1985 as the secondary coach. He was the defensive backfield coach for the Buffalo Bills in 1984. Carroll was the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at the University of Pacific in 1983. Was an assistant coach at North Carolina State (1980-82), Ohio State (1979), Iowa State (1978) and Arkansas (1977). He played two years (1971-72) at UOP and earned All-Pacific Coast

Conference honors twice, after transferring from the College of Marin. Received his Master's degree from Pacific in 1978. Carroll was born on September 15, 1951 in San Francisco, California. He and his wife, Glenna, have two children — Brennan (3/20/79) and Jaime (4/12/82) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



BOB HOLLWAY, Special Asst./Football Operations

Hollway is in his 13th season with the Vikings. He first joined the club in 1967 as defensive coordinator. In 1969 the defense established 12 NFL records for excellence. He left the Vikings after the 1970 season to become head coach of the St. Louis Cardinals; then served as defensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions (1973-74), San Francisco 49ers (1975) and Seattle Seahawks (1976-77). Hollway rejoined the Vikings in 1978 as

defensive coordinator. In 1984 he worked in research and development for the team before again serving as defensive coordinator in 1985. In 1986 he was named Special Asst./Football Operations. Hollway played football at the University of Michigan on three Big 10 championship teams (1947-49). After receiving his Master's degree from Michigan, he coached at the University of Maine and Eastern Michigan University where he also was the head basketball coach. Hollway then coached at Michigan for 14 years before joining the Vikings. Hollway was born on January 29, 1926, in Ann Arbor, Michigan. He and his wife, Colleen, have six children — Michael (9/23/52), Anne (12/6/53), Kathleen (9/6/55), Robert (12/5/56), Bruce (10/22/58), and William (7/4/61) — and live in Edina, Minn.



MONTE KIFFIN, Linebackers

Kiffin joined the Vikings in 1986 as linebacker coach. He was the linebacker coach at Buffalo for two seasons (1984-85) and a member of the Green Bay staff in 1983. Prior to that he was a college coach for 17 years. He began his coaching career at the University of Nebraska in 1966 and served as a member of the Cornhusker staff for 11 seasons. He moved to Arkansas in 1977 as assistant head coach to Lou Holtz. After the 1979 season, he left to become head coach at North Carolina State, where he coached for three seasons (1980-82). Kiffin was born February 29, 1940, in Lexington, Neb. He was Nebraska (Lexington High School) High School Athlete-of-the-Year in 1958. He was a three-year letterman at Nebraska and then played two seasons with Winnipeg in the CFL before beginning his coaching career. He and his wife, Robin, have three children — Heidi (9/4/68), Lane (5/9/75), and Christopher (1/19/82) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



JOHN MICHELS, Offensive Line

Michels joined the Vikings in 1967 and coached the line for his first 17 seasons with Minnesota. In 1984 he coached the running backs before returning to the offensive line coaching position in 1985. Michels played collegiately at the University of Tennessee from 1949-53, earning All-America honors in 1952. He also played for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1953 and again in 1956, following a tour of duty with the Army. He coached one year (1958) at Texas A&M before coaching Winnipeg (CFL) from 1959-66. Michels was born February 15, 1931, in Philadelphia. He and his wife, Ann, have four children — John Jr. (1/6/55), Steve (4/8/56), Lila (8/31/58) and Sara (7/29/61) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



DICK REHBEIN, Receivers

Rehbein joined the Vikings just prior to the start of training camp in 1984 as a special assistant. In 1985 he was named receivers coach. He was the special teams coach for the LA Express (USFL) in 1984, where he also served as the assistant offensive line coach. Prior to that he coached the special teams for the Green Bay Packers (1979-83). He played center at Ripon College (Wis.) from 1973 through 1977. At Ripon he earned a degree in criminal justice. Rehbein was born November 22, 1955, in Green Bay, Wisconsin. He and his wife, Pam, have one child — Betsy (2/24/85) — and live in Bloomington, Minn.



MARC TRESTMAN, Running Backs

Trestman joined the Vikings in 1985 as coach of the running backs. He came to Minnesota from the University of Miami (1981-84), where he had been serving as an offensive assistant, working primarily with the quarterbacks. Trestman played quarterback at the University of Minnesota from 1976 to 1978. He has a degree in political science from Minnesota and attended law school while in Miami; he passed the Florida Bar Exam in 1984. Trestman was born January 15, 1956, in Minneapolis and attended St. Louis Park Senior High School. He is single and lives in Minneapolis, Minn.



PAUL WIGGIN, Defensive Line

Wiggan joined the Viking coaching staff in 1985 as defensive line coach. He was head coach at Stanford University (1980-83) and did not coach in 1984, spending the year working with the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee. Prior to the Stanford job, he was the defensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (1978-80). Also served as head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs (1975-78). Following his retirement as a player, Wiggan coached the defensive line at San Francisco (1968-73) and was then named defensive coordinator in 1974. He coached in the 1970 and 1971 Pro-Bowl games. He was a three-year starter at offensive and defensive tackle at Stanford receiving first-team All-America honors in 1955 and 1956 and played in three post-season all-star games. Played 11 seasons with the Cleveland Browns, and was selected to play in two Pro-Bowls: 1965 and 1967. Won the Browns' Player of the Year award in 1966, and the Cleveland Pro Athlete of the Year award in 1967. Wiggan was born on November 18, 1934 in Modesto, California. He earned his Master's degree in physical education from Stanford in 1959. He and his wife, Carolynn, have three daughters — Kymberly (3/22/61), Kristyn (6/6/63), and Kellie (7/4/67) — and live in Edina, Minn.

ANDERSON, ALFRED / 46

PRO: Was nagged for much of the 1985 season with various injuries and as a result only carried the ball 50 times, gaining 121 yards. Missed games four, five and six with a strained left knee, and game No. 10 with a strained neck. Still managed to finish fourth on the team in TDs last season with five. Scored four TDs rushing: vs. San Francisco (9/8/85), Tampa Bay (9/15/85), Detroit (11/17/85) and Philadelphia (12/22/85), and one TD via the pass, a 54-yarder, vs. New Orleans (11/24/85). Best game of the season was vs. San Francisco (9/8/85) when he rushed for 23 yards on eight carries and also had two receptions for 46 yards. In 1984, he was the leading rookie rusher in the NFC, and second ranking rookie leaguewide, while finishing 12th overall in rushing yardage. Led the club in rushing attempts and yards gained rushing in 1984. Career best was vs. Detroit (9/23/84) when he ran for 120 yards on 19 attempts. Against Philadelphia (9/9/84) he threw a 20-yard TD pass to Tommy Kramer and also rushed for 105 yards on 20 carries. Completed three of seven passes in 1984, and two were touchdowns. Played in all 16 games and started 14 in 1984 and was named to the Pro Football Writers, Pro Football Weekly, and Football Digest All-Rookie teams. Was the fourth running back, and the 67th player, selected in the 1984 NFL draft.

COLLEGE: As a junior and senior led Baylor in rushing and TDs, setting a school record for career scoring. As a senior, ranked second in the Southwest Conference and 13th in the NCAA in rushing was also named All-SWC (AP and UPI), and second-team All-American (Football News). Played in both the Japan Bowl and the East-West Shrine Game. As a four-year letterman and three-year starter, played in 43 of 44 games. Career totals include: 2,424 yards rushing on 554 attempts, with 36 touchdowns; also caught 42 passes for 543 yards and one touchdown. Rushed for 100 yards seven times during his career. Finished second on the Bears' all-time rushing list behind Walter Abercrombie, now with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Suffered a wrist injury in a prep high school all-star game, forcing him to move from quarterback to running back as a freshman and was named SWC Freshman-of-the Year. Moved to wingback as a sophomore. As a junior returned to running back and earned second-team All-SWC (UPI) honors. Majored in recreation.

PERSONAL: Born Alfred Anthony Anderson in Waco, Tex., where he attended Richfield High School. As a senior quarterback he passed for 17 TDs and rushed for 14 more. Also lettered in basketball (three), and track (four) at Richfield. Was a celebrity waiter to help raise money for leukemia, and played on the Viking off-season charity basketball team. Also attended school during the off-season. He and his wife Monica live in Burnsville, Minn.

PRO: Spent the 1985 season on injured reserve after rupturing his right achilles tendon during the second pre-season game vs. Pittsburgh (8/17/85). In 1984 he finished eighth on the team in tackles, third among linebackers, with 78 total tackles. Played in 15 games, starting one, the season finale vs. Green Bay (12/16/84). Led the team with six solo tackles, four assists and one caused

fumble in that game. In 1983 was the eighth linebacker, and 73rd player, selected overall in the NFL draft.

COLLEGE: As a senior earned UPI second-team All-American honors, AP and Sporting News honorable mention All-American notice and was selected to play in the East-West Shrine game. A four-year letterman, who played on Penn State teams that compiled a 39-9 overall mark and went to the Liberty Bowl (1979), Fiesta Bowl (1980 and 1981) and defeated Georgia 27-23 in the Sugar Bowl for the 1982 national championship. Recorded 136 tackles during his career, and also forced six fumbles, recovered five fumbles and had 23 tackles for loss. Graduated with a degree in community development.

PERSONAL: Born Walker Lee Ashley in Bayonne, N.J., and attended Snyder High School in Jersey City, N.J. Was a linebacker there, and also lettered in basketball and baseball. Enjoys all of the outdoor activities. Worked out with weights and rehabilitated the achilles injury during the off-season. He is single and lives in Burnsville, Minn.

PRO: Was named Sports Illustrated's defensive player-of-the-week for his performance in the season opener vs. San Francisco (9/8/85). He forced a club record three fumbles, recovered one fumble, intercepted one pass and added ten tackles in that game. The following week vs Tampa Bay (9/15/85) he recovered one fumble, blocked one punt attempt and contributed ten tackles to lead the

defense. Intercepted two passes last season including a 27-yard return vs. San Diego (10/20/85). Started the first 11 games last season at left cornerback, and ranked eighth on the club defensively, before suffering a shoulder separation vs. Detroit (11/17/85). Was placed on injured reserve the following week for the remainder of the season. In 1984 he led the defense with three interceptions and was the team's third leading tackler. Was claimed on waivers from Buffalo (9/7/82). Originally signed as a free agent by the Raiders in 1979. Was waived just prior to the 1980 season and claimed by Buffalo. Played two seasons for the Bills before being waived and claimed by the Vikings.

COLLEGE: Made the varsity team as a freshman walk-on and became a three-year starter at cornerback for the Bulldogs. Had 70 tackles and five interceptions during his final two seasons. Graduated from SCSU with a degree in industrial education.

PERSONAL: Born Rufus T. Bess, Jr., in Darlington, S.C. Lettered in football, basketball and track at Butler High School in Hartsville, S.C. He was an All-Conference quarterback and defensive back at Butler. Also was the punter, kicker and designated kick returner. Wants to combine his industrial education degree with architecture. Spent the off-season playing on the Viking charity basketball team. He is single and lives in Edina, Minn.

BUD GRANT

Minnesota Vikings Head Coach, 1967-1983, 1985

Bud Grant, a head coach for 28 years, won a total of 290 regular and post-season games — 122 as coach of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League from 1957-1966 and 168 as coach of the Vikings from 1967-1983 and 1985. Only one man — the legendary George Halas with 326 victories — won more professional football games.

In Grant's 18 years as head coach of the Vikings, his teams compiled a regular-season record of 158-96-5, made the playoffs 12 times, and won 15 championships: 11 Central Division (1968-1971, 1973-78, and 1980), one NFL (1969) and three NFC (1973, 1974 and 1976). The Vikings, under Grant, played in four Super Bowls.
