WILLIAM H. SULLIVAN, JR.

PRESIDENT

Until 1959 New England had been a graveyard for more than a half dozen professional football teams. William H. "Billy" Sullivan, Jr. changed that.

On November 18, 1959, Billy was awarded the eighth franchise in the fledgling American Football League. And, while many said he would never field a team Billy ignored such talk and spread the good word that pro football was back to stay in New England.

Billy has made an indelible impact on the nation's No. 1 sport since that great day. He did get a team on the field. From 1961 to 1964 he was President of the AFL and served on the television committee that authored a \$36 million contract with NBC to guarantee survival of the young league. He was a key member of the AFL's team that hammered out the merger format with the NFL, he still serves as a director of both NFL Properties and Films.



Since starting his love affair with pro football, Billy has travelled through many valleys and over many peaks. By undaunted determination and a boundless capacity for hard work, he kept the Patriots alive until locating the team in its present 61,279-seat Schaefer Stadium home, and assumed control of the franchise on Nov. 7, 1975 when he purchased 88 per cent control of the club's voting stock.

Billy graduated from Boston College in 1937, served as Publicity Director at his alma mater from 1938-1940. In 1941 he went to Notre Dame as special assistant to the Director of Athletics. After a hitch on the staff of the U. S. Naval Academy, he joined the Boston Braves baseball team as Director of Public Relations in 1946. During his six-year tenure with the Braves he conceived the "Jimmy Fund" that has since grown to be an internationally known cancer research program studying leukemia in children.

In 1955 he joined Metropolitan Petroleum Co. that was doing \$14 million worth of business. In '58 he became President and today the giant Boston oil company is up to \$76 million.

Whether it's the Metropolitan oil business or the Patriots fortunes in the NFL, Billy Sullivan has the same, unwavering philosophy, "The best is yet to come."

CHUCK FAIRBANKS

GENERAL MANAGER AND HEAD COACH

Charles Leo "Chuck" Fairbanks became the sixth in a line of Patriots' head coaches when he joined the organization in the dual capacity of general manager-head coach on January 26, 1973.

Coach Fairbanks came to the Patriots from a remarkably successful career as a college football coach during which he led Oklahoma to a fantastic 52-15-1 record over six years. Prior to his term with the Sooners, his coaching career had run the full cycle from high school ranks through collegiate assistant, and has spanned more than two decades.

At 43 years of age, he ranks as one of the youngest head coaches in the National Football League.

Since assuming control of the helm of the Patriots forces, coach Fairbanks more than lived up to the reputation that preceded him to New England — strong organizer, promotes the image of oneness among his charges, strives for solidarity and believes in *esprit de corps*.

In addition to his role as the on-field leader of the Patriots fortunes as head coach, Chuck has the added responsibility of directing the organization on an administrative level as he also serves in the capacity of General Manager of the franchise.

Coach Fairbanks was born in Detroit on June 10, 1933 and was educated at Charlevoix (Mich.) High School and Michigan State ('55). An all-State end in high school, he played under Biggie Munn with the Spartans' 1952 national champion team and the '53 Big Ten champs who defeated UCLA in the Rose Bowl. He finished off his collegiate career under Duffy Daugherty and earned a berth in the Blue-Gray all-star classic.



He launched his coaching career in 1955 as a student assistant at Michigan State's spring drills. His first head coaching assignment was at Ishpeming (Mich) High School, 1955-57, and he moved to the collegiate ranks under Frank Kush at Arizona State where he served as defensive backfield coach from 1958-61. From 1962 to 64 he was backfield coach at Houston and in '65 he was named assistant head coach under Bill Yeoman. The following year he became defensive backfield coach at Oklahoma and took over the top post in 1967.

Assistant Head Coach, Defensive Line

Born 1-24-34 at Scranton, Pa. . . . standout defensive tackle on same Michigan State team as coach Fairbanks . . . on 1955 College All-Star team that beat Cleveland . . . played guard for Packers in '55 and '58 . . . Spartans' defensive coordinator for 11 years before moving to pro ranks . . . three seasons with Baltimore grooming linebackers before joining Patriots in 1973.

ROBERT "RED" MILLER

Western Illinois

Offensive Line, In Charge of Offense

Born 10-31-27 at Macomb, Ill. . . . Western Illinois' MVP three years in a row as top guard . . . spent six years in college coaching before joining Lou Saban's staff with Boston Patriots in 1960 . . . coached with Buffalo, Denver, St. Louis and Baltimore before returning to Patriots in '73 . . . has developed more than a dozen all-Pros in the NFL.

ROLLIE DOTSCH

Michigan State

Outside Linebackers

Born 2-14-33 at Escanaba, Mich. . . . four year offensive guard at MS . . . graduated 1955 . . . high school coach two years, offensive and defensive line coach at N. Michigan 1958-60, def. backfield coach at Colorado 1961, head coach and AD at N. Michigan 1966-70 and had 33-15-1 record . . . offensive line coach at Green Bay 1971-73.

RON ERHARDT

Jamestown

Running Backs

Born 2-27-32 at Mandan, N.D. . . . played his college football as a quarterback for Jamestown (N.D.) College . . . followed two year hitch in military with seven seasons as high school coach during which he had a 45-9-2 record . . . became defensive chief at North Dakota State in '63 and head coach in '66 . . . four time coach of the year in college division with 62-7-1 record.

RAY PERKINS

Alabama

Receivers

Born 11-6-41 at Mount Olive, Miss. . . . all-America receiver at Alabama in '66 . . . sparked big win over Nebraska in Orange Bowl . . . in final college season caught 33 passes for 490 yards . . . seventh round choice of Colts . . . five seasons with Baltimore caught 93 for 1538 yards and 11 scores . . . played in two Super Bowl games . . . joined Patriots staff in 1974.

JOHN POLONCHEK

Michigan State

Quarterbacks

Born 1-1-28 at Granastov, Czechoslovakia . . . four year DB-receiver at MS 1946-49 . . . graduate assistant at MS until called to military service 1952-55 . . . joined Duffy Daugherty's MS staff 1956-58, Colorado offensive line coach 1959-61 . . . spent next five years as businessman and parttime scout for Jets . . . Raiders offensive backfield coach 1967-71, receivers coach with Packers 1972-73.

CHARLIE SUMNER

William & Mary

Inside Linebackers

Born 10-19-30 at Radford, Va. . . . affiliated with pro football for nearly two decades since playing quarterback and running back at W&M . . . starting defensive back with Bears in rookie season . . . switched to Minnesota in expansion . . . coached Oakland secondary for six years, with Pittsburgh in '69 (defensive backs three years, linebackers one), joined Patriots in 1973.

LARRY WEAVER

Adams State

Defensive Backs

Born 11-17-31 at Monte Vista, Col. . . . played with New York Giants while completing his education at Adams State, Colorado . . . seven years as collegiate coach at North Dakota State, Arizona and UCLA . . . was Tommy Prothro's defensive coordinator with Bruins and switched with him to Rams in 1971 . . . joined Patriots staff in 1973.

TOM YEWYCIC
Special Teams, Pro Scouting

Michigan State

Born 5-9-33 at Conemaugh, Pa. . . . two-time, two-sport all-American for Spartans . . . outstanding catcher, four years in Detroit Tiger organization . . . teammate of Coach Fairbanks and quarterbacked 1954 Rose Bowl win over UCLA . . . played with Toronto Argonauts in 1960, with Patriots as punter and QB from 1961-66 . . . coached backs for Patriots 67-68, college coaching 69-72, NE Colonials head coach 73, joined Patriots 1974.

The team has had 30 different assistant coaches over the years . . . Art Spinney served as the offensive line coach for seven years to head the longevity listing of assistant coaches.

6th Yr. (D-2, 71)

Born 4-26-48 at Macon, Ga. . . . great collegiate career at Texas Southern where he was a four year starter, two time all-conference choice . . . Patriots No. 2 draft choice in '71 who had a great game in the annual College All-Star affair . . . AP defensive lineman of the week honors for leading 34-13 upset win over Miami 12-5-71 . . . UPI all-rookie team in 1971 . . . has played in 62 of possible 70 regular season games (including 57 starts) since joining the Patriots . . . standout season in '74 in which his 7½ sacks led team . . . honorable mention UPI all-AFC, rated among top defensive linemen in NFL by Pro Quarterback Magazine . . . Foxboro Jaycees MVP for '74 season . . . to prove versatility has started at three different positions for Patriots—DE, DT and LB . . . foot injury limited his play to nine games in '75, including eight starts . . . credited with five sacks.

PRO STATS: Recovered one fumble in 1971; recovered one fumble in 1973. Blocked one PAT in 1974. Games played — 1971-14, 1972-11, 1973-14, 1974-14, 1975-9.

SAM EDWARD ADAMS

6-3, 252 Prairie View

G

5th Yr. (W-Dallas, 71)

Born 9-20-48 at Jasper, Texas . . . three year regular at Prairie View where he played both tackle and guard . . . originally selected by Los Angeles in the supplemental draft of 1970 . . . released by Rams, he signed on with Dallas and was subsequently picked up by the Patriots prior to the '71 season and served on cab squad . . . started seven games at guard in '72 . . . moved to tackle (played both sides) in '73 and started eight games while playing in 12 games . . . underwent successful knee surgery after '73 season . . . came back strong in '74, shifted from tackle to right guard and had great year . . . has started 26 of 28 regular season games over last two seasons . . . often utilized as second tight end in running situations.

PRO STATS: Recovered one fumble in 1972. Games played — 1972-7, 1973-12, 1974-14, 1975-13.

STEVEN BRUCE (STEVE) BURKS

WR

6-5, 211 Arkansas State

2nd Yr. (D-4b, 75)

Born 8-6-53 at Little Rock, Arkansas . . . all-America and all-state at Cabot (Ark.) High . . . won state decathlon and lettered in three sports . . . one of the best offensive players ever to play at ASU . . . played four different positions during varsity career (QB, Punter, WR, RB) . . . rushed for 1351 yards on 347 attempts (3.9 avg.) and scored 26 rushing TDs in four-year career . . . punted for last three years (145 punts, 5653 yds., 39.0 avg.) . . . caught 29 passes for 552 yards (19.0 avg.), 4 TDs . . . also team's leading passer last two seasons completing 61 of 134 (45.5 avg.) for 698 yards, 4 TDs, 7 interceptions . . . all-conference punter in 1972 . . . set Southland Conference scoring records in 1973 for one game (42 points on 7 TDs against Abilene Christian) and season (110 pts.) . . . first ASU player ever drafted by Patriots . . . physical education major . . . expert horseman . . . played in 13 regular season games last year as a reserve WR and special team player . . . caught 76-yard pass vs. Dallas, longest by a Patriot in '75.

PRO STATS: caught six passes for 158 yards, returned four kickoffs for 65 yards in 1975. Games played — 1975-13.

DONALD C. (DON) CALHOUN

RB

6-0, 205 Kansas State

3rd Yr. (FA, 75)

Born 4-29-52, at Muskogee, Oklahoma . . . gained 1200 yards in varsity career at Kansas State as both fullback and halfback . . . teammate of QB Steve Grogan . . . led Wildcats in rushing as a junior with 608 yards (4th best in K-State history) . . . drafted on 10th round in 1974 by Buffalo . . . played in all 14 games as a

rookie and first six games of 1975 before being waived by Bills . . . signed as free agent with Patriots 11/22/75 . . . played final five games for Patriots . . . earned starting assignment vs. NY Jets on 12/7/75 and rushed for 103 yards on 15 carries including 38-yard TD . . . caught longest scoring pass of season (62 yards) from Steve Grogan vs. Buffalo.

Born 12-12-52 at Pomona, California . . . one of California's greatest schoolboy athletes of all-time . . . played at Bonita High (same as Army's Glenn Davis) . . . high school all-America, Southern California 3-A Player of the Year in 1970 . . . three-year rushing totals were 406 carries for 4388 yards and 70 touchdowns . . . USC Coach John McKay called him, "the best high school running back I've ever seen" . . . led undefeated 1971 Trojan frosh in rushing with 332 yards on 67 carries, starting ahead of Anthony Davis . . . played in three consecutive Rose Bowls . . . career rushing stats: 184 rushes, 1100 yards, 7 TDs . . . also returned 17 kickoffs for 307 yards, 18.1 avg. in three years . . . Patriots' top kickoff returner in 1975 . . . ranked second in AFC with 27.5 average . . . broke club records for longest return (99-yard TD) and most yards in a game (206) at Baltimore in season's finale.

Born 11-18-50, at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma . . . earned all-Big 8 honors two straight years and named to several all-America teams at Oklahoma under Chuck Fairbanks . . . college roommate of Ray Hamilton for four years at OU . . . drafted on second round in 1973 by Cincinnati . . . played 27 of possible 28 regular season games for Bengals over two seasons, mostly as special teams performer (caught one pass for 9 yards) . . . rated as an outstanding blocker . . . traded to San Francisco June 11, 1975, for a 1976 draft choice . . . waived on final cut by 49ers . . . signed as free agent with Patriots April 6, 1976.

PRO STATS: Caught one pass for nine yards in 1974. Games played: 1973-13, 1974-14.

Born 1-9-51, at Louisville, Kentucky . . . signed as free agent with Pittsburgh in 1974 after three-year varsity career at the University of Georgia (teammate of Andy Johnson's) . . . played in 12 regular season games for Steelers in 1974 and appeared in Super Bowl IX, mostly as special teams player and fifth defensive back . . . versatile performer who also returns punts and kickoffs . . . waived during 1975 training camp and signed with Jacksonville of World Football League . . . played with Jacksonville until WFL folded . . . signed as free agent by Patriots, 11-26-75 . . . played in three of last four game for Patriots.

SCHAEFER STADIUM

Schaefer Stadium was built at the cost of \$6.7 million and financed through the private sale of more than 400,000 shares of stock in Stadium Realty Trust. The official ground breaking ceremony took place on Sept. 23, 1970, and 326 days later (Aug. 15, 1971) the first game was played at the new Foxboro facility in which the Patriots posted a 20-14 victory over the New York Giants before 60,423 fans.

With space to park 16,000 automobiles surrounding the stadium, the site covers an area of 15 acres and is as long as it is wide, 700 feet. In the process of excavating the bowl shape for the stadium, 250,000 cubic yards of earth were removed from the 35-feet deep hole. The J. F. White Construction Co. then used 15,000 cubic yards of concrete and 660 tons of steel to erect the stadium.

The playing surface required 75,000 square feet of Poly-Turf weighing 600 pounds and spread over an asphalt bed and shock pad. Lighting is provided by three towers with 324 mercury lamps (1500 watts per); 200 candle power per square foot on the playing field.

Seating is constructed of aluminum with a capacity of 61,279. There are 5604 special box (chairs) seats, 48,710 seats on the sidelines, and 6965 end zone seats.

Through the 1974 season there have been 40 pre-season and regular season games played in Schaefer Stadium. A total of 2,199,261 fans (54,982 per game) have watched the Patriots games at Schaefer Stadium.


