GIANTS' COACHING STAFF



ALEX WEBSTER HEAD COACH

The 1973 season will mark Alex Webster's fifth year as head coach of the New York Giants. The 42-year-old Webster replaced Allie Sherman a week before the opening of the 1969 campaign and since assuming the position has compiled a record of 27 victories and 29 losses while embarked on a rebuilding program. The Giants' overall mark for the five seasons prior to Webster's first year was 24 wins, 43 setbacks and 3 ties. And New York did not have a winning season in any of those five prior years. Under Webster, the Giants have had two winning years in the past four seasons, and twice were in contention for the NFC Playoffs. In 1970, Alex led the club to a 9-5 record, missing the playoffs on the final day of the year, and last year the club finished 8-6 and was in contention for a wild card berth until the 13th week of the season. For these performances, Webster was voted NFC Coach of the Year by UPI in 1970, and was also named NFL Coach of the

Year that same season by the Washington Touchdown Club., and also earned some mentions in the various 1972 Coach of the Year Polls.

Alex joined the Giant's coaching staff in 1967 and served as an assistant until being named to the head post. As a player with the Giants, the 6-3 225-pounder was a star performer from 1955 through 1964, playing with the powerhouse Giant teams which won six Eastern Division titles (1956-58-59-61-62-63) and a NFL Championship (1956).

Although Webster played under such renowned coaches as Jim Lee Howell, Tom Landry and the late Vince Lombardi, he has faithfully resisted the temptation to imitate them or their methods. "I learned much from them," he says, "but I must be my own man when it comes to coaching; I can't be a carbon copy of someone else."

Webster's strength as a head coach lies in his ability to inspire young players, in his tough but fair approach to discipline, in his knack of sensing trouble before it happens and, perhaps most important, in his determination to relate to today's athletes and to meet current issues with an open mind. "Above all," he points out, "I want to make football fun for my players, because that's the way I always approached the game when I was in their shoes. Football is a business but it can be fun, too."

Like Jim Lee Howell, under whom he broke into the NFL in 1955, Webster firmly believes in the abilities of his assistants, and he gives them great latitude in their individual areas of responsibility. "Coaching," he reminds, "is like playing—it's a team effort. Everyone has something valuable to contribute."

As an All Pro running back with the Giants from 1955-64, Webster ranked as one of the top ball-carriers in the NFL. He still holds three New York club records — most rushing attempts (1,213), most rushing yardage (4,205) and most touchdowns rushing (39).



EMLLEN TUNNELL
Assistant Coach—11th Year

One of the all-time great safetymen in the history of professional football and also the first member of his race ever to become a regular fulltime coach in the National Football League, Em Tunnell is presently in his 11th season as an assistant on the staff of the New York Giants. In 1963-64, Tunnell combined his scouting chores with special coaching assignments in training camp and then, in 1965, he became a regular member of the staff. It followed that Em would be put in charge of the secondary; few men in the game have a wider knowledge or a keener insight into the intricacies of defensive backfield play than the former Giant great. Affable, easy-going Em Tunnell was a legendary safetymen with the Giants for 11 brilliant seasons (1948-58) and then spent three additional seasons with Green Bay (1959-61) before becoming a scout. The word legend is easily applicable to Tunnell. In his day, he was truly one of the ironmen of the sport. With the Giants he set a consecutive game record of 126 and he later ran that string to 158 with Green Bay. Em still holds two all-time NFL records—most career interceptions (79) and most punt returns (258).



JOE WALTON
Assistant Coach—5th Year

Now in his fifth season as one of coach Alex Webster's most valuable and imaginative young assistants, Joe Walton is responsible for the Giants' offensive ends and also, in large measure, for the overall passing game. The former Giant receiving great is eminently qualified for this specialized role. As a member of the Washington Redskins (1957-60) and the Giants (1961-63), Walton won acclaim as one of the finest tight ends in the National Football League and was called by quarterback Y.A. Tittle "...the best third-down receiver in the game, bar none." Walton came to the Giants as part of a six-player deal in 1961 and immediately teamed with Tittle and Del Shofner to propel New York to three straight divisional championships. During those three title campaigns, Joe caught 95 passes for 1,321 yards and 17 touchdowns. Despite his 5-11 195-pound dimensions, he was regarded as one of the best blocking tight ends in the business. Including his time with the Redskins, Walton's career totals show 178 receptions for 2,623 yards and 28 touchdowns. After retiring as an active player, Joe did some radio work and then returned to the Giant organization as a special scout, a position he held for two years (1967-68) before joining the staff as offensive end mentor.



JIM KATCAVAGE
Assistant Coach—5th Year

Like many of the others on coach Alex Webster's staff, big Jim Katcavage identifies strongly with the winning past of the New York Giants, as well as with the promise of the future. Jim spent 13 seasons as a premier defensive end with the Giants (1956-68) and in 1969 was added to the staff as coach of the defensive line. In that capacity, he has played a key role in helping develop a number of promising young linemen while adding to his growing stature as a pro coach. "Kat" is still young enough—and still well conditioned enough—to "get down in the dirt" and show his charges how it should be done when classroom discussions and playbook strategy fail to get the point across. Because of his renown as a great defensive end, Jim commands the respect of the players under him; what's more, he's still close enough in age to relate to even the youngest, most inexperienced men in his charge. Drafted No. 4 out of Dayton U. in 1956, the 6-3 240-pound native of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., joined Dick Modzelewski, Rosey Grier and Andy Robustelli as a rookie to help form the original "Fearsome Foursome," the famed front line that carried the Giants to the NFL title that year via a 47-7 trouncing of the Chicago Bears.



JIM GARRETT
Assistant Coach 4th Year

Energetic and enthusiastic Jim Garrett has held down three different jobs during his four years as an assistant on coach Alex Webster's staff. Jim joined New York in 1970 and was assigned the task of improving the special teams, which he did quite well. In 1971, he took over as offensive backfield coach, with special responsibilities in the area of pre-game preparation, and last year replaced the departed Norm Hecker as overall chief of the defensive unit. It is not surprising that the Giants have such faith in Garrett's ability to handle a variety of assignments; he is a gifted, experienced and bright young man, tireless and dedicated. After a brilliant career at Utah State, Jim tried to make it as a fullback in the NFL but untimely injuries cut short his bids with the Eagles (1954) and the Giants (1956). He did play briefly in Canada but soon embarked on a coaching career. He started as an assistant at the Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn. (1959) and served in a similar capacity at Lehigh U. (1959-60) before becoming head coach at Susquehanna U. (1960-66). In 1968, Garrett coached the Orlando Panthers of the Continental League and from 1968-70 he was a personnel talent scout with the Dallas Cowboys.



MATT HAZELTINE

Assistant Coach—3rd Year

Matt Hazeltine, a name synonymous with great defense in the National Football League, is in his third season as special linebacker coach for the Giants. Hazeltine had retired in 1968, after 13 memorable seasons with the San Francisco Forty-Niners, but coach Alex Webster talked him into making a comeback with the Giants in 1970. Matt, 38 years old, responded with a fine season that helped New York to a surprising 9-5 eastern conference finish. In 1971, Hazeltine was carried as a playing coach but did not make the active roster. Now, with 15 NFL seasons behind him, the five-time defensive captain of the Forty-Niners is concentrating solely on helping to develop the Giants' youthful and promising linebacker corps, an assignment for which he is well qualified. As a player Matt was regarded as not only an aggressive hitter but also as a "thinking man's" linebacker, an intelligent, heads-up competitor with a great instinct for defense. These are the very qualities which Webster—and others in the Giant organization—are certain will make Hazeltine a fine professional coach. Matt is known as a "theorist" by his fellow coaches but he's also a strict fundamentalist and a sound teacher of defensive football.

RAY WIETECHA

Assistant Coach—2nd Year

Ray Wietecha, who returned to the New York Giants in 1972 as offensive line coach on Alex Webster's staff, is an experienced football man who knows what winning is all about. As an All Pro center with the Giants for 10 seasons (1953-62), Ray played on five eastern division title teams and also was a star performer in the 1956 world championship win over the Chicago Bears. When his playing days ended, he gained two years of experience as an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams (under ex-Giant teammate Harland Svare) and then, from 1965 through 1970, he coached the offensive line for the Green Bay Packers. During this Vince Lombardi era, the Packers won three straight NFL championships (1965-66-67) and captured the first two Super Bowls (1966-67). Lombardi gave much of the credit for the fine Packer running attack to the influence of Wietecha as line coach. In fact, in his final season with Green Bay, Ray had the title of "Running Game Coach." Wietecha spent the 1971 campaign in the capacity of scout for the Giants and was then named to succeed Frank (Pop) Ivy as offensive line aide for 1972. An all-Big Ten center at Northwestern, Wietecha was the Giants' No. 11 draft choice in 1953.



JIM LEE HOWELL
Director of Personnel

Jim Lee Howell, a towering figure in the past and present of the New York Giants, lends a wealth of experience and football savvy to his position as Director of Player Personnel. It was 35 years ago that Jim Lee arrived on the New York scene, a long-legged rookie end out of the U. of Arkansas, and since then he has filled a variety of key roles for the Giants, player, assistant coach, head coach and now, of course, as a top-ranking administrator. Howell's record speaks boldly for itself. During his nine years as a player (1937-42, 1946-48), the Giants posted a mark of 55-37-9 and played in four world championship games (1938-39-41-46). After his playing days, the 6-6 Arkansan served as end coach under Stout Steve Owen from 1949-53 and, when Owen departed after the 1953 campaign, Jim Lee was named head coach. The winning pattern Howell had established as a player continued during his reign as coach. Over the next seven years, the Giants won 56 games, lost just 36 and tied four, and they made the world championship game three times, beating the Bears in 1956 and losing classic struggles to the Colts in 1958-59.



JIM TRIMBLE
Director of Pro Personnel

Few men in professional football are better qualified than big Jim Trimble to handle the role of Director of Pro Personnel, an assignment he shouldered at the start of the 1969 season when the Giants re-organized their administrative staff. As Director of Pro Personnel, Trimble serves as a liaison between coach Alex Webster and club president Wellington Mara, helps coordinate trades, works closely with Jim Lee Howell and members of the scouting staff and generally handles the myriad details and personnel problems that result from the everwidening range of pro football activity. Whatever the problems, though, it is likely that Jim has encountered them somewhere along the line during his 33 years in football. His background in the game is not only broad, it is also very successful. He was head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles (1952-56), the Hamilton Tiger Cats (1956-62) and the Montreal Alouettes (1963-65) and rarely was he ever on the losing side. His NFL record with the Eagles was 27-20-2. In Canada, he compiled an overall record of 77-61-2 and was named Coach of the Year in 1961. Additionally, he served in the dual role of head coach and general manager.



JOE SULAITIS

Assistant Director of Personnel

Joe Sulaitis brings to his role of Assistant Director of Personnel a broad football background that includes playing, scouting and coaching. As a player with the Giants from 1943-45 and again from 1947-53, Joe earned a reputation as one of the most versatile men ever to play the game. He was, at various times, a wingback, end, quarterback (blocking back in the A formation) and guard on offense, while on defense he played defensive end, linebacker and defensive back. At any position, he was known as a tough, aggressive 60-minute football player. After his first three-year stint with the Giants, Joe played one year with the Boston Yanks (1946). He returned to the Giants in 1947 and put in seven more productive seasons before retiring in 1953. Sulaitis' coaching experience included one year (1943) as head coach of North Arlington (N.J.) High School and two years (1947-48) as backfield coach at Wagner College under Jim Lee Howell, who later became head coach of the Giants and who is now Joe's immediate superior in the club's scouting division. Sulaitis was in private business from 1953 until 1966, when he rejoined his old ball club as an area scout.



ANTHONY PISANI, M. D.

Team Orthopedic Surgeon

Dr. Anthony (Tony) Pisani, Chief Orthopedic Surgeon at St. Vincent's Hospital in New York City, Clinical Professor of Orthopedic Surgery at Bellvue Medical College and consultant to the Surgeon General of the U.S. Army, has been associated with the Football Giants for the past nine years, the last seven as team orthopedic surgeon. In this capacity, he has prolonged the careers of many top Giant players, among them Tucker Frederickson and Greg Larson, and at the same time has won distinction among his fellow medical practitioners as one of the most skilled orthopedic men in professional sports. It is a matter of record that Dr. Pisani's surgical techniques for repairing torn knee ligaments have been copied by doctors from other pro football teams, as well as those from basketball and baseball. Athletes are sent to Tony from all parts of the country by coaches and trainers who are familiar with his great success in this area of surgery. Dr. Pisani, a native New Yorker, graduated from Fordham U. in 1931, received his medical degree from New York University and Bellvue Medical School and then spent five years there specializing in orthopedic surgery. From 1941-45, he was chief orthopedic surgeon for U.S. Army hospitals here and abroad.



RUDY BONO, M. D.
Team Physician

As they say, Dr. Rudy Bono had "a tough act to follow" when he joined the medical staff of the New York Giants back in 1967 as the successor to Dr. Francis J. Sweeney, who had died the previous year. Doc Sweeney had been with the ball club for over 35 years and was something of a walking legend in the NFL, and his shoes would be hard to fill. But in the ensuing six years, Rudy Bono has left his own mark on the Giants and is now regarded as one of the top team physicians in the league. The 44-year-old resident of Englewood, N.J., forms one half of the Giants' medical team. He is responsible for the general health problems of players and coaches while his confederate, Dr. Tony Pisani, concerns himself with the orthopedic problems. Dr. Bono, a bouncy little fellow, received a BS from Union College in 1950 and his MD from Albany Medical College in 1954. He did his surgical internship at St. Vincent's in New York City from 1954-55 and then served for three years as a Navy lieutenant (1955-57). In 1965, he became associate attending surgeon at St. Vincent's Hospital and, the same year, was appointed assistant professor of clinical surgery at the New York University-Bellvue Medical Center.



JOHN DZIEGIEL
Physical Fitness Director

John Dziegiel, one of the best known and most widely respected trainers in the sports field, has a career that dates back over 40 years to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. John started in 1928 by assisting the regular West Point trainers with rubdowns; in 1930, he became a fulltime assistant trainer and stayed at The Point until 1944. From 1946 through 1967, Dziegiel was head trainer at Fordham University, dividing his time between Rose Hill and Yankee Stadium, where he was co-trainer, along with John Johnson, for the Football Giants, a post he acquired in 1956. An acknowledged authority on sports injuries and treatment, John helped found the National Association of Athletic Trainers and is also active in the Eastern Athletic Trainers' Association. He and his family live in Nanuet, N.Y. Dziegiel now devotes his full time and energies to a year-round physical training and conditioning program for the Giants. Players living in the New York metropolitan area work regularly with John at Yankee Stadium in the off-season.



JOHN JOHNSON

Trainer

John Johnson, a graduate of the Swedish Institute of Physical Therapy, has been a trainer for the Giants for the past 22 years and, during this period, also has served as head trainer and physical instructor at Manhattan College. After serving an internship period at Brooklyn Jewish and Long Island College Hospitals (1937-38), Johnson worked as a physical trainer for the Bedford YMCA and then, from 1942-46, was in charge of physical therapy and rehabilitation at a U.S. Air Force base hospital. His service hitch included duty as a physical therapy instructor, athletic trainer for post teams and as an air-sea rescue medic. From 1946-47, John was a civilian athletic trainer at the U.S. Naval Preflight School at Ottumwa, Ia. A member of the Eastern and National Athletic Trainers' Associations as well as the National Physical Therapy Association, Johnson also has served as a trainer for visiting teams at Madison Square Garden (1954-63). He lives in Cresskill, N.J., with his wife and two daughters.



SID MORET

Equipment Manager —Assistant Trainer

For the past 24 years, Sid Moret has been an invaluable contributor to the behind-the-scenes operations of the New York Giants. He has filled a variety of necessary roles, including equipment manager, assistant trainer and director of clubhouse morale. A colorful and vocal personality, he is a favorite with coaches, players and the press. Sid, a New Yorker all the way (via Brooklyn, that is), is a product of New York University. He joined the staff of the Giants in 1949 (the same year as co-trainer John Johnson) and assumed the dual role of equipment manager and part-time trainer. Moret worked with the N.Y.U. Athletic Association after leaving school and, during World War II, he was associated with the Gene Tunney physical fitness program in the U.S. Navy (1943-45). In 1946-47, Sid was introduced to professional sports as trainer for the Brooklyn Dodgers of the old All America Conference. Prior to joining the Giants, Brooklyn-born Moret handled the training chores for Brooklyn College (1948-49). At various times Sid has also served as trainer for basketball teams visiting Madison Square Garden.



KEN KAVANAUGH SCOUT

Ken Kavanaugh, one of the most famous names in National Football League history, joined the Giants' scouting staff in 1971 and brought with him a wealth of experience as both a professional player and coach. Actually, Kavanaugh moved into the Giants' scouting department from the coaching staff, where he had been offensive end coach from 1955-68 and offensive coach from 1969-70, a total of 16 years under three head coaches, Jim Lee Howell (his current scouting superior), Allie Sherman and Alex Webster. Prior to becoming a Giant aide, the Pro Hall of Fame end had spent one season (1951) as end coach for his old club, the Chicago Bears, and one season (1954) at Villanova College in his hometown of Philadelphia. As a player, Ken was one of the Bear greats. He starred at end in 1940-41, left for an Air Force tour of duty and returned to make All Pro again in 1946-47. At LSU, Kavanaugh was a four-year regular (1936-40), twice earning All American honors.



ROSEY BROWN SCOUT

Roosevelt Brown's appointment to the Giants' scouting staff in 1971 signaled the beginning of yet another era in his outstanding career with the New York ball club. From 1953 through 1965, Rosey ranked as one of the all-time great offensive linemen in the National Football League, a big, fast, wide-ranging tackle, who earned All Pro honors six times, was selected to play in the Pro Bowl on eight occasions and, in 1956, was voted Lineman of the Year in the NFL. When a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966, Brown was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants, a post he held until 1969 when he became head line coach, replacing Jim Trimble. In 1971, Brown, along with another coaching aide, Ken Kavanaugh, left Alex Webster's staff to assume new responsibilities under Jim Lee Howell, his onetime coach, in the scouting department. Rosey, now 42, is a resident of Teaneck, N.J., but spends a good deal of his time on the road in search of fresh talent for the Giants.



FRANK (POP) IVY SCOUT

With the start of the 1972 NFL season, Frank (Pop) Ivy began his second tour of duty as a scout for the Giants. A veteran of head coaching assignments in three major professional leagues (the NFL, AFL and Canada), Ivy first joined the New York organization as defensive line coach in 1965. He held that post through the 1966 season and then left to head up scouting operations in the southwest. Coach Alex Webster talked Pop back into coaching in 1971 and he returned to New York from his home in Norman, Okla., to tutor the offensive line. Now, for the second time in his Giant career, the veteran football man is once again the club's chief talent hunter in the southwest. Ivy has a broad background in pro football. He was head coach of the Edmonton Eskimos in Canada (1954-57), head coach of the Chicago Cardinals in the NFL (1958-61) and then head coach of the Houston Oilers of the AFL (1962-63). An All-American college player at the U. of Oklahoma, Pop saw NFL service as an end with the Pittsburgh Steelers and Chicago Cardinals.



ED KOLMAN SCOUT

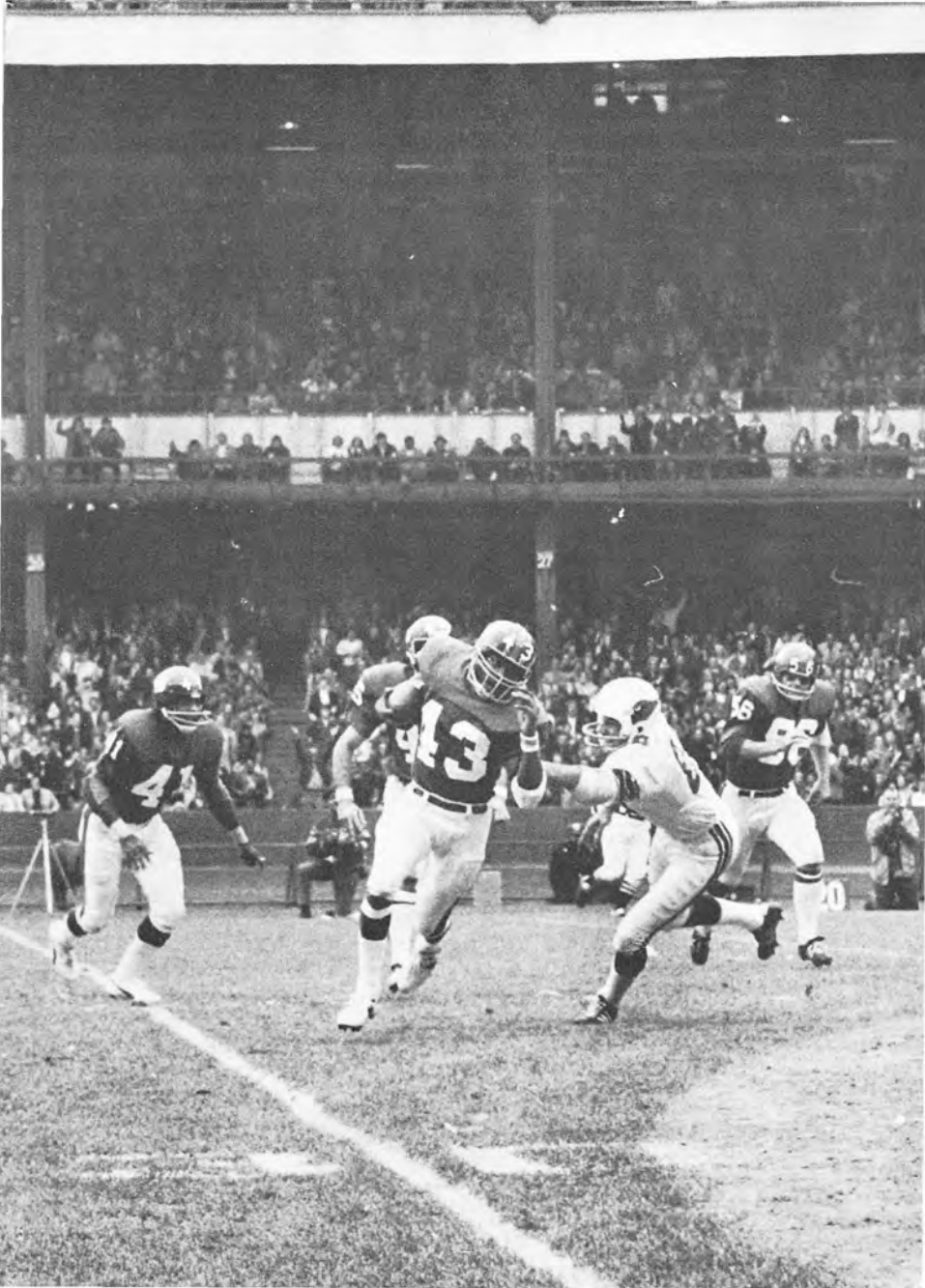
When big Ed Kolman, one of the National Football League's great all-time linemen, quit the coaching lines after the 1966 season it was only natural that he move into the scouting and personnel departments where his broad knowledge of the game and his knack of recognizing potential talent would be of continued help to the Giants. Also, he brought to the scouting staff a very necessary ingredient — a winning history, both as a player and as a coach. Kolman enjoyed a stellar career with the Chicago Bear powerhouses of the 1940s (along with fellow Giant scout Ken Kavanaugh) and was a starting tackle in four world championship games for the Monsters of the Midway (1940-41-42-46). Ed played the final year of his career (1949) with the Giants under Steve Owen and then became line coach in 1950, a position he held (with the exception of three years, 1957-59), until 1966. During that span of New York successes, the ex-Bear great had a hand in four more world title games (1956-61-62-63), giving him a total of eight in his NFL career. A native New Yorker, Kolman played high school ball at Stuyvesant and Boys' High and then won All-American honors at Temple U. from 1937-39.



HARRY BUFFINGTON SCOUT

During his 35-odd years in football, Harry Buffington has gained wide experience on virtually every level of the game, experience that he now brings to the Giants' scouting department. In his time, the Pryor, Okla., native has been player, coach, scout, recruiter and personnel expert. His professional playing experience includes one year with the Giants (1942) when he played running back, guard and linebacker; and three years with the Brooklyn Dodgers of the AAC (1946-48). As a collegian, Harry was an all-conference wingback and blocking back for three years at Oklahoma A&M. He received a Master's Degree in secondary school administration there in 1947. Buffington was head coach and athletic director at Austin College in Texas from 1951-54 and from 1955-62 was defensive coach at Oklahoma State. He filled the same role at Texas Tech in 1963 and then coached the defense for the Edmonton Eskimos in Canada (1964-65). Since 1966, Harry has been an area scout with CEPO.

TOM BLANCHARD Punter-Quarterback
 Oregon 6-0 190 24

3rd Year
 Grants Pass, Ore.

PRO: Blanchard was the Giants' No. 12 draft pick for 1971 and had a fine rookie campaign as the club's punter. He finished with a 40.6 average on 66 punts to rank No. 6 in the NFC and was named as the punter on the NFC's All-Rookie team. He also completed the only pass he attempted off a fake punt and served as the No. 3 quarterback, although he did not get any playing time in at QB in 1971. In 1972, Tom upped his punting average to a fine 42.7 and rushed one time for 17 yards on a fake punt situation.

SCHOOL: Tom had a fine career at Oregon, winning three letters as quarterback and punter. He was captain his senior season, despite the fact he sat out a good deal of that year with a knee injury. He holds the college record for most TD passes in a game (4) and the all-time college punting average (41.7). His best game was against Army when he completed 22 of 32 passes for 262 yards.

PERSONAL: Thomas R. Blanchard was born on May 28, 1949, in Grants Pass, Ore., and starred at Grants Pass High School. He's married to the former Pam Manchel, still lives in Grants Pass and aspires to a career in teaching when his playing days are concluded.

OTTO BROWN Defensive Back 5th Year
Prairie View 6-1 188 26 Tallahassee, Fla.

PRO: The Giants acquired Brown as a free agent prior to the 1970 season after he was released by the Dallas Cowboys, with whom he had played as a rookie in 1969. Otto spent his first Giant season as a reserve, seeing some duty at free safety, and in 1971 he played both safety and cornerback. Last year, he was again a reserve and had one interception against Cincinnati. He is rated one of the best in the secondary at man-to-man pass coverage and is also an aggressive tackler.

SCHOOL: Otto earned two letters at Prairie View College in football as a running back and as a defensive cornerback; he also served as a punt return specialist for coach Hoover Wright. Brown won the Thomas Burton Award for the Prairie View athlete with the highest academic average in the sciences. He was a pre-med student.

PERSONAL: Otto Brown was born on January 12, 1947, in Tallahassee, Fla., and grew up there, starring in high school as a football and baseball man. A bachelor, Otto still lives in Tallahassee, where he is continuing his education in the off-season.

CARTER CAMPBELL Defensive End 4th Year
Weber State 6-4 248 26 Rockaway, N.J.

PRO: Giants obtained Campbell via waivers from the Denver Broncos just prior to the opening of the regular season in 1972 and he proved to be a valuable member of the special teams as well as a reserve linebacker. He had one key fumble recovery and one quarterback sack during his playing time, while doing a fine job on the special teams. Plans call for him to get a look at defensive end in 1973. Campbell was a No. 8 draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers in 1970, then went to the Broncos for the 1971 season where he appeared in all 14 games for the Broncos.

SCHOOL: Carter was a Junior College All-American at Treasure Valley C.C. in Oregon before winning two letters at Weber State as a defensive tackle. He was named to the Coaches' All-American team his senior season, and also lettered in track as a high hurdler.

PERSONAL: Carter Campbell was born on September 29, 1947 in Mobile, Ala., and starred at Vanden High School in California prior to entering junior college. His father was a career NCO in the U.S. Air Force. Carter designs his own clothes, has coached during off-season at East Stroudsburg St. College and is an accomplished congo drummer.

VIN CLEMENTS Running Back 2nd Year
Connecticut 6-3 210 24 Southington, Conn.

PRO: Clements came to the Giants as part of the Fran Tarkenton trade to the Minnesota Vikings after being a No. 4 draft choice of the Vikings in 1971. He started the regular season on the taxi squad, was activated late in the season and showed power and speed when he got his chance to play. He had 221 yards rushing in 46 carries for a fine 4.8 average, and rushed for 105 yards against the Dallas Cowboys in the season finale. Clements also caught 9 passes for another 118 yards, showed that he could block and now certainly looms as a challenger to Charlie Evans for the starting fullback spot in 1973.

SCHOOL: Vin was an All-East selection at Connecticut where he set marks in rushing with 2,327 yards, despite missing time with a knee injury which required surgery. He had 1,060 yards rushing in his junior year and also punted for a 40.0 average. Also received a letter in track.

PERSONAL: Vincent-Anthony Clements was born on January 4, 1949 in Southington, Conn., was an all-around athlete at Southington, H.S. before heading to college. He's married to the former Susan Benjamin of New Britain and lists chess and golf as his hobbies.

LINZY COLE	Wide Receiver	4th Year
T.C.U.	5-11 170 25	Houston, Tex.

PRO: Giants acquired Cole as a free agent on waivers during the off-season from the Buffalo Bills where he was used primarily as a return man. Linzy finished as the 7th ranked AFC kickoff return man with a 25.3 average on 18 returns, and also averaged 5.0 yards on punt returns. Originally a No. 9 draft choice of the Chicago Bears, he went to the Houston Oilers for the 1971 season where he had 32 kickoff returns for a fine 26.1 average to rank 2nd in the AFC that year.

SCHOOL: Cole was the first black athlete ever to play for Texas Christian after starring in high school football in Dallas, his hometown. He had 53 receptions for 839 yards as a wide receiver in college and also did the punt return and kickoff return work as well.

PERSONAL: Linzy was born on April 21, 1948 in Dallas, and attended schools in that city where he excelled in football, basketball and track. He's single and resides in Houston during the off-season.

CHUCK CRIST	Defensive Back	2nd Year
Penn State	6-2 205 22	Great Valley, N.Y.

PRO: Chuck was signed as a free agent last year by the Giants and turned out to be an outstanding performer with unlimited potential. The rugged Crist had played only basketball at Penn State where he was team captain, but got a tryout with the Giants through a recommendation by Penn State basketball coach Johnny Bach. Chuck was used primarily on all of the special teams where he excelled in all phases, showing improvement each and every week. He also got in some playing time at strong safety and had one interception and one key fumble recovery, and has to be rated as a strong contender for starting status in 1973.

SCHOOL: Crist won three varsity letters in basketball at Penn State where he was a fine all-around player and top rebounder, despite his relative lack of size for a rebounder. He also had one season with the Penn State track team. A major in Physical Education, he plans on a coaching career in the future.

PERSONAL: Charles Thomas Crist was born on January 16, 1951 in Salamanca, N.Y. and was an all-around star at Salamanca High School, playing quarterback in football. He's married to the former Patti Lou France of Salamanca and has a 2-year old son, Scott.

JOHN DOUGLAS Linebacker 4th Year
U. of Missouri 6-2 225 27 Garland, Tex.

PRO: Douglas was originally a No. 4 draft choice of the Dallas Cowboys in 1968 but his rookie season was interrupted when he was called up by the Army Reserves. He served two years, including a stretch in Viet Nam (where he was wounded), and returned for another try with Dallas in 1970. This time, however, he was cut, whereupon the Giants claimed him via waivers as a free agent. John saw considerable duty on the special teams that year, in addition to some reserve action at linebacker, and in 1971 he became the club's starting left linebacker. Last year, he was a reserve again, had one interception and a big day in a win over the St. Louis Cardinals.

SCHOOL: John played two seasons of varsity football at the U. of Missouri, winning unanimous All-Big-Eight honors at linebacker as a senior. He co-captained the Tigers in his final year and was selected to play in the Senior Bowl and North-South games, where he made quite an impression on the Dallas scouts.

PERSONAL: John Douglas was born on September 6, 1945, in Columbiana, Mo., where he grew up and starred in high school sports. John was married in 1970 and now makes his permanent home in Dallas, Tex.

MARK ELLISON Guard 2nd Year
Dayton 6-2 250 25 Pittsburgh, Pa.

PRO: Mark was the Giants' No. 11 pick in 1971, but opted for the Canadian Football League that season and played with Toronto. He became a free agent last year and the Giants signed him for 1972. Mark proved to be a tough and steady performer as a reserve guard and a good hitter and blocker on the special teams. He is extremely adept at pulling to lead the sweeps and has fine potential.

SCHOOL: Ellison was captain at Dayton in his senior year and doubled as both an offensive guard and as a fullback on occasions. His work at fullback was usually as a blocker, but he won conference honors as an offensive lineman.

PERSONAL: Mark Ellison was born on April 15, 1948 in Pittsburgh, Pa., was a stand-out performer at Westinghouse H.S. in his home city, and still resides in Pittsburgh during the off-seasons.

DICK ENDERLE Guard 5th Year
Minnesota 6-2 250 25 Minneapolis, Minn.

PRO: Enderle came to the Giants in a trade for a No. 6 draft choice with the Atlanta Falcons prior to the 1972 season and won a starting role at left guard. He turned in an outstanding season for a much improved offensive line that allowed only 10 sackings of Giant passers. Dick was a No. 7 draft choice of the Falcons in 1969 and spent three seasons with Atlanta. He was a starting left guard his rookie year, then moved to right guard his second campaign and again was a regular. During 1971, he started most of the games at left guard.

SCHOOL: Dick won three letters in both football and wrestling at Minnesota and was picked for the All-Big 10 team in football his senior year. He also played in the East-West game after his senior campaign.

PERSONAL: Richard Allyn Enderle was born on November 6, 1947, in Breckenridge, Minn., and graduated from Elbow Lake High School where he was All-State in football as well as the State wrestling champion his senior year. Single, he now resides in Minneapolis during the off season.

CHARLIE EVANS **Running Back** **3rd Year**
U.S.C. **6-1 220 25** **Rockaway, N.J.**

PRO: Evans has had hard luck during his two seasons with the Giants, suffering broken legs in each of those two campaigns after he had won a starting role at fullback each season. A No. 14 draft choice, he had 171 yards rushing and scored five TDs in 1971 before breaking a leg, then last year, he had 317 yards for a 3.5 average and five more TDs when he broke his leg again halfway through the season. He also had 26 receptions in those seven games before being sidelined. He has twice scored three TDs in one game—against San Diego in 1971 and New Orleans in 1972. Evans is a strong runner, outstanding blocker and tough competitor and is now recovered from his leg problems.

SCHOOL: Charlie lettered for two seasons at U.S.C. after beginning his collegiate career at Utah. At U.S.C., he was primarily a blocking back and had only 117 carries for 479 yards in his two campaigns.

PERSONAL: Charles Evans was born on January 10, 1948 in Gardena, Calif., and starred at Gardena High School before heading to Utah. He's a newlywed, having been married on St. Patrick's Day, 1973, worked as a speaker on the Giants' Speaker's Bureau during the off season and now lives in Rockaway, N.J.

JIM FILES **Linebacker** **4th Year**
U. of Oklahoma **6-4 240 25** **Fort Smith, Ark.**

PRO: Files was the Giants' No. 1 draft choice for the 1970 season and won the middle linebacking job as a rookie. He performed so well that first campaign that he received considerable backing in the NFL Rookie of the Year balloting. Ex-Giant great Sam Huff (then a coach with Washington) called him "...the best rookie linebacker I've seen in a long time." With the emergence of rookie Ron Hornsby as a middle linebacking candidate in 1971, however, Files was switched to the outside (where, incidentally, the Giants planned to use him when they originally drafted him). The theory behind the switch was that Files, with his greater speed and range, could handle pass coverage responsibilities on the outside better than the rookie Hornsby, who had never played anywhere but in the middle. Jim played all of 1972 at outside linebacker, had another fine year and picked off two interceptions, running one of them back 37 yards for ATD against Denver. Now, the plan for 1973 is to move the rangy, versatile Files back into the middle linebacking slot.

SCHOOL: Files played defensive end at the U. of Oklahoma in 1967-68 but was moved to the monster linebacking spot as a senior in 1969. He was co-captain of the Sooners and earned second team All-Big-Eight honors as Oklahoma's best pass rusher. A quarterback at Southside High School in his hometown of Fort Smith, Ark., for two years, Jim, oddly enough, began his freshman career at Oklahoma as a split end. It wasn't long, however, before Sooner coaches saw his potential as a great defensive player.

PERSONAL: James Dales Files was born on January 16, 1948, in Paris, Ark., where his father is parts manager of an auto agency. As a high school athlete, Jim says he was better at basketball and track than he was in football. In fact, he received just one football scholarship offer—from the U. of Oklahoma. SCHOOL: Tom was an All-American at Notre Dame as well as making the Dean's List every semester as an Economics and Sociology major. He was also an NCAA Scholarship winner and a National Football Foundation Scholarship winner. He had 159 catches in

Dan spent a year on Cardinals' taxi squad then was sold to Detroit where he spent two seasons. Also spent some time with Baltimore Colts before signing as free agent with Saints. SCHOOL: Goich was a fine player and outstanding student at the University of California, earning two varsity letters in football after transferring from Coalinga Junior College. PRO: Giants obtained Gregory from the Cleveland Browns just before training camp last year after Jack had played out his option, with No. 1 draft choice going to Cleveland. That proved to be one of the finest acquisitions in years for the Giants as Gregory had an outstanding year and added much-needed sinew to the Giants' front four. Gregory led the NFL in sacking opposing passers, getting to the quarterback 21 times by himself—three more than the entire Giant team did in 1971. For his superb play, Gregory was a first-team All-NFL selection and was named to the Pro Bowl. Jack was a No. 9 choice of the Browns as a future in 1965 and spent four seasons as a starter with the Browns, getting a second-team All-AFC berth in 1970 and a trip to the Pro Bowl that season also. Big, very strong and always aggressive, Gregory ranks among the top pass rushers in the NFL and provides solid leadership for the Giants' defensive unit.

SCHOOL: Jack began his collegiate career at Chattanooga University, winning letters as both defensive tackle and end, then transferred to Delta State where he also lettered and starred on both offense and defense.

Originally a No. 2 draft choice of the Vikings, Bob had his best season in 1971, grabbing 45 passes for 691 yards and seven touchdowns and being named to the Pro Bowl where he caught another TD pass for the NCF team. He had a big day against Giants, catching winning 55-yard TD pass from Norm Snead in 17-10 win and setting up first Vike TD with a 56-yard run on a flanker reverse. Bob also doubled as a punt and kickoff return man with Minnesota, showing 34 punt returns for 159 yards and a 4.6 average and 22 kickoffs for 493 yards and a 22.4 average during five seasons in Minnesota. He saw only limited action with the Giants in '72 after reporting late to camp, with 5 catches for 67 yards and one TD, plus seven punt returns and 14 fair catches. Should be ready now to make big bid to regain starting status.

SCHOOL: Three-year letterman at Oregon State, Grim was both a running back and wide receiver and also played some defensive back. He was named MVP in the Senior Bowl after his final season and also was chosen to play in the College All-Star game of 1967.

PERSONAL: Robert Lee Grim was born on May 8, 1945, in Oakland, Calif., and starred at Red Bluff H.S. in Red Bluff, Calif. Bob is married and he and his wife, Kathy, have one daughter. They now reside in Willamette, Ore., during the off-seasons.

PRO: The Giants' No. 3 draft choice for 1971, Hornsby stepped into a starting role at middle linebacker and was outstanding in his rookie year, being named to the NFC's All-Rookie team. A sure and deadly tackler, he improved with each game and has vast potential at middle linebacker. He had a big game in the 21-17 victory over Atlanta, making nine solo tackles and assisting on five others and also sacked the passer for a seven-yard loss. Last year, he continued his hard hitting work as the starting MLB on an improved defensive team.

SCHOOL: Hornsby earned four letters at Southeast Louisiana and was selected all-conference three years in succession. He was twice the MVP on defense in the conference, captain of the team his senior year and was named to the Kodak All-American team. Line coach Ray Wietecha was duly impressed by Hill's rookie year and feels that John has exceptional potential at tackle.

SCHOOL: John was a standout at Lehigh in football and track, winning not only All-East honors in football but College Division All-American honors as well. Team captain, he also was selected for the East-West Shrine game. He also earned three letters in track as a shot-put and discus man and won the Middle Atlantic Conference championship twice in the shot-put with throws of 57'3" and 60'2", as well as hurling the discus 158'5".

PERSONAL: John Stark Hill was born on April 16, 1950 in East Orange, N.J. and was an all-around star at Franklin H.S. in Somerset, N.J. John's dad, Otto Hill, is Business Manager of Athletics at Rutgers. Hill is a bachelor, resides in Fort Lee, lists crossword puzzles as a favorite hobby and was in the export-import business during the off-season with teammate Bob Hyland.

RICHARD HOUSTON Wide Receiver 5th Year
E. Texas State 6-2 197 27 Newark, N.J.

PRO: Houston was the Giants' No. 4 draft choice for 1969, spent two seasons learning the ropes as a reserve pass catcher and kick return specialist and, in 1971, finally earned himself starting status as a wide receiver. With 9.7 speed and a yardage-eating stride, Dick has the credentials needed to become a genuine long-bomb threat but thus far costly dropped passes have delayed his development. In 1971, he caught 24 for 426 yards (a 17.8 average) and four touchdowns. Last year, Rich improved his totals with 27 catches for 468 yards and three TDs, including a 94-yard bomb vs. Dallas, second longest in club history.

SCHOOL: Richard starred for two years at East Texas State, setting a school record with a 79 yard TD reception, and then left college to serve for a year with the Army in Vietnam. He returned in 1968 to finish his collegiate career and impressed pro scouts with his speed and range.

PERSONAL: Richard Houston was born on November 16, 1945, in Texarkana, Tex., and played football and basketball at Dunbar High School. An only child, he is still a bachelor. He resides in Newark, N.J., and works for the Consolidated Capital Corp. Rich also makes frequent appearances as a member of the Giants' off-season speakers' bureau.

PAT HUGHES Linebacker 4th Year
Boston U. 6-2 240 26 Colonia, N.J.

PRO: Originally drafted No. 9 as a center in 1970, Pat Hughes was a reserve behind veteran Greg Larson as a rookie and then, in 1971, was shifted to outside linebacker, where he turned in several fine late-season performances. Last year, Pat won a starting job at outside LB and turned in an outstanding year, getting two pass interceptions and playing tough against the run. He also had one QB "sack" and recovered one enemy fumble.

SCHOOL: Pat was a genuine two-way performer at Boston U., playing both center and linebacker, but it was as a defensive specialist that he made the biggest impact on pro scouts. He co-captained Boston U., was the team's MVP on defense and earned All-East and All-New England honors in 1969.

PERSONAL: William Patrick Hughes was born on June 2, 1947, in Everett, Mass., into a family of three boys and one girl. As a college student majoring in education and biological science, he belonged to the Scarlet Key Honor Society and won the Harry Agganis Memorial Scholarship. Pat is married to the former Carole Ann Basino, and spends his off-season as one of the busiest and most popular members of the Giants' speakers' bureau.

BOB HYLAND **Guard-Center** **7th Year**
Boston College **6-5 255 28** **New Rochelle, N.Y.**

PRO: Hyland came to the Giants along with Bennie McRae in the trade with the Chicago Bears for New York's No. 1 draft choice and turned out to be a valuable asset. Bob appeared in all 14 games, logged 411 minutes playing time to lead the club in that category and was a solid blocker. He also snapped the ball on punts. In 1972, he was a key reserve at center and member of the special team unit. A No. 1 draft choice of the Green Bay Packers in 1967, Hyland played three years with the Packers, appearing in every game, including the 1968 Super Bowl. He was traded to Chicago for a No. 1 draft choice and started all 14 games at center for the Bears in 1970 prior to joining the Giants.

SCHOOL: An All-American at Boston College, Hyland was rated the top collegiate offensive lineman in 1966. He played in both the Senior Bowl and East-West games, was an honor student at B. C. and won letters in track (shot-put better than 53 feet) and in baseball. He clocked 10.1 in the 100!

PERSONAL: Robert Joseph Hyland was born on July 21, 1945, in White Plains, N.Y., and was an all-around high school star at Stepinac High School. He's a bachelor and resides in New Rochelle, N.Y. He's also now in the import business and owns a restaurant, The Single Wing in White Plains.

LARRY JACOBSON **Defensive Tackle** **2nd Year**
Nebraska **6-6 260 23** **Lincoln, Neb.**

PRO: Larry was one of the Giants' two picks in the first round of the 1972 draft after winning All-American honors and the Outland Trophy in his senior year at Nebraska. "Jake" came to the Giants' camp after the College All-Star game and won himself a starting spot at tackle as a rookie and turned in a superb season. He had six solo quarterback sacks, recovered one fumble and won a game ball for a particularly fine day against Denver. Big and strong, Larry is remarkably quick for a man of his size and impressed everyone with his pursuit abilities.

SCHOOL: Jacobson was a unanimous All-American selection at Nebraska in his senior year and in addition to winning the Outland Trophy was named the MVP Lineman in the country for 1971 by the Washington D.C. Touchdown Club. He starred in the Orange Bowl games of 1970 and 1971 and was also named to the Senior Bowl and the College All-Star units. An accounting major, he also won academic honors at Nebraska.

PERSONAL: Larry Paul Jacobson was born on December 10, 1949 in Sioux Falls, S.D. and was an All-State selection in both football and basketball at O'Gorman H.S. in Sioux Falls. He lists hunting as his favorite hobby and now lives in Lincoln, Neb. during the off-seasons.

RANDY JOHNSON

PRO: Johnson was a No. 1 draft pick of the expansionist Atlanta Falcons in 1966 after a brilliant career at Texas A&I. He was the Falcons starting quarterback until a knee injury (requiring surgery) sidelined him midway through the 1969 season. After that, he shared the quarterback spot with Bob Berry. Prior to the start of the 1971 season he came to the Giants in the trade that involved Dick Shiner. As a back-up man behind Fran Tarkenton, Randy saw only limited duty, completing 41 of 74 for 477 yards and three TDs. In the final game against Philadelphia, however, he completed 30 of 47 for 372 yards and three TDs. That performance got him into the Giants' record book; his 47 attempts were second only to Charlie Conerly's 53 tries in 1948, and his 30 completions were second to Conerly's 36, also in 1948. The 372 yards put him in the No. 2 spot behind Y.A. Tittle (505). Randy won the No. 1 job in training camp in 1972, then was injured against the Jets in pre-season, with Norm Snead taking over. Randy was hurt again in the regular season against Dallas, and saw only limited action the rest of the way. Now solid again, he's contending for the No. 1 job again vs. Snead.

SCHOOL: Randy earned Little All-American honors at Texas A&I with a career mark of 349 completions in 673 attempts for 4,600 yards and 35 TDs. His rushing yardage gave him a total offense of 5,428 yards. He was named MVP in no less than three post-season games—the Blue-Gray, the Senior Bowl and the Coaches' All-America. In addition to football, Johnson played baseball at Texas A&I and was No. 1 man on the golf team.

PERSONAL: Randolph Klaus Johnson was born on June 17, 1944, in San Antonio, Tex., of Irish-German parents. He married a former Texas A&I cheerleader, Penny Ann Johnson, and they now have two daughters, Ashley Ann, 3, and Jennifer, 1. Randy, who makes his permanent home in Atlanta, studied English and journalism in college and was a top student. He is an avid golfer with a 2 handicap, and he also digs music and gin rummy.

RON JOHNSON Running Back 5th Year
 Michigan 6-1 205 25 Fort Lee, N.J.

PRO: In his career with the Giants, Ron has proven himself to be one of the foremost running backs in the NFL. Last year, he broke his own club one-season rushing mark by gaining 1,182 yards, winning Pro Bowl honors as well as All-NFC mention as well. Ron also caught 45 passes for 451 yards, scored 14 touchdowns to lead the NFC in TDs scored, and set an alltime Giant record with four touchdowns in one game (against Philadelphia.) Also set an alltime NFL combined attempts record in one game for a combined attempt total of 41. Ron's 298 rushing attempts was also a new Giant club record for one season. Ron had a superb comeback from 1971 when he appeared in only two games due to thigh and knee injuries after coming from Cleveland in a key 1970 trade with Jim Kanicki and Wayne Meylan for Homer Jones. In 1970, Ron rushed for 1,027 yards and also made All-Pro and the Pro Bowl, so that in his two full seasons with the Giants, he has been a 1,000-yard plus rusher, All-Pro and Pro Bowler.

SCHOOL: Ron was an All-American at Michigan and set several records there, including 2,440 yards rushing in his career to erase the former mark of Tommy Harmon. He set an NCAA one-game record with 347 yards rushing vs. Wisconsin, was the Big Ten MVP in 1968 and Michigan's MVP in both 1967 and 1968. He was Cleveland's No. 1 draft choice for the 1969 season.

PERSONAL: Ronald A. Johnson was born on October 17, 1947 in Detroit, Mich., and was an all-around high school star in the Motor City. He earned a B.S. degree in business administration at Michigan and has worked in finance and banking during off seasons. Ron's older brother Alex is an outfielder with the Texas Rangers in the American League and a former AL batting champion in 1970. Ron is married to the former Karen Lyons and resides in Fort Lee, N.J.

GREG LARSON Center 13th Year
U. of Minnesota 6-3 250 33 Minneapolis, Minn.

PRO: Larson, the dean of Giant offensive linemen, was the club's No. 6 draft choice for the 1961 season and, over the ensuing years, has established himself as one of the most talented and respected players at his position. Greg played three different positions (all as a starter) in his first three pro campaigns—tackle in 1961, guard in 1962 and center, his natural position, in 1963. The following year he suffered a serious knee injury, one that threatened to end his career, but Greg overcame this adversity (a knee completely rebuilt on the operating table) and today, at age 32, is still one of the game's premier centers, an excellent blocker, a shrewd offensive diagnostician and, more important to the Giants, an acknowledged team leader. In 1968, Larson was named to his first Pro Bowl squad.

SCHOOL: Greg was center and captain (and sometimes linebacker) of the 1961 U. of Minnesota eleven that went to the Rose Bowl. Although he was an AP and UPI All-Big Ten selection and a Catholic All-America nominee, he was generally overlooked by the professional scouts, many of whom did not think he was "tough enough" to play in the NFL.

PERSONAL: Gregory Kenneth Larson was born on November 15, 1939, in Minneapolis, Minn., which is still his permanent home. He received a degree in business administration at the U. of Minnesota and is presently employed by a stock brokerage firm in Minneapolis. He is married to the former Josephine Blegen and they have four children, Karin, 11; Barton, 9; Michael, 6; and Christopher, 5. Larson is of Swedish descent.

CARL LOCKHART Defensive Back 9th Year
N. Texas State 6-2 175 29 New York City

PRO: Lockhart was the Giants' No. 13 draft pick in 1965 in a bumper crop of rookies that included Tucker Frederickson, Ernie Koy, Chuck Mercein and Willie Williams. Today—despite his size, or lack of it—Spider ranks as one of the premier free safeties in all of pro football, an aggressive, intelligent, instinctive ballhawk with lightning reflexes and an uncanny ability to out-guess rival quarterbacks. Over the years, he has proven almost indestructible in head-on collisions with the mammoth NFL running backs and tight ends. Spider (defensive backfield coach Em Tunnell hung that nickname on him as a rookie because "...he was all over those guys, like a spider.") is co-captain of the Giants and is recognized as one of the team leaders, on and off the gridiron. He now has 36 career interceptions, which ranks him third in club records behind Emlen Tunnell and the late Jimmy Patton.

SCHOOL: Spider was a regular for three seasons at N. Texas State, playing defensive back and flanker. He carried 60 times for 237 yards, caught 32 passes for 384 yards and four touchdowns, intercepted 10 passes and punted 95 times for a near 40-yard average. In 1963-64, he led the Missouri Valley Conference in punting and received honorable mention on several All-America teams. He also played baseball at N. Texas State and was a hurdler on the track squad.

PERSONAL: Carl Lockhart was born on April 6, 1943, in Dallas, Tex., into a family of seven children. For the past several years, the veteran defensive back has made New York City his year-round home. Spider is married to the former Erma Jean Havis and they have a son, Carl, Jr., age 4. One of the most popular members of the Giants, Carl is kept busy in the off-season with personal appearances. He also represents Bache & Co. and has some business interests of his own.

PRO: Giants picked up this veteran defensive back and return specialist as a free agent during the off-season. Mallory was a No. 10 draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1968, played a year with the Eagles and was then traded to Atlanta where he played three seasons. Atlanta dealt him to New Orleans, and the Giants signed John as a free agent after his release by the Saints. He was among the NFC leaders in punt returns in 1970 with 17 for 203 yards and an 11.9 average, including one 75-yard return for a TD. He also scored TDs for the Falcons on 17 and 54-yard fumble recoveries and had two interceptions for 31 yards in his three campaigns there. Once caught a 58-yard TD pass for the Eagles off a fake punt.

SCHOOL: Mallory was twice named to the All-Southern Conference team at West Virginia where he was a fine defensive halfback. In three seasons, he collected 1,044 yards on punt returns alone. In 1967, he was West Virginia's MVP.

PERSONAL: John was born on July 24, 1946 in Summit, N.J. and starred at Summit High School. He and his wife Marybeth have a son Scott, 3 and Mallory works for the Bell Telephone Co. in Personnel Administration in Murray Hill, N.J. The Mallorys still reside in Summit.

JOE ORDUNA **Running Back** **2nd Year**
 Nebraska **6-0 195 24** **Omaha, Neb.**

PRO: Giants obtained Orduna on waivers from San Francisco prior to regular season in 1972. Joe had been a No. 2 draft choice of the 49ers in 1971, but sat out season with injuries. Proved to be a valuable reserve for Giants last year, rushing 36 times for 129 yards. Also caught four passes, returned 12 kickoffs for 244 yards and scored two touchdowns overall. Played mostly at fullback for Giants when Charlie Evans was hurt, but will concentrate on halfback this season.

SCHOOL: Joe was an outstanding performer at Nebraska, leading the club in rushing in 1970 with 834 yards and 14 touchdowns. Rushed for 1,958 yards and scored 28 TDs during three seasons with Cornhuskers and was named MVP in 1971 Coaches' All-America Game. Joe also won three letters in track at Nebraska as a hurdler.

PERSONAL: Joseph Manual Orduna (pronounced Or-DUNE-ya) was born on November 6, 1948 in Omaha and starred at Central High School there where he was a three-letterman in football and in track. He was a state champion high hurdler and long jumper and was the National Junior Olympic champion in the triple jump. Also won three letters in wrestling! Joe and his wife Valerie Jean still live in Omaha and Orduna has continued his work towards a degree in zoology during off-seasons.

HENRY REED **Defensive End** **3rd Year**
 Weber State **6-3 230 25** **Detroit, Mich.**

PRO: Henry was the Giants' 10th round draft pick for 1971 and, after getting brief looks as a running back and linebacker, settled into playing defensive end and won a starting job in his rookie season. Henry turned in an impressive job at left end, showing fine speed, pursuit and agility despite his relative lack of size. Reed also proved to be a valuable man on special teams. He had two solo sacks on enemy passers and also had one pass interception for an 11-yard return. Last year, Reed was even better, getting nine sacks of the passer to rank right behind Jack Gregory. He may get a try at linebacker in 1973.

SCHOOL: Reed was both a fullback and linebacker at Weber State where he was clocked at 4.7 for the 40-yard dash. He was all-conference for two years, was selected to play in the East-West Shrine game and won All-American honors in the Coaches' College Division poll. Prior to entering Weber State, Reed was an All-American at Iowa Central Junior College.

PERSONAL: Henry Elax Reed, Jr., was born on January 15, 1948, in Detroit, Mich., and sparkled in sports at Northwestern High School. He's single, a jazz buff and still resides in Detroit during the off-season.

ELDRIDGE SMALL	Defensive Back	2nd Year
Texas A&I	6-1 190 24	Houston, Tex.

PRO: Small was one of the Giants' two choices in the first round of the 1972 draft and was tried at both wide receiver and defensive back during his rookie season. He eventually settled into a reserve role as a cornerback and will be working at that position in 1973. Eldridge also did duty with the special teams as he appeared in all 14 games and had his big moment against the Redskins in Washington when he took a lateral on a kickoff return and raced 77 yards with it.

SCHOOL: Eldridge was a three-year starter at Texas A&I playing both wide receiver and defensive back. He had 167 receptions for 2,547 yards and 20 touchdowns as a receiver and five interceptions as a defensive back and was named to the Associated Press Little All-American team and the Coaches' All-American team in his senior year. He also played in the Senior Bowl on both offense and defense.

PERSONAL: Eldridge Small was born on August 2, 1949 in Houston, Tex., and was a three-spot standout in football, basketball and track at Wheatley High School. He still makes Houston his off-season residence.

NORM SNEAD	Quarterback	13th Year

PRO: Giants got Snead in the Fran Tarkenton trade to Minnesota, along with four other players, and the veteran QB responded by winning the NFL passing championship in 1972, leading the Giants to an 8-6 record, a Pro Bowl spot for himself and an alltime Giant club record with a 60.3 passing percentage!! Norm also was sacked only eight times all year—the lowest total for any regular quarterback in the entire NFL. Snead was originally a No. 1 draft choice of the Washington Redskins in 1961 and spent three seasons as the 'Skins regular quarterback before being traded to the Philadelphia Eagles for Sonny Jurgensen in 1964. Norm was the Eagles' No. 1 man for seven years until dealt to the Vikings in 1971 prior to coming to the Giants. Snead's trip to the Pro Bowl this year was his third.

SCHOOL: Norm was an All-American quarterback at Wake Forest from 1958-1960, team MVP two seasons, team captain and played in the Senior Bowl, Blue-Gray Game, College All-Star game and Coaches' All-American games, winning MVP honors in the Senior Bowl game. He also played freshman basketball.

PERSONAL: Norman Bailey Snead was born on July 31, 1939 in Halifax County, Va., starred at Warwick High School in Newport News, Va. He's married to the former Susie McGahey of North Carolina and has five children—Sheron, 10; Janie, 6; Jeff, 5; Joey, 4; and Cindy, 2.

JOE TAFFONI Tackle 6th Year
Tennessee-Martin 6-3 255 28 Euclid, Ohio

PRO: Taffoni came to the Giants in a trade with the Los Angeles Rams for Dick Buzin during the 1971 pre-season, but elected to retire after joining the Giants briefly. Joe returned in 1972 and promptly won a starting job at RT and was a power-house player on a greatly improved line which led the NFL in allowing fewest QB sacks with 10. Very quick and strong, his man never once got to the Giant passer in 1972. A No. 4 draft choice of Cleveland in 1967, he was a reserve for three seasons, then won the starting right tackle job in 1970. He was traded to Los Angeles early in 1971 and was a starter during pre-season action before being sent to the Giants.

SCHOOL: Joe began his collegiate career at West Virginia University, where he was a standout defensive tackle, then transferred to Tennessee-Martin where he attracted the pro scouts with his hard-nosed defensive play.

PERSONAL: Joseph Taffoni was born on March 27, 1945, in Brownsville, Pa., and starred at Carmichael Area High School there. An outstanding baseball player, he had several major league baseball offers before deciding to play pro football instead. He is married to the former Susan Gilbert and they reside in Euclid, Ohio.

ROCKY THOMPSON Running Back 3rd Year
West Texas State 5-11 200 25 Spice Hill, Bermuda

PRO: The Giants' No. 1 draft choice for 1971, Rocky proved to be a versatile player, accounting for 1,209 yards of offense. Most of that came on kickoff returns as Rocky chalked up 947 yards on 36 returns for a 26.3 average to rank seventh in the NFC. One went for 93 yards and a TD against St. Louis. He also rushed for 177 yards on 54 carries for a 3.3 average and one touchdown, and caught 16 passes for 85 yards. Last year, the Rock had another dazzling season in returns, showing a 28.3 average, including a 92-yard TD against the Lions and a 75-yarder to set up a score vs. San Francisco. He should also be getting a longer look at running back in 1973.

SCHOOL: Thompson was a standout track and football star at West Texas State, clocking 9.2 in the 100. He also won the British Empire 100-meter championship with a 10.1 clocking. In football, he rushed for 848 yards, a 4.8 average, and scored 12 TDs in his senior year. Thompson was named to play in the Senior Bowl, where he scored another TD.

PERSONAL: Ralph Gary Symonds-Thompson was born on November 18, 1947, in Paget, Bermuda, and attended high school in Chicago, Ill., and in Yokohama, Japan, traveling with his father who was in the U.S. Air Force. Rocky is married and still makes his home in his native Bermuda during the off season.

DAVE TIPTON	Defensive End	3rd Year
Stanford	6-6 240 24	Hollister, Calif.

PRO: Dave was the Giants' No. 4 draft pick in 1971, but before he had a chance to report to training camp he suffered a knee injury in the Coaches' All-American game and underwent surgery. He recovered sufficiently to get activated late in the season and turned in some fine efforts as a reserve defensive end. His weight had dropped to 215 after the operation but he was back up to 240 at season's end. He's got fine potential. In 1972, Dave saw limited duty at defensive end, but was a key man on the special team units.

SCHOOL: Tipton was a defensive tackle at Stanford for two seasons after transferring from Gavilan Junior College and won All-Coast, All-Pacific Eight and second team All-American honors in his senior year. He starred in the Rose Bowl win over Ohio State and also was selected to play in the All-American Bowl in Tampa, Fla.

PERSONAL: David Lance Tipton was born on April 23, 1949, in Hollister, Calif., and was a fine all-around athlete at San Benito H.S. in that town. He's a bachelor and still resides in his hometown.

BOB TUCKER	Tight End	4th Year
Bloomsburg State	6-3 230 28	Lincroft, N.J.

PRO: The Giants signed Tucker as a free agent in 1970 and he immediately beat out Aaron Thomas as the starting tight end. Bob caught 40 passes for 571 yards and five TDs that year and came very close to winning the NFL's Rookie of the Year award. In 1971, he became the first tight end in NFL history to take a receiving title when he caught 59 for 791 and four TDs. Additionally, he was the first Giant end to earn an individual title since 1935, when Tod Goodwin led the league. Tucker came back with another great season in 1972, winning All-NFL honors for the first time, grabbing 55 passes for 764 yards. He also now has the club mark of catching passes in 38 consecutive games. He also rushed 13 yards for a touchdown vs. Denver. Big, strong, a great runner, Bob is also the new player rep on the Giants. Prior to joining New York, Bob had trials with the Eagles and Patriots and spent two seasons in the minor leagues with Lowell, Mass., and Pottstown, Pa.

SCHOOL: Tucker set three NAIA records with Bloomsburg State in 1967—most receptions, highest single game yardage and most yardage in a season. As a two-way end he was named to the Little All-America team in 1967 but, strangely, no pro club took him in the draft.

PERSONAL: Robert Tucker was born on June 8, 1945, in Hazelton, Pa., and is of Tyrolean-Polish descent. His father is a construction foreman in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., his brother Tom is an engineer and a younger brother, Henry, is a student at Bloomsburg. Bob is married to the former Lorraine Marie Zack of Trenton, N.J., and they have one son, Robert, Jr. Bob was a top student in college and earned a degree in biology. He represents Walsh & Walsh Insurance Co. in between football seasons.

PRO: Van Horn was Detroit's No. 4 draft selection for 1966, spent one year in the Army (1967) and then rejoined the Lions in 1968, only to be released in training camp. The Giants claimed Doug and assigned him to their minor league eleven for the rest of that year. Doug was brought up in 1969 and has been a regular ever since. "Reggie", as his teammates call him, rates as one of the top guards in the NFL and had an outstanding year in 1972 as a leader of one of the most outstanding offensive lines in the NFL, a line which helped the Giants finish No. 1 in offense in the NFC.

SCHOOL: Van Horn had an outstanding career at Ohio State, where he was regarded as one of the top linemen in the Big Ten. He was named to the AP, UPI and Coaches' All-America teams in 1965.

PERSONAL: Douglas Van Horn, a redhead, was born on June 25, 1944, in Sedalia, O. He majored in marketing at Ohio State. Doug is married to the former Connie Wilson and they have a 3-year-old daughter, Heather. Van Horn served six months in the Army reserve in 1967. He now works as a stockbroker with Stone-Webster in the off-season. Doug had knee surgery after the 1971 NFL season but is expected to have a full recovery.

WAYNE WALTON **Guard** **2nd Year**
Abilene Christian **6-5 245 23** **Abilene, Tex.**

PRO: Wayne was the Giants' No. 2 draft choice for 1971. He appeared in all 14 games as a rookie reserve offensive guard, and became a starter late in the season when Doug Van Horn suffered a knee injury. Big and strong, Walton improved each week and seems to have fine potential as either a guard or tackle. He spent the 1972 season as a member of the taxi squad.

SCHOOL: Walton won four varsity letters in football and in track at Abilene Christian. He was named to the All-Southland Conference team in football and honorable mention All-American. In track, he was a discus thrower and set the college mark of 180' 10½" in his senior year.

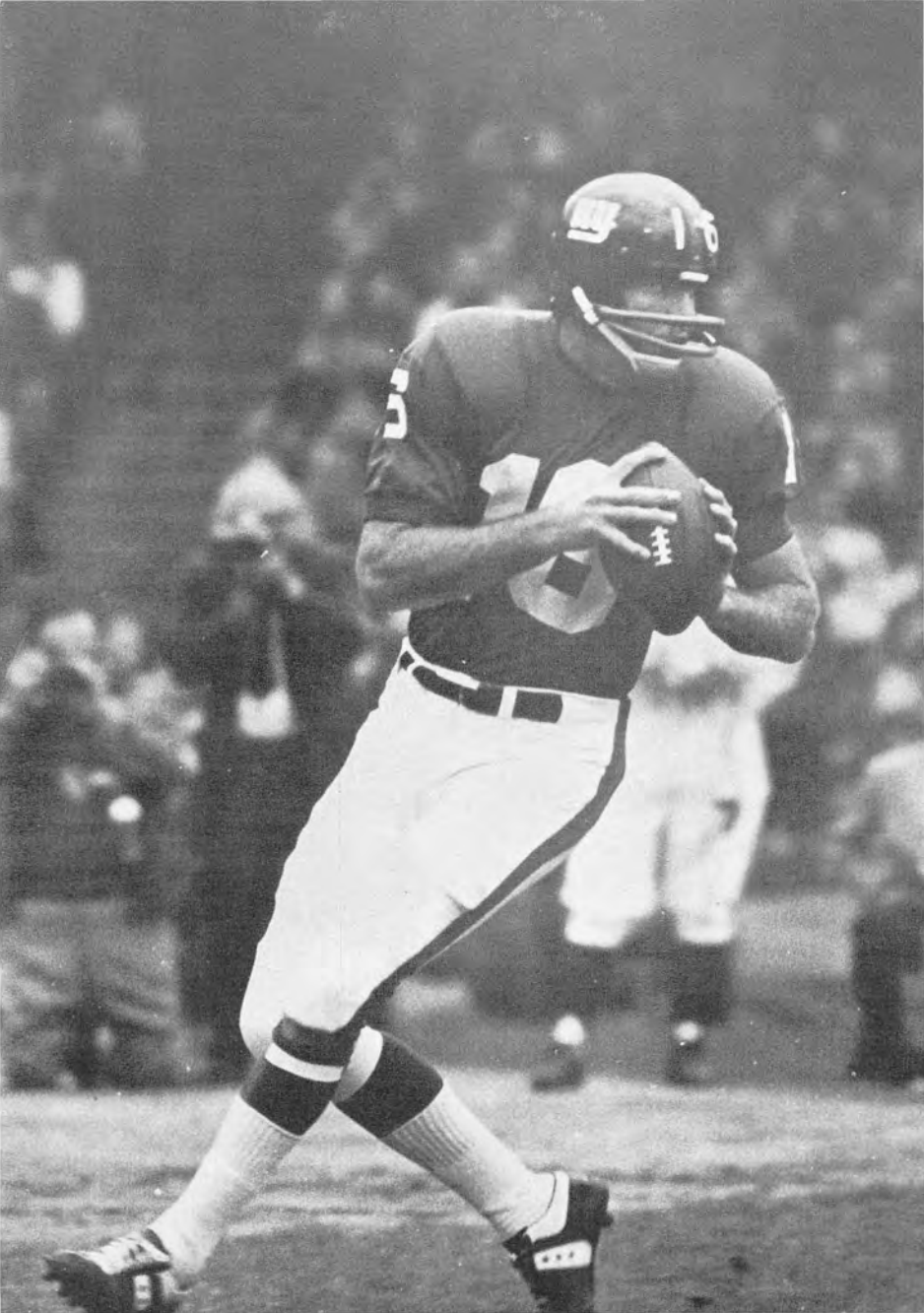

He asked the Giants for a second chance and it was granted. Willie took over a starting role in 1968 and won the league interception title with 10 steals. He also won a trip to the Pro Bowl that year. In 1972, Willie had four more interceptions for 42 yards and now has a total of 31 interceptions as a Giant to rank behind Spider Lockhart's 36 among active Giant players.

SCHOOL: Willie won five letters as an all-around athletic star at Grambling College, four in football and one in track, where he was a 9.7 man in the century dash. On the gridiron, Williams was a flanker and a defensive back and sometimes a lefthanded quarterback. In 1964, he was Grambling's top pass receiver.

PERSONAL: Willie Williams was born on December 29, 1942, in Atlanta, Ga., which is still his home town. He is married to the former Mary Anne Williams and they have one son, Lazarus, aged 5. Willie is still working toward a Master's in physical education. He is one of the Giants' top golfers, too, and fires close to par most of the time. Williams is in business for himself during the off-season as the owner of a sporting goods store in Atlanta.

Davis finished his collegiate career as Alcorn's leading career rusher with 1,698 yards, was a three-letter winner and twice was named to the All-Southwestern Athletic Conference team. Team captain his senior season, he twice led Alcorn in rushing during his three years. A Phys Ed major with a Biology minor, he made the Dean's List three times at Alcorn. Born in Bessemer, Ala., he starred at Carver H.S. in that city. Clifton is married to the former Ghika Toni Anderson and the father of a daughter, Tawayla Darlene. ROD FREEMAN Tight End (D 7 '73)

Drew attention of pro football scouts when he played in Vanderbilt's Spring football scrimmages on his own. Scored in double figures all three seasons as hoop star, also outstanding rebounder. Named to All-Tourney teams as soph in both the Sugar Bowl and Vanderbilt Invitationals. Signed as a free agent after outstanding three-year career at Rutgers where he holds career records for completions (230), passing yardage (2,801), and attempts (448). Had particularly outstanding games against Morgan State in both 1971 and 1972 as Scarlet upset Morgan State two years in succession. Leo was born in Passaic, N.J. and starred at Garfield H.S. in Garfield before entering Rutgers. He was a Political Science major at Rutgers, made the Dean's list and Scarlet Key Society as well. Leo is a bachelor, still resides in Garfield and is an avid golfer and tennis player.

RICH GLOVER Defensive Tackle (D 3 '73)
 Nebraska 6-1 240 23 Jersey City, N.J.

Won virtually every honor among collegiate defensive linemen in 1972—unanimous All-American choice; the Outland Trophy Winner for the nation's top lineman; the Vince Lombardi Trophy, and Football Writer's Association Player of Year Award. Giants got him on third round of draft because many scouts felt he might not be big enough to play at defensive line position, but would make a linebacker instead. Giants' Jim Garrett thinks otherwise. Glover was a powerful performer for three seasons at Nebraska, was named Orange Bowl MVP one year, also played in All-American Bowl. Coach Bob Devaney called Rich "greatest defensive lineman I've ever coached." Rich was born in Bayonne, N.J., later starred at Snyder H.S. in Jersey City. Has played tight end, linebacker and wide receiver, won four letters in football, three in rugby and another in wrestling where he won the District heavyweight championship. Member of the College All-Star rugby team for two years, he's been called "greatest athlete in history of California Lutheran" by coaching staff. WALTER LOVE Defensive Back (D 10 '73)

Recommended by former Giant Allen Jacobs, now head coach at Westminster, Love was a standout performer in the Rocky Mountain Conference as both a defensive rover and running back. He was named by UPI as the MVP in the Conference and was an All-Conference selection three times, once on offense, twice on defense. As a soph running back, he rushed for 859 yards in nine games, then became the rover on defense for the next two seasons where he reminded a lot of scouts of Oakland's Jack Tatum. Walter is first player ever drafted by NFL from Westminster, won Dean's List rating with a 3.22 academic average, has done a 4.5 in the 40 and bench presses 350 pounds. Born in Cleveland, Ohio, starred at J.F. Kennedy H.S. there, majored in Behavioral Science in college and is single.

RON LUMPKIN Defensive Back (D 12 '73)
 Arizona State 6-2 205 22 Los Angeles, Calif.

Giants tabbed Lumpkin on 12th round and feel he has fine potential. Missed seven games in 1972 because of injuries, so was overlooked by a lot of clubs. Ron won three letters at Arizona State and was the starting strong safety for two seasons before suffering kidney injury. Returned to action in eighth game of '72 season, made eight unassisted tackles, intercepted a pass vs. San Jose State. Appeared in Fiesta Bowl twice, once in the Peach Bowl and career totals showed 81 unassisted tackles, 47 assists and five interceptions. Ron was born in Los Angeles, played at Mount Carmel H.S. there, and he and his wife Myrna still reside in Los Angeles.

BEN NITKA Kicker (D 16 '73)
Colorado College 5-10 210 26 Philadelphia, Pa.

A native of Drawsko, Poland, Nitka served three years in the U.S. Army before entering Colorado College where he began his athletic career as a soccer and rugby player. He soon switched to football where he doubled as a punter and place-kicker for four seasons. He had a 43.3 punting average in 1971 to finish as the No. 2 ranked punter in the NCAA College Division and once averaged 50.8 for eight punts in one game. Booted 18 field goals during college career, including two 54-yarders and one from 52 yards. Has also been an amateur heavyweight boxer. His father, Josef, was a well-known soccer and boxing star in Poland. TY PAINE Running Back (D 9 '73)
Washington State U. 6-2 215 21 Billings, Mont.

The Cougar's quarterback for the past three seasons, Paine was drafted by the Giants as a running back. In three seasons Ty compiled 5,046 total yards on offense, a career high at Washington State. His career records show he completed 325 passes in 725 attempts for 4,136 yards, all of which are school records. In addition he rushed for 910 yards in 327 attempts. In his last season Ty ranked 5th in total offense in the Pacific Eight Conference with 1,599 yards and was named by both UPI and AP to the second team All Conference. The highlight of Paine's career was leading the Cougars to an upset win over Rose Bowl bound Stanford in '71. Ty was born and makes his home in Billings, Montana.

EDDIE RICHARDSON Running Back (D9 '72)
Southern U. 23 6-4 240 Baton Rouge, La.

Richardson is a versatile athlete who played several positions at Southern--running back, tight end and kickoff return specialist. As a junior, Eddie averaged 6.0 yards per carry and had a big day against Prairie View in the Astrodome when he rushed for 100 yards in just eight carries in the first half before an injury forced him out of action in the second half. Richardson was plagued by injuries through most of his senior year, yet still won AP Little All-American honorable mention honors. Eddie won three letters in football, was clocked at 4.7 in the 40 and 9.8 in the 100, excellent speed for such a big man. Richardson was born on January 9, 1950 in Homer, La., and starred at Mayfield H.S. in Homer, La. He's married to the former Susan Kennedy and has a daughter, Lisa, 3. The Richardsons live in Baton Rouge, La. during the off season.

JACK RIZZO	Running Back	Free Agent
Lehigh	5-10 195 24	Westville, N.H.

Second try for Jack with the Giants who originally signed him as a free agent in 1972. Released, he played briefly in Canada, then was signed by Cincinnati Bengals who released him via waivers. Tough, hard runner Rizzo appeared in several pre-season games with the Giants in 1972, rushing for 33 yards on 12 carries and catching 7 passes for 60 yards. He was Lehigh's MVP in 1970 and 1971 and won All-ECAC first team honors his senior year. Jack holds several Lehigh rushing records including most yards in a season (1,143); most points scored in one game (25) and in a season (129) as well as most yards rushing in one game, which was his final game against Lafayette, when he carried 32 times for 313 yards. Also lettered in track with clockings of 4.5 in the 40; 6.2 in the 60 and 9.7 in the 100. Rizzo lives in Westville, N.H. and breeds Tennessee walking horses for a hobby.

CARL SCHAUKOWITCH	Guard	(D 15 '73)
Penn State	6-2 225 22	McKees Rocks, Pa.

Co-captain of the Nittany Lions in his senior year, Schaukowitch was described by Coach Joe Paterno as "the best guard in the East." The Giants feel that Carl has everything but size and that his growth potential can overcome this. Pro scouts rate him an outstanding competitor who is tough and dedicated. He is considered to excel at pulling to lead sweeps. Carl's outstanding performance of 1972 came against Syracuse star, Joe Ehrmann. An honor student in mechanical engineering, Carl is single and lives in McKees Rocks, Pennsylvania.

GORDON TAYLOR	Running Back	Free Agent
So. Connecticut St.	6-0 195 23	Kingston, N.Y.

Signed as a free agent just prior to the opening of training camp, Taylor was a standout running back at Southern Connecticut State, winning All-Conference honors as well as MVP ratings. He was the second player at his college ever to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a career, making it is his final game when he rushed for 150 yards and caught six passes for another 130 yards. Taylor also lettered in varsity track for three seasons and also played freshman basketball. Taylor was born in July 18, 1950 in Mount Vernon, N.Y. and began playing football when he was 10 years old at the Mount Vernon Boys Club. He majored in physical education at Southern Connecticut and plans on a career in physical therapy after his football days are finished.

BRAD VAN PELT Linebacker (D 2 '73)
Michigan State 6-5 235 22 Owosso, Mich.

Unanimous All-American choice, Maxwell Trophy winner, Van Pelt lasted until the second round of the draft because other NFL teams were convinced that the multi-talented star was going to sign a bonus contract with the St. Louis Cardinals in baseball. Giants took the chance, drafted Van Pelt and signed him . . . getting themselves a bonafide first-round star on the 40th pick of the draft. Named to every All-American team his senior year, after making several as a junior Coach Duffy Daugherty said "Van Pelt's the best all-around football player I've ever coached . . . he can play any or all 22 positions." Had 42 solo tackles, 42 assists, four interceptions in 1972 as safetyman . . . career totals were 14 interceptions, including two returned for touchdowns. Also returned 10 punts for 48 yards and kicked off. Won varsity letters in baseball and basketball. Has great speed and strength for size, Giants see him as strongside linebacker. Native of Owosso, Mich., Brad's married to the former Mary Scott and still resides in his hometown where he was, obviously, a great all-around athlete. Oh yes, he's also a fine golfer . . . and don't challenge him at bocci either.

WILLIAM WIDEMAN Defensive Tackle (D 11 '73)
North Carolina A&T 6-4 270 22 Greenwood, S.C.

Twice named to the All-Mid Eastern Athletic Conference team, William is a big and strong defensive lineman who missed winning his Conference MVP on defense by just one vote in 1972. Had 69 unassisted tackles in his senior season, was named to Pittsburgh Courier's All-American first team. Wideman has patterned himself after Joe Greene of the Steelers, who is his personal idol. He's got 5.1 speed in the 40 and can play at either tackle or end with that speed and strength. Born in Greenwood, S.C., he starred at Brewer High School in that town, is single and still resides in his hometown.

WILLIE C. WILLIAMS Defensive Back Free Agent
Florida Southern 6-4 205 22 Columbus, Ohio

Giants signed Williams as a free agent after scouting report from Dick McGuire, the Knicks' scout who doubles as a scout for the Giants and submits reports on basketball players he feels have more potential in the NFL than in the NBA. Williams was a fine football player at McKinley H.S. in Columbus, Ohio, but went to Florida Southern on a basketball scholarship and did not play football at all in college. Outstanding rebounder, he's strong, has fine speed. Set a high school mark of 21.3 in the 220. Giants feel he may have potential as a safetyman. Willie was born in Columbus, is single, still resides in his hometown and paints for a hobby.

THE 1972 SEASON IN REVIEW

Sunday, September 17 Detroit 30, GIANTS 16 (54,418) At Detroit

Though trailing only 13-10 at halftime in the season opener at Detroit, the Giants fell victim to some shoddy second-half breakdowns with three fumbles and an interception and were gunned down 30-16. The Giants lost Spider Lockhart in the first period with a shoulder injury and what looked to be a sure TD when Bob Tucker fumbled on the Lion 28 as he raced towards the end zone. Errol Mann's 26-yard field goal and a 66-yard TD pass from Greg Landry to John Hilton soon had Detroit on top 10-0. Pete Gogolak's 42-yard FG got the Giants on the scoreboard and then Rocky Thompson exploded a 92-yard kickoff return for a TD after a second Mann FG to make it 13-10 at the half. The Lions moved 51 yards for a TD in the third period with Landry hitting Al Barnes for 8 yards and the score, then after Norm Snead was intercepted, Detroit went 84 yards for another score, this one an 11-yard pass from Landry to Ron Jessie and the Lions were up 27-10. Snead hit Bob Tucker on a 2-yard TD pass late in the fourth period, but Mann's 38-yard FG closed out the scoring. Steve Owens had 113 yards rushing for the Lions while Landry had three TD tosses. Snead was 16-for-25 for 137 yards in his debut with the Giants with Charlie Evans the leading rusher (57 yards) and receiver (5 catches for 38 yards.)

Sunday, September 24 Dallas 23, GIANTS 14 (62,725) At N.Y.

The Super Bowl champion Cowboys got off to a good start in the Giants' home opener. After QB Randy Johnson was kayoed in the first period, Snead replaced Randy J., but Dallas led 10-0 on a one-yard slant by Walt Garrison and a booming 54-yard FG by Toni Fritsch. The Giants fought back as Snead clicked with Richie Houston on a 55-yard scoring bomb and it was 10-7 at halftime. The Giant defense played consistently and with sinew in the second half, halting several Dallas drives, though Fritsch managed to boot short range FG's of 13 and 8 yards for a 16-7 lead. Then, pinned back inside their own 10, the Giants exploded for a lightning score as Snead faded into his own end zone, then hit Houston in full stride for a 94-yard TD burner and it was a 16-14 battle. The Cowboys toughened up after that thrust, holding the Giants at bay and then in the final minute of play, Dallas added icing on the cake with a 3-yard TD pass from Craig Morton to Lance Alworth.

Monday, October 2 GIANTS 27, Philadelphia 12 (65,720)

In the Monday night nationally televised game, the Giants picked up their first win, with Ron Johnson setting an NFL record and a club record in the process. The multi-talented running back rushed 36 times and caught 4 passes with the 41 combined attempts setting an alltime league mark. The 6-1 205-pounder also scored all four Giant touchdowns, a new club record for most TDs in a single game. Johnson's 36 rushes produced 124 yards and his catches 60 more as the Giants dominated the contest. It was 7-0 early as Snead hit Ron for a 16-yard scoring strike, then Tom Dempsey booted a 27-yard FG for the Eagles to cut it to 7-3, but Ron Hornsby recovered an Eagle fumble at the Philly 14 to set up a 5-yard scoring burst by Johnson and a 14-3 edge. Dempsey had a





15-yard FG thereafter, but it went to 21-6 halftime when Rocky Thompson returned a kickoff 47 yards to set up the next scoring drive, capped by Snead's 9-yard TD pass to Johnson. Rookie John Reaves passed 5 yards to Po James midway in the third period to close it to 21-12, but early in the finale, New York drove 78 yards in 12 plays with Johnson scoring his final TD on a 15-yard pass from Snead. All told, New York converted 11 of 16 third down situations, the defense sacked Reaves 5 times, led by Jack Gregory and Snead was 12-for-19 for three TDs against his former mates. Ron Johnson took care of all the rest.

Sunday, October 8 GIANTS 45, New Orleans 21 (62,507) At N.Y.

The Giants made it two straight with an awesome offensive display, rolling up 357 yards of offense. Charlie Evans had a big day, rushing for 87 yards, catching 3 passes and scoring 3 touchdowns as the New Yorkers rumbled to a 31-7 halftime lead. New York's big lead came on a 10-yard TD pass from Snead to Evans, then a 17-yard Gogolak FG, and a 24-yard TD run by Evans after a key fumble recovery by Spider Lockhart. Ron Johnson cracked three yards for a TD, then Evans sliced 8 yards for another score and a 31-0 lead. Archie Manning hit Dave Parks on a 66-yard TD connection for the Saints lone score in the half. Snead cranked up for two more TD throws in the second half, the first for 14 yards to Don Herrmann, then one of 15 yards to Bob Grim for a 45-7 lead. New Orleans got two late scores when Manning hit Dan Abramowicz for 16 yards and Parks for 25 yards to close out the scoring. The Giants defense turned in another solid effort, sacking Manning four times for 48 yards with Gregory again the ringleader, while the secondary intercepted Manning four times.

Sunday, October, 15, GIANTS 23, San Francisco 17 (58,606) At S.F.

On rain-swept Candlestick Park, the Giants proved they were for real by upsetting the playoff San Francisco 49ers with an all-around display of offensive and defensive brilliance. The offensive line proved so potent in this big triumph that all five received game balls at the end of the victory. The 49ers struck first via a 21-yard Bruce Gossett FG after the Giant defense had stiffened at the 12. The Giants retaliated with a long drive which ended in a 15-yard Gogolak FG to tie the score. On the subsequent kickoff, Vic Washington was jarred by Gogolak and fumbled, with Willie Williams returning the fumble 52 yards for an apparent TD, but the score was nullified by a quick whistle. Undaunted, the Giants drove 52 yards for a TD with Ron Johnson going the final eight yards for a 10-3 lead. John Brodie's 10-yard TD throw to Gene Washington knotted it at 10, but on the ensuing kickoff, Rocky Thompson slogged 75 yards on the return to set up an 11-yard Gogolak FG for a 13-10 NY lead at intermission. The third period was scoreless, but then SF drove 87 yards for a go-ahead score on Brodie's 4-yard pass to Gene Washington and a 17-13 lead. The Giants fought back for a 19-yard Gogolak FG to cut it to 17-16, then Pete Athas made a key interception at the SF 43 with less than five minutes to play. Snead then sent Johnson and Evans behind great blocking on seven straight running plays, with Evans going the final four with the winning TD. SF had one final shot, but Gregory sacked Brodie, putting him out of action with an ankle injury, and a last play pass into the end zone by Steve Spurrier was intercepted by Athas to preserve the triumph. Ron Johnson had 83 yards rushing, Snead completed 11 of 16 passes and the defense turned in another fine afternoon in the third straight triumph.

Sunday, October 22, GIANTS 27, St. Louis 21 (62,756) At N.Y.

The Giants made it four straight, but had to rally from an inept first half in which the Cardinals took a 21-7 halftime lead. The Cardinals drove early for a 7-0 lead, getting it when Jim Hart threw an 8-yard TD pass to Donny Anderson, but the Giants marched right back to knot it with Charlie Evans crashing in from the one-yard line. Then New York faltered. An interception set up another St. Lou score, this one coming on a 5-yard run by Johnny Roland. Again, the Giants coughed up the ball on a fumble and St. Louis drove for another TD, Roland getting this one too on a 1-yard slant for the 21-7 halftime lead. The Giants regrouped with some fiery halftime oration by Jack Gregory and stormed back for the victory. Pat Hughes recovered a fumble early in the third period and New York went in to score on Norm Snead's 16-yard TD throw to Don Herrmann. On the next series, Hart's pass was intercepted by Spider Lockhart who made a dazzling 29-yard touchdown return behind fine blocking to tie it 21-21. Pete Gogolak booted 16 and 43-yard field goals in the final period as the Giant defense shut out the Cardinals in the second half. A last gasp St. Lou drive in the final minutes was blunted when Gregory sacked Hart for a 12-yard loss and John Mendenhall blocked a fourth down pass attempt by Hart. Ron Johnson had 76 yards rushing and Bob Tucker caught six passes for 86 yards.

Sunday, October 29 Washington 23, GIANTS 16 (62,878) At N.Y.

The Giant's four-game win streak came to an end amidst some controversial plays in the hard-hitting well-played game. The Redskins got off to a 3-0 lead on a 41-yard FG by Curt Knight, but New York tied on Pete Gogolak's 43-yarder. Billy Kilmer threw a 7-yard scoring pass to Larry Brown to make it 9-3 (the PAT was missed), and Gogolak's 14-yard FG made it 9-6 at halftime. In the third period, the Giants stormed back on a long drive with Snead hitting Ron Johnson for an apparent 3-yard TD to take the lead. But the officials called offensive interference in the end zone on Richie Houston, nullifying the score, so the Giants settled for a 22-yard FG by Gogolak to tie the game at 9-9. Then came the biggest controversy of all. The Giants held the 'Skins, forcing a punt and Snead completed a 4-yard pass to Ron Johnson. As Johnson was hit by Jack Pardee, linebacker Chris Hanburger began to wrestle the ball out of Johnson's arms as he was hitting the ground. One official called the play dead, but was overruled by another who gave Washington possession on a fumble. On the next play, Larry Brown, who rushed for 191 yards on the day, sped 38 yards for a TD and a 16-9 Redskin lead. The Giants had two more shots, but were held and the Redskins upped it to 23-9 on a 5-yard TD pass from Kilmer to Jerry Smith. Snead drove the Giants back 80 yards, capping it with a 10-yard TD throw to Bob Tucker to make it 23-16, but the score came too late. Snead had a big day with 25 completions in 37 attempts for 258 yards, and Tucker and Charlie Evans had seven receptions apiece.

Sunday, November 5 GIANTS 29, Denver 17 (62,689) At N.Y.

The Giant defense had another fine day, intercepting three passes and sacking the QB five times, Ron Johnson rushed for 89 yards and New York led all the way, building up a 19-0 halftime lead. Bob Tucker scored the first TD on a 13-yard end around romp. In this same period Charlie Evans suffered a broken leg and was lost for the remainder of

the season. Rookie Joe Orduna replaced him and led the next TD march of 92 yards, scoring the TD on a one-yard leap over the middle. Three plays later, Jim Files intercepted Charlie Johnson and raced 37 yards for a touchdown. Denver got on the board when Bob Anderson took a handoff, then passed 14 yards for a TD to Riley Odoms and a 40-yard Jim Turner FG made it 19-10. New York drove 80 yards for another score, Snead hitting Ron Johnson with an 11-yard TD only to have Floyd Little zoom 55 yards for a score and a 26-17 ball game. Gogolak booted a 27-yard field goal to end the scoring midway through the period and the defense stayed tough thereafter. Little had a fine day for the Broncos, rushing 14 times for 124 yards.

Sunday, November 12 Washington 27, GIANTS 13 (53,039) At Washington D.C.

Another hard-fought battle was the order of the day as the Redskins broke a 13-13 tie late in the fourth period with two scores, the final one coming with 10 seconds to play as George Allen called for a time out to get that final TD by Larry Brown from four yards out. After a scoreless first period, the Giants took a 7-0 lead with Ron Johnson's one-yard slant capping a 52 yard march. Back came the 'Skins with Billy Kilmer hitting Jerry Smith for an 18-yard score. Pete Athas blocked the point after attempt and the Giants led 7-6. On the second half kickoff, the Giants used a reverse handoff from Rocky Thompson to Eldridge Small and the rookie raced 77 yards to the Redskin 13. Washington stiffened, so Gogolak kicked a 12-yard FG for a 10-6 lead. The Redskins retaliated with a 78-yard drive culminated by a one-yard scoring slant by Charlie Harraway to lead 13-10 and then the Giants marched again in the final period from their own 20 to set up another Gogolak FG, this one from 23 yards to knot the game at 13-13 with just 3:50 to play. Alvin Haymond's 40-yard kickoff return set the Skins up and a 38-yard pass from Kilmer to Roy Jefferson moved it closer. Finally, Brown knifed over from five yards out to put Washington up 20-13 with 1:03 to play. With 45 seconds to go, a Snead pass was intercepted by Ted Vactor, but instead of playing out the clock, the Skins took a time-out, then another after Brown had carried for one yard. Larry then scored with 10 seconds left for the final points. Brown rushed for 106 yards on 30 carries while Ron Johnson had 96 rushing in 23 attempts.

Sunday, November 19 GIANTS 13, St. Louis 7 (48,014) At St. Louis

The Giants rallied from an early 7-0 deficit to get back on the winning track. Ron Johnson had another superb day, rushing 30 times for 134 yards and the defense turned in still another strong performance. After a scoreless first period, the Cardinals scored in the opening minute of the second quarter on a 13-yard screen pass from Gary Cuozzo to Johnny Roland. Gogolak thumped a 40-yard FG to narrow the gap at halftime. Pete kicked a 21-yarder in the fourth period for a 7-6 Cardinal edge, and then with the defense thwarting St. Lou, the Giants marched for the winning score, featured by two key pass connections from Snead to Bob Tucker for 22 and 21 yards. Ron Johnson carried it in from one yard out and the Giants led 13-7 with 4:17 to play. The Cardinals came back to the Giant 25, but a fourth and one situation was slammed back by John Douglas and Richmond Flowers and the Giants took possession and ran out the clock. Donny Anderson had a good day for the Cardinals with 121 yards rushing on 22 attempts, but Cuozzo threw only seven passes, had one intercepted and was sacked three times. Snead was 13-for-24 and continued to lead the NFC in passing.

Sunday, November 26 GIANTS 62, Philadelphia 10 (62,586) At N.Y.

The points came in bushel baskets as the Giants set an alltime one-game scoring harvest, erasing the former record of 56 set in 1933. All told, the Giants had 28 first downs and 503 yards of offense. It was 38-10 at halftime, and 55-10 with only 11 seconds gone in the final period. By then, Alex Webster had all of his second units in action. The Giants had two interceptions and three fumble recoveries. Snead threw three TD passes (29 and 15 to Bob Tucker and 5 yards to Joe Orduna) and replacement Randy Johnson threw a pair as well (32 and 63 yarders to Don Herrmann). Ron Johnson rushed for 123 yards in three quarters of play and scored on runs of 35 and 1 yard and Randy Johnson scored on a 2-yard sneak. Pete Gogolak booted a pair of field goals from 29 and 25 yards out. For the Eagles, Harold Jackson had a 77-yard TD catch from John Reaves and Tom Dempsey kicked a 13-yard field goal.

Sunday, December 3 Cincinnati 13, GIANTS 10 (59,523) At Cincinnati

With a 7-4 record and a chance at the playoffs, the Giants were knocked off by the rugged Bengals in the first meeting ever between the clubs. The Bengal defense did a job on the Giants through most of the day, intercepting three passes and dropping the QB three times . . . and Giant QBs were dropped only 10 times all season, the lowest figure in the NFL in 1972. Horst Muhlmann got the Bengals going with a 27-yard FG in the first period and then added an 18-yarder in the second for a 6-0 lead. Willie Williams' fumble recovery set up a Giant drive which ended in a 15-yard Gogolak FG and it was 6-3 at the half. The Bengals then drove for a TD late in the third period, with QB Ken Anderson hitting Bruce Coslet for a 3-yard TD pass and 13-3 lead. Randy Johnson replaced Snead here and had one drive going until being intercepted at the Bengal 24. Randy came right back, however, on an 80-yard march with the TD coming on an 8-yard pass from Randy to Don Herrmann and it was 13-10 with 3:34 to play. The Giants got the ball back with 1:50 to go, but Tommy Casanova made a sparkling interception as Johnson had Bob Tucker open for what could have been a game-winning TD. Ron Johnson had another 100-plus rushing day, churning up 119 yards on 19 carries and went over the 1,000-yard mark for the season.

Sunday, December 10 Miami 23, GIANTS 13 (62,728) At N.Y.

Taking on the undefeated and eventual Super Bowl champion Dolphins, the Giants slammed out 343 yards of offense and trailed 17-13 at halftime on a rainy, windy afternoon. The Giants jolted the Dolphins right off, taking the opening kickoff and driving to a TD, with the big gainer a 34-yard pass from Snead to Herrmann. Ron Johnson slanted over from a yard out and the Giants led 6-0 (placement blocked.) The Dolphins retaliated with a long drive of their own capped by a 12-yard sweep by Mercury Morris, then after Rocky Thompson fumbled a kickoff return, Garo Yepremian kicked a 37-yard FG for a 10-6 Miami edge. The Giants drove again, but Vin Clements fumbled inside Miami's 10 and the Dolphins recovered. Miami struck again midway in the second period when Earl Morrall fired a 34-yard TD strike to Paul Warfield, but the Giants drove back on an 81-yard march with the big plays a 16-yard run by Clements and a 23 yard Snead throw to Richie Houston. Johnson got the TD on another one-yard smash and it was 17-13 halftime. New York drove again on Miami in the third period, but on the Dolphin

16, a fake field goal failed when holder Tom Blanchard failed to see Dick Kotite alone in the end zone and instead threw incomplete to Bob Tucker and Miami took over again. Yepremian booted a 31-yard FG in the fourth period for the 20-13 edge, but again the Giants drove back, this time to Miami's 28, where Bob Tucker fumbled on an end around and Miami recovered to kill another threat. Yepremian added a 16-yard FG for the final points with 3:00 left to play. Mercury Morris had 98 yards rushing in 19 carries for the winners, while Clements had 63 to pace the Giants. Snead had 15 completions in 25 attempts for 231 yards.

Sunday, December 17 GIANTS 23, Dallas 3 (64,602) At Dallas

The Giants wrapped up a fine 8-6 season by completely dominating the defending Super Bowl champion and playoff-bound Cowboys. New York had 25 first downs and 349 yards of offense as to 10 first downs and 132 total yards for Dallas . . . and rookie Vin Clements ran wild for 105 yards rushing on 23 carries. Norm Snead was 16-for-28 for 175 yards and two TDs and won the NFL's passing title for 1972. The Giants also sacked Craig Morton and Roger Staubach four times for 25 yards, with Jack Gregory getting three of them solo for a year's total of 21 . . . high in the NFL. New York opened with a 49-yard FG by Gogolak for a 3-0 lead, then made it 6-0 when Pete connected again from 22 yards out. Toni Fritsch kicked a 43-yard FG in the second period to narrow the margin, but from thereon it was all New York. Snead threw a 9-yard TD pass to Ron Johnson for 13-3 edge, then Spider Lockhart intercepted Morton and the Giants turned that into a 12-yard TD connection from Snead to Richie Houston and a 20-3 halftime lead. Richmond Flowers recovered a Dallas fumble at the Giant 7-yard line, and New York marched again, with Gogolak booting a 26-yard FG to close out the scoring for the day in a smashing season finale.
