ROBUSTELLI

Andy Robustelli — Director of Operations — Hall of Fame member . . . perennial All-pro . . . team captain . . . former assistant coach . . . successful businessman . . . those are the impressive credentials that Andy Robustelli brings with him in his capacity as Director of Operations for the Giants.

As Director of Operations, Robustelli oversees all field operations of the Giants including coaching, scouting, signing of players, trades and the pre-season training camp.

The 48-year-old Robustelli is one of the great success stories of professional football. A 19th round draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 out of little Arnold College in Connecticut, he went on to star with the Rams through 1955, winning All-Pro honors and appearing in two championship games with Los Angeles. He came to the Giants in a 1956 trade and won All-Pro honors consistently. All told, he was an All-NFL selection 9 times during his 14 seasons and appeared in the Pro Bowl nine times as well. He played in six championship games with the Giants, was team defensive captain for six years and was named as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1962.

Robustelli was elected to the Professional Football Hall of Fame in 1971 and was additionally voted into the Helms Football Foundation Hall of Fame. His career with the Giants ended in 1964 after spending his final seasons as a player-defensive coach.

In recent years, Andy has served as President of Robustelli Travel Service, Inc., a group of five travel agencies in Connecticut and has also been associated with the Allied Chemical Company. He has also conducted his own TV show during the football seasons, but remains first and foremost a football man and has grown with professional football over the years.

Robustelli was born December 6, 1926 in Stamford, Conn., graduated from Stamford Public School System and then attended LaSalle Military Academy in Oakdale, L.I. from September 1943 to January 1944. He joined the U.S. Navy in January 1944 and served for two years in the South Pacific, including the invasion of Okinawa. After his discharge, he matriculated to Arnold College, and graduated with a B.S. Degree, majoring in Health and Physical Education. He was named to the Little All-American team for three years and also lettered in baseball.

Drafted by the Rams in 1951, he played five seasons with L.A., winning All-Pro honors three times and playing on two championship teams. Named MVP on defense for the Rams for three consecutive years, he came to the Giants in that 1956 trade, adding to his laurels with six more All-Pro honors and six more championship game appearances. He was an assistant coach-player for his final four seasons.

In addition to his business and television interests, Andy has been the Connecticut chairman of the United Fund and is also a member of the President's Council on Physical Fitness where he organized a business task force for that Council group. He is married to the former Jean Dora and is the father of nine children and still resides in Stamford with his family.

GIANTS' COACHING STAFF



ARNSPARGER

Bill Arnsparger – Head Coach – Three days after his Miami Dolphins' "No Name" defense had throttled the Minnesota Vikings in the 1974 Super Bowl, William Stephenson "Bill" Arnsparger became the ninth head coach in Giants' history. He had served under Don Shula for four seasons at Miami, initially as Defensive Coordinator and then as Assistant Head Coach. Bill came to the Dolphins in 1970— one year after Miami had finished with a 3-10-1 record and allowed 332 points scored to the opposition. Arnsparger's first campaign as chief defensive aide, the Dolphins rose to a 10-4 record and a playoff berth while limiting the opposition to 228 points. In 1971, the record was 10-3-1 with but 174 points allowed and in 1972 when Miami went undefeated en route to a Super Bowl crown, the defense allowed but 171 points, the fewest in the NFL including three shutouts. In 1973, with a 12-2 record and second Super Bowl title, the Dolphins allowed but 150 points, again the lowest in the NFL, with two shutouts and four other victories in which no touchdowns were allowed. Bill was affiliated with Shula for nine years in the NFL, joining Shula's staff at Baltimore in 1964 as chief defensive aide. He served with the Colts through 1968 on four playoff teams, then rejoined Shula in Miami in 1970. Prior to being named at Baltimore, Arnsparger's coaching background included assistant stints at Tulane (1962-63); Kentucky (1954-61); Ohio State (1951-53) and at his alma mater, Miami of Ohio (1959). Bill was born on December 16, 1926 in Paris, Kentucky and starred as a lineman at Paris High School where his coach was Blanton Collier. After high school, Arnsparger joined the Marines and served as a sergeant from 1944 to 1946 with a year's duty in China. He entered Miami of Ohio after his discharge and played offensive tackle there on teams that also had such players as Art Parseghian, Paul Dietzel and Bo Schembechler and a head coach named Woody Hayes. In 1950, Arnsparger was named an assistant coach at Miami by Hayes and the following year when Hayes was named head coach at Ohio State, he brought Arnsparger with him as an assistant there. Bill first worked with Shula at Kentucky where the head coach was Blanton Collier, his old high school mentor. That association with Shula carried into the pros for Bill in 1964 and ended in the Miami locker room after the Super Bowl triumph in January of 1974 when Arnsparger was presented a game ball by the Dolphin player. Well respected and admired throughout the National Football League, Arnsparger's credentials are prestigious. Of Dutch descent, Bill married the former Betty Jane Carter in 1959 and is the father of two children, David, 9; and Mary Susan, 6.



PETERS

Floyd Peters — Defensive Line — 2nd Year — Peters returns to the NFL after serving for three years as the chief scout for the Miami Dolphins in the 13-state Western area. Peters played 12 years in the NFL as a defensive tackle with the Baltimore Colts, Cleveland Browns, Detroit Lions, Philadelphia Eagles and Washington Redskins and had outstanding years with the Eagles winning All-Eastern Conference honors in 1964, 1966 and 1967. He played in the Pro Bowl in each of those years and was selected as the defensive MVP in the 1966 game. The 6-4, 250-pounder earned four letters as a tackle for San Francisco State and was named to the Little All-American team in 1957. A No. 8 draft choice of Baltimore in 1958, he concluded his career in 1970 as a player-coach with the Redskins. During his playing days as a defensive tackle, Peters had three interceptions for 12 yards returned. Floyd was born on May 21, 1936 in Council Bluffs, Iowa then moved to California where he starred at John Swett H.S. in Crocket, Calif. He was a stock-broker in San Francisco prior to joining the Giants, Floyd and his wife Nancy have four sons — Craig, 16; Kelly, 14; Dean, 12 and Allen, 10.



SYMANK

John Symank — Defensive Secondary — 2nd Year — The 39-year-old Symank, a former defensive back with the Green Bay Packers, brings a fine blend of collegiate and professional coaching with him to the Giants. For the past 3 years, John was the head coach at the University of Texas at Arlington and prior to that was the head coach for 10 years at Northern Arizona University. From 1966 through the 1968 season, Symank was defensive backfield coach for the Atlanta Falcons and prior to his tenure with the Falcons was a defensive coach at both the University of Virginia and at Tulane. He was on the same staff at Tulane with Bill Arnsparger. John was both a running back and defensive back at the University of Florida after a transfer from Arlington State Junior College in Texas. He was drafted by the Packers in 1957 and played on championship teams through 1962 before concluding his playing career with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1963. As a rookie safety in 1957, Symank intercepted 9 passes for the Packers to rank second in the NFL that year. The 5-10, 190-pounder was also rated as a rugged tackler. Born on Aug. 31, 1935 in LaGrange Tex., John was a football and track star at Caldwell High School in Caldwell, Tex., and also earned two letters in track at Florida. Symank is married to the former Sariann Bowers and is the father of four children — Sally Ann, 19; sons Cindy and Susan, 17; and John Jr.,



WIETCHA

Ray Wietcha — Offensive Line — 4th Year — Highly respected aide returns for his third season as offensive line coach and the only holdover from previous staff. At No. 1 “future pick of the Giants” in 1950 out of Northwestern, Ray joined the Giants in 1951 after a season in minor league baseball in the Washington Senator’s farm system and two years in the Marines as a Captain. He was a center, linebacker and even defensive back in his rookie year, and then went on to become a star center for 10 seasons, winning All NFL and Pro Bowl honors five times, appearing with five Eastern Division title winners and the NFL championship team of 1956. Wietcha joined the Los Angeles Rams as an assistant coach in 1963, then moved on to the Green Bay Packers under Vince Lombardi from 1965 through 1970 where he was offensive line and running game coach with the championship Packers of that era. He was a Giant scout in 1971, then became offensive line coach in 1972. Ray was born on Nov. 4, 1928 in East Chicago, Ind., and starred at Roosevelt High School in that city. At Northwestern, he was an All-Big 10 choice as a center, winning three letters in both football and baseball. Ray is married to the former Joan Warren, is the father of four children—William, 19; Barbara, 18; Donna, 15, and Darren, 14 and lives in Florham Park, N.J.



PLUMB

Ted Plumb — Offensive Backfield — 2nd Year — 35-year-old Plumb had been the offensive backfield coach at Kansas University for the past two seasons where he helped develop All-American David Jaynes. Ted was an outstanding receiver at Baylor for three seasons, playing in both the Gator Bowl and Gotham Bowl. He was drafted by the Buffalo Bills of the AFL in 1962, but a training camp injury cut his professional playing career before it began and he entered the coaching profession. Ted first coached at Raymondville High School in Texas, then at Lubbock H.S. in Lubbock, Texas. He moved on to Cerritos Junior College in California in 1966 and was then named an assistant coach at TCU in 1968. Plumb coached at TCU for three seasons, helping develop Norm Bulaich and Ross Montgomery, then moved on to Tulsa University in 1971 and then to Kansas in 1972. Ted was born on Aug. 20, 1939 in Reno, Nev., moved to California as a youngster and starred at Mount Diablo H.S. in Concord, Calif. in football, basketball and track. He played a year at Mount Diablo Junior College before entering Baylor. Ted and his wife Marianna have three children—Loyal Thomas, 11; John Alarico, 10; and Molly, 6.



RUTLEDGE

Ed Rutledge — Special Teams — 2nd Year — Veteran coach and scout joins the Giants' staff after five years with the NFL's CEPO scouting organization and rejoins head coach Arnsparger with whom he had previously worked at both Baltimore and the University of Kentucky. With the Colts from 1966 through 1969, Rutledge served under Don Shula as a linebackers coach as well as being the man who scouted the upcoming opponents. His previous association with Shula and Arnsparger was at the University of Kentucky where Rutledge served for seven years from 1956 through 1962 under Blanton Collier as both head freshman coach and varsity offensive backfield coach. Ed was born May 14, 1918 in Ironton, Ohio, played his high school football there and went on to Western Kentucky where he lettered in football (as a two-way end), track and swimming. He spent the next six years in the U.S. Navy (1941-47) as a pilot, reaching the rank of Lieut. Commander with service in the Caribbean and Panama areas. He entered FBI School after discharge and was a special agent in the FBI through 1948 at which time he decided to return to football, taking a job as head coach at Danville H.S. in Kentucky. He also coached at Paducah, Ky. After leaving the University of Kentucky in 1965, he initially worked for CEPO as a scout, prior to going to the Colts. Rutledge is married to the former Pearl Black of Kew Gardens, N.Y. and is the father of a married son, Richard, and a daughter Rebecca, 17.

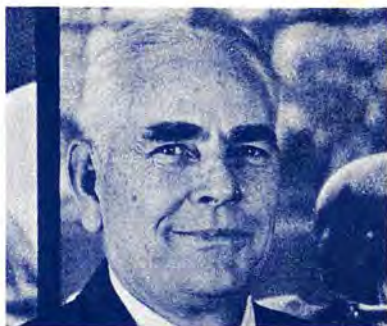


WEBB

Allan Webb — Offensive Backfield — 2nd Year — The former Giants' defensive back has had a diversified background as both player and coach. A Little-All-American at Arnold College in Connecticut in 1952 as both a running back and defensive back, Allan had a tryout with the Los Angeles Rams in 1955 after two years of service in the Navy, then played for the Montreal Alouettes that season in the CFL as a two-way back. He subsequently played for the Stamford Golden Bears in the minor leagues before getting a tryout with the Giants in 1961. He made the club as a safety and played through the 1965 season. As a safety in the championship years of 1962-63, he won starting roles and had three interceptions in each of those campaigns. In 1966, he was an assistant coach with the Scranton Miners of the ACFL, then moved on to the Westchester Bulls in that league. He was head coach of the Long Island Bulls in 1971, then became a Giant scout in 1972 and special assistant in 1973. Born on Jan. 22, 1933 in Washington, D.C., Allan starred in football, baseball and basketball at Ansonia H.S., Ansonia, Conn. before entering Arnold College. He had a brief tryout with the Milwaukee Braves in baseball in 1953 before entering the Navy. Webb is married to the former Olga Rojas, has a daughter, Lisa, 16; and a son, Marc, 10, and resides in Glen Rock, N.J.



SCHOTTENHEIMER



HOWELL

Marty Schottenheimer — 1st Year — Linebackers — Newest member of the Giants' coaching staff joins the club from Portland of the World Football League where he served as linebackers' coach, a responsibility he will also have with New York. The 31-year-old coach is a former NFL linebacker himself, having played the position with both the Buffalo Bills and New England Patriots. Born on Sept. 23, 1943 in Canonsburg, Pa., Marty starred at Fort Cherry High School there and then went on to become an All-American linebacker at the University of Pittsburgh. He played in the Senior Bowl in his final year at Pitt and was subsequently drafted by both Baltimore in the NFL and Buffalo in the AFL. The 7th round choice of the Bills, he played four seasons in Buffalo as a linebacker, appearing in both the 1965 and 1966 AFL championship games, and had six career interceptions for 133 yards returned and one touchdown, as well as earning top ratings for his hitting abilities on special teams. He concluded his playing career with the Patriots in 1970 and then went into the real estate development business in both the Miami and Denver areas through 1973 when he returned to pro football as the LB coach with Portland. Marty is married to the former Patricia Hoeltgen of Chicago, is the father of two youngsters, Kristen, 5, and Brian, 2, and has been living in Denver during the last few years.

Jim Lee Howell — Director of Personnel — Jim Lee Howell, a towering figure in the past and present of the New York Giants, lends a wealth of experience and football savvy to his position as Director of Player Personnel. It was 38 years ago that Jim Lee arrived on the New York scene, a long-legged rookie end out of the U. of Arkansas, and since then he has filled a variety of key roles for the Giants: player, assistant coach, head coach and now, of course, as a top-ranking administrator. Howell's record speaks boldly for itself. During his nine years as a player (1937-42, 1946-48), the Giants posted a mark of 55-37-9 and played in four world championship games (1938-39-41-46). After his playing days, the 6-6 Arkansan served as end coach under Coach Steve Owen from 1949-53 and, when Owen departed after the 1953 campaign, Jim Lee was named head coach. The winning pattern Howell had established as a player continued during his reign as coach. Over the next seven years, the Giants won 56 games, lost just 36 and tied four, and they made the world championship game three times, beating the Bears in 1956 and losing classic struggles to the Colts in 1958-59.



TRIMBLE



TUNNELL

Jim Trimble — Director of Pro Personnel — Few men in professional football are better qualified than Jim Trimble to handle the role of Director of Pro Personnel, an assignment he shouldered at the start of the 1969 season when the Giants reorganized their administrative staff. As Director of Pro Personnel, Trimble serves as a liaison between Coach Bill Arnsparger and club president Wellington Mara, helps coordinate trades, works closely with Jim Lee Howell and members of the scouting staff and generally handles the myriad details and personnel problems that result from the everwidening range of pro football activity. Whatever the problems, though, it is likely that Jim has encountered them somewhere along the line during his 35 years in football. His background in the game is not only broad, it is also very successful. He was head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles (1952-56), the Hamilton Tiger Cats (1956-62) and the Montreal Alouettes (1963-65) and rarely was he ever on the losing side. His NFL record with the Eagles was 27-20-2. In Canada, he compiled an overall record of 77-61-2 and was named Coach of the Year in 1961. Additionally, he served in the dual role of head coach and general manager.

Em Tunnell — Assistant Director, Pro Personnel — Perhaps the greatest safetyman ever to play professional football, Em is now in his 25th year with the Giants . . . initially as a player, then a scout, assistant coach and now as Assistant Director of Pro Personnel. Tunnell played 11 seasons with the Giants (1948-58), three more with the Packers (1959-61) and during his brilliant career set four NFL records which still stand—most career interceptions (79) most punt returns (258) and most yardage on both interception and punt returns. Tunnell's exploits were such that he is now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and was named to the first team 50th anniversary All-NFL Alltime team. Em became a Giant originally after walking into the club front office and asking for a tryout after a college career at Iowa and service in the Navy. The rest is history. He became a perennial All-Pro and was named to the Pro Bowl seven straight seasons. A Giant scout in 1962-64, Em became an assistant coach in 1965 and served in that capacity through this past year when he was named to his new position. Born on March 29, 1925 in Bryn Mawr, Pa., he still makes his home in Philadelphia.



SULAITIS

Joe Sulaitis — Assistant Director of Personnel — Joe Sulaitis brings to his role of Assistant Director of Personnel a broad football background that includes playing, scouting and coaching. As a player with the Giants from 1943-45 and again from 1947-53, Joe earned a reputation as one of the most versatile men ever to play the game. He was, at various times, a wingback, end, quarterback (blocking back in the A formation) and guard on offense, while on defense he played defensive end, linebacker and defensive back. At any position, he was known as a tough, aggressive 60-minute football player. After his first three-year stint with the Giants, Joe played one year with the Boston Yanks (1946). He returned to the Giants in 1947 and put in seven more productive seasons before retiring in 1953. Sulaitis' coaching experience included one year (1943) as head coach of North Arlington (N.J.) High School and two years (1947-48) as backfield coach at Wagner College under Jim Lee Howell, who later became head coach of the Giants and who is now Joe's immediate superior in the club scouting division. Sulaitis was in private business from 1953 until 1966, when he rejoined his old ball club as an area scout.

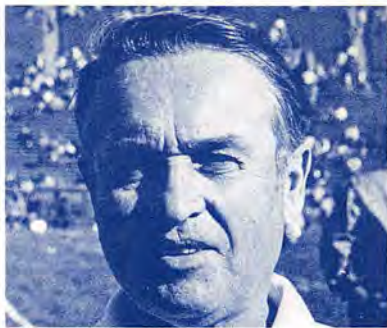


CUNNEFF

Ray Cunneff — Orthopedic Surgeon — The newest member of the club's staff is Dr. Ray Cunneff of Red Bank, N.J. who joined the Giants as team orthopedic surgeon prior to the 1974 season. A native of Philadelphia, Ray graduated Cum Laude from St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia and from Jefferson Medical College in the same city. After an internship and residency at Jefferson Hospital, Ray served in the Air Force Medical Corps as a Captain at Bolling Air Force Base in orthopedic surgery. After his discharge he was a resident at New York Orthopedic Hospital. Dr. Cunneff is currently engaged in his own practice in Red Bank, N.J., and is also the Director of Orthopedic Surgery at Riverview Hospital in New Jersey as well as being an Associate Attending Orthopedic Surgeon at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York. He is also President of the New Jersey Orthopedic Society and is a Consultant at both Northern Westchester Hospital and White Plains Hospital in Westchester County. He is often a guest lecturer at symposiums on sports injuries at various colleges. An avid golfer, Ray and his wife Shirley, are the parents of five boys and reside in Red Bank, N.J.



BONO



DZIEGIEL

Rudy Bono, M.D. — Team Physician — As they say, Dr. Rudy Bono had “a tough act to follow” when he joined the medical staff of the New York Giants back in 1967 as the successor to Dr. Francis J. Sweeney, who had died the previous year. Doc Sweeney had been with the ball club for over 35 years and was something of a walking legend in the NFL, and his shoes would be hard to fill. But in the ensuing eight years, Rudy Bono has left his own mark on the Giants and is now regarded as one of the top team physicians in the league. The 46-year-old resident of Englewood, N.J., forms one half of the Giants’ medical team. He is responsible for the general health problems of players and coaches while his confederate, Dr. Ray Cunneff, concerns himself with the orthopedic problems. Dr. Bono, a bouncy little fellow, received a BS from Union College in 1950 and his MD from Albany Medical College in 1954. He did his surgical internship at St. Vincent’s in New York City from 1954-55 and then served for three years as a Navy lieutenant (1955-57). In 1965, he became associate attending surgeon at St. Vincent’s Hospital and, the same year, was appointed assistant professor of clinical surgery at the New York University-Bellvue Medical Center.

John Dziegiel — Physical Fitness Director — John Dziegiel, one of the best known and most widely respected trainers in the sports field, has a career that dates back over 40 years to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. John started in 1928 by assisting the regular West Point trainers with rubdowns; in 1930, he became a fulltime assistant trainer and stayed at The Point until 1944. From 1946 through 1967, Dziegiel was head trainer at Fordham University, dividing his time between Rose Hill and Yankee Stadium, where he was co-trainer, along with John Johnson, for the Football Giants, a post he acquired in 1956. An acknowledged authority on sports injuries and treatment, John helped found the National Association of Athletic Trainers and is also active in the Eastern Athletic Trainers’ Association. He and his family live in Nanuet, N.Y. Dziegiel now devotes his full time and energies to a year-round physical training and conditioning program for the Giants. Players living in the New York metropolitan area work regularly with John in the off-season.



JOHNSON

John Johnson — Trainer — John Johnson, a graduate of the Swedish Institute of Physical Therapy, has been a trainer for the Giants for the past 23 years and, during this period, also has served as head trainer and physical instructor at Manhattan College. After serving an internship period at Brooklyn Jewish and Long Island College Hospitals (1937-38), Johnson worked as a physical trainer for the Bedford YMCA and then, from 1942-46, was in charge of physical therapy and rehabilitation at a U.S. Air Force base hospital. His service hitch included duty as a physical therapy instructor, athletic trainer for post teams and as an air-sea rescue medic. From 1946-47, John was a civilian athletic trainer at the U.S. Naval Preflight School at Ottumwa, Ia. A member of the Eastern and National Athletic Trainers' Associations as well as the National Physical Therapy Association, Johnson also has served as a trainer for visiting teams at Madison Square Garden (1954-63). He lives in Cresskill, N.J., with his wife and two daughters.



PATTON

Dave Patton — Trainer — Newest member of the Giants' trainer staff is 25-year-old Dave Patton who joined the staff last year after serving for two years as the assistant athletic trainer at West Point. Born in Indianapolis, Dave was a defensive back at North Central High School until an illness curtailed his gridiron activities. He then got into the training field while still in high school, working with the school's trainer who had previously worked at Cincinnati University. Dave continued his education and training internship at Muskingum College in Ohio, working with all of the teams at that college until his graduation. While at Muskingum, he was selected as the trainer for the All-Star Shrine Bowl game in Ohio. After graduation, Dave served in the Army and was assigned as an enlisted man to West Point where he continued his chosen field of work, and he continued for two more years as assistant trainer at West Point for the varsity football and hockey teams until joining the Giants on a fulltime basis last year. A bachelor, Dave still lives in Highland Falls, N.Y.



BUFFINGTON



IVY

Harry Buffington — Scout — During his 35-odd years in football, Harry Buffington has gained wide experience on virtually every level of the game, experience that he now brings to the Giants' scouting department. In his time, the Pryor, Okla., native has been player, coach, scout, recruiter and personnel expert. His professional playing experience includes one year with the Giants (1942) when he played running back, guard and line-backer; and three years with the Brooklyn Dodgers of the AAC (1946-48). As a collegian, Harry was an all-conference wingback and blocking back for three years at Oklahoma A&M. He received a Master's Degree in secondary school administration there in 1947. Buffington was head coach and athletic director at Austin College in Texas from 1951-54 and from 1955-62 was defensive coach at Oklahoma State. He filled the same role at Texas Tech in 1963 and then coached the defense for the Edmonton Eskimos in Canada (1964-65). Since 1966, Harry has been an area scout with CEPO.

Frank (Pop) Ivy — Scout — With the start of the 1972 NFL season, Frank (Pop) Ivy began his second tour of duty as a scout for the Giants. A veteran of head coaching assignments in three major professional leagues (the NFL, AFL and Canada), Ivy first joined the New York organization as defensive line coach in 1965. He held that post through the 1966 season and then left to head up scouting operations in the southwest. Coach Alex Webster talked Pop back into coaching in 1971 and he returned to New York from his home in Norman, Okla., to tutor the offensive line. Now, for the second time in his Giant career, the veteran football man is once again the club's chief talent hunter in the southwest. Ivy has a broad background in pro football. He was head coach of the Edmonton Eskimos in Canada (1954-57), head coach of the Chicago Cardinals in the NFL (1958-61) and then head coach of the Houston Oilers of the AFL (1962-63). An All-American college player at the U. of Oklahoma, Pop saw NFL service as an end with the Pittsburgh Steelers and Chicago Cardinals.



KAVANAUGH

Ken Kavanaugh – Scout – Ken Kavanaugh, one of the most famous names in National Football League history, joined the Giants' scouting staff in 1971 and brought with him a wealth of experience as both a professional player and coach. Actually, Kavanaugh moved into the Giants' scouting department from the coaching staff, where he had been offensive end coach from 1955-68 and offensive coach from 1969-70, a total of 16 years under three head coaches, Jim Lee Howell (his current scouting superior), Allie Sherman and Alex Webster. Prior to becoming a Giant aide, the Pro Hall of Fame end had spent one season (1951) as end coach for his old club, the Chicago Bears, and one season (1954) at Villanova College in his hometown of Philadelphia. As a player, Ken was one of the Bear greats. He starred at end in 1940-41, left for an Air Force tour of duty and returned to make All Pro again in 1946-47. At LSU, Kavanaugh was a four-year regular (1936-40), twice earning All American honors.



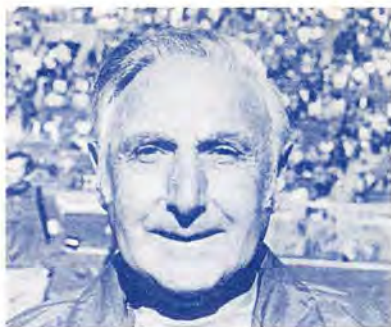
BROWN

Rosey Brown – Scout – Roosevelt Brown's appointment to the Giants' scouting staff in 1971 signaled the beginning of yet another era in his outstanding career with the New York ball club. From 1953 through 1965, Rosey ranked as one of the all-time great offensive linemen in the National Football League, a big, fast, wide-ranging tackle, who earned All Pro honors six times, was selected to play in the Pro Bowl on eight occasions and, in 1956, was voted Lineman of the Year in the NFL. When a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966, Brown was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants, a post he held until 1969 when he became head line coach, replacing Jim Trimble. In 1971, Brown, along with another coaching aide, Ken Kavanaugh, left Alex Webster's staff to assume new responsibilities under Jim Lee Howell, his onetime coach, in the scouting department. Rosey, now 44, is a resident of Teaneck, N.J., but spends a good deal of his time on the road in search of fresh talent for the Giants.



SHAY

Jerry Shay — Scout — Former Giants defensive tackle Jerry Shay serves as the Giants' scout in the Western States area, including the West Coast and several other states such as Wyoming, Montana and the Dakotas. A native of Gary, Ind., the 31-year-old Shay played for the Minnesota Vikings, Atlanta Falcons and Giants before a broken leg in the final game of the 1970 season ended his playing career. A 6-3, 250-pounder, Jerry was the Vikings' No. 1 draft choice in 1966 after an All-Star career at Purdue. He played two years with the Vikings, then was traded to the Falcons in 1968 where he was a starting tackle for two years. Jerry came to the Giants in 1970 and was a starter for all of that season, a 9-5 year for the Giants. He never recovered fully from the broken leg and retired after the 1971 season in which he appeared in only six games, and has served as a scout since 1972. An All-American for two years at Purdue, Jerry was born on July 10, 1944 in Gary into a family named Dzedzeji (since changed to Shay). He's married to the former Cynthia Zajkowski and has a daughter Tiffany Leigh, 6.



MORET

Sid Moret — Equipment Manager—Assistant Trainer — For the past 26 years, Sid Moret has been an invaluable contributor to the behind-the-scenes operations of the New York Giants. He has filled a variety of necessary roles, including equipment manager, assistant trainer and director of clubhouse morale. Sid, a New Yorker all the way (via Brooklyn, that is), is a product of New York University. He joined the staff of the Giants in 1949 (the same year as co-trainer John Johnson) and assumed the dual role of equip-man and part-time trainer. Moret worked with the N.Y.U. Athletic Association after leaving school and, during World War II, he was associated with the Gene Tunney physical fitness program in the U.S. Navy (1943-45). In 1946-47, Sid was introduced to professional sports as trainer for the Brooklyn Dodgers of the old All America Conference. Prior to joining the Giants, Brooklyn-born Moret handled the training chores for Brooklyn College (1948-49). At various times Sid has also served as trainer for basketball teams visiting Madison Square Garden.



HORAI

Julius Horai — Administrative Assistant — A key man in the Giants' training facility operation at Pace University in Westchester County, N.Y. is Julius "Whitey" Horai who has been associated with the club since 1954. Whitey handles a myriad of details at the training complex, including maintenance of fields, buildings, grounds and equipment as well as serving as the coordinator of transportation and film exchanges. He's also a familiar figure on the sidelines during games. A native of Richmond, Staten Island, Whitey graduated from Curtis High School there, then went on to Wagner College where he worked for the athletic department as equipment and field maintenance man under Jim Lee Howell. When Jim Lee came to the Giants as head coach in 1954, Horai came too in a partime capacity, then joined the club fulltime in 1970. A bachelor, Whitey still resides in Staten Island.



SWERC

Vinnie Swerc — Administrative Assistant — A retired sales and purchasing executive, Vinnie Swerc has been affiliated with the Giants since the 1933 season . . . giving him four decades of being around the club. During that period, Swerc has assisted in many ways, initially working in the clubhouse on game days and assisting on the field and now as a fulltime administrative assistant at the club's Pace University training facility where he assists in such areas as preparation of contracts, purchasing orders, and public relations as well as continuation of his gameday work during the season in the clubhouse and on the field. Vinnie is a native of Elm Park, Staten Island, graduated from Port Richmond High School there and played on championship basketball teams in the Staten Island area for several years thereafter. His arrival with the Giants in 1933 coincided with that of Ken Strong, the N.Y.U. All-American. Swerc served for many years as the head of sales and purchasing agent for the George H. McFaddon Cotton Merchants in New York until his retirement in 1972. Married to the former Alice Wisnefski for 28 years, Vinnie lives in Port Richmond and his favorite pastime, other than the Giants, is travel, particularly in the Caribbean area.

PETE ATHAS Cornerback 5th Year
 Tennessee 5-11 185 27 Miami, Fla.

PRO: Came to the Giants as a free agent prior to the 1971 season and won a spot as a defensive back and return man. He's been the starting left cornerback ever since and led the club in interceptions in 1973 with five for 52 yards returned and in punt returns with 20 for 153 yards. Pete also shared the club lead in interceptions in 1972 with four and of his 13 interceptions in four years, one went for a touchdown — a 37-yard return against Dallas in 1971. The Cowboys had drafted Athas No. 10 in 1969, but released him during the pre-season. He spent the next two seasons in the Continental League, winning All-League honors twice.

SCHOOL: Pete had an extremely brief collegiate career, first at Dade Junior College in Miami and then at Tennessee where he played just one season of freshman football after going out for the team without benefit of scholarship. Expected to make a strong bid for a starting cornerback job this season.

SCHOOL: Brooks was a safetyman for three seasons at Bishop, earning his good ratings for that hitting ability and strength as well as for his good speed in covering opponents' top receivers. Clocked in 4.7 for the 40 while in college.

PERSONAL: Bobby Brooks was born on February 24, 1951 in Dallas and played his high school sports at I.M. Terrell High School in Big D. He's married, has one youngster and still resides in Dallas during the off-seasons.

PRO: Signed as a free agent after an impressive performance in a pre-season tryout camp at Fordham, Chandler proved to be a valuable addition in his rookie season. When starter Bob Hyland was injured in the season opener, Chandler stepped right in alongside rookie guards John Hicks and Tom Mullen and did a solid job. All told, he started four games during the season and appeared in all 14 as a special team player as well. Line coach Ray Wietecha feels that Chandler has top potential.

SCHOOL: Chandler earned varsity letters in both football and wrestling at Princeton, playing offensive tackle with the Tigers. In wrestling, Karl had an imposing record, losing only two matches in three years and setting Princeton records for points scored, career.

PRO: Larry was one of the Giants' two picks in the first round of the 1972 draft after winning All-American honors and the Outland Trophy in his senior year at Nebraska. "Jake" came to the Giants' camp after the College All-Star game and won himself a starting spot at tackle as a rookie and turned in a superb season. He had six solo quarterback sacks, recovered one fumble and won a game ball for a particularly fine day against Denver. In 1973, he missed most of the pre-season with a foot injury and appeared in only nine games in the regular season, getting one QB sack. Last year, he was used mainly in a reserve role appearing in 11 games.

SCHOOL: Jacobson was a unanimous All-American selection at Nebraska in his senior year and in addition to winning the Outland Trophy was named the MVP Lineman in the country for 1971 by the Washington D.C. Touchdown Club. He starred in the Orange Bowl games of 1970 and 1971 and was also named to the Senior Bowl and the College All-Star units. An accounting major, he also won academic honors at Nebraska.

DAVE JENNINGS Punter 2nd Year
St. Lawrence 6-4 205 23 Woodbridge, Conn.

PRO: Signed by the Giants as a free agent in August, 1974 after he had been cut by the Houston Oilers, Jennings battled incumbent Tom Blanchard for the punting job through the pre-season campaign and won himself a job as Blanchard was waived and subsequently picked up by New Orleans. In his first appearance for the Giants, Jennings averaged 44.6 on seven punts against the Redskins, and in a 14-6 win over Dallas two weeks later, punted six times for a 46.0 average on high boomers to keep the Cowboys pinned in their own territory. He finished the year with a 39.8 average on 68 attempts with two blocked, and did well on angling his kicks. He was named to the All-NFL Rookie team as the punter by UPI, Pro Football Weekly and the Pro Football Writers.

SCHOOL: A product of the Punt, Pass and Kick program in Garden City, N.Y., Dave did not play high school football at Garden City H.S., but got into it at St. Lawrence where he was a basketball letterman. Earned three varsity letters as a punter and had a 41.7 average in college, winning All-Conference honors.

PERSONAL: David Tuthill Jennings was born on June 8, 1952 in New York City. He now lives in Connecticut with his father, Manson, who is the president of Southern Connecticut State College. Dave worked one summer at the Sheraton Park Plaza Hotel in New Haven where the Giants stayed, is a diehard Boston Celtic fan and is a third cousin of Red Sox catcher Carlton Fisk.

RON JOHNSON Running Back 7th Year
 Michigan 6-1 205 27 Upper Saddle River, N.J.

PRO: In his five-year career with the Giants, Ron has been one of the premier running backs in the NFL and is well on his way to rewriting the Giants' record book in rushing. A No. 1 draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1969, Ron had 472 yards rushing there in his rookie season, then came to the Giants in the key 1970 trade for Homer Jones. He hit 1,027 yards his first year with the Giants to set a club one-season record and led New York to a 9-5 season, making All-Pro and the Pro Bowl. In 1971, thigh and knee injuries sidelined him for all but two games, but in '72 he came back for another banner year rushing for 1,182 yards and again winning All-Pro and Pro Bowl designations. In 1973, despite missing three games with injuries, he added another 902 yards rushing. Then last year, he ran into more injury problems— a hamstring pull, knee injury, broken hand— and as a result had only 218 yards rushing during the year. He already holds club marks for most TDs one game (4); rushing yardage one season (1,182); and rushing attempts one season (298) and is closing in on all of the other career rushing marks as well. His 14 TDs in 1972 led the NFC in TDs scored, and that same year, his 41 combined attempts in one game set an alltime NFL mark.

SCHOOL: Ron was an All-American at Michigan and set several rushing records there, including 2,440 yards, career, to erase Tommy Harmon's previous mark. He set an NCAA one-game record with 347 yards rushing against Wisconsin and was the Big-10 MVP in 1968 and Michigan MVP in both 1967 and '68.

PERSONAL: Ronald Adolphus Johnson was born on October 17, 1947 in Detroit and starred at Northwestern H.S. in the Motor City. He earned a B.S. degree in business administration with a major in finance and has worked in that field during off-seasons. His older brother Alex is an outfielder with the Yankees and a former AL batting champion. Ron is married to the former Karen Lyons.

PRO: A 14th round draft pick by the Giants in 1973, Brian won himself a spot on the roster and appeared in all 14 games, chiefly as a key special teams player although he did log considerable playing time as an outside linebacker. Had two kickoff returns for 30 yards and was a big hitter on the kick coverage teams. Brian had a 36-yard TD run with an interception in a pre-season win over the Steelers. Last year, when Ron Hornsby was injured, Brian moved into the middle linebacker's spot and turned in a quality season, and ended up as the leading tackler on the team for the season. Nick-named "Ralph", he continued to be a solid hitter all the way, on defense and on the special teams. He also came up with a key interception that led to a TD against Kansas City.

SCHOOL: Kelley was named to the NAIA and AP Little All-American teams after his senior year at California Lutheran where he played middle linebacker and tight end. Also won three letters in rugby and played on U.S. College All-Star team and one in wrestling as district heavyweight champion. Won MVP honor in 1971 NAIA championship game.

PERSONAL: Brian Lee Kelley was born on September 1, 1951 in Dallas, Tex., but grew up in Fullerton, Calif. where he sparkled at Sunny Hills H.S. He once worked for the Dallas Cowboys in their training camp and more recently as an instructor at Jack LaLane's health spas.

DOUG KOTAR Running Back 2nd Year
 Kentucky 5-11 205 24 Muse, Pa.

PRO: Signed as a free agent by the Steelers, Doug came to the Giants in a minor trade for free agent quarterback Leo Gasienica during training camp and became an almost instant celebrity by leading the NFC in rushing during the pre-season with 391 yards and a 5.8 average, including 124 yards rushing against the Eagles and 153 against Buffalo. He continued his fine performance in the regular season, finishing as the second leading rusher on the club with 396 yards, a 3.7 average and four touchdowns, despite missing several games with rib injuries. Doug came up with the best rushing day of the season—119 yards against Atlanta— and also had the longest run from scrimmage, a 53-yarder for a TD against the Falcons. Blessed with great quickness and deceptive speed, Doug also had 10 pass receptions and was used as a reserve kickoff and punt return man too.

SCHOOL: Kotar earned three varsity letters at Kentucky as a running back, although injuries slowed him down somewhat in his senior year. He finished with 1,167 yards rushing in his career, and in his first varsity game, ran the opening kickoff back 90 yards for a TD.

PERSONAL: Douglas Allan Kotar (pronounced "Coat-Er") was born on June 11, 1951 in Canonsburg, Pa. and was an all-around star at Canon-McMillan H.S. in his hometown. Doug is married to the former Donna Jean Carosone and is the father of a young son, Doug Jr., 2.

PRO: A 13th round draft choice in 1965, "Spider" has been a starter in the defensive secondary since his rookie year, initially at left corner and for the last eight years as free safety. The defensive captain of the Giants, he rates as one of the premier free safeties in the NFL. An aggressive, intelligent and instinctive player who has proven virtually indestructible despite his slender size and the all-out way he plays. Had his best season, statistically, in 1968 when he intercepted eight passes, returning two for touchdowns. Named to the All-NFL Eastern Conference team that year, he has also been named to the Pro Bowl team twice. His 40 career interceptions ranks him third on the alltime Giant list behind Emlen Tunnel and the late Jimmy Patton and he shares the club record for most interceptions in a game (3). Spider also doubled as a punt return man for seven years and had 62 returns for 314 yards and a 5.1 average. And he's also doubled as a punter during his fine career!

SCHOOL: A two-way player for three seasons as flanker and defensive back at North Texas State, he also had a 4.0 rushing average as a runner and also had a 40.0 punting average. He led the Missouri Valley Conference in punting for two years and also lettered in baseball and track.

PERSONAL: Carl Ford Lockhart was born on April 6, 1943 in Dallas into a family of seven children. He starred at Hamilton Park H.S. in Dallas. He's now made his home in the New York area where he works for Bache & Co. in the off-season. Married to the former Erma Havis, they have a son Carl Jr., 6. Extremely popular speaker, he stays busy with personal appearances year round.

He finished the year as the club's third leading rusher with 240 yards, but had the best average-per-carry with a 4.4 mark. Had his best day in a starting role against Detroit when he rushed for 98 yards on 16 carries. Nicknamed "Slick McQuick", he returned 25 kickoffs for 689 yards and a 27.6 average, including a 72-yarder against the Patriots, and had an 11.6 punt return average. Leon played two seasons in the CFL, rushing for 977 yards his rookie year with Toronto and a 7.1 average to make the All-CFL team. He had 745 yards his second year and his two-year receiving and TD totals showed 58 receptions and 14 touchdowns.

SCHOOL: McQuay rewrote the record book while at Tampa University, despite the fact he left the school in his junior year to sign with Toronto. The speedball halfback rushed for 3,039 yards in 514 attempts for a 6.0 average while at Tampa and scored 37 touchdowns overall.

Mendy missed one game with a knee injury, but in the other 13 was as good a defensive tackle as anyone, coming up with 11 quarterback sacks, fumble recoveries, blocked passes and general mayhem against opposing teams. Combines great strength with quickness and agility and usually requires double-teaming. One play against Dallas typified his overall abilities— he knocked down two blockers, got to Calvin Hill and dumped him for an 8-yard loss so hard that Calvin fumbled, with Roy Hilton picking up the fumble to go 71 yards for a TD. . . and Mendy getting up after his tackle to throw a block to help spring Hilton loose. A starter since his rookie year, John was named to the All-NFL Rookie team that season. In 1973, he was on his way to All-Pro honors when he went down with a knee injury halfway through the year and underwent surgery. Last year, he had it all together and now ranks as one of the premier tackles in the NFL.

SCHOOL: Mendenhall was an AP Little All-American and NAIA choice at Grambling, won four letters, team defensive MVP honors and was a star in the Senior Bowl. Had a big day in the College All-Star game in 1972 also.

PERSONAL: John Rufus Mendenhall was born on December 3, 1948 in Cullen, La., starred at Charles Brown H.S. in Springhill, La. He's married to former Patti Price, has a daughter Zandra and lives in Houston during off-season.

PRO: Morton came to the Giants from Dallas for a No. 1 draft choice just before the trading deadline in 1974 and moved right in as the No. 1 quarterback. In fact, with just three days work, he played the following Sunday against the Cowboys in relief of Jim DelGaizo, then started the remaining games. Morton's presence improved the offense considerably. The Giants scored but 68 points in the first seven games of the year, then increased production to 127 for the final seven with Morton doing the orchestration. By season's end, he had completed 122 of 237 passes for the Giants, for 1,510 yards and nine touchdowns and had enjoyed several outstanding afternoons. He had 21 completions for 259 yards against the Cardinals and was 21-for-32 against the Jets. Mostly, he brought direction and leadership to a young club, and freed now from WFL obligations, should benefit from being with the club from the start of training camp. Morton originally was a No. 1 draft choice of Dallas in 1965 and spent 10 years with the Cowboys, several of those seasons as the No. 1 QB, including taking the club to a Super Bowl. He had a banner year in 1972 with a club record 185 completions for 2,396 yards and 15 TDs.

SCHOOL: Morton was an All-American quarterback at California, starring for three seasons and setting records in the process. A teammate in the backfield was Mike Epstein, later a major league baseball player. Morton was also a top baseball player at Cal, turning down a baseball bonus offer to join the Cowboys.

PERSONAL: Craig L. Morton was born on February 5, 1943 in Flint, Mich., and was raised in Campbell, Calif., where he was an All-State high school star in football, baseball and basketball. A bachelor, he has a restaurant in Dallas and spends time skiing in Aspen as well.

PRO: The No. 2 draft choice of the Giants in 1974 but not as heralded an arrival as John Hicks, Mullen nonetheless proved to be a stellar addition to the club. Like Hicks, Tom stepped right into the starting lineup at left guard and performed with distinction. Despite the fact he missed three games with a shoulder separation, by season's end Mullen was also named to the All-NFL Rookie team by UPI, Pro Football Weekly and the Pro Football Writers Association, giving the Giants both guard positions on those rookie teams. Nicknamed "Moon", for obvious reasons, Mullen proved to be an outstanding pass blocker, perhaps as fine a pass blocker one year removed from college, as the Giants have ever had. Like Hicks, he has the potential to become an All-Pro at his position.

GARY PETTIGREW **Defensive Tackle** **10th Year**
Stanford **6-5 255 30** **Santa Barbara, Calif.**

PRO: Veteran defensive lineman was obtained on waivers from the Philadelphia Eagles at cutdown time last year and claimed a starting job with the Giants until he went down with a knee injury and was sidelined for the final three games. Big and strong, he can play either tackle or end on the front four. Originally a No. 2 draft choice of the Eagles in 1966, Gary played for nine seasons in Philadelphia as a regular and in 1973, as a DT, led the Eagles in minutes played and in tackles. Lifetime stats show six fumble recoveries and four kickoff returns for 65 yards.

SCHOOL: Gary majored in Mechanical Engineering at Stanford where he was co-captain and All-Pac 8 in his senior year. Fine all-around athlete, he also won varsity letters in boxing and rugby at Stanford and was a Kappa Alpha fraternity member.

PRO: Big Jim was the No. 6 draft choice of the Giants last year and turned out to be a versatile young man. He worked at offensive tackle through the pre-season, then moved to defensive tackle in the regular season, playing all 14 games as a special team man and starting a half-dozen games at tackle, as well as snapping for punts on occasion. Hard worker with fine potential, he tied for the club lead in enemy fumble recoveries with two.

SCHOOL: Jim played center, guard and tackle during his three seasons at Eastern Michigan, winning College Division All-American honors by Kodak, AP and the Football News. Big guy also won varsity letters in wrestling and in track as a weight thrower. He was vice president of the Alpha Phi Omega fraternity and majored in Marketing Research.

PERSONAL: James Michael Pietrzak (pronounced "Peter-Zak") was born February 21, 1953 in Hamtramck, Mich., and was a three-sport star at University of Detroit H.S. in Detroit. A bachelor, he plays the guitar and aspires for a career in public relations.

PRO: The No. 5 draft choice of the Giants in 1974, Powers won himself a spot on the club with fine work during the pre-season. He played in all 14 regular season games as a strong safety and special team man and showed versatility and potential. Started at strong safety in seven games and proved to be a fine hitter. Clyde was a cornerback in college and made the transition to safety successfully in the pros.

SCHOOL: Three-year letterman at Oklahoma, Powers was an All Big-Eight selection in his senior year and was picked to play in both the Senior Bowl and Blue-Gray post-season games. Had eight interceptions in collegiate career, including two touchdown returns against Kansas and Clemson.

SCHOOL: Jim won three letters as a cornerback in college, winning All-Conference honors twice as well as Little All-American honors his senior year. Played in the Senior Bowl and Coaches' All-American games, also won two letters in track as a sprinter.

PERSONAL: James L. Stienke was born on November 7, 1950 in Houston, Tex., grew up in Johnson City where his father, Harold, was the communications director at the LBJ Ranch for President Johnson. Jim starred at Lyndon B. Johnson H.S. there, Jim's uncle, Gil Stienke, coached at Texas A & I. Jim is married to the former Kathy Branyon and has a son, Kristopher Scott, 1.

PRO: Stuckey came to the Giants from the Miami Dolphins for a fifth round draft choice during the off-season, and will get an opportunity to win himself a job at cornerback with the Giants. Originally a No. 8 draft choice of the Detroit Lions, Stuckey went to Miami as a free agent in 1972 and made his first pro appearance in that year's Super Bowl when he was activated after an injury to Tim Foley. Played in two Super Bowls with the Dolphins as a special team man, and during his two seasons as a reserve defensive back, had two interceptions for 31 yards returned.

SCHOOL: Henry began his collegiate career at Merritt Junior College in California, then moved on to Missouri where he had eight interceptions in two varsity campaigns there. All-American J.C. pick in 1969.

PERSONAL: Henry Stuckey was born on August 24, 1950 in Oakland, Calif. and grew up in the Bay area where he was All-State at Oakland Prep. Now lives in Miami during the off-seasons.

CARL SUMMERELL **Quarterback** **2nd Year**
East Carolina 6-4 208 23 Virginia Beach, Va.

PRO: No. 4 draft choice of the Giants in 1974 Carl got in valuable playing time during the pre-season games where he displayed good poise and a strong arm. Appeared in seven regular season games, mostly on special teams, but had one long workout at QB against the Redskins and was 6-for-12 for 59 yards in a second-half appearance. Also rushed for eight yards in that game. Will battle it out with Jim DelGaizo for the backup QB spot this season behind Craig Morton.

SCHOOL: Led East Carolina to two straight Southern Conference titles and set college total offense mark with 1,700 yards in his junior year, 425 rushing and 1,275 passing. Had 82 completions for 1,222 yards and 11 TDs in his senior season and rushed 80 times for 351 yards and seven more TDs.

PERSONAL: Carl Leight Summerell was born December 6, 1951 in Norfolk, Va., and starred in football and baseball at Kellam H.S. in Virginia Beach. As a youngster, he was a top Little League player and competed in the Punt, Pass and Kick program. Single, he's an avid golfer.

BOB TUCKER **Tight End** **6th Year**
Bloomsburg State 6-3 230 30 Nutley, N.J.

PRO: The Giants signed Tucker as a free agent in 1970 and he immediately beat out Aaron Thomas as the starting tight end. Bob caught 40 passes for 571 yards and five TDs that year and came very close to winning the NFL's Rookie of the Year award. In 1971, he became the first tight end in NFL history to take a receiving title when he caught 59 for 791 and four TDs. Additionally, he was the first Giant end to earn an individual title since 1935, when Tod Goodwin led the league. Tucker came back with another great season in 1972, winning All-NFL honors for the first time, grabbing 55 passes for 764 yards. In 1973, Tucker again led the club with 50 catches to move past the 200th mark and added five more TDs and last year finished second on the club with 41 grabs to run his 5-year total to 245. He also holds the club record for catching passes in 45 consecutive games. Big, strong, a great runner, Bob had trials with the Eagles and Patriots and spent two seasons in the minor leagues with Lowell, Mass., and Pottstown, Pa.

SCHOOL: Tucker set three NAIA records with Bloomsburg State in 1967—most receptions, highest single game yardage and most yardage in a season. As a two-way end he was named to the Little All-America team in 1967 but, strangely, no pro club took him in the draft.

PERSONAL: Robert Tucker was born on June 8, 1945, in Hazelton, Pa., and is of Tyrolean-Polish descent. His father is a construction foreman in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., his brother Tom is an engineer and a younger brother, Henry, is a student at Bloomsburg. Bob was a top student in college and earned a degree in biology. He represents Walsh & Walsh Insurance Co. in between football seasons.

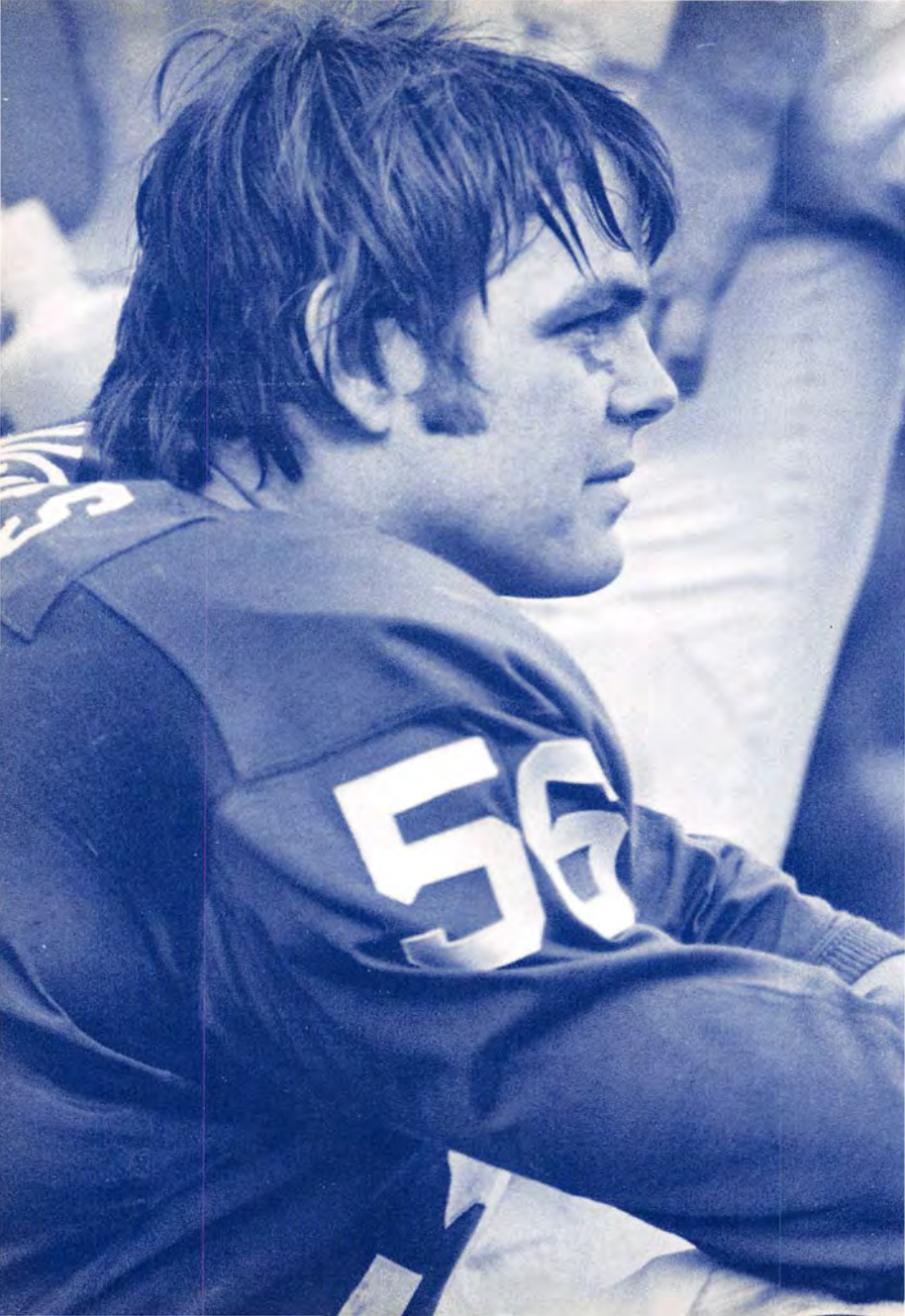

ALLEN SIMPSON **Offensive Tackle** **Round 2**
Colorado State 6-5 265

An All-Western Athletic Conference choice, Simpson starred in this year's East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco where he attracted the attention of pro scouts. Born on July 27, 1951 in Pittsburgh, Simpson played his high school football at Wilkinsburg High School in that city and also earned letters as a shot-putter on the track team. He began his collegiate career at McCook Junior College in Nebraska before moving to Colorado State as a defensive tackle. He was switched to offensive tackle as a sophomore and started for three seasons at left tackle. Teamed with Mark Mullaney, a first-round choice of the Vikings, Simpson helped Colorado State to that No. 1 ranking nationally in passing offense with solid pass blocking all season long. Allen is married and the father of two young sons and still resides in his hometown of Pittsburgh. As a three-year letterman at Colorado State, he was also elected co-captain his senior year and displayed outstanding leadership qualities.

DANNY BUGGS **Wide Receiver** **Round 3**
West Virginia 6-2 188

Wide receiver won All-American honors in both his junior and senior seasons at West Virginia, the Kodak All-American team as a junior and the Time Magazine team his senior year. Buggs was also a two-year letterman in track at West Virginia with clockings of 9.5 in the 100 and 48.3 in an indoor 440-yard event. He was selected as the West Virginia Track MVP of the Year as a junior and also as the West Virginia State Amateur Athlete of the Year that same season. Danny's statistics show a three-year harvest of 86 pass receptions for 1,796 yards and 15 touchdown receptions and a solid average-per-catch figure of 20.8. He was also used extensively on running plays, reverses and end-arounds and in three seasons carried 36 times for 553 yards, an average of 15.3 yards-per-carry ... and six more touchdowns, and added even more lustre to his credentials by being a punt return man, showing 41 returns for 299 yards and three more touchdowns!! A Pre-Med student at Houston, Giblin was also honored by his selection to the All-Academic All-American team. In his last two seasons, Robert had 8 pass interceptions for 131 yards returned, with one of those being a 52-yard TD return in his junior year. He also led the club in fumble recoveries for those two seasons with a total of five and doubled as a fine punt return man. He had 7 returns for 113 yards in his senior year, a 16.1 average with a long return of 51 yards. A native of Port Neches Groves, Tex., just outside of Houston, Robert was an All-State performer at Port Neches Groves High School in football as a two-way player, split end on offense and cornerback on defense as well as linebacker. He was also an outstanding golfer in high school, winning two letters in that sport.

The highly rated tight end of top-rated USC was a two-year starter for USC after starting his collegiate career as a linebacker, initially at El Camino Junior College before his transfer to Southern California. A clutch performer for his two seasons with USC, the 6-2, 225-pounder concluded his collegiate career in winning fashion, including the decisive TD catch from Pat Haden against Ohio State in the Rose Bowl and subsequent impressive work in both the East-West Shrine Game and Senior Bowl. His prowess for catching the ball in a crown has been evident in the past two years as Jim twice has been named to the first team All-PAC 8 team in addition to All-American mentions.

JOHN TATE **Linebacker** **Round 8**
Jackson State **6-2** **228**

A teammate of All-American Bob Brazile, Tate was a standout three-year starter at strongside linebacker for Jackson State, winning Pittsburgh Courier All-American honors the past two years as well as All-Conference laurels with Brazile. Nicknamed "Wildman" by teammates, Tate had 74 solo tackles, 41 assists, 4 quarterback sacks and one interception for 21 yards and a TD in his senior season. Also doubled as punter with a 35.8 average for 25 punts in final season. Native of Mobile, Ala., John is 22, single and still resides in Mobile.

MIKE MAHONEY **Wide Receiver** **Round 9**
Richmond **6-4** **205**

A native of Alexandria, Va., Mike was the starting flanker for Richmond for three seasons, showing a final career mark of 84 pass receptions for 1,388 yards and 13 touchdowns. As a junior, his six TD receptions and average-per-catch of 20.1 yards was tops among receivers in the Southern Conference. This past year, Mahoney's totals were 32 catches for 515 yards and three touchdowns. Mike was an All-State football and track man at Francis Hammond High School in Alexandria, working as both a running back and split end in football and as a sprinter and hurdler in both indoor and outdoor track. Born on June 10, 1953, Mahoney comes from a football-oriented family. His dad, Mike Sr. was a collegiate star and had a brief trial with the San Francisco 49ers.

TERRY McCLOWRY **Linebacker** **Round 10**
Michigan State **6-3** **225**

All Big-10 linebacker hails from a strictly football family. His father, Jim, was a standout player at Chicago University, brother Bob lettered at Michigan State and Terry's twin brother, Pat, also lettered at MSU at a linebacker position. As for Terry, he enjoyed a banner year in his senior season, leading the Spartans in tackles with 129— 67 solos and 62 assists— while adding six quarterback sacks and one interception. Followed up his All-Big 10 honors by playing well in both the East-West Shrine and Hula Bowl games and came up with an interception for a touchdown return in that East-West battle in San Francisco. Terry's junior year credentials were also impressive, finishing second in tackles with 38 solos and 64 assists for a total of 102.

GEORGE MARTIN **Defensive End** **Round 11**
Oregon **6-4** **245**

Highly versatile athlete began his collegiate career as a tight end at Oregon, then switched over to defense in his junior year and became a starter, winning letters in both his junior and senior seasons. Had 64 tackles in his junior year to rank second on the club, upped his totals to 83 in his senior year. Martin was born in South Carolina, then moved to Fairfield, California as a youngster where he became an All-American basketball prep star at Armijo High School. Martin was additionally an All-State football player in high school and earned three letters in tennis as well.

MARSH WHITE **Running Back** **Round 12**
Arkansas 6-2 215

Swift and elusive running back is considered to have fine potential despite a history of nagging injuries in his sophomore and junior seasons at Arkansas. In those two campaigns, he saw but limited action, rushing 80 times for 340 yards and a 4.3 average, but still had some fine days, including a 64-yard game on 8 carries against USC and 78 yards against Texas Tech. Blessed with 4.5 speed in the 40, Marsh had 76 carries for 355 yards in his senior year for a 4.6 average. Scored 10 touchdowns as a freshman in Frosh competition at Arkansas and still maintains that power and speed which made him such a fine prospect before his injury problems.

RICKY TOWNSEND **Kicker** **Round 13**
Tennessee 6-2 205

Twice an All-American selection by the Football Writers Association of America, Townsend was a consistent point-producer for the Vols for three seasons. A soccer-style kicker, Ricky did his number bare-footed in his sophomore and junior seasons, then put the shoe back on in his senior year after a foot infection incurred during the 1973 Gator Bowl. During his three-year career, he hit on 33 of 61 field goal attempts and 72 of 77 conversion attempts. He twice kicked 48-yard field goals, one of which beat Georgia 17-14 and another of 46 yards which knocked off Kentucky 16-14 in his sophomore year. That same season he didn't miss in 31 conversion attempts.

JIM O'CONNOR **Running Back** **Round 15**
Drake 6-0 202

Jim was named to the All-Conference first team for the past two years, as well as getting an honorable mention in the AP All-American listings. Rugged youngster overcame concussion, and back injury in junior year to finish this past season with 1,031 yards rushing in 238 attempts for a 4.3 average and four touchdowns. Also caught 39 passes for another 309 yards and two TDs and finished with career totals of 2,324 yards rushing, third highest total in Drake history, as well as 74 pass receptions for 748 yards. Best single day was a 197-yard rushing game in 1973 before injuries knocked him out of action after seventh game.

Rondy also drew some praise for his ability to read plays quickly and to fill the hole. Rondy also doubled as a punt return man during his career at Lamar.
