Timothy J. Mara, the former co-owner, vice president and treasurer of the New York Football Giants, died of cancer on May 31, 1995 in Jupiter, Florida at the Jupiter Medical Center. He was 59.

Mr. Mara was associated with the Giants from his earliest years, attending his first training camp at age six. Throughout his scholastic career, he served an apprenticeship in all the departments of the team's front office and joined the organization on a full-time basis after his graduation from lona College in 1957.

Mr. Mara was a key figure in the Giants' move from Yankee Stadium to New Jersey and in the construction of Giants Stadium. Working closely with the design architects, contractors and New Jersey state officials, he was involved in every aspect of the new stadium's design and completion. He was also instrumental in the 1979 reorganization that brought George Young, the team's current vice president and general manager, to the Giants.

Mr. Mara was buried from St. Ignatius Loyola Church in Manhattan on June 5.

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WELLINGTON MARA PRESIDENT & CO-CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

The city of New York was introduced to professional football on October 18, 1925 when the New York Giants played their first home game against the Frankford Yellow Jackets. It was on that day that the then nine-year old Wellington T. Mara began a lifetime that has been dedicated to the Giants and the National Football League.

Wellington Mara has been involved in every aspect of operating the Giants during his seven decades with the team, from his first job as a ballboy at training camp to the on-the-field operations to scouting and general organization, and eventually to the front

office executive capacity where he now serves as President and Co-Chief Executive Officer. The only interruption in Mara's Giants career was World War II when he served with distinction for more than three years in the Navy, seeing action in both the Atlantic and Pacific theaters aboard aircraft carriers and emerging as a Lieutenant Commander.

Because of his extensive background in the development and growth of the National Football League, Wellington Mara is recognized as one of the league's leaders. He has been instrumental in the outstanding accomplishments of the Giants: 16 NFL Divisional championships and six NFL

championships, including the Super Bowl XXI and Super Bowl XXV championship titles.

Wellington Mara has not only served the Giants admirably over the years, but he has also been a valuable contributor to league efforts, having served on many ownership committees. From 1971 until 1977, he was Chairman of the Executive Committee of the NFL Management Council, the labor arm of the NFL, and it was under his leadership that the league achieved five years of labor peace from 1977 to 1982. Wellington was elected President of the National Football Conference in 1984, succeeding the late George Halas in that role. Mara is currently a member of the Realignment, Hall of Fame and Player-Club Operations committees, as well as the Executive Committee of the Management Council.

In 1925, Wellington's father, Timothy J. Mara, purchased the Giants franchise to establish a New York entry in the fledgling National Football League. The Mara family's presence has been constant with the Giants since Timothy Mara's purchase of the team. In addition to Timothy's and Wellington's involvement, Wellington's older brother, the late Jack Mara, served as the club's President until his death in 1965. After Jack's death, his son Tim served as Vice President and Treasurer of the team until Bob Tisch purchased the Jack Mara holdings in 1991. Today, two of Wellington's sons are important members of the organization: John Kevin as Executive Vice

President and General Counsel and Frank as Director of Promotions.

Until 1965, Wellington Mara was responsible for the franchise's football decisions, while his brother Jack handled the business side of the team. A key to the Giants' championships in the late-'50s and early-'60s were trades engineered by Wellington that brought Y.A. Tittle, Andy Robustelli, Del Shofner, Dick Modzelewski, Pat Summerall, Joe Walton, Dick Lynch, Erich Barnes, Bill Svoboda, Harland Svare, Bob Schnelker, Herb Rich, Ed Hughes and Walt Yowarsky, among others, to the Giants. Draft choices Frank Gifford and Rosey Brown went on to become members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, as did Tuffy Leemans, whom Wellington personally scouted and recommended in 1936.

Wellington T. Mara, whose nickname is "Duke," was born on August 14, 1916 in New York City. He graduated from Loyola High School before matriculating to Fordham University where he earned his degree in 1937. His brother, Jack, preceded him to Fordham University where he earned a law degree, but Wellington was interested only in joining his father with the Giants and did so immediately after graduation. He has been with the organization ever since.

Wellington married the former Ann Mumm in 1954 and the Maras have 11 children: John Kevin, 40; Susan Ann, 39; Timothy Christopher, 38; Stephen Vincent, 36; Francis Xavier, 35; Shelia Marie, 33; Kathleen Mary, 32; Maureen Elizabeth, 30; Ann Marie, 28; Meghan Ann, 24; and Colleen Elizabeth, 22. The Maras, who reside in Rye, New York, also have 26 grandchildren.



PRESTON ROBERT TISCH CHAIRMAN & CO-CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Preston Robert Tisch, a lifelong New Yorker and one of the country's most successful businessmen, realized a dream come true in February, 1991. It was at that time that he purchased 50% interest in the New York Giants and became Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer of the organization.

Bob Tisch brings to the Giants an unparalleled business sense. In addition to his duties with the football club, Tisch is Co-Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer and a Director of Loews Corporation, one of the nation's largest and most successful financial companies. Tisch served as Postmaster General of the United States from August 1986.

until returning to New York in March 1988. Prior to his appointment as Postmaster, he served as President and Chief Operating Officer of Loews Corporation and its corporate predecessor, Loews Theatres, Inc., a position he held since 1960.

Throughout his career Tisch has been active in civic affairs. He served as Chairman of the New York Convention and Visitors Bureau for 19 years and currently serves as the bureau's Chairman Emeritus. He was also founding Chairman of the New York Convention and Exhibition Center Corporation and Chairman of the Citizens Committee for the Democratic National Conventions held in New York City in 1976 and 1980. In May 1990, New York City Mayor David N. Dinkins appointed Tisch New York City's Ambassador to Washington, a newly-created, unpaid position. In June 1990, Tisch was elected Chairman of the New York City Partnership, Inc. and the New York Chamber of Commerce and Industry. He was previously a Director of the Chamber.

Since his return to New York in 1988, Tisch has been elected to the Board of Directors of CBS Inc. and to the Board of Hasbro, Inc. He was re-elected to the Board of Rite Aid Corporation, renamed a Trustee of New York University, and as a founding co-chairman of Citymeals-on-Wheels, he now serves as President of the Board of Directors. Tisch serves as Chairman of the United States Capitol Preservation Commission, which raises funds for the restoration and renovation of the Capitol. He also was a member of the organizing committee for the 1990 Economic Summit of Industrialized Nations held in Houston. Tisch was recently honored by the Touchdown Club of America as he received the first David "Sonny" Werblin Award for his contributions to the sport of football and for his contributions to society.

The Loews company's history dates back to a summer camp in New Jersey, run by Tisch and his brother, Laurence, followed by the purchase of a hotel in Lakewood, New Jersey and the formation of Tisch Hotels, Inc. In 1959, the Tisch brothers bought controlling interest in Loews Theaters, Inc., a real estate-rich theater chain, which was sold in 1985. In 1971, after Loews acquired Lorillard tobacco, its name was changed to Loews Corporation. Since 1974, Loews has acquired controlling interests in CNA Financial Corporation and Bulova Corporation. Tisch has played an integral role in restructuring the management and market repositioning of both companies which has led to their continued growth and profitability. With 1994 revenues of \$13.5 billion and assets exceeding \$50 billion, Loews Corporation is a major factor in four diverse industries: operation of hotels and resorts through Loews Hotels; property, casualty and life insurance through 83% owned CNA Financial Corporation; production and sale of watches and timing devices through 97% owned Bulova Corporation; and production and sale of cigarettes through Lorillard Tobacco Company. In addition, Loews Corporation owns approximately 18% of the common stock of CBS Inc.

Tisch was born in New York City. He attended Bucknell University before entering the Army in 1944. After military service in World War II, he earned a B.A. degree in economics from the University of Michigan in 1948. Tisch is married to the former Joan Hyman, and they have three children: Steven, Laurie and Jonathan, who is Treasurer for the Giants. Tisch lives with his wife in New York City and Rye, New York.



JOHN K. MARA EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT & GENERAL COUNSEL

John K. Mara, the oldest son of team President Wellington Mara, begins his fifth season with the Giants after joining the club in 1991 as Executive Vice President and General Counsel. In his present position, Mara heads all administrative and financial aspects of the organization and reports directly to the Co-Chief Executive Officers, Wellington Mara and Preston Robert Tisch. Mara spent more than a decade as a distinguished attorney with two prominent New York City law firms prior to joining the Giants.

Mara was born in New York City on December 1, 1954 and grew up in Westchester County in White Plains and then Harrison

where he graduated from Iona Prep High School in New Rochelle. He continued his education at Boston College where he received a B.S. degree in Marketing, graduating with Cum Laude honors in 1976. John then entered the Fordham University Law School in that same year and earned his Law Degree in 1979. He then began his career as an attorney with the law firm of Vedder, Price, Kaufman, Kammholz and Day, specializing in labor and employment law and litigation, then two years later moved to the prestigious firm of Shea & Gould in Manhattan while working in his area of specialization. He continued with Shea & Gould until April 1991 when he joined the Giants.

Throughout his early and formative years, Mara was a familiar fixture at Giants training camps, initially as a ballboy, then as an on-the-field assistant to the coaching staff as well as an assistant in the public relations and media services offices. He also was in attendance at every home and away game, and during that span worked as a production assistant for the major television networks — CBS, NBC and ABC — during telecasts of Giants games in various capacities. He continued these affiliations while at Boston College.

John married the former Denise Walter on July 12, 1980 in Rye, New York. John and his wife are the parents of five children: Lauren, 14; Courtney, 12; John Jr., 11; Christine, 9; and Erin, 5. The Mara family resides in Harrison, New York. John's favorite hobbies include golf and coaching Little League baseball.



JONATHAN M. TISCH TREASURER

Jonathan M. Tisch joined the Giants in February 1991 and immediately began his role as Treasurer. In addition to serving on the Giants Board of Directors, Tisch serves as the President and Chief Executive Officer for Loews Hotels.

During his tenure at Loews, Tisch has been instrumental in overseeing the company's growth and subsequent emergence as one of the leading luxury hotel chains. He has received numerous honors and accolades for his dedication and hard work. Most recently he was honored as the recipient of the "New Yorker for New York Award" given by the Citizen's Committee for New York

City. He has also been named as one of the Business Travel Industry's Most Influential Executives by Business Travel News, as well as one of Crain's New York Business magazine's "All-Stars." Underscoring his presence as an industry leader, he serves as Treasurer of the American Hotel & Motel Association. Tisch also serves on the Commerce Department's Advisory Board, which provides guidance for the United States Travel & Tourism Administration (USTTA)

and also helps direct the National Tourism Policy. He is also a member of the Travel Industry Association of America's (TIA) Government Affairs Council.

Tisch is actively involved in several community philanthropic activities, such as the Pediatric AIDS Foundation and the Robert Steel Foundation for Pediatric Cancer Research at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center. He has also been instrumental in the efforts to bring the Grammy Awards to New York City and has served as Chairman of the Host Committee in 1988, 1991-92 and 1994.

A graduate of Tufts University, Tisch's affection for the television and film industry traces back to working as a Cinematographer/Producer at WBZ-TV in Boston where he received two Emmy Nominations.



GEORGE YOUNG VICE-PRESIDENT & GENERAL MANAGER

George Young has created a lasting impact on the Giants since being named General Manager on Valentine's Day, 1979. Prior to his assuming the stewardship, the Giants had not been in NFL postseason play since the 1963 season, a 15-year famine at the time. Since he instituted his reconstruction policies, the Giants have now won two Super Bowl championships and have been to the NFL playoffs seven times while missing out on an eighth playoff season in the final game of the strike-shortened 1982 campaign and again in 1988 and 1994. The Giants' back-to-back winning playoff seasons in 1984 and 1985 also marked the first time that the club had

achieved postseason play in consecutive years in 22 seasons. Young, who is heading into his 17th season at the helm of the Giants football operation, has been named the National Football League's Executive of the Year an unprecedented four times, winning the award in 1984, 1986, 1990 and 1993.

In building the Giants, Young has placed special emphasis on the draft. From his inaugural draft in 1979 through the 1994 selection process, Young has succeeded in signing every player drafted over that span, and from those drafts, a total of 105 players made the club at one time or another. Young's Giants draft list includes Pro Bowlers Lawrence Taylor, Phil Simms, Leonard Marshall, Mark Bavaro, Rodney Hampton and John Elliott. Over that same span, 22 of those drafted players were named to the All-NFL Rookie team, including 1993's eighth round draft choice LB Jessie Armstead and 1994 second round pick CB Thomas Randolph.

Prior to being named GM by the Giants, Young had spent 11 years in the NFL with the Baltimore Colts and Miami Dolphins. During his tenure with those two clubs, Young had been closely associated with Don Shula at both franchises and had served in a variety of capacities. He was initially brought into the Colts organization in 1968 by Shula as an assistant in the Personnel Department, then two years later was named offensive line coach with that Colts team going all the way to the Super Bowl and scoring a 16-13 win over the Dallas Cowboys. In 1971, Young was named Director of Player Personnel and then in 1973 was named Offensive Goordinator of the Colts by Howard Schnellenberger. A year later, Young rejoined Shula with the Miami Dolphins as Director of Personnel and Pro Scouting.

George Bernard Young was born on September 22, 1930 in Baltimore, Maryland, and was an outstanding football player at Calvert Hall High School in Baltimore. He went on to Bucknell University where he was a starting defensive tackle for three seasons, team captain in 1951 and was named to the Little All-America first team and All-East first team in his senior year. Selected to play in the Blue-Gray game, he was then drafted by the Dallas Texans and played in professional

football for one year.

Young then began a coaching career in the Baltimore school system at Calvert Hall and City College High School and over a 15-year span won six Maryland state championships and had a 60-11-2 record during one span. Additionally, Young was an educator while coaching in Baltimore, teaching History and Political Science. During that teaching career, George also earned two Master's degrees from John Hopkins University and Loyola College. He was further honored in May, 1987 when he was awarded an honorary Doctorate in Humane Letters from Western Maryland College. George and his wife, Mary Love, reside in Upper Saddle River, New Jersey.

COACHING STAFF



DAN REEVES Head Coach

At the end of last season, head coach Dan Reeves told the New York writers, "If you take away the seven-game losing streak, we would have been undefeated." That statement was made after the Giants up-and-down year ended on an up note. Reeves and his staff were faced with many questions before the start of the 1994 season, not the least of which was what kind of production they would get from a young, inexperienced quarterback and secondary. Following a 3-0 start, Reeves' Giants suffered the seven-game losing streak, the longest of Reeves'

29-year NFL career. In what many say may have been his best coaching job ever, Reeves and his coaching staff managed to keep the team together as the Giants won their final six games to get back into playoff contention and finish the year with a 9-7 record.

Reeves is a winner, something that General Manager George Young already knew when he named Reeves the 14th head coach of the New York Giants on January 27, 1993. Reeves quickly proved to Giants followers just what kind of winner he is when he was named the Associated Press Coach of the Year after helping turn a 6-10 Giants 1992 season into a playoff qualifying 11-5 mark in 1993, the best-ever record for a first-year Giants coach. He became just the second head coach in Giants history to lead his team to the playoffs in his first season with the Giants. Allie Sherman was the other Giants head coach to do so in 1961.

Reeves came to the Giants after spending 12 years as head coach of the Denver Broncos (1981-1992). Reeves' 138 career victories going into the 1995 season, his 30th NFL season, gives him the eleventh-most victories in league history. His 138 victories is the second-best among active head coaches in the NFL, behind Miami's Don Shula (337). Reeves has only had two losing seasons in his 14 seasons as a head coach.

Reeves' record of success dates back to his playing days with the Dallas Cowboys. He has participated in 45 NFL postseason games, 15 games as a head coach, 16 as an assistant, six as a player-coach and eight as a player. Reeves has played or coached in a record eight Super Bowls, including leading Denver to three Super Bowl appearances as head coach (Super Bowls XXI, XXII and XXIV). In his 12 seasons in Denver, he produced five first place finishes in the American Football Conference Western Division, the three Super Bowl appearances and four AFC Championship Game appearances. From 1981-1991 Reeves' record at home was 65-20, the best in the NFL during that stretch of time. He was the only AFC coach in the decade of the 1980s to lead his team to consecutive Super Bowl appearances and he led Denver to seven 10-victory seasons in his 12 years. Under Reeves, the Broncos put together winning streaks of 10 games once, eight games once and four games nine times.

Reeves was the youngest head coach in the NFL when he assumed command of the Broncos in 1981 at the age of 37. Denver finished that first season with a 10-6 record and narrowly missed a playoff berth. In 1983, a 9-7 mark and a Wild Card berth earned Reeves a second place finish in the AFC Coach of the Year balloting by UPI, following a 2-7 record in the strike-shortened 1982 season.

In 1986, Reeves' Broncos won the AFC Championship with a team that featured a high-powered passing game that took care of the ball as it established a team record for lowest interception percentage (.029). Even though the Broncos compiled an 11-5 mark in 1985, Denver did not make the playoffs. That performance came on the heels of a 13-3 record in 1984, which gave Denver its highest victory total ever and Reeves was recognized as Coach of the Year.

In 1987, Reeves led an injury-riddled team to a 10-4-1 record, best in the AFC, and its second straight AFC West title. Even though the 1987 season was only 15 games, Denver set numerous single-season team records, including most touchdowns scored (tied team mark with 45), most yards total offense (5,624), most games scoring 20 or more points (12) and most consecutive games scoring 20 or more points (seven), which tied a mark from three other seasons. Also, the Broncos tied a team mark with six games of 30 or more points.

In 1989, Reeves led the Broncos back from an 8-8 mark in 1988 to their third Super Bowl appearance in four years while garnering AFC Coach of the year honors. Reeves' record of Super Bowl appearances in that four-year span was the first time an AFC coach had taken his team to the league's championship game with such frequency since Don Shula led the Miami

Dolphins to three Super Bowls in 1971, 1972 and 1973.

In 1991, Reeves was named AFC Coach of the Year by the Kansas City 101 Club, the first time the club has ever honored a coach three times while he was coaching the same leam, and Football News when the Broncos finished with a 12-4 record and earned a spot in the AFC Championship Game. It was the best turnaround effort in the NFL that season after the Broncos had finished with a 5-11 mark in 1990.

Even though his 1992 Denver team finished 8-8, his ballclub was still in the hunt for a Wild Card berth on the season's final weekend when the Broncos lost to the Kansas City Chiefs.

Until taking the Denver post, Reeves had been a member of the Dallas coaching staff since 1970, when he spent two seasons as a player-coach. In 1972 he was a full-time assistant coach in charge of the offensive backfield. Reeves was in private business in 1973 before returning to the coaching ranks in 1974 as the backfield coach for the Cowboys. He remained in that position until 1977 when he was named offensive coordinator on Tom Landry's staff.

Reeves began his professional playing career as a free agent running back for Dallas after having been an outstanding collegiate quarterback at the University of South Carolina where he is a member of the school's Hall of Fame. Reeves was an all-purpose player during his eight seasons (1965-1972) with Dallas (1,990 yards rushing with 25 TDs and 129 pass receptions for 1,693 yards and 17 TDs) and he finished his playing career as the fifth all-time rusher in Dallas history. In addition, he completed 30 passes, including two for TDs, on the halfback option, and he also returned punts and kickoffs at various times.

Reeves was born in Americus, Georgia on January 19, 1944. Reeves and his wife Pam, who celebrated their 31st wedding anniversary on June 27, have three children — daughters Dana and Laura, and a son Lee. They also have two granddaughters, Caitlin and Ashley.

ASSISTANT COACHES



GEORGE HENSHAW OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

George Henshaw enters his third season with the Giants after being named offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach on February 2, 1993. In his first season, the 1993 Giants offense featured a running game that led the NFL with 138.1 yards per game. In 1994, Henshaw's biggest achievement was tutoring quarterback Dave Brown, who finished with a 9-6 record in his first season as a starter.

Before coming to the Giants, Henshaw spent five years with the Denver Broncos (1988-1992), including the 1992 season

as Denver's offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. Prior to that position, Henshaw coached Denver's wide receivers in 1991, and from 1988 until 1990 he coached the Broncos offensive line. During Henshaw's tenure in Denver, the Broncos won two AFC West titles and appeared in Super Bowl XXIV.

Henshaw, 47, was head coach at the University of Tulsa in 1987. Before that, he was offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at the University of Alabama from 1983 until 1986. In 1983, Alabama led the Southeastern Conference in scoring offense (30.7 points per game) and total offense (424.1 yards per game). Prior to going to Alabama, Henshaw was on the coaching staff at Florida State from 1976 until 1982. For three years, he served as defensive line coach. Henshaw was the Seminoles' offensive coordinator and offensive line coach during his final four years at Florida State. In 1982, Florida State ranked second in the nation in scoring offense, averaging 30.7 points per game, and third in total offense with an average of 465.7 yards per game.

Henshaw was born on January 22,1948 in Richmond, Va. and is a 1970 graduate of West Virginia University. He coached at West Virginia from 1970 until 1976. Henshaw and his wife Kathleen have three children: Michael, Matthew and Kerry.

MIKE NOLAN DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Mike Nolan begins his third season with the Giants after being named defensive coordinator by Dan Reeves on February 2, 1993. Nolan worked on Reeves staff for six seasons in Denver (1987-1992), the last four as the Broncos linebackers coach.

In his first season at the helm of the Giants defense, the team allowed the fewest points in the NFL (205 points). In 1994, Nolan made the adjustments for a successful switch from the 3-4 to the 4-3 defensive scheme. The Giants defense

fell to 11th in the NFL but was fourth in the league and second in the NFC during the Giants season-ending six-game winning streak.

Nolan, 36, was Denver's special teams coach in 1987 and 1988, and he assisted the defensive coaching staff in 1988 before assuming the linebackers assignment. Nolan joined the Denver staff after serving as linebackers coach at Louisiana State in 1986. He was secondary coach at Rice in 1984 and 1985, Prior to joining the Rice staff, Nolan spent two years at Stanford, coaching the secondary in 1982 and the linebackers in 1983.

The son of former NFL head coach and former Giants defensive back, Dick Nolan, Mike was a four-year letterman at free safety at the University of Oregon, graduating in 1981. He went to the Denver Broncos training camp in 1981 as a free agent and then spent a year at Oregon as a graduate assistant coach.

Born in Baltimore, Maryland on March 7, 1959, Nolan and his wife Kathy have four children: Michael, Laura, Jennifer and Christopher.

DON BLACKMON LINEBACKERS

Don Blackmon, a seven-year standout linebacker for the New England Patriots, was named the Giants linebackers coach on February 10, 1993. Blackmon came to the Giants from the Browns organization where he served as linebackers coach during the 1991 season. He coached the outside linebackers for the Patriots for three seasons (1988-1990) after retiring as a player in 1987.

Blackmon was a fourth-round draft choice of the New England Patriots out of Tulsa in the 1981 draft. He recorded

541 tackles, 30.5 quarterback sacks, six fumble recoveries, 19 pass deflections, two safeties, 10 forced fumbles and five interceptions during his NFL career. He started 72 of 89 games for the Patriots before being forced to retire after a neck injury in a game against the Raiders in 1987.

Blackmon, 37, was a three-time all-conference selection at the University of Tulsa. As a senior, he was named the Missouri Valley Conference Defensive Player of the Year and was named to the school's Hall of Fame.

Don and his wife Jacqueline have two daughters, Candice and Tiffany, and a son, Don II.



DAVE BRAZIL DEFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

Dave Brazil joined the Giants staff in the spring of 1992 as the team's linebackers coach. When Dan Reeves came to the Giants in January of 1993, Brazil was retained as the defensive quality control coach.

Prior to coming to the Giants, Brazil was defensive coordinator of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1990 and 1991 after joining Chuck Noll's coaching staff in Pittsburgh as linebackers coach in 1989. Brazil's 1990 Steelers defense finished first in the NFL, allowing the fewest overall yards and fewest passing

yards in the league. From 1984 through the 1988 season Brazil was a member of the Kansas City Chiefs coaching staff as secondary and then linebackers coach.

Before joining the NFL in 1984, Brazil was defensive coordinator at Kent State (1981-1982) and Boston College (1980). Brazil's first pro coaching experience was in the World Football League with the Detroit Wheels (1974) and the Chicago Fire (1975). Prior to joining the pro ranks, Brazil coached at Eastern Michigan (1971-1973), Tulsa (1969-1970) and Holy Cross (1968).

Brazil was born in Detroit, Michigan on March 25, 1936. He graduated from the University of Detroit with a business administration degree. He and his wife Bridget have six children: daughters Kathleen and Mary Ann and sons Michael, Daniel, Thomas and Patrick.



JAMES DANIEL TIGHT ENDS

James Daniel began his professional coaching career when Dan Reeves named him tight ends coach of the Giants on February 16, 1993. Daniel came to the Giants after spending 12 years on the coaching staff at Auburn University (1981-1992) where he was offensive line coach. During his tenure at Auburn, the Tigers made nine postseason bowl game appearances.

Prior to going to Auburn, Daniel was an assistant coach at Enterprise High School in Enterprise, Alabama from 1974

through 1980. During his time at Enterprise, 11 of his offensive linemen received college scholarships.

Daniel's only NFL coaching experience before coming to the Giants was in 1988 when he received a coaching fellowship to spend training camp working with the New Orleans Saints coaching staff and then in 1992 when he served the same fellowship with Reeves staff in Denver.



STEVE DEBERG QUARTERBACKS

Steve DeBerg joined Dan Reeves staff on February 15, 1995 as the team's quarterbacks coach. DeBerg will help develop the Giants three young quarterbacks. In addition, the hiring of DeBerg will allow offensive coordinator George Henshaw, who also served as the team's quarterbacks coach for the past two seasons, more time for his coordinator duties.

DeBerg, who stepped in for the Miami Dolphins in 1993 when Dan Marino injured his achilles tendon early in the season, comes to the Giants after a 17-year National Football

League career. DeBerg, 41, played on five different teams during his career, finishing with the Miami Dolphins in 1993 when he was the oldest player in the league. A 10th-round draft choice by the Dallas Cowboys out of San Jose State in 1977, DeBerg played with San Francisco (1978-1980), Denver (1981-1983), Kansas City (1988-1991), Miami (1993) and had two stints with Tampa Bay (1984-1987, 1992). He played for Reeves in Denver from 1981 through 1983.

DeBerg compiled some of the most impressive passing statistics in NFL history. He ranks ninth on the NFL's all-time passing yardage chart with 33,872 yards, seventh on the league's all-time completion list with 2,844, and ninth on the all-time attempt list with 4,965.

Born January 19, 1954 in Oakland, California, DeBerg and his wife, Marcia have a daughter, Amy, 15, and a son, Drew, 12.



JOE DECAMILLIS SPECIAL TEAMS

Joe DeCamillis joined Dan Reeves and the Giants staff on February 9, 1993 as special teams coach. DeCamillis spent five years (1988-1992) with the Denver Broncos. He spent the 1992 season as the Broncos defensive quality control coach as well as an assistant special teams coach.

DeCamillis, 30, was an All-America wrestler as a senior at the University of Wyoming where he received a degree in secondary education in 1987. He wrestled for Wyoming from

1983 through 1987 and was a two-time All-Western Athletic Conference performer.

Born on June 29, 1965 in Arvada, Colorado, DeCamillis was an all-state quarterback and wrestler at Arvada High School. Joe and his wife Dana have two daughters, Caitlin and Ashley.



KERRY GOODE ASST. STRENGTH & CONDITIONING/ OFFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

Kerry Goode joined the Giants coaching staff on March 1, 1993 as the team's assistant strength and conditioning coach. In addition to assisting Al Miller with the team's strength and conditioning responsibilities, he serves as the Giants offensive quality control coach. Goode joined the Giants staff after spending the 1992 season as regional manager for Sportplex fitness centers in Alabama and 1991 as assistant to the

Associate Athletic Director for Compliance at the University of Alabama.

Goode was a tailback for Alabama from 1983 through 1987. During his playing career, Goode was the team's co-captain as a senior and the SEC Freshman of the Year in 1983. He was a seventh-round draft choice of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1988. In his rookie campaign, Goode gained 231 yards rushing on 63 attempts. Goode signed with Dan Reeves' Denver Broncos in 1989 before being released prior to the start of the season. Goode signed with Miami later in the season and appeared in one game for the Dolphins.

Goode, was born on July 28, 1965 in Town Creek, Alabama. He and his wife, the former Pamela Fending, have a son, Brooks (5-6-95). Goode's brother Chris spent eight seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, and his cousin Antonio Langham was the first pick of the Cleveland Browns in 1994.



EARL LEGGETT DEFENSIVE LINE

After spending the previous 13 seasons as a coach with the Raiders and Broncos, Earl Leggett joined the Giants staff as defensive line coach on February 2, 1993.

Leggett was with the Raiders staff from 1980 through 1988 and then again in 1991 and 1992. During his tenure with the Raiders, the franchise won two Super Bowl titles. He spent the 1989 and 1990 seasons on Dan Reeves' staff in Denver. In his first year with Denver, the Broncos captured the AFC championship. Prior to his first stint with the Raiders. Leggett

coached the defensive line for the San Francisco 49ers in 1978 and for the Seattle Seahawks in 1976 and 1977. Leggett began his coaching career at Nicholls State in 1971 before moving to Texas Christian in 1972 and 1973. His first professional coaching experience was with the Southern California Sun of the World Football League in 1974 and 1975.

Leggett was an All-America defensive tackle at Louisiana State University before being chosen by the Chicago Bears in the first round of the 1957 draft. He was traded to the Los Angeles Rams in 1966 and later taken in the 1967 veteran allocation draft by the New Orleans Saints, for whom he played two seasons (1967-1968).

Leggett and his wife Bobbie have two sons and two daughters.



PETE MANGURIAN OFFENSIVE LINE


Pete Mangurian spent five years on Dan Reeves staff in Denver (1988-1992), including the 1989 Super Bowl season, before coming to the Giants on February 2, 1993 as offensive line coach. Mangurian heads an offensive line that has helped Rodney Hampton record his third and fourth consecutive 1,000 yard rushing seasons the past two years.

He was Denver's offensive line coach during the 1991 and 1992 seasons after spending three seasons as the Broncos tight ends and H-backs coach. Prior to joining Dan Reeves

coaching staff in Denver, Mangurian served as offensive line coach at Louisiana State University from 1984 through 1987. During those four years, LSU made four consecutive bowl game appearances and established a school record for total offense in a season three times. Mangurian began his coaching career at Southern Methodist in 1979 and 1980. He was on the staff at New Mexico State in 1981 and at Stanford in 1982 and 1983.

Mangurian was a defensive tackle at LSU from 1975-78. He earned a political science degree from LSU in 1978.

Mangurian was born in Los Angeles, California on June 17, 1955 and was raised in Sherman Oaks, California. He and his wife Amy have two daughters, Lauren and Katie.



AL MILLER
STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Al Miller begins his third season with the Giants after being named the strength and conditioning coach on February 2, 1993. Miller came to the Giants from the Broncos after spending eight seasons (1985-1992) in Denver in the same capacity. Miller is the driving force behind the Giants successful off-season conditioning program.

Prior to joining the Broncos, Miller was the strength coach for the University of Alabama from 1982 through 1984. Before that, he was strength and conditioning coach at Northeast

Louisiana in 1981 and Mississippi State in 1980. From 1974 through 1978, Miller was line-backers and strength coach at Northwestern Louisiana. He was a high school and junior high school coach from 1970 through 1973.

Miller was born in El Dorado, Arkansas on August 29, 1947 and is a 1970 graduate of Northeast Louisiana. He was a four-year letterman at Northeast Louisiana as a wide receiver and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame in 1992. He earned a Master's degree from Louisiana Tech in 1974. Al and his wife Janis have a son, Carey Brian, and a daughter, Lisa.



DICK REHBEIN WIDE RECEIVERS

Dick Rehbein originally joined the Giants staff in February 1992 as the team's tight ends coach. When Dan Reeves took over the team in January of 1993, Rehbein was given the assignment of coaching the wide receivers.

Rehbein joined the Giants after spending eight seasons with the Minnesota Vikings (1984-1991). While with Minnesota, Rehbein was a special assistant in 1984, receivers coach from 1985 through 1988 and assistant offensive coordinator/ passing game coach from 1989 through

1991. Prior to his Minnesota experience, Rehbein was special teams coach and assistant offensive line coach of the Los Angeles Express of the USFL in 1984. Before that, he was special teams coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1979 through 1983.

A four-year letterman as a center at Ripon College in Wisconsin, Rehbein was a Division II All-American who went to training camp with the Green Bay Packers in 1977.

Rehbein, 39, was born on November 22, 1955 in Green Bay, Wisconsin. Rehbein and his wife Pam have two daughters, Betsy and Sarah.



GEORGE SEFCIK

RUNNING BACKS

George Sefcik enters his 23rd year in the NFL coaching ranks and his fifth season as a coach with the Giants. Sefcik originally joined the Giants as receivers coach in May of 1991. When Dan Reeves was named head coach of the Giants in January of 1993, Sefcik was assigned to coach the team's running backs and he has helped Rodney Hampton produce two of his four career 1,000-yard seasons. In 1993, Sefcik coached a unit that led the NFL in rushing yardage with 138.1 yards per game.

Sefcik's first NFL job was as offensive backfield coach for the Baltimore Colts in 1973. He moved to the Cleveland Browns as running backs coach in 1975. Following the 1978 season, Sefcik coached the running backs for six years for the Cincinnati Bengals (1979-1983), helping guide the Bengals to Super Bowl XXVI. He was running backs and quarterbacks coach for the Green Bay Packers from 1984 through the 1987 season before serving as offensive coordinator for the Kansas City Chiefs in 1988. From 1989 through 1991, Sefcik coached the running backs for Cleveland.

Sefcik was born on December 27, 1939 in Cleveland, Ohio, where he helped lead Benedictine High School to the state championship as a halfback in 1958. He was a three-year letterman as a two-way halfback for Notre Dame from 1959 through 1961. Sefcik began his coaching career by spending six years at Notre Dame and was on the staff at the University of Kentucky for four seasons before joining the NFL.

Sefcik and his wife Lorie have three children.



ZAVEN YARALIAN DEFENSIVE BACKS

After spending three seasons on Mike Ditka's staff with the Chicago Bears as defensive backs coach (1990-1992), Zaven Yaralian joined the Giants on February 4, 1993 in the same capacity. In his first season with the Giants, he helped direct a unit that allowed the fewest points in the NFL (205 points). Yaralian's coaching was a key reason that the Giants were the second-best defense against the pass over the final six weeks of the 1994 season, In 1990, Chicago led the NFL with 31 interceptions.

Yaralian began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Nebraska, in 1975. He then coached the defensive backs at Washington State in 1976 and 1977 before moving on to the University of Missouri in the same role from 1978 through 1983. Yaralian served as the secondary coach at the University of Florida from 1984 through 1987 and was the Gators defensive coordinator as well from 1985 through 1987. He coached the defensive backs at the University of Colorado in 1988 and 1989 before joining the Bears staff prior to the 1990 season. Yaralian was a member of the coaching staff at Colorado during their National Title game against Notre Dame in the 1989 Orange Bowl.

Yaralian was a two-year starter at cornerback for Nebraska before a short stint with the Green Bay Packers in 1974 and the Philadelphia Bell of the World League in 1975.

Born on February 5, 1952, Yaralian grew up in California where he was the state's high school player of the year in football at Ingelwood High in 1969. Yaralian and his wife Lorraine have two sons, Blake and Garrett.

PLAYER PERSONNEL



ERNIE ACCORSI ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Since beginning his NFL career with the Baltimore Colts in 1970, Ernie Accorsi has worked in virtually every phase of the football business. Accorsi, who was Executive Director of Business Affairs for the Baltimore Orioles from February 25, 1994 until being hired by the Giants on July 6, 1994, was brought to the Giants to assist George Young with the football operations.

Most recently in the NFL, he served as Executive Vice President/Football Operations for the Cleveland Browns from 1984 until he left the team in 1992. During that time, the Browns made five consecutive playoff appearances, including three appearances.

in the AFC Championship Game. With the Browns, Accorsi was responsible for player acquisitions and player-related movements. He handled all player contract negotiations and managed the Browns player personnel department.

After serving as the Colts public relations director for five years, Accorsi worked in the NFL office as Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference in 1975 and 1976. He returned to the Colts in 1977 as the team's assistant general manager. He later became the Colts general manager for two years, 1982 and 1983, prior to joining the Browns organization.

Since leaving the Browns and prior to joining the Orioles at the beginning of last year, Accorsi served as a special advisor on the committee to attract an NFL expansion franchise in the city of Baltimore. In that capacity, he was responsible for selling all 100 sky suites for the proposed football stadium, as well as all 7,500 club seats. The sky suites were sold out in six weeks, while the club seating sold out in eight weeks. In addition, he also raised commitments of \$51 million for Baltimore's Expansion Efforts Premium Seating Campaign.

While with the Orioles, Accorsi oversaw the team's stadium operations, media relations, community relations and coordination of TV and radio operations, including Major League Baseball Network.

A 1963 graduate of Wake Forest University, Accorsi has worked as a sports writer for the Charlotte News, Baltimore Evening Sun and Philadelphia Inquirer. He has also worked in the sports information departments at St. Joseph's College in Philadelphia and Penn State University. Accorsi has three children: sons Michael (26), a former graduate assistant under George Welsh at the University of Virginia and currently an Administrative Assistant at the University of Maryland, and Patrick (21), a student at the University of Kentucky; and a daughter Sherlyn (25), a graduate of Penn State University.



HARRY HULMES

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

With 38 years of professional football experience to his credit, Hulmes brings a wealth of NFL knowledge to the Giants. The veteran NFL executive joined the Giants in 1984 as the team's Assistant General Manager.

Prior to being named by the Giants, Hulmes had served as Chief Operating Officer for the Arizona Wranglers of the USFL, but virtually all of his previous experience was within the NFL where he served for 12 years with the Baltimore Colts and 13 years with the New Orleans Saints in a variety of positions.

Hulmes began his career in sports with the Baltimore Orioles as

assistant business manager, then was the sports information director at Bucknell University before entering the NFL as business manager of the Colts in 1958. He subsequently served as public relations director and general manager of the Colts before moving to the Saints in 1970 as assistant general manager. Until he departed for the Wranglers in 1982, Hulmes also served the Saints as Director of Player Personnel and Vice President of Administration.

After graduating from Northeast High School in Philadelphia, Hulmes spent three years in the Navy as a radarman in the South Pacific and Persian Gulf theaters. Hulmes earned a B.A. degree in journalism and psychology at the University of Pennsylvania after returning from the service.

Boisture began his coaching career at Austin Catholic H.S. in Detroit where he was head football coach, then continued as a head coach at St. Ambrose H.S. in Detroit. He moved into the collegiate ranks at the University of Houston as an assistant coach for offensive backs then moved on to Holly Cross College in 1966 as Defensive Coordinator. 
JERRY SHAY DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING

Shay, a Giants tackle during the 1970 and 1971 seasons, was named Director of College Scouting in 1977 after serving as a scout for the team since 1972. While serving as a scout, Shay was responsible for the Western states area, including all of the West Coast as well as Wyoming, Montana and the Dakotas.

Shay was an All-America star at Purdue University and was the No. 1 draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings in 1966. He was a starting defensive tackle for the Vikings for two years, then was traded to the Atlanta Falcons in 1968 where he again starred for two seasons before coming to the Giants in a trade in 1970 for a

draft choice. Shay was a key performer that season as the Giants finished with a 9-5 record and missed the playoffs by one game. ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Donohue begins his second season as Assistant Director of Player Personnel after spending 10 years as a scout. He originally joined the Giants in August of 1983 after serving in coaching capacities on both the collegiate and high school levels.

Donahue played his scholastic sports at Dewitt Clinton High School in the Bronx. He earned a B.S. degree in Education from the University of Dayton, then continued at Michigan State University in Educational Administration. He began his coaching career as a head football coach at Buckeye H.S. in Rushsylvania, Ohio, then was a coach and science teacher at Bellefontaine H.S.

in Bellefontaine, Ohio before entering the collegiate ranks as a freshman football coach at Michigan State. He then served as a defensive coach at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy, secondary coach at C.W. RAYMOND WALSH, JR. RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Ray has been with the Giants since 1973, initially as an Administrative Assistant before moving over to the scouting and player personnel department. As a youngster, Walsh worked at Giants preseason training camps from 1956-63.

Walsh, who is also known by his nickname "Whitey," earned a degree in Inter-American Relations at Fordham University in 1963 after graduating from Archbishop Stepinac H.S. in White Plains where he grew up. After a tour of duty in the U.S. Army, he joined United Airlines in 1965 in the Passenger Service department and

remained with United until April of 1973 when he joined the Giants.

Married to the former Judith Carey, Ray is the father of two sons, David 21, and Timothy, 7, and a daughter Susan, 19. The family resides in Ramsey, New Jersey. ROSEY BROWN

After a Hall of Fame career as a tackle for the Giants from 1953-1965, Roosevelt "Rosey" Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a coach before being appointed as a scout in 1971.

During his playing career, Brown ranked as one of the all-time great offensive linemen in the National Football League. The wideranging tackle earned All Pro honors eight times and was selected to play in the Pro Bowl on ten occasions. In 1956, Brown was voted Lineman of the Year in the NFL.

Brown was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966. In 1969, Brown replacd Jim Trimble as head line coach. In 1971.

Brown, along with another coaching aide, Ken Kavanaugh, left Alex Webster's staff to assume new responsibilities under Jim Lee Howell, his one-time coach, in the scouting department.

Brown, now 63, is a resident of Scottsville, Va. but spends a good deal of his time on the road in search of fresh talent for the Giants.



JOHN CREA

Crea originally joined the Giants as a scout in the spring of 1992 after an impressive college coaching career.

After graduating from Monsignor Farrell High School in Staten Island, Crea began his collegiate days at the University of Utah. He then transferred to Albany State University where he won three varsity letters as a defensive back and wide receiver. He graduated from Albany State with a B.A. degree in English and Communications. Crea added a Master's degree in Physical Education from Arizona State University where he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant.

He continued his collegiate coaching career with stops at Albany State, Kean College, Frostburg State in Maryland, and Holy Cross. In 1982, Crea was named the head coach at William Paterson College in New Jersey. After six years in that position, he became the head coach at Methodist College in Fayetteville, North Carolina from 1987 through the 1991 campaign.

Married to the former Kathleen Coyle, John and his wife have a daughter, Kelly, 12, and he lists racquetball and golf as his favorite hobbies.



JEREMIAH DAVIS

Davis began his affiliation with the Giants in 1988 as a part-time scout after a career as a collegiate coach and recruiting specialist. In March of 1990, Davis was named to the Giants scouting department in a full-time capacity.

Davis graduated from Montclair High School in Montclair , New Jersey, then bagan his college football career at Yakima Junior College in Yakima, Washington before receiving a B.A. degree in Criminal Law from the University of Wyoming in 1977. He subsequently earned a Master's degree in Sports Administration from Grambling University in 1981.

Davis began his college coaching career at Wyoming as a secondary assistant and strength coach and served in the same capacity at the University of Washington and at Grambling where he also worked with the linebackers. He moved on to Northern Iowa and to the University of Central Florida as an assistant coach, then moved into the recruiting area with Purdue University in 1985. He was also at Tennessee-Martin for two years as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator before joining the Giants in 1988.



GREG GABRIEL

Gabriel joined the Giants scouting department during the 1985 offseason after serving as an area scout for an NFL scouting combine in the Great Lakes area. Gabriel gained his first professional football experience working part-time in the scouting department of the Buffalo Bills, both in film grading and in player evaluation.

A native of Buffalo where he was born on May 4, 1951, Gabriel played his scholastic sports at Bishop Neumann High School in Williamsville, New York, He won three varsity letters as a running back at Canisius College where he earned a B.S. degree.

Prior to entering the football profession, Gabriel was an account executive with Prudential-Bache and later with Dean Witter Reynolds while working part-time with the Bills.

He played for eight seasons as a running back with the Buffalo Geminis, a semi-pro outfit, and was additionally the offensive backfield coach for one season there. Gabriel is married to the former Suzanne Kallay, is the father of three daughters, Liza, Ryan, and Kelsey, and resides in Grand Island, New York.



KEN KAVANAUGH

Kavanaugh, a member of the Chicago Bears all-time team, brought a wealth of experience as both a professional player and a coach to the Giants when he joined the scouting department in 1971. He moved into the scouting department from the coaching staff where he had been offensive end coach from 1955-68 and offensive coach from 1969-70. Kavanaugh coached the Giants for a total of 16 years under three head coaches: Jim Lee Howell, Allie Sherman and Alex Webster.

Prior to joining the Giants coaching staff, the College Hall of Fame end spent one seaon (1951) as end coach for the Chicago

Bears and one season (1954) at Villanova College in his hometown of Philadelphia.

As a player, Ken starred for the Chicago Bears from 1940-41. He left the Bears for an Air Force tour of duty as a bomber pilot in World War II in Europe, then returned to the team to make All Pro in 1946 and 1947. Kavanaugh set four all-time Chicago records which still stand today: most touchdown passes caught (50); most TD passes caught one season (13); highest average gain, career (22.4); and highest average gain, season (25.6).

During his collegiate career, Kavanaugh was a four-year regular (1936-40), twice earning All-America honors.

Kavanaugh and his wife, Ann, now reside in Sarasota, Florida.



JERRY REESE

Jerry Reese was added to the Giants scouting department on December 15, 1994 after a successful playing and coaching career at the University of Tennessee at Martin. During his college playing career (1981-1984), Reese was honored as a two-time All-Gulf South Conference pick. He is high on UT-Martin's all-time career list in interceptions and still holds several punt return records. Reese was GSC Defensive Player of the Week three times during his career and was named team MVP following his senior season.

Following his playing career, Reese served as a student assistant for one year and as a graduate assistant for two seasons before becoming a fulltime coach of the secondary from 1988 through 1993. He moved to coaching the receivers and assumed the assistant head coach title in January of 1993.

Reese has his Bachelor's degree in Health and Physical Education and earned his Master's degree in Education Administration and Supervision.

Married to the former Gwen Moore, a UT-Martin graduate, the couple had their first child, Jasmyne Danielle, on June 13, 1992.

STEVE VERDEROSA

The 1995 season marks Steve Verderosa's eighth season with the New York Giants after joining the scouting staff in 1988. Verderosa came to the Giants after serving in the scouting department for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Verderosa began his collegiate career at Central lowa as a wide receiver and punter after graduating from Melville High School in Setauket, N.Y. He then moved to New York Institute of Technology where he continued his dual roles, earning ECAC Player of the Week Honors for an eight-catch, 100-yard day vs. Western Connecticut in the 1975 season.

After receiving a degree in general architecture and a design award in his senior year, Verderosa had a tryout with the Washington Redskins as a wide receiver and punter in 1977 and also had a two-week stint with the Cleveland Browns as a punter in the 1978 preseason.

Verderosa worked for one year as an architectural draftsman before getting the football urge and beginning a coaching career at his alma mater, New York Tech, as an offensive assistant. He then spent two seasons as a coach and teacher at St. Anthony's High School before landing a spot as defensive backfield coach at Columbia University. From there, he moved on to C.W. Post for four years as secondary coach and then joined the scouting department of the Buccaneers.

TONY CEGLIO DIRECTOR OF VIDEO OPERATIONS

Ceglio begins his 20th season with the Giants and his second as the team's Director of Video Operations after joining the Giants in 1975 as the club's Film Director. Ceglio handles the broadcasting side of the Giants video operations, including producing and directing the Giants TV show, "Giants Today," while still coordinating the video department. This past offseason, "Giants Today" was honored with an Emmy Award in the category of Outstanding Sports Programming at the 38th Annual New York Emmy Awards ceremony.

When the NFL officially switched from 16mm film to video in 1986, Ceglio designed the premier video tape editing system in the NFL, the Lake Sports Compiler. The Giants were the first team in the NFL to put this system on line, and since then several other teams have employed this system. Ceglio also co-authored the official NFL rules for the video taping of games and game tape exchange, and he has been elected chairman of the NFL Video Directors for three years.

Currently, Tony roams the sidelines shooting for the "Giants Today" show, which he produces and which airs on the MSG Network. Ceglio is well-known in the freelance community as a producer, cameraman, editor on music videos, documentaries, feature film promotions and sports.

TYRONE WHEATLEY
Running Back 6-0, 227 Michigan Born: January 19, 1972

Prototype runner with an excellent combination of size, strength, stamina and speed...Only the third player in school history to rush for over 3,500 yards and gain over 4,000 all-purpose yards during a career, joining Jamie Morris (4,293 rushing: 6,201 all-purpose; 1984-87) and Butch Woolfolk (3,861 rushing: 4,126 all-purpose; 1978-81)...Ranks second on the Michigan career list with 4,186 yards on the ground, surpassed only by Morris (4,393)...Carried the ball 688 times, ranking behind Wolfolk (718) and Morris (809) on the school's career chart...His 47 rushing touchdowns broke the old Michigan record of 34 by Rick Leach (1975-78) and his 54

total scores topped the school career record of 40 by Anthony Carter (1979-82)...His 54 total touchdowns rank second behind Ohio State's Pete Johnson (58 scores, 1973-76) on the Big Ten Conference's career charts...6.08-yard average per rush ranks behind Jon Vaughn (6.29 avg. 226 carries) and his 673 yards in kickoff returns rank fourth on the school's all-time list... Average of 95.13 yards per game during career is surpassed only by Bill Taylor (102.4 avg) among Wolverine runners...His 20 games with over 100 yards rushing broke the old school career record of 18 by Morris...Scored multiple touchdowns in 17 regular season games, tying the NCAA Division 1-A record held by Steve Owens of Oklahoma (1967-69), Tony Dorsett of Pittsburgh (1973-76) and Glen Davis of Army (1943-46)...Ranks third in Big Ten history and set a school career scoring record with 326 points, topping the old Wolverine mark of 306 by placekicker Mike Gillette (1985-88) 1994: Second-team All-American and first-team All-Big Ten Conference choice by The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft...Played in 10 games, sitting out Boston College and Notre Dame games after suffering a shoulder injury in fall drills...Still managed to lead the team in rushing, joining Jamie Morris (1,030 yards in 1985; 1,086 in 1986; and 1,703 in 1987) as only backs to rush for over 1,000 yards in three seasons during their Michigan careers...Gained 1,144 yards with 12 touchdowns on 210 carries (5.4 avg)...Made 14 catches for 123 yards (8.8 avg) and two scores...Ran for a five-yard touchdown vs. Colorado...Had 182 yards on 35 attempts with twoand 12-vard scores in a 29-14 defeat of lowa...Rushed 23 times for 153 yards, including two and 11-yard touchdowns and caught a five-yard pass for a score in a 40-20 drubbing of Michigan

State... Picked up 144 yards on 19 tries with 21- and 67-yard touchdowns vs. Penn State...Registered a solo tackle while gaining 132 yards on 20 attempts with a score vs. Wisconsin....Had 20 carries for 148 yards, including touchdowns of one and seven yards in a 45-23 defeat of Purdue...Added 90 yards with a two-yard score on 21 carries and caught a pair of passes for 70 yards, including a 57-yard touchdown as the Wolverines downed Minnesota, 38-22. Picked up 109 yards on 16 tries and scored the go-ahead touchdown on a three-yard run before he suffered a right foot injury early in the first quarter in a 24-14 beating of Colorado State in the Holiday Bowl. 1993: All-America second-team and All-Big Ten Conference first-team choice by The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft and Football News...Bothered late in the year by a shoulder injury, missing the Wisconsin and Purdue games...Led the team with 1,129 yards and 13 touchdowns on 207 carries (5.5 avg)... Hauled in 14 passes for 152 yards (10.9 avg) and a score...Returned 10 kickoffs for 246 yards (24.6 avg)...Ran for over 100 yards seven times...Opened the season with 117 yards and a 59-yard score on 15 attempts and had a 50yard kickoff return in a 41-14 thrashing of Washington State...Picked up 146 yards on 25 tries with one- and four-yard touchdowns, caught three passes for 39 yards and returned four kickoffs for 133 yards, including a 50-yarder vs. Notre Dame...His 133 yards in kickoff returns rank second in school history behind Desmond Howard's 135 vs. Michigan State in 1991...Picked up 171 yards on 26 tries with touchdowns of five, 25 and nine yards vs. Houston and had 28 carries for 113 yards with two scores, 29 yards on a kickoff return and 60 yards on three receptions, including a 48-yard touchdown, in a 24-7 beating of lowa...Ran 32 times for 192 yards vs. Penn State...Had 16 rushes for 105 yards vs. Ohio State and 18 carries for 124 yards, including 26and 18-yard touchdowns in a 42-7 romp over North Carolina State in the Hall of Fame Bowl. 1992: Sophomore All-America first-team pick by The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft...All-America honorable mention by United Press International...All-Big Ten Conference first-team selection...Ranked 12th in the nation and led the Big Ten in rushing, averaging 112.2 yards per game during the regular season... Was ninth in the country in all-purpose yardage with an average of 152.3 yards per game...Played in 11 games, missing the Oklahoma State clash with a leg injury, but still managed to gain 1,357 yards with 13 touchdowns on 185 carries (7.3 avg), the eighth-best season total in school history...His 7.3 yards per play broke the Wolverines' season mark of 6.81 yards by Bill Daley in 1943...His 13 scores tied Tom Harmon (1939), Bill Taylor (1971), Gordon Bell (1975) and Butch Woolfolk (1979) for fifth place on the school's record chart...Ran for over 100 yards in seven games, fourth on the school's season list...Caught 13 passes for 145 yards (11.2 avg) and three scores...Returned 12 kickoffs for 282 yards (23.5 avg) and a touchdown...Had a 22-vard touchdown catch vs. Notre Dame and ran for a 29-yard score. adding another touchdown on a 99-yard kickoff return in a 61-7 drubbing of Houston...His 99yarder earned AT&T Long Distance Award honors and tied Dennis Fitzgerald's school record set vs. Michigan State in 1960...It also marked the ninth time in school history that a Wolverine returned a kickoff for a touchdown... Exploded for 224 yards on 19 carries with touchdowns of 82, 18 and 29 yards in his first starting assignment, a 52-28 victory over lowa...His 82-yarder was the ninth-longest run from scrimmage in school annals...Followed with 28 rushes for 172 yards and a pair of touchdowns vs. Michigan State...Gained 134 yards with a 54-yard score on 18 attempts and hauled in a 26-yard scoring pass as the Wolverines beat Indiana, 31-3...Ran 24 times for 148 yards and two touchdowns in a 63-13 romp over Minnesota...Picked up 143 yards with a score on 23 tries vs. Northwestern and had 14 carries for 86 yards, two kickoff returns for 30 yards and a pair of receptions for 55 yards, including a 50-yard touchdown, in a 22-22 tie with Illinois...Had 100 yards on 19 carries, 16 yards on two catches and 46 yards on two kickoff returns in a 13-13 tie with Ohio State....Named Most Valuable Player of the Game after rushing for 235 yards on 15 carries with touchdowns of 56, 88 and 25 yards in a 38-31 win over Washington in the Rose Bowl...His 88-yarder was the fourth-longest run from scrimmage in school history behind an 89-yarder by Butch Woolfolk vs. Wisconsin (1981), a 91-yarder by Tony Boles vs. Indiana (1989) and Woolfolk's record 92-yard run vs. Wisconsin in 1979...It was also the school's longest touchdown run in a bowl game...His 235 yards set another bowl record and

was the sixth-best game in Michigan history, topping Jamie Morris' 234-yard effort vs. Alabama in the 1988 Hall of Fame Bowl...His three touchdowns tied the school bowl record first set by Jack Weisenburger vs. Southern California in the 1948 Rose Bowl and equalled by Mel Anthony vs. Oregon State in the 1965 Rose Bowl and Morris in the Hall of Fame Bowl...His 261 all-purpose yards broke Morris' Hall of Fame Bowl mark of 230 yards. 1991: Freshman All-America pick by The Poor Man's Guide to the NFL Draft...Despite playing in a reserve role, he ranked third on the team with 552 yards and nine touchdowns on 86 carries (6.4 avg)...Caught 10 passes for 90 yards (9.0 avg) and returned nine kickoffs for 145 yards (16.1 avg)...Rushed for 37 yards on eight tries vs. Boston College, his first game in a Michigan uniform...Had 15 rushes for 59 yards and his first collegiate touchdown from three yards out in a 45-28 triumph over Michigan State...Had his first 100-yard effort with nine carries for 141 yards and two scores, including a 74-yarder (earned AT&T Long Distance Award honors) vs. Northwestern...Rushed nine times for 72 yards, including a 53-yard score, and caught three passes for 30 yards vs. Washington in the Rose Bowl.

Game 1 GIANTS 28, PHILADELPHIA 23 at East Rutherford, Sept. 4, 1994

The Giants kicked off the 1994 season with a 28-23 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles at Giants Stadium. Midway through the first quarter, CB Willie Beamon forced the Eagles Jeff Sydner to fumble a Giants punt that was recovered by RB David Meggett at the Eagles' 21. On the next play WR Chris Calloway's 20-yard run put the Glants at the one-yard line, where RB Rodney Hampton punched it in to give the Giants a 7-0 lead. After stopping the Eagles on the next series, Meggett returned a punt 68 yards for his fifth career touchdown on a punt return to give the Giants a 14-0 advantage. The Eagles mounted a drive that ultimately gave them a first-and-goal situation from the Giants one-yard line. The stingy Giants defense held the Eagles to a 21-yard PK Eddie Murray field goal. On the Giants' next possession, QB Dave Brown threw his first career touchdown. a 51-yarder to Calloway to put the Giants up 21-3. The Eagles closed the gap to 21-10 before the half on a 3-yard touchdown pass from QB Randall Gunningham to TE Mark Bayaro. A 93-yard completion from Cunningham to RB Herschel Walker but the Eagles in position for the score. In the second half, the Eagles drove inside the Giants 20yard line three times, but the Eagles had to settle for a pair of field goals on two of those drives. The Giants scored their last touchdown on a 26 -vard run by Meggett. Meggett's effort was the second two-touchdown game of his career. His first was when he had two receiving touchdowns vs. Philadelphia on December 8, 1991. After recording just four sacks in the five preseason games, the Giants defense had five sacks of Randall Cunningham (Erik Howard (2), Michael Strahan (1.5), Keith Hamilton (1), Stacey Dillard (.5)). Dave Brown finished his first professional start with 10 completions on 20 attempts for 171 yards and one touchdown:

Game 2 GIANTS 20, ARIZONA 17

at Tempe, Sept. 11, 1994

The Giants broke their two-game losing streak at Sun Devil Stadium and spoiled Buddy Ryan's home debut by defeating the Cardinals, 20-17. CB Phillippi Sparks intercepted Cardinals' QB Steve Beuerlein on the first play of the game to set up the Giants' first score. The interception out the Giants at the Arizona 16-yard line. Five plays later, QB Dave Brown hit TE Howard Cross for a oneyard touchdown. On the ensuing drive, the Cardinals held onto the ball for 10:07, but the Giants defense held Arizona to a field goal and held onto a 6-3 lead. The Cardinals cut the Giants lead to 20-17 after CB Aeneas Williams blocked a P Mike Horan punt that gave the Cardinals the ball at the Giants' 17yard line. QB Jlm McMahon, who came in to relieve Beuerlein, threw a two-yard touchdown pass to RB Ron Moore. DT Keith Hamilton finished the night with two sacks. The game marked Hamilton's fourth career two-sack game. The Cardinals were penalized 10 times for 150 yards In the game, while the Giants defense limited Arizona to 174 total yards in 46 plays.

Game 3 GIANTS 31, WASHINGTON 23 at East Rutherford, Sept. 18, 1994

The Giants beat the Washington Redskins, 31-23, for their third straight win and their third straight victory over an NFC East opponent, as the Giants and Redskins celebrated the National Football League's 75th anniversary with "Throwbacks Weekend." For the second consecutive week, the Giants recorded an interception on the first play of the game, LB Corey Miller intercepted QB John Friesz to give the Giants the ball at the Redskins' 32-yard line. QB Dave Brown helped convert two fourth-and-one situations to set up RB David Meggett's two-yard run that gave the Giants a 7-0 lead. The lead changed hands five times during the remainder of the game. The Giants came out on top despite giving up 456 total yards, including 381 passing yards from Friesz, thanks to the performances of Brown and Meggett, Meggett, filling in for the injured Rodney Hampton (kidney and back), helped lead the Giants with a career day. Meggett set personal single-game highs with 26 carries for 82 yards. In addition to scoring the Giants' first touchdown, Meggett ran for a oneyard fourth quarter touchdown to put the game out of reach for the Redskins. It was the first game in Meggett's career in which he rushed for two touchdowns and marked the third two-touchdown game of his career. After trailing, 20-17, at the half, Meggett gave the Giants a 24-20 lead when he threw a 16-vard touchdown pass on the halfback option to H-back Aaron Pierce. The pass was Meggett's third career touchdown pass. all of which have come against Washington (42 yards to WR Mike Sherrard at Washington, 10 -10-93; 21 yards to WR Chris Calloway vs. Washington, 11-14-93; 6 yards to Pierce vs. Washington 9-18-94). Brown had the best day of his young career, completing 14 of 19 passes for 221 yards and a 30-yard touchdown pass to WR Mike Sherrard in the second quarter. The Redskins got the ball back with 1:52 left to play and had a chance to tie the game with a touchdown and a two-point conversion. Friesz led the 'Skins to the Giants' 25-yard line where he attempted a pass to the end zone on the game's final play that was intercepted by S John Booty.

Game 4 NEW ORLEANS 27, GIANTS 22

at New Orleans, Oct. 2, 1994

The Giants suffered their first defeat of the season as the Saints prevailed, 27-22, at the Louisiana Superdome. The Giants drove inside the Saints' 20-yard line four times, yet were only able to manage 19 points. The Giants scored first on a 41yard PK David Treadwell field goal that was set up by a 25-yard punt return by WR Thomas Lewis. Following a QB Dave Brown interception, the Saints drove to the Giants' 11-yard line where PK Morten Anderson tied the score, 3-3, with a 29vard field goal. In the second guarter the Giants scored 10 points and appeared to have the game in their control with a 13-3 lead with 1:56 left in the first half. The Giants scored their first touchdown of the game when Brown threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to WR Mike Sherrard. The scoring drive was set up by a 35-yard punt return by Lewis that gave the Giants the ball at the Saints' 11-yard line. S John Booty intercepted Saints QB Jim Everett and returned it 34 yards to the Saints' 12-vard line where Treadwell connected for a 32yard field goal. The Saints took the game into their hands before the half by scoring two touchdowns in the final two minutes. First, Everett drove the Saints 80 yards in eight plays and threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to WR Quinn Early to cut the Giants lead to 13-10. Then, LB James Williams intercepted a Brown pass and returned it 33 yards. for a touchdown to give the Saints a 17-13 half time lead. The Saints opened the second half by driving to the Giants' 15-yard line and scored on a 32-yard kick by Anderson. The Saints scored their final touchdown on a 3-vard run by RB Derek Brown to give the Saints a 27-13 lead. The Giants comeback was stopped short by a series of damaging penalties and missed opportunities. A holding penalty nullified a 75-yard kickoff return by Lewis that would have given the Giants the ball at the Saints' 25-yard line. After the Giants recovered a fumble by Saints' CB Tyrone Hughes, Brown completed a pass to WR Chris Calloway, who managed to catch the ball despite defensive pass interference. The reception would have given the Giants a first down inside the Saints' five-yard line. Instead the play was called back by offsetting penalties after Calloway was penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct for spiking the ball. After recovering an Everett fumble at the Saints' 15-yard line, the Giants failed to get the ball in the end zone and had to settle for a 35-yard field goal by Treadwell. The Giants cut the Saints' lead to 27-22 when Brown threw a 3-yard touchdown pass to Sherrard with only two minutes left to play. The Giants tried an onsides kick that was recovered by the Saints, who were able to run out the clock.

Game 5 MINNESOTA 27, GIANTS 10 at East Rutherford, Oct. 10, 1994

The Giants record fell to 3-2 with a 27-10 loss to the Minnesota Vikings on Monday Night Football. On a night when Lawrence Taylor's jersey number was retired, the Giants were hoping that Rodney Hampton, who was playing in his first game since suffering back/kidney injuries against Arizona on September 11, would help spark the Giants to a victory. Instead, the Vikings stopped the Giants' rushing attack, holding the Giants to just 37 yards on the ground. The Vikings won the toss and elected to defend the east goal, taking the wind in the first guarter. After falling behind, 10-3, the Giants got the ball at their own six-vard line with 1:27 left in the first half. QB Dave Brown completed six of eight passes for 91 yards and scored on a threeyard quarterback draw to tie the game at 10-10. In the third quarter, the Vikings took advantage of the wind and scored 14 points. Whatever momentum the Giants gained before the half was killed when Brown threw a pass that was intercepted by CB Anthony Parker, who returned it 44 yards for a touchdown to give the Vikings a 17-10 lead at the 13:16 mark of the third quarter. Minnesota scored again in the third quarter when QB Warren Moon drove his team 71 yards in five plays and hit WR Cris Carter for a 20-yard touchdown to give the Vikings a 24-10 lead. On their next series, the Vikings drove 62 yards in seven plays before settling for a 24-yard field goal by PK Fuad Reveiz. The Giants comeback was stopped when a Brown to WR Thomas Lewis touchdown pass with a little less than 10 minutes left in the game was called back because of a holding penalty. Game 6 RAMS 17, GIANTS 10 at Anaheim, Oct. 16, 1994

The only bright spot for the Giants was RB Rodney Hampton, who returned to his old form. rushing 27 times for 112 yards, including a 27vard touchdown run in the first quarter. Game 7 PITTSBURGH 10, GIANTS 6 at East Rutherford, Oct. 23, 1994

In a mistake-filled game that was played in a steady rain, the Pittsburgh Steelers handed the Giants their tourth straight defeat with a 10-6 victory. There were a total of nine fumbles, seven turnovers and 17 punts in the ballgame. On their first possession of the game, the Giants drove to the Steelers 29-yard line and appeared to be in position to score before C Brian Williams' shot gun snap to QB Dave Brown resulted in a 26-yard

loss that pushed the team out of scoring range. Game 8 DETROIT 28, GIANTS 25 (OT) at East Rutherford, Oct. 30, 1994

The Giants watched their losing streak extend to five straight games with a 28-25 overtime loss to the Detroit Lions. Although the Giants ran for 195 yards and intercepted QB Scott Mitchell three times, the Giants were once again plagued by mistakes, suffering 14 penalties for 120 yards. ## Game 10 ARIZONA 10, GIANTS 9

#### Game 13 GIANTS 16, CLEVELAND 13 at Cleveland, Dec 4, 1994

PK Brad Daluiso kicked a 33-yard game-winning field goal with 19 seconds left in regulation to lift the Giants past the Cleveland Browns, 16-13. The victory improved the Giants record to 6-7 and marked their third consecutive victory on the road, QB Dave Brown completed 17 of 33 passes for 226 yards and a 10-yard touchdown pass to HB Aaron Pierce on the Giants opening drive. The Browns took an early 3-0 lead in the first quarter on a 41-yard field goal by PK Matt Stover to cap a 60-yard opening drive. The Giants responded by marching 87 yards on 11 plays before Brown hit Pierce in the end zone to give the Giants a 7-3 lead. On that drive, Brown completed four of five passes for 75 yards, including a 44yard pass to WR Mike Sherrard. The Browns opened the second guarter with a 23-yard field goal by Stover to cut the Giants lead to 7-6. The Giants drove into Cleveland territory on their next. two possessions of the first half but failed to come away with any points. Despite forcing four turnovers in the second half, the Giants offense could only manage six points against a stingy Cleveland defense. LB Michael Brooks and S Jesse Campbell both intercepted QB Vinny Testaverde to stop Browns' drives, Campbell also forced a fumble that was recovered by the Giants at the Browns 31-yard line. Five plays later, Daluiso kicked a 25-vard field goal to extend the Giants lead to 10-6. After the Giants recovered a Testaverde fumble at the Browns 26-yard line. Daluiso kicked a 30-yarder to put the Giants ahead, 13-6, with a little more than eight minutes left in the game. On the Browns next series, Testaverde threw a 60-yard pass to WR Derrick Alexander to give Cleveland the ball at the Giants five-yard line. On the next play, RB Leroy Hoard scored on a five-vard touchdown run to tie the

# Game 14 GIANTS 27, CINCINNATI 20 at East Rutherford, Dec. 11, 1994

RB Rodney Hampton scored on a three-yard run with :40 left in regulation to give the Giants a 27-20 victory over the Cincinnati Bengals, After a scoreless first quarter, the Giants built a 17-7 halftime lead. #### Game 15 GIANTS 16, PHILADELPHIA 13 at Philadelphia, Dec. 18, 1994

#### Game 16 GIANTS 15, DALLAS 10 at East Rutherford, Dec. 24, 1994

RB Blair Thomas scored from one yard out two plays later to the tie the game at 10-10. After a guick kick by Dave Brown pinned the Cowboys inside their own 10-yard line, the Giants took a 12-10 lead when LB Jessie Armstead forced QB Rodney Pete to fumble out of the end zone for a safety, RB Rodney Hampton, who gained 91 yards to finish the 1994 season with 1,075 yards, helped the Giants control the ball in the second half as Dallas had the ball for just 6:43. ### 1994 PRESEASON REVIEW

### MIAMI 20, GIANTS 19

July 30, at East Rutherford

The Giants opened their preseason with a solid effort but came up short as they dropped a 20-19 decision to Miami. The Giants committed four turnovers (three fumbles and an interception) in the second half as Miami came back from a 14-6 halftime deficit. Dave Brown started the game for the Giants and played the first half and the first series of the second half. Brown completed eight of 12 passes for 107 yards and a touchdown. On the Giants' first series opssession, the Brown guided offense moved 62 yards in 12 plays as FB Kenyon Rasheed scored on a three-yard run. On the Giants' third possession Brown connected with WR Chris Calloway on a 54-yard bomb to give the Giants a 14-3 advantage. The four second half turnovers by the Giants resulted in 11 Miami points, including the season's first two-point conversion.

### CLEVELAND 24, GIANTS 15

August 6, at East Rutherford

For the second consecutive week, the Giants paid dearly for their mistakes in dropping a 24-15 decision to Cleveland. The Browns got on the board first when Eric Turner intercepted a Kent Graham pass intended for David Meggett. Turner returned the pick 68 yards for a TD. The Giants tied the game 8-8. but the Browns built a 15-8 halftime advantage with a 71-yard drive that ended with a 24-yard Vinny Testaverde-to-Michael Jackson TD pass. The Giants scored when tackle Greg Bishop recovered a Graham fumble in the end zone. PK Matt Stover kicked two more field goals in the fourth quarter for the final margin of 24-15. Graham started the game at QB for the Giants and played the first three quarters. Dave Brown relieved Graham in the fourth quarter. Graham finished 12 of 23 passing for 122 yards and an interception. Brown was 9 of 15 for 88 yards and an interception.

### GIANTS 28, SAN DIEGO 20 (American Bowl)

August 13, at Berlin, Germany

The Giants played in their first NFL American Bowl series game and defeated San Diego, 28-20, in Berlin. In his first game after being named the starting quarterback, Dave Brown was 15 of 21 passing for 187 yards and one touchdown. Brown also rushed for 30 yards on six carries, including a nine-yard TD run. The Giants controlled the ball for 19 of the game's first 30 minutes. After playing to a 14-14 tie in the first half, rookie RB Keith Elias scored on a six-yard run late in the third quarter for a 21-14 Giants advantage. The Chargers scored a touchdown on a Gale Gilbert to Shannon Mitchell 11-yard TD pass in the fourth quarter but failed on a two-point conversion. The final margin came on a Kent Graham-to-Omar Douglas five-yard TD pass following a Chargers' muffed punt that was recovered by Jessie Armstead.

### JETS 13, GIANTS 10

August 20, at East Rutherford

The Giants fell victim to their own second half mistakes in dropping a 13-10 decision to the Jets. The two teams exchanged field goals for a 3-3 tie early in the second quarter. Following a LB Corey Miller interception of OB Boomer Esiason on the Jets' first possession of the second quarter, the Giants moved 18 yards in four plays as TE Howard Cross caught a five-yard scoring pass from QB Dave Brown for a 10-3 Giants' advantage. The Giants thwarted another drive late in the first half when CB Willie Beamon picked off Esiason at the Giants three-yard line as the Giants took a 10-3 lead into the half. In the fourth quarter, the Giants secondary got caught in between coverages and QB Jack Trudeau hit WR Stevie Anderson for an 80-yard TD to tie the score at 10-10. After three plays the Giants punted and Trudeau then marched the Jets 45 yards in 10 plays before PK Nick Lowery knocked down a 38-yard FG attempt for the winning points.

### CHICAGO 27, GIANTS 21

August 27, at Chicago

The Giants closed out their preseason by traveling to Chicago and dropping a 27-21 decision to the Bears. It was a mixed performance by the Giants. In the first quarter the Giants cranked up their running game and put together an 80-yard drive that culminated with an eight-yard scoring pass from QB Dave Brown to WR Chris Calloway. Two Steve Walsh TD passes gave the Bears a 14-7 halftime advantage. The Giants ran just five offensive plays in the third quarter as the Bears extended their lead to 21-7 on a Shane Matthews TD pass. Kevin Butler booted two fourth quarter FGs for the Bears, while QB Kent Graham engineered a couple of Giants' scores. On the first, the Giants moved 69 yards in eight plays with RB Keith Elias scoring from one-yard out. Following a Bear fumble on their next possession, Graham hit Calloway with a 20-yard scoring pass. The game ended when the Giants turned the ball over on downs at the Chicago 19-yard line with four seconds remaining.

### GANTS TID BIT

In 1994 Brad Daluiso (11 of 11) and David Treadwell (11 of 17) combined to give the Giants a 78.6 field goal percentage. That mark is the second-highest field goal percentage in team history behind the 83.3 percent that was set in 1983.

### HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS

- 1925-29 Tim Mara purchased a National Football League franchise for New York for \$500. Bob Folwell was named head coach and all-time great Jim Thorpe was signed. More than 70,000 jammed the Polo Grounds to see the Giants play Red Grange and the Chicago Bears. The Giants went 8-4 in their first season. Folwell left, and was replaced by Dr. Joe Alexander as head coach. Despite an 8-4-1 record in 1926, Mara lost \$40,000, Earl Potteiger replaced Alexander in 1927, and the Giants won their first title with an 11-1-1 record. In 1929 the 13-1-1 Giants averaged 25,000 fans and turned a small profit.
- 1930 Ownership of the club was turned over to Jack and Wellington Mara, the two sons of the founder.
- 1931 Center Mel Hein was signed. Steve Owen was named head coach.
- 1932 Ray Flaherty became the NFL's first official pass reception champion with 21 catches.
- 1933 The Giants easily won the Eastern Division of the newly-divided NFL. In the league's first championship game, the Giants lost to the Bears 23-21.
- 1934 In what has come to be known as the "Sneakers Game," the Giants defeated the Bears 30-13 for the NFL title. Some of the New York players wore basketball shoes to increase traction on the icy Polo Grounds turf.
- 1935 The Giants advanced to their third straight NFL championship game, but lost to Detroit 26-7.
- 1936 The first NFL draft was held in 1936, and the Giants' first pick in it was Art Lewis, a tackle from Ohio University. The Giants finsihed with a 5-6-1 record, marking only the third time in the team's twelve-year history that it finished without a winning record.
- 1937 Seventeen rookies helped make up the twenty-five man roster in 1937. The 1937 seson also marked the debut of the now familiar blue jerseys. The Giants lost to the Washington Redskins on the last day of the season and finished as a runner-up in the Eastern Division with a 6-3-2 record.
- 1938 A 23-17 victory over Green Bay produced the Giants' third NFL title.
- 1939 Green Bay avenged the 1938 loss with a 27-0 drubbing of the Giants in the NFL title game.
- 1940 The Giants finished third in the East with a 6-4-1 record. Tuffy Leemans was lost for the season midway through the season with a back injury. C Mel Hein was the only Giant to win All-Pro honors, accomplishing that for the tenth year in a row.
- 1941 In the wake of Pearl Harbor, only 13,341 spectators turned out to see Chicago top the Giants in the NFL title game.
- 1942 After losing many players to the service, the Giants finished with a 5-5-1 record and a third place finish in the NFL East.

- 1943 With the league down to just nine teams due to World War II, the Giants overcame a 2-2-1 start to finish with a 6-3-1 record. The Giants advanced to the NFL title game where they dropped a 28-0 decision to the Washington Redskins.
- 1944 Luring Arnie Herber and Ken Strong out of retirement, the Giants scored five shutouts en route to the Eastern title, but lost the NFL championship game to Green Bay 14-7.
- 1945 The War ended in 1945, but the Giants finished with their worst record to date. The Giants 3-6-1 record was only one game better than the last place Pittsburgh Steelers.
- 1946 Frankie Filchock, an understudy to Sammy Baugh at Washington, signed with the Giants for a reported \$35,000, but was suspended indefinitely along with teammate Merle Hapes for alleged gambling involvement.
- 1947 The Giants went from the title game in 1946 to the cellar, finishing with a 2-8-2 record, including an eight-game losing streak.
- 1948 The team's renovation movement was stepped up in 1948 when the team acquired quarterback Charlie Conerly from the Washington Redskins. The Giants reached another milestone in their illustrious existence, and it had nothing to do with their 4-8 record. That season, the Giants signed their first black player, Emlen Tunnell.
- 1949 Giants head coach Steve Owen switched from the A formation to the T and it resulted in bringing the Giants back to .500 with a 6-6 record, Allie Sherman was hired to work with the Charlie Conerly.
- 1950 The Giants finished with a surprising 10-2 record and tied for first place with the Cleveland Browns. The Browns defeated the Giants, 8-3, in the American Conference Playoff Game. It marked the first time the Giants finished above .500 since the Eastern Division Championship season of 1946.
- 1951 Kyle Rote of Southern Methodist was the Giants' bonus pick in the draft, but was injured in the preseason and saw little action. Eddle Price led the NFL in rushing with 971 vards.
- 1952 Tailback Frank Gifford of USC was drafted number one. Playing in his fifth year, Emlen Tunnell gained more yardage on kick returns and interceptions (924) than the league's leading rusher, Dan Towler (894) of Los Angeles.
- 1953 Owens retired at the end of the season after 23 years as the Giants' head coach.
- 1954 Former Giants' end Jim Lee Howell was promoted from end coach to head coach.
- 1955 After opening with three straight losses, the Giants got their act together and finished with a 6-5-1 record.
- 1956 Defensive end Andy Robustelli was obtained from the Rams. The Giants switched their home games from the Polo Grounds to Yankee Stadium. A 47-7 rout of the Chicago Bears produced New York's first NFL championship since 1938. Linebacker Sam Huff was rookie of the year.

- 1957 The Giants were still in the running for the title in 1957 until they dropped their final three games.
- 1958 Advancing to the NFL championship game with a playoff win over Cleveland, the Giants lost to Baltimore 23-17 in sudden death overtime.
- 1959 Baltimore exploded for 24 points in the fourth quarter to defeat New York in the NFL title game for the second straight year.
- 1960 The Giants finished an injury-plagued 1960 season with a 6-4-2 record. Head coach Jim Lee Howell announced his retirement at the end of the season and Allie Sherman was promoted to the top slot.
- 1961 The NY logo was added to the helmets for the 1961 season. Allie Sherman replaced the retired Howell as head coach. The Giants obtained Y.A. Tittle and Del Shofner in trades. Alex Webster gained 928 yards to help the Giants reach the NFL title game. With the league championship on the line, the Giants were no match for Green Bay, losing 37-0.
- 1962 Frank Gifford, who returned to the team from retirement, Tittle, Shofner and Webster led the Giants into the NFL title game against the Packers. Green Bay prevailed, 16-7.
- 1963 Tittle threw 36 touchdown passes and kicker Don Chandler led the league in scoring as the Giants romped to their third straight conference title. With Tittle injured in the second quarter, New York lost yet another bid for the league championship, 14-10 to Chicago's Bears.
- 1964 For the first time in seventeen years, the Giants finished in last place in their conference with a 2-10-2 record. Alex Webster and Frank Gifford announced their retirement at the end of the season.
- 1965 Y.A. Tittle announced his retiremnt on January 22 in Mamma Leone's restaurant in New York. In addition to Tittle, Andy Robustelli and Jack Stroud also retired. On June 15, Jack Mara died after serving as team president for thirty-one years.
- 1966 The Giants had their worst season to date, finishing with a 1-12-1 record in the process of allowing 501 points, an NFL record at the time. Pete Gogolak became the first AFL player to cross to the NFL.
- 1967 Quarterback Fran Tarkenton was obtained from Minnesota.
- 1968 The Giants finished with a 7-7 record in Allie Sherman's last season as Giants coach.
- 1969 The Giants lost 37-14 to the New York Jets in a preseason contest. Webster replaced Sherman as head coach.
- 1970 Ron Johnson became the Giants' first 1,000-yard rusher, totaling 1,027 yards.
- 1971 After a disappointing 4-10 finish in 1971, Fran Tarkenton asked for a trade. The Giants obliged and traded him back to the Minnesota Vikings for quarterback Norm Snead. Bob Tucker became the first TE to lead the league in receptions with 59 catches.

- 1972 Norm Snead, obtained in the Tarkenton trade, led the league in passing and the Giants finished above .500 for only the second time in nine years.
- 1973 Prior to the final game of the season, Webster announced his retirement. New York lost the game 31-7 to Minnesota to close out the year at 2-11-1. They played their late-season home games at Yale Bowl.
- 1974 Bill Arnsparger was named the Giants' ninth head coach. Snead was traded to San Francisco. Craig Morton was obtained from Dallas.
- 1975 The Giants finished in fourth place in the NFC East with a 5-9 record. The team played all of its home games at Shea Stadium while they waited for the scheduled open of Giants Stadium for the 1976 season. DE George Martin made the team as an 11th round draft choice out of Oregon.
- 1976 Larry Csonka, the former Miami running back who had played in the World Football League, signed as a free agent. Snead was reacquired from San Francisco. The Giants moved to Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Arnsparger was fired in midseason and replaced by assistant coach John McVay, who signed a long-term contract following the 3-11 season.
- 1977 Morton was traded to Denver. The Giants improved to a 5-9 record. McVay went with Joe Pisarcik and Jerry Golsteyn at quarterback. Csonka rushed for 100 yards on the last day of the season and finished the year with 464 yards.
- 1978 The Giants had a 5-3 record at the halfway point of the season but lost seven of their final eight games and finished 6-10. Punter Dave Jennings and linebackers Harry Carson and Brad Van Pelt were named to the NFC Pro Bowl team. McVay was fired in late December. Robustelli, who had been the Giants' director of operations since 1974, resigned. George Young was named general manager in January, 1979. He announced the appointment of San Diego Chargers assistant Ray Perkins as head coach.
- 1979 Before the season began, tragedy struck as defensive tackle Troy Archer was killed in a traffic accident on June 22. Rookie Phil Simms, a first round choice, took over at quarterback. But the Giants had another 6-10 record. Dave Jennings led the NFC with a 42.7-yard punting average.
- 1980 A porous defense allowed opponents to score 425 points, second worst in the NFL. The Giants fell to 4-12. They did upset Dallas 38-35 after eight straight defeats. Jennings led NFL punters with a 44.8-yard average.
- 1981 With the second selection in the draft. New York chose Lawrence Taylor, a linebacker from North Carolina. The Giants started slowly, going 2-3, but then obtained running back Rob Carpenter from Houston. Carpenter sparked a three-game winning streak. A three-game losing streak dropped the club to 5-6, and then Simms was injured. Second-year quarterback Scott Brunner replaced Simms and the team responded with four victories in the final five weeks, including a 13-10 overtime victory over Dallas in the season finale that sent them into the playoffs. On December 27, the Giants defeated the Eagles 27-21 in the NFC wild card game. The season ended for New York on January 3 when it was defeated by the 49ers 38-24 in a divisional playoff game.

1982 A wild, wooly and turbulent year which saw the NFL players' strike shorten the season to just nine games. The final game played before the strike pitted the Giants and Packers on a Monday night game from Giants Stadium in which a power failure caused a blackout during the game. Rob Carpenter was a holdout for most of the season, returning to play in just the final five games, and then on December 15, head coach Ray Perkins resigned to accept the head coaching job at Alabama, with defensive coordinator Bill Parcells being named to replace him in 1983. The Giants then lost two straight after the Perkins' announcement, and missed the playoffs on the final day of the season with a 4-5 record. Despite the adversity, four Giants – Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and Dave Jennings – were named to the Pro Bowl.

1983 After breaking even in their first four games for a 2-2 record, the Giants were decimated by injuries during the rest of the year, with a total of 25 players appearing on the injured reserve list at one time or another. With players such as Harry Carson, Phil Simms and Rob Carpenter missing most of the season, and with the club leading the entire NFL in turnovers with 58 on 31 interceptions and 27 lost fumbles, the record tumbled to 3-12-1. The year was also marred by the tragic deaths of assistant coach Bob Ledbetter and former star running back Doug Kotar. Four players were nonetheless named to the Pro Bowl again—Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and rookie place-kicker Ali Haji-Sheikh who set an all-time NFL record with 35 field goals during the year.

1984 With Phil Simms enjoying his first full season at quarterback, the Giants won the NFC wild card playoff spot again, finishing with a 9-7 mark and second-place in the NFC East as Simms set three all-time single season club records with 286 completions in 533 attempts for 4,044 yards. The Giants knocked off the Los Angeles Rams 16-13 in that wild card game, then bowed to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers 21-10 in the divisional playoff. Taylor, Carson and Haynes were again named to the Pro Bowl, while head coach Bill Parcells was named NFC East Coach of the Year and five rookies—Karl Nelson, Gary Reasons, Carl Banks, Perry Williams and Bobby Johnson—were named to the All-NFL Rookie team.

1985 With a final 10-6 mark, the Giants put back-to-back winning seasons on the board for the first time in 22 years, won another trip to the playoffs and had their first home playoff game since 1962, winning 17-3 over the defending Super Bowl champion 49ers, Again, the club lost in the Divisional playoffs to the eventual Super Bowl champion team, the Chicago Bears, by a 21-0 score, the toughest outing the Bears encountered in the entire playoffs. Five players—Taylor, Carson, Phil Simms, Joe Morris and Leonard Marshall—were named to the Pro Bowl. All told, there were 12 team records set by this club, and 16 individual club records. Morris set an all-time one season rushing mark with 1,336 yards plus an all-time mark for TDs in a season with 21 while Simms broke all-time club records with 40 completions in a game for 513 yards passing. Marshall added another club mark with 15 1/2 OB sacks in a season, while rookie TE Mark Bavaro, an All-NFL Rookie team choice set a club mark with 12 receptions in one game.

1986 The club's first Super Bowl championship, an all-time final record of 17-2, as well as a club record 12 straight victories, made this year the greatest in team history. The Giants also set an all-time composite margin of victory in the playoffs, outscoring three opponents 105-23, for an 82-point domination, the most ever in NFL playoff history. Phil Simms was the MVP of the Super Bowl victory with an NFL all-time playoff mark of 88% passing accuracy with his 22-

for-25 passing in the 39-20 title conquest of the Denver Broncos. Lawrence Taylor was named the league's MVP. Joe Morris broke his own club rushing record with 1,516 yards, and eight players—Taylor, Morris, Harry Carson, Leonard Marshall, Jim Burt, Brad Benson, Mark Bavaro and Sean Landeta, were named to the Pro Bowl. Coach Bill Parcells was a unanimous NFL Coach of the Year in all the national polls, the Giants were 10-0 at home, including regular season and the two playoff games, and all-time attendance records were set for both home and away, as well as single game home attendance.

1987 Not exactly a year to remember. After winning the Super Bowl, the Giants dropped to a final 6-9 record, thanks to an 0-5 start in this players' strike season and the replacement games which followed. Add to that a rash of injuries which sidelined no less than 11 starters at one time or another, and the fifth-place finish was the result. While the Giants had a 6-4 record after the players' strike had been settled, it was a case of too little, too late. Despite the final record, four players—Lawrence Taylor, Carl Banks, Harry Carson and Mark Bavaro—were selected to the Pro Bowl and all four also were named to various All-NFL teams.

1988 The Giants bounced back from the debacle of '87 and after splitting their first six games, engineered a 7-2 run which had them all alone in first-place in the NFC East with a 10-5 mark into the final weekend of the season. Alas, an upset setback at the hands of the Jets not only knocked the Giants out of first-place, but also cost them a playoff berth as well. With that final 10-6 record, the Giants' overall mark over the five past seasons reached 54-32 for a winning percentage of .628, and those 54 victories were the most in club history for any five-year consecutive span. RB Joe Morris set an all-time club record with his third 1,000-plus rushing season and WR Lionel Manuel had his first 1,000-yard receiving year. Morris also surpassed Alex Webster as the Giants' all-time rushing leader, moving past the 5,000-yard plateau. Lawrence Taylor was named to his eighth straight Pro Bowl and All-NFL designation and safety Terry Kinard was selected for his first Pro Bowl appearance.

1989 Despite the loss of several starters due to injuries, the Giants startled the experts by winning their second NFC East championship in four years with a final 12-4 record, after most of those experts had predicted no better than a .500 season for the club. Veteran RB Ottis Anderson rushed for 1,023 yards at the age of 32 as the replacement for the injured Joe Morris and rookle David Meggett set all-time club marks in punt returns with 582 yards and a 12.7 average, while also accounting for 1,807 all-purpose yards during the year. Linebacker Lawrence Taylor equalled an NFL record by being named to his ninth consecutive Pro Bowl, and also ran his league record sack total to 104. Meggett also went to the Pro Bowl and scored a TD.

1990 The Giants began the year on a hot streak, winning their first 10 games for a solid NFC East lead, then held on to win the title with a final 13-3 record, despite losing QB Phil Simms late in the year. With Jeff Hostetler at the helm, the club surged through the playoffs to win their second Super Bowl title with a stirring 20-19 win over the Buffalo Bills. Seven Giant players were named to the Pro Bowl, including LB Lawrence Taylor for a record-setting 10th straight year. The Giants also set all-time attendance records, both for season home and one-game home marks. Veteran RB Ottis Anderson won Super Bowl MVP honors after rushing for 102 yards. At season's end, the long-time Mara family ownership ended when Tim Mara sold his 50% share of the club to Preston Robert Tisch who became Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer, and in May, head coach Bill Parcells resigned after a career mark of 85-52-1 and was

succeeded by offensive coordinator Ray Handley.

- 1991 In Ray Handley's first year as head coach, the Giants were in contention for another playoff spot late in the year with a 7-5 record, then dropped three straight to finish at 8-8 and out of the playoffs. Jeff Hostetler became the starting QB, but was injured late in the season and Phil Simms finished the rest of the campaign. Simms added his 15th all-time club record when he passed Charlie Conerly for career TD passes with 179. Rodney Hampton became the fourth back in club history to rush for 1,000 yards when he finished the year with 1,059. Center Bart Oates was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl.
- 1992 Ray Handley's learn struggled through a 6–10 campaign as injuries to key players hurt the team and the team's performance ultimately cost Handley his job following the season. Phil Simms regained his starting QB spot, but was limited to starting the first four games before an elbow injury forced him to miss the rest of the season. Before his injury, Simms became just the 14th passer in NFL history to surpass 30,000 yards passing. Jeff Hostetler then started the next nine games before being forced to the sidelines with a concussion. In the ninth game of the season against Green Bay, LB Lawrence Taylor injured his Achilles tendon that placed his career in jeopardy. After announcing plans to retire following the season, Taylor re-considered and decided to re-join the Giants. RB Rodney Hampton turned in another outstanding season, rushing for 1,141 yards and earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl. After dismissing Handley, the Giants general manager George Young hired former Denver Broncos head coach Dan Reeves to lead the team in 1993.
- 1993 Dan Reeves and a rejuvenated Phil Simms led the Giants to an 11-5 regular season record. The Giants finished second to Dallas in the NFC East race, a race that was decided on the final Sunday of the regular season when Dallas defeated the Giants, 16-13, in overtime at Giants Stadium. Reeves became the first Giants head coach to lead his team to the playoffs in his initial campaign since Allie Sherman did so in 1963. Reeves was selected as NFL Coach of the Year by several organizations, including the Associated Press which bases its honor on voting by coaches around the league. The Giants earned a Wild Card berth in the playoffs and defeated the Minnesota Vikings at Giants Stadium, 17-10, in the Wild Card game. San Francisco defeated the Giants, 44-3, at Candlestick Park in an NFC Divisional Playoff game. Following the San Francisco game, LB Lawrence Taylor announced his retirement, capping a 13-year career that altered the nature of the game. Taylor will be eligible for election into the Pro Football Hall of Fame following the 1998 season.
- 1994 After a 3-7 start, the Giants climbed back into playoff contention with a six-game winning streak to close out the season with a 9-7 record. The Giants came into week 16 needing a victory over the World Champion Dallas Cowboys, combined with a Tampa Bay Buccaneers victory over the Green Bay Packers, to win a Wild Card berth in the NFC playoff field. The Giants defeated the Cowboys, 15-10, but the season officially ended when the Bucs failed to defeat the Packers in a 34-19 loss. Dave Brown won the starting quaterback job in training camp and responded by leading the team to a 9-6 record in games that he started. RB Rodney Hampton finished the season with 1,075 yards to become the first Giant in the team's history to record four career 1,000-yard seasons. The 1994 season was the first in many years that the Giants roster did not include Lawrence Taylor or Phil Simms. Taylor's jersey number 56 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Minnesota Monday Night game on Oct. 10. Simms was released on June 15, prior to the start of training camp.

# THE GIANTS IN CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

*1927 GIANTS 13, Chicago Bears 7

Led by Steve Owen, the Gianls finished with an 11-1-1 record, then stunned Red Grange, John Driscoll and the Bears 13-7 at the Polo Grounds. "It was the toughest, roughest football game I ever played in," Owen was later to say. With the score tied 7-7, the Bears drove to the Giants' one-yard line, but Owen and Cal Hubbard spearheaded a goal line defense which held the Windy City crew. Hinkey Haines then faked a punt from his own end zone and completed a pass to Charlie Corgan for a 58-yard gain which set up the winning score and elation for Tim Mara.

1933 Chicago Bears 23, GIANTS 21

Jack Manders opened the scoring for the Bears at Wrigley Field, before 26,000 with a 16-yard field goal in the first period to touch off 60 minutes of fireworks which kept fans standing on their chairs through most of the game. Manders kicked a 28-yard FG for a 6-0 lead in the second period before Harry Newman hit Red Badgro for a touchdown pass and a 7-6 Giant lead at the half. Manders' third FG regained the lead for the Bears, but Max Krause's TD and the conversion by Ken Strong put NY back in front 14-9. A pass from Bronko Nagurski to Bill Karr made it 16-14, Chicago, before Strong lateraled to Newman who then threw a TD pass back to Strong for a 21-16 Giant lead late in the game. The Bears bounced back to win, however, when Nagurski's jump pass to Bill Hewitt was lateraled to Karr for the game-winning touchdown.

1934 GIANTS 30, Chicago Bears 13

With the temperature at nine degrees and the Polo Grounds covered with a sheet of ice, this one became famous as the "sneakers" game when Steve Owen provided his squad with basketball shoes to open the second half with his club trailing 10-3. The Giants responded with four touchdowns which had a crowd of 35,059 roaring approval. The Bears had a string of 33 games without a defeat going into this one, but fell behind 3-0 on a 38-yard FG by Ken Strong. A TD by Nagurski and a field goal by Manders got the Bears in front 10-3 at the half, when Owen sent for the sneakers to take advantage of the slippery footing. Ahead 13-3 on another Manders' FG, the Bears were swamped in a fourth-period Giant uprising which saw Ed Danowski throw a 28-yard TD pass to Ike Frankian and Ken Strong race 42 yards for another TD just moments later for a 17-13 lead. Danowski and Strong raced for subsequent touchdowns against the stunned Bears to turn the game into a rout.

## 1935 Detroit Lions 26, GIANTS 7

With a crowd of about 15,000 looking on, the Lions took a 13-0 lead in the first period when Leroy "Ace" Gutowsky plunged over from the 2-yard line and Earl "Dutch" Clark shook loose on a 40-yard touchdown romp. The Giants closed the gap at 13-7 in the third period when Danowski connected with Strong for a 42-yard touchdown pass, but the Lions' defense accounted for two more scores in the final period on a blocked punt and intercepted pass. Ernie Caddel scored the first on a 4-yard slant and Buddy Parker the second on a 9-yard run.

1938 GIANTS 23, Green Bay Packers 17

A slam-bang, bruising thriller was staged for the largest crowd (48,120 at the Polo Grounds) to see a championship game up to that time. With the victory, the Giants became the first team to win the championship twice since the divisional splitup. The Giants blocked two punts early in the game, and capitalized on both with Ward Cuff kicking a 13-yard FG and Tuffy Leemans blasting over on a 6-yard plunge. Arnie Herber's 50-yard TD pass to Carl Mulleneaux got the Packers on the scoreboard, but Danowski hit Hap Barnard for a 20-yard

TD pass and a 16-7 lead. The Packers closed to 16-14 at halftime on Clark Hinkle's 6-yard TD, then took the lead 17-16 on Engebretsen's third-period FG. New York then stormed back to the Packer 23 from where Danowski passed to Hank Soar for the game-winning TD.

#### 1939 Green Bay Packers 27, GIANTS 0

The Packers came up with sweet revenge in a grudge match played before 32,279 at Milwaukee's State Fair Grounds. Cold weather and a 35-MPH wind made aerial sorties a bit dubious, but Green Bay scored quickly on a 7-yard pitch from Herber to Milt Gantenbein. Engebretsen kicked a 29-yard FG in the third period for a 10-0 lead, and the Packers wrapped it up with touchdowns by Joe Laws on a 20-yard pass from Cecil Isbell, a one-yard plunge by Jankowski and Ernie Smith's 42-yard field goal.

1941 Chicago Bears 37, GIANTS 9

Attendance was only 13,341 at Wrigley Field, just two weeks after Pearl Harbor Day. The Giants led 6-3 in the first period on a Tuffy Leemans to George Franck touchdown pass of 31 yards, but the Bears scored on a pair of field goals, then broke the game wide open in the second half on touchdowns by Norm Standlee (2), George McAfee and Ken Kavanaugh.

1944 Green Bay 14, GIANTS 7

The Packers took a 14-0 lead at halftime before 46,016 at the Polo Grounds on touchdowns by Ted Fritsch – the first on a 2-yard plunge and the second on a 26-yard pass from Irv Comp with Don Hutson adding the conversions. Ward Cuff scored on a 1-yard plunge on the first play of the final period for the Giants, but the Packers hung on for the triumph.

#### 1946 Chicago Bears 24, GIANTS 14

Sid Luckman was the big man for the Bears in this win before 58,346 at the Polo Grounds. He passed for a 21-yard TD to Ken Kavanaugh to open the scoring, then ran 19 yards for a score later in the game. Dante Magnani's 19-yard pass interception accounted for the third Bear score, while the Giants hit the scoring column on touchdown passes from Frank Filchock to Frank Liebel and Steve Filipowicz.

1956 GIANTS 47, Chicago Bears 7

Fullback Mel Triplett smashed 17 yards for a TD early in the game on an icy field before a big crowd, then Ben Agajanian added a brace of field goals for a 13-0 lead. It was 34-7 at halftime as Alex Webster crashed over for a pair of touchdowns from inside the 5-yard line. Charlie Conerly's aerials brought nothing but more woe to the Bears in the second half, with Kyle Rote snaring a 9-yard TD throw and Frank Gifford a 14-yarder to close out the scoring.

## 1958 Baltimore Colts 23, GIANTS 17 (OT)

Some people call this the greatest game ever played, and perhaps it was for drama and its sudden-death ending. With a crowd of 64,185 on hand at Yankee Stadium, the Giants led 3-0 on a 36-yard Pat Summerall FG in the first period, with the Colts taking over 14-3 at half-time on scores by Alan Ameche from the 2-yard line and Ray Berry on a 15-yard pitch from Johnny Unitas. The Giants scored in the third period on a 1-yard plunge by Mel Triplett after an 86-yard gainer from Conerly to Rote with Webster picking up Rote's fumble. The Giants went in front 17-14 on Conerly's 15-yard TD throw to Gifford, but the Colts tied it with seven seconds to play on Steve Myrah's 13-yard FG and won in the overtime on Ameche's 1-yard plunge, the 13th play of a Colt drive.

#### 1959 Baltimore Colts 31, GIANTS 16

A sellout crowd of 57,577 was on hand at Baltimore's Municipal Stadium for the big rematch of the divisional champions. The home crowd had plenty to cheer about in the early going as

Unitas hit Lenny Moore for a 60-yard TD bomb, but the Giants surged back to stop the Colt offense. With Summerall kicking three field goals (23, 26 and 23 yards), the Giants led 9-7 going into the final period. But the Colts stormed back with a furious final period onslaught as Unitas scored on a 4-yard run, threw a 12-yard TD pass to Richardson and Johnny Sample returned an interception for another score.

1961 Green Bay Packers 37, GIANTS 0

With a crowd of 39,029 looking on in Green Bay, Paul Hornung paced the Packers to a stunning 37-0 triumph by scoring 19 points on a touchdown, three field goals and four conversions. On leave from his Army duties in Fort Riley, Kan., Hornung scored on a 6-yard slant in the second period to break a scoreless deadlock and set off a Packer splurge which accounted for 24 points in that quarter. The Giants were unable to recover from this onslaught and suffered their first shutout in nine seasons. Bart Starr's touchdown pass to Ron Kramer and a pair of Hornung field goals closed out the scoring in the second half.

1962 Green Bay Packers 16, GIANTS 7

Bitter cold weather at Yankee Stadium was no deterrent to 64,892 fans who turned out for the year's big one. As things turned out, a trio of field goals by Packer guard Jerry Kramer made the difference in a game where both defensive units turned in superlative jobs. The only Giant score was a result of defensive work when Erich Barnes blocked a Max McGee punt and reserve end Jim Collier fell on the ball in the end zone.

1963 Chicago Bears 14, GIANTS 10

The Bear defense turned the tide in this championship game, played in 10 degree weather in Wrigley Field. Taking the early lead on a 14-yard Y.A. Tittle TD pass to Frank Gifford and Don Chandler's FG, the Giants were the victims of five pass interceptions thereafter, two of which set up the Bear scores. Larry Morris swiped the first one for a return of 61 yards, while Ed O'Bradovich's steal of a screen pass set up what turned out to be the winning score. Tittle suffered a knee injury in the first half, but gallantly returned to action in the second half, though he was hampered and hobbled by his injury.

1986 GIANTS 39, Denver Broncos 20

Led by the brilliant record-setting passing of Phil Simms, the Giants won their first Super Bowl with a 30-point second-half onslaught before 101,063 spectators at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena. Simms pitched 22-for-25 for 268 yards and three TDs, setting an all-time NFL playoff mark of 88.0% completion and winning the MVP honors in the game. Down 10-9 at halftime, the Giants rang up 24 unanswered points to take a commanding 33-10 lead in the fourth period with Simms' TD passes going to TEs Zeke Mowatt and Mark Bavaro and to WR Phil McConkey. Linebacker Carl Banks was a star on defense with 10 solo tackles as the Giants concluded their greatest season ever with a 17-2 record.

1990 GIANTS 20, Buffalo Bills 19

The Giants won their second Super Bowl championship before 73,813 at Tampa Stadium by battling back from a 12-3 deficit in what many considered to be the best of all Super Bowls. Ahead 20-19 in the final moments of play, the Giants prevailed when Buffalo kicker Scott Norwood missed a 47-yard FG attempt in the final moments of the game. QB Jeff Hostetler, replacing the injured Phil Simms during the playoffs, hit 20-for-32 for 222 yards and one TD, while the veteran RB Ottis Anderson had 102 yards rushing and one TD and won the MVP honors. The Giants set an all-time Super Bowl record for time of possession with 40:33 in their ball-control offensive game plan.
