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Harry Wismer, owner and president of the Titans of New York, has devoted a quarter of a century to sports promotion as a radio and television sportscaster; and has also been connected with professional football as a stockholder of both the Detroit Lions and the Washington Redskins. Wismer has broadcast the games of the Lions, the Redskins, and the New York Giants, as well as fourteen world championship play-offs. The famed sportscaster helped Lamar Hunt of Dallas to spark the organization of the American Football League last year. He has since traveled far and wide, promoting not only the Titans and the AFL, but all of professional football. The Titan president has also demonstrated an unceasing concern for maximum spectator interest and an open receptiveness to innovation. Wismer's initiative paved the way for the adoption by the American League of the college two-point option for conversions after touchdowns in 1960.

A classmate of President Harry Wismer at Michigan State, **STEVE SEBO** came to the Titans after serving as head football coach at the University of Pennsylvania from January, 1954 through the 1959 campaign. In his final year at Penn, Sebo guided the Quakers (8-1) to the Ivy League title and engineered a tie with Navy. During his playing days at Michigan State, he was a star halfback, leading the Spartans in scoring in both 1934 and '36. After five years in the Air Force, he joined Alma (Mich.) College as head coach, serving from 1946-48. He was a backfield aide at Harvard for one year, before returning to Michigan State as freshman mentor in 1950. Sebo moved up to backfield coach at MSU in 1952, and the following year he produced the great backfield foursome—Leroy Bolden, Billy Wells, Evan Slonac and Tom Yewcic—which sped the Spartans to a Rose Bowl win over UCLA on New Year's Day, 1954. Sebo lives in Philadelphia with his wife and son.

BILL TACKMANN has devoted himself to maintaining a top-flight slate of sports activity in the New York Metropolitan area. He's a former newspaperman with long experience in promotion, marketing, merchandising and advertising. Until recently the Director of Sports Promotion for the City of New York and Ass't Director of Industrial Development & Promotion for the Dep't of Commerce & Public Events, Tackmann was greatly instrumental in bringing about the return of major college football games to New York. The Titans' aggressive business manager attended Evander Childs High School in the Bronx, and later the School of Commerce at NYU.

DR. FRED J. CRESCENTE has a dual capacity with the Titans, serving both as assistant to the president and as team physician. From Ridgewood, N. J., he has been affiliated for many years with metropolitan area sports events. A graduate of Georgetown University, Washington, D. C., Dr. Crescente was connected with the New Jersey State Athletic Commission as its official physician for some 12 years. The Titans' two-way official also finds time to head the New Jersey branch of "Boys Town of Italy" and to serve in the New Jersey "Oldtimers Athletic Association." Through the years he has been a financial backer for many semi-pro sports team in the Garden State, with his particular interest in football.

JOHN A. ROOSEVELT, youngest son of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, joined The Titans during the off season as Vice President and Director. He is a partner in the investment house of Bache and Company, a director of the New York World's Fair and has served on various United States Government committees.

Other Vice Presidents include DENNIS J McMAHON Collector of Internal Revenue under Presidents Truman and Eisenhower, he is a partner in the tax consulting firm of McMahon & Andrews.

HON. GEORGE SMATHERS, United States Senator from Florida, serves as Executive Vice President of The Titans. A top figure in the Senate and prominent administration figure, Senator Smathers joined The Titans because of his interest in sports and the expansion of Pro Football. After serving in the Marine Corps during the past war, Senator Smathers was elected to the House in 1945 and in 1950 was elected to the Senate. During his first 10 years there he served as Deputy Floor Leader and Acting Majority Leader during the absence of then senator, Lindon Johnson. His Senate committees include: Senate Finance, Interstate and Foreign Commerce, Small Business and Aviation. He has specialized on Latin American affairs and, as an Assistant Floor Leader, attends weekly conferences with President Kennedy.

SAMMY BAUGH
Head Coach

Samuel Adrian Baugh is generally recognized as the greatest passer in the history of the National Football League. It's not altogether surprising, either, that in his first season at the helm of the Titans last year, Slingin' Sammy would mold the most explosive offensive attack in the American Football League. During 16 (1937-52) spectacular seasons with the Washington Redskins, Baugh established these NFL records:

- **Most years leading passer—16
- **Most passes completed (lifetime)—1,709
- **Most passes completed (season)—210
- **Most yards gained on passes (lifetime)—22,085
- **Most yards gained on passes (season)—2,938
- **Most TD passes—187
- **Best passing efficiency (500 or more attempts)—
56.7%
- **Best passing efficiency (season)—70.3%
- **Most punts (one game)—14
- **Best punting average (one season)—51.4 (35 punts)

By way of demonstrating that his toe was equally as talented as his pitching arm, Sammy once boomed an 85-yard punt in a playoff contest. The wiry, 47-year-old native of Temple, Texas, was an All-American quarterback at Texas Christian University in 1936. In addition to his football experience, Baugh played in the St. Louis Cardinal farm system as a third baseman. Following his playing days, he became assistant coach at Hardin-Simmons until 1955, when he took over the head post there. Baugh's off-season activities include the presidency of a large insurance firm and the ownership of a 6,344 acre ranch near Rotan, Texas. Sammy is married and has five children.

JOHN DELL ISOLA

Assistant Coach

Defensive line coach, John was an All-American center at Fordham and later defensive captain and five-time All-Pro guard with the New York Giants. Calling defensive signals for the Giants, John's units compiled the best defensive average in the NFL for five of seven years. Before coming to the Titans last season, he had served as line coach for Dartmouth and the Giants.

JOHN STEBER

Assistant Coach

Steber was a Washington Redskins teammate of Head Coach Sammy Baugh after gaining All-American honors at Georgia Tech. He also served as an aide to Baugh at Hardin-Simmons for five years, and later accompanied Slingin' Sammy to the Titans. Steber is a Navy veteran, and holds an engineering degree from Vanderbilt University. John coaches the offensive line.

HUGH TAYLOR

Assistant Coach

"Bones" coaches offensive ends and defensive backs. Like the rest of the Titan staff, he was an All-American, playing end for Oklahoma City University. As an All-Pro end with the Redskins, Taylor caught 58 touchdown passes in eight seasons. He was head coach at Arkansas State in 1959, before moving up to the Titans last year.

Titans In 1961

The New York ground attack is every bit as potent as the aerial offensive this season. Some talented newcomers of the speedster and pile-driving variety, plus experienced returnees, give the Titans the ability to wreak havoc on the ground, as well as in the air. Leon Burton, a student of the swivel-hipped school, who averaged 7.4 yds. per carry in rushing last year and 22.4 yds. on kick returns, showed sparks of brilliance toward the end of the season. Amazingly fleet Canadian league addition, Mike Hagler, gives the Titans another dangerous breakaway threat. Bob Brooks, a young 215-pounder fresh out of Ohio University, and Jim Joyce from Maryland are two powerhouse full-backs who have joined hard-running 1960 regular, Bill Mathis.

The offensive bulwark is anchored by versatile All-Pro guard Bob Mischak on the left side and his right-side counterpart, John McMullan (244). Both of them are sharp-blocking, rugged competitors. Center Mike Hudock, at 245 pounds, runs interference with great speed and skill. Rounding out the interior line are tackles Jack Klotz (260) and Gene Cockrell (248). A powerful 260-pound tackle from Indiana University, Moses Gray, has been tabbed as a Titan "sleeper," who has the potential to become a top-notch pro lineman.

On defense, mammoth Sid Youngelman (265) adds his beef and six-years experience to the Titan line. Bob Reifsnnyder (260) and second-year man Nick Mumley (255) are both hardened defensive ends. Larry Grantham (195), an All-Pro selection as a rookie linebacker last season, has good speed, reflexes, and he's a devastating tackler. The linebacking posts have been bolstered by the acquisition of former Green Bay Packer star, Larry Hubbard (228), and rookies Fred Boylen (215) and Jim Lindner (215). The defensive backfield features speedsters Dick Felt (180) and Roger Donnahoo (185), Corky Tharp (180) and Fred Julian (200), and newcomer Lenny King (205).

The 1961 Titans are a well-balanced club, with added beef, speed and savvy on both offense and defense. The big weapon is again the forward pass, but New York also has breakaway speed to round out the attack and make it again the most explosive in the AFL. The linebacking and forward wall positions have been bolstered, giving the Titans a crack defensive unit. What this means is that the Titans are strong now and getting stronger all the time.

New York football fans were treated last year to one of the most exciting and explosive offensive displays ever seen in the Metropolitan area. Under the guidance of offense-minded Head Coach, Sammy Baugh, the spanking new Titans, this city's entry in the American Football League, ran up the staggering total of 382 points in 14 games to lead the AFL in scoring.

In their second year of competition, the Titans are again featuring the same wide-open attack, but with a few added attractions. Quarterback Al Dorow, who spearheaded the Titan 1960 offensive with a league-leading 26 touchdown passes, is the key operative in Coach Baugh's lineup. The veteran signal-caller runs with daring, passes with needle-threading accuracy and directs the offense with the consummate skill that makes him ideal for the Titans' diversified brand of football. Behind Dorow is another slick quarterback, Dick Jamieson, himself an excellent passer and runner and a fine operative to have in the wings, ready to go.

On the receiving end, the Titans sport two of the finest pass-catchers in the business, split end Art Powell and flanker-back Don Maynard. Between them, they caught 141 aerials last season, including 20 TD snags. Both Maynard and Powell blossomed as dangerous offensive threats in 1960, when they saw full-time duty with the Titans. Bob Jewett, another experienced (Chicago Bears) end with fine speed and moves, joins the Titans this year for service at the tight end spot, along with 1960 holdover, Thurlow Cooper.

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JOE BISCAHA

End

185 ... 6'1" ... 24 ... Richmond

Signed this year by the Titans, the tall Passaic, N. J., native captained the Richmond University football team in 1958. That year he earned All-Southern Conference and All-Virginia honors, to add to earlier Southern Conference All-Scholastic recognition. Joe also put in 2 years as a catcher and outfielder on the baseball team. Biscaha, who makes his home in Paterson, N. J., is a substitute teacher during the off-season.

DEWEY BOHLING

Halfback

190 ... 5'11" ... 23 ... Hardin-Simmons

Operating out of the slot- or flanker-back position, Bohling was the leading Titan ground gainer in 1960. The stocky back picked up 431 yards in 123 carries, was third on the team in pass-catching, with 30 receptions, and scored 6 touchdowns. Dewey is a bouncy, jolting runner who put in four years of stalwart service under Coach Sammy Baugh at Hardin-Simmons. Bohling signed with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1959, but quit in favor of selling for a sporting-goods distributor. Last year, Baugh coaxed him back into the play-for-pay set, and the results have been mutually satisfying. Dewey resides in Baltimore, Md., with his wife and two children .

FRED BOYLEN

Linebacker

225 ... 5'10" ... 22 ... Michigan State

A June graduate of Michigan State, Fred is slated to bolster the Titans defensive backfield. The hard-hitting Spartan is serviceable at either the middle or outside line-backing posts. Boylen twice earned All-American recognition for his stalwart defensive work. While in high school in the Great Lakes State, he was named to the All-City and All-State teams three years in a row. But the chunky Grand Rapids, Mich., resident's athletic talents are not confined to football. Fred was an All-State prep school baseball player, in addition to State Golden Glove champion and two-time state diving and highboard titleholder. Boylen, who enjoys hunting, fishing, and other outdoor activity, envisions a law career sometime in the future.

ARNOLD BRANCH

Guard

235 ... 6'2" ... 22 ... Langston

At Langston the big guard—who's also serviceable at tackle—was named the outstanding lineman of the Oklahoma collegiate Conference as well as an NAIA All-American. In addition to these and other kudos Branch earned during four seasons of football, he also was a distance runner and field man on the track squad and a forward on the basketball team for two years. Fast and rugged, he's entering his first season of professional football. A chemistry major with a B.S. degree, Arnold is continuing his studies during the off-season.

LEON BURTON

Halfback

173 ... 5'9" ... 26 ... Arizona State

Lightning-fast and swivel-hipped, Burton was used mostly on punt and kick-off returns in 1960, where he averaged 22.4 yds. per carry. Leon was second in the league in the latter department. As an offensive halfback, he averaged 7.4 yds. and tallied 3 touchdowns. At Arizona State in 1957, Leon posted an amazing 9.6 yd. average, leading the nation in rushing with a total of 1126 yds. That year he won All-American mention and Border Conference All-Star honors. Burton also played in three post-season classics—the East-West Shrine game, the All-American Bowl and the Copper Bowl. A native of Flint, Mich., the trim speedster was a track, basketball and football star in high school there. He was a Michigan prep dash champion in 1953 and 1954. Burton, father of three children, is in his third pro season.

DAN CALLAHAN

Guard

230 ... 5'11" ... 24 ... Wooster

Added to the Titan roster after the start of last season, Dan shaped up as a capable offensive guard and a valuable defensive replacement, both on the rushline and as a linebacker. The big Ohioan, a native of Cuyahoga Falls, was an outstanding all-round athlete in high school. He attended Wooster College from 1956-58 and was a top lineman there. Then he transferred to the University of Akron and put in another fine varsity season. Although he had another year of college eligibility left, he elected to go pro and signed with the Cleveland Browns. He played with them during the early part of last season, before switching to the Titans.

BOB BROOKS

End

215 ... 6'0" ... 21 ... Ohio U.

Fresh out of Ohio U., where he was a two-time conference leader in rushing and scoring, the youthful 21-year-old has been tabbed as the "sleeper" of the AFL. His physical attributes—size, speed, and strength—qualify him as a good pro prospect, and his sparkling college grid credentials explain why many believe the powerfully-built rookie is destined for AFL stardom. Bob's brilliant play was mainly responsible for making the Bobcats the leading small college team in the country. In ten games, Brooks carried the ball 165 times and made 830 yards. He was twice an All-Star selection in the Mid-American Conference and he led his team in scoring and ground gaining for three years. Though Brooks was a high draft choice of the Detroit Lions, the Titans finally landed him and the big boy figures to start paying dividends soon.

GENE COCKRELL

Tackle

247 ... 6'0" ... 28 ... Hardin-Simmons

Offensive captain of the Titans, Cockrell is a sturdy blocker both at the line and downfield. Gene attended the University of Oklahoma for two years, and was a guard and tackle on the undefeated Sooners team of 1954. He then transferred to Hardin-Simmons, where he was an outstanding Border Conference lineman for two years under Sammy Baugh. During the off-season, the three-year veteran runs a ranch of his own in his native Pampa, Texas. Gene is also a well-known rodeo performer in the Longhorn State, which is as good as anything for preparing him for the rugged competition in pro football. Cockrell is married and has two sons.

THURLOW COOPER

End

228 ... 6'4" ... 28 ... Maine

With the great combination of Powell and Maynard taking care of most of the pass-catching duties, thundering Thurlow has been used primarily as a blocking end. But he has also demonstrated on more than one occasion his ability to catch passes. Cooper made 8 receptions in 1960, 3 for TDs. The fact that the big end cannot be ignored as an offensive threat prevents the opposition from overplaying Powell or Maynard and makes the Titan receivers still more dangerous. Cooper played one year with the Giants and two in Canada, following a star-studded college career. A former All-Maine, All-Yankee Conference, and All-New England gridder, Thurlow is a teacher-coach in Portland, Me., during the off-season.

ED COOKE

Defensive End

250 ... 6'4" ... 25 ... Maryland

Ed is a muscular flanker whom the Titans picked up from the Baltimore Colts at the beginning of last season. The Norfolk, Va., native spent the entire 1959 championship season with the Colts. Cooke attended the University of Maryland, where he starred at tackle under both the late Jim Tatum and Tommy Mont. He also was the Atlantic Coast Conference shotput champion for a couple of years. He lofted the 16-pound brass pellet 56 feet and might well have made the Olympic team had he not decided to devote full attention to football. He now throws his ample 250 pounds around on the defensive line with surprising agility. A public relations major in college, Ed is employed off-season as a salesman in Norfolk. He is married and a reserve officer in the Army.

JOE DOMEN

Linebacker

225 ... 5'11" ... 25 ... West Virginia

Playing the middle linebacking position, Joe—usually called by his middle name, Tom—helped West Virginia to the Southern Conference championship and earned himself All-Conference mention. After four years of college football, Domen went into teaching for two years, but the husky lineman is giving pro football a try this season. He lives with his wife in Uniontown, Pa., where he still plans to teach during the off-season.

ROGER DONNAHOO

Defensive Halfback

185 ... 6'0" ... 23 ... Michigan State

Nimble Roger was one of the pleasant surprises for the Titans in 1960. He was a superlative defensive specialist at MSU, and he incurred little difficulty in making the step up into the pros last year. The Lincoln Park, Mich. resident was tied with Fred Julian for the team pass interception leadership, with 6, one of which he ran back for a touchdown. Alert and quick-thinking, Roger also scored two more touchdowns on blocked-punt and fumble returns. Donnahoo, whose chief non-athletic hobby is stamp collecting, originally hailed from Greenville, S. C.

AL DOROW

Quarterback

195 ... 6'0" .. 29 ... Michigan State

The 29-year-old veteran signal-caller spearheaded the Titan offense in 1960. Dorow's ability to run, coupled with a great passing arm, has made him one of the most dangerous threats in pro football. Three times last season he won the league trophy as the player-of-the-week on offense. Al's masterly executed roll-outs have caused no end of aggravation for opposing defensemen; and his deft field generalship ranks him with the great quarterbacks. When the solid 195-pounder was right last season, the Titans had the most explosive attack in the AFL. Dorow completed 201 of 396 pass attempts, for a sparkling .508 percentage. He amassed 2848 yards in the air, and led the league in touchdown passes with 26. Against Oakland last year, the ex-Michigan State All-American put on the most spectacular one-man show of the season. He completed 29 of 48 aerials for 375 yards, 3 touchdowns and not a single interception. On the second play of the game, Dorow lofted an 82-yard scoring pass to end Art Powell, and later he capped a drive with one of his patented roll-outs. Al kept the defense "honest" last year by skirting the end himself for 7 touchdowns. While MSU's quarterback in 1950 and 1951, Dorow started the Spartans on a 28-game winning streak. After graduation he played at Bolling Field Air Base in Washington, D. C., where he was voted the "top" player in Air Force Service football in 1954. A veteran of 8 years of pro ball, Al spent four seasons with the Washington Redskins, two with the Philadelphia Eagles, and one at Toronto in the Canadian League. Dorow was named the most valuable player in the 1956 Pro Bowl game. He resides in Plainview, L. I., with his wife and two children—Bernadine, 4½, and Debbie, 3.

BOB DUNNINGTON

Halfback

198 ... 6'1" ... 23 ... Richmond

The former second-team All-Southern Conference halfback is in his first season of pro ball. Bob, a powerful runner, lettered in football and track at Richmond University. He tied Richmond's single-game scoring mark of 4 touchdowns, set by another Titan, Dave Ames. Dunnington also makes his home in Richmond, where last June he married a hometown girl. During the off-season, Bob is employed by the Phillip Morris Co.

ROGER ELLIS

Center

233 ... 6'3" ... 23 ... Maine

One of the most versatile operatives on the Titan squad, Roger is serviceable at offensive guard, center and linebacker. Since professional clubs are permitted to carry only a limited number of players during the regular season, a performer of varied talents, like Ellis, becomes of prime importance. The bruising lineman is capable of holding a regular position, but Coach Baugh has seen fit to shift him as the need arises. Roger gained All-Maine, All-Yankee Conference and Little All-New England rankings at Maine in 1958, as well as the team's Most Valuable Player award. Ellis's home is in Westwood, Mass. Off-season he works for the state as a civil engineer.

DICK FELT

Defensive Halfback

180 ... 6'0" ... 28 ... Brigham Young

Dick was another impressive Titan rookie last season. Though he reported to New York with a string of college scoring and rushing records, he has been cast primarily in a defensive role. Dick is the fleetest of the Titan defensive backs. He put in three varsity seasons at BYU, where he set a one-game record by scoring 4 TDs in one quarter against San Jose State. Then he played service football, including two stellar campaigns with the crack Bolling Air Base team. He not only earned All-Air Force rating but also was named the most valuable player in Air Force football for his outstanding contributions to the 1959 Bolling team. Dick resides in Lehi, Utah, with his wife, Dayleen.

HAROLD GRAY

Guard

235 ... 6'0" ... 21 ... Maryland State

Just out of Maryland State College, Harold was recommended to the Titans by his coach, Vernon McCain, who has sent John Sample and Sherman Plunket up to the Colts and Roger Brown to the Detroit Lions. "He is one of the best pulling guards I have seen," said McCain. As for speed, Harold churns over the 100 in 10.3 seconds. The husky Virginian was an All-Conference guard and team captain last season. He was the iron-man of the squad, putting in more playing time than any other team member. As catcher on the varsity baseball team, he also won the National College Batting Championship.

LARRY GRANTHAM

Linebacker

195 ... 6'0" ... 23 ... Mississippi

The former crack lineman for Ole Miss's 1959 Sugar Bowl champs was one of the outstanding rookies in professional football last year. As a mainstay of the Titan defensive unit, Larry earned a spot on the All-Pro squad. Though Larry is smallish as outside linebackers go, he nevertheless earned himself the reputation of a devastating tackler. Numbered among his assets are blazing speed, hair-trigger reactions and keen football instincts. In his senior year at MU, Larry received honorable mention All-American, as well as the "most valuable lineman" award in the Hula Bowl. Oddly enough, he went to Mississippi on a baseball scholarship. But after his freshman year, he devoted his entire attention to football. He lives with his wife in Crystal Springs, Miss.

MOSES GRAY

Tackle

260 ... 6'3" ... 23 ... Indiana

Both of New York's professional football teams drafted this young giant last winter, but the Titans lured him into the American League fold. Gray was a standout regular for three years at Indiana. His speed and aggressiveness impressed the scouts, and they're saying he has the potential to become a crack professional lineman. Though Gray is able to go both ways, the Titans will probably use him on the offensive line. Moses lives in Conemaugh, Pa.

DICK GUESMAN

Tackle

255 ... 6'4" ... 25 ... West Virginia

Dick is one of a number of rugged linemen to graduate from West Virginia University into professional football. Other distinguished Mountaineer alumni to make the grade include Sam Huff, Joe Stydahar, Bruce Bosley and Chuck Howley. Guesman was one of the top 1960 draft choices of the Baltimore Colts, but the Titans snatched him away at the start of last season. He served as a defensive tackle replacement for Sid Youngelman and Tom Saidock, and in the pinch he showed he could play on either end of the defensive rushline. Those who have followed his career predict a bright future for this tough Pittsburgh, Pa. resident.

Halfback

180 ... 5'10" ... 26 ... Iowa

A former Rose Bowl star, Hagler was one of the best breakaway backs in the Big Ten. Mike, who has been clocked in under 10 seconds for the 100, running in full gear, has a sturdy pair of legs and can cut well, making him difficult to tackle. He comes to the Titans this year after three outstanding seasons in Canadian football, where he earned All-Pro honors. During Mike's All-American days at Iowa, he was called the greatest halfback in that school's history. He compiled a three-year rushing average of 6.4 yds. and better than 27 yds. on both punt and kick-off returns. The 26-year-old Washington, D. C. resident has the blazing speed and deceptiveness to become one of the most exciting backs in the AFL.

DON HERNDON

Halfback

190 ... 6'0" ... 24 ... Tampa

Don saw spot duty at slotback and on kick returns for the Titans in 1960. The swift operative, who has been timed at 9.8 seconds for 100 yards, had a fine return average of 22.5 yards. He also caught 5 passes and scored one touchdown. The former Little All-American was a draft choice of the New York Giants. Herndon is a fine receiver and can also do a capable job on defense.

LARRY HUBBARD

Linebacker

228 ... 6'0" ... 24 ... Marquette

One of the distinguished alumni of Montclair High School and now a resident of that New Jersey town, Larry started at end and linebacker for three seasons at Marquette University. He was twice selected for the first string Catholic All-American team, and in 1959 he gained third team All-American honors. That year, Hubbard caught 15 passes in one game and established Marquette's career receiving mark. Last season, Larry saw duty with the Green Bay Packers and then with the Hamilton Tigercats of the Canadian league. Off-season, he is employed by a leading brewery company.

MIKE HUDOCK

Center

245 ... 6'2" ... 26 ... Miami (Fla.)

Mike was a Titan starter last year. His size and experience make Hudock a valuable asset at the offensive pivot position. He played three years under Any Gustafson at the U. of Miami, where he won All-South rating, and two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he shared the offensive center berth with the veteran Chuck Bednarik. The big pivotman is reliable on snaps, blocks with shattering impact and has exceptional mobility. No. 52 is a frequent sight streaking downfield leading the way for Titan ballcarriers. Mike hails from Tunkhannock in the anthracite-laden hills of Pennsylvania.

DICK JAMIESON

Quarterback

192 ... 6'1" ... 24 ... Bradley

Dick spelled Dorow in 1960, taking charge when the No. 1 quarterback was injured around mid-season. Jamieson proved a competent replacement, completing 35 of 70 aerial attempts, for 586 yards and 6 touchdowns. The lanky signal-caller was an understudy at Baltimore in 1959, behind a pretty fair quarterback, Johnny Unitas. Noted for his intense competitive spirit, he was acquired by the Titans last year in a trade with Dallas. At Bradley, Jamieson was named to the Little All-American team in 1956, as he took the NCAA total offense crown in his sophomore year. He also was a star basketball and baseball player, working as a catcher with the Brave nine and later in the professional ranks. Dick, who lives in Peoria, Ill., is married and has two sons, Jeff, age 3, and Timmy, age 2.

FRED JULIAN

Defensive Halfback

200 ... 6'0" ... 24 ... Michigan

Though he was a powerful triple threat halfback in college, Fred impressed the Titan scouts mostly with his defensive prowess. In his first pro season last year, he broke into the regular defensive lineup and was a terror in the safety position. The hard-knock halfback not only cut down 6 passes but also dealt out a lot of bone-crushing tackling. For three years Fred was a big offensive gun for the Wolverines, in addition to turning in a yoeman-like job on defense. A native Detroiter, and former All-Michigan prep star, Fred hopes to teach and coach in the off-season.

BOB JEWETT

End

198 ... 6'2" ... 26 ... Michigan State

The fleet receiver is a newcomer to the Titans, but not to pro football. Bob had an outstanding rookie campaign with the Chicago Bears in 1957. After sustaining an injury, he entered the Canadian League, where he has played the last three seasons. The wiry Spartan showed recently that he has returned to his old form. Bob has exceptional speed and moves, giving quarterback Dorow another top receiver. His blocking talents also make him a fine candidate for the "tight" end slot. The recipient of the All-American Scholastic award in 1957, Jewett was Michigan State's starting end for three seasons. He also received MVP awards in the 1957 North-South Shrine Game and the 1958 Optimist Bowl. Married and the father of 2 children, Bob operates a rug upholstery firm in Charlotte, Mich.

JIM JOYCE

Fullback

225 ... 6'1" ... 24 ... Maryland

Jim comes to the Titans after a fine year in the Canadian league. The powerfully-built fullback had a brilliant career at Maryland, where he was the leading ground-gainer in the Atlantic Coast Conference, as well as an All-Conference and honorable mention All-American selection. He also was named the outstanding offensive performer in the Senior Bowl and Blue-Gray Game in 1960. His teammates voted him their best back, and in addition, he received the Silvester Watch, a senior award at Maryland for the athlete who typified the best in college sports. A rugged competitor, Joyce can wear down the defense with his pile-driving brand of football. He resides in Philadelphia, Pa., with his wife and two daughters.

LENNY KING

Defensive Halfback

205 ... 6'0" ... 25 ... Connecticut

The chucky defenseman played with the Giants last year. He went from Cheshire Academy to the University of Connecticut in 1954, where in three years of varsity play he established himself as one of the outstanding performers in UConn history. Lenny was named to the All-Yankee Conference, All-New England, and All-East teams, as well as receiving All-American mention. In 1957, he led the nation in pass interceptions, with 20. He also set school season rushing and scoring marks, and the University has since retired his jersey number, 45. In addition, Lenny starred on the varsity baseball and squash teams for three years. King resides in Waterbury, Conn., with his wife and three-year-old daughter.

JACK KLOTZ

Tackle

260 ... 6'5" ... 27 ... Penn Military

Fast afoot for his mammoth proportions, Klotz impressed the Titans from the start last season. He fits into the picture as a swing replacement at either tackle on the offensive unit. And in a pinch, he can also play at offensive guard or in the defensive line. A four year letterman at PM, Jack was a first team little All-American selection in 1956. He later played with the San Diego, Calif., Marine Base unit which was undefeated in both 1957 and 1958. Jack spent the following season in the Canadian league.

DICK LEADBETTER

Tackle

238 ... 6'3" ... 22 ... Maine

Dick comes from the northeastern section of the country, an area usually neglected by professional talent scouts. The Titans landed two top notch Yankee Conference performers last year, in Roger Ellis and Thurlow Cooper, and they're looking for the strapping Leadbetter to bolster the Titan defensive bulwark. As the Maine captain in 1960, he was named to the All-Yankee Conference team. Dick lives in Bangor, Me.

JIM LINDNER

Linebacker

215 ... 6'2" ... 24 ... Ohio State

Center and linebacker under Woody Hayes at Ohio State, Lindner is slated for duty with the Titan defensive unit. The stocky lineman, a resident of Enon Valley, Pa., was an All-State fullback at East Palestine High in Ohio. A bachelor, he is still studying for his physical education degree during the off-season. In his spare time, Jim pursues hunting and fishing.

BOB MARQUES

Linebacker

220 ... 6'0" ... 23 ... Boston U.

Bob was the starting middle linebacker for the Titan defensive unit last year, until he was injured at mid-season. The stocky second-year man has excellent lateral range and tackles with tigerish ferocity. A 1959 graduate of BU, Marques (pronounced Marks) was named on the All-New England team as a center. At high school in his native Everett, Mass., he played at fullback as well as on the line. A member of the Marine Corps reserves, Bob works off season with an Everett construction company.

BILL MATHIS

Fullback

220 ... 6'1" ... 23 ... Clemson

A hard-nosed runner, Mathis was a Titan starter in 1960. Besides performing effectively in gaining short yardage—he churned up 307 yards in 1960—Bill has the speed to turn the end as well as take on pass-catching assignments. Mathis caught 18 passes last season and scored 2 touchdowns. At Clemson, the burly North Carolinian led the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring and was named to the All-Conference team. The Titans acquired his contract from Houston early last season.

DON MAYNARD

End

185 ... 6'1" ... 25 ... Texas Western

Buffalo coach Buster Ramsey last year called the Titans' Don Maynard and Art Powell "the best double receiving threat in the AFL. They make the Titans an explosive team." Maynard, who has good speed and glue on his hands, caught 72 aerials in 1960, second in the league, averaging 17.6 yds. per completion. Included in his receptions were 6 route-going snatches. Don also turned in the outstanding individual pass-catching performance last year against Houston. The wiry flanker-back riddled the Oiler secondary, gaining 174 yards in 11 catches and scoring one TD. Maynard won All-Conference honors while at TWU and starred in the 1958 Blue-Grey game. He was also a Border Conference champion in the high and low hurdles, taking the 100-yd. dash in 9.6 seconds and the 220 in 20.9. With the Giants in 1958, Don was used primarily as a kick-return man. Maynard played in Canada the following year. Don is married to the former Marilyn Weaver, a one-time Texas baton-twirling champion. He works the off-season as an equipment engineer in the Texas oil fields.

BRAD MYERS

Defensive Halfback

195 ... 6'0" ... 23 ... Michigan

Brad was a Michigan halfback for three seasons. His 12 receptions against Ohio State in 1958 are a Michigan record. The former All-Big Ten Conference selection is starting his first professional season. A native of Evanston, Ill., Brad now lives in Wilmette.

FRANCIS MORELLI

Tackle

258 ... 6'2" ... 22 ... Colgate

The hulking tackle is expected to beef up the Titans' offensive forward wall. A Colgate starter for two years before he dropped out of school, Frank was twice a pre-season All-East selection of Stanley Woodward. Joining the Titans won't be an altogether strange experience for Morelli, because he got his initial football schooling under Titan line coach, John Dell Isola, while attending Medford High. Frank's cousin, John Morelli, played pro football with the old Boston Yanks and New York Yanks. Off-season, Frank does construction work while continuing his studies at Boston University.

NICK MUMLEY

Defensive End

255 ... 6'4" ... 25 ... Purdue

Obtained from the Dallas Texans shortly before the start of the 1960 season, Nick stepped right into the defensive line. Although currently at the defensive end spot, he's capable of playing anywhere up front. Nick has the speed, power and desire to keep any opposition from gaining yardage on his flank. Last year ran back an intercepted pass 26 yds. for a TD. The rugged Purdue graduate played in the 1959 College All-Star game, then had a trial with the Philadelphia Eagles. But as often happens with all-stars, the practice time he missed cost Mumley a real shot at a job. Nick showed last year with the Titans that he was ready for the pros.

JOE PAGLIEI

Fullback

227 ... 6'0" ... 26 ... Clemson

It did not take Joe long to make his mark with the Titans last year. Three games after he had joined them he moved into top position among the AFL's punters, with a 42.8-yard average. That hardly was a surprise. At Clemson, where he starred at fullback for three seasons under Coach Frank Howard, Joe won three straight Atlantic Coast Conference punting titles. On his graduation from Clemson in 1956, Pagliei signed with the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian League, played with them for one year, then entered the service. After his discharge, he joined the Philadelphia Eagles, playing with them through the first two games of the 1960 season. In addition to handling punting chores for the Titans last year, Pagliei saw spot duty at fullback, scoring one touchdown. The Clairton, Pa., resident plans to teach and coach between football seasons.

JOHN McMULLAN

Guard

244 ... 6'0" ... 26 ... Notre Dame

John is a rugged competitor, who after four years in the pros knows how to throw his weight around on the line. McMullan handled chores on the right side of the offensive line last season. He was tutored in his trade under the watchful eyes of Notre Dame greats, Frank Leahy and Terry Brennan. Part of his aggressiveness came from playing on those fabulous Fighting Irish teams of 1953-55, which crushed 27 of 30 opponents. After graduation, John entered the service, playing at Fort Dix, N. J., where he was named to the All-Army and All-Service team in 1956 and 1957. Before signing with the Titans, McMullan saw duty with the Giants and Philadelphia Eagles. John, who resides in Ft. Lee, N. J., is married and has one daughter.

BOB MISCHAK

Guard

240 ... 6'0" ... 28 ... West Point

The bulky All-Pro guard will again anchor the left side of the Titan offensive line. Bob's crisp blocking and speed make him a key to the New York ground attack. Versatility personified, he has seen duty everywhere on the forward wall, as well as in the backfield. Mischak was an outstanding offensive end with Army's famous "Comeback Team" of 1953. That year he was named to the All-East squad and played in the College All-Star game. After being drafted by the Cleveland Browns, Bob entered the service for a three year stint. He returned to the Browns following his discharge, and in 1958 was traded to the Giants, where he put in fulltime duty as offensive guard. After a one-year layoff, the Titans lured the husky cadet back into the pro ranks, and Bob lost no time in reasserting his status as one of the top guards in the game.

JIM NIEMANN

Defensive Halfback

180 ... 6'0" ... 26 ... Cincinnati

Another highly touted newcomer to the Titans, Jim made one of the best records of Ohio football during his days at the University of Cincinnati. He won All-Ohio honors and was selected on three all-opponent teams. He tried out for pro baseball following his graduation, then switched to football and has had professional experience with the Philadelphia Eagles. Niemann brings with him a reputation as one of the hardest hitting defense men in the game. Niemann lives in Cincinnati, Ohio.

TOM SAIDOCK

Defensive Tackle

260 ... 6'5" ... 29 ... Michigan State

Defensive captain of the Titans, towering Tom Saidock adds plenty of beef and savvy to the four-man rush-line. He's a solid performer with four years of professional experience behind him. The rugged Michigan State graduate starred on the line for the Spartans in 1951 and 1952, then took time out for a three year hitch in the service, and returned in 1956 to finish out his varsity career. He is married and the father of a 5-year-old son.

BOB SCRABIS

Quarterback

225 ... 6'3" ... 24 ... Penn State

With two experienced quarterbacks of the caliber of Al Dorow and Dick Jamieson on the roster, a rookie signal-caller doesn't get much of a chance to put in playing time. That was the case with Scrabis last year. Fresh out of Penn State, where he lettered in football for three years and in baseball for two, the big quarterback saw only limited duty in 1960. During the off-season, the Albany, N. Y., resident is a graduate assistant in business administration at Penn State.

BILL SHOCKLEY

Halfback

185 ... 5'11" ... 23 ... West Chester State

The versatile halfback was the Titan utility man last season. Shockley's 86 points paced the New Yorkers. He averaged 4.2 yds. in rushing, and 21.2 yds. on punt and kick-off returns. The agile rookie also snagged 8 passes, two of them going for the route. In addition, Bill sports an educated toe that converted on 47 of 50 PAT attempts, booted 9 field goals and handled kick-off assignments. Before joining the Titans, Shockley was a Little-All-American at West Chester State, a small college powerhouse. Bill holds all WCS scoring records—most touchdowns, season (15); most extra points, season (42, career 79); most points, single game (26); most points, season (132); most points, career (241).

BERT RECHICHAR

Linebacker

210 ... 6'1" ... 31 ... Tennessee

Bert is one of the top place-kicking specialists in pro football. The Titans acquired Rechichar's contract last summer, after he obtained his release from the Pittsburgh Steelers. The Tennessee all-star was the first draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1952. Traded to the Baltimore Colts in 1953, he saw duty as an end, punter and kick-return man, as well as place-kicker. Bert played in three Pro Bowl games from 1956-'58, and was voted the Most Valuable Player in the '57 classic. The versatile nine-year veteran holds the NFL mark for the longest field goal, with a booming 56-yard boot. He's also recorded kicks of 52 and 48 yards. Bert lives in Vernon, Pa.

BOB REIFSNYDER

Defensive End

260 ... 6'2" ... 24 ... Annapolis

Bob was one of the most highly touted of all college linemen. But it wasn't until last year with the Titans that he began to fill his big pro billing. In his third year at the Naval Academy, 1957, "Reef" was a unanimous All-American selection. He also won the Maxwell Trophy as the season's outstanding player, helping Navy score a smashing victory over Mississippi in the Cotton Bowl. But from the start of his senior year until 1960, Bob had been hobbled by a badly damaged Achilles tendon. Though he was high draft choice of the Los Angeles Rams and later picked up by the Giants, the injury kept him from making the grade. Getting closer to his Baldwin, L. I. home when the Titans acquired his contract from the Los Angeles Chargers at the start of last season, Reifsnnyder began to come around to his All-American form. Fully recovered at last in 1960, he was a one-man wrecking crew on opposing passers and running backs. He covers a lot of ground for a big man, and with his 250 pounds breathing down the quarterback's neck on every play, he makes things mighty uncomfortable for the opposition.

ROYCE SHELTON

Defensive Halfback

190 ... 6'0" ... 22 ... Stephen F. Austin College

A slotback for four seasons and team captain in his senior year at Stephen F. Austin College, Shelton gained All-American mention. He was also an outstanding trackman, winning the National Junior College high hurdle championship and the Lone Star Conference low hurdle title. The rookie speedster lives with his wife in Malakoff, Texas.

TOM SAIDOCK

Defensive Tackle

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CORKY THARP

Defensive Halfback

180 ... 5'10" ... 28 ... Alabama

In Corky the Titans have an experienced defensive performer. Playing the deep or safety position, Tharp has the keen football instincts to anticipate offensive maneuvers, plus the speed enabling him to move quickly to break up pass plays. He intercepted only 2 aerials in 1960, but he spent most of the season batting balls out of the reach of opposing receivers. The fiery Alabaman from Birmingham had been a glowing star in the Canadian league for three years before joining the Titans. At the University of Alabama, he won laurels as a stickout running quarterback in Coach Harold (Red) Drew's Split T offense. Corky was voted All-South and All-Southeastern Conference rating in both 1953 and 1954. The father of a 5-year-old daughter and a year-old son, Tharp operates a thriving home improvement business between football seasons.

ED WALSH

Tackle

243 ... 6'4" ... 25 ... Penn Military

A solid performer, Ed put in three years of service as an end at Penn Military and captained the team in his senior year. He also lettered for four years in basketball and track. Walsh is being converted to strengthen the interior line. He's a reserve officer in the Marine Corps. Walsh teaches during the off-season and resides in Ft. Meade, Md.

SID YOUNGELMAN

Defensive Tackle

265 ... 6'5" ... 29 ... Alabama

The pride of Brooklyn, where he attended Abraham Lincoln High, Sid is an established veteran of pro football. With 7 seasons under his belt, he is second only to quarterback Al Dorow in terms of service. For six years he was a defensive regular with the 49ers, the Eagles and the Browns. Prior to that, Sid put in three seasons of varsity football at Alabama, gaining All-Southeastern Conference recognition as the team captain in 1953. He also played in three Bowl games with the Crimson Tide. The Titans surrendered a 1960 draft choice to the Buffalo Bills in exchange for negotiation rights to the massive lineman. At 265-pounds the heaviest man on the squad, Sid teams with Saidock to plug up the center of the line. Together, their 525 pounds of choice beef present an impregnable barrier. Youngelman is also a terror at bulling through the line and pressuring the offense. When he's not playing football, Sid teaches school in Brooklyn.

Headquarters for Titan pre-season work-outs this year was the spacious and picturesque Bear Mountain Inn in upstate New York. According to the terms of an agreement completed recently between Titan president, Harry Wismer, and manager Jack Martin of the Inn, the Titans will set up camp at Bear Mountain this season and next, with an option thereafter. The sixty-five man team arrived at the resort spot, along with coaches, other personnel, and press members, on July 21st, following a leisurely Hudson Day Line boat ride up the Hudson River. For seven weeks, the squad was dined abundantly and housed comfortably in the plush facilities of the Inn, with air-conditioning, wall-to-wall carpeting and television in every room. Naturally, though, the Titans didn't go there to enjoy themselves. Head Coach Sammy Baugh ran the Titans through rigorous drills twice daily on the practice field of the State-owned grounds, in preparation for the start of the American Football League's second season. The thousands of vacationers who streamed into the Inn daily found an interesting extra-added attraction in watching the Titans round into shape prior to their invasion of the Polo Grounds. The team broke camp just four times during their stay, for exhibitions in Dallas, Boston, Philadelphia and Greenville (S. C.). Harry Wismer expressed the hope that this summer would be the beginning of a long and pleasant relationship between the Titans and the Bear Mountain Inn.

New York City Municipal Stadium

The Titans' new home come next season will be the Municipal Stadium in Flushing Meadow Park, Queens, to be completed in time for the 1962 campaign. The horse-shoe shaped stadium will be the last word in modern sports arenas, providing not only the finest facilities for the athletes, but also maximum comfort for the spectators. Flushing Meadow Stadium will house a capacity of 60,528 for football, and there won't be a "bad" seat in the park. With not a pillar or post anywhere, every seat will offer a clear, unobstructed view. The box-seat sections on the field will be mounted on rails so that they can be moved into different positions for baseball and football without loss in capacity or hindrance of view. Among the added comforts will be escalators and elevators to provide speedy service to and from the upper stands. An ultra-modern stadium club is planned for members of the Titans' "Blue and Gold" sections, and the stadium will also feature a large cafeteria. The central location of the new ballpark makes it easily accessible from anywhere in the Metropolitan Area. By subway from Grand Central Station to the Stadium is just 15 minutes; furthermore, the park is conveniently reached from New Jersey, Connecticut and Long Island. Spacious parking lots will hold 6,800 cars, with a capacity of 10,000 foreseen in the near future. The Titans' new stadium, as well as plans for construction in other American Football League cities, attests to the solidity of the league after only one year of operation. It also represents a desire to provide the finest facilities for a rapidly growing sport.
