JETS DIRECTORS

"It all starts at the top."

That's a common phrase when talking about the success of any professional operation, and it particularly holds true with the steps taken to bring about the resurgence of the New York Jets.

Directors Leon Hess, Townsend B. Martin and Mrs. Helen Dillon showed their desire to return the club to the forefront of the National Football League in 1977 when they selected Walt Michaels to be their leader on the field and Jim Kensil to assume the full responsibility of administering the overall operation of the club.

In between naming Michaels and Kensil, the directors fought long and hard to secure early home dates. For the past decade, the Jets had been "orphans" of the NFL, never being allowed to play preseason or regular season games before its fans during the baseball season.

That all changed last year when the Jets opened the season at home for the first time since 1964 and played five games at Shea in September and October. For the remaining five years of their lease with the City at Shea, the Jets have been guaranteed at least four early season home games.

Hess and Martin have been totally involved in the development of the club since acquiring part of the franchise in 1963. Mrs. Dillon, daughter of former club president Donald C. Lillis, assumed the post of vice president and secretary in 1968 upon the death of her father and has been an active member ever since.

LEON HESS, chairman of the board and chief executive officer for corporate affairs, is chairman and chief executive officer of the Amerada Hess Corporation. He is a respected member of the board of directors of the Monmouth Park Jockey Club, the American Broadcasting Corporation and the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company.

TOWNSEND B. MARTIN, vice president and treasurer, is an internationally known owner and breeder of thoroughbred horses and also an honored member of the Jockey Club. He is engaged in the investment banking business with Bessemer Securities in New York City. An original backer of the Monmouth Park Jockey Club in 1946, he is now a member of the board of directors.

MRS. HELEN DILLON, vice president, is a vivacious and enthusiastic fan who is in regular attendance at every Jets' game and function. She has become one of the most respected and knowledgeable woman executives in sports and is the first woman on the board of directors of the Pop Warner Football Association. Mrs. Dillon was honored in 1977 by that organization for her contributions to football. She resides in Cos Cob, Conn., with her husband, Dr. Thomas F. Dillon.

JIM KENSIL, President

Progress in pro football depends greatly on stability and direction. The Jets believe that in Jim Kensil they have the man at the top to provide these essential elements for success.

In his first two seasons with the Jets, Kensil has stressed communication within the organization and has outlined everyone's responsibilities.

"What we've tried to do is make sure everybody knows his specific job and understands it," said Kensil, who was named to the executive committee of the NFL Management Council this year.

Kensil had quite a few responsibilities as an administrator in the National Football League for 16 years. He had to move only several blocks from Park to Madison Avenue when he was named the Jets' president and chief operating officer on June 6, 1977.

For nine years prior to joining the Jets, Kensil had been executive director of the NFL, the man Pete Rozelle called "my offensive and defensive coordinator." For seven years before that, he was the NFL's public relations director.

Kensil succeeded Leon Hess, who had served as acting president of the Jets following the death of Phil Iselin in December, 1976. Hess now has the responsibilities of chairman of the board and chief executive officer for corporate matters.

While in the NFL office, Kensil made many innovative contributions to pro football. He was one of the chief architects of the new NFL scheduling format that was introduced last season.

Kensil began his sportswriting career as a student stringer at the University of Pennsylvania. After graduating in 1952, he went to work for the Associated Press in New York City on the sports and news desk before being drafted. He served in Germany and edited the Seventh Army newspaper.

He returned to the AP in 1954 and worked nearly two years in Columbus, Ohio, before coming back to the New York bureau where he covered general sports assignments, edited the teletypesetter Sports Wire and wrote a weekly column about sports on radio and television called "The Sports Dial." He left the AP in 1961 to join the NFL as public relations director.

Kensil was born Aug. 19, 1930, in Philadelphia, Pa. He and his wife, Catherine, have four children and reside in Massapequa, Long Island. Their oldest son, Mike 23, is an administrative assistant for the Jets. They also have two other sons, Joe 21 and Danny 17, and a daughter, Mary Jo 19.



WALT MICHAELS, Head Coach

One of Walt Michaels' favorite sayings is what his father used to tell him after returning from a tough day at the coal mines in Swoyersville, Pa.

"Don't tell me if the sea was stormy...just tell me if you brought home the ship."

The sea was stormy for Michaels and the Jets in 1978. They faced the toughest schedule in the NFL based on the opponents' 1977 won-loss records. Half of the Jets' games were against playoff teams—Miami and New England twice each, Pittsburgh, Dallas, Denver and Philadelphia. Michaels had probably the youngest team in the history of the NFL with an average age of 24 (15 rookies) and an average NFL experience of 1.6 years.

In the fourth game of the season, quarterback Richard Todd broke his left collarbone and reinjured it when he returned after missing seven games. Defensive leader Greg Buttle suffered a sprained knee in the ninth game of the year and was placed on injured reserve.

Despite the Jets' inexperience and injuries, Michaels brought home the ship. New York stayed in playoff contention for 15 games, three minutes and seven seconds before losing in overtime at Cleveland. The Jets finished 8-8, their best record since 1974 and the most wins since 1969. They made the biggest improvement in the won-loss record of any team in the NFL, picking up five victories from last year and almost equaling the win total of the last three seasons combined (all 3-11).

Michaels was named AFC Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writers of America and UPI. He was selected NFL Coach of the Year by *Pro Football Weekly* and several other publications.

The 49-year-old former Cleveland Brown great earned accolades from his own squad plus opposing coaches and players.

"Walt's the guy who gave this club organization," said offensive captain Randy Rasmussen, the only Jet left from the Super Bowl III squad. "He knows how to handle talent, and that's the difference in this team, the big difference from the Jets of the past several seasons."

After the Jets won at Miami to sweep both games from the Dolphins for the first time since 1969, Bob Griese said, "I don't know Walt Michaels personally, but I have much respect for him. He's put things together in New York. From what I could gather about Michaels as a player, he had much character and hustle, and believe me, he's transmitted it to that Jets' team."

Cleveland coach Sam Rutigliano echoed Griese's sentiments: "I think the Jets are an outgrowth of Walt Michaels. They know the kind of guy he is, the kind of guy who plays every down. He is involved with his team, and his players can only get better. They are so young, but they didn't fold when things got tough. And that is a credit to Walt Michaels."

Michaels gives the credit to his players. "I'm proud of the guys. My philosophy is not to ask people to do something I wouldn't do myself. As a result of being honest, they responded."

"We had a roller coaster type of year...a lot of highs and lows, but these kids never quit. They learned a lot of painful lessons last year. We had some adversities to get over and suffered some tough losses, but they bounced back time and time again."

In Michaels' first season as head coach two years ago, the Jets did not improve their record from 1976, but they regained respect throughout the league with their aggressive, hard-hitting style of play, particularly against some of the toughest teams in the NFL.

Michaels was rewarded with an extension of his contract before the 1978 season. "It's a simple matter of Walt doing the job," said club president Jim Kensil. "He has leadership quality. He's a hard worker. He's organized. And people believe in him. It's not just the players, it's the ownership."

The son of Polish immigrants, Michaels' football philosophy was molded in the Pennsylvania coal mine country. "My father died when he was 54 and he understood two things about football," Michaels said. "If you hit, you win. And if you won, you were successful."

Michaels did a lot of hitting and winning as a linebacker for the Cleveland Browns from 1952-61. He played on two NFL championship teams, five divisional winners and made the Pro Bowl four straight years from 1957-60.

He was drafted in the seventh round by Cleveland in 1951 out of Washington & Lee, where he played fullback, guard and linebacker while earning a B.A. in psychology and education. The Browns traded Michaels that same year to Green Bay for Dan Orlich and then reacquired him in 1952 for Richard Logan, Elmer Costa and Forrest Grigg. Michaels became a starting linebacker and missed only two games in his 10-year career with Cleveland.

Michaels' toughness was transplanted into the defenses he coached in the pro ranks. He began as defensive line coach for the Oakland Raiders in 1962 and joined the Jets the following year in a similar position under Weeb Ewbank.

For 10 years Michaels masterminded the growth of the Jets' defense, which became one of the most respected in the AFL and then AFC. Under his tutelage, such players as Gerry Philbin, John Elliott, Verlon Biggs, Al Atkinson, Larry Grantham and Ralph Baker were developed.

In 1976 when Michaels returned to New York after three years (1973-75) as defensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles, he transformed the Jets' linebacking from the weakest spot on the squad to the strongest unit despite the fact three of the starters were rookies and only one, Greg Buttle, was a high draft choice.

When Michaels first joined the Jets' staff, he came out of retirement for the 1963 opener at Boston when the Jets' linebacking corps was decimated by injuries. He played the entire game after not having practiced for two years.

Michaels devoted all his energy to coaching after his one-game "comeback." In 1967 he took over the secondary and linebackers and helped mold the Jets' 1968 defense into the number-one unit in the AFL against the rush and in total defense. In 1970, the unit again ranked on top in total defense as well as first against the rush in the AFC.

Michaels' finest hour came in Super Bowl III. Although the Jets' defense received little of the glamour in the stunning 16-7 upset

victory, Michaels' men played a significant role by holding Baltimore scoreless until less than four minutes remained. The often-maligned secondary of four free agents intercepted four Colt passes.

The game created an unusual situation for Walt's mother, Mary, who was chosen NFL mother of the year in 1966. On the Baltimore side was Walt's brother, Lou, a standout placekicker who played in the NFL from 1958-69 after earning All-America honors as a tackle at Kentucky.

Michaels remained with the Jets until 1973 when, with Charley Winner designated as the next head coach, he left to join the Eagles.

When Lou Holtz was selected as the Jets' head coach in 1976, Michaels was brought back as defensive coordinator. Holtz resigned after the 13th game that season, and Michaels became the eighth head coach in Jets' history in January, 1977.

Michaels is another in the line of Paul Brown products to become a head coach in the pros. Presently there are three others, Don Shula, Chuck Noll and Bill Walsh.

In 1977 Michaels was named to the Commonwealth of Virginia and Long Island (N.Y.) sports halls of fame. In 1978 he was inducted into the ODK honorary fraternity at Washington & Lee for outstanding achievement and also was honored by the New York Press Photographers Association for his cooperation. Earlier this year Michaels and his staff coached the North squad in the Senior Bowl at Mobile, Ala. Last February Michaels appeared on the TV quiz show, "Sports Challenge," with two of his players, Wesley Walker and Matt Robinson.

Michaels was born Oct. 16, 1929, in Swoyersville, Pa. He and his wife, Betty, have four children: Mary Ann 23; Walter, Jr., 20, a standout linebacker and captain at Kutztown (Pa.) State; Mark 15 and Paul 11. They make their home in West Islip, N.Y.

MIKE Hickey

**Director of Player Personnel
3rd Season**

The youngest director of player personnel in the NFL at 32, Mike Hickey is entering his third season with the Jets. He has the responsibilities of coordinating the Jets' college scouts and preparation for the draft.

In 1978 Hickey organized the Jets' draft for the first time. Ten of the club's 17 selections made the team, and two of them, Chris Ward and Bobby Jackson, were selected to the NFL all-rookie squad.

Hickey joined the Jets shortly after the draft in May, 1977, replacing director of scouting Mike Holovak. Prior to coming to New York, he was a personnel assistant for the Patriots under Bucko Kilroy for six years.

His father, Red Hickey, was head coach of the 49ers from 1959-63 and has been a scout with the Cowboys since 1965. Hickey played under three present and former NFL coaches: Dick Vermeil (high school in San Mateo, Calif.) plus John Madden and Don Coryell (both at San Diego State).

Hickey attended the University of Texas on a track scholarship and won the Southwest Conference discus championship in 1965. He transferred to San Diego State, where he was a reserve tight end before a knee injury ended his career.

Hickey was born on Nov. 18, 1946, in Santa Monica, Calif. He and his wife, Kathy, have two daughters, Kim 7 and Kelly 4.



JIM Royer

**Pro Personnel Coordinator
2nd Season**

Jim Royer was promoted to the newly created position of pro personnel coordinator last season after serving as a talent scout for five years. He is responsible for scouting the Jets' next opponent each week of the season and working with Walt Michaels in evaluating pro talent for the club's personnel needs. Royer also is involved in signing players.

From 1975-77, Royer scouted exclusively for the Jets. Prior to that, he was with the Galaxy combine in 1974 and the Washington Redskins in 1973.

A 1957 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy where he earned a degree in electrical engineering, Royer has been active in coaching or scouting since 1958 when he started as head coach of the U.S. Marine football team in Okinawa. He spent the next 10 years in the college ranks as an assistant coach at Navy (1959-60, 1964-65), Buffalo (1961), Tulane (1962-63) and Pittsburgh (1966-68).

Royer served as defensive coordinator of the Richmond Roadrunners in the Atlantic Coast League in 1969. He joined the New Orleans Saints midway through the 1970 season as offensive line coach and remained there through 1972.

He was born on Sept. 15, 1932, in Baltimore, Md.

The senior member of the Jets' assistant coaching staff...has had a key role in the development of tackles Marvin Powell and Chris Ward, the Jets' top draft picks in 1977 and 1978 respectively...both were selected to NFL all-rookie teams...Jets set a team rushing record of 2,250 yards in 1978 behind blocking of Fry's offensive line...has a background of 26 consecutive seasons in the NFL as either a player, administrator or coach...worked with the Pittsburgh Steelers' offensive line for five years under head coach Chuck Noll before coming to the Jets in 1974...Steelers' running attack established a club record under Fry in 1972 ...played for the Rams from 1953-59 with two years out for a military hitch...was original member of Dallas Cowboys, playing from 1960-64...began administrative career with Atlanta Falcons as a scout in 1965 and was assistant player personnel director and offensive line coach in 1967 and 1968...joined Steelers in 1969 ...was star tackle at Kentucky under Bear Bryant from 1949-52...born Nov. 11, 1930, in Cincinnati, Ohio...wife Vonnie, daughters Alicia 19, Deanne 15 and Monica 13; sons Brian 20, Erick 10 and Matthew 9.

Has been instrumental in the development of the special teams ...also works with the linebackers...Jets led NFL in 1978 in punt return average (12.5)...also played a key role in the performance of Pat Leahy, who led the AFC in scoring with 107 points...received a game ball for the Jets' win vs. Buffalo at Shea last year when the special teams scored a TD and set up two others...joined the Jets' staff in 1976 after serving as head coach of the Portland Thunder in the WFL for three games before league folded...began coaching career at Oratory Prep in Summit, N.J., where he produced two winning seasons in three years for a school that was 0-37 in five years prior to his arrival...became head coach at Roselle Park (N.J.) High in 1967...school had not had a winning record in 10 years...Gardi produced a pair of winning seasons, including an undefeated state championship team in 1969...returned to his alma mater, Maryland, as freshman coach in 1970 and was a varsity assistant from 1971-74...joined the Philadelphia Bell of the WFL in 1975 as an assistant and was named interim head coach in the middle of the season...defeated Portland in his only game and was chosen head coach of the Thunder a week later...co-captain and named "unsung hero" for Maryland in 1959...signed as free agent with Washington and Buffalo but did not make clubs...born March 2, 1939, in Newark, N.J....a native of Harrison, N.J., where he was an all-state tackle at Harrison High in 1955...wife Audrey, daughter Joanne Lynn 14 and son T. David 8.

2nd Season**

Joined the Jets in August last year after serving three years as an assistant at Kent State...supervises weight training program for Jets, helps Joe Gardi with special teams and works with Walt Michaels in breaking down films and other special assignments...a 1965 graduate of Bucknell where he was defensive captain and an all-conference linebacker on the Bisons' Lambert Cup team in 1964...after serving in Vietnam with the U.S. Army, he returned to Bucknell in 1968 as an assistant under Carroll Huntress, who is now a Jets' talent scout...moved with Huntress to Kentucky in 1969 where he was freshman coach for two seasons and offensive backfield coach for two more...became offensive line coach at Boston University in 1973 and was elevated to offensive coordinator the following year...joined the Kent State staff in 1975 as offensive backfield coach...switched to defensive line in 1976 and helped guide Kent State to top defensive performance in Mid-American Conference...became defensive coordinator in 1977...brother, Chuck, is an assistant football coach at Southern Colorado...born Feb. 4, 1944, in Pittsburgh, where he was All-Catholic quarterback at Central Catholic High...single.

**Offensive Coordinator,
Quarterbacks
3rd Season**

Had a major role in the Jets' offensive improvement last year ...after finishing 22nd in the NFL in scoring in 1977 with 191 points, Jets rocketed to third in 1978 with 359 points, the biggest increase of any team in the league...Jets also set a team rushing record...considered one of the best quarterback teachers in the NFL...has been vital in the progress of Richard Todd, Matt Robinson and Pat Ryan...before coming to New York, Idzik helped develop Bob Griese at Miami and worked with John Unitas and Roman Gabriel...served as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach with the Philadelphia Eagles for four seasons before joining the Jets in 1977...both Idzik and defensive coordinator John Mazur were assistants at Philadelphia with Walt Michaels from 1973-75 before Michaels returned to the Jets...began NFL coaching career with the Dolphins in their first year (1966) as quarterback and receiver coach under George Wilson...held a similar position under Don McCafferty at Baltimore from 1970-72 and contributed to Colts' Super Bowl V victory in 1971...started coaching at Tennessee in 1954...moved to Ottawa in the CFL for a year before returning to the college ranks at Maryland under Jim Tatum, who coached Idzik during his outstanding playing career with the Terps from 1947-51...after four years at Maryland, moved to the University of Detroit in 1960 and was head coach from 1963-64 before the school dropped football...after a year as an assistant at Tulane in 1965, he joined the Dolphins' staff...an out-

standing athlete at North Catholic High in Philadelphia...earned seven varsity letters in football and baseball at Maryland...played in the Gator Bowl twice and in the North-South Game...born June 25, 1928, in Philadelphia...wife Joyce, daughters Cynthia 20, Joy 14 and son John, Jr., 18, a sophomore receiver at Dartmouth.

1978 JETS GAME-BY-GAME

Sept. 3, AT JETS 33, MIAMI 20 (49,598)—Hazy and warm. Opening at home for the first time since 1964 when they inaugurated Shea Stadium to football, the Jets defeated the Dolphins, 33-20. Coach Walt Michaels' team (probably the youngest in the history of the NFL with an average age of 24 and average NFL experience of 1.6 years) scored on seven of its 10 possessions with Richard Todd tossing three touchdowns, two to WR Wesley Walker and one to TE Mickey Shuler. Pat Leahy added four field goals. Todd sent the Jets in front on their first possession with a 47-yard pass to Walker, and Leahy kicked a 36-yard field goal about a minute later following a Mike Hennigan interception of Don Strock, who was playing for injured Bob Griese. An interception by Greg Buttle set up another Leahy FG that gave New York a 13-0 lead. After Delvin Williams twisted and raced 58 yards for a TD, the Jets answered back immediately with Todd completing a one-yard pass to Shuler to climax a 59-yard drive. The Jets took over the driver's seat for good at the beginning of the half when Todd and Walker hooked up again on a 43-yard TD pass. "We not only got whipped," said Don Shula. "I never even felt we were in the game." "We played the type of football game I like—sound," said Michaels. Todd passed for 245 yards and spread 17 completions of his 25 attempts to seven different players. Walker began his race for NFL receiving honors with four for 108 yards.

Sept. 10, JETS 21, AT BUFFALO 20 (40,985)—Cloudy. "With a little bit of luck" could have been the Jets' theme song as they scored with 50 seconds remaining to defeat Buffalo, 21-20, and increased their record to 2-0. With Richard Todd having an erratic day, the Jets got some help from lady luck. For example—Jerome Barkum's first TD catch came off the hands of a Bills' defender, Tom Dempsey missed the PAT to leave it 14-13 in favor the the Jets and Wesley Walker bobbled a catch in the winning TD drive, but the ball fell into his lap as he hit the turf. The Jets did make several clutch plays, especially in the winning drive; and the defense played with intensity except during Buffalo's 92-yard TD march. Todd wasn't as on target as he was against Miami, but he did complete three touchdown passes for the second straight week. He hit the winner to Barkum at the end of an 11-play, 77-yard drive and was 14-26 for 171 yards with two interceptions. Rookie WR Derrick Gaffney, taking advantage of Wesley Walker's double coverage, received the "game ball" for his 5-108 performance. DE Joe Klecko harrassed the Bills with one nine-yard sack, an eight-yard loss on a QB keeper and drew five holding penalties—totaling a minus 67 yards. Sept. 17, SEATTLE 24, AT JETS 17 (46,911)—Sunny and warm. Jets' mistakes, offensively and defensively, and an inability to stop Seattle on third down led to the New Yorker's first loss of the season, 24-17. The Jets set a club record for penalties with 14. They lost one TD via a penalty

and nullified their last drive with another. Richard Todd was intercepted twice in scoring situations, once at the Seattle 13 and again at the Seahawks' 22. QB Jim Zorn completed 19 of 26 passes for 191 yards and RB Dave Sims scored three touchdowns, the last coming after Zorn converted a fake field goal into a first down at the Jets' two. NY opened the scoring with a 65-yard drive on the initial kickoff. The teams traded touchdowns and field goals until Sims' final tally at 4:40 of the fourth quarter. "They took advantage of opportunities and we didn't. You've got to give 'em credit," said Walt Michaels. The Jets' head coach was disappointed in his young team's inability to stop Seattle on third down—the Seahawks converted 10 of 14 tries. Kevin Long gained 80 yards, Clark Gaines had 56 and two TDs and Scott Dierking added 40 as the club netted 177 yards rushing. "It's a shame we wasted such a great effort by Long," said Michaels. Sept. 24, AT WASHINGTON 23, JETS 3 (54,729)—Cloudy and cool. The Jets not only lost to Washington, 23-3, they also lost starting QB Richard Todd for seven weeks with a broken left collarbone. New York took a 3-0 lead the first time it had the ball via Pat Leahy's 31-yard FG. On the next series the Jets missed another big opportunity when they recovered a punt that hit a Washington receiver on the four, but a penalty nullified the effort. The Redskins, behind the passing of Joe Theismann, picked their way to a 13-3 halftime lead and then generated a second half offense and pass rush that put the game away. "Very simple," said Walt Michaels, "it was an old fashioned a—kicking. We played well in the first half and then they whipped us in the second half." Theismann wound up 21-30 for 209 yards and two TDs. Ex-Jet John Riggins (21-114) and Mike Thomas (17-57) led the Redskins' ground attack which netted 256 yards. and Matt Robinson's 22-yard pass to Derrick Gaffney. Nov. 5, JETS 31, AT DENVER 28 (74,983)—Partly cloudy and cool. After losing 55-21 at New England a week earlier, the Jets appeared to be on the verge of another humiliating rout when Denver took a 28-7 lead in the second quarter. But coach Walt Michaels' young squad grew up in a hurry by scoring the next 24 points to stun the defending AFC champions, 31-28, in the most miraculous comeback of the 1978 NFL season and one of the greatest turnarounds in Jets' history. The winning TD came on a perfect 75-yard TD strike from Matt Robinson to Wesley Walker with 5:45 to go in the final quarter. The Broncos had a chance to send the game into overtime with eight seconds remaining, but former Jet Jim Turner was short on a 42-yard FG try. The Jets' offense contributed to all of Denver's points with a misplayed punt, a fumble and two interceptions, snapping Robinson's streak of 70 straight passes without a theft. The Jets erupted for 17 points in the second period and then completely dominated the second half by gaining 231 yards, 130 of them on the ground, against the vaunted Orange Crush defense. When the Jets regained possession with 3:17 left in the game, Michaels installed a one-back offense that produced three first downs and used up 2:10 on the clock. Kevin Long carried seven straight times for 54 yards during the drive. It was only the third defeat for the Broncos at Mile High Stadium since 1975 (Oakland won the other two), and

season to beat Miami, 24-13, and sweep the season series for the first time since 1969. It was the Jets' first victory in the Orange Bowl since 1971. The Jets' defense completely frustrated Bob Griese, limiting him to just 112 yards passing, picking off three interceptions and sacking him twice. Griese was lifted for Don Strock in the fourth quarter, marking the first time since 1970 that he had been benched for ineffectiveness, not injury, in a game that counted. Matt Robinson led the Jets' attack by completing 17 of 26 for 257 yards, including a 33-yard TD pass to Wesley Walker in the fourth quarter that clinched the victory. Trailing 6-3 at halftime, the Jets took the lead for good in the third period with an 80-yard drive that culminated in Darnell Powell's three-yard run, the first TD of his career that gave New York a 10-6 advantage. The key play in the game came on the next series when Bob Martin picked off Griese's pass and returned it 26 yards to the Dolphin three to set up Kevin Long's one-yard TD plunge. The Jets held Miami to 256 yards in total offense, which was their second best defensive effort of the year.

Dec. 3, AT JETS 24, BALTIMORE 16 (50,248)—Overcast and cold. With most of the members of the Super Bowl III championship team watching from the stands, the Jets kept their playoff hopes alive with a 24-16 win over the Colts that gave New York a sweep of the season series for the first time since 1973. The Jets held a 10th reunion for the 1968 squad, and they were treated to a good show both at the banquet on Saturday night and during the game on Sunday. The Jets' defense came through with its best performance of 1978, holding the Colts to 244 yards in total offense and recording a season-high five QB sacks. The combination of Matt Robinson and Wesley Walker clicked for two TDs, the third game in a row that they had paired together for at least one scoring pass. Abdul Salaam's fumble recovery on the Colt 16 set up the Jets' first score. Baltimore took the lead late in the second period, but Robinson put New York on top for good on a 48-yard TD pass to Walker with a minute left in the first half. Walker's catch pushed him over the 1,000-yard mark for the season, making him the first Jet to accomplish that feat since Don Maynard and George Sauer (both were at the game) each did it in 1968. The Jets' defensive line put tremendous pressure on QB Bill Troup late in the game to prevent the Colts from rallying. Kevin Long rushed for 107 yards, the second time in 1978 that he passed the 100-yard mark vs. the Colts.

Dec. 10, AT CLEVELAND 37, NEW YORK 34 overtime (36,881)—Snow, windy and very cold. It took 15 games, three minutes and seven seconds before the Jets finally were eliminated from playoff contention. Don Cockroft's 22-yard field goal in overtime put the pin in New York's bubble and gave Cleveland a 37-34 victory. The Browns seemed to have the outcome clinched with a 27-10 lead at the end of the third quarter; but as it was all year, the Jets refused to give up. Behind the arm of Matt Robinson, who had the most productive day of his career, and the opportunistic play of the special teams, the Jets rallied for 24 points in less than 10 minutes in the fourth quarter to take a 34-27 advantage. Robinson tossed two TD passes to Mickey Shuler and Bruce Harper to bring the Jets to within three points. Ken Schroy recovered an onside kick, and Pat Leahy booted a 39-yard FG to tie it with 2:36 remaining. On the next kickoff, Tim Moresco jarred the ball loose from Keith Wright, and Darnell Powell scooted 23 yards with it to the Browns' eight. Three plays later, Kevin Long went over

from the one to give New York the lead for the first time in the game with 1:16 to go. But the Jets' defense, which yielded 519 yards in total offense, could not hold the Browns as Brian Sipe drove his team 73 yards in six plays and hit Calvin Hill with the tying TD pass with 14 seconds remaining. The man who hurt the Jets the most all day was Greg Pruitt, who rushed for 138 yards (the most against New York in 1978), caught six passes for 69 yards and returned the opening kickoff of the overtime 31 yards to set up Cockroft's FG. Robinson completed 22 of 44 for 289 yards, three TDs and four interceptions (all career highs). Harper had one of his best days of the year with 245 yards in all-purpose yardage.

Dec. 17, DALLAS 30, AT JETS 7 (52,532)—Clear and cold. With gusts as high as 50 miles per hour creating mini-tornadoes at the closed end of Shea Stadium, the defending Super Bowl champion Cowboys held the Jets to their lowest offensive output of the season (137 total yards) en route to a 30-7 victory. Tony Dorsett was the offensive hero for Dallas with 121 yards rushing and five receptions for 27 yards. He made the pivotal play of the game late in the third quarter when he scooped up Billy Joe DuPree's fumble and raced 54 yards for his second TD of the day that gave the Cowboys a commanding 23-0 bulge. QB Roger Staubach sat out the contest with a bruised throwing hand, but backup Danny White was just as effective despite the wind with 15 of 24 for 156 yards, one TD and no interceptions. The Dallas defense picked off three interceptions and sacked Matt Robinson five times. Kevin Long's 40 yards rushing gave him the second highest season total (954) in Jets' history.

RULES FOR FREE RE-ACTIVATIONS FROM INJURED RESERVE

Each club shall have during a season (including postseason) a maximum of three free re-activations from injured reserve which may be used only on players who were placed on reserve after the final cutdown of that year. In order for a club to use a free re-activation on any player injured in the preseason, such player must count on the active list at the final cutdown and be placed on injured reserve thereafter. Free re-activations may be used only on players who meet the four-week minimum requirements from the date of going on injured reserve during the regular season or from the date the injury occurred in preseason. The four-week minimum means that a player's injury renders him physically unable to play football for a minimum of four weeks.

1959

ORGANIZED—First organizational meeting held in Chicago under the leadership of Lamar Hunt of Dallas. Charter franchises granted to New York and Harry Wismer; Dallas, Los Angeles, Minneapolis, Denver and Houston (Aug. 14).

FIRST DRAFT—Player selection through first 33 rounds. Draft was by position. New York took George Izo, quarterback, Notre Dame (Nov. 22).

SECOND DRAFT—Twenty extra rounds completed to make 53 for first year (Dec. 2).

DIVISIONS—Eastern Division set up with Boston, Buffalo, Houston and New York; Western—Dallas, Denver, Los Angeles and Oakland.

BAUGH TO COACH—Wismer hires Sammy Baugh as the first coach of the N.Y. Titans at \$28,000 a year (Dec. 18).

1960

SEBO NAMED—Steve Sebo, Penn football coach, hired as general manager.

COACHES—George Sauer, Bones Taylor, Dick Todd, John Steber and John Dell Isola named as assistant coaches.

MAYNARD SIGNS—Don Maynard, flanker from Texas Western, becomes the first Titan to sign a contract. He came as a free agent from Canada.

HOME FIELD—Wismer gains access to the Polo Grounds for home Titan games.

TV PACT—Wismer completes five-year pact with ABC to televise AFL games. First year fee was \$1,785,000 (June 9).

TRAINING CAMP—Over 100 players reported to first Titan training camp at the University of New Hampshire, Durham, N.H. (July 9).

PRESEASON GAMES—Titans break camp July 31 for their first preseason game. Los Angeles wins 27-7 before 27,778 in the Coliseum (Aug. 2).

FIRST WIN—Titans won their first game of any kind 52-31 at Buffalo in the final exhibition game (Sept. 3).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME—Titans open championship play at Polo Grounds, beating Buffalo in the rain, 27-3. Titans' colors were blue and gold. Attendance was 9,607 (5,727 paid) (Sept. 10).

FIRST SEASON—Titans break even at 7-7 (second place), drawing 221,285 for 14 games.

DRAFT FOR 1961 SEASON—Titans pick Tom Brown, G, Minnesota, as their number one.

1961

1961 SEASON—Titans finished at 7-7 again, good for third place.

DRAFT FOR 1962—Sandy Stephens, QB, Minnesota, drafted first by Titans (Dec. 2).

1962

SEBO RESIGNS—Steve Sebo quits job as general manager to become athletic director at Virginia.

NEW COACH—Clyde (Bulldog) Turner named by Harry Wismer to succeed Sammy Baugh.

COACHING CONFLICT—Harry Wismer agrees to pay off Baugh's contract and keep Turner as the coach.

NEW QB—Wismer signs Lee Grosscup just before opening game. He directed a 27-17 victory over Oakland (Sept. 9).

FINANCIAL TROUBLE—Wismer unable to meet his payroll and the AFL assumed the costs of running the club until the end of the season (Nov. 8).

ATTENDANCE—Team drew only 36,161 for seven home games, finished last at 5-9.

1963

NEW OWNERSHIP—A five-man syndicate composed of David A. (Sonny) Werblin, Townsend B. Martin, Leon Hess, Donald C. Lillis and Philip H. Iselin purchased the New York franchise for \$1-million (March 28).

EWBANK CHOSEN & TITANS TO JETS—Weeb Ewbank, who had been released by Baltimore, was named head coach of the team. On the same day the new owners changed the name from Titans to Jets (April 15).

ASSISTANT COACHES—Ewbank designated Clive Rush, Walt Michaels, J.D. Donaldson and Chuck Knox as his assistant coaches. George Sauer, Sr., retained as head talent scout.

TRAINING CAMP—Jets move to Peekskill, N.Y., for their first training camp.

QB TROUBLES—Still needing a quarterback and the opening day less than a week away, Ewbank picked up Dick Wood as a free agent.

OPENING GAME—Boston upended Jets 38-14 in the opener at Boston College (Sept. 8).

FIRST VICTORY—Jets won first game under new ownership as they defeated Houston 24-17 at the Polo Grounds in the home opener. Marshall Starks set AFL record with 97-yard TD return of a missed field goal (Sept. 22).

CANCELLED GAMES—AFL calls off games on day of national mourning for President John F. Kennedy (Nov. 24).

SNELL DRAFTED—The Jets made Matt Snell, RB, Ohio State, their number one draft choice. Snell also drafted by the Giants. Snell became the first number one to sign with the N.Y. team. Also signing were Dave Herman and Mike Taliaferro, both drafted by Jets and Giants, and high draft choices Gerry Philbin and Ralph Baker.

SHUTOUT—Jets record first shutout in their history, a 17-0 blanking of Kansas City at the Polo Grounds (Dec. 1).

THE SEASON—The Jets finished last (5-8-1) but were successful at the box office, drawing 103,550 for seven games.

1964

TRADE—Jets and Denver complete historic nine-player deal. Jets sent Dick Guesman, Ed Cooke, Charlie Janerett, Jim Price and Sid Fournet to Denver for Gene Prebola, Wahoo McDaniel, Gordy Holz and Bob Zeman (January).

TV PACT—AFL and NBC announced a five-year television contract calling for \$36,000,000 starting with the 1965 season (Jan. 29).

NEW HOME—Jets moved into Shea Stadium, beating Denver 30-6, before an AFL record crowd of 45,665. Jets' Gene Heeter scored the first Shea TD (Sept. 12).

SNELL RECORD—Matt Snell rushes for 180 yards, a club record, as Jets topple Houston 24-21 at Shea (Oct. 17).

FIRST SELLOUT—60,300 sat in at Shea to see Buffalo stop the Jets 20-7 (Nov. 8).

TRADE RIGHTS—Jets trade rights to Jerry Rhome to Houston in return for a number one draft choice.

NAMATH DRAFTED—Using their pick gained from Houston, the Jets drafted Alabama QB Joe Namath.

SNELL HONORED—Matt Snell was named the AFL's Rookie of the Year. Snell gained 948 yards on 215 carries and caught 56 passes (Dec. 17).

1965

NAMATH SIGNS—The day after the Orange Bowl game, Joe Namath signed a Jets' contract reported to be worth \$427,000 (Jan. 2).

HUARTE SIGNS—Heisman Trophy winner John Huarte of Notre Dame signed a Jets' contract estimated to be worth \$200,000, giving the Jets over one-half million dollars worth of QB talent within a week (Jan. 9).

NAMATH OPERATION—Twenty-three days after signing, Joe Namath entered Lenox Hill Hospital to undergo an operation for cartilage and ligament damage in his right knee (Jan. 25).

ROOKIE GAME—Joe Namath plays in his first professional game as the Jets' rookies beat the Patriot rookies at Lowell, Mass. (July 28).

FIRST APPEARANCE—After sitting on the bench for the opener, Namath entered the second quarter vs. Kansas City (Sept. 18).

FIRST START—Joe Namath starts his first game (third of the year for Jets) and throws 19 for 40 for 287 yards and 2 TDs, but Jets lose 33-21 to Bills (Sept. 26).

FIRST WIN—After going 0-5-1, the Jets stopped Denver 45-10 at Shea (Oct. 31).

DRAFT FOR 1966—Jets draft Bill Yearby, Carl McAdams, Emerson Boozer and Pete Lammons.

NAMATH HONORED—Joe Namath was named the AFL's Rookie of the Year. Namath completed 164 of 340 for 2,220 yards with 18 TDs and only 15 interceptions.

1966

ALL-STAR GAME—With Joe Namath at the helm, the AFL all-stars beat Buffalo 30-19. Namath named MVP (Jan. 15).

EXPANSION DRAFT—Jets lose Wahoo McDaniel, Willie West, Mike Hudock and LaVerne Torczon to Miami Dolphins in the expansion draft (Jan. 16).

AFL-NFL MERGER—Representatives of the AFL and NFL agreed to merge and play a world championship game following the 1966 season. Pete Rozelle named commissioner of both leagues (June 8).

WIDEST MARGIN—Jets open home season, beating Houston 52-13. The 52 points and margin of 39 set records for the Jets (Sept. 18).

SPOILERS—Jets close season at Shea, whipping the Patriots 38-28 to knock Boston out of the Eastern Division title (Dec. 17).

NAMATH UNDER KNIFE—Ten days after the close of the season, Joe Namath entered the hospital for a tendon transfer and cartilage removal in his right knee (Dec. 28).

1967

SUPER BOWL—In the first Super Bowl at Los Angeles, Green Bay beats Kansas City 35-10 for the first world crown (Jan. 15).

AFL-NFL DRAFT—Jets tab Paul Seiler as their first choice in the first combined AFL and NFL draft. Jets rotated, drafting 12, 13 and 11 (March 14).

BUFFALO JINX—Ignoring a 17-0 deficit, Buffalo stormed back in the second half to defeat the Jets 20-17 in the season opener. Matt Snell and Cornell Gordon sidelined with knee injuries (Sept. 10).

A TIE—Joe Namath and Don Maynard tackled Larry Carwell at the four-yard line after time was over to preserve a 28-28 tie with Houston. Had the Jets won, they would have been well in front for the Eastern Division title.

BOOZER HURT—The other member of the Jet backfield, Emerson Boozer, was lost to the team with torn ligaments in his knee in a loss to Kansas City. Boozer was on his way to a pro TD record with 10 rushing and 3 receiving at the time (Nov. 5).

WINNING CAMPAIGN—Jets beat Boston 29-24 to clinch their first winning season in history (Nov. 19).

ELUSIVE TITLE—Jets lost to Oakland 38-29 on the West Coast and saw their chances for a title evaporate. Houston beat Miami the next Saturday to clinch the crown (Dec. 24).

RECORD PERFORMANCE—Joe Namath passes for 343 yards to finish season with 4,007 yards, the only pro to go over the 4,000-yard mark in a year (Dec. 24).

ATTENDANCE—Jets set AFL attendance record with 437,036 for seven games. All home games were sold out.

1968

NAMATH OPERATION—Joe Namath enters the hospital and his left knee is operated on for repair of small tear in the tendon (March 20).

WERBLIN LEAVES—Jet partners Don Lillis, Leon Hess, Townsend Martin and Phil Iselin bought out Sonny Werblin for a reported \$1.6 million and Lillis assumed the presidency (May 21).

TRAINING CAMP—Jets relocate their camp at Hofstra University in Hempstead, L.I.

ANOTHER LEADERSHIP CHANGE—On July 23 Don Lillis passed away, leaving the Jets without a president. Shortly afterwards, Philip Iselin was appointed president and Mrs. Helen Springborn, Lillis' daughter, joined the board of directors (Aug. 6).

SEASON OPENER—Namath controls the ball for the final 5:56 of the game as the Jets defeat Kansas City 20-19 in the opener (Sept. 15).

HOME OPENER—Jets come home after three road games and defeat San Diego 23-20 on Boozar's last minute touchdown. An AFL record crowd of 63,786 sat in (Oct. 5).

STORYBOOK TALE—"Heidi" became a part of the nation's sporting vocabulary when decisive last few minutes of key Jet-Oakland game were cut off the air to permit children's special to begin on time. Raiders scored twice in last 42 seconds to win, 43-32 (Nov. 17).

NINTH VICTORY—Jets set a club record with their ninth win, 35-17 over Miami. Previous high was eight in 1967 (Dec. 1).

ALL-PROS—Joe Namath, George Sauer and Gerry Philbin named to the combined AFL-NFL all-pro team. Thirteen Jets named to the AFL all-star squad.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME—Joe Namath engineers late rally to defeat Oakland 27-23 for the Jets' first AFL title before 62,627 at Shea Stadium. Two passes to Don Maynard late in the game gave the Jets the victory (Dec. 29).

1969

SUPER BOWL III—Jets become the first AFL team to win the Super Bowl, pounding out a 16-7 victory over the Baltimore Colts at Miami's Orange Bowl. Weeb Ewbank becomes first coach to win world title in both leagues. Namath chosen Super Bowl MVP (Jan. 12).

NAMATH HONORS—Joe Namath reaped a harvest of awards. AFL MVP, Hickok Belt winner, George Halas Award as the Most Courageous Pro Player, Pro Player of the Year.

COACHING SHUFFLE—Clive Rush, chief assistant to Weeb Ewbank, leaves the Jets to become head coach of the Boston Patriots (Jan. 30).

FRONT OFFICE RE-ALIGNMENT—George Sauer, head talent scout, leaves to become Boston's general manager (Feb. 11).

RE-ALIGNMENT—Baltimore, Cleveland and Pittsburgh join the AFL clubs to complete the merger of the two leagues. Jets placed in Eastern Division with Baltimore, Boston, Buffalo and Miami (May 17).

MONDAY TV—ABC signs a four-year contract for a series of Monday night TV games. First time regularly scheduled sports events would be seen in prime time (May 26).

NAMATH RETIRES—Joe Namath announces his retirement from pro football in dispute over his ownership of Manhattan night spot Bachelors III (June 6).

TRAINING CAMP—Jets reports to Hofstra without Joe Namath (July 8).

RETIREMENT ENDED—Joe Namath announces sale of Bachelors III and comes out of retirement (July 18).

ALL-STAR GAME—Jets defeat College All-Stars 26-24, becoming the first AFL team to play in the Chicago classic (Aug. 1).

CROSSTOWN RIVALS—Jets beat Giants 37-14 in first meeting between the two New York teams. Namath throws three TD passes and Mike Battle returns a punt 86 yards for a score (Aug. 17).

JINX BROKEN—Jets defeat Buffalo 33-19 to record their first victory at Buffalo since becoming Jets. Weeb Ewbank gets his 100th victory as a head coach (Sept. 14).

WINNING STREAK—Jets defeat Buffalo 16-6 to extend their winning streak to six, a club record (Nov. 9).

RECORD CROWD—The third record crowd of the year at Shea, 63,865, sets AFL mark as Oakland upends the Jets 27-14 (Nov. 30).

SECOND DIVISION CROWN—Jets defeat Houston 34-26 in Houston to win their second Eastern Division title (Dec. 6).

PLAYOFF GAME—Kansas City takes its first step toward the Super Bowl crown by beating New York 13-6 in the interdivisional AFL playoffs (Dec. 20).

ALL-PRO—Joe Namath voted the all-pro (NFL-AFL) quarterback by league coaches for the second year in a row. Joining him on all-pro squads were Winston Hill and Matt Snell (Dec. 22).

ALL-TIME AFL TEAM—Weeb Ewbank named the all-time coach of the AFL and Joe Namath, Don Maynard and Gerry Philbin chosen to the all-time AFL team selected by the Hall of Fame.

1970

PLAYERS STRIKE—NFL Players Association strikes pro football camps, leaving the Jets with only rookies as full training camp was supposed to open (July 19).

STRIKE SETTLED—Veterans report to camp after missing three weeks due to the strike (Aug. 3).

OPENER—Jets open up the 1970 season against new AFC rival, Cleveland, losing 31-21 in Monday night TV inaugural (Sept. 21).

SNELL LOST—The Buffalo jinx claimed not only the game with the familiar fourth-quarter comeback, but also Matt Snell, who was lost for the season with a ruptured Achilles tendon (Oct. 4).

BLACKOUT LIFTED—The Jets agreed to lift the TV blackout of the New York area for the Jets-Giants game (October).

NAMATH EXITS—In the first meeting between the Colts and Jets since 1969 Super Bowl, Joe Namath fractured his right wrist and was sidelined for the year (Oct. 18).

NEW YORK RIVALS—The Jets and Giants met in the first regular season game between the two intracity squads. The Giants came back in the second half for a 22-10 win before a Shea Stadium record crowd of 63,903 (Nov. 1).

UPSETS—Behind Al Woodall's quarterbacking and the top AFC defense, the Jets upset the powerful Rams and Vikings within a three-week span, toppling two of the NFC's leading contenders (Nov. 15, Nov. 29).

1971

NAMATH HURT—For the second time in as many seasons, Joe Namath was forced out of the lineup. This time he was hurt in first preseason game trying to make a tackle on a fumble runback and underwent surgery on his left knee immediately (Aug. 7).

OPENER—Al Woodall opens the season in place of injured Joe Namath, but the Jets suffer their first shutout since 1963 at the hands of Baltimore 20-0 (Sept. 19).

NAMATH RETURNS—Joe Namath, on the sidelines for 19 straight games, made his return in the second quarter against San Francisco and tossed for 358 yards and three TD passes as the Jets barely fell to the 49ers, 24-21 (Nov. 28).

ATTENDANCE RECORD—Jets close out with a 35-21 win over Cincinnati and set a one-season home attendance mark of 441,099 (Dec. 19).

1972

NAMATH SIGNS—Joe Namath signed a two-year contract for a reported \$250,000, becoming the highest paid player in the game (Aug. 1).

NAMATH SPARKLES—Joe Namath had his finest day as a pro, throwing for 496 yards and six touchdowns as the Jets defeated Baltimore 44-34. Namath and John Unitas set an NFL combined record for passing yardage—872 (Sept. 24).

RUSHING MARK—Jets set club rushing record of 333 yards as team defeated Patriots 41-13. John Riggins (168 yards) and Emerson Boozer (150) became first tandem in history to hit the 150-yard mark in a game (Oct. 15).

MAYNARD MARK—Don Maynard became pro football's all-time receiving leader with his 632nd career catch. The historic grab came in the fourth quarter at Oakland. Namath passed for 403 yards, but Jets were eliminated from race (Dec. 11).

1973

WINNER HIRED—Charley Winner, former head coach of St. Louis, is named to succeed Weeb Ewbank as head coach of the Jets, starting with the 1974 season. Winner serves as an assistant coach under Ewbank for 1973 (Feb. 1).

JETS EVICTED FROM HOME—Due to World Series games, the Jets were forced to play their first six games on the road, including moving the Pittsburgh game to Three Rivers Stadium. This left the Jets with only six games for the home fans (Oct. 21).

CONTROVERSIAL LOSS—Joe Namath returned to action after seven weeks and nearly directed a win over Cincinnati, but two controversial calls by the officials denied the Jets and the game ended on the Bengals' one-yard line (Nov. 18).

EWBANK-O.J.—Weeb Ewbank's last game after 11 years as Jets' head coach, but Buffalo's O.J. Simpson provided the fireworks as the Jets finished out at 4-10. Simpson broke the NFL season rushing mark with a 200-yard afternoon and wound up with 2003 for the year (Dec. 16).

1974

PLAYER STRIKE—Jets open training camp with 31 rookies and one veteran as the NFLPA strike begins (July 9).

FREE AGENT SIGNINGS—Jets hold open tryout day and sign 19 free agents to add depth to the training camp squad (July 10).

PRESEASON OPENS—Playing with a team composed mainly of rookies, the Jets defeated Denver 41-19 in the opening preseason game. John Jones was at QB (Aug. 3).

TRAINING CENTER—Jets took occupancy of their new training center in Hempstead, N.Y. The center contains coaches' offices, players' quarters and full practice facilities (Sept. 3).

NEW HAVEN VICTORY—After going 1-7 over the first part of the year, the Jets snapped their slump with a tingling 26-20 overtime victory over the Giants at Yale Bowl. Joe Namath threw six yards to Emerson Boozer for the winning points (Nov. 10).

EWBANK RESIGNS AS VP—Weeb Ewbank announces that he will retire as vice president of the Jets at the end of the season (Nov. 12).

VICTORY BINGE—Jets close out the season with six consecutive victories to provide a 7-7 season. Included in the streak were upsets over playoff-bound Miami and Buffalo and contender New England.

1975

DRAFT—Jets traded their number one pick for DE Billy Newsome of New Orleans (Jan. 28).

GENERAL MANAGER NAMED—Al Ward, vice president of the Dallas Cowboys, was named Jets' general manager to succeed Weeb Ewbank who had retired (Feb. 13).

NAMATH SIGNS—Joe Namath turned down a reported multi-million dollar WFL contract to sign a two-year contract with Jets (July 30).

GAME STRUCK—The final preseason game between the Jets and New England Patriots was canceled when the Patriots' players went on strike (Sept. 14).

JETS STRIKE—The New York Jets' players voted to support the New England players' strike and walked out of camp the week of the opener against Buffalo (Sept. 16).

PLAYERS RETURN—Jets' players returned to camp as strike was settled (Sept. 18).

EMPEROR HIROHITO—His Majesty, Emperor Hirohito of Japan, attends home opener and watches Jets defeat Patriots 36-7 (Oct. 5).

WINNER FIRED—Charley Winner was dismissed as head coach after the Jets lost six games in a row and were in the AFC East cellar with a 2-7 record. Ken Shipp, the offensive coordinator, was named interim head coach (Nov. 19).

RIGGINS 1,000 YARDS—John Riggins became the first Jet in history to gain 1,000 yards as he reached 1,005 vs. Dallas in season finale (Dec. 21).

1976

HOLTZ NAMED COACH—Lou Holtz, who had a successful four years at North Carolina State, was named head coach. He signed a five-year contract (Feb. 10).

DRAFT—Jets tab another Alabama quarterback as their number one pick, selecting Richard Todd (April 8).

ISELIN CARDIAC ARREST—Jets' president Phil Iselin suffered a cardiac arrest while attending the Jets-Broncos game at Denver (Sept. 19).

HOLTZ RESIGNS—Lou Holtz, deciding that he wasn't right for the pros, resigns with one game to go and soon returns to college coaching job. Mike Holovak was named interim coach for final game (Dec. 9).

NAMATH LAST GAME—Joe Namath started what was to be his final game as a Jet against Cincinnati (Dec. 12).

ISELIN DIES—Phil Iselin, who led the Jets for eight years, suffered a fatal heart attack while at his office (Dec. 28).

1977

MICHAELS HEAD COACH—Veteran defensive coach Walt Michaels was named head coach, signing a three-year contract. Leon Hess was named acting president. (Jan. 5)

PLAYER AGREEMENT—The NFL and the NFL Players Association agreed on a contract for the first time in three years. The contract extends five years and contains a modified draft. (March 1).

NAMATH WAIVED—Joe Namath, symbol of the Jets for 12 years, was granted his freedom as he was placed on waivers when a special trade attempt with Los Angeles was unsuccessful (April 1, became final April 12).

DRAFT—Marvin Powell, offensive tackle from Southern California, was Jets' first pick (May 3).

NAMATH SIGNS WITH RAMS—Joe Namath signs with the Los Angeles Rams as a free agent (May 12).

JETS WIN EARLY ACCESS TO SHEA—After a two-month court struggle, the Jets were guaranteed two September games in Shea Stadium, one on either the first or second date of the NFL season, plus two games in October. The agreement was for each of the remaining six years of the Jets' lease with the city, beginning in 1978. State Supreme Court Justice Harold Baer also allowed the Jets to play two preseason games plus their 1977 home opener at Giants Stadium in the Meadowlands (May 26).

KENSIL NAMED PRESIDENT—Jim Kensil, executive director of the NFL since 1968, was named president and chief operating officer of the Jets. Leon Hess, who had served as acting president, became chairman of the board and chief executive officer for corporate matters (June 6).

TODD HAS BEST PASSING DAY IN NFL—Second-year quarterback Richard Todd came through with the best passing performance in the NFL in 1977, throwing for 396 yards and four TDs in a 28-27 loss to the defending Super Bowl champion Oakland Raiders at Shea (Oct. 23).

WARD RESIGNS—Al Ward, Jets' general manager since 1975, resigned (Dec. 30). He became assistant to the president of the AFC (April, 1978).

1978

EWBANK NAMED TO HALL OF FAME—Weeb Ewbank, who guided the Jets from 1963-73 and was the only coach to win world championships in both the NFL and AFL, was selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Joining Ewbank were Larry Wilson, Ray Nitschke, Tuffy Leemans and Lance Alworth, the first player from the AFL to be enshrined (Jan. 23).

NAMATH RETIRES—Joe Namath announced his retirement from pro football (Jan. 25).

JETS CHANGE LOGO AND UNIFORM—For the first time since 1963, the Jets changed their uniform design. The team also adopted a new logo and changed the helmet to green (Feb. 27).

DRAFT—For the second straight year, the Jets picked an offensive tackle in the first round—Chris Ward of Ohio State (May 2).

MICHAELS' CONTRACT EXTENDED—Coach Walt Michaels' pact was extended during the week before the Jets' opener (Sept. 1).

JETS WIN FIRST DEBUT SINCE 1972—Opening the season at home for the first time since 1964, the Jets upset Miami, 33-20, behind Richard Todd's three TD passes. It was the first Jets' opening-day win in seven years (Sept. 3).

JETS OVERCOME BRONCOS IN DENVER—In one of the most dramatic comebacks in the history of the franchise, the Jets fought back from a 28-7 deficit in the first half to defeat the defending AFC champion Broncos, 31-28, before 74,983 fans at Mile High Stadium. Matt Robinson's 75-yard TD pass to Wesley Walker provided the winning margin in the last quarter (Nov. 5).

WALKER SELECTED TO PRO BOWL—Wide receiver Wesley Walker became the first Jet since 1975 to be chosen for the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl (Dec. 14).

JETS FINISH WITH MOST WINS SINCE 1969—The Jets closed with an 8-8 record, the most wins by the club in 10 years and the best record since 1974 (Dec. 17).

MICHAELS PICKED COACH OF THE YEAR—Walt Michaels, who kept the youngest team in the NFL in playoff contention for 15 games, was named AFC Coach of the Year by UPI and the Pro Football Writers of America. He was chosen NFL Coach of the Year by several publications.

1979

JETS SIGN WITH WCBS—The Jets and WCBS Newsradio 88 agreed to a five-year contract. WCBS replaced WOR, which had broadcast Jets' games for the previous eight seasons (Jan. 2).

DRAFT—Marty Lyons, All-America defensive lineman from Alabama, was Jets' first round pick (May 3).

AFL CHAMPIONSHIP

DEC. 29, 1968 — SHEA STADIUM

NEW YORK 27, OAKLAND 23

The New York Jets climaxed their finest season in history (11-3) by scoring a 27-23 victory over Oakland in the ninth annual American Football League championship game. A title game record crowd of 62,627 sat in on the chilly and windy proceedings at Shea Stadium and saw Joe Namath toss three touchdown passes (two to Don Maynard, one to Pete Lammons). In addition, Jim Turner, the league's leading scorer, booted two field goals.

Despite the fact that Namath attempted a record 49 passes, the Jets still mixed their attack. Matt Snell and Emerson Boozer gained 71 and 51 yards, respectively, behind fine blocking from the front line.

Oakland, bidding for its second straight crown, was led by the passing arm of Daryle Lamonica, who threw for 401 yards. Its running attack was blunted by the Jets' league-leading defense which held Hewitt Dixon & Co. to 44 yards. The Raiders carried the game down to the final minutes before Lamonica's lateral pass for Charlie Smith rolled free and was recovered by the Jets' Ralph Baker.

The victory gave head coach Weeb Ewbank the honor of being the only coach to win titles in both the NFL and AFL.

SUPER BOWL III

JAN. 12, 1969 — MIAMI ORANGE BOWL

NEW YORK 16, BALTIMORE 7

Defying the oddsmakers (17½ point underdogs) and the strength of traditions, the Jets became the first AFL team to win the Super Bowl by rumbling over and through the Baltimore Colts to record a 16-7 triumph. A crowd of 75,377 witnessed the spectacle in Miami's Orange Bowl.

As it was in the AFL championship contest, Joe Namath led the way. The all-pro quarterback directed the Jets' attack flawlessly, driving the team to a second quarter touchdown by Matt Snell (four yards) and three second-half field goals by Jim Turner. Snell had an outstanding game, gaining 121 yards on 30 carries. The blocking and pass protection by the Jets' line was superb.

The defense shared at least as much glory as the offensive unit, intercepting the Colts four times. Randy Beverly picked off two; Jim Hudson and Johnny Sample, one each. The defensive unit harrassed Colts' quarterbacks Earl Morrall and Johnny Unitas all afternoon, allowing them to complete only 17 of 41 passes. The one touchdown represented the lowest output by the powerful Colts in 35 games. The victory was the third in World Championship competition in as many tries for Weeb Ewbank and made him the only man ever to coach world champions in both the AFL and NFL.

AFL PLAYOFF

DEC. 20, 1969 — SHEA STADIUM

KANSAS CITY 13, NEW YORK 6

For the second year in a row, the Jets entered the American Football League playoffs as champions of the Eastern Division. Under the playoff scheme devised for 1969, the Big Green had to meet the second-place team in the Western Division in order to advance to the championship game. Thus the Jets entertained Kansas City at Shea Stadium in the first step toward another Super Bowl.

The game was a classic battle of defenses, played in remarkably cold and windy conditions before a sellout 62,977 fans. Through the first three quarters, neither team could penetrate for a touchdown and the score stood at 6-3 for the Chiefs. Jim Turner had put New York out in front, 3-0, with a 28-yard field goal the first time the Jets had the ball, but the Chiefs' Jan Stenerud retaliated with a 23-yarder on the next series.

Not until the fourth quarter did the breaks occur. With first and goal on the one-yard line, three cracks, including a Joe Namath bootleg, failed to bring a touchdown. Turner then kicked a 7-yard field goal to tie it, 6-6.

Two plays later Kansas City was in the end zone. Len Dawson hit Otis Taylor for a 61-yard pass play to take the Chiefs to the Jet 19. Then Dawson fired the final 19 yards to Gloster Richardson for the only touchdown of the game.

Namath threw 20 passes over the next two Jets' series, but a fourth down incomplection and a Jim Marsalis interception thwarted the Jets and put Kansas City on the road to the world championship.

WEEB EWBANK — A HALL OF FAMER

Weeb Ewbank, who guided the Jets for more than a decade, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 1977.

The former Jets' and Colts' (1954-62) head coach achieved a distinction that will never be matched — the only coach to win world championships in both leagues.

The Colts were dismal losers when Weeb took over in 1954. He built them up to the NFL champions in 1958 when they beat the Giants in a memorable sudden death overtime and they won the title again in 1959. Weeb joined the Jets in 1963 and developed them to the team that shocked the Colts in Super Bowl III.

Weeb joined impressive company. Paul Brown, George Halas and Vince Lombardi are the only coaches in the Hall of Fame who were contemporaries of Weeb during his head coaching career.
