LEON HESS, Chairman of the Board

"A breath of fresh air."

That's what the prescription read to cure the woes of the New York Jets. With that in mind, Chairman of the Board Leon Hess took the first step to bring about the resurgence of the Jets when he decided to get the best "football" man to run the club and named Dick Steinberg, former director of player development for the New England Patriots, to the post of Vice President and General Manager. And a month and a half later, Steinberg named Cincinnati offensive coordinator Bruce Coslet as head coach.

"Dick Steinberg was named Vice President and General Manager of the Jets following extensive interviews with myself and President Steve Gutman which have led to our finding the best 'football' man to take full charge of our team's operations," said Hess. "Steinberg's authority and command of the football operations will be with full power to bring about those changes which are necessary to rebuild the team."

Hess declared his desire to return the club to the forefront of the NFL when he announced in 1988 that he would be taking a more active role in the running of the club.

"We are very optimistic about where we are going from here," said Hess at that time. "We will end up with a winning team. The fans want a championship, the fans deserve it. The organization wants it, the organization deserves it. Leon Hess, at my age, would sure love to see a winning team while I can still enjoy it."

Hess has also fought long and hard to achieve first-class conditions for both the players and fans throughout the years.

After citing Shea Stadium as "the NFL's poorest facility for athletes and spectators alike," Hess announced plans to move to the Meadowlands prior to the 1984 season. As a result, during the last six seasons, thousands of additional Jets' fans have had the opportunity to watch NFL football in comfort and safety, in modern, clean surroundings, with proper facilities, adequate parking and good football sight-lines.

In addition, Hess has continued to provide the Jets' players and staff with outstanding facilities by building an ultra-modern lockerroom at the Meadowlands and by improving the Weeb Ewbank training complex at Hofstra University with a new AstroTurf field, a new lockerroom and weightroom and additional offices.

In 1983, Hess was an honored recipient of the Distinguished American Award at the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Dinner. Past winners of that award have included Vince Lombardi, Bob Hope, Jimmy Stewart, Bill Carpenter and Fr. Theodore Hesburgh.

Hess, the sole owner, has been totally involved in the development of the club since acquiring part of the franchise in 1963. He is chairman of the board of the Amerada Hess Corporation.



STEVE GUTMAN

President

Managing an NFL franchise is a challenging task. In his two seasons as club president, Steve Gutman is meeting that challenge and is playing a key role in the rebuilding of the team and the front office.

In his position as president, Gutman has exhibited strong leadership. When the decision was made to get the best "football" man to run the club, he led the search which resulted in the appointment of Dick Steinberg as General Manager.

"Given the opportunity to get a Dick Steinberg, someone of that caliber and reputation, we had to do it," said Gutman. "We're rebuilding the franchise for our fans. It is a step we're taking to appropriately restore the franchise to its level of success."

Gutman, who works closely with owner and Chairman of the Board Leon Hess, was named president on June 14, 1988. He has been with the Jets since 1977. His first 11 seasons were spent serving as the corporate treasurer-secretary and administrative manager. In that role he supervised the daily operation of the club and served on the Board of Directors. He also directed all of the Jets fiscal operations including players contract negotiations, tickets and marketing. Gutman has added the responsibilities of the presidency while still directing all of the fiscal and daily operations of the club.

Gutman has been a respected figure around NFL circles. He served as an economic consultant to the NFL Management Council during the 1982 collective bargaining sessions with the NFLPA and is a consultant again in 1990. He has been a member of the NFL coaches and front office pension plan committee.

Prior to joining the Jets in 1977, Gutman was executive director of the Westchester County Guidance Center in New Rochelle. He has had extensive experience as a financial consultant in areas of securities, research, sales, underwriting, investment banking and management.

Gutman received his BS in accounting and MBA in corporate finance from New York University. He was born Jan. 24, 1935 in the Bronx, New York. He and his wife, Carol, have three children, sons Fred, Rob and daughter Elise. Gutman and his wife reside in Manhattan.



DICK STEINBERG

Vice President-General Manager

The New York Jets named Dick Steinberg as Vice President and General Manager of the club on December 18, 1989 giving the former New England Patriots director of player development full control of the Jets' football operations.

"Dick Steinberg was named Vice President and General Manager of the Jets following extensive interviews with myself and President Steve Gutman which have led to our finding the best 'football' man to take full charge of our team's operations," said New York Jets owner Leon Hess. "Steinberg's authority and command of the football operations will be with full power to bring about those changes which are necessary to rebuild the team."

"Dick has been given full authority to run the football operation," said Jets President Steve Gutman. "Given the opportunity to get a Dick Steinberg, someone of that caliber and reputation, we had to do it. We're rebuilding the franchise for our fans. It is a step we're taking to appropriately restore the franchise to its level of success."

"I'm looking forward to working with the Jets and Leon Hess and Steve Gutman," said Steinberg upon accepting the role of General Manager. "It's our goal to make the New York Jets a winning team and to bring a championship to the fans of the Jets. I'm convinced Mr. Hess wants to do everything possible to put a winning team on the field. The control that we felt was necessary to have a chance to put the best possible team on the field, and evaluate personnel and acquire personnel, has been given. And that's all anybody could ask for."

Steinberg comes to New York not only highly regarded by the Jets, but also well respected by others in the NFL.

"I just think he's one of the better people we have in this business," said Giants' General Manager George Young. "Does he have the background, knowledge, instincts, guts, work ethic? Has he been with winning teams and does he have ideas that give him a chance to win? It's 'yes' to all those things. Nobody is a sure thing, but I'll take my chance with guys like him. Dick knows what it takes to win."

"Dick is a hard worker with a terrific eye for talent," said the Chargers' new General Manager Bobby Beathard. "I think he has a good feel about the whole picture—coaching and the strengths and weaknesses of a team. He's not a guy who thinks he's some hot number. He's kind of laid-back and easy to get along with."

Steinberg's laid-back style is even exhibited in his style of dress. He has long been known as a man who hates the thought of wearing a necktie. In fact, for the press conference to introduce him as the Jets General Manager, he had to have someone else tie his knot.

"It's a great thing for this organization and the guys in the

lockerroom," said quarterback Tony Eason, who was drafted by Steinberg in 1983 at New England. "New England was spoiled up there. I was spoiled. He always got the best talent. He's got a knack for getting people who can play ball. It's amazing the athletes New England has. Sometimes people wonder why he takes people at a certain position. But if you've got a Porsche up on the board, you take it. Over time, you have more quality on your team."

"Nobody works harder than Dick," said New England Vice President Bucko Kilroy, who originally hired Steinberg in 1972 as a scout. "He's always out. He's always checking. He's real good at analyzing things and he also understands the kind of things about people you can't put on paper. But I think where Dick has the edge on any of them is his football knowledge."

Steinberg, who has selected the talent for two Super Bowl teams—the Patriots of Super Bowl XX in 1986 and the Rams of Super Bowl XIV in 1980, is considered one of the most knowledgeable minds in the NFL and a top talent hunter. He comes to the Jets after nine years with the New England Patriots as director of player development. In his capacity for the Patriots he was responsible for the draft, the overall scouting of players as well as the team's trade negotiations. He also assisted in the signing of players. At New England Steinberg acquired Pro Bowlers Andre Tippett, Brian Holloway, Tony Collins, Irving Fryar and Fred Marion and traded for Sean Farrell to solidify its offensive line.

Steinberg originally left the Patriots as a scout (1971-76) to become director of college scouting for the Rams in June, 1976. He remained in that post until being promoted to the position of Director of Player Personnel, a job he held until June, 1980. In his first draft with the Rams in 1977 his first four picks were Bob Brudzinski, Nolan Cromwell, Wendell Tyler and Vince Ferragamo, all key figures in their Super Bowl season. After his four-year stay with the Rams, Steinberg joined then-General Manager Steve Rosenbloom as Vice President of Player Personnel with New Orleans. Steinberg later resigned that post on January 20, 1981 before rejoining the Patriots.

Upon taking the Jets job, Steinberg said: "It'll be a brief, brief honeymoon period. The microscopes will be out. We're going to do things that won't work out. We expect to be criticized. You can't be intimidated by it. You can't go the safe route because you know the wolves are out there. That's part of the thing that makes the whole deal interesting. It is New York.

"You've got to have a plan and stick to it. We all know there are going to be mistakes, and you've got to be lucky with things like injuries. It's a percentage game. Nobody is going to pick the best player every time.

"The most important thing in a player is competitiveness. But you have to combine that with speed and athletic ability. We probably put less priority on the skill position than those two factors. That's something you can develop.

Regarding his philosophy on the draft Steinberg said, "If you get away from taking the best player on the board, you're making a mistake. If you've got five good receivers, and you take another one, don't worry. That's been proven so many times. It comes back to haunt you. We don't mind stockpiling talent at all because the injury factor is so prevalent.

"It's important to test players and it's important to watch film, but it's also important to watch a guy live," said Steinberg on his style of scouting. "Many times a guy looks different in person than he does on film. You get a feeling for his intensity more because you recognize what the situation is in a game. You can sense if a guy turns it up a notch or two when it's 3rd and long. But all the aspects of evaluating fit into the big picture. The more information the better the profile you have."

Steinberg prepared himself for the pressures of the NFL when he thought he wanted to become an NBA official in the early 1960s. At the time he was officiating college games in the ACC and SEC and he went to work summer league games in Puerto Rico in 1963 to gain further experience. During one game Steinberg made a controversial call

against the home team which went on to lose. Following the game the angry crowd attacked his van, turning it over and Dick and his partner were standing on the van's side wondering how they would escape. A police car showed up to escort them away. His officiating days ended soon after.

A native of Philadelphia, born August 9, 1935, Steinberg played football and majored in physical education and health at Temple University. In addition to serving a two-year tour of duty with the U.S. Army in France, Steinberg was a high school coach at Philadelphia's Roman Catholic High (1960-61) and at Staunton (VA) Military Academy (1961-64). He then entered the collegiate coaching ranks as an assistant at Vanderbilt (1964-66) and Kansas State (1967-69).

Following a brief stint as a scout with the Dallas Cowboys in 1969, Steinberg spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Southern Mississippi (1970-71) before joining the Patriots as a personnel scout under then-Director of Player Personnel Bucko Kilroy. Steinberg served with the Patriots from 1972-1976 before departing for the Rams.



BRUCE COSLET, Head Coach

The New York Jets named Bruce Coslet as the 8th full time head coach in club history on February 6, 1990. Following extensive interviews, Jets Vice President and General Manager Dick Steinberg decided on the former Cincinnati offensive coordinator as the top candidate to lead the football team in the '90s.

"We looked for a strong motivator, a teacher and a disciplinarian, a guy who can get the most out of his players every time out, and we feel that Bruce is that guy," said Steinberg. "We were looking for someone who can create a winning environment. In addition we are getting a man with one of the most innovative minds in the business. At Cincinnati he was not only instrumental in developing an exciting offense, but also one of the most productive running attacks in the NFL, an important ingredient in the northeast. I also talked to guys who played for him. Guys liked to play for him and they played hard."

"I'm not a tough guy, that's a misnomer, but I'm as tough as I need to be," said Coslet. "I'm not a gruff, tough, yell-at-the-players type coach, but I can deal with problems. If I can stand up and coach the Anthony Munozes and Boomer Esiasons of this league, I can get my point across to anybody. I'm a creation of all the people I've played with and worked for (included in that group are Bill Walsh, Paul Brown, Sam Wyche, Forrest Gregg, Lindy Infante and Buddy Ryan).

"We won't be dull," adds Coslet. "We won't be I-formation, three yards and a cloud of dust. But don't get me confused with being just a passing coach. Believe me, I believe in the running game. One of the criterion of being a good coach is that you fit the program to the players,

not the other way around. That's important. We're not going to ask a player to attempt to do something that they physically can't do. That's stupid. We'll open it up and we'll be exciting on defense and special teams, too. We'll make things happen and our guys will be flying all over the field hitting people.

"We're going to put on the field an attacking style of defense," said Coslet, who immediately hired former Minnesota secondary coach Pete Carroll as his defensive coordinator. "The days of the bend-but-don't-break defense I believe are over. The Minnesota Vikings attack, attack, attack. They come across the line of scrimmage. They take the fight to the offense, and really, that's what it's all about. The days of laying back, playing a lot of zone and funneling them in, that's history. Teams are too good.

"My pet peeve is assignment error. I tell my guys that. Lack of effort, I won't stand for it. There are specifics, like the wide receiver must block. The quarterback shall not throw the ball down the middle when there's a free safety. Certain things I won't put up with. I can't stand drugs."

The 43-year old Coslet, who is now the 2nd youngest head coach in the NFL (3½ months older than the Raiders' Art Shell), had been with the Cincinnati Bengals as a coach since 1981, the last four years as offensive coordinator. During his stretch as coordinator from 1986-89, the Bengals had one of the most explosive offensive schemes in the NFL. During that time the Bengals had the NFL's number one offense twice (1986 and 1989), the NFL's top ranked rushing attack twice (1988 and 1989) and led the AFC in total offense in three of the last four years (1986, 1988 and 1989).

This past season Cincinnati had the AFC's best offense (381.3 yards per game), the NFL's top rushing attack (155.2 avg.) and scored more TD than any other team in the NFL (52). With Boomer Esiason leading the way as the AFC's top ranked passer (#2 overall to Joe Montana in the NFL) the Bengals averaged 25.3 points per game. In Cincinnati's passing attack Esiason threw 28 TD and only 11 INT and was named as the Pro Bowl starter. Other Bengal offensive players named to the Pro Bowl were TE Rodney Holman, RB James Brooks, T Anthony Munoz and G Max Montoya.

In 1988, Coslet was a key factor in the Bengals' trip to the Super Bowl. On the way to the AFC Championship, Cincinnati had the number one offense in the NFL (378.6 avg. per game) and the top ranked rushing attack led by rookie RB Ickey Woods who rushed for 1066 yards in the regular season and 307 in the postseason. Cincinnati's passing attack was paced by Pro Bowl WR Eddie Brown's 53-1273-9 TD receiving.

Coslet originally joined the Cincinnati coaching staff in 1981 as the TE and special teams coach and served in that capacity through 1982. In 1983 he was given the added responsibility of the Bengals' passing game. Coslet tutored the WRs in 1984-85 under Sam Wyche before being named the coordinator. During those years Coslet was credited with the emergence of Pro Bowlers WR Cris Collinsworth and TE Dan Ross. When he joined Cincinnati in 1981, he became the first former Bengal to join the coaching staff.

Coslet originally signed as a free agent and played TE and special teams for Cincinnati from 1969-76 and was coached for seven of those eight seasons by Bill Walsh. He served as captain of the special teams there for six years playing behind Bob Trumpy. Coslet's career receiving totals were 64-877-9 TD in the NFL. In 1968 he played TE in the CFL for Edmonton under Neil Armstrong before being released after one season.

After retiring in 1976, Coslet went back to his native Stockton, CA, and opened a successful construction business from 1977-79 where he managed over 250 employees. During that time he also invested in a chain of delicatessens in that area. A visit to the 49er training camp in the summer of 1979 made him realize how much he missed football. When he received a call from Bill Walsh to assist the 49ers during training camp, Coslet jumped at the offer. Coslet stayed on as an assistant coach the entire season in 1980 working with the TEs and

special teams before joining the Bengals in 1981.

Coslet played TE at the University of Pacific from 1965-67 where the head coach at the time was Doug Scovil and the defensive coordinator was Buddy Ryan. He also earned his BA in history and psychology there.

Coslet was born August 5, 1946 in his hometown of Oakdale, CA, where he was a football standout at Joint High. He and his wife Kathy have 2 children, son J.J. 15 and daughter Amy 13.

WHAT THEY'RE SAYING ABOUT BRUCE COSLET...

Cincinnati head coach Sam Wyche—"Bruce is number one, a very good friend, a former teammate of mine and we have been together my entire tenure as a coach here. Whatever success we have had wouldn't have happened without him. New York will find a young coach in terms of years, but not in terms of experience. Bruce is a talented and imaginative coach who is willing to take a chance as long as it falls in the realm of sound football. I think the Jets' fans will not only see winning football at some point, but exciting football from the beginning. All of us at Cincinnati, players and coaches, will miss him, but it couldn't happen to a better guy."

NBC commentator and former 49er head coach Bill Walsh—"Having coached Bruce as a player and seen him grow as a coach, I know him as well as you can know someone. He is extremely bright and his intellect is not common in athletics. He is creative and has a solid knowledge of offensive football. He has proven to be at the cutting edge of the game. He is a strong, solid coach who will work well with Dick Steinberg. They are as good a combination as there is in the game today."

Cincinnati owner and former head coach Paul Brown—"The Jets made an excellent choice. Bruce was an important contributor to our team as a player and coach and we will miss him. I have great respect for him and wish him well."

Former Cincinnati LB Reggie Williams—"The players love Bruce Coslet. You don't elicit that type of emotion casually. It embodies a response to discipline, a respect of intellect and recognition that he always had the players' best interest at heart."

Cincinnati Pro Bowl QB Boomer Esiason—"It's a great sense of loss to our players and a great gain for the Jets. He will be very difficult to replace. It's like losing a star player. He has great rapport with the players and his football knowledge is unsurpassed by any coach. He's a steal for the Jets. He knows more about how to dissect a defense than anyone I've ever seen. He wasn't only my teacher, but my eyes."

Cincinnati Pro Bowl T Anthony Munoz—"People don't realize what a big part of our offense Bruce was. He was a good coach and I think he'll be a great head coach. We'll miss him."

Cincinnati WR Tim McGee—"We lost a very innovative mind and someone who is a proven winner. It's a dramatic loss to our offense. I think Bruce is just as much of an offensive genius as Sam Wyche. Sam is the center of attention, but Bruce is just as much a part of it as anyone else in the organization. For personal reasons, I hate to see him go. He was the Boomer of the coaching staff. Boomer is the leader on the field, and in the pressbox Bruce was the big gun."

Former Cincinnati Pro Bowl WR Cris Collinsworth—"All Bruce had to say was 'let's go to work'. He will be a tremendous head coach. I see Bruce melding three systems—Bill Walsh's, Sam Wyche's and Lindy Infante's. The thing about Bruce is the players really liked him and more important they respected him. A lot of coaches are liked, but not respected."

Jets C Jim Sweeney—"They had a great program in Cincinnati. I hated playing Cincinnati because their offense controlled the ball so much. I hope people start hating us now."

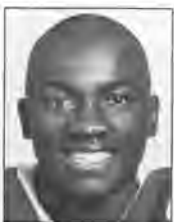

The PAT failed giving the Jets one more chance to tie, but the Jets' hopes died at their own 40. O'Brien had a big 2nd half going 14-22-226-2 TD. Tony Eason led the NE offense with 15-23-273-2 TD.

The Jets opened the game with 2 drives to the C26 and C15 but came away empty when Pat Leahy missed FG of 43 and 32 yards. The Jets scored on their next possession, but led only 7-0 instead of being up by 13 points. The Browns knotted it at 7-7 and made it 14-7 on a 36-yard INT return for a TD by Thane Gash, the 1st of 4 big INT by the Browns. NY tied it at 14 all on a 49-yard TD pass, but the Browns put together their only long drive of the day—80 yards, and upped their lead to 21-14. Townsell's PR of 69-yards led to a Jets FG, but Cleveland turned its next opportunity into another score when Felix Wright grabbed a deflected pass to set up Keith Jones' 9-yard TD run for a 28-17 lead. Then CB James Hasty made the key defensive play intercepting Marino at the J44 and returning the ball to the D41. Five plays later O'Brien hit Roger Vick on an 11-yard TD pass vs. the Miami blitz for the 40-33 lead. The Jets then had to hold on to see if Miami could be denied for 2 straight times. This time the Miami Hail Mary was not answered. O'Brien led the incredible 2nd half comeback going 19-22-260-3 TD. The Raider win went to new head coach Art Shell, the first black head coach in the NFL's modern era. The 2 teams played a scoreless 1st half, but both scored on their 1st possessions in the 3rd quarter. The Raiders went 92 yards in 2 plays, the TD coming on Fernandez's maneuver through the Jets' secondary and the Jets answered back with a 93-yard, 15-play march culminating in Roger Vick's 1-yard TD run. NY stymied itself with 9 of its 11 drives entering Raider territory but coming up empty all but 1 time. The crusher, though, came with the score tied and the Jets driving to the LA36 when Anderson came up with the INT at the LA13 and danced his way 87-yards for the winning TD. The Jets lost WR Al Toon for approximately 4 weeks in the 1st half when he sprained both ankles.

Oct. 22 — at BUFFALO 34 Jets 3 (73,811) — Sunny, cool. The Jets saw a snowball turn into an avalanche as Buffalo rolled to the win at Rich Stadium. The loss was the 4th straight for the Jets whose offense was missing once again. It marked the 2nd consecutive week in which the offense couldn't produce a TD. The Jets held the Bills to a 13-0 halftime lead, but the defense was almost helpless as the Bills scored 3 2nd half TD without having to go more than 30 yards. For the day, Buffalo scored 34 points but only had 2 drives of any length going 79 yards for a TD (after the Jets were called for 12 men on the field when the Bills were forced to punt and even after they were stopped and made to attempt a FG, awarded a 1st down when the Jets jumped offside) and a 14-play, 56-yard drive for a 27-yard FG. The Buffalo defense stymied the NY offense all day allowing only 154 yards of total offense and only 39 rushing. They sacked Ken O'Brien 5 times, but even more important pressured him throughout the game. The Bills controlled the ball for 42:53 and in the 1st half had it for 22:23. They held the Jets to only 3 yards rushing and 3 1st downs in the 1st half. Frank Reich took advantage of the Bills' outstanding field position (an avg. of the B46) and threw for 3 TD. Buffalo's scoring opportunities came via Jets' short punts of 11, 29 and 15 yards, an INT at the J30 and FR at the J18.

Prior to the game the Jets had their share of distractions when they announced the hiring of Dick Steinberg as the new General Manager (Dec. 18) and the arthroscopic surgery on Ken O'Brien's right shoulder (Dec. 22). The Jets kept the game close for the 1st half as the Bills were holding on to a slim 3-0 lead before scoring their 1st TD of the game on a Larry Kinnebrew 1-yard plunge with only 1:07 before the intermission. Buffalo broke open the game in the 3rd quarter with 3 TD, including 2 TD passes by Jim Kelly. Tony Eason started at QB for the Jets for the 2nd straight week and played 3 quarters before being relieved by Kyle Mackey in the

4th quarter. The Buffalo defense was sparked by the play of LB Cornelius Bennett who registered 2 sacks, 1 INT and 5 tackles. The game marked the first time in team history the Jets were shut out in back-to-back home games and also the first time they were ever shut out twice in a year at home (the Jets had been shut out 2 or more in three other seasons). The attendance was also the smallest non-replacement game at home for the Jets since Dec. 14, 1963. The game also marked the end of the Joe Walton era as the Jets head coach was dismissed 3 days later. He finished his 7- year term with a record of 53-57-1.

EWBANK, NAMATH & MAYNARD — HALL OF FAMERS

Weeb Ewbank, who guided the Jets for more than a decade, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 29, 1978. Joe Namath, his QB, joined him in the Hall on Aug. 3, 1985 and Don Maynard, his top WR, entered on Aug. 8, 1987.

The former Jets' (1963-73) and Colts' (1954-62) head coach achieved a distinction that will never be matched—the only coach to win world championships in both leagues. Weeb led the NFL champion Colts team in 1958-59. He joined the Jets in 1963 and developed the team that shocked the Colts in Super Bowl III.

Namath, the Jets' all-time passing leader with 1,886 of 3,762 for 27,663 and 173 TDs, was a Pro Bowl selection 5 times and first QB to pass for more than 4,000 yards (1967 in 14-game season). He was MVP in Super Bowl III victory.

Maynard (633-11, 834-88 TDs) has the 2nd most yardage and TD catches in NFL history and still holds the NFL mark for 100-yard games with 50. A 4-time All-Star pick, his most memorable game was his 6-118-2 TDs in the 1968 AFC Championship over Oakland to put the Jets in the Super Bowl.

TV PACT—Wismer completes five-year pact with ABC to televise AFL games. First year fee was \$1,785,000 (June 9).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME—Titans open play at Polo Grounds, beating Buffalo in the rain, 27-3. Attendance was 10,200 (5,727 paid) (Sept. 11).

FIRST SEASON—Titans break even at 7-7 (second place), drawing 221,285 for 14 games.

1961 SEASON—Titans finished at 7-7 again, good for third place.

DRAFT FOR 1962—Sandy Stephens, QB, Minnesota, drafted first by Titans (Dec. 2).

1962

NEW COACH—Clyde (Bulldog) Turner named by Harry Wismer to succeed Sammy Baugh.

COACHING CONFLICT—Harry Wismer agrees to pay off Baugh's contract and keep Turner as the coach.

NEW QB—Wismer signs Lee Grosscup just before opening game. He directed a 27-17 victory over Oakland (Sept. 9).

FINANCIAL TROUBLE—Wismer unable to meet his payroll and the AFL assumed the costs of running the club until the end of the season (Nov. 8).

ATTENDANCE—Team drew only 36,161 for seven home games, finished last at 5-9.

1963

NEW OWNERSHIP—A five-man syndicate composed of David A. (Sonny) Werblin, Townsend B. Martin, Leon Hess, Donald C. Lillis and Philip H. Iselin purchased the New York franchise for \$1-million (March 28).

EWBANK CHOSEN & TITANS TO JETS—Weeb Ewbank, who had been released by Baltimore, was named head coach of the team. On the same day the new owners changed the name from Titans to Jets (April 15).

ASSISTANT COACHES—Ewbank designated Clive Rush, Walt Michaels, J.D. Donaldson and Chuck Knox as his assistant coaches. George Sauer, Sr., retained as head talent scout.

TRAINING CAMP—Jets move to Peekskill, N.Y., for their first training camp.

OPENING GAME—Boston upended Jets 38-14 in the opener at Boston College (Sept. 8).

FIRST VICTORY—Jets won first game under new ownership as they defeated Houston 24-17 at the Polo Grounds in the home opener. Marshall Starks set AFL record with 97-yard TD return of a missed field goal (Sept. 22).

CANCELLED GAMES—AFL calls off game on day of national mourning for President John F. Kennedy (Nov. 24).

SNELL DRAFTED—The Jets made Matt Snell, RB, Ohio State, their number one draft choice. Snell also drafted by the Giants, Snell became the first number one to sign with the N.Y. team. Also signing were Dave Herman and Mike Taliaferro, both drafted by Jets and Giants, and high draft choices Gerry Philbin and Ralph Baker.

SHUTOUT—Jets record first shutout in their history, a 17-0 blanking of Kansas City at the Polo Grounds (Dec. 1).

THE SEASON—The Jets finished last (5-8-1) but were successful at the box office, drawing 103,550 for seven games.

1964

TRADE—Jets and Denver complete historic nine-player deal. Jets sent Dick Guesman, Ed Cooke, Charlie Janerette, Jim Price and Sid Fournet to Denver for Gene Prebola, Wahoo McDaniel, Gordy Holtz and Bob Zeman (January).

TV PACT—AFL and NBC announced a 5-year TV contract calling for \$36,000,000 starting with the 1965 season (Jan. 29).

NEW HOME—Jets moved into Shea Stadium, beating Denver 30-6, before an record crowd of 45,665. Jets' Gene Heeler scored the first Shea TD (Sept. 12).

SNELL RECORD—Matt Snell rushes for 180 yards, a club record, as Jets topple Houston 24-21 at Shea (Oct. 17).

FIRST SELLOUT—60,300 sat in at Shea to see Buf. stop the Jets 20-7 (Nov. 8).
TRADE RIGHTS—Jets trade rights to Jerry Rhome to Houston in return for a number one draft choice.

NAMATH DRAFTED—Using their pick gained from Houston, the Jets drafted Alabama QB Joe Namath.

SNELL HONORED—Matt Snell was named the AFL's Rookie of the Year. Snell gained 948 yards and caught 56 passes (Dec. 17).

1965

NAMATH SIGNS—The day after the Orange Bowl, Joe Namath signed a Jets' contract for a reported \$427,000 (Jan. 2).

HURATE SIGNS—Heisman Trophy winner John Huarte of Notre Dame signed a Jets' contract estimated to be worth \$200,000, giving the Jets over one-half million dollars worth of QB talent within a week (Jan. 9).

NAMATH OPERATION—Twenty-three days after signing, Joe Namath entered Lenox Hill Hospital to undergo an operation for cartilage and ligament damage in his right knee (Jan. 25).

ROOKIE GAME—Joe Namath plays in his first professional game as the Jets' rookies beat the Patriot rookies at Lowell, Mass. (July 28).

FIRST APPEARANCE—After sitting on the bench for the opener, Namath entered the second quarter vs. Kansas City (Sept. 18).

FIRST START—Joe Namath starts his first game (third of the year for Jets) and throws 19-40-287 yards and 2 TD, but Jets lose 33-21 to Bills (Sept. 26).

NAMATH HONORED—Joe Namath was named the AFL's Rookie of the Year. Namath completed 164-340-2,220 yards with 18 TD and 15 INT.

1966

ALL-STAR GAME—With Joe Namath at the helm, the AFL All-Stars beat Buffalo 30-19. Namath named MVP (Jan. 15).

EXPANSION DRAFT—Jets lose Wahoo McDaniel, Willie West, Mike Hudock and LaVerne Torczon to Miami Dolphins in the expansion draft (Jan. 16).

AFL-NFL MERGER—Representatives of the AFL and NFL agreed to merge and play a world championship game following the 1966 season. Pete Rozelle named commissioner (June 8).

1967

BUFFALO JINX—Ignoring a 17-0 deficit, Buffalo stormed back in the second half to defeat the Jets 20-17 in the season opener. Matt Snell and Cornell Gordon sidelined with knee injuries (Sept. 10).

BOOZER HURT—Emerson Boozer was lost to the team with torn ligaments in his knee at Kansas City. Boozer was on his way to a pro TD record with 10 rushing and 3 receiving at the time (Nov. 5).

WINNING CAMPAIGN—Jets beat Boston 29-24 to clinch their first winning season in history (Nov. 19).

ELUSIVE TITLE—Jets lost to Oakland 38-29 on the West Coast and saw their chances for a title evaporate. Houston beat Miami the next Saturday to clinch the crown (Dec. 24).

RECORD PERFORMANCE—Joe Namath passes for 343 yards to finish season with 4,007 yards, the only pro to go over the 4,000-yard mark in a 14-game season (Dec. 24).

ATTENDANCE—Jets set AFL attendance record with 437,036 for seven games. All home games were sold out.

1968

EXPANSION DRAFT—Solomon Brannan, Jim Wasklewicz, Pete Perreault and John Matlock go to Cincinnati.

WERBLIN LEAVES—Jet partners Don Lillis, Leon Hess, Townsend Martin and Phil Iselin bought out Sonny Werblin and Lillis assumed the presidency (May 21).

TRAINING CAMP—Jets relocated their camp to Hofstra University in Hempstead, L.I.

ANOTHER LEADERSHIP CHANGE—On July 23 Don Lillis passed away, leaving the Jets without a president. Shortly afterwards, Philip Iselin was appointed president and Mrs. Helen Springborn, Lillis' daughter, joined the board of directors (Aug. 6).

SEASON OPENER—Jets control the ball for the final 5:56 of the game as they defeat Kansas City 20-19 in the opener (Sept. 15).

HOME OPENER—Jets come home after three road games and defeat San Diego 23-20 on Boozer's last minute touchdown. An AFL record crowd of 63,786 sat in (Oct. 5).

STORYBOOK TALE—"Heidi" became a part of the nation's sporting vocabulary when last 1:05 of key Jet-Oakland game was cut off the air to permit children's special to begin on time. Raiders scored twice in last 42 seconds to win, 43-32. Jets took 32-29 lead at 1:05 (Nov. 17).

ALL-PROS—Joe Namath, George Sauer and Gerry Philbin named to the AFL-NFL all-pro team. Thirteen Jets named to the AFL All-Star squad.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME—Jets defeat Oakland 27-23 for their first AFL title before 62,627 at Shea. Joe Namath passes for three TD (two to Don Maynard, one to Pete Lammons) (Dec. 29).

1969

SUPER BOWL III—Jets become the first AFL team to win the Super Bowl, pounding out a 16-7 victory over the Baltimore Colts at Miami's Orange Bowl. Weeb Ewbank becomes first coach to win world title in both leagues. Namath chosen Super Bowl MVP (Jan. 12).

NAMATH HONORS—Joe Namath reaped a harvest of awards. AFL MVP, Hickok Belt winner, George Halas Award as the Most Courageous Pro Player, Pro Player of the Year.

COACHING SHUFFLE—Clive Rush, chief offensive assistant to Ewbank, leaves the Jets to become head coach of the Boston Patriots (Jan. 30).

FRONT OFFICE RE-ALIGNMENT—George Sauer, head talent scout, leaves to become Boston's general manager (Feb. 11).

RE-ALIGNMENT—Baltimore, Cleveland and Pittsburgh join the AFL clubs to complete the merger of the two leagues. Jets placed in East with Baltimore, Boston, Buffalo, Miami (May 17).

NAMATH RETIRES—Joe Namath announces his retirement from pro football in dispute over his ownership of Manhattan bar Bachelors III (June 6).

RETIREMENT ENDED—Joe Namath announces sale of Bachelors III and comes out of retirement (July 18).

ALL-STAR GAME—Jets defeat Collegé All-Stars 26-24, becoming the first AFL team to play in the Chicago classic (Aug. 1).

CROSTOWN RIVALS—Jets beat Giants 37-14 in first meeting between the two New York teams. Namath throws three TD passes and Mike Battle returns a punt 86 yards for a score (Aug. 17).

JINX BROKEN—Jets defeat Buffalo 33-19 to record their first victory at Buffalo since becoming Jets. Weeb Ewbank gets his 100th victory as a head coach (Sept. 14).

SECOND DIVISION CROWN—Jets defeat Houston 34-26 in Houston to win their second Eastern Division title (Dec. 6).

PLAYOFF GAME—Kansas City takes its first step toward the Super Bowl by beating New York 13-6 in the interdivisional AFL playoffs (Dec. 20).

ALL-PRO—Joe Namath voted the all-pro (NFL-AFL) quarterback by league coaches for the second year in a row. Joining him on all-pro squads were Winston Hill and Matt Snell (Dec. 22).

ALL-TIME AFL TEAM—Weeb Ewbank named the all-time coach of the AFL and Joe Namath, Don Maynard and Gerry Philbin chosen to the all-time AFL team selected by the Hall of Fame.

1970

PLAYERS STRIKE—NFLPA strikes pro football camps, leaving the Jets with only rookies as full training camp was supposed to open (July 19).

STRIKE SETTLED—Veterans report to camp after missing three weeks due to the strike (Aug. 3).

OPENER—Jets open up the 1970 season against new AFC rival, Cleveland, losing 31-21 in Monday night TV inaugural (Sept. 21).

NAMATH EXITS—In the first meeting between the Colts and Jets since 1969 Super Bowl, Joe Namath fractured his right wrist and was sidelined for the year (Oct. 18).

NEW YORK RIVALS—The Jets and Giants met in the first regular season game between the two intra-city squads. The Giants came back for a 22-10 win before a Shea Stadium record crowd of 63,903 (Nov. 1).

UPSETS—Behind Al Woodall's quarterbacking and the top AFC defense, the Jets upset the powerful Rams and Vikings within a three-week span, topping two of the NFC's leading contenders (Nov. 15, Nov. 29).

1971

SAUER RETIRES—The Jets' all-pro wide receiver, George Sauer, a five-year veteran, announced his retirement (April 16).

BIGGS DEPARTS—Weeb Ewbank had a player exercise his option for the first time ever as Verlon Biggs, DE, signed with Washington. The Redskins sent two draft choices as compensation (June 10).

NAMATH HURT—For the second time in as many seasons, Joe Namath was forced out of the lineup. This time he was hurt in first preseason game trying to make a tackle on a fumble runback and underwent surgery on his left knee immediately (Aug. 7).

NAMATH RETURNS—Joe Namath, on the sidelines for 19 straight regular season games, made his return in the second quarter against San Francisco and tossed for 358 yards and three TD passes as the Jets barely fell to the 49ers, 24-21 (Nov. 28).

1972

NAMATH SPARKLES—Joe Namath had his finest day, throwing for 496 yards and six touchdowns as the Jets defeated Baltimore 44-34. Namath and John Uinitas set an NFL combined record for passing yardage—872 (Sept. 24).

RUSHING MARK—Jets set club rushing record of 333 yards as team defeated Patriots 41-13. John Riggins (168 yards) and Emerson Boozer (150) became first tandem in history to hit the 150-yard mark in a game (Oct. 15).

MAYNARD MARK—Don Maynard became pro football's all-time receiving leader with his 632nd career catch. The historic grab came in the fourth quarter at Oakland. Namath passed for 403 yards, but Jets were eliminated from race (Dec. 11).

1973

WINNER HIRED—Charley Winner, former head coach of St. Louis, is named to succeed Weeb Ewbank as head coach of the Jets, starting with the 1974 season. Winner serves as an assistant coach under Ewbank for 1973 (Feb. 1).
JETS EVICTED FROM HOME—Due to World Series games, the Jets were forced to play their first six games on the road, including moving the Pittsburgh game to Three Rivers Stadium. This left the Jets with only six games for the home fans (Oct. 21).

EWBANK-O.J.—Weeb Ewbank's last game after 11 years as Jets' head coach, but Buffalo's O.J. Simpson provided the fireworks as the Jets finished out at 4-10. Simpson broke the NFL season rushing mark with a 200-yard afternoon and wound up with 2003 for the year (Dec. 16).

1974

PLAYER STRIKE—Jets open training camp with 31 rookies and one veteran as the NFLPA strike begins (July 9).

PRESEASON OPENS—Playing with a team composed mainly of rookies, the Jets defeated Denver 41-19 in the opening preseason game. John Jones was at QB (Aug. 3).

TRAINING CAMP—Jets took occupancy of their new training center in Hempstead, N.Y. The center contains coaches' offices, players' quarters and full practice facilities (Sept. 3).

NEW HAVEN VICTORY—After going 1-7 over the first part of the year, the Jets snapped their slump with a tingling 26-20 overtime victory over the Giants at Yale Bowl. Joe Namath threw six yards to Emerson Boozer for the winning points (Nov. 10).

EWBANK RESIGNS AS VP—Weeb Ewbank announces that he will retire as vice president of the Jets at the end of the season (Nov. 12).

VICTORY BINGE—Jets close out the season with six consecutive victories to provide a 7-7 season. Included in the streak were upsets over playoff-bound Miami and Buffalo.

1975

DRAFT—Jets traded their number one pick for DE Billy Newsome of New Orleans (Jan. 28).

GENERAL MANAGER NAMED—Al Ward, vice president of the Dallas Cowboys, was named Jets' general manager to succeed Weeb Ewbank who had retired (Feb. 13).

NAMATH SIGNS—Joe Namath turned down a reported multi-million dollar WFL contract to sign a two-year contract with Jets (July 30).

GAME STRUCK—The final preseason game between the Jets and New England was canceled when the Patriots' players went on strike (Sept. 14).

JETS STRIKE—The New York Jets' players voted to support the New England players' strike and walked out of camp the week of the opener against Buffalo (Sept. 16).

PLAYERS RETURN—Jets' players returned as strike was settled (Sept. 18).

EMPEROR HIROHITO—His Majesty, Emperor Hirohito of Japan, attends home opener and watches Jets defeat Patriots 36-7 (Oct. 5).

WINNER FIRED—Charley Winner was dismissed as head coach after the Jets lost six games in a row and were in the AFC East cellar with a 2-7 record. Ken Shipp, the offensive coordinator, was named interim head coach (Nov. 19).

RIGGINS 1,000 YARDS—John Riggins became the first Jet in history to gain 1,000 yards as he reached 1,005 vs. Dallas in season finale (Dec. 21).

1976

HOLTZ NAMED COACH—Lou Holtz, who had a successful four years at North Carolina State, was named head coach. He signed a five-year contract (Feb. 10).

DRAFT—Jets tab another Alabama quarterback as their number one pick, selecting Richard Todd (April 8).

ISELIN CARDIAC ARREST—Jets' president Phil Iselin suffered a cardiac arrest while attending Jets game at Denver (Sept. 19).

HOLTZ RESIGNS—Lou Holtz, deciding that he wasn't right for the pros, resigns with one game to go and returns to college coaching job. Mike Holovak was named interim coach for final game (Dec. 9).

NAMATH LAST GAME—Joe Namath started what was to be his final game as a Jet against Cincinnati (Dec. 12).

ISELIN DIES—Phil Iselin, who led the Jets for eight years, suffered a fatal heart attack while at his office (Dec. 28).

1977

MICHAELS HEAD COACH—Veteran defensive coach Walt Michaels was named head coach, signing a three-year contract. Leon Hess was named acting president (Jan. 5).

PLAYER AGREEMENT—The NFL and the NFL Players Association agreed on a contract for the first time in three years. The contract extends five years and contains a modified draft (March 1).

NAMATH WAIVED—Joe Namath, symbol of the Jets for 12 years, was granted his freedom as he was placed on waivers when a special trade attempt with Los Angeles was unsuccessful (April 1, became final April 12). Namath signed as free agent with Rams on May 12.

JETS WIN EARLY ACCESS TO SHEA—After a two-month court struggle, the Jets were guaranteed two September games in Shea Stadium, one on either the first or second date of the NFL season, plus two games in October. The agreement was for each of the remaining six years of the Jets' lease with the city, beginning in 1978. State Supreme Court Justice Harold Baer also allowed the Jets to play two preseason games plus their 1977 home opener at Giants Stadium in the Meadowlands (May 26).

KENSIL NAMED PRESIDENT—Jim Kensil, executive director of the NFL since 1968, was named president and chief operating officer of the Jets. Leon Hess, who had served as acting president, became chairman of the board and chief executive officer for corporate matters (June 6).

WARD RESIGNS—Al Ward, Jets' general manager since 1975, resigned (Dec. 30). He became assistant to the president of the AFC (April, 1978).

1978

EWBANK NAMED TO HALL OF FAME—Weeb Ewbank, who guided the Jets from 1963-73 and was the only coach to win world championships in both the NFL and AFL, was selected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame (Jan. 23).

NAMATH RETIRES—Joe Namath announced his retirement.

JETS CHANGE LOGO AND UNIFORM—For the first time since 1963, the Jets changed their uniform design. The team also adopted a new logo and changed the helmet to green (Feb. 27).

JETS WIN FIRST DEBUT SINCE 1972—Opening the season at home for the first time since 1964, the Jets upset Miami, 33-20, behind Richard Todd's three TD passes. It was the first Jets' opening-day win in seven years (Sept. 3).

WALKER SELECTED TO PRO BOWL—Wide receiver Wesley Walker became the first Jet since 1975 to be chosen for the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl (Dec. 14).

JETS FINISH WITH MOST WINS SINCE 1969—The Jets closed with an 8-8 record, the most wins in 10 years and the best record since 1974 (Dec. 17).

MICHAELS PICKED COACH OF THE YEAR—Walt Michaels, who kept the youngest team in the NFL in playoff contention for 15 games, was named AFC Coach of the Year by UPI and the Pro Football Writers of America.

1979

FIRST MONDAY NIGHT TV GAME FROM NEW YORK AREA—The Jets defeated the Vikings, 14-7, at Shea Stadium in the first Monday night television game to originate from the New York City area (Oct. 15).

JETS CLOSE WITH THREE STRAIGHT WINS—The Jets defeated AFC East rivals Baltimore, New England and Miami in the final three games of the year to finish 8-8.

1980

MATT ROBINSON TRADED TO DENVER—Backup quarterback Matt Robinson was traded to Denver for the Broncos' first and second round picks in the 1980 draft plus quarterback Craig Penrose (Feb. 1).

DRAFT—Jets made bold trade to move up to second spot in first round and picked Johnny "Lam" Jones, wide receiver from Texas. New York swapped its two first round choices (13th and 20th) to the 49ers for their first round position (April 29).

TODD SETS NFL RECORD—Richard Todd's 42 pass completions set an NFL record (60 attempts for 447 yards and 3 TDs) as the Jets dropped a 37-27 decision to San Francisco at Shea. In that game Clark Gaines set an AFC record (2nd in the NFL books) with 17 pass receptions (Sept. 21).

1981

OWNERSHIP SHARES CHANGE—Townsend B. Martin sold his 25% interest in the team to Leon Hess, Hess assumed 75% ownership in the club, while Helen Dillon remained at 25% (Mar. 2).

BRAGGING RIGHTS—Jets defeat the Giants 26-7 at the Meadowlands to raise their record to 4-4-1 after an 0-3 start. The defense records 9 QB sacks and the only Giant score comes on a fumbled punt snap (Nov. 1).

FIRST PLACE—The Jets capture a share of first place with a stunning 16-15 win over Miami at Shea. Playing with a broken rib and sprained ankle, Richard Todd drove the Jets 77-yards in the final 2:44, hitting Jerome Barkum from 11-yards out with 16 remaining for the win (Nov. 22).

JETS LAND FOUR IN PRO BOWL—Representing the Jets at the Pro Bowl were Marvin Powell (for the third straight year), Joe Klecko and Mark Gastineau as starters, along with Joe Fields. Richard Todd is voted MVP by his teammates (Dec. 16).

JETS CLINCH PLAYOFF SPOT—With a 28-3 victory over Green Bay, the Jets finished with a 10-5-1 record and clinched their first playoff berth since 1969. The club added 9 more sacks to finish the season with 66, one shy of the NFL record. Joe Klecko and Mark Gastineau finish as the league leaders with 20½ and 20, respectively (Dec. 20).

WILD-CARD PLAYOFF GAME—After fighting back from a 24-0 deficit, the Jets' dreams died on the 11-yard line when Buffalo's Bill Simpson intercepted a pass on the 2-yard line with less than 10 seconds left. The Bills defeat the Jets 31-27 (Dec. 27).

1982

KLECKO HURT—Joe Klecko was lost for 14 weeks after suffering a ruptured patellar tendon in his knee in the fourth quarter of a 31-7 win at New England

(Sept. 19)

PLAYERS STRIKE—NFLPA strikes pro football following the second regular season game (Sept. 21).

STRIKE SETTLED—The NFL and NFLPA agree on a five year contract that ends the longest strike (57 days) in the history of professional sports. An abbreviated 9-game schedule and 16-team playoff format are agreed upon for the 1982 season (Nov. 16).

1983

MCNEIL LEADS NFL—Freeman McNeil becomes the first Jet to lead the NFL in rushing as he finishes with 786 yards on 151 carries (5.2 avg.). The Jets finish the shortened season with a 6-3 record.

PLAYOFF UPSET—Freeman McNeil has the second best game in playoff history (202 yards rushing), and Darrol Ray sets a postseason record with a 98-yard interception for a TD as the Jets upset the Bengals 44-17 in Cincinnati to mark their first playoff win in 14 years (Jan. 9).

JETS ADVANCE—Aided by two Lance Mehl interceptions in the final three minutes, the Jets advance to the AFC championship game after defeating the Raiders 17-14 in L.A. (Jan. 15).

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME—On an extremely muddy field at Miami's Orange Bowl, the Jets and Dolphins waged a defensive battle which ended with Miami on top, 14-0. A.J. Duhe was the hero of the game that saw 12 turnovers with three interceptions including a 35-yard return for the insurance TD (Jan. 23).

COACHING CHANGE—After six seasons as head coach, Walt Michaels announces his retirement. The next day, offensive coordinator Joe Walton is named head coach, and defensive coordinator Joe Gardi is promoted to ass't. head coach (Feb. 9, 10).

MCNEIL HURT—In a 27-24 OT win over the Rams, the Jets lost Freeman McNeil for 7 weeks with a separated shoulder (Sept. 25).

JETS MOVE—Citing Shea Stadium as "rundown, neglected and the NFL's poorest facility for athletes and spectators alike", the Jets announced their plans to move to the Meadowlands for the 1984 season. The Jets pledged to return to New York City if a first-class professional stadium is ready for occupancy starting in 1989 under a lease equitable to the city and the Jets (Oct. 6).

LAST GAME AT SHEA—The Jets drop a 34-7 decision to Pittsburgh in their final home game at Shea Stadium (Dec. 10).

PRO BOWLERS, MVP—Marvin Powell is voted to the Pro Bowl for the fifth straight year, while NFL sack leader Mark Gastineau and Joe Klecko are also chosen. Lance Mehl becomes the first defensive player since 1971 to be picked MVP by his teammates (Dec. 14).

1984

OWNERSHIP SHIFT—Leon Hess assumed full ownership of the team as Helen Dillon, a partner since 1968, sold her 25% interest in the club (Feb. 9).

RICHARD TODD TRADED—The Jets concluded a full week of trading by sending QB Richard Todd to New Orleans for a 1st round pick (15th overall) (Feb. 18). Earlier in the week, the Jets acquired a 2nd round draft choice by trading Abdul Salaam and Kenny Neil to San Diego (Feb. 13).

MEADOWLANDS—Jets moved into Giants Stadium in the Meadowlands, dropping a 23-17 decision to Pittsburgh in a nationally televised Thursday night game, despite a 97-yard KOR for a TD by Bobby Humphery (Sept. 6).

JETS-GIANTS—The Giants evened the regular season series between the two teams at two each with a 20-10 win. The loss overshadowed a fine performance by QB Ken O'Brien who finished with 28-40-351-1TD. Freeman McNeil, the AFC's leading rusher at the time, played the game with a broken rib which ended his season. McNeil finished with 1,070 yards rushing, the most ever by a Jet (Dec. 2).

PRO BOWLERS, MVP—Freeman McNeil is named MVP by his teammates for the 2nd time in addition to being voted to the Pro Bowl. Mark Gastineau leads the NFL in sacks for the 2nd straight year and is also named to the Pro Bowl (Dec. 13), where he earned MVP honors. Joe Klecko, named as an alternate, also plays in the game following an injury to Bob Baumhower.

1985

NAMATH NAMED TO HALL OF FAME—Joe Namath, who was MVP as the Jets became the first AFL team to win the Super Bowl in 1969, became the team's first player elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame (Jan. 29). Namath, the Jets' all-time leading passer, also became the first Jet to have his number retired to go with this honor.

NAMATH HONORED—In an emotional halftime ceremony televised nationally on Monday night, Namath comes down from the announcers booth to have his number retired. The Jets also beat Miami 23-7 that night (Oct. 14).

OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION—The Jets scored the most points in club history while trouncing Tampa Bay 62-28. The team racked up 581 yards offense, while Ken O'Brien tossed 5 TD passes, 3 of those to Mickey Shuler.

LONGEST PASS—Ken O'Brien throws the longest pass in Jets' history, a 96-yard TD to Welsey Walker, in a 27-7 win at Buffalo (Dec. 8).

FIVE TO PRO BOWL—The Jets send five players to the Pro Bowl. Freeman McNeil, Joe Klecko, Mark Gastineau and Lance Mehl are voted in and Ken O'Brien, named as an alternate, also goes following an injury to Dan Marino.

O'Brien is also named MVP by his teammates (Dec. 18).

PLAYOFF CLINCHER—With a 37-10 victory over Cleveland, the Jets finished 11-5 and clinched their 3rd playoff spot in 5 years. Ken O'Brien becomes the first Jet QB to lead the NFL in passer ratings.

WILD-CARD PLAYOFF—Turnovers are the story as the Jets commit 4 costly ones while dropping a 26-14 decision to the eventual AFC champions, New England. The Patriots score the backbreaking TD in the 3rd quarter on a fumbled kickoff returned for a TD. Ken O'Brien suffers a concussion and Pat Ryan comes on to play the 2nd half (Dec. 28).

1986

OT THRILLER—In one of the most memorable games in club history, the Jets topped Miami 51-45 in a wild OT contest. Ken O'Brien, who was 29-43-479-4 TD, threw a perfect strike to Wesley Walker from 21 yards out on the final play of regulation to tie the score. In OT, Walker caught a club record 4th TD on a 43-yard bomb at the 2:35 mark. (Sept. 21).

RECORD SETTER—The Jets defense set a club record holding New England to 10-17 rushing in a 31-24 victory. Johnny Hector also set a team mark with 40 rushing attempts for 143 yards and 3 TD. (Oct. 12).

MEHL HURT—Pro Bowl LB Lance Mehl was lost for the season after suffering a knee injury during a 28-24 win over New Orleans (Oct. 26).

WINNING STREAK, GASTINEAU HURT—The Jets won a club record 9th consecutive game with a 31-16 decision over Indianapolis to improve to 10-1 on the season. The win was costly though as Mark Gastineau suffers a knee injury which forced him to miss the rest of the regular season. (Nov. 16).

INJURIES MOUNT—Injuries continued to be the story as the Jets lost Joe Klecko and Reggie McElroy to reconstructive knee surgery following a 45-24 loss to Pittsburgh. (Dec. 13).

PRO BOWLERS, MVP—Al Toon, who set a Jets' record for catches in a season with 85 to finish 2nd in the AFC, is voted MVP by his teammates in addition to being named a Pro Bowl selection. Also named to the Pro Bowl for the first time is Mickey Shuler (Dec. 17).

WILD-CARD PLAYOFF WIN—After ending the season with 5 straight defeats, Joe Walton named Pat Ryan as the starting QB for this playoff game, and the Jets won their first home playoff contest since 1968 with a 35-15 trouncing of Kansas City. The key play of the game was Ryan's 24-yard run on a QB draw on 4th and 6 to the 9-yard line in the 1st quarter. The Jets took the lead 2 plays later and it set the tone of the game. (Dec. 28).

1987

DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF—In one of the most disappointing losses in team history, the Jets lost a heartbreaking 23-20 decision in 2 OTs at Cleveland. The Jets opened a 20-10 lead with 4:14 left before the Browns mounted their comeback which tied the score. The Jets received a 2nd life in OT when Mark Mosely missed a 23-yard FG, but his 27-yard FG 2:02 into the 2nd OT sent Cleveland to the AFC championship game. The game was the 3rd longest in NFL history. (Jan. 3).

MAYNARD VOTED IN HALL OF FAME—Don Maynard became the second Jet player elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, joining his teammate Joe Namath along with their coach Weeb Ewbank. Maynard, who had the second most reception yardage in NFL history, also became the second Jet to have his number retired to go with the honor. (Jan. 27).

LEAHY REACHES 1,000—Scoring 7 points in an opening day 31-28 win at Buffalo, Pat Leahy becomes the 13th player in NFL history to register 1,000 points. (Sept. 13).

PLAYERS STRIKE—NFLPA strikes pro football following the Jets-New England Monday night game after the 2nd week of the season. (Sept. 22).

REPLACEMENT GAMES—The NFL canceled week #3 and prepares to play the schedule with new players and veterans who wish to return. Fielding teams of replacement players, the Jets lose to Dallas 38-24 (Oct. 4) and at Indianapolis 6-0 (Oct. 11).

PLAYERS RETURN—The NFLPA sends the players back to work but miss the deadline for playing week #6 (Oct. 15). In the final week of replacement games, the Jets beat Miami 37-31 in OT at home with Pat Ryan throwing 4 TD passes. (Oct. 18).

MAYNARD HONORED—Flanked by fellow Jets' Hall of Famers Weeb Ewbank and Joe Namath, Don Maynard is presented his Hall of Fame ring and his number 13 is retired in a halftime ceremony (Nov. 1).

TOON EXCELS—Al Toon finished the season as the AFC's leading receiver and is named to a starting spot in the Pro Bowl. He also becomes the only Jet other than Joe Namath to be voted MVP by his teammates in consecutive seasons. (Dec. 23).

1988

KLECKO WAIVED—Joe Klecko, the only defensive player in NFL history to make the Pro Bowl at 3 different positions (DE, DT, NT), was waived/failed physical after the club recommended that he retire. He turned down an opportunity to join the coaching staff in his attempt to continue playing (Feb. 8).

KENSIL RETIRES, GUTMAN NAMED PRESIDENT—Jim Kensil took medical retirement after serving 11 seasons as team president. Steve Gutman, the

club's corporate treasurer and administrative manager since 1977, was named president to succeed Kensil. Leon Hess also announced that he would take a more active role in the operation of the club. (June 14).

LOST LINEBACKERS—The Jets lose 2 of their veteran LBs in training camp as former Pro Bowler Lance Mehl announces his retirement and Bob Crable injures his knee, undergoes reconstructive surgery, is lost for the year and retires after the season. (Aug.)

GASTINEAU RETIRES—Citing personal reasons, Mark Gastineau leaves the team in midseason and announces his retirement. The club places him on reserve/retired (Oct. 21).

O'BRIEN STREAK—In the 3rd quarter of a 17-10 win at Detroit, Ken O'Brien throws his first INT in 211 passing attempts, the 2nd longest streak in NFL history. (Sept. 25).

BIG WIN IN MIAMI—Despite Dan Marino passing for the 2nd highest yardage in NFL history (521 yards), the Jets beat the Dolphins in Miami with rookie FS Erik McMillan recording 3 INT and returning 1 for a 55-yard TD (Oct. 23)

BRAGGING RIGHTS—The Jets beat the Giants 27-21 in the final game of the season to post a winning record in 1988 at 8-7-1 and in the process knocked the Giants out of the playoffs. Al Toon caught the winning 5-yard TD pass on a Ken O'Brien 3rd down audible with only :37 left. (Dec. 18)

LEAHY ENTERS TOP 10—By scoring 112 points in 1988, Pat Leahy broke into the top 10 all-time NFL scorers and finished the year ranked 8th overall in league history with 1190 career points. (Dec. 18)

HONORS—Al Toon became the 1st Jet to lead the NFL in receptions and to also be voted team MVP in 3 consecutive years. He was named to the Pro Bowl along with Mickey Shuler, who was the AFC's leading receiver among TEs and Erik McMillan, who led the AFC with 8 INT, and was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year. (Dec. 19).

1989

McMILLAN RECORD SETTER—Erik McMillan returns an INT 92-yards for a TD vs. IND to break the 27-year mark previously held by Wayne Fontes who had recorded an 83-yarder as a member of the NY Titans. (Oct. 1). McMillan also tied an NFL record for most fumbles returned for TD in a season (2) when he had a 74-yarder at NO (Oct. 15) and 45-yarder vs. SF (Oct. 29).

MONDAY NIGHT HISTORY—The Jets share a moment of history on Monday Night Football when they play the Raiders in the debut of Art Shell, the first black head coach in the modern era of the NFL. The Raiders beat the Jets 14-7 (Oct. 9).

STEINBERG NAMED VP-GM—Following extensive interviews to find the best 'football' man to take full charge of the team's operations, Leon Hess and Steve Gulman name Dick Steinberg, the former New England director of player development, as the Jets' Vice President and General Manager. (Dec. 18).

HONORS—Erik McMillan makes it 2 in a row when he is once again named to the Pro Bowl team in his sophomore season, while WR-KR JoJo Townsell is voted MVP by his teammates. (Dec. 19).

DISMAL SEASON ENDS—The Jets drop a 37-0 decision to Buffalo in the season finale to finish the year 4-12, the worst record since 1980. It becomes the first time in club history that the team was shut out in back-to-back home games. (Dec. 23).

WALTON ERA ENDS—Citing the need for the team to get off to a "fresh start", Dick Steinberg announces his plan to dismiss Joe Walton and begin a search for a new head coach. Walton ends his 7-year reign with a 53-57-1 mark. (Dec. 26).

1990

COSLET NAMED HEAD COACH—At the conclusion of his detailed search, Dick Steinberg decided on former Cincinnati offensive coordinator Bruce Coslet as the 8th full time head coach in club history. (Feb. 6).

The New York Jets climaxed their finest season in history (11-3) by scoring a 27-23 victory over Oakland. A title game record crowd of 62,627 sat in on the chilly and windy proceedings at Shea Stadium and saw Joe Namath toss three touchdown passes.

Despite the fact that Namath attempted a record 49 passes, the Jets still mixed their attack. Matt Snell and Emerson Boozer gained 71 and 51 yards, respectively, behind fine blocking from the front line.

The Raiders carried the game down to the final minutes before Lamonica's lateral pass for Charlie Smith rolled free and was recovered by the Jets' Ralph Baker.

The victory gave head coach Weeb Ewbank the honor of being the only coach to win titles in both the NFL and AFL.

NEW YORK 16, BALTIMORE 7

Defying the oddsmakers (17½ point underdogs) and the strength of traditions, the Jets became the first AFL team to win the Super Bowl by rumbling over and through the Baltimore Colts to record a 16-7 triumph.

As it was in the AFL championship contest, Joe Namath led the way. The all-pro quarterback directed the Jets' attack flawlessly, driving the team to a second quarter touchdown by Matt Snell (four yards) and three second-half field goals by Jim Turner. Snell had an outstanding game, gaining 121 yards on 30 carries.

The defense shared at least as much glory as the offensive unit, intercepting the Colts four times. Randy Beverly picked off two; Jim Hudson and Johnny Sample, one each. The defensive unit harassed Colts' quarterbacks Earl Morrall and Johnny Unitas all afternoon, allowing them to complete only 17 of 41 passes. The victory was the third in World Championship competition in as many tries for Weeb Ewbank and made him the only man ever to coach world champions in both the AFL and NFL.

The game was a classic battle of defenses, played in remarkably cold and windy conditions before a sellout 62,977 fans. Through the first three quarters, neither team could penetrate for a touchdown and the score stood at 6-3 for the Chiefs. Jim Turner had put New York out in front, 3-0, with a 28-yard field goal the first time the Jets had the ball, but the Chiefs' Jan Stenerud retaliated with a 23-yarder on the next series.

Not until the fourth quarter did the breaks occur. With first and goal on the one-yard line, three cracks, including a Joe Namath bootleg, failed to bring a touchdown. Turner then kicked a 7-yard field goal to tie it, 6-6.

Two plays later Kansas City was in the end zone. Len Dawson hit Otis Taylor for a 61-yard pass play to take the Chiefs to the Jet 19. Then Dawson fired the final 19 yards to Gloster Richardson for the only TD of the game.

Namath threw 20 passes over the next two Jets' series, but a fourth down incomplection and a Jim Marsalis interception thwarted the Jets and put Kansas City on the road to the world championship.

The Bills scored on the opening kickoff when they recovered a Bruce Harper fumble and quickly built that to a 24-0 second quarter lead. The Jets rallied in the third quarter to make it 24-13. The game appeared over as Joe Cribbs busted a 50-yard TD to give Buffalo a 31-13 lead with 10:16 left.

The Jets refused to die, however, and with Richard Todd at the controls, New York scored 2 quick TDs and were now down 31-27 with 3:44 to go. A swarming defense forced the Bills to go three and out and with 2:36 left and the goal line 80-yards away, Todd started the Jets on their march. They drove to the Bills 11-yard line with 14 seconds on the clock, but Simpson made his game-saving interception and the Jets' season ended.

Duhe was the hero of the game which saw a total of 12 turnovers, with three interceptions, returning the final one 35-yards for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter. Woody Bennett ran seven yards for the first Miami touchdown on the Dolphins' first possession of the third quarter, capping a 48-yard, seven-play drive following Duhe's second interception. The poor field conditions severely hurt the Jets' rushing attack as Freeman McNeil, who had rushed for 303 yards in the previous two playoff wins, was limited to only 46 yards on 17 carries due to the footing. It was the first time in NFL playoff history that two teams were deadlocked at 0-0 at halftime. The Jets passing game was also hindered as Richard Todd was intercepted a record-tying five times by Miami. The New York defense held Miami to only 198 net yards, intercepted David Woodley three times and forced three fumbles.

Before Pat Ryan could relieve him though, New England added a FG and then scored a TD when the ensuing kickoff was fumbled by Johnny Hector and returned 15-yards by Johnny Rember. With the Jets trailing 23-7, Ryan came in and directed a TD drive.

Joe Walton started Pat Ryan to give the team an emotional lift — they got just that from Ryan plus a key running play and a 3-TD passing performance along with Freeman McNeil's 135-yard rushing to spark the Jets' first home playoff win since 1968. Trailing 6-0, Ryan ran a QB draw for 24 yards from the KC33 on a 4th & 6 play to set up the Jets' go ahead TD. On the ensuing series 1st down, the Jets defense forced a KC fumble and Ryan concluded a 12 play, 47-yard drive with a 1-yard pass to McNeil. Just prior to the half, Ryan hit Al Toon with a TD pass for a 21-6 halftime edge. The Jets nailed the victory on the 1st play of the 2nd half when Kevin McArthur swiped a Todd Blackledge pass and dashed 21 yards for a 28-6 margin. The Jets' defense allowed a season low 241 yards total offense and had 2 sacks, 2 INTs and 1 recovered fumble.

With Pat Ryan at QB, the Jets jumped on top 7-0 following a flea-flicker 42-yard TD pass from Ryan to Wesley Walker. Ryan was forced to leave the game in the 2nd quarter with a groin injury and was replaced by Ken O'Brien. Meanwhile, the Jets defense was outstanding holding the Browns to just 10 points and 302 total yards late in the 4th quarter. Immediately after a Jerry Holmes interception, the Jets took a 20-10 lead on Freeman McNeil's 25-yard TD with 4:14 remaining in regulation. Kosar led the Browns 68 yards to set up Kevin Mack's one-yard run to make the score 20-17 with 1:57 left. Cleveland's defense forced the Jets to punt with :51 left before Kosar's 37-yard pass to Webster Slaughter to the 5-yard line set up the tying 22-yard FG. The Jets got a 2nd life when Mosely missed a 23-yard FG 6:06 into OT, but he redeemed himself by kicking the winning 27-yard FG on a first-and-goal play from the J9.
