



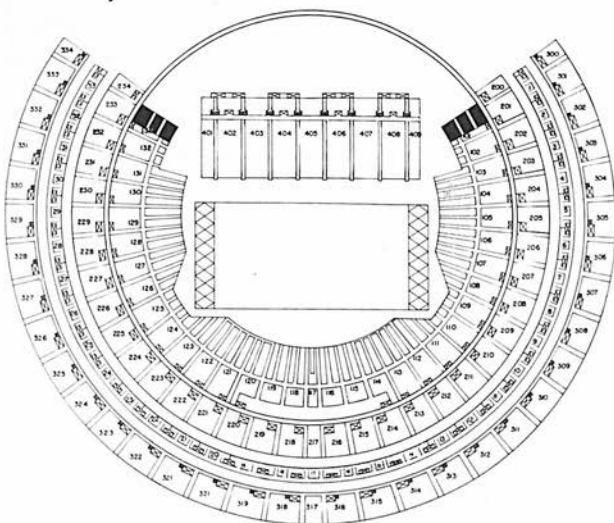

OAKLAND COLISEUM



Home of the Raiders is the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum Complex, comprised of the 54,041 seat Coliseum for football and baseball and the 14,000-seat Arena and Exhibit Hall for basketball, hockey and many other indoor shows and events.

The \$30 million dollar complex opened September 18, 1966, as the Raiders played the Kansas City Chiefs before a crowd of 50,746. Just over six months later, the facility had welcomed its 1,000,000th fan.

Built by the City of Oakland and the County of Alameda the Complex won awards for its engineering achievements. It is also a home base for major league baseball, basketball and hockey.

The all-time Coliseum record for football attendance is 54,843 fans, who turned out December 11, 1972, to see the Raiders defeat the New York Jets, 24-16.

THE ORGANIZATION

The pledge to build the Oakland Raiders into the finest organization in professional football today finds the Oakland franchise at the top of the pro sports world.

Much has been accomplished in the past 11 years, including an American Football League Championship in 1967 and Western Division titles in 1967, 1968, 1969, 1970, 1972, and 1973. The Raiders' record of 103-40-11 (.720) since 1963 is the best in pro football.

For the past seven years, the Raiders have maintained a dominance over pro football in terms of games won. In their last 98 games, the Raiders have won 72, tied 7, and lost 19. Oakland's consecutive seasons in 1967-68-69 are a landmark victory total (37-4-1) for a three-year period in pro football history. Unbeaten streaks of 14, 15 and nine games were also accomplished during the last five seasons. The 15-game string equaled the AFL record.

COACH OF THE YEAR

Another tribute to the organization is that in 11 years, three different coaches have been chosen "Coach of the Year."

This monumental rise came about by design, careful design. The past 14 years have been marked by long hours of dedication by all those who work for the Raider organization.

The fans are appreciative of the Raiders' effort. There have been 46 straight sellout crowds at the Oakland Coliseum. Some 50,840 season tickets were sold in 1974, the maximum available to the public. The total home attendance in the Raiders' first season in 1960 was only 69,122, and some say that figure is generous.

The ultimate goal of the Raiders is a world championship, and the organization is working long hours to achieve that goal.

RAIDER OWNERS

AL DAVIS *Managing Partner*

A strong dedication to excellence has marked the Oakland Raiders' rise during the last 11 years to the top of the pro sports world. The Oakland Raiders produced the best record in pro football during that period.

The Raiders have six times been Western Division champions (1967-68-69-70-72-73) and won the AFL title in 1967. Their winning percentage during the 11 years is an excellent .720, based on a 103-40-11 record.

The man who guided the progress of the Raiders during these 11 years is the managing owner, Al Davis.

Davis' 14-year professional football story, from assistant coach of the San Diego Chargers, to head coach and general manager of the Raiders, to Commissioner of the AFL and finally to a principal owner in the Oakland franchise, is an amazing saga in pro sports.

In April, 1966, the then 36-year old Davis became Commissioner of the American Football League. It was a post he accepted with some reluctance, for first and foremost he was a football coach, and he knew that accepting the commissionership would in all probability mean an end to his coaching career. But the AFL, priming for an all-out battle with the rival National Football League, prevailed on Davis to accept the position. He was described by AFL president Ralph Wilson as "a coaching genius and astute administrator." AFL owners pointed to his brilliant coaching and administrative record and the high esteem in which he was held by players, the news media, and coaches across the country.

Eight weeks later, when pro football's two major leagues put an end to their six-year war, Davis was nationally acclaimed as the driving force who brought the leagues to the conference table. When the merger was completed, Davis resigned his AFL post of Commissioner.

He was once again a driving force in the May, 1969, realignment of the pro football. Three NFL teams, Cleveland, Baltimore and Pittsburgh, moved over to the AFL to form two 13-team conferences for 1970.

Now a member of the NFL Owners Executive Committee and the vital Competition Committee, Al Davis came to Oakland in January, 1963, dedicated to building the Raiders into pro sports' finest organization. Davis was the youngest (33) in pro football holding down the dual positions of head coach and general manager.

But Davis possessed 14 years' coaching experience and had been tabbed a "young coaching genius" by Sports Illustrated and called "the most inventive mind in the country" by Scholastic Coach magazine. The Raiders, who had won just three games during 1961-62, were floundering on the field and in the front office.

But 1963 started one of the great rehabilitation jobs in the history of football. Introducing a meticulously designed offense and a new concept in defense, the "picked to

finish last" Raiders zoomed to a 10-4 record and missed the Western Division crown by one game.

Davis was named Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, United Press International, Sports Illustrated, Sporting News and by his fellow coaches. He was named Oakland's Young Man of the Year, becoming the first in athletics to win the Chamber of Commerce award. Aside from his deep love of the Raiders and the community, he is vitally interested in the Bay Area baseball and basketball teams.

Davis was born July 4, 1929, in Brockton, Massachusetts, but was raised in Brooklyn. He attended Wittenberg College and Syracuse University, earning a degree in English. In college, he played football, basketball and baseball.

In 1950-51, he joined the staff at Adelphi College in New York as line coach, and his technical articles published in coaching magazines gained him considerable attention. He then went into the Army, being assigned as head football coach at Ft. Belvoir, Virginia. He molded a national power service club and capped one year by defeating national champion Maryland in a squad game.

Davis served on the staff of the Baltimore Colts in 1954 (age 24), devoting most of his time to personnel work. In 1955-56, he was line coach and chief recruiter at The Citadel. He spent the next three years at the University of Southern California, being the line coach for head coach Don Clark. In 1959, Davis was in charge of the entire defense.

In 1960, Sid Gillman hired Davis as offensive end coach of the Los Angeles Chargers. There Davis developed the finest passing attack in the league and kept the Chargers in the forefront among pro clubs in the fight for collegiate talent. From the Chargers, in San Diego in 1963, it was on to Oakland.

WAYNE VALLEY



Two highly successful businessmen with a deep-seated interest in sports and their community are general partners of the Raiders, along with managing partner Al Davis. Edward McGah and Wayne Valley were among the Raiders' original group of nine owners when the Oakland franchise was awarded in 1960.

Since then, the ownership has evolved into a limited partnership, with Davis, McGah and Valley heading the group.

McGah is in the real estate and development business and has been active in sports many years. He still rates as one of the all-time best semi-pro ball players in the Oakland area, famed for his sandlot baseball. McGah's son, Ed, Jr., once belonged to the Boston Red Sox organization but left baseball to work with his father.

Valley's interest in football goes back to his high school days when he played at Oakland's Castlemont High. He played college football at Oregon State, the fullback of the Beavers' famed "Iron Men" clubs of the mid-30s. Valley's business interests are in the construction and development field.

JOHN MADDEN

HEAD COACH

One of the outstanding coaches in the National Football League is the Raiders' John Madden, at the age of 38 the NFL's youngest head coach and one of its most successful.

Madden has produced five consecutive superior seasons, won four Western Division championships and was named Coach of the Year in 1969 after his first Oakland team finished 12-1-1. Overall, his Raider teams have won 47 games, lost 16 and tied seven for an excel-

lent .746 winning percentage, second highest among active NFL coaches.

One of the trademarks of Madden's Raider teams has been their ability to put together unbeaten streaks of seven, six, seven, nine, four and six games.

The Raiders, under Madden, have recorded seasons of 12-1-1, 8-4-2, 8-4-2, 10-3-1 and 9-4-1. The '71 record was better than two teams which reached the playoffs. In 1970, Madden guided his team to a title with a mid-season, seven-game unbeaten streak after an 0-2-1 start. In '69, he piloted the Raiders to the second best record ever produced in the American Football League. He was named Coach of the Year by The Sporting News, Pro Football Weekly, The Professional Football Writers Association and the Santa Clara Valley Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association.

Madden is also one of the youngest coaches ever to be in charge of an NFL Pro Bowl team. Madden was head coach for the AFC All-Stars in 1971 and in 1973.

Madden began his pro coaching career with the Raiders in 1967, serving as linebacker mentor for two years. He came to the Raiders from San Diego State, where as defensive coordinator he helped produce fine teams in 1964-66. The Aztecs were ranked No. 1 among small colleges in 1964.

The 6-foot-4, 260-pound redhead started his coaching career at Hancock Junior College in Santa Maria, California in 1960. He was 23. After two years as an assistant, he became head coach and compiled a 13-5 mark for two seasons. In 1963, his Hancock team won the league championship and was ranked 9th in the country with an 8-1 record.

Madden spent one year (1959) with the Philadelphia Eagles, but a knee injury cut short his pro career. He graduated from California Polytechnic College, where he was an all-conference tackle and a catcher on the baseball team. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in 1959 and a Master of Arts degree in 1961, both from Cal Poly.

Born in Austin, Minnesota, but raised in Daly City, near San Francisco, Madden was always active in sports as a youth and played football and baseball at Jefferson High.

The coach lives in Pleasanton with his wife, Virginia, and their sons, Mike, 10, and Joe, 8.



OLLIE SPENCER, *Offensive Line*

Ollie Spencer, now in his 13th year with the Raiders, is the senior member of the coaching staff. He joined the Raiders in 1962 as offensive line coach and was a player-coach in 1963. Spencer played seven years in the NFL with Detroit and Green Bay from 1953, 1955-61 as an offensive guard and tackle. He was a starter on the Lions' championship team of '53. One of Kansas' all-time great linemen, Spencer was an NEA All-America and all Big Eight in 1952. He played in the East-West and Senior Bowl games. Spencer, 43, is a native of Hopewell, Kansas. Ollie and his wife Yvonne make their home in Oakland.



TOM DAHMS, *Defensive Line*

Tom Dahms has started his 12th season as a coach with the Raiders. He came to Oakland after serving on the Dallas Cowboys' staff (1960-62). Dahms, 47, began his coaching at the University of Virginia in 1959 after a fine seven-year pro playing career as a two-way tackle with Los Angeles (1951-54), Green Bay (1955), Chicago (1956) and San Francisco (1957). He was a member of the Rams' 1951 championship team. A native of San Diego, Dahms was a Little All-America tackle at San Diego State and was signed by the Rams as a free agent. Tom and his wife Diane and their four sons and daughter live in Castro Valley.



PAUL ROACH *Offensive Backfield*

Paul Roach joined the Raiders in April, 1972. He came to Oakland from the University of Wisconsin, where he was offensive backfield coach in 1970-71. Earlier, Roach spent eight years as backfield coach at Wyoming, helping the Cowboys win three straight Western Athletic Conference titles. The 45-year-old Roach also coached at North Dakota University (1957-61). A native of Spring Green, Wisconsin, Roach was a three-sport star at Black Hills State College in South Dakota. He obtained a master's degree from North Dakota University in 1962. Roach makes his home in Danville.



DON SHINNICK

Linebackers

Don Shinnick joined the Raiders in April, 1973. He was linebacker coach for the St. Louis Cardinals in 1972 and defensive backfield coach for the Chicago Bears in 1970-71. A second round draft choice, Shinnick played 13 years for the Baltimore Colts as a linebacker. He intercepted 37 passes, an NFL record for linebackers, and played on four championship teams during 1957-1969. A native of Kansas City, Missouri, Shinnick played at San Pedro (California) High before starring at UCLA at several positions. Shinnick, 39, a tournament handball player, lives in Pleasanton with his wife Marsha and sons Joel, Josh, Peter and Adam.



BOB ZEMAN,

Defensive Backfield

Bob Zeman, former American Football League All-Star defensive back, joined the Raiders in March, 1971, after college coaching stints at Wisconsin (1970) and Northwestern (1968-69). Zeman, 37, was also coach in 1967 for the Joillet, Illinois Chargers, a San Diego farm team. He co-captained Wisconsin's 1959 Big Ten champions after a three-year career as a two-way backfield standout. Signed by the Los Angeles Chargers in 1960, he played two seasons, then was with the Denver Broncos in 1962-64, winning all-league honors in '62. He returned to the Chargers in 1965-66. A native of Wheaton, Illinois, Zeman was a 1954 high school All-America. Zeman and his wife, Kathy, have four children—sons Clarke, Eddie and Donnie, and daughter, Jennifer.



TOM FLORES,

Receivers

Tom Flores returned to the Raiders in February, 1972, as receivers coach. The 37-year-old Flores played six years at quarterback for the Raiders in 1960-66. He spent two years (1967-68) with the Buffalo Bills and two seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs (1969-70). Flores still ranks as the Raiders number two all-time passer with 11,635 yards and 92 touchdowns. He passed for a record six touchdowns in one game in 1963. A native of Sanger, California, Flores played at College of Pacific. He coached at his alma mater before joining the Raiders. Flores lives in Lafayette with his wife Barbara, twin sons Mark and Scott, and daughter Kimberly.



JOE SCANNELLA, ***Assistant Coach***

Joe Scannella joined the Raiders in June, 1972, after two seasons as head coach at the University of Vermont. A Little All-America quarterback at Lehigh University in 1947-50, he was also a quarterback-safety with Saskatchewan in the Canadian Football League in 1951-52. Scannella, 43, coached at Port Jefferson, Oceanside and Baldwin high schools (Long Island) plus Cornell University during 1952-62. In 1964, he became head coach at C. W. Post College and had a 27-18-1 record for five years. He served with the New York Giants in 1968 as a scout and was offensive coach of the Montreal Alouettes in 1969. Scannella, wife Lillian and children Joe, Beth Ann and Jim reside in Danville.



GEORGE ANDERSON, ***Trainer***

George Anderson is one of the original Raiders, and is starting his 15th season as trainer for the Silver and Black. Anderson, 45, joined the Raiders in 1960 after serving 10 years in training positions at Southern California, Odessa (Texas) High School and the University of California. He first started as a trainer after injuring a knee as a sophomore at San Jose State. Anderson went to college after serving 1946-48 in the Army. A native of Vallejo, California, he played baseball and basketball in high school. George and his wife Marcy and their three children live in Pinole.



RICHARD ROMANSKI, ***Equipment Manager***

Richard Romanski is in his 12th season with the Raiders. He joined the team in 1963. Romanski, during two years in the Army at Ft. Belvoir, Virginia, was a player and later a coach for Al Davis' outstanding service teams. A native of Milwaukee, Romanski, 47, played five high school sports and was an all-league quarterback his final two years. He graduated from St. Norbert College in 1951 after earning Catholic All-America honors in football. He taught and coached in high school after his Army tour. Richard, wife Rose and their four children live in San Leandro.



RON WOLF, ***Director of Player Personnel***

Ron Wolf is now in his 12th year with the Raiders, holding down the director of player personnel position all that time except for a few months in 1966. During those months, he served as Coordinator of Talent for the entire American Football League. A native of New Freedom, Pennsylvania, Wolf played football and baseball in high school and college. An intelligence specialist in West Berlin with the Army in 1956-59, he is blessed with a near-photographic memory. Wolf, 35, attended Maryville College, then completed his education at the University of Oklahoma, where he majored in history. Ron and his wife Virginia and their three daughters live in Pleasanton.



KEN HEROCK, ***Chief Scout, Assistant Coach***

Ken Herock is starting his 10th year with the Raiders. Herock, 33, started his scouting career with the Raiders in 1969 after completing a six-year playing career in the American Football League. A tight end, Herock played five years with Oakland and one with the Cincinnati Bengals. A native of Munhall, Pennsylvania, Herock was a three-year, two-way star at West Virginia University. He signed with the Raiders as a free agent in 1963. Herock holds a bachelor of science degree from West Virginia. The Herock family lives in Pleasanton and includes wife Barry and sons Kenny and Shawn.



BOB MISCHAK, ***Administrative Coach***

Bob Mischak is in his fifth year with the Raiders. He joined the Silver and Black in June, 1973, after spending the prior seven years as assistant athletic director and offensive line coach at the United States Military Academy at West Point. Mischak, 41, was an All-America end at Army, where he starred in football and baseball during 1951-53. The Newark, New Jersey native served in the Infantry and as assistant coach at Army before starting his pro playing career with the New York Giants in 1958. He was an all-league guard with the AFL New York Titans in 1960-62 and played tight end and guard with the Raiders in 1963-65. The Mischak family includes wife Doris and twins Robert, Jr. and Kathleen.



Al LoCASALE, ***Executive Assistant***

Al LoCasale joined the Raiders in 1969 after serving as Director of Player Personnel of the San Diego Chargers and the Cincinnati Bengals. LoCasale is an original AFL executive, being with the Los Angeles Chargers when the league started in 1960. He joined the Bengals in 1967, the first employee hired by Paul Brown. Now in his 22nd year in football, he was administrative assistant at Southern California in 1959 and previously coached at the University of Pennsylvania, his alma mater, Bainbridge Naval Training Center and in high school. He is on the Board of Directors of NFL Properties, Inc., and NFL Films, Inc., and is a member of the NFL Management Council and the PRO Advisory Committee. LoCasale, 41, is a native of Philadelphia. He makes his home in Alameda.



TOM GRIMES, ***Director of Public Relations***

Tom Grimes is now in his sixth season as the Raiders' director of public relations. He came to the Raiders after two years as assistant publicity director of the Miami Dolphins. Grimes covered the AFL in 1966 from Fort Lauderdale, where he served 6½ years as a sports editor. A native Miamian, he began his career at the Miami Herald in 1954. He was graduated from the University of Miami in 1958 with a degree in education and journalism. During two years Army duty, Grimes served in the United States Military Academy sports information office. He is chairman of the Radio-Television Committee for the NFL Public Relations directors. Grimes, wife Lynn and two daughters live in Alameda.



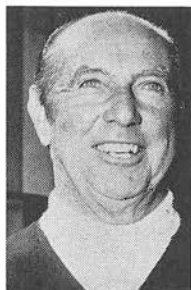
KEN LaRUE, ***Business Manager***

Ken LaRue is now in his sixth year with the Raiders and his 19th year in football. LaRue, 43, came to the Raiders from Ball State University, where he was director of conferences and special events. While at Ball State, LaRue was also a scout for the San Diego Chargers. He coached at Kansas State for seven years and was a high school coach in Anderson, Indiana, for four seasons. A native of Goshen, Indiana, LaRue was an all-state end in high school and also won honors as a receiver at Ball State. He spent 1952-56 in the Air Force. LaRue, wife Anne and their two daughters live in Pleasanton.



DEL COURTNEY, *Director of Administration*

Del Courtney is starting his 15th year with the Raiders. He has been in charge of the Raiders' halftime shows since 1960, and since 1968 has handled radio, television, promotions and the team's speaker's bureau among other duties as director of administration. He has served as vice-president of the NFL Entertainment Directors and the Courtney band at Raider games was acclaimed best in the league. Born in Oakland, and now a resident of Moraga, Courtney was an athlete and musician before graduating from the University of California. The campus band he organized in the early 40's became so popular that it toured the country for 14 years. Before joining the Raiders, Courtney starred in and produced network television and radio shows.



GEORGE GLACE, *Ticket Manager*

George Glace is another veteran Raider employee. He is starting his 12th year as ticket manager. He came to Oakland from the San Diego Chargers in 1963 after serving with the Charger organization three years. Glace, a native of Jamestown, New York, gained experience in the ticket field in Los Angeles at the Pan Pacific Auditorium, the Los Angeles Coliseum and Sports Arena and Santa Anita and Hollywood Park race tracks. He also gained administrative experience as manager of a Los Angeles bowling facility for eight years. The Glace family makes its home in San Leandro.



KEN BISHOP, *Public Relations Assistant*

Ken Bishop enters his sixth season with the Raiders as assistant in public relations. He came to the Raiders after six years as Foothill College sports publicist. Bishop covered the Raiders in 1963-64 for the San Jose Mercury-News where he worked five years as a staff sports writer. He was also a correspondent for Peninsula newspapers, including the Palo Alto Times, and was a contributor to Amateur Athlete, Swimming World and All-America Swimmer magazines. Born in Palo Alto, he served 18½ months in the Kansas City Army Air Defense while in the Army. Bishop, 31, makes his home in Fremont with his wife Gretchen.



1974 OUTLOOK

The Oakland Raiders, in winning their sixth divisional championship in the last seven years, continued as the National Football League team with the best won-loss record over the last 11 years.

The successful 1973 season pushed Oakland's record since 1963 to 103-40-11, a .720 winning percentage. The Cleveland Browns are second at .680 and the Baltimore Colts are third at .673.

The last seven years have been even more spectacular for the Raiders, with the six divisional titles and a record of 72-19-7 (.791), unchallenged in the National Football League.

The Raiders finished the 1973 season with four straight victories, then defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers 33-14 at Oakland in the American Football Conference Playoffs. The season ended with a 27-10 loss to the World Champion Miami Dolphins in the AFC Championship game at Miami.

In registering their ninth straight winning season with a 9-4-1 record, the Raiders set six team records and equaled two others. The Raiders were No. 1 in offense in the AFC with an average of 340.9 yards per game and first in defense by allowing only 225.7 yards per game.

Oakland allowed just 175 points in 14 games, or 12.5 per game, for its best mark in 14 seasons, shattering the record of 233 points set in 1967 and equaled in 1968. It was the second best defensive mark in points allowed in the AFC and third best in the NFL. Seven Raider opponents were limited to one touchdown or less, and 11 of 14 foes scored less than 20 points.

Offensively, the Raiders had a record 547 rushing plays which resulted in a record 2,510 rushing yards. The rushing average of 4.6 yards per play equaled the mark first set in 1968 and repeated in 1972.

Other team records shattered in 1973 were for best passing percentage (58.1; old mark 53.5 in 1972), highest punting average (45.3; old mark 44.0 in 1967) and most field goals (23; old mark 21 in 1968).

The 1974 schedule includes three teams which made the NFL Playoffs—the Dallas Cowboys, Pittsburgh Steelers and Cincinnati Bengals. Other opponents will be the Detroit Lions, San Francisco 49ers, Buffalo Bills, Cleveland Browns, New England Patriots and the always-tough Western Division trio of the Kansas City Chiefs, Denver Broncos and San Diego Chargers.

Raiders Coach John Madden believes that Situation Substitution will continue in pro football.

"You now see more and more of it on offense," said Madden, who last year noted the use of defensive specialists for certain down-and-distances.

"For instance, the use of two tight ends, or an extra offensive lineman on short yardage, is being done regularly. Teams are using three running backs in a "full house" situation for certain plays, and running backs are being substituted on consecutive plays.

"This is so you can utilize your best people, and play the percentages. That's what defenses have been doing, and now the offense is getting more flexible. Situation Substitution takes a great talent and finds a place for him. A team can better utilize its strengths.

"In a sure passing situation, you might as well have your best receivers in the game. There's no point in fooling around," said Madden.

The '74 Raiders:

QUARTERBACK

Ken Stabler became the starter early in the 1973 season and went on to pilot the Raiders to a division title and earn Pro Bowl honors for himself. The 28-year old former Alabama star completed a record 62.7 percent of his passes for 1,997 yards and 14 touchdowns. His 88.5 rating as a passer was tops in the American Football Conference, and third best in the NFL. Against the Baltimore Colts, Stabler broke one of the NFL's oldest records as he completed 25 of 29 passes for 86.2 percent. The percentage mark erased the record of 85.7 set by Sammy Baugh in 1945. Stabler's 14 straight completions

was also the third best effort of all-time, exceeded only by the 15 straight by Len Dawson and Joe Namath, both in 1967.

Daryle Lamonica, now in his 12th NFL season at age 33, ranks 17th on the all-time list for touchdown passes with 163. Lamonica passed for 614 yards in 1973 and quarterbacked the Raiders' dramatic 12-7 victory over Miami, stopping the Dolphins' 17-game regular season winning streak.

George Blanda returns for his 25th season of professional football. Blanda, who will be 47 years old on September 17, did not participate at quarterback in '73 but scored 100 points by kicking on a record 23 field goals and 31 extra points. Blanda has played in a record 312 NFL games, including a record 196 in a row.

Don Milan, who saw action in the pre-season in 1973, is the other quarterback. He's a free agent from California Poly of San Luis Obispo. Milan is 6-foot-3, 196 pounds.

RUNNING BACKS

Marv Hubbard, Charlie Smith and Clarence Davis were the prime movers as the Raiders established a team rushing record of 2,510 yards in 1973.

Hubbard and Smith were the starters, with Hubbard rushing for 903 yards and six touchdowns, and Smith gaining 682 yards and scoring four times. Davis, with 609 yards, a 5.3 average and four scores, was the 14th-leading rusher in the AFC. With Hubbard ranked No. 8, and Smith at No. 13, the Raiders were the only AFC team with three rushers in the top 15.

Hubbard's 903 yards in '73 and 2,003 yards in the last two seasons pushed him to second place on the Raiders' all-time list of rushers. Hubbard now has 3,235 yards and a 4.9 lifetime rushing average. He had consecutive games of 121 and 115 yards at Houston and against Kansas City.

Smith climbed over the 3,000 yards rushing for his career and went over 600 for the fourth time in six seasons. He was also the Raiders fourth-best receiver with 28 catches for 260 yards and one touchdown.

Veterans Pete Banaszak and Bob Hudson also performed well for the Silver and Black in 1973, with Banaszak carrying a 5.8 average for his 34 rushing attempts. Jeff Queen and Warren Bankston were also available, and both are capable of playing tight end.

Newcomers are 3rd round draft pick Mark van Eeghen of Colgate, 11th rounder Harold Hart of Texas Southern and 12th round selection Noe Gonzalez of Southwest Texas State, plus free agent Eddie Richardson of Southern.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Fred Biletnikoff continued his climb as one of the all-time great receivers in 1973, pacing the Raiders for the sixth straight season. His 48 receptions for 660 yards and four touchdowns ranked him fourth in the conference and ninth in the National Football League. Biletnikoff's 408 lifetime receptions ranks him fourth among active players and 18th all-time, and his 6,512 yards receiving stands 22nd on the all-time list. He had eight receptions for 116 yards in Monday night game at Denver and four for 115 yards and touchdown in regular season game against Pittsburgh. Biletnikoff, now in his 10th season, has caught a pass in 91 of his last 94 regular season games and has played in 98 consecutive league games.

Mike Siani was the other wide receiver and had a fine season in '73. Siani caught 45 passes for 742 yards and three touchdowns in his second year, and he sported an outstanding 16.5 average per catch. Three times he caught six passes in one game, and at Denver turned three receptions into 116 yards, including an 80-yard scoring bomb from Ken Stabler. Siani has now caught 73 passes for 1,238 yards and eight touchdowns in two seasons.

Young Cliff Branch and rookie Steve Sweeney were also active for every game in 1973, with Branch pulling in 19 passes for 290 yards and three scores and Sweeney two receptions for 52 yards and one touchdown.

New wide receivers are fourth round draft pick Morris Bradshaw of Ohio State and free agent Alan Walker of Michigan.

TIGHT ENDS

Bob Moore, in his third pro season, stepped into the starting lineup and performed exceptionally well. The ex-Stanford star caught a pass

in the last 12 games in a row to finish with 34 receptions for 375 yards and four touchdowns. He caught six passes at Baltimore and five in games at St. Louis and against Pittsburgh. His receiving total was third best on the team. Moore has now played in 42 straight games for the Silver and Black.

Veterans Jeff Queen and Warren Bankston were the other active tight ends, with 6-foot-6 Kent Gaydos on the reserve squad.

Dave Casper, consensus All-America tight end from Notre Dame, was the Raiders' number two draft pick. He's the biggest tight end ever for Oakland at 6-foot-4, 240 pounds.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Raiders established a team rushing record in 1973 and paced the AFC in total offense and a key reason for this showing was the fine play of the offensive line of the Silver and Black.

Four of the five regulars—center Jim Otto, guards Gene Upshaw and George Buehler and tackle Art Shell—started every game.

Upshaw and Shell, who have never missed a game in their pro careers, each were named to the AFC Pro Bowl team as starters. Otto completed his 14th year with the Raiders and finished the season with 196 consecutive games started at center. This is an NFL record, which Otto shares with teammate George Blanda. Upshaw has played in 98 straight games; Shell in 84 straight. Buehler will be starting his sixth year and has improved each season.

Veteran Bob Brown and young vet John Vella shared the right tackle position in 1973, with Vella starting eight of the last 10 games (including the playoffs).

Also available are veterans Dave Dalby, who plays center and guard, and Paul Seiler, center and tackle. Dave is starting his third pro year; Seiler number six.

Holdover rookie Dan Medlin, at 6-3, 260 pounds, shows promise at guard.

The Raiders' No. 1 draft pick for 1974, Henry Lawrence of Florida A&M, has the size, speed and ability to make a contribution at tackle. He's 6-3, 255 pounds.

DEFENSIVE LINE

A now-established group of young veterans became a more solid unit and improved over 1972. Tony Cline (6-3, 244), a four-year fixture, played right end most of the campaign to make room for Bubba Smith (6-7, 265) on the left side. Smith was obtained from Baltimore prior to the pre-season.

Starting tackles for every game were Art Thoms (6-5, 260) and Otis Sistrunk (6-4, 255) for the second consecutive year. The tall Oakland front four netted its share of blocked passes and spilled opponent quarterbacks 40 times, highest total for the Raiders since 1969.

Four-year veteran Horace Jones (6-3, 255) started four games at his former right end post. Tackle Kelvin Korver (6-6, 270) a No. 2 choice in 1972, was the only Raider lineman to intercept last season, returning a deflected pass 12 yards at Baltimore.

Rounding out the group is Ben Davidson (6-8, 280) who was on the inactive list, after missing '72 by injury.

LINEBACKERS

Complimenting play of the front four were outside linebackers Phil Villapiano (6-2, 222) and Gerald Irons (6-2, 230) and middle linebacker Dan Conners (6-1, 230). The trio was honored as Associated Press NFL Defensive Players of the Week for their outstanding play against Miami as Oakland clipped the Dolphins victory string.

Villapiano was selected to the Pro Bowl. Conners enters his 11th season with 18 career fumble recoveries and 12 interceptions. Irons intercepted twice in '73 and Villapiano once to put their respective career totals at four and six after four and three years, respectively.

Monte Johnson (6-4, 235) a No. 2 draft choice, played in 13 games while second-year vet Joe Carroll (6-1, 220) and Gary Weaver (6-1, 224) a first year man, contributed. Mike Denney (5-11, 225) is a 13th round draft pick from Southern Mississippi.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Yielding just 12 regular season opponent touchdown passes and only two others in two post-season games, the '73 Raiders boasted a

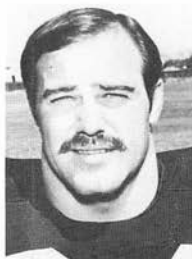

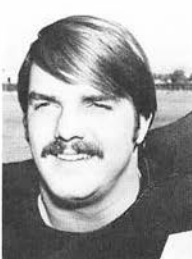

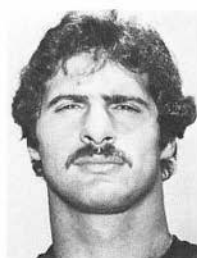

hard-hitting, anti-aerial outfit featuring both youth and veteran workmanship.

Entering their respective 12th and 10th campaigns in 1974 are cornerbacks Willie Brown and Nemiah Wilson. Safeties George Atkinson and Jack Tatum begin their seventh and fourth seasons. Brown was chosen to his fourth consecutive AFC Pro Bowl berth, Tatum to his first. Second-year man Alonzo (Skip) Thomas intercepted twice to add to the 10 thefts of the starting foursome, playing their third season together. The 12 opponent touchdowns was a Raider defensive record as was the 1,690 yards allowed passing. The old mark was 2,089 yards in 1970.

Veteran Jimmy Warren played in spot roles. Jackie Allen returns for his fifth year after being sidelined by injury in 1973.

Additions via the draft are No. 5 choice Pete Wessel (Northwestern), No. 9 Kenith Pope (Oklahoma), No. 10 Chris Arnold (Virginia State) and No. 15 Greg Mathis (Idaho State).

SPECIALISTS

Pro football's all-time leading scorer, George Blanda, added an even 100 points to reach his current NFL total of 1,842. He set a Raider single season record with 23 field goals en route to becoming the first pro performer to surpass 300 field goals for a career. The 24-year veteran led Oakland a seventh year in scoring and in this period has registered 703 points.

In his first professional season, Ray Guy received Pro Bowl accolades. The No. 1 draft selection from Southern Mississippi punted 69 times for a 45.3 average and second place in the AFC. His average was a Raider record and his long punt of 72 yards equals the second longest in Oakland annals. He also kicks off.

George Atkinson heads the punt returners with acknowledgement as one of football's finest. His 336 yards was superior to the club's meager 66 yards in 1972 and the most since the 1968 Raiders rolled for 666.

Leading the Raiders for the third time, three-year vet Clarence Davis paced Oakland in kickoff returns with 504 yards (26.5 average), including a 76-yarder, fourth-longest in Raider history. Newcomer Bob Hudson had a 25.0 average on 14 returns.

Goal posts were moved to the end line; kickoffs are from the 35-yard line; missed field goals are returned to line of scrimmage or 20-yard line, whichever is farther from goal line; and members of a team kicking from scrimmage (punt or field goal) cannot cross line of scrimmage until ball is kicked. Wide receivers are afforded better opportunity to go downfield by elimination of roll blocking and cutting of receivers and by restricting extent of downfield contact defenders will be permitted to have with eligible receivers. Offensive holding penalty, illegal use of hands and tripping infractions occurring in area of line of scrimmage and three yards beyond are reduced from 15 to 10 yards. Wide receivers blocking back toward the ball three yards from line of scrimmage cannot block below the waist. Tampa was awarded NFL franchise rights for entry fee of \$16 million. **June 4**—Seattle awarded NFL franchise rights for similar \$16 million entry fee. **July 1**—Raiders season ticket sale reaches club record 50,840.

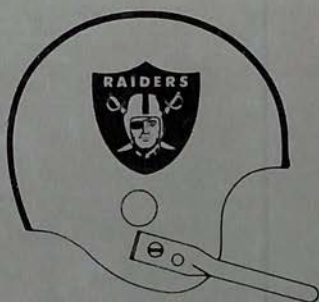
