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WAYNE VERNAL MILLNER

HEAD COACH

Born January 31, 1913, Roxbury, Mass.

At 39 one of the youngest head coaches in professional football, Wayne Millner this year embarks upon his first full season as bossman of the revitalized Eagles. He succeeds the late Bo McMillin and was named to the full-time post in January after handling the reins for the last 10 games of 1951 when illness forced McMillin to retire.

Millner is no stranger to these parts. "Double L," as he was known in his school days, played for one year at Malvern Prep of Philadelphia before going on to All-America stardom at Notre Dame. He brings with him a wealth of background and schooling



under the game's best mentors. Signed on as McMillin's top aide in March of 1951, Wayne Vernal Millner has been in professional football, as player and coach, since joining the old Boston Redskins in 1936. He entered professional football after three brilliant years with the Irish, winning All-America honors as an end in 1934 and 1935 and starring in one of Notre Dame's memorable games.

Millner caught a TD pass from Bill Shakespeare in the final seconds to give ND an 18-13 triumph over Ohio State in a blazing finish. His competitive spirit, so distinctive in his college and pro days, still is a big part of his makeup and an asset he instills into the players he coaches.

Interrupted by three and a half years service in Uncle Sam's Navy as a gunnery officer aboard an armed guard, Millner's professional span covers periods with the Boston-Washington Redskins, Chicago Hornets and Baltimore Colts. The latter two clubs were members of the now defunct All-America Conference. He was top end with the Skins from 1936 through 1941 and for the next three and a half years he was in service.

Discharged in 1945, Wayne rejoined the Redskins as an active player. He started 1946 as a player but before season opened was named end coach to assist Turk Edwards, then Washington head man. He remained in that position until 1949 when he resigned to rejoin Ray Flaherty, his first pro coach, with the old Hornets.

The year 1950 found Wayne with the Baltimore Colts and when McMillin was scouting around for an assistant early in 1951, he picked Millner.

Wayne started his coaching career by assisting Elmer Layden, his college coach, with the Notre Dame ends early in 1936. Then while with the Redskins, he helped Dutch Bergman at Catholic University in 1938, 1939, and 1940 and in 1946 was an aide to the master of the T, Clark Shaughnessy, at University of Maryland.

Wayne is married and makes his home with his wife, Sarah, in Drexel Hill, a Philadelphia suburb.

JAMES WILLIAM TRIMBLE

ASSISTANT COACH

Born May 29, 1918, McKeesport, Pa.

Big Jim or Tiny, as he is known, joined the Eagles' staff in 1951 right from the campus of the University of Wichita where he was head coach and athletic director . . . picked along with Millner by the late Bo McMillin and then renamed along with Wayne last January . . . although only 34 and in the professional league one year, Trimble has impressed veterans with coaching ability and sound knowledge of game . . . top tackle at Indiana in 1939, 1940 and 1941 and then spent four years in Navy as commanding officer . . . returned to assist McMillin in spring practice of 1945 and 1946

. . . went to Wichita as line coach under Ralph Graham in 1946 . . . he succeeded Graham as head coach and athletic director in 1948 and held both positions until resigning to take Eagles' post . . . won letters in wrestling as well as football in college and still grapples for exercise . . . lives with wife Patricia, and three children in Plymouth Meeting, Pa.



VICTOR LINDSKOG

ASSISTANT COACH

Born December 3, 1914, Roundup, Mont.

Often called "Mr. Center," Vic starts a long-looked-for career, that of coaching . . . rated the greatest offensive center in professional football, he is an exponent of the T formation and is compiling a book on it that, when completed, should be the most exhaustive one of its kind . . . as a blocker, Vic had no peer in the eight years he battled for the Eagles . . . he learned his football first under the old T master, Clark Shaughnessy, at Stanford where he was named All-America . . . he was a member of the famed Cinderella team that concluded an unbeaten season by winning the 1941 Rose Bowl championship . . .

Vic also is a handy guy with his dukes . . . he won the California State A. A. U. championship title in 1938 . . . proud of a well-knit physique . . . He lives with his wife, Doris, and young son in Drexel Hill.



FRANCIS XAVIER REAGAN

ASSISTANT COACH

Born July 28, 1919, Philadelphia, Pa.

A home town boy, Reagan makes his bow as coach and with the team he has admired ever since his high school days . . . gifted with an agile mind and a retentive memory, Reagan will have the respect of his former teammates because they know he knows whereof he speaks . . . the popular Irishman was one of Pennsylvania's brightest football stars in 1938, 1939 and 1940 as quarterback, ball carrier and punter . . . he was selected by the New York Giants for the 1941 season and played six games with the pros before leaving to join the Marines . . . After four years' service as captain of the Marine detachment aboard the USS New Jersey,



he returned to the Giants in 1946 . . . he picked up where he left off and helped lead the Giants to the Eastern Division title only to have his jaw fractured in seven places in the 1946 championship playoff with the Chicago Bears . . . for the next two seasons Reagan played mostly on defense for the Giants and it was his defensive ability that prompted the Eagles to make a deal for him in 1949 . . . makes his home with wife Katherine and four children in Roxborough, Phila. suburb.

TRIBUTE TO BO McMILLIN



Bo McMillin, January 12, 1895—March 31, 1952

Many fine tributes were paid Bo by sports writers all over the country. Bo was their friend. He was 'good copy.' He always had something to tell them for their columns or feature stories.

Alvin (Bo) McMillin was a man of character and class. He had a delightful drawl, an infectious grin and a warm, bubbling personality. His place in football history is secure. He will rank as one of the game's great players although he never gained equal stature as a coach despite his Coach of the Year honors one season. The genuinely beloved Bo died yesterday but his death was not unexpected. It had been an open secret in sport circles for a year that his days were numbered, ever since it had been discovered that he had cancer.

The discovery came shortly after he had succeeded Greasy Neale as the coach of the Philadelphia Eagles. Bo got to do little work on that job. He went home to wait for the end, unafraid and at peace with his God. Bo was always a God-fearing man. He never used profanity. He never took a drink. He never smoked. His was a model life.

The white-thatched McMillin delighted to tell a story of his boyhood days in Fort Worth, and Bo was a magnificent story-teller, much in the Will Rogers manner. He was on his way to church one Saturday afternoon—or so he drolly claimed—when he heaved a rock through a store window. A policeman collared him instantly.

"Why did you do that?" sternly asked the gendarme.

"Well, officer," drawled Bo, turning on the charm, "I wuz on my way to confession and I reckon I was jes' a mite short of material."

It's an apocryphal tale, of course, but Bo was never shy about going after material when he was a college coach. He pursued it with great industry. Once he tried to woo away a player from Pitt back in the days when the dour Jock Sutherland was turning out powerhouses for the Panthers.

The wily Bo phoned the boy's home. "Hello," snapped a voice at the far end of the wire. Bo went into his spiel, reciting the greater educational advantages that Indiana had to offer over Pitt. Bo thought he was convincing but soon began to get uneasy at the strange and uncomfortable silence at the Pittsburgh end of the line.

"Do you know whom you're talking to?" asked the voice. There was a note of asperity to it. Also a faint Scottish burr. The quick-witted Bo recognized it as belonging to Jock Sutherland himself.

"Yes, sir," he chuckled. "Now I dö." He hung up.

The gracious McMillin was a success as long as he remained in college coaching, but when he yielded a virtual lifetime tenure at Indiana for a fling at the professionals, he overreached himself. He just wasn't gaited for the play-for-pay boys and he failed with the Detroit Lions.

He was a true builder of character. But the best job he did in that respect was in building his own.

SPORTS PARADE

The Bible says that the span of a man's life is three score years and ten, and that if he attain four score years then is his strength but labor and sorrow, so soon passeth it away and he is gone.

Bo McMillin did not attain four score years. He was in his 58th year when he died on Monday, withered like the grass by a wasting disease. But in this comparatively brief life span, he was a dynamo that never stopped humming, a disciplinarian who never spared himself, a man who left his imprint on the lives of hundreds of younger men.

It was a day last summer at the Eagles' training camp in Hershey when the soft wind rippled the tall wheat on a nearby hillside and the sun glistened on the ripening stalks. It was a day that you like to remember, and with it Bo McMillin. For on that day, when nothing seemed out of tune, Bo was brimming with life as he crouched and leaped, showing the "pore little boys" how football should be played to perfection.

Football was the warp and woof of McMillin's existence, and while such an absorption might seem trifling to some people, to the little Praying Colonel it was Napoleon before Waterloo, Lee at Chancellorsville, and Petain declaring they would not pass at Verdun.

Men who played under McMillin will tell you that his was one of the most fertile minds in football, but sometimes this fertility had been his undoing because the seed was too widely sown. In his time, he had devised such intricacies as the "cockeyed" T, the five-man backfield and a formation in which the center faced the backfield. With his brilliance of tactics went an intense emotional drive and a flare for dramatics that could fire most of his players.

It was not the making of money that induced McMillin to spend practically all his life in football. He loved to abide in a world of "boys." Though they be grizzled and no more than a score of years his junior, the pros he coached were always "boys." And so were the startled newspaper gaffers who had come to interview him.

McMillin had his share of vanity, maybe sometimes more than his share. He took great pride in his physical condition, his hard, flat stomach and especially his legs that bulged and rippled like a ballet dancer's even when he was 57.

When in the throes of illness, he visited the Eagle's office last winter, his body had wasted away to 110 pounds and only his fervent religious faith prevented him from giving way to stony despair.

"Look at my legs," he whispered, "They have shrunk away to nothing. All I can do is to keep on praying and praying that I will recover my health and strength."

Bo was like that. Victory was his consuming desire, even when the adversary was as formidable as death.

VIEWS ON SPORT

Probably all the stories known here about Bo McMillin have already been told in this space. If they can bear repetition once more, this will be the last time. Bo died yesterday. He was a sweet little man who earned his rest; he was ill a long time. There was the tale Bill Crowell used to tell about the memorable game between Harvard and little Centre College, when Bo and his playmates in Uncle Charley Moran's troupe of unknowns went up to Cambridge and perpetrated what was then a monumental upset. Bill Crowell, who is dead now, too, was an official in Centre's famous victory.

"We'd all heard tell of Centre's 'Praying Colonels,' as they were called," Bill used to say, "and I suppose we all took it for granted the name was just a press agent's idea. Certainly it didn't occur to me that maybe these fellows actually did go in for prayers.

"I'd finished dressing for the game and I was passing the door of Centre's dressing room in the old Harvard Field House when I heard a voice inside. Somebody was making a speech, and he was letting go with the organ tones.

"Then the voice stopped and a moment later a lot of voices joined in a kind of chant. 'By golly,' I thought, 'they are praying,' and I called the other officials to hear what I was hearing. We eavesdropped for a few moments and then the chanting ended and we slipped out of the field house and stepped aside to let the team file out past us.

"They came out looking grim and exalted. This one was rubbing his eyes with a big fist and that one's face was tear-streaked. Bo McMillin was the last out. He was blubbing a little. He saw us officials and stopped.

"'Mistah,' he said, 'out theah on that field today, you're gonna see the _____ bunch of prayin' Southern _____ you ever seen in your life.'"

"It's hard today," Bill used to say, "to appreciate the magnitude of that upset but it was a national sensation at the time. And those guys Charley Moran had, there never was a cockier bunch.

"Centre had a tall, rawboned end with big knobby wrists that stuck this far out of his sleeves. When a Harvard play started he'd take one step forward and wait. If the play went away from him, he'd drop to one knee, rest his chin on a hand and watch with a pleased smile as the runner was smacked down. Then he'd call to the Harvard quarterback, "'Didn't do so good over there, youngster. Better come around and see me next time.'

"It was traditional with Harvard quarterbacks that they all called signals in the same way, accenting the second digit of each number. The quarterback would yell, 'twenty-three forty-six' and on 'three' and 'six' his voice would be a shrill squeak. McMillin listened to this several times. Then he called time out.

"'What do you want?' one of us asked him.

"'Jes' want to say,' he told us, 'that if that little old boy keeps on doing that, I'm gonna kiss him.'

"'You stop the game again like this,' I told him, 'and we'll kiss you for 15 yards.'"
