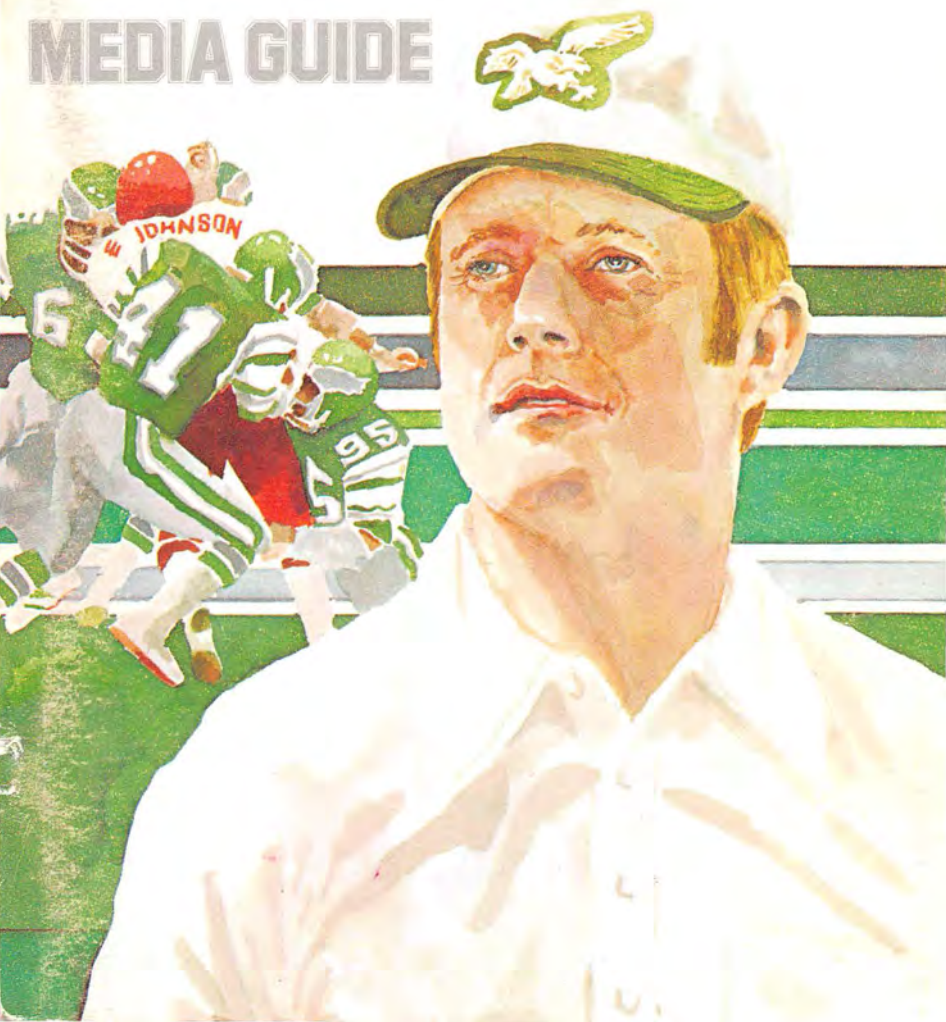

Veterans Stadium



The Eagles have played their home games in Veterans Stadium since 1971. Known to millions of sports fans in Delaware Valley as the "Vet," the stadium is one of the finest multi-purpose facilities in the nation.

Veterans Stadium is built on a 74-acre site in South Philadelphia and cost in excess of \$50 million. It was opened in 1971 by the Eagles' co-tenants, the Philadelphia Phillies of the National Baseball League. Both teams maintain their executive offices in Veterans Stadium.

The first Eagles' game at The Vet was a 34-28 pre-season win over the Buffalo Bills on August 16, 1971. The first championship season win came at the expense of the New York Giants, 23-7, on October 24, 1971.

Previous home fields for the Eagles in Philadelphia have been the Baker Bowl, Shibe Park (Connie Mack Stadium), Municipal (J.F.K.) Stadium and the University of Pennsylvania's Franklin Field.

In five previous seasons in Veterans Stadium, the Eagles have compiled a 14-20-1 regular season record. Seating capacity for football is 66,052.

EAGLES' OUTLOOK



After months of viewing films and talking with players and assistant coaches, Dick Vermeil has concluded that the Eagles have more talented football players than last year's 4-10 record would indicate.

"First off," he says, "I'm going to give every guy in a green uniform credit for being a pretty good football player or else they wouldn't be here."

"Now what we've got to do is find a way to make them better football players and that usually starts with self-motivation and self-discipline."

The ability to instill those qualities in football players has made Vermeil a successful coach on virtually every level. If he can do the same with the Eagles, the club could be a surprise factor in the stiff competition of the NFC's Eastern Division.

Offensively, the Eagles must develop a consistent rushing attack to complement what could be one of the NFL's most productive aerial games.

Last year the Birds ranked eighth in the NFC in rushing and scored a league low three touchdowns on the ground. Only Tom Sullivan, a durable four-year pro, surpassed the 500-yard mark. He carried 173 times for 632 yards to lead the team in rushing for the third straight year.

Sullivan's backfield mates, James McAlister, Art Malone and Po James, combined for 856 yards on 247 carries. Each of the top four has the potential to improve on his 1975 statistics.

Rookie draft choices at running back include 10th round selection Herb Lusk of Long Beach State, who ranked second nationally in rushing last year with 1,596 yards on 310 carries (5.1-yard average).

The passing offense fell to eighth in the conference last season despite having two receivers, All-Pro tight end Charles Young and wide receiver Harold Carmichael, among the NFC's top seven.

Each caught 49 passes and the third starter, second-year man Charley Smith, added 37 receptions including six for touchdowns.

"Our receivers are the strength of our football team at this time," says Vermeil.

The competition for starting quarterback honors should again feature Roman Gabriel and third-year man Mike Boryla.

Gabriel, beginning his 15th NFL season, underwent off-season knee surgery and a complete recovery would enhance his chances of regaining his starter's role.

Boryla gained a great deal of experience in his first two seasons as a part-time starter and enhanced his reputation by throwing two touchdown passes in leading the NFC to a come-from-behind victory in last year's Pro Bowl game.

The offensive line is a veteran group led by former Dallas All-Pro guard John Niland and fourth-year tackle Jerry Sisemore. Stan Walters is the other tackle while the other guard should come from among Bill Lueck, Wade Key, Tom Luken or former Redskin John Wilbur. With the exception of the final two games of last season, when Ron Lou stepped in, Guy Morriss has started every game at center since 1973.

Dennis Nelson, a former starting tackle at Baltimore, could be a factor on the forward wall along with 6th round choice Kirk Johnson, a 6-5, 277-pound product of Howard Payne.

Defensively, it is no secret that the number one priority is the upgrading of a pass rush that produced only 17 sacks of opposing quarterbacks.

"The defensive line could very well be the weakest area of our football team at this time," Vermeil says. "It is inexperienced and not as talented as we would like, but there is great room for improvement."

The Eagles did not begin selecting until the 4th round of the 1976 college draft but, when their turn finally came, they made two defensive linemen their first two choices. Mike Smith is a 6-4, 245-pound end from Florida, and 6-4, 240-pound tackle Greg Johnson is from Florida State.

Later selections included 6-3, 245-pound defensive end Carl Hairston from Maryland (Eastern Shore), and 6-2, 250-pound tackle Mike Gilbert from San Diego State on the 7th and 11th rounds, respectively.

Each of those rookies, along with a host of free agents, will get a close look as Vermeil attempts to shore up his first line of defense.

Over the past two seasons, strong tackle Bill Dunstan has been the Birds' most consistent lineman. He was joined last year by tackle Rich Glover and ends Will Wynn and Blenda Gay. End Don Ratliff and tackle Roosevelt Manning also saw some action.

The Eagles were dramatically stronger last season at linebacker and in the defensive secondary.

"The strength of our defense is definitely within the linebacker corps," Vermeil says.

All-Pro middle linebacker Bill Bergey is flanked by steady vet John Bunting and third-year man Frank LeMaster, who intercepted four passes last year, including one for an 89-yard touchdown.

The top subs have been veteran Dean Halverson and young special teams standout Tom Ehlers.

The Eagles' pass defense picked off 26 passes last year, second in the NFC behind Minnesota's 28. The secondary should again be solid with the return of five quality players.

Safeties Bill Bradley and Randy Logan return along with Artimus Parker, who intercepted four passes when he was given a starting opportunity when Bradley suffered a late season knee injury. Before missing the final four games, Bradley recorded five interceptions to tie cornerback John Outlaw for the team lead.

Joe Lavender, the other cornerback, picked off three passes and scored his third NFL touchdown with a 36-yard return against Washington.

The top specialists of a year ago, punter Spike Jones and kicker Horst Muhlmann, return to meet challenges from newcomers.

Jones, who averaged over 40 yards, will compete with 15th round draft choice Brett White of UCLA while David Ray, who scored 497 points with the Los Angeles Rams, has been added as a free agent kicker.

Muhlmann had a good season in 1975, finishing fourth among NFC kickers with 20 field goals in 29 attempts and 21 of 24 extra points.

"We would like to give Horst the opportunity to attempt more kicks by getting the ball into scoring range more frequently in 1976," says Dick Vermeil.

The head coach hopes to instill that kind of positive attitude in each of his Eagles' players by the time the regular season kicks off at Dallas on September 12.



LEONARD H. TOSE

Owner and President

When the Eagles won their last National Football League championship in 1960, Leonard H. Tose enjoyed the team's success as a fan and season ticket holder.

Now, as owner and president of the Eagles, he remains steadfast in his determination to return championship football to Philadelphia and the hundreds of thousands of loyalists who are among the most fervent sports fans anywhere.

"I and everyone associated with the Eagles' organization believe that we owe something to the fans of the Philadelphia area for their continued support," Tose says, "and we are determined to pay whatever it costs to reward that loyalty with winning football."

Leonard's interest in football was nurtured at Notre Dame before his graduation in 1937.

After army service with the military police, he joined his late father, Mike, and his late brother, Louis, in the successful family business, Tose Trucking, Inc.

With the trucking company, he has served in virtually every capacity from driver to Chairman of the Board, his current position. He is also president of the Patterson Canning Company.

Tose purchased the Eagles for a sum in excess of \$16 million in 1969 and since then he has labored tirelessly to build an organization that is first class in every respect.

"We believe that outstanding people and outstanding facilities are conducive to winning football," he says. "I am positive that our investments in quality will be repaid with quality football."

Besides his reputation as a businessman and as a sportsman, Leonard is well known for his many philanthropic endeavors, the foremost of which is the "Eagles Fly for Leukemia."

He became involved with the program when former Eagles' player Fred Hill, whose daughter Kim suffers from leukemia, requested his support in a fund-raising effort.

Since then, Kim is doing well and Eagles Fly for Leukemia, with Tose absorbing all administrative costs, has raised in excess of \$450,000 for the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. The eventual "Super Goal" is \$800,000.

Leonard has also lent his financial and administrative support to the high school football programs in the city of Philadelphia.

His personal donation of \$79,000 in 1971 helped insure the survival of the Philadelphia public school system's varsity football programs when financial difficulties threatened to end all extra-curricular activities.

In 1975, his financial support made possible the establishment of a Philadelphia high school all-star game.

The inaugural game, co-sponsored by the Eagles and the Philadelphia Daily News, drew over 14,000 fans and resulted in 25 student athletes receiving college football scholarships. This year's game was a similar success.

"We are proud to represent the city of Philadelphia in the NFL," Tose says, "and we are equally proud to be contributing members of our community."



JIM MURRAY

General Manager

In his seven years with the Eagles, Jim Murray has proven to be one of those rare people who can do many things well and do them at the same time.

That is probably the main reason Murray was named to the post of general manager by owner Leonard Tose in December, 1974 and later was rewarded with a new five-year contract by Tose in February, 1976.

Murray, 38, is the youngest GM in the NFL.

He joined the Eagles as assistant director of public relations in 1969 and was promoted to administrative assistant in 1971.

Jim is a native Philadelphian and a graduate of the city's West Catholic High School and Villanova University.

He graduated from college in 1960 and, at age 22, began work in organized baseball as business manager of the Tidewater Tides of the Sally League.

A stint with the Marine Corps Reserve followed and, upon discharge, Murray joined the St. Louis Cardinals' baseball organization as assistant general manager of the Cards' Atlanta Crackers affiliate. The team won the Little World Series in Murray's first season, 1962.

In 1964, Jim took a sojourn from sports and entered the restaurant business, first in Atlanta and later in Malibu, Calif.

He returned to the East and to athletics in 1966 when he was named sports information director at Villanova.

During his years with the Eagles, Jim has earned a reputation as a hard-working executive with the ability to conceive ideas and see them through to fruition.

He has taken leadership roles in various projects like the highly successful Eagles Fly for Leukemia drive, the introduction of the Eagles Highlights television show, and the club's continued support of Philadelphia's high school football programs.

In his less hectic administrative assistant days, Jim edited three prize-winning Eagles yearbooks and also used some of his scarce free time to serve as a color commentator on Villanova football and basketball radio broadcasts.

In extending Murray's contract for five years, owner Tose cited his performance in his first year as GM and, particularly, his contributions in acquiring the services of new head coach, Dick Vermeil.

"I deeply appreciate Leonard's confidence in me," Murray says, "and I am excited about the opportunity to work with Dick Vermeil in taking on our obvious challenge—that of moving the Eagles in an upward direction."

In his free time, Jim relaxes at his Rosemont, Pa. home with his wife, Dianne, and their four children: Karin, 17; Amy, 8; Jimmy Joe, 6 and Brian, 5.

Head Coach

When Eagles' owner Leonard H. Tose and general manager Jim Murray began their search for a head coach after the 1975 season, they listed certain qualities that any successful candidate would have to possess.

The new Eagles' coach, said Tose, would have to be a proven winner as a head coach; a man with experience in the NFL; an offensive innovator; and a motivator of proven ability.

Seven weeks after the search began, 39-year-old Dick Vermeil became the 14th head coach in the history of the Eagles' franchise.

Without exception, the intense young coach had exceeded all of the prerequisites that Tose and Murray had established.

As a head coach on the college and high school levels, Vermeil had established a 43-16-4 record, including a two-year mark of 15-5-3 at UCLA in 1974 and 1975.

In a total of four years with the Los Angeles Rams, Dick labored and learned the pro game under such coaches as George Allen, Tommy Prothro and Chuck Knox. In each regime, he enhanced his reputation as a coach on the move and as a man with the ability to communicate his philosophies to professional athletes.

His ability to motivate was conclusively demonstrated to a national television audience last New Year's Day when he led his underdog UCLA Bruins to a stunning 23-10 upset of Ohio State in the Rose Bowl.

"Dick is *THE* man we wanted for the Eagles' head coaching job," says Leonard Tose. "He is the one man we talked to who combined all of the assets we were looking for in our new coach."

Vermeil was born on October 30, 1936 in Calistoga, Cal.

After starring in four sports at the 125-student Calistoga High School, he continued his academic and athletic pursuits at Napa Junior College and later at San Jose State, where he earned his Master's degree in physical education in 1959.

That same year, he began coaching as an assistant at San Jose's Del Mar High School.

The following year, 1960, he became head coach at Hillsdale High School in San Mateo, Cal. and posted a 17-9-1 record there through 1962.

He moved to San Mateo Junior College as backfield coach in 1963 and returned to Napa J.C. as head coach in 1964, leading the school to a 7-2 record.

In 1965, Vermeil was hired as an assistant on the staff of coach John Ralston at Stanford. He coached the 1965 Stanford freshman team to a 4-0 record before becoming an assistant varsity coach through 1968.

Dick was hired by George Allen to coach the Rams' special teams in 1969 before joining Tommy Prothro as offensive coordinator at UCLA the following year.

When Prothro became head coach of the Rams in 1971, Vermeil returned as quarterback coach and was retained on the staff when Chuck Knox took over in 1973. Dick became head coach at UCLA in 1974.

Dick and his wife, the former Carolyn Drake, have settled in the Philadelphia suburb of Bryn Mawr with their three children, Richard, 18; David, 16 and Nancy, 15.

CHUCK CLAUSEN, Defensive Line

Chuck Clausen joins the Eagles for his first NFL coaching assignment after handling the outstanding defensive lines at Ohio State for the last five seasons. Clausen, 36 (June 23, 1940), is a native of Anamosa, Iowa. He graduated from the University of New Mexico in 1963 as a three-year letterman in football and wrestling. He began his coaching career immediately after graduation and worked on the high school level in New Mexico and California from 1963 through 1967. During that period, he also earned a Master's degree in physical education at San Jose State. In 1968, Chuck was defensive coordinator at New Mexico Military Institute and in 1969 he moved to the major college ranks at William and Mary under Marv Levy. He remained at that school for two more years under current New York Jets' head coach Lou Holtz, then joined the staff of Woody Hayes at Ohio State. The Buckeyes won Big Ten titles in four of his five years there and he developed All-Americans George Hasenohr, Pete Cusick and Nick Buonamici. Chuck and his wife, Betsy, have two daughters, Cari, 8 and Lisa, 6, and a son, Chad, 5.

DICK COURY, Wide Receivers

Dick Coury joins the Eagles with head coaching experience on the professional, college and high school levels. Dick was born in Athens, Ohio on September 29, 1929 and graduated from Notre Dame in 1951. He played freshman football for the Irish. After serving with the U.S. Army in Japan in 1952 and 1953, Coury began coaching at Mater Dei High School in Orange County, Cal. He remained there from 1953 to 1964, then became defensive coordinator at the University of Southern California in 1965. In 1968, he was named head coach at Cal State-Fullerton and remained there through 1970. He joined the Denver Broncos staff from 1971 to 1973 and spent the 1974 season as head coach of the Portland Storm of the World Football League. He was an assistant to Tommy Prothro at San Diego last year. Dick and his wife, Bonnie, have seven children and now reside in Mount Laurel, N.J. Son Steve, 18, is a freshman running back at Oregon State.

BILL DAVIS, Linebackers

In his first pro coaching assignment, Bill will work with Rod Rust in tutoring the Eagles' linebackers. Davis, 38 (July 21, 1938), spent the past four seasons (1972-76) as offensive backfield coach and assistant to the head coach at Michigan State. A native of Youngstown, Ohio, he earned a B.A. degree in English from Mount Union (Ohio) College in 1961. Bill earned Little All-American honors as a running back at Mount Union in addition to varsity letters in baseball and basketball. After three years as a high school head coach from 1964 through 1966 in Ohio, Davis moved to the college level as an assistant at Westminster (Pa.) College in 1967. He also holds a Master's degree in education from Westminster. The following year he became head coach at Adrian (Mich.) College where his teams were Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association co-champions in three of his five seasons. Bill and his wife, Joanne, will reside in Mount Laurel, N.J. with their three children.

JOHN IDZIK, Offensive Coordinator and Quarterbacks

Philadelphia native John Idzik is beginning his fourth year with the Eagles after previous NFL stops at Miami and Baltimore. John was retained from the previous coaching staff along with John Mazur by head coach Dick Vermeil. Idzik, 48 (June 25, 1928), attended North Catholic High School in Philadelphia before going on to the University of Maryland, where he won a total of seven varsity letters as a football and baseball star from 1947 to 1951. An 11-year college coaching tenure followed, with stops at Maryland from 1956 to 1959 and at the University of Detroit, where he was the final head coach in the history of football at that school. John began his pro coaching career as an assistant at Miami from 1966 to 1970 when he moved on to the Baltimore Colts. His stay in Baltimore was highlighted by the Colts' triumph in the 1970 Super Bowl. John and his wife, Joyce, have three children, Cynthia, Joyce and John, Jr. They reside in Hamorton, Pa.

KEN IMAN, Offensive Line and Special Teams

Ken Iman will be making his NFL coaching debut with the Eagles after a stellar 14-year playing career as a center with the Green Bay Packers and the Los Angeles Rams. Iman, 37 (February 8, 1939), is a native of St. Louis, Mo. and a 1960 graduate of Southeast Missouri State College. He joined Green Bay as a free agent in 1960 and played in NFL championship games with the Packers in 1960, '61 and '62 before being traded to Los Angeles for quarterback Zeke Bratkowski in 1964. He missed the entire 1964 season with the Rams with a broken ankle but went on to start 140 consecutive regular season games from 1965 through 1974. In 1972, his Los Angeles teammates voted him Most Valuable Player honors. He also started the 1974 NFC championship game with the Rams. Ken was traded by Los Angeles to St. Louis before the 1975 season but a past leg injury forced his retirement. Ken and his wife, Phyllis, live in Mount Laurel, N.J., with their four children, Susan, Karen, Betsy and Robert.

JOHN MAZUR, Defensive Coordinator and Secondary

John Mazur is beginning his fourth season with the Eagles after being retained from the previous staff by head coach Dick Vermeil. Mazur, 46 (June 17, 1930), is a native of Plymouth, Pa. and a graduate of Notre Dame, where he played quarterback from 1948 to 1951. He began coaching at Tulane (1955-57) after one year as a quarterback with Vancouver of the Canadian League and a two-year stint as a lieutenant in the Marine Corps. John spent 1959 through 1961 as an assistant at Boston University before becoming an aide to Lou Saban at Buffalo from 1962 through 1968. He joined the Boston Patriots in 1969 and became head coach of that team in mid-1970. Mazur resigned from that position after nine games of the 1972 season. John has done a consistently outstanding job with the Eagles' secondary in the past three years. Last year's interception total of 26 was second in the NFC. John and his wife, Bernadine, reside in Moorestown, N.J., with their two children, Cynthia and John, Jr.

CARL PETERSON, Administrative Assistant and Tight Ends

Carl Peterson begins his first NFL coaching assignment as administrative assistant to Dick Vermeil. He will also coach the tight ends. Carl has had a varied coaching background since graduating from UCLA in 1966. His grid career as a split end with the Bruins was ended by knee surgery after he had played two years (1963-64) at West Point. Carl began coaching in 1966 at Wilson High School in Long Beach, Cal. He moved on to Loyola High in 1967-68 before becoming head coach at Cal-State College at Sonoma from 1969 through 1971. In 1970, he was awarded a doctorate in Administration in Higher Education from UCLA. Peterson returned to his alma mater as a receivers coach under Pepper Rodgers in 1973. JOHNNY ROLAND, Running Backs

Johnny Roland, who rose to prominence on the gridirons of Missouri, will be charged with lending some of his running expertise to the Eagles' offensive backfield. Roland, at 33 (May 21, 1943), is the youngest Eagles' assistant coach. A native of Corpus Christi, Texas, he enjoyed an All-American career at the University of Missouri under Dan Devine before going on to an eight-year career in the NFL. He was a 4th round future draft choice of the St. Louis Cardinals in 1965 and was selected to the Pro Bowl after his rookie season. He was also selected to, but did not play in, the 1967 Pro Bowl. Johnny spent seven years with the Cardinals and concluded his NFL playing career in 1973 with the New York Giants. On October 2, 1966 in Philadelphia, he returned a punt for an 86-yard touchdown that still stands as the longest ever recorded against the Birds. After retiring, Johnny worked as an assistant to Dan Devine at Green Bay in 1974 and followed Devine to Notre Dame in 1975. Johnny is the father of two sons, Johnny, Jr., 11 and Jamie, 6. He resides with his wife, Florence, in Cherry Hill, N.J.

ROD RUST, Linebackers and Front Seven

Rod Rust begins his first NFL coaching assignment after an impressive career that included a six-year tenure as head coach at North Texas State, where his prize pupil was Pittsburgh Steelers' star Joe Greene. Rod, 48 (August 2, 1928), is a native of Webster City, Iowa. He played college football at Iowa State before graduating in 1950. After a two-year tour of duty with the Army in the Far East, Rust began coaching at various high schools in the Midwest. His first college coaching opportunity came in 1960 at the University of New Mexico. In 1963 he became an assistant at Stanford and remained there until he was named head coach at North Texas State in 1967. He remained there until 1972 when he moved on to the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian League as an assistant coach and defensive coordinator. HERMAN BALL, Director of Player Personnel

Herman Ball enjoys a reputation as one of pro football's most competent judges of player talent. Herman, 64, has been associated with the National Football League in some way for the past 32 years and has served in just about every capacity with the Eagles, Redskins, Steelers and Colts. Herman played guard at Davis-Elkins College from 1932 to 1934 before beginning his coaching career at high schools in Ridgeley, W. Va., and Cumberland, Md. In 1943 he joined the coaching staff at the University of Maryland and remained there until 1946 while serving concurrently for two years as a Washington Redskins' assistant. Ball went on to become head coach of the 'Skins in 1950-51. In 1955 he joined the Pittsburgh Steelers for a year before a seven-year stint (1956-62) with the Baltimore Colts, where his ability to evaluate talent was instrumental in obtaining the great John Unitas. He began his association with the Eagles as an assistant coach in 1964 and was appointed to his present position in 1969. JACKIE GRAVES, Assistant Director of Player Personnel

Jackie Graves, 50, begins his fourth season with the Eagles and second as assistant director of player personnel. 1975

Upset losses in the first two games set the stage for a disheartening 4-10 season that included three losses by field goals in the final seconds. Leonard Tose announced that the contract of head coach Mike McCormack would not be renewed for 1976. He and general manager Jim Murray then began an exhaustive search for a new coach that ended with the appointment of 39-year-old Dick Vermeil of UCLA on February 8, 1976. On-the-field highlights for the 1975 Eagles included twin wins over the Washington Redskins for the first time since 1961. Second year wide receiver Charley Smith emerged as a game-breaker and second year linebacker Frank LeMaster was a defensive standout. Tight end Charles Young was selected to play in his third straight Pro Bowl and second year quarterback Mike Boryla, a late substitute in that game, led the NFC to victory with two 4th period touchdown passes. The Eagles compiled a respectable 7-7 record despite a six-game mid-season losing streak that cost them a legitimate chance at a playoff berth. The Birds rebounded from that slump to win their final three games behind the quarterbacking of rookie Mike Boryla, a spring acquisition from Cincinnati. That team also provided the Eagles with middle linebacker Bill Bergey, who arrived during training camp for two first draft choices and one second choice. Bergey enjoyed All-Pro honors at the end of his first season in Philadelphia and played in the Pro Bowl along with tight end Charley Young, who became the third straight Eagle to win the NFC receiving title. Young caught 63 passes for 696 yards. Owner Leonard Tose named former administrative assistant Jim Murray to the post of general manager at the end of the season. 1969

1969 was totally the year of change for the Eagles. Owner Jerry Wolman sold the team to trucking tycoon Leonard Tose for \$16,155,000.00. Tose replaced General Manager-Head Coach Joe Kuharich immediately after the purchase. He named Pete Retzlaff, the former Eagle All-Pro tight end, as his General Manager. Retzlaff then picked Jerry Williams, an ex-Eagle player and Assistant Coach, as the Head Coach. MEDIA INFORMATION

PRESS BOXES: The Eagles maintain three press boxes, designated A, B, and C, on the 4th level of Veterans Stadium. Admission to these press boxes is strictly limited to those individuals holding credentials issued by the Eagles' Public Relations department. No other media identification credentials will be honored. With the exception of field photographers (see below), all news media should enter through the press gate (Spectrum side of stadium) and take the elevator to the 4th level.

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS: News media representatives on assignment who do not hold season press box credentials should request single game credentials in advance by writing or calling the Eagles' Public Relations office, Veterans Stadium, Philadelphia, Pa. 19148 (phone 215-463-2500). Credentials reserved in advance can be picked up at the press gate (not the Will Call window) two hours before the scheduled kickoff. Members of the media covering a visiting team should arrange to acquire their credentials through the visiting team's PR department.

TELEVISION AND RADIO: Network television and visiting radio facilities are located on the 4th level between press boxes A and B. Network television credentials will be issued through the network game producer while visiting radio credentials will be issued through the visiting team's PR man unless other arrangements have been made in advance.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field photographers with the proper credentials should enter the press gate and take the press elevator to the 1st level where special identifying arm ribbons are issued in the southwest corner of the stadium (off the playing field). All field photographers must wear both a credential and the appropriate ribbon. There is also a photo deck located on the 4th level. Space there is extremely limited and is available only on a reserved basis. Field photographers and anyone else holding a field credential are cautioned that the bench area inside the respective 35-yard lines is off-limits to all non-playing personnel. Field photographers must also remain at least six feet behind the sideline at all times.

LOCKER ROOMS: Admission to the home and visiting locker rooms after the games is limited to those individuals holding credentials issued by the Eagles. There is no admission to the locker rooms before or during a game.

PRESS CLUB: The Eagles provide food and beverages in the Press Club behind Press Box A before, during and after each game. Admission to the Press Club is limited to those holding game credentials. No one else is permitted in the dining area.
