**OWNERSHIP/ADMINISTRATION****JEFFREY LURIE**

OWNER/CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



On May 6, 1994, NFL owners voted to approve the sale of the Philadelphia Eagles from Norman Braman to Jeffrey Lurie. The approval came exactly one month after Lurie had reached an agreement to purchase the club for what was then the highest sum ever paid for a professional sports franchise. "It has been a life-long dream to own a professional football team," Lurie said following the owners' approval. "To own one in one of the greatest sports cities in America - Philadelphia - is the culmination

of that dream."

Just one-and-a-half years later, Lurie was named NFL Owner of the Year by *The Sporting News*. Wrote TSN's Bill Plaschke, "The most decorated [owner] should be Lurie, who in his first full season has led with his heart as much as with his head. And the results are impressive: a playoff team, happy fans, and even the dreaded 'S' word, 'stability'.... Not that Lurie is afraid of breaking down barriers. In making inexperienced Ray Rhodes only the third African-American head coach in NFL history, Lurie risked criticism that he was making either a token hire or an ill-advised one. As it turned out, Rhodes [became] Coach of the Year.... Lurie is friendly and accessible. Before one game, you might spot him walking around the field, talking to fans in box seats. Before another, you might find him in the parking lot [joining in with fans at] tailgate parties."

By the start of the 1996 season, the Birds – under Lurie's leadership – had inked two of the NFL's most sought-after free agents in successive offseasons: RB Ricky Watters from the 49ers in '95 and CB Troy Vincent from the Dolphins in '96. And by the end of that season, the Eagles – led by second-year head coach Rhodes – had reached the playoffs for the second straight year.

This winter, the Birds continued to implement an aggressive, strategic approach to free agency, again adding young, ascending stars to the roster – unrestricted free agents such as center Steve Everitt (Ravens) and linebacker Darrin Smith (Cowboys), as well as the league's top young kicker, Chris Boniol, a restricted free agent also from the Cowboys. Clearly, Lurie has seen to it that Philadelphia has become a place where some of the NFL's rising stars want to be.

The club's improvement in all areas is unmistakable. Wrote Kevin Noonan of the *Wilmington News Journal*, "... Lurie has changed the team's fortunes on the field, and he's changed its image off of it, with help from Rhodes. Leigh Steinberg, an influential agent for more than 60 NFL players, said Lurie's leadership will keep the Eagles among the NFL's elite. Lurie, Steinberg said, 'is plenty smart and plenty ambitious. Jeff is going to be a major player in the NFL for a number of years'."

Long before his purchase of the Eagles was final, Lurie had begun analyzing how best to turn the Birds into a Super Bowl winner. During that process, he tapped into the knowledge and experience of prominent persons in various professional



sports leagues, each of whom had pieced together highly successful franchises and subsequently won numerous championships.

Once the 1994 season was complete, Lurie made swift and bold changes, clearly putting his stamp on the Eagles organization and pointing the franchise in a new direction. From the start, Lurie clearly defined the mission of the organization: to win the Super Bowl. While he noted that the Eagles had experienced a degree of success in recent years, reaching the early rounds of the playoffs in the late '80s and early '90s, he steadfastly said it wasn't the type of success he was interested in. In fact, Lurie wanted to see the pieces put in place that would lead to a number of *championships*.

In keeping with this stated goal, the youthful, energetic Lurie personally began laying the groundwork for his club's future. In the process, Lurie took a number of major steps, moves that many observers feel will make the Eagles a championship contender in the years to come.

On February 2, 1995, Lurie made perhaps the biggest of those moves when he hired San Francisco's dynamic defensive coordinator, Ray Rhodes, as the 19th head coach in Eagles' history, replacing Rich Kotite. Lurie wanted a coach who would be able to build and lead his organization to Super Bowl championships. In Rhodes he found a man who was no stranger to a winning tradition. In his 12 seasons as a 49ers assistant, the Niners earned postseason berths 10 times, advanced to the NFC Championship Game seven times, and won an unprecedented five Super Bowls.

Says Lurie of Rhodes, who earned numerous Coach of the Year honors in 1995 and became the first Eagles head coach in history to lead the Birds into the playoffs in each of his first two years at the helm, "If you want to measure a coach's heart, I'd go with Ray's. He's obsessed with winning championships. He won five in San Francisco and he expects to win them here. I think he has all the ingredients of being a star head coach and it's because he's a great person. I think behind all the speeches and discipline and the fighting attitude, is a guy who is very comfortable with himself. He brings that across to his players and to the whole organization. I think, if you look at most successful sports franchises, there's a leader there that everybody can rally around and respect, and Ray's that type of guy.

"Ray represents the epitome of who and what I wanted to bring to the Eagles. The discipline, the winning tradition that Ray brings, as well as his ability to relate to players and his ability to recruit players is outstanding. Once I was able to interview Ray, the choice was automatic."

More significant moves came when Lurie, Rhodes, and the Birds' front office put into practice the type of bold, aggressive moves Lurie had vowed his organization would make when he purchased the club. First, in March of 1995, the Eagles signed Pro Bowl running back Ricky Watters. One month later, Lurie and Rhodes oversaw an Eagles' draft that included seven trades, the biggest of which saw the Birds swiftly and decisively move up in the first round in order to select defensive end Mike Mamula with the seventh pick overall.

In 1996, Lurie saw that the Birds continued their aggressive approach, again signing one of the NFL's most sought-after free agents, cornerback Troy Vincent. The signing of Watters and Vincent enabled Philadelphia to become the only team to sign a transition player away from another club in successive seasons.

Lurie's efforts have not gone unnoticed.

"It's very evident," said current Miami Dolphins head coach Jimmy Johnson, "that



Jeffrey Lurie is going to do whatever it takes to get Philadelphia to a Super Bowl - he emphasized that when he hired Ray Rhodes, because Ray has the same type of attitude. Looking around the organizations in the NFL, I think the combination of Jeffrey Lurie and Ray Rhodes is as fine a combination as there is, as far as a couple of individuals totally committed, and not just being satisfied with winning games and getting to the playoffs. They're going to be relentless, as far as getting to the Super Bowl, and that's a credit for Philadelphia."

Lurie's desire for the Eagles to be bold and aggressive is something deep seated. "Growing up," said Lurie, "I admired the Celtics franchise of Red Auerbach. Players were proud to be playing for the organization. He was a model for me.... I admire the coaches that have bold dreams, that are not afraid to reach out and look for alternatives. I like owners and managers that don't necessarily make the easy choices, the safe choices, the ones the media would approve of."

In his two years as owner, Lurie also has overseen the restructuring of the player personnel department, a process he began on May 17, 1994, his first official day as owner, when he said, "The top priority is for us to become the best organization in terms of information gathering and talent evaluation. Toward that end we will certainly increase the scouting capacity on both the college and pro levels."

To help facilitate this information gathering process Lurie named as the club's director of football operations, Dick Daniels, a man who earned four Super Bowl rings with such successful organizations as the Dolphins and Redskins. Lurie also modernized the club's computer systems. Evidence of such is the new opponent/player analysis software programs now used by both the coaching and scouting staffs, as well as the new editing capabilities installed in the club's video operation.

The hiring of Daniels, who, like Rhodes, brought with him a handful of Super Bowl rings, was noteworthy in another respect, as well. Daniels, again like Rhodes, is African-American. The significance was unmistakable. Lurie was indeed practicing the philosophy he espoused when he purchased the club - making the Eagles a model franchise in terms of hiring the best, most qualified people, regardless of color. Wrote Bonitta Best of *Pro Football Weekly*, "Maybe teams [hiring head coaches and front office executives] should consider giving Jeffrey Lurie a call. Lurie has organized his own version of a Rainbow Coalition. He has whites, blacks, Hispanics, and women in decision-making roles on his team."

Added Kevin Noonan of the *Wilmington News Journal*, "Lurie said he didn't intentionally hire minorities, but the Eagles have more African-Americans in top positions than any other NFL team."

Shortly after taking over the reins of the Eagles, Lurie, now 45, described his philosophy of ownership as "a partnership - a partnership between the city, the fans, and the team."

Toward that end, Lurie and his wife, Christina, saw to it that the Eagles would make a difference in the Philadelphia community. Together, they oversaw the formation of Eagles Youth Partnership, the non-profit, charitable wing of the Eagles.

"You can really be a catalyst for change," said Lurie. "People look to the sports team owners as leaders in the city. We can try to make a better life for more people. Philadelphia is a great example of a city that has a lot of great things to offer, but there's an underclass that has fewer and fewer opportunities. So I really believe we can make a difference, especially with children."

Founded in 1995, the mission of Eagles Youth Partnership (EYP) is to improve the quality of life and enhance opportunities for underprivileged youth in the region



through education and health partnerships. EYP also raises funds for after-school programming through sponsored events like an annual carnival and through the sale of a special-edition calendar featuring Eagles players.

In addition to their work with Eagles Youth Partnership, the Lurie's interest in social issues is well known as both are extremely active in the local Philadelphia charitable community. Lurie himself was the 1995 recipient of the Small Miracles Award from the Center for Autistic Children. He also received the Torch of Liberty Award conferred by the Anti-Defamation League of Philadelphia in 1996. Their contributions towards enriching the lives of young children also earned the Luries the 1996 "Great Friends to Kids" award presented by Philadelphia's Please Touch Museum.

When Lurie purchased the Eagles he said, "I understand that NFL football is a form of entertainment, but I am also aware that nothing is more entertaining than winning."

The Birds' owner is certainly familiar with entertainment, having served as the president and chief executive officer of Chestnut Hill Productions, a Los Angeles-based film company, since forming it in 1985. Chestnut Hill has produced several movies, including the HBO hit, *Blindside*, and the widely acclaimed *State of Emergency*. Among the other films produced by the company are *Sweet Hearts Dance* (1988) starring Susan Sarandon and Don Johnson, *I Love You to Death* (1990) with Kevin Kline, Tracey Ullman, and William Hurt, and *V.I. Warshawski* (1991) featuring Kathleen Turner.

In addition to his film work, Lurie's other business interests include, among others, international publishing, specialty retailing, and movie exhibition through his investment in Harcourt General and its majority ownership of the Neiman Marcus Group and G C Companies. Today, Lurie is a member of Harcourt General's board of directors.

Lurie currently serves as a member of the NFL's Finance Committee, the League's Expansion Committee, and is a member of NFL Properties' Executive Committee. He also serves on the Board of Directors of NFL Charities and is a key figure locally as a member of the Executive Committee of the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is a director of the Autism Research Foundation in Boston, director of the National Alliance for Autism Research in Princeton, NJ, and has served as a trustee of Clark University.

Prior to entering business, Lurie was an educator, serving as an adjunct assistant professor of social policy at Boston University, and before that as a teacher at Westford (MA) Academy where he founded that school's alternative education program. As a student, he earned a B.A. from Clark University, a Master's in psychology from Boston University, and a Ph.D in social policy from Brandeis University. In his doctoral thesis, Lurie examined the depiction of women in contemporary film.

Born September 8, 1951, in Boston, MA, Lurie grew up in nearby West Newton. He now resides in the Philadelphia area with his wife and their two children.

## JOE BANNER

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT



In July of this year, the Eagles announced the promotion of Joe Banner from Senior Vice President to Executive Vice President. In this role, the native of Chestnut Hill, MA, serves as the top executive beneath team owner Jeffrey Lurie and will continue to be a primary figure in terms of supervising the day-to-day operations of the franchise while also helping shape the Eagles organization of tomorrow.

"While the media, and subsequently the fans, may primarily see Joe's function as that of an expert 'capologist,' that is very much an understated view of his role with the Eagles," said Lurie. "Joe's role is much larger in scope than that. He is, in fact, one who helped shape - and will continue to shape - the direction of this organization, both on and off the field, on a day-to-day basis."

The 44-year old Banner (2/13/53) has played a vital role in the operation of the Eagles since Lurie became owner of the club on May 17, 1994. Said Lurie at the time, "Joe will provide this club with a great deal of vision. He has an extremely diverse and successful background that he brings to the Eagles."

Now, just over three years later, Lurie said of his first hire as Eagles' owner, "Joe has been invaluable in terms of helping oversee the operation of the Eagles. He has been a major contributor in numerous ways."

Indeed, Banner has played an extremely vital role in restructuring the club's football operations as well as the front office - helping to make the Eagles one of the most progressive and dynamic organizations in all of sports.

During his first year with the club, one of Banner's most significant contributions was aiding Lurie in the hiring of head coach Ray Rhodes, who went on to become the 1995 NFL coach of the year and the first Eagles coach to lead the club to the playoffs in each of his first two seasons at the helm. Banner also played a significant role in restructuring the player personnel department, as well as in modernizing the club's computer systems on all levels.

In subsequent years he also oversaw the hiring of a corporate sales & marketing force well on its way to being recognized as one of the finest such departments in professional sports, and laid the groundwork for the well-received move of the club's summer training camp to Lehigh University.

In addition, Banner played a role in the formation of Eagles Youth Partnership, the club's highly popular and successful non-profit, charitable wing.

Today his most visible responsibilities include serving as the club's salary cap management expert, contract negotiator, and as a point person on the development of a new training facility and stadium.

Said Lurie when discussing Banner's promotion to Executive Vice President,



"Joe has done an extraordinary job. In fact, Joe's shrewd cap management and creative deal structuring enabled us to be the only club to sign a top quality, free agent 'transition' player away from another team in 1995 and 1996 (Ricky Watters from the 49ers in '95 and Troy Vincent from the Dolphins in '96)...Joe's work in this area has earned him recognition around the League and in the media as one of the top cap management experts in the NFL.

"In addition, Joe has developed a unique and fair approach to contract negotiations that has put this organization on new footing with agents and the players they represent. That was a key goal of mine when I purchased the club and Joe has helped see that to fruition. He also has been our prime liaison to the Governor's Stadium Task Force, has played a significant role in the hiring of our front office executives, and has been invaluable in his efforts to help the Philadelphia community.... In general, Joe Banner is one who has greatly helped shape the Eagles organization of today and one who will continue to help point us in the right direction."

After graduating from Denison University in 1975, Banner became a sports producer and reporter at Philadelphia radio station WCAU-AM 1210, and a national sports correspondent for the CBS Radio Network. After several years, he left the broadcasting industry and started his own business, Designers Clothing, Ltd. The company prospered and grew under Banner's guidance and in 1992 he sold the business.

In January, 1993, Banner began working with Lurie in the latter's quest to purchase the New England Patriots. When that transaction did not materialize, Lurie - again with the aid of Banner - successfully pursued the Eagles.

At the same time, Banner, who has a long history of community service, particularly through his devotion of time and effort to non-profit organizations, was extremely involved with groups such as Big Brothers, Children's Hospital of Boston and City Year, a youth-based organization that functions like an urban Peace Corps. City Year, in fact, is the program on which President Clinton is basing his National Service Program. Locally, Banner was instrumental in bringing City Year to Philadelphia and currently serves as a board member for that group.

Since returning to Philadelphia in 1994, Banner's commitment to the community has only grown. First and foremost, Banner was involved in the formation of Eagles Youth Partnership, the charitable wing of the Eagles that serves as a direct link between the team and the Philadelphia community in the areas of education and child health. In 1995, Banner, a longtime advocate of public service, was appointed by President Bill Clinton to a panel of ten judges nationwide who in turn selected the 15 recipients of the prestigious President's Service Award. Today, he also serves on the board of directors of the Maxwell Football Club and is actively involved with numerous other civic and charitable endeavors.

Banner and his wife, Helaine, reside in the Philadelphia area with their daughter, Jill (7) and their two sons, Jason (2) and newborn Jonathan.

**MIMI BOX**
**SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT-CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER**


Mimi Box first joined the Eagles in 1983 as Business Manager. Then in July, 1986, one year after Norman Braman had purchased the Eagles from Leonard Tose, Box was promoted to Vice-President/Chief Financial Officer.

Today, Box serves as the club's Senior Vice President/CFO, having been promoted in June, 1996 by current Eagles' owner Jeffrey Lurie. Said Lurie at the time, "Mimi is among the top people in her field. There are none better. When I purchased the Eagles from Norman Braman in 1994, she did a fantastic job



in terms of helping usher us through the transition period in as smooth and seamless a manner as possible. Since then, she has continued to be a key figure in the day-to-day operation of this team."

In this role Box oversees the daily cash management functions, budgeting, all aspects of financial reporting and is periodically called on to assist in the structuring of player contracts involving deferred compensation issues.

Mimi is one of the few financial officers in the NFL who has served under three ownerships.

Additionally, Box has served as the club's game day coordinator since 1983. Responsibilities of this position include serving as the club's main liaison with the game day security contractor, the first-aid and ambulance support teams, working with the City on stadium readiness, policies and issues of fan involvement.

Mimi also has served as treasurer of The Eagles Charitable Foundation, Inc., Eagles Youth Partnership, since its inception in January 1995. This not-for-profit charitable corporation is committed to improving the quality of life and enhancing opportunities for children and youth through education and health partnerships.

Box was recently elected to serve on the board of The Corporate Alliance for Drug Education ("CADE"), a not-for-profit corporation reaching out to young children while still in elementary school helping them to build the skills needed to make decisions to resist drug use.

Prior to joining the Eagles, Box, 46, worked for the Internal Revenue Service for 11 years. From 1972-79, she was a special agent in the Criminal Investigation Division in the Philadelphia District Office. During this time she was selected for the position of Federal Women's Program Coordinator, an Equal Employment Opportunity advisory position. During the next three years, she served in two managerial roles in the IRS Mid-Atlantic Regional Office and the Wilmington District Office.

Born in Philadelphia (12/21/50), Box attended the Academy of Notre Dame de Namur in Villanova, Pennsylvania before enrolling at Drexel University, where she earned a business administration degree in 1972 and where she played four years of varsity basketball.

Mimi and her husband, Bob, reside in West Chester, PA, with their two children Lauren, 16, and Daniel, 13.



## LEN KOMOROSKI

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, SALES AND MARKETING



On April 15, 1996, the Eagles made a significant addition to the club's front office with the hiring of Len Komoroski as Vice President-Sales and Marketing. Fifteen months later, with the Eagles sales and marketing efforts earning national acclaim, Komoroski was elevated to his current position of Senior Vice President.

"Under Len's guidance, we have developed one of the most aggressive and visionary sales teams in all of professional sports," said Eagles' owner Jeffrey Lurie. "Sales and marketing is an enormously important aspect of professional sports in the '90s and the Eagles will be at the forefront where those areas are concerned. We have made no secret of the fact that we want to be as aggressive in marketing our club as our players and coaches are on the field.

"When Len came on board, he was charged with overseeing - and, basically,



reinventing - our sales and marketing efforts. In the process he brought with him a level of skill and wide-ranging vision rarely seen."

"With the type of track record Len has, and with his knowledge of the marketplace, we anticipate him having a very positive effect on the Philadelphia Eagles," added Joe Banner, the Eagles' Executive Vice President. "His experience is so vast in terms of sponsorship, marketing, the leasing of luxury suites and club seats, facility development and management, and the maximization of revenue streams."

With the Eagles, Komoroski oversees all sales and marketing aspects of the organization, including corporate sales, broadcasting, Penthouse Suites, ticketing, advertising and promotions, merchandising, and event presentation, while assisting in the team's facility development and administrative efforts.

Over the past year, Komoroski has enhanced the organization's sales and marketing capabilities by recruiting some of the top marketing executives within their areas of concentration in the sports field. During that span, he also spearheaded the creation of the *Eagles Television Network*, developed one of the largest local television packages in the NFL, and brought in-house other properties such as publications. In addition, the franchise has dramatically grown its event capabilities through the Allegheny University Hospital/Eagles Training Camp, and the advent of "Eagles Fridays" and the "Eagles Fan Fair in FDR Park," as well as created a merchandising division.

Komoroski came to the Eagles from the Cleveland Lumberjacks of the International Hockey League, with whom he served as the club's Senior Vice President-Chief Operating Officer. In that role, Komoroski oversaw all business operations for the franchise, including sales and marketing and financial and administrative functions while also serving as an alternate governor for the team. He also was a minority shareholder of the club.

During his first season with the Lumberjacks, the franchise realized a 60% increase in attendance - the largest such year-to-year increase in professional hockey, as well as a 300% gain in corporate sales revenue. The over 350,000 fans who attended 1995 'Jacks games helped the club set a Cleveland pro hockey single season total attendance record, which spans 45 years of pro hockey in the market. While with the 'Jacks, Komoroski was a member of the IHL's Marketing Advisory Committee, and was also runner-up in the League's executive of the year vote.

Prior to his tenure in Cleveland, Komoroski spent six and one-half seasons with the NBA's Minnesota Timberwolves and their facility, Target Center, serving in a senior management role during the startup of both entities and later as the senior sales and marketing official for both groups. It was with considerable input and guidance from Komoroski that the Target Center became one of the first facilities in professional sports to bear a corporate name from its inception. During his tenure there, the Timberwolves set an NBA all-time attendance record with an average of 26,000 fans per game during their 1989-90 inaugural season and annually ranked among the NBA leaders in both attendance and corporate revenues.

Under his direction, the Wolves were also highly acclaimed for their broadcast, game presentation, and advertising and promotional efforts. He also oversaw the organization's efforts for the 1994 NBA All-Star Weekend at Target Center. During the last two years of his tenure there, the Target Center was tabbed as one of the top six facilities in the nation for gross revenues and event activity by Pollstar.

Komoroski also oversaw an eight-state region as a regional manager for the Miller Sports Group in 1987-88, developing and supervising Miller's relationships



with the NBA, NFL, NHL, Major League Baseball, NASCAR, National Hot Rod Association and minor league baseball properties. Prior to Miller, Komoroski was an assistant general manager of the Minnesota Strikers of the Major Indoor Soccer League from 1986-87. From 1982-86, Komoroski performed in various sales and marketing management positions with the Pittsburgh Civic Arena Corporations, the NHL's Pittsburgh Penguins and the MISL's Pittsburgh Spirits.

A graduate of Duquesne University, Len and his wife Denise have three daughters, Kristin, Kelly, and Jamie.

"There is no question that Len is among the very best in his field," said Banner. "He came to us with an extensive and highly successful background in marketing and sales, not the least of which included his work on opening the Target Center in Minneapolis and the integration of a franchise into the Gund Arena in Cleveland. We feel Len's extremely creative and imaginative style and, in particular, his wealth of experience with new facilities will help us achieve our long term goals. It's also somewhat flattering to think that, in Len, here is someone who set aside an ownership interest in a sports franchise to be a part of our vision for the future of the Eagles."



## DICK DANIELS

DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS



On February 19, 1996, Jeffrey Lurie announced the hiring of Dick Daniels as the club's director of football operations.

"Ever since I bought this franchise, one of my top priorities was to hire a football staff that has a proven track record throughout the years," said Eagles' owner Jeffrey Lurie. "Having been involved with organizations that took part in seven Super Bowls and won four of those, Dick Daniels certainly fits that mold. A top notch talent evaluator, he will be a key addition to our organization."

The 52-year old Daniels had worked with the San Diego Chargers since 1/25/90, when he was named the Chargers' assistant general manager under Bobby Beathard. With the Chargers, Daniels assisted in contract negotiations and in scouting college talent.

Daniels also worked with Beathard during two stints with the Washington Redskins, serving as the Redskins' director of player personnel under Beathard from 1978-84 and again from 1985-89. In 1984, Daniels left the Redskins to become Vice President of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Express of the United States Football League, but returned to Washington in 1985 when the USFL folded. During his one season in LA, the Express posted a 10-8 record and participated in two playoff games.

Daniels began his NFL scouting career in 1972 under Beathard, then the Dolphins' director of player personnel. He scouted for Miami until joining the expansion Tampa Bay Buccaneers as head scout in 1975. Daniels also worked in the scouting department of the San Francisco 49ers from 1976-77.

During his 24-year tenure as an NFL administrator/scout, Daniels has been involved with seven Super Bowl teams. In three trips to the Super Bowl with Miami, another three with Washington, and one with San Diego, Daniels earned four world championship rings.

A former defensive back with the Dallas Cowboys from 1966-68, Daniels partic-



ipated in the 1966 and '67 NFL championship games. He also played with the Chicago Bears from 1969-70 and with the Miami Dolphins in 1971.

As a collegian, Daniels was a running back and defensive back at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Oregon, where he earned a degree in physical education in 1966.

Richard Bernard Daniels was born on 10/19/44, in Portland, OR, and participated in football and track for the Jefferson High Democrats in Portland, where he set a state record in the long jump as a senior. Dick and his wife, Gloria, have two daughters, Sunde' (19) and Whitney (16).



## VIC GREGOVITS

### VICE PRESIDENT OF SALES



Gregovits, who joined the Eagles' front office this in April 1996, spent the previous five years with the 1995 American League champion Cleveland Indians as that club's director of ticket sales. During his tenure there, Gregovits' efforts helped the Indians set franchise records for both season and group ticket sales as the team made an enormously successful move from Cleveland Stadium into the new Jacobs Field. He also was responsible for the sale of luxury seating and suites. Prior to his stint with the Indians, Gregovits spent 1987-90 as a ticket account executive for the NBA's Cleveland Cavaliers. A product of Robert Morris College in Pittsburgh, PA, Gregovits got his start in professional sports in the Major Indoor Soccer League, working for both the Minnesota Strikers and the Pittsburgh Spirit.

"Vic helped make baseball history in Cleveland where he was an instrumental figure in the Indians' move from Cleveland Stadium into the enormously successful and popular Jacobs Field," said Eagles' Senior VP Joe Banner. "Last year the Indians became the first major league club ever to sell out an entire season prior to opening day, not only in terms of regular seating but with regard to suites and club suites as well. Undoubtedly, his experience with opening a new facility is a very valuable asset."

Gregovits, a native of Pittsburgh, is married to the former Patty Lech. They reside in Lumberton, NJ.



## SARAH HELFMAN

### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR EAGLES YOUTH PARTNERSHIP



When Eagles owner Jeffrey Lurie and his wife, Christina, established Eagles Youth Partnership (EYP) in 1995, they named Sarah Helfman as its Executive Director. Already, Helfman has shaped the new non-profit, charitable wing of the Eagles into a powerful vehicle through which the Eagles, their players, and the program's corporate partners can make a meaningful difference in children's lives.

Focused on enriching the health and education of youth in the Philadelphia region, Eagles Youth Partnership develops and administers programs that address hardship at its core. In September, 1996, in conjunction with Eagles' first round draft pick Jermaine Mayberry and Wills Eye Hospital, EYP launched the Eagles Eye Mobile. To date, it has provided free eye exams and prescription glasses for nearly 1,500 children in low-income neighborhoods and this year the Eye Mobile will



make a far greater impact.

Reaching even farther into the community with new initiatives, the 1997 season will see EYP implement a new project called "Eagles Read," a literacy program led by Eagles players. The program will involve employees from EYP's corporate partners as reading "coaches" for elementary school children who are entered in our "4th Down Reading Clubs." EYP will pilot the "4th Down Reading Clubs" in the Chester schools and plans to reach more than 100,000 children with our Eagles read brochure and televised public service announcements.

"Sarah's energy, her commitment, and her drive," said Jeffrey Lurie, "have helped make Eagles Youth Partnership one of the most innovative and dynamic non-profit organizations in Philadelphia. Sarah has been with EYP since its inception. She hit the ground running and her pace has not slowed since. Her commitment to EYP extends beyond a professional level. With Sarah, EYP and its direction is an intensely personal commitment. That is why she has been, and will continue to be, such a driving force behind EYP's focus — helping improve the health and well being of youngsters in the Philadelphia region."

Entering only its third year of existence, EYP already has made grants to approximately 40 after-school programs, has created the Top Achiever Award to recognize academic excellence among area high school football players, and is in the process of producing PSAs that feature Eagles players addressing the issues of literacy, wearing glasses, violence, smoking, mentoring, and volunteering.

Earlier this year, EYP and the entire Eagles organization played a vital role in the Presidents' Summit on America's Future, a three-day, Philadelphia-based summit on volunteerism led by former General Colin Powell, President Bill Clinton, and past presidents George Bush, Jimmy Carter, Gerald Ford, along with Vice President Al Gore and Nancy Reagan, wife of former President Ronald Reagan. The entire Eagles front office and 27 of the club's veteran players joined forces to construct a playground in the Hunting Park section of Philadelphia and a \$10,000 grant from EYP provided safety matting at the site to ensure the health and well being of area youngsters.

All these programs are supported through proceeds from the Annual Eagles Youth Partnership Carnival and from sales of the new EYP Calendar that features Eagles players with children from community organizations supported by EYP.

Helfman has devoted much of her career to working with young people. She has helped develop two National Service AmeriCorps Programs, has served as Chief Clinician of a residential treatment center for adolescent males in the juvenile justice system and as the lead advocate of a Rape Crisis Center.

On the corporate end, Helfman spent three years in Europe, advising corporations, groups, and individuals on their charitable giving in England, Ireland, and Russia.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Helfman earned her B.A. in English Literature and her master's degree in Counseling Psychology. She also holds certificates as a trainer of diversity, conflict resolution and perceptual processing. Having lived in four countries, she now is happily settled with her family in Haverford, PA.





## RAY RHODES

HEAD COACH



The Philadelphia Eagles' biggest personnel move of 1995 came long before the season ever started. That move came on February 2nd of that year when team owner Jeffrey Lurie named Ray Rhodes as the 19th head coach in Philadelphia's history. Eleven months and a playoff victory later, that decision resulted in numerous NFL coach of the year honors for Rhodes. By the end of the following campaign, Rhodes' 1996 Eagles had earned a second consecutive 10-6 mark and made him

the only head coach in Eagles history to lead the club to the playoffs in each of his first two years at the helm.

A key factor in Rhodes' success to date is, simply put, his own expectation of success. Lurie touched upon that when he said, "Ray is not satisfied with anything that doesn't have to do with winning championships. And he brings that type of expectation and a winning attitude into the locker room. With Ray, it's all about winning championships, nothing else."

Explains Rhodes, "I just want to be remembered as a guy who came in here and won a world championship and got the job done. All the fanfare and accolades I can do without. It's not about being a black man or being egotistical. I have been winning my whole life. It hurts, it hurts badly when I lose. I dread that feeling after a loss. It burns me up inside. Failure is not an option. If you kick my butt, you kick my butt. But the next time I see you, I'm going to get you. It's not about black or white. In this league, it's about winning."

As such, Rhodes, whose ultimate goal is a Super Bowl title, was less than satisfied with the Eagles' one playoff win in 1995, saying, "Winning one game in the playoffs and then being sent home to watch the rest of the post-season on TV ... you know what that is? That's being teased. And I hate being teased. This whole game is about winning the Super Bowl. That's why what we did [in 1995] only served to whet my appetite."

After a second consecutive 10-6 regular season record in '96 was marred by a loss to San Francisco in the Wild Card round of the playoffs, Rhodes referred to his club's regular season as being "no better than if we had gone 3-13. It's all about what you do in the post-season; it's about getting that big prize ... and we didn't get there."

It is not, however, the accolades and the trappings that accompany success that fuel Rhodes' passionate drive to succeed, his obsessive need to win. In fact, in a March '96 interview with Philadelphia Inquirer columnist Bill Lyon, Rhodes said, "You know what drives me? Not money, not ego. Fear of failure. You've got to have that fear."

That fear, that sense of urgency is something ingrained in Rhodes, who grew up in the small Texas town of Mexia (pronounced Muh-HAY-uh). "Nobody gave me anything my whole life," Rhodes recalled in a recent interview. "I've had to scratch, claw, and fight for everything I ever got. I'm still that way and I don't want to ever lose that feeling."

It is little wonder then that Rhodes' often colorful speeches to the Eagles are lib-



erally sprinkled with the word "fight." Said quarterback Rodney Peete, "I think Ray's favorite word is 'fight.' Whether it's dog fight, street fight, or alley fight [he just applies it to football]....Fight them for 60 minutes and there's no telling what's going to happen."

In all, however it was Lyon who best summed up Rhodes' "Super Bowl-or-bust" mentality when he wrote: "Over the years, I've heard a lot of other coaches and a lot of players offer variations on the same theme. But only a very few of them actually meant it. Ray Rhodes means it more than anyone I have ever heard.... His tone is not one of defiance or petulance. No, his tone is that of a man who not only doesn't shy away from pressure but invites it in and says: 'No, don't sit over there. Come 'round here, behind my desk. Right here, right over my shoulder.'"

Rhodes demands from his players that very same will to succeed. "I want to find out which guys are going to pay the price for us to be champions. I'm going to identify the people who are b.s.-ing and those who are not. If there are players who want to just pick up a paycheck and steal, I will unmask them.... If a player's commitment is not the same as mine, they won't be here...."

At the same time, Rhodes possesses an uncanny ability to relate to his players. That ability is part intuitive, part experience, and part learned. It is an ability culled from his experiences as an NFL player and coach, and from the classroom lectures he absorbed as a college psychology student.

Indeed, Rhodes prides himself on being able to read a player and understand how much a player can give him. "He can tell if a player has heart, or if a player has jive," said former 49er all-pro defensive back Ronnie Lott, now a football analyst for the FOX television network. "He can really look at a player and say, 'That guy can play.' Not so much because of the player's physical ability, but because of what's inside."

"All people will respond to Ray," explained former 49ers' head coach Bill Walsh, who gave Rhodes his first coaching job. "They'll appreciate his honesty, his directness, his passion, and his feel for the game...."

"What I liked about Ray was that he was completely committed. He demanded of himself and his men. He would have made a great general. Men respect him, because he's a no-nonsense guy who cuts right to the issue."

The 45-year old Rhodes, who served as San Francisco's defensive coordinator in 1994, joined the Eagles just one week after helping coach the 49ers to that franchise's unprecedented fifth World Championship.

In 1995, the Eagles' rookie head coach battled through major roster turnover, a slew of injuries to key personnel, an early season quarterback change, and a sluggish 1-3 start to put the Eagles back on the winning track. Following that 1-3 start, Rhodes replaced quarterback Randall Cunningham with Rodney Peete, inserted rookie CB Bobby Taylor into the lineup, and rallied the Birds who then rode the legs of running backs Ricky Watters and Charlie Garner to nine wins in their final twelve games. The Rhodes-led turnaround resulted in a 10-6 record, a berth in the playoffs as the NFC's top wild card team, and a record-setting 58-37 postseason defeat of the Detroit Lions at Veterans Stadium.

For all of his accomplishments and for those of the Eagles, Rhodes was named the NFL's coach of the year by the Associated Press, *Sports Illustrated*, *The Sporting News*, *Football Digest*, The Maxwell Club, Visa, and NFL Films. He was also honored by the United Press International, *Football News*, and the prestigious



Kansas City 101 Club as the NFC coach of the year.

When Rhodes ended his 7-year NFL playing career with the Niners after the 1980 season, he joined Bill Walsh's 49er staff as an assistant secondary coach and went on to become one of only four men to serve on the staff of all five of the 49ers' Super Bowl winning teams (George Seifert, Bobb McKittrick, and Bill McPherson were the others).

In Rhodes' 12 seasons as a Niners assistant, the team earned postseason berths 10 times and advanced to the NFC Championship Game on seven occasions.

In 1981, his first season as an assistant, Rhodes made an immediate impact, helping the Niners win Super Bowl XVI with three rookies starting in the defensive backfield - cornerbacks Ronnie Lott and Eric Wright, and safety Carlton Williamson. The following year, Rhodes was promoted to defensive backs coach, a position he held through 1991. During that period, he developed four Pro Bowl defenders, Lott, Williamson, Wright and safety Dwight Hicks.

Altogether, Rhodes a former wide receiver and defensive back with the New York Giants and 49ers of the 1970s, would spend 14 years as an NFL assistant, including 12 with the 49ers. In that time, he meticulously prepared for the day he would become a head coach. It was then, with the Niners, that Rhodes learned not to simply strive for success, but to expect it.

In 1994, his final season with the 49ers, San Francisco's explosive offense received an enormous amount of attention. But it was Rhodes, who - after re-joining the Niners on February 9th of that year following a two-year stint as Green Bay's defensive coordinator - quietly orchestrated a stellar defense filled with many new faces. In fact, of that unit's 11 starters, six were new to the team in '94. That reshaped unit went on to rank 2nd in the NFL against the run and 8th overall while racking up 35 takeaways and five defensive touchdowns. San Francisco's Rhodes-led defense also shut down the potent San Diego Chargers offense in Super Bowl XXIX.

Prior to his 1994 stint with San Francisco, Rhodes spent two seasons as the Packers' defensive coordinator under fellow ex-49er assistant Mike Holmgren. In 1993, Rhodes' second year in Green Bay, the Packers defense flourished, helping lead the team to its first playoff appearance since 1982, and sending a pair of Packer defensive players to the Pro Bowl for the first time in 15 years. In all, Rhodes took a unit that had ranked 10th in the NFL in '91 and elevated it to the #2 overall ranking in just two seasons.

Born 10/20/50 in Mexia, TX, Rhodes attended that town's Dunbar High before becoming one of the first minorities to integrate Mexia High at the start of his junior year. Recalled Rhodes some 25 years later, "There was a lot of unrest going on around the country. Being one of the first, it was important to me to encourage everyone to get along. I knew there would be some hard times, but with the upbringing I had, I felt I could get along with anybody.... My parents would tell me, 'Ray, you're no better than anybody else, but nobody is better than you either.'"

As a collegian, he spent two years as a running back at Texas Christian University before transferring to the University of Tulsa, where he was converted to a wide receiver and defensive back. Selected by the New York Giants in the 10th round of the 1974 NFL draft, he played wide receiver in his first three NFL seasons, includ-



ing 1975 when he led all NFC receivers with a 20.7 yards-per-catch average. Two years later, however, Rhodes was switched to defensive back by the Giants and won a starting job at cornerback. In 1979, he was sent to San Francisco as part of a four-player trade that also saw Tony Dungy, presently the head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, sent from the 49ers to the Giants.

Now, 17 years later, Rhodes and Dungy are again linked, having become the third and fourth African-American head coaches in modern NFL history, following the Raiders' Art Shell (1989-94) and Minnesota's Dennis Green (1992-present). In addition, Rhodes is one of seven former San Francisco assistants now serving as an NFL head coach. The others, with years as a 49er assistant listed in parenthesis, are the Patriots' Pete Carroll (1995-96), Cincinnati's Bruce Coslet (1980), Minnesota's Green (1979, 1986-88), Green Bay's Mike Holmgren (1986-91), Denver's Mike Shanahan (1992-94), and the Oilers' Jeff Fisher (1978-79).

Rhodes and his wife Carmen reside in Mt. Laurel, NJ. They have four daughters: Detra (11/4/70), Candra (5/25/76), Tynesha (9/10/79), and Raven (5/23/85).

*What kept Rhodes focused and grounded is a sense of mission - to turn the Eagles around - and a sense of responsibility to open the doors wider for African American coaches.*

*"I want to win a championship - everybody does - but as a black man I want to get that done because winning helps open the door," he said. "It's important that me and Tony Dungy and Denny Green do a good enough job where people will say, 'We're going to take a look at Emmitt Thomas, take a look at Sherman Lewis.' They ask me why we take losses so hard. Because when we lose, I'm not only letting myself down, I'm letting down a lot of people in life, depending on somebody to make a spark and make everybody proud."*

"He is why I'm an Eagle. I want to go out and do my best for him, almost more than for myself. It's nice to see African-Americans prosper like he has. You don't have a lot of black coaches in the NFL. And him winning Coach of the Year? That makes him second to none. When you study the history of guys like him, you realize they have overcome a lot. I respect that."

## ON BEING ONE OF THE FIRST MINORITY STUDENTS TO ATTEND MEXIA (TX) HIGH SCHOOL:

*When the doors of all-white Mexia High opened to everyone for the first time, a handful of kids from [Mexia's] all-black Dunbar High transferred. Rhodes, a junior, was one of them.*

*"There were no problems at all," said Bob Wright, a longtime writer and editor for the Mexia Daily News. "Some places they had fights and things, but not here, not at all. I attribute that to Raymond and other kids like him...."*

*"Nothing surprises me about Ray Rhodes. He was a leader from the day he was born. He had this big desire to excel at whatever he did."*

"There was a lot of unrest going on around the country. Being one of the first, it was important to me to encourage everyone to get along. I knew there would be some hard times, but with the upbringing I had, I felt I could get along with anybody.

"My parents would tell me, 'Ray, you're no better than anybody else, but nobody is better than you either.'"

## 1997 ASSISTANT COACHES



### BILL CALLAHAN OFFENSIVE LINE



Bill Callahan was named as the Eagles' offensive line coach on February 13, 1995. The 41-year old Callahan (born 7/31/56) had spent the previous five seasons coaching the University of Wisconsin's offensive line.

In 1995, his first season with the Eagles, Callahan's ability to adapt on the fly helped enable the Birds' rushing game to rank fourth in the NFL behind only Kansas City, Dallas, and Seattle. When his unit lost two starting tackles early on - one to a suspension and the other to a season-ending injury - Callahan reached into his bullpen and helped the Birds change their planned "West Coast" passing attack to one of the most feared rushing games in the league. Callahan's deft patchwork gave the Eagles a unique and successful mix of long-time NFL vets along with a rookie starting left tackle. One year later, Callahan's group helped the Birds' offense rank first in the NFC and fourth in the NFL (351.7 yards per game) en route to a second straight 10-6 record and a berth in the playoffs. In both '95 and '96, his line enabled Philadelphia to rank 2nd in the NFC in rushing.

Over his final two seasons at Wisconsin, Badger linemen earned nine 1st team All-Big 10 honors on units selected by the media and by the conference's coaches. Among the Badgers named to those All-Big 10 teams were Joe Panos, a 3rd round pick of the Eagles in '94, and center Cory Raymer, a 2nd round pick of the Redskins in '95 and UW's first consensus All-America in 13 years.

Prior to serving at Wisconsin, Callahan spent 1989 as the offensive coordinator at Southern Illinois where his unit set 18 school marks. Before that, he served a two-year stint (1987-88) as offensive line coach at Northern Arizona. Callahan began his coaching career at Illinois, serving first as a graduate assistant and then as a full-time assistant from 1982-87, coaching a variety of different positions including tight ends, offensive line, quarterbacks, and special teams.

A Chicago native, Callahan received a B.A. degree from Illinois Benedictine where he was a three-year starter at quarterback and an NAIA honorable mention All-America pick in 1976-77.

He and his wife Valerie reside in Mt. Laurel, NJ, with their four children, daughters Cathryn and Jaclyn and sons Brian and Danny.



## GERALD CARR

WIDE RECEIVERS



Gerald Carr, 38, came to the Eagles in 1995 after spending the previous 11 seasons coaching in the collegiate ranks.

Last year, in his second season with the Birds, Carr successfully oversaw a revamped receiving corps that included two new starters in veteran free agent acquisition Irving Fryar and second-year pro Chris T. Jones. Fryar went on to earn a trip to the Pro Bowl after setting personal career highs in TDs (11) and receptions (88, also an Eagles' single-season record). Jones, meanwhile, caught 70 balls for 859 yards and 5 TDs and became, in the words of TNT football analyst Pat Haden, "one of the emerging stars in the NFL." Overall, Carr's troops helped Philadelphia rank first in the NFC and fourth in the NFL in passing offense with an average of 234.1 yards per game.

Just prior to making the jump to the NFL's Eagles, Carr spent the 1992-94 campaigns as the quarterbacks coach at the University of North Carolina. During that time, he was responsible for the development of Tar Heel quarterback Jason Stanicek who set school records in virtually every passing category.

After beginning his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Southern Illinois in 1981, Carr spent '83 - '85 at Davidson coaching receivers and defensive backs. He then tutored quarterbacks and receivers at Akron for three years before moving on to Washington State as receivers coach from 1989-90 and then the University of Arizona as quarterbacks coach in 1991.

A native of Davidson, NC, Carr (born 6/28/59) starred at North Mecklenburg HS before moving on to Southern Illinois (1977-80) where he played quarterback and earned a degree in administrative science. He is a cousin of Mel Hoover, a wide receiver with the Eagles from 1982-84.

Carr and his wife Vanessa reside in Sicklerville, NJ, with their two daughters, Ashonti and Miteya.



## JUAN CASTILLO

TIGHT ENDS



Juan Castillo joined the Eagles' coaching staff on March 1, 1995, as an offensive assistant. In that role, he worked closely with coordinator Jon Gruden and the offensive position coaches assisting in game-planning, the studying of game tapes, and with various on-field responsibilities during the 1995 and 1996 seasons.

Now, in his third year with the Birds, Castillo will oversee the club's tight ends.

Castillo came to the Eagles from Texas A&M-Kingsville (formerly Texas A&I University), where he was the Javelinas' offensive line coach from 1990-94. During that time, Castillo aided in the development of five Division II All-America offensive linemen, including tackles Jermane Mayberry, the Eagles' 1996 first round pick, and Earl Dotson, a third round pick of the Green Bay Packers in 1993. He also served as a summer coaching intern for the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1994), Seattle Seahawks (1993), and Buffalo Bills (1992).

A former linebacker with Texas A&M-Kingsville and the USFL's San Antonio Gunslingers, Castillo began his coaching career as a graduate assistant with the



Javelinas before spending 1986-89 on the staff at Kingsville (TX) High School.

The 37-year old Castillo (born 10/8/59) is a native of Port Isabel, TX. He and his wife, Zaida, reside in Moorestown, NJ, with their two sons, Gregory and John.



## JON GRUDEN

### OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR



One of the first moves Ray Rhodes made when he took over the Eagles' head coaching reins in 1995 was to name Jon Gruden as the club's new offensive coordinator. As such, the then 31-year old Gruden became the NFL's youngest offensive coordinator.

In his role at the helm of the Birds' offense, Gruden, considered by many NFL coaches and executives to be one of the finest young minds in the game today, is responsible for all aspects of the offense.

In 1995, his first year with the club, Gruden's implementation of the "West Coast" offense - the attack made famous by the San Francisco 49ers of the 1980s and '90s - was hampered by early-season injuries to the club's starting right tackle and fullback and a suspension of the team's #1 left tackle. Undaunted, Gruden changed the pass oriented "West Coast" attack to what he jokingly referred to as the "Jersey Shore Offense." The successful switch, combined with the insertion of backup QB Rodney Peete into the starting lineup, enabled the Birds to turn their 1-3 start into a 10-6 finish and the top Wild Card slot in postseason play. Along the way, Philadelphia rode the legs of running backs Ricky Watters and Charlie Garner, who helped power the Eagles' ground game to a #4 ranking in the NFL behind only Kansas City, Dallas, and Seattle.

One year later, Gruden, Peete and another solid ground game got the Birds off to a 3-1 start before a season-ending knee injury sidelined the quarterback. As such, Gruden turned to free agent acquisition Ty Detmer, whose experience in four previous NFL seasons consisted of 21 pass attempts. Together with WRs Irving Fryar and Chris T. Jones and RB Ricky Watters, Gruden and Detmer led the Birds to a 10-6 record and a second consecutive playoff berth. In the process, the Birds' offense ranked first in the NFC in both total yards per game (351.7) and passing yards per game (234.1). Gruden's diverse attack also enabled Watters to rank fourth in the league in rushing (1,411 yards) while Detmer ranked fourth among NFC passers and Fryar and Jones pulled in 88 and 70 passes, respectively.

Before joining the Eagles, Gruden had spent the previous three seasons with the Packers who, under head coach Mike Holmgren, successfully implemented the "West Coast" offense. A Tampa, FL, native, Gruden first joined the Pack's staff as offensive/quality control coach in 1992 before being promoted to wide receivers coach in 1993.

Prior to becoming a Packers' aide, Gruden enjoyed a rapid ascent through the coaching ranks, making five different stops in a five-year span. He first served as the passing game coordinator at Southeast Missouri State for one year before moving to the University of the Pacific in 1989 where he coached wide receivers. He then became an offensive assistant with the San Francisco 49ers during the '90 season and worked closely with Holmgren, then the 49ers' offensive coordinator. In 1991, Gruden joined then-head coach Paul Hackett's staff at the University of Pittsburgh to tutor the Panthers' wide receivers.



A degree of Gruden's early success in football may be attributed to his being born into a football family - his father, Jim, is a regional scout for the San Francisco 49ers and formerly served as the backfield coach under John McKay with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. His brother, Jay, quarterbacked the Arena Football League's Tampa Storm to four championships between 1991-96 and now serves as the offensive coordinator of that league's Nashville Kats. Jay's wife, Sherri, formerly served as the Buccaneers' asst. director of sales and fundraising.

Born 8/17/63 in Sandusky, OH, Jon went on to the University of Dayton where he was a three-year letterman as a quarterback before graduating in 1985 with a degree in communications. He then began his coaching career by spending two seasons (1986-87) as a graduate assistant at the University of Tennessee.

Jon is married to the former Cindy Brooks, a one-time cheerleader at Tennessee. The couple resides in Mt. Laurel, NJ, with their sons, Jon David II (1/19/94) and Michael James (12/21/96).



## **CHUCK KNOX, JR.**

**DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT**



Chuck Knox, Jr. joined head coach Ray Rhodes' Eagles coaching staff on March 10, 1995, as a defensive assistant. In that role, he works closely with coordinator Emmitt Thomas and the defensive position coaches, assisting in game-planning, the studying of game tapes, and with various on-field responsibilities.

The 32-year old Knox (2/19/65) came to the Eagles from the Los Angeles Rams, where his father, Chuck, Sr., was head coach from 1992-94. In 1994, the younger Knox served as the Rams running backs coach and, in that role, worked closely with Pro Bowl RB Jerome Bettis. Prior to that he spent the '93 season as a Rams coaching intern, aiding the offensive assistants with computer analysis of opponents and with the Rams' self-scouting procedure.

As a junior at Orchard Park (NY) High School, Knox was a teammate of current Anaheim Angel, Dave Hollins. Knox was the club's leading rusher while Hollins was an all-league quarterback. After his father became the coach of the Seattle Seahawks the next season, Knox transferred to Bellevue (WA) High School for his senior year and earned all-state honors. He then was a three-year letterman as a running back at the University of Arizona from 1985-87.

Knox and his wife, Andrea, reside in Mt. Laurel, NJ.



## **SEAN PAYTON**

**QUARTERBACKS**



Sean Payton formally joined the Eagles as the club's first quarterbacks coach under Ray Rhodes on March 17, 1997. As such, Payton becomes the Birds' first full-time QB mentor since Doug Scovil served in a similar capacity with the club from 1986 until his death in December, 1989.

The 33-year old (12/29/63) came to the Eagles after a brief stint at the University of Maryland. Payton joined the Terrapins' staff this past winter after spending the 1996 season as quarterbacks coach at Illinois and the 1994-95 campaigns in a



similar role at Miami (OH). Prior to his stint at Miami (OH), Payton tutored All-WAC quarterback Tim Gutierrez at San Diego State in 1993. One year earlier, he served as the Aztecs' running backs coach, working closely with Heisman Trophy runner-up Marshall Faulk, currently of the Indianapolis Colts. The Naperville, IL, native began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at San Diego State in 1988-89 before moving on to Indiana State, where he served as the quarterbacks/receivers coach from 1990-91.

Payton earned a degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he threw for 10,655 yards, seventh best on the all-time NCAA Div. I-AA list. After leading all Div. I-AA quarterbacks in passing in 1986, the three-time Associated Press All-America selection had a brief stint in the Arena Football League in 1987 as a member of the Chicago Bruisers. Later that same year he signed on with the Canadian Football League's Ottawa Roughriders before entering the NFL ranks as a replacement player for the Chicago Bears during the three-game NFL players strike.

Payton currently resides in Marlton, NJ, with his wife, Beth, and daughter, Meghan (3/21/97).



## DAVID SHAW

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT



The 25-year old Shaw formally joined the Eagles coaching staff on March 17, 1997, as an offensive assistant. In this role, he will work closely with coordinator Jon Gruden and the offensive position coaches, assisting in game-planning, the studying of game tapes of the Eagles and their opponents, and with various on-field

responsibilities.

Shaw comes to the Birds fresh from the collegiate ranks, having spent the 1995-96 seasons at Western Washington and the early portion of 1997 at Idaho State. At Western Washington, he first tutored that school's outside linebackers before moving over to the offensive side of the ball in '96 to oversee tight ends, wide receivers, and punt returners. Shaw then had a one-month stint as wide receivers coach at Idaho State before jumping to the NFL ranks with the Eagles.

No stranger to Philadelphia or the NFL, Shaw spent the summer of 1996 with the Eagles as a training camp fellowship coach, working with wide receivers, tight ends, and punt returners. One year earlier he had worked with the Rams' linebackers as a coaching intern during St. Louis' 1995 training camp.

Born 7/31/72 in San Diego and raised in Union City, CA, he went on to earn a degree in sociology at Stanford, where he recorded 57 receptions and 6 touchdowns as a flanker and four-year letterwinner for the Cardinal. A multi-talented athlete, Shaw became only the third man in Stanford history to participate in three varsity sports (football 1990-94, track 1993, and basketball 1994).

He is the son of New Orleans Saints defensive backs coach Willie Shaw, and nephew of two-time USC All-America football player Nate Shaw.

Shaw is single and currently resides in Philadelphia.



## DANNY SMITH

### DEFENSIVE BACKS



Now in his third year with the Eagles, Danny Smith will tutor the club's defensive backs after overseeing the special teams the past two seasons.

Smith originally joined the Philadelphia staff after spending the previous eight years as an assistant at Georgia Tech. During his tenure at Tech, Smith served as the Yellow Jackets' assistant head coach from 1992-94, and also tutored defensive backs (1987-91, 1994) and wide receivers (1992-93) in addition to serving as the recruiting coordinator in 1994.

In 1990, Smith's fourth season as an assistant with the Yellow Jackets, Bobby Ross' Tech squad went 12-0 to earn the national championship (UPI) as the nation's only undefeated major college team.

Before joining the staff at Georgia Tech, Smith coached at The Citadel (defensive coordinator and defensive backs coach, 1984-86), William & Mary (defensive backs and ends, 1980-83), and Clemson (defensive backs, 1979).

Smith, now 40 (11/7/56), began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Edinboro (PA) State, where he received his bachelor of science degree in elementary and special education in 1977. He then spent two years at his former high school, Central Catholic, in Pittsburgh, PA, where he tutored current Miami Dolphin quarterback Dan Marino.

Danny and his wife, Elaine, reside in Mt. Laurel, NJ, with their two daughters, Erin, 17, and Courtney, 13, and son, Jason, 7.



## EMMITT THOMAS

### DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR



On February 7, 1995, just four days after becoming the Eagles' head coach, Ray Rhodes named Emmitt Thomas as his defensive coordinator. In Thomas, Rhodes found a man much like himself - a Texas native and former NFL defensive back who went on to earn multiple Super Bowl rings as an assistant coach.

Under Thomas, the Birds' defense brought a much more aggressive approach to the game in 1995 and '96.

In Thomas' first year at the helm, that approach enabled Philadelphia to rank second in the league in sacks (48) and third in takeaways (38). As such, the 1995 Birds' defense also ranked second in the NFL vs. the pass, allowing just 176 yards per game, and fourth overall in terms of total yards allowed (289.9 yds./game). Under Thomas's guidance that year, defensive end William Fuller (13 sacks) and linebacker William Thomas (7 interceptions) earned trips to the Pro Bowl while 1995 second round draft pick, cornerback Bobby Taylor, earned a spot on the NFL's All-Rookie Team.

Last year, Thomas' defensive unit helped the Eagles to another 10-6 record and a playoff berth while ranking third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL, allowing just 285.1 yards per game. Once again, Fuller and Thomas represented the Birds in the Pro Bowl while, for the second straight year, an Eagles defensive back earned NFL All-Rookie Team honors - free safety Brian Dawkins.



No stranger to Philadelphia and the NFC East when he joined the Eagles in 1995, Thomas had spent the previous 14 seasons as an assistant in the division, first with the Cardinals (1981-85) and then with the Redskins (1986-94).

After spending his first season with the Redskins tutoring wide receivers, Thomas spent the next eight years as Washington's secondary coach (the first six of those under head coach Joe Gibbs, the last two under Richie Petitbon and Norv Turner, respectively). During Thomas' tenure with the 'Skins, the team made five playoff appearances, won two NFC titles, and captured victories in Super Bowls XXII and XXVI. Under his guidance, the Redskins also finished among the top five in the NFL in interceptions twice between 1991-94.

Before joining the Washington staff, Thomas coached the Cardinals' receivers from 1981-85. In 1984, his pass catchers, led by Pro Bowler Roy Green, ranked first in the NFC in receptions. Thomas' first coaching experience came as defensive backfield coach at Central Missouri State (1979-80).

Born June 3, 1943, in Angleton, TX, Thomas, now 54, went on to become a quarterback and receiver at Bishop (TX) College (1963-65). He then signed with Kansas City as a free agent and made a successful transition to defensive back.

In his 13-year playing career with the Chiefs (1966-78), Thomas played in five Pro Bowls and in Super Bowls I and IV. He twice led the NFL in interceptions and finished his career with 58 INTs, including one in Kansas City's Super Bowl IV victory over Minnesota. In fact, Thomas holds the distinction of being the last AFL player to record an interception with his INT in the closing moments of that Super Bowl (the AFL and NFL merged the following year).

The father of two children, Derek and Debra, Thomas resides in Voorhees, NJ, with his wife, Jacqui. His son Derek is an assistant basketball coach at St. Louis University.



## MIKE TRGOVAC

### DEFENSIVE LINE



Thirty eight-year old Mike Trgovac (pronounced TER-guh-vak) enters his third season as the Birds' defensive line coach after spending the 1992-94 seasons as an assistant on Lou Holtz's staff at Notre Dame.

In Trgovac's first NFL campaign, the Birds' defensive line was among the league's best. In fact, the Eagles, whose 48 sacks overall led the NFC and ranked 2nd in the NFL, got an NFL-best 42.5 from their defensive linemen. One key factor to the consistent play of the defensive line was the rotation system implemented by head coach Ray Rhodes and Trgovac. Besides William Fuller, who earned a Pro Bowl berth, other strong contributions were turned in by Andy Harmon (11 sacks), and four players who had not seen any NFL action in 1994: Kevin Johnson (6 sacks), rookie DE Mike Mamula (5.5), Daniel Stubbs (5.5), and Ronnie Dixon.

One year later, with Harmon sidelined by a knee injury for all but two games, Trgovac's unit still ranked fifth in the NFC with 40 sacks. In fact, it was under Trgovac's guidance that Fuller logged another 13 sacks and a third straight Pro Bowl berth; at the same time, second-year pro Mamula emerged as a defensive force and free agent tackle Hollis Thomas earned All-Rookie honors from *Football News*.



During his tenure with Notre Dame, Trgovac vastly improved the Fighting Irish's defensive line and sent three players on to the NFL. Trgovac became the Notre Dame defensive line coach in 1992 and was promoted to assistant head coach a year later after the Irish's defensive front flourished under his guidance, tripling its sack total from the previous year with 36.

In 1994, he saw a pair of his players selected early in the NFL draft as San Francisco took tackle Bryant Young with the seventh pick in the first round and Chicago grabbed tackle Jim Flanigan in the 3rd round. As an NFL rookie, the well-prepared Young started every game for the Super Bowl champion 49ers, whose defense was under the direction of then-coordinator Ray Rhodes, now the Eagles' head coach.

Prior to his stint in South Bend, Trgovac served as the defensive line coach on staffs at Colorado State (1990-91), Navy (1989), and Ball State (1986-88) after beginning his coaching career by spending two seasons as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Michigan.

As a collegian himself, Trgovac started three seasons at middle guard for Bo Schembechler's Michigan defense from 1978-80. He twice earned All-Big 10 honors, was a second team All-America selection as a senior, and was a member of three Big 10 championship teams.

Trgovac went on to graduate from Michigan in 1982 with a degree in education. Today, he and his wife, Angela, reside in Marlton, NJ, with their three-year old daughter, Jordan.



## JOE VITT

LINEBACKERS



Entering his third season on Ray Rhodes' Eagles staff is linebackers coach Joe Vitt. A native of nearby Blackwood, NJ, Vitt returned to the Delaware Valley two years ago with 16 seasons of NFL experience under his belt.

In 1995, his first season with the Eagles, Vitt guided William Thomas to his first Pro Bowl berth and also was instrumental in helping the Eagles' defense rank 4th in the NFL in total yards allowed and 2nd in the entire league in pass defense.

Now 42, Vitt first broke into the league as the weight training coordinator for the Baltimore Colts (1979-81) before joining the Seattle Seahawks in the same capacity in 1982. One year later, when Chuck Knox, Sr. was made the Seahawks' head coach, Vitt became the club's special assignments coach and saw his duties expanded. He subsequently became Seattle's secondary coach for the next eight seasons. Vitt then followed Knox to the then Los Angeles Rams and from 1992-94 served as that club's assistant head coach/secondary coach.

Born 8/23/54 in Syracuse, NY, Vitt became a three-year letterman at linebacker for Towson State University in Maryland after attending Highland Regional High in Blackwood, NJ. Today, Joe and his wife, Linda, reside in Mt. Laurel, NJ, with their two children, Joe Jr., (17) and Jennifer (15).



## JOE WESSEL

### SPECIAL TEAMS



On March 17, Joe Wessel became one of three new assistants to join Ray Rhodes' Eagles coaching staff this year. With the Birds, Wessel will oversee the club's special teams units.

Wessel, 35, spent the past three seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals. After coaching the defensive line in his first season with Cincinnati, Wessel moved over to special teams in '95. In his very first season in that role, Wessel helped the Bengals' special teams rank second in the NFL (according to a survey by the *Dallas Morning News*), the highest ranking in team history and a marked improvement from the club's No. 22 ranking the season before.

After beginning his coaching career as an assistant at Louisiana State (1985-90) where he tutored the Tigers' linebackers and secondary, he joined Lou Holtz's staff at Notre Dame. From 1991-93 with the Irish, Wessel coached special teams as well as linebackers and defensive backs. During his nine years as a collegiate assistant, he coached in seven bowl games.

A 1984 business graduate from Florida State University, this former Seminoles free safety set an NCAA single-game record for blocked punts returned for touchdowns with two against Arizona State during his senior year. Wessel went on to be named by numerous publications as an All-America special teams player of the year following the '84 season. He played in four major bowl games with FSU.

Born 1/5/62, he is a graduate of Pace High in Miami. He spent the 1979-80 school year at Fork Union (VA) Military Academy, where he starred in both football and baseball.

Wessel and his wife Mary Gayle, an interior designer, reside in Cincinnati, OH, with their son, Louis (1).



## TED WILLIAMS

### RUNNING BACKS



For Ted Williams, who coached on the collegiate level for 15 consecutive years before moving to the NFL ranks, 1997 marks his third season with the Eagles and his first in the role of running backs coach. Williams' first two years with the Birds were spent overseeing the club's tight ends. During that time, 1996 second

round draft pick Jason Dunn earned first team NFL All-Rookie honors with a whopping 22.1 yards per catch average.

Prior to joining Ray Rhodes' Eagles staff, Williams, now 53, had most recently served as secondary coach at the University of Arizona in 1994. Before that he spent three years (1991-93) as offensive coordinator and running backs coach at Washington State and the previous 10 seasons as an assistant on Terry Donahue's UCLA staff, tutoring the Bruins' linebackers from 1980-86 and running backs from 1987-89.

During his tenure at UCLA, the Bruins went to eight straight bowl games and Williams aided in the development of All-America linebackers Ken Norton, Jr., and Carnell Lake, and heralded running backs Gaston Green, Eric Ball, and Mel Farr.

After serving more than a decade as a football coach, teacher, and athletic di-



rector at Compton (CA) High School, Williams was named head coach at Los Angeles City College in 1980 but a short time later accepted an offer from Donahue to join the Bruins' staff.

A high school basketball and baseball star himself at Centennial High in Compton, Williams earned a place in the Cal Poly Pomona University baseball Hall of Fame. A 1966 graduate of CPP with a degree in biological sciences and physical education, Williams went on to earn a Master's degree, a second undergraduate degree in zoological science, and his teaching-administration credentials from Cal State Los Angeles in 1968.

Born in Lyons, TX, (11/17/43) Williams and his wife, Theresa, have three sons, Darryl (27), Donald (10), and Daniel (1), and a daughter, Terri (25).



## MIKE WOLF

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



Mike Wolf, 32, joined Ray Rhodes' coaching staff in 1995 as the Eagles' strength and conditioning coordinator after spending the previous three seasons as the assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Minnesota Vikings.

Wolf began his career as a graduate assistant strength coach at Vanderbilt (1988-89). He then served as the head strength and conditioning coach at Lehigh University (1990) and as an assistant at Penn State for one season prior to joining the Vikings.

Wolf attended Penn State from 1983-87 and was a two-year letterman at center for the Nittany Lions.

A native of Allentown, PA, (5/15/65) Wolf was an all-state center at William Allen High before going on to Penn State. Wolf then earned a bachelor's degree in exercise and sports science from Penn State and a master's degree in health promotion and exercise science from Vanderbilt. His brother, Joe, a standout offensive lineman for Boston College, spent the past eight seasons as a player with the Arizona Cardinals.

ASST. STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING



An assistant to Mike Wolf since 1995, Tom Kanavy was promoted to assistant strength and conditioning coach on 1/1/97.

A native of Scranton, PA, the 27-year old Kanavy earned a degree in Exercise Science from Penn State, where he served as an assistant strength coach from 1992-95. He also worked in the same capacity at Miami (FL) in the spring of 1993. Kanavy is single and resides in Roxborough, PA.



## BARON BAPTISTE

PEAK PERFORMANCE SPECIALIST



Baron Baptiste was named to the newly created position of peak performance specialist by Eagles' owner Jeffrey Lurie on April 26, 1995.

In this position, Baptiste, one of the leading specialists in dynamic stretching and injury prevention, oversees the team's stretching regimen and nutritional intake.

The son of Walt Baptiste, a former Mr. America and Mr. Universe, Baron has taught classes on high performance nutrition and peak training specialties. A native of Beverly Hills, CA, Baptiste has designed a "power stretching conditioning workout" - a rigorous, super flexibility and strength-building series of poses designed to transform and increase joint mobility, agility, muscle flexibility, coordination and mental focus.

Baron has worked with entertainers like Raquel Welch, Ali McGraw, Helen Hunt, and athletes such as John McEnroe and Kareem Abdul Jabbar.

## JOHN WOOTEN

DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING



A success on a variety of levels in the NFL — as a player, a scout, and as an executive — John Wooten now begins his fifth season directing the Eagles' college scouting department. It was with Wooten in that role that the Birds' 1995 and 1996 drafts produced a trio of NFL All-Rookie Team selections -- cornerback Bobby Taylor, a second round pick in '95, as well as tight end Jason Dunn and free safety Brian Dawkins, second round choices the following year.

Immediately prior to joining the Eagles, Wooten, one of the highest-ranking minorities in the NFL, spent a year as the league's director of player programs, overseeing the league's services with regard to continuing education, financial planning, offseason internships, and family assistance.

Before working at the league office, Wooten spent 16 years with the Dallas Cowboys, beginning as a scout and eventually ascending to the rank of director of pro personnel. Wooten headed the Cowboys' player personnel department from 1989-91 and is widely credited with helping rebuild the Cowboys into a Super Bowl winner through key drafts and trades. In his tenure as personnel director, Dallas drafted such stars as quarterback Troy Aikman, center Mark Stepnoski, and fullback Daryl Johnston and defensive end Tony Tolbert. Former Cowboys head coach Jimmy Johnson, in particular, credited Wooten with also orchestrating trades that enabled Dallas to draft DT Russell Maryland and star RB Emmitt Smith.

Wooten's stint with the Cowboys followed 10 years in the NFL as a player and another as a player agent. Drafted by Cleveland in the fifth round in 1959, Wooten started nine seasons at guard for the Browns under head coaches Paul Brown and Blanton Collier and one season with Washington. So great was his impact on the Browns, he was named to the organization's all-time team by Cleveland fans in



1979. During his playing days, Wooten was selected to two Pro Bowls and, in 1965, was named all-pro while helping Cleveland to a 27-0 thrashing of Baltimore in the NFL Championship Game.

As a prep star, Wooten lettered in football and, as a basketball center, led Carlsbad (NM) High to two state championships. He then went on to an All-America career at the University of Colorado and, in 1989, was named to that school's all-century team.

The 61-year old (12/5/36) Wooten and his wife Beverly reside in Cherry Hill, NJ. They have two daughters, Gina and Lynette, and one son, John David.



## STEVE CROSBY

### COLLEGE SCOUT



Steve Crosby, 47, joined the Eagles in the spring of 1996 after spending five years with the Cleveland Browns organization. With the Browns, Crosby was that club's running backs coach for four years before assuming the role of offensive coordinator in 1994.

After his brief stint as a running back for the New York Giants from 1974-76, Crosby served as a scout for Don Shula's Miami Dolphins from 1977-78. From 1979 through 1982, Crosby coached the Dolphins' special teams and linebackers, while also continuing his duties in the personnel department. He then joined the Atlanta Falcons, working with quarterbacks and running backs from 1983-84. After tutoring the Browns' running backs in 1985, Crosby returned to Atlanta as quarterbacks coach in 1986 before switching to running backs coach (1987-89). He then served as a special teams and tight ends coach with the Patriots before re-joining the Browns.

Crosby and his wife, Lisa, have three children: Mathew, Jeffrey, and Lauren.



## JAKE HALLUM

### COLLEGE SCOUT



After serving as a regional scout for National Football Scouting from 1992-94, Jake Hallum became a member of the Eagles' player personnel department in June, 1995. In this role, he is the club's regional scout in the Southeast portion of the country.

Prior to joining National, with whom he scouted the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, and Mississippi, Hallum, now 58, had been a coach on the college level for 24 years. After serving as head coach at Morehead State (KY) from 1968-71, he went on to Maryland and served as the Terrapins' offensive line coach from 1972-81. He then served as an assistant at Kentucky (1982-89) before spending 1990-91 at Arizona State as an offensive line/tight ends coach.

Born 11/2/38 in Liberty, SC, Hallum went on to play guard and linebacker at Newberry (SC) College (1957-60) and later earned his master's degree from Murray State in 1965. ## MARC ROSS

### COLLEGE SCOUT



Marc Ross enters his first season as a full-time member of the Eagles' scouting staff. He will serve as one of the club's college scouts.

After a standout playing career at Princeton where he was an All-Ivy League wide receiver in both 1993 and 1994, Ross began his professional career working as a training camp intern in the New York Giants' public relations department in 1995. After completing his stint with the Giants, Ross was an administrative intern with the athletic department at Columbia University, and then with the player personnel department of the Eagles during the club's 1996 training camp.

## DAN SHONKA

### COLLEGE SCOUT



Dan Shonka is in his fourth year with the Eagles after joining the club as a regional college scout in 1994. The 44-year-old (9/19/52) native of Cedar Rapids, IA, first came to the Eagles with a wide range of football experience, having spent 1987-93 as an area scout for National Football Scouting, a service to which 14 NFL teams, including the Eagles, subscribe. He also spent a year (1983) covering the midwest region for the USFL's Philadelphia Stars (1983).

Shonka's coaching resume includes stints as a highly successful head coach at New Mexico Highlands (1984-86), Independence (KS) Community College (1981-82), and Highland (KS) Community College (1980). The University of Iowa grad helped turn around the football program at all three of those schools, each of whom had experienced a 1-8 campaign the year before his arrival. In fact, his New Mexico Highlands squads set over 50 team, conference, and NAIA records. Prior to that, Shonka was an assistant at Purdue (1977-78) and Rice (1976).

Dan and his wife, Peggy, are co-publishers of *College Football Preview*, an annual national sports magazine focusing on small college football. Shonka has also been active in greyhound adoption programs nationally and has helped get over 400 retired racers homes over the past seven years.

## MIKE LOMBARDI

CONSULTANT



The 38-year old Lombardi joined the Eagles scouting department on February 1, 1997. In his role as consultant, Lombardi will be called upon to help the club's player personnel department primarily in the evaluation of pro and college players.

Lombardi came to the Eagles after a nine-year stint with the Cleveland Browns, with whom he served as the AFC Central club's player personnel director from 1994-95. In that capacity, Lombardi oversaw both the Browns' college and pro scouting systems. During his tenure in Cleveland, the Browns earned four playoff berths, two division titles, and two trips to the AFC Championship game. In 1996, Lombardi worked for ESPN as a NFL draft analyst.

While with Cleveland, Lombardi orchestrated major player moves through trades, free agency, and the NFL draft, while negotiating many player contracts. He helped prepare the Browns for the first year under the salary cap by working under a team-imposed "ceiling" in 1993.

Lombardi was originally hired by the Browns in 1984, and, two years later, was promoted to pro personnel director. In 1994, he was then elevated to player personnel director. While in Cleveland, Lombardi was an advocate of the "black box" device, a sophisticated method the team used to test a player's agility and speed.

A native of Ocean City, NJ, Lombardi lettered in both football and baseball at Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, PA). He then attended Hofstra University (1978-81), where he played nose tackle for the Flying Dutchmen.

His first coaching stint came at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, where he served as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator from 1982-83. From there, he joined the San Francisco 49ers scouting department and coordinated all scouting reports in addition to scrutinizing collegiate talent in the northeast, southwest, and western regions.

## BOBBY DEPAUL

PRO SCOUT



Although he is entering his first season with the Eagles player personnel department, Bobby DePaul is no stranger to the NFL after serving the past eight seasons as an assistant coach in the league.

For the past three years, DePaul, 34, was an assistant coach for the Cincinnati Bengals, serving as a defensive assistant in 1994, defensive line coach in 1995, and as a staff assistant in 1996. In his one season tutoring the club's defensive linemen, DE John Copeland notched 9 sacks and DT Dan Wilkinson registered 8.

Prior to joining the Bengals, DePaul spent five seasons with the Washington Redskins as a member of Joe Gibbs' coaching staff and earned an NFL championship ring following the 1991 campaign when the 'Skins defeated Buffalo in Super Bowl XXVI.



DePaul played four seasons (1981-84) as a linebacker at Maryland before a knee injury during his senior season ended his playing career. He then spent the '85 campaign as an undergraduate assistant coach under Bobby Ross, who currently serves as the head coach of the NFL's Detroit Lions. James Collins enters his second season as the Eagles' head trainer. The 40-year old Collins joined the Eagles in 1996 after having spent five years as an assistant trainer with the Denver Broncos and the summer of '95 with the World League's London Monarchs as head athletic trainer.

Bartolozzi, who brings a wealth of knowledge and experience in orthopedic medicine to the Eagles, has been the head orthopedic surgeon for the Philadelphia Flyers since 1990. The 41-year old Bartolozzi (1/7/56) has also worked as the team physician for the Philadelphia Freedom soccer club, team orthopedic surgeon for Rowan (NJ) College, and assistant team physician for the United States National soccer team.

One of the most highly respected men in his field, Davis is a five-time recipient of the National Athletic Trainers' Association's "Professional Trainer of the Year" award. He also is a member of the Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame, the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame's Philadelphia Chapter and the Southwest Athletic Trainers Association Hall of Fame. In 1982, he received the Distinguished Service Award for Sports Medicine from the American Orthopedics Society for Sports Medicine. From 1971-89, Davis was the executive director of the NATA, an organization whose national headquarters office building in Dallas is named in his honor. ### UNIFORMS & LOGOS

On February 5, 1996, the Philadelphia Eagles took another step into the future as team owner Jeffrey Lurie unveiled the club's bold new logos, colors, and uniforms. As such, the Birds now wear Midnight Green – a new color *developed exclusively* for the Eagles – silver, black, and white on two new uniforms along with an updated helmet design.

On the helmets, a metallic Midnight Green replaced the traditional Kelly green as the base color. In addition, white Eagles wings – with bold new silver and black trim – go completely across the front of the helmet and around the sides. There are two different-colored pairs of pants and jerseys, one white and another Midnight Green. While the midnight green jerseys of 1996 featured the striking new Eagle-head logo on the sleeves, the white tops featured one green stripe and one black stripe. In 1997, however, the Eagle-head logo has been removed from the green pants and added to the white jerseys in place of the green stripe.

"The whole idea when we unveiled the new concepts in 1996 was to come up with something evolutionary, not revolutionary," Lurie said. "We wanted something that stuck to the tradition of the franchise, yet really contemporized it into something a lot bolder, a lot more powerful and a lot more exciting."

The new Midnight Green color replaced Kelly and similar shades of green, which had been the Eagles' trademark colors since 1941. The redesigned helmet marked the first change to the team's headgear since 1974 when the Birds switched from a white helmet with green wings back to a Kelly green helmet with white trim around silver wings.

Prior to the change introduced in '96, the Birds' game pants and jerseys were last altered in 1985. The changes made then involved removing the multi-striped pattern from the sleeves of both the home and road jerseys and replacing them with what was then the team's primary logo, a soaring eagle carrying a football in its talons.

After only three seasons in the NFL, Chris Boniol has proven himself to be one of the most accurate and consistent kickers in the league. In those three seasons, the Louisiana Tech product made 87.1% of his field goal attempts (81 of 93) and authored streaks of 26 and 27 straight field goals ... over that same three-year span, Boniol earned a reputation as one of the NFL's best big-game kickers, making 13 of his 15 postseason FG tries, including his last nine in a row ... enters 1997 look-



ing to extend *three* streaks -- one that includes a string of 27 successful FGs (the third-longest such streak in NFL history), one that has seen him score in all of his 48 regular season games as a pro, and another that has seen him make his last 46 FG atts. from 35 yds. and under ... originally began his career with the Cowboys in 1994 when he became the sixth Dallas kicker since 1989 and - after Ken Willis and Lin Elliott - the 'Boys' third rookie-free agent kicker since 1990 ... went on to become the first player to kick for the Cowboys for three straight years since Rafael Septien (1978-86) ... As such, Boniol became the league's first 1997 restricted free agent to ink a pact with a new club and the second "restricted" player to join the Birds in the three years of free agency (Kevin Turner from New England in 1995 was the other) ... **1996:** In his third pro season and his final campaign with the Cowboys, Boniol made 32 of 36 FG atts., including a 7-7 effort vs. Green Bay on 11/18 that tied an NFL record for most field goals in a game. He also drilled his last 27 regular-season FG atts. 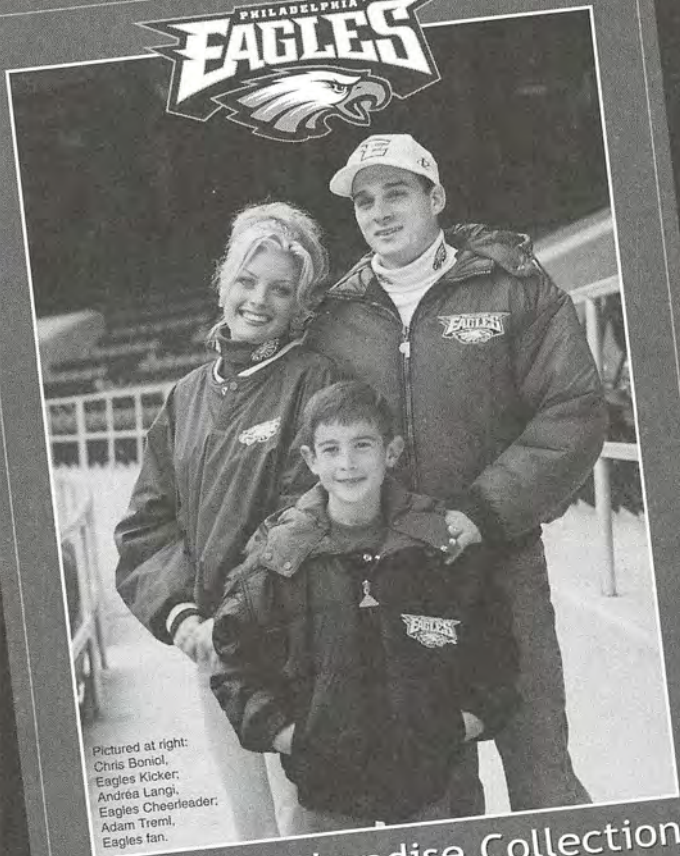

If you believe in the cliché that says, "good things come to those who wait," or in the one that says, "good things happen to good people," then Ty Detmer richly deserved the breakthrough season he enjoyed with the Eagles in 1996 ... the 1990 Heisman Trophy winner, Detmer joined the Eagles as a free agent prior to the '96 campaign after spending his first four NFL seasons as a backup to all-pro Brett Favre in Green Bay ... in that four-year span, Detmer saw action in just 7 games and threw just 21 passes; his first season as an Eagle, however, would enable him to write a marvelous new chapter in a theretofore undistinguished pro career ... a student of the "West Coast" offense, he took over at QB for the Eagles after starter Rodney Peete suffered a season-ending knee injury and went on to lead the Birds to a 7-4 record and a berth in the playoffs ... along the way, the 6-foot, 194-pound Detmer displayed an uncanny knowledge of the Birds' version of the "West Coast" offense and a mental and physical makeup that his mother, Betty, refers to as "Texas Tough" ... by season's end, Detmer was ranked fourth among NFC passers and had made many a convert out of critics who had claimed he lacked the size and arm strength to be an NFL passer ... **1996:** After having spent four seasons as a backup in Green Bay, Detmer stepped into the starting role after Rodney Peete was injured in game 5 vs. Dal. and helped the Birds earn a 10-6 record overall and a Wild Card playoff berth ... led the Birds to a 7-4 record as a starting signal caller and finished the season with an 80.8 QB rating (4th best in the NFC) ... went 376-225-59.8-12-15TDs passing as a starter and formed a solid combination with WR Irving Fryar who hauled in 67 of the 225 completions by Detmer in his 11 starts, including 9 TDs ... also displayed a knack for running the 2-minute drill when, in succession, he fired a TD strike to Fryar just before intermission vs. Mia., tossed another TD pass to TE Jason Dunn with 1:02 left in the first half vs. Car., and ran 6 yds. for a score with just 0:59 remaining in the 2nd qtr. at Dal. ... started the final preseason game vs. Pit (after Peete suffered a sprained knee at NE) and was very impressive ... then saw his first regular season action as an Eagle late in the 4th qtr. of a lopsided game 2 loss at GB ... three games later, in a Monday night contest vs. Dal, took over the QB reins in the 2nd qtr. after Peete's season ended when he tore the patellar tendon in his right knee while dropping back to pass ... then on 10/13 at NYG, made his first NFL start - it was, in fact, Detmer's first start since the final game of his collegiate career at BYU in the 1991 Holiday Bowl ... helped engineer a 19-10 victory over the Giants that afternoon in what would be the first of four consecutive wins for Philadelphia ... one week later, in the Birds' 35-28 win over Mia., put together the first of three straight spectacular outings by going 24-18-226 passing with a career-high 4 TD strikes ... those four TD tosses (38, 2, 12, and 36 yds., all to WR Irving Fryar) were the most by an Eagle QB since 11/4/90, when Randall Cunningham fired 4 vs. NE ... in a game 8 win vs. Car., Detmer with-

stood the Panthers' relentless blitzing and completed 23 of 38 passes for a career-best 342 yds. and 1 TD (the 342 passing yards were the most by an Eagle since Cunningham's 344 at NYG on 9/4/94) ... the Texas native followed up that effort by earning Miller Lite NFL player of the week honors after leading the Birds to a 31-21 win at Dal., the club's first win at Texas Stadium since 1991 ... in that game at Dal, was 33-19-217-0-1TD passing and registered the first rushing TD of his career on a 6-yd QB draw ... while the Birds' four-game win streak was followed by a three-game skid, Detmer continued to put up very impressive numbers - in a 24-17 loss vs. Buf., he recorded career highs in atts. (44) and cmps. (26) en route to a 315-yd, 2-TD effort; in a 26-21 loss to Wash., he went 33-21-251-1-1TD passing; then, at Ariz., he threw for 300-plus yards for the third time in his first seven starts (38-21-322-1-0TD) ... in two of those losses, Detmer marched his club inside the Bills' 5 and to the Redskins' 20 in the final seconds, only to see the Birds come up short ... helped end the skid by leading the Birds to a 24-0 win vs. NYG with 3 TD passes in a 33-25-284 effort ... together with an inspired Eagles' defense, helped lead the Birds back from 10-0 and 20-7 deficits at NYJ in game 15 when his 3 second-half TD passes included two strikes to Fryar, one of which was a 14-yd game-winner with 5:29 left to play ... **1995:** Stepped in for an injured Brett Favre (ankle) in the 2nd qtr. of game 9 at Minn. ## PRO CAREER

After establishing himself as one of the league's best young centers during his first four pro seasons with the Browns/Ravens, Everitt became the top priority of Philadelphia this past winter when the free agent signing period commenced. And when the Birds landed the 26-year old, 6-5, 290-pounder, team owner Jeffrey Lurie said, "With the signing of Steve we have made another key step in building a team that will help us achieve our ultimate goal - winning championships. We intend to be as aggressive off the field as we are on it and the acquisition of Steve Everitt affirms that commitment. For the third consecutive year, we've targeted and signed a young, ascending star who was the top player available at a particular position." Added Eagles' head coach Ray Rhodes, "He's the best young center in the NFL." ... indeed, Everitt's move to Philadelphia followed that of free agent transition players Ricky Watters and Troy Vincent, whom the Eagles lured away from the 49ers and Dolphins, respectively, in '95 and '96 ... a first round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1993, Everitt earned NFL All-Rookie team honors in his very first campaign and has never looked back ... **1993:** Was named to the NFL's All-Rook-



ie squad by *Pro Football Weekly*, PFWA, *Football Digest*, *College & Pro Football Newsweekly* and *Football News* after being the 14th selection overall in the draft and the first offensive lineman taken by the Browns in round one since Pete Adams in 1973 ... Cleveland obtained the pick they used on Everitt (along with the 83rd selection overall) from Denver in exchange for the Browns' first round pick (the 11th choice overall which the Broncos subsequently used to select Toledo DE Dan Williams) ... saw action at center and guard in the preseason before taking over the starting center job on opening day ... went on to start all 16 games as a rookie and along the way faced some of the league's toughest linemen, including Cortez Kennedy, Sean Gilbert, Ray Childress (twice), Ted Washington, and Tim Krumrie - not to mention banging heads with Michael Dean Perry in practice every day ...

**1994:** Earned second team all-pro honors from Tom Jackson's *Pro Football Update* after starting 15 of 16 regular season games and both playoff contests at center for the Browns ... anchored a line that permitted the league's fewest sacks, a team-record 14 ... also helped the offense ring up 340 points (Cleveland's highest total since '87) and propelled Pro Bowl back Leroy Hoard to 890 yards on 209 carries ... handled the long-snapping duties on placekicks as well ... added to his reputation as a tough, "throwback" kind of player in a narrow, week four win at Indy (9/25) - re-aggravated a pinched nerve in his neck in the second quarter and was apparently done for the day. **1995:** Started 14 of the 15 games in which he played for Cleveland, once again holding down the Brown's #1 center role ... was deactivated at Minn. on 12/9, one week after suffering a hamstring injury that sidelined him during the second half at SD ... helped the Browns hold Pitt. and Cin. without a sack on 11/26 and 12/17, respectively ... early on handled deep-snapping duty in place of the injured Brian Kinchen in consecutive games vs. KC (9/24) and Buf. (10/2) ...

In fact, Everitt is an accomplished artist and a quiet humanitarian who devotes much of his time to community service with little regard for fanfare ... earned a degree in fine arts from the Univ. of Michigan ... originally began building his art portfolio while in junior high school and today specializes in painting (abstract and surreal) ... has been a featured artist at Cleveland events that benefitted the art education programs of NOVA (New Organization for the Visual Arts) ... while with the Browns, frequently contributed time and effort to the Rainbow Babies and Children's Hospital of Cleveland; helped fund the hospital's art therapy program and, in addition, donated to the hospital a percentage of the proceeds generated from the sale of his prints ... today Everitt sponsors two college scholarships at his alma mater, Miami's Southridge HS – one for a promising senior artist and another for scholar-athletes ... it was at Southridge that Everitt twice earned all-state honors in football and was named the Dade County offensive player of the year as a senior in 1987 ... his father, Michael, started his career as a commercial graphics artist and is an experienced sculptor ... his mother, Barbara, is an elementary school teacher ... missed the 1993 Senior Bowl because he returned to his parents' home in Cutler Ridge, FL, six miles north of Homestead, which was devastated by Hurricane Andrew - the family's home had been leveled by the storm... "Our house was pretty much wiped out," said Steve. "I felt guilty, I felt bad. So I stayed in Miami for about two weeks. I didn't play [in the Senior Bowl] because I wanted to stay home and help out" ... said Everitt on his biggest disappointment in football, "I was cut when I went out for 65-pound pee-wee football when I was around seven years old. They said I had no talent. My dad was one of the coaches." ... a regular at heavy metal rock concerts - those of Metallica, in particular - Everitt was delighted with the recent return of "Kiss." In fact, during his rookie year with the Browns, when it came time for the training camp ritual that calls for rookies to stand and sing at the dinner table, Steve's choice was Black Sabbath's "Iron Man": "There wasn't a real big sing-along," understated Everitt ... full name: Steven Michael Everitt.

Or, as Eagles trainer James Collins more succinctly put it, "He's a freak of nature." Indeed, in his 13th NFL season, after being allowed to test the free agent waters by Miami, Fryar became the Eagles' go-to receiver and a full-fledged star who put up some of the best numbers of his career ... when Eagles head coach Ray Rhodes brought Fryar - the first selection overall in the 1984 NFL draft - to Philadelphia prior to the '96 campaign, he said he liked not only the wide receiver's production, but his attitude and leadership as well. As such, it was no surprise when, just months later, Fryar explained his motivation much in the same way that Rhodes describes his own obsessive drive to succeed - "People who doubt me motivate me," said Fryar. "I'm motivated by the negatives. Most people don't think I can [still] do it, and as long as they think that way, that's what's going to keep me going strong." ... as for his leadership qualities, all you need to know is that Rhodes and the Eagles players fondly refer to Fryar, a Pentecostal minister, as "The Rev." ... now, 14 years after New England made him the first pick in the '84 draft, Fryar's 650 catches rank him 11th among all-time NFL receivers and 5th among active pass catchers ... meanwhile, his 10,111 receiving yards rank 13th all-time ... along with 49er all-pro Jerry Rice, Fryar is as the only player to catch over 50 passes in each of the last seven seasons ... with his 1,195 receiving yds. last year, became the first player in league history to log 1,000-yd seasons with three different clubs ... spent the first 9 seasons of his career with the Patriots and in that time helped New England reach Super Bowl XX ... was traded to Miami for two draft picks on 4/1/93 and quickly became QB Dan Marino's favorite target, hauling in 199 balls for 3,190 yards over the next three years ... **1996:** Signed a three-year deal with the Eagles as an unrestricted free agent on 3/19 (after new Dolphins' head coach Jimmy Johnson opted not to retain the veteran) and went on to make a huge statement with a monstrous season that ended with a trip to the Pro Bowl ... in a season that also ended with his teammates naming him the Birds' offensive MVP, Fryar ranked 1st in the NFC/4th in the NFL with 11 TD receptions ... overall, hauled in 88 passes (an Eagles' sin-



gle-season record) for 1,195 yds. ... posted personal career-high numbers in receptions and TDs while registering the second-best yardage total of his career ... became only the 13th receiver in NFL history to reach the 10,000-yard plateau ... topped the 1,000-yd. mark for the third time in the last four seasons and for the fourth time in the last six years ... enjoyed a marvelous stretch in games 7-9 vs. Mia., Car., and Dal., when he was a combined 24-379-5TDs receiving ... in that span, Fryar became the first Eagles' WR to put together three straight 100-yd. rec. games since Mike Quick did so in '85 ... the highlight of that three-game stretch was an 8-116-4TD outing vs. his former Dolphins teammates in which he tied an Eagles' single-game record for TD grabs and set a new mark for most TD catches in a game vs. Miami after hauling in scoring strikes of 38, 2, 12, and 36 yds. from Ty Detmer ... subsequently earned Miller Lite/NFL player of the week honors for his effort vs. the Dolphins ... closed his awesome three-game stretch by matching his career-best effort of 9 receipts. at Dal. ... opened the year with an 18-yd TD grab from QB Rodney Peete at Wash. and never looked back ... truly became the Eagles' go-to receiver when Detmer took over at QB following Peete's season-ending knee injury in game 5 vs. Dal. -- in Detmer's 11 starts, Fryar hauled in 67 of the QB's 225 completions and 9 of his 15 TD strikes ... after his remarkable three-game stretch at midseason, other highlights included a 7-131 effort at Ariz. and a 2-TD effort in game 15 at NYJ where he hauled in two scoring tosses from Detmer in the second half of a come-from-behind win, including a 14-yd game winner with 5:29 to play ... although he was originally voted as the 1st alternate at wide receiver to the NFC Pro Bowl squad, Fryar played in the game when the 49ers' Jerry Rice was unable to participate ... **1995:** In the last of his 3 seasons with the Dolphins, started all 16 games and Miami's AFC Wild Card playoff contest at Buf. (12/30) ... finished the regular season 62-910-8TDs receiving ... began the year with consecutive 100-yard games - a 5-110-2TD effort vs. the NYJ in game 1 and a 3-113-2TD performance at NE ... his big-play capabilities were on display in those games when he hooked up with Dolphins' QB Dan Marino for a 50-yd. TD vs. the Jets and a 67-yd. score at NE ... caught a nine-yard pass vs. NE (11/12) that made Marino the NFL's all-time leader in passing yardage ... made his biggest catch of the year vs. Atl. in game 13 when he caught a 21-yard TD with 11 seconds remaining in the game to give the Dolphins a 21-20 victory ... was 3-29 receiving in AFC Wild Card game at Buf. ... **1994:** Had perhaps the best season of his career as he paced the Dolphins in every major receiving category while notching career highs in receptions (73) and yards (1,270) and tied a career best with 7 TDs ... reached the 1,000-yd receiving plateau for the 2nd consecutive year and for the third time in his career ... recorded 500th reception of NFL career vs. Det. (12/25) ... his 1,270 yds. ranked 3rd in AFC/6th in NFL, while his 73 catches placed him 9th in AFC/22nd in NFL ... logged a team-record string of four consecutive games with 100 or more receiving yards with 112 vs. Chi., 113 at Pit., 103 at NYJ and 110 vs. Buf. ... overall, had six 100-yd games on the season, tied for 2nd best in Dolphin history (with Mark Clayton, 1984) ... earned his third trip to the Pro Bowl and his 2nd in as many years with the Dolphins (this time as a backup to starters Tim Brown of the Raiders and Andre Reed of the Bills) ... had 5 catches for a career-high 211 yards and 3 TDs all in the second half of the season opener vs. NE ... that 211-yd output marked 2nd-highest single game receiving ydgs. total in Dolphin history (surpassed only by Mark Duper's 217 yds vs. NYJ on 11/10/85) ... tied a single-game career high for receptions with 9 for 112 yds vs. Chi. (11/13) ... other big outings included a 6-160



effort at Min. and a 8-89 output at Cin. ... was the club's postseason leader with 11 catches for 141 yards and 1 TD ... **1993:** Became just the third player in Dolphin history to post a 1,000-yd receiving season (Mark Clayton and Mark Duper preceded him) ... was acquired by the Dolphins in a trade from NE Patriots on 4/1/93 in exchange for a 2nd round draft choice in 1993 and a 3rd round pick in 1994 ... finished with 64 catches for 1,010 yards and 5 TDs ... ranked 4th in AFC/9th in NFL in receiving yards ... ranked among team leaders in receptions (2nd), receiving yards (1st) and TDs (2nd) ... caught at least one pass in all 16 games and had four or more catches in ten of those contests ... named to AFC Pro Bowl team for second time in career and first as a wide receiver (had gone to Pro Bowl as member of Patriots following the 1985 season as return specialist) ... became first Dolphin WR other than Mark Duper or Mark Clayton to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Nat Moore in 1977; was actually selected as a 1st alternate but went to the Pro Bowl when Hou.'s Webster Slaughter missed the contest due to an injury ... led team with 7 catches for 103 yards and 1 TD at Buf. for his first 100-yard game as a Dolphin ... went 6-103 with a season-long 65-yard TD grab from Scott Mitchell at NYJ ... was 4-97 vs. NE, including a 44-yd TD pass from Steve DeBerg in first game against former Patriots' teammates ... **1992:** In his ninth and final season with New England, started 14 games and was 55-791-4TDs as a receiver ... registered 8 receipts, for a then career-high 165 yards and 2 TDs at NYJ ... other big outings included a 7-71 effort at LA Rams and a 6-101-1TD day vs. Sea. ... was also 5-87 with a 54-yd TD at Mia. ... was inactive vs. Cle. (10/25) due to right groin strain ... **1991:** Played in 16 games with 15 starts ... caught 68 passes for 1,014 yards with 3 TDs and a long of 56 yards ... had three 100-yard receiving games ... registered career-high 9 catches for 161 yards and was named Miller Lite Player of the Game vs. Min. (9/22), the NFL's longest punt return of the year ... also had a 77-yd punt return for a score vs. Ind. and was 6-132 receiving vs. Buf. ... caught 39 passes for 670 yards with 7 TDs and a long of 56 yards ... logged a total of 10 TDs (7 rec., 1 rush., and 2 on PR) on the year, which represented the most by a Patriot since Tony Collins notched 10 TDs in 1983 ... also added 7 rushes for 27 yards and a TD ... during postseason, caught four passes for 47 yards with 1 TD ... was also 6-34 on punt returns and 1-3 rushing ... had two catches for 47 yards in AFC Wild Card Game at NYJ ... missed AFC Championship Game at Mia. due to cut tendons in right little finger suffered in week prior to contest ... returned to action in reserve role in Super Bowl XX against Chi. and was 2-24 receiving, including an 8-yd scoring pass from Steve Grogan for the Pats' only TD of the game ... **1984:** A first round pick of New England and the first overall selection in the '84 NFL draft, he played in 14 games with two starts ... was 11-164-1TD receiving ... returned punts for a 9.6-yd. average (36 for 347 yards) and kickoffs for a 19.0 average ... ranked 4th in AFC/6th in NFL in punt returns as a rookie ... suffered rib injury in 3rd preseason game that hampered his early season performance ... had season-long 56-yard punt return and scored on 15-yard touchdown reception for first NFL score vs. Sea. (9/16) ... suffered dislocated shoulder vs. Mia. and missed two contests.

#### COLLEGE

A consensus All-America selection following his senior season at Nebraska, Fryar caught 40 passes for 780 yards and 8 TDs ... finished his career fifth on the school's all-time receiving list with 67 catches for 1,196 yds. and 11 TDs ... despite battling injuries during junior season, he ranked as nation's 3rd leading punt returner with 15.4 avg. on 18 returns, and went 5-84 receiving, 2-12 rushing, and 2-56 on punt returns in 21-20 win over LSU in the Orange Bowl ... as a sophomore, ranked 1st in conference and 4th in nation in punt returns ... recorded 2 punt returns for TDs during career - an 82-ydr. vs. Florida St. and a 63-ydr. vs. Iowa St.

Irving and his wife, Jacqueline, have four children, sons Londen and Irving, Jr., and daughters Adrienne and Jacqueline, and reside in Weston, Fla ... was a wide receiver and safety at Rancocas Valley HS in nearby South Jersey ... that school also produced Hall of Fame RB Franco Harris and Bears DE Alonzo Spellman ... a licensed ordained minister, Fryar attended the South Florida Bible College and Theological Seminary this past offseason to obtain his bachelor's degree in bible study and his master's degree in divinity ... formed The Fryar Foundation, a non-profit organization that helps at risk youths in the Florida area ... also is extremely



involved with Eagles Youth Partnership, the charitable wing of the Eagles, and was named the Birds' True Value/NFL Man of the Year in 1996 in recognition of the time and effort he frequently gives to the community ... similarly, won the N.E. Patriots' 1776 Quarterback Club Community Service Award in 1988 for his numerous talks to youth groups on behalf of "Just Say No" campaign and D.A.R.E. ... a talented musician as well, Irving can play five instruments: drums, trombone, bass guitar, lead guitar and piano ... majored in meteorology ... Irving Dale Fryar was born on 9/28/62 in Mount Holly, NJ.

Since bursting onto the NFL scene as a rookie in '94 when he became only the 7th player in league history to rush for 100 yards in each of his first two games, Garner has become one of the NFL's most exciting players ... the lightning-quick University of Tennessee product truly adds another dimension to the Eagles' offense ... with his uncanny quickness and agility, Garner - when healthy - has the ability to score every time he touches the ball and provides a tremendous change of pace to throw at any defense ... said Eagles' head coach Ray Rhodes, "If you give Charlie the ball three straight times, one of those is going for 20 yards. He sees so many things that other backs don't see. I compare him to a young Barry Sanders ... he's quick, he's explosive and he may be even quicker than Barry." ... has averaged nearly 5 yards per carry during his career while ranking second on the club in rushing yards in each of his three seasons, trailing Herschel Walker in '94 and Watters in both '95 and '96 ... **1996:** With #1 RB Ricky Watters handling the bulk of the rushing behind FB Kevin Turner, the latter of whom missed 14 games in '95, Garner saw only limited action in his third NFL season ... was also hindered by an assortment of bumps and bruises but still managed to lead the Birds with a 5.2-yds-per-carry avg. and finished as the club's second leading rusher with 346 yds. on 66 carries ... after going 13-48 on the ground in the opener at Wash., was slowed by a strained knee suffered while leaping for a pass on a 2-pt. conversion attempt late in game 2 at GB ... that, combined with a seven-game stretch in which Watters topped the 100-yd. rushing mark five times, limited Garner to just 10 carries in games 3-9 ... then, in game 10 vs. Buf., saw his most extensive action since the opener, going 10-60 rushing, including runs of 15, 12, and 10 yds. ... one week later vs. Wash., was inserted in the 3rd qtr. and jump-started the offense, setting up



a TD with consecutive runs of 10, 22, and 9 yds. before exiting with a sprained ankle suffered on his third and final carry ... sat out the following game at Ariz. but returned to carry the ball 6-or-more times in each of the final four contests ... during that four-game span, Garner spelled an injured Watters (concussion) at Indy before sealing a win over the Jets with a 46-yd., 4th qtr. scamper that enabled the Birds to run out the clock ... **1995:** After FB Kevin Turner's season ended with a knee injury in game 2, Garner frequently joined fellow RB Ricky Watters in the backfield and gave the Eagles one of the NFL's most exciting one-two punches ... finished the regular season ranked 2nd on the club to Watters in all rushing categories (108-588-6TDs) while his 5.4-yds.-per-carry average led all NFL ballcarriers with over 100 attempts ... despite sitting out the club's spring minicamp while rehabbing the knee he injured the previous December, Garner regained the explosiveness and flash in his running style ... etched his name into the Eagles' record books vs. Wash. on 10/8, tying a club mark with 3 rushing TDs in a single game (something no Eagle had done since Wilbert Montgomery on 12/19/82 vs. Hou.) ... posted the third 100-yd. rushing game of his career that afternoon as he went 9-120-13.3-3TDs ... a week later at NYG, a bruised knee on a kick return limited him to 4 carries ... following the bye week, a healthy Garner ripped the Rams for 60 yds. on 7 carries, incl. a 36-ydr. ... then, after seeing only limited action at Dal., bounced back with three straight solid rushing efforts (9-52-5.8 vs. Den., 13-58-4.5 vs. NYG, and 11-50-4.5 at Wash.) ... over that 3-game span, Garner's total rushing #s included 160 yds. and a 4.85-yd. avg. on 33 carries ... late in that game at Wash., however, Garner suffered a fractured right thumb and subsequently underwent surgery on 11/29 ... as a result, was deactivated for game 13 at Sea. and saw only limited action in the final three games ... in the postseason, however, Garner and Watters powered the running game in a 58-37 Wild Card game win over Det.; Garner jump-started the Birds' scoring outburst with a 15-yd. TD scamper in the 1st qtr. ... **1994:** After being slowed by a rib injury that sidelined him for most of the pre-season and kept him out of the first three games, this '94 second round draft pick burst onto the NFL scene like a bolt of lightning ... saw his first action when he started games 4-5 at SF and vs. Wash. and quickly etched his name into the record books ... became only the 7th player in NFL history to rush for 100 yds. in each of his first two NFL games as well as the first Eagle rookie with consecutive 100-yd. rushing games ... ripped off 111 yds on 16 carries, including 1st qtr. One of the most electrifying, big-play makers in Tennessee history, Garner led the Volunteers in rushing in each of his two seasons after transferring from Scottsdale (AZ) Community College ... the speedy and elusive back ran for 1,161 yards and 8 TDs in '93, highlighted by a 186-yard effort vs. Kentucky ... finished his Tennessee career with 2,223 rushing yards and 10 TDs while tacking on an additional 17 receptions for 106 yds ... was a backfield mate of QB Heath Shuler, the Redskins' 1st round draft pick in '94 and James Stewart, the Jaguars' 2nd of two, first round se-



lections in the 1995 draft ... In 1990, Garner set JUCO records for most rushing yards in a single game (430) and most yards in two consecutive games (765).

## PRO CAREER

After six trips to the NFL waiver wire, a stellar stretch run with the '94 Super Bowl champion 49ers paved the way to Philadelphia for Hall - then a veteran free agent - in 1995 ... it was then, however, with his first campaign as an Eagle and a starting role in his grasp, that Hall was sidelined for nearly all of the '95 season by a serious bout with blood clots in his lungs ... but in 1996, a return to health meant a return to the lineup for this former 1991 sixth-round pick of Tampa Bay as Hall went on to start every regular season game for the Birds ... prior to joining the Birds, tallied 3 sacks in the playoffs for Super Bowl XXIX champion San Francisco when he



played for current Eagles head coach and then-Niners defensive coordinator Ray Rhodes ... **1996:** After missing 14 games the previous year due to blood clots in his lungs and a sprained knee, started all 16 games for the Birds at right defensive tackle ... was a steadying veteran presence in light of the fact that fellow defensive tackle Andy Harmon missed most of the season with a knee injury ... tallied 67 tackles, a career-high 4.5 sacks, 13 quarterback hurries, 1 pass deflection and 2 fumble recoveries (one of which he returned for a TD) ... notched his first sack of the year vs. Det.'s Scott Mitchell ... had a fine outing vs. Dal. when he recovered two fumbles, the first of which was caused by FS Brian Dawkins' sack of Troy Aikman. ## PRO CAREER

After moving into the upper echelon of the league's defensive tackles by averaging 11.3 sacks per season from 1993-1995, this former 6th-round pick of the Birds saw action in only two games last year due to a nagging knee injury ... Harmon's absence was a major blow to an Eagles' defense that subsequently missed his pass rushing and run-stopping ability from the left defensive tackle position ... just one year earlier Harmon, poised on the brink of stardom, signed a contract in Oct. '95 that will keep him with the Birds through the '98 season ... enters the '97 season ranked 4th on the Eagles' career sack list with 40 (the most ever by an Eagles' DT) ... also enters the 1997 campaign as one of only two Eagles defenders remaining from the Birds' 1991 defense that ranked #1 in the NFL across the board (LB William Thomas is the other) ... **1991:** The Eagles' 6th round pick in 1991 (the 157th selection overall), Harmon got his feet wet as a rookie by playing on special teams and short-yardage situations and by occasionally spelling Pro Bowl ends Reggie White and Clyde Simmons ... saw considerable action at RDE in preseason (3 sacks) in place of the then unsigned Simmons, including starts against Cin. and Pitt. ... **1992:** Displayed a wealth of potential after a move from defensive end to tackle allowed him to best use his strength and quickness ... after breaking his left ulna & radius at Atl. in preseason, played with a cast early on and recorded a



sack in each of games 2-4 ... earned his 1st start as a DT in that 4th game (vs. Dal.) and forced a fumble that led to an Eagles' TD ... held down a starting DT spot the rest of the season (RDT in games 4-6 & 14-16 and LDT in games 7-13) and was very impressive ... finished the year with 7.5 sacks, including 2.5 vs. Minn. ... **1993:** Overcame early season injuries and posted a team-leading and career-high 11.5 sacks, the most ever by an Eagles' DT ... as such, he bested the mark of 10.5 set by the late Pro Bowl DT, Jerome Brown, in 1989 ... among the league's DTs, only Minn.'s John Randle had more sacks (12.5) ... was slowed by a pulled hamstring and a strained achilles in the first 5 games ... came on at midseason, however, registering all of his 11.5 sacks in the last 11 games ... had his best outings vs. playoff clubs, tallying 2.5 & 2.0 sacks in two meetings vs. Dal. and a career-high 3.0 at SF ... after opening the season at the LDT spot, started games 5-6 at LDE for the injured Tim Harris (elbow) ... but it was a return to health and his familiar LDT role in game 7 that started his great run ... **1994:** Picked up where he left off in '93 and began to receive the recognition he deserved as one of the NFL's top young defensive tackles ... yet, despite being named 1st team All-NFL by *Sports Illustrated's* Paul Zimmerman, 2nd team all-pro by *Football Digest*, the Eagles' defensive MVP by his teammates, and despite having his gritty and tenacious play honored with a spot on FOX-TV analyst John Madden's *All-Madden Team*, Harmon was overlooked in the Pro Bowl balloting ... registered 9 sacks to rank 3rd in the NFL/2nd in the NFC among defensive tackles behind Min.'s John Randle (13.5) and the Raiders' Chester McGlockton (9.5) ... although hampered by a fractured thumb that occurred when making his first career interception (off Steve Young in game 4 at SF), Harmon notched 7 of his sacks in the final 12 games while playing with a cast on the injured hand ... registered the fifth 2+ sack game of his career with 2 vs. Ariz. (11/6) ... tied his career-high of 12 tackles vs. Hou. (10/24) ... **1995:** Put together another outstanding season while starting 15 regular season games and both playoff contests at the LDT spot ... for the second straight year, was done an injustice when not voted to the Pro Bowl squad ... was, however, honored by the AP as a 2nd-team all-pro selection ... after recording 9 sacks a year earlier, Harmon notched 11 more in '95 ... those 11 sacks ranked 2nd on the Eagles to LDE William Fuller, tied for 5th overall in the NFC, and 4th best among DTs around the league ... overall, helped the Birds post 48 sacks, tops in the NFC and 2nd in the NFL only to Buffalo (49) ... got off to a solid start before suffering a strained groin and being deact. at NO ... returned vs. Wash. on 10/8 and earned NFC defensive player of the week honors when he tied his career high, single-game sack total with 3 vs. QB Gus Frerotte ... continued his sack barrage in consecutive games at NYG and vs. StL, collecting two sacks in each ... subsequently inked a 4-year contract on 10/30 that included a revised '95 pact and a new deal through the '98 season ... on 11/19, notched his 4th multiple-sack effort of the season when he twice dumped Giants' QB Dave Brown ... **1996:** Despite having been overlooked for the Pro Bowl after notching 11.0 sacks in 1995, Harmon looked to make a strong bid for all-pro honors in '96 ... the Birds' #1 LDT would, however, see action in just two games due to an ailing left knee. In the 3rd preseason game he suffered a knee injury at NE that sidelined him for the final preseason contest and deactivated him for the regular season opener at Wash. He then underwent arthroscopic surgery on Sept. 5 and missed games 2-5 ... returned to the starting lineup at NYG in game 6 and then rotated in at the DT position in game 7 vs. Mia., recording his only sack of the season vs. the Dolphins' Craig Erickson ... a flare up in his left knee, however, pre-



vented Harmon from suiting up in games 8-14 and finally landed him on the Injured Reserve list on 12/10.

### COLLEGE

Was a three-year starter at Kent State who shifted from outside linebacker to defensive tackle in his senior year ... was an All-MAC choice and honorable mention All-America that season with 91 tackles, including 9 sacks ... as a junior, earned All-MAC honors with 71 stops, including 5 sacks.

Andy and his wife, Kristy, reside in St. Petersburg, FL, with their son, Grant (5/18/97) ... majored in business ... was voted the top lineman in the Western Ohio Conf. and earned all-state honors at Centerville High in his hometown of Centerville, OH ... born in Dayton, OH ... prior to his junior year of high school, enjoyed 60-100-mile bike tours with his family; no longer takes such trips, however, and explains why with reference to his 6-4, 285-lb. frame saying, "I catch too much wind now" ... has an older brother, Mike.

### PRO CAREER

Since leaving Boston College after his junior season and becoming the Eagles' first round draft pick in 1995, Mamula has registered 13.5 sacks and shown signs of becoming a force to reckon with ... as such, Eagles head coach Ray Rhodes has eagerly pointed to the '97 campaign as being an important one for the Birds' right defensive end. "What you hope happens is that in year three, Mike steps up and comes up with 10 or 11 sacks," said Rhodes. "That's what he's capable of doing." ... indeed, Mamula, who will turn just 24 in August of '97, is still maturing and learning the subtleties of the NFL game ... after a rookie season in which he frequently relied on his speed, a somewhat more savvy Mamula added more set-up moves to his repertoire in '96. He became not only a more accomplished pass rusher (8 sacks), but a better run defender as well according to Eagles coaches ... first caught the eye of NFL talent evaluators when he tallied 17 sacks as a junior at BC in 1994 and then augmented his on-field production with an awesome performance at the NFL Combine workouts prior to the '95 draft ... "Mamula was the show at the Combine, absolutely knocking scouts over with his amazing athleticism," wrote Eagles Digest's Dave Spadaro. "The personnel men who had seen so much over the years were frothing at the mouth. 'Is this kid for real?' they asked themselves." But for Eagles' coach Ray Rhodes, the determining factor was game-time production -- and that's what set Mamula apart from the rest ... **1996:** As one of the NFC's up-and-coming defensive ends, Mamula started 16 games at the RDE spot and finished the year with 8 sacks, second on the club to William Fuller's 13 ... led the team with 24 QB hurries and tied for the club lead in both forced fumbles and fumble recoveries with 3 of each ... ranked third on the club and tops among



the Birds' defensive linemen in tackles (75) ... after being challenged by Rhodes to take his play to another level in '96, got off to a great start in the opener at Wash. with 2 sacks of Gus Frerotte, including one that caused a fumble ... had another multiple-sack outing in game 6 at NYG where he notched 2.5 sacks of QB Dave Brown. His final sack that day resulted in a 4th qtr. fumble that LB William Thomas returned 23 yds. for a TD, sealing a 19-10 win ... one week later had a solid performance vs. Miami's all-pro LT Richmond Webb, including a sack of Craig Erickson at the Dolphins' 1 ... closed out the year with a sack in each of the final two games - one vs. the Jets' Glenn Foley and one vs. Arizona's Kent Graham ... in that 29-19 win over Ariz., Mamula set the tone on the 2nd play from scrimmage as he sacked Graham and forced a fumble that he scooped up and returned 4 yds. for the first TD of his career ... **1995:** So coveted by Ray Rhodes and the Eagles' staff was Mamula prior to the 1995 draft, that the Birds traded with Tampa Bay in order to move up from the 12th spot to the 7th position in order to take him ... was in the starting lineup by opening day and went on to record 5.5 sacks on the year ... showed tremendous promise as 5 of those sacks came vs. two of the league's best tackles, all-pro Willie Roaf of New Orleans, and former all-pro Jumbo Elliott, then of the Giants ... overall, helped the Birds post 48 sacks, tops in the NFC and 2nd in the NFL only to Buffalo (49) ... excelled at NO notching the first two sacks of his career vs. QB Jim Everett ... two weeks later, posted a 7-tackle, 1/2-sack effort at NYG where his 3rd qtr. hit on QB Tommy Maddox forced an INT by William Thomas ... in game 10, Mamula combined with William Fuller on a 1st-qtr. hit of Denver's John Elway that sidelined the QB for the rest of the game with a concussion; he also scooped up a fumble by Den.'s Hugh Millen ... then had a bittersweet outing vs. the Giants' Elliott on 11/19 as he earned NFC defensive player of the week honors by recording 3 sacks and a FF, but exited the game early in the 2nd half with a dislocated shoulder ... subsequently missed games 12-13 before returning to action vs. Dal. and to the starting lineup a week later ... notched a sack of Det's Scott Mitchell in the Birds' NFC Wild Card Game win over the Lions.

After spending the first six years of his career as a part-time starter in Detroit and the '94 campaign as a backup to all-pro Troy Aikman in Dallas, Peete signed a one-year deal with the Eagles in '95 and got the break he had been waiting for ... although Peete had joined the Birds as the primary backup to incumbent QB Randall Cunningham, head coach Ray Rhodes turned over the reins of the offense to the USC product just five games into his Eagles career — and Peete never looked back ... in fact, Peete took such a firm hold on the starting job that he did not relinquish it until being felled by a season-ending knee injury early in the '96 campaign ... it was during his 17-game stint as the starting signal caller that the Birds posted a 12-5 record and Peete earned a well-deserved reputation as a gutsy, feisty, intelligent leader ... over that same span, Peete helped turn the Eagles' 1-3 start in '95 into a 10-6 finish, the top NFC Wild Card slot in postseason play, and a record-setting 58-37 playoff victory over his former teammates from Detroit; he then got the Birds' off to a solid 3-1 start in '96 before having his season cut short by an injury ... originally began his career as a 6th round draft pick of Detroit in 1989 (the 141st player selected overall) and, despite being hampered by injuries during each of his five seasons there, posted five consecutive years of at least 1,300 passing yards ... joined Dallas on 5/4/94 as an unrestricted free agent and, as the #2 QB, enjoyed his finest hour as a Cowboy when he started in place of Troy Aikman and led Dallas to an NFC East division-clinching win at Phila. ... **1996:** After leading the Eagles to 9 wins in their last 12 regular season contests the previous year, Peete held off a prese-



son challenge by Ty Detmer, a veteran free agent newcomer from Green Bay, and opened the year as the Birds' starting signal caller ... picked up where he left off in '95 and helped the Eagles fly from the gate with a 3-1 start ... in fact, so solid was Peete's start that he earned Miller Lite/NFL Player of the Week honors after leading Phila. past the Redskins on opening day with a 34-20-269-2TD passing effort ... on 9/30, however, in the 2nd qtr. of game 5 vs. Dal., Peete's season ended abruptly when he tore the patellar tendon in his right knee while planting his foot to throw ... Peete, who had entered that contest directing the league's #1 rated offense, had surgery performed by team orthopedist Dr. Arthur Bartolozzi immediately following the game and was subsequently placed on the Injured Reserve list on 10/3 ... at the time of his injury, Peete's passing #s for the season were 134-80-992-5-3TDs ... had actually begun the regular season with a sprained left knee suffered in the third preseason game at NE when he was hit by DE Willie McGinest on the next to last play of the 1st half (subsequently missed the preseason finale vs. Pitt.) ... recovered quickly enough to have a super opener at Wash. and then, in a game 3 win over Det., enjoyed one of his finest days as an Eagle when he ran a QB sneak for a TD and posted a career-best 83.3% completion rate with a 30-25-284-1TD passing effort ... **1995:** Leadership and a winning attitude were what Peete brought with him in 1995 when he joined the Eagles in April as a veteran free agent from Dallas ... began the year as the #2 QB behind Randall Cunningham but took over the starting job in game 5 and never looked back ... went on to lead the Birds to 9 wins in their final 12 games and to a playoff victory vs. Detroit ... said head coach Ray Rhodes, "Rodney is a fiery competitor who players respect. He brings an attitude onto the field; he'll bark at people. That's what it takes sometimes. You find it in the Marininos, the Montanas, the Youngs. They get what they need out of players. They find a way to win." ... although he finished the year as the NFC's 13th ranked passer (67.3 rating on 375-215-57.3-2326-14-8TDs), Peete truly emerged as a leader and a winner ... was the QB of record in every Eagles' win (including game 2 at Ariz., when he took over in the 2nd qtr.) ... prior to Peete becoming the starter, head coach Ray Rhodes had called on him three times in relief of Cunningham — early on at Ariz. where he led three straight TD drives; in game 3 for one play in relief of an injured Cunningham (shoulder); and in game 4 at Oak. when he replaced Cunningham in the 3rd qtr. after a 17-0 lead had disintegrated ... five days later on 9/29, Rhodes moved Peete into the starting role ... in his first start (at NO), Peete was 28-18-173-0-0TD passing in a 15-10 win ... a week later vs. Wash. he engineered a 37-34 OT win by completing a career-high 30 passes (256 yds., 1 TD), including a 4-5-38 effort on the 73-yd. drive to the winning FG ... then played only the first half at NYG, suffering a concussion in the 2nd qtr. on a hit by DT Keith Hamilton ... returned to the lineup a week later in a win vs. StL ... went on to turn in a great performance in a win over Den. with a 2-yd. Peete withstood a pounding and delivered two 2nd half TD passes - including a 37-yd. game-winner to Calvin Williams - to help rally the Birds from a 17-0 deficit ... after struggling in the final two regular season games (2 TD passes vs. 5 INTs), Peete put together the finest performance of his brief Eagle career in a 58-37 Wild Card playoff win over his former team, the Lions (12/30) ... in that game Peete was 25-17-270-0-3TDs passing in his first career playoff start while di-



recting the Birds to 5 TDs and 3 FGs in their first 11 drives as well as to a club post-season record 452 yds. of total offense ... while his 3 TD strikes vs. Det. - including a 43-yd. Hail Mary to Rob Carpenter on the final play of the first half - tied an Eagles' playoff record, his 270 passing yards bested any performance he had in the regular season ... likewise, his 43 & 45-yd. TD tosses vs. the Lions were his longest completions of the year ... a week later in the divisional playoff loss at Dal., a scrambling Peete suffered a concussion on a hit by SS Darren Woodson and left the game late in the 1st qtr. ... **1994:** Signed with Dallas as an unrestricted free agent on 5/4 and saw action in seven regular season games as the top backup to QB Troy Aikman ... was 56-33-470-1-4TDs passing for the Cowboys, including a 17-10-172-1TD performance at Phila. in his only start of the year; the Cowboys won that game 31-19 and subsequently clinched the NFC East division title ... also guided Dallas to a 4th qtr. come-from-behind win at Ariz. when Aikman went out for the remainder of the game with a concussion suffered in the 1st stanza ... in that outing he went 19-12-186-2TDs passing, including a 65-yd TD strike to Michael Irvin ... also subbed for an injured Aikman (knee) vs. Wash. and went 5-2-20-1TD before suffering a sprained right thumb that sidelined him, too, for Thanksgiving day match-up vs. GB ... in the first postseason action of his career, went 0-2 passing in late-game action of an NFC divisional playoff victory over GB ... **1993:** Started 10 games in his final season with the Lions and completed a career-best 62.3% of his passes (157 of 252) ... his best outing came at Min., where he went 28-20-273-1-1 passing in leading the Lions back from a 27-13 4th qtr. deficit to a thrilling 30-27 triumph — the comeback included a career-long, 93-yd. ## PRO CAREER

"If you line everybody up and pick a football team," said Eagles head coach Ray Rhodes, "Kevin's one of the first guys you'd choose. He's a tough kid, a throwback, an old-time football player. He comes to work ready to work and he does his job. He's been blocking his rear end off for Ricky Watters and he may only carry the ball a couple of times ... but he doesn't say two words. He just plays football and he's a tough S.O.B. You need more guys like him on your football team." ... an unsung hero to say the least, Turner is one of the NFL's top, young stars ... after being a 3rd round draft pick of New England in 1992, Turner quietly earned a reputation as one of the game's up-and-coming, tough, young fullbacks ... became a favorite target of Patriots' QB Drew Bledsoe and established himself as a hard-nosed runner and blocker before the Eagles lured him to Philadelphia as a restricted free agent prior to the '95 season ... and despite having his first Eagles' campaign ended prematurely by a knee injury in game 2 at Ariz., Turner returned to the starting lineup in '96 and truly provided the versatility required from the fullback in the Birds' version of the "West Coast" offense ... with his dependable receiving, solid blocking, and straight-ahead running style, Turner became the perfect complement to the Birds' "Thunder & Lightning" backfield of 1,000-yd. rusher Ricky Watters and scat-back Charlie Garner ... **1996:** Made a complete recovery from the knee injury that had shelved him for the final 14 games of the previous season and became a vital cog in an Eagles' offense that finished the '96 campaign ranked first in the NFC ... provided the trademark blocking and pass-catching ability that made him so at-



tractive to the Eagles a year earlier when the club first pirated the restricted free agent away from New England ... despite carrying the ball just 18 times, he ranked fourth on the club in receptions with 43 (for 409 yds and 1 TD) while primarily serving as a lead blocker for RB Ricky Watters ... in fact, Turner's bulldozing style was a prime reason Watters earned his second straight 1,000-yd. rushing season and his second consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl ... started 12 of 16 games (DNS at Wash. when Watters and Garner opened in a 2-RB set, and DNS in games 10-12 when the Eagles opened with a 2-TE, one-back set) ... hauled in a 34-yd catch at Atl. and a career-long 41-ydr. vs. Dal. (both from Rodney Peete), and a 23-yd TD pass from Ty Detmer vs. Buf. ... **1995:** Philadelphia fans were deprived of an opportunity to see one of the NFL's best young fullbacks in 1995 when Kevin Turner had his first Eagles' campaign cut short by a season-ending knee injury in game 2 ... a huge free-agent acquisition by the Birds in the spring, Turner was expected to be the perfect complement to RBs Ricky Watters and Charlie Garner in the Eagles' backfield ... unfortunately, Turner was sidelined for the year when he suffered a torn MCL and ACL in his right knee while on punt coverage at Ariz. (9/10) ... subsequently had surgery performed by Dr. Art Bartolozzi on 9/11 ... had been 2-9-7LG rushing, 4-29 rec. vs. TB (9/3) and was excelling on special teams prior to being injured ... **1994:** Started 9 games for the resurgent Patriots and caught a personal-high 52 of QB Drew Bledsoe's aerials for 471 yards and 2 TDs ... in fact, Turner, TE Ben Coates (96), WR Michael Timpson (74), RB Leroy Thompson (65), and WR Vincent Brisby (58) enabled the Pats to become the only team in NFL history with 5 receivers all surpassing 50 receipts. in a single season ... also went 36-111-1TD rushing ... on opening day at Mia., snared a season-high 7 passes, and logged a 2-yd TD run ... caught 4 passes for 27 yards vs. Min., including the 14-yd game-winning TD toss from Bledsoe in OT as the Pats overcame a 20-3 halftime deficit ... **1993:** Despite not moving into the starting lineup until game 6 vs. Hou., finished as the Pats' 2nd leading rusher with 231 yds on 50 carries ... made an even bigger impact as a receiver as his 39 catches for 333 yds. and 2TDs led all Patriot running backs and ranked 4th on the team ... had a personal-best 63 rushing yds. at Cleve., including a 49-yd jaunt that led to the winning TD ... registered a career-high 8 receipts. for 61 yds. in an OT win vs. Mia. ... **1992:** Saw action in all 16 games as a rookie, primarily on special teams ... was 10-40 rushing and 7-52-1TD receiving in limited offensive duty ... led all special teamers with 13 tackles ... made his first NFL start vs. SF in place of injured RBs John Stephens and Leonard Russell ... recorded his first career TD with a 19-yd reception from Hugh Millen vs. Cle.

### COLLEGE

Enjoyed an outstanding career as a pass-catching and blocking fullback at Alabama where he left as the school's 4th all-time leading receiver, first among running backs ... in fact, his 48 receptions as a sophomore was the fifth-highest single season total in Crimson Tide history and again, tops among RBs ... started all 12 games during his senior season, going 73-432-3TDs rushing and 12-156 rec., while helping pave the way for backfield mate Siran Stacy's 966 rushing yards ... in 1990, started all 12 games and went 66-269 rushing and 26-240-1TD receiving.

### PERSONAL

Married to the former Joyce Labbe (5/18/96) ... resides in Cherry Hill, NJ ... born in Prattville, AL ... was an all-metro running back at Prattville High where he served



as team captain and earned player of the year honors as a senior after rushing for 1,077 yards on 165 carries ... also lettered in basketball and track ... majored in finance at Alabama.

## PRO CAREER

After being the Miami Dolphins' first round draft pick in 1992, Vincent immediately became a starter at left cornerback and, over the next four years, forged a reputation as one of the NFL's top young coverage men ... recorded 14 interceptions for Miami in that span, including a team-leading five thefts in both 1994 and 1995 ... indeed, it was the profile of a young, ascending star that led the Eagles to sign Vincent (then a Miami "transition free agent") to an offer sheet in the spring of '96 - an offer that the salary cap strapped Dolphins could not match ... **1996:** A highly sought after free agent "transition" player, Vincent officially became an Eagle on 3/3/96 and, along with RCB Bobby Taylor, provided the Birds with one of the NFL's top cornerback tandems ... started all 16 games at the LCB spot ... after missing the first two preseason games with a strained groin, returned to the lineup in time to help limit Redskin QB Gus Frerotte to just 119 yds. passing in a season-opening win ... but it was in the final seconds of a 31-21, game 9 win at Dal. that Vincent etched his name into the NFL record books. With Dallas trailing by 3 and facing a 3rd-n-goal situation at the Eagles' 3, MLB James Willis INT'd a Troy Aikman pass 4 yds. deep in the end zone and ret'd it 14 yds. Willis then lateralled the ball to Vincent who raced the final 90 yds. for a game-clinching score. As such, the combined efforts of Vincent and Willis resulted in the longest INT return for a TD in NFL history (topping the 103-yd. effort by San Diego's Vencie Glenn vs. Den. on 11/29/87) ... other big plays by Vincent included INTs off Atl.'s Jeff George on 9/22, Wash.'s Gus Frerotte on 11/17, and the Giants' Dave Brown on 12/1 ... helped seal a win vs. Car. when he forced two fumbles deep in Eagles' territory - one by QB Kerry Collins that FS Brian Dawkins recovered at the Eagles' 4 and one by Anthony



Johnson that set up a Birds FG ... **1995:** In his fourth and final season with Miami, Vincent started 16 games and the AFC Wild Card Game at Buf. and continued to establish himself as one of the finest young cornerbacks in the NFL ... tied for third in the AFC with five INTs ... had three INTs off Jets' QBs as he pilfered a Bubby Brister pass at NYJ (10/22) and had two thefts of Boomer Esiason on consecutive 3rd qtr. possessions on 9/3, including one that he returned 69 yds. for a TD ... also registered INTs vs. KC's Steve Bono and Buf's Jim Kelly ... **1994:** Rebounded from a 1993 knee injury to play in 13 games, including 12 starts at LCB ... finished with 62 tackles and team-high totals of 5 INTs and 20 KDs ... those 5 thefts tied him for sixth in the AFC and 10th in the NFL ... was the Dolphin winner of the 1994 Ed Block Courage Award, an honor given annually to one player on each NFL team for his courage, strength, and leadership ... started in season opener vs. NE and registered an INT off Drew Bledsoe before leaving game with sore knee in 3rd qtr. ... was inactive for games 2-4 because of that sore knee ... returned to his starting role in week 6 at Buf. ... posted 2nd INT of season off of Bledsoe vs. NE ... Vincent's 4th qtr. INT at NYJ set up a Dolphin TD in a come-from-behind win over the Jets ... registered seven tackles, an INT, and his first career TD vs. the Chiefs. His score came following an interception by teammate Gene Atkins, who returned the ball 18 yds. before laterally to Vincent, who then raced the final 58 yds. ... started both of Mia.'s playoff contests and logged 13 tkls. ... **1993:** Despite having his season cut short when he suffered a knee injury in game 13, Vincent finished the year with 68 tackles, 2 INTs, a fumble recovery, and 11 passes defended en route to being voted by the South Florida media as the Dolphins' outstanding defensive back ... his interceptions came in the season opener at Ind. (off Jack Trudeau) and in game 4 vs. Wash. ... in fact, the INT vs. Wash.'s Rich Gannon ended the Redskins' final drive and preserved a 17-10 victory ... however, Vincent tore ligaments and cartilage in his right knee on a reverse of a punt return vs. Pit. and was placed on Injured Reserve on 12/15 before undergoing reconstructive surgery on 12/23 ... **1992:** After Miami made him the 7th overall pick in the '92 draft, Vincent went on to start the final 14 regular season games and both playoff contests at LCB ... finished his rookie campaign with 77 tackles, 2 INTs, a forced fumble and a team-high 13 knockdowns ... for his efforts, Vincent earned NFL all-rookie honors from *Football News*, *Pro Football Weekly*, and *College and Pro Football Newsweekly* ... opened the season on inactive list (hamstring); made NFL debut in reserve role vs. LA Rams ... posted a career-high 10 tackles at Buf., before registering his first career INT off of Jeff George at Ind. ... also recorded a theft off Cody Carlson vs. Hou. ... Vincent, though, truly made his mark in the postseason as he garnered AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors following a 5-tackle, 2-INT performance vs. SD ... in fact, both of his INTs in that game (off Stan Humphries) led to TDs in the Dolphins' 31-0 win over the Chargers ... despite battling a stomach virus throughout the game, Vincent became the first rookie in Dolphin history to intercept a pass in a playoff game.

## COLLEGE

A four-year letterman and three-year starter at Wisconsin, Vincent was one of the most honored defensive backs as a senior, when he garnered first team All-America honors from *College and Pro Football Newsweekly*, *The Football News* and *The Sporting News*, while also earning co-defensive player-of-the-year accolades from the Big Ten ... was also a finalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, given to the na-



tion's top defensive back ... a dangerous return man for the Badgers as well, he averaged 11.4 yards and scored 3 TDs on punt returns and had a 22.0-yard kickoff return average during collegiate career.

## PERSONAL

Troy and his wife, Tommi (3/19/94), reside in Fort Lauderdale, FL, during the off-season ... was born in Trenton and raised in the Fallsington Twsp. area of suburban Philadelphia. But when his mother, Alma, moved back to Trenton, Vincent opted to stay at Pennsbury High in order to obtain a better education. In the process, he moved in with the family of his best friend, James Bodley – years later, Bodley's parents, Linda and Jim, would become Vincent's agents ... earned letters in football, baseball, and track ... Vincent's hobbies today include fishing as well as being an avid follower of boxing and track ... placed 3rd in the 1993 NFL's Fastest Man Competition ... is very active in the community and has done extensive work with Eagles Youth Partnership, the American Cancer Society, the Leukemia Foundation, and the Make-A-Wish Foundation ... in the fall of '96, Troy and his wife distributed 600 supermarket gift certificates to needy families in Trenton so that they might enjoy Thanksgiving ... Said Vincent at the time, "I'm very fortunate. My family will not go hungry. I wanted to do something for those who are not as fortunate as we are. I did these kinds of things all the time when I was in Miami but now that I'm home, it means even more to me" ... majored in landscape architecture.

HIS VERY FIRST SCORE CAME WHEN MIAMI'S GENE ATKINS INTERCEPTED A PASS OFF THE CHIEFS' STEVE BONO ON 12/12/94 AND RETURNED IT 18 YDS. BEFORE LATERALLING TO VINCENT WHO COVERED THE FINAL 58 YDS. HIS MOST RECENT TD CAME AT DALLAS ON 11/3/96 WHEN EAGLES' MLB JAMES WILLIS INT'D A TROY AIKMAN PASS 4 YDS. DEEP IN THE END ZONE AND RETURNED IT 14 YDS. BEFORE LATERALLING TO VINCENT WHO COVERED THE FINAL 90 YDS. OF AN NFL-RECORD 104 YD. TD RETURN.

Although somewhat overshadowed by QB Steve Young and WR Jerry Rice in the high-octane San Francisco 49er offense from 1992-94, Watters still managed to establish himself as one of the premier - and most versatile - running backs in the NFL while earning three trips to the Pro Bowl and a championship ring in Super Bowl XXIX ... as a free agent after the '94 campaign, Watters looked to become the focal point of an NFL offense and he found just such an opportunity in Philadelphia ... landed in the Eagles' nest on March 25, 1995, after San Francisco declined to match the Philadelphia offer sheet signed by the 49ers' transition player one week earlier ... has since gone on to exceed his advanced billing and, following the '95 and '96 seasons, earned consecutive trips to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two years with Philadelphia ... as such, Watters became the first Eagles' running back named to the Pro Bowl since Wilbert Montgomery was so honored following the 1980 season ... an accomplished receiver as well as a fast and powerful runner, Watters has consistently ranked among the league leaders in total yds. of offense during the past five seasons ... in fact, with 9 games of at least 100 combined yds. from scrimmage in 1996, Watters has topped the 100-yd. mark in total offense in 42 of the 74 regular season games he has started and in 7 of his 10 career playoff outings ... originally a 2nd round pick of San Francisco in '91, Watters overcame an injury-plagued rookie year and went on to lead SF in rushing in each of the next three years, going 653-2,840-25TDs over that period before jumping to Philadelphia ... **1996:** For the second straight year, the Eagles boasted one of the top running attacks in the league and Watters was the workhorse once again ... earned his fifth consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl - his second straight as an Eagle - after ranking first in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,855) and 2nd in the NFC/4th in the NFL in rushing yardage (1,411) ... also led the league in carries (353) and to-



tal touches (404 combined carries and receptions) ... while his personal-best 353 carries set an Eagles' single-season record, his 1,411 rushing yds. marked the second best effort in club history (second only to the 1,512 yds. Wilbert Montgomery posted in 1979) ... also finished the season with 13 rushing TDs – a personal-best effort that tied him with Steve Van Buren for the second highest single-season total in Eagles history and fell just two short of the club-record set by Van Buren in 1945 ... again proved to be one of the top all-around backs in the league by hauling in 51 passes (3rd on the club) for 444 yds ... exploded out of the blocks, topping the 100-yd. rushing mark five times in a seven-game stretch (games 3-9) ... first got the hot hand in a win over Det. in week 3, ripping off a 52-yd. run on the first play en route to a 27-153-1TD rushing/6-57 receiving effort ... continued his torrid pace at Atl. the next week when he scampered for 121 yds. and 2TDs on 26 carries, including the longest scoring jaunt of his career, a 56-ydr. ... as such, Waters reached the 100-yd rushing plateau in consecutive games for the 2nd time in as many years and also registered a 50-plus yard run in back-to-back games ... in game 6 at NYG, rushed for 110 yds., incl. 40 on Philly's 4th qtr. drive to the winning FG ... excelled again the following week in the Birds' win over Mia. with a career-high 173-yd. rushing performance, including a 47-yd. run on the Birds' first series and a 49-yd. TD scamper in the 4th. qtr. that sealed the victory ... two weeks later, in the Birds' 31-21 win at Dal., Watters' 24-116-1TD performance was his fifth 100-yd rushing effort in the first nine games ... then, with 26-87-2TD numbers vs. Wash. in game 11, Watters tied an Eagles' single-season record as the player to reach the 1,000-yd rushing plateau the fastest (Wilbert Montgomery and Steve Van Buren reached the four-digit plateau in 11 games in '79 and '49, respectively) ... Watters went on to log his sixth 100-yd. rushing effort of the year in a win vs. NYG on 12/1 (104 yds.). With that, the Birds raised their record to 6-0 in 1996 and 10-0 overall when Watters topped 100 yds. on the ground ... at season's end, Watters was named first team all-pro by *Sports Illustrated* and second team all-pro by *College and Pro Football Newsweekly*; also was selected as the Birds' MVP by *Eagles Digest* and as the club's "Miller Lite" player of the year ... **1995:** After coming to the Eagles as the NFL's most prominent veteran free agent signee of '95, Watters was every bit the workhorse running back the Eagles expected him to be ... en route to earning his fourth trip to the Pro Bowl, Watters fueled the Eagles' running game, turning it into the primary weapon of Philadelphia's offensive attack ... helped the Birds' ground game rank 2nd in the NFC (behind Dallas) and 4th in the NFL ... was the Birds' leader in rushing atts. & yds. (337-1,273), total yds. from scrimmage (1,707), total touchdowns (12), and rushing TDs (11) ... while the rushing and total yards from scrimmage figures all represented then-career highs for Watters, his 62 catches marked the second highest total of his career ... Watters' 1,273 rushing yds. also ranked 4th in the NFC/6th in the NFL and, at the time, represented the third best rushing effort in Eagles history ... in terms of combined rushing & receiving yds., his 1,707 yds. ranked 6th in the NFC/7th in the NFL ... his selection to the NFC Pro Bowl squad (as a backup to starters Emmitt Smith and Barry Sanders) made him the first Eagles' back so honored since Wilbert Montgomery was selected following the '80 campaign ... with his 124 rushing yds. in game 12 at Wash., Watters became the first Eagle to rush for 1,000 yds. in a season since Herschel Walker did so in '92 and only the second Eagle to do so since '85 when Earnest Jackson had 1,028 ... in game 6 vs. Wash., Watters had a monster effort with 139 rushing yds. and personal career-highs in total offense (229 yds.) and receptions



(11). Finished a fine career with the Fighting Irish with 1,814 yards rushing and 21 TDs on 325 carries ... was converted to flanker for one season by Notre Dame head coach Lou Holtz in 1988 and paced the Irish's national championship team that year with 15 receptions for 286 yards and 2 TDs ... an accomplished punt returner as well, his 97-ydr. for a TD vs. SMU in 1989 is still the longest in Irish history, while his 3 TDs on punt returns tied him for first on Notre Dame's all-time list along with current Raider WR Tim Brown and Nick Rassas.

### PRO CAREER

After fighting the injury bug in Green Bay, Willis was welcomed to Philadelphia by Eagles' head coach Ray Rhodes, who had served as the Packers' defensive boss in 1993 when Willis was plucked from Auburn in the fifth round of the NFL draft ... waived midway through the '95 campaign by the Packers, Willis signed with the Eagles shortly thereafter and earned his wings on Philadelphia's special teams over the rest of that season ... one year later, in 1996, Willis made the most of his opportunity, and used his hard-hitting style to take over the Birds' starting middle linebacker role ... **1996:** Went into training camp as somewhat of an unknown commodity and emerged as a starter and key performer on an Eagles' defense that went on to rank 5th in the league ... began the season penciled in as the #1 MLB, filling the vacancy created by the departure of free agent Kurt Gouveia to San Diego; he then held off a preseason challenge from mid-camp acquisition Joe Kelly, a veteran free agent himself ... paced the Eagles with 9 tackles in the opener at Wash. and with 10 tackles at NYG on 10/13 on his way to finishing second on the club with 77 total stops ... although recognized as a hard-hitting MLB, the defining moment of Willis' first full season as a starter came when his pass coverage skill earned him NFC defensive player of the week honors from *Pro Football Weekly* and *The Sporting News* following game 9 at Dallas. It was then, with the Birds holding a 24-21 lead and the Cowboys facing 3rd-n-goal from the Eagles' 3 with just



seconds to play, that he intercepted a Troy Aikman pass 4 yds. deep in the end zone and sealed a victory with a record-setting play. Early on in the 1996 NFL campaign, Zordich's career was appropriately summed up by the Phila. Inquirer's Bill Lyon, who wrote, "This is his 10th year in the NFL. ## VETERANS STADIUM

The Eagles have called Veterans Stadium home since 1971 after previous stops at Municipal (JFK) Stadium, Connie Mack Stadium, and Franklin Field. In their history, the Birds have also played home games at the Baker Bowl, Temple University Stadium, and Pittsburgh's Forbes Field during the 1943 season.

Veterans Stadium, known as "the Vet," is a multi-purpose sports complex located in South Philadelphia. Built on a 74-acre site, the sports complex also includes a recreational park, the CoreStates Spectrum indoor arena, and the new CoreStates Arena, home of the Philadelphia Flyers and 76ers. The Core States Center was built upon the former site of JFK Stadium.

The Vet was opened before the Phillies' 1971 baseball season and was built at a cost in excess of \$50 million. The Eagles and Phils maintain their executive offices in the stadium.

In February, 1995, the field at the Vet was replaced with a new synthetic turf called Astro Turf-8. This new state-of-the-art surface features a vertical drainage system whereby water will drain through holes in the turf, its padding, and the stone and earth sub-base.

In 1986, the Eagles installed two grass practice fields in the north parking lot of the Vet. In 1992, "the Bubble," an inclement weather facility, was moved from the former JFK Stadium site to adjacent to the grass practice fields. The Bubble consists of a synthetic roof supported by currents of air and covers a 70-yard Astro Turf field. It was installed by Air Structures International, Inc.

In 1985, 27 luxurious Penthouse Suites were built atop the south side of the stadium. Twenty-four more Suites were constructed the following year on the north side. Thirty-eight additional Suites on the west side were constructed in 1987 to bring the total number of Suites to 89.

The first Eagles' game at the Vet took place on August 16, 1971, when they defeated the Buffalo Bills in a preseason encounter, 34-28. The first regular season win came at the expense of the New York Giants, 23-7, on October 24, 1971.

In 25 seasons at Veterans Stadium, the Eagles have compiled an 112-91-2 record (including a 4-3 playoff mark). The seating capacity for football is 65,352.

**JOHN DUFF, DE (6-8, 282)**

Originally signed as a rookie free agent by Dallas in '89, Duff was waived by the Cowboys prior to the start of that season and later spent 1991-92 as a member of Team Dallas in the World League ... jumped to the LA Raiders prior to the '93 campaign, seeing action on both sides of the ball as a reserve DE and TE ... played in five regular season games and two playoff contests in two seasons for the silver and black ... then, after being exposed to the NFL's expansion draft in February of 1995, Duff became a fourth round pick of the Jacksonville Jaguars ... was subsequently waived by Jacksonville after spending the entire '95 campaign on the Jags' Injured Reserve list ... did not attend any NFL training camps in '96 ... inked a free agent deal with the Eagles on 4/7/97... as a collegian, played two seasons at tight end for New Mexico after transferring from Saddleback (CA) JC ... attended Tustin (CA) HS ... born 7/31/67 in Columbus, OH.

After spending this past spring with the World League's Scottish Claymores, Ford returns to the Eagles once again ... spent the entire '96 season as a member of the Birds' practice squad ... originally signed with Philadelphia as a rookie free agent on 4/26/96 and opened the Birds' first and second preseason games at RCB when veteran starter Bobby Taylor was sidelined by a knee injury ... was, however, released during the preseason and eventually re-signed to the practice squad on 8/28 ... as a senior at Mississippi Valley State in '95, started all 11 games, recording 39 tackles and 2 INTs ... born 1/2/72 in Greenwood, MS, where he attended Amanda Elzy HS ... majored in health education and recreation.

**RUDY HARRIS, FB (6-2, 257)**

## 1996 GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW



**GAME 1**  
**SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1, 1996**  
**PHILADELPHIA 17, WASHINGTON 14**  
**RFK STADIUM**



The Eagles opened the regular season with a 17-14 win over the Redskins at Washington's RFK Stadium. Philadelphia jumped to a 17-7 lead at halftime by outgaining the Skins 310 yards to 77 and held on to win on a sweltering afternoon (80 degrees, 87% humidity) ... Philadelphia, however, might have been on top 28-7 at intermission were it not for a fumble at the Washington 3 and a dropped pass at the goal line ... Eagles' QB Rodney Peete, who had sat out the preseason finale after suffering a sprained knee at New England, was brilliant in the first half, completing 17 of 24 passes for 257 yds and 2 TDs. On four of the Birds' first five drives, Peete moved his club inside the Washington 20, capping the first possession with an 18-yd TD strike to veteran free agent newcomer Irving Fryar, and the fourth with a 9-yd bullet to 2nd-year man Chris T. Jones. For Fryar, it was his first score as an Eagle; for Jones, it was his first TD as a pro. Jones' score, which put Philly back on top, 14-7, was set up by a 54-yd catch-n-run by rookie TE Jason Dunn ... Redskins' all-pro kickoff returner Brian Mitchell set up each of Washington's TDs. His 1st qtr. runback, a 50-ydr. to the Eagles' 45, led to Terry Allen's 2-yd scoring burst. His 42-ydr to open the second half set up Allen's 49-yd TD

scamper. Allen finished the day 20-111-2TDs rushing, but Redskins' QB Gus Frerotte was held to just 25-12-119-0TDs passing and was sacked 3 times, twice by RDE Mike Mamula, and once by LDE William Fuller ... For the first three qtrs. Peete received excellent protection from a reshuffled Eagles offensive line. One new face up front was that of 2nd-year pro Troy Drake, who replaced veteran starter Richard Cooper (sprained knee) in the 2nd qtr and played well. On the day, Peete fired completions to three WRs, three TEs, and three backs. Pro Bowl RB Ricky Walters led the Eagles on the ground with an 18-86 effort. Defensively, although the Birds registered no takeaways, they did halt Washington after each of the three turnovers committed by the Philadelphia offense ... With 6 minutes left to play, Washington missed an opportunity to tie the game at 17 when Scott Blanton's 53-yd FG try was short. Just one play earlier, Mitchell cost the Skins a 5-yd penalty with an illegal forward lateral. But the Redskins had one big chance after reaching their own 46. There, however, Eagles' SS Michael Zordich held Mitchell to no gain on a 3rd down pass, and a Philadelphia blitz on 4th down enabled DT Kevin Johnson to force Frerotte into an incomplete pass.

Philadelphia saw its record dip to 1-1 after being manhandled, 39-13, by the Packers in a Monday Night Football matchup at Green Bay. Packers' QB Brett Favre fired three TD passes, including two to WR Robert Brooks, and the Eagles' offense turned the ball over four times - upping their season total in that category to seven. By comparison, the Eagles' defense failed to record a takeaway for the second straight week .... On Philadelphia's first offensive play, Packer DB Doug Evans stole a Rodney Peete pass out of WR Chris T. Jones' hands for an INT at the PE14. That theft set up the first of four FGs on the night by Chris Jacke. Midway through the opening quarter, RB Ricky Watters' fumble at the GB44 led to a 25-yd. Favre-to-Brooks TD strike and a 10-0 Packers lead. On the Birds' ensuing drive, a pass by Peete bounced off the shoulder of Packer lineman Santana Dotson and into the arms of LB George Koonce inside Eagles territory, setting up another FG and a 13-0 Green Bay

lead .... In the 2nd stanza, 38 and 33-yd tosses from Favre to Brooks set up a TD and FG, respectively. Although a 29-yd pass to Jones (with a lateral to Irving Fryar for 33 more yds.) led to an Eagles' TD, Favre capped a two-minute drill with a 20-yd TD strike to Brooks for a 30-7 halftime lead .... After intermission, Packer RB Edgar Bennett's 25-yd TD play on a screen pass put Green Bay on top 37-10. A sack of Peete in the end zone by Reggie White in the final quarter closed out the scoring for Green Bay before the Eagles added a final 1-yd TD run by Charlie Garner .... Brooks finished the night 5-130-2TDs receiving while Favre was 32-17-261-3-0; Bennett was 17-93 on the ground as the Pack got 171 of their 432 total yards of offense via an impressive running game .... Backup QBs Jim McMahon of the Packers and Ty Detmer of the Eagles saw most of the action in the final quarter. Detmer, in fact, led the Birds' final scoring drive.

The Eagles bounced back from a lopsided defeat at Green Bay by putting their West Coast offense in high gear and engineering a 24-17 win over the Lions. Quarterback Rodney Peete (30-25-284-0-1TD passing), running back Ricky Watters (153 yards, 1TD rushing; 57 yards receiving), and wide receiver Chris T. Jones (9-121-1TD receiving) led the Birds' attack. On the day, Philadelphia outgained Detroit with 446 yards of offense to just 233 for the visitors. Detroit's all-pro RB Barry Sanders scored two TDs from in close but, overall, was held to just 49 yards on 16 carries and just one reception .... After turning the ball over 7 times and registering no takeaways in their first two games, the Eagles' offense kept a tight grip on the ball and their defense halted a Lions' drive when CB Bobby Taylor intercepted a Scott Mitchell pass in the end zone .... Watters, whose 153 rushing yards included a 52-yd jaunt on the game's first play, also contributed 6 catches for 57 yards. For Peete, who benefited from excellent pass protection, his 83.3% passing was a personal best while his 284 passing yards represented his best output as an Eagle. Peete also added to the Birds' ground game as his 4 QB sneaks earned one TD and three first downs (including two on

4th-n-1 situations). Jones, a 2nd-year player, posted career highs with 9 catches for 121 yds .... Two Eagles rookies made the first starts of their career - TE Jason Dunn and FS Brian Dawkins, the latter of whom was in the lineup at Green Bay when the Birds started five DBs, but this time found himself among the four regulars .... The Eagles jumped on top 7-0 on their first possession as Watters' 52-yd burst set up his own 11-yd TD scamper. Detroit came right back, only to have Taylor pick off a Mitchell pass in the end zone. The two teams then traded field goals as Detroit's Jason Hanson nailed a 50-ydr. and Philadelphia's Gary Anderson hit a 39-ydr. In the 3rd qtr., Philadelphia scored on its first drive as Peete hit Jones from 17 yards out, but Detroit answered with an 8-yd. run by Sanders. Leading 17-10 midway through the final stanza, the Eagles faced a 3rd-n-28 at the D39 when Jones took a short pass and ran over a defender on his way to a 38-yd gain that set up Peete's QB sneak for a TD. A 49-yd return by Glyn Milbourn on the ensuing kick and a 34-yd Mitchell-to-Brett Perriman pass led to a 1-yd. TD run by Sanders as Detroit cut the Eagles lead to 24-17. Philadelphia, however, used a 16-yd pass to Jones and the rushing of Watters to run out the clock.

The Eagles' defense registered 5 interceptions and Ricky Walters rushed for 121 yards and 2 TDs as the Eagles topped the host Atlanta Falcons, 33-18, to up their record to 3-1. Philadelphia's special teams also chipped in as Derrick Witherspoon returned a kickoff 97 yards for a score and Gary Anderson booted 4 field goals. Anderson's effort moved him past the legendary George Blanda and into a tie with Atlanta's Morten Andersen for 3rd place on the NFL's all-time FG list at 337 apiece .... Walters, who had a 153-yd rushing effort vs. Detroit a week earlier, bulled his way to a 2-yd TD in the 1st qtr and then burst off right guard for a 56-yd TD in the 3rd qtr. The 56-yd scamper was the longest TD run of Walters' career .... RLB William Thomas (2 INTs) and LDE William Fuller (2 sacks) led the defense. For Thomas, it was the third 2-INT game of his career. Other Eagles who registered pass thefts were CB Troy Vincent, SS Mike Zordich, and FS Brian Dawkins. Philadelphia's 5 INTs were the most by the club since they hauled in 6 at Arizona on 10/15/89. The Birds had entered the contest with just one takeaway in their first three games .... Philadelphia, however, struggled inside the red zone settling for just one TD

and four FGs on five trips inside the plus-20 yard line. Similarly, the Eagles squandered opportunities as they came away with just a field goal following their first four takeaways .... Philadelphia had opened a 13-0 lead in the 2nd qtr on two FGs and the first of Walters' two TD runs. But Atlanta struck back as a 67-yd pass to Eric Metcalf set up a 23-yd scoring strike from Jeff George to Bert Emanuel. The Birds seemed to halt Atlanta's next drive when CB Bobby Taylor recovered a Falcons' fumble in Eagles' territory. Taylor, however, fumbled the ball back to the Falcons who, with 0:09 left in the half, cut their deficit to 13-10 with a FG .... Walters' 56-yd TD run in the 3rd qtr upped the Eagles' lead to 10 before Thomas notched INTs on successive drives, first off of George, then off of his replacement Bobby Hebert. The first of those INTs set up a FG and a 13-point bulge. Hebert, however, cut into the lead with a TD pass and a 2-pt. conversion loss to WR Terance Mathis. But the Birds put the game out of reach when Witherspoon returned the ensuing kickoff for a TD .... Dawkins and Zordich snuffed out Atlanta's final two possessions with INTs.

In a nationally televised Monday night tilt, the host Eagles bowed to the defending Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys, 23-19. Dallas RB Emmitt Smith rushed for 92 yards and 1 TD and QB Troy Aikman was 23-13-149-1TD-0INT passing as the Cowboys overcame a 10-0 first-quarter deficit and a raucous Veterans Stadium crowd to secure a key NFC East victory .... The loss was a costly one, too, as QB Rodney Peete suffered a ruptured patella tendon in his right knee during the 2nd qtr. that sidelined him for the remainder of the season. ... The Eagles raced to a 10-0 lead with 3:48 remaining in the first qtr. when RB Ricky Watters scored on a 2-yd TD run. Watters's jaunt followed a 46-yd Gary Anderson FG early in the first stanza .... The Cowboys roared back, however, with 20 consecutive points to close the first half. First, former Eagle Herschel Walker's 49-yd kickoff return set up an Aikman TD pass to TE Eric Bjornson that cut the Birds lead to 10-7. Smith then followed with a 5-yd TD run and Chris Boniol added two FGs to give the Cowboys a 20-10 halftime advantage .... With momentum in favor of the Cowboys, and Philadelphia desperate for a big play, Eagles FS Brian Dawkins and DT Rhett Hall delivered early

in the 3rd stanza. On a safety blitz, Dawkins blindsided Aikman and jarred the ball loose right into the hands of Hall, who rumbled 32 yards for his first career touchdown. Hall also recovered a fumble in the 4th qtr. after DE William Fuller sacked Aikman .... QB Ty Detmer, who relieved Peete after the injury, suffered a concussion early in the 3rd qtr. and subsequently struggled, finishing 16-9-98-0-1INT passing. With 4:35 remaining in the game and the Eagles trailing 23-17, a gutsy Detmer moved the Birds from their own 22-yd line to the Cowboys' 29, prior to being intercepted by SS George Teague. After Cowboys P John Jett opted to run time off the clock by running out of the end zone for a safety, the Eagles were given one more shot to win from their own 41, but rookie QB Bobby Hoying was sacked to end the contest ... Bright spots for the Eagles included FB Kevin Turner, who finished the game with a career-high 79 yards on 4 catches, including a career-long 41-yd catch from Peete in the 1st stanza ... With 5 pts. on the night, K Gary Anderson moved into a 4th-place tie with Eddie Murray on the NFL's all-time scoring leader list with 1,473.

Gary Anderson booted four field goals, including a game-winning 29-ydr. with 2:12 left to play, as the visiting Eagles overcame a 10-3 deficit en route to a 19-10 victory. Anderson's fourth FG in as many tries put the Birds on top 12-10 and gave them their first lead of the day. One play later, RDE Mike Mamula sacked Giants' QB Dave Brown and caused a fumble that LB William Thomas returned 23 yards for a TD. The sack by Mamula was one of the season-high eight registered by Philadelphia. Mamula led the way with 2.5 sacks while LDE William Fuller chipped in 2 more. In all, the Eagles' defense held New York to just 150 yards of offense, including only 63 net yards passing .... Offensively, Ty Detmer started at QB for the Eagles in place of Rodney Peete who was lost for the season when he suffered a torn tendon in his right knee a week earlier vs. Dallas. For Detmer, a fifth-year pro in his first season with the Birds, it marked the first starting assignment of his NFL career. Despite a number of dropped balls by Eagles receivers, Detmer finished the day 33-18-170-0-0TDs passing.

Philadelphia RB Ricky Watters was 27-110 for his third 100-yd. rushing game of the year. Eight of Watters' carries and 40 of his rushing yards came on the 4th quarter march to the game-winning field goal .... In the first half, the Giants enjoyed great field position, starting their first four drives on the NY 45, 47, 46, and 36 while the Birds' first five drives started inside their own 22. New York took an early 3-0 lead when Brad Daluiso's 39-yd FG capped a 31-yd drive that featured six runs by Rodney Hampton. Philadelphia responded with a FG that was set up by WR Irving Fryar's spectacular one-handed, leaping grab of a 30-yd. Detmer pass. Moments later, Giants' WR Amani Toomer fielded a Tom Hutton punt and, with the aid of an illegal block that went unpenalized, raced 65 yards for a TD and a 10-3 lead. In the second half, the Eagles chipped away until Anderson's 4th FG put the Birds on top and Thomas's TD gave them the game .... The 4-4 FG outing by Anderson was his second such effort in three weeks; he also was 4-4 in a win at Atlanta on Sept. 22.

Philadelphia used four Ty Detmer-to-Irving Fryar TD passes and a 47-yd scoring romp by Ricky Watters to defeat the Miami Dolphins, 35-28, and up their record to 5-2 .... With his 4 TD receptions (38, 2, 12, and 36 yds), Fryar tied an Eagles' single game record set by Ben Hawkins in 1969 and Joe Carter in 1934. On the day, the 34-year old Fryar was 8-116-4TDs vs. his former Dolphins teammates (Fryar played for Miami from 1993-95). Watters led the ground attack, carrying 25 times for a career-high 173 yards, including 47 and 49-yd bursts. The 47-ydr, on the second play of the game, set up a TD; the 49-yd TD run came with 2:28 left to play and sealed the win. Detmer made just the second start of his career, filling in for the second straight week for the injured Rodney Peete, who suffered a season-ending knee injury on Sept. 30. With great protection from his offensive line, Detmer completed 18 of 24 passes for 226 yds and 4 TDs. As such, he became the first Eagle QB to toss 4 TD passes in a game since Randall Cunningham did so vs. the Patriots on Nov. 4, 1990 .... Leading 7-0, the Eagles took over at the Miami 49 after a 26-yd punt re-

turn from Mark Seay. Minutes later, the second Detmer-to-Fryar TD put the Birds up 14-0 before Joe Nedney's 37-yd FG got Miami on the board. Miami QB Craig Erickson, starting in place of the injured Dan Marino (ankle), then led an 80-yd scoring drive, using 36-yd and 22-yd passes to set up a 6-yd TD toss to Randall Hill. Detmer and the Eagles, however, executed a perfect 2-minute drill, capping a 75-yd march with a 12-yd TD strike to Fryar for a 21-11 halftime lead .... In the second half, the Eagles opened up a 17 point lead before Erickson drilled a 24-yd TD pass to O.J. McDuffie and Joe Nedney booted a 39-yd FG to cut that lead to 28-21. Then, with 2:38 to play, Watters put the Birds on top, 35-21, by ripping off a 49-yd TD jaunt. But Miami responded quickly, starting at the PE 42 following a long kickoff return and a penalty on the Eagles. Six plays later, QB Bernie Kosar, on in relief of Erickson, fired a 17-yd TD toss to McDuffie to once again bring Miami within 7 points. Philadelphia squashed any remaining hope Miami had of a comeback, however, by recovering the ensuing onside kick.

The Eagles won their third straight game, defeating the visiting Carolina Panthers 20-9, in the first-ever meeting between the two teams. The win lifted the Birds' record to 6-2 and kept them within one game of the NFC East Division-leading Washington Redskins (7-1) ... While Eagles' RB Ricky Watters, who had entered the game as the leading rusher in the NFC, was held in check (21-33-1.6 rushing), QB Ty Detmer sparked in his third consecutive start. Detmer finished the game with career-high passing figures for attempts, completions, and yards (38-23-342). With his 342 passing yds, Detmer became the first Eagles' passer to top the 300-yr mark since Bobby Brister did so at Cincinnati on 12/24/94. Just one week after firing 4 TD passes to WR Irving Fryar against Miami, Detmer again made Fryar his go-to guy vs. Carolina. On the day, Fryar hauled in 7 passes for 143 yards, including a 42-ydr that set up the Birds' first TD and a 36-ydr that led to a fourth qtr. field goal. The seven catches by the 13th-year pro enabled him to become just the 15th player in NFL history to reach the 600-reception plateau ... Philadelphia took a 7-0 lead on its first drive and upped that margin

to 14-0 just before the half. The Birds' second TD came when Delmer, for the second straight week, led a 2-minute drill that resulted in a TD just before halftime. This time rookie TE Jason Dunn hauled in his first career TD pass, a 9-yd TD strike. Carolina QB Kerry Collins, however, quickly moved his club to the Eagles 29, setting up John Kasay's 47-yd FG that pulled the Panthers to within 14-3 at intermission ... In the 3rd qtr, Eagles CB Troy Vincent forced a fumble by RB Anthony Johnson that DE Mike Mamula recovered at the Panthers 22, setting up a 46-yd FG by Gary Anderson. Carolina came right back, marching to the Eagles 12 before a 3rd down sack of Collins by rookie DT Hollis Thomas forced the Panthers to settle for another FG and a 17-6 deficit. But an interception of Detmer by Carolina CB Eric Davis minutes later gave the Panthers the ball at the Philadelphia 19. Once again, however, Carolina mustered only a FG. After an Anderson FG put Philly on top 20-9 in the 4th qtr, the Birds held off another Panther march when Vincent again forced a fumble, this one by a scrambling Collins, that was recovered by FS Brian Dawkins at the Eagles 4-yd line.

With one of the most exciting finishes in Eagles' history, the Birds defeated the host Cowboys, 31-21, and improved their record to 7-2, good for a share of the NFC East division lead with Washington ... After Gary Anderson's 20-yd FG gave the Birds a 24-21 lead with 3:19 to play, QB Troy Aikman and WRs Michael Irvin and Kelvin Martin marched Dallas to the Birds' 3-yd line. Once there, CB Troy Vincent held RB Emmitt Smith to one yard on a sweep and LB Sylvester Wright threw Smith for a 1-yd loss. Then, on 3rd down and with 0:56 to go, SS Michael Zordich and LDE William Fuller pressured Aikman - the result was an interception by MLB James Willis 4 yards deep in the end zone. Although Dallas was out of timeouts and the Eagles needed only to kneel on the ball, Willis returned it 14 yards before laterally to Vincent who raced the final 90 yds for a TD (the longest return of an INT for a touchdown in NFL history) ... In a game featuring matchups like Eagles CB Troy Vincent vs. WR Deion Sanders and Eagles CB Bobby Taylor against Irvin, Sanders was held to just 2 catches and Irvin was shut out in the first half ... Philly's offense was led by QB Ty Detmer, who ran 6 yds for a TD and went 33-19-217-0-1TD passing while raising his record as a starter to 4-0 since taking over for the injured Rodney Peete. The Birds' offensive line allowed no sacks and also

enabled Ricky Watters (24-116-1TD) to be the first back to rush for over 100 yds vs. Dallas in 1996. Detmer's #1 receiver - for the third straight week - was WR Irving Fryar whose 9-120-1TD effort tied his career high for receptions and made him the first Eagle WR to notch three straight 100-yd games since Mike Quick did so in 1985 ... Former Eagle Herschel Walker opened the game with an 86-yd kick return that set up Smith's 1-yd TD run. Philly responded when Watters capped a 74-yd drive with a 5-yd TD run. Then, after Aikman recovered a fumbled snap on 3rd down at the PE1, Dallas had to settle for a Chris Boniol FG and a 10-7 lead. Just before intermission, however, two runs by Watters and three Detmer passes (including a 3rd down, 24-yd toss to Mark Seay) set up Detmer's 6-yd QB draw for a 14-10 lead. It marked the third straight week in which Detmer led the Birds to a TD in the final minutes of the first half ... After Dallas pulled to within one, Detmer capped a 75-yd march with a 14-yd TD pass to Fryar late in the 3rd qtr for a 21-13 lead. Dallas quickly tied the game with a 7-yd TD run by Smith and Aikman's 2-pt. conversion toss to TE Eric Bjornsen. Minutes later, Aikman threw a pass that Eagle S James Fuller hauled in at the D35 for his first career interception. That led to Anderson's go-ahead FG and set the stage for the amazing finish.

For the second straight week, Philadelphia saw a dramatic ending unfold inside the 5-yard line. A week earlier, with Dallas at the Birds' 3-yd line, Eagles' MLB James Willis intercepted a pass by Troy Aikman to preserve a victory. This time, however, Philadelphia's Ty Detmer marched the Birds to the Buffalo 3 only to be sacked by Bruce Smith on 4th down with 0:28 left to play. Although the loss put the Eagles' record at 7-3, Arizona's overtime victory at Washington dropped the NFC East co-leading Redskins to 7-3 as well .... Against Buffalo, Philadelphia got off to a solid start, scoring a TD on their opening drive for the fourth straight week as Detmer capped a 74-yd drive with a TD toss to FB Kevin Turner. On the Eagles' next possession, however, disaster struck as Gabe Northern blocked a punt by Tom Hutton, chased down the loose ball, and returned it 18 yds for a TD that knotted the game at 7-7. Philadelphia quickly recaptured the lead with a 70-yd drive that ended with a 23-yd FG by Gary Anderson. The lead was shortlived, however, as Buffalo went on top 17-10 late in the first half with the aid of a 5-yd TD run by Thurman Thomas and a 38-yd FG by Steve Christie .... Midway through the 3rd qtr, Philadelphia had a

chance to pin the Bills deep in their own end but a 15-yd punt gave Buffalo the ball at their 26. Fifteen plays and four third down conversions later, Jim Kelly tossed a 5-yd TD strike to WR Quinn Early for a 24-10 Buffalo lead. The biggest of the Bills' third down conversions on that series was a 23-yd run by Thurman Thomas on 3rd-n-13 from the Eagles 34. Overall, Buffalo was successful on 69% of its third down plays (9 of 13) while the Eagles were just 5-12 (41.6%) prior to their final drive .... The Birds did come to life in the fourth qtr with a Detmer-to-Irving Fryar TD pass that brought them to within 7 points. Then with 8:02 left to play, Detmer marched the Eagles 73 yards to the Buffalo 3. There, on fourth down, excellent coverage on Philadelphia receivers gave Smith time to sack Detmer and snuff out the Eagles' comeback effort .... On the day, Detmer withstood a pounding from the Bills (5 sacks) to throw for 315 yards and 2 TDs. The Birds also got a spark from reserve RB Charlie Garner in the 2nd half. Garner, who saw his most extensive action since opening day, finished the afternoon as the Eagles' leading rusher with 60 yds on 10 carries.

For the second straight week, the Eagles had an opportunity to pull out a last-minute victory but fell short, this time allowing the Redskins to escape with a 26-21 victory. After being halted on 4th-and-goal at the Buffalo 3 a week earlier, the Eagles, trailing by five, reached the Redskins' 20 with just 24 seconds to play. Four incompletions followed, however, and the Eagles' comeback effort was snuffed out. The loss dropped the Birds (7-4) to second place in the NFC East and put Washington (8-3) atop the division .... Washington got on board first with a 37-yd FG by Scott Blanton late in the 1st quarter. Both clubs then traded interceptions before Eagles' RB Ricky Watters lost a fumble at the Birds' 25. Six plays later, Gus Frerotte threw the first of his 2 TD passes to tight end Jamie Asher for a 10-0 lead. Philadelphia responded with a 9-play drive capped by Watters' 1-yd TD plunge. But when the ensuing kickoff went out of bounds, Washington took over at their own 40 with two minutes left in the half. Frerotte then led the Skins to another FG and a 13-7 lead .... In the second half, Washington extended its lead to 20-7 as Frerotte connected with Asher from 7 yards out on the Skins' first drive. Philadelphia came right back as

RB Charlie Garner ignited the Birds with three straight runs of 10, 22, and 9 yards, setting up a Ty Detmer-to-Chris T. Jones TD pass. Garner, however, suffered an ankle injury on the third run and was sidelined for the remainder of the game .... Washington answered the Birds' TD with Blanton's third FG, a 30-ydr. that put the Skins up 23-14. Early in the final stanza, Watters and Detmer led a 79-yd march that brought Philadelphia to within two points. But Blanton's fourth FG in as many tries boosted Washington's lead to 26-21 with 1:20 left to play and set the stage for a dramatic ending. Starting at his own 28, Detmer fired 22 and 19-yd passes to Jones before an 11-ydr to Watters put the Eagles at Washington's 20 with 24 ticks left on the clock. From there, Detmer tried four different receivers but four incompletions resulted and Washington had held off the Eagles .... On the day, Watters topped the 1,000-yd rushing mark in the 11th game of the season and thereby tied Wilbert Montgomery and Steve Van Buren as the Eagles to reach 1,000 yards the fastest (Montgomery did so in 11 games in 1979, Van Buren in 1949). Watters also joined Montgomery as the only Eagles to post consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

In one of the wildest finishes ever, the Eagles overcame a 9-point deficit in the final 2:30, only to surrender a game-winning TD to the host Cardinals with 0:14 remaining ... When it was over, Arizona had won 36-30 and the Eagles - with a chance to win in the final moments for the third straight week - dropped their third consecutive contest ... Trailing 29-20, Philly's Derrick Witherspoon returned a kickoff 95 yards for a TD. Seconds later, the Eagles attempted two onside kicks - the first was negated by a penalty; Johnny Thomas recovered the second attempt at the PE 41 .... Three completions by Ty Detmer then moved the Eagles deep into Arizona territory before three runs forced the Cards to use all their timeouts. Gary Anderson then drilled a 32-yd FG that put Philadelphia up 30-29. After the ensuing kick, Arizona took over at its own 34 with 0:45 to go. Cardinals' QB Boomer Esiason calmly led a 6-play drive, however, capped by a 24-yd TD strike to Marcus Dowdell for a 36-30 lead with 14 ticks left on the clock .... The loss dropped the Eagles' record to 7-5 and was more difficult to accept when division-foes Washington (8-4) and Dallas (7-5) both lost .... On the day, the Eagles' defense surrendered a season-high 447 total

yards. Esiason's 43 passes, 24 completions, and 367 passing yards all marked season-highs against Philly as well. WR Rob Moore was Esiason's #1 target, hauling in 9 catches for 156 yards .... Phila. had jumped out to a 7-0 lead after MLB Joe Kelly, starting in place of the injured James Willis, forced a tumble by LeShon Johnson that Phila. recovered at the Cards' 22. Arizona then got a FG from Kevin Butler but had a subsequent attempt in the 1st qtr blocked by Kelly. It was the first FG blocked by the Eagles since 11/13/88 .... After Anderson's 2nd FG put Philly on top 10-3, Esiason's 26 and 35-yd passes to Moore set up a 4-yd run by Leeland McElroy that tied the game. Two more Butler FGs gave Arizona a 16-13 lead entering the final stanza. In that breathtaking 4th qtr, Arizona would record TDs on all three of its possessions while the Eagles would get a TD from their offense, a kickoff return for a score, and a successful onside kick that led to a go-ahead FG. Arizona's 3rd and final TD of the quarter, however, proved to be the biggest .... On the day, WR Irving Fryar (7-131) posted his fourth 100-yd game of the year and moved past Drew Hill and into 13th place on the NFL's career receiving yardage list with 9,868.

The Eagles snapped a three-game losing streak and raised their record to 8-5 with a 24-0 victory over the visiting New York Giants. The shutout, the Birds' first since Sept. 20, 1992, enabled Philadelphia to move into a tie atop the NFC East division alongside the Cowboys and Redskins, both of whom moved to 8-5 after Dallas' Thanksgiving Day win over Washington .... Philadelphia was led by QB Ty Detmer, who completed 25 of 33 passes for 284 yds and 3 TDs despite a driving rain. Wideouts Irving Fryar and Chris T. Jones and tight end Jason Dunn hauled in Detmer's TD strikes. Fryar, who was 6-59-1TD on the day, topped the 1,000-yd mark for the season and raised his career reception total to 635. His six catches also moved him past Raymond Berry, Don Maynard, and Drew Hill and into 12th place on the NFL's all-time reception list. On the ground, RB Ricky Watters turned in his sixth 100-yd effort of the year, going 29-104 ... The Eagles' defense, a unit that had struggled in recent weeks, turned in its best effort of the year, registering five sacks and four takeaways while limiting New York to 121 total yards. Rookie LLB Ray Farmer forced two fumbles and notched an INT, a sack, and a fumble recovery all in the first half. LDE William Fuller chipped in two sacks .... The Eagles, who took the opening kick and marched to the NY 12 before losing a fumbled snap, took a 3-0 lead minutes later when

Farmer's INT off Dave Brown set up a 44-yd Gary Anderson FG. That boot, Anderson's 12th straight successful FG, enabled him to tie a club record set by Sam Baker in 1966-67. Later in the 1st qtr, back-to-back passes of 36 and 17 yards to Watters set up the 14-yd Detmer-to-Dunn TD loss that upped the Birds' lead to 10-0. Then, after Mark Seay muffed a punt and New York took over on the Eagles' 9, Farmer sacked Brown and forced a fumble that Fuller recovered. Early in the 2nd stanza, Farmer forced and recovered a fumble by RB Tyrone Wheatley in Giants' territory. Two plays later, Detmer fired a 19-yd TD pass for a 17-0 lead. Philadelphia then closed out the half with a 15-play TD drive that chewed 7:57 off the clock. Detmer's 2-yd TD bullet to Chris T. Jones capped the drive .... After intermission, the Eagles had three straight scoring opportunities but came up empty each time. Early in the 3rd qtr, Troy Vincent returned an INT off Brown to the NY 13 but Philadelphia was stopped short on 4th-n-goal from the 1. The Eagles then saw a 44-yd FG try by Gary Anderson sail wide and, early in the final stanza, marched to the NY 9 before CB Jason Sehorn picked off a Detmer pass in the end zone .... New York's Brown was 11-3-31-2-0TDs passing in the first three quarters before giving way to Danny Kanell, who fared no better, going just 13-4-47-0-0TDs through the air.

In a Thursday night contest televised nationally by ESPN, the Eagles picked a bad time to play their worst game of the year. The result was a 37-10 drubbing at the hands of the host Indianapolis Colts. In fact, the final score, made closer only by an Eagles' TD with 0:05 left to play, was not indicative of the dominance displayed by the Colts .... Indianapolis, playing without a number of injured starters - including QB Jim Harbaugh - took a 7-0 lead on their first possession and never looked back. Turnovers were a huge factor in the game as the Birds, under relentless pressure from the blitzing Colts, committed three, Indianapolis, meanwhile, committed none .... A 31-yd FG by Gary Anderson brought Philadelphia to within 7-3, but Indy went on to rip off 30 straight points, including three field goals and a TD in the second stanza. The second qtr. was also costly for the Eagles as CB Troy Vincent (strained knee) and FS Brian Dawkins (strained groin) were sidelined for the remainder of the game .... After the first of Cary Blanchard's three 2nd qtr. boots put Indy up 10-3, FS Jason Belsler intercepted a Ty Detmer pass that went off the hands of WR Irving Fryar and returned it

44 yards for a score. Six plays later, blitzing LB Steve Morrison deflected a Detmer pass that fellow LB Trev Alberts INTd and returned to the Birds' 38. Moments later, Blanchard booted a 42-yd FG. On the ensuing Philadelphia drive, Detmer was intercepted for the third time in as many series, this time by Belsler again. That INT set up a 51-yd FG by Blanchard as the Colts took a 23-3 halftime lead .... In the 3rd qtr, the Eagles went 3-plays-and-out on their two possessions. Meanwhile, Indy QB Kerwin Bell came on in relief of Paul Justin (shoulder), who had started in place of Harbaugh and gone 23-14-144 passing in only his 3rd career start. Bell, seeing his first action as a pro, went on to complete all 5 of his passes, throwing for 75 yards and one TD, a 20-yd strike to rookie WR Marvin Harrison. Colts' RB Marshall Faulk led his club in both rushing (16-101-2TD) and receptions (7-40), while Harrison finished with 6 catches for 106 yds and one TD. Midway through the 4th qtr, Eagles' backup QB Mark Rypien saw his first action of the year, replacing Detmer for the final two series. Rypien closed out the scoring with an 8-yd. TD toss to Fryar.

In a nationally televised encounter with the Jets, the visiting Eagles trailed all afternoon before staging a fourth quarter rally and a 21-20 come-from-behind victory. The win upped the Birds' record to 9-7 and, coupled with Washington's loss at Arizona the following day, put Philadelphia into the playoffs as a wild card team for the second straight season .... In the first half, New York capitalized on the two takeaways registered by its defense while the Eagles, who twice took over inside New York territory following Jets' miscues, came up empty both times. First, Jets' DB Marcus Coleman intercepted a Ty Detmer pass when WR Freddie Solomon slipped, then the New Yorkers recovered a fumble by Ricky Waters. They then turned those takeaways into a 46-yd Glenn Foley-to-Keyshawn Johnson TD pass and a 27-yd Nick Lowery FG, respectively .... Shortly after intermission, Philadelphia got on the board when SS Mike Zordich's INT off Foley set up a 40-yd TD strike from Detmer to WR Irving Fryar. On that play, Fryar logged his 82nd catch of the year and etched his name into the Eagles' record books, surpassing Keith Jackson and Keith Byars, who had shared the club record for receptions in a single season. Moments later,

however, CB Aaron Glenn stepped in front of a slanting Fryar, picked off a Detmer aerial, and raced 13 yards for a score. Just three plays later, Chad Cascadden sacked Detmer, forcing a fumble that DE Hugh Douglas recovered at the Eagles' 28. The resulting Lowery FG upped New York's lead to 20-7 at the close of the third quarter. Philadelphia's defense, however, soon caught fire. After struggling in four of the five previous games, the Birds' D made big plays when it counted most .... After Detmer fired 24 and 31-yd completions to Fryar and TE Jimmy Johnson, respectively, he capped an 80-yd drive with a 2-yd TD pass to WR Chris T. Jones and set the stage for the defense. Two plays later, Zordich gave the Eagles the ball at the NY 18 when he stepped in front of a Foley pass and logged the first 2-INT day of his career. Detmer then fired a TD strike to Fryar (4-92-2TDs on the day) and Gary Anderson's extra point kick put the Birds on top 21-20 with 5:18 left to play. Although New York returned the ensuing kickoff to their own 44 and moved into Eagles' territory, the Birds' sealed the game when LB William Thomas INT'd a tipped Foley pass and RB Charlie Garner ripped off a 46-yd run to run out the clock.

The Eagles closed out the regular season with a 29-19 victory over the visiting Arizona Cardinals. The win boosted the Eagles' record to 10-6 and sealed a second place finish in the NFC East division for the second consecutive season. (The 10-6 Dallas Cowboys, who fell at Washington on the season's final weekend, had clinched the division title a week earlier on the basis of a better record versus common opponents) .... A solid effort by the Birds' defense, including 3 sacks by Pro Bowl DE William Fuller, and a 5-5 effort on field goals by Gary Anderson were the keys to Philadelphia's victory. Defensive end Mike Mamula got the Birds started when, on the second play of the game, he sacked Arizona QB Kent Graham at the Card's 4-yd. line, recovered the loose ball and returned it for a touchdown. Philadelphia then booted 3 straight FGs. The first two of those FGs were set up by long drives; the last was set up when SS Mike Zordich returned an interception off Graham 28 yards to the Cards' 19. For Zordich, it was his third INT in two weeks. The Eagles then allowed Arizona a FG before RB Ricky Watters capped a 77-yd drive with a 1-yd TD run that put Philadelphia on top

23-3 at halftime .... Boomer Esiason replaced Graham in the 3rd qtr. and led a FG drive in his first series at the helm. The Eagles responded with FGs on their next two drives and took a commanding 29-6 lead early in the final stanza. Arizona fought back, however, with a 22-yd Esiason TD pass to RB Leeland McElroy. Then, on the Birds' subsequent possession, CB Aeneas Williams intercepted a Detmer pass and raced 65 yds to a TD that cut Philadelphia's lead to 29-19. Moments later, Butler, who had already missed one PAT kick, was off the mark on a 38-yd FG try that would have set up a dramatic finish .... With 17 points on the afternoon, Anderson upped his season total to 115, second best in club history only to the 116 scored by kicker Paul McFadden in 1984. For Anderson, it was the third 5-5 FG game of his career. Watters, with 31 attempts for a game-high 99 rushing yards, raised his season total for carries to 353 and topped the old club mark of 338 set by Wilbert Montgomery in 1979. The 3-sack effort by Fuller upped his team-leading total to 13 for the second consecutive year.

As the fifth of six seeds in the NFC playoffs, the Eagles (10-6, 2nd in the NFC East division) met the fourth-seeded 49ers (10-6, 2nd in the NFC West) at San Francisco's 3Com Park ... On a day dominated by constant rain and winds reaching up to 51 miles per hour, the Birds' inability to produce points once inside the 49ers' 20-yd line proved costly. The result was a 14-0 loss for Philadelphia and the first ever shutout registered against the Eagles in post-season play ... On the game's opening drive, Philadelphia marched 43 yards to San Francisco's 14. There, however, LB Lee Woodall registered the first of the Niners' three sacks vs. Eagles quarterbacks. Woodall threw Ty Detmer for an 8-yd. loss and forced the Birds to settle for a 40-yd FG attempt by Gary Anderson that was pushed wide left by the gusting winds. Thus had begun a trend of red zone futility that would plague the Eagles all afternoon ... Early in the second stanza, QB Steve Young got the 49ers going, engineering a 74-yd drive comprised of short passes to five different receivers. Young then put San Francisco on the scoreboard first by capping the drive with a 9-yd TD run on a quarterback draw. But Young paid a price for his TD, suffering badly bruised ribs on the play when he was hit by DE Darion Conner. The subsequent pain would make it difficult for

Young to throw as the game wore on. On the Birds' next possession, Detmer moved the offense to the SF 7, where, when faced with a 3rd-n-1 situation, the 49ers blitzed again. This time, MLB Ken Norton came up the middle and forced Detmer to throw the ball away. But Norton got enough of Detmer's throwing arm that the ball fluttered and was intercepted by CB Marquez Pope in the end zone ... Just before the half, the Eagles came up empty once again when, at the SF 5, a Detmer pass intended for WR Chris T. Jones was picked off by DE Roy Barker ... On Philadelphia's first possession of the 2nd half, misfortune struck once again as QB Ty Detmer was forced to exit the game after sustaining a pulled hamstring when sacked by DT Bryant Young. Mark Rypien, seeing action for only the second time in '96, took over the QB reins for the remainder of the contest ... The only scoring in the second half came midway through the 3rd qtr when Young capped a 61-yd drive with a 3-yd TD strike to WR Jerry Rice for a 14-0 lead. A 36-yd Young-to-Rice connection set up the TD ... Strong defense by both clubs and poor weather conditions dominated the last stanza. On the games final play, Forty Niner SS Tim McDonald closed out the game and the Birds' 1996 season by intercepting Mark Rypien's "Hail Mary" pass.

## THE EAGLES' STORY

**1933** — Frankford Yellowjackets' franchise in the NFL awarded to syndicate headed by Bert Bell and Lud Wray for \$2500. Club christened "Eagles" in honor of the symbol of the New Deal's National Recovery Act. Eagles and Chicago Bears play in Philadelphia's first Sunday game (Nov. 12) at Baker Bowl. Game ends in a 3-3 tie.

**1935** — General manager Bert Bell proposes an annual college draft to equalize talent in the league. Proposal is adopted on May 19 for the 1936 season.

**1936** — Eagles have first choice in the inaugural college draft and select University of Chicago back Jay Berwanger but fail to sign him. Bell becomes sole owner of the team with \$4,000 bid. Playing site for home games moves from Baker Bowl to Municipal Stadium.

**1939** — Davey O'Brien, Texas Christian's All-America quarterback, signs with the Eagles for a reported \$12,000 per year salary and percentage of the gate. O'Brien plays in every game and sets NFL passing yardage record with 1,324 yards. On October 22, the Eagles play in the first televised pro football game and fell to the host Brooklyn Dodgers, 23-14, at Brooklyn Ebbets Field. Allan "Skip" Walz broadcasts the game for NBC from Ebbett's field to the approximate 1,000 TV sets then in Brooklyn.

**1940** — Home playing site switches from Municipal Stadium to Shibe Park (later known as Connie Mack Stadium). Pittsburgh owner Art Rooney buys half interest in the Eagles after selling the Steelers franchise to Alexis Thompson of New York, a 30-year old heir to a six million fortune in steel stocks.

**1941** — Bell and Rooney swap franchises with Thompson, Rooney returning to Pittsburgh and Thompson taking over the Eagles. Bert Bell joins Rooney as a full-time partner in Pittsburgh. Thompson hires Earl (Greasy) Neale as head coach of the Eagles.

**1943** — Eagles merge with Pittsburgh Steelers to form the "Steagles" due to manpower shortage during World War II. Merger dissolved at end of season.

**1944** — First draft choice Steve Van Buren debuts as Eagles' halfback. Team finishes in second place with 7-1-2 record.

**1945** — Team again finishes in second place with 7-3 record and leads league in scoring with 272 points. Van Buren leads NFL with 838 rushing yards and 110 points.

**1946** — Team finishes second for third straight year with 6-5 record.

**1947** — Rookie end Pete Pihos, Van Buren, and Bosh Pritchard combine with an overpowering defense to lead Philadelphia into the NFL championship game for the first time but the Chicago Cardinals earn the NFL title with a 28-21 victory at icy Comiskey Park.

**1948** — Eagles win their first NFL championship, defeating the Chicago Cardinals, 7-0, in a blinding snowstorm at Shibe Park. Team finishes with overall record of 10-2-1.

**1949** — Thompson sells the team to 100 buyers, each of whom paid \$3,000 for one of the 100 shares. They were called the "Happy Hundred" or the "100 Brothers". Their leader was James P. Clark, a Philadelphia sportsman and business executive, and the 100 investors included some of the leading names in Philadelphia business, government and politics, including Leonard Tose. Vince McNally is named general manager. University of Pennsylvania All-America center-linebacker Chuck Bednarik is a first round draft choice.

**1950** — Eagles win third straight Eastern Division title and defend their NFL championship with a 14-0 victory over the Los Angeles Rams. Team finishes with overall



record of 12-1.

**1951** — Alvin (Bo) McMillan replaces Greasy Neale as head coach after a 6-6 season in 1950. McMillan becomes ill the night before the season opener and is replaced by Wayne Millner. End-placekicker Bobby Walston is named rookie of the year.

**1952** — Jim Trimble succeeds Wayne Millner as head coach. Team rides strong defense to 7-5 second place finish.

**1953** — Bobby Thomason and Adrian Burk combine to pass for a league-high 3,089 yards. Pete Pihos catches 63 passes for 1,049 yards and 10 touchdowns to lead league. Eagles finish in second place and snap Cleveland's 11-game winning streak with 42-27 win in season finale.

**1954** — Bobby Walston leads league in scoring with 114 points. Eagles finish second for third consecutive year with second straight 7-4-1 record.

**1955** — Pihos again leads all NFL pass receivers with 62 catches for 864 yards. Joseph A. Donoghue, Eagles' vice president/secretary, is elected assistant treasurer of the NFL.

**1956** — Hugh Devore replaces Jim Trimble as head coach.

**1957** — Rookie QB Sonny Jurgensen highlights a 4-8 season by passing Eagles to a 17-7 upset of the NFL Eastern Division Champion Cleveland Browns.

**1958** — Buck Shaw signs as head coach replacing Hugh Devore. Eagles acquire quarterback Norm Van Brocklin in trade with Los Angeles. Team moves home games from Connie Mack Stadium to University of Pennsylvania's Franklin Field and attendance almost doubles.

**1959** — With Pete Retzlaff and Tommy McDonald his chief targets, Norm Van Brocklin passes Eagles to 7-5 record and second place tie with Cleveland.

**1960** — QB Norm Van Brocklin and Chuck Bednarik, who plays 60 minutes at center and linebacker, pace the Eagles to their first Eastern Division title in 11 years. The Birds then win their third NFL championship with a come-from-behind 17-13 victory over Green Bay at Franklin Field. Van Brocklin, the league's MVP, and head coach Buck Shaw both announce their retirements at the end of the season.

**1961** — Nick Skorich replaces Buck Shaw as head coach and Sonny Jurgensen takes over as the starting quarterback. Despite Jurgensen's record-setting season as a passer and a 10-4 record, the Eagles fail to repeat as division champions.

**1962** — Injuries in unprecedented numbers hit Eagles as the team wins only three games and falls to last place.

**1963** — RB Timmy Brown sets a then NFL record for total offense (2,436 yards; 841 rushing, 487 receiving, 11 passing, 945 kickoff returns, and 152 punt returns) in a season. With the club's 91 outstanding shares now held by 65 stockholders, club president Frank L. McNamee said it would be put up for sale with an asking price of 4,500,000. Jerry Wolman, a 36-year old builder and self-made millionaire from Washington outbid Philadelphia businessman Jack Wolgin and became the new owner. The sale price was \$5,505,000.

**1964** — Former Chicago Cardinals and Washington Redskins coach Joe Kuharich signs as head coach and begins a series of major trades to rebuild the club.

**1966** — After extensive roster changes, the Eagles finish 9-5 for their first winning season in five years.

**1967** — Quarterback Norm Snead and flanker Ben Hawkins set team passing and receiving records, respectively, but injuries to other key players contribute to a disappointing 6-7-1 record and a second place finish.



**1969** — After Wolman's empire fell into serious financial trouble, a bankruptcy referee in U.S. District Court in Baltimore oversees the team's sale to Leonard Tose, a millionaire trucking executive. The price was a reported \$16.1 million, at the time a record price for a professional sports team. Tose names former Eagles' receiving great Pete Retzlaff as general manager and Jerry Williams as head coach.

**1971** — The Eagles leave Franklin Field for a new home at Veterans Stadium. After three consecutive crushing losses at the beginning of the season, assistant Ed Khayat replaces Jerry Williams (who had led the club to only a 3-10-1 mark in 1970) as head coach.

**1972** — After a stormy 2-11-1 season, Tose accepts general manager Retzlaff's resignation and releases the entire coaching staff. A bright spot, however, is Harold Jackson who leads the NFL in receptions and receiving yards (62-1,048).

**1973** — Under new coach Mike McCormick and new quarterback Roman Gabriel, the Eagles have an exciting offensive season but can muster only a 5-8-1 record. In his first year as a full-time receiver, Harold Carmichael becomes the second consecutive Eagle to lead the NFL in receptions (67).

**1974** — Under newly appointed general manager Jim Murray, the Eagles trade with Cincinnati and acquire LB Bill Bergey. Bergey bolsters the defense and wins Pro Bowl honors along with TE Charlie Young, who becomes the third consecutive Eagle to lead the league in pass receptions (63).

**1976** — After a 4-10 season in 1975, Tose appoints 39-year old Dick Vermeil of UCLA as head coach but the Birds again earn a 4-10 mark. Bergey wins All-NFC and Pro Bowl recognition.

**1977** — QB Ron Jaworski is obtained from the Los Angeles Rams in exchange for the rights to TE Charlie Young. Bill Bergey, keying the newly-installed 3-4 defense of coordinator Marion Campbell, wins all-pro and all-conference honors and is selected to play in his third Pro Bowl. The Birds show improvement on the field but earn only one more victory than the previous year.

**1978** — The Eagles post a 9-7 record, their first winning season since 1966, and make the playoffs for the first time since 1960. They lose the NFC Wild Card playoff game in Atlanta, however, 14-13 as the Falcons score two 4th-quarter TDs and Eagles' Mike Michel misses a 34-yard FG try with 1:34 to play. Wilbert Montgomery, in his first starting season, rushes for 1,220 yards to become the first Eagle since Steve Van Buren to surpass 1,000 in a season. CB Herman Edwards provided the "Miracle of the Meadowlands" when he scooped up a fumbled handoff from Joe Pisarcik to Larry Csonka and raced 26 yards for the winning touchdown with 20 seconds left to play before a stunned Giants Stadium crowd of 70,318.

**1979** — With an 11-5 regular season record — their best since 1961 — the Eagles tie Dallas for first place in the NFC East and go to the playoffs as a wild card team. After beating Chicago, 27-17, in the Wild Card Game, the Birds are upset at Tampa Bay, 24-17 in a divisional playoff round. Wilbert Montgomery sets a club record with 1,512 rushing yards, and Harold Carmichael sets a then NFL record on Nov. 4, catching a pass in his 106th consecutive game. Rookie barefoot kicker Tony Franklin boots the second longest FG in NFL history — 59 yards — in a 31-21 victory at Dallas. Dick Vermeil is voted NFL coach of the year.

**1980** — The Eagles win 11 of their first 12 games and go on to a 12-4 mark and the NFC East championship. The Birds trounce Minnesota 31-16, in the divisional playoff round and then upend Dallas, 20-7 at Veterans Stadium, to win the NFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XV. The Oakland Raiders prevail in that game, however, 27-10.



Ron Jaworski leads the NFC with a 90.9 passing rating while throwing for 3,527 yards and 27 touchdowns. He is named NFL player of the year by the Maxwell Football Club and NFC player of the year by UPI. Harold Carmichael's then-record NFL receiving streak is snapped at 127 games when he fails to catch a pass in the regular season finale at Dallas after sustaining a back injury in the first half.

**1981** — After building a 6-0 record early in the season, the Birds struggle in their final eight games, post a 10-6 record and appear in the playoffs for the fourth consecutive year but are upset at home in the NFC Wild Card Game by the NY Giants, 27-21. The Birds' defense ranks first in the NFL in fewest yards allows (4,447) and fewest points allowed (221). On offense, Harold Carmichael enjoys the third 1,000-yard receiving year of his career and Wilbert Montgomery rushes for 1,402 yards.

**1982** — An NFL players' strike takes place after two games and stops play for eight weeks. When play resumes on November 21, the long layoff hurts the Eagles. After splitting their first two games of the season, the Birds come back from the strike to lose four in a row and miss the playoffs for the first time since 1977. A 24-20 Eagles' victory at Dallas on December 26 is the last victory in the Philadelphia career of head coach Dick Vermeil, who resigns shortly following the season after compiling a 55-51-0 overall record.

**1983** — Marion Campbell replaces Dick Vermeil as head coach after six seasons as the Eagles' defensive coordinator. Owner and president Leonard Tose announces in January that his daughter, Susan Fletcher, the Eagles' vice president and legal counsel, would eventually succeed him as primary owner of the Eagles. After winning four of their first six games, the Eagles become mired in a seven-game losing streak and finish with a 5-11 record. The Birds' offense is highlighted by first-team all-pro and AFC-NFC Pro Bowl selection Mike Quick, who leads the league and sets club records with 1,409 yards receiving on 69 catches.

**1984** — After a 1-4 start, the Eagles post a 5-5-1 record over their final 11 games. Philadelphia's swarming defense sets a then club record of 60 quarterback sacks and is the catalyst for the team's improved play. Wilbert Montgomery establishes the Eagles' career rushing record for yards (6,538) and attempts (1,465) surpassing the marks set by Pro Football Hall of Famer Steve Van Buren from 1944-1951. Kicker Paul McFadden establishes an Eagles' season scoring record with 116 points (tops among rookies), surpassing Bobby Walston's 30-year mark of 114, and is named NFC rookie of the year. Ron Jaworski suffers a broken leg at St. Louis in week 13, snapping his streak of 116 consecutive starts (believed to be an all-time record for NFL quarterbacks). Mike Quick is selected to the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl for the second straight year.

**1985** — On March 12, Leonard Tose, the Eagles' owner since 1969, announces an agreement to sell the team to Norman Braman and Ed Leibowitz, highly successful automobile dealers from Florida for a reported \$65 million. After obtaining the approval of the other NFL owners and fulfilling the terms of the transaction, Braman officially becomes the Eagles' new owner on April 29. That same day, Braman elevates Harry Gamble, general manager since February 4, to vice president-general manager overseeing day-to-day operations of the club. All-time Eagles' rushing leader Wilbert Montgomery does not report to training camp and is traded to Detroit for LB Garry Cobb in preseason. The Eagles again overcome a 1-4 start, but fall off the pace and finish 7-9. Head coach Marion Campbell is released on December 16, and Fred Bruney takes over as interim head coach for final game at Minnesota. Mike Quick, who catches 71 passes to break his own club season record, and Wes Hopkins represent Philadelphia in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl.

**1986** — Buddy Ryan, defensive coordinator of the Chicago Bears' Super Bowl XX



Champions, is named the 17th head coach in Eagles' history on January 29. On July 16, Norman Braman becomes the sole owner of the team, purchasing the remaining 35 percent from his brother-in-law Ed Leibowitz. Harry Gamble is promoted to president-chief operating officer. Ryan makes sweeping changes in the Eagles' roster, keeping young players and releasing several veterans. The youthful Birds struggle to a 5-10-1 record against the toughest schedule in the league. The Birds place two players on the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl roster: WR Mike Quick and DE Reggie White. White ties a Pro Bowl record with 4 sacks and is named MVP of the game.

**1987** — In March, Ron Jaworski, who set nearly every club passing record from 1977-1986, is put on waivers after the club decides not to guarantee his contract. The Eagles split their first two games of the season before the NFL was beset by a players strike. After all games of Week 3 were cancelled, the NFL resumed play with replacement teams for the next three weeks. The Birds' replacement team goes 0-3 and sets the stage for a surge by the regular players when they return to work. Philadelphia's regulars proceed to win three straight after the strike and move into a tie for 2nd place in the NFC East. They go on to finish 7-8 overall (7-5 in non-strike games) and due to a tie-breaking system, rank 4th in the NFC East behind Dallas and St. Louis who also posted 7-8 marks. Offensively, WR Mike Quick earns his fifth consecutive trip to the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl while QB Randall Cunningham (Pro Bowl 1st alternate) emerges as a rising talent. Cunningham threw 23 TD passes and became the first QB to lead his team in rushing (505 yards) since the Bears' Bobby Douglas did so in 1972. The defense was led by DE Reggie White, who was named the NFL's defensive player of the year. White's 21 sacks set an NFC record and fall one shy of the NFL mark.

**1988** — The Eagles' 1988 highlight film was appropriately titled "Living on the Edge," as the Birds took a number of games down to the wire en route to a 10-6 record and the NFC Eastern division title. Under third-year head coach Buddy Ryan, the Eagles post the NFL's best mark (6-1) over the final seven weeks of the regular season. But their playoff fate is not sealed until moments after the conclusion of their 23-7 victory at Dallas in week 16. It is then that N.Y. Jets' QB Ken O'Brien throws a TD pass to Al Toon to defeat the Giants and ensure the division title for the Eagles. Philadelphia then travels to Chicago for an NFC divisional playoff game against the Bears and a place in NFL history. The game, which begins in sunny, 29 degree weather, would later be dubbed "The Fog Bowl," after a thick fog rolls off Lake Michigan late in the 2nd quarter. Due to the fog, visibility on the playing field was extremely difficult and the Bears prevail, 20-12. The shining season included the selection of QB Randall Cunningham, DE Reggie White and TE Keith Jackson as starters in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl. Cunningham, who sets a number of Eagles' single-season passing records and leads the club in rushing for the second straight season, earns Pro Bowl MVP honors. He also wins the Maxwell Football Club's Bert Bell Award as the NFL's top player. White leads the NFL in sacks for the second consecutive year and Jackson sets an Eagles' receiving record with 81 catches en route to earning rookie of the year honors from The Sporting News.

**1989** — The Eagles used an aggressive, ball-hungry defense — which led the NFL in takeaways (56) and interceptions (30), and set a team record with 62 QB sacks — to improve their regular season record to 11-5. Philadelphia, however, finished second to the Giants in the NFC East (despite two victories in head-to-head competition) and faced the LA Rams in the Wild Card playoff. Although playing a post-season game at Veterans Stadium for the first time since 1981, the Birds fell 21-7. QB Randall Cunningham posted similar numbers to his superb '88 campaign despite missing receivers Mike Quick and Keith Jackson for most of the season due to injuries. A deeper loss came on December 9, when quarterback coach Doug Scovil passed away. The second



alternate to the Pro Bowl, Cunningham started for the NFC squad when injuries kept the other QBs from participating. He was joined by Reggie White, Eric Allen (who led the NFC in interceptions with 8), and Jackson.

**1990** — In February, Buddy Ryan hired Rich Kotite as offensive coordinator to improve the Eagles' sluggish attack. At season's end, the offense led the NFL in rushing (2,556) and time of possession (33:19) and the NFC in scoring (396) and TD passes (34). On the other side of the ball the defense led the NFL in stopping the run (1,169), thereby making the Birds the first team to lead the league in both rushing categories since Chicago did so in 1985. A 10-6 record put Philadelphia in the playoffs once again, but the Eagles suffered their third opening round defeat in as many seasons. The 20-6 Wild Card Game loss to Washington signaled an end to the five-year Ryan era. On January 8, 1991, owner Norman Braman announced that Ryan would not be offered a new contract. On the same day, he elevated Kotite to the head coaching position noting that it was time for the Eagles "to reach the next plateau." Under Kotite, QB Randall Cunningham flourished with an NFC-leading 30 TD passes, 942 rushing yards, and a selection to the Pro Bowl while rookie WRs Calvin Williams and Fred Barnett combined to make 17 TD receptions. TE Keith Jackson, DE Reggie White, and DT Jerome Brown also earned Pro Bowl berths but RB Keith Byars, who tied a team record with 81 receptions and also threw 4 TD passes, was overlooked.

**1991** — On January 8th, team owner Norman Braman opted not to renew the contract of Buddy Ryan, the Eagles' head coach since 1986. On the same day, Braman promoted then-offensive coordinator Rich Kotite to the vacant position, thus making him the 18th head coach in club history. When the season began, the Eagles opened with a 3-1 mark, their best start since 1981, despite having lost quarterback Randall Cunningham for the year due to a knee injury suffered at Green Bay on opening day. But after coming on to lead the Eagles to their solid start, backup QB Jim McMahon was also injured in game 5. With McMahon sidelined for nearly three straight games, the Birds suffered through a four-game losing streak. By midseason, Philadelphia had used five quarterbacks in eight games and seen its record sink to 3-5. The Eagles regrouped, however, and surged into contention for a playoff spot with a six-game winning streak (the club's longest since the start of '81) that upped their record to 9-5. And while a loss at home to Dallas in game 15 ended Philadelphia's remarkable run for the playoffs, the Birds finished the season with a stirring come-from-behind, 24-22 victory over the eventual Super Bowl champion Redskins. With a record of 10-6, the Eagles finished third in the NFC East behind Washington and Dallas and joined the 49ers as the only NFL clubs to post 10-or-more wins in each of the last four years. And despite missing the playoffs for the first time in four years, Philadelphia proved to be one of the NFL's hottest clubs, winning seven of its last eight games. Said Braman of Kotite's ability to rally the Birds in the second half of the season despite all the injuries at quarterback, "Richie has been a great leader. He kept the team together when everybody had written us off." Another catalyst during this stretch run was a defensive unit that finished the season ranked number one in the NFL in terms of fewest yards allowed overall, vs. the run, and vs. the pass. As such, the Birds became only the fifth club in NFL history and the first since 1975 to accomplish this rare triple. In addition, the Eagles' defense led the NFL in quarterback sacks and fumble recoveries, and tied New Orleans for the league lead in overall takeaways. Five members of that defensive unit represented the Eagles in the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl - DEs Reggie White and Clyde Simmons, DT Jerome Brown, and LB Seth Joyner were selected as starters while CB Eric Allen also made the NFC squad. The selection of White, Simmons, and Brown marked only the sixth time in NFL history that three defensive linemen from one team were elected



to the Pro Bowl. The offense was led by WR Fred Barnett (62-948-4TDs receiving), multi-talented RB Keith Byars (62 receptions and 383 rushing yards), and QBs Jim McMahon and Jeff Kemp. McMahon was 8-3 as a starter after taking over for Cunningham; Kemp came on in relief of an injured McMahon three times and twice led the Birds to comeback victories while also compiling a 1-1 mark as a starter in the final two games.

**1992** — The Eagles were dealt the cruelest of blows before the '92 season even began when all-pro defensive tackle Jerome Brown was killed in an automobile accident on June 25th in his hometown of Brooksville, FL. The tragedy overshadowed the promise of the upcoming season which included the return of QB Randall Cunningham - out almost the entire '91 season with a knee injury - as well as the addition of RB Herschel Walker whom the Eagles acquired as a free agent just three days before Brown's death. A team that had gone through five different quarterbacks in the first eight games of '91 again began the season facing adversity. The Birds, however, got out of the blocks quickly in their second season under head coach Rich Kotite, as they opened with 4 straight wins. Keys to that success were Walker, who topped the 100-yard rushing mark in each of the first two games and Cunningham, the NFC's offensive player of the month for September. Midway through the season, however, the offense struggled and the defense suffered several key injuries, particularly to starting safeties Andre Waters, who broke his leg in game five, and Wes Hopkins, who was bothered by a recurring knee injury for most of the season's second half. Despite these obstacles, the Birds finished second in the NFC East with an 11-5 regular season record. In addition, the team returned to the playoffs after a one-year absence and earned a Wild Card victory over the Saints in New Orleans before dropping the Divisional Playoff to the eventual Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys. The win over the Saints was the team's first postseason victory since 1981 and its first road playoff conquest since 1949. Offensively, Walker became only the fourth Eagle ever to top 1,000 rushing yards in a season and the first since Earnest Jackson did it in '85. While the defense slipped from its '91 number one ranking across the board, DEs Reggie White and Clyde Simmons and CB Eric Allen each earned Pro Bowl berths as did WR Fred Barnett. Off the field in '93, a September 24th ruling by U.S. District Judge David Doty paved the way for free agency in the NFL by finding the league's "Plan B" policy in violation of federal antitrust laws and provided the four plaintiffs in the suit with an opportunity to sign with another club. Among those four was Eagles TE Keith Jackson, who four days later inked a deal with the Miami Dolphins.

**1993** — In January, lawyers for the NFL and the Players Association reached agreement on a Collective Bargaining Agreement, a seven-year deal that would institute a form of limited free agency to replace the "Plan B" system. The most prominent NFL player affected by the settlement was the Eagles' all-time sack leader Reggie White, who went on to sign with the Green Bay Packers on April 5th. On the field, the Eagles' injury-riddled, roller-coaster 1993 campaign produced an 8-8 record. Despite injuries to key personnel throughout the season, head coach Rich Kotite kept his troops playing hard right through their overtime victory over the playoff-bound 49ers at San Francisco in the season finale. After a flying start in which the Birds jumped out to a 4-0 record on the strength of three consecutive dramatic come-from-behind wins, season-ending injuries to QB Randall Cunningham, Pro Bowl WR Fred Barnett and others were followed by a six-game losing streak. Despite suffering their worst skid since 1983, the resilient Eagles bounced back behind the fine play of backup QB Buddy Brister to win 4 of their final 6 contests — a stretch that kept them in the playoff hunt until the final week of the season. Despite having been dealt the league's most difficult schedule (in



terms of opponent's '92 records), and despite the rash of injuries, the Eagles were in nearly every game, including the three against the Super Bowl XXVII foes - Dallas twice and Buffalo once - in which they had opportunities to win in the final quarter. The Birds were represented at the Pro Bowl in Hawaii by CB Eric Allen and LB Seth Joyner.

**1994** — A new chapter in Philadelphia Eagle history began on April 6th as Norman Braman, the Birds' owner since 1985, reached an agreement in principle to sell the franchise to Boston native and Hollywood-based movie producer Jeffrey Lurie. Once NFL owners voted to approve the sale on May 6th, Lurie officially took over the club on May 17. Not only were there new faces in the front office, there were many new faces on the field as well as the Eagles, particularly the defense, sported many veteran acquisitions such as DEs William Fuller, Burt Grossman, and Greg Townsend, safeties Greg Jackson and Michael Zordich, LB Bill Romanowski, and K Eddie Murray. Despite losing the season opener to the Giants, the new-look Birds bounced back to soar through the first half of the season, winning 7 of their next 8 contests, including a 40-8 thumping of the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers at Candlestick Park. However, the club went on to drop their last 7 games, finishing 7-9 and out of the playoffs for the second consecutive season. Two days after the season finale, Rich Kotite's 4-year reign as head coach of the Birds ended when he was relieved of his duties. Despite the dismal ending to a one-time promising campaign, several Eagles provided memorable performances throughout the year. RB Herschel Walker etched his name into the NFL record books as he became the first player in the 75-year history of the league to record a 90-plus yard run, reception, and kickoff return in a single season. To appreciate the uniqueness of this feat, note that only one other player - Hall-of-Famer Bobby Mitchell - had previously recorded that trifecta in a *career*. With back-to-back 100-plus yd. rushing performances at SF and vs. Wash, rookie RB Charlie Garner became only the 7th back in NFL history to eclipse the 100-yard rushing mark in his first two contests. Fuller, a free agent acquisition from Houston, notched at least one sack in 7 straight games and subsequently broke the club record of 6 consecutive games shared by Reggie White and Clyde Simmons. Fuller and CB Eric Allen represented the Eagles in the Pro Bowl.

**1995** — Perhaps the biggest personnel move of the year came long before the season ever started. That move came on February 2, 1995, when owner Jeffrey Lurie named Ray Rhodes as the 19th head coach in team history. Eleven months and a playoff victory later, that decision resulted in numerous NFL coach of the year honors for Rhodes. In just his first season at the helm, the former San Francisco 49ers defensive coordinator battled through major roster turnover, a slew of injuries to key personnel, an early season QB change, and a sluggish 1-3 start to put the Eagles back on the winning track. Following that 1-3 start, Rodney Peete took over at QB for Randall Cunningham and the Birds rode the legs of running backs Ricky Watters and Charlie Garner to 9 wins in their final 12 games. Philadelphia's defense also chipped in with 48 sacks (second best in the league). The result was a 10-6 record and a spot in the playoffs as the NFC's top Wild Card team. Watters, one of the NFL's most prominent free agent acquisitions of the year (he left the 49ers for the Eagles on 3/25/95), combined with Garner to give Philadelphia the league's fourth best rushing attack. Individually, Watters was sixth in the league in rushing with a career-high 1,273 yards and 11 TDs while the lightning quick Garner added 588 yards and 6 TDs. In games 14-15, the Eagles knocked off division rivals Dallas and Arizona to clinch the club's first playoff berth since 1992. In the postseason, the Eagles routed the favored Detroit Lions, 58-37, in a Wild Card game, putting their name firmly in the NFL's postseason record books as they mounted a 51-7 lead and coasted to victory. Philadelphia's season, however, came to



a close eight days later as they bowed out to the eventual Super Bowl champion Dallas Cowboys, 30-11, at Texas Stadium. At season's end, Watters, DE William Fuller (an NFC-high 13 sacks), and LB William Thomas (whose 7 INTs were the most by an NFL linebacker since 1983) represented the Eagles in the Pro Bowl. DT Andy Harmon and a pair of rookies, CB Bobby Taylor and punter Tom Hutton, also received numerous honors. Off the field, team owner Jeffrey Lurie and his wife, Christina, oversaw the formation of Eagles Youth Partnership (EYP). The charitable wing of the Eagles, EYP was formed in order to improve the quality of life and enhance opportunities for children in the Philadelphia region through education and health partnerships.

**1996** —The 1996 season marked the second consecutive year in which the Eagles compiled a 10-6 regular season record and earned a Wild Card playoff berth. As such, Ray Rhodes became the first coach to lead the Eagles into the playoffs in each of his first two seasons at the helm. Philadelphia's playoff dance did not last long, however, as the Eagles fell to the host San Francisco 49ers, 14-0, in rain-drenched 3Com Park. For the third time in six seasons, the Eagles lost their starting QB to injury early in the regular season. Rodney Peete, who had led Philadelphia to 12 wins in his 17 starts as an Eagle (including a 3-1 mark to open the '96 campaign), ruptured a tendon in his right knee vs. Dallas on 9/30. Rhodes then turned to Ty Detmer, the former Green Bay Packer and 1990 Heisman Trophy winner, who had joined the Birds in the spring as a free agent. Detmer, who subsequently became a starter for the first time since his days at BYU, immediately led the Birds to four straight victories and went on to rank 4th among NFC passers while teaming with WR Irving Fryar and RB Ricky Watters to fuel the conference's #1 offense (351.7 yds/game). Fryar, one of the league's best free agent acquisitions in 1996, had the most productive campaign of his 13-year career, recording career highs in TDs (11) and receptions (a team-record 88). Fryar also tied a Birds' single-game record with four TD catches vs. Miami on 10/20. Watters earned his fifth consecutive trip to the Pro Bowl - his second as an Eagle - with personal bests in rushing atts. (353), rushing yards (1,411), TDs (13), and total yards from scrimmage (1,855). He finished first in the league in total yards from scrimmage, carries and touches (404 combined carries and receptions) while also ranking 2nd in the NFC/4th in the NFL in rushing yardage. Other Eagles making a big impact on offense included 2nd-year WR Chris T. Jones (70-859-5TDs), rookie TE Jason Dunn (22.1 yds/catch avg.), and FB Kevin Turner, who rebounded from a 1995 knee injury to grab 43 passes. Philadelphia's defense ranked 3rd in the NFC and 5th in the NFL, allowing an average of only 284.0 yds/game. These rankings were accomplished without the services of DT Andy Harmon (11 sacks in 1995), who was sidelined for all but two games due to a knee injury. LDE William Fuller again led the Birds with 13 sacks and earned his 3rd straight trip to the Pro Bowl. Fuller's 13 sacks were the most by an NFC lineman and fourth best in the NFL. Also earning a Pro Bowl berth was RLB William Thomas, who registered 3 interceptions and 5.5 sacks. He was the leader of a young linebacking corps that included MLB James Willis, whose interception in the end zone in the final moments of game nine at Dallas sealed the Birds' first win at Texas Stadium since 1991. Willis' theft off Dallas' Troy Aikman and subsequent lateral to CB Troy Vincent resulted in a 104-yd. TD return, the longest in NFL history. Prior to the season, the Birds had once again been one of the NFL's most aggressive teams in terms of free agency. The signing of Troy Vincent from Miami, along with that of Watters from San Francisco the previous year, made Philadelphia the only team to land another club's "transition" free agent in 1995 and '96. In addition, the Eagles' solid drafting contributed heavily to a starting lineup that boasted seven starters from the last two drafts, including a pair of 1996 first team All-Rookie picks - Dunn and FS Brian Dawkins - as well as RCB Bobby Taylor, who was similarly honored in 1995.



## EAGLES HONOR ROLL INDUCTEES

In 1987, the Philadelphia Eagles "Honor Roll," sponsored by Mellon PSFS, was created in order to pay tribute to outstanding members of the organization. Automatically included at the inception of the Honor Roll were the 11 members of the Hall of Fame who played all or part of their NFL careers with the Eagles. From 1987 through 1996, additional inductees were honored in each season.



### CHUCK BEDNARIK

**Center/Linebacker**      **Years with Eagles: 1949-62**  
**University of Pennsylvania**  
**Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1967**

As long as there is football in Philadelphia, the name Chuck Bednarik will long be remembered. "Concrete Charley" played in 253 of a possible 256 games with the Eagles during his illustrious 14-year career. Elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967, he played in eight Pro Bowl games (an Eagles record) and was named the most valuable player of the 1954 Pro Bowl. Although the Eagles won the league championship in 1949, Bednarik's rookie year, his star shined brightest in 1960 when he played every minute at both center and linebacker during the Birds 1960 NFL Championship victory over Green Bay. In addition to his Hall of Fame status (he was inducted in 1967 with former Eagles coach Earle "Greasy" Neale as his presenter), Bednarik was named to the Eagles' "All-Time Team," and was cited by the nation's press as "Lineman of the Decade" for the 1950s. Born May 1, 1925, in Bethlehem, PA, Bednarik was an All-America selection at the University of Pennsylvania in 1948 before joining the Eagles as their first selection in the 1949 NFL draft.



### DE BENNEVILLE "BERT" BELL

**Owner**      **Years with Eagles: 1933-40**  
**University of Pennsylvania**  
**Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1963**

The first owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, Bell proved to be a man of extraordinary vision. As owner of the Birds (1933-40), co-owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers (1941-46), and as NFL commissioner (1946-59), Bell was responsible for instituting the college draft and setting up visionary television policies, including the implementation of home-game blackouts. In 1933, he moved the Frankford Yellowjackets to Philadelphia and renamed them the Eagles, in honor of the symbol of President Franklin Roosevelt's National Recovery Act. In 1946, Bell moved the NFL office from Chicago to the Philadelphia suburb of Bala Cynwyd, PA where it remained until his death on October 11, 1959. Bell played and coached at the University of Pennsylvania where he led the Quakers to the Rose Bowl in 1916. A founder of the Maxwell Football Club, Bell was born February 25, 1895, in Philadelphia. He was elected to the Hall of Fame posthumously in 1963. A member of the inaugural H.O.F. class, Bell was represented by Steelers owner Art Rooney at the induction ceremony.

The 6-foot-4, 245-pound product of Arkansas State regularly set the defensive tempo of a game with his intimidating, hard-hitting tackles and his explosive quickness. After coming to the Eagles in a 1974 trade with Cincinnati (in exchange for Philadelphia's first round picks in '77 & '78 as well as a second round pick in '78), Bergey recorded nearly 1,200 tackles in seven seasons as an Eagle. He was a key factor in the Birds' rise to the 1980 NFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XV. His play also earned him Eagles' MVP status three times and trips to the Pro Bowl on four occasions. Bergey was born February 9, 1945 in South Dakota, NY.

**BILL BRADLEY**

**Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1993**

**Years with Eagles: 1969-76**

One of the most versatile players in Eagles' history, Bill Bradley played eight years (1969-76) with the Birds as a defensive back, punter, and kick returner. As of today, over 20 years after the end of his Eagles career, Bradley remains tied for the team's all-time lead in career interceptions (34) and still ranks first on the Birds' all-time interception yardage list (536). As an Eagle, Bradley earned three trips to the Pro Bowl (following the 1972-74 seasons) and became the first player in NFL history to lead the league in interceptions in consecutive seasons (1971 & 1972). It was in that 1971 campaign that Bradley set an Eagles' single-season record for most INTs and most INT return yards (11-248). Originally the Birds' third round draft choice out of the University of Texas in 1969, Bradley also handled the majority of the Birds' punting duties for six of his eight years with the club, averaging 39.0 yards per punt.

**TOM BROOKSHIER**

**Years with Eagles: 1953, 1956-61**

An inspirational player who could turn a game around with one big play, Tom Brookshier spent seven seasons with the Eagles and collected 20 interceptions along the way. Originally a tenth-round pick from the University of Colorado, Brookshier made an immediate impact with 8 interceptions in his rookie season of 1953. Then, after a two-year stint in the Air Force, the defensive back returned to the Eagles and twice earned all-pro honors - first in 1959, and again in 1960 as a member of Philadelphia's world championship team. Upon retiring as a player, Brookshier entered the broadcasting field and went on to be teamed with Pat Summerall on CBS's telecasts of NFL games including the 1980 Super Bowl.

**JEROME BROWN**

**Defensive Tackle****Years with Eagles: 1987-91****Miami (FL)****Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1996**

A two-time Pro Bowl selection and a member of one of the most dominant defensive lines in NFL history, Jerome Brown's life was cut short at the age of 27. Brown was killed in a tragic automobile accident on June 25, 1992, in his hometown of Brooksville, FL. The Eagles' first round draft pick out of the University of Miami in 1987, he quickly became a fan favorite not only because of his outstanding ability but because of the passionate leadership and competitive fire he displayed. Despite playing only four years in the NFL, Brown will long be remembered as a key figure on the Birds' legendary 1991 defense - a unit that led the NFL in terms of fewest yards allowed overall, against the run, and vs. the pass. He capped the 1991 season by joining fellow linemates Reggie White and Clyde Simmons as starters in the Pro Bowl. Born February 4, 1965 in Brooksville, he went on to attend that town's Hernando High.

**TIMMY BROWN**

One of the most electrifying players in Eagles' history, Brown holds the club record for longest kickoff return with his 105-yarder vs. Cleveland in 1961. Brown also set a then-NFL record for all-purpose yardage in a season with 2,428 yards in 1963. Today, he still shares the NFL record for kickoff returns for touchdowns in a single game with two vs. Dallas in 1966 (90 and 93 yards). Originally a 27th round draft pick of Green Bay in 1959, Brown spent time on the Packers taxi squad that year and was then signed by the Eagles as a free agent just after the start of the 1960 season. Brown finished his Eagles career in 1967 as the third leading rusher in club history in terms of both yards (3,703) and TDs (29) on 805 carries.

**HAROLD CARMICHAEL**

**Wide Receiver****Years with Eagles: 1971-83****Southern****Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1987**

The 6-foot, 8-inch Carmichael was not only one of the tallest receivers ever to play the game, he was one of the best. The Birds' seventh round pick out of Southern University in 1971, Carmichael played 13 seasons with the Eagles before finishing his career with the Dallas Cowboys in 1984. Upon retirement, he ranked sixth on the NFL's all-time reception list with 590 catches, including 589 as an Eagle, the most in team history. Today he also remains the Birds' career receiving leader in terms of yards (8,978) and touchdowns (79). During his tenure with Philadelphia, Carmichael led the Birds in receptions eight times.



His outstanding play earned him trips to the Pro Bowl following the '74, '79, '80, and '81 seasons. Moreover, he was a key figure on the Eagles 1980 club that defeated Dallas in the NFC Championship Game and earned a berth in Super Bowl XV vs. the Raiders. Carmichael was born on Sept. 22, 1949 in Jacksonville, FL, where he attended William Raines High.



## JIM GALLAGHER

**Executive**

**Temple**

**Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1995**

**Years with Eagles: 1949-1995**

He never put on a uniform, he never played a down. But many would say that "Jimmy Gal," an Eagles executive from 1949-95, was a first round pick in his own right. In that remarkable 46-year span, Gallagher worked with 17 head coaches and for 12 owners, GMs, and team presidents. During that time, Gallagher saw the Eagles capture two NFL titles and one NFL crown, and watched the Birds play home games in four different stadiums. A native of Philadelphia and a graduate of Northeast Catholic High School, Gallagher joined the Eagles in 1949 and worked nearly every phase of the operation until being named personnel director in 1957. Gallagher went on to serve stints as director of public relations and associate director of sales and marketing before being named the club's director of alumni relations/traveling secretary in 1990. It was in that capacity that Jimmy Gal served until retiring on August 1, 1995.



## BILL HEWITT

**Years with Eagles: 1936-39, 1943**

Considered by many to be the best "two-way" end the league ever produced, Hewitt was the first player to be named All-NFL with two different teams - the Bears (1933, '34, '36) and Eagles (1937). A Michigan Wolverine and a member of the 1933 NFL Champion Chicago Bears before he joined the Eagles, the fast, elusive Hewitt revolutionized the end position. Nicknamed "Stinky," Hewitt is known for pitching a lateral to Bill Karr for the touchdown that won the 1933 championship game for the Bears. He also was credited with inventing many trick plays. Hewitt, who played without a helmet until a rule change forced him to wear headgear, was born October 8, 1909, in Bay City, Michigan. He died in an automobile accident on January 14, 1947, at the age of 37. Twenty four years after his death, Hewitt was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He was represented by his daughter Mary Ellen Coccozza at the induction ceremony and was formally presented for induction by Upton Bell, then the GM of the New England Patriots.

**RON JAWORSKI**

**Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1992**

Few players have had as great an impact on their teams as Ron Jaworski had on the Eagles of the late 1970s and early 1980s. After coming to the Birds in a 1977 trade with the Los Angeles Rams (in exchange for the rights to TE Charles Young), "Jaws" went on to enjoy a stellar 10-year career in Philadelphia. With the Eagles he set seven club passing records, including career marks for completions (2,088), touchdowns (175), and yards (26,963). After leading the Eagles to the NFC title in 1980 and a berth in Super Bowl XV vs. the Raiders, the Youngstown State product earned a Pro Bowl selection and was named the NFL Player of the Year by UPI and the Maxwell Football Club. Known throughout his career as one of the NFL's most durable quarterbacks, Jaworski earned the respect of his peers by starting 116 consecutive regular season games. His outstanding career, coupled with his involvement in numerous charitable and civic events, undoubtedly made him one of the most popular Eagles of all time. Jaworski was born March 23, 1951 in the Buffalo suburb of Lackawanna, NY, and attended Lackawanna High.

**SONNY JURGENSEN**

**Duke**  
**Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1983**

Despite spending the last 10 years of his career with the Redskins, Christian Adolph (Sonny) Jurgensen is remembered not only as one of the finest quarterbacks ever to wear an Eagles uniform, but as one of the best passers in NFL history. A fourth round draft pick of the Eagles in 1957, Jurgensen - a future Hall of Famer himself - was a backup to another Hall of Fame quarterback, Norm Van Brocklin, on the Birds' 1960 NFL Championship team. The following year the rifle-armed red-head took over as the Eagles starting signal caller and threw 32 TD passes, a single-season mark which still stands as a club record. In that stellar 1961 season he completed 235 of 436 passes for 3,723 yards. Jurgensen went on to finish his NFL career in 1975 with 32,224 passing yards. A member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's class of 1983, he was formally presented for induction by Edward Bennett Williams, then the President of the Washington Redskins.

**OLLIE MATSON**

Years with Eagles: 1964-66

In his career with Chicago, Los Angeles, Detroit, and Philadelphia, Matson compiled some very impressive numbers – 12,844 combined net yards and 5,173 yards rushing. He was selected to participate in five Pro Bowls and, in fact, earned MVP honors for his effort in the 1956 Pro Bowl. Matson was traded to the Rams by the Chicago Cardinals for nine players in 1959. The speedy halfback was also a medal winner in track at the 1952 Olympics. A member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's class of 1972, Matson was formally presented as an inductee by Joe Kuharich, his former coach with the Eagles as well as with the Cardinals and the University of San Francisco.

**TOMMY McDONALD**

Years with Eagles: 1957-63

A game-breaking receiver from the University of Oklahoma, the 5-foot, 9-inch, 170-pound McDonald dazzled NFL fans with his acrobatic receptions for 13 seasons. During his seven-year stint with the Eagles, McDonald led or shared the team lead in receptions from 1959-62. In Philadelphia's 1960 NFL championship season he averaged one touchdown every third time he caught the ball, registering 13 TDs among his 64 receptions. In fact, McDonald capped that season by catching 3 passes, including one for a 35-yd TD in the Championship Game victory over Green Bay. He led the league in TD receptions in 1958 (9, tie) and in 1961 (13) when he also paced the NFL with 1,144 receiving yards. Born July 26, 1934, in Roy, NM, McDonald later starred for Bud Wilkinson's national champions at Oklahoma despite having lost half of his right thumb in a freak motorcycle accident in high school. As a senior with the Sooners, he won the Maxwell Award as the nation's top collegian and finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting behind Paul Hornung and Johnny Majors. He then became a third round selection of the Birds in the 1957 draft and went on to be named to the Pro Bowl six times (five times as a starter). After his final season with the Eagles, McDonald finished his NFL career, with the Cowboys (1964), Rams (1965-66), Falcons (1967) and Browns (1968). In June of 1997, McDonald was nominated by the seniors committee as a finalist for the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

**WILBERT MONTGOMERY**

**Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1987**

**Years with Eagles: 1977-84**

Wilbert Montgomery joined the Eagles as a quiet, shy, sixth round pick out of Abilene Christian in 1977. Eight years later, he finished his Philadelphia career as the Birds' all-time rushing leader in terms of yards (6,538) and attempts (1,465), surpassing Hall of Famer Steve Van Buren in the process. After playing for Detroit in 1985 (he was traded to the Lions that pre-season), Montgomery retired as the 16th leading rusher in NFL history with 6,789 yards. Despite his smallish 5-foot-10, 195-pound frame, Montgomery won the hearts of Philadelphia fans with his dogged determination. His 194-yard effort in the 1980 NFC Championship Game victory over Dallas, including a 42-yard touchdown on the Birds' first offensive play, will never be forgotten. Montgomery scored 58 career TDs as an Eagle (45 of which came on the ground) including 14 combined TDs rushing and receiving during the 1979 season. He also tallied 6 playoff touchdowns, including 3 in the 1980 post-season when he averaged 104 rushing yards per game in three performances (including the Super Bowl against Oakland). Montgomery played in the Pro Bowl following the 1978 and 1979 seasons.

**EARL "GREASY" NEALE**

**Head Coach**  
**West Virginia Wesleyan**  
**Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1969**

**Years with Eagles: 1941-50**

After coaching extensively on the collegiate level at Marietta, Washington and Jefferson (1922 Rose Bowl team), Virginia, and West Virginia, Neale broke into the NFL in 1941 and quickly turned the Eagles into contenders. He went on to lead the Birds to three straight Eastern Division crowns and back-to-back NFL championships in 1948 and 1949. Neale was, in particular, recognized as a master of the T formation. From 1918 to 1922, just prior to beginning his coaching career, Neale was a scrappy outfielder with the Cincinnati Reds and the Philadelphia Phillies. He was born in Parkersburg, WV, on November 2, 1891. Two years after Neale served as presenter when former Eagle great Chuck Bednarik was inducted into the Hall of Fame, Bednarik returned the favor, presenting Neale to the assemblage at Canton, OH, upon the latter's induction into the Hall in 1969.

**PETE PIHOS**

**Years with Eagles: 1947-55**

An integral member of the Eagles' 1948 and 1949 championship teams, Pihos enjoyed a career that included six trips to the Pro Bowl and three straight seasons leading the NFL in receptions. The All-America selection from the University of Indiana may best be remembered for his game-



winning catch in the 1949 NFL championship game vs. the Rams. Pihos came to the Eagles in 1947 and was a starter on offense for eight of his nine years with the team. He played defense in 1952 but returned to the offensive unit a year later. During his Eagles career, Pihos caught 373 passes, a figure that still ranks third on the Eagles' all-time list (his 61 TD catches also remain tied for third best in team history). He led the league in receptions and receiving yards in 1953 (63-1,049) and again in 1955 (62-864). In between, he tied for the league lead in catches with 60 in 1954. After the advent of the Pro Bowl in 1951, he made it six times in as many seasons.

**MIKE QUICK**

Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1995

Years with Eagles: 1982-90

One of the most graceful and athletic wide receivers ever to play the game, Mike Quick electrified Eagles fans for nine years. During that time, the former first round pick from North Carolina State distinguished himself as one of the NFL's premier pass catchers. A fixture among the league leaders during his career, Quick also became a regular selection to the Pro Bowl. Five consecutive times (following the 1983-87 seasons), the Hamlet, NC, native was voted to the Pro Bowl by his peers. At the conclusion of his brilliant career, Quick had etched his name into the Eagles record books, ranking among the club's all-time career and single-season receiving leaders in terms of catches, yardage, and TDs.

**PETE RETZLAFF**

Years with Eagles: 1956-66

Acquired off waivers at the start of the 1956 season from Detroit for \$100, the 6-foot-1, 210-pound Retzlaff went on to earn all-pro honors five times as an Eagle. At the time of his retirement, Retzlaff was the Eagles' all-time leader in receptions (452) and receiving yardage (7,412). Today, over 30 years later, those figures still stand as the second highest totals in club history. A 22nd round draft pick of the Lions in 1953, Retzlaff also scored 47 touchdowns in his career and was selected to the Pro Bowl five times. When Philadelphia acquired his services, coach Buck Shaw converted the fullback into one of the league's all-time best tight ends. Nicknamed "the Baron," Retzlaff went on to receive both the Washington Touchdown Club's Pro Football Player of the Year Award and the Maxwell Club's Bert Bell Award in 1965 when he was 66-1,190-10TDs receiving. Instrumental in founding the NFL Player's Association, Retzlaff later served as the Birds' general manager from 1969-72.

**JIM RINGO**

Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1981

A member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Ringo began his career as the Packers' seventh round draft choice out of Syracuse in 1953. Despite being small for an offensive lineman, his quickness and determination enabled Ringo to earn all-pro honors eight times and play in 10 Pro Bowls. He also played in three NFL championship games. Ringo, who ignored numerous injuries to start in a then NFL-record 182 straight games from 1954-67, played on Green Bay's 1961 and 1962 World Championship teams. After 11 years with the Packers, Ringo spent his final four seasons as a player with the Eagles. Following his playing career, Ringo moved into the coaching ranks and became head coach of the Buffalo Bills from 1976-77. He was born November 21, 1931, in Orange, N.J., and inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1981 with Willard "Whiz" Rinehart, his former coach at Phillipsburgh (NJ) High, serving as his presenter.

**JERRY SISEMORE**

Years with Eagles: 1973-84

Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1991

A first round draft pick of the Eagles in 1973 (the 3rd player selected overall) this University of Texas product became one of the cornerstones of an offensive line that helped lead the Eagles to the 1980 NFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XV. Siseamore ranks fifth on the Eagles' all-time career list in both number of seasons (12) and games played (156). During his illustrious career, Siseamore started 127 consecutive games and was selected to the Pro Bowl following the 1979 and 1981 seasons. Overall, he teamed with fellow tackle Stan Walters, QB Ron Jaworski, RB Wilbert Montgomery and WR Harold Carmichael (all members of the Eagles Honor Roll) to power an offense that helped Philadelphia reach the playoffs five straight times from 1978-82.

**NORM VAN BROCKLIN**

Years with Eagles: 1958-60

Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1971

A 1971 inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, Van Brocklin was a member of one of one of the Hall's most distinguished classes - a group that included Jim Brown, Vince Lombardi, Andy Robustelli, and Y.A. Tittle. Acquired in a 1958 trade with the LA Rams that many recall as the biggest deal in Eagles history, Van Brocklin went on to quarterback the Birds for three years. The fiery signal caller helped turn a last place Eagles club into one that eventually captured the NFL championship in 1960. As such, "The Dutchman"



teamed with future Hall-of-Famer Chuck Bednarik to pace the Eagles to their third NFL championship with a 17-13 victory over Vince Lombardi's Green Bay Packers at Franklin Field. This storybook ending would garner Van Brocklin the league's MVP award and provide a fitting end to his playing career as both he and head coach Buck Shaw announced their retirements at the end of the season. In addition to ranking with the league's all-time great quarterbacks, "Dutch" was an accomplished punter, twice leading the league in punting average. An All-America selection at the University of Oregon, he went on to participate in 10 Pro Bowls. Van Brocklin threw for 23,611 yards and 173 TDs in an NFL career that spanned 12 seasons. He then went on to be the head coach for the Minnesota Vikings (1961-66) and Atlanta Falcons (1968-73).



## STEVE VAN BUREN

**Louisiana State**
**Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1965**

The Birds' first round draft choice (the fifth player selected overall) out of Louisiana State in 1944, Van Buren signed his first contract, in the amount of \$4,000, with an Eagles team that had never finished above fourth place. They finished second in Van Buren's rookie season, were runners-up two more years and then won three straight division titles. In 1948 and '49, the Birds won consecutive league championships and Van Buren cemented his place in history as one of the most talented backs ever to play the game. Van Buren, nicknamed "Wham-Bam" by his teammates for his quick and punishing running style, twice surpassed the 1,000-yard mark while capturing the NFL rushing title on four occasions. In the 1948 title game against the Chicago Cardinals, he scored the game's only touchdown in a blinding snow storm. A year later, he waded through mud and torrential rains in the Los Angeles Coliseum to rush for 196 yards while helping the Eagles defeat the Rams and capture the title once again. His 205 yards rushing vs. Pittsburgh earlier that same season (1949) still stands as a club record. Similarly, his 5,860 career rushing yards and 77 touchdowns today rank second and second, respectively, in Eagles history. A five-time all-pro, Van Buren was inducted into the Pro Football's Hall of Fame in 1965 with fellow Hall member Clark Hinkle, a former Packers running back, serving as his presenter. In 1987, Van Buren was named to the Eagles Honor Roll. Seven years later in 1994, he was also selected to the NFL's 75th Anniversary Team. Van Buren was born December 28, 1920, in Tela, Spanish Honduras.



## DICK VERMEIL

**Head Coach**
**Years with Eagles: 1976-82**
**San Jose State**
**Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1994**

Dick Vermeil, the Eagles head coach from 1976-82, will long be remembered as a workaholic and perfectionist ... but he will be remembered most as a winner. A success at every level of coaching, from his first



high school head coaching job in 1960, to a stint at UCLA in 1974-75 and, of course, with the Eagles. Vermeil attacked his profession with a degree of passion rarely seen. A native of Calistoga, CA, in the Napa Valley, Vermeil became a hero in Philadelphia where he coached the Eagles into the playoffs five consecutive times from 1978-82, including a trip to Super Bowl XV as NFC Champions in January of 1981. Vermeil's Eagles earned that trip to the Super Bowl after capturing the NFC East division title with a 12-4 regular season record and after defeating their arch rival, the Dallas Cowboys, in the NFC title game at Veterans Stadium. After one more season at the Birds' helm, Vermeil resigned, moving into the broadcasting booth before returning to the NFL in 1997 as head coach of the St. Louis Rams.

**STAN WALTERS**

**Syracuse****Years with Eagles: 1975-83****Eagles Honor Roll Inductee, 1991**

Originally a ninth round draft pick of the Cincinnati Bengals in 1972, Walters joined the Eagles via trade in 1975. The Syracuse University product went on to play in 122 consecutive regular and post-season games for Philadelphia. Walters provided solid play at left tackle throughout his career, anchoring the team's offensive line (along with fellow Honor Roll member Jerry Sisemore), especially during the successful seasons of the late 1970s and early 1980s. A key member of the Birds' 1980 NFC championship squad that participated in Super Bowl XV, Walters was honored by his peers following the '78 and '79 seasons when he was selected to the Pro Bowl. After his playing career, Walters became a color commentator on radio broadcasts of Eagles games.

**ALEX WOJCIECHOWICZ**

**Center**  
**Fordham****Years with Eagles: 1946-50****Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductee, 1968**

A two-time All-America selection at Fordham where he was the center on the famed 'Seven Blocks of Granite' line, Wojciechowicz was the Detroit Lions' top draft pick in 1938. One of football's original "iron men" for eight years with the Lions, Wojciechowicz joined the Eagles in 1946 as a defensive specialist and helped the Birds capture back-to-back NFL championships in '48 and '49. Known for his exceptionally wide stance as a center, "Wojie" also was an outstanding pass defender who pilfered 16 passes during his pro career. Born August 12, 1915, in South River, NJ, Wojciechowicz organized the National Football League Alumni Association. A member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's class of 1968, "Wojie" was presented for induction by Earle "Greasy" Neale, the Eagles head coach during his five seasons with Philadelphia.

## EAGLES' CHAMPIONSHIP GAME REVIEW

### 1947 NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME Chicago 28, Eagles 21 December 28, 1947 at Comiskey Park

A frozen field in Comiskey Park did not prevent an offensive game as the Chicago Cardinals defeated the Philadelphia Eagles 28-21 in their first NFL championship playoff. The Cardinals' Elmer Angsman set a record by rushing for 159 yards in 10 carries, scoring twice on 70-yard runs. Philadelphia's Tommy Thompson set a record for pass completions (27-44-297-1TD) and returned a punt 75 yards for another TD. The Cardinals' Charlie Trippi also scored 2 TDs on a 44-yard run from scrimmage and a 75-yard punt return. Steve Van Buren, the NFL's leading ground gainer with 945 yards during the season, gained only 26 yards on 18 carries due to the slippery conditions.

The Cardinals, who had started the game wearing basketball shoes, had a 7-0 lead after Trippi's 44 yard TD run with 8:38 left in the first quarter. The Eagles themselves changed to sneakers after being penalized for illegal equipment, but trailed 14-0 before scoring on Thompson's pass to William (Pat) McHugh, who caught a 36-yard pass on Chicago's 17 and completed a 53-yard play. Philadelphia never got closer than a touchdown as the Cardinals held leads of 21-7 and 28-14 in the second half. The Birds did lead 357-336 in total offense, partly because Paul Christman of the Cardinals completed only 3 of 14 passes for 54 yards as the Eagles' eight-man defensive line succeeded in pressuring Christman into hurried passes.

### 1948 NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME Eagles 7, Chicago 0 December 19, 1948 at Shibe Park

After many years of waiting, the Philadelphia Eagles finally won the National Football League championship. Playing in a driving snowstorm at Shibe Park, Coach Greasy Neale's team triumphed over the champion Chicago Cardinals 7-0.

A protective tarpaulin was not removed from the playing field in Shibe Park until 30 minutes before the kickoff but snow blanketed the entire field by game time.

Of the 36,309 persons who bought tickets and assured a sellout, a total of 28,864 braved the storm with the temperature below the freezing mark to watch the little game, which began a half hour later than scheduled because the snow made removal of the tarpaulin a difficult operation. The sidelines were marked by ropes tied to stakes and conditions were



so adverse that NFL commissioner Bert Bell decreed that while the 10-yard first-down chain would be used, there would be no measuring; referee Ron Gibbs would be the final judge of all first downs.

The Eagles started the game's only touchdown drive near the conclusion of the third quarter when the Cardinals' Elmer Angsman fumbled a handoff from Ray Malouf that Eagles' lineman, Frank (Bucko) Kilroy, recovered on the Cards' 17. Three plays into the fourth quarter, Steve Van Buren scored on a five-yard run and Cliff Patton kicked the PAT.

Van Buren had pounded out 98 yards in 26 carries. Bosh Pritchard rushed for 67 yards and Thompson ran mainly up the middle for 50 yards. The rugged weather conditions made it almost impossible to complete passes. Thompson was 2 out of 12 for 7 yards while Malouf threw 3 of 8 for 35 yards. Kicking was just as difficult; Patton attempted 3 field goals but made none while Pat Harder of the Cardinals bobbled his only attempt.

**1949 NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME**  
**Eagles 14, Los Angeles 0**  
 Dec. 18, 1949 at LA Memorial Coliseum

The Philadelphia Eagles, in the NFL title game for the third consecutive year, defeated the Los Angeles Rams 14-0 as halfback Steve Van Buren set records with 31 carries and 196 yards gained. Van Buren achieved the record after a storm, that began 24 hours before kickoff, dropped almost two inches of rain on the muddy Los Angeles Coliseum field. A crowd of more than 60,000, which would have set a playoff record, was expected before the storm but only 22,245 attended the game.

With all-pro Van Buren carrying the ball, the Eagles were able to control possession for 70 plays on 274 rushing yards. The Rams rushed for only 21 yards and did not advance the ball further than the Eagles' 26-yard line. The Birds scored their first TD in the second quarter on a 31-yard pass from quarterback Tommy Thompson to Pete Pihos.

The Eagles' other score came in the third quarter as defensive end Leo Skladany blocked Bob Waterfield's punt from the 5-yard line. The snap of the ball was high and Waterfield had no chance to get the kick away. Skladany picked up the bouncing ball on

the 2-yard line and scored.

The victory marked the Eagles' second straight shutout in the NFL title game, climaxing the rise that began when Earle (Greasy) Neale was hired as coach in 1941.

**1960 NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME**  
**Eagles 17, Green Bay 13**  
 December 26, 1960 at Franklin Field

The Philadelphia Eagles overcame leads of 6-0 and 13-10 by the Green Bay Packers to score a 17-13 victory for their first NFL championship in 11 years. Bill Quinlan intercepted Norm Van Brocklin's pass on the first play of the game and Eagles' rookie Ted Dean fumbled on the Birds' second possession. Five plays later the Packers' Paul Hornung kicked a 20-yard field goal. Another Hornung field goal increased Green Bay's lead to 6-0 in the second quarter before Philadelphia got on the scoreboard with a two-play, 57-yard drive. Van Brocklin passed 22 yards to Tommy McDonald, then teamed with McDonald on a 35-yard TD pass.

A Bobby Walston field goal for Philadelphia made it 10-6 at the half, but Green Bay took a 13-10 lead in the first two minutes of the fourth quarter. Bart Starr's seven-yard pass to Max McGee marked the Packers' only touchdown. On the ensuing kickoff, Dean returned the ball 58 yards to the Packers' 39. Dean then completed the drive with a 5-yard TD run.

Chuck Bednarik endured 58 minutes of the contest — playing center on offense and linebacker on defense.

With only two healthy wide receivers and a passing game that was hampered by frigid temperatures and blustery winds, the Eagles rode a tremendous defensive effort and Wilbert Montgomery's 194-yard rushing performance to the NFC title. The Birds never trailed after Montgomery's 42-yard scoring burst early in the first period, although Dallas managed a 7-7 tie at halftime after their only long drive of the day in the middle of the second period. The Eagles continued to dominate after intermission as fullback Leroy Harris (10 carries, 60 yards) complemented Montgomery's effort. Dallas managed only 202 yards of total offense and 11 first downs to the Eagles 340 yards and 19 first downs.

**SUPER BOWL XV**

The Eagles' first Super Bowl appearance was a disappointing one as they fell behind early and could never play the type of football that had made them champions of the National Football Conference. Behind quarterback Jim Plunkett, the game's MVP, the Raiders jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first period. The first score, a two-yard pass from Plunkett to Cliff Branch, was set up by an Oakland interception and return to the Eagles' 30-yard line with less than two minutes elapsed in the opening period. Plunkett followed late in the period with an 80-yard scoring pass to running back Kenny King. The Eagles trailed by 14-3 at halftime and by 24-3 after three periods before Keith Kreple scored the only Philadelphia touchdown on an 8-yard pass reception from Ron Jaworski. A first period apparent touchdown toss of 40 yards from Jaworski to Rodney Parker was nullified by an illegal motion penalty against the Eagles. That score, if it had stood, would have made the score 7-7 at the time and might have gotten the Eagles untracked.

## EAGLES TELEVISION NETWORK

On February 12, 1997, the Philadelphia Eagles and WB17 announced a three-year, comprehensive local broadcast agreement. As such, WB17 will serve as the flagship station of the newly formed Eagles Television Network (ETN). The agreement provides for more Eagles local programming than any other similar arrangement in team history. WB17 is Philadelphia's sports leader, and also serves as the sports home of the Philadelphia Phillies and Flyers.



As part of this arrangement, the Eagles Television Network will extend into the Harrisburg-York-Lancaster area (the nation's 45th largest market) on FOX 43, as well as into Scranton-Wilkes-Barre (the nation's 49th largest market) on FOX 38.

"We are excited to expand the Eagles programming lineup by joining forces with a station known for bringing hometown sports to Philadelphia's fans," said Eagles owner Jeffrey Lurie at the time. "Our fans are continually asking for more opportunities to access greater amounts of up-to-date information on the team, and this arrangement with WB17 certainly helps meet that demand."

*ETN will air the following programs:*

**Eagles Pre-Season Games:** This includes all non-nationally televised broadcasts of Eagles pre-season games. In 1997, ETN will broadcast the following three preseason games – Sat., August 2 at NY Jets; Sat., August 16 vs. Baltimore; and Thurs., August 21 vs. New England. (The Birds' game at Pittsburgh on August 11 will be televised nationally by ABC). Each game will be re-aired after the live broadcast.

**The Ray Rhodes Show:** Eagles Head Coach Ray Rhodes steps into prime time for a 30-minute show that will air every Saturday at 10:30 p.m. throughout the football season. Rhodes will offer his unique insights on the Birds' upcoming opponent as well as on other topical issues related to the Eagles and the NFL.

**Eagles Wrap:** This half-hour show will air on Sunday evenings at 10:30 and will provide Eagles fans with the definitive source for Eagles highlights, interviews and reaction concerning that day's game.

**Eagles Scrimmage:** For the first time ever the Eagles will televise their annual scrimmage live from the Birds' Training Camp at Lehigh University. Eagles fans across the tri-state area will thus have an opportunity to experience the first taste of football each new season.

*ETN will air this program on cable TV:*

**Inside the Eagles:** This weekly program will offer cable viewers player information and insight on each game. A prominent Eagles player will join local television personalities in a round-table discussion of the latest news from the gridiron. Each show will be replayed twice throughout the weekend.



**IMPORTANT NFL DATES 1997-98**

- July 15** Signing period ends at 4 PM (ET) for Unrestricted Free Agents to whom June 1 tender was made by Old Club, Transition Players, and Franchise Players who are eligible to receive Offer Sheets. After this date and through 4 PM (ET) on November 4, Old Club has exclusive negotiating rights to these players.
- August 1** If a Drafted Rookie has not signed with his club by this date, he may not be traded to any other club in 1997.
- August 19** Roster cutdown to maximum of 60 players on Active List by 4 PM (ET).
- August 24** Roster cutdown to maximum of 53 players on Active/Inactive List by 4 PM (ET). Clubs may dress minimum of 42 and maximum of 45 players and Third Quarterback for each regular season and postseason game.
- August 25** After 4 PM (ET) clubs may establish a Practice Squad of five players by signing free agents who do not have an accrued season of free agency credit, unless that season was achieved by spending an entire regular season on Reserve/Injured or Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform.
- August 29** Clubs are required to identify their 49-player Active List by 7 PM (ET) on this Friday and thereafter on each Friday before a regular season Sunday game. No later than one hour and 30 minutes prior to kickoff, clubs must identify their 45-player Active List and Third Quarterback, if any.
- October 7** All trading ends at 4 PM (ET).
- October 8** Players with at least four previous pension-credited seasons are subject to the waiver system for the remainder of the regular season and postseason.
- November 3** Deadline for 1997 for an increase in a player's Salary to be counted as Salary for the current year. Any increase in a player's 1997 Salary negotiated after this date will be treated as a Signing Bonus.
- November 4** Deadline for clubs to sign by 4 PM (ET) their unsigned Franchise and Transition Players. If still unsigned after this date, such players are prohibited from playing in NFL in 1997.
- November 4** Deadline for clubs to sign by 4 PM (ET) their Unrestricted and Restricted Free Agents to whom June 1 tender was made. If still unsigned after this date, such players are prohibited from playing in NFL in 1997.
- November 4** Deadline for clubs to sign Drafted players by 4 PM (ET). If such players remain unsigned, they are prohibited from playing in NFL in 1997.
- November 22** Deadline for reinstatement of players in Reserve List categories of Retired and Did Not Report, and of players who were placed on Reserve/Left Squad in a previous season.
- December 19** Deadline for waiver requests in 1997, except for "special waiver requests" which have a 10-day claiming period, with termination or assignment delayed until after the Super Bowl.
- December 23** Clubs may begin signing free agent players for the 1998 season.
- Dec. 27-28** Wild Card Playoff Games.
- January 3-4** Divisional Playoff Games.
- January 11** AFC and NFC Championship Games.
- January 25** Super Bowl XXXII, San Diego, Calif.
- February 1** AFC-NFC Pro Bowl, Honolulu, Hawaii.
- February 5-9** Combine Timing and Testing, RCA Dome, Indianapolis, Ind.
- February 12** Deadline for clubs to designate Franchise and Transition Players.
- February 12** Expiration date of all player contracts due to expire in 1997.
- February 13** Free Agency period begins.
- March 22-27** NFL Annual Meeting, Hyatt Regency Grand Cypress, Orlando, Florida.
- April 18-19** Annual Player Selection Meeting, New York, N.Y.



## PERSONNEL GUIDE

**WAIVERS:** The waiver system is a procedure by which player contracts or NFL rights to players are made available by one club to other NFL clubs. During this procedure, a club may make a claim to obtain the player or "waive" its right to do so—thus the term "waiver". Claiming clubs are assigned players on a priority based upon the inverse of won-loss standings. The claiming period is normally ten days during the offseason and 24 hours from July 7 through December 19. In some circumstances, another 24 hours is added on to allow the original club to rescind its action (known as waiver recall) and/or the claiming club to do the same (known as a withdrawal of a claim). If a player passes through waivers from July 7 through December 19 they are no-recall and no withdrawal. Under the Collective Bargaining Agreement, from February 1 through October 8, any veteran who has acquired four years of pension credit may, if about to be assigned to another club through the waiver system, reject such assignment and become a free agent.

**ACTIVE LIST:** The Active List is a status for players participating for a club. It consists of all players under contract, including option, who are eligible for preseason, regular season, and postseason games. Clubs are allowed to open training camp with 80 players but thereafter must meet a series of mandatory roster reductions prior to the season opener. Teams will be permitted to dress a minimum of 42 and a maximum of 45 players and a third quarterback for each regular season game and postseason game during the 1997 season. In addition, each club will have an Inactive List of 8 players. For Active List maximums and dates for 1997, see ROSTER LIMITS below.

**RESERVE LIST:** The Reserve List is the principle status for players who, for reason of injury, retirement, military service, or other circumstances, are not immediately available for participation with a club. Those players in the category of Reserve/Injured that have been placed on the list prior to the final 53-man roster may not return to the active list that season and are not permitted to practice. Any player placed on the Injured Reserve List after the 53-man roster has been set also **will not** be eligible to play for the remainder of the season. This is different from previous years when a player would be eligible to return after a minimum of six weeks missed.

**ROSTER LIMITS:** No more than 80 players can be under signed contract from June 1-August 18. Rosters must be cut to 60 active players by 4:00 p.m. on August 19 (Tuesday after 3rd preseason weekend). Rosters must be cut to 53 active players by 4:00 p.m. on August 24. Clubs will be permitted to dress 45 players for each regular season game (plus a third quarterback, if desired). Each team must designate a four man inactive squad by Friday at 7:00 p.m. Additionally, the club will then designate 4 more players to their inactive list for that game no later than one hour and 30 minutes prior to kickoff.

**PRACTICE SQUADS:** After 4:00 PM ET on August 25, each club may establish a Practice Squad of no more than five players by signing free agents who do not have a season of free agency credit. This squad includes only rookies and/or first-year players (those whose NFL experience is limited to previous training camp or less than three active games).

**TRADES:** Unrestricted trading is allowed in 1997 between clubs through October 7 (Tuesday following the sixth regular season weekend), after which trading of the player contract/rights will end until mid-February, 1998.

**CREDENTIAL REQUESTS/CREDENTIAL PICK-UP:** News media representatives who have not been issued season press credentials should request single-game credentials in advance by writing or calling the Eagles' public relations department, 3501 South Broad Street, Philadelphia, PA 19148-5201 (Phone: 215-463-2500 ... FAX: 215-339-5464). Written requests, either mailed or faxed should be on company letterhead. Credentials reserved in advance can be picked up at the Press Gate/Security Entrance below Gate B off Pattison Ave. (not the Will Call Window) three hours before the scheduled kickoff. Media members who regularly cover the visiting team should arrange to acquire their credentials through that team's PR department.

**PRESS BOXES:** The Eagles maintain three press boxes, designated A, B, and C, on the fourth level of Veterans Stadium. Admission to the press area is strictly limited to those individuals holding credentials issued by the Eagles' public relations department. No other media identification cards will be honored. All news media should enter the stadium through the press gate (Pattison Ave. side of the Stadium). Those with credentials for the press box should take the elevator to the fourth level.

**TELEPHONES:** Game day telephone *lines* at an assigned seat can be ordered by calling Penny Stevens of Bell Atlantic at 610-941-7831.

**TELEVISION AND RADIO:** Network television and visiting radio facilities are located on the 4th level between press boxes A and B. Visiting radio credentials will be issued through the visiting team's PR representative. Television announcers may do stand-ups on the field in pregame, halftime, during the last three minutes of play, and post game. Television "announcers" and producers are not allowed on the sidelines except during these aforementioned periods.

**PHOTOGRAPHERS:** Sideline credentials for field photographers are issued by the Eagles' public relations department only. Space limitations make it impossible to accredit free lance photographers who are not on specific assignment by a recognized sports or news publication. Photographers should enter the press gate (B) and take the elevator to the first (field) level. Space on the fourth level photo deck is extremely limited and available only on a reserved basis. *All field photographers are reminded that they must remain outside the bench areas and behind the broken lines that surround the entire perimeter of the playing field.*

**LOCKER ROOMS:** Admission to the home and visiting locker rooms after a game is controlled by each team. There is absolutely no admission to the locker room before or during a game. The Eagles' head coach and quarterback will meet with the media in an interview room across the hall from the Eagles' locker room. During the regular season the locker room is normally open to the media on Monday, Friday, and Saturday for 45 minutes after practice and on Wednesday and Thursday for 20 minutes before and after practice. This schedule is subject to change, however.

**PRESS CLUB:** Admittance to the Press Club before, during, and after the game is limited to working media and Eagles' staff holding appropriate credentials.

**DIRECTIONS FROM AIRPORT TO VET STADIUM:** Take I-95 north for approximately 6 miles to Broad Street exit. Go straight on Broad for two lights. The stadium is located at the intersection of Broad and Pattison Ave. NOTE: Eagles' practice fields are located in the north parking lot of the stadium....The entrance to the stadium's VIP parking lot is off of Broad Street.

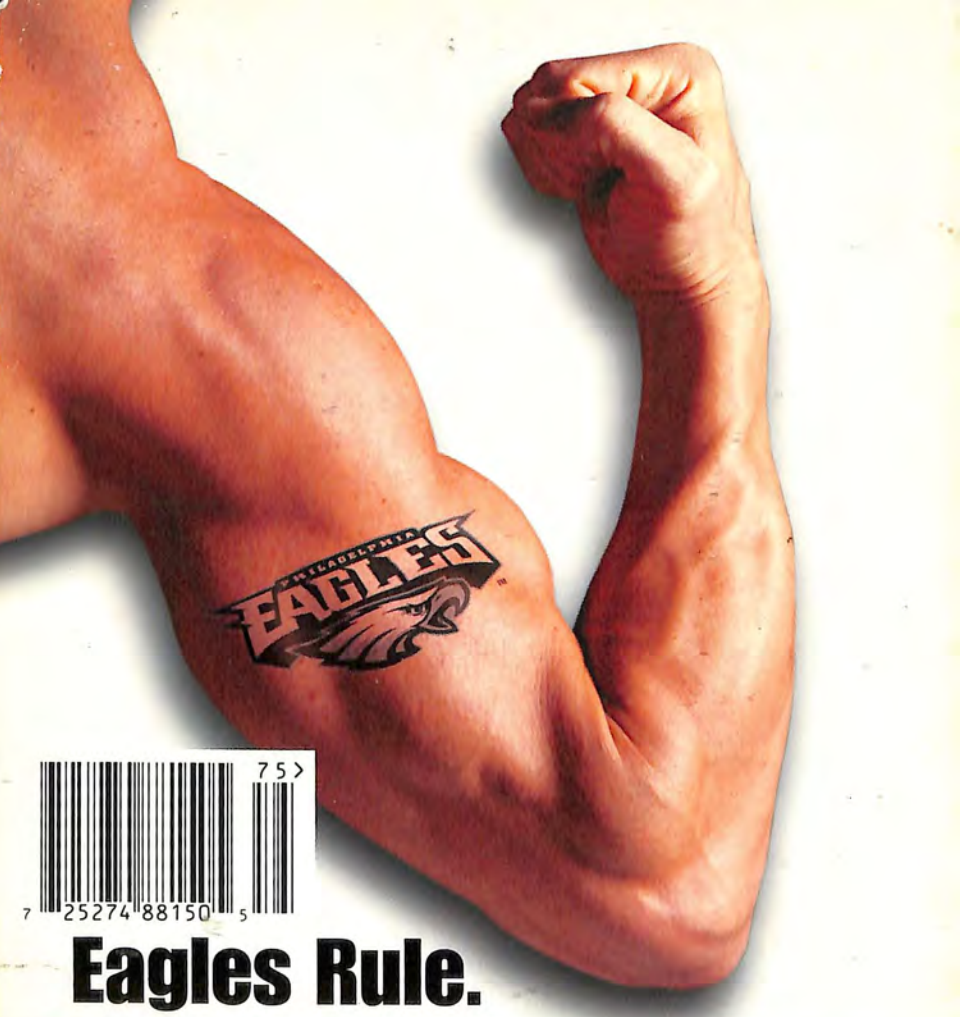
