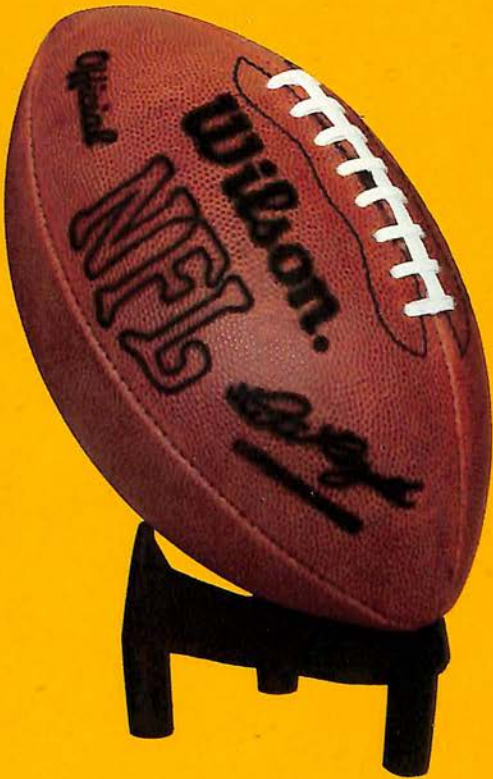

## STEELER HISTORY

The Pittsburgh Steelers will be shooting for their 10th straight winning season in 1981 and at the same time, attempt to regain a position in the NFL playoffs.

Last season, for the first time since 1971, the Steelers failed to make the playoffs. Their 9-7 record left them two games short of qualifying for postseason play and spoiled their attempt to win a third straight Super Bowl.

During the decade of the 1970's, the Steelers were pro football's most successful team. They made the playoffs a record-tying eight straight years and won four Super Bowls, two more than any other team has ever captured.

The Steelers are now in their 49th season. The team was founded by Art Rooney in 1933 and is the fifth oldest team in the NFL. Until 1940, the team nickname was the Pirates.

Mr. Rooney was born in Coulterville, Pa. on January 26, 1901 and moved to Pittsburgh with his family when he was a year and a half old. He spent his boyhood on the site which Three Rivers Stadium now occupies and still lives just a five minute walk from the Steelers' home field.

He was an outstanding athlete and excelled in football, baseball and boxing. Knute Rockne wanted him to play at Notre Dame but he attended Indiana State (Pa.), Georgetown and Duquesne. In baseball, he was signed by the Boston Red Sox and Chicago Cubs. An arm injury ended his major league ambitions. He was selected to represent the United States on the 1920 Olympic boxing team.

For the Steelers and other pro football teams, the early years were a struggle as they competed with major league baseball, then the national pastime, and college football, the more established and popular version of the gridiron sport. The Steelers played their home games at Forbes Field but often it was necessary to take the game to the fans. It was not unusual for home games to be held in places such as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, Louisville and New Orleans.

In 1938, Mr. Rooney shocked the sports world by signing Colorado All America Whizzer White to a contract calling for \$15,800, an unheard of sum at that time in pro football. The NFL's first big-money player is now United States Supreme Court Justice Byron White.

It was not until 1942 that the Steelers had their first winning season. Sparked by rookie halfback Bill Dudley, a genuine triple threat who is now in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, they compiled a 7-4 record and finished second in the Eastern Division.

But this success was short-lived and the nucleus of a promising team was soon in military service. Because of the manpower shortage created by World War II, the Steelers combined forces with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1943 and the Chicago Cardinals the next season.

After the war, the Steelers made another major move in an attempt to bring Pittsburgh a winner when Jock Sutherland was appointed head coach in 1946. Dr. Sutherland had become a legend in the city coaching the University of Pittsburgh.

Utilizing the single wing offense, he quickly had the Steelers headed in the right direction and they tied for the divisional title in 1947 before losing a playoff to Philadelphia.

Again fate was unkind to the Steelers when Sutherland died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip in the spring of 1948. He was succeeded by John Michelosen.

An era ended in 1952 when Joe Bach began his second term as the team's coach and the Steelers became the last pro club to abandon the single wing. Bach had the Steelers playing more exciting football and improved their performance to .500 in 1953 when he resigned because of failing health.

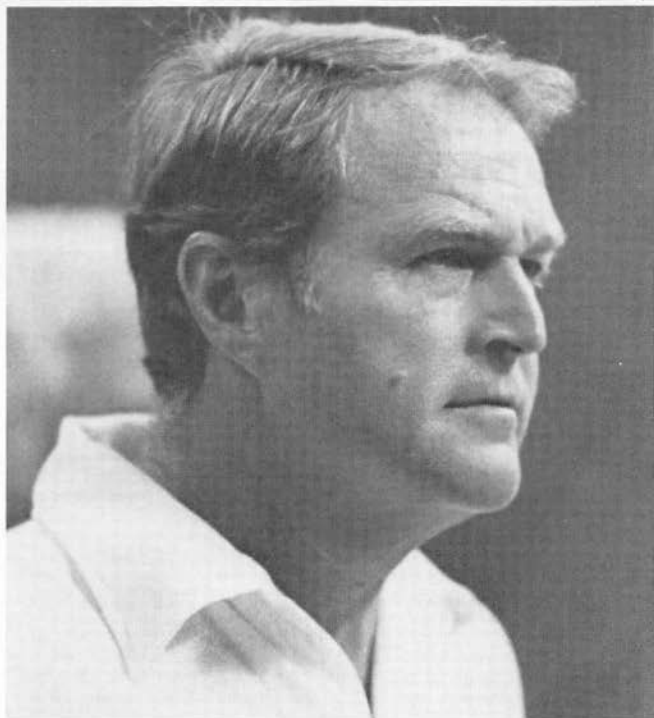
For the third time, Rooney called on his long-time friend, Walt Kiesling, to take over. He held forth until Buddy Parker arrived from Detroit in 1957 and gave Pittsburgh its best professional football until the present era.

With the flamboyant Bobby Layne joining his former coach in 1958, the Steelers went 7-4-1 and started a string of four winning seasons in six years. However, they fell short of a title although the 1963 team could have delivered one if it had won its final game against the New York Giants.

In 1964, Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. At about the same time, a transition was beginning to take shape in the front office. Dan and Art, Jr., the oldest of Mr. Rooney's five sons, became active in the organization on a full-time basis.

As youngsters, both had performed menial duties in training camp and their life spans actually paralleled that of the Steelers. Dan's first formal assignment was selling advertising and editing the program. Art, Jr. worked in the ticket office, specializing in group sales.

At 49, Dan is one of the most able and respected executives in sports. He currently serves on the three-member Executive Committee of NFL Properties and the same body of the Management Council and is on the Board of NFL Films. He served in the past as Chairman of the NFL's



### **CHUCK NOLL** Head Coach

Chuck Noll faces another great challenge in 1981 as he begins the third phase of his Steeler coaching tenure. In his 13th season, the longest of any AFC coach with the same team, the 49-year old Noll and his assistants have the task of bringing the Steelers back to the top.

When Chuck came to Pittsburgh in 1969, he inherited a team that had just 18 victories in the previous five seasons, and had only four winning seasons in 19 years. This was the first, and by far the greatest test of his career.

The second major challenge came after the Steelers had won their first two Super Bowls in 1974 and 1975 and then fell one game short the following year of a third straight trip to the NFL title game. They slipped to a 9-5 mark in 1977 and were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs. Many observers felt that the team's star was in descent, but Noll regrouped and won two more Super Bowls with basically the same players.

Now the situation is similar. Only in 1980, the Steelers failed to make the playoffs for the first time in nine years and their record fell to 9-7, the most defeats since 1971. As they begin the climb back, there is an age factor which was not present after the 1977 slump. Only 17 players remain from the first Super Bowl team. It will not be easy, but those who are familiar with Noll's career are confident he will succeed. He is accustomed to tough assignments. He will approach it in the same analytical, low-key manner which is characteristic of the man himself. Changes that are made will be subtle and with as little fanfare as possible.

Noll is tied with Sid Gillman as the tenth winningest pro coach of all time with 123 victories. He needs 12 wins to pass Weeb Ewbank (134) and move into ninth place. Overall, Chuck is 123-68-1 and, among the 15 coaches who have won 100 games, his winning percentage of .643 is the seventh best.

In postseason play, Noll has a phenomenal 14-4 (.778) record which is topped only by Vince Lombardi's 9-1 (.900). Noll and Lombardi, who won five, are the only post-World War II coaches to win four NFL championships. Chuck, of course, is the only one to capture four Super Bowls and he and Lombardi are the only coaches who have not lost in that classic among those in it more than once. Noll and Tom Landry share the NFL record of eight straight playoff seasons.

This is Noll's 29th consecutive year in pro football as a player, assistant and head coach. In his first 28 years, his teams have had 23 winning seasons and have made the playoffs 18 times.

When Noll became the 14th coach in Steeler history in 1969, he com-

mitted himself and the organization to building a championship team through the player draft. He has never deviated from this course.

He seldom makes a trade and adds players from other teams only in emergencies. In 13 years, he has made just five trades in which the Steelers acquired players. A common practice is to trade expendable players for draft choices.

Noll and the Steeler personnel department have shown an extraordinary ability to evaluate college talent and that ability has been one of the major reasons for the team's great success.

The other reasons are Noll's patience and desire to teach. Very few of the current regulars became immediate starters. It is common for Chuck to work with players on a man-to-man basis regardless of their positions. He selects his assistants as much for their teaching skills as their football knowledge.

Success did not come immediately. After the rookie coach won his first regular season game in 1969, the Steelers lost the next 13 that season and the opening three in 1970. From a 1-13 record, the Steelers improved to 5-9 and then 6-8 in 1971.

The breakthrough occurred in 1972 when the Steelers won their first AFC Central division title with an 11-3 mark. They defeated Oakland, 13-7, on a miraculous last-second touchdown in a first round playoff game before losing the AFC Championship game, 21-17, to undefeated Miami, which went on to win its first Super Bowl. Noll was named AFC Coach of the Year by UPI.

The following season the Steelers made the playoffs but were eliminated by Oakland in a first-round game.

In 1974, Noll's sixth season, the Steelers' reached his ultimate goal. Their 12-2 regular season record was the best in the league and they beat Buffalo, 32-14, and Oakland, 24-13, to qualify for Super Bowl IX, in which they defeated Minnesota, 16-6. The title drive was highlighted by one of the greatest defensive performances of all time when the Raiders were held to 29 yards rushing and the Vikings to 17.

Chuck became the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls when the Steelers defeated Dallas, 21-17, the next season.

After losing four of their first five games in 1976, the Steelers rallied to win ten in a row, but their first bid for a third straight league title ended in the AFC Championship game in Oakland, 24-7. It was one of Chuck's best coaching jobs and he was honored by the Football News as the NFL Coach of the Year.

Denver eliminated the Steelers, 34-21, in the first round of the 1977 playoffs. It was only the second time they had been beaten in a first round game and there were many who felt the team had fallen on hard times.

It was at this stage that the rules were changed in an attempt to inject more offense into pro football and Noll was quick to capitalize on the opportunity to throw the football. He got the jump on his colleagues. The Steelers went from a conservative, defense-oriented team to an explosive, quick-scoring one that had the ability to strike from anywhere on the field.

The tactical move paid off and Noll led his team to the best regular season records in the league in both the 1978 and 1979 seasons. They went on to win the Steelers' third and fourth Super Bowls.

Chuck is a quiet, unassuming person who maintains a low profile. He remains in the background and, as a result, his players have received most of the recognition, which is what he prefers.

Although his prior coaching background is mainly defense-oriented, Chuck works primarily with the Steeler offense and is the quarterback coach and offensive coordinator. He also coaches the special teams. He derives the greatest satisfaction from the daily routine of football and seems to be happiest during training camp when he has the time to teach and provide individual instruction.

Noll's pro career began as a player with the Cleveland Browns in 1953 as a 21st round draft choice from Dayton University, where he majored in Education and captained the team as a senior. He played seven years with the Browns as an offensive guard and linebacker. He was a member of five Eastern Conference title teams, two of which went on to win NFL championships.

At 27, he retired prematurely as a player to go into coaching. A position at Dayton did not materialize, and he was ready to begin a teaching career when he was offered the last position on Sid Gillman's staff with the Los Angeles Chargers in the new American Football League in 1960. After one season, the Chargers moved to San Diego. In Noll's six years as defensive assistant, they won four division titles and two AFL championships.

Chuck returned to the NFL in 1966 as a defensive aide to Don Shula with Baltimore. The Colts lost just seven regular season games in his three years, and won the NFL championship in 1968 before losing Super Bowl III to the New York Jets.

A native of Cleveland, he was born on January 5, 1932 and attended Benedictine High School. He and his wife Marianne have a 23-year old son, Chris.

Chuck's outside interests are many and varied. His hobbies are tennis, photography, scuba diving, gardening and cooking. He is a wine connoisseur. He spends a lot of his leisure time reading and enjoys classical music.

## NOLL CONTINUES WINNING WAYS

Chuck Noll is now in his 29th consecutive year in pro football as a player, assistant coach and head coach. In his first 28 seasons, his clubs have had 23 winning records and played in postseason playoffs 18 times. Noll's cumulative record is 274-132-11 including 123-68-1 as a head coach, a mark which ties him for tenth place on pro football's all-time list with Sid Gillman. Among active NFL coaches, Noll's 123 wins in 12 seasons is fourth behind Tom Landry's 200-120-6 mark over 21 seasons. Don Shula (193-78-5) and Bud Grant (140-77-5) rank second and third.

## **ROLLIE DOTSCH** Offensive Line Coach

Rollie Dotsch, a veteran of 21-years in the coaching ranks including a decade in the NFL, is in his fourth season as the Steelers' offensive line coach.

Dotsch, who joined Chuck Noll's staff in 1978, is the only Steeler assistant with previous head coaching experience at the collegiate level.

Dotsch's teaching abilities have been an important factor in Steeler fortunes in the last two seasons when injuries sidelined key starters and veteran reserves forcing young players into pressurized roles. In 1980, last round draft choice

Tyrone McGriff earned All Rookie honors after starting 10 games at guard while Ray Pinney, with pro playing experience at tackle and center, filled a critical void at left guard as a 16-game starter.

In 1979 en route to a Super Bowl XIV championship, the offensive line helped the Steelers lead pro football in rushing average (4.6) and allowed the third fewest sacks in the pass-minded AFC. The Steelers won the Super Bowl in both of Dotsch's first two seasons. The net result of Dotsch's coaching ability and playing time for young players is the club's noteworthy depth situation in the offensive line, a definite asset.

Dotsch began his NFL career as offensive line coach for the Green Bay Packers (1971-74) before joining the New England Patriots in 1975 as linebacker coach. In 1977, he served in the same capacity at Detroit.

A former two-way lineman at Michigan, Dotsch first began coaching at Northern Michigan (1958-60), where he served as defensive coordinator. He coached the defensive backfield at Colorado (1961) and the offensive line at Missouri (1962-65) before returning to Northern Michigan as head coach and athletic director (1966-70). He posted a 33-15-1 record and earned district coach of the year honors.

Dotsch's playing experience at Michigan State included three letters and a role on the Spartans' 1952 national championship team. He holds an undergraduate degree in History and a master's in Secondary Education.

A native of Escanaba, Michigan, Dotsch was inducted into the Upper Peninsula Sports Hall of Fame during this past off-season.

## **TONY DUNGY** Defensive Assistant

After a two-season absence from the Steeler organization, Tony Dungy returns as a defensive assistant. In this position, he will have responsibilities which involve all phases of the defense with an emphasis on the secondary.

At 25 and just one full year removed from the playing ranks, Tony is the youngest full-time assistant in the NFL. His prior coaching experience consists of the 1980 season with the University of Minnesota, his alma mater. In college, he was an option quarterback and still holds the school career records for total

plays, passing attempts, completions, yards passing and touchdown passes. He is fourth on the Big 10's all-time total offense list. He was a four year letterman and captain in his senior year.

The Steelers signed him as a free agent in 1977 and converted him to a defensive back. He immediately impressed the coaching staff and made the transition smoothly. Even though he was not yet 21 years of age, he was labeled then as a future coaching prospect.

For most of his two seasons with the Steelers, Dungy was used as a fifth defensive back and special teams player. Although he only started two games on the 1978 Super Bowl club, he led the team in interceptions with six and ranked second in the AFC. His two year total of nine interceptions was very high in relation to his playing time.

In August of 1979, the Steelers traded Dungy to the San Francisco 49ers for a draft choice. He played one year on the West Coast and started seven games before being traded in the off-season to the New York Giants who waived him in training camp last summer.

Tony is single and lives in the Greentree section of Pittsburgh.

## DICK HOAK Offensive Backfield Coach

Dick Hoak, a former Steeler All Pro and 10-year NFL veteran, is in his 10th season as offensive backfield coach. His talents as a player have been translated into that of a teacher in what has been a significant role in the development of the Steeler running game since joining Chuck Noll's staff in 1972.

The earmarks of the Steeler ground attack under the low-key Hoak have been consistent productivity and great versatility as exemplified in the mid-1970's when the tandem of Franco Harris and Rocky Bleier became one of pro football's most productive backfields and helped the Steelers drive to back-to-back Super Bowl championships. More recently, Hoak has helped engineer the injection of new talent such as Sidney Thornton and Greg Hawthorne into the club's running plans. In 1979, Bleier and Thornton meshed to complement Harris en route to Super Bowl XIV. The Bleier-Thornton effort helped the Steelers lead the NFL in average yards per rushing attempt.

Hoak has been a focal point in the development of Harris, one of pro football's greatest rushers. Both began new careers in 1972. In the last nine seasons, Harris has rushed into third place among all-time NFL players and virtually rewritten the Steeler record book once heavily spiced with Hoak's performances.

The Steelers drafted Hoak in the seventh round of 1961 from Penn State, where he played both halfback and quarterback and was a former team MVP and offensive captain. During his Steeler career (1961-70), Hoak gained 3,965 yards on 1,132 carries and scored 25 rushing touchdowns. He led the team in rushing three times during his career. Hoak also caught 145 passes for 1,152 yards and eight scores.

Hoak enjoyed his best season in 1968, rushing for 858 yards to rank fourth among all NFL runners. His 77-yard run from scrimmage was the longest in the league that season. His play earned him a berth in the Pro Bowl and on the All Eastern Conference team. He was also named the outstanding sports figure in Pittsburgh by the Dapper Dan Club. Former teammate Bobby Layne once called him "the most perfect player in my time."

Tom Moore, now in his fifth season with the club and a veteran of 21 years in the coaching profession, tutors one of pro football's most productive units—the Steeler wide receiver corps. In the era of the pro passing attack, Moore has been a key ingredient in the air game featuring a multi-talented corps of wide receivers who have been a focal point of Steeler fortunes in recent seasons.

Moore joined the Steelers in 1977 from the University of Minnesota and quickly contributed in the transition to the team's wide open style of passing attack, a Steeler trademark.

Following his playing career at Iowa (1957-60) under Forest Evashevski, Moore began his coaching career as freshmen coach for the Hawkeyes (1961-62). After a stint in the Army, he returned to coaching at Dayton University in 1965 as offensive backfield coach. In 1969, he was named offensive coordinator at Wake Forest before joining the Georgia Tech staff as offensive backfield coach (1970-71).

Moore returned to the Big 10 in 1972 as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach at Minnesota. Two years later (1974), he took his first pro coaching position as wide receiver coach of the New York Stars of the World Football League. In 1975-76, he rejoined the Gophers' program as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach.

As a player, Moore lettered three years (1957-60) and played on a Big 10 championship team (1958) which defeated California in the Rose Bowl. He earned a History degree and a master's in Guidance.

## GEORGE PERLES

### Assistant Head Coach

George Perles, now in his 10th season as a member of Chuck Noll's staff, is in his third year of responsibilities as assistant head coach.

Perles coaches the club's defensive line while aiding Noll in accomplishing many of the administrative tasks. He is also involved with the Steeler offense and special teams. His unique ability to complement the head coach and relate to the players produces an excellent working combination on the Steeler staff.

A former Michigan State assistant coach under Duffy Daughterty, Perles

joined the Steelers in 1972 and has been an invaluable contributor to the team's decade of success in the 1970's. Early in his tenure, the Steeler defensive front laid the ground work for the team's winning tradition which produced eight playoff entries in the last nine seasons. In the late 1970's, Perles helped engineer changes in personnel and subtle strategy to help the team maintain it's winning ways.

In 1978, Perles was named defensive coordinator and the unit returned to its championship level as the Steelers won a third world title in Super Bowl XIII. He became the club's first ever assistant head coach in 1979.

Perles' coaching background includes nearly two decades in the high school, collegiate and professional ranks. After coaching at St. Rita High School in Chicago for a year and at St. Ambrose High in his hometown of Detroit for three winning seasons, he joined the staff at Dayton University as defensive coordinator (1965-66) before moving to Michigan State as a defensive assistant in 1967.

As a player, Perles was a two-way tackle for the Spartans (1957-60). He earned a master's degree in Physical Education from Michigan State.

## PAUL URAM

### Conditioning Coach

Paul Uram, a member of the Steeler coaching staff since 1972, is now in his second year of expanded duties which include the team's strength and flexibility programs and work with special teams and kickers. Prior to the 1980 season, he was promoted from administrative assistant to Conditioning Coach.

Uram is charged with developing and maintaining a flexibility and strength program designed so that Steeler players can be as physically prepared as possible for practice and game situations. The Steeler flexibility program emphasizes

the stretching of muscles and limbs rather than the bouncing type movements associated with conventional calisthenics. The flexibility effort has resulted in a noticeable reduction in muscle pulls, strains and tears.

The strength program, featuring considerable free weight work, combines with the flexibility phase for a net result of a more efficient player who is less susceptible to injury. In both programs, Uram works with each player individually to design an effective daily program. It begins at training camp and continues throughout the season. Both programs are also especially effective for players facing rehabilitation from injuries.

Uram is a pioneer in his field and was the NFL's first flexibility coach on a permanent basis. Prior to joining the Steelers, he worked with several pro football and major league baseball teams. His extensive background includes two books: "Refining Human Movement" and "The Complete Stretching Book," published last December. He is a former gymnastics participant and coach. At Slippery Rock College, he lettered in football (quarterback), track (sprinter) and gymnastics. He won the National Sokol Junior and Senior gymnastic championships in the early 1950's and was later named to the Helms, Western Pennsylvania and Butler Halls of Fame. He holds a master's degree in Physical Education.

In 1955, Uram joined the Butler High School faculty where he coached football, basketball, track and gymnastics. In 13 years as gymnastics coach, he compiled a perfect 107-0 record.

**DICK WALKER**  
**Defensive Backfield Coach**

Dick Walker, a veteran of 24 years in the coaching profession, is now in his fourth season with the Steelers as defensive backfield coach.

One of five former Big 10 assistant coaches now on the Steeler staff, Walker came to Pittsburgh in 1978 after serving as defensive secondary coach for the New England Patriots in 1977.

Coaching the defensive secondary has become one of pro football's most pressurized positions with the advent of the pro passing game. In 1979, Walker's Steeler secondary allowed a completion

percentage of 47.1 percent, lowest in the NFL while intercepting 27 opponent passes to rank third in the AFC. In his three seasons as secondary coach, the secondary has picked off 80 passes (26.6 per season) and played a vital role in Super Bowl championships in 1978 and 1979.

This season, Walker and the Steeler staff must find a replacement for retired safety Mike Wagner while continuing to adapt to the more wide open, pass-oriented styles of attack.

Walker began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Cathedral Latin High in Cleveland (1957) before moving to Watterson High in Columbus, O., in 1960 as head coach. In seven seasons, he compiled a 51-11-3 record including a state title in 1966 and honors as Ohio's outstanding high school football coach.

He entered the college ranks at the University of Toledo (1967-68) before moving to Ohio State where he coached the defensive secondary for Woody Hayes and the Buckeyes from 1969 through 1976. During that tenure, Ohio State won or shared seven Big 10 championships and produced six All-America defensive backs including Mike Sensibaugh, Jack Tatum, Neal Colzie, Tim Fox, Steve Luke and Doug Plank.

Walker played collegiately at John Carroll where he lettered three times as a center and linebacker and earned All Big Four Conference twice.

**WOODY WIDENHOFER**  
**Defensive Coordinator**

Woody Widenhofer, one of pro football's bright young coaches, is now in his ninth season with the Steelers. The 38-year-old former Missouri player is a veteran of 17 years in the coaching profession. His credentials and the accomplishments of the Steeler defense he coordinates have thrust him into the limelight as one of the NFL's prime head coaching prospects.

Widenhofer, who played for Dan Devine and served Duffy Daugherty at Michigan State along with George Perles, joined the Steelers in 1973 as linebacker

coach. He has played a significant role in the development of All Pros Jack Ham and Jack Lambert while engineering the maturation of Robin Cole and Dennis Winston, both important contributors.

In 1978, Widenhofer inherited the defensive secondary and that unit was instrumental in the team's push towards Super Bowl XIII. Then, in 1979, he was promoted to defensive coordinator as the club won its fourth championship. Under Widenhofer, flexibility, versatility and quality depth have become Steeler trademarks. In recent seasons, the ability of the defense to adapt and overcome problems, especially injuries, is a testament to Widenhofer's unit.

He joined Chuck Noll's staff from the University of Minnesota where he coached the linebackers (1972). He served as defensive coordinator at Eastern Michigan in 1971 when that program posted an unbeaten record and ranked third nationally. In 1969-70, he coached the defensive line at Michigan State and also coordinated the defense of the freshmen team.

Widenhofer began his coaching career in 1965 at Holy Redeemer High School in Detroit before moving to Nativity High (1967-68). His playing career as a linebacker as Missouri was cut short by a broken leg after lettering twice. He holds a master's degree in Physical Education from Michigan State.

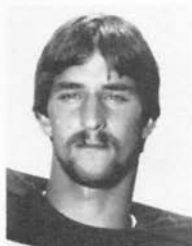

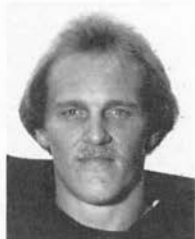

# 1980 STEELER REVIEW

## Pittsburgh 31, Houston 17

Sept. 7 at Pittsburgh, 54,386

The Steelers sat on a 17-0 first quarter lead and then had to score twice in the final 13 minutes to fight off a Houston comeback as Terry Bradshaw accounted for three of the team's four TDs. Larry Anderson provided early momentum when he returned the opening kickoff 63 yards. The Steelers went on to score on three of their first four possessions but realized only three points as the result of four interceptions of Ken Stabler passes the first six times Houston had the ball. The Oilers got the 17 points back by the halfway point of the third quarter. Trailing 17-3, they scored two TDs in 97 seconds. Earl Campbell's first pro pass, a sidearm wobbler, got the first score and when Theo Bell fumbled the next kickoff, Houston tied the game six plays later. Four Bradshaw passes ate up 72 yards of an 80-yard drive to get the Steelers back on top. A broken play on which John Stallworth outfought two defenders for a high Bradshaw lob was the final score of the game. Franco Harris passed Jim Taylor to become the third leading rusher in NFL history with 8,609 yards. Mel Blount and Donnie Shell each had two interceptions and Mike Wagner got the fifth.

## Pittsburgh 20, Baltimore 17

Sept. 14 at Baltimore, 54,914

Donnie Shell's interception on the four-yard line with 3:30 remaining ended a 70-yard drive and prevented the Colts from tying or winning the game in a bitterly fought contest which featured two of the NFL's premier quarterbacks. The Steelers lost the services of receivers John Stallworth and Theo Bell in the first half but reserves Jim Smith and Calvin Sweeney made the key catches in the winning drive. Smith's TD was his fifth and last reception which enabled him to match his single game high. Even though they outgained the Colts, 291-138, the Steelers led by just six

points at the half because of a 34-yard interception return by Baltimore for its only score of the half and the only Steeler turnover of the game. Pittsburgh rebounded from that mistake with a well-executed 87-yard drive as Terry Bradshaw passed for 74 of the yards. The Colts took the lead for the second time when they marched 76 yards after the second half kickoff with Bert Jones throwing for 62 yards. Thirty-five yards in penalties were the major factor in the Colts' final score. A short drive and an exchange of punts gave the Steelers good field position and they were able to capitalize for the winning drive.

After the Bengals converted six Steeler turnovers into 20 points, Matt Bahr was inches wide on a 51-yard field goal attempt on the final play of the game and for the second year in a row Pittsburgh handed Cincinnati its first win. A Terry Bradshaw interception and a Franco Harris fumble on back-to-back first quarter possessions gave the Bengals an early 10-0 lead after Harris' fumble had ended a promising drive following the opening kickoff. Reserve quarterback Jack Thompson, who replaced the injured Ken Anderson late in the first half, twice rallied the Bengals from eight point deficits with clutch scoring passes to keep the game within reach. Frank Pollard fumbled the kickoff following the second TD and the Bengals were able to get two first downs to make the winning field goal a fairly easy kick. When it was able to hold onto the ball, the Steeler offense was very productive in spite of running just 53 plays, and 16 fewer than Cincinnati. The Steelers moved the ball 47 yards on two plays before Bahr's miss.

## Pittsburgh 38, Chicago 3

### Sept. 21 at Pittsburgh, 53,987

Terry Bradshaw and Jim Smith provided much of the offense and, after a slow start, the defense shut down the Bears' attack. Chicago moved 69 yards with the opening kickoff to a field goal as Walter Payton gained 32 of his 60 yards rushing. After fumbling on their first offensive play, the Steelers scored on their next three possessions and then put the game out of reach with a fourth score 36 seconds before the half ended. It was the third time in Bradshaw's career he threw four TD passes and Smith became the first Steeler to catch three scoring passes in one game since 1968 as the Steelers registered their highest point total ever against Chicago. Cliff Stoudt made his first pro appearance late in the third quarter and directed a crisp 80-yard drive, capped by his initial TD pass. After the first Chicago drive, the Steeler defense limited the Bears to 131 yards and nine first downs the rest of the game. Mike Wagner intercepted three passes, the first Steeler to accomplish the feat since he did it in 1973, and Jack Ham recovered two fumbles to highlight the defensive effort.

Donnie Shell's second interception of the game at the 7-yard line with less than 20 seconds to play saved the Pittsburgh victory. Minnesota had capitalized on a fumble and recovered an onside kick for two quick fourth quarter TDs. After Matt Bahr hit the left upright on a 39-yard FG attempt, the Vikings moved 51 yards before Shell slipped in front of Tommy Kramer's second down pass for the Steelers' fifth interception of the game. ## Cincinnati 17, Pittsburgh 16

Oct. 12 at Pittsburgh 53,668

The Bengals won their first game ever in Pittsburgh and snapped the Steelers' 18-game home field winning streak. They became the first AFC Central team to beat the Steelers twice in the same season as Pittsburgh had another sloppy performance similar to their setback two weeks earlier in Cincinnati. Although they only had two turnovers, the Steelers fumbled five times without losing the ball. These miscues stymied a possible winning drive in the fourth quarter and thwarted the opportunity to generate scoring drives earlier. This resulted in the lowest offensive yardage total of the first six games. A critical factor was the loss of punter Craig Colquitt with a foot injury early in the first quarter. This forced Terry Bradshaw to punt and it cost the Steelers valuable field position. A 24-yard punt contributed to the Bengals' winning TD. As was the case in their first loss to Cincinnati, the Steelers had a chance to win the game in the final seconds but Matt Bahr's 39-yard FG attempt was short and wide. Earlier in the game, a 47-yard attempt hit the upright and the extra point try after the Steelers' first TD was blocked.

## Oakland 45, Pittsburgh 34

Oct. 20 at Pittsburgh, 53,940

In the highest scoring Monday Night football game ever and the fourth highest in Steeler history, Pittsburgh lost two home games for the first time since 1971. It was the most points scored against the Steelers since 1969 and the most they have ever allowed at Three Rivers. The defeat created a three-way tie for first place in the AFC Central with Cleveland and Houston. The Steelers had a season-high in offensive yardage but three critical turnovers, two Ted Hendricks' interceptions and a Terry Bradshaw fumble in the second quarter led to 21 points as the Raiders managed to overcome a 10-point deficit to go in front for good. The Steelers got back

to within one point late in the third quarter but their defense was unable to contain the Raiders. Oakland's three second half TDs came on long passing plays in which Raider receivers easily beat the Steeler coverages behind excellent pass protection which allowed quarterback Jim Plunkett time to throw deep. Bradshaw was injured twice, once in each half, and was relieved by Cliff Stoudt who had a pass intercepted on his first series and later engineered a 79-yard drive in the last minute of the first half.

## Cleveland 27, Pittsburgh 26

### Oct. 26 at Cleveland, 79,095

For the first time since 1976, the Steelers lost three games in a row as they fell into third place in the AFC Central behind Houston and Cleveland. It was the second straight week the pass defense broke down as the Browns defeated the Steelers for the first time in eight games. The fourth quarter collapse spoiled QB Cliff Stoudt's first NFL start. He led the Steelers on five scoring drives, three of which went for 75 yards, and threw for 310 yards. However, he was outgunned by Brian Sipe who passed for 349 yards and four TDs. It was the Browns' QB's 12th TD pass in his last three games against the Steelers. Stoudt's 72-yard pass to Theo Bell, the Steelers' longest play of the season, set up a TD and gave Pittsburgh a 12-point lead late in the third quarter. But for the second straight game the defense could not hold a double digit lead. On successive possessions, Sipe hit on seven of nine passes for 73 yards for one TD and three of four for 56 yards for the game-winner. Terry Bradshaw missed a starting assignment for the first time in 64 games because of a bruised right thumb injured against Oakland. Franco Harris, Lynn Swann and Jack Lambert also sat out the game with injuries.

The Browns missed the extra point after their first TD because of a fumbled snap and this changed the complexion of the game. Don Cockroft failed on field goal attempts of 46, 46 and 47 yards which could have made the outcome different. Franco Harris became the third NFL player to rush for 9,000 yards.

The Steelers missed an opportunity to move into a first place tie and instead suffered a serious blow to their playoff chances as Houston lost and Cleveland won to place both a game ahead of Pittsburgh. Robin Cole

The Steelers' best drive of the game in the final two minutes of the half led to a field goal. On the Bills' second series of the second half, Ferguson completed four of six passes before Curtis Brown scored the first TD rushing in five games against Pittsburgh. The Steelers' last chance to get back into the game ended with three incomplete passes from the Buffalo 30 after they had gained six yards on first down. Joe Cribbs became the first player in 1980 to rush for 100 yards against the Steelers. Franco Harris moved into third place with his 75th TD rushing. The game was costly to the Steelers as they lost L.C. Greenwood, Robin Cole, Jim Smith and Jon Kolb with injuries.

After Jack Lambert stripped the ball, Mel Blount returned the fumble 32 yards to set up the first score. Dennis Winston outfought several players for a fumbled punt and this led to the first TD. With the Steelers leading 16-10 in the fourth quarter and Miami on a second and goal at the Steeler one-yard line, Ron Johnson's vicious tackle forced a Tony Nathan fumble which was recovered by Jack Ham. The Steelers then clinched the game with a 98 yard drive. Lambert iced the victory with an interception. The win moved the Steelers into a second

place tie with Houston as Cleveland beat the Oilers to take over undisputed possession of first place by one game.

## Houston 6, Pittsburgh 0

The Steelers were all but mathematically eliminated from the playoffs as they were shut out for the first time in 114 games and wasted their finest defensive effort of the season. Three Terry Bradshaw interceptions, two Franco Harris fumbles and some untimely penalties, particularly a procedure call on first down at the Houston one-yard line played a major role in the loss. Cliff Parsley's great punting forced the Steelers to start six first half possessions from their 14, 6, 2, 21, 11 and 10-yard lines which dictated the tone of the half. Harris' first fumble on a first down play from the Houston 37 ended the Steelers' first series of the game. The Pittsburgh defense held the Oilers without a first down rushing in the first half and limited Earl Campbell to 13 yards on seven carries. Aided by holding and interference penalties, the Steelers took the second half kickoff and moved to the 1-yard line when a procedure penalty on first down set them back to the six. Mike Reinfeldt intercepted Bradshaw's pass in the end zone on the next play. Houston followed with its best drive of the game for their first field goal. Harris' second fumble on his own 33 led to the second field goal. On the Steelers' next to last possession, they drove 59 yards, 54 on Sidney Thornton's running, to the Oiler 25 but the drive stalled and Matt Bahr missed on a 42-yard field goal attempt.

## San Diego 26, Pittsburgh 17

Dec. 22 at San Diego, 51,785

In a meaningless game for themselves but one that San Diego had to win, not only for the AFC West title but also to avoid complete elimination from the playoffs, the Steelers completed their worst season since 1971 with a 9-7 record. Although they moved the ball almost at will in gaining 488 yards, a season-high against the Steelers, the Chargers scored just two TDs and Rolf Benirschke four field goals were the eventual margin of difference as they ran 30 more plays than the Steelers and did not commit a turnover. For the first time all season, the Steelers did not have a turnover but they lacked balance in their offense as they were held to a season-low 49 yards rushing. Their attack consisted mostly of big passing plays with four going for over 32 yards. Theo Bell registered his fourth 100-yard game of the season on five important catches. After a TD-less first half, Dan Fouts combined with Kellen Winslow for a 59-yard pass on the first play of the third quarter which set up San Diego's first TD and forced the Steelers to play catchup the balance of the game. The Steelers came back to score on their first possession of the second half but that was as close as they would get as the Chargers scored on two of their next three chances.

## STEELERS vs. NFC OPPONENTS

Since realignment in 1970, the Steelers have compiled a 28-10 overall record against NFC opponents including a 24-10 regular season mark—15-2 at home and 9-8 on the road.

The team is 23-5 since first making the playoffs in 1972 including a 14-game Three Rivers Stadium unbeaten string which began on Nov. 26, 1972 against Minnesota (23-10). The Los Angeles Rams were the last team to defeat the Steelers at Three Rivers, 23-14 on Dec. 19, 1971.

The Steelers have posted undefeated seasons vs. NFC opponents in 1973 (3-0), 1974 (3-0), 1977 (2-0) and 1980 (4-0).

## FRANCO CONTINUES RECORD RUSH!

Franco Harris, now third among all-time NFL runners and the Steelers' top all-time rusher (9,352), needs 648 yards to reach the 10,000-yard plateau and become only the third running back in pro football history to accomplish that feat. Jim Brown (12,312) is pro football's all-time leading ground gainer followed by O.J. Simpson (11,236). Harris moved into third place past Jim Taylor in 1980.

With 76 career touchdowns rushing, Harris needs eight to pass Jim Taylor (83) for second place on the all-time list behind Brown's first place total of 106. With 82 total career touchdowns, he can also climb into the top ten in that category past Paul Warfield (86) by scoring five times in 1981. He could climb as high as fourth.

With a 1,000-yard season, Harris would become the first player in NFL history to accomplish that feat eight times. He shares the record of seven with Brown.

Players completing the top ten among all-time rushers include Jim Taylor (8,597), Joe Perry (8,368), Walter Payton (8,386), Larry Csonka (8,081), Leroy Kelly (7,274), John Riggins (6,822) and former Steeler John Henry Johnson (6,803).

### ACTIVE STEELERS IN PRO BOWL

Twelve members of the Steelers active roster have played in the Pro Bowl led by Joe Greene's 10 appearances, an all-time club record. Remaining active players include Franco Harris (9), Jack Ham (8), L.C. Greenwood and Jack Lambert (6), Mel Blount and Terry Bradshaw (4), Donnie Shell, Lynn Swann and Mike Webster (3) and J. T. Thomas and John Stallworth (1).

Harris is the only active player in the NFL to play in the Pro Bowl nine consecutive times. His nine appearances ties him for second all-time with Ernie Stautner in the Steeler record book. Ham is the only active linebacker in pro football to earn a Pro Bowl berth in each of the last six seasons.

Lambert has played in the postseason contest the last six years in a row while Shell and Webster have earned a spot the last three consecutive years.

In 1976, 11 Steelers were selected to the Pro Bowl, a club high. Ten players were picked after the 1978 and 1979 seasons.

## **(STEELER HISTORY—continued)**

Expansion Committee and guided the league through the difficult process that resulted in the current labor contract with the players. On a club level, he has been the architect of one of the most successful franchises in professional sports and guides it with a steady hand.

Art's most significant contribution was and still is in personnel. A former football player at St. Vincent College, he is the man behind the great Steeler drafts. He oversees a department that has been creative and productive and still spends many hours himself scouring the country for talent.

After Parker left prior to the 1965 season, Mike Nixon and Bill Austin attempted to produce a winner. They failed.

In 1969, the Rooneys named 37-year-old Chuck Noll as the 14th coach in the club's history. Relying solely on the draft to build, he patiently nursed his young team to maturity.

The team's ability to maximize their draft selections has been the key to their unprecedented success. When Joe Greene was picked in the first round in 1969, he became the nucleus of what was to become a great defense. The following year Terry Bradshaw was the first choice and it was the makings of an explosive offense.

After three building years under Noll in which the team went from 1-13 in 1969 to 5-9 and 6-8 the next two seasons, the big breakthrough came in 1972 as the Steelers won their first division title ever. They lost to Miami, the eventual NFL champion, in the AFC Championship game but it was to be their first of six trips in eight years to that plateau.

In 1974, the Steelers won their first league crown. The next season they became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls. In 1978, they were the first team to win three Super Bowls and in 1979, became the first to win four and win two consecutively twice. Their total of four league championships is third to Green Bay (11) and Chicago (8).

If, at the end of the regular season, two or more clubs in the same division finish with the best won-lost-tied percentage, the following steps will be taken to determine the division winner.

## WILD CARD TIES

If necessary to break ties to determine the two Wild Card clubs from each conference, the following steps will be taken:

1. If all the tied clubs are from the same division, apply division tiebreaker.  
2. If the tied clubs are from different divisions, apply the following steps.

### Two Clubs

1. Head-to-head, if applicable; 2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference; 3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, minimum of four; 4. Best net points in conference games; 5. Best net points in all games; 6. Strength of schedule; 7. Best net touchdowns in all games or 8. Coin toss.

### Three or More Clubs

(NOTE: If two clubs remain tied after the third or other clubs eliminated, tiebreaker reverts to step one of applicable two-club format.)

1. Head-to-head sweep (applicable only if one club has defeated each of the others or one club has lost to each of the others); 2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference; 3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, minimum of four; 4. Best net points in conference games; 5. Best net points in all games; 6. Strength of schedule; 7. Best net touchdowns in all games or 8. Coin toss.

## 1981 PLAYOFF PAIRINGS AND PRIORITY

- First Round**—Wild cards play each other. Home clubs will be clubs with the best won-lost-tied percentage in regular season. If tied in record, apply all applicable division tiebreakers.
- Other Rounds**—Sites for the AFC and NFC Divisional Playoffs and AFC and NFL Championship games are determined by the won-lost records of the division champions.

## THREE RIVERS STADIUM

Three Rivers Stadium, opened on July 16, 1970, saw its first pro football action on Aug. 28 when the Steelers hosted the New York Giants in a preseason game. The team opened the regular season vs. Houston on Sept. 20.

The stadium, with a seating capacity for football of 54,000, occupies approximately ten acres on the North Side of the Allegheny River. Prior to the 1980 season, 3,700 seats were added. Fifty percent of all seats are under cover with the highest seat 122 feet above the Tartan Turf surface and the farthest seat 259 feet away.
