



STEELER HISTORY

The first AFC Central division championship since 1979 and a seven-game winning streak — longest in the NFL — made the 1983 season a noteworthy one for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

In 1984, the Steelers' 52nd season, more work must be done. A year ago, the roster counted 25 players with three or less years of NFL experience. With the retirements of cornerback Mel Blount and linebacker Loren Toews and Terry Bradshaw's uncertain status, the rejuvenation process under Chuck Noll will continue.

The Steelers were founded by Art Rooney in 1933 and carried the nickname Pirates until 1940. For more than five decades, Mr. Rooney has watched the growth of the NFL's fifth oldest franchise. The early years — 1930's and 1940's — were lean times while the 1950's and 1960's brought some success, though never a playoff entry. But during the 1970's, the Steelers were pro football's most successful team. They won four Super Bowls, more than any other team in NFL history while making the postseason playoffs a record-tieing eight straight years.

Born in Coultersville, Pa., on January 26, 1901, Mr. Rooney moved to Pittsburgh with his family when he was a year and a half old. He grew up on the site now occupied by Three Rivers Stadium and still lives just a short walk from the Steelers' home field.

He was an outstanding athlete who excelled in football, baseball and boxing. Knute Rockne wanted him to play at Notre Dame, but he attended Indiana State (Pa.), Georgetown and Duquesne. In baseball, he was signed by the Boston Red Sox and Chicago Cubs, but an arm injury ended his major league ambitions. He was also selected to represent the United States on the 1920 Olympic boxing team.

With competition coming from major league baseball and the more established collegiate football game, the early years proved to be difficult ones for the Steelers and other pro football teams. Mr. Rooney's team played their games at Forbes Field, but frequently took the games to the fans, playing in such places as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans and Louisville.

In 1939, the Steelers stunned the sports world by signing Colorado All America Whizzer White to a \$15,800 contract, an unheard of sum at that time. The NFL's first big-money player is now United States Supreme Court Justice Byron White.

Sparked by rookie halfback Bill Dudley, now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, the Steelers had their first winning season in 1942 (7-4). The nucleus of that promising club was soon in the military. During World War II, the Steelers combined forces with the Philadelphia Eagles (1943) and Chicago Cardinals (1944).

After the war, the Steelers rekindled their efforts to bring a winner to Pittsburgh. Jock Sutherland, a legend at the University of Pittsburgh, joined the team in 1946. Utilizing the single wing, the Steelers tied for the divisional title in 1947 before losing in the playoffs to Philadelphia.

When Sutherland died unexpectedly on a scouting trip in 1948, the Steelers were dealt another setback. John Michelosen replaced him.

In 1952, Joe Bach began his second term as the team's coach as the Steelers became the last pro club to abandon the single wing. Under Bach, the Steelers were playing exciting football and improved their performance to .500 in 1953 when he resigned for health reasons.

For the third time, Rooney called on his friend Walt Kiesling. He coached the team through 1956 before Buddy Parker arrived from Detroit (1957). Parker and the flamboyant Bobby Layne reeled off a string of four winning seasons in six years beginning with a 7-4-1 mark in 1958. In 1963, the Steelers fell one game short of delivering a title when they lost their final game to the New York Giants.

In 1964, Art Rooney, Sr. was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. At about the same time, a transition was beginning to take shape in the front office. Dan and Art, Jr., the oldest of Mr. Rooney's five sons, became active in the organization on a full-time basis.


As youngsters, both had performed menial duties in training camp and their life spans actually paralleled that of the Steelers. Dan's first formal assignment was selling advertising and editing the program. Art, Jr. worked in the ticket office, specializing in group sales.

At 51, Dan is one of the most able and respected executives in sports. He currently serves on the three-member Executive Committee of NFL Properties and the same body of the Management Council and is on the Board of NFL Films. He also has served as Chairman of the NFL's Expansion Committee. On a club level, he has been the architect of one of the most successful franchises in professional sports and guides it with a steady hand.

Art's most significant contribution was and still is in personnel. A former football player at St. Vincent College, he is the man behind the great Steeler drafts. He oversees a department that has been creative and productive and still spends many hours himself scouring the country for talent.

After Parker left prior to the 1965 season, Mike Nixon and Bill Austin attempted to produce a winner. They failed.

CHUCK NOLL

Head Coach

Chuck Noll, one of the most successful coaches in National Football League history, looks to 1984 as one of the more unique in his 16 years as Steeler head coach.

Back-to-back playoff entries and a roster heavy with young players, brings significant promise for the coming season. There are also important question marks such as the team's sub-par play late in the 1983 regular season and in the playoffs, front line vacancies created by the retirements of Mel Blount and Loren Toews and the uncertain status of Terry Bradshaw.

Noll, who has conquered many obstacles since inheriting a 2-11-2 team in 1969, is the eighth winningest coach of all-time with a 147-87-1 career mark and needs eight victories to pass Steve Owen (154-108-17) for seventh. Only Tom Landry (234) and Don Shula (226) have won more games among active NFL coaches.

The 52-year-old Cleveland native has put together 12 consecutive non-losing seasons and his teams have made the playoffs 10 times in the last 12 years. He has the longest tenure of any of the 14 Steeler head coaches and has been with the same club longer than any other AFC head coach. Noll is one of only five NFL head coaches to lead a team for 16 consecutive seasons — Curly Lambeau (31), Landry (23), Owen (23), Bud Grant (16) and Noll.

With a .628 winning percentage, Noll is fifth among active coaches behind Joe Gibbs (36-12-0, .750), Shula (226-91-6, .709), Tom Flores (55-27-0, .670) and Landry (234-134-6, .634). Noll is the only coach to win four Super Bowls and needs one more to tie Vince Lombardi and the late George Halas who each won five NFL championships. Noll, Lombardi and Flores are the only coaches in pro football history who have not lost in the Super Bowl among

those there more than once. His 14-6 postseason record is topped only by Lombardi (9-1) and Flores (8-1).

Now one of only 16 pro coaches with 100 wins, Noll's trademarks are patience and his enthusiasm for the teaching aspects of the game. He enjoys the daily routine of football and the intense preparation which accompanies it. The 1984 season marks Noll's 32nd in pro football as a player, assistant and head coach. His teams have recorded 25 winning seasons and have made the playoffs 20 times.

Noll came to Pittsburgh in 1969 from Shula's staff in Baltimore and immediately committed the Steelers to a program of building through the draft. The team makes infrequent trades — just nine in 16 seasons which brought players to Pittsburgh — including a 1984 offseason trade for Miami quarterback David Woodley. By comparison, in 15 of the last 16 drafts, the club has had extra picks. Fourteen active Steelers were obtained with extra selections including seven full-time and two part-time starters.

Noll's first team opened with a win and then lost 13 in a row to finish with the No. 1 draft choice (Terry Bradshaw). The losing streak carried over into 1970 when the Steelers began a new decade in a brand new Three Rivers Stadium with three straight losses and finished with a 5-9 mark. The following season, the club was 6-8, but a foundation was being built.

The breakthrough came in 1972 when the Steelers posted an 11-3 record and won their first AFC Central title. The team upended Oakland, 13-7, in the first round of the playoffs on a miraculous last-second touchdown by Franco Harris on a deflected pass. Eight days later, the Steelers lost to Miami, 21-17, in the AFC Championship game. The Dolphins finished with a perfect 17-0 record and their first Super Bowl. Noll was named UPI's AFC Coach of the Year.

The next year (1973), the team reeled off 10 wins but lost in the first round of the playoffs to Oakland. The club's productive drafting was beginning to pay big dividends.

In 1974, the Steelers rolled to the best regular season record in the NFL — 12-2 — and climbed to their ultimate goal. Pittsburgh whipped Buffalo (31-14) and Oakland (24-13) to win the AFC title and advanced to Super Bowl IX. Against Minnesota, the Steelers held the Vikings to just 17 yards rushing and won their first-ever world championship, 16-6. The victory climaxed a string of stellar defensive performances. To reach the Super Bowl, the Steeler defense produced one of the greatest efforts in playoff history, limiting the Raiders to 29 yards rushing.

In 1975, Noll became the third coach to win back-to-back Super Bowls when the Steelers won 10 of 14 regular season games, defeated Baltimore and Oakland in the AFC playoffs and capped the season by beating Dallas, 21-17, in Super Bowl X in Miami.

The following season (1976), the Steelers fielded what many say was Noll's best club, but it lost four of the first five games before rallying to win the last nine regular season games in a row and the opening playoff game. Noll was named NFL Coach of the Year by the Sporting News, but the Steelers' bid to become the first team in league history to win the Super Bowl three consecutive times ended with a 24-7 AFC Championship game loss to Oakland.

Pittsburgh made the playoffs for the sixth straight season in 1977, losing in the first round to Denver. In 1978 and 1979, the team rebounded, posting the best regular season won-loss records in the NFL and then going on to win Super Bowl XIII (35-31) and XIV (31-19) against Dallas and Los Angeles to finish the 1970's as the "Team of the Decade." In six short seasons, the club had become the first NFL team to win four Super Bowls and the first to win two consecutively twice.

Noll's pro football career began as a 21st round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953 following a college career at Dayton, where he was team captain. He played seven seasons (77 career games) with the Browns as an offensive guard and linebacker. During that span, Cleveland won five Eastern Conference championships and played for three NFL titles (1953-54-55), winning two.

Noll's playing career ended prematurely at 27 when he retired to enter the coaching profession. However, an opportunity at Dayton did not materialize. He was planning a teaching career when Sid Gillman offered him the last spot on the staff of the Los Angeles Chargers of the new American Football League. Noll served as defensive assistant for six years with the Chargers winning four divisional titles and two AFL championships.

In 1966, he returned to the NFL as defensive backfield coach on the staff of Don Shula in Baltimore. In his three years, the Colts lost just three regular season games and won an NFL title in 1968 before losing to the New York Jets in Super Bowl III.

RON BLACKLEDGE

Offensive Line Coach —
Tackles/Tight Ends

A veteran of 24 years in the coaching ranks, Ron Blackledge begins his third season with the Steelers. This year, he will team with Bill Meyers and handle the offensive tackles and tight ends. Blackledge came to Pittsburgh in 1982 as an offensive assistant and then filled the void left by Rollie Dotsch's USFL departure.

The offensive line will be the focus of considerable attention after injuries and inexperience caused it to drop from its long-time top ten status in sacks allowed. The Steelers fell to 22nd and tied a team record by allowing 52 while in per game rushing average, another key measuring stick, the club was tied for eighth leaguewide (4.3).

The 46-year-old North Canton, Ohio native came to the Steelers from Kent State where he served as head coach from 1979 thru 1981, compiling an 8-25 mark. In 1977-78, he had served as offensive coordinator under Dennis Fitzgerald, now the Steeler inside linebacker coach.

Blackledge began coaching in the high school ranks for nine seasons at Canton South (1960-62), Canton Timken (1963-66) as head coach and at Canton Glenwood (1967-68). He moved to the college level as offensive line coach at Ashland College (1968-69) and later at the University of Cincinnati (1970-72). From 1973 thru 1975, he served as offensive line coach at Kentucky and then coached the line at Princeton (1976) before going to Kent State.

A member of the Bowling Green Hall of Fame, Blackledge played tight end and defensive end. He received a Physical Education degree (1960) and holds a master's in Guidance and Physical Education from Ohio University (1967).

PERSONAL: Full name: Ronald Dale Blackledge. Date of birth: April 15, 1938 in North Canton, Ohio. Married, wife Linda, with daughters Michelle (6/13/64) and Traci (8/17/71) and son Todd (2/25/61), a first round draft choice of the Kansas City Chiefs in 1983. The Blackledge family lives in the North Hills.

TONY DUNGY

Defensive Coordinator

Tony Dungy, a four-year veteran on the Steeler coaching staff, begins his first season as defensive coordinator. The 28-year-old former defensive secondary coach is the NFL's youngest coordinator — defensive or offensive.

Dungy, a former defensive back with the Steelers, 49ers and Giants, replaces Woody Widener, who joined the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws. He inherits a defense which finished third in the league in total defense, fifth against the pass and among the top five in six major categories including tied for third in interceptions (28). Still, improvement is

possible and replacements for retired 14-year veteran Mel Blount and linebacker Loren Toews must be found.

Dungy's coaching career began at Minnesota (1980) as defensive backfield coach. He joined the Steelers in 1981 as a defensive assistant and took over the secondary in 1982.

His first stint with the Steelers came as a player in 1977. After converting from quarterback, he made the team as a free agent safety, beating out veterans Ray Oldham and Glen Edwards. He played two seasons, primarily as a fifth defensive back and on special teams. In 1978, while starting only two games, he led the club in interceptions (6). In August of 1979, he was traded to San Francisco for a draft choice. The following year, Dungy was traded to the New York Giants and later waived.

As a player at Minnesota, the Jackson, Michigan native was an option quarterback, senior captain and two-time MVP. Until 1982, he held Gopher records for total plays (999), passing attempts (586), completions (274), passing yards (3,577) and touchdowns (25). He played in the Japan and Hula Bowls and the East-West game. Dungy earned a Business Administration degree (1977).

PERSONAL: Full name: Anthony Kevin Dungy. Date of birth: October 6, 1955 in Jackson, Michigan. Married, wife Lauren. The Dungys live in Allison Park.



WALT EVANS

Assistant Conditioning Coach

Thirty-three year old Walt Evans is in his second season as assistant conditioning coach. He joined the Steelers prior to the 1983 training camp.

Evans assists Jon Kolb in implementing the club's extensive conditioning program and spends the bulk of his time with the weight training, flexibility and nutritional aspects.

Before joining the Steelers, Evans served as a corporate consultant for General Nutrition Corporation (1980-82) and helped formulate health and fitness programs for major area corporations such as Westinghouse and H.J. Heinz.

He coached football and basketball at South High (1975-79) following his graduation from Marietta College in Ohio with a B.A. in Health and Physical Education (1974). In 1983, Evans received a master's in Sports Physiology from Pitt and is currently working towards a doctorate.

A member of the American College of Sports Medicine, Evans has written several articles on health and fitness for major magazines in the field and is presently working on a book on conditioning. He compiled a physiological profile of the Steelers following the 1983 season, a project which took a year to complete.

Evans played football and basketball at Oliver High School and played in the city championship game, the last game played at Forbes Field.

DENNIS FITZGERALD

Inside Linebacker Coach

Dennis Fitzgerald, in his third season on the Steeler staff, this year teams with Jed Hughes at the linebacker position. Fitzgerald will handle the inside linebackers in the 3-4 scheme while Hughes will work with the outside linebackers.

The 48-year-old Fitzgerald brought 22 years of experience to the club when he joined the staff in 1982 from Tulane. For the second time in his career, he will be working with perennial All Pro Jack Lambert while Bob Kohrs and David Little will battle for a starting job vacated by Loren Toews' retirement. The team also expects to look

at Robin Cole on the inside.

Fitzgerald's coaching career began at Michigan where he was assistant freshman coach (1961-62) and head freshman coach (1963-65) before being promoted to defensive line coach under Bump Elliott.

He served as defensive coordinator at Kentucky (1969-70) and before moving to Kent State (1971-74) where he coached nine-time Pro Bowler Jack Lambert. In 1975, he succeeded Don James as Kent State's head coach and compiled an 18-16 overall mark including an 8-4 record in 1976. In 1978, Fitzgerald coordinated the Syracuse defense before going to Tulane (1981) in the same capacity.

Fitzgerald was a five-time letterman in both football and wrestling at Michigan. He was the football team's MVP in 1960 as a halfback and still holds the school record for longest kickoff return — 99 yards vs. Michigan State in 1960. He also captained the wrestling team and won Big Ten championships twice (1960-61), was an NCAA semifinalist twice (1960-61), a national AAU finalist (1961) and participated in the 1963 Pan American Games and World Championships.

The Ann Arbor, Michigan native has an undergraduate and master's degree in Physical Education from Michigan.

DICK HOAK Offensive Backfield Coach

Dick Hoak has been a part of the Steeler organization for 23 years including 10 as a player. This year, the 44-year-old Jeannette, Pa., native begins his 13th season as the club's offensive backfield coach.

Last year, the Steelers gained more yards rushing than passing in seven of their 10 wins and wound up fourth in the league. Franco Harris, the key contributor, moved into second place on the all-time list behind Jim Brown while becoming the first back in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards eight times. In 1984, Hoak's versatility and unique credentials as a teacher and former player

will be vital to offensive development with Walter Abercrombie's expanded role, the continued growth of Frank Pollard and the addition of three draft choices.

Hoak is Pittsburgh's No. 3 all-time rusher behind Harris and John Henry Johnson and second in rushing attempts. From 1961-70, he rushed 1,132 times for 3,965 yards and 25 touchdowns. He led the team in rushing three times while catching 145 career passes for 1,152 yards and eight touchdowns. In 1968, Hoak had his best year, gaining 858 yards, fourth in the NFL, and playing in the Pro Bowl. Former teammate Bobby Layne once called him "the most perfect player in my time."

As a collegian, Hoak played both quarterback and running back at Penn State (1958-60) where he was offensive captain and team MVP. He holds a Social Studies degree (1961) and is a former recipient of the Dapper Dan Club's award as Pittsburgh's outstanding sports figure.

JED HUGHES Inside Linebacker Coach

Former Minnesota Vikings' assistant Jed Hughes is in his first season as the Steelers outside linebacker coach. He will be working with inside linebacker coach Dennis Fitzgerald and first-year coordinator Tony Dungy.

Hughes joins a defense with championship potential at one of the club's strongest positions. It is a critical area for development with young talents such as Mike Merriweather, Bryan Hinkle, Craig Bingham and Todd Seabaugh figuring in key roles.

The 36-year-old Hughes coached the Vikings' defensive secondary in 1982 and 1983 after 11 years of collegiate experience at Stanford, Michigan and UCLA. He began his coaching career at Biglerville (Pa.) High School (1970) before moving to Stanford as offensive line coach for one year and a year with the defensive line. He coached the offensive line for a season and the linebackers for three seasons at Michigan (1973-75) before joining the UCLA staff as defensive coordinator — inside linebackers and defensive line.



JON KOLB

Defensive Line/Conditioning Coach

Jon Kolb begins his third season as the Steelers defensive line and conditioning coach. He joined Chuck Noll's staff on Feb. 17, 1982 following his retirement after 13 seasons as an offensive tackle for the club.

A year ago, the Steelers reached opposing quarterbacks 50 times to rank second in the AFC while finishing third overall in the NFL. It was the second year of the team's 3-4 scheme and Kolb played a major role in the top caliber play of nose tackle Gary Dunn and the development of Keith Willis, Keith Gary and Edmund Nelson. Willis, a former free agent, set a team record

with 14 sacks in 1983.

As conditioning coach, Kolb is charged with developing and maintaining a strength and flexibility program. He brought a unique approach in 1982 and it continues. Without sacrificing the Steeler role as pioneers in weight work, Kolb introduced cardio-vascular stress tests for all players. The tests identify the conditioning needs of each individual player and workout routines are developed specifically to meet those needs.

Kolb's Steeler career began as a No. 3 draft choice in 1969 as part of Noll's first draft class. He started 138 games including 112 in a row (1971-79) at tackle and was one of the building blocks for what would be named the 'Team of the Decade.' In his first 10 seasons, the former All-America center at Oklahoma State started 156 of 157 possible games including postseason (1969-78). Kolb is one of only nine Steelers to play 13 seasons and stands fourth all-time in career games (177) behind all-time leader Mel Blount (200).

BILL MEYERS

Offensive Line Coach — Centers/Guards

Bill Meyers, a former offensive line coach with the Green Bay Packers, is in his first season with the Steelers. He will team with Ron Blackledge and handle the guards and centers.

Meyers inherits two talented positions in the Steeler line and a combination of players including six-time Pro Bowl center Mike Webster, experienced guards in Craig Wolfley and Steve Courson and capable young players in Emil Boures, Rick Donnalley and Blake Wingle. The Steelers were fourth in the NFL in rushing in 1983, but battled injury problems throughout the season while yielding a record-tying 52 sacks.


A veteran of 11 years in the collegiate ranks, Meyers coached the Packers' line in 1982 and 1983 after three seasons at Notre Dame as offensive line coach (1979-80) and later defensive tackles coach (1981) under new head coach Gerry Faust.

The 37-year-old Meyers started his coaching career at California as a graduate assistant working with the defensive line (1972-73). He coached the linebackers at Santa Clara (1974-76) before returning to California as offensive line coach (1977-78).

A junior college All-America at Long Beach (Ca.) City College, Meyers started for two seasons at Stanford when the school posted Rose Bowl championships in 1970 and 1971. He was All-Pacific Coast Conference in both seasons. Meyers earned an undergraduate degree from Stanford in Political Science and Pre-law (1972) and considered law school before deciding on the coaching profession.

Meyers is a Marine Corps veteran (1964-67).

TOM MOORE Offensive Coordinator

A veteran of eight seasons as the Steelers wide receiver coach, Tom Moore begins his second season as the club's first offensive coordinator.

Last season, the Steeler offense was one of only two in the NFL to gain more yards rushing than passing. The team ranked fourth in the league in rushing, but 27th in passing and played without quarterback Terry Bradshaw. Moore will have a different cast in 1984 with Cliff Stoudt's departure, the addition of former Dolphin David Woodley and the first three picks of the 1984 draft, all receivers — two wide receivers and

a tight end.

In 1983, Calvin Sweeney, a veteran of one NFL start, was the Steelers leading receiver with John Stallworth having season-long injury problems. Three rookie receivers made the active roster and two — Gregg Garrity and Wayne Capers — wound up as part-time starters.

Moore joined the Steelers in 1977 after serving as offensive coordinator at Minnesota where Tony Dungy was the Gopher quarterback. He began his coaching career at Iowa (1961-62) as freshman coach and moved to Dayton (1965) as backfield coach after a military stint. Moore was offensive coordinator at Wake Forest (1969) and backfield coach at Georgia Tech (1970-71) before accepting the first of two assignments at Minnesota as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach. He coached in the World Football League with the New York Stars (1974) and returned to Minnesota when the league folded.

Moore was a quarterback under Forest Evashevski at Iowa (1957-60) on a Big Ten championship team (1958). The club beat California in the Rose Bowl and established a total offensive record (580 yards).

He received a History degree (1961) and a master's in Guidance (1966) from Minnesota.

The Pasadena, California native supervises the day-to-day health of the squad including rehabilitation of all injuries. He also has previous experience in the professional ranks with the St. Louis Cardinals (1963-64).

Berlin, an Iowa State graduate with a Physical Education degree, grew up in Philadelphia and served in the Marines for three years before beginning his training

career at DePauw (Indiana). He later earned a master's degree in Health and Safety from Indiana (1965).

Berlin and his wife Dee have a daughter Beth and a son, Steven, who plays defensive tackle at Clemson.

Berlin is assisted by Gary Strager, now in his fourth season with the Steelers.

College Talent Scout


Joe Krupa is in his sixth season as the Steelers' college talent scout. He is a former Pro Bowler who played nine seasons with the team as a defensive tackle.

NOW THERE ARE SIX!

With the retirements of cornerback Mel Blount, a 14-year veteran, and linebacker Loren Toews and Terry Bradshaw's uncertain status for 1984, only six Steelers remain from the four Super Bowl championship teams which won titles in 1974, 1975, 1978 and 1979.

Those remaining include offensive tackle Larry Brown, running back Franco Harris, linebacker Jack Lambert, strong safety Donnie Shell, wide receiver John Stallworth and center Mike Webster.

Sixteen Steelers played in at least one championship game. Only two members — one starter (Lambert) — remain from the "Steel Curtain" defense.



Seven turnovers and 121 yards in penalties spoiled a great defensive effort, highlighted by seven quarterback sacks. Until the fourth quarter, the Steelers had held Denver to 59 yards total offense and three pass completions as John Elway made his pro debut by completing just one pass in eight attempts. The Broncos drove 54 yards on nine running plays before hitting a two-yard pass for the winning touchdown. Franco Harris' second lost fumble on the first play of the second quarter led to the game's first score. Two of Cliff Stoudt's three interceptions came deep in Denver territory which eliminated almost certain field goals and Frank Pollard's fumble occurred at the Denver 30. Six times the Steelers crossed midfield, scoring twice and turning the ball over the other four times.

The Steelers' running game kept the ball away from Green Bay's potent passing attack and did not commit a turnover as Cliff Stoudt won his first regular season game as a starting quarterback. Playing without three of their four defensive linemen and with a fourth hurting, the Steelers ran 34 more plays than the Packers and had the ball more than twice as many minutes. The Steelers rushed the ball 10 straight times on their first possession for the opening score and did not throw a pass until their 17th play. The failure of the Pittsburgh kicking game kept the score close as Gary Anderson had two field goals and one extra point blocked. Franco Harris passed the 11,000-yard plateau rushing and Frank Pollard had the highest rushing total of his career (90 yards). Bob Kohrs was a defensive hero with a sack and a safety which gave the Steelers breathing room at the end.

Gary Anderson tied a Steeler record with four field goals, all in the first half, and three of the four followed Houston turnovers. His 16 points set a new mark for Steeler kickers. One of Anderson's field goals was a 49 yarder, a career best. The Steelers put the game out of reach with 85 and 80 yard drives on their first two second half possessions. Franco Harris had his 44th 100-yard game and Walter Abercrombie his first two-touchdown game. The defense added six sacks to take over the NFL lead. Keith Gary and Keith Willis had two each. NEW ENGLAND 28, STEELERS 23

Sept. 25 at Pittsburgh, 58,282

For the second straight home game, the Steelers dominated the statistics and lost by giving up a touchdown late in the fourth quarter. The defeat dampened Franco Harris' milestone game in which he passed O. J. Simpson to move into second place on the all-time rushing list. The Patriots capitalized on three big plays to neutralize Pittsburgh's huge statistical advantage. The Steelers ran 36 of the first 40 plays but only had a 10-7 lead because of Steve Nelson's first down interception which he lateraled to Clayton Weishuhn while lying on the ground. They fell behind on the Patriots' third possession following another interception. The winning score came on a possession-type pass on which Dwayne Woodruff missed a sideline tackle. Two quarterback sacks on the Steelers' final possession killed their comeback chances. It was the third time in 14 seasons the Steelers had lost two games in a row at Three Rivers.

The Oilers got a field goal when Gifford Nielsen ran 20 yards with three seconds to play in the half and then marched 62 yards following the second half kickoff to take the lead. The Steelers went back in front early in the fourth quarter when a scrambling Cliff Stoudt looped a pass to a wide-open Walter Abercrombie. Donnie Shell's interception on the Steeler nine-yard line ended a Houston drive on the Oilers' first possession of the game and steals by Mel Blount and Rick Woods stopped two second half threats.

For the second straight game, the Steelers committed five turnovers and the mistakes led to the Bengals' two first quarter touchdowns. A fumble and an interception on the Steelers' first two series gave Cincinnati the ball at the Pittsburgh 39 and 16-yard lines. Twelve consecutive running plays, nine by Pete Johnson, resulted in two scores. The Steeler offense produced a season-low 154 yards and just nine first downs. Its failure to move the ball and the defense's inability to create a turnover gave the Bengals a 31-play edge. A mild Steeler comeback was thwarted on a Turk Schonert-Steve Kreider 54-yard pass which led to the game's final score. In spite of the defeat, the Steelers held their one game lead as Cleveland lost in Denver. They finished their home season with a 4-4 record, the most losses in Three Rivers since the stadium opened in 1970.

For the second straight year, the Steelers were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs. The defeat was their fifth in the last six games and their sixth straight to the Raiders. After taking the lead on an impressive 78-yard drive which produced three first downs, the Pittsburgh offense struggled for the balance of the game. On their first scoring series, the Steelers elected to kick a field goal rather than try for a touchdown inches from the Raider goal line. The march was highlighted by a spectacular 44-yard reception by Wayne Capers. The Raiders took the lead the next time the Steelers had the ball when Lester Hayes stepped in front of a Cliff Stoudt to Calvin Sweeney sideline pass. Los Angeles scored on its next possession and added a field goal with six seconds remaining in the first half. The Raiders scored the first three times they had the ball in the second half with drives of 72, 58 and 65 yards while the Steelers settled for a 58-yard scoring pass from Stoudt to John Stallworth. It was a record-tying 10th TD reception for Stallworth and the eighth straight playoff game in which he had scored to extend his own NFL mark. The attendance of 90,334 was the largest postseason crowd in NFL history other than a Super Bowl and the second largest to ever see the Steelers play.

In 1969, the Rooneys named 37-year-old Chuck Noll as the 14th coach in the club's history. Relying solely on the draft to build, he patiently nursed his young team to maturity.

The team's ability to maximize their draft selections has been the key to their unprecedented success. When Joe Greene was picked in the first round in 1969, he became the nucleus of what was to become a great defense. The following year Terry Bradshaw was the first choice and it was the makings of an explosive offense.

After three building years under Noll in which the team went from 1-13 in 1969 to 5-9 and 6-8 the next two seasons, the big breakthrough came in 1972 as the Steelers won their first division title ever. They lost to Miami, the eventual NFL champion, in the AFC Championship game but it was to be their first of six trips in eight years to that plateau.

In 1974, the Steelers won their first league crown. The next season they became the third team to win back-to-back Super Bowls. In 1978, they were the first team to win three Super Bowls and in 1979, became the first to win four and win two consecutively twice. Their total of four league championships is third to Green Bay (11) and Chicago (8).

The Steelers 50th Anniversary season (1982) was a very special one. An all-time team was selected by the fans and honored at a gala banquet in October. The banquet was part of a weekend of activities which attracted thousands of people to an exhibit featuring memorabilia and other informational materials from the five decades of Steeler football.

STEELER PRESEASON RESULTS

STALLWORTH PRODUCING RECORDS

John Stallworth is one of only three Steelers in team history to record 1,000-yard season's receiving. Stallworth, Buddy Dial and Roy Jefferson have each done it twice.

Stallworth, now in his 11th year, has caught a touchdown pass in eight consecutive NFL postseason games, a league record. He also has 10 touchdown receptions and four 100-yard games receiving in postseason which tie Fred Biletnikoff's all-time NFL marks.

He holds the Steeler single season record for pass receptions (70) in 1979 and could rewrite Lynn Swann's career records for catches, yards receiving and touchdown receptions this season.

TERRY BRADSHAW'S PRO RECORD

Terry Bradshaw, the first player selected in the 1970 draft after the Steelers won a coin flip with the Chicago Bears, is one of only three Steelers (Mel Blount, Ernie Stautner) to play 14 seasons. He ranks among the NFL's all-time top 15 in the four major passing categories including ninth in touchdown passes (212). With 27,989 career yards passing, he stands 13th and is 12th in all-time attempts (3,901) and 15th in passes completed (2,025).

A two-time Super Bowl Most Valuable Player, Bradshaw holds six Super Bowl records including career passing yards (932), touchdown passes (9), highest average gain (11.1) and single game marks for yards passing (318 vs. Dallas, SB XIII), TD passes (4, SB XIII) and highest average gain (14.1, SB XIII). In four appearances, he completed 49 of 84 passes (58.3%) for nine TDs and only three interceptions.

ACTIVE STEELERS IN PRO BOWL

Seven members of the Steelers active roster have played in the Pro Bowl. Running back Franco Harris and linebacker Jack Lambert have each been named to the game nine times.

Lambert is the only linebacker in pro football history to be named to the game the last nine years in a row (1975-83). That feat broke a tie he shared with former teammate Jack Ham (8).

Harris, who also played in nine consecutive Pro Bowls (1973-80), was the only active NFL player to play in every Pro Bowl game during that period.

By making the Pro Bowl squad this season, Harris and Lambert could tie the club for Pro Bowl appearances (10) held by Joe Greene.

Center Mike Webster has a six game Pro Bowl streak, but Donnie Shell saw his five-game string end last year.

Placekicker Gary Anderson, the AFC's leading scorer, was voted to the game for the first time and kicked a field goal for the only AFC points in the game.

Remaining active players in Pro Bowls include John Stallworth (2) and Larry Brown (1).
