# HISTORY OF THE STEELERS

In 1989 the Steelers snapped a four-year playoff drought, the team's longest in 17 years, when they won a wild card berth and were stopped one point short of the AFC Championship game. Beginning a new decade, the 1990 Steelers' first goal is to win their 10th AFC Central Division title.

Arthur Joseph Rooney founded the Steelers on July 8, 1933, which makes them the fifth-oldest franchise in the NFL today. Originally named the Pittsburgh Pirates, they were a member of the Eastern division of the 10-team National Football League.

Mr. Rooney passed away on August 25, 1988, following a stroke at the age of 87. The man affectionately known as "The Chief" will be remembered by Pittsburghers as the common man's man and by the sports world as one of its greatest pioneers.

The oldest of Daniel and Margaret Rooney's nine children, Art Rooney was born on January 27, 1901 in Coulterville, Pa. He grew up in Old Allegheny, now known as Pittsburgh's North Side, and until his death in 1988 he still lived a short distance from Three Rivers Stadium.

Rooney attended St. Peter's Parochial School and Duquesne University Prep School prior to his studies at Indiana (Pa.) Normal, now known as Indiana University of Pa. He also studied at Georgetown University and Duquesne.

An outstanding athlete, Rooney held middleweight and welterweight titles from the AAU Boxing Championships and was named to the U.S. Olympic Boxing team in 1920, although he did not participate in the Olympic games. From 1920 to 1925 Rooney played minor league baseball, but a promising career was ended by an arm injury. He continued playing semi-pro football for several teams in the Pittsburgh area.

Rooney was married on June 11, 1931 to Kathleen McNulty. The Rooneys had five sons — Daniel, Art Jr., Tim, John, and Pat.

After founding the Pirates in 1933, Rooney saw his club struggle through its first seven seasons with five different head coaches and just 22 victories. Home games were played at Forbes Field, but in the 1930s Rooney often took his team to such towns as Johnstown, Latrobe, Youngstown, New Orleans, and Louisville because of the competition from baseball and college football.

In 1938 Rooney signed Colorado All-America Byron "Whizzer" White, making White the first big-money player in the league with a contract that paid him \$15,800. White led the NFL in rushing as a rookie, and today he is one of the NFL's most illustrious alumni as a Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court.

Rooney changed his team's name to the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1940 to represent the city's heritage, but the name change did not drastically change the team's losing ways. Under head coach Walt Kiesling, the 1942 Steelers posted a 7-4 record to mark the Steelers' first winning season, due in part to the league-leading rushing of rookie Bill Dudley. But the following year Dudley joined the armed forces along with many other NFL players as the nation was at war. With rosters depleted, Rooney merged the Steelers in 1943 with Philadelphia (Phil-Pitt Steagles) and in 1944 with the Chicago Cardinals (Card-Pitt).

In 1946 Rooney hired legendary Pitt coach Jock Sutherland and Dudley returned to the Steelers to lead the league in rushing, interceptions, and punt returns, earning NFL MVP honors. Today Dudley is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

In 1947 Sutherland's Steelers finished 8-4 to share the Eastern division title, but they lost their first-ever postseason game to Philadelphia, 21-0. That spring, Sutherland died unexpectedly while on a scouting trip.

John Michelosen succeeded Sutherland and posted a 20-26-2 record while coaching the Steelers through the 1948-51 seasons.

Joe Bach returned in 1952 to coach the team he had previously coached in 1935-36. The Steelers became the last team to abandon the single wing for the T-formation when they made that change in 1952. When Bach resigned for health reasons in 1954, assistant Walt Kiesling began his third stint as the Steelers' head coach. Kiesling had coached the team in 1939-40 and 1941-44, with his third stint lasting from 1954-56.

Buddy Parker was named the Steelers' head coach in 1957 and he directed the team to five non-losing campaigns in his eight seasons, with the flamboyant Bobby Layne quarterbacking the Steelers for three years. In Layne's last season in Pittsburgh (1962), the team finished 9-5 to earn its second postseason berth before losing to Detroit, 17-10. Parker finished his term with a 13-10-1 record, ranking third in team history today to Chuck Noll and Sutherland.

Brief stints by Mike Nixon in 1965 and Bill Austin from 1966-68 preceded the hiring of Noll in 1969. At 37, Noll became the 14th man to coach the Steelers. He brought with him a firm belief in building through the draft. His first selection in 1969 was All-America defensive tackle Joe Greene, the initial building block of the "Steel Curtain" defense and now a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

A 1-13 record in Noll's first year gave him the opportunity to select first overall in the 1970 draft. Noll chose quarterback Terry Bradshaw, another current Hall of Famer, around whom he would build a dominating offensive attack.

In 1970 the Steelers made two significant changes. With the merger of the NFL and AFL, they moved from the NFL's Century division to the new AFC's Central division. They also moved into a new home as Three Rivers Stadium was opened.

Prior to the building of Three Rivers, the Steelers played home games at Forbes Field from 1933-57 and at both Forbes Field and Pitt Stadium from 1958-63. Pitt Stadium was the team's home from 1964-69 until Three Rivers was opened in 1970.

At the start of the 1970s the Steelers showed gradual improvement with 5-9 and 6-8 records in 1970 and '71. The Steelers came of age in 1972 with an 11-3 record to win their first-ever division title. It had been 40 years since their birth before the Steelers won a championship, but once they did they achieved a level of success unprecedented in professional football.

The Steelers' first playoff game of 1972 was against the Oakland Raiders. It marked the team's first postseason victory in its 40-year history when Franco Harris' "Immaculate Reception" in the final minute decided the 13-10 win. The Steelers' dream season ended the next week when Miami won the AFC Championship with a 21-17 decision, but the Steelers had risen to a new plateau which would continue to the end of the decade.

A 10-4 finish and wild card playoff berth preceded a second postseason game against Oakland in 1973, but the Raiders avenged the previous year's loss, 33-14. In 1974 the Steelers won the AFC Central title with a 10-3-1 record and marched past Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) on their way to Super Bowl IX. A tough Pittsburgh defense posted the 16-6 victory over the Minnesota Vikings to give the Steelers their first of an NFL-record four Super Bowl championships.

The Steelers won 11 consecutive games in 1975 to finish 12-2 for their second straight division title. They defeated Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs, setting up their second consecutive Super Bowl win, this time over the Dallas Cowboys by a 21-17 margin. The victory made the Steelers the third team in NFL history to win back-to-back Super Bowls.

Postseason losses followed the Steelers' 1976 and 1977 division titles. In 1976 the Steelers bounced back from a 1-4 start to win nine straight games and finish 10-4, but they lost to Oakland 24-7 in the second round after beating the Baltimore Colts 40-14 in the playoffs. In 1977, the Steelers dropped a playoff game to Denver (34-21) after capping the regular season with a 9-5 mark and their fourth straight AFC Central title.

Returning in 1978 to make their third Super Bowl appearance, the Steelers rode the momentum of a league-leading 14-2 record to defeat Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) en route to Super Bowl XIII and a rematch with Dallas. The 35-31 victory made the Steelers the first team to win three Super Bowls.

In 1979 history was made once again when the Steelers claimed Super Bowl win number four, marking the second time they won consecutive Super Bowls. They beat the Los Angeles Rams 31-19 following a 12-4 regular season and playoff wins over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). With six consecutive AFC Central titles, eight straight years of playoffs, and four Super Bowl championships (IX, X, XIII, XIV), the Steelers were tagged the "Team of the Decade" for the 1970s.

The new decade of the 1980s was not as friendly as the Steelers failed to qualify for the playoffs after finishing 9-7 in 1980 and 8-8 in 1981.

In 1982 the Steelers organization celebrated its 50th anniversary by returning to postseason play with a 6-3 record in the strike-shortened campaign. An anniversary banquet was held during the season to commemorate the team's first 50 seasons and to honor the all-time team as selected by fan voting. Thousands of fans were attracted to Pittsburgh during the week of activities.

## **FRITO-LAY "CHALLENGE FOR CHILDREN"**

Since the "Challenge For Children" program began in 1983, the Frito-Lay Corporation has donated \$242,500 to youth-related charities in the Tri-State area. In 1990, for the eighth consecutive season, Frito-Lay will contribute \$100 for every point the Steelers score in regular and postseason games.

Last year's total was \$31,400. In 1983 the amount was \$36,500, in 1984 it was \$43,900 as the Steelers advanced to the AFC Championship game, in 1985 the total was \$37,900, in 1986 the donation was \$30,700, in 1987 the sum was \$28,500, and in 1988 the total was \$33,600.

Charities which have been a part of this program are Children's Hospital, Ronald McDonald House, American Diabetes Youth Research, Cystic Fibrosis, Sickle Cell Society, National Society for Autistic Children, the Abraxas Foundation, Boys Clubs of Western Pennsylvania, Spina Bifida, and the Parental Stress Center. Grants were also provided to the Western Pennsylvania School for Blind Children, March of Dimes, Pittsburgh Rehabilitation Institute, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, the Lupus Foundation of America, Make-A-Wish Foundation, Project Bundle-Up, Boy Scouts of America, Association for Retarded Citizens, and the Abraxas Foundation. This year the donations will go to the Boy Scouts of America, Easter Seals, St. Peter's Child Development Center, and Three Rivers Youth.

and exhibits, but the San Diego Chargers ended the Steelers' anniversary campaign with a 31-28 playoff win.

In 1983 the Steelers claimed their eighth AFC Central division title with a 10-6 record, but they fell short once again in the playoffs, losing 38-10 to the Los Angeles Raiders.

In 1984 the 9-7 Steelers won their 9th division championship and followed that with a 13-7 playoff win at Denver. In the AFC Championship game, however, Miami produced a 45-28 assault which prevented a fifth Super Bowl appearance for the Steelers.

The Steelers' streak of 13 consecutive non-losing seasons came to an end in 1985 when they finished 7-9, followed by a 6-10 record in 1986. Losses in the last two games of 1987, another strike-shortened season, dropped the Steelers to 8-7 and out of playoff contention.

In 1988 the Steelers struggled through their worst season since Noll became head coach in 1969, finishing 5-11 with losing streaks of six and four weeks. In 1989 they got off to a rocky start, losing the first two games by a combined score of 92-10 to Cleveland (51-0) and Cincinnati (41-10). But the young team battled back to post a 9-7 record and earn a wild card spot. An exciting 26-23 overtime win in Houston in the wild card game was followed by a 24-23 loss in Denver in which the Steelers led until the final minutes. The strong 1989 finish gives the Steelers much optimism entering the 1990s.

When Art Rooney was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1964 he had begun turning over much of the operation of the team to his oldest son, Dan. Having worked in every area of the organization since 1955, Dan Rooney was named president of the Steelers in 1975. Now in his 36th year with the Steelers, he is one of the most active NFL executives and one of Pittsburgh's most involved executives in civic affairs.

Among his community activities, Dan Rooney is an officer and board member for The United Way, The American Ireland Fund, The American Diabetes Association, The Pittsburgh History and Landmarks Foundation, and Duquesne University.

As a key member of several NFL committees over the past 16 years, Dan Rooney has served on the board of directors for the NFL Trust Fund, NFL Films, and the Scheduling Committee. He was appointed chairman of the Expansion Committee in 1973, which considered new franchise locations and directed the addition of Seattle and Tampa Bay as expansion clubs in 1976. That year Dan was also named chairman of the Negotiating Committee, and in 1982 he contributed to the negotiations for the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the NFL owners and the Players' Association. Rooney is currently a member of the six-person Management Council Executive Committee, the Hall of Fame Committee, the Super Bowl Ring Committee, the NFL Properties Executive Committee, and is chairman of the World League of American Football Committee.

Daniel M. Rooney was born on Pittsburgh's North Side on July 20, 1932. He is a 1950 graduate of North Catholic High School, where he played quarterback. He went on to Duquesne University and was graduated in 1955 with a bachelors degree in accounting. Dan and his wife Patricia live in Mt. Lebanon, where they raised nine children.

## CHUCK NOLL

### Head Coach

In 1989 Chuck Noll took the Steelers to the playoffs for the first time in five years, and he was rewarded by being named AFC Coach of the Year for the first time by the Professional Football Writers of America. It was an honor long overdue for a man whose professional football career spans five decades.

The second-winningest active coach and fifth-winningest in the history of the NFL, the 58-year old Noll begins his 22nd season as the Steelers' head coach in 1990. His overall career record of 193-140-1 (.579) puts him within seven victories of becoming the fifth head coach in NFL history to win 200 games and the fourth coach to win 200 games with the same team.

Noll's 193 wins are topped by only George Halas (325), Don Shula (285), Tom Landry (270), and Curly Lambeau (229), with only Halas (325 for Chicago), Landry (270 for Dallas), and Shula (212 for Miami) winning more games with one team. Shula, Noll's former boss with the Baltimore Colts, is the only current coach with more wins and the only active NFL coach who has been a head coach longer than Noll's 22 years. But Noll has been in charge of the same team longer than any of the NFL's current coaches and is one of just four men — Lambeau (29), Landry (29), and Steve Owen (23) — to lead the same team for 22 consecutive seasons.

Noll's overall record includes a 177-132-1 (.573) regular season mark and 16-8 in postseason. His postseason winning percentage of .667 ranks fifth in NFL history and is the highest among the six coaches who have been in 15 or more postseason contests. It also includes four Super Bowl wins, which distinguish Noll as the only coach in league history to claim four Super Bowl titles.

Noll was named the 14th head coach in Steelers history in 1969. He brought with him a solid belief in building through the draft. His first draft class included such future stars as Hall of Famer Joe Greene, Jon Kolb, and L.C. Greenwood. A 1-13 inaugural season gave Noll the first overall pick of the 1970

draft, which he used to select Hall of Famers Terry Bradshaw on the first round and Mel Blount on the third. In fact, Noll selected five players in his first four draft classes who are now members of the Hall of Fame, including three of his first 20 and four of his first 38 draft picks. Records of 5-9 and 6-8 in Noll's second and third seasons reflected the progress his young team was making.

In 1972 the Steelers turned the corner with an 11-3 campaign for their first division title in the club's 40-year history. They won a thrilling 13-7 playoff game over Oakland before losing to Miami 21-17 in the AFC Championship, but this began a streak of eight years of postseason play.

In 1973 the Steelers claimed a wild card playoff berth but lost to Oakland 33-14 in the wild card game. The following year Noll got his second division title and the first of six consecutive as he led the Steelers to a 10-3-1 finish. But the Steelers were not finished yet as they defeated Buffalo (32-14) and Oakland (24-13) en route to Super Bowl IX. A 16-6 domination of Minnesota handed Noll and the Steelers their first Super Bowl trophy.

In 1975 the Steelers became the third team, joining Green Bay (Super Bowls I and II) and Miami (VII and VIII) to repeat as Super Bowl champion. They plowed through the regular season with a 12-2 record before dispatching Baltimore (28-10) and Oakland (16-10) in the playoffs and Dallas (21-17) in Super Bowl X. Noll joined Vince Lombardi and Shula as the only coaches to win two Super Bowls.

The Steelers struggled in 1976, starting 1-4 before nine straight wins left them at 10-4 to win the AFC Central division. They downed Baltimore 40-14 in the playoffs but could not beat Oakland, losing 24-7. A 9-5 finish in 1977 preceded the Steelers' 34-21 playoff loss to Denver.

In 1978 Noll got his team back on track as they posted a league-best 14-2 record. They dominated Denver (33-10) and Houston (34-5) in the playoffs to set up a Super Bowl rematch vs. Dallas in Super Bowl XIII. The Steelers' 35-31 win made them the first team to win three Super Bowls.

The Steelers made history one more time after a 12-4 campaign in 1979 and postseason wins over Miami (34-14) and Houston (27-13). Their 31-19 Super Bowl XIV win over the Los Angeles Rams gave the Steelers an unprecedented fourth Super Bowl championship and the title, "Team of the Decade."

Noll's 1980 and 1981 teams fell short with 9-7 and 8-8 records, but in 1982, the Steelers' 50th season, the team rebounded to a 6-3 finish in a strike-interrupted season. They lost their playoff game, however, 31-28 to San Diego.

In 1983 and 1984 Noll claimed his eighth and ninth division titles. The 1983 team went 10-6 before losing to the Los Angeles Raiders in the playoffs, 38-10. In 1984 the team advanced as far as the AFC Championship game with a 9-7 regular season mark and a 24-17 playoff win in Denver. The hope for a fifth Super Bowl appearance vanished in the Steelers' 45-28 AFC Championship loss to Miami.

Noll's longest playoff drought lasted from 1985-88, but he ended that last season with a 9-7 team that claimed an AFC wild card berth as it won five of its final six games. The team showed its character by bouncing back from an 0-2 start in which the Steelers were outscored 92-10. They proved their character again in a 26-23 overtime playoff win in Houston, and the following week dominated Denver before losing 24-23 in the final minutes.

Noll's 38-year pro football career includes seven seasons as a player, nine as an assistant coach, and 22 as a head coach. He began as a 21st-round draft choice of the Cleveland Browns in 1953, where he played guard and linebacker through 1959. He retired at the age of 27 and began his coaching career in 1960 as an assistant to Sid Gillman with the Los Angeles Chargers.

In 1966 Noll joined Shula's Baltimore Colts staff for a three-year stint that included a total of seven losses and a Super Bowl III loss to the New York Jets. Following Super Bowl III, Noll was named head coach of the Steelers.

Charles Henry Noll was born in Cleveland, Ohio, on January 5, 1932. He attended Holy Trinity School and Benedictine High prior to enrolling at Dayton, where he studied education and was captain of the football team and is a charter member of the school's athletic hall of fame. Noll was graduated from Dayton in 1953 with a bachelor of science degree in education, and in 1980 he was presented a Distinguished Alumni Award. He also has two honorary degrees, receiving a Ph.D. in humanitarian service from Duquesne in 1980 and a Ph.D. in commercial science from Robert Morris College on May 11, 1990. Noll and his wife Marianne have one son, Chris. The Nolls live in Upper St. Clair.

**RON BLACKLEDGE**  
Offensive Line Coach

Ron Blackledge enters his ninth season on the Steelers staff and his 32nd year in coaching. He joined the Steelers on Aug. 31, 1982 as an offensive assistant and was named offensive line coach two days later when Rollie Dotsch went to the USFL. From 1984-88 Blackledge shared the offensive line coaching duties, focusing on the tackles and tight ends. He took over responsibility for the entire line in 1989.

Blackledge is responsible for teaching the Steelers' intricate trapping schemes, which they utilize more than any other NFL team.

Blackledge's 32 years in coaching include 9 seasons at the high school level in Canton, Oh., 14 in college, and 9 in the NFL.

A native of North Canton, Oh., Blackledge's first coaching position was at Canton South High in 1960. He also coached at Timken (1963-65) and Glenwood (1966-67) high schools in Canton before moving on to Ashland College as offensive line coach in 1968.

Following 2 years at Ashland were stints as offensive line coach for Cincinnati (1970-72), Kentucky (1973-75), and Princeton (1976).

Blackledge was named offensive coordinator at Kent State in 1977. He served as that school's head coach from 1979-81 before joining the Steelers the next year.

As a player, Blackledge played tight end and defensive end for Bowling Green from 1957-59. He was later inducted into the school's Hall of Fame. Blackledge was graduated with a bachelors degree in physical education in 1960, and in 1967 he received his masters in guidance and physical education from Ohio University.

Ron and his wife Linda have three children — daughters Michelle (6-13-64) and Traci (8-17-71) and son Todd (2-25-61). Ron was born April 15, 1938 in North Canton, Oh. The Blackledges live in the North Hills.



**DAVE BRAZIL**  
Defensive Coordinator

Dave Brazil begins his first year as an NFL coordinator after being promoted to defensive coordinator on March 1 of this year. He joined the Steelers on Feb. 9, 1989 as linebackers coach after 5 seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Brazil is a veteran of 30 years of coaching, including 10 at the high school level, 12 in college, and 8 at the professional level. In 10 seasons (1958-67) of high school coaching in Michigan his teams enjoyed a streak of 8 years during which they never lost more than 2 games. After his successful high school coaching career, Brazil held offensive or defensive coordinator positions at 5 different colleges.

In 1968 Brazil got his first college job at Holy Cross, where he spent 2 seasons as offensive and defensive coordinator. He followed that with 2 years as defensive coordinator at Tulsa (1970-71) and 3 seasons (1972-74) as offensive and defensive coordinator for Eastern Michigan.

Brazil got his first professional coaching position in 1975 as defensive coordinator for the World Football League's Detroit Wheels. The following season he held the same post for the WFL Chicago Fire.

In 1978 Brazil returned to the college ranks, spending 2 years as Boston College's defensive coordinator and 3 (1980-82) at Kent State.

Brazil moved to the NFL in 1984 as a defensive assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs. He coached the Chiefs' secondary in 1987 and the linebackers in 1988.

Brazil was graduated in 1958 with a business administration degree from the University of Detroit.

Dave and his wife Bridget have six children — daughters Kathleen and Mary Ann, and sons Michael, Daniel, Thomas, and Patrick. Dave was born in Detroit, Mich., on March 25, 1936. The Brazil family lives in Bethel Park.



**JOHN FOX**  
Defensive Backs Coach

John Fox embarks upon his second season as the Steelers' defensive backs coach after joining the team Feb. 10, 1989. His first NFL coaching position follows 3 years as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of Pittsburgh.

In the Steelers secondary Fox coaches one of the team's youngest but most talented group of players. His effectiveness in working with young athletes is impressive, having led the Pitt defense to a top-10 national ranking for pass defense each of his 3 seasons there.

Prior to joining the Steelers, Fox spent 10 seasons coaching defensive secondaries at 7 different colleges. He began in 1979 at U.S. International University. Following were one-year stints at Boise State (1980), Long Beach State (1981), Utah (1982), Kansas (1983), and Iowa State (1984).

Fox took his first coaching position at the professional level in 1985, coaching the defensive backs for the USFL's Los Angeles Express. He returned to the college ranks that fall, joining Mike Gottfried's staff at Kansas.

In 1986 Fox went from Kansas to Pittsburgh as defensive coordinator under Gottfried. In his first season, Fox's defense ranked ninth in the country, yielding 276.9 yards per game. The following year they jumped to fourth with 233.0 yards per game, and in 1988 finished fourth again with a 254.2-yards-per-game average including second in pass defense with 118.9 yards per game.

Fox played defensive back at San Diego State from 1975-77. He was graduated with a bachelors degree in physical education and a teaching certificate in 1977.

John and his wife Robin have one son, Matthew (6-5-87). John was born Feb. 8, 1955 in Virginia Beach, Va. The Fox family lives in Upper St. Clair.



**JOE GREENE**  
Defensive Line Coach

Joe Greene begins his fourth season coaching the Steelers defensive line, which is where he made a lasting mark as one of the outstanding defensive linemen ever to play in the NFL. Greene joined the Steelers' coaching staff on Feb. 19, 1987. Five months later he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility.

Greene was the first player Chuck Noll drafted in 1969, and is one of 3 Steelers assistants who also played under Noll. A perennial All-Pro defensive tackle for the Steelers for 13 seasons (1969-82), he made 10 Pro Bowl appearances in addition to many other honors. Greene retired after the 1982 season.

Greene won NFL defensive rookie of the year honors and played in the first of 8 consecutive Pro Bowls after his rookie season in 1969. He was the fourth player selected overall in the 1969 draft. The heart of the famous "Steel Curtain" defense, Greene was widely considered the most dominating defensive lineman in the NFL. He accumulated 66 career quarterback sacks and still ranks second in team history, 7 years after his retirement.

Greene was named to the Steelers' All-Time Team in 1982, and in 1987 he was presented the first Walter Camp Football Foundation Alumni Award.

A native of Temple, Tex., where he attended Dunbar High School, Greene went on to become a consensus All-American at North Texas State. The head coach for Greene's final two years (1967-68) was New England Patriots head coach Rod Rust.

Greene now serves on the North Texas State board of trustees.

Joe and his wife Agnes have three children — sons Major (7-29-68) and Delon (10-13-69), who both attend and play football at North Texas State, and daughter JoQuel (10-13-73). Joe was born in Temple, Tex. on Sept. 24, 1946. The Greens live in Wexford.



**DICK HOAK**  
Offensive Backfield Coach

Dick Hoak enters his 19th season as a member of the Steelers coaching staff and his 29th year with the organization. He is the longest-tenured Steelers assistant and one of 3 current coaches who also played for Chuck Noll. Hoak's last year as a player (1969) was Noll's first year as the Steelers head coach. He was named the team's offensive backfield coach in 1972 after one year of coaching high school football. Hoak is the only remaining assistant from all four Steelers Super Bowl staffs.

Hoak enjoyed an outstanding 10-year career as a Steelers running back after being drafted on the seventh round in 1961 from Penn State. He gained 3,965 career rushing yards and when he retired after the 1969 season, Hoak ranked as the second-leading rusher in team history, trailing Hall of Famer John Henry Johnson. Today, 21 years after the end of his career, Hoak is still the fourth-leading rusher behind Franco Harris, Johnson, and Frank Pollard. He was the team's rushing leader in 1965, '68, and '69, and his career-high 858 yards in 1968 ranked fourth in the NFL that year and led to his Pro Bowl appearance. He was also honored as the Dapper Dan 1968 man of the year in sports.

Hoak still ranks in the Steelers record book including eighth in career touchdowns with 33, fourth in rushing touchdowns with 25, and second in rushing attempts with 1,132. He also had 145 receptions for 1,152 yards and eight touchdowns and had a 77-yard touchdown run in 1968 which is the Steelers' fourth-longest.

Hoak was a standout running back and quarterback for Penn State, receiving MVP honors his senior year. He was graduated in 1961 with a degree in social studies.

Dick and his wife Lynn have three children — daughters Kelly (5-18-65) and Katie (7-23-68), and son Richard (7-5-72). Dick was born in Jeannette, Pa. on Dec. 8, 1939. The Hoak family lives in Greensburg.



**JON KOLB**  
Tight Ends &  
Conditioning Coach

Jon Kolb is in his 22nd year with the Steelers and his ninth season as a member of the coaching staff. For the second straight year, he coaches the tight ends in addition to overseeing the conditioning of all of the Steelers players.

One of the 22 players who were on all four Steelers Super Bowl champion teams, Kolb is one of 3 Steelers assistants who also played for Chuck Noll. He joined the coaching staff as conditioning coach on Feb. 17, 1982, the day he announced his retirement as a player. Later that year Kolb took over as defensive line coach replacing George Perles. After coaching the defensive line from 1982-86, Kolb coached special teams in 1987-88 and was conditioning coach and an offensive assistant in 1989.

In 1969 Kolb's career with the Steelers began as a third-round selection, Noll's third draft pick. He helped pave the way to four Super Bowl titles over the next 13 years from his offensive tackle position. Kolb played in 177 games to rank sixth in team history, including 156 of a possible 157 in his first 10 seasons with 112 consecutive starts. He is one of only 12 men to have played 13 seasons for the Steelers.

Kolb was a second-team All-America selection his senior year at Oklahoma State. Playing center and linebacker, he was also a two-time All-Big Eight performer and played in every major postseason bowl game following his senior season. He was graduated with a bachelors degree in physical education.

Kolb was honored in 1982 when he was named to the Steelers' All-Time Team, and in 1987 he was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Hall of Fame.

Jon and his wife Debbie have two sons, Eric (8-28-71) and Tanner (10-26-80). Jon was born Aug. 30, 1947 in Ponca City, Okla. The Kolb family lives in the North Hills.



**DWAIN PAINTER**  
Receivers Coach

Dwain Painter enters his third year with the Steelers since joining the staff on Feb. 15, 1988. He is a veteran of 26 years of coaching including 6 at the high school level, 17 in college, and 3 with the Steelers.

Painter works closely with new offensive coordinator Joe Walton in planning the Steelers' pass offense.

Painter began his coaching career in 1965 at the high school level, coaching at Wall High School in Wall Township, N.J. from 1965-70.

In 1971 Painter got his start at the college level as offensive coordinator at San Jose State. After 2 seasons he was named quarterbacks/receivers coach at the College of San Mateo, followed by 2 years as offensive coordinator at Brigham Young from 1974-75.

In Painter's next position he coached the quarterbacks and receivers at UCLA from 1976-78, leading to his first head coaching position at Northern Arizona in 1979. In three seasons at Northern Arizona Painter compiled a record of 16-17. He then served as assistant head coach for 4 years (1982-85) at Georgia Tech.

Stops as offensive coordinator at Texas in 1986 and Illinois in 1987 preceded Painter's move to the Steelers in 1988.

The 48-year old Painter attended Gateway High in Monroeville. He was the first quarterback to play for the successful Pete Antimmarino, who retired last year. Painter was a member of the school's first graduating class in 1960.

Painter played defensive back at Rutgers from 1961-64. He was graduated in 1964 with a bachelors degree in physical education, and in 1966 received his masters in education.

Dwain and his wife Diane have two children, daughter Deborah (12-23-62) and son Doug (10-21-71). Dwain was born in Monroeville, Pa. on Feb. 13, 1942. The Painter family lives in Wexford, Pa.



**GEORGE STEWART**  
Special Teams Coach

George Stewart begins his second season coaching the Steelers special teams. He joined the staff on March 3, 1989 in his first NFL coaching position.

Under Stewart last season the Steelers' special teams showed improvement in many areas, including kick returner Rod Woodson leading the NFL with a 27.3-yard average on kick-off returns to earn election to the Pro Bowl.

Stewart is in the eighth year of his coaching career, which began in 1983 as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Arkansas, under head coach Lou Holtz. In 1984 he followed Holtz to Minnesota as offensive line coach.

After 2 seasons at Minnesota, Stewart went with Holtz to Notre Dame in 1986. While at Notre Dame he coached the tight ends and special teams in 1986 and 1987 and the defensive ends in 1988. The following year Stewart joined the Steelers staff.

As a player, Stewart was an All-America guard under Holtz at Arkansas from 1977-80. He was named to the All-Southwest Conference team as a junior when the Razorbacks were 10-2. After being named team captain his senior year, he suffered a knee injury in the fourth game which ended his college playing career.

Stewart signed a free agent contract with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1981, but the knee injury prevented him from playing. He spent 2 years in business in Little Rock, Ark. prior to returning to Arkansas as a graduate assistant.

The 31-year old Stewart was a prep All-American at Parkview High School in his native Little Rock.

George and his wife Cindy have a daughter, Tiffany, and a son, Christopher. George was born on Dec. 29, 1958 in Little Rock, Ark. The Stewart family lives in Allison Park.



**BOB VALESENTE**  
Linebackers Coach

Bob Valesente is the newest member of the Steelers coaching staff. He was named linebackers coach on March 9 after serving as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator at the University of Pittsburgh last year. A veteran of 28 years of coaching, Valesente has held positions as head coach, assistant head coach, and offensive or defensive coordinator for 7 colleges. This is his second NFL coaching position.

Valesente began his coaching career at Ithaca High School in 1962 before being named freshman defensive coordinator at Cornell (1964-68), followed by 6 seasons coaching Cornell's varsity secondary (1969-74).

In 1975-76 Valesente was secondary coach at Cincinnati, followed by stops as defensive backs coach at Arizona (1977-79) and defensive coordinator/linebackers coach at Mississippi State (1980-81).

In 1982 Valesente got his first NFL coaching position as secondary/special teams coach for the Baltimore Colts. He returned to the college ranks in 1984 as assistant head coach/quarterbacks coach at Kansas under head coach Mike Gottfried. He succeeded Gottfried as head coach from 1986-87, then spent one year as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Maryland before joining Gottfried's staff at Pitt in 1988.

A graduate of Ithaca College, Valesente played halfback and was a catcher and outfielder for the baseball team that went to the 1962 College World Series. Drafted by the Chicago Cubs, he played at the Class A level in 1963-64. A member of the Ithaca College Hall of Fame, Valesente was graduated in 1962 with a bachelors in physical education and in 1965 he earned his masters in education.

Bob and his wife Joan have three children — son Bob (6-18-68) and daughters Ginger (11-5-65) and Michelle (7-7-80). Bob was born in Seneca Falls, N.Y. on July 19, 1940. The Valesentes live in Oakland.



**JOE WALTON**  
Offensive Coordinator

Joe Walton was named offensive coordinator on Feb. 16 of this year after 7 seasons as head coach of the New York Jets. Beginning his 30th season in the NFL this year, Walton has been an NFL coach for the past 20 years after a 7-year playing career and 2 seasons as a scout.

Walton's NFL career began as a second-round draft choice of the Washington Redskins in 1957. He played tight end for 4 seasons for Washington (1957-60) before being traded to the New York Giants, where he played from 1961-63. He finished his career with 178 receptions for 2,623 yards and 26 touchdowns.

In 1967 Walton returned to the NFL as a scout for the Giants. Two years later he began his coaching career with a 5-year stint (1969-73) coaching the Giants' wide receivers and passing game.

Walton joined the Redskins' coaching staff in 1974 and was named offensive coordinator in 1978, a position he held for 3 seasons before moving to the Jets as offensive coordinator in 1981. The Steelers suffered their worst defeat in history in losing to Cleveland for the seventh straight time. The Browns scored three defensive touchdowns, forced eight turnovers, registered six sacks, and held the Steelers offense to 53 net yards and five first downs. Thirty-four of Cleveland's 51 points were either scored or set up by the defense. The Steelers broke three all-time team records for fewest first downs, fewest net yards, and worst margin of defeat. It was just the second time the Steelers had been shut out on opening day and the first time in 40 games.

Both teams then added three field goals each before the Oilers staged a fourth-quarter comeback. QB Warren Moon hit WR Ernest Givins with touchdown passes of 19 and nine yards to put Houston ahead 23-16 with 6:02 left in the game. The Steelers then marched 82 yards on 11 plays, including a 22-yard reverse by WR Dwight Stone, to tie the score at 23-23 with 46 seconds remaining. In overtime, Pittsburgh got the ball first but was forced to punt after three plays, giving Houston possession at their own 45-yard line. ## AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

### DENVER 24, STEELERS 23

The Steelers dominated Denver throughout the game before falling behind by one point with 2:27 remaining, after which a fumbled snap from shotgun formation on third down eliminated them from advancing to the AFC Championship game. The Steelers produced a season-high 404 offensive yards including 180 total yards by RB Merrill Hoge, but Denver marched 71 yards in nine plays on a fourth-quarter drive for the winning touchdown. The Steelers had a lead throughout the game, opening with the first of PK Gary Anderson's three field goals. In the second quarter, Hoge swept left end untouched for a seven-yard touchdown run that extended the Steelers' lead to 10-0 and capped a 93-yard drive that began with a 45-yard run by Hoge. The Broncos responded with a 12-play, 75-yard drive with RB Melvin Bratton scoring the first of his two one-yard touchdown runs. WR Louis Lipps gave Pittsburgh a 10-point lead again with a nine-yard touchdown catch from Bubby Brister, but the Broncos tied the score at 17-17 on WR Vance Johnson's 37-yard reception. Anderson's 35- and 32-yard field goals extended the Steelers' lead to six before Bratton's touchdown and the PAT put Denver ahead 24-23. Hoge became the first Steelers player to have consecutive 100-yard rushing games in postseason as he ran 10 times for 100 yards in the first half. Anderson set a team record with his seventh consecutive field goal in postseason, while Brister's 65.5% completion rate (19 of 29) was the fourth-highest in team history for a postseason game.

Franco Harris and Jack Lambert were inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 4 of this year, becoming the fifth and sixth representatives of the Steelers' four Super Bowl champion teams of the 1970s to receive pro football's greatest honor. Both former greats were elected in their first year of eligibility.

Harris was the Steelers' first-round draft pick in 1972 when he rushed for 1,055 yards to lead the team to its first-ever division title. The only NFL player voted to every Pro Bowl from 1972-80, Harris is one of just two NFL players to rush for 1,000 yards eight times. Today he ranks as the fourth-leading rusher in NFL history with 12,120 yards. When his career ended in 1984 Harris ranked second, just 192 yards behind all-time leader Jim Brown. The owner of virtually every team rushing record in addition to many postseason and Super Bowl records, Harris was named MVP of Super Bowl IX.

Lambert was the Steelers' leading tackler each of nine straight seasons (1975-83) and was the only linebacker in the NFL voted to all nine Pro Bowls during that span. A second-round draft choice in 1974, he was named the Steelers' MVP twice (1976, '81) and NFL defensive player of the year twice (1976, '79). Lambert was the only rookie starter on the Steel Curtain defense in 1974, and later served as the defensive captain for his final seven years. A serious toe injury ended his career following the 1984 season, but by that time Lambert had accumulated 23½ sacks and had 28 career interceptions to lead all active NFL linebackers.

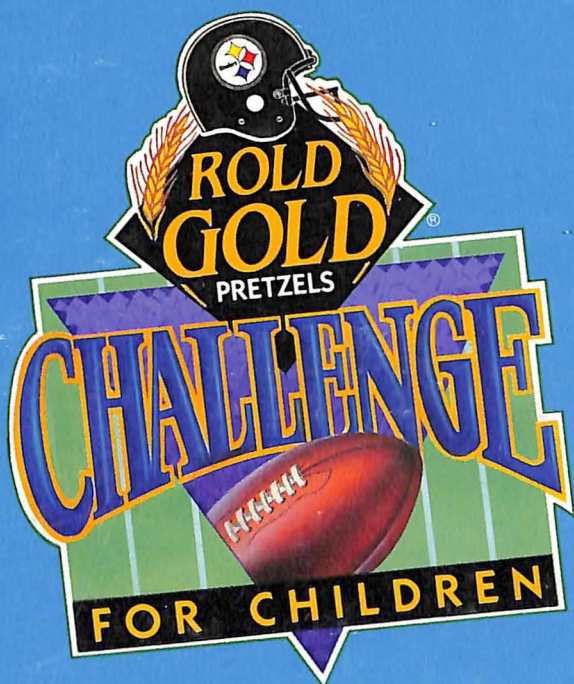
