

#### GENE KLEIN President

In the competitive, super-charged environment of pro football, Gene Klein has emerged as one of the game's strongest leaders. Klein's San Diego Chargers have become one of the National Football

League's most successful and glamorous teams, regular participants in nationally-televised games, qualifiers for the postseason playoffs in each of the last four seasons, and parties to some of the greatest games of the era. The Chargers had sold out 32 consecutive season and playoff games entering the 1983 season.

Klein took over the Chargers in 1966 but did not become involved on a day-to-day basis until December, 1973, when he divested himself of most of his business interests other than the Chargers. The Los Angelesbased Klein charged others with the responsibility of run-

ning the football franchise.

Klein's first move after the team finished with a 2-11-1 record in 1973 was to appoint Tommy Prothro head coach. Klein named John Sanders general manager and Tank Younger assistant general manager a year later. Prothro, Sanders, and Younger all were well-versed in the important areas of player personnel and front-office administration. With this nucleus, Klein was able to construct a strong management staff and supervise the development of a team that became one of the most exciting and successful in football.

When Prothro resigned after the fourth game of the 1978 season, Klein selected Don Coryell as head coach. Coryell provided the final ingredient to success. The former San Diego State coach guided the Chargers to seven wins in their final eight games in 1978 and to divi-

sion championships in 1979, '80 and '81.

Klein and his staff built the Chargers through the draft and with well-conceived trades; some of those trades brought such outstanding players as Ed White, John Cappelletti, Chuck Muncie, Kellen Winslow, Tim Fox, and Wes Chandler. The trades also allowed the Chargers to maneuver to three of the first 22 picks in the first round of the 1983 draft.

Klein headed a group that purchased the Chargers for \$10 million from Barron Hilton Aug. 25, 1966. The acquisition was small in financial comparison to some of the transactions Klein has made in other areas of American business . . . but Klein had realized a lifelong ambition of owning a professional football team.

Eugene Victor Klein was born in New York City Jan. 29, 1921. He attended New York University and majored in electrical engineering until Dec. 8, 1941, the day after United States military installations were bombed in Pearl

Harbor, Hawaii.

The 6-foot, 5-inch Klein enlisted in the Air Force and attained the rank of captain, serving as a bomber pilot in World War II. Klein went into the automobile business

in Los Angeles's San Fernando Valley after the war and eventually became Western States distributor of the Volvo automobile.

In 1961 Klein assumed leadership of a company that had \$80 million in assets. That company, renamed National General Corporation, became one of the largest corporations in the country under Klein's guidance. Among its holdings were Bantam Books, largest paperback publishing company in the world; Great American Insurance Company, and Grosset and Dunlap publishers. National General also was involved in motion picture production, distribution, and theaters. NGC had assets of \$1.2 billion when Klein negotiated the sale of the company 12 years later.

Klein is among the most active NFL owners in civic and charitable projects. He is on the board of directors, Cedars Sinai Medical Center, Los Angeles. He is vice chairman, board of trustees, City of Hope. He is a member of the Los Angeles District Attorney Advisory Council, the Mental Health Association, Variety Club, Big Brothers Boosters, American Cancer Society, and National Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Klein is a life member of the San Diego Hall of Champions and a member of the Board of Trustees of the San Diego Museum of Art, and the Palm Springs Desert Museum. Klein is also a member of the Board of Trustees, Eisenhower Medical Center, and the University of San Diego. He is on the board of directors of the Scripps Memorial Hospital Foundation.

Gene and his lovely wife Joyce maintain residences in Rancho Santa Fe and Palm Springs. Gene has a son, Michael Klein, and a daughter, Randee Shuken, both of whom are members of Chargers ownership.

Other members of Chargers ownership are former majority owner Hilton, Jack Foreman, Bill Fox, George Pernicano, John Quirk, Frank Rothman and Alexander Spanos.



#### DON CORYELL Head Coach 11th NFL Season 6th Season with Chargers

Don Coryell's imprint on the National Football League becomes more distinct each year. The San Diego Chargers' head coach entered the

1983 season with the second-best won-loss percentage among active NFL coaches and was nearing a landmark 100 coaching victories, achieved by only 14 others in the 64-season history of the NFL.

Coryell's 89-49-1 (.644) record in the regular season was topped only by the .721 winning percentage of Miami's Don Shula through the 1982 season. Coryell's teams also have qualified for the NFL playoffs in each of the last four seasons and have made the playoffs in six of his 10 seasons as an NFL coach.

Coryell was appointed head coach of the Chargers by President Gene Klein Sept. 25, 1978. The Chargers lost three of their first four games under Coryell but won seven of the last eight and their overall record of 46-19 since the middle of the 1978 season is second only to Dallas' 47-18.

Donald David Coryell was born in Seattle Oct. 17, 1924. He played at Seattle's Lincoln High and joined the U.S. Army as a private in the ski troops upon high school graduation in 1943. Coryell was a first lieutenant in the paratroopers when he was discharged three-and-a-half years later and entered the University of Washington. Don played defensive back for the Huskies and was graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in 1950. He took a master's degree one year later and accepted his first coaching assignment as an assistant at Punahou Academy in Honolulu. Coryell was head coach at Honolulu Farrington in 1952, then coached two seasons at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

Coryell moved to the junior college ranks in Washington in 1955, taking over a Wenatchee team that had been winless the year before. Wenatchee was undefeated under Coryell, who became the athletic director and head coach at the Army base at Ford Ord, California, the following year. Ford Ord emerged as the only unbeaten

service team in the country in 1956.

Coryell became head coach at Whittier College in 1957 and led the Poets to a 23-5-1 record, three Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships and number-one ranking among U.S. small colleges in total offense and passing in 1959. Coryell then served one year as offensive backfield coach at the University of Southern California before taking over a downtrodden San Diego State program.

Don was named the San Diego Aztecs' head coach Jan. 14, 1961. Coryell immediately embarked on a strong recruiting program and whipped the Aztecs to a 7-2-1

comeback in his first season.

Over the next 11 seasons under Coryell, San Diego State became recognized for great offensive teams and the development of outstanding pro prospects. Among other achievements:

—San Diego State had unbeaten seasons of 11-0 in 1966, 9-0-1 in 1968, and 11-0 in 1969. The Aztecs won 25 games in a row from 1965-67, then went 31 games without defeat.

 Coryell was named College Division district coach of the year in 1963, '66, '67, and '68.

After a 10-1 season in 1972, Coryell was hired by the St. Louis Cardinals of the NFL.

His San Diego State record was 104-19-2.

The Cardinals were 4-9-1 in 1973, Coryell's first season, then put together records of 10-4, 11-3, and 10-4, winning NFC East championships in 1974 and 1975. Coryell was NFL and NFC coach of the year in 1974.

Don and his lovely wife, Aliisa, live in El Cajon and have a son, Mike (July 16, 1957), a graduate in physics from the University of California at San Diego, and a daughter, Mindy, who is the wife of Michael Lewis of El Cajon.

#### JOHN SANDERS General Manager 32nd NFL Season 9th Season with Chargers

Few persons in football match the pro football knowledge, experience, and expertise of John Sanders, general manager of the Chargers

since Feb. 16, 1976. Sanders was named National Football League executive of the year for 1979 by other NFL executives in a poll conducted by The Sporting News and the Chargers have enjoyed the most successful period in their history since Sanders was charged with the day-to-day operation of the franchise under President Gene Klein.

Sanders joined the Chargers as assistant to the president for player personnel Feb. 6, 1975, after a long association with the Los Angeles Rams, with whom Sanders worked in the areas of personnel and contracts

as a scout and front-office executive.

Sanders has been involved with football almost from the time his family moved from San Antonio, Texas, where he was born July 26, 1922, to Van Nuys, California, in Los Angeles' San Fernando Valley. Sanders played football for the Van Nuys High Wolves and was a running back and three-year letterman (1946-48) at Occidental College in Eagle Rock, California.

Johnny was a starter on the 1948 Occidental team that had a 9-0 record, defeated Colorado A&M in the Raisin Bowl in Fresno, California, Jan. 1, 1949, and was the school's first unbeaten squad in 33 years. Sanders is a member of Occidental's Athletic Hall of Fame and Van

Nuys Hall of Fame.

Johnny began teaching and coaching in the Los Angeles City Schools system after his graduation from college. He joined the Rams as a parttime scout in 1952 after having been associated with the team during train-

ing camps since 1946.

Sanders was head coach at North Hollywood High from 1951-58, posting a 50-16-1 won-lost record, advancing to the Los Angeles City championship game in 1955, and gaining the playoffs six times. Johnny moved to the new Grant High in 1959 and coached there until accepting an invitation from Rams owner Dan Reeves to join the organization fulltime in 1964 as director of player

Sanders served in that position until his appointment

as assistant general manager March 3, 1969.

Johnny and his wife, Peggy, live in San Diego. They have a daughter, Pamela, and a son, Rob, who reside in Los Angeles.



#### PAUL (Tank) YOUNGER Assistant General Manager 35th NFL Season 9th Season with Chargers

Tank Younger is in his thirty-fifth season in the National Football League.

Younger's career spans player, scout and administrator, beginning in 1949 as a fullback in the Los Angeles Rams' "Bull Elephant" backfield.

Younger played during what has been described as pro football's Golden Era and he contributed a historic footnote to that period as the first outstanding NFL player from a predominantly black Southern school. Younger was graduated in 1949 from Louisiana's Grambling College, where his size (6-3, 235) and power inspired the nickname Tank.

Younger was named assistant general manager of the Chargers June 17, 1975. He played for the Rams from 1949-57, and served them as a parttime scout from 1958-64 and as a fulltime scout from 1964-75. Younger also played for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1958. His career totals included 3,640 yards rushing, a 4.7 average, and 35 touchdowns.

Paul Lawrence Younger was born June 25, 1928, in Grambling, Louisiana. He spent most of his early years in Los Angeles. Tank and his wife Lucille, a Los Angeles pediatrician, have a son, Howard (Aug. 31, 1956) and two daughters, Harriette (Dec. 21, 1957) and Lucy (March 6, 1961). Howard is a graduate of the University of Southern California with a degree in business. Harriette is attending medical school at Morehouse University, Atlanta, and Lucy is a graduate student in sociology at UCLA.



#### JACK TEELE Assistant to the President 24th NFL Season 3rd Season with Chargers

Teele joined the Chargers April 15, 1981, after a long and distinguished career with the Los Angeles Rams. Jack is one of the most experi-

enced pesons in pro football in the areas of public relations, ticket office operations, training camp, game management, and administration. He was the most prominent Rams official in the club's move from the Los Angeles Coliseum to Anaheim, working with stadium officials, architects for stadium expansion, contractors, and city management.

Teele's association with pro football began in 1957, when he was assigned to cover the Rams for the Long Beach Independent-Press Telegram newspaper. He joined the Rams as director of public relations in 1960. Teele was appointed Assistant to the President in 1969 and from 1978 served as Vice President, Administration.

Jack Earl Teele was born June 17, 1930, in Bloomington, Illinois. Teele played basketball for Long Beach Poly

High and for the first varsity basketball team at Long Beach State, 1951-52. He was named Long Beach State's Outstanding Alumnus in 1971 and to the Long Beach City College Hall of Fame in 1975. Jack served two years with the Army's Counter Intelligence Corps in Japan, 1952-54. He resides in San Diego with his wife (Marilyn). The Teeles have two daughters, Dana, who is Mrs. Robert Thurston, and Lisa, who is Mrs. Richard Owen.



#### JOHN TRUMP Administrative Assistant 31st NFL Season 6th Season with Chargers

Trump joined the Chargers July 17, 1978, as administrative assistant for player personnel.

Trump is in charge of the player

personnel department and coordinates scouting assignments and the NFL draft.

Trump's appointment in San Diego reunited John with Johnny Sanders, the Chargers' general manager who had started with Trump in the Los Angeles Rams' scouting department and who had played in the same backfield with Trump at Occidental College, Eagle Rock, California.

Trump was Little all-Coast and Little-all America as a running back and safety on the 1948 Occidental team. Trump also is a member of the Occidental Hall of Fame.

John became a high-school football and baseball coach in the Los Angeles City Schools in 1950. Three years later he began a 25-year association with the Rams.

He was born John Mountford Trump June 26, 1925, in Glendale, California. Trump played football for the Burbank High Bulldogs and was student body president. John and his wife Jean have two sons, Frank (Nov. 26, 1952), a scout for the Rams, and Richard (Dec. 25, 1954).



#### AUBREY (Red) PHILLIPS Chief Scout 17th NFL Season 17th Season with Chargers

Red Phillips travels more than 100,000 miles a year researching college players for the San Diego Chargers' draft. Phillips joined the

Chargers as a scout in 1967, and is on the road almost continually in the spring and fall, charting prospects, filing information, and updating records.

Red played collegiately as a center and linebacker at Texas Tech and professionally with Saskatchewan of the Canadian Football League. He coached at Texas Tech, Southwestern Louisiana, and Northwestern Louisiana.

Aubrey Clyde Phillips was born Nov. 14, 1929, in Abbott, Texas. He played football for the Paschal High

Panthers in Fort Worth, Texas. Red and his wife Kay reside in Poway. They have three sons, Rusty (May 12, 1953), Mike (Oct. 20, 1955), and Tony (Jan. 11, 1966), and two daughters, Phyllis (May 17, 1964) and Amy (Feb. 2, 1970).



#### TOM BASS **Defensive Coordinator** 20th NFL Season 6th Season with Chargers

Bass begins in his second season as the Chargers' defensive coordinator and his sixth year in the Chargers' organization. He coached

for the Chargers from 1964-67 after serving as an assistant under Don Corvell at San Diego State from 1961-63. Bass rejoined the Chargers March 1, 1982, leaving the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, for whom he served as director of pro personnel when the franchise was formed in 1975, as an assistant offensive coach in 1976 and from 1977-81 as defensive coordinator.

Bass coached for the Cincinnati Bengals from 1968-69. He was out of football in 1970 and a Bengals scout from 1971-75. During that time Bass published two books of poetry, "Pro Football From The Inside," and "Fly Free My Love." He also served as a contributing editor to five Super Bowl game programs produced by National Football League Properties, Inc.

Thomas Lee Bass was born Aug. 2, 1935, at March Field Air Force Base, Riverside, California. He played high school football in Southern California for the San Bernardino Cardinals. Bass was a linebacker at San Jose State until he was stricken with polio in 1955, about one week before the distribution of the Salk Vaccine. Bass missed a year of school recovering from the disease and was forced to abandon his playing career. He became a student assistant coach at San Jose State while earning a degree in physical education and biological science and being graduated with academic distinction. Tom was a graduate student at San Diego State when he joined Don Coryell's first staff at the school in 1961.

Since joining the Chargers staff Bass has become a member of the Board of Trustees for the San Diego-

based "Journal of Sports Literature."

Bass and his wife, Michelle, reside in Solana Beach. Both are actively involved in supporting the La Jolla Playhouse, located on the campus of University of California at San Diego. They have three sons, Michael (June 1, 1960), a placekicker drafted in the sixth round in 1983 and signed by the New England Patriots, Bobby (Nov. 13, 1964), and David (Oct. 19, 1966), and a daughter, Shana (May 7, 1971).



# MARV BRADEN Special Offensive Assistant 7th NFL Season 3rd Season with Chargers

Braden was named Special Offensive Assistant March 8, 1983. He has coached the special teams and assisted in the offensive game plan

since his arrival from Denver February 17, 1981. Braden previously served as the Broncos' special team coach from 1977-80. Braden will continue to coach the special teams in addition to his new duties assisting on the field whenever possible to aid the smooth operation of the Chargers' offense.

The Chargers' appointment meant a return to San Diego for Braden. He served as head coach at United States International University, 1969-73, during which time his teams posted a 26-12-1 record. Braden's first head coaching post was at Northeast Missouri, 1967-68. ... came to Chargers in 1973 as third-round draft choice, the sixty-fourth player in the draft, and the sixth quarterback (behind Bert Jones, Gary Huff, Ron Jaworski, Gary Keithley, and Joe Ferguson, in that order) ... has overcome early career rap of frailty by starting last 67 games, including postseason, and by playing in 97 of possible 98 games since end of 1975 season.

1973 Fouts made professional debut in fourth game of season at Pittsburgh . . . Chargers trailed 38-0 at halftime but Fouts entered game at beginning of third quarter and completed 11 of 21 passes for 174 yards and 1 touchdown and marshaled 2 other scoring drives in 38-21 defeat.

1974 The Chargers, pregame underdogs by 17½ points, trailed 17-13 in the fourth quarter with third down and 10 yards to go on their two-yard line . . . Fouts then marched San Diego 98 yards to a touchdown for a 20-17 victory that snapped the Cincinnati Bengals' Riverfront Stadium unbeaten streak of 15 games . . Fouts tied a personal best with 4 touchdown passes at Houston in the final game of the season and tied the club record of 369 yards passing as the Chargers defeated the playoff-bound Oilers 45-24.

1979 Fouts began an NFL-record streak of 4 consecutive games in which he threw for 300 yards with 305 yards in a 7-0 loss at Denver . . . Fouts passed for 318 yards against Seattle the following week, setting a club record by completing 28 of 35 passes (.800), and topping the 20-10 triumph with a 49-yard strike to John Jefferson for the clinching touchdown in fourth quarter . . . Fouts's 326 yards the next week helped beat Los Angeles 40-16, and he completed his streak with 303 yards in a 45-22 loss at Oakland . . . ing week, Fouts became the twenty-ninth passer and seventh active NFL player to pass for more than 20,000 yards in a career . . . Fouts established team record for completions in a game with 30 against Seattle in Week 5 . . . Chicago's Reuben Henderson picked off a Fouts pass in overtime in Week 8, breaking a string of 168 consecutive passes without an interception; the club record covered five games . . . set a team record with six touchdown passes in 55-21 victory over defending Super Bowl Champion Oakland . . . Fouts broke his team record with 33 completions at Tampa Bay and his 351 yards marked the 25th time in Fout's career that he has thrown for 300-plus yards . . . Fouts' 33-53-433 passing performance in 41-38 overtime win at Miami resulted in records for completions, attempts, and yards in a divisional playoff.

1982 In first two weekends of 1982, Fouts averaged 228.5 yards a game and completed 58 percent of his passes in win at Denver and loss at Kansas City . . . # Game by Game

#### Week 1

San Diego 23, at Denver 3

Sunday, Sept. 12

Quarterback Dan Fouts marshaled 88- and 80- yard touchdown drives in the second half as San Diego pulled away from the Denver Broncos for the Chargers' second victory in Mile High Stadium since 1968. The Chargers had won in Denver in 1980 and had tied in 1971 and their overall record was 1-11-1 for 13 prior appearances. Rolf Benirschke kept the Broncos at a distance with field goals of 50, 24, and 40 yards, the third coming after 5:08 of the third quarter. He was short and wide to the left on a 58-yard attempt, longest in club history. Fouts completed 11 of 16 passes for 154 yards and one touchdown in the second half, a period in which the Chargers outgained the hosts 241 yards to 137. With 3:59 left to play, San Diego mounted its winning drive, an 8-play, 64-yard march climaxed when Fouts hit Winslow on a screen pass that Winslow carried 12 yards to victory. The workhorse of the Chargers' offense was Chuck Muncie who gained 126 yards on 25 attempts. It was Muncie's third-straight 100-yard performance and second-straight against league's number one rated defense against the run. Fouts threw for 333 yards, the fifth time with more than 300 yards in six playoff games.



- **July 9**—Sid Gillman assumes dual role of coach and general manager.
- **Aug. 6**—Paul Lowe returns opening kickoff 105 yards for a touchdown as Chargers defeat New York Titans 27-7 before 27,778 persons in Los Angeles Coliseum in first preseason game.
- **Sept. 10**—The Chargers overcome 20-7 deficit in fourth quarter to defeat Dallas 21-20 before 17,724 persons in Coliseum in opening league game.
- **Dec. 10**—A crowd of 9,928 persons in Coliseum watches Chargers top Denver 41-33 to clinch AFL Western Division title.
- **Dec. 23**—Hilton says he will accept invitation to visit San Diego regarding a possible move of Chargers from Los Angeles.

#### 1961

- Jan. 1—A crowd of 32,183 in Jeppesen Stadium and a national television audience sees host Houston defeat L.A. 24-16 for AFL championship.
- **Jan. 6** Civic leaders form Greater San Diego Sports Association to bring major league sports to San Diego, following Hilton's visit.
- **Feb. 10**—AFL gives Hilton formal approval to move Chargers to San Diego.
- May 1—Construction begins on enlarging Balboa Stadium, where the San Diego Chargers will play home games, from 23,000 to 34,000 by building an upper deck.

- **July 22**—The Chargers open training camp at University of San Diego.
- Aug. 6—Balboa Stadium is reminiscent of ancient Roman ruins as Chargers defeat Houston 27-14 on a 93-degree afternoon before paid crowd of 12,304 persons (total attendance estimated at 15,000) in first preseason game.
- Nov. 19—Chargers defeat Dallas 24-14 to clinch AFL West title with 5 games remaining; safety Charlie McNeil makes club's forty-third pass interception, a professional record.
- **Dec. 17**—The Chargers lose to Boston 41-0 in Balboa Stadium but Dick Harris intercepts Babe Parilli's pass to Gino Cappelletti in fourth quarter for Chargers' forty-ninth of season.
- Dec. 24—Houston defeats Chargers 10-3 before 29,556 persons in Balboa Stadium to win second AFL championship.

- Jan. 7 West defeats East 47-27 in Balboa Stadium in first AFL All-Star game, featuring 11 Chargers and coach Sid Gillman and his staff.
- July 16-Chargers open training camp at University of San Diego.
- **Dec. 16** A 26-17 loss to Dallas marks the end of a 4-10 season for the Chargers, who saw 23 players miss at least 2 games with injuries.

#### 1963

- Jan. 13—Chargers Earl Faison is named outstanding defensive player as West defeats East 21-14 in AFL All-Star game before 27,641 persons in Balboa Stadium.
- April 30 Barron Hilton and his father, Conrad, sell one-third of their interest in the Chargers to San Diego businessmen John Mabee, George Pernicano, Kenneth Swanson, and James Copley, and M.L. Bengtson of Los Angeles.
- July 10—The Chargers open their training camp at Rough Acres Ranch, located near Boulevard, a hamlet of 100 persons in the mountains of East San Diego County, 60 miles from the city.
- **Dec. 22**—Eight Chargers score and Paul Lowe rushes for 183 yards in 17 carries and scores two touchdowns as the Chargers clinch AFL West title with 58-20 victory over Denver; season ended week later than scheduled after AFL postponed games weekend following Nov. 22 assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

#### 1964

- **Jan. 5**—Keith Lincoln accounts for 349 yards total offense as Chargers win their first AFL championship, defeating Boston 51-10, before 30,127 persons in Balboa Stadium.
- Jan. 19—Lincoln is named outstanding player after gaining 121 yards in 14 carries as West defeats East 27-14 in front of 20,016 persons in AFL All-Star game in Balboa Stadium.
- Jan. 29—The Chargers and other AFL teams sign a five-year television contract with National Broadcasting Company for a record \$36 million; the contract will commence with the 1965 season.
- **July 15**—The Chargers open training camp at the TraveLodge in Escondido.
- Oct. 3—The Chargers and New York Jets tied 17-17 before a record AFL crowd of 50,222 persons—46,828 paid—in New York's Shea Stadium.
- Nov. 26 A Balboa Stadium attendance record of 34,865 is set as Buffalo defeats San Diego 27-24 on Thanksgiving Day.

**Dec. 6** – The Chargers defeat the Jets 38-3 before 25,753 persons in Balboa Stadium to clinch their fourth AFL West title in five years.

**Dec. 26**—With wide receiver Lance Alworth out of the game with a knee injury and fullback Keith Lincoln sidelined in the first quarter with a fractured rib, the Chargers are beaten 20-7 in Buffalo for the AFL championship.

#### 1965

Jan. 16—Fullback Keith Lincoln runs 80 yards for one touchdown and combines on a 73-yard pass play for a touchdown as the West defeats the East 38-14 in the AFL All-Star game before 15,446 persons at Houston's Jeppesen Stadium. The game, originally moved from San Diego to New Orleans, was switched to Houston on one day's notice after black players experienced mistreatment in New Orleans.

May 17—The City Council approves expenditure of \$750,000 for architectural and engineering drawings of a 50,000-seat stadium at the Southwest corner of Friars Road and Murphy Canyon Road in Mission Valley.

**April 27**—The San Diego City Council endorses construction of a multipurpose stadium in Mission Valley and drops the idea of a floating stadium in Mission Bay.

July 14—The Chargers open their Escondido training camp.

Nov. 2—Construction of a \$27-million San Diego Stadium is authorized by a 73 percent "yes" vote by San Diego citizens.

**Dec. 12**—The Chargers claim their fifth AFL West title in six years by winning in Houston 37-26.

**Dec. 26** — Buffalo defeats the Chargers 23-0 in front of 30,361 persons in Balboa Stadium for the AFL championship; a new automobile, the "Charger", is introduced by Chrysler officials at halftime.

Jan. 15—The AFL All-Stars beat the Buffalo Bills, 30-19, as Lance Alworth catches two touchdown passes and Chargers' linebacker Frank Buncom is defensive player of the game before a crowd of 35,572 persons in Houston's Rice Stadium.

Jan. 18—Tight end Dave Kocourek, guard Ernest Park, and defensive backs Dick Westmoreland and Jimmy Warren are selected from San Diego by Miami in the allocation draft to stock the new AFL franchise during league meeting in Houston.

June 8—AFL and National Football League teams announce plans to merge in the 1970 season and Chargers and Los Angeles Rams announce they will play three preseason games in San Diego Stadium, beginning in 1967.

July 8-The Chargers report to training camp in Escondido.

Aug. 25—Eugene V. Klein of Beverly Hills heads a group of 21 business executives who purchase the Chargers for \$10 million, a record transaction in professional football.

#### 1967

July 10—The Chargers report to their Escondido training camp.

Aug. 20—San Diego Stadium is dedicated before a crowd of 45,988 persons; Detroit defeats the Chargers 38-17 in San Diego's first meeting with an NFL team.

Oct. 15—Leslie (Speedy) Duncan has 203 yards in returns—35 on a fumble recovery for a touchdown, 68 on four kickoff returns, and 100 for a touchdown on the longest interception return in AFL history as the Chargers defeated visiting Kansas City 45-31 in a game in which both teams combined for 897 yards total offense and 622 in returns.

**Dec. 3**—The Chargers are beaten by Oakland 41-21 before the first sellout crowd in the Stadium, 52,661 persons, and 2,018 persons who also watched the game on closed-circuit television in the San Diego Sports Arena.

**Dec. 30**—Sid Gillman returns as head coach and Charlie Waller becomes offense coach in staff reorganization announced by President Gene Klein.

### 1971

May 19—The Chargers trade wide receiver Lance Alworth to Dallas for tight end Pettis Norman, tackle Tony Liscio, and defensive tackle Ron East.

July 10-Summer training camp opens at UC Irvine.

Nov. 15 — Dennis Partee's 45-yard field goal at the gun lifts the Chargers to a 20-17, Monday Night victory over St. Louis.




