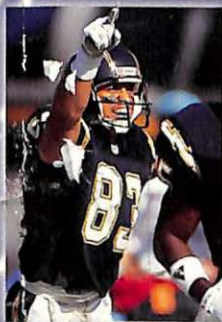

ALEX G. SPANOS



Chairman of Board/President

Alexander Gus Spanos, a self-made giant in the building industry, purchased majority interest in the San Diego Chargers Aug. 1, 1984.

When Spanos was offered the opportunity to purchase the club, he put the decision to a vote before the board of directors of the A.G. Spanos Companies.

"The vote was 10 to two not to buy the ball club," he recalls. But the chairman used his veto power to overrule: "I told them, 'When you turn 60 you'll understand.'"

"I always believed in the pursuit of one's dreams," Spanos characteristically said in announcing his intention to buy the team. "For me, it has been a life-long goal to own an NFL team. In buying the San Diego Chargers, I've been able to realize a dream."

The dream became reality and 1992 brought the joy and exhilaration of the playoffs.

"Every morning I have to tell myself it really happened," said Spanos. "It's the greatest feeling I've had in 69 years. What I've enjoyed most about this is watching the fans enjoy it."

Spanos moved with strength and vision to build the Chargers into the champions of the AFC Western Division. With a "whatever-it-takes" approach, he has brought all the pieces together to form a solid foundation for success. The hiring of General Manager Bobby Beathard, one of the most respected football men in the National Football League, was hailed around the League. He has aggressively pursued and signed some of the top players in football. He has modernized and upgraded the team's football training camp facilities with the state-of-the-art Alex G. Spanos Athletic and Recreation Building at the Chargers' summer camp at the University of California at San Diego. An astroturf field at the Chargers' in-season practice facility at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium was installed. Spanos also has completely renovated the team's locker room facilities and front office at the Stadium.

Spanos' commitment to the NFL was recognized when NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue named him to the League's Expan-

sion and Realignment Committee in 1991 to develop recommendations on expansion issues which will greatly affect the future of pro football. He also serves on the league's Legislative Committee.

In 1991, Spanos was invited by President George Bush to join him on a two-day goodwill trip to Greece and drew praise from the Chief Executive who singled him out as an American of Greek heritage who has achieved success in America. During the visit, President Bush addressed the Greek Parliament in Athens July 18, 1991, and credited Spanos with making "a tremendous imprint in our country." Bush also cited Spanos for his continued efforts to promote stronger ties between the two countries. Spanos and his wife, Faye, also hosted a formal dinner party for 250 Greek government, political, business and community leaders, which was attended by American Ambassador to Greece, Michael Sotirhos, and Greek Prime Minister Konstantinos Mitsotakis.

And when America needed a helping hand, Spanos was there to deliver. He spearheaded the most aggressive fundraising campaign during the Gulf War crisis and delivered the most successful fundraising event in the history of the United Service Organization. As National Chairman of the U.S.O.'s Golden Anniversary Salute Luncheon April 5, 1991, in Los Angeles, Spanos guided an effort which raised more than \$4.5 million. Spanos personally arranged for and presented a check for \$250,000 to the U.S.O. on behalf of the 28 NFL teams through NFL Charities. The contribution was the second-largest single grant ever by NFL Charities. The Luncheon was attended by President George Bush, former Presidents Ronald Reagan and Gerald Ford, Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney, General Colin Powell, and U.S.O.'s Ambassador of Goodwill, Bob Hope.

These moves demonstrate the commitment of a man who has carved a remarkable career in business and whose dedication to family and community has been an inspiring example for others.

Spanos was born September 28, 1923, in Stockton, California. He developed his tireless work ethic early, starting as an eight-year-old in his father's restaurant, rising before dawn to help prepare pastries before attending school. In 1951, Spanos borrowed \$800, purchased a truck and set out on his own. He began his own catering business serving migrant farm workers in the San Joaquin Valley. Spanos later began investing in real estate and in 1960 formed the A.G. Spanos Construction Company.

Spanos is the founder and chairman of ten companies bearing his name, including A.G. Spanos Construction, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Properties, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Management, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Development, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Enterprises, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Realty, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Marketing, Inc.; AGS Financial Corporation; the A.G. Spanos Jet Center, and the A.G. Spanos Land Company.

In the last 32 years, he single-handedly built a construction empire stretching across the nation. The A.G. Spanos Companies build, market and manage multi-housing units in 15 states. Since 1960, the companies have overseen the construction of over 60,000 apartment units and over 2.5 million square feet of commercial property. Land development and the construction of master-planned communities are also part of the Spanos Companies' expertise.

Throughout his rags-to-riches life, Spanos always has treasured family and community above all else.

Though one of the nation's most productive corporate businesses, the A.G. Spanos organization continues as a family-run operation. Eldest son Dean serves as President of the Spanos corporate organization and Vice Chairman of AGS Financial and the Chargers. Son Michael manages the construction and development activities in the western and southeastern divisions of the company. Together, they are the driving force behind each business venture.

A son of Greek immigrants, Spanos' hard work and determination to succeed was recognized in 1986 as he was one of a select group of 80 Americans awarded the Ellis Island Medal of Honor by the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation and the New York Statue of Liberty Commission. In a special ceremony on Ellis Island, the honorees were cited for being "outstanding American citizens who have distinguished themselves in their respective fields of endeavor, while preserving the values of their particular heritages."

In 1989, Spanos received the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith's National Distinguished Community Service Award for devo-

tion to community and concern for others.

Spanos is Honorary Regent of the University of the Pacific and a Trustee of the Eisenhower Medical Center in Palm Springs. He has donated substantially to benefit critically ill youngsters at Childrens Hospital and Health Center in San Diego. He was awarded a Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree by the University of the Pacific on the same day he gave the commencement address to the 1984 graduating class. In 1985, Spanos was chairman of San Diego Childrens Hospital's first Miracle Network Telethon. In 1987, Spanos served as chairman of the San Diego County Easter Seals Telethon and was chairman of the Loaned Executive campaign during the annual United Way/CHAD drive in San Diego County.

He has been a strong supporter of high school sports in San Diego. Spanos annually has sponsored the CIF San Diego Section football championships, allowing the games to be played in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. His backing of the San Diego High School Coaches Association and the San Diego County high school all-star football game led to the game being named the Alex Spanos High School All-Star Football Classic.

Spanos also was the founder and driving force behind seven biennial fundraising "Evening of Elegance" dinners benefitting assorted children's charities including San Diego Childrens Hospital and Health Center. Proceeds from the last "Evening of Elegance" held in 1985 topped the one-million-dollar mark.

Another side to this complex man was revealed with the help of his close friend Bob Hope. Spanos displayed an entertainer's talent and flair when he lived a childhood dream and danced on stage. Together, Spanos and Hope sang and danced on numerous occasions both in the United States and abroad.

Spanos' acquisition of the Chargers culminated a lifelong interest and involvement in sports. He earned varsity letters in swimming and diving at the University of the Pacific in Stockton and later distinguished himself as an amateur golfer. Spanos was the first person ever to be on the winning teams in both the Bob Hope Desert Classic in Palm Desert (1977) and the Bob Hope British Pro-Am in Epsom, England (1980). In 1987, Spanos was inducted into the Stockton Athletic Hall of Fame.

Alex and Faye have four children — Dean, Dea (Mrs. Ron Berberian), Alexis (Mrs. Barry Ruhl), and Michael — and 11 grandchildren. They maintain residences in Stockton and Palm Springs, California, and Tarpon Springs, Florida.

DEAN SPANOS

Vice Chairman



Dean Spanos brought broad business and financial expertise to the Chargers when he moved to La Jolla, California, in 1984. He plays a leading role in the management and administration of personnel and fiscal matters of the Chargers and also the NFL, where he attends all league meetings and serves on the NFL Films Committee.

In addition to his role with the Chargers, he doubles as President of the Spanos corporate organization and Vice Chairman of the AGS Financial Corporation from his office in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. He is responsible for all construction operations nationwide and all financial matters relating to the acquisition and development of projects for the Spanos organization. For the past 22 years, Dean has been working alongside his father, owner Alex Spanos, in construction and land development.

Dean attended the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California, from which he received a degree in business administration in 1972. He maintains close ties with his alma mater, serving as a Regent at the University.

Dean's busy career in business and the National Football League hasn't hampered his status as one of the nation's most successful amateur golfers. An avid golfer since his college years, he has been on the winning team in four Pro-Am tournaments, including back-to-back wins in 1990 at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and the AT&T National Pro-Am at Pebble Beach where he teamed with partner Hubert Green. He also was on the winning team at the Hope Classic again in 1991. Spanos and Green won the Bing Crosby Pro-Am at Pebble Beach in 1985 where Dean was awarded the "Most Valuable Amateur" trophy for supplying the most help to his professional partner. Also in 1985, he was on the winning team in the Senior Players Reunion Pro-Am in Dallas with Billy Casper.

Dean Alexander Spanos was born May 26, 1950, in Stockton. He was an outstanding member of the Lincoln High School golf team in Stockton before continuing his golfing career at the University of the Pacific. Dean received the Lincoln High Hall of Fame Award which honors alumni whose contributions and accomplishments are representative of the school. He was recognized for his achievements in the areas of business and athletics.

Dean has become an integral part of the local community since moving to San Diego. He is a member of the United Way's Alexis de Tocqueville Society which is made up of the group's top supporters. He has been a major contributor and supporter of the American Cancer Society in San Diego. Dean also was co-chairman this year of the US WEST Cellular/San Diego Chargers Charity Golf Classic benefitting Childrens Hospital. He now resides in La Jolla, California, with his wife, Susan, and sons, Alexander Gus (July 2, 1978) and John Dean (Nov. 7, 1979).

BOBBY BEATHARD

General Manager

31st NFL Season

4th Season with Chargers



When Alex Spanos named Bobby Beathard general manager of the San Diego Chargers January 3, 1990, it brought hope to a city thirsting for a winner. Beathard brought a sparkling reputation and a history of building champions, including five Super Bowl participants and four world champions. He turned the NFL's oldest team of the 70's — the Washington Redskins — into one of the most successful organizations of the 80's. And in just his third season in San Diego he handed the organization and the city it's first AFC Western Division championship in more than a decade.

With a proven plan to follow, he immediately set out in 1990 to bring top athletes with a winning attitude to San Diego. A tireless and aggressive approach to the NFL draft is a Beathard trademark. Acting with the same vitality and decisiveness that highlights his 30 years as an NFL talent evaluator, his judgement was on the mark in 1990 when seven players from his first draft in San Diego ended up in the starting lineup, including 1992 NFL Defensive Player of the Year Junior Seau. Beathard made more strong moves in 1991 which allowed him to draft 14 players, including 12 who completed their rookie season with the Chargers and eight who saw regular-season action. Eleven of his 13 selections in 1992 finished the season with the Chargers, including seven who appeared on the roster during the regular season or playoffs.

Beathard also has been one of the NFL's most active and successful participants in signing veteran free agent talent. He landed immediate help for the Chargers when he arrived by signing Plan B free agents running back Ronnie Harmon, punter John Kidd and kicker John Carney. Two-time Most Valuable Player Harmon has proven to be a phenomenal talent both rushing and receiving while Kidd and Carney solidified the kicking game. In 1991, Plan B brought starting left tackle Harry Swayne while the 1992 Plan B class added four players, including cornerback Sean Vanhorne. Beathard took advantage of the new free agency system to bring proven talent to the Chargers, most notably linebacker Jerrol Williams and guard Joe Milinichik.

Beathard's golden touch was clearly evident in the 1992 AFC Western Division Champion Chargers. Of the 59 players who finished the season with the team, 48 were acquired by Bobby since his arrival in 1990. Twenty-one of the 48 players were Beathard draft choices, four were acquired by trade, nine were Plan B free agents, nine more were free agents and four were claimed on waivers.

Though success has followed him through every step of his NFL career, Beathard has remained one of League's most low-key and well-liked personalities. Representative of his modesty is the fact he owns five Championship rings, yet never wears or displays one.

Beathard has demonstrated a keen eye for talent since becoming a part-time scout with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1963. He left the Chiefs briefly to scout for the American Football League and returned to Kansas City full-time after the AFL-NFL merger in 1966 and earned his first championship ring as a member of the 1966 Chiefs' organization. Beathard then served as a scout for the Atlanta Falcons, 1968-71.

In 1972, Beathard was named director of player personnel for the Miami Dolphins. The Dolphins won the following two Super Bowls. Then on February 24, 1978, the Redskins made Bobby their general manager and he ultimately showed the league that first-round draft picks were weapons to be used in trades. In his 11 years, the Redskins had only three first-round picks. They went to the Super Bowl three times and won twice.

Beathard's handiwork was apparent on all three Super Bowl teams, including the World Champion Redskins of 1982 whose roster included an astounding 27 free agents signed by Bobby since he

joined the team in 1978. The 1983 squad, which finished 14-2, also made it to the Super Bowl. The Super Bowl XXII team that defeated Denver, 42-10, in San Diego, was led by players acquired through Beathard's respected eye for talent, including MVP Doug Williams and record-setting running back Timmy Smith.

Appropriately, Beathard's first selection as Washington's general manager, 1978 sixth-round returner Tony Green, made the Pro Bowl. The following year he signed linebackers Rich Milot, Monte Coleman and Neal Olkewicz, who played together for nine years.

Beathard left the Redskins to serve as a commentator for the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) on its weekly "NFL '89" show during the 1989 season.

When Beathard joined the Chargers, he returned to the Southern California lifestyle in which he was raised. Born in Zanesville, Ohio, January 24, 1937, Robert Beathard, Jr., grew up in the Los Angeles area and attended El Segundo High. He moved on to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo where he played quarterback, 1956-58, and led the 1957 and '58 teams to consecutive 9-1 records.

Bobby signed to play for the Redskins in 1959. He played in six preseason games for the Los Angeles Chargers in 1960 as a defensive back and was in the Minnesota Vikings' 1962 training camp.

Bobby and his wife, Christine, reside in Encinitas, California. Beathard is an avid runner. He has run in dozens of marathons, including several Boston Marathons. He also enjoys surfing and cycling. Bobby has four children — Kurt (Jan. 4, 1963), currently an assistant coach at Colgate University; Jeff (June 9, 1964), a twelfth-round choice of the Rams in 1988 who currently scouts for the Los Angeles Rams; Casey (Dec. 2, 1965), and Jaime (Sept. 25, 1968) — and three grandchildren.

BOBBY ROSS

Head Coach

6th NFL Season

2nd Season with Chargers



On January 2, 1992, San Diego Chargers general manager Bobby Beathard announced the selection of former Georgia Tech head coach Bobby Ross to become the ninth head coach in team history. Ross, whose ability to turn around college programs was well-documented,

would be put to the test in his efforts to reverse the fortunes of the Chargers who were coming off a last-place, 4-12 finish in 1991.

Ross' first season had an ominous beginning as starting quarterback John Friesz suffered a season-ending knee injury in the opening game of the preseason. Quick maneuvering landed quarterback Stan Humphries, but critics predicted trouble for the team which featured a new head coach, a new coaching staff and a roster made up of nearly one-third new faces, including a new quarterback.

The Chargers struggled early, but Ross kept a firm hand on the helm and continued to guide the Chargers without deviating from his original course. After four losses, Ross' motto of "perfect practices make perfect" began to take hold. Slowly a team whose confidence had been eroded by years of losing began to believe in itself.

Under Ross, the Chargers caught fire and quickly became the Cinderella story of the 1992 season. The team won 11 of its final 12 regular-season games, its finest winning streak since 1961, and won the AFC Western Division title for the first time since 1981. Ross' squad continued its winning ways by shutting out Kansas City, 17-0, at home in the AFC Wild Card game.

San Diego improved immeasurably under the guidance of the NFL rookie head coach. The offense ranked sixth in the NFL in 1992, up from thirteenth in 1991, and made huge strides in the passing game which improved from twenty-fourth to seventh in the league. The defense jumped from nineteenth to fourth in the NFL, led by the AFC's top-ranked rushing defense. The team allowed 101 fewer points throughout the regular season.

Ross and the Chargers earned their niche in NFL history by doing something 132 teams previously could not do: start a season with four losses and have a winning record, yet make the playoffs. San Diego was only the third team in NFL history to lose its first four games and win its next four games.

The Chargers' accomplishments under Ross did not go unnoticed, earning the head coach a host of postseason honors. He was named NFL Coach of the Year by United Press International, Pro Football Weekly, Football News, Football Digest, Maxwell Football Club, Kansas City 101 Banquet and the Pro Football Writers Association.

Ross has coached college or professional football for the past 28 years. He was a college head coach 15 of 19 years prior to coming to San Diego, interrupted only by four seasons as an assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs (1978-81). Ross' 15-year record as a head coach at The Citadel, Maryland and Georgia Tech was 94-76-2.

Before reversing the fortunes of the Chargers, the 56-year-old Richmond, Virginia, native turned around the Georgia Tech program and carried it into the national spotlight. He inherited a down-trodden program which struggled through a 5-20 mark before Ross' teams won 18 of their next 20 games and a share of the national championship in 1990 with an 11-0-1 mark. It was the football program's first-ever national championship and conference title, and Ross was a consensus choice nationally for coach of the year. He culminated his career at Georgia Tech with a 31-26-1 record, including a 26-6-1 record over his final 33 games. He finished his five-year stint with an 8-5 record in 1991 and a big 18-17 come-from-behind victory over Stanford in the Aloha Bowl on Christmas Day.

In 1990, Ross directed Georgia Tech to the *United Press International* national championship as the nation's only unbeaten team at 11-0-1 following a convincing 45-21 win over Nebraska in the Florida Citrus Bowl. It was Tech's first appearance in a New Year's Day bowl game since 1966. Ross collected one of the biggest wins of his

coaching career when Tech knocked off then-top-ranked Virginia, 41-38, in a nationally-televised thriller. The Yellow Jackets won their first Atlantic Coast Conference title in school history and their first national and conference championship of any kind since 1952. A consensus national Coach of the Year and the ACC Coach of the Year, Ross returned Tech to the glory days of Bobby Dodd as the number-one-ranked team by *UPI*, *The Sporting News* and *Scripps Howard Publishing*.

The success of 1990 was earmarked by the strong finish of the 1989 campaign. Tech won seven of its last eight games to post a 7-4 record — the Yellow Jackets' first winning season in four years — while decisively defeating a pair of bowl-bound teams in Clemson and Georgia. Georgia Tech dominated its foes down the stretch, outscoring the opposition, 123-55, in its last four games — all of them victories. The team finished the 1989 season ranked thirty-first nationally by *The Sporting News*.

The turnaround in 1989 of Tech's football fortunes was really foreshadowed by Ross' 1988 squad that, despite a 3-8 record, ranked fifteenth nationally in total defense and seventh in pass defense. The 1988 squad lost six games by a total of 32 points.

His first team at Georgia Tech nearly broke the school's all-time season passing record with 2,284 yards, the most yards by air for a Rambling Wreck squad since 1968.

Ross coached five successful seasons at the University of Maryland (1982-86) where his Terrapin teams were known for their explosive offenses that resulted in the unprecedented success in College Park. During that time, his Maryland teams compiled a sparkling 39-19-1 mark (.672) against what annually was one of the toughest schedules in Division I football. He guided Maryland to three ACC titles and four postseason bowl games during his autumns in College Park. Ross left Maryland to become only the eighth full-time head football coach in Georgia Tech history.

With an imaginative offense as its major characteristic, Ross' Maryland squads averaged 28.1 points per outing in his 59 games at the school. Maryland led the ACC in total offense in 1984 and '85, in passing offense in 1984 and '86 and in scoring offense in 1982, '84 and '85. His 1982 team averaged 32.1 points a game, the highest scoring team in the conference since 1972 and the third-highest scoring team in league history.

In his first season at College Park, Ross was named ACC Coach of the Year and District III Coach of the Year after the 1982 campaign that saw Maryland post an 8-4 record and earn a trip to the Aloha Bowl. That year he was also named National Coach of the Year by the Washington Touchdown Club.

His second Maryland squad in 1983 also recorded an 8-4 record and was chosen for the Florida Citrus Bowl. His 1984 squad posted a 9-3 mark, including a win over Tennessee in the Sun Bowl, and Ross' 1985 team also managed a 9-3 mark with a win over Syracuse in the Cherry Bowl.

The results of his successful program were electric in the Washington D.C. area, a region previously dominated by pro football interest. During his time in College Park, Maryland's attendance showed a marked increase, increasing by 8,225 fans in his first season and climbing over 20,000 per game to a school-record average of 51,546 in 1985.

Perhaps if there is any one game indicative of his all-out, never-say-die coaching style, it might be Maryland's thrilling, 42-40 win over nationally-ranked Miami in 1984. Making the greatest comeback in Division I history, Ross coached the Terps from a 31-0 halftime deficit to a last-second win over the Hurricanes in the Orange Bowl.

Ross' teams have played tough defense as well, leading the conference in scoring and rushing defense in 1982 and in total and rushing defense in 1985 while at Maryland. In 1988, Georgia Tech was the ACC's top team in pass defense and third in total defense.

Born Dec. 23, 1936, in Richmond, Virginia, Robert Joseph Ross was a three-sport letterman at Virginia Military Institute in football, basketball and baseball. He started at quarterback and defensive back for two seasons and served as captain of the team as a senior. Ross graduated from the Lexington, Virginia, school in 1959 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and History.

After a tour of duty in the U.S. Army as a First Lieutenant (1960-62) and four seasons of coaching on the prep level, he started his

collegiate coaching career at VMI in 1965. Ross then spent four seasons as an assistant at William and Mary (1967-70), one year at Rice (1971), and one year at Maryland (1972) before beginning his head coaching career at The Citadel in 1973.

Ross spent five seasons at The Citadel (1973-77) before leaving to become an assistant coach in the NFL under Marv Levy with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1978. He coached special teams and defense two seasons and offensive backs his final two seasons with the Chiefs. After four seasons (1978-81) with the Chiefs, Ross returned to the collegiate ranks as head coach at Maryland in 1982.

Ross' Maryland teams have produced such outstanding all-America talents as quarterbacks Boomer Esiason, Frank Reich and Stan Gelbaugh, tackle J.D. Maarleveld, guard Ron Solt, center Kevin Glover, linebacker Eric Wilson and safety Al Covington. He developed the school's two greatest all-time passers in Esiason and Gelbaugh, its all-time leading scorer in fullback Rick Badanjek, its all-time placekicking leader in Jess Atkinson and its all-time leading receiver in Greg Hill.

Standouts from Georgia Tech include linebacker Marco Coleman, safety Ken Swilling, running back Jerry Mays and quarterback Shawn Jones.

Ross is known for sharing a uniquely personal relationship with his players. During practice he's involved in all facets of the game. He enjoys teaching and usually can be found in the huddle with his team.

"I always take the approach with my players that I want to treat them with the same respect that I would give to my (five) children," Ross said when he joined the Chargers. "I'm straight-forward. I think I'm a good communicator. I know how to look a person in the eye, eyeball-to-eyeball, and say what's on my mind. And I would expect the same from our players.

"I consider myself demanding of everyone," he continued, "starting with myself on down to the assistants and players. That doesn't mean I holler and scream and make players run extra laps. If discipline is detail and doing things right, then we're going to have a lot of that because that's what I believe in. If we don't do something right in practice, then we're going to repeat it. That doesn't mean we're going to have four-hour practices. Practice doesn't make perfect. Perfect practices make perfect."

Ross and his wife, Alice, have five children — sons Chris, Kevin and Robbie and daughters Mary and Teresa — and four grandchildren. Chris (Air Force Academy - '84), Mary (Maryland - '85), Teresa (Loyola of Baltimore - '87), and Kevin (Naval Academy - '88) are college graduates while Robbie is attending Georgia Tech. Bobby and Alice reside in the Scripps Ranch district of San Diego.

"There are so many things that led us to Bobby Ross. You never hear anything bad (about him). You talk to players around the NFL who played for him and they loved playing for the guy. He's a tough, demanding coach, but at the same time, a fair guy. He's not going to ask them to do anything he wouldn't do himself. There's nothing selfish about him. There's no ego involved in Bobby Ross. People seem to respond to his kind of coaching. He's going to win by getting absolutely the most out of his players. He's very decisive. He knows what he wants. He's a head football coach and he's a coaching football coach. Things are going to get done the right way. Bobby's mission is to win. He's just been a winner wherever he's gone. He's gone into tough situations and turned them around. He's taken programs that were floundering and made them champions."

BILL ARNSPARGER

Defensive Coordinator

22nd NFL Season

2nd Season with Chargers

Arnsparger returned to the NFL coaching ranks Jan. 13, 1992, as the Chargers' defensive coordinator after eight years in collegiate athletics and led San Diego to one of its finest defensive performances in team history. The Chargers finished with the number-two ranked defense in the AFC and fourth in the NFL allowing just 264.2 yards a game after finishing nineteenth overall in 1991. It was the team's highest overall defensive ranking since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. His defense allowed an AFC-low 87.2-yards rushing a game. But, more importantly, Arnsparger's defense held its opponents to 241 points, 101 fewer than the previous year.

"Bill is one of the finest defensive minds in all of football," said Ross. "He has an uncanny ability to get people in the right place based on alignments, personnel and formations. That's half the game."

General Manager Bobby Beathard said: "I think it's a real opportunity for the rest of the staff just to be able to work with him."

Arnsparger, 66, has 37 years of coaching experience, including 21 seasons in the NFL. He began his NFL career in 1964 with the Baltimore Colts where he coached until 1970 when he joined Don Shula's staff in Miami. Arnsparger left the Dolphins in 1974 to become head coach of the New York Giants, a post he held until mid-way through the 1976 season when he rejoined Shula in Miami.

Arnsparger was the architect of the Dolphins' "No-Name Defense" in the early 1970s, and later developed the "Killer B's" defense in the early '80s. His defenses ranked either first or second in the NFL for fewest points allowed in nine of his 11 full seasons with Miami, including his final year with the Dolphins (1983) when they allowed an NFL-low 15.6-points a game. He has coached in five Super Bowls, including Super Bowl VIII in which he received a game ball after his defense allowed only 150 points in the 1973 season.

In 1984, Arnsparger left the NFL to become head coach at Louisiana State University where he guided the Tigers to one conference championship, two Sugar Bowl appearances and a Liberty Bowl berth in three years (1984-86).

He held the position as Director of Athletics at the University of Florida five years (1987-91). Arnsparger's leadership at Florida placed a premium on academics as well as athletics. The 156 student-athletes at Florida who earned all-academic honors over the last three years is the best three-year total in school history. Florida's combined men's and women's program ranked among the ten most successful in the nation in each of Arnsparger's first four years, according to *USA Today*. He left the University mid-way through his fifth year to join the Chargers' staff.

Arnsparger began his coaching career at his alma mater, Miami of Ohio, in 1950. He then served as an assistant at Ohio State (1951-53), Kentucky (1954-61) and Tulane (1962-63) before coming to the Colts in the NFL.

William Stephen Arnsparger was born Dec. 16, 1926, in Paris, Kentucky, and attended the University of Kentucky and, after a stint in the Marine Corps, transferred to Miami of Ohio where he obtained a degree in education and a Master's in school administration. Bill and his wife, Betty Jane (B.J.), have a son, David (Aug. 6, 1965), and a daughter, Mary Susan (Feb. 29, 1968). David currently serves as secondary coach at Alabama A&M. Bill and B.J. reside in the Rancho Bernardo area of San Diego.



SYLVESTER CROOM

Offensive Backs

7th NFL Season

2nd Season with Chargers

Croom is in his seventh season of coaching NFL running backs. He joined the Chargers Jan. 7, 1992, after serving as running backs coach of the Indianapolis Colts in 1991. He coached the same position four seasons, 1987-90, for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before joining the Bucs, "Sly" spent 10 seasons with the University of Alabama where he served as linebackers coach. He coached both outside linebackers, 1977-81 and 1984-86, and inside linebackers, 1982-83. During his tenure Alabama won back-to-back national titles in 1978-79. He tutored four players who were NFL first-round draft choices — E.J. Junior (1981), Mike Pitts (1983), Cornelius Bennett (1987) and Derrick Thomas (1989). During Croom's tenure, Alabama led the Southeastern Conference in total defense two seasons, 1979-80. He began with the Crimson Tide as a graduate assistant coach in 1975-76.

As a 6-0, 235-pound center, Croom helped lead the Crimson Tide to three consecutive SEC Championships. A three-year letterman for Paul "Bear" Bryant, Croom was named Kodak All-America and first-team all-SEC as a senior in 1974. He also earned the Jacobs Award as the best down lineman in the conference. Alabama compiled a 32-4 record during Croom's three years as a starter and was named national champion in 1973 by UPI. He began his career at Alabama as a linebacker, then switched to tight end and tackle and finally to center.

He continued his playing career one season in the NFL when he signed as a free agent in 1975 with the New Orleans Saints.

Croom received a bachelor's degree in history with a minor in biology from Alabama in 1975. He earned his Master's degree in educational administration two years later at Alabama.

Sylvester Croom Jr. was born on September 25, 1954, in Tuscaloosa, Ala. He played linebacker and tight end for the Tuscaloosa High Black Bears. Sly and his wife, Jeri, have a daughter, Jennifer (Dec. 13, 1972), who's attending the University of Alabama. The Crooms reside in the Rancho Bernardo area of San Diego.

JOHN DUNN

Strength & Conditioning Coach

10th NFL Season

4th Season with Chargers



Dunn took over the Chargers' strength and conditioning program March 1, 1990, after serving a three-year stint in charge of the Los Angeles Raiders' strength and conditioning program (1987-89). Dunn began his career in the NFL as an assistant strength coach with the Washington Redskins from 1984-86.

Dunn attended Penn State where he played on the defensive line his first two seasons, 1974-75, before switching to offensive tackle as a junior and to guard as a senior. He was named offensive co-captain for the Nittany Lions his senior season. Dunn signed a free agent contract with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1978. He returned to Penn State and graduated with a degree in health and physical education in 1978 and stayed with the Lions as the team's assistant offensive line and weights coach in 1979.

He operated "Mother Dunn's Nautilus Club" in York, Pennsylvania, 1980-83, and Goshen, New York, 1984-86, before coming to the NFL in 1984.

John James Dunn, Jr., was born July 22, 1956, in Hillsdale, New York. He was a three-sport star, including a nationally-ranked shot putter, for Taconic Hills High in Philmont, New York. John and his wife, Julia, have two daughters — Jessica (May 15, 1989) and Taylor (July 29, 1991) — and reside in the Rancho Penasquitos area of San Diego.



JOHN FOX

Secondary

5th NFL Season

2nd Season with Chargers

Fox, a former defensive back for the San Diego State Aztecs from 1976-77, returned to San Diego and joined Bobby Ross' staff as secondary coach Jan. 9, 1992. His troops made an immediate impact making 21 of the team's 25 interceptions, two more than the entire squad made in 1991.

Fox, 38, spent his first NFL coaching assignment as the secondary coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers, 1989-91. The Steelers had the NFL's top-ranked pass defense in 1990.

The Virginia Beach native came to the NFL Feb. 10, 1989, after three years as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of Pittsburgh (1986-88). The Panthers' pass defense had a top-ten national ranking each of his three seasons there. In his first season, Fox's defense ranked ninth in the country, yielding 276.9 yards per game. In 1987 it jumped to fourth overall, allowing only 233.0 yards per game. And in 1988, it finished fourth again by allowing just 254.2 yards per game. That year it surrendered just 118.9 yards a game passing to rank second in the country.

Fox began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at San Diego State in 1978 before becoming an assistant coach at United States International University in San Diego in 1979. He served under Athletic Director and former Chargers' head coach Sid Gillman and head coach Tom Walsh (Raiders). He also coached the secondary at Boise State (1980), Long Beach State (1981), Utah (1982), Kansas (1983) and Iowa State (1984).

He entered the professional coaching ranks in 1985, coaching the defensive backs for the USFL's Los Angeles Express. He returned to the collegiate level that fall, joining Mike Gottfried's staff at Kansas. He followed Gottfried to Pittsburgh in 1986 as defensive coordinator.

John William Fox was born Feb. 8, 1955, in Virginia Beach, Virginia. He grew up in the San Diego area and attended Castle Park High in Chula Vista. He was an all-CIF cornerback and also played wide receiver for the Trojans. He went on to play two years at Southwestern Junior College in Chula Vista (1974-75) before finishing his career as a defensive back at San Diego State, 1976-77. He was graduated with a bachelors degree in physical education and earned a secondary education teaching credential in 1977. John and his wife, Robin, have three sons — Matthew (June 5, 1987), Mark (Dec. 4, 1990), and Cody (Feb. 21, 1992) — and reside in Del Mar, California.



RALPH FRIEDGEN

Tight Ends & H-Backs/

Running Game Coordinator

Friedgen brought 23 years of collegiate coaching experience to the Chargers Jan. 11, 1992, when Bobby Ross assigned him to coordinate the running game and coach the tight ends and H-backs. This is his seventeenth season in which he has coached alongside Ross, including five seasons each at The Citadel (1973-77), Maryland (1982-86) and Georgia Tech (1987-91).

Most recently at Georgia Tech, Friedgen (pronounced "FREE-gin") served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach and was in complete charge of the offense, including play-calling. In 1990, he directed a Tech offense that was the highest scoring team in school history during the modern era, averaging over 30 points and almost 400 yards per game. Five of Tech's offensive players earned all-Atlantic Coast Conference recognition, including quarterback Shawn Jones, who is among Tech's all-time passing leaders after

just two seasons.

Friedgen, 46, also was the offensive coordinator and line coach under Ross at Maryland. Friedgen has been credited with much of the Terrapins' offensive firepower which produced more than 28 points per game and helped Maryland win three Atlantic Coast Conference titles and play in four bowl games.

He spent the first three seasons at The Citadel as defensive line coach under Ross before becoming the offensive coordinator and line coach.

When Ross jumped to the NFL in 1978, Friedgen stayed at The Citadel through the 1979 season before going to William & Mary (1980), where he also was offensive coordinator, and then on to Murray State (1981), where he was the team's assistant head coach. He rejoined Ross in 1982 at Maryland.

Ralph Harry Friedgen was born April 4, 1947, in Harrison, New York. He played quarterback and linebacker for the Harrison High Huskies in Harrison where his father, Ralph E. Friedgen, has been the head coach the past 29 years. He is a 1969 graduate of Maryland and was named academic all-ACC in 1967-68 as a guard. Ralph graduated with a degree in Physical Education. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Roy Lester at Maryland in 1969 while he was earning a Master's degree in Psychology of Sports. Ralph and his wife, Gloria, have three children, Kelley (April 10, 1977), and Kristina (March 19, 1986), and Katharine (Feb. 21, 1988). The Friedgen's reside in Poway.

DALE LINDSEY

Linebackers

16th NFL Season

Lindsey has 19 years of coaching experience, nine years of NFL playing experience and brings a wealth of knowledge and expertise from a career which spans eleven stops

in four professional leagues as well as the collegiate and high school levels. He joined Bobby Ross' staff Jan. 13, 1992.

After retiring in 1973 from a nine-year playing career as a middle linebacker with the Cleveland Browns (1965-73), Lindsey, 50, jumped right into the coaching ranks when he became the linebackers coach of the Browns in 1974. He landed in the World Football League in 1975 with the Portland Storm before he spent two seasons (1977-78) as the head coach at Warren Central High School in Bowling Green, Kentucky. He returned the professional ranks in 1979, this time with Toronto of the Canadian Football League, and coached the Argonauts' linebackers through the 1982 season. His coaching career took him into his fourth professional league when the United States Football League kicked off in 1983. He coached linebackers for the Boston Breakers (1983) and was the defensive coordinator for the New Jersey Generals (1984-85). Lindsey returned to the National Football League in 1986 and served as the Green Bay Packers' linebackers coach through the 1987 season before following head coach Forrest Gregg to Southern Methodist University in 1988 where he served as defensive coordinator, 1988-89. The NFL called once again in 1990 and Lindsey spent the 1990 season as the defensive line coach of the New England Patriots. He coached the linebackers for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1991 before joining the Chargers.

Phillip Dale Lindsey was born Jan. 18, 1943, in Bedford, Indiana, and grew up in Bowling Green, Kentucky. He participated in football, basketball and track at Bowling Green High. He was a first-team Little all-America selection as a senior linebacker at Western Kentucky and was twiced named all-Ohio Valley Conference. Dale was inducted this year into the Western Kentucky Hall of Fame. He was drafted by both the NFL Cleveland Browns (seventh round) and the AFL New York Jets in 1965 before signing with the Browns. Dale and his wife, Eva, have five children — Blan (Sept. 6, 1963), Jennifer (March 6, 1965), Kim (July 19, 1967), Johnny (Sept. 25, 1973), and Derek (May 29, 1975) — and reside in the Rancho Bernardo district of San Diego.



CARL MAUCK

Offensive Line

23rd NFL Season

6th Season with Chargers

Mauck is in the midst of his second season on the Chargers' coaching staff since joining Bobby Ross' crew Jan. 11, 1992, but his name is familiar to San Diegans who remember his four-year stint as the team's starting center, 1971-74. Mauck's NFL playing career spanned 13 seasons (1969-81) and now he is in his tenth season as an assistant coach in the NFL.

Mauck's 1992 line led a ground game which gained 192 yards versus Kansas City in the AFC Wild Card game and 11 games of more than 100 yards. It also allowed just seven sacks in the last seven regular-season games.

Mauck (pronounced "Mock"), 46, most recently served as the offensive line coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1991 after two years in the lumber business in Missouri (1989-90).

Mauck immediately jumped to the coaching ranks after retiring as a player in 1982. His former head coach, Bum Phillips, named him to his coaching staff in New Orleans in 1982. After four years (1982-85) as the Saints' offensive line coach, Mauck spent three seasons coaching the offensive line of the Kansas City Chiefs (1986-88).

During his 13-year playing career, Mauck started 155 consecutive games and played in 156 straight contests at center. He was a thirteenth-round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts in 1969. After one season with the Colts, he played in Miami in 1970 before being traded to the Chargers in 1971 for tackle Tony Liscio and a draft choice. Mauck started four seasons for the Chargers, 1971-74, before being traded to Houston for guard Booker Brown and the right to cornerback Benny Johnson. He was the Oilers' starting center until his retirement after the 1981 season. Mauck earned UPI and Associated Press all-Pro honors following the 1979 season. He anchored an offensive line which opened holes for Hall of Fame running back Earl Campbell and also started in seven playoff games.

Carl Frey Mauck was born July 7, 1947, in McLeansboro, Illinois, where he graduated from Township High. He continued his athletic career at Southern Illinois University where he played both line-backer and center. He also played basketball as a freshman alongside former NBA great Walt Frazier. Mauck graduated with honors in 1969, earning a degree in business management, and is enshrined in the Southern Illinois University Sports Hall of Fame. Carl and his wife, Vicki, have four children — Tim (Aug. 24, 1972), Chrissy (Aug. 10, 1974); Teresa (Nov. 11, 1976), and Cathy (Feb. 8, 1980) — and reside in San Clemente, California.

On Jan. 6, 1992, Misciagna became the first assistant coach named to Bobby Ross' staff. The 37-year-old New York native breaks down game tape of both the Chargers and their opponents and supplies computer analysis for the staff's game-plan preparation.

Misciagna (Mi-SHAG-nuh) first joined Ross in 1982. He had worked at Maryland since 1979 when he was a graduate assistant working with wide receivers. When Ross became Maryland's head coach in 1982, Misciagna became recruiting coordinator and continued those duties under head coach John Krivak in 1988. He returned to Ross' staff at Georgia Tech in 1989 as Director of Recruiting and as a volunteer assistant coach. Misciagna served the 1991 season as Director of Football Operations at Georgia Tech.

He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant offensive line coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (1976-77) and as a graduate assistant coach for wide receivers and defensive backs at

GEORGE O'LEARY

Defensive Line

O'Leary was Bobby Ross' defensive coordinator for five seasons at Georgia Tech (1987-91) before joining Ross in San Diego Jan. 11, 1992, as the team's defensive line coach. He is in his twenty-sixth year of coaching on either the prep, collegiate or professional levels.

Under O'Leary, the defensive line made huge strides in 1992. The Chargers increased their sack total from 28 in 1991 to 51 last season, the fourth-highest total in team history. The line accounted for 44.5 of the 51 sacks, including a career-high 17 for Leslie O'Neal and 10 for Chris Mims who tied for the lead among all rookies.

O'Leary served five seasons at Georgia Tech under Ross as the team's defensive coordinator and defensive line coach. The Ramblin' Wreck defense was consistently ranked among the top 20 in the nation during O'Leary's tenure. His 1990 nationally-ranked defense opened the season with a streak of 19 quarters without allowing a touchdown. Overall, Tech was ranked 11th nationally in scoring defense, 13th in passing efficiency defense, 15th in rushing defense, and 14th in total defense. O'Leary coached 10 all-ACC honorees, including four first-team picks in 1990 in Ken Swilling, Marco Coleman, Willie Clay and Calvin Tiggler.

He coached the defensive line for seven years (1979-86) at Syracuse and was elevated to assistant head coach under Dick McPherson for the final two seasons. He helped the Orangemen to rank fourth in the nation in rushing defense in 1985 and earn a Cherry Bowl berth, where they fell to Bobby Ross' Maryland team.

Prierer joined the Chargers Jan. 6, 1992, and is in charge of all of San Diego's special teams' units. He followed head coach Bobby Ross to the Chargers from Georgia Tech where he coached the defensive backfield five seasons, 1987-91. He uses his experience to assist with the Chargers' secondary. Prior to joining Ross at Georgia Tech, Prierer spent the 1986 season as the defensive coordinator at Kent State.

Last season the Chargers' kickoff coverage team ranked sixth in

the NFL and the opponent's average starting field position after kickoff was the 21.5-yard line, fourth best in the League. Punter John Kidd had the best average of his career (42.6) and the second best net average (36.4). John Carney set a club record with 26 field goals.

While at Tech, he formulated a pass defense which ranked number one in the nation for several weeks during both the 1988 and 1990 seasons. The Ramblin' Wreck's pass defense was ranked eighth in the nation in 1991 and ranked in the top 15 three times. Priefer coached one-time Chargers defensive back Sammy Lilly, all-ACC cornerbacks Cedric Stallworth (1988) and Willie Clay (1990-91), and two-time first-team all-ACC safety Ken Swilling.

Priefer brought NFL coaching experience with him from two seasons as the special teams coach for the Green Bay Packers, 1984-85, where he also assisted with the linebackers. Under Priefer in 1984, the Packers' kickoff coverage team led the NFL by allowing just 16.0-yards a return and the special teams finished with the top average ranking in the NFC Central Division.

Reilly was the only coach retained by head coach Bobby Ross in 1992 from the previous coaching staff. He coordinates the Chargers'

passing game, coaches the quarterbacks and calls the offensive plays. He originally joined the Chargers Feb. 8, 1990, and brought his expertise in the passing game to San Diego as an offensive assistant for two seasons (1990-91) after making the jump from the collegiate ranks.

Reilly has been instrumental in the development of young quarterbacks for the Chargers. In 1991 he tutored John Friesz through 16 starts after the first-year passer had played just one previous NFL game. After a knee injury to Friesz in the first preseason game last year, Reilly quickly prepared Stan Humphries after the newcomer arrived just two weeks before the season. His passing-game expertise paid off as the Chargers jumped from twenty-fourth to seventh in the NFL in passing offense and Humphries was named a first alternate to the AFC Pro Bowl squad.

Before joining the Chargers, Reilly served the previous five seasons, 1985-89, as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the University of Utah. Under Reilly's guidance, the Utes led the nation in passing offense with 395.9 yards a game and total offense with 526.8 yards a game. Utah's passing game ranked second in the nation in 1989 and third in 1987. Utah quarterback Scott Mitchell set 10 NCAA records, five conference records, and 24 school marks under Reilly before foregoing his senior season and coming to the NFL in 1990.

Reilly coached five years at El Camino Junior College, 1980-84, serving as head coach his final three seasons and posting a 19-10 record. While at El Camino, he coached three junior college all-

The club's senior receiver, Anthony Miller, had his best season since 1989 while leading the AFC with 1,060 yards. Nate Lewis had a career-high 580 yards and 17.1-yard average in his third season while Shawn Jefferson blossomed with 29 catches for 377 yards in his sophomore year.

Sullivan spent the 1991 season coaching the receivers at Ohio State. He had a successful seven-year stint as the wide receivers coach at Louisiana State University, 1984-90, and served under head coach Bill Arnsparger his first three seasons, 1984-86. His list of prize pupils included two-time all-America Wendell Davis. In addition to Davis, Sullivan also tutored Tony Moss, Eric Martin and Todd Kinchen who, with Davis, rank as the top four receivers in LSU history. He was part of an LSU program which won Southeast Conference titles in 1986 and '88.

Sullivan began his collegiate coaching career in 1971 as a graduate assistant at Kansas State. He was elevated to a full-time position before going to Texas Tech in 1973 as coach of the Red Raiders' freshmen and tight ends. 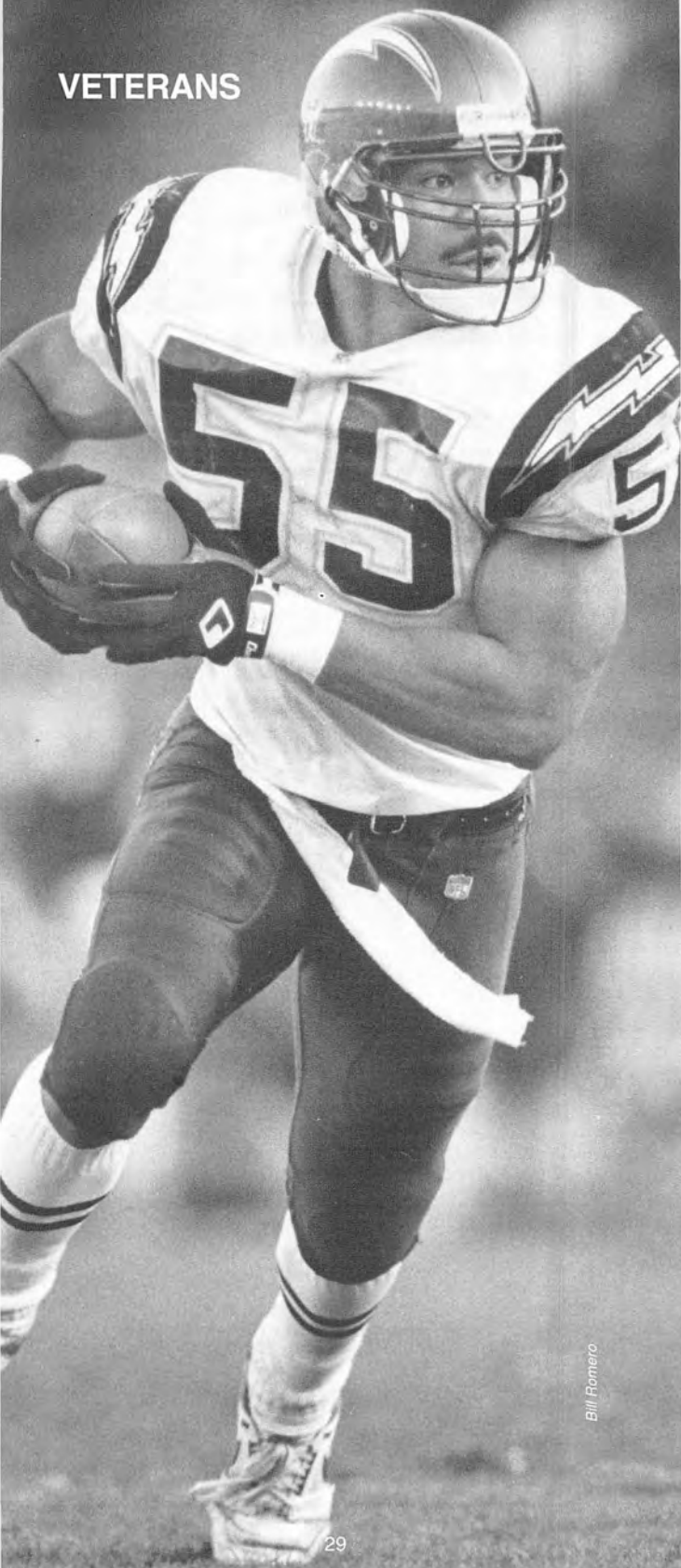

It recorded three interceptions and four sacks. Miller caught nine passes for 142 yards and two touchdowns. It was his first 100-yard game since Nov. 10, 1991, and his nine receptions tied a career high. The Chargers did not allow a turnover. Marion Butts re-aggravated a knee injury and was replaced on Rod Bernstine who gained 74 yards.

The Chargers turned in their second victory in a row with a 34-14 win over the Colts in Indianapolis. The 34 points by San Diego are twice its previous season high of 17 points scored the game before. With 20 points in the second half, it doubled its total from the second half of the first five games. Running back Rod Bernstine, making his first start of 1992 for an injured Marion Butts, scored touchdowns on runs of 25 and two yards on the team's first two possessions. Stan Humphries hit Nate Lewis on a 62-yard pass play to set up the second score. San Diego led, 14-7, at the half after gaining 242 yards. Bernstine gained 91 yards and Humphries hit eight of 10 passes in the first half. In the second half, the defense forced three fumbles and picked off its second pass of the game. Sunday, Oct. 25

The Chargers made it three wins in a row with a big, 24-21 win over the Division-leading Broncos in front of 53,576 fans in San Diego. It marks the first three-game winning streak since Games 8-10 in 1990. The teams traded touchdowns in the first half. Stan Humphries connected with Anthony Miller on a 38-yard touchdown in the first quarter and John Elway hit Mark Jackson from 32 yards out to tie the score, 7-7, at the half. San Diego outgained Denver in the half, 231 yards to 143 yards. Humphries was 11 of 15 for 183 yards in the half, including five completions for 107 yards to Miller. The Chargers notched touchdowns on their first two possessions of the second half. Humphries hit tight end Derrick Walker on a 59-yard catch and run to set up the first score — a two-yard run by Humphries, his second in as many games. Gill Byrd intercepted Elway on the Broncos' next drive and Walker caught a 27-yard scoring pass three plays later. Denver came back to tighten the score, 21-14, before Byrd intercepted Elway again to set up a 37-yard John Carney field goal. Denver kept the pressure on with another touchdown to make the score 24-21. But Anthony Blaylock intercepted Elway with 3:10 left in the game and San Diego ran out the clock by gaining two big first downs. San Diego gained a season-high 434 yards, including 334 yards passing. Humphries had the top day of his career. It's a career-high yardage total (349 yards) for the quarterback and the best passing percentage (20 of 27, .741) by a San Diego passer in a non-strike game since Dan Fouts completed 24 of 31 passes (.774) Nov. 30, 1986. Anthony Miller had his second 100-yard receiving effort of 1992 (6-129), eleventh of his career, and Derrick Walker had a career-best performance (4-104). It was the first time two San Diego players have gained 100-or-more yards receiving in a game since Wes Chandler and Charlie Joiner did it Dec. 8, 1985. Byrd's two interceptions led to 10 points and gives him nine against Elway in his career. Junior Seau returned after missing Game 6 and led the team with 10 tackles and two passes defended.

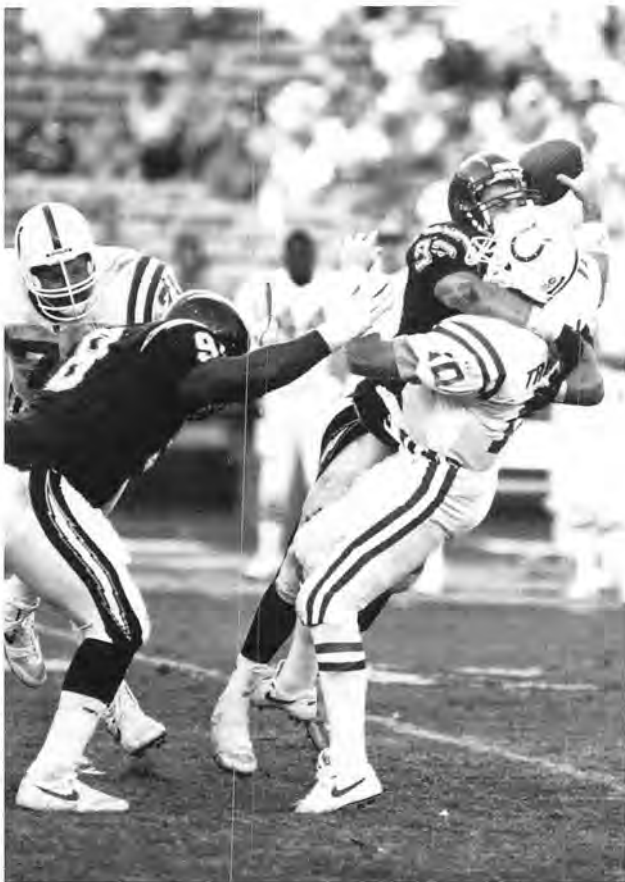

The Chargers defeated the Bengals, 27-10, to become the first team in NFL history to earn a winning record after starting the season with four-straight losses. San Diego's offense clicked early when it took the game's first possession and marched 77 yards in 14 plays and took a 3-0 lead on a 21-yard field goal. But the Bengals struck quickly with an 83-yard catch and run for a touchdown on their first play from scrimmage. An interception in the second quarter gave the ball to Cincinnati, who turned the miscue into three points on a 48-yard field goal. Down 10-3 with 1:34 left in the half, Stan Humphries led the team on a near-perfect, 75-yard drive on seven plays and tied the score on an 11-yard toss to Anthony Miller. Humphries completed six of seven passes in the drive. The Chargers outgained the Bengals in the half, 262 yards to 138, and controlled the ball 21:51 to Cincinnati's 8:09. Humphries completed 14 of 19 passes for 162 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions in the half. San Diego jumped out, 27-10, by scoring on its first three possessions. The team marched 66 yards on the first possession and interceptions on the next two Cincinnati series led to scores. The ground game produced 161 yards rushing and the offense notched 7.2 yards per play, a season high. The defense recorded four sacks, 1.5 each by Leslie O'Neal and Burt Grossman, and two interceptions.

The Chargers clinched their first playoff berth since 1982 with a 36-14 decision over the Raiders in Los Angeles. It was the most points in a game by San Diego since it scored 38 in Game 15 last year. The Chargers scored on in all five of their first-half possessions. The defense held the Raiders to three offensive plays in the each of their first three possessions. John Carney hit a club-record five field goals in the game. Leslie O'Neal became the team's all-time leading sacker when he notched one sack to raise his career total to 67.5 sacks, surpassing Gary Johnson's 67 sacks. San Diego doubled the Raiders' yardage output, 332 yards to 167 yards. The defense notched three interceptions and four sacks. The offense did not suffer a turnover. The offensive line led the rushing attack to 104 yards, the team's tenth 100-yard effort this year and fourth time in the last five games. at San Diego 17, Kansas City 0

Saturday, Jan. 2

San Diego defeated the Kansas City Chiefs, 17-0, in the AFC Wild Card playoffs in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium. It marked the first shutout in the history of Wild Card games. It also was the first shutout by the Chargers over Kansas City and the first time the Chiefs have been shut out in a non-strike game since 1985. The two defensive powerhouses battled to a scoreless first half. The Chargers gained 130 total yards to the Chiefs' 122 yards in the half, but were sacked four times for 47 yards in losses. San Diego hit the scoreboard first when Marion Butts dashed up the middle a career-long 54 yards for a touchdown. On the Chiefs' first play of their next possession, a tipped pass by Blaise Winter was intercepted by Leslie O'Neal to set up a 34-yard John Carney field goal. Up 10-0 in the fourth quarter, the Chargers put together an 11-play, 91-yard drive and culminated the series with a five-yard scoring plunge by Steve Hendrickson. The Chargers gained 192 yards on the ground, the second-most productive effort of the 1992 season. The defense harrassed the Chiefs' passing game into two interceptions and sacked Dave Krieg seven times to tie a season high. Burt Grossman had 2.5 sacks and O'Neal and Shawn Lee each had two.

The first Chargers' game ever played in San Diego was August 6, 1961, in Balboa Stadium (San Diego 27, Houston 14).

Aug. 14—First meeting of proposed football league is held in Chicago with representatives of six teams, including Los Angeles entry headed by Barron Hilton.

Aug. 22—Second meeting is held in Dallas with announcement that league will be known as "American Football League".

March 20—Owner Barron Hilton unveils Chargers uniforms, blue and gold with lightning bolts on sides of helmets and trousers, at cocktail party at Hilton's Santa Monica residence; players Jack Kemp and Ron Mix model uniforms.

April 9-12—A total of 207 candidates is reduced to three who are invited back to summer training camp after four-day tryout camp in Burbank.

June 9—AFL teams sign five-year contract with American Broadcasting Company for televising of selected games.

July 1—General manager Frank Leahy resigns because of poor health.

July 8—Chargers open training camp at Chapman College, Orange, 30 miles Southeast of Los Angeles.

July 9—Sid Gillman assumes dual role of coach and general manager.

Aug. 6—Paul Lowe returns opening kickoff 105 yards for a touchdown as Chargers defeat New York Titans 27-7 before 27,778 persons in Los Angeles Coliseum in first preseason game.

Sept. 10—The Chargers overcome 20-7 deficit in fourth quarter to defeat Dallas 21-20 before 17,724 persons in Coliseum in opening league game.

Dec. 10—A crowd of 9,928 persons in Coliseum watches Chargers top Denver 41-33 to clinch AFL Western Division title.

Dec. 23—Hilton says he will accept invitation to visit San Diego regarding a possible move of Chargers from Los Angeles.

1961

Jan. 1—A crowd of 32,183 in Jeppesen Stadium and a national television audience sees host Houston defeat Chargers 24-16 for AFL championship.

Jan. 6—Civic leaders form Greater San Diego Sports Association to attract major-league sports following Hilton's visit.

Feb. 10—AFL gives Hilton formal approval to move Chargers to San Diego.

May 1—Construction begins on enlarging Balboa Stadium, where the San Diego Chargers will play home games, from 23,000 to 34,000 by building an upper deck.

July 22—The Chargers open training camp at University of San Diego.

Aug. 6—Balboa Stadium is reminiscent of ancient Roman ruins as Chargers defeat Houston 27-14 on a 93-degree afternoon before paid crowd of 12,304 persons (total attendance estimated at 15,000) in first preseason game.

Nov. 19—Chargers defeat Dallas 24-14 to clinch AFL West title with 5 games remaining; Charlie McNeil makes club's forty-third pass interception, a professional record.

Dec. 17—The Chargers lose to Boston 41-0 in Balboa Stadium but Dick Harris intercepts Babe Parilli's pass to Gino Cappelletti for Chargers' forty-ninth of season.

Dec. 24—Houston defeats Chargers 10-3 before 29,556 persons in Balboa Stadium to win second AFL championship.

1962

Jan. 7—West defeats East 47-27 in Balboa Stadium in first AFL All-Star game, featuring Chargers coaches and 11 players.

July 16—Chargers open training camp at USD.

Dec. 16—A 26-17 loss to Dallas marks the end of a 4-10 season for the Chargers, who saw 23 players miss at least 2 games with injuries.

1963

Jan. 13—Chargers Earl Faison is named outstanding defensive player as West defeats East 21-14 in AFL All-Star game before 27,641 persons in Balboa Stadium.

April 30—Barron Hilton and his father, Conrad, sell one-third of their interest in the Chargers to San Diego businessmen John Mabee, George Perricano, Kenneth Swanson, James Copley, and M.L. Bengston of Los Angeles.

July 10—The Chargers open their training camp at Rough Acres Ranch, located near Boulevard, a hamlet of 100 persons in the mountains of East San Diego County, 60 miles from the city.

Dec. 22—Eight Chargers score and Paul Lowe rushes for 183 yards and two touchdowns on 17 carries as the Chargers clinch AFL West title with 58-20 victory over Denver; season ended week later than scheduled after AFL postponed games weekend following Nov. 22 assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

1964

Jan. 5—Keith Lincoln accounts for 349 yards total offense as Chargers win AFL championship, defeating Boston 51-10, before 30,127 persons in Balboa Stadium.

Jan. 19—Lincoln is named MVP after gaining 121 yards in 14 carries as West defeats East 27-14 in front of 20,016 persons in AFL All-Star game in Balboa Stadium.

Jan. 29—AFL teams sign a five-year television contract with National Broadcasting Company for a record \$36 million; the contract will commence with the 1965 season.

July 15—The Chargers open training camp at the Travelodge in Escondido.
Oct. 3—The Chargers and New York Jets tied 17-17 before a record AFL crowd of 50,222 persons, 46,828 paid in New York's Shea Stadium.
Nov. 26—A Balboa Stadium attendance record of 34,865 is set as Buffalo defeats San Diego 27-24 on Thanksgiving Day.
Dec. 6—The Chargers defeat the Jets 38-3 before 25,753 persons in Balboa Stadium to clinch their fourth AFL West title in five years.
Dec. 26—With wide receiver Lance Alworth out of the game with a knee injury and fullback Keith Lincoln sidelined in the first quarter with a fractured rib, the Chargers are beaten 20-7 in Buffalo for the AFL championship.

1965

Jan. 16—Fullback Keith Lincoln runs 80 yards for one touchdown and combines on a 73-yard pass play for a touchdown as the West defeats the East 38-14 in the AFL All-Star game before 15,446 persons at Houston's Jeppesen Stadium. The game, originally moved from San Diego to New Orleans, was switched to Houston on one day's notice after black players experienced mistreatment in New Orleans.
April 27—The San Diego City Council endorses construction of a multipurpose stadium in Mission Valley and drops the idea of a floating stadium in Mission Bay.
May 17—The City Council approves expenditure of \$750,000 for architectural and engineering drawings of a 50,000-seat stadium at the Southwest corner of Friars Road and Murphy Canyon Road in Mission Valley.
July 14—The Chargers open their Escondido training camp.
Nov. 2—Construction of a \$27-million San Diego Stadium is authorized by a 73 percent "yes" vote by San Diego citizens.
Dec. 12—San Diego wins fifth AFL West title in six years by winning in Houston 37-26.
Dec. 23—Paul Lowe and Lance Alworth finish 1-2 in balloting by players for AFL player of the year.
Dec. 24—Groundbreaking ceremonies are conducted for San Diego Stadium.
Dec. 26—Buffalo defeats the Chargers 23-0 in front of 30,361 persons in Balboa Stadium for the AFL championship; a new automobile, the "Charger", is introduced by Chrysler officials at halftime.

1966

Jan. 15—The AFL All-Stars beat the Buffalo Bills, 30-19, as Lance Alworth catches two touchdown passes and Chargers' linebacker Frank Buncom is defensive player of the game before a crowd of 35,572 persons in Houston's Rice Stadium.
Jan. 18—Tight end Dave Kocourek, guard Ernest Park, and defensive backs Dick Westmoreland and Jimmy Warren are selected from San Diego by Miami in the allocation draft to stock the new AFL franchise during league meeting in Houston.
June 8—AFL and National Football League teams announce plans to merge in the 1970 season and Chargers and Los Angeles Rams announce they will play three preseason games in San Diego Stadium, beginning in 1967.
July 8—The Chargers report to training camp in Escondido.
Aug. 25—Eugene V. Klein of Beverly Hills heads a group of 21 business executives who purchase the Chargers for \$10 million, a record transaction in professional football.

1967

July 10—The Chargers report to their Escondido training camp.
Aug. 20—San Diego Stadium is dedicated before a crowd of 45,988 persons; Detroit defeats the Chargers 38-17 in San Diego's first meeting with an NFL team.
Oct. 15—Leslie (Speedy) Duncan has 203 yards in returns, 35 on a fumble recovery for a touchdown, 68 on four kickoff returns, and 100 for a touchdown on the longest interception return in AFL history as the Chargers defeated Kansas City 45-31 in a game in which teams combined for 897 yards total offense and 622 in returns.
Dec. 3—The Chargers are beaten by Oakland 41-21 before the first sellout crowd in the Stadium, 52,661 persons, and 2,018 persons also watched the game on closed-circuit television in the San Diego Sports Arena.

1968

July 5—The Chargers open training camp in Escondido.
Aug. 3—The Chargers open the preseason at home and score their first victory over an NFL team, defeating San Francisco 30-18 before 39,553 in San Diego Stadium.
Nov. 24—Leslie (Speedy) Duncan sets an AFL record with a 95-yard punt return for a touchdown in a 37-15 loss to the New York Jets in San Diego Stadium.

1969

July 11—The Chargers open training camp at the University of California at Irvine, 85 miles north of San Diego.
Sept. 28—The Chargers defeat the defending Super Bowl III champion New York Jets before a record San Diego Stadium crowd of 54,042 persons.
Nov. 14—Offensive backfield coach Charlie Waller is named head coach following the resignation of Sid Gillman, who is suffering from stomach ulcer and chest hernia. Gillman continues as general manager.
Dec. 14—Lance Alworth sets a professional record with a pass reception in his ninety-sixth consecutive game; the Chargers finish with an 8-6 record and a 45-6 victory over Buffalo.

1970

Jan. 17—John Hadl completes 18 of 26 passes for 224 yards and 1 touchdown and leads the West to a 26-3 victory over the East in the final AFL All-Star game before 30,170 persons in the Houston Astrodome.
July 15—The Chargers open training camp at the University of California at Irvine.
Sept. 27—Smoke and ashes from a huge fire in San Diego's East County darken the skies over San Diego Stadium as John Hadl huris touchdown of 65 yards to Jeff Queen and 37 yards to Lance Alworth in the final 5:18 of play, giving the Chargers a 27-27 tie with Oakland.

March 28—Former Chargers great Lance Alworth is inducted into San Diego Hall of Fame at the Balboa Park Hall of Champions.

July 12—The Chargers report to their Irvine training camp.

Sept. 5—The Chargers trade defensive tackle George Wright to Cleveland for a 1973 fifth-round draft choice, climaxing a 221-day period in which general manager-coach Harland Svare consummated 21 trades, an NFL record.

Dec. 3—The Chargers outgain Oakland 440 yards to 298 and Mike Garrett rushes for 145 yards in 28 carries but lose 21-19 before a record San Diego Stadium crowd of 54,611.

1973

Jan. 22—The Chargers obtain quarterback immortal John Unitas from Baltimore.

Jan. 25—In the second stage of the Unitas acquisition, the Chargers trade quarterback John Hadl to Los Angeles for defensive end Lander McCoy Bacon and running back Bob Thomas.

July 11—The Chargers begin training camp at UC Irvine.

Sept. 30—Unitas' 30-yard pass completion to Mike Garrett against Cincinnati in San Diego makes Unitas the first quarterback to pass for more than 40,000 yards.

Nov. 5—Harland Svare remains as general manager after resigning as head coach; Ron Waller appointed interim head coach.

1974

Jan. 8—Tommy Prothro is named the fifth head coach of the Chargers; the announcement is made by President Gene Klein.

Jan. 29—Prothro's first significant trade sends Walt Sweeney, 32-year-old former all-pro guard who played in 154 consecutive games for the Chargers, to Washington for a draft choice.

July 3—The Chargers open training camp at a new base, U.S. International University, 9 miles North of San Diego Stadium.

Sept. 29—Rookie Don Woods, claimed on waivers 12 days before from Green Bay, rushes for 157 yards in 18 carries and scores on a 56-yard run but defending Super Bowl VIII champion Miami scores 21 points in the final 11 minutes for a 28-21 victory.

Aug. 21—The Chargers complete their international trip with a 17-16 loss to San Francisco in Honolulu.

Sept. 28—The Chargers explode for 27 points in the second quarter and demolish St. Louis 43-24 for a 3-0 start, their best since 1968.

Oct. 25—John Roveto's 26-yard field goal after 9:30 of overtime gives Chicago a 20-17 victory over the Chargers in Soldier Field.

Nov. 29—Ernie Ladd and Walt Sweeney, stars of the sixties, are inducted into the Chargers' Hall of Fame at halftime of the Denver game.

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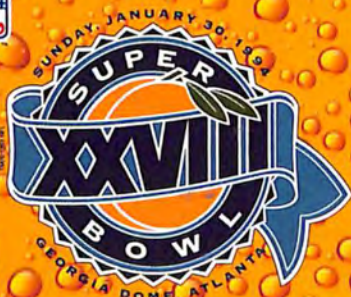
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
