### **ALEX G. SPANOS**



### Chairman of the Board

Alex G. Spanos transformed a modest business venture into a corporate giant ranked at the top of the national construction industry. As the founder and chairman of A.G. Spanos Companies, the nation's largest family-owned construction company, his commitment to excellence, quality and integrity are imprinted in the daily operation and management of the 12 companies which are wholly owned and managed by the Spanos family.

The success of the A.G. Spanos Companies allowed him to realize many dreams in his lifetime, including owning a National Football League team.

In 1984 when Spanos was offered the opportunity to purchase the Chargers, he put the decision to a vote before the Companies' board of directors.

"The vote was 10 to two not to buy the ball club," he recalls. But the chairman used his veto power to overrule. "I told them, When you turn 60 you'll understand."

"I always believed in the pursuit of one's dreams,"" Spanos characteristically said in announcing his intention to buy the team. "For me, it has been a lifelong goal to own an NFL team. In buying the San Diego Chargers, I've been able to realize a dream." On Aug. 1, 1984, the dream became reality.

Throughout his ownership, Spanos has moved with strength and vision to build a solid foundation for success. The hiring of General Manager Bobby Beathard, one of the most respected football men in the NFL, was hailed around the league. He has given Beathard the freedom to aggressively pursue and sign the top players in football, annually spending the limit of the NFL salary cap.

Spanos' commitment and value to the NFL was recognized when NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue named him to the League's Expansion and Realignment Committee in 1991. He also serves on the League's Legislative Committee and the NFL Properties Executive Committee.

Prior to the 1994 season, Spanos turned over the day-to-day management of the organization to his son, Dean, but remains active in all business related to the team. This new role enables him to fully enjoy being the number-one fan of the Chargers and San Diego.

Throughout his storied life, Spanos has remained centered in his belief in family values and giving back to the community.

Though one of the nation's most productive corporate businesses, the A.G. Spanos organization continues as a family-run operation. The family works as a unit with trust and confidence in each other to guide the direction and actions of the company. Eldest son Dean serves as President/Vice Chairman of the Chargers and the Spanos corporate organization as well as Vice Chairman of AGS Financial. Son Michael manages the construction and development activities in the western and southeastern divisions of the company and is the Executive Vice President of the Chargers. Together, they are the driving force behind each business venture.

Spanos' belief in giving back to the community have paid countless dividends to San Diego. Most recently he and his son, Dean, committed to stay in San Diego through the year 2020 and were the driving forces behind the upgrades of Qualcomm Stadium.

"I've never been so happy," said Spanos after solidifying the team"s future in San Diego, "I love this city."

"The greatest feeling I've ever had in my career was watching the San Diego Chargers get to the Super Bowl," he added. "It was a tremendous accomplishment for this organization. What I enjoyed most was watching the fans enjoy it. The city deserved it. Our fans deserved it."

His dedication to the team and the City of San Diego has been evident throughout his ownership.

During the 1998 offseason, Spanos announced the creation of the Brooke Humphries Heart Fund in honor of retiring quarterback Stan Humphries. Daughter Brooke underwent major surgery to correct a heart birth defect.

Spanos is widely credited for using his influence with the NFL and its owners to land Super Bowl XXXII for the City of San Diego, which was played Jan. 25, 1998. The game brought close to \$300 million to the community. Spanos and his family kicked off Super Bowl week by chairing and contributing \$100,000 to the Children's Hospital Super Ball. During the festivities he contributed the same amount to the national Christmas in April program.

In 1995, the Alex G. Spanos San Diego

Foundation was created and funded by Spanos to "help San Diego build on its strenaths by supporting individuals. activities and organizations that work to make the city a better place to live." Simultaneously. Spanos announced that the first project of the Foundation would be a \$1.5 million donation to kick off the \$6.5 million fundraising effort for the San Diego Hall of Champions Sports Museum, for which he serves on the advisory board. With a focus on youth and education, Spanos and the Foundation have contributed millions of dollars to support San Diego charities and organizations.

"My family and I are proud to be a part of the San Diego community," said Spanos. "I'm very fortunate to be in a position to help the city and the people who have been so supportive of me, my family and the Chargers over the years."

In 1995, Spanos donated more than \$100,000 for the development of a multi-use sports facility for the Pacific Beach community and the students of Kate Sessions Elementary and The Bishops School. The Alex G. Spanos Sports Fields were dedicated in 1997.

His leadership was instrumental in bringing the 1996 Republican National Convention to San Diego, another financial coup for the city. In 1994, he kicked off a fundraising telethon for the San Diego Olympic Training Center with a \$100,000 pledge and challenge to the local community. His donation led to a successful effort to complete the first phase of the world-class facility in San Diego County.

Spanos has been a strong supporter of high school sports in San Diego. He annually sponsors the CIF San Diego Section football championships, allowing the games to be played in Qualcomm Stadium. His backing of the San Diego High School Sports Association and the San Diego County high school all-star football game led to the game being named the Alex Spanos All-Star Football Classic in 1993.

Spanos built the state-of-the-art Alex G. Spanos Athletic and Recreation Building at the University of California-San Diego where the Chargers hold summer training camp.

He has been a leading contributor to Children's Hospital and Health Center in San Diego, and served as chairman of their

first Miracle Network Telethon. He also has served as chairman of the San Diego County Easter Seals Telethon and the Loaned Executive campaign drive for United Way/CHAD.

Spanos' philanthropy extends across the globe.

Earlier this year Spanos' generosity paid off with separate \$1 million donations to three different institutions in California. His support of his alma mater. The University of the Pacific improved the stadium, athletic facilities and residence halls for the entire student polulation and lured the San Francisco 49ers' training camp to the school. A similar contribution to the facilities Sacramento State's athletic enabled that university to host the 2000 Olympic track and field trials. His support also went to rebuild the Samuel N. Hancock Christian School, a private school in an urban area of Stockton.

In 1997 he gave \$1 million to the American Red Cross to help flood victims in Northern California and promised to help raise an additional \$1 million.

Spanos drew national attention in 1996 when he came to the rescue of a California volunteer teacher who was stranded in a Cambodian hospital after being badly burned in an accident. After he learned that the woman had no money or insurance and was not receiving the proper medical care, he sent his private jet across the globe to bring her home.

Spanos spearheaded the top fundraising campaign during the Gulf War crisis and delivered the most successful fund-raising event in the history of the United Service Organization. In 1991, he chaired the U.S.O.'s Golden Anniversary Salute Luncheon which raised more than \$4.5 million.

Spanos also was the founder and driving force behind seven biennial fundraising "Evening of Elegance" dinners benefiting assorted children's charities including San Diego Children's Hospital and Health Center. Proceeds from the last "Evening of Elegance" held in 1985 topped the \$1 million mark.

Organizations in San Diego and across the country have honored Spanos for his generosity.

In 1995 Spanos was honored by the Greater San Diego Chamber of Commerce and the San Diego Convention and Visitors Bureau and received their Chairman's Award for his contributions to the city and community. He received the Golden Achievement Award from the San Diego Boys and Girls Clubs, the group's highest honor for community involvement and youth-related support. California Governor Pete Wilson presented the award to Spanos.

Recently Volunteers of America awarded Spanos the Marco Polo Award for his support of its volunteer initiative. Also this year he received the Warner Award from Pop. Warner Youth Football for "Excellence in athletics, scholarship and life's endeavors with integrity and humanity." The American Awards Foundation Cinema honored Spanos two years ago with the Gloria Swanson Humanitarian Award for "his numerous contributions to the arts and educational institutions as well as civic and athletic organizations." Former President Gerald Ford and his wife, Betty, presented the award.

In 1991, Spanos was invited by President George Bush to join him on a two-day goodwill trip to Greece and drew praise from the Chief Executive who singled him out as an American of Greek heritage who has achieved success in America. During an address to the Greek Parliament, Bush credited Spanos with making "a tremendous imprint in our country."

A son of Greek immigrants, Spanos' hard work and determination to succeed were recognized in 1986 when he was one of a select group of 80 Americans awarded the Ellis Island Medal of Honor by the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation and the New York Statue of Liberty Commission. In a special ceremony on Ellis Island, the honorees were cited for being "outstanding American citizens who have distinguished themselves in their respective fields of endeavor, while preserving the values of their particular heritage."

Spanos is Honorary Regent of the University of the Pacific and a Trustee of the Eisenhower Medical Center in Palm Springs. He was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree by the University of the Pacific on the same day he gave the commencement address to the 1984 graduating class. In 1989, he received the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith's National Distinguished Community Service Award for devotion to community and concern for others.

This long list of accomplishments and awards demonstrates the commitment of a man who has carved a remarkable career in business and whose dedication to family and community have been an inspiring example for others.

Spanos was born September 28, 1923, in Stockton, California. He developed his tireless work ethic early, starting as an eight-year-old in his father's restaurant, rising before dawn to help prepare pastries before attending school. In 1951, Spanos borrowed \$800, purchased a truck and set out on his own. He began his own catering business serving migrant farm workers in the San Joaquin Valley. Spanos later began investing in real estate and in 1960 formed the A.G. Spanos Construction Company.

Spanos is the founder and chairman of 11 companies bearing his name, including A.G. Spanos Construction, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Properties, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Management, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Development, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Enterprises, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Realty, Inc.; A.G. Spanos Marketing, Inc.; AGS Financial Corporation; A.G. Spanos Jet Center; A.G. Spanos Land Company and The Spanos Corporation.

Another side to this complex man was revealed with the help of his close friend Bob Hope. Spanos displayed an entertainer's talent and flair when he lived a childhood dream and danced on stage. Together, they sang and danced on numerous occasions both in the United States and abroad.

Spanos' acquisition of the Chargers culminated a lifelong interest and involvement in sports. He earned varsity letters in swimming and diving at the University of the Pacific in Stockton and later distinguished himself as an amateur golfer. Spanos was the first person ever to be on the winning teams in both the Bob Hope Desert Classic in Palm Desert (1977) and the Bob Hope British Pro-Am in Epsom, England (1980). In 1987 Spanos was inducted into the Stockton Athletic Hall of Fame.

This year Alex and his wife, Faye, are celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary on Saturday, Aug. 22. The couple has four children - Dean, Dea (Mrs. Ron Berberian), Alexis (Mrs. Barry Ruhl), and Michael - and 15 grandchildren. They maintain residences in Stockton and Palm Springs, California, and Tarpon Springs, Florida.

## **DEAN A. SPANOS**



### President/Vice Chairman

Dean Spanos has been overseeing the daily operation of the San Diego Chargers since he took over as President/Vice Chairman in 1994. His presence has been felt in every area of the organization and in the San Diego community since the day his family moved to La Jolla, California, in 1984.

After his father, Alex Spanos, purchased majority interest in the team on Aug. 1. 1984. Dean was the man behind the scenes for the Chargers while serving as President of all Spanos corporate entities and Vice Chairman of the AGS Financial Corporation. For the past 27 years, Dean has been working alongside his father in apartment construction and land development. He is responsible for all construction operations nationwide and all financial matters relating to the acquisition and development of projects for the Spanos organization. In addition to his role in the Spanos Corporation, Dean now carries the full burden of running the Chargers.

Spanos oversees the management and administration of personnel and all fiscal matters of the Chargers. He also plays a prominent role in league affairs and represents the team at all league meetings.

When Alex Spanos turned the Chargers over to his eldest son in January, 1994, he had just one request:

"I said to him, 'Deno, the ball club is yours,' " said Alex Spanos. " 'You run it the best way you know how. Whatever your needs are, just let me know. All I hope for is

to get to the playoffs. Now, could you imagine what a year we had. He took us to the Super Bowl in his first year."

General Manager Bobby Beathard is just as vocal in praising Dean's leadership and contributions.

"The guy that makes it all work for us is Deno." said Beathard.

Dean immediately took on the task of securing the Chargers' future in San Diego. He showed the Spanos family's commitment to San Diego by negotiating a new lease with the City extending through the year 2020. The agreement also refurbished Qualcomm Stadium and expanded the 32-year-old building to accommodate more than 71,000 fans. Spanos oversaw the plans and construction of the team's new practice facility, which is among the finest in the National Football League. The new facility was completed in August, 1997.

"This new lease ensures that both the Chargers and Qualcomm Stadium will always be the pride of our community," Dean said.

Through the Spanos family's focus on youth and education, Dean has taken every opportunity to bring students from throughout San Diego to the stadium to experience a Chargers game. In 1997 he purchased and contributed more than 40,000 Chargers tickets to deserving students for their achievements in school. Dean expects to double that number in 1998 through the Touchdowns for Youth Community Partnership for Education.

Dean is a major contributor throughout the San Diego business and civic community. He is on the board of directors of the San Diego International Sports Council, an elite group of San Diego business executives whose purpose is to promote and enhance sports of all kinds in San Diego. Dean also is on the board of the San Diego Economic Development Corporation as well as the San Diego Inner-City Games. He has been a major contributor and supporter of the American Cancer Society in San Diego and the United Way. Dean co-chaired the US WEST Cellular/San Diego Chargers Charity Classic benefiting Children's Hospital in

Dean's busy career in business and the National Football League hasn't hampered

his status as one of the nation's most successful amateur golfers. An avid golfer since his college years, he has been on the winning team in four Pro-Am tournaments. including back-to-back wins in 1990 at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and the AT&T National Pro-Am at Pebble Beach, where he teamed with Hubert Green. He was on the winning team at the Hope Classic again in 1991. Spanos and Green won the Bing Crosby Pro-Am at Pebble Beach in 1985. where Dean was awarded the "Most Valuable Amateur" trophy for supplying the most help to his professional partner. Also in 1985, he was on the winning team in the Senior Players Reunion Pro-Am in Dallas with Billy Casper.

Dean Alexander Spanos was born May 26, 1950, in Stockton. He was an outstanding member of the Lincoln High School golf team in Stockton. Dean received the Lincoln High Hall of Fame Award which honors alumni whose contributions and accomplishments are representative of the school.

He was recognized for his achievements in the areas of business and athletics. Dean continued his golfing career at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California, from which he received a degree in business administration in 1972. He maintains close ties with his alma mater, having served as a Regent at the University. Dean and his wife, Susie, reside in La Jolla, California, with their sons, Alexander Gus (July 2, 1978) and John Dean (Nov. 7, 1979). A.G. is a iunior business major at the University of Southern California. As a freshman he attended Tufts University in Medford, Mass., where he was a member of the football team. He received six varsity letters as a two-sport athlete (basketball and football) at La Jolla Country Day School. John is a freshman at Wake Forest University. While at The Bishops School in La Jolla, he earned nine varsity letters in a variety of sports, including football, basketball and golf, and played on three championship teams.

### **Executive Vice President**

Michael Spanos, the youngest son of Alex Spanos, and Executive Vice President of all the A.G. Spanos corporate entities, assumed the same position in the Chargers' management team in 1995.

Michael, 39, assists Chargers President/ Vice Chairman Dean Spanos in financial matters related to the ball club and relevant issues pertaining to the National Football League, which includes representing the Chargers at annual league meetings.

Michael has been an executive in the Spanos corporate organization for 18 years. He is responsible for all activities in construction, property management and land acquisition in the Southeast United States and Northern California. Born in Stockton, California, in 1959, he attended Lincoln High School and then the University of the Pacific, where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration.

In 1989, Michael was appointed to the Board of Regents at the University of the Pacific where he served for five years. He also served as a trustee on the Board of Dameron Hospital and is very active in the Greek Orthodox Church. He contributes both his time and resources to the church and many other charitable causes in his hometown of Stockton.

Michael and his wife, Helen, live with their children in Stockton.

### **BOBBY BEATHARD**



General Manager 36th NFL Season, 9th with Chargers

The Chargers will feature a new look in 1998 as Bobby Beathard enters his ninth season as the team's general manager.

Disappointed with last year's 4-12 record, Beathard and the Chargers' organization set out during the '98 offseason to strengthen the team in several key areas.

Through free agency, the Chargers' offense gained immediate help by adding two of the NFL's most-coveted veteran offensive linemen in left tackle John Jackson (Steelers) and left guard Aaron Taylor (Packers). San Diego also signed center-guard Roman Fortin (Falcons) for much needed stability and depth. The team's running game will get a boost with the return of running back Natrone Means, Diego's single-season who set San rushing record with 1,350 yards in the Chargers' 1994 Super Bowl season. Veteran wide receiver Webster Slaughter also will add valuable experience.

San Diego's defense and special teams will benefit thanks to the signing of line-backer Gerald Dixon, who led Cincinnati in 1997 with eight sacks while adding 22 tackles on special teams.

After quarterback Stan Humphries announced his retirement in February, San Diego was left without a proven quarterback, Beathard and his staff changed that by making one of the biggest trades in team history to move up to the second spot in the draft in order to select the quarterback who

will lead the Chargers into the new millenium — Washington State's Ryan Leaf.

To get Leaf, the Chargers traded their 1998 first-round (third overall) and second-round (32nd overall) and 1999 first-round picks, as well as wide receiver Eric Metcalf and linebacker Patrick Sapp, to Arizona to move up to the second spot in the draft.

"Everyone is excited," said Beathard after making the trade. "I don't think you get an opportunity to get a guy like this very often."

"I'm delighted," added Head Coach Kevin Gilbride. "We realize it was costly, but we all feel good about it."

"Man, I can't tell you how excited we are," said President/Vice Chairman Dean Spanos. "Everybody in the entire organization is ecstatic."

The Chargers also added invaluable NFL experience to their coaching ranks when Beathard and Gilbride recruited two of the league's most-respected coaches - June Jones and Joe Bugel, Jones, who was the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons from 1994-96, will be in charge of tutoring Leaf and the Chargers' quarterbacks. Bugel, has been a head coach who Oakland (1997) and Arizona (1990-93). was named the Chargers' offensive line coach, bringing his immense enthusiasm and reputation to aide the Chargers' offensive line.

In addition to acquiring new players and coaches in 1998, the Chargers have spent the past two years signing their top players to long-term deals. During the 1997 regular-season, perennial Pro Bowl linebacker Junior Seau was re-signed to a contract through the 2002 season, which made him the highest paid linebacker in NFL history at the time of deal.

In 1997 and 1998, the Chargers resigned several key players to multi-year contracts, including: Chargers Defensive Most Valuable Player safety Rodney Harrison, cornerback Dwayne Harper, linebacker Lew Bush, defensive tackle Reuben Davis, defensive end Raylee Johnson, running back Terrell Fletcher, tackles Tony Berti and Vaughn Parker, guard Troy Sienkiewicz and quarterback Craig Whelihan.

When Alex Spanos named Beathard general manager of the Chargers January 3, 1990, it brought hope to a city thirsting for a winner. He turned the NFL's oldest team of the 1970s — the Washington Redskins — into one of the most successful organizations of the 1980s. In just his third season in San Diego the organization won it's first AFC Western Division championship in more than a decade and, after five years, appeared in its first Super Bowl.

When the 1994 San Diego Chargers earned a trip to Super Bowl XXIX in Miami, Florida, it marked the seventh time a Beathard team has journeyed to the world championship. Four times his team has produced a Super Bowl victory.

duced a Super Bowl victory.

The 1966 Kansas City Chiefs...the 1972 and '73 Miami Dolphins...the 1982, '83 and '87 Washington Redskins...and the 1994 San Diego Chargers were all products of Beathard's handiwork. Though success has followed him through every step of his NFL career, Beathard remains one of the league's most low-key personalities.

He immediately set out in 1990 to bring top athletes with a winning attitude to San Diego. Acting with the same vitality and decisiveness that highlights his 36 years as an NFL talent evaluator, his judgment was on the mark in 1990 when seven players from his first draft in San Diego ended up in the starting lineup, including Pro Bowler Junior Seau. Each year, a majority of the team's draftees continue to make the team's roster. The trend continued in 1997 when five of the Chargers' eight draft picks saw game action as rookies.

Leveraging tomorrow to help today also is a Beathard trademark. Since coming to San Diego in 1990, he has traded a future number-one draft choice six times in nine

drafts, including twice in 1998.

In 1997, Beathard did not move up in the draft, but the feam's top choice, tight end Freddie Jones from North Carolina, made an immediate impact by starting eight of 13 games and catching 41 passes for 505 yards and two touchdowns. It was the most receptions and receiving yards by a Chargers tight end since Kellen Winslow had 53 catches for 519 yards in 1987.

In 1998, the draft-day trend continued when Beathard traded the team's first-round pick in 2000 for Tampa Bay's 1998 second-round pick for the right to select wide receiver Mikhael Ricks from Stephen F. Austin with the 59th overall choice in the draft. At 6-5, 237, Ricks gives the Chargers a prototypical, big NFL wide receiver.

Beathard has demonstrated a keen eye

for talent since becoming a part-time scout with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1963. He left the Chiefs briefly to scout for the American Football League and returned to Kansas City full-time after the AFL-NFL merger in 1966. He earned his first championship ring as a member of the 1966 Chiefs' organization. Beathard then served as a scout for the Falcons, 1968-71.

In 1972, Beathard was named director of player personnel for the Miami Dolphins. The Dolphins won the following two Super Bowls. Then on February 24, 1978, the Redskins made Bobby their general manager and he ultimately showed the league that first-round draft picks were weapons to be used in trades. In his 11 years at Washington, the Redskins had only three first-round picks. They went to the Super Bowl three times and won twice.

Beathard's handiwork was apparent on all three Super Bowl teams, including the World Champion Redskins of 1982 whose roster included an astounding 27 free agents signed by Beathard since he joined the team in 1978. The 1983 squad, which finished 14-2, also made it to the Super Bowl. The Super Bowl XXII team defeated Denver, 42-10, in San Diego.

Beathard left the Redskins to serve as a commentator for the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) on its weekly "NFL '89"

show during the 1989 season.

When Beathard joined the Chargers, he returned to the Southern California lifestyle in which he was raised. Born in Zanesville, Ohio, January 24, 1937, Robert Beathard, Jr., grew up in the Los Angeles area and attended El Segundo High. He moved on to Cal Poly-San Luís Obispo where he played quarterback, 1956-58, and helped lead the 1957 and '58 teams to consecutive 9-1 records.

Bobby and his wife, Christine, reside in Leucadia, California. Beathard is an avid runner, surfer and cyclist. He has run in dozens of marathons, including several Boston Marathons. Beathard has four children: sons Kurt (Jan. 4, 1963), currently the offensive coordinator at Western Carolina; Jeff (June 9, 1964), a twelfth-round choice of the Rams in 1988 who is a scout for the Chargers; and Casey (Dec. 2, 1965), a songwriter and singer in Nashville, Tennessee, who also scouts part-time for the Chargers; and daughter Jaime (Sept. 25, 1968). Bobby also has 10 grandchildren with an eleventh expected in September.

### **KEVIN GILBRIDE**



Head Coach 10th NFL Season, 2nd with Chargers

The San Diego Chargers tapped into one of the NFL's most dynamic coaching minds when General Manager Bobby Beathard named former Jacksonville Jaguars Offensive Coordinator Kevin Gilbride as the tenth head coach in Chargers' history on January 19, 1997.

"We are very excited to name Kevin Gilbride our head coach," said Beathard. "He's an exciting and innovative coach who has been on the cutting edge of offensive football in the National Football League.

"The search around the league just emphasized our original thoughts that Kevin is a well-respected and rising talent in this league."

"I thought the best move I could make was to go with the Chargers' organization," said Gilbride. "The success they've had...the ability of Bobby Beathard...the support of the Spanos family. For me, San Diego was the perfect fit.

"I felt the strength of the organization was most important. I felt most comfortable here. What these people have done in the past —going to the Super Bowl only a few years ago — their track record speaks for itself.

"I'm really excited about the process of building back a football team that will be in the playoffs again and one the San Diego community can be proud of."

The 46-year-old Gilbride is a veteran of 24 years in coaching, including nine seasons in the NFL. He joined the Chargers after spending the previous two seasons (1995-96) as the offensive coordinator of the Jacksonville Jacuars.

Gilbride spent his first season in San Diego in 1997 building the team's coaching staff and implementing his innovative offensive system. And while the Chargers suffered through a host of devastating injuries, including the loss of the team's top two quarterbacks, the offense showed glimpses of things to come.

The first glance of the Chargers' future came September 28, 1997, versus Baltimore when the the team passed for 352 yards and amassed 440 total yards on its way to a 21-17 win over the Ravens. It was the most total yards gained by the Chargers' offense since gaining 465 yards versus the Cincinnati Bengals on September 11, 1994, a span of 50 regular-season games. It was also the most yards passing by the Chargers' offense in over eight seasons since September 17, 1989, when the team passed for 372 yards versus Houston, a span of 129 regular-season games.

Three weeks after gaining 440 total yards against Baltimore, the Chargers' offense showed its balance by rushing for 202 yards and gaining 424 total yards in a 35-19 win over Indianapolis. It was the most yards rushing by the Chargers' offense since it gained 220 yards on the ground versus Miami on December 27, 1993, a span of 56 regular-season games.

In 1996 when Gilbride was guiding Jacksonville's offense, the Jaguars had the topranked passing offense in the NFL when they averaged 259.7 yards passing per game. Jacksonville also ranked second overall in the league in total offense by averaging 360.2 yards per game in 1996.

"Kevin is an outstanding football coach," said Jaguars' head coach Tom Coughlin. "His vast experience and great instincts make him a very poised game-day coach. Kevin is a very effective leader. The players will respond to Kevin, and the San Diego Chargers will be successful under him."

Jacksonville's potent offense was one of the reasons the Jaguars advanced to the 1996 AFC Championship Game in just their second year in existence. Jacksonville upset the Buffalo Bills and the Denver Broncos by identical scores, 30-27, before falling to the New England Patriots, 20-6, in the AFC Championship Game.

In addition to his duties as offensive coordinator, Gilbride also tutored the Jaguars' quarterbacks and had a major impact in the development of guarterback Mark Brunell. Brunell led the NFL with 4,145 yards passing in 1996 and also led all NFL guarterbacks in rushing with 396 vards. In his first season with the team in 1995. Gilbride helped develop Brunell from an inexperienced quarterback who had played in just two previous NFL games into the top-ranked passer ever for an expansion team. In 1995, the Jaguars' offense scored an average of 17.2 points per game, second highest ever among previous expansion teams.

Prior to joining Jacksonville, Gilbride was the assistant head coach/offense for the Houston Oilers in 1994 after serving four seasons (1990-93) as the Oilers' offensive coordinator. Under Gilbride, the Oilers' offense ranked first in the NFL in passing yards from 1990 through 1992 and was third in 1993. For four consecutive seasons (1990-93), the Oilers ranked among the NFL's top three teams in total offense

(including No. 1 in 1990), and entering the 1994 campaign, the Oilers had scored more points over a four-year span than 26 of the other 27 NFL teams. During that same span, the Oilers also ranked among the NFL's top five teams in third-down efficiency and first downs. Gilbride joined the Oilers as quarterbacks coach in 1989.

Even though he is known primarily as an offensive coach, Gilbride has extensive experience as a defensive coach as well. This balance between offensive and defensive coaching experience has given Gilbride a clear idea of how he wants the San Diego Chargers to play.

"Our offensive philosophy is an easy one: do whatever it takes to move the football," said Gilbride. "The starting point always has to be the ability to both run and throw the football. Not everyone strives to do that equally as well. But we will have a balanced, systematic style that will use a lot of different forma-

tions, a lot of different personnel groups. We'll try to intelligently attack defenses within the framework of our offensive system."

Gilbride is equally clear about his

defensive philosophy.

"We're going to be a diversified, aggressive defense that will employ a lot of different fronts and coverages," said Gilbride. "Our defense will have the flexibility necessary to defend the many different and varied offensive attacks that we will confront. We'll also have the ability to keep offenses off-balance through pressure packages designed to keep them off the field and from having a lot of time-consuming drives."

A former quarterback and tight end for Southern Connecticut State, Gilbride began his coaching career in 1974 at Idaho State. He also had stops as linebackers coach at Tufts University (1976-77) and defensive coordinator at American International College (1978-79), before gaining his first head coaching job at Southern Connecticut State (1980-84). While at SCSU, Gilbride posted a 35-14-2 record and was

named New England Coach of the Year and NCAA Division II Coach of the Year by various groups, including the ECAC Officials, the Walter Camp Foundation and the New Haven Gridiron Club. He coached a couple of former NFL players at SCSU — defensive tackle Scott Mersereau (Jets) and tight end Travis Tucker (Browns).

In 1985 and 1986 Gilbride was with the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League, the first season as quarterbacks/receivers coach before being elevated to offensive coordinator in 1986. He then returned to the college ranks at East Carolina as passing game coordinator in 1987 and offensive coordinator in 1988 prior to joining the Houston Oilers.

"I certainly think my time in the Canadian Football League influenced my offensive thinking," said Gilbride. "That's where a lot of the principles of our passing game came from. The impact of the wide-open approach to throwing the football and moving the football; the use of many different formations was sharpened and enhanced through my time in the CFL."

Gilbride credits many coaches throughout his career for having a great impact on his career and coaching philosophy, including three NFL head coaches he tutored under.

"All of the coaches I've been around have contributed to my coaching philosophy," Gilbride said. "Jerry Glanville had a great feel for players — when to back off, when to push. He had a great sense of timing in dealing with the team in order to maintain a high intensity level. He had a good sense of the players emotionally.

"Jack Pardee gave me great insight into consistency — the importance of a head coach to maintain a consistent demeanor. Consistency is important to maintain trust and a level of dependability.

"Tom Coughlin reinforced the need to be committed completely to the profession and the job so that the details are attended to. His discipline and structure certainly have influenced the way I will go about things from an organizational point of view."

But the person who had the most profound effect in Gilbride's life was his father.

"The single most influential person in my life definitely was my father," said the head coach. "My father was a high school math teacher and coach, and I saw the pleasure and joy he received and the impact he had on young lives. That motivated me to get

into this profession because I wanted to have an impact in a positive way on young people.

"The values that he instilled in me about life in general have stuck with me — perseverance, work ethic, willingness to sacrifice personally in order to achieve your goals. Those were the things that he cherished and had the greatest impact on me."

Gilbride was born August 27, 1951, in New Haven, Connecticut. The oldest of seven children, including three brothers and three sisters, Kevin was a three-sport star at North Haven High School in North Haven, Connecticut. He played quarterback, forward on the basketball team and pitched for the baseball team. He suffered a knee injury in his senior football season, which later turned out to be a torn anterior cruciate ligament, and never had surgery, dimming a bright athletic future. Gilbride played one football season at the United States Merchant Marines Academy in Long Island, New York. He later enrolled at Southern Connecticut State University and played three seasons as a tight end. He graduated from SCSU with a degree in physical education and received his master's degree in sports administration from Idaho State.

While serving as the offensive coordinator of the Oilers in 1992, a routine physical revealed his greatest fear. Oiler offensive lineman Doug Dawson pushed the busy coach to get a long-overdue physical so he could sell Gilbride a life insurance policy. Following the physical on Tuesday, Dec. 1, Gilbride "just knew something was up." On Tuesday, Dec. 8, he underwent surgery to remove a tumor the size of a grapefruit along with his right kidney.

"It was a heck of a wake-up call," said Gilbride, who's father died at age 45 when Kevin was 20. "What that experience did was reinforce what I always felt. You better not waste time, and whatever is important to you, you better go for it with as much gusto as you have. Don't think you have forever. Whatever you think is important, you better get it done."

Since his surgery, Gilbride has been very active in working with organizations such as the American Cancer Society and the Polycystic Kidney Disease Research Foundation as well as other cancer treatment and research organizations. Since coming to San Diego, Gilbride also has joined the March of Dimes' fight against

children's birth defects and become the honorary chairman of the organization's annual golf tournament.

Kevin and his wife, Deborah, have two daughters, Kelly (Sept. 11, 1975) and Kristen (June 19, 1977), and a son, Kevin (Dec. 14, 1979). Kelly recently graduated with a degree in psychology from Harvard

University. Kristen is a senior education major at the University of Connecticut. Kevin, a three-sport star in high school, will be attending Brigham Young University in the fall on a full football scholarship.

The Gilbrides reside in Alpine, California, about 20 miles east of San Diego.

Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named Nick Nicolau the team's assistant head coach on February 5, 1997.

"I had the good fortune of working with Nick at Jacksonville for two years (1995-96) and grew to admire and appreciate the expertise he possesses," said Gilbride. "We were fortunate to hire him."

Nicolau, a veteran of 18 years of coaching in the National Football League, spent two seasons (1995-96) on the Jacksonville Jaguars' staff with Gilbride as the tight ends coach. Prior to that, Nicolau spent three years (1992-94) as the offensive coordinator for the Indianapolis Colts.

Nicolau, 65, began his NFL coaching career in 1980 as running backs coach for the New Orleans Saints. He joined the Denver Broncos' staff as a special assistant in 1981 before tutoring the team's running backs for six seasons (1982-87). During Nicolau's tenure in Denver, the Broncos played in Super Bowls XXI and XXII.

In 1988, Nicolau served as the wide receivers coach for the Los Angeles Raiders before joining the Buffalo Bills in 1989. He spent three seasons (1989-91) with the Bills as receivers coach and was with the team during Super Bowls XXV and XXVI.

Nicolau's 40-year coaching career also includes two years at the high school level, three years in the Canadian Football League and 17 years at the collegiate level, with stops at Southern Connecticut State (1960), Springfield College (1961), the University of Bridgeport (1962-69, including as head coach from 1965-69), Massachusetts (1970), Connecticut (1971-72), Kentucky (1973-75) and Kent State (1976).

In 1977, Nicolau coached with the Canadian Football League's Hamilton Tiger-Cats before spending two seasons (1978-79) as the director of player personnel/running backs coach for the Montreal Alouettes. Montreal made Grey Cup appearances both seasons that Nicolau was on the staff.

During his tenure as an assistant coach, Nicolau has coached in two Grey Cups, five AFC Championship Games and four Super Bowls.

Nick Nicolau was born May 5, 1933, in the Bronx, New York. He grew up and went to high school in New Bedford, Massachusetts. He was a running back at Southern Connecticut from 1951-53 and in 1956. He earned a master's degree from Indiana University and a doctorate from Springfield College.

Nick and his wife, Eleanor, have six children — Tracey (June 6, 1958), Duane (Jan. 1, 1960), Shari (April 19, 1961), Vickie (Aug. 7, 1962), Wendy (Sept. 15, 1965) and Randy (Aug. 29, 1970).



JOE PASCALE

Defensive Coordinator

13th NFL Season, 2nd with Chargers

Joe Pascale became the Chargers' defensive coordinator on January 27, 1997. He is a veteran of 31 years in coaching, including 12 in the National Football League, two in the United States Football League, four in the Canadian Football League and 13 years in the collegiate ranks. During his coaching career, Pascale has coached every position on defense and has been a defensive coordinator in the NFL, CFL and on the collegiate level.

"I've known Joe for 24 years and from the first moment I worked with him, I have been impressed with his intellect, work habits and character," said Head Coach Kevin Gilbride.

Before joining the Chargers, Pascale spent three seasons (1994-96) as the line-backers coach of the Cincinnati Bengals. In 1996, the Bengals' defense led the NFL in takeaways with 44, including 34 interceptions and 10 fumble recoveries. Cincinnati's 34 interceptions also led the league in 1996.

Before joining the Bengals, Pascale spent eight seasons (1986-93) on the defensive staff of the Phoenix Cardinals.

During his NFL coaching career, Pascale has worked with several outstanding linebackers, including Ken Harvey, Freddie Joe Nunn, Eric Hill, E.J. Junior, James Francis, Junior Seau and Steve Tovar.

Before his stint with the Cardinals, Pascale coached two seasons (1984-85) for the New Jersey Generals of the United States Football League. Pascale spent four seasons coaching in the Canadian Football League, including two each with the Ottawa Rough Riders (1982-83) and Montreal Alouettes (1980-81). In each of his six seasons in the USFL and CFL, Pascale's teams made playoff appearances.

Pascale's coaching career began as an assistant coach at the University of Connecticut (1967-69). He then spent four seasons (1970-73) as an assistant at Rhode Island before working as an assistant at Idaho State for two seasons (1974-75). He spent the 1976 season as head coach at Idaho State. He spent his last three seasons (1977-79) in the collegiate ranks as an assistant coach at Princeton.

Pascale played linebacker, nose tackle and offensive guard at the University of Connecticut for four seasons (1963-66). He also played defense on the school's lacrosse team. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in education from Connecticut, and also completed an advanced graduate curriculum in education administration at Connecticut.

Joseph Vincent Pascale was born April 17, 1946, in New York City. He played football for Lakeland High School in Peekskill, New York. Joe and his wife, Lucille, have a son, Joseph (March 22, 1977).



MIKE SHEPPARD Offensive Coordinator/ Wide Receivers 6th NFL Season, 2nd with Chargers

Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named former Baltimore Ravens' wide receivers coach Mike Sheppard as the Chargers' offensive coordinator on February 26, 1997. Last year, Sheppard assisted Gilbride and Assistant Head Coach Nick Nicolau in teaching San Diego's offense while also tutoring the team's quarterbacks. In 1998, Sheppard will be in charge of the team's wide receivers

and will work closely with Quarterbacks Coach June Jones in implementing the Chargers' offensive system.

In addition to coaching Baltimore's wide receivers in 1996, Sheppard handled the Ravens' play calling when they had the NFL's third-ranked offense (357.7 yards per game) and second-ranked passing game (248.6 yards per game). The only passing offense to finish higher than Baltimore's was Jacksonville's (256.9 yards per game), which was led by Gilbride.

Sheppard, a coaching veteran of 24 years — including eight seasons as a head coach on the collegiate level — spent four seasons with Baltimore and the Cleveland Browns. He originally joined the Browns as the team's tight ends coach in 1993 before spending three seasons (1994-96) coaching wide receivers.

Before joining the Browns, Sheppard was offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at California for one season (1992). He spent five years (1987-91) as head coach at the University of New Mexico. Sheppard also was the head coach at Long Beach State for three years (1984-86).

Sheppard's other coaching experience includes stops at Kansas (offensive coordinator and quarterbacks, 1983), Long Beach State (quarterbacks, 1982), Idaho State (quarterbacks and receivers, 1980-81), United States International University (offensive coordinator and quarterbacks, 1979), Brigham Young (graduate assistant/offense, 1977-78) and Cal Lutheran (receivers, 1974-76).

A 1973 graduate with a bachelor's degree in business from Cal Lutheran, Sheppard was a two-sport standout who earned all-district honors in both football and baseball as a junior and senior. He was chosen most valuable lineman in the 1971 NAIA national championship game and won All-America honors in 1972. He was named the baseball team's most valuable player in his senior season and played professional baseball for one summer with the Portland Mavericks (1973).

Born October 29, 1951, in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Sheppard earned a California teaching credential in 1975 and a master's degree in physical education from Brigham Young in 1982. He attended John Burroughs High School in Burbank, California. Sheppard and his wife, Cathie, have four children — Chrissi (April 2, 1979), Brian (Jan. 14, 1983), Shelby (Aug. 5, 1988) and Macall (May 23, 1991).

JOE BUGEL Offensive Line 23rd NFL Season. 1st with Chargers

The Chargers added 33 years of coaching experience, including 22 years in the National Football League, when Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named former Oakland Raiders and Arizona Cardinals Head Coach Joe Bugel as the Chargers' Offensive Line Coach on January 26, 1998.

"Joe's experience with the offensive line lends great credibility to him," said Gilbride upon Bugel's hiring. "I'm really impressed with his enthusiasm. He will be a step in the right direction and we have really helped out our staff by adding him."

"I'm excited about it in a big, big way," said Bugel. "One thing I missed was being on the football field with the offensive line. I wanted

to get back to that."

He is so enthusiastic, he is a complete team guy," said Chargers' General Manager Bobby Beathard who won two Super Bowls with Bugel in Washington. "I think he is going to work great with Kevin and the rest of our coaching staff."

Bugel, 58, will be taking over a young offensive line which surrendered 51 sacks in 1997. Only five NFL teams gave up more

sacks than the Chargers last year.

"If they were all five Pro Bowlers, then I wouldn't want to come because they wouldn't need my help," added Bugel, "If they want hard work, they're getting the right

quy."

Before joining the Chargers, Bugel spent the previous three seasons (1995-97) with Oakland, serving as assistant coach/offense from 1995-96 before being elevated to head coach for the 1997 season. Prior to working in Oakland, Bugel was the head coach for the Arizona Cardinals for four seasons (1990-93).

In his 17 seasons as an NFL assistant. Bugel's teams have posted a 159-99 record (.616 winning percentage), including 13 winning seasons and eight playoff appearances. Bugel has participated in three Super Bowls, six conference championship games and 21 playoff contests.

From 1981-89. Bugel was in charge of the offensive line for the Washington Redskins where he developed the famous "Hogs" offensive line. He began as the Redskins' offensive coordinator in 1981 and was promoted to assistant head coach in charge of the offensive line in 1983. Under Bugel's tutelage, the Redskins scored an NFLrecord 541 points (1983), had four 1,000vard rushers, one 4,000-yard passer and nine 1.000-vard receivers.

Chargers General Manager Bobby Beathard was with Bugel in Washington, serving as the Redskins' general manager from 1978-88. Washington won two Super Bowls while Bugel and Beathard were with the team following the 1982 and 1987 seasons.

From 1977-80, Bugel was the offensive line coach for the Houston Oilers, during which time the team set records in rushing and passing.

Bugel entered the professional coaching ranks as the offensive line coach for the Detroit Lions from 1975-76.

He also worked at Ohio State (1974) under Woody Hayes, Iowa State (1973). Navy (1969-72) and his alma mater Western Kentucky (1964-68).

Born March 10, 1940, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Bugel was a two-way star in football at Munhall High School. He walked onto the football team at Western Kentucky and eventually earned a scholarship. Bugel was an all-conference guard from 1960-63 and also played linebacker.

Bugel earned a bachelor's degree from Western Kentucky in physical education in 1963 and a master's degree in counseling from Western Kentucky in 1964.

Bugel and his wife, Brenda, have three daughters - Angie (Jan. 22, 1970), Holly (Aug.16, 1972) and Jennifer (Oct. 13, 1976).



JUNE JONES Quarterbacks 15th NFL Season. 1st with Chargers

The Chargers' offense inherited one of the brightest offensive minds in the National Football League when Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named former Atlanta Falcons Head Coach June Jones as the Chargers quarterbacks coach on January 20, 1998.

"He's a good football coach and I've

known him for a long time," said Gilbride. "I think his presence will contribute immediately to the improvement of our football team."

"I'm looking forward to this," said Jones. "I feel comfortable with the guys in San Diego. I know a lot of those guys, and it's important to me to be comfortable with the people around you. That trickles down to the

players."

"I'm happy for June," said Green Bay Packers Quarterback and three-time NFL Most Valuable Player Brett Favre who played under Jones in 1991 in Atlanta. "He's really a great coach and truly one of the great guys in the league. Every time I see June, I think of the patience and teaching that he gave me. It was something he didn't have to do. I think he'll do really well with San Diego."

Jones spent three seasons (1994-96) as the head coach of the Falcons and compiled a regular-season record of 19-29. In 1995 Jones led the Falcons to a 9-7 record and their first playoff berth since 1991. Under Jones' direction, the Falcons' offense gained 5,613 total yards in 1994, the most since 1983. In 1995, the Falcons had the first 4,000-yard passer in team history when Jeff George passed for 4,143 yards.

Prior to being named head coach, Jones served three seasons (1991-93) as Atlanta's assistant head coach/offense. The Falcons established a club record with 33 passing touchdowns in 1992 with Jones guiding the offense. The team also passed for 30 touchdowns in 1991 and 28 in 1993.

Before joining the Falcons, Jones was the quarterbacks/wide receivers coach for the Detroit Lions for two seasons (1989-90). Under his influence the Lions were the fifth-highest scoring team in the NFL (373 points), third in total yards in the NFC (3,636), and first in average gain per rush (5.3 yards) in 1990.

Jones began his NFL coaching career as the quarterbacks coach for the Houston Oilers (1987-88). The Oilers had the second-highest scoring offense in the NFL in 1988 when they averaged 26,5 yards per

game.

Jones spent one season (1986) as an offensive assistant for the Ottawa Roughriders of the Canadian Football League after serving one year (1985) as the offensive coordinator of the Denver Gold of the United States Football League. He also served one season (1984) as the wide receivers coach for the USFL's Houston Gamblers.

Jones began his coaching career as the

quarterbacks coach at the University of Hawaii in 1983.

Before getting into coaching, Jones played quarterback professionally for the Atlanta Falcons (1977-1981) and the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League (1982). Jones completed 75 of 166 passes for 923 yards, three touchdowns and seven interceptions as an NFL quarterback. He spent the majority of his career as a backup to Steve Bartkowski, who remains a close friend.

Jones collegiate playing career began at the University of Oregon (1971-72), where George Seifert and John Robinson were on the coaching staff and NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Fouts and Washington Redskins Head Coach Norv Turner were Jones' teammates. After two years at Oregon, Jones moved on to the University of Hawaii (1973-74) before finally ending up at Portland State (1975-76), where he played for the highly-respected Mouse Davis.

Jones and his wife, Diane, have three daughters — Jenni (Aug. 20, 1973), Kelli (Dec. 29, 1977) and Nikki (Aug. 17, 1983) — and a son, June Jones IV (May 12, 1994).



BILL MACDERMOTT Tight Ends 2nd NFL Season,

2nd with Chargers

Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named Bill Macdermott the Chargers tight ends coach on February 14, 1997. Macdermott has 38 years of coaching experience, including 16 years as a head coach on the collegiate level. During his 38 years of coaching, Macdermott has experienced only five losing seasons.

Along with furthering the development of returning veterans Frank Hartley and Brian Roche, Macdermott helped mold the Chargers' 1997 top draft choice — tight end Freddie Jones — into one of the NFL's top rookies last year. Jones' 41 catches and 505 receiving yards in 1997 were the most by a Chargers' tight end since Kellen Winslow had 53 catches for 519 yards in 1987.

Immediately prior to joining the Chargers,

Macdermott (MAC-dur-mott) had a brief stint as the assistant head coach of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League. He also spent five seasons (1992-96) as the offensive line coach for the Edmonton Eskimos. While he was in Edmonton, the Eskimos won the Grey Cup once in 1993 and appeared in the CFL's championship game again in 1996. Before working in Edmonton, Macdermott was the offensive line coach for the Orlando Thunder of the World League of American Football for two seasons (1991-92). Macdermott was with the Thunder when they appeared in the 1992 World Bowl.

Macdermott had his initiation in the Canadian Football League when he helped the Montreal Alouettes during training camp in 1987. He was a guest coach at Edmonton's camp in 1989 and was the offensive line coach for Toronto in 1990 when the Argonauts set a still-unbroken Canadian Football League record for points in a season with 493. He was the assistant head coach and offensive line coach at California Poly -San Luis Obispo for three years (1987-89) before joining Toronto's staff in 1990.

Macdermott was the head coach at Weslevan University in Middletown, Connecticut. for 16 years (1971-86). His career record as a head coach was 66-59-3 (.527). Macdermott originally joined the Wesleyan staff in 1966 as offensive and defensive line coach, a position he held for two seasons (1966-67) before becoming the offensive coordinator for three years (1968-70). In 1969, he engineered an offense which averaged 21 points per game and carried the Cardinals to an 8-0 mark and a share of the Lambert Cup as the top small college team in the East. Macdermott also headed the Weslevan wrestling program from 1966-70.

Prior to his stint at Weslevan, Macdermott served as assistant football coach and head wrestling coach at Hopkins High School in New Haven, Connecticut, for five years (1961-65).

William Hough Macdermott was born May 14, 1936, in Providence, Rhode Island. He played football, wrestling and baseball at St. George's High School in Middletown. Rhode Island. He went on to play football at Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut. He graduated with a degree in physical education and history from Trinity in 1960.

Bill and his wife, Kathleen, have three daughters - Alexandra (Aug. 7, 1980), Tiffany (June 5, 1981) and Stephanie (Feb.

13, 1990).



#### FRANK NOVAK

Special Teams

10th NFL Season. 2nd with Chargers

Frank Novak became the Chargers' special teams coach on January 30, 1997, after spending the previous two years (1995-96) as the special teams coach for the Detroit Lions.

"I have always been impressed by Frank's enthusiasm and excitement for the game," said Head Coach Kevin Gilbride. "Players really respond well to him. He does an outstanding job of getting our players to play with the enthusiasm that's necessary to be good on special teams."

In his first season in San Diego in 1997. the Chargers scored five touchdowns on special teams, which is the most by any NFL team in a single-season in the 1990s. And when Eric Metcalf returned two punts for touchdowns at Cincinnati Nov. 2, 1997, it marked just the ninth time in NFL history that a player had returned two punts for scores in the same game.

Under Novak's direction in 1996. Detroit's Glyn Milburn ranked fourth in the NFC with an average of 25.4 yards per kickoff return while returning the second-most kickoffs in the conference (64). In Novak's first season in Detroit in 1995, the Lions' kickoff coverage unit finished third in the NFL in average starting field position.

Novak tutored the running backs for the Houston Oilers for five seasons (1989-93). During his tenure as Houston's running backs coach the Oilers had a stable of topflight NFL backs, including former Heisman Trophy winner Mike Rozier (1,002 yards in 1988), Alonzo Highsmith, Allen Pinkett, Lorenzo White (1,226 yards in 1992) and Gary Brown (1,002 yards in 1993). Novak also coached the Oilers' special teams for one season (1994). His speciality units limited opponents to a league-low 17.3 yards per kickoff return in 1994.

Novak, 59, joined the Oilers following one year (1988) as the running backs coach at the University of Missouri. He was the quarterbacks coach at the University of Massachusetts in 1986. Prior to coaching at Massachusetts, he was the receivers coach for the Birmingham Stallions of the United States Football League for one season (1985). He had been named the Stallions' offensive coordinator in 1986 before the team folded, Novak was the running backs coach for the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws in 1984.

Prior to his stint in the USFL, Novak coached at Holy Cross for six seasons (1978-83). He coached the Crusaders' offensive backs for four years (1978-81) before being promoted to offensive coordinator. He was the offensive coordinator at Western Illinois for two seasons (1976-77). Novak spent two years at the University of Virginia, coaching the quarterbacks in 1974 and the offensive backs in 1975. In 1973, he was the offensive coordinator at East Carolina. That season, the Pirates won the Southern Conference Championship.

Novak started his college coaching career at his alma mater, Northern Michigan University, in 1966. He spent five years (1966-70) as the offensive backs/receivers coach before serving as offensive coordinator for two years (1971-72). Novak coached on the high school level in New London, Connecticut, and Iron Mountain, Michigan, prior to his tenure at Northern Michigan.

Prior to going into coaching, Novak was in the Toronto Argonauts training camp in 1962.

Frank Leonard Novak was born May 18, 1939, in Leominster, Massachusetts, and was a starter on the football, basketball and baseball teams at Leominster High School. He was an Associated Press honorable mention quarterback at Northern Michigan, where he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in English and a certificate as a secondary reading specialist.

Frank and his wife, Ellen, have one son, Jason (Nov. 12, 1974). Frank also has four children, including son, Frank, Jr. (June 2, 1961), and daughters Kimberly (May 23, 1962), Tracy (May 30, 1963) and Linda (Oct. 5, 1965).





#### WAYNE NUNNELY

Defensive Line

4th NFL Season, 2nd with Chargers

San Diego Chargers' Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named Wayne Nunnely the team's defensive line coach on February 5, 1997.

"Wayne is tremendously organized and has great knowledge of the defensive line," said Gilbride.

Before coming to the Chargers, Nunnely spent two seasons (1995-96) in the same capacity with the New Orleans Saints. In his two years with New Orleans, the Saints' defense ranked in the top five in the NFL in sacks and sacks per play. He first worked for the Saints in their training camp in 1994 when he served on the staff as part of the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship program.

Prior to joining New Orleans full-time, Nunnely spent nearly 20 years as an assistant coach, head coach and administrator on the collegiate level. Most recently, he spent two seasons (1993-94) as the defensive line coach at UCLA where he helped the Bruins win the 1993 PAC 10 championship and earn a Rose Bowl appearance. He also spent two seasons (1991-92) as the running backs coach at Southern California.

Nunnely's first job as a coach was at Valley High School in Las Vegas, Nevada, in 1975. He began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Nevada-Las Vegas. in 1976. His initial full-time job came at California Polytechnic University-Pomona, where he coached the running backs in 1977 and the defensive line in 1978. He moved to Cal State Fullerton for one season (1979) where he coached the defensive line. He then went on to the University of the Pacific (1980-81), coaching the running backs, before returning to UNLV (1982-85), where he served as running backs coach and helped the Rebels to win their first PCAA and California Bowl championship in 1984.

In 1986, Nunnely was named head coach at UNLV, a post he manned for four seasons. At the time of his appointment, he was only the fifth African-American to be named

Nunnely played fullback and also lettered in track at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas for two seasons (1972-73), where he earned a bachelor of science degree in physical education. He was selected by the school's faculty as Most Outstanding Male Physical Educator.

Wayne Benjamin Nunnely was born March 29, 1952, in Los Angeles, California. He played football, basketball and track for Monrovia High School in Monrovia, California. He and his wife, Velda, have two sons, Channing (July 10, 1973) and Aaron (Oct. 27, 1986), and a daughter, Amber (July 30, 1983).



ROD PERRY Defensive Backs 11th NFL Season, 2nd with Chargers

Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named former Houston Oilers' Defensive Backs Coach Rod Perry to the same position with the Chargers on January 27, 1997.

"Rod is a former player who was an outstanding technician and student of the game as a player," said Gilbride. "He has continued to expand his knowledge of the game since he's been coaching and has done an outstanding job of imparting that knowledge to our secondary."

Perry, 45, has 10 years of NFL coaching experience. He spent the 1995-96 seasons as the Oilers' detensive backs coach, where under Perry's direction, cornerback Darryll Lewis and safety Blaine Bishop made their first trips to the Pro Bowl.

Prior to joining the Oilers, Perry spent three seasons (1992-94) as the secondary coach of the Los Angeles Rams. He also served three seasons (1989-91) as the secondary coach with Seattle where he coached current Chargers' cornerback Dwayne Harper.

Perry joined Seattle after coaching four years at the collegiate level, including two years at Fresno State (1987-88) and one year each at Fresno City College (1986) and Columbia University (1985).

As a player, Perry was an All-Big Eight selection as a senior defensive back at the University of Colorado. He was selected by the Los Angeles Rams in the fourth round of the 1975 NFL Draft. He twice earned Pro Bowl honors (1978, 1980) and finished his eight-year stint (1975-82) with the Rams with 28 interceptions. He is a member of the Rams' 40th Anniversary All-Time Team. "The greatest compliment I can pay him is that he gave our offenses so many problems that he was one of the first guys I wanted to hire. I'm glad to have him on our side for a change."

Before his stint with the Jets, Vechiarella was the linebackers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles for four seasons (1991-94).

In 1990, Vechiarella was the defensive

coordinator for the Cleveland Browns under then-head coach Bud Carson. Prior to working for the Browns, Vechiarella spent four seasons (1986-89) as the linebackers coach for the New York Jets. He was the linebackers coach at Kansas City for three seasons (1983-85) after beginning his NFL coaching career with the Los Angeles Rams (1981-82).

OLLIE WILSON Running Backs 8th NFL Season, 2nd with Chargers

Head Coach Kevin Gilbride named former Atlanta Falcons Running Backs Coach Ollie Wilson to the same position with the Chargers on January 27, 1997.

"I've known Ollie since his days at Springfield College and on the professional level since he started with the Oilers as an intern," said Gilbride. "I've always been impressed with his ability to relate and motivate players and his knowledge of the game."

Wilson, 47, joined the Chargers after spending the previous six seasons (1991-96) as Atlanta's running backs coach. Under Wilson's direction, three Falcons' running backs rushed for 1,000 yards or more, including Jamal Anderson (1,055 in 1996), Craig Heyward (1,083 in 1995) and Erric Pegram (1,185 in 1993). In 1995, Heyward became the first Falcons' running back to be

voted to the Pro Bowl since 1988.

Wilson began his stint with the Falcons in 1990 while working as part of the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship program in a position similar to the one he had held with the Houston Oilers in 1990.

Wilson spent eight seasons (1983-90) coaching several different positions at the University of California-Berkeley, including running backs, wide receivers and defensive backs. Prior to his stint at California, Wilson was the offensive coordinator at Northeastern University for eight seasons (1976-82). His first coaching job was as the wide receivers coach at his alma mater, Springfield College, in 1975.

### **MEDIA GUIDELINES**

On behalf of the San Diego Chargers, welcome to the 1998 National Football League season. As we enter our second full season in the renovated Qualcomm Stadium, we hope to make your job covering the Chargers as easy and pleasant as possible. Here are a few simple guidelines to help you.

Media credentials are issued to working media only. Season and individual game credential holders should enter through the press entrance at Gate H. The press entrance and press will-call open four hours prior to the game. Credentials are non-transferable, and any unauthorized use will subject bearer to ejection from Qualcomm Stadium and confiscation of the credential.

Season media passes will be issued to recognized newspapers, magazines, television and established radio stations making reasonable requests on company letterhead. Please indicate persons that will be using each pass. It is imperative that season pass holders notify this office of their intentions to cover a game in order to reserve press seating.

Individual game credentials should be requested in writing through the public relations department (through mail or tax) a minimum of 72 hours prior to game time. Our PR fax number is (619) 292-2780. Pre-arranged passes must be picked up from Robyn Walters at the Chargers office no later than 4 p.m. the Friday before the game or at the press will call window located at Gate H on the day of the game. Credentials will be issued on an availability-only basis.

Press booth and press box credentials are valid for admittance to the stadium, press box, field (for the final two minutes of the game) and both locker rooms (postgame only). Field and photo passes are good for admittance to the stadium, press box, field and both locker rooms (postgame only). Requests for interviews to take place prior to the game with injured players not suiting up for the game or front office staff members must be made well in advance. The locker rooms will open 10-12 minutes after they are closed postgame. The officials' locker room is off limits to media. Should a comment or interpretation for the game's officials be needed, a pool reporter may be assigned. Your cooperation is asked in maintaining a working atmosphere. ABSOLUTELY NO AUTOGRAPHS ALLOWED DURING MEDIA ACCESS PERIODS.

Interviews which need advance preparation or special accommodation by a Chargers' player, coach or staff member should be made by contacting the Chargers Public Relations Department. This includes all live and taped television interviews both pre and postgame.

Photo credentials will be issued in the same manner as other passes. Only working photographers will be allowed on the field during the game. Because of strict NFL guidelines, nonworking personnel, including television reporters, will not be allowed on the field during the game (except for the final two minutes). Weekly newspapers and magazines on assignment may obtain passes by having the photo editor request a single-game credential. Because of strict NFL guidelines, it is impossible to allow freelance photographers access unless assigned to shoot for a specific story or project.

Telephones for working media in the press box should be ordered through Gary Brashear of San Diego Sports Communications at Qualcomm Stadium (619-281-1500).

Chargers public relations personnel Bill Johnston, David Neville, Scott Yoffe and Robyn Walters can be found in Row 2, Seats 38-40, to the left of the PA booth on the 25-yard line. Following the game, the Chargers' public relations department can be found in the press box.

FAX service is available by contacting Joe Brucia in the auxiliary press room or in Row 4, Seat 134. Any reporters who desire to have postgame statistics sent to their papers via fax can arrange to do so through Brucia for a \$25 charge. Two pay phones are located in the auxiliary press room next to the dining room.

Statisticians are available to assist radio and television broadcasters by contacting the Chargers' public relations department. These services must be arranged a minimum of 72 hours prior to kickoff, and once they are made, the statistician must be compensated whether or not used.

Appropriate game credentials are necessary for locker room access postgame. Kevin Gilbride's interview room is located next to the visitors' locker room. The visiting head coach will meet the media inside the visitors' locker room. The coaches' locker room is closed to the press, but coaches are available through the teams' public relations representatives. Typewritten quotes from both locker rooms will be provided in the press box after the game.

Exit the press box and go down Elevator 4 to Level 1 (Plaza). Stadium security is located to the right at Gate A.

The telephone number for **Yellow Cab** is (619) 234-6161. Pickups are made at the Gate F security door on the main Plaza Level.

We hope this outline of procedures and guidelines will assist you in your coverage of the San Diego Chargers and the National Football League at Qualcomm Stadium. Please don't hesitate to call on us if you need additional assistance. We look forward to working with you this season.







### 1997 GAME BY GAME

### GAME 1 at New England 41, San Diego 7 (Sunday, Aug. 31)



The Chargers opened the 1997 regular season with a 41-7 loss to the defending AFC Champion New England Patriots in Foxboro Stadium. The Patriots' offense took control of the game early, scoring on five of its first six possessions, including four touchdowns and one field goal. The Patriots led 31-0 at halftime after quarterback Drew Bledsoe connected on touchdown passes to tight end Ben Coates, wide receiver Terry Glenn, fullback Sam Gash and fullback Keith Byars. Adam Vinatieri added a 21-yard goal to round out the Patriots' first-half scoring. The Chargers had the lone score of the third quarter, a 44-yard strike from Stan Humphries to rookie tight end Freddie Jones. New England closed out the scoring with a 26-yard field goal and a 53-yard interception return for a touchdown by Willie Clay off a Jim Everett pass in the fourth quarter. Humphries left the game in the fourth quarter with a dislocated left shoulder. Bledsoe finished the day with 26 completions of 39 attempts for 340 yards and four touchdowns. Freddie Jones led the Chargers with four catches for 73 yards and one touchdown, while wide receiver Charlie Jones hauled in four catches for 55 yards. The Patriots outgained the Chargers in total yards, 424 to 227, and passing yards, 340 to 142. San Diego turned the ball over three times, leading to 10 Patriots' points.



### GAME 2 San Diego 20, at New Orleans 6 (Sunday, Sept. 7)



The Chargers got their first victory under Head Coach Kevin Gilbride with a 20-6 win over the Saints in New Orleans. The Chargers' defense was the key throughout, forcing six turnovers (three interceptions and three fumbles) which led to 10 of San Diego's 20 points. Linebacker Junior Seau returned to the lineup after missing the season opener and led the defense with 11 tackles, one sack and one fumble recovery. After a first-quarter field goal by the Saints, the Chargers' defense gave San Diego the lead on a wild play in which the Saints fumbled on their own 37. Seau recovered the ball on the Saints' 15-yard line. before fumbling himself on the ten. Safety Rodney Harrison recovered in the end zone to give San Diego a 7-3 lead. The Saints tightened the score to 7-6 with their second field goal. John Carney added a 37yard field goal in the second quarter and a 34-yarder in the third to make San Diego's lead 13-6. San Diego's defense controlled the second half by forcing two fumbles and three interceptions while keeping the Saints out of scoring position. San Diego sealed the win with 2:10 left to play when Jim Everett hit rookie tight end Freddie Jones with a 21-yard touchdown pass. Everett, who started the game and went the distance in place of injured Stan Humphries, completed 17 of 29 passes for 195 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Defensive ends Marco Coleman and William Fuller and linebacker Kurt Gouveia each had interceptions for the Chargers. Coleman and John Parrella added one-half and 1.5 sacks, respectively.

### GAME 3 Carolina 26, at San Diego 7 (Sunday, Sept. 14)



The Chargers fell to 1-2 with a 26-7 loss to the Carolina Panthers in front of a crowd of 63,149 fans at Qualcomm Stadium. Four lost fumbles, including three by quarterback Stan Humphries, seven sacks and one blocked punt doomed the Bolts. Carolina scored 16 points off fumble recoveries and the blocked punt. San Diego opened the scoring in the first quarter with a six-yard touchdown run by Erric Pegram, its first score with the Chargers. San Diego's defense held, forcing Carolina kicker John Kasay to kick the first of his four field goals. In all, Kasay connected from 25, 36, 34 and 28 yards. The Panthers closed out the scoring with a one-yard, fourth-quarter touchdown pass from Collins to Walls to make the final score 26-7. In addition to losing three fumbles, Humphries was sacked seven times by Carolina's zone-blitzing defense.

### GAME 5 San Diego 21, Baltimore 17 (Sunday, Sept. 28)





The Chargers got their first home win of the 1997 season with a 21-17 victory over the visiting Baltimore Rayens. The Chargers' offense exploded for 440 yards, its highest total since Sept. 11, 1994, when the Bolts put up 465 yards versus the Cincinnati Bengals, a span of 50 regular-season games. Wide receiver Tony Martin led the charge with three touchdown catches and 155 yards on four receptions. Stan Humphries passed for a career-high 358 yards while completing 17 of just 26 attempts. Each team punted on its first possession before San Diego converted a fourth and two from the Ravens' 36-yard line into a touchdown. Humphries hit Martin on a crossing pattern underneath Baltimore's secondary and outran three defenders on his way to the Chargers' first score, Matt Stover kicked a 47-yard field goal to make the score 7-3 and the end of the first period. Humphries and Martin struck again in the second quarter, this time on a 72-yard bomb, the longest play for both since their 99-yard touchdown hook-up at Seattle on Sept. 18, 1994. Once again Stover tightened the score with field goals from 35 yards in the second guarter and 28 yards in the third quarter to make the score, 14-9. Baltimore then took the lead in the third quarter when quarterback Vinny Testaverde connected with Jermaine Lewis on a 37-yard touchdown strike. A successful two-point conversion gave the Ravens a 17-14 lead. Martin and Humphries put San Diego up for good, 21-17, with their third touchdown of the day, a 38 yarder with three seconds left in the third quarter. Two late Baltimore scoring attempts were thwarted deep in San Diego territory on interceptions by free safety Michael Dumas and cornerback Dwayne Harper. In addition to the interceptions, Harper led the Chargers with four passes defensed, while Dumas added five tackles, two passes defensed and a forced fumble. Rodney Harrison finished with a team-high 12 tackles and two passes defensed.

## GAME 6 San Diego 25, at Oakland 10 (Sunday, Oct. 5)



A dominating defense and ball-control offense gave the Chargers a 25-10 win at Oakland. The Raiders entered the game with the NFL's top-ranked offense, but San Diego outgained Oakland in total yards, 398 to 241, and in rushing yards, 180 to 13. Oakland's 13 yards rushing was the second lowest total allowed by San Diego's defense in team history since the Chargers held the Raiders to two rushing yards on Oct. 22, 1961. San Diego's 180 yards rushing was the most since Sept. 1, 1996, versus Seattle when the team had 186. The Chargers opened the scoring with a 30-yard field goal by Greg Davis after the Raiders turned the ball over deep in their own territory on a fumbled punt snap. Davis connected on two more field goals and the Raiders hit one to give San Diego a 9-3 lead going into halftime. Davis added another field goal in the third quarter before Raiders' running back Napoleon Kaufman turned a short Jeff George pass into a dazzling 70-yard touchdown to tighten the score to 12-10. San Diego's offense came storning back on its very next possession, driving 80 yards on nine plays with running back Gary Brown punching it in from one vard out to make San Diego's lead. 19-10. San Diego's defense dominated the fourth quarter while holding Oakland's offense scoreless, and the Chargers' offense added two impressive drives for field goals to make the final, 25-10. San Diego's offense controlled the ball for 38:57 to Oakland's 21:03. The Chargers' defense recorded a season-high six sacks while holding Oakland's rushing attack to just one yard per carry. Linebacker Junior Seau had nine tackles, one sack and one forced tumble, while Raylee Johnson led the defense with two sacks. Marco Coleman, William Fuller and John Parrella each added sacks.

## GAME 7 Kansas City 31, San Diego 3 (Thursday, Oct. 16)



The Chargers dropped to 3-4 with a 31-3 loss at Kansas City in front of a nationally-televised TNT Thursday Night Football audience. San Diego was outgained in total yards, 313 to 258, and suffered a team-record 19 penalties for 146 yards in losses. Two San Diego interceptions also led to 10 Chiefs' points. The Chargers completed just 14 of 43 pass attempts. The loss dropped San Diego's record in games coming off a bye week to 4-5 and it's record in games played on Thursday night to 1-4. Kansas City jumped out to a 7-0 first-quarter lead on a one-yard run by quarterback Elvis Grbac. Matters got worse for the Chargers on the ensuing drive when quarterback Stan Humphries left the game with a mild concussion. The Chiefs extended their lead to 24-0 by halftime when wide receiver Andre Rison caught touchdown passes from 0 and five yards out. Kansas City added a Pete Stoyanovich field goal in the second quarter. San Diego got its lone score of the night in the third quarter on a 26-yard Greg Davis field goal. Chiefs' running back Marcus Allen (inished out the scoring with a six-yard run in the fourth quarter to make the final, 31-3. ## GAME 8 San Diego 35, Indianapolis 19 (Sunday, Oct. 26)



The Chargers reached the halt-way point of the 1997 season with a record of 4-4 after defeating the Indianapolis Colts, 35-19. San Diego's offense gained 424 total yards, including 202 yards rushing. San Diego led at haltime after four **Greg Davis** field goals from 45, 35, 34 and 31 yards. The Chargers added to their lead in the third quarter when they marched 67 yards in 11 plays, capped off by a one-yard run by running back **Gary Brown**. Brown set up the score when he broke a third-and-one play 31 yards before being hauled down at the Colts' two-yard line. After his score, the Colts took their ensuing possession and marched 73 yards in four plays, culminated by a 36-yard touchdown pass. But San Diego's offense came storming back on its next drive, traveling 76 yards on nine plays before quarterback **Stan Humphries** hit tight end **Frank Hartley** with a two-yard touchdown pass. ## GAME 9 Cincinnati 38, San Diego 31 (Sunday, Nov. 2)



The Chargers dropped to 4-5 with a 38-31 loss at Cincinnati, Three turnovers which led to 21 Bengals' points late in the second quarter and the loss of quarterback Stan Humphries with a concussion proved to be too much for the Bolts to overcome. The Chargers led 14-10 near the end of the first half on the strength of a one-yard run by Gary Brown in the first period and a 85-yard punt return for a score by Eric Metcalf In the second quarter, But with just a little more than two minutes remaining in the half, disaster struck, First, Bengals' cornerback Corey Sawyer intercepted a Humphries' pass on the 39-yard line and returned it to the Chargers' two. A two-vard touchdown run put the Bengals up, 17-14. #### GAME 10 Seattle 37, San Diego 31 (Sunday, Nov. 9)



The Chargers lost, 37-31, to the visiting Seattle Seahawks in front of a team home-record 64,616 fans. Quarterback Craig Whelihan got his first NFL start for the Chargers and completed 17 of 29 passes for 206 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. Both touchdowns went to Tony Martin, who caught five passes for 100 yards. The Chargers opened the scoring when safety Greg Jackson returned a fumbled punt 41 yards for a score following San Diego's opening offensive possession. Martin increased the lead to 14-0 when he and Whelihan hooked up on a 10-yard touchdown, A Seattle field goal made the score, 14-3, before kicker Greg Davis gave the Bolts a 17-3 lead with a 33-yard field goal. But Seattle quarterback Warren Moon began to work his magic, first connecting with Joey Galloway with a 33-yard touchdown pass which made the halftime score, 17-10. Moon opened the second-half scoring by orchestrating a 13-play. 61-yard drive which was culminated by a one-yard Chris Warren touchdown plunge. Seattle took a 24-17 lead when defensive end Michael Sinclair fell on a Whelihan fumble in the endzone. Rookie cornerback Paul Bradford kept the Chargers alive when he intercepted a Moon pass and raced 56 yards for his first career touchdown to knot the score, 24-24. Whelihan and Martin electrified the San Diego crowd, this time on a 61-yard scoring bomb to give San Diego a 31-24 lead in the fourth quarter. But two Seattle field goals and a 40-yard scoring toss from Moon to Galloway doorned the Chargers, 37-31.

## GAME 13 Denver 38, San Diego 28 (Sunday, Nov. 30)



The Chargers dropped to 4-9 with their fifth-consecutive loss, a 38-28 defeat at the hands of the AFC West leading Denver Broncos in San Diego. Denver improved its record to 11-2 with the win. The Broncos jumped out to a 28-7 halftime lead on the strength of two touchdown catches, one run and an interception return for a score off a Craig Whelihan pass with 1:01 left in the half. Whelihan and Tony Martin supplied the Chargers' only first-half score when they combined on a four-yard touchdown pass. Denver outgained the Chargers in the half in total yards, 249 yards to 84, including 120 yards rushing to San Diego's 20. Eric Metcalf did his best to get the Chargers back into the game with an 83-yard punt return for a touchdown in the third quarter, but Denver came right back with a touchdown drive of its own to increase the lead to 35-14. The Chargers went on a 25-play, 98-yard drive in the fourth quarter which culminated with a one-yard run by Gary Brown to make the score, 35-21. Denver added a 32-yard field goal in the fourth quarter and the Chargers added a Whelihan-to-Metcalf touchdown pass to make the final score, 38-28. Denver outgained the Chargers in total yards, 438 to 269, and in rushing yards, 198 to 47. Metcalf became the first person in NFL history to return nine career punts for touchdowns, and he increased his total of kicks and punt returns for scores to 11, also an NFL record. He also became the first player in Chargers' history to return three punts for touchdowns in the same season.

The Chargers dropped to 4-11 with their seventh consecutive loss, a 22-7 defeat at the hands of the Kansas City Chiefs. San Diego native Marcus Allen opened the scoring on the Chiefs' second possession. with a one-yard run. The Chargers tied the score in the second quarter when Craig Whelihan connected with Eric Metcalf for a 14-yard touchdown pass. Kansas City led at the half, 14-7, on the strength of a 21yard touchdown pass from Rich Gannon to Lake Dawson. The Chargers were penalized seven times for 85 yards in losses and the Chiefs gained 77 yards rushing on 12 carries (6.4 avg.) in the first half. The Chiefs got the ball first in the second half and increased their lead to 17-7 with a 40-yard field goal by Pete Stoyanovich. Kansas City increased its lead to 19-7 with a safety on a sack of quarterback Todd Philcox. in the end zone. 1998 Important Dates

- July 15 Signing period ends at 1 p.m. (PT) for Unrestricted Free Agents to whom June 1 tender was made by Old Club, Transition Players, and Franchise Players who are eligible to receiver Offer Sheets. After this date and through 1 p.m. on Nov. 4, Old Club has exclusive negotiating rights to players.
- Aug. 7 If a drafted rookle has not signed with his club by this date, he may not be traded to any other club in 1998.
- Aug. 25 Roster cutdown to maximum of 60 players on Active List by 1 p.m. (PT). Exemptions to NFL Europe League players expire.
- Aug. 30 Roster cutdown to maximum of 53 players on Active/Inactive List by 1 p.m. (PT). Remainder of NFL Europe League exemptions expire. Clubs may dress a minimum of 42 and maximum of 45 players and third quarterback for each game.
- Aug. 31 Beginning at 1 p.m. (PT), clubs may establish a Practice Squad of five players by signing free agents who do not have an accrued season of free-agency credit or who were on the Active/Inactive List for less than nine regular season games during their only Accrued Season. A player cannot participate on the Practice Squad for more than two seasons.
- Sept. 4 All clubs are required to identify their 49-player Active List by 4 p.m. (PT) on this Friday and thereafter on each Friday before a regular-season game (or at 4 p.m. (PT) two days prior to non-Sunday games). No later than one bour and 15 minutes prior to kickoff, clubs must identify their 45-player Active List and Third Quarterback, if any.
- Sept. 6-7 Regular-season opens.
- Sept. 22 Priority on multiple waiver claims is now based on 1998 standings.
- Oct. 13 All trading ends at 1 p.m. (PT).
- Oct. 14 Players with at least four previous pension credits are subject to the waiver system for the remainder of regular season and postseason.
- Nov. 10 Deadline for clubs to sign by 1 p.m. (PT) their Unrestricted Free Agents, Restricted Free Agents and draft choices to whom June 1 tender was made. If still unsigned after this date, such players are prohibited from playing in NFL in 1998.

July 1-General manager Frank Leahy resigns because of poor health.

July 8-Chargers open training camp at Chapman College, Orange, 30 miles Southeast of Los Angeles.

July 9-Sid Gillman assumes dual role of coach and general manager.

Aug. 6—Paul Lowe returns opening kickoff 105 yards for a touchdown as Chargers defeat New York Titans 27-7 before 27,778 persons in Los Angeles Coliseum in lirst preseason game.

Sept. 10-The Chargers overcome 20-7 deficit in fourth quarter to defeat Dallas 21-20 before 17,724 persons in Coliseum in opening league game.

Dec. 10—A crowd of 9,928 persons in Coliseum watches Chargers top Denver 41-33 to clinch AFL Western Division title.

Dec. 23-Hilton says he will accept invitation to visit San Diego regarding a possible move of Chargers from Los Angeles.

#### 1961

Jan. 1-A crowd of 32,183 in Jeppesen Stadium and a national television audience sees host Houston defeat Chargers 24-16 for AFL championship.

Jan. 6-Civic leaders form Greater San Diego Sports Association to attract major-league sports following Hilton's visit.

Feb. 10-AFL gives Hilton formal approval to move Chargers to San Diego.

May 1—Construction begins on enlarging Balboa Stadium, where the San Diego Chargers will play home games, from 23,000 to 34,000 by building an upper deck.

July 22-The Chargers open training camp at University of San Diego.

Aug. 6—Balboa Stadium is reminiscent of ancient Roman ruins as Chargers defeat Houston 27-14 on a 93-degree afternoon before paid crowd of 12,304 persons (total attendance estimated at 15,000) in first preseason game.

Nov. 19—Chargers defeat Dallas 24-14 to clinch AFL West title with 5 games remaining; Charlie McNeil makes club's forty-third pass interception, a professional record.

Dec.17—The Chargers lose to Boston 41-0 in Balboa Stadium but Dick Harris intercepts Babe Parilli's pass to Gino Cappelletti for Chargers' forty-ninth of season.

Dec. 24—Houston defeats Chargers 10-3 before 29,556 persons in Balboa Stadium to win second AFL championship.

#### 1962

Jan. 7-West defeats East 47-27 in Balboa Stadium in first AFL All-Star game, featuring Chargers coaches and 11 players.

July 16-Chargers open training camp at USD.

Dec. 16-A 26-17 loss to Dallas marks the end of a 4-10 season for the Chargers, who saw 23 players miss at least 2 games with injuries.

#### 1963

Jan. 13—Chargers Earl Faison is named outstanding defensive player as West defeats East 21-14 in AFL All-Star game before 27,641 persons in Balboa Stadium.
April 30—Barron Hilton and his father, Conrad, sell one-third of their interest in the Chargers to San

Diego businessmen John Mabee, George Pernicano, Kenneth Swanson, James Copley, and M.L. Bengston of Los Angeles.

July 10-The Chargers open their training camp at Rough Acres Ranch, located near Boulevard, a hamlet of 100 persons in the mountains of East San Diego County, 60 miles from the city.

Dec. 22-Eight Chargers score and Paul Lowe rushes for 183 yards and two touchdowns on 17 carries as the Chargers clinch AFL West title with 58-20 victory over Denver; season ended week later than scheduled after AFL postponed games weekend following Nov. 22 assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Jan. 5-Keith Lincoln accounts for 349 yards total offense as Chargers win AFL championship, defeating Boston 51-10, before 30,127 persons in Balboa Stadium.

Jan. 19-Lincoln is named MVP after gaining 121 yards in 14 carries as West defeats East 27-14 in front of 20,016 persons in AFL All-Star game in Balboa Stadium.

Jan. 29-AFL teams sign a five-year television contract with National Broadcasting Company for a record \$36 million; the contract will commence with the 1965 season.

July 15-The Chargers open training camp at the TraveLodge in Escondido.

Oct. 3-The Chargers and New York Jets fied 17-17 before a record AFL crowd of 50,222 persons. 46,828 paid in New York's Shea Stadium.

Nov. 26-A Balboa Stadium attendance record of 34,865 is set as Bulfalo defeats San Diego 27-24 on Thanksgiving Day.

Dec. 6-The Chargers defeat the Jets 38-3 before 25,753 persons in Balboa Stadium to clinch their fourth AFL West title in five years.

Dec. 26-With wide receiver Lance Alworth out of the game with a knee injury and fullback Keith Lincoln sidelined in the first quarter with a fractured rib, the Chargers are beaten 20-7 in Buffalo for the AFL championship.

#### 1965

Jan. 16-Fullback Keith Lincoln runs 80 yards for one touchdown and combines on a 73-yard pass play for a touchdown as the West defeats the East 38-14 in the AFL All-Star game before 15,446 persons at Houston's Jeppesen Stadium. The game, originally moved from San Diego to New Orleans, was switched to Houston on one day's notice after black players experienced mistreatment in New Orleans.

April 27-The San Diego City Council endorses construction of a multipurpose stadium in Mission Valley and drops idea of a floating stadium in Mission Bay.

May 17-The City Council approves expenditure of \$750,000 for architectural and engineering drawings of a 50,000-seat stadium at the Southwest corner of Friars Road and Murphy Canyon Road in Mission Valley.

July 14-The Chargers open their Escondido training camp.

Nov. 2-Construction of a \$27 million San Diego Stadium is authorized by a 73 percent "yes" vote by San Diego citizens.

Dec. 12-San Diego wins fifth AFL West title in six years by defeating Houston 37-26.

Dec. 23-Paul Lowe and Lance Alworth finish 1-2 in balloting by players for AFL player of the year.

Dec. 24-Groundbreaking ceremonies are conducted for San Diego Stadium.

Dec. 26-Buffalo defeats the Chargers 23-0 in front of 30,361 persons in Balboa Stadium for the AFL championship; a new automobile, the "Charger," is introduced by Chrysler officials at halftime.

#### 1966

Jan. 15-The AFL All-Stars beat the Buffalo Bills, 30-19, as Lance Alworth catches two touchdown passes and Chargers' linebacker Frank Buncom is defensive player of the game before a crowd of 35,572 persons in Houston's Rice Stadium.

Jan. 18-Tight end Dave Kocourek, guard Ernest Park, and defensive backs Dick Westmoreland and Jimmy Warren are selected from San Diego by Miami in the allocation draft to stock the new AFL franchise during league meeting in Houston.

June 8-AFL and National Football League teams announce plans to merge in the 1970 season and Chargers and Los Angeles Rams announce they will play three preseason games in San Diego Stadium, beginning in 1967.

July 8-The Chargers report to training camp in Escondido.

Aug. 25-Eugene V. Klein of Beverly Hills heads a group of 21 business executives who purchase the Chargers for \$10 million, a record transaction in professional football.

#### 1967

July 10-The Chargers report to their Escondido training camp.

Aug. 20-San Diego Stadium is dedicated before a crowd of 45,988; Detroit defeats the Chargers 38-17 in San Diego's first meeting with an NFL team.

record San Diego Stadium crowd of 54,042 persons.

Nov. 14—Offensive backfield coach Charlie Waller is named head coach following the resignation of Sid Gillman, who is suffering from stomach ulcer and chest hernia. Gillman continues as general manager.

Dec. 14—Lance Alworth sets a professional record with a pass reception in his ninety-sixth consecutive game; the Chargers finish with an 8-6 record and a 45-6 victory over Buffalo.

#### 1970

Jan. 17–John Hadl completes 18 of 26 passes for 224 yards and 1 touchdown and leads the West to a 26-3 victory over the East in the final AFL All-Star game before 30,170 persons in the Houston Astrodome.

July 15-The Chargers open training camp at the University of California at Irvine.

Sept. 27–Smoke and ashes from a huge fire in San Diego's East County darken the skies over San Diego Stadium as John Hadl hurls touchdown of 65 yards to Jeff Queen and 37 yards to Lance Alworth in the final 5:18 of play, giving the Chargers a 27-27 tie with Oakland.

Dec. 30-Sid Gillman returns as head coach and Charlie Waller becomes offense coach in staff regranization announced by President Gene Klein.

#### 1971

Feb. 13-Harland Svare named general manager.

May 19—The Chargers trade wide receiver Lance Alworth to Dallas for tight end Pettis Norman, tackle Tony Liscio, and defensive tackle Ron East.

July 10-Summer training camp opens at UC Irvine.

Nov. 15—Dennis Partee's 45-yard field goal at the gun lifts the Chargers to a 20-17, Monday Night victory over St, Louis.

Nov. 22-After a 34-33 loss at Oakland, leaving San Diego with a 4-6 record, coach Sid Gillman

resigns and is replaced on an interim basis by GM Harland Svare.

Dec. 19–Svare is named head coach in a locker room press conference following a season-ending, 49-33 loss at Houston.

#### 1972

Jan. 18—John Hadl is named National Football League "Man of the Year" in balloting for top citizenathlete of 1971; a \$25,000 scholarship fund in Hadl's name will benefit San Diego students.

March 28-Former Chargers' great Lance Alworth is inducted into San Diego Hall of Fame at the Balboa Park Hall of Champions.

July 12-The Chargers report to their Irvine training camp.

Sept. 5-The Chargers trade defensive tackle George Wright to Cleveland for a 1973 fifth-round draft choice, climaxing a 221-day period in which general manager-coach Harland Svare consumates 21 trades, an NFL record.

Dec. 3—The Chargers outgain Oakland 440 yards to 298 and Mike Garrett rushes for 145 yards in 28 carries but lose 21-19 before a record San Diego Stadium crowd of 54.611.

#### 1973

Jan. 22-The Chargers obtain quarterback immortal John Unitas from Baltimore.

Jan. 25—In the second stage of the Unitas acquisition, the Chargers trade quarterback John Hadl to Los Angeles for defensive end Lander McCoy Bacon and running back Bob Thomas. Sept. 28-The Chargers explode for 27 points in the second quarter and demolish St. Louis 43-24 for a 3-0 start, their best since 1968.

Hilton was one of the founding members of the American Football League in 1959 and brought the Chargers to San Diego in 1961 to become the city's first major league sports franchise.

July 30—The Chargers fell to the Atlanta Falcons, 21-17, in the team's second appearance in the Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio.

Aug. 13-San Diego made its first appearance in an American Bowl game, losing to the N.Y. Giants, 28-20, in Olympic Stadium in Berlin, Germany. The game concluded the longest road trip in team history, playing two games during the 10-day trip.

Jan. 15-The Chargers advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history with a stunning, 17-13 victory over the nine-point-favorite Pittsburgh Steelers in Pittsburgh, Linebacker Dennis Gibson knocked down a Neil O'Donnell pass and stopped the Steelers on downs on the Chargers' three-yard line with 1:04 left in the game. The team returned to San Diego following the game and were greeted by an estimated crowd of 70,000 screaming fans in San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium.

Jan. 29-In Super Bowl XXIX in Miami, Florida, the Chargers suffered a 49-26 loss to the San

Francisco 49ers.

Jan. 30-More than 100,000 San Diegans crowded the streets of downtown San Diego at a post-Super Bowl parade to show support for the Chargers upon their return from Miami.

Feb. 1-Defensive Coordinator Bill Arnsparger retired.

March 6-Chargers' President/Vice Chairman Dean Spanos announced that the team has come to an agreement with the City of San Diego to extend its lease and call San Diego home through the year 2020. As part of the agreement, plans were outlined to permanently expand the seating capacity of San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium to accommodate more than 70,000 fans and modernize the 28-year-old facility.

May 11-Running back Rodney Culver and his wife, Karen, are killed in the crash of ValuJet Flight 592 in the Florida Everglades. Culver is the second player in team history to die while on the active roster after David Griggs was killed in a one-car accident in Davie, Florida, eleven months earlier.

July 12-The Chargers open training camp at UCSD for the 20th consecutive season.

July 27—The Chargers defeat the Pittsburgh Steelers, 20-10, in Tokyo, Japan, in the American Bowl preseason opener. It marks the Chargers' second American Bowl appearance and second trip to Japan. The team played in Japan in 1976.

Sept. 8-Minority owner George Pernicano is inducted into the Chargers' Hall of Fame at

halftime of the Chargers-Bengals game. San Diego won the game, 27-14.

Nov. 2—Owner Alex Spanos is the recipient of the Gloria Swanson Humanitarian Award at the American Cinema Awards' 11th Annual All-Star Gala in Beverly Hills. The Award is given to the individual who contributes beyond all others to those who are less fortunate around the United States and the world. Jan. 3 - Head Coach Bobby Ross resigns and the coaching staff is released.

Jan. 10 - Owner Alex Spanos gives a generous donation of \$1 million to the American Red Cross to help flood victims in Northern California.

Jan. 19 - San Diego Chargers' General Manager Bobby Beathard names former Jacksonville Jaquars Offensive Coordinator Kevin Gilbride the tenth head coach in team history.



# **CHARGERS ON KFMB**

This past offseason, the San Diego Chargers and KFMB formed a new community partnership through 1999. Starting in 1998, all of the Chargers' preseason, regular season and postseason games will be broadcast on Star 100.7 FM, with 760 KFMB AM simulcasting most games as well, while all of the team's preseason games will be televised by KFMB-TV, Channel 8. KFMB-TV also is the home of the Chargers' regular-season games because CBS Sports purchased the rights to televise the NFL's American Football Conference games beginning in 1998 and extending through 2005.

KFMB-TV Sports Director Ted Leitner will handle the play-by-play on the Chargers' radio broadcasts. Former Chargers' player and coach and current Channel 8 sportscaster Hank Bauer will handle color commentary. Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Fouts, the leading passer in team history, and Stan Humphries, the only quarterback to lead the Chargers to an AFC Championship, will team up on the team's four preseason television broadcasts, with Fouts handling play-by-play and Humphries providing analysis. In addition to the preseason telecasts, KFMB-TV will produce offseason programming to promote the Chargers, the players

and the team's extensive community activities.







He set a single-season record with 52 tackles in 1982, the year he was named Team Captain. He also scored 21 touchdowns in his career. In 1983, a broken neck forced Hank off the field. After coaching for the Chargers for four years, he made his move to broadcasting and eventually became a sports reporter at News 8 in 1987. In addition to his TV sportscasts, Bauer hosts a top rated "Sports Talk" show on 760 KFMB-AM weeknights from 4 to 7 pm.
