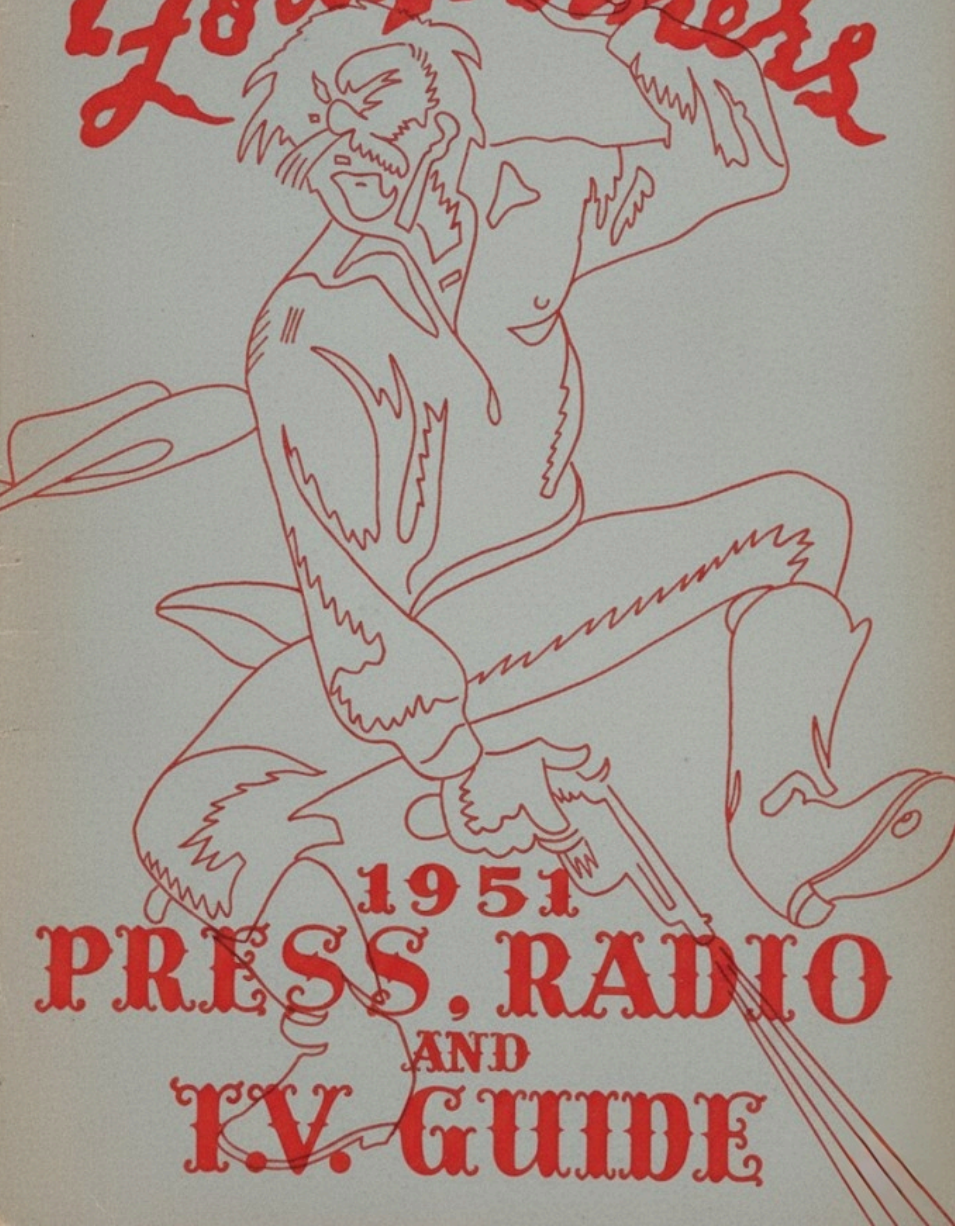

FORTY NINER OWNERS

ANTHONY J. (TONY) MORABITO

Co-Owner

VICTOR P. (VIC) MORABITO

Co-Owner

A dynamic gentleman of 41 summers, Tony Morabito has had a burning determination to own the best football team in the country ever since he played halfback for San Francisco's St. Ignatius High School in the mid-1920's.

Tony's own football career was cut short by a shoulder injury during his freshman year at the University of Santa Clara. But even then the 49er gridiron fortunes were being welded for it was at Santa Clara that Tony met Lawrence T. (Buck) Shaw.

After his graduation in 1931, Tony went into the lumber carrier business and helped develop a concern that became one of the West's largest in this field before World War II. During these years he began actively to plan for a San Francisco franchise in the National Football League.

Numerous disappointments and rebuffs followed until the All-America Football Conference was formed early in 1946. The 49ers and Cleveland Browns became the strongest clubs on the field and at the box office during the four seasons the AAC operated.

Tony's hour of triumph came in December of 1949 when the AAC and NFL merged. The 49ers, averaging 40,000 paid admissions during the '49 season, appeared to have a bright future in the merged league.

The blow fell quickly—the 49ers lost four out of five of their 1950 exhibition games, then won only three of 12 contests during the league campaign. Attendance in San Francisco, however, backed by a substantial season ticket sale, hit a surprisingly high average of 30,000 per game despite the many losses.

Since Dec. 10, 1950, when the 49ers flashed their old-time power to whip the Green Bay Packers, 30 to 14, Tony has worked night and day to assure the loyal San Francisco fans of a winner in 1951.

He and Mrs. Morabito reside in San Mateo, a close-by suburb of San Francisco, with their daughters, Grace and Josephine Ann.

Vic Morabito, eight years younger than Tony, also played prep football at St. Ignatius in San Francisco and then spent his freshman year at Santa Clara scrimmaging against Buck Shaw's second Sugar Bowl varsity.

Vic then transferred to the University of California where he won a monogram as a halfback on the reserve or "Rambler" team. Graduating in 1941, he joined his father in a ships' outfitting service on the San Francisco waterfront.

Vic sold that business last year in order to take an active part in the management of the 49ers. He resides in San Francisco with his wife and young son, "Rickey."

FORTY NINER COACHES

Lawrence T. "Buck" Shaw

HEAD COACH

There is no more determined man in football this year than Lawrence Timothy (Buck) Shaw, handsome, silvery-haired coach of the San Francisco 49ers.



During the four years the 49ers were in the All-America Conference, Shaw could take pride in an overall record of 38 victories against only 14 defeats and two ties. But in 1950—their first National Football League campaign—the 49ers suffered nine losses in league play and managed to win only three games. This was on top of a miserable exhibition record of four defeats in five outings.

When 49er veterans reported to their training camp at Menlo College, Menlo Park, Calif., they found that Shaw had a glint in his eye that spelled plenty of hard work. Practice started a full two weeks earlier than in 1950 and contact drills were the rule rather than the exception.

Football experts who know that Shaw is one of the game's master strategists are confident that he'll prove the '50 season was just one of

those pitfalls that every top coach falls into at some time during his career.

Buck learned his football from the immortal Knute Rockne, performing at tackle on the Fighting Irish varsities of 1919-20-21. After coaching at North Carolina State and the University of Nevada, he went to Santa Clara in 1929 as chief assistant to Maurice (Clipper) Smith.

When Smith went to Villanova at the end of the 1935 season, Buck stepped into the No. 1 job for the Broncos and compiled a brilliant record. His 1936-1942 Santa Clara teams rang up 47 victories against 10 losses and four ties. The 1936-37 teams came through with great Sugar Bowl victories over Louisiana State.

Wartime conditions forced Santa Clara to abandon football after the '42 season. Buck stayed on to assist in the physical training program for military students. In 1945, while plans for the professional debut of the 49ers were underway, Buck agreed to take over at the University of California for one season. His Golden Bears, unmanned at most positions, managed to win four while losing five and tying one.

Of his 1951 team, Buck, in characteristic fashion, has only this cryptic statement:

"We'll be bigger, faster and tougher. Beyond that, a lot of victories or defeats will depend on which way the ball bounces."

Buck and Mrs. Shaw reside at Atherton, Calif., 30 miles south of San Francisco. They have two married daughters.

James Wilmer "Jim" Lawson

ASSISTANT COACH

Whenever the subject of "Old Pros" is brought up, the name of Jim Lawson can't be overlooked. In the mid-1920's, Jim played for the Jacksonville, Fla., team in the American Football League and later barnstormed with Red Grange's New York Yankees.

Jim first won football fame at Stanford during the great Ernie Nevers' era of 1922-23-24. On Jan. 1, 1925, Jim wound up his collegiate career by playing a slashing end game against Notre Dame in the Rose Bowl.

In 1932, Jim became an assistant coach at Stanford, serving under Claude (Tiny) Thornhill and Clark Shaughnessy. When Shaughnessy left after the 1941 season, Jim was named head coach. But when World War II started, Jim got into a Navy officer's uniform as soon as possible. He was stationed at St. Mary's Pre-Flight School, then saw action in the Western Pacific aboard the USS West Virginia.

When Buck Shaw took over the 49ers in 1946, he immediately selected Jim as an assistant. The Shaw-Lawson combination, except for 1950, has been eminently successful.

Jim and Mrs. Lawson live in Palo Alto, Calif., where he operates a cleaning plant in the off-season. They have two grown sons.

John Phillip "Phil" Bengtson

ASSISTANT COACH

A native of St. Paul, Minn., Phil Bengtson reached the collegiate gridiron heights at the University of Minnesota in 1933-34 when he was named an All-American tackle. From 1935 through 1939 he was an assistant coach at Missouri. In the spring of 1940 Phil came west with Clark Shaughnessy and turned out a fine line that helped Stanford go through undefeated and then whip Nebraska in the Rose Bowl.

After the 1941 season, Phil went into the Navy and was stationed at Iowa Pre-Flight School. Later he served on aircraft carriers in the Pacific and was discharged in 1945 as a lieutenant commander.

Phil returned to Stanford in 1946 and was chief aide to Marchy Schwartz until Buck Shaw gained his services last January. Phil and Mrs. Bengtson live in Menlo Park, Calif., with their four children—Jay 8; Bobbie, 5; Betty, 3; and Brian, 1.

ALBERT, Frank—Quarterback Ht. 5'10" Wt. 170 Stanford

Received one of his highest compliments from Coach Bo McMillin of the Philadelphia Eagles who called him "football's most colorful player." . . . pro coaches say Frank is the best ball-handler among T-formation quarterbacks . . . brilliant field general and always dangerous as a runner when he shoots out of his protective passing cup . . . native of Glendale, Calif. . . All-America quarterback at Stanford in 1940 when he led the famed "Cinderella" team to an undefeated season and a Rose Bowl win over Nebraska . . . saw combat action in World War II as a Navy carrier flight deck officer . . . joined the 49ers when they were organized in 1946 and has been a great pro star for five seasons . . . shared the All-America Conference's "Most Valuable Player" award with Otto Graham in 1948 . . . second in total offense during the four AAC seasons with 6,948 yards passing and 767 running . . . voted Sport Magazine's "Pro Player of 1948" . . . despite 49ers' rough season in 1950, Frank continued his brilliant play . . . completed 155 of 306 passes for 1,767 yards and 14 touchdowns . . . has his own TV show in San Francisco . . . has been an assistant coach at spring practices at Stanford and the U. S. Naval Academy . . . his biggest thrill in pro football came in 1949 when the 49ers whipped the Cleveland Browns, 56 to 28 . . . resides in Palo Alto, Calif., with his wife, Marty, and two daughters—Nancy, 8, and Jane, 5 . . .

***ARENAS, Joe—Halfback Ht. 5'11" Wt. 185 Omaha U.**

Starred in football, basketball and track at Omaha . . . 10 flat sprinter and exceptional open field runner . . . 49ers picked him eighth in NFL draft, rating him the top "sleeper" among the 1950 college crop . . . wounded in action with the Marines at Iwo Jima in 1945 . . . his life was saved by a buddy who carried him through enemy fire to an aid station . . .

BANDUCCI, Bruno—Guard Ht. 5'11" Wt. 220 Stanford

Another "original" 49er, joining club when it was organized in 1946 after playing for the Philadelphia Eagles . . . star sophomore tackle on Stanford's unbeaten 1940 team, shifted to guard by Buck Shaw . . . named on All-America Conference's All-League team in 1946 . . . hampered by injuries last season . . . scored a touchdown against the Chicago Bears on a lateral . . . lives in San Carlos, Calif., with his wife, Norma, and two sons—Russell, 7, and Douglas, 4 . . . car salesman during off-season . . .

BEALS, Al—End **Ht. 6'0"** **Wt. 190** **Santa Clara**

Sidelined much of 1950 with injuries, Al caught 22 passes for 315 yards and three touchdowns . . . was all-time scoring leader for the four years of the All-America Conference with 278 points . . . shifty as a halfback in an open field . . . played for Buck Shaw at Santa Clara in 1940-41-42 . . . All-Pacific Coast honors and All-America mention . . . captain in field artillery during the war, serving 23 months in Europe . . . parts salesman for San Francisco auto concern during off-season . . . lives in Redwood City, Calif., with wife, Betty, and daughter . . .

***BERRY, Rex—Halfback** **Ht. 5'11"** **Wt. 181** **Brig. Young U.**

Attended Carbon High School, Price, Utah, and won letters in football, basketball, baseball and track . . . All-State in football 1942 . . . enrolled at Carbon Junior College and was named to the All-Conference teams in both football and basketball . . . competed in football and track at Brigham Young, gaining All-Mountain States Conference recognition in both sports . . . served more than three years in Navy . . . biggest thrill was pitching his American Legion team to the Utah championship in 1940 . . . plans to go into coaching . . .

BROWN, Hardy—Fullback **Ht. 6'0"** **Wt. 196** **Tulsa U.**

Drafted by 49ers from defunct Baltimore Colts' list of players . . . previously saw action with the Chicago Hornets . . . native of Childress, Tex., played football, baseball and ran the 440 and low hurdles on the track team . . . enrolled at Southern Methodist in 1941, then went into the Marine Corps for 34 months . . . was a paratrooper in the Pacific and says his biggest thrill was his first parachute jump . . . despite his size, he's recognized as one of the NFL's toughest linebackers . . . plans coaching career after pro ball . . . resides in Tulsa with wife, Betty, and daughter, Donna Lee, 7 . . .

BRUCE, Gail—End **Ht. 6'1"** **Wt. 210** **U. of Washington**

Used mainly on defense, Gail joined 49ers in 1948 after earning All-Pacific Coast award at Washington . . . served three years in Marine Corps . . . scored a touchdown for the West in the 1948 Shrine East-West classic . . . has assisted spring practice at San Jose State and during season writes technical football articles for Palo Alto, Calif., "Times" . . . lives in Palo Alto with wife, Patricia Ann, and Stephen, 2, Robin Elizabeth, infant . . . contractor during off-season . . .

BURKE, Don—Guard Ht. 6'0" Wt. 235 So. California

"Boom-Boom" played fullback in his rookie debut last year and performed well as a linebacker . . . fast despite his size . . . coaches shifted him to offensive guard and he should be on the starting eleven . . . native of Chico, Calif., attended high school in Oakland where he was an All-City halfback and a sprinter on the track team . . . spent two years in the Navy, serving in the Pacific most of the time . . . attended Salinas, Calif., Junior College for two years, then transferred to USC where he helped the Trojans tie a heavily-favored Notre Dame team, 14-14, in 1949 . . . hobbies are skiing and golf . . . father is a doctor . . . plans to coach . . . lives in Berkeley, Calif. . . .

***CARAPPELLA, Al—Tackle Ht. 6'0" Wt. 235 Miami (Fla.)**

Named on Associated Press All-America in 1950 as Miami drove to an Orange Bowl bid . . . every team that faced him named Al on its All-Opponents' squad . . . also a catcher and outfielder on the baseball varsity. Miami named him "Outstanding Lineman of 1950" . . . hails from Tuckahoe, N. Y., where he played football, basketball and baseball for Tuckahoe High . . . served 17 months in Army . . . stationed in Europe where he played on the 1946 Berlin Bears team . . . likes hunting and fishing . . . plans business or coaching career . . .

CASON, Jim—Halfback Ht. 6'0" Wt. 168 Louisiana State

"Old Aches and Pains" had all kinds of miseries in 1950, including a leg infection that sidelined him for the last five games . . . up to that time he'd been among the NFL's top pass receivers . . . snagged 30 passes for 374 yards and three touchdowns . . . brilliant defensive back and excellent on punt and kickoff returns . . . became a 49er in 1948 and was the rookie sensation of the year . . . plays golf and tennis . . . resides in Harlingen, Tex., with wife, Betty . . . sporting goods salesman . . .

COLLINS, Ray—Tackle Ht. 6'0" Wt. 230 Louisiana State

Pound for pound, according to 49er coaches, "Socks" was the best rookie tackle in the NFL last season . . . aggressive, agile and tough . . . plays just as hard in practice as he does in a game . . . says his biggest thrills are "making the team and winning games" . . . named LSU's "Athlete of the Year" in 1949 . . . on third All-America team . . . served in Army Air Forces . . . home is in Tomball, Tex. . . . plans to become a veterinarian and has been taking graduate work at LSU during the off-season . . .

***DOWNS, Bob—Guard Ht. 5'10" Wt. 210 So. California**

One of the surprises of training camp . . . signed by 49ers as a free agent . . . attended Alhambra, Calif., High School and won All-League honors in 1944 . . . spent two years in the Navy . . . played for San Diego Navy team that walloped USC, 33 to 6, in 1945 to break a 16-game Trojan winning streak . . . favorite athletic hero is Red Grange . . . plans to coach . . . lives in San Gabriel, Calif. . . .

***FASKE, Jerry—Halfback Ht. 5'9" Wt. 185 Iowa**

A native of Brooklyn, Jerry attended Boys High School and was named to the All-America Prep team in 1946 . . . also selected New York city's outstanding high school player . . . enrolled at Iowa and was picked on the second All-Big 10 squad in 1949 . . . In 1950 had 5.4 yard average on 86 carries . . . greatest performance was against USC when he rolled up 124 yards on 14 tries and threw a 55-yard touchdown pass . . . biggest thrill was when Iowa came from behind in '49 to defeat Oregon, 34-31 . . . still resides in Brooklyn where his father is a physician . . . athletic hero is Joe DiMaggio . . .

***FEHER, Nick—Guard Ht. 6'0" Wt. 220 Georgia**

Followed in Frank Sinkwich's footsteps from Youngstown, O., to Georgia . . . played football and baseball at North High in Youngstown . . . served two years in the Marines . . . played guard and tackle for four varsity seasons at Georgia and also was on the wrestling team . . . played in '49 Orange Bowl game . . . biggest thrill was holding Charlie Justice and North Carolina for four downs on the Georgia one-foot line in 1948 . . . hobbies are hunting and fishing . . . plans to coach . . . one of the best rookie guards ever bagged by the 49ers . . .

***FORBES, Dick—End Ht. 6'2" Wt. 215 St. Ambrose**

Seventh draft choice of 49ers who received glowing reports on his talents as a linebacker . . . also a good defensive end . . . attended St. Philip High School in Chicago . . . participated in football, baseball, basketball and boxing . . . All-City in 1944 as a fullback and quarterback . . . enrolled at St. Ambrose (Davenport, Ia.) . . . played center and end . . . honorable mention Little All-America 1949 . . . All-Midlands Conference 1949-50, second team Little All-America . . . served 23 months in Army, saw action in the Philippines . . . played one season for 86th Division team . . . likes to sing . . . plans to coach or open a business of his own . . .

GRGICH, Visco—Guard Ht. 5'11" Wt. 220 Santa Clara

A 49er since operations began in 1946 . . . All-City halfback at West Seattle High School . . . freshman fullback at Santa Clara in 1942 . . . served in Army Air Forces . . . played for 2nd Air Force and 4th Air Force and was shifted to the line . . . named on All-League team of All-America Conference in 1949 . . . played for National Conference All-Stars in Pro Bowl last January . . . fine team man . . . completing work for master's degree at University of Washington . . . resides in Seattle with wife, Sue, and son, Stephan, 2 . . . biggest thrill was 40-yard pass interception return against Los Angeles Rams . . .

HENKE, Ed—Tackle Ht. 6'4" Wt. 220 So. California

Played for Los Angeles Dons in 1949 and was with 49ers in training camp last year . . . spent most of '50 season in the Canadian League with Winnipeg . . . asked for another shot at 49er job . . . versatile lineman, playing tackle, guard or defensive end . . . attended Ventura, Calif., High School and won letters in football, basketball and track . . . All-Pacific Coast mention as a tackle at USC in 1948—plans to coach . . .

JESSUP, Bill—End Ht. 6'1" Wt. 190 So. California

Attended Long Beach Polytechnic High, earning letters in football, basketball and track . . . one year at Long Beach City College before transferring to USC . . . biggest thrill was punting average of 48 yards that helped Trojans upset Notre Dame last year . . . won three varsity football letters . . . played for the West in the East-West Shrine game . . . resides in Buena Park, Calif. . .

JOHNSON, Bill—Center Ht. 6'3" Wt. 220 Texas A & M

With 49ers since 1948 . . . broke wrist in rookie season . . . came back to play brilliant ball last two years . . . product of Tyler, Tex., High School . . . attended Texas A & M, then enlisted in Navy . . . returned to Tyler Junior College and was named to Junior College All-America team in 1947 . . . can play either offense or defense and would like linebacking role most of all . . . lives in Tyler with wife, Dot, and two children—William, 2, and Sherilyn, 1 . . . biggest thrill was playing Cleveland for the last AAC championship in 1949 . . .

LILLYWHITE, Verl—Halfback Ht. 5'10" Wt. 185 So. California

One of the most versatile backs in football . . . can play halfback, fullback or quarterback . . . offense or defense . . . excellent pass defender . . . did part of the 49ers kicking last year and averaged better than 39 yards on 26 attempts . . . won three letters and All-Pacific Coast honors at USC before joining the 49ers in 1948 . . . played in two Rose Bowl games . . . rancher in off-season . . . says "just playing pro football" was his biggest thrill . . .

LIVINGSTON, Howie—Halfback Ht. 6'1" Wt. 195 Full. J. C.

Although he's only 28, this will be Howie's eighth season in the NFL . . . formerly played for New York Giants and Washington Redskins . . . obtained by 49ers in mid-season last year and immediately lived up to his reputation as one of the best pass defenders in the league . . . picked off four passes in seven games, including a 35-yard touchdown return against Los Angeles . . . held the great Don Hutson to 27 yards and took two passes away from him for touchdowns when the Giants won the Eastern division title in 1944 . . . that was his biggest thrill, aside from pole vaulting 13 feet 3 inches at Montebello, Calif., High School . . . served 18 months in Navy . . . resides in Pico, Calif., with wife, Clara, and son, Howard, 2 . . . works as movie stunt man and contractor during off-season . . .

LOYD, Alex—End Ht. 6'3½" Wt. 198 Oklahoma A & M

The 49ers best receiver last year with 32 catches for 402 yards as he enjoyed a great rookie season . . . traded to 49ers by Redskins and became a favorite with San Francisco fans because of his spectacular plays . . . attended high school at Stigler, Okla., then enrolled at Oklahoma A & M and was a reserve halfback on the Aggies' Sugar Bowl team of 1945 . . . interrupted education to serve 16 months in Air Forces . . . returned to A & M and was named on the All-Missouri Valley team in 1949 . . . set the all-time intercollegiate record with 16 pass receptions in a game with Kansas . . . biggest thrill came when he was voted the outstanding player on the field in the 1949 A & M-U. of Oklahoma game . . . has been attending school during the off-season and selling sporting goods . . . resides in Stigler with wife, Jimmie Lee . . .

***MONACHINO, Jim—Halfback Ht. 5'10" Wt. 187 California**

Played three consecutive years in the Rose Bowl with the Golden Bears . . . versatile in the backfield, being used at right half, left half and full-

back . . . led Pacific Coast Conference in scoring in 1949 with 90 points . . . named on the Associated Press, Collier's and Sportscasters' All-America teams . . . also the All-Catholic All-America . . . his 83-yard run against Stanford in 1949 saved the Bears from an upset loss . . . in three varsity seasons carried the ball 284 times for 1,438 yards, averaging five yards plus . . . his coaches said no other back in the country could match Jim in following blockers . . . an excellent blocker himself . . . born in Cleveland but attended Redondo Union High School, Redondo, Calif. . . letters in football and baseball . . . student body president . . . played with College All-Stars in Honolulu last January . . . varsity letter in baseball as third baseman and outfielder . . .

NOMELLINI, Leo—Tackle Ht. 6'3" Wt. 270 Minnesota

Enjoyed great rookie season in NFL last year . . . born in Lucca, Italy, moved to Chicago when he was two years old . . . attended Crane Tech but did not participate in sports . . . played his first football with the Cherry Point, N. C., Marines . . . in combat in Okinawa . . . enrolled at Minnesota in 1946 and won four varsity football letters, two in track and two in wrestling . . . Big 10 mat champion in 1949 . . . fast and agile for his size, wants to play offense as well as defense . . . played for the National Conference team in the Pro Bowl last January . . . national sensation on the heavyweight wrestling circuit . . . his hero is Bronko Nagurski, with whom he often teams in "tag" matches . . . building a home in Palo Alto, Calif., where he'll reside with his wife and infant son, Kim . . .

PERRY, Joe—Fullback Ht. 6'0" Wt. 195 Compton J. C.

Fifth in ground gaining in the NFL last year with 647 yards on 124 carries . . . his 78-yard touchdown run against Green Bay was one of the longest of the season . . . the great Negro back is among the fastest men in the league . . . at Compton J. C. he was timed in :9.5 for the 100-yard dash . . . served two years in the Navy and played for the Alameda, Calif., Naval Air Station team . . . joined 49ers in 1948 . . . was the AAC's individual rushing leader in 1949 with 783 yards on 115 tries . . . resides in San Francisco . . .

POWERS, Jim—Quarterback Ht. 6'0" Wt. 185 So. California

Listed as a quarterback, Jim's main forte is as a defensive back, although he can pass with the best of them . . . Frank Albert was injured in the Detroit game of last year and Jim played the entire second half, completed nine of 20 passes, including a 50-yarder . . . led team in interceptions with five . . .
